GAME SUMMARY

NEW ENGLAND PATRIOTS (14-2) at HOUSTON TEXANS (9-7) Saturday Jan. 14, 2017 • Gillette Stadium (66,829) • 8:15 p.m. ET

The New England Patriots finished the 2016 regular season with a 14-2 record for an NFL record fifth time in team history. The team also earned the top seed in the AFC playoff field for the sixth time (2016, 2014, 2011, 2010, 2007 and 2003), the most in the NFL since the current playoff formula was established in 1990. The Patriots will host a Divisional Playoff game against Houston on Sat., Jan. 14 at 8:15 p.m. This season marks the seventh straight year that the Patriots will host a Divisional game, adding to their NFL record. Miami hosted five straight from 1981 through 1985.

BROADCAST INFORMATION

TELEVISION: This week's game will be broadcast by CBS and can be seen locally on WBZ-TV Channel 4 in Boston. Jim Nantz will handle play-by-play duties with Phil Simms as the color analyst. Tracy Wolfson will work the sidelines. The game will be produced by Lance Barrow and directed by Mike Arnold.

NATIONAL RADIO: This week's game will be broadcast to a national audience on Westwood One. Ian Eagle and Mike Mayock will call the game with Ross Tucker providing sideline analysis.

LOCAL RADIO: 98.5 FM, The Sports Hub, is the flagship station for the Patriots Radio Network. Play-by-play broadcaster Bob Socci will call the action along with former Patriots guarterback Scott Zolak, who will provide color analysis. Produced by Marc Cappello.

PATS LOCK UP TOP SEED IN AFC

The Patriots have now earned six number one seeds (2016, 2014, 2011, 2010, 2007 and 2003) in the postseason since 1990, the most in the NFL under that system. The NFL began playoff seeding in 1975 and the current playoff format was instituted in 1990.

PATRIOTS IN THE PLAYOFFS

The Patriots have qualified for the playoffs 24 times in their 57-year history. Eighteen of those playoff berths have come in the 23 seasons since Robert Kraft purchased the team in 1994, a dramatic contrast to the six total playoff berths the team earned in its first 34 years of existence. The Patriots have won 19 division crowns, including 14 in the last 16 seasons, and have qualified as a Wild Card team four times (1976, 1985, 1994 and 1998). The Patriots also qualified for the playoffs in 1982 during the strike season.

PATRIOTS CLINCH PLAYOFF SPOT FOR 18th TIME IN KRAFT'S 23 YEARS OF OWNERSHIP

New England has now qualified for the playoffs 24 times in its 57-year history. The Patriots have earned 18 of those playoff berths in the 23 seasons since Robert Kraft purchased the team in 1994. New England has won 19 division crowns overall (18 AFC East crowns) and has qualified as a Wild Card team on four occasions (1998, 1994, 1985 and 1976). The Patriots also qualified for the playoffs in 1982 as part of a 16-team tournament following a players' strike.



ANNUAL ACHIEVEMENTS

The Patriots won more than half of their games for the 16th straight year with a 14-2 record in 2016. They are the first team to win more than half of their games in 16 straight seasons since free agency began in 1993.

The Patriots are the third team to win more than half of their games in 16 straight seasons since the 1970 AFL-NFL merger, joining the 49ers (16 straight from 1983-98) and the Cowboys (16 straight from 1970-85).

The Patriots have now won nine or more games in 20 of the 23 seasons Robert Kraft has owned the team.







SERIES HISTORY



The Patriots and Texans will meet in the postseason for the second time. In 2012, the Patriots hosted the Texans in an AFC Divisional Game, a matchup the Patriots won, 41-28, on Jan. 13, 2013, at Gillette Stadium.

This week's game will be the second meeting between the two teams in 2016. The Patriots hosted the Texans on Thurs, Sept. 22 and beat them, 27-0 in rookie QB Jacoby Brissett's first NFL start.

Overall, the Patriots have met Houston eight times and hold a 7-1 advantage since Houston entered the NFL in 2002.

The Patriots are 4-0 overall against the Texans when playing at home.

New England's only loss against Houston was in the final game of the 2009 regular-season when Houston defeated the Patriots 34-27. The Patriots had already clinched the division prior to that game and Tom Brady was relieved for portions of that game by then backup QB Brian Hoyer.

Before the Texans joined the league, the Patriots and the Houston Oilers were foes dating back to the days of the American Football League, playing twice a year from 1960-69 and 33 times overall before the Oilers moved to Tennessee following the 1996 season.

QB Tom Brady passed for three touchdowns and RB Shane Vereen scored three times as the Patriots led by as many as 25 points en route to victory. The teams combined for 882 yards (457 for New England) and 69 points.

Houston opened the game with a 94-yard kickoff return that set up a 27-yard field goal for a quick 3-0 lead.

Late in the first quarter the Patriots began a stretch of scoring drives consisting of 65, 80, and 65 yards, the last of which was set up by a Wes Welker 47-yard reception and capped by Vereen's second touchdown, for a 17-3 lead.

Houston scored the next 10 points to close the gap to 17-13 at halftime.

The Patriots responded with a touchdown on the first drive of the second half, highlighted by a 40-yard catch and run that set up an 8-yard touchdown run by Stevan Ridley for a 24-13 lead. Rob Ninkovich intercepted a Houston pass and Ridley had a 23-yard run to set up a 5-yard touchdown pass to Brandon Lloyd for a 31-13 lead heading into the fourth quarter.

Early in the fourth quarter, Houston was stopped on a fourth-down play. On the first play following the stop, Brady completed a 33-yard touchdown pass to Vereen to give New England a 38-13 lead with 13:07 to play. A 69-yard kickoff return led to a Houston touchdown. Houston scored again on the next series and added a two-point splay to make it 38-28 with 5:11 to play.

But, Ninkovich recovered an onside kick attempt and Stephen Gostkowski kicked a 38-yard field goal with 1:14 to play to seal the win. Brady was 25-of-40 for 344 yards and three touchdowns.

The New England Patriots improved to 3-0 following a 27-0 shutout win over the Houston Texans in a Thursday Night Football game at Gillette Stadium.

Rookie QB Jacoby Brissett was called in for his first start when Jimmy Garoppolo was declared inactive due to an injury. He finished 11-of-19 for 103 yards and scored on a 27-yard touchdown run in the first quarter.

In addition to a great defensive effort, special team turned out to be the difference in the game. The Patriots average drive start was their own 40-yard line, while Houston's average drive start was their own 16-yard line.

The Patriots forced two fumbles on kickoffs that led to 14 points. In the first quarter, RB Brandon Bolden forced a fumble that was recovered by S Duron Harmon at the 22-yard line to set up a touchdown run by Brissett. In the third quarter, S Nate Ebner forced a fumble that was recovered by S Jordan Richards at the 21-yard line to set up a touchdown run by RB LeGarrette Blount.

P Ryan Allen had six of his seven punts downed inside the 20-yard line and helped hold Houston to no punt return yards. He landed punts at the 11, 10, 10 14, 5 and 4. His only punt that did not land inside the 20, was downed at the 20-yard line.

Houston crossed midfield just two times and did not move past the 50 yard line until the fourth quarter. Their only promising drive of the first half ended when LB Jamie Collins picked off a Brock Osweiler pass at the New England 39yard line and returned it 18 yards to the Houston 43-yard line. Collins finished the game with a career high 14 total tackles.

Blount carried the load for the Patriots, gaining 105 yards on 24 carries and scoring two touchdowns. He scored on a 1-yard touchdown after the Patriots recovered a fumble on a kickoff in the third quarter. In the fourth quarter he broke free for a 41-yard touchdown run. Blount rushed for over 100 yards for the second straight week with his performance against Houston.

The Patriots got on the board midway through the first quarter when Brissett led a 10-play, 74-yard drive that ended in a field goal. The rookie quarterback converted a third-and-2 to keep the drive alive when he completed a 27-yad pass to WR Malcolm Mitchell for a first down at the 15-yard line. On the ensuing kickoff, Bolden forced a fumble that was recovered by Harmon at the Houston 22-yard line. That helped position the Patriots for Brissett's 27-yard touchdown run for a 10-0 first quarter lead.

A methodical 13-play, 71-yard drive to start the third quarter led to a field goal for a 13-0 lead. Ebner's forced fumble and Richards' fumble recovery on the ensuing drive set up a first down at the Houston 21-yard line and helped get into position for Blount's 1-yard run for a 20-0 lead. Blount 41-yard touchdown run in the fourth quarter sealed the 27-0 victory.

Since Robert Kraft purchased the team in 1994, the Patriots have experienced one of the most dramatic turnarounds in the history of sports. Now in his 23rd season of ownership, Kraft has transformed one of the league's least successful clubs into what observers view as a model NFL franchise. In the five seasons immediately preceding his purchase (1989-93), the Patriots were a moribund team, winning just 19 of 80 games (.238 pct.) and logaring the weat preceding the NE logging the worst record in the NFL over that span. When he bought the franchise on Jan. 21, 1994, Kraft announced his intention to bring a championship to New England, a tall

order considering the team's previous success rate. But under Kraft's order considering the team's previous success rate. But under Kratt's leadership, the Patriots have won more division titles [16], conference crowns (7] and Super Bowl championships (4) than any other NFL team. Super Bowl XLIX was the seventh Super Bowl appearance since Kraft purchased the team, a period during which no other team has earned more than four berths. In Kraft's 23 seasons, the Patriots have qualified for the playoffs 18 times, more than doubling the franchise's accomplishments during its first 34 seasons. In 2016, Kraft earned his 20th winning season in 23 years of owning the franchise.

The Patriots have sold out 249 consecutive home games, including playoff and preseason games (dating back to the 1994 season opener).

MILESTONE WIN FOR KRAFT

The victory over the New York Jets (12/21/14) was the 250th win under Robert Kraft. His 250 wins in his first 368 total games tied Chicago's George Halas for the fastest an owner has reached 250 victories.

CONTINUITY BREEDS SUCCESS

New England is the second team (1970s Pittsburgh Steelers) in NFL history – and first in 35 years – to win four Super Bowls with the same owner (Robert Kraft), head coach (Bill Belichick) and quarterback (Tom Brady).

KRAFT PRODUCES MORE WINS THAN EV-ERY OTHER PATRIOTS OWNER COMBINED

The Patriots have 280 wins overall under Robert Kraft. He has produced more victories than every other Patriots owner combined. Under Kraft, the Patriots are 280-126 overall since he purchased the team in 1994. Kraft's predecessors in the owner's office went 225-276-9 in the 34 years prior to his purchase of the team.

Four members of the New England Patriots have been selected to the 2017 NFL Pro Bowl. Quarterback Tom Brady, LB Dont'a Hightower, DB Devin McCourty and WR Matthew Slater (special teams) have been selected to represent the New England Patriots in the 2017 NFL Pro Bowl on Sun., Jan. 29, 2017, at Camping World Stadium in Orlando, Fla. All four players that have been selected are team captains. The Patriots have now

had at least four players selected to the Pro Bowl in each of the last eight seasons -(2009-5, 2010-8, 2011-8, 2012-7, 2013-5, 2014-7, 2015-7 and 2016-5). **Brady** was named to the Pro Bowl for a franchise record 12th time in his 17-year career and this is Brady's eighth consecutive selection to the all-star game

17-year career and this is Brady's eighth consecutive selection to the all-star game. He was voted to the Pro Bowl after each of the following seasons: 2001, 2004, 2005, 2007, 2009, 2010, 2011, 2012, 2013, 2014, 2015 and now, 2016. He has tied G John Hannah (1978-85) for most consecutive Pro Bowl selections in

franchise history. Brady finished the season with 28 touchdown passes, a quarterback rating of 112.2, highest in the AFC and second in the NFL and has thrown a league-low two interceptions among starting quarterbacks. Brady's touchdown/interception ratio was 14.00, the best ever by a quarterback in a single season. Brady became the NFL's all-time winningest quarterback in 2016 and is the fifth quarterback in NFL history to reach 60,000 passing yards. He also guided the Patriots to their 14th division title of his career, the most by a quarterback in NFL history, including eight straight, also an NFL record.

Hightower was named to his first Pro Bowl. A first-round draft pick out of Alabama in 2012, Hightower has started 64-of-67 games in his five-year career and was selected by his teammates as a captain for the first time in 2016. He is fourth on the team with 65 total tackles, has 2½ sacks, one forced fumble and two passes defensed despite missing three games due to injury.

McCourty is headed to his third career Pro Bowl. The seven-year veteran defensive back started all 16 games at safety this season and finished third on the team with 78 tackles. He leads all current Patriots with 19 career interceptions. McCourty has earned Pro Bowl honors as a cornerback as a rookie in 2010 and as a safety in 2014.

Slater earned his sixth consecutive Pro Bowl selection as a special teams player. The former fifth-round draft pick out of UCLA earned a roster position with the Patriots as a rookie in 2008 with his contributions on special teams. Entering the 2011 season, teammates elected him as their special teams captain. That year, he was also selected to his first Pro Bowl. Since then, he has earned special teams captain honors to start each season and been voted to the Pro Bowl at season's end. He has led the Patriots in special teams tackles for five of his first nine seasons and finsihed this season with six special teams tackles.

*Bill Belichick (6) needs to reach one more Super Bowl as a head coach to break a tie with Don Shula (6) for the most conference titles.

*Belichick has four Super Bowl wins as a head coach to match Pittsburgh's Chuck Noll for the most wins. With one more Super Bowl win, Belichick will have the most wins by a head coach in Super Bowl history.

*Bill Belichick now has 237 regular seasons wins. He is behind Don Shula (328), George Halas (318) and Tom Landry (250).

BY THE NUMBERS

The Patriots forced two fumbles on \overline{kic} koffs in the 27-0 win vs. Houston on Sept. 22, 2016.

WR Chris Hogan caught two 40-yard passes (63 and 43) at Cleveland (10/9/16) to become the first Patriots player to do so in a game since Rob Gronkowski (50 and 49) at Washington (12/11/11).

James White finished third in the NFL among running backs with 60 receptions and 551 yards in 2016. $\mathbf{4}$

Stephen Gostkowski executed a successful onside kick vs. Washington (11/08/15) and vs. Philadelphia (12/06/15). It was his third (Cleveland - 12/08/13) and the fourth in team history. The first came when Jim Lee Hunt recovered a Gino Cappelletti kick at the end of the first half in a 26-10 win vs. the NY Jets [9/27/64].

TE Martellus Bennett had his fifth career 100-yard game and his third of the 2016 season after finishing with 7 receptions for 102 yards vs. Seattle (11/13/16).

The Patriots became the first team in $\overline{\text{NFL}}$ history in 2014 to earn five straight first-round byes and extended that record with their seventh straight bye in 2016. Dallas and San Francisco earned four straight byes from 1992 through 1995 and Denver earned four straight from 2012-15.

The Patriots and Green Bay Packers are the only teams that has made the playoffs in each of the last eight seasons (2009-2016). 14

The Patriots have now had at least one rookie free agent make the team in 13 straight seasons (D.J. Foster and Jonathan Jones), the second-longest streak to 17 by Indianapolis.

 $\frac{16}{100}$ The Patriots have gone 16 straight seasons without being swept by a division opponent after beating each of the AFC East teams in 2016, extending the longest such streak since the 1970 NFL merger. **16**

The Patriots have won nine or more games in 16 straight seasons, the most seasons of 9 or more wins since 2001 in the NFL.

The Patriots have held their opponent under 30 yards rushing a total of 17 times after holding Cleveland (10/9/16) to just 27 yards rushing. **17.9**

The Patriots WR Chris Hogan finished tied for first in the NFI with Washington's DeSean Jackson withja 17.9-yard average in 2016.

RB Legarrette Blount led the NFL with 18 rushing otuchdowns in 2016, a Patriots team record.

Nate Ebner finished tied for first in the NFL with Miami's Michael Thomas (19) with a career-best 19 special teams tackles.

The Patriots have scored in the final possession of the first half and the opening possession of the second half 20 times since 2009, first in the NFL. New Orleans is second with 14 such scoring drives.

Following a 3-0 record in September and a 4-0 recor din December in 2016, the Patriots now have 23 undefeated months since 2000, the most in the NFL. Indianapolis is second with 15.

<u>24</u>

The Patriots have won 24 straight home games against non-division AFC opponents. Their last loss to a non-division AFC team was a 33-10 loss vs. Pittsburgh on Nov. 30, 2008.

<u>67</u>

Rob Gronkowski and Tom Brady have connected on 67 touchdown passes. It is the second-most connections between a quarterback and a tight end in NFL history and is sixth overall.

Bill Belichick is the only head coach in NFL history to win three Super Bowl titles in a four-year span. He won more regular season games (123) and more games overall (136) during a 10-year stretch (2002-11) than any other coach in NFL history. In the 2007 season, Belichick led the Patriots to the fourth undefeated and untied regular season in NFL history and the first since the NFL established a 16-game schedule in 1978. His 42 consecutive years as an NFL coach are second in NFL history to 44 by Tennessee's Dick LeBeau.

In 2011, Belichick became the first coach in NFL history with nine straight seasons with at least 10 victories. George Seifert has the second most consecutive 10-win seasons with eight from 1989-1996 for San Francisco.




On April 20, 2011, just days before Texas Christian offensive line prospect Marcus Cannon was to enter the NFL Draft, he was diagnosed with non-Hodgkin's lymphoma, a treatable form of cancer found in lymph tissue. A little more than one week later, the Patriots selected Cannon in the fifth round [138th overall] of the draft with the knowledge of his illness. The Patriots placed Cannon on the Reserve/Non Football Injury list to start the 2011 season while he received treatment and recovered. Cannon was activated to the 53-man roster later that year and is now in his fifth season with the team. Cannon made a full recovery and was named the Patriots 2011 Ed Block Courage Award winner - an annual award presented to select players in the National Football League who are voted by their teammates as role models of inspiration, sportsmanship and courage.

FROM STANDOUT QB TO WR

Edelman began his college football career with a year at the College of San Mateo (Calif.) before transferring to Kent State where as a senior he com-pleted 56 percent of his passes (153 of 275 passes for 1,820 yards) with 13 touchdowns. He was also the leading rusher, gaining 1,551 yards on 215 attempts (an average of 7.5 yards per carry) and scoring 13 touchdowns. His offensive numbers broke Kent State's single-season record for total offense set by Joshua Cribbs in 2003. Said head coach Bill Belichick on the versatility of Edélman: "He played the quarterback position in college at Kent State and all the positions really that he's played in the NFL - covering kicks, returning kicks, slot receiver, outside receiver, slot defender - he didn't do any of those things in college. I think that really speaks to his versatility and how much he's grown as a player and how many things he's learned how to do that he really didn't have much experience with in college. I'd say that's pretty unusual, especially to be as competent in them as he is."

As the football itch still lurked in the back of his mind, Chris played his final year of eligibility with the Monmouth football team, and at the end of the season, joined in on some workouts with teammates who were training for the NFL Combine.

"I honestly didn't know if I had what it took to play in the NFL," Hogan wrote in the Tribune. "Still, it was one of those things where I didn't want to look back in five years and be like, 'Man, I wish I would've tried."

Chris did not get invited to compete in that year's Combine, but turned heads during a Pro Day held at Fordham. Later that summer, he signed with the San Francisco 49ers as an undrafted free agent.

ELECTED TEAM LEADER

Patriots wide receiver Matthew Slater has been named to six straight Pro Bowls (2011-16) for his special teams work, but perhaps more revealing of his value to New England is the fact that he was elected a captain by his teammates for the sixth straight season in 2016.

The special teams ace was willing to share his advice on being a great captain with high school football players in a story published by *The Boston Globe*. "I think first and foremost, you have to be able to put others before yourself. Being a captain and leadership is about serving, and to me, that means a great deal of sacrifice – putting aside personal agendas for the greater common goal. Leadership is equated with sacrifice. I think you have to be willing to do whatever it takes for the unit to succeed. I think you need to lead by example. A lot of times, it's about what you do, not what you say."

SLATER'S EMERGENCE WAS SPECIAL

Bill Belichick acknowledged Matthew Slater's role as a gunner on special teams: "Matt is one of the best in the league," Belichick said. "Any time the punt return team has to double somebody, that makes it one less guy they can use somewhere else in the return. He almost always draws two guys out there unless they're in an eight-man rush. Most of the time, there's two guys out there — fourth-and-short, where they're trying to protect the box — but he draws a lot of double teams, and deservedly so. He does an outstanding job of covering punts."



WHITE HAS CAREER DAY

James White set career highs with 10 receptions and 115 receiving yards vs. Philadelphia (12/6/15). White's 115 receiving yards are the second-highest such total for a Patriots running back since the 1970 AFL-NFL merger, trailing only Shane Vereen's team-record 153 receiving yards vs. Cleveland on Dec. 8, 2013. White's 10 catches are the third highest such total of the Bill Belichick era for a running back (since 2000), trailing only Shane Vereen's club record 12 catches vs. Cleveland on Dec. 8, 2013, and Kevin Faulk's 11 catches vs. Tampa Bay on Sept. 3, 2000.

On July 18, Nate Ebner was selected to the 2016 U.S. Olympic Rugby squad and after he was given an excused leave of absence from his football obligations in Foxboro, suited up for Team USA in Rio de Janeiro in August. The Dublin, Ohio native was introduced to the sport of rugby around the age of six and developed a passion and a talent that stemmed from his father and role model, Jeff Ebner, who played the game at the University of Minnesota. Nate did not play football in high school but was a two-time MVP of the USA Rugby team at the Junior World Cup and a standout on the U19 and U20 national teams.

Although his parents were divorced, Nate and his father remained very close. "We were super tight," Nate told the Boston Globe. "I would put my father-son relationship against anyone's. He taught me how to be a man." The two often spent time working together at the family's auto reclamation business, Ebner & Sons in Springfield, Ohio, and would also train in the gym together behind the motto, "Finish Strong," - a message Jeff always preached to his son.

Nate played rugby at Ohio State during his first two years of college, but as an All-American on the school's club team, he decided to walk on to the Buckeyes football team and finish his career with his sights set on reaching the NFL.

Devin redshirted for the 2005 season and therefore was a year behind his brother in eligibility. McCourty is the second twin to suit up for the Patriots, after CB Kato Serwanga was a member of the team from 1998-2000. His twin brother, Wasswa, played for San Francisco and Minnesota from 1999-2001. According to McCourty's mother, the two can only be told apart by tiny scars on their faces left by chickenpox. The McCourty twins are one of two active sets of twins playing in the NFL.

WHERE DID HE COME FROM?

Rob Ninkovich's journey to the Patriots was not easy. He entered the league as a fifth-round pick by the Saints in 2006 and was waived four times by New Orleans and Miami before landing in New England on Aug. 2, 2009. He spent the 2009 offseason trying to make the New Orleans team as a long snapper. Before coming to the Patriots, he had appeared in just eight games over three seasons. He doubled that total in his first year in New England, appearing in 15 games in 2009 and his role on the team has grown since, earning a starting role at linebacker in 2010 and 2011 before moving to a starting role on the defensive line in 2011.

CAREER DAY IN BUFFALO

Ninkovich finished with a three-sack game for the first time in his career in the win at Buffalo (10/12/14), He has had two two-sack performances - vs. Miami (1/2/11) and at Carolina (11/18/13).

Ninkovich had eight sacks in three consecutive seasons from 2012-14, becoming the first Patriots player to have at least eight sacks in three consecutive seasons since Pro Football Hall of Famer Andre Tippett achieved the feat from 1985-87 (1985, $16\frac{1}{2}$, 1986, $9\frac{1}{2}$ and 1987, $12\frac{1}{2}$).

CLASSMATES REUNITE IN NEW ENGLAND

Defensive backs Logan Ryan and Duron Harmon are used to working together. Ryan and Harmon began their college football careers together as members of the same recruiting class at Rutgers University and developed a close friendship during their four years in Piscataway, N.J. As fate would have it, Ryan and Harmon would begin their NFL journeys together as well when the Patriots selected the two defensive backs just eight picks apart in the third round of the 2013 NFL Draft.

Reunited once again, the former Scarlet Knights are excited and eager to make their mark, just as they did at Rutgers. "We talked before the draft and said how good it would be to play on the same team again, and for it to happen again, it's exciting and it's a blessing," Harmon told *The Boston Globe.* "It's great [we're contributing], because at the end of the day you want to play, and to contribute to a team like this, it's fun."

RYAN RETURNS... TO SCHOOL

When Logan Ryan decided to leave Rutgers and enter the NFL Draft after his redshirt junior season in 2012, he made a promise to his parents that after his rookie year, he would return to school and earn his degree. Ryan kept his promise and graduated in the spring of 2014 with a

degree in labor relations and a minor in psychology.

"I committed to Rutgers, not only as a football player, but as a student, so I was going to make sure I finished that end too," Ryan told NJ.com.

"It's a big accomplishment in my life. I held my word to my parents and stuck with it and I'm fortunate. It took a lot of work, but I was able to go back and finish and walk in graduation."

RYAN'S FIRST PICK FOR SIX

Ryan returned his first NFL interception 79 yards for a touchdown N.Y. Jets on Oct. 20, 2013. SCORING FLURRY

The Patriots scored three touchdowns in a 57-second span during the final two minutes of the first half against Chicago on Oct. 26, 2014 to turn a 17-7 lead into a 38-7 cushion. It was the fastest three-touchdown flurry in the NFL since the Patriots had three touchdowns in 52 seconds against the New York Jets on Nov. 22, 2012. The Patriots are one of three teams to score three touchdowns in under a minute since the 1970 merger, and are the only team to have achieved the feat twice.

 \star On the Bears' first play following the LaFell touchdown, Zach Moore forced a Jay Cutler fumble that was recovered by Rob Ninkovich and returned for a 15-yard touchdown and a 38-7 Patriots lead with 55 seconds left in the first half.

A COMEBACK FOR THE AGES

The Patriots came back from a 24-point deficit to defeat the Broncos, 34-31, in overtime in a Sunday Night Football matchup on Nov. 24, 2013, marking the largest comeback win in team history, after trailing 24-0 at halftime.

New England's previous best comeback win was from a 23-0 deficit to win, 38-23, vs. Seattle (9/16/84). The Patriots also came back from 22 points down to win at the New York Giants, 23-22 (12/21/96). The Patriots have come from 21 points down to win four times, most recently vs. Buffalo (1/1/12).
