### COWBOYS & EAGLES

#### Series Notables:

- \* Dallas has faced no team more than Philadelphia (114 times) and has defeated them more times (64) than all but one team (Washington - 66).
- \* Dallas and Philadelphia have met in one wild card playoff game, two Divisional Playoff Games and an NFC Championship Game.
- \* The Cowboys won 11 consecutive games over the Eagles from 1967-1972, marking the second-longest win streak over one opponent in club history.
- \* Dallas and Philadelphia have combined to win 25 of a possible 45 NFC Eastern Division titles.

#### A Cowboys Win Would:

- \* Improve Dallas' record to 6-1 on the 2016 season - the 11th time in franchise history and first since 2014.
- \* Give the Cowboys their sixth straight win - the longest winning streak during a single season since winning six in a row at the beginning of the 2014 regular season.
- \* Mark the first time Dallas has started the season 0-1 and gone on to win the next six games since 2014.
- \* Notch the Cowboys third straight win at AT&T Stadium - longest streak since the team won three in a row in 2014 (9/28-10/19).
- \* Up Dallas' record to 19-9 after the bye week, 8-2 at home, and improve to 5-1 against Philadelphia after the bye.
- \* Notch Dallas' second straight win on Sunday Night Football in 2016 and serve as the Cowboys 29th win on SNF, most all-time.

## BY THE NUMBERS



**.957** Dallas has scored on 95.7% of their red zone trips in 2016, third in the league, while Philadelphia has only allowed opponents to convert a score on 65% of trips inside the 20, first in the NFL.

**17** The Cowboys have 17 drives of 10-plus plays through six games, (2nd) and their defense is tied for first in the league, allowing zero scoring drives of four-or-less plays, while the Eagles offense is tied for fifth with three touchdown drives of four plays-or-less.

**20** Dallas ranks second with eight rushes of 20-plus yards in 2016 and the Eagles defense is near the bottom of the league (t-27th), allowing six rushes of 20-plus yards on the season.

**27** The Cowboys have scored on their opening possession in five-of-six games and have the third-highest first possession point total (27), while the Eagles have allowed only one first possession score in 2016.



## UPCOMING MILESTONES AND CURRENT NOTES

With the 2016 season underway for the Dallas Cowboys, the following information pertains to the most current notes and page location in the release for the remainder of the information, as well as upcoming milestones:

### 2016 DALLAS COWBOYS CURRENT TEAM & PLAYER HIGHLIGHTS:

- \* The Dallas offense has produced the top ranked rushing attack by averaging 161.2 yards-per-game (**RUSHING TO THE TOP - page 26**).
- \* The Cowboys have 23 big play runs of 10-or-more yards to tie for 7th in the NFL. Dallas also has eight rushes of 20+ yards for second (**BIG PLAY RUNS - page 27**).
- \* The offensive unit leads the NFL with a commanding 33:09 time of possession mark (**OFFICIAL TIMEKEEPERS OF THE NFL - page 27**).
- \* The Cowboys offense boasts 16 drives of five-or-more minutes - 15 for scores, tops in the NFL in 2016. The unit also has had eight drives go five-or-more minutes and result in touchdowns, best in the league (**DRIVE FOR FIVE - page 27**).
- \* The Cowboys have recorded 17 drives of 10-or-more plays to rank second in the NFL (**TEN PLAYS-OR-MORE - page 27**).
- \* The Dallas offense has scored on 29 of its 59 drives for a 49.2% scoring efficiency rate to pace the NFL, while boasting the second-highest touchdown efficiency rate (30.5%) (**FINISHING DRIVES WITH SCORES - page 27**).
- \* Through six games the Cowboys offense leads the NFL with 59 rushing first downs (**FIRST DOWN COWBOYS - page 27**).
- \* Dallas offense is fourth in the league with a 46.6 third down percentage (34-of-73) (**THIRD-AND-NO PROBLEM - page 27**).
- \* The Dallas defense is one-of-two teams (Minnesota) in the NFL to not allow a 100-yard rusher or 100-yard receiver in a single game. It is also the longest such streak since the team had six-straight games to start the 2011 season (**NO HUNDREDS EXCHANGED HERE - page 29**).
- \* The Cowboys defense is one-of-six teams to give up 20-or-more points in only two games to tie for the third-fewest in the league (**STOP AT 17 POINTS - page 29**).
- \* Dak Prescott ranks second in completion percentage (68.7) and fifth in rating (103.9) amongst all NFL quarterbacks (**DAKOTA THE DUDE - page 15**).
- \* Prescott leads the league in third down completion percentage (73.1) and is fifth in rating on third downs (96.6) (**THIRD DOWN IMPRESSIONS - page 16**).
- \* Cole Beasley is tied for fifth in the NFL with 10 first downs on third down ('**BEAS' IN THE TRAP - page 23**).
- \* Ezekiel Elliott leads the NFL in rushing yards (703) (**THE BOOK OF EZEKIEL - page 24**) and rushing first downs (37) while he is third in total first downs (39) (**ROOKIE 1ST DOWN LEADER - page 24**).
- \* Prescott (3) is tied for the most rushing touchdowns by a quarterback in the NFL this season (**RAYNE MAN - page 26**).
- \* David Irving earned NFC Defensive Player of The Week honors following his performance in Week 6 at Green Bay. He is the first Cowboys defensive lineman to earn the award since Leon Lett (Week 5 - 1996) (**NFC DEFENSIVE PLAYER OF THE WEEK - page 29**).

### 2016 DALLAS COWBOYS UPCOMING MILESTONES - INDIVIDUAL:

#### Dan Bailey - K

- \* Dan Bailey (687) needs 13 points to become third player in team history - second kicker (Rafael Septien) - to reach 700 career points.
- \* Bailey (155) needs eight field goals to surpass Septien (162) for the most field goals made in team history.

#### Cole Beasley - WR

- \* Cole Beasley (176) needs seven receptions to pass Walt Garrison (182) for 24th and tie Lance Rentzel (183) for 23rd on the team's all-time receptions list.

#### Dez Bryant - WR

- \* Dez Bryant (5,975) needs 25 yards to become the sixth player in team history to reach 6,000 career yards.

#### Ezekiel Elliott - RB

- \* After rushing for over 130 yards in each of his last four contests, Ezekiel Elliott can become the sixth player in NFL history with five straight 130-yard games by reaching that mark against Philadelphia. It would also mark the first time since Chris Johnson had a streak of five games in 2009 (**ZEKE MONSTER - page 25**).

#### Barry Church - S

- \* Barry Church (499) needs one tackle to reach 500 for his career.

#### Dak Prescott - QB

- \* Dak Prescott (1,486) needs 70 passing yards to move past Chad Hutchinson (1,555 - 2002) for the second-most yards by a rookie quarterback in team history. He (125) needs three completions to pass Hutchinson (127 - 2002) for second. With two touchdowns, Prescott (7) ties Troy Aikman (9 - 1989) for first (**DAK ATTACK - page 14**).

- \* With a rating of 100.0-or-better, Prescott will up his streak to six consecutive games with a 100.0-or-better quarterback rating to break a tie with Tony Romo and Roger Staubach for the second-longest streak in team history (**PRESCOTT RATINGS AT 100.0 - page 14**).

#### Terrance Williams - WR

- \* Terrance Williams (2,508) can pass Mel Renfro (2,525) with 18 yards for 20th, and with 49 yards, he will pass Herschel Walker (2,556) for 19th on the team's all-time receiving yards list.

#### Jason Witten - TE

- \* With a start against Philadelphia, Jason Witten will make his 204th consecutive start to surpass Ed Jones for the most in team history (**I AM IRON MAN - page 19**).

### 2016 DALLAS COWBOYS MOST RECENT NOTES AT GREEN BAY (10/16) - TEAM:

- \* The win over the Packers gave the Cowboys their fifth straight victory - the longest winning streak during a single season since winning six in a row at the beginning of the 2014 regular season. Dallas improved to 5-1 for the 14th time in franchise history and first since 2014.
- \* The victory also snapped a five-game losing streak - including postseason - against the Packers, a four-game losing streak in Green Bay (9/21/08), and marked only the second overall victory in Green Bay in franchise history.
- \* The offense had a 97-yard scoring drive in the second quarter to mark the longest touchdown drive (yards) since a 98-yard scoring drive against St. Louis (10/23/11).
- \* Dallas totaled three runs of 20-plus yards to mark the first time in 2016 that Green Bay had given up a run of 20+ or-more. The Packers were one of two teams (Minnesota) to have not allowed a run of 20-plus yards this season entering the game. Additionally, the Cowboys rushing attack produced six runs of 10-plus yards - the highest the Packers had allowed all season. They entered the game allowing the fewest (two) in the NFL.
- \* For the sixth straight game, the Dallas defense did not allow a 100-yard rusher or a 100-yard receiver against the opposing offense - one-of-two teams (Minnesota) to not allow a either all season, and it is also the longest such streak since the team had six-straight games to start the 2011 season.
- \* The defense had four takeaways against the Packers to mark the most since the unit had four at Washington (12/28/14) (**TAKEAWAYS FROM "MIGHTY ORPHANS" - page 29**).

### 2016 DALLAS COWBOYS MOST RECENT NOTES AT GREEN BAY (10/16) - INDIVIDUAL:

#### Jason Garrett - Head Coach

- \* Jason Garrett won his 50th career regular season game (currently 50-44) to become only the second head coach (Tom Landry) in team history to reach that milestone.

#### Dan Bailey - K

- \* With three field goals made, Dan Bailey recorded his 23rd career game with three-or-more. He also reached 50 career field goals made from 30-39 yards.

#### Cole Beasley - WR

- \* Cole Beasley moved into the team's top-25 receptions list while his two touchdowns marked his fourth career multi-score game.

#### Ezekiel Elliott - RB

- \* Ezekiel Elliott rushed 28 times for a season-high 157 yards - fourth-most in team history by a rookie (**ZEKE MAKES THE LEAP - page 24**).
- \* Elliott's 703 rushing yards are the most by a Cowboys rookie rusher during his first six games, and the second-highest overall by a league rusher through his first six games in NFL history (**COMPARING ROOKIE RUSHERS - page 25**).
- \* It was Elliott's fourth consecutive game to rush for 100 yards - first time in team history that a rookie runner had four straight games over the century mark. It was also the first time in NFL history for a rookie to rush for 130+ yards in four consecutive games in a single season (**ZEKE MONSTER - page 25**).

#### David Irving - DE

- \* David Irving had a career-high three forced fumbles against Green Bay. It marked the second-highest number recorded in NFL history as he tied for third overall.

#### Sean Lee - LB

- \* Sean Lee reached 600 career tackles.

#### Dak Prescott - QB

- \* Dak Prescott became the first Cowboys rookie quarterback to start the first six games of the season, third rookie quarterback in the NFL drafted in the fourth round-or-later to start the team's first five games of the season, and with the win improved to 5-1. Collectively, Dallas is the first team since the 1970 merger to win five-or-more out of their first six games with a rookie starting quarterback (**DAK TO THE FUTURE - page 15**).

- \* With his 247 yards, he moved past Steve Walsh (1,371 - 1989) for the third-most passing yards by a Cowboys rookie. His three touchdowns allowed him to tie Chad Hutchinson (7-2002) for second and his completions allowed him to pass Walsh (110-1989) for third (**DAK TO THE FUTURE - page 15**).

- \* Prescott tossed three touchdowns to mark his first career game with three-or-more passing scores. It was the third time in team history that a Dallas rookie has thrown for three-or-more scores and tied for the second-most by a rookie in a single game by a Cowboy (**TDS AND ROOKIES - page 15**).

- \* Prescott surpassed Tom Brady (162) with his 163rd passing attempt without an interception. However, he was picked off in the third quarter to end his streak at 176 pass attempts (**PASS NO PICK NFL RECORD - page 16**).

- \* Prescott's 117.4 rating marked his fifth consecutive game with 100.0 rating - longest streak and most games in franchise history by a rookie quarterback and tied the second-longest streak overall by a Cowboys quarterback (**PRESCOTT RATINGS AT 100.0 - page 16**).

#### Lucky Whitehead - WR

- \* Lucky Whitehead caught one pass for 35 yards to establish a career-long catch.

#### Terrance Williams - WR

- \* Terrance Williams caught four passes for 75 yards to pass Alvin Harper (2,486) for 21st on the team's all-time receiving yards list.

#### Jason Witten - TE

- \* Jason Witten tied Ed "Too Tall" Jones (203, 1974-78, 1980-89) for the most games started in franchise history. (**I AM IRON MAN - page 19**).

# COWBOYS & DR PEPPER

Stephen and his guests then made their way to take a private VIP tour of AT&T Stadium. On Sunday, Stephen will receive a check for \$7,500 to put towards his education at Texas Tech University. Upon entering the stadium, co-branded rally towels will be placed on seats, courtesy of Dr Pepper. After the game, cans of Dr Pepper, Diet Dr Pepper and Dr Pepper Cherry will also be provided to fans.

## HEAD COACHES

### JASON GARRETT (51-45, 6th Year)

Jason Garrett was named the eighth head coach in Dallas Cowboys history on January 5, 2011. Garrett became the first former Dallas Cowboys player to become the team's head coach. As a backup quarterback during his playing career in Dallas, he started nine-of-23 games played and was a member of teams that won six division titles and three Super Bowl championships. The 2015 season was a challenge as injuries sidelined two of Dallas' top playmakers - Tony Romo and Dez Bryant - for a majority of the season and the club finished with a 4-12 record. Romo (collarbone) started only four games and finished the year on Reserve/Injured and Bryant (foot) was slowed through a majority of his nine starts, also finishing on IR. Garrett saw four different players start at quarterback for the club for only the second time in team history. Veterans Brandon Weeden (three) and Matt Cassel (seven) started the majority of games while Kellen Moore made the first two starts of his career. The running game saw a burst through the second half of the season as Darren McFadden posted his second career 1,000-yard season (1,089) to mark the first time in club history two different running backs each rushed for 1,000 yards in consecutive seasons. Despite the struggles, Dallas still sent five players to the Pro Bowl - Tyron Smith (third), Travis Frederick (second), Zack Martin (second), Dan Bailey (first) and Sean Lee (first).

Garrett was elevated to the Cowboys top job after taking over as the team's interim head coach midway through 2010. He guided the club to a 5-3 mark to finish the season after the team started 1-7. He led Dallas to an 8-8 record, narrowly missing the playoffs and an NFC East Division title in each his first three full seasons as head coach (2011-13). With Garrett at the helm of the offense, the unit reached new heights from 2007-13, ranking among the NFL's top-10 in total offense in five of his seven years at the helm: 2013 (10th), 2012 (6th), 2010 (10th), 2009 (2nd) and 2007 (2nd). Inclusively from the start of the 2007 season, the club has averaged 364.9 total yards-per-outing (sixth in the NFL) and 24.3 points-per-game (eighth). Since his arrival in 2007, not only has the team set single-season records in numerous offensive categories, but the club's cumulative numbers for total net yards (52,540), gross passing yards (38,325) and total points (3,498) are among the best totals over a nine-year span in the history of the organization. Under Garrett's tutelage, 13 different offensive players have earned 34 total trips to the Pro Bowl.

### DOUG PEDERSON (4-2, 1st Year)

Doug Pederson was named head coach of the Philadelphia Eagles on January 18, 2016, following a three-year run as the offensive coordinator of the Kansas City Chiefs (2013-15). Pederson helped guide Kansas City to a 31-17 regular-season record and playoff appearances in 2013 and 2015. During his three seasons as the team's offensive coordinator, the Chiefs ranked first in the NFL in rushing touchdowns (54), third in yards-per-carry (4.64) and seventh in total rushing yards (6,018). In 2015 Pederson helped the Chiefs rebound from a 1-5 start to win a team-record 11 consecutive games, including Kansas City's first playoff victory in 22 years. In 2013 Pederson and the coaching staff helped turn a 2-14 Chiefs team into an 11-5 playoff contender, marking the largest one-year turnaround in team history. During Pederson's first two years in Kansas City, Pro Bowl running back Jamaal Charles ranked third amongst NFL running backs in yards per carry (4.99) and rushing touchdowns (21), fifth in rushing yards-per-game (77.3) and sixth in total rushing yards (2,320). In 2013 Charles' first season in Pederson's offense, the eight-year veteran set career highs in yards from scrimmage (1,980), total touchdowns (19), receptions (70) and receiving yards (693). The Chiefs acquired quarterback Alex Smith via trade in 2013, and the former No. 1 overall pick went on to post single-season career highs in passing yards (3,313) and passing touchdowns (23), while earning his first trip to the Pro Bowl in his first year under Pederson's tutelage. During his three years in Pederson's offense, Smith notched three-consecutive 3,000-yard seasons, threw the second-fewest interceptions among quarterback with more than 1,000 attempts (20) and ranked fourth among all quarterbacks with 1,183 rushing yards. Pederson began his pro coaching career in Philadelphia where he served under Andy Reid as an offensive quality control coach (2009-2010) and quarterbacks coach (2011-12) and helped quarterback Michael Vick become the second quarterback in NFL history to top the 3,000-yard passing and 500-yard rushing plateaus in consecutive seasons. In 2011, the Eagles' offense recorded the second-most net yards in team history (6,386) and a franchise-record 356 first downs. He enjoyed a 12-year playing career in the NFL with the Packers, Dolphins, Eagles and Browns. As a backup quarterback for the Packers, Pederson was part of a team that won Super Bowl XXXI, captured two NFC Championships (1996 and 1997) and earned eight playoff berths and six division titles. During his playing career, Pederson was coached by three of the most successful coaches in NFL history: Don Shula, Mike Holmgren and Andy Reid.

## WINNING HEAD COACH

Dallas Cowboys Head Coach Jason Garrett had his best season as a head coach by wrapping up the 2014 regular season with a record of 12-4 - the fifth coach to reach 12 wins-or-better in a season in team history. He also secured his first NFC East Division title as the head coach. Against the N.Y. Giants (10/19/14), Garrett passed former head coaches Bill Parcells and Wade Phillips (both with 34) with his 35th regular season win as the head coach of the Dallas Cowboys to place fourth in team history. He passed Barry Switzer (40) for third with his 41st victory at Washington (12/28/14), then tied Jimmy Johnson (44) for the second-most victories at Miami (11/22/15), and passed Johnson at Washington (12/7/15). Garrett won his 50th regular season game at Green Bay (10/16/16) to become only the second head coach in franchise history to reach 50 wins.

Following a 4-12 record in 2015, and a 5-1 start to 2016, Garrett's current regular season record as the head coach of the Dallas Cowboys stands at 50-44, with the second-most wins all-time in team history:

## A WINNING TREND

The Dallas Cowboys entered the 2016 season as one-of-12 teams in the league with at least 480 regular season wins. At the end of Week 16 in 2014, Dallas became just the 12th team with 475 all-time wins with the win against Indianapolis (12/21/14). Dallas is currently 12th on the NFL's all-time wins list:

## SUNDAY NIGHT LIGHTS

This week's game against the Philadelphia Eagles is Dallas' second-of-three scheduled Sunday night contests in 2016. Following this primetime matchup against the Eagles in Week 8, the Cowboys will again be featured on Sunday Night in Week 14 on Dec. 11 at the N.Y. Giants.

No team in the NFL has played more Sunday Night games than Dallas' 57 (N.Y. Giants are closest with 49), and Dallas' 28 wins are the most on Sunday Night by any team.

The Cowboys had a six-game Sunday Night win streak - the longest Sunday night win streak in club history - snapped in 2009. Twice, Dallas won three straight - their first three Sunday Night games and three games spanning 1991-1995. The Cowboys lost eight consecutive Sunday Night games - six on the road - from 1999-2006 for their longest series losing streak. The Cowboys won their first Sunday Night contest of 2016 against the Chicago Bears in Week 3.

Dallas has played 26 Sunday Night home games (13-13). This week's matchup marks the 10th time Dallas will take on Philadelphia on Sunday night, second-most versus any opponent, with a 4-5 record (1-3 at home) against the Eagles.

Overall, Dallas has faced the N.Y. Giants (11 times) more than any other opponent on Sunday Night Football.

## PICK A DAY, ANY DAY

This week's game is Dallas' second of five scheduled primetime games in 2016. This season is the 11th straight in which Dallas plays three-or-more primetime games.

In total, Dallas has played in 154 primetime kickoffs - 80 Monday night, two on Thursday, one each Wednesday and Friday, 12 Saturday and 58 on Sunday. The Cowboys hold a 81-73 record in primetime games. Dallas' longest primetime win streak was 11 games (2006-08) and its longest losing streak was six (2010-11). Dallas won 12 straight primetime road games from 2005-09. The Cowboys were 1-2 in home primetime games during the 2015 season, and are 1-0 in 2016.

## BYE-BYE BYE

This week's game against the Philadelphia Eagles marks the 28th game for Dallas following a regular season bye week. Since 1990 when the bye week was installed, the Cowboys hold an 18-9 record in games following the bye. Dallas is tied with Minnesota for the third-most wins following a bye week.

From 2005-09, Dallas enjoyed a streak of five consecutive wins coming out of the bye week until losing to Tennessee coming out of the bye in 2010. The club's longest win streak following a bye is eight games (1993-1999) which includes the 1993 season in which the team had two bye weeks. The Cowboys lost last season's game out of the bye at the New York Giants.

This is the first time since 2010 that Dallas has played at home following a bye. In total, the Cowboys have played nine times at home after a bye and own a 7-2 record in those games.

This season is the fourth straight season and 17th overall that Dallas will play an NFC East team out of the bye. It is the fifth time that the Cowboys have played the Eagles coming off the bye, but the first time to play them at home. Dallas is 12-4 in those games against its own division and is 4-1 against Philadelphia, including winning the last four straight.

## DATING GAME

This week's game against the Philadelphia Eagles is being played on Oct. 30. In the 56-plus years of Cowboys football, there have been nine Oct. 30 games. The Cowboys hold a 6-3 record when playing on Oct. 30. They have faced Baltimore, Pittsburgh, Detroit, the N.Y. Giants, Phoenix/Arizona, Cincinnati and Philadelphia on Oct. 30. Dallas' first-ever Oct. 30 game came in 1960, a 45-7 loss against Baltimore. Its last Oct. 30 game was in 2011, a 34-7 road loss at Philadelphia:

## DALLAS LAST GAME

The Dallas Cowboys enjoyed their bye week in Week 7. In the previous game the Cowboys went into Green Bay and defeated the Packers 30-16 during Week 6. It marked only the team's second victory at historic Lambeau Field in Dallas' 57-year history. Dak Prescott completed 66.7 percent of his passes (18-of-27) for 247 yards and a career-high three touchdowns, setting an NFL record with 177 pass attempts without an interception to start his career, ending when he threw an interception in the third quarter. Prescott benefited from the outstanding play of his offensive line, which not only gave him time in the pocket, but also came away from the challenge of facing the top-ranked rushing defense in the NFL as clearly the superior side. Green Bay had surrendered an average of only 42.8 rushing yards-per-game, but thanks to the big men up front, Ezekiel Elliott compiled 157 rushing yards, the fourth consecutive game he's topped the 130-yard mark, an NFL record. Aaron Rodgers and the Packers were often able to move the ball, as the quarterback finished with 294 passing yards, but the Cowboys got timely turnovers and big stops when they needed them. In all, the defense recorded one interception and three fumble recoveries, garnering four takeaways for the first time since 2014.

Once again, the Cowboys got off to a strong start, putting points on the board on their opening possession for the fifth time in six games with a one-yard pass from Prescott-to-Cole Beasley. Mason Crosby then added two field goals for the Packers. After a Dan Bailey field goal, and with the first half winding down, and Dallas on their own three-yard line, it looked like the halftime score would stay at 10-6. The Cowboys generated three plays of 20-plus yards and drove 97 yards in five plays and 0:33, ending with a Prescott-to-Brice Butler 20-yard touchdown. The Cowboys added another Bailey field goal, then Prescott's third touchdown pass of the day, second to Beasley, before the Packers scored a late touchdown on a pass to Randall Cobb, but the game was already out of reach. Dallas went into its Week 7 bye in first place in the NFC East at 5-1.

## PHILADELPHIA LAST GAME

The Philadelphia Eagles downed the Minnesota Vikings 21-10 at home. Following a scoreless first quarter, Minnesota got on the board first behind a 48-yard field goal by Blair Walsh in the second quarter. Philadelphia scored 11 points before the end of the first half to take the lead on a 98-yard kickoff return by Josh Huff (Carson Wentz run) and a 21-yard field goal by Caleb Sturgis.

The Eagles pushed their lead to 18-3 in the third quarter when Wentz hit Dorial Green-Beckham for a five-yard passing touchdown, then increased to 21-3 after Sturgis hit a 21-yarder in the fourth quarter. The Vikings cut the lead to 21-10 with under 1:00 left in regulation on a 14-yard touchdown connection from Sam Bradford-to-Cordarrelle Patterson, but it was not enough as Philadelphia emerged with the victory.

### Dan Bailey - K

Perfect on 12 field goal tries and all 26 PATs, including four games with five PAT tries. Also has 30 touchbacks on 47 kickoffs. Made all four field goals and all five PATs in the 2015 series.

### Cole Beasley - WR

Established career-highs in receptions (nine) and receiving yards (112) and tied his career-best with two touchdowns against Philadelphia (11/8/15). In eight career games has 30 receptions for 285 yards and two touchdowns.

### Dez Bryant - WR

In nine games caught 49 passes for 775 yards (15.8) and eight touchdowns. Made five receptions for 104 yards with one touchdown in one game last season (11/8/15). Has gone over 100 yards in both previous games against the Eagles (114 - 12/14/14; 104 - 11/18/15). Established a career-best three touchdown catches at Philadelphia (12/14/14).

### Brandon Carr - CB

In eight games with Dallas, posted 23 tackles with two interceptions, one returned 47 yards for a touchdown - the first score of his career (11/11/12) - and his first career quarterback hurry. Had four total tackles in the 2015 series.

### Barry Church - S

Has collected 47 tackles, four tackles for loss, a pressure, two pass breakups and one interception in eight games. Compiled 17 tackles and three tackles for loss in the 2015 series.

### Morris Claiborne - CB

Made 27 tackles and four pass breakups in six career games. Had 11 stops and two breakups in the 2015 series.

### Tyrone Crawford - DT

In six career games has logged 10 tackles, nine quarterback pressures, three sacks, a tackle for loss and a pass breakup. Had his first career multi-sack game with two takedowns at Philadelphia (12/14/14). Made three stops, six pressures and a breakup in two games last season.

### Justin Durant - LB

### Alfred Morris - RB

In eight career games while with Washington, rushed 154 times for 576 yards (3.7 avg.) and three touchdowns.

### Mark Sanchez - QB

Spent two seasons (2014-15) with Philadelphia and made 10 starts in 13 games played. Threw for 3,034 yards on 257-of-400 passes (64.3%) with 18 touchdowns and 15 interceptions.

### Orlando Scandrick - CB

Has amassed 39 tackles, seven pass breakups and six tackles for loss in 13 career games.

### Cedric Thornton - DT

Entered the league as an undrafted free agent with Philadelphia. Totaled 233 tackles, 4.0 sacks, 12 tackles for loss, 21 quarterback pressures, five pass breakups, one forced fumble and three fumble recoveries - one for a score - in 61 games with 45 starts in five seasons (2011-15).

### J.J. Wilcox - S

In six career games, has notched 39 tackles, three pass breakups and two interceptions. Established a career-high with 15 stops against Philadelphia (11/27/14). Had 10 tackles, an interception and a pass breakup in the 2015 series.

### Terrance Williams - WR

Has made 18 receptions for 278 yards (15.4 avg.) and two touchdowns in six career games. Hauled in seven passes for 111 yards and one touchdown in two games last season.

### Jason Witten - TE

## SERIES HISTORY

The Cowboys finished the 2014 regular season with an undefeated 8-0 record on the road - the only squad with a perfect mark away from home in the NFL. The Cowboys eight road wins were the most in team history during the regular season since the NFL began a 16-game schedule. They were the second team in franchise history to win all road games in a season, joining the 1968 team, which won all seven of its road games during a 14-game season. In NFL history, they were the sixth team since the 1970 NFL merger to form a perfect 8-0 record on the road, joining the 2007 New England Patriots, the 2001 St. Louis Rams, the 1984, 1989 and the 1990 San Francisco 49ers.

Dallas continued its road victory streak into 2015, winning the first contest away from home at Philadelphia (9/20) before falling to the Saints at New Orleans (10/4) in overtime, ending the road run. Dating back to the Cowboys final road game of the 2013 season at Washington (12/22), Dallas won 10 consecutive regular season road games to tie a franchise-high with both the 2006-07 and 1968-69 squads for the longest road win streak in team history.

## SOLD OUT STADIUMS

The Cowboys have played in front of sold out stadiums in 428 of their last 430 games (including playoffs) and in 230 consecutive games. They played in front of sold out crowds in 153 consecutive games at Texas Stadium (including playoffs) - dating back to Dec. 16, 1990 against Phoenix, their last home non-sellout. Dallas opened what is now named AT&T Stadium with the largest crowd to witness a regular season NFL game with 105,121 tickets distributed and have 61 straight sellouts (including playoffs). The Cowboys have sold out each of their last 213 home games.

On the road, Dallas has played in front of sold out crowds in 115 straight games (including playoffs), dating back to its last road non-sellout - at Arizona (10/20/02).

## AT&T STADIUM RECORD WHEN...

The Dallas Cowboys are currently in their eighth season in what is now AT&T Stadium in 2016, owning a 29-30 regular season record at home. The Cowboys finished their seventh season in their home building with a 1-7 record in 2015, and are 2-1 at home in 2016.

Dallas' first game at the venue was on Sept. 20, 2009 - a 31-33 loss to the N.Y. Giants. The club's first win came a week later with a 21-7 decision over Carolina. Overall, Dallas owns a 31-30 record - 2-0 postseason - in AT&T Stadium. Below is a breakdown of the club's record on their home turf:

Tony Romo climbed to 30,000 passing yards following his 176-yard performance at Tennessee (9/14/14), and now has 34,154 for his career. By reaching 30,000 career passing yards Romo became the second Cowboys quarterback to reach that milestone (Troy Aikman - 32,942), the 38th player in NFL history and only the fifth undrafted player to do so. Through his career Romo has steadily climbed the club's all-time quarterback charts, making strides in 2012 by moving into second for completions, then established the club mark in touchdown throws against Philadelphia (12/2/12) to break Aikman's old record of 165. He was unable to repeat the performance at Philadelphia (9/20) to end the streak.

## WHAT A RATING

In 2011 Tony Romo recorded a passer rating of more than 100.0 nine times to tie the then second-most in a season in club history. Romo closed out 2012 with a 100.0-or-better rating six times and had six again in 2013 before posting 10 in 2014 to tie his 2007 total for the most in team history:

In 2014 he had his first game over 100.0 at St. Louis (9/21) with a 116.8 rating, then had a 137.4 rating the next week against New Orleans (9/28). At Seattle (10/12) Romo finished with a 110.2 rating, then registered his next game against the N.Y. Giants (10/19) with a 135.7 rating. He had his fifth 100.0 rating game of 2014 at Jacksonville (11/9) with a 138.8 rating - the 10th-highest of his career and the 60th of his career. At the N.Y. Giants (11/23) he recorded a then season-high 143.4 rating for the fifth-highest of his career. He posted his seventh game with a 138.0 rating at Chicago (12/4), then racked up a 129.1 rating at Philadelphia (12/14). He posted a career-high rating of 151.7 against Indianapolis (12/21), which also ranked third in team history, for his 64th career 100.0 game. He closed out the regular season with a 100.0 rating at Washington (12/28).

Romo continued his 100.0 rating games with a 103.3 rating in the 2015 season opener against the N.Y. Giants (9/13).

His franchise and career-high 113.2 rating in 2014 led the league for the first time of his career, and his career passer rating of 97.1 is third all-time in NFL history:

Romo continued his prowess in the fourth quarter with the opening game of the 2015 season against the N.Y. Giants (9/13). Down 16-13 entering the fourth quarter - a lead that increased to 10 in the middle of the period - Romo went on to complete 13-of-16 passes (81.3) for 159 yards with two touchdowns and one interception for a 121.6 rating that included two scoring drives in the few remaining minutes to claim the comeback victory.

In 2012 Tony Romo hit 92 home touchdowns to surpass Danny White (91) for the most in team history. By season's end, he added nine more to total 101. Romo tossed 16 scores at home in 2013 - including a club-record tying five against Denver (10/6) - to give him 117 at the conclusion of the season. In 2014 Romo had one passing touchdown in the season home opener against San Francisco (9/7), three against New Orleans (9/28), two against Houston (10/5), three against the N.Y. Giants (10/19), one against Washington (10/27) and four against Indianapolis (12/21).

In 2015, Tony Romo opened the seventh season at what is now AT&T Stadium against the N.Y. Giants (9/13), marking his 42nd game in the stadium since it opened in 2009. With Romo as the starting quarterback, Dallas holds a 25-18 record at its home venue. Romo's personal stats at the stadium are quite impressive. ## ROMO'S ROAD

With his 78-49 record as a starter, Tony Romo has had success when playing on the road. Since being named the club's starter leading into the game at Carolina (10/29/06), Romo holds a 40-24 record away from home.

Romo began his career as a starting quarterback on the road at Carolina (10/29/06) and went on to post an 11-2 road record during his first season and a half at the reins of the Cowboys offense. He was 4-1 in his first season in 2006, then followed that up with a 7-1 record in 2007. In 2008 Romo fought through a finger injury and missed two games to finish 3-3 away from home. He finished 2009 with a 5-3 road record, then in 2010, his season ended three road games in where he was 1-2 before he fractured his left clavicle against the N.Y. Giants (10/25). Romo was 3-5 in 2011, then was 4-4 in 2012. In 2013 he was 3-5. Romo finished 2014 with a perfect 8-0 record and continued it into 2015 as he was victorious at Philadelphia (9/20), but suffered a broken clavicle to his left shoulder that forced him to miss the next seven games. He returned at Miami (11/22) and picked up the win:

Romo was one of the top road quarterbacks in the NFL in 2014. ## CONSECUTIVE TD STREAK ENDS

Tony Romo had a streak of 38 consecutive games with a touchdown pass end against Philadelphia (11/27/14) when he failed to connect on a scoring throw. His 38 games are a club record and the fifth-longest streak in NFL history that began on Oct. 1, 2012 against Chicago. He threw at least one in each of the remaining 12 games of 2012 and in each of the 15 he played in 2013. He continued it through 10 games played in 2014 before it ended:

## CALL IT A COMEBACK

Since taking over as the Dallas Cowboys starting quarterback during the 2006 season, Tony Romo has been at the helm of some thrilling wins for the club. Included in his 78 wins as a starter are 24 occasions in which he led the team to a come-from-behind victory in the fourth quarter or overtime during the regular season. Romo's 24 wins are a franchise-best, and in 2012 he had three straight games in which he had a come-from-behind win and followed that up with two in 2013.

Romo had three late comebacks in 2014 highlighted by his performance at St. Louis (9/21) as the team battled back from 21 points down to overcome the most points to win a game in a non-overtime game in franchise history. He wasted no time to earn his first comeback win in the fourth quarter or overtime in 2015, coming back from a 10-point deficit in the season opening game against the N.Y. Giants (9/13)

Below is a look at each of Romo's 24 games in which he battled a deficit to pull out the win and his fourth quarter stats in those games:

## DAK TO THE FUTURE

The Dallas Cowboys selected Rayne Dakota "Dak" Prescott in the fourth round of the 2016 NFL Draft (135th overall), allowing the Mississippi State product to become the first quarterback drafted by Dallas since Stephen McGee in 2009, and only the fifth since Jerry Jones bought the team in 1989. Dallas' intention was to groom Prescott for the future and slowly bring him along at the position. However, Prescott's trajectory took a quick turn, beginning in training camp after veteran and intended No. 2 backup quarterback Kellen Moore suffered a season-ending leg injury during the first week of camp on Aug. 2. Prescott then battled first-year player Jameil Showers for the No. 2 role for the right to backup Tony Romo. However, before the decision could be made, Romo went down with a back injury during the third preseason game at Seattle (8/25), forcing Prescott to enter the game with the first unit. With Romo expected to miss some time, Prescott will assume the role as the starting quarterback for the Dallas Cowboys to begin the 2016 season.

Prescott dazzled in the preseason, and in three games completed 39-of-50 passes (78.0%) for 454 yards with five touchdowns and no interceptions for a 137.8 quarterback rating to lead all NFL quarterbacks. His five scoring tosses led the NFL, while he finished second with a 78.0 completion percentage, and his 454 passing yards placed him seventh (fourth in the NFC). Prescott also added 53 yards on seven carries on the ground with two scores.

Prescott made his NFL debut against the N.Y. Giants (9/11) and became only the fourth rookie to start a season opener at quarterback in franchise history - first since Quincy Carter in 2001 - and the 11th overall Cowboys rookie quarterback to start a game at any point during the season. He completed 25-of-45 passes for 227 yards with no touchdowns and no interceptions for a 69.4 quarterback rating. His yards, completions and attempts were the most by a Cowboys rookie quarterback on opening day and the most overall by a Dallas signal caller making his first career start during the season as a rookie. He completed 22-of-30 passes (73.3%) for 292 yards - fourth-highest by a Cowboys rookie quarterback - with no touchdowns and no interceptions for a 103.8 rating. With his first career win, Prescott became the first Cowboys rookie quarterback to win a game since Drew Henson against Chicago (11/25/04). He earned his second win of the season against Chicago (9/25/16) to become the first backup quarterback to win making a start at AT&T Stadium since Jon Kitna against Washington (12/19/10), completing 19-of-24 passes for 248 yards with his first career passing touchdown (17-yard strike to Dez Bryant) and no interceptions for a 123.6 rating. Prescott's 123.6 rating and 79.2 completion percentage were both the highest by a Cowboys rookie quarterback in a single game in team history. He also added a one-yard rushing touchdown to mark his second rushing score of the season - most by a rookie quarterback in franchise history. At San Francisco (10/2) he completed 24-of-33 passes for 252 yards with two touchdowns and no interceptions for a 114.7 rating. Against Cincinnati (10/9) he made his fifth start of the season - the first Dallas rookie quarterback to start the first five games to begin a season and third rookie quarterback drafted in the fourth round-or-later in NFL history - and completed 18-of-24 passes (75.0%) for 227 yards with one touchdown and no interceptions for a 117.9 rating. With the win, he surpassed Carter for the most victories by a Cowboys rookie quarterback in his first pro season, and his 4-1 record is the best by a Cowboys rookie quarterback. He also became the first rookie to win at least four of his first five starts since Trent Edwards did it with Buffalo in 2007. By not throwing an interception, Prescott pushed his total to 155 passes without a pick, the second-most by a quarterback to begin his NFL career, and the most by a rookie. His 117.9 rating marked his fourth consecutive game with a 100.0 rating - longest streak and most games in franchise history by a rookie quarterback. By completing 75.0 percent of his passes, it marked the fourth consecutive game he has completed 70.0 percent-or-better of his passes to notch the longest streak by a Cowboys rookie quarterback and tied Romo for the longest streak by a quarterback in team history. His yardage allowed him to move past Carter (1,072) for the fourth-most by a rookie in team history, while his touchdown tied Kevin Sweeney (4 - 1987) for the fourth-most by a rookie. Prescott totaled 247 yards on 18-of-27 passes (66.7%) with a season-high three touchdowns and one interception for a 117.4 rating at Green Bay (10/16). With the win, Dallas is the first team since the 1970 merger to win five-or-more out of their first six games with a rookie starting quarterback. He surpassed Tom Brady (162) with his 163rd passing attempt without an interception to establish an NFL record, but was picked off in the third quarter to end his streak at 176 pass attempts to begin a career without an interception. He extended his streak of consecutive games with a 100.0 rating-or-better to five, but failed to complete 70 percent of his passes to end his streak of games with 70.0 percent-or-better at four. Prescott's yardage pushed him past Walsh (1,371 - 1989) for third-most by a rookie in a single season, while his first career game with three-or-more scores - tied for second-highest by a rookie in team history - allowed him to pass Walsh (5 - 1989) and Carter (5 - 2001) and tie Chad Hutchinson (7 - 2002) for second. His completions allowed him to pass Walsh (110 - 1989) for third.

For the season, Prescott ranks second in completion percentage (68.7) and fifth in quarterback rating (103.9), while completing 125-of-182 passes for 1,486 yards with seven touchdowns and one interception.

## DAKOTA THE DUDE

Dakota "Dak" Prescott's rookie season continues to amaze the league as the first-year NFL signal caller is proving that he belongs. Through six games played, he ranks in the top-five amongst league passers as he is second in completion percentage (68.7) and fifth in quarterback rating (103.9):

Starting in each of the club's first five games - only the second Dallas rookie quarterback to do so (Troy Aikman, 1989) - he has completed 125-of-182 passes (68.7%) for 1,486 yards with seven touchdowns and one interception for a 103.9 rating while boasting a 5-1 record, allowing him to make his mark amongst the top-five performances by a Cowboys rookie quarterback during their first pro season:

## TDS AND ROOKIES

Through his first six games, Dak Prescott has thrown seven touchdowns to tie for the second-most by a Cowboys rookie in team history. At Green Bay (10/16) he tossed a season-high three for his first career game with three-or-more scores, while it marked only the third time in team history a rookie quarterback threw three scores in a game. Prescott's three passing touchdowns also tied for the second-most by a Dallas rookie in a single game in franchise history:

## COOL HAND DAK

Dak Prescott's accuracy has been on display since taking over the reigns of the Dallas offense, and his 68.7 completion percentage (125-of-182) currently ranks second in the NFL. He has already registered four games with a completion percentage of 70 percent-or-better for the most games - and longest consecutive - by a rookie in a season in team history. He had a completion percentage of 73.3 on 22-of-30 passes at Washington (9/18), the then second-highest, before topping that by going 19-of-24 on his passes for a 79.2 mark against Chicago (9/25) to set the highest mark in franchise history. Prescott completed 72.7 percent of his passes (24-of-33) at San Francisco (10/2/16), then had a 75.0 mark (18-of-24) against Cincinnati (10/9):

## PRESCOTT RATINGS AT 100.0

Dak Prescott is quickly adding up the accolades during his first pro season. Through six games, he has already registered five games with a quarterback rating of 100.0-or-better - most by a rookie quarterback in team history - and has set five of the top-10 single-game quarterback rating marks by a Dallas Cowboys rookie. Prescott registered a 103.7 quarterback rating in his second career game at Washington (9/18) - good for the then fifth-highest by a rookie signal caller in team history. He topped that with a 123.6 rating against Chicago (9/25) - highest in franchise history. Prescott became the seventh player in team history to record three consecutive games with a 100.0 quarterback rating - first rookie - after registering a 114.7 mark at San Francisco (10/2). He added to his streak with his fourth consecutive game with a 100.0 rating - longest streak and most games in franchise history by a rookie quarterback and tied for the third-longest streak by a Cowboys quarterback overall - with a 117.9 rating against Cincinnati (10/9). Prescott had a 117.4 rating at Green Bay (10/16) to mark his fifth straight game with at least a 100.0 rating to tie the second-longest streak in team history:

## PASS NO PICK NFL RECORD

In his first two pro games, rookie Dak Prescott attempted an NFL-record 75 passes with no interceptions. After his 45 attempts against the N.Y. Giants (9/11) and 30 attempts at Washington (9/18), Prescott's combined number of 75 surpassed Warren Moon's (72 - 1984) for the most pass attempts through a player's first two career games without an interception in NFL history:

At San Francisco (10/2) he didn't throw a pick on 32 attempts to move up to 131 passes without an interception - tied for the second-most by a player to begin his career and most by a rookie. Prescott's 131 pass attempts are also the most by a player who did not throw an interception in his first four career games. The streak continued against Cincinnati (10/9), as the rookie quarterback once again did not throw a pick to up his streak to 155 passes without an interception - the second-most by a quarterback to start his career, and most by a rookie. At Green Bay (10/16), Prescott surpassed Tom Brady (162) with his 163rd passing attempt without an interception to establish an NFL record. However, he was picked off in the third quarter to end his streak at 176 pass attempts to begin a career without an interception:

## CLIMBING THE TE CHARTS

Since entering the league in 2003, Jason Witten has proven his skills as an offensive weapon. He has provided Dallas with the full package at tight end. In his 14th season, Witten has caught 1,048 passes for 11,489 yards and 60 touchdowns. He is the second all-time leading tight end in career receptions and receiving yards.

To open the 2011 season Witten became the seventh tight end in league history to reach 7,000 receiving yards. His work through the 2011 season allowed him to crack the top-five on the tight end receiving yards list. In 2012 against Tampa Bay (9/23), Witten moved into third all-time. He then crossed the 8,000-yard mark against Chicago (10/1) with his 15th career 100-yard game. He opened the 2013 season by crossing the 9,000-yard threshold.

By mid-November of 2011, Witten passed Ozzie Newsome (662) for third on the all-time receptions list. With four catches at Seattle (9/16) in 2012, he became the third tight end in league history with 700 career catches. His seven catches in the finale at Washington (12/30) made him the third tight end in league history to reach 800 career receptions. In Week 2 of 2013 at Kansas City (9/15) Witten passed Shannon Sharpe (817) for second in catches.

In 2014 he reached 10,000 career receiving yards on a 34-yard catch against Houston (10/5) to become only the third tight end in NFL history to reach that mark. The very next game at Seattle (10/12) he caught his 900th career pass on a three-yard scoring strike from Romo in the second quarter to become the second tight end in league history, the first Dallas Cowboy and the 16th overall player to reach 900.

In 2015 he had 27 yards against the N.Y. Giants (10/19) to pass Sharpe (10,060) for the second-most receiving yards by an NFL tight end. Witten surpassed 11,000 career receiving yards against Carolina (11/26) to become only the second tight end in NFL history to do so. He reached 1,000 career receptions at Washington (12/7), becoming the 12th player in NFL history - second tight end - to reach that milestone.

## TE's TDs

Coming off a 2010 season in which he registered a career-high and club tight end record-tying nine touchdowns, Jason Witten became the seventh Dallas Cowboy with 40 career touchdown catches in 2011. Later that same season, Witten tied Billy Joe DuPree (41) for sixth in club history. He then broke that tie in 2012 with a scoring grab against Chicago (10/1) to give him sole possession of sixth. He added a pair in the 2013 season opener, one against Denver (10/6) and one against Minnesota (11/3) to give him 48 and tie Drew Pearson for fifth in squad history. He tied Frank Clarke for fourth with two more snags at the N.Y. Giants (11/24), tied Tony Hill for third with a score at Chicago (12/9) and took sole possession of third with a touchdown against Green Bay (12/15):

Against Washington (10/27/14) he broke a tie with Clark with one touchdown and tied Wesley Walls for sixth, then moved past Walls and tied Vernon Davis (55) at Jacksonville (11/9/14). He passed Davis with a score at the N.Y. Giants (11/23/14). He tied Jerry Smith with his 60th score against Washington (1/3/16):

## LEADING MAN

Already placing in the top-two in career receptions and receiving yards all-time among league tight ends, Jason Witten is climbing the NFL's all-time receptions and receiving yards charts among all position players. Witten opened 2016 ranked 10th in receptions (1,020) and 32nd in receiving yards (11,215).

In 2015 Witten reached 1,000 career receptions at Washington (12/7) - only the second tight end and 12th player overall to do so - while moving up to 10th overall in catches in NFL history.

In league all-time receiving yards, he climbed up to 30th all-time when he passed Keenan McCardell (11,373) and Rod Smith (11,389) at San Francisco (10/2), then moved past Muhsin Muhammad (11,438) for 29th against Cincinnati (10/9).

Witten began the 2016 season with nine catches in the season opener against the N.Y. Giants (9/11) to surpass Isaac Bruce (1,024) for 10th on the NFL's all-time receptions list:

## THAT'S A BUNCH OF WITT

After coming into the league as Dallas' third round draft pick in 2003, Jason Witten has strung together a Hall of Fame career. He has appeared in the most Pro Bowls by a Cowboys tight end (10, seven consecutive - 2004-10 and three consecutive 2012-14), and is tied for the second-most by any Dallas player in team history, is tops on the club's all-time receptions chart and second on the receiving yards chart. In 2012 he took the top spot on the club's receptions chart from Michael Irvin at Atlanta (11/4). Witten took 151 games to reach the top of the team's receptions chart which was faster than Irvin (159). When compared to the two other NFL tight ends with at least 750 catches - Tony Gonzalez and Shannon Sharpe - Witten also reached the mark faster - Gonzalez (163 games), Sharpe (169).

Witten hit 950 career receptions after an eight catch performance against the N.Y. Giants (9/13/15). By reaching that mark in his 192nd career game, he did it faster than Gonzalez (198 games) - the only other tight end to reach 950 career receptions.

He surpassed 1,000 career receptions at Washington (12/7/15) with five catches against the Redskins, reaching that mark in his 203rd game to become the sixth-fastest NFL player to do so, and the fastest tight end.

Witten accounts for 649 catches and 7,287 yards of Romo's 2,826 completions and 34,154 yards. Both numbers are more than any other player that has caught a pass from Romo.

In 2012 Witten caught 13 passes against Chicago (10/1) which was third in his career and tied for third among any Cowboys pass catcher and tied for eighth by an NFL tight end. He then bettered that with a club-record 18-catch game against the N.Y. Giants (10/28). His 18 receptions tied for third in a game in NFL history and were the most by a tight end in league history:

## QUICK WITT-ED

Jason Witten has steadily climbed Dallas' all-time receiving yards charts. In 2008 he became the sixth player in Cowboys history to reach 4,000 career receiving yards. In 2010 Witten became the fifth Cowboy to top 6,000 career yards. He opened 2011 with 110 yards at the N.Y. Jets (9/11) to become the fifth Cowboy to reach 7,000. His 94-yard outing against Detroit (10/2) put him past Bob Hayes (7,295) for fourth all-time in club history. He took third from Drew Pearson with four catches for 24 yards against Philadelphia (12/24). In 2012 Witten topped 8,000 yards with his 112-yard game against Chicago (10/1). Witten opened 2013 with 70 yards against the N.Y. Giants (9/8) to become the second Cowboy and third tight end to reach 9,000 career receiving yards. In 2014 he reached 10,000 career yards after a 59-yard performance against Houston (10/5) to become the third tight end - and second Cowboy - to reach that mark. In 2015 Witten became only the second NFL tight end - and second Cowboy - to reach 11,000 career receiving yards with 36 yards against Carolina (11/26/15):

With a club-record 18 catches against the N.Y. Giants (10/28/12), Jason Witten hit 51 receptions for the season for his ninth straight season of 40 catches-or-more. He was the fourth tight end in NFL history with nine 40-catch seasons and the third to do it in nine-plus straight. ## BY DEZIGN

After trading up in the 2010 NFL Draft to select Dez Bryant in the first round with the 24th overall pick, the Dallas Cowboys have seen nothing but production from the wide receiver. Despite his rookie season being cut short due to injury, Bryant was third on the team with 561 yards and six touchdowns and fourth with 45 catches. His reception total was second all-time among club rookies, his touchdowns were third and receiving yards fifth.

He improved upon those numbers in his second season (2011), catching 63 passes for 928 yards and nine touchdowns before topping club receiving charts in 2012 with 1,382 yards (fourth in club history) and 12 touchdowns (tied for fifth) on 92 catches (seventh).

Bryant finished 2013 as the team leader in receptions (93) yards (1,233) and touchdowns (13). He continued in 2014 where he left off, leading the team with 88 receptions for 1,320 yards and a franchise-best 16 touchdowns. He fought through foot and ankle injuries and was limited to nine games in 2015, catching a career-low 31 passes for 401 yards and three touchdowns.

Now in his seventh season, Bryant has totaled 423 receptions for 5,975 yards and 60 touchdowns. His totals all rank amongst the top five spots in club history through a player's first seven seasons:

With the selection of Dez Bryant in the first round of the 2010 NFL Draft, the Dallas Cowboys added to their lineage of home-grown talent at wide receiver. Bryant was issued the jersey number 88 to follow in the footsteps of two of the previous 88s in club history - Drew Pearson (1973-83) and Michael Irvin (1988-99).

His progress as a rookie was slowed after landing on IR with an ankle injury suffered at Indianapolis (12/5/10). He returned in 2011 with 63 catches for 928 yards and nine touchdowns. In 2012 Bryant notched his first career 1,000-yard receiving season with a career-best 1,382 yards on 92 catches and 12 touchdowns. In 2013 Bryant led the team in receiving yards (1,233) with his second consecutive 1,000-yard season while also leading with a career-high in catches (93) and a then career-high in touchdowns (13).

Bryant came on strong in 2014, leading the team with 88 receptions for 1,320 yards and a club-record 16 touchdowns.

He looked to return to form in 2015 following a contract extension, but suffered a foot injury against in the season opener against the N.Y. Giants (9/13) that would linger for the rest of the season, limiting him to nine games. Bryant finished the year with 31 receptions for 401 yards and three touchdowns.

Bryant began the 2016 season with one catch for eight yards in the season opener against the N.Y. Giants (9/11). He increased his production significantly at Washington (9/18) with seven receptions for 102 yards - his 16th career 100-yard game. Bryant caught his 60th career touchdown against Chicago (9/25) as part of a three reception, 40-yard game.

Dez Bryant collected his first touchdown of the 2015 season on an 18-yard acrobatic grab against Philadelphia (11/8). He added his second at Miami (11/22), then had his third against the N.Y. Jets (12/19).

In 2014 Bryant found the endzone a franchise-high 16 times to lead the NFL. This is beginning to be a trend for Dallas' top receiver. He finished the 2013 season with 13 scores to tie for third in the league, was third in 2012 with 12 touchdowns, tied for sixth in 2011 with nine and logged six scores in 2010 - third amongst rookies.

Since the 2012 season, Bryant has the second-most receiving touchdowns in the NFL:

Adding to his total were his career-high three scores at Philadelphia (12/14/14) where he became the first Dallas receiver to post three touchdowns in a game since Miles Austin at San Francisco (9/18/11) and the 12th player overall in team history.

## DEZ-STRUCTIVE

Since entering the league as the Dallas Cowboys first round draft choice in 2010, Dez Bryant has continued his rise each season as arguably one of the league's best receivers. He has reached the century mark in 16 career games, and has steadily improved his output in each season of his early pro career.

As a rookie in 2010 he logged his first career 100-yard game with a 104-yard output at the N.Y. Giants (11/14/10). After no 100-yard games in 2011, he returned in 2012 to log a career-best five games including a career-best 224-yard effort against New Orleans (12/23/12). It was the 10th 200-yard game in team history and was the fourth highest number in a game in franchise record books. In 2013 he turned in his first Pro Bowl campaign highlighted by four games with 100 yards, including a season-best 153 yards against Green Bay (12/15/13). He tied his effort in 2014 as he once again recorded four games north of the century mark, with his centerpiece game of 2014 coming across the pond in London, England with a 158-yard effort at Jacksonville (11/9/14) - the second-highest yardage output of his career.

After returning from a foot injury he suffered in Week 1, Bryant notched his lone 100-yard game of the 2015 season with 104 yards against Philadelphia (11/8) on five catches with one touchdown to break a tie with Miles Austin (14) for the sixth-most career 100-yard receiving games in team history.

He added his first 100-yard game of the 2016 season with 102 yards at Washington (9/18).

To date, Bryant's 16 career 100-yard outings are good for sixth in team history:

## DEZZLING PERFORMANCES

Dez Bryant finished 2012 with 92 receptions, a career-high 1,382 yards and 12 touchdowns. From Weeks 8-13, he opened the flood gates of production. Over that span, he led the league with six touchdown catches, was third with 475 yards and seventh with 29 catches. He logged three 100-yard games, including back-to-back 145-yarders against Cleveland (11/18) and Washington (11/22).

Bryant tied a club record with a touchdown catch in seven consecutive games. On Thanksgiving Day against Washington, he had two scoring grabs then did the same the next week against Philadelphia (12/2/12), the sixth time in team history - fifth different player - a Dallas Cowboy had back-to-back multi-touchdown games. Bryant repeated the feat in 2013 with another pair in two games - at San Diego (9/29) and against Denver (10/6). He did it again in 2014 with two at Jacksonville (11/9) and two at the N.Y. Giants (11/23) to become the first player in team history to boast three instances of back-to-back multi-touchdown games:

In 2012 Bryant had two scores against New Orleans (12/23). His two touchdown catches came on consecutive drives, both from 58 yards. Bryant became the first league pass catcher with 55-plus yard touchdown grabs on consecutive drives since Buffalo's Lee Evans (at Houston, 11/19/06) did it.

Bryant's two touchdown catches against the Saints was his fourth multi-touchdown game of the season, sixth of his career. Bryant's four in 2012 were a single-season club best, while his six career tied for sixth.

Bryant finished 2013 with three multi-score games. He had two scores at Jacksonville (11/9) for his first multi-touchdown game of 2014 to give him 10 for his career and break a tie with Frank Clarke, Tony Hill and Michael Irvin (all with nine) for sole possession of second in club history.

In 2014 he posted a career-high tying four multi-touchdown games with two at Jacksonville (11/9), two at the N.Y. Giants (11/23), a career-high three at Philadelphia (12/14) and two at Washington (12/28) to give him 13 for his career:

## DEZ VS. THE AFC

Dez Bryant caught a 10-yard touchdown against the N.Y. Jets (12/19/15) to extend his streak of consecutive touchdowns against AFC opponents to 14 games. It is the longest interconference streak in the NFL since the 1970 NFL merger.

Overall since entering the league in 2010, Bryant has caught the most touchdowns (20) by an NFC player against AFC foes. He also has posted the fourth-most receptions (130) and fifth-most receiving yardage total (1,715) during that timespan in interconference matchups:

## THE REAL DEAL T-WILL

After concluding his third pro season, Terrance Williams has emerged as one of the Cowboys top receiving targets, particularly in catching touchdowns. After posting five scores as a rookie in 2013, he proved as a threat to score again in 2014 by surpassing his rookie total with eight touchdowns in 2014, good for second on the team. His three scores in 2015 tied for second on the squad, and he has one so far in 2016. Together, his 17 career touchdowns are the seventh-most by a Cowboys receiver during his first four pro seasons:

Williams caught five touchdowns as a rookie to tie for fourth in team history by a player in his first pro season. His rookie year was highlighted by a streak of four consecutive games with a touchdown pass to mark the longest streak of his career.

He increased his scoring production in 2014 with eight touchdowns, including a stretch of three straight games with a scoring grab: at St. Louis (9/21/14), against New Orleans (9/28/14) - where he had two touchdowns to tally the first multi-touchdown game of his career - and against Houston (10/5/14) to record the second-longest touchdown streak of his career. He recorded his second career multi-touchdown game with two scoring catches against Indianapolis (12/21/14).

Williams amped it up for the 2014 postseason, scoring three of the team's four receiving touchdowns while finishing second with 130 receiving yards and tied for fourth with four receptions. His three touchdowns tied for the postseason lead amongst all NFL receivers and also tied for the most by a Cowboys receiver in a single postseason in team history:

## TERRANCE THE TERRIFIC

Terrance Williams serves as a deep threat option to compliment Dez Bryant. Since entering the league in 2013, Williams led all Cowboys receivers in each of his first three pro seasons in receiving average (from players with at least 15 catches). He has continued that trend by currently leading the team in 2016 with a 15.6 average. His career average of 16.4 is the eighth-highest in the league from 2013-16 among receivers with at least 50 catches during that span:

In 2015 Williams posted nine games with an average of 15.0-or-better, and three games with an average of 20.0-or-better. He posted career-highs with eight catches for 173 yards in the season finale against Washington (1/3/16), while his 21.6 average was the third-highest number of his career (with at least three receptions). It was also Williams' second career 100-yard receiving game, and his 173 yards were the most by a Cowboys receiver since Bryant had 224 against New Orleans (12/23/12).

Against Chicago (9/25) Williams caught four passes for 88 yards for a 22.0 average - highest of the 2016 season. He then had a season-high five grabs for 70 yards and a 14.0 average against Cincinnati (10/9). Williams boasted an 18.8 average on four catches for 75 yards at Green Bay (10/16).

## COLE WORLD

Cole Beasley has steadily increased his production at the receiver position since entering the league as an undrafted free agent in 2012. Since then, he has become an automatic weapon in the Cowboys passing game, collecting 176 receptions for 1,842 yards and 14 touchdowns in his career.

He finished the 2015 season with a team-best five touchdowns, tied for second with 52 receptions and third with 536 yards - all-career-highs. Included his highlight season was a breakout game against Philadelphia (11/8/15), hauling in nine passes for 112 yards - both career-highs - and a career-high tying two touchdowns. It was his first career 100-yard receiving game, while his two scores marked his second career multi-touchdown game. Beasley also tied his career-best with five first downs, including two on third down, and hauled in a 30-yard pass in the fourth quarter that was the second-longest catch of his career. He matched his career-high in the 2015 season finale against Washington (1/3/16), hauling in two scores - his third career multi-touchdown game - on five receptions for 53 yards.

Beasley continues to be one of Dallas' top options in the passing game in 2016. Through six games he leads the team with 33 receptions for 390 yards and three touchdowns. Beasley also currently leads all Cowboys receivers with 22 first downs - 23rd in the league - including 10 on third down, tied for fifth in the NFL, while his 13 overall receptions on third down are tied for sixth in the league.

He collected eight passes for 65 yards - both second on the team - with a team-high and career-high tying five first downs in the season opener against the N.Y. Giants (9/11). Beasley was second on the team in receptions (five), yards (75) and receiving first downs (four) at Washington (9/18). He once again led the team with seven receptions - two on third down - for 73 yards against Chicago (9/25), then posted a team-high 66 yards - including a career-long catch of 47 yards - on three receptions with two first downs and one on third down at San Francisco (10/2). Beasley was second on the team with four catches for 53 yards - including four for first downs with one on third down - and his first touchdown of the season against Cincinnati (10/9). Beasley led the team with six receptions for 58 yards - including four for first downs - and two touchdowns at Green Bay (10/16). His two scores marked his fourth career multi-touchdown game.

## 'BEAS' IN THE TRAP

On third down, Cole Beasley has recorded 10 first downs to tie for the fifth in the NFL on 13 receptions - tied for sixth - for 141 yards (10.8 avg.) through Week 7 in 2016. More specifically, Beasley's receiving output has accounted for 13-of-38 completions and 141-of-439 passing yards for Dallas Cowboys rookie quarterback Dak Prescott, who ranks sixth in the league with a 96.6 rating on third down.

Overall, Beasley has produced his highest receiving yardage output (711) and yards-per-catch (11.1), second-most touchdowns (five) and receptions (64) on third down throughout his career.

## THE BOOK OF EZEKIEL

For only the second time in franchise history, the Dallas Cowboys used a top-five pick to choose Ezekiel Elliott out of Ohio State with the fourth overall selection in the 2016 NFL Draft. Dallas selected Tony Dorsett with the second pick in the 1977 NFL Draft. The former Buckeye has started since Week 1 as the team's feature runner.

Limited during training camp due to a hamstring injury, Elliott saw action in only one game during the preseason at Seattle (8/25). In one half against the Seahawks first team defense, Elliott rushed seven times for 48 yards (6.9 avg.).

Elliott has come on strong to begin his pro career, as he currently leads the NFL in 2016 in rushing yards (703), is fifth in attempts (137) and rushing average (5.1) and is tied for sixth in rushing touchdowns (five) - all tops by a rookie rusher:

Elliott made his NFL debut against the N.Y. Giants (9/11) and became only the fourth rookie running back in team history to start a season opener, joining Calvin Hill (1969), Ron Springs (1979) and Derrick Lassic (1993). He rushed 20 times for 51 yards and his first career touchdown as his totals were the most carries and the third-highest rushing yardage by a Cowboys rookie rusher to start a season opener. At Washington (9/18) he upped his effort to amass 83 yards on 21 carries with a touchdown, although he had two fumbles with one lost. However, his score allowed him to become the first rookie running back for the Cowboys to rush for a touchdown in each of the first two games of the season and the seventh league rookie rusher to accomplish that feat since 1999. Elliott turned in his best game to date against Chicago (9/25), rushing 30 times for 140 yards and eight first downs. His 140-yard rushing output marked his first career 100-yard game, and he became the 10th rookie running back in team history to reach 100. It was also the 24th time that a Cowboys rusher went over the century mark, and the first time Dallas had a rookie do it since DeMarco Murray had 135 yards against Buffalo (11/13/11). His 140 yards were good for eighth by a Cowboys rookie runner while his 30 carries tied the second-highest number by a rookie rusher in a single game in team history. He posted 138 yards on 23 carries with one score at San Francisco (10/2). It was Elliott's second consecutive game to rush for 100 yards to mark the fourth time in team history that a rookie accomplished that feat, and the first player with back-to-back 100-yard games since Darren McFadden last season (12/13/15-12/19/15). Against Cincinnati (10/9) Elliott rushed for 134 yards on 15 carries with two touchdowns. His two scores marked his first career multi-touchdown game, it was the 21st time in team history that a rookie rusher recorded two-or-more touchdowns, and he was the 12th Cowboys rookie running back to accomplish that feat. He had a career-long 60-yard rushing touchdown in the third quarter that tied the fifth-longest rush by a Cowboys rookie and the longest since Joseph Randle had a 65-yard run and score at Washington (12/28/14). It was also his third consecutive game to rush for 100 yards - the first time in team history that a rookie runner had three straight games over the century mark - and the first time a Cowboys rusher had three consecutive games over 130 yards rushing in a single season. It was also only the third time in NFL history that a rookie runner posted three consecutive games of 130+ yards, and the first time it has happened by a running back overall since Adrian Peterson had three consecutive games with 130+ yards (12/2/12-12/16/12). Elliott rushed for 157 yards - fourth-most by a Cowboys rookie - on 28 carries at Green Bay (10/16), who entered the game with the NFL's No. 1 rushing defense. It was also the fourth game in a row that he rushed for over 100 yards - first time that a rookie rusher accomplished that feat in team history and tied for the second-longest streak in team history overall. By compiling 157 yards, it also marked the first time in NFL history that a rookie runner posted four consecutive games with 130-plus yards.

## ZEKE MAKES THE LEAP

Ezekiel Elliott had a breakout game against Chicago (9/25), establishing a career-high 30 carries for a then career-high 140 yards. His 140 yards were then the eighth-most by a Cowboys rookie runner in team history, then he topped that at Green Bay (10/16) with 157 yards - good for fourth - on 28 rushes:

## ZEKE MONSTER

Ezekiel Elliott recorded another 'monster' game against Cincinnati (10/9), rushing 15 times for 134 yards and two touchdowns. His two scores marked his first career multi-touchdown game, and he became the 12th Cowboys rookie running back to accomplish that feat - 21st time by a rookie runner - in team history. Part of his performance included a career-long 60-yard rushing touchdown in the third quarter that tied the fifth-longest rush by a Cowboys rookie and the longest since Joseph Randle had a 65-yard run and score at Washington (12/28/14):

Elliott's performance against the Bengals also marked Elliott's third consecutive game to rush for 100 yards - the first time in team history that a rookie runner had three straight games over the century mark. It was also the first time a Cowboys rusher had three consecutive games over 130+ yards rushing in a single season, following his 140-yard performance against Chicago (9/25) and 138-yard mark at San Francisco (10/2). It was only the third time in NFL history that a rookie runner posted three consecutive games of 130+ yards, then he topped that with 157 yards at Green Bay (10/16) to establish an NFL rookie record with his fourth consecutive game with 130-plus yards:

Rayne Dakota "Dak" Prescott had one rush for a six-yard touchdown - his first career score (passing or rushing) - in the third quarter at Washington (9/18). It marked only the third time a Dallas quarterback scored a rushing touchdown in a game during his rookie campaign:

Prescott had another rushing touchdown against Chicago (9/25) to mark his second consecutive game with a rushing score - first time in team history that a rookie quarterback accomplished that feat. He added his third rushing score against Cincinnati (10/9) to mark the most by a Cowboys quarterback since Danny White had four in 1983, while also tying the third-highest total by a Cowboys quarterback in a single season:

## 214 + 46 + 25 = RUSHING TDS

The Dallas Cowboys rushing attack has produced 11 touchdowns behind a stable of rushers as Ezekiel Elliott (five), Alfred Morris (two), Lance Dunbar (one) and quarterback Dak Prescott (three) have all contributed to the running cause. The 11 total rushing touchdowns have already surpassed the eight scores that the 2015 team had all last season.

Along with Elliott and Prescott's rushing scores at Washington (9/18), former Redskin Morris added to the rushing attack with a game-clinching four-yard touchdown in the fourth quarter against his ex-team. Collectively, it marked the first time that the Dallas offense had boasted three different players with at least one rushing touchdown since Miles Austin, Marion Barber III and Tashard Choice each had one against New Orleans (11/25/10). The Cowboys repeated that feat for the second consecutive game against Chicago (9/25), as Morris, Prescott and Dunbar - who scored his first career touchdown - each got into the endzone. It marked the first time that has happened in consecutive weeks in team history since the 1983 season (11/20 against Kansas City and 11/24 against St. Louis). Elliott scored the team's lone rushing touchdown at San Francisco (10/2), before the squad added three more (Elliott - two; Prescott - one) against Cincinnati (10/9).

With the 2016 season through the first seven weeks, Dallas is tied for the league lead in rushing touchdowns with 11.

As an unexpected surprise, the 2016 NFL Draft brought two new rookie starters on opening day. Ezekiel Elliott was drafted with the fourth overall pick with the intention of starting from day one, but fourth round selection Dak Prescott worked his way up the ladder following injuries to backup Kellen Moore in training camp and starter Tony Romo during the preseason. With Moore out for the year, and Romo mending a back injury until his return, Prescott will take the helm as the team's starting quarterback.

Due to the circumstances, the combination of number 21 (Elliott) and number 4 (Prescott) - which ironically is the area code for Dallas - allowed the Cowboys to open the season with a rookie quarterback and rookie running back for only the second time in team history when Roger Staubach and Calvin Hill started the 1969 opener. The Cowboys won that game against the St. Louis Cardinals with Staubach passing for 220 yards and a touchdown, while Hill rushed 18 times for 70 yards. Against the N.Y. Giants (9/11), Prescott passed for 227 yards on 25-of-45 passes with no touchdowns and no interceptions, while Elliott rushed 20 times for 51 yards and his first career touchdown.

The Cowboys also became the first team to start two rookies in the offensive backfield since the 2012 Washington Redskins rolled out rookies Robert Griffin III and Alfred Morris.

Overall, the Cowboys have featured a rookie QB/RB duo five-times in their history, and suffered their first loss in a game that featured a rookie backfield against the N.Y. Giants (9/11):

The rookie combo made waves once again in Week 2 at Washington (9/18). Both Elliott and Prescott each contributed rushing touchdowns in the first win of the 2016 season for the Cowboys, marking the first time a rookie running back and a rookie quarterback each scored a rushing touchdown in a single game in team history. Elliott had a one-yard run - his second of the season - in the first quarter to give Dallas a 10-0 lead, then Prescott notched his first career touchdown on a six-yard rush in the third quarter to give the Cowboys a 20-17 advantage. Prescott added his second career rushing score against Chicago (9/25). Both Elliott and Prescott contributed with rushing scores against Cincinnati (10/9), with the running back adding two - his first career multi-touchdown game - and Prescott adding his third of the season to mark the most by a Cowboys rookie quarterback in team history.

## ROOKIE RAMPAGE

Following the fifth game of the season which saw rookie quarterback Dak Prescott pass for 227 yards and rookie running back Ezekiel Elliott rush for 134 yards against Cincinnati (10/9), Prescott had 1,239 passing yards along with 546 rushing yards for Elliott this season. With those totals, the Cowboys became the first team in NFL history to boast a rookie quarterback with at least 1,000 passing yards and a rookie running back with at least 500 rushing yards in the first five games of a season.

## RUSHING TO THE TOP

Over the last few seasons, the Dallas Cowboys have established an identity on offense with their rushing attack, finishing each of the previous two seasons (2014-2nd; 2015-9th) in the top-10 in the NFL in rushing. The Cowboys are out to accomplish the same feat in 2016 and currently boast the league's best rushing offense, averaging 161.2 rushing yards-per-game:

## BIG PLAY RUNS

After only three combined runs of 10+ runs in the first two games, the Cowboys ground game has begun to make longer runs throughout the course of a game. Against Chicago (9/25) the offense produced five runs of 10-plus, including one run over 20 yards. They added four more at San Francisco (10/2) including two 20+ runs by Ezekiel Elliott (23, 26). Against Cincinnati (10/9) the offense tacked on five more including a 60-yard romp by Elliott - the longest run from scrimmage by a Cowboy since Joseph Randle had a 65-yard run at Washington (12/28/14). At Green Bay (10/16) the offense tallied six 10-plus runs, including three 20-plus runs.

For the 2016 season, Dallas' 23 runs of 10-plus yards are tied for seventh in the NFL, led by Elliott's 17 runs that tie for third:

## OFFICIAL TIMEKEEPERS OF THE NFL

Over the last few seasons, the Dallas Cowboys offense has made a focal point in time of possession, controlling the clock for a season average of 32:26 in 2014 - highest in the NFL - and tied for 11th in the league with an average of 30:59 per-game in 2015.

Dallas is continuing its trend in 2016, as the offensive unit currently leads the NFL with a 33:09 mark:

The unit has posted four games with at least 30:00 minutes of possession to tie for the fifth in the NFL in 2016.

Dallas' offense clocked in at 36:43 in the season opener against the N.Y. Giants (9/11), including a season-high 8:25 on the opening drive. At Washington (9/18) the offense logged its second consecutive game of 30:00-or-more with a 32:51 mark which was highlighted by a 94-yard touchdown drive on nine plays on its second possession of the game to mark the longest scoring drive since going 95 yards at Seattle (9/16/12). Against Chicago (9/25) the unit clocked in at 35:19 to mark its third consecutive game to go over 30:00. The unit dialed in at 36:27 - second-highest of the season - at San Francisco (10/2).

## DRIVE FOR FIVE

While the Dallas Cowboys offense continues to be atop the league in time of possession, the squad also boasts 16 drives of five-or-more minutes with 15 going for scores, tops in the NFL in 2016. Specifically, the unit also has had eight drives go five-or-more minutes and result in touchdowns, best in the league:

Furthermore, Dallas' offense is tied for the second-most games with 50.0 percent-or-better on third downs in 2016 with three.

Dallas produced a season-high 59.0% third down conversion rate in the season opener against the N.Y. Giants (9/11), including a season-best 10 first downs on 17 attempts. The Cowboys produced their second consecutive game with a 50.0 percent conversion mark, going six-of-12 (50.0) at Washington (9/18), then were four-of-eight (50.0) against Cincinnati (10/9).

## RETURN OF THE LEE-DER

Dallas Cowboys linebacker Sean Lee returned to the field in 2015, this time coming back from a torn ACL he suffered in a spring practice that took away his 2014 season. Before that, Lee had bounced back in 2013 to tally a team-best 123 tackles after landing on Reserve/Injured with a toe injury in 2012.

Having manned the middle linebacker spot since his rookie season, Lee moved to a new position in 2015 with a shift over to the weakside spot to further utilize his speed and playmaking ability in the Cowboys 4-3 defense. Lee led the squad with a career-high 156 tackles along with his first career sacks (2.5), a team and career-high 11 tackles for loss, six pressures, an interception and five pass breakups. He was named to his first Pro Bowl as an injury replacement for Justin Houston (Kansas City).

Lee leads the 2016 team with 71 tackles along with two tackles for loss and two pass breakups.

In the season opener against the N.Y. Giants (9/11), Lee led the team with 15 tackles. He topped the defense again with 10 stops at Washington (9/18) along with a breakup. Lee made seven tackles and a tackle for loss against Chicago (9/25). He tied for the team lead with 10 stops at San Francisco (10/2) along with a tackle for loss. Lee made a season-high tying 15 tackles against Cincinnati (10/9), then notched 14 stops and a breakup at Green Bay (10/16).

Known to always be around the ball, Lee has collected 12 interceptions since entering the league as Dallas' 2010 second round draft choice to mark the most on the team and is tied for the most amongst league linebackers in the NFL during that span. His 12 are also fifth among linebackers in team history. Lee has intercepted a career-high four passes twice in season during his career - leading the team in 2013 and tying for the team lead in 2011 - to tie for sixth-most in a single-season in team history:

## TANK ON A ROLL

During the 2014 NFL Draft, the Dallas Cowboys moved up in the second round to select defensive end DeMarcus "Tank" Lawrence. Limited to only seven games due to a broken foot suffered in training camp, he logged only 11 tackles, a tackle for loss and six pressures. However, during the postseason he cranked up his play, tallying two sacks - one in each playoff game - two forced fumbles and a fumble recovery.

During his second season in 2015 he led the team with a career-high 8.0 sacks, was second with 31 pressures, third with eight tackles for loss and eighth with 56 tackles - all career-bests.

In particular, Lawrence turned on the pressure over the final eight weeks of the season, as his 7.0 sacks from Week 10-Week 16 tied for the fifth-most quarterback takedowns in the NFL during that period:

After serving a league mandated four-game suspension to start 2016, Lawrence made his season debut against Cincinnati (10/9) and had a pressure.

## CHURCH IN SESSION

Barry Church has consistently been one of Dallas' top defensive performers and leaders. He has posted over 100+ tackles in each of the last three seasons (2013-15) - the longest such streak since Bradie James recorded six seasons (2005-10) with 100+ tackles - while finishing as either the leading and second-leading tackler in each of those seasons.

Church made his mark on the Cowboys defense in 2013, turning in a team-leading, and career-best 147 tackles, bouncing back after missing the majority of the 2012 season after suffering a ruptured Achilles tendon three weeks into the season. He posted eight games with 10-or-more tackles in 2013 - most on the defense - including a career-high 17 at New Orleans (11/10/13). Overall, his tackle totals were the third-most by a Cowboys safety, and the 11th-most overall by any Cowboys defender, dating back to 1989:

He finished 2014 atop Dallas' defense with 110 tackles - his second consecutive season with 100+ stops - to become the first player to lead the team in tackles in back-to-back seasons since James' six seasons streak (2005-10). It was also the first time a Dallas defender posted consecutive 100+ tackle seasons since James had six in a row from 2005-10.

In 2015, Church finished second on the team with 136 tackles to mark his third consecutive 100-plus tackle season, the longest streak since James' six (2005-10).

He began 2016 not unlike the past few seasons, amassing 12 stops in the season opener against the N.Y. Giants (9/11) - good for second on the squad. Church made six stops, a pass breakup and an interception - fourth of his career - at Washington (9/18). He had 13 tackles and two pass breakups - both season-highs - to lead the team against Chicago (9/25). Church made 10 stops and two tackles for loss at San Francisco (10/2), then had 11 tackles against Cincinnati (10/9). He totaled eight stops, his second interception of the season - tied a career-high - and also had a breakup and a forced fumble.

Church currently leads the team with two interceptions, is second with 60 tackles and is tied for second with four pass breakups.

## BYRON THE BREAKUP ARTIST

Byron Jones was a standout defensive player in the Cowboys secondary as a rookie in 2015, finishing the season fifth on the team with 76 tackles, adding two tackles for loss, and first on the defense with 12 passes defended. Jones was the first Cowboys rookie defender to lead the team in pass breakups since Derek Ross (12) in 2002, and is the only rookie defender in Cowboys history to finish the season with 75-plus tackles and lead the team in breakups (Cowboys did not track PBUs before 1984):

Jones returned to swatting passes to start 2016, breaking up one pass against the N.Y. Giants (9/11) in the season opener along with seven tackles. He had six stops and a breakup at Washington (9/18). Jones made five tackles, a breakup and a forced fumble against Chicago (9/25). He had six stops and a breakup against Cincinnati (10/9), then at Green Bay (10/16) contributed four stops and a breakup.

For the 2016 season, Jones currently leads the defense in pass breakups with five. He also is seventh on the team with 28 tackles along with a forced fumble.

## MO BETTER BLUES

Morris Claiborne came through for the defense at San Francisco (10/2). He made two big plays in the fourth quarter with an interception of Blaine Gabbert - his first since at St. Louis (9/21/14) - then on the 49ers next offensive possession, he stopped the receiver short of the first down on 4th-and-6 to allow the Cowboys offense to run out the clock for the win. He finished the day with six tackles, a tackle for loss, an interception and a pass breakup. Against Cincinnati (10/9) he deflected a season-high two passes while also contributing six tackles. At Green Bay (10/16) he added three stops and recovered a fumble.

On the year, Claiborne is fifth on the team with 31 tackles, tied for second with four breakups and also has an interception and a fumble recovery.

## NFC DEFENSIVE PLAYER OF THE WEEK

The Dallas Cowboys added David Irving via the Kansas City Chiefs practice squad last season as a rookie. In 12 games in 2015 he became a rotational player on the defensive line, summing up 14 tackles, a half sack, two tackles for loss, 14 quarterback pressures and a blocked field goal.

He returned in 2016 to contribute more to the defense and thus far leads the team with three forced fumbles, is tied for the team lead with two tackles for loss and seven pressures and has also made four tackles, a sack, two pass breakups, three forced fumbles and a fumble recovery.

In the season opener against the N.Y. Giants (9/11) he posted three tackles and a tackle for loss. Irving led the team with a career-high four pressures against Chicago (9/25). He had his best game to date at Green Bay (10/16), notching a tackle, a sack, a tackle for loss, a breakup, a fumble recovery and three forced fumbles. His three forced fumbles tied for third-most all-time in a single game in NFL history, and he became the second Cowboy to do accomplish that feat, joining DeMarcus Ware (2005).

For his efforts against the Packers, Irving was named the NFC Defensive Player of The Week for Week 6, becoming the first Dallas defender to win the award since Sean Lee did it last season (Week 2 - 2015) and the first defensive lineman since Leon Lett (Week 5 - 1996).

## STOP AT 17 POINTS

Through six games played, the Dallas Cowboys defensive unit is allowing only 17.8 points-per-game to place seventh in the league. Additionally, Dallas is one of only six teams to give up 20-or-more points to opposing team's offenses only twice this season - tied for third-fewest games in the NFL - and that came in the Cowboys first two games. Since then, the defense has not allowed a team to score more than 17 points in four consecutive games to mark the longest such streak in a single season since the 2009 team had a streak of five games in 2009 (11/1-11/26).

## TAKEAWAYS FROM "MIGHTY ORPHANS"

Dallas Cowboys Defensive Coordinator Rod Marinelli has dubbed his defense "The Mighty Orphans" in respect that his group of defenders are made of up "castaways" in the NFL that are not top draft picks or major free agent signees. Instead, they are a core group of men who will fight on every snap, a mantra that Marinelli distills upon his unit.

The nickname, one that Marinelli gives with respect, is based on the book the "Twelve Mighty Orphans" written by Jim Dent, which tells the story of the Masonic Orphanage in Fort Worth, TX. During the 1930s and '40s, the orphanage, under coach Rusty Russell, played high school football with a limited enrollment of 150 and little to no budget as they went on to tie Corsicana in the 1932 high school state championship game.

With that nickname and mantra, the defense has been opportunistic with nine takeaways (5 fumble recoveries; 4 INTs) in the team's first six games to tie for 12th in the NFL.

The unit had two takeaways (two fumble recoveries) against Chicago (9/25). At Green Bay (10/16) the defense gathered a season-high four takeaways (3 fum; 1 INT) to mark the most in a single game since four at Washington (12/28/14).

## SHUTOUTS AND SACKS

The Dallas Cowboys defense turned in its best performance against Cincinnati (10/9). The unit held the Bengals offense scoreless through through the third quarter to mark the first shut-out through three quarters since at Philadelphia (9/20/15). It was also the fifth consecutive game that the Cowboys have held their opponent scoreless during at least one quarter in 2016 to join the 1975 team as the only two times that has happened in franchise history. The defense extended that streak at Green Bay (10/16), holding the Packers offense scoreless in the third quarter to match the 1975 defense as the only two teams to accomplish that feat through the first six games.

The defense also logged four sacks on Cincinnati's Andy Dalton - the most since logging five against New England (10/11/15) - with Terrell McClain leading the way with a career-high 1.5, while Benson Mayowa and Cedric Thornton each had one and Jack Crawford had a half sack.

On the year, the defensive unit has produced 11.0 sacks with Tyrone Crawford and Benson Mayowa leading the way with 2.0 each.

## NO HUNDREDS EXCHANGED HERE

Through six games, the defense of the Dallas Cowboys is one-of-two teams in the National Football League to not allow a 100-yard rusher or 100-yard receiver in 2016, along with the Minnesota Vikings.

This is the longest such streak since the team had six-straight games to start the 2011 season (9/11/11-10/23/11).

## BAILEY FROM 50

For his career, Dan Bailey is 23-of-31 (74.2) from 50-plus yards, and sits atop the club's charts for 50-yarders in a season (six - 2013) and career, while he also tied a franchise-long 56-yard field goal twice - at Seattle (10/12/14) and against the N.Y. Giants (9/11/16).

Bailey has hit two 50+ field goals in a game four times (three times in 2013), including most recently in the 2016 season opener against the N.Y. Giants (9/11), to tie Eddie Murray (at Minnesota, 12/12/93) for the most in a single game.

At Kansas City (9/15/13) Bailey was true on three tries, including a pair from 50-plus yards (51 and a career-long 53). Bailey's two 50-yard field goals marked the second time in team history a kicker hit two 50-plus tries in the same game. The first was Eddie Murray at Minnesota, 12/12/93 (51 and 52 yards). Bailey did it twice more after nailing two 53-yarders at Detroit (10/27) and two 50-yarders against Green Bay (12/15).

In 2014, Bailey finished five-of-seven (71.4) on field goals from 50 yards-or-more during the regular season for the second-most field goals made in a single season in team history.

He was five-of-six from 50 yards in 2015, the second-highest percentage (83.3) in team history in a single season from 50-yards, and tied for the second-most made in a single season.

Bailey opened 2016 with four field goals against the N.Y. Giants (9/11), with two from 50 yards (including a career and franchise-high to tying 56-yarder) to tie for the most 50-yard field goals in a single game in team history.

## GAME-WINNING KICKS

In his rookie season, Dan Bailey was called upon six times to win or tie the game with his foot. Four times he came through for Dallas. Bailey's four game-winning field goals were the most by a Dallas Cowboy in a single season and the most by a rookie in NFL history.

In 2012 Bailey had four opportunities to do the same, and he came through in three games including two in overtime. He added one game-winner in 2013 with a 35-yarder at the N.Y. Giants (11/24).

Bailey was one-of-two during the 2014 season.

His only game-winner of the 2015 season came at Washington (12/7) where he nailed a 54-yarder - tied for the second-longest kick of his career, and the longest game-winner of his career.

In team history, there have now been 39 instances in which a kicker was true on a game-winning field goal with 2:00-or-less left in the fourth quarter or in overtime.

Bailey has rang true with 10 game-winners - and a franchise-best five in overtime - to serve as the most in team history:

## BAILEY'S BOOTS

Since joining the Dallas Cowboys as an undrafted free agent in 2011 as the club's kicker, Dan Bailey has recorded 23 games with three-or-more field goals - the most in team history. He also has seven games with four-or-more field goals - tops in team history.

Bailey had five games with three-or-more field goals as a rookie in 2011, including his first game with four-or-more when he struck a career-best six against Washington (9/26/11). He matched that total with five games in 2012, while also adding one game with four field goals at Carolina (10/21/12). For the third consecutive season in 2013 he notched five games with three-or-more field goals, with a season-high five field goals made against Green Bay (12/15/13). In 2014 and 2015 he recorded three each, while he added one four field goal game in 2014 and a career-high two in 2015.

Bailey began 2016 with a bang, connecting on all four field goal attempts against the N.Y. Giants (9/11) to break a tie with Rafael Septien for his 22nd game with three-or-more field goals to establish a team record, while also extending his team record with his seventh career game with four-or-more field goals made:

## MORE RELIABLE IS BETTER

Dan Bailey came to Dallas in 2011 as a rookie free agent and immediately earned his spot as the club's place kicker, finishing the season 32-of-37 (86.5%) on field goals for the second-best field goal percentage by a rookie in franchise history. His 32 field goals made were also a club rookie record. He had a streak of 26 consecutive made which were the most by a rookie in NFL history.

In his second season he finished with a 93.5 (29-of-31) field goal percentage - second in team history. He went 28-of-30 (93.3) in 2013, hitting 30 consecutive field goals from 2013 into 2014 to establish a team record. Bailey finished 2014 25-of-29 (86.2) with a career-high 56 extra points to tie the third-most in team history. He was 30-of-32 with field goal tries and hit all 25 PATs in 2015, and has begun 2016 seven-of-eight on field goals while connecting on all eight PATs for 29 points.

For his career, Bailey has converted 155-of-172 tries (90.1%), and his field goals made are second in team history. Bailey has also hit all 222 PAT tries - second in franchise history:

## MAKING THE POINT

Dan Bailey has been a scoring machine since entering the league in 2011 as the former undrafted free agent has totaled 687 points to rank third in team history:

In 2014 Bailey passed Michael Irvin (392), Bob Hayes (456) and Tony Dorsett (516) for third on Dallas' all-time points list. He also reached 400 points during the season to become the second kicker (Rafael Septien - 874) in team history - fifth player overall - to do so. At Philadelphia (12/14/14) he reached 500 career points, becoming the fourth player - second kicker - in team history to get to that plateau. Bailey reached 500 points in his 62nd game to become the second-fastest kicker in NFL history to hit that mark. He reached 600 points against Carolina (11/26/15) to become the third player - second kicker - in team history to do so.

## CAN'T MISS KICKER

The Dallas Cowboys feature one of the league's most dependable kickers, as the former 2011 undrafted free agent has hit true on 150-of-165 field goals for his career. During that time, Dan Bailey has challenged some of the franchise's longest consecutive field goal records, including 26 in a row in his first season to tie the second-longest streak in team history and mark the longest streak of field goals made by a rookie in team and NFL history. He then hit 21 in a row in between his second and third seasons (2012-13) - the third-longest in team history.

However, after that streak was snapped, Bailey quickly embarked on a new field goals streak in 2013 and extended it into the 2014 season. He opened the season with one field goal made against San Francisco (9/7) to extend his streak to 22 straight field goals made and move to the third-longest streak. Bailey then hit all four of his tries at Tennessee (9/14/14) to extend his field goals made to 26 in a row, tying Chris Boniol (1995) and his 2011 total for the second-longest streak in team history. He had two field goals at St. Louis (9/21/14) to reach 28 in a row and pass Boniol's 1995 total of 27 to establish the longest streak of field goals made in team history. He continued that streak up to 30 successful kicks before missing a 53-yarder against Houston (10/5/14).

Bailey had a streak of 21 consecutive field goals made - tied for fifth-longest in team history - that began with three made at Washington (12/28/14) in 2014 and continued with 18 straight in 2015 until he missed his first one at Tampa Bay (11/15) to end the streak:

After connecting on two-of-three field goals at Buffalo (12/27/15), Dan Bailey reached 30 field goals on the season for the second time of his career. It was also only the fourth time a Dallas kicker had reached 30 field goals made and the first since his 2011 season when he made 32 field goals:

## JONES-ING TO PUNT

Dallas Cowboys punter Chris Jones had a career year in 2015. The fourth-year pro ranked third with a career-high 42.5 net average and was 20th with a 45.2 gross while his 27 punts downed inside opponents' 20-yard line tied for 14th.

In 2016, Jones is seventh with a 48.2 gross average and is tied for 20th with a 39.1 net average and has six punts downed inside the 20-yard line.

He logged a career-best 55.3 gross average along with a season-long punt of 63 yards on four boots at San Francisco (10/2).

For his career, Jones boasts a 45.3 gross average and a net average of 40.3, with 95 punts downed inside the 20-yard line - good for fifth all-time in team history.

## 2016 DRAFT CLASS

The Dallas Cowboys drafted nine players - five defensive, four offensive - in the 2016 NFL Draft. It was the third consecutive season the team leaned more towards defense, as 17 of the last 26 picks by Dallas in the last three drafts (2014-16) have been on that side of the ball. The new class started off with Dallas' first round choice - running back Ezekiel Elliott - who was selected with the fourth overall pick to mark just the second time in team history that the club has selected a running back with a top-five pick (Tony Dorsett, No. 2 overall - 1977).

Of the nine players chosen by Dallas, eight made the final roster entering Week One while one (Rico Gathers) was signed to the club's practice squad.
