

# **BALTIMORE RAVENS (2-0) AT JACKSONVILLE JAGUARS (0-2)**

## **JUST THE FACTS**

- This Sunday (Sept. 25), the Baltimore Ravens (2-0) visit the Jacksonville Jaguars (0-2) and look to open the season at 3-0 for the second time (2009) during the **John Harbaugh** Era. Kickoff at EverBank Field is set for 1 p.m. and marks the Ravens' first trip to Jacksonville since the 2011 campaign.
- The Jaguars lead the all-time series, 11-8, with the Ravens going 2-6 in games played in Jacksonville. In the last four matchups between these clubs, all with coach Harbaugh at the Ravens' helm, each team has won two games, including Jacksonville claiming last year's bizarre, 22-20 win in Baltimore on 11/15/15.
- Last Sunday at Cleveland, in the second-biggest comeback in franchise history, the Ravens rebounded from a 20-0 first-quarter deficit to top the Browns, 25-20. The victory followed the death of Ravens assistant coach Clarence Brooks, who passed away the previous day after a difficult battle with cancer. The team dedicated the game to the highly-respected coach, who would have been proud of a defensive effort that held the Browns scoreless in the final three quarters and had the win sealed by LB C.J. Mosley, who intercepted a QB Josh McCown pass at the Baltimore 1-yard line with 13 seconds left in the contest.
- QB Joe Flacco led an offense that saw TE Dennis Pitta record a game-high 9 catches for 102 yards, while WR Mike Wallace posted 2 receiving TDs (4 catches for 41 yards), and WR Steve Smith Sr. tallied 3 receptions for 64 yards. (Smith Sr. also moved into 10th on the NFL's all-time receiving yards chart with 14,015 career yards).

#### HARBS SAYS

JOHN HARBAUGH ON THE INFLUENCE OF COACH CLARENCE BROOKS' PASSING AFTER THE RAVENS' WEEK 2 WIN AT CLEVELAND:

"We dedicated the game to 'C.B.' Of course, [Saturday] night in our team meeting, when we talked about 'C.B.,' we had to talk about Tray Walker [who died in a March motorbike accident], as well. These are the things of life we all have to deal with, and this is what life is. It's the same in football as it is in life, whatever job you have, or whatever your family situation is. We're like a family; we're together every day, and these things impact all of us. [The win] was for Clarence Brooks. I think what the players did out there in his name says it all."



#### **INJURY UPDATE**

The Ravens have 11 players on Injured Reserve, including standout TE Benjamin Watson, who tore his Achilles tendon on Aug. 27. Key contributors CB Kyle Arrington, DT Carl Davis and S Matt Elam are also on IR, as is third-round rookie draft pick DE Bronson Kaufusi, who broke his ankle during training camp. The following players did not play in Week 2 at Cleveland due to injury: RB Kenneth Dixon (knee), OLB Elvis Dumervil (lower leg) and CB Jerraud Powers (ankle).

#### **NOTE THE QUOTE**

#### WR MIKE WALLACE ON QB JOE FLACCO'S DEMEANOR/TOUGHNESS:

"This is a guy who stands tall, 6-foot-6 the whole time, no matter who's coming in his face. For a guy like me, that makes me want to make a play, because we have a quarterback who is 'supposed to be' fragile; he just came off an ACL [injury]. He's going to sit in there and take shots. Who am I not to go and make plays? I honestly haven't been around anyone as cool as Joe. Nothing bothers him. Just the way he reacts to situations is [unique]. We're down 20-0, whatever. He's just composed."

#### WHAT'S GOING ON? PITTA IS.

**TE Dennis Pitta**, who has twice overcome breaking/dislocating his hip and, at times, thought he would never play again, is back in full force for the Ravens after not seeing game action in almost two years. Entering Week 3 this season, Pitta ties for the NFL lead in receptions by a TE, while he ranks second in receiving yards.

## **IN MEMORIAM: CLARENCE BROOKS**





Clarence Brooks, the Baltimore Ravens' longest-tenured assistant coach, passed away on Sept. 17 at a hospital in Weston, Fla., following a battle with esophageal and stomach cancer. He was 65. The beloved Brooks – referred to by most as "C.B."

– originally joined the organization in 2005 and served 11 seasons as defensive line coach. This past spring, while undergoing intense treatment for his illness, he transitioned into a senior defensive assistant role, but still spent as much time as he possibly could working with players and fellow coaches, including during the Ravens' recent training camp. Brooks was a 24-year NFL coaching veteran and one of six assistant coaches retained by head coach John Harbaugh upon his 2008 Baltimore arrival.

In addition to the Ravens, "C.B." coached for the Miami Dolphins (2000-04), Cleveland Browns (1999) and Chicago Bears (1993-98). Brooks also spent 17 years in the collegiate ranks holding coaching positions at Arizona (1990-92) — where he was instrumental in the notable "Desert Swarm" defense that led the nation in scoring defense in 1992 — Syracuse (1981-89) and his alma mater Massachusetts (1976-80).

During Brooks' Baltimore tenure as defensive line coach (2005-15), the Ravens allowed the NFL's fewest rushing touchdowns (89), second-fewest points per game (18.9) and the league's second-fewest rushing yards per game (94.2).

#### **Head Coach John Harbaugh:**

"Our heartfelt condolences and love go out to Justa and the Brooks family on the passing of Clarence. We loved that man! He is at peace now through the grace of Jesus Christ. He fought the good fight and won. One of the finest coaches I have ever met, he changed the lives and influenced players and coaches for the better. He was a great man, loving husband and devoted father. He was as tough and determined in adversity as you'll ever see and as loyal a friend as there is. 'C.B.' will forever walk as a loved and cherished member of the Ravens family."

#### General Manager & Executive Vice President Ozzie Newsome:

"Very few, if any, coaches influenced their players – on and off the field – like Clarence Brooks. How fortunate are the Ravens to have had this special person in our lives for the past 12 years? He was a teacher, a friend, a father figure to many and a great football coach. A lot of our defensive success over the years is due to his ability to get the most out of his players on the defensive line. This is a sad, sad day for our team and extended family. Our hearts ache for Justa and the rest of Clarence's family."

#### Owner Steve Bisciotti:

"The Bisciottis are so sad to hear about Clarence's passing. He was the sweetest man I've ever met in football. He was also as tough as nails and was as respected by everyone on our team as any coach who ever touched the Ravens. His impact was more than people on the outside could know. He will be so missed."

#### **President Dick Cass:**

"Clarence had a special rapport with his players. He was both beloved as coach and as a person. His infectious laugh and welcoming smile will be greatly missed, not by just the players and his fellow coaches, but by everyone in our building."

#### DT Brandon Williams:

"Coach Brooks was like a father figure to me and every other player he coached. He made me the player I am today, but more importantly, helped me to be the man I am today. He always got the best out of you. He saw the potential in every player and did everything in his power to help you be the best you could be — on and off the field. Every day I walked in this building, no matter what was going on, he could always make me smile. I will miss him, and my heart goes out to the entire Brooks family."

#### **DE Lawrence Guy:**

"Coach Brooks was a heck of a coach, but an even better man. He cared so much about all of us and could always pull the best out of you in any situation. Through him, I learned how to prepare better, practice better and play better. I will truly miss his coaching, his fellowship and his mentorship. Rest well, 'C.B.'"

#### **OLB Terrell Suggs:**

"Clarence Brooks was a rare, special coach. We had a relationship that became more than football; he was family. He was every bit the definition of the word 'coach.' He was firm and demanding when he needed to be, but was a father figure and caring at the same time. I will definitely miss my friend."

#### Linebackers Coach Don Martindale:

"Clarence Brooks is one of the finest human beings I have ever met. Selfishly speaking, you would like to say he was your best friend, but he was really everybody's best friend. We are happy he is not suffering anymore. I love him like a brother, and I am going to miss him terribly."

#### Former Ravens Head Coach Brian Billick (Who Hired Brooks in 2005):

"Whew, this hurts. What a man, what a coach, what an inspiration. Beyond being one of the best position coaches in the league, Clarence was one of the most respected people in the NFL. He was a great teacher and friend. His positive and upbeat, yet stern, way was special. The proof is in the pudding. Look at how players improved under him. It would be tough to find a more respected assistant in the NFL. My heart reaches out to Justa and his family."

## Former Ravens DT Haloti Ngata:

"I am deeply saddened by the news of 'C.B.' passing away. I hope that I can help continue his legacy by the way I live and play. I played under 'C.B.' for nine years. In that time, he helped me go to five Pro Bowls and win a Super Bowl ring. He deserves a lot of that credit. He worked so hard with me and my Ravens teammates. This is tough news to swallow. I will miss you, Coach. Thank you for everything you taught me through the years — on and off the field. I love you, Clarence."

#### Former Browns, Ravens & Dolphins DE Rob Burnett:

"I cried a few weeks ago when I found out about Clarence and his fight against cancer, and I immediately reached out to Justa and 'C.B.' His death rips at my heart. I loved Clarence. He was more than my coach. He was my friend, a mentor and a motivator. This is a sad day for all of those fortunate enough to have known this great person."

#### **SPOTLIGHT: TIMMY JERNIGAN**

How excited are you for this game, considering you are from Florida? "I always love being able to go home and play. Jacksonville is a little closer to where I am originally from. I actually lived in Jacksonville for a couple years as

a kid. It is going to mean a lot to play there. I remember days as a kid when I was living in Jacksonville just wishing that I would be in the position that I am in now."

How important is the Ravens' tradition to you? "It is very important. From the day that I got the [draft] phone call from Ozzie [Newsome], that was the only thing really on my mind. I was excited to get to work for a team like this. Being able to play beside guys like 'Sizz' [Terrell Suggs], and [Elvis] Dumervil and with C.J. Mosley is an honor."

What has stood out about the Ravens organization in your three years? "I love the standard that is set here. Every day is a grind. All of our coaches challenge us in ways you couldn't even imagine. It is a joy every morning coming in here and being able to work with our coaches. We have great coaches pushing us, and we as players really want to live up to that standard that has already been set."

What is the best feeling in football for a defensive lineman? "Getting a sack – no question. It is not even close. Tackles for loss are nice, but nothing will ever beat that feeling of getting to the quarterback. You may only get 20 opportunities to rush the passer in a game, and you might only be able to hit him one time."

What is something most fans wouldn't guess about you? "I'm a very calm person off the field. What you see on Sundays is another person. I don't even know who that guy is. (laughter) Monday through Saturday, I'm a pretty calm guy. But on Sunday, once you lace those cleats up, it is either going to be you or the person across from you. You have to handle your business, or you are going to get embarrassed."

What has OLB Terrell Suggs taught you? "He is one of those guys who leads by example. Of course, he is a vocal leader, but just watching him – he is professional day-in and day-out. His wisdom of the game is great, and for him to be at his age and still practicing as hard as he does, I think that really says a lot about him."

What do you like most about John Harbaugh? "I love his enthusiasm and what he brings every day. It doesn't matter win, lose or draw. You are going to get the same guy every day. I really love that you never have to guess what his expectations are of you or what he thinks of you. He will let you know what is on his mind, and he is very straight-up with his players. That's a great thing; not everybody is like that."



#### **NOTE OF THE WEEK I**

Eight-year veteran **WR Mike Wallace**, who is in his first season with the Ravens, currently ties WR Kelvin Benjamin and WR Larry Fitzgerald for the NFL lead in receiving touchdowns (3) entering Week 3. Below is the chart detailing each player's start to the 2016 campaign and several other notes about Wallace:

#### Wallace Quick Hits:

- ✓ Since he entered the NFL in 2009, Wallace and Calvin Johnson (retired) are the NFL's only players to produce at least 50 receiving touchdowns and to sport a 15.0 yards-per-catch average. (Wallace has 52 TDs and a 15.3 ypc average.)
- ✓ Wallace owns 65-career catches of at least 25 yards, tying (Brandon Marshall) for the NFL's third most since Wallace entered the NFL in 2009 (DeSean Jackson - 91 & Demaryius Thomas - 67).
- Wallace's 15.3 yards-per-catch average ranks seventh best in the NFL among active players.
- Wallace's 11 receiving TDs of at least 50-plus yards tie (A.J. Green and Calvin Johnson) for the NFL's third most since 2009. (DeSean Jackson is first with 19 and Jordy Nelson second with 14.)
- ✓ In Week 2 at Cleveland, Wallace recorded 2 receiving TDs for the seventh time in his career.



#### NOTE OF THE WEEK II

For years, the Ravens' special teams unit has been outstanding under the direction of ST coordinator/associate head coach **Jerry Rosburg**, and Baltimore has been especially strong at blocking kicks. Since 2014, the Ravens have produced the NFL's most blocked kicks (punts, FGs or PATs), a mark that includes **DE Lawrence Guy**'s blocked PAT this past Sunday at Cleveland, which was returned by **CB Tavon Young** for 2 points and changed the game's momentum.

## QB Joe Flacco on the Ravens overcoming a 20-point deficit in Week 2 at Cleveland:

"I told those guys that I couldn't be more proud. It wasn't pretty; it wasn't great. Do you want to play that kind of game in September? Not necessarily, but every single game in January and, come February, where we hope to be, is going to be like that. There are going to be tough situations. Over the years, these games have just taken us to that next level and really made us mentally tough so when we get into those games, we don't blink. We've already been through it four, five, six times in September, October and November. That's why we can be so good late in the year. I think this was one of those games that helps some of our young guys out with confidence and toughness, to help you win late in the year."

#### WR Steve Smith Sr. on playing with QB Joe Flacco:

"Every quarterback and wide receiver has some dialogue, but not every quarterback that I played with is a Super Bowl champ or a Super Bowl MVP. Not every quarterback is his height and can throw 60 or 70 yards off his back foot. There are things that Joe can uniquely do that some of the other guys I've played with cannot."

#### QB Joe Flacco on what WR Steve Smith Sr. has meant to him:

"He's one of the best that's ever played, there's no doubt about it. Just getting the chance to be around him, to see what he's about and to develop a true, honest opinion about who he is as a player and as a person, I've just been very fortunate. He's been huge for me and my career. You can listen to all the bad things you hear about people and form an opinion. I didn't know what to think of him [when he first arrived in 2014], but since he's been here, he's been nothing but great."

#### WR Mike Wallace on the Ravens wideout group:

"We work hard every single day. There's not one day I come in the building with a down attitude, because when I see those guys, I get happy. I know the type of players, the type of workers, that they are. Just being around Steve [Smith Sr.], that's a guy who just gets me motivated, fired up every day. Breshad [Perriman], all the stuff he overcame, that just makes me happy to see those guys doing well. That just makes me want to do well. That's just what it is – we work for each other every single day, every single play."

## John Harbaugh on ILB Zachary Orr, who became a starter this season after being undrafted in 2014:

"He knows what he is doing – man, zone coverage, run game – and he runs to the ball. He is like a lightning bolt out there. That is really valuable to the defense."

#### S Eric Weddle on S Lardarius Webb moving from CB to safety:

"He is extremely humble. He brings a lot of energy, a lot of laughter to our meetings. He brings the level of energy up. When he is out there, he is talented. He is fast. He is healthy. He had a couple seasons of dealing with injuries, but he looks fantastic. He is starting to see the field more as a safety. So many years as a corner, you are locked in on a guy and the first few weeks, he was seeing too much. Now he is letting it come to him. We expect a big season from him and [for him] to make a lot of plays on the ball."

#### The MMQB's Andy Benoit on DT Brandon Williams:

"Meet the best football player you've probably never heard of. Williams is 6-1, weighs 340 pounds and was drafted out of Missouri Southern (Division II) in the third round in 2013. He's become a dominating force, but in a generally thankless role. That isn't to say he can't, and doesn't, flash. He still has the freedom to penetrate, though, and he often does."

#### John Harbaugh on the Ravens' appreciation of K Justin Tucker:

"We've always realized how good he was, and we do appreciate it. But he has to make the next kick. We're not sitting here going, 'The next kick is in the bag because we have Justin Tucker as our kicker.' That's why he works hard. That's why those three guys [Justin Tucker, Sam Koch and Morgan Cox] work hard, and protection works hard. You don't take everything for granted, and you try to have great players at every position playing great. We are very blessed to have Justin as our kicker and try to do everything we can to help him be the best he can be."

#### **Defensive coordinator Dean Pees on OLB Albert McClellan:**

"Albert is a tough guy. He is a physical guy. The guy plays with just absolute effort on every play. That's what I love about the guy. Really, the thing I think that goes unnoticed a little bit about Albert is he is a very, very intelligent football player. He does a lot of little things sometimes you don't necessarily see. There are certain players that have to go out, and they have to do repetitions in practice to make sure they have it. If you want to change something on the sideline and just go tell the guy, if he hasn't repped it, you have to know that maybe this isn't the best thing to do. Albert is not one of those guys. Albert is one of those guys on the sideline [where] you can tell him, 'We want to do this when they do that,' and he goes out and gets it done — in every facet of it. He's tough, he's smart and he plays with effort, and those are the only three things you can ask of a guy."

# **TE Dennis Pitta on FB Kyle Juszczyk's abilities and versatility:** "Kyle is a versatile guy. He's a great football player. He's a very savvy football player and understands what we're trying to do offensively. We're able to use him in a lot of different roles. He's a fullback and good at the point of attack. I think, unlike most fullbacks around the league, he's able to split out and run routes and do some things that create mismatches. It's good to have a weapon like Kyle."

#### DT Timmy Jernigan on the Ravens' defensive tradition:

"We know what it takes to be a Raven. We still have guys from those good old days, when the Ravens' defense was very respected, like [Terrell] Suggs and coach [John] Harbaugh. They know what it looks like. We're definitely trying to get back there."

#### CB Jimmy Smith on the Ravens' defensive improvement:

"I think cohesiveness, the game plan and just knowing what you're doing, it allows you to play fast. Experience and knowledge of what you're doing allows you to go 100 percent. In the second half of last season, when we started jelling, you could see speed a little bit. But this year, the coaches simplified it, and that has allowed us to play fast."

## WEEK 2 RECAP: RAVENS 25, BROWNS 20

In the second-biggest comeback in franchise history, the Ravens rebounded from a 20-0, first-quarter deficit to top the host Browns, 25-20, at FirstEnergy Stadium last Sunday. The victory followed the death of Ravens assistant coach Clarence Brooks, who passed away the previous day after a difficult battle with cancer. The team dedicated the game to the highly-respected coach. The win was not sealed until ILB C.J. Mosley intercepted a QB Josh McCown pass at the Baltimore 1-yard line with 13 seconds left in the contest. The Browns opened the game with a 9-play, 75-yard drive that ended with a McCown-to-rookie WR Corey Coleman 31-yard touchdown strike. After stopping the Ravens, the Browns' offense exploded with an 85-yard TD sprint by RB Isaiah Crowell for a 14-0 lead. CB Joe Haden then intercepted **QB Joe Flacco** and returned it to the Ravens' 27-yard line. Four plays later, McCown found Coleman again for an 11-yard TD. Next came one of the most significant plays of the game when **DE Lawrence Guy** blocked K Patrick Murray's extra point, which was scooped up by CB Tavon Young, who raced for a 2-point conversion to make the score 20-2. Baltimore's defense shut out Cleveland the remainder of the game. A Flaccoto-WR Mike Wallace 7-yard TD dart and a 52-yard K Justin Tucker field goal made the score 20-12 at the half. The Ravens opened the second half with another Flacco-to-Wallace TD, this one for 17 yards (20-19). Tucker added a pair of fourth-quarter FGs (49 and 41 yards) to give the Ravens the winning margin. Flacco completed 25 of 45 for 302 yards, including 9 for 102 yards to **TE Dennis Pitta**. McCown was 20-of-33 for 260, with 5 of those going to Coleman for 104. Haden picked off 2 Flacco passes, while Baltimore S Eric Weddle's INT late in the first half set up a Ravens' FG. The Ravens started at 2-0 for the fifth time in team history. In the four previous 2-0 starts, Baltimore earned playoff berths.

#### JAGUARS 22, RAVENS 20 – 11/15/15 IN BALTIMORE

In a season with dramatic game endings for the Ravens, the one against Jacksonville was the most bizarre. While many players thought the game ended, Jaguars QB Blake Bortles took a snap and was sacked by OLB Elvis Dumervil. However, a facemask penalty was called on Dumervil, allowing Jags' K Jason Myers a 53-yard FG attempt with no time on the clock. Myers converted, giving the Jaguars a 22-20 victory. The following day, however, the NFL stated that the play involving Dumervil should not have happened, as not every Jacksonville player was fully set before the snap, and a false start penalty should have been called. This would have forced a subsequent 10-second run-off and ended the game with a Ravens' victory. (Prior to his final FG, Myers had missed a 26-yarder, partially blocked by OLB Za'Darius Smith, near the end of the third quarter.) The Ravens took a 20-19 lead with 7:30 left in the contest after QB Joe Flacco hit WR Chris Givens with a 14-yard TD strike. The 2-point conversion failed. In a game that stayed close throughout, the Jaguars scored first on a Bortles-to-WR Allen Hurns 5-yard TD. The Ravens tied the game at 7 when Flacco threw a 10-yard TD dart to TE Crockett Gillmore in the second quarter. After a 21-yard Myers FG, Flacco found rookie TE Maxx Williams in the end zone for a 21-yard TD strike, giving the Ravens a 14-10 halftime lead. Flacco then turned the ball over 3 times in the third quarter (2 INTs and a fumble), but the Jaguars managed just 3 points with those extra opportunities and trailed 14-13 at the start of the fourth quarter. The Jags received another added possession after Ravens WR/RS Jeremy Ross muffed a punt at Baltimore's 37-yard line. Five plays later, Bortles threw a 15-yard TD pass to WR Allen Robinson for a 19-14 lead (2-point attempt failed).

LB Ray Lewis - 2000 Super Bowl XXXV MVP

In a magnificent effort showcasing thrilling performances by their defense, offense and special teams units, the Baltimore Ravens won Super Bowl XXXV with a 34-7 victory over the New York Giants. Allowing the Giants a meager 152 total net yards, New York's attack crossed midfield just twice, while Baltimore's "D" posted 4 INTs. LB Ray Lewis was named the game's MVP, capping an accolade-filled season in which he was also tabbed the NFL's Defensive Player of the Year.



QB Joe Flacco - 2012 Super Bowl XLVII MVP

Baltimore defeated San Francisco, 34-31, in Super Bowl XLVII, capturing the franchise's second World Championship. After an amazing first-half performance, the Ravens took a commanding 28-6 lead. But following a bizarre, 34-minute power outage that halted play, the 49ers stormed back into contention. #### **COACH HARBS**



John Harbaugh has led the Ravens to a playoff berth in six (2008-12 and 2014) of his eight full seasons in Baltimore, and in 2012, captured the franchise's second Super Bowl championship. Under his guidance, the Ravens have secured an appearance in three AFC Championships (2008, 2011 & 2012). Here are several Harbaugh quick hits:

## HEAD COACH SNAPSHOT

- The Ravens are one of only five teams with at least six playoff berths in the past eight seasons: GB (7), NE (7), Bal. (6), Cin. (6) and Ind. (6).
- The Ravens' 10 playoff wins since '08 are two more than the next teams' wins (New England & Seattle, both 8).
- Harbaugh is the only head coach in NFL history to win a playoff game in each of his first four and five seasons.
- John and his brother, Jim

(formerly of the 49ers), are the only head coaches to advance to three conference title games in the first five years as NFL bosses.

- Harbaugh is the only head coach in NFL history to win a playoff game in six of the first seven seasons of a coaching career.
- In 2012, John Harbaugh became the third coach (with Bill Cowher & Chuck Knox) since the 1970 merger to guide his team to the playoffs in each of his first five seasons.
- Harbaugh, Tom Landry (Dallas) and Tom Coughlin (Jaguars/Giants) own the most road playoff wins (7) by a HC in NFL history.
- Including playoffs (10-5), the Ravens are 89-56 since 2008, posting the NFL's fourth-most total victories. He has led the Ravens to 79 regular season wins, ranking fifth most since 2008.

#### **FOUR-STRAIGHT TOP 5s**

In 2015, senior NFL writer Rick Gosselin of *The Dallas Morning News* ranked the Ravens' special teams unit No. 1 in the NFL in his annual comprehensive ratings system based on 22 categories, assigning points according to each standing — 1 for best, 32 for worst. 2015 marked the fourth-straight year in Gosselin's Top 5, as Baltimore was No. 5 in 2014, No. 5 in 2013, and in 2012, earned the No. 2 spot.



#### **RAVENS THRIVE UNDER ROSBURG**

Special teams coordinator/associate head coach **Jerry Rosburg**, a 38-year coaching veteran, has guided a strong special teams group since arriving in Baltimore in 2008. Here are several standout notes:

#### **PRIME PUNTER & KICKER**

• Earning his first Pro Bowl nod in 2015, **P Sam Koch**'s 46.7 gross average ranked No. 9 in the NFL, while his 42.9 net average was No. 2. In 2014, Koch posted the NFL's No. 3 gross (47.4) and No. 1 net (43.3) averages. Both marks are career highs and Ravens records.

• Pro Bowl **K Justin Tucker**, who Rosburg scouted and helped sign as a rookie free agent, owns the NFL's second-most FGs (135) since entering the NFL in 2012. "Tuck" has hit on 135 of 153 FGAs to post an 88.2 success rate, the second-best mark in league history. In his 60th game on Dec. 6, 2015, Tucker became the fastest kicker in NFL history to reach 500 points, surpassing HOFer Jan Stenerud (61 games).

#### **RAVENS BIG RETURNS**

• Led by Pro Bowl RS Jacoby Jones in the 2012 Super Bowl season, Baltimore ranked first in the NFL in kickoff return average (27.3), also setting a then-team record. Jones, who became the first player ever to record dual KORs of at least 105 yards in a career, tied for a league-leading 3 kick return TDs (2 KORs & 1 PR) and averaged an NFL-best 30.7 yards per KOR. Jones also tied an NFL record for longest KOR in Super Bowl history with his 108-yard KOR-TD. (In 2014's Week 9 game at Pittsburgh, Jones added another 108-yard KOR-TD to his stellar resume, marking 4 total KOR-TDs over 100 yards during his career.)

#### **ROSBURG'S PAST**

• Prior to Baltimore, Rosburg built a successful NFL special teams resume with the Browns (2001-06) and Falcons (2007). Over a five-year span (2002-06), Cleveland's special teams were ranked as the top NFL unit in *The Dallas Morning News*' annual comprehensive report.

#### **JERRY'S SIX PRO BOWLERS**

• Six Ravens have earned Pro Bowl honors while playing for Rosburg: ST Brendon Ayanbadejo (2008), K Billy Cundiff (2010), RS Jacoby Jones (2012), K Justin Tucker (2013), LS Morgan Cox & P Sam Koch (2015).

#### **RAVENS BLOCK PARTY**

- In Games 7 through 11 during the 2015 season, the Ravens blocked a kick (2 PATs, 2 FGs and 1 punt) in five-straight contests, a feat that had not been accomplished since 1983 (Atlanta Falcons).
- Impressively, Baltimore's 5 blocked kicks in 2015 tied (Oakland) for the NFL's most. Dating back to 2014, the Ravens have produced 9 blocked kicks, including **DE Lawrence Guy**'s blocked PAT at Cleveland in Week 2 this season, ranking as the NFL's No. 1 figure.

#### A STRONG RETURN

Since 2008, when **Jerry Rosburg** became the Ravens' ST coordinator, Baltimore owns the NFL's No. 1 KOR average (25.4).

# **COORDINATORS: TRESTMAN / PEES NOTES**

#### TRESTMAN GUIDES THE "O"



Marc Trestman was hired as the Ravens' offensive coordinator on Jan. 20, 2015, replacing Gary Kubiak. In his first Baltimore season, Trestman's offense produced the second-most total yards (5,749) in team history and the most passing yards (4,271) – despite using four different starting QBs.

- During Trestman's time in the NFL, he has helped teams to eight playoff appearances, two conference championship games and a Super Bowl berth (XXXVII as offensive coordinator of the Raiders).
- In the five seasons prior to his Chicago arrival, Trestman was a head coach in the Canadian Football League, leading the Montreal Alouettes to back-to-back Grey Cup Championships in 2009 and 2010. He was named the CFL's Coach of the Year in 2009.
- In its first year (2013) under Trestman, Chicago's "O" posted several records by gaining a franchise-best 6,109 net yards. The 2013 Bears also finished second in team history with 445 points.
- QB Josh McCown had a career year in 2013, setting the singleseason franchise records in passer rating (109.0) and completion pct. (66.5). In 2013, Pro Bowl RB Matt Forte ranked second in the NFL with 1,339 rushing yards and was third in yards from scrimmage (1,933), while Pro Bowl WRs Alshon Jeffery & Brandon Marshall were sixth and 11th, respectively, in NFL receiving yards.

#### PEES LEADS THE "D"



**Dean Pees**, a 13-year NFL-coaching veteran, became the Ravens' defensive coordinator in 2012 and helped guide Baltimore to its second World Championship in Super Bowl XLVII. Pees, who was New England's "D" coordinator from 2006-09, heads a Ravens' squad that in 2015 ranked No. 8

in total defense (10th passing & 12th rushing). Pees also leads a unit that, during the **John Harbaugh** Era (2008-16), has allowed the NFL's second-fewest points (19.0) per game, the third-fewest yards (315.6) per game and the second-fewest overall TDs (255).

- In the Ravens' last 10 playoff games (since the 2010 season), Flacco is 196-of-327 for 2,563 yards, 24 TDs and 4 INTs (104.1 rating). He has led the Ravens to a 7-3 record in these contests.
- In Baltimore's last six playoff games (5-1 record), Flacco has thrown 17 TDs and 2 INTs. Completing 119 of 200 passes for 1,691 yards, he owns a magnificent 111.1 QB rating.
- Flacco has thrown at least 2 TDs in eight-straight playoff games, marking the longest streak in NFL postseason history.
- Flacco has 25-career postseason TD passes, tied (Brett Favre) for second most in a QB's first eight seasons. (Tom Brady is first - 26.)
- Flacco's streak of 197 passes without throwing an INT in the postseason (from 1/22/12 to 1/10/15) is the second longest in NFL playoff history (Drew Brees, 226). Joe Montana (179 from 1989-91) and Steve Young (173 from 1994-96) are third and fourth, respectively.

#### THE RETURN SPECIALIST



On Sept. 5, the Baltimore Ravens signed four-time Pro Bowler RS/WR Devin Hester Sr., who has produced the most return touchdowns (20) in NFL history, to a one-year contract. Hester Sr., who is in his 11th season, is arguably the best return specialist in NFL history. Here are a few notes about his impressive career:

- ✓ He has posted the most return touchdowns (20) in NFL history.
- ✓ Hester Sr. has registered an NFL-record 14 punt return touchdowns, adding 5 kickoff return touchdowns and 1 missed field goal return touchdown (108 yards).
- Seeing action in 146 career games (47 starts), he has also tallied 255 receptions for 3,311 yards (13.0 avg.) and 16 touchdowns, also posting 116 rushing yards and one touchdown on 36 carries.
- Hester Sr.'s 12.0-yard career punt return average ranks sixth in NFL history, while his 3,583 punt return yards (on 294 returns) stand fourth. (Both marks currently rank best among active players.)
- ✓ For kickoff returns, Hester Sr. owns a 24.9-yard career average, gaining 6,984 yards on 280 attempts.
- ✓ In 2014 with Atlanta, he recorded 45 kickoff returns for 1,128 yards (25.1 avg.) and 18 punt returns for 240 yards (13.3 avg.) and 1 touchdown, en route to earning Pro Bowl honors.
- ✓ His four Pro Bowls occurred in 2006, 2007, 2010 and 2014. He was named to the All-Decade Team (2000s) by ESPN and *The AP*, and he has been tabbed All-Pro three times (2006, 2007 & 2010).

#### **SOARING WITH SAM**



2015 Pro Bowler Sam Koch owns a 45.2 career gross average and 39.4 career net, both marks that rank first in Ravens history. In 2014, Koch posted a career-high and Ravens franchise-record 47.4yard gross average and a 43.3-yard net average, shattering his previous personal bests.

#### Ravens special teams coordinator/associate head coach Jerry Rosburg on P Sam Koch's innovative punting methods:

"He's a unique punter. He's changing the way the game is going to be played. It's remarkable to me that more have not necessarily followed the lead. Perhaps that's an indication of how difficult it is to do what he's doing, because you don't see much of it – even from the highly-skilled professionals that we see on a weekly basis."

#### ESPN.com's Kevin Seifert on Koch's arsenal of punts:

"Some are designed to hook toward the sideline with maximum hang time. Others use an intentionally low trajectory to aid coverage teams. He has a knuckler and one kick that drops, from the returner's perspective, roughly in the shape of the letter "S." He's debuted a "boomerang" punt that does just what you would imagine it might. Most, but not all, of these punts are intended to discourage a clean catch and minimize the return.

"It's not unusual for NFL punters to develop a "changeup" of sorts, but no one has ever had multiple options at the ready. ... The NFL changes every day, but there are only a few moments in each generation when it transforms. This is one of them. In plain sight, Sam Koch and the Ravens have introduced a new way to punt."

P Sam Koch is the Ravens' all-time leader in punts inside the 20 (currently has 282 during his career). In 2010, he posted a career-high 39 boots inside the 20, which were the NFL's second most and tied for eighth best all time in league history.

Pro Bowl K Justin Tucker ranks as the NFL's secondmost accurate kicker of all time. He's connected on 135 of 153 FGAs to produce an 88.2 success rate.

• In 2013, he made his first Pro Bowl by setting team records in FGs made (38) and FGAs (41), with both figures tying (Stephen Gostkowski) for the NFL's most.

Tucker also had a franchise-record 140 points (tied for sixth in NFL).

- In addition to his 2013 Pro Bowl, Tucker was named Special Teams Player of the Month (November) and AFC Special Teams Player of the Week three times in 2013. In 2014, he was named AFC Special Teams Player of the Week (Week 3) and Month (November).
- Tucker made 33-straight FGs at one point during the 2013 season, ranking as the NFL's fifth-longest streak of all time.
- His 6 FGs on 12/16/13 at Det. set a team record and were a singlegame NFL high in 2013. Against the Lions, he became the first NFL kicker ever to connect from the 20-, 30-, 40-, 50- & 60-yard range in a game.
- Tuck earned two AFC Player of the Week honors in 2015 (Week 4 at Pit. & Week 8 vs. SD, both contests in which he hit game-winners).
- He is 56-of-62 (90.3%) during his career when the Ravens are losing a game, and he's 40-of-44 (90.9%) when Baltimore is down by 7 points or fewer. The Pro Bowler is 30-of-37 (81.1%) in the last 2 minutes of a half during his career, and he's 50-of-56 (89.3%) in the fourth guarter.

#### JOHN HARBAUGH MONDAY PRESS CONFERENCE: WEEK 3 AT JACKSONVILLE

**Opening statement:** "It is good to see everybody. I appreciate you guys being here. We just spent the morning evaluating the last game. Now, we are moving forward to getting ready for Jacksonville and to try and apply the lessons learned to the things that we need to anticipate. There is a reactive element to what we do and also a proactive element to what we do. You go back and try to correct things that come up, and new things always come up. There are a lot of things that were a lot better this week than they were the week before. But, there will be new things that we have to anticipate that we will be chasing ahead of time and also some new things that we won't be able to anticipate that will come up. That is the process that we are in. I think every team has that [process] in every sport – but especially football, because it such a complex sport. That is kind of how it works."

In the last two seasons and the early part of this one, you have nine blocked kicks from at least six different guys. Does this serve as a reminder for young players who may not be willing to do special teams that they can make a difference here? (Joe Platania) "Sure. Special teams are vitally important, and you know that. I think that is the point of your question; it is a great point. But, if you are a young guy and you don't understand the value of special teams, you are probably not on a team. You certainly aren't on this team, and you probably aren't on a lot of teams right now, because that is just the way it is. There are 46 guys active, and not just young guys — C.J. Mosley, Zach Orr, Albert McClellan, Kamar Aiken — those guys are playing big roles on offense and defense, and they are playing big roles on special teams. That is just the nature of the game. It is going to be always be that way. It can be alleviated with bigger rosters one day. I keep slipping that in there. (laughter) But, that is how the game is played."

How much pride does the team take in being able to consistently block kicks? (Jamison Hensley) "I just think that [special teams coordinator/associate head coach] Jerry Rosburg does a phenomenal job. He is the best special teams coach in the league. I say that assuredly. In my mind, it is not even close. He does a fantastic job – motivates guys, gets them excited to go do it. But, then we have a bunch of guys that want to do it. Lawrence Guy, who got the latest [block], he is into it every single day. He loves it. He talks about it, he watches tape on it, and he practices hard. He is into it. It is not just him; all those guys are into it. Devin Hester commented just last week to me about how impressed he was, how cool it was [and] how excited he was about the level of the enthusiasm in the special teams meeting and the level of the conversation and dialogue. Guys were talking at lunch, and they were talking about special teams – the nuances of it. [They were saying], 'Hey, you have to look at this, you have to see that on kickoff coverage.' That is part of the culture, and I think it is a credit to our guys."

Speaking of WR/RS Devin Hester, you guys talked about how you needed to block better for him. Were you much more pleased with how you went about that? (Jeff Zrebiec) "Devin, is a threat every time he touches it. First of all, he is very secure. He makes good decisions. He made good decisions all day [on] kickoffs with the ball being a touchback or not. Punts, there were some high-hanging punts up there. There was a little bit of wind, too, and he handled it great – very mature, which is what you expect. Also, the electricity, the excitement; I think everyone felt it when he has the ball in his hands. The anticipation rises, especially if he has a little bit of room. The blocking can continue to improve. We will work really hard on that, but I thought that the kickoff return especially ... Two things: The kickoff return blocking was much better; the fundamentals were way better. We were close. We felt like we were close even through preseason and last week. But, one or two guys did some things that we were surprised about. We got those things cleaned up and executed beautifully in this game. There will be new challenges next week. On punt return, we had a lot of good blocks without having fouls. The most challenging, toughest phase, as far as not committing penalties, is on punt return. It is happening fast out there, and the angles create blocks in the back. Our guys did a really good job of playing with discipline in that phase."

Can you explain the decision not to go ahead and kick the field goal in the second quarter there on fourth down? (Jerry Coleman) "Well, the analytics said clearly, go for it. I've had this argument with my analytics guys, because they are in my ear all the time about how the numbers are all that matters. I'm like, 'The numbers are not all that matter. The gut matters, too, and how you feel about it.' We have had two [fourth downs] in the past games that we have not gotten. To me, it is a good decision to go for it if you get it. It is not a good decision if you don't get it. That is the point I try to make. We have to start getting those. We give our offense and our guys a chance to make those plays, and we should make those plays; we should convert those. That is why we do it. We should try to turn it into seven [points]. We have had a lot of success. Our guys have



done a great job over the years converting those, but that was disappointing not to get that. We have to do a better job, and if we don't do a better job, we have to kick them."

Can you talk about rookie DT Michael Pierce? It seems like he is getting pressure up the middle without having to blitz. You guys were getting pressure on Josh McCown, even when you weren't in the lead, and they weren't in obvious passing situations. (Cliff Brown) "He did. Michael Pierce [got pressure], and Timmy Jernigan was also a big part of that. I thought our edge rushers did a good job of holding the edge and not letting McCown get out. He is a good scrambler going in every direction and making plays on the run. They did a good job of keeping him in there, or at least chasing him when he did get out. There was good pressure. We pushed the pocket really well with Timmy and Michael, and Brandon [Williams] pushed the pocket well, too. They did a good job, and like you said, it was a lot of time converting run to pass rush. That was a factor."

I think it was 3.1 yards per carry yesterday. What do you have to do to get the running game ramped up? (Todd Karpovich) "We have to do a lot of things. We have to execute better. We have to have better schemes. We have to run against better looks. We had a couple looks that we couldn't block, and you have to have answers for that. That is always the chess match. We do the same thing on defense – we try to create looks that they can't block as well. All those things go into it. We have to run. We have to make some people miss. We have to run some people over. We have to create some yards on our own, too. I think Justin [Forsett] said it best – it is a team effort. I would include the coaches in that team effort; we have to scheme up some runs. We have tried to do that this year; we have tried to scheme up some runs. When you break a run, that tends to make a difference in the average. They had one run for 85 yards, and the rest of the runs were about 60 yards [total]. You have to pop a run here and there and be consistent with a number of runs over four yards per carry. We haven't really done either well enough. We have to go to work on it and get better at it. It is not easy, because people are determined to stop the run, but we are determined to run the ball."

Along those lines, you are 2-0 and you know that your best football is ahead of you. Have you seen progress in the first two games, and do you think the team has played well enough thus far? (Dave Ginsburg) "We have seen progress. I feel like we have improved all through the offseason program, the preseason from game to game, from practice to practice, and we have gotten better. Our guys have done nothing but work really hard. They have worked really hard, and most importantly, as you pointed out, they have found a way to win games. Part of that is not losing games, either. We haven't made mistakes down the stretch that have cost us. That is really important. Sometimes that can be the difference in the game. Also, making plays—making a catch, making a throw—[is important]. We made a number of third-down conversions in the second half of this game that were really enormous that probably made a difference. We had to score a bunch of points and not allow them to score any to get back in and win that game, and that is pretty rare. To me, they should feel good about that and be commended about it. They are [feeling good]. They will enjoy today. But, I promise you that there were 28 guys in the weight room at 10 this morning working out. Every one of them has seen the game tape probably twice. I know they watch it on the plane ride back home, and they probably have seen it again today. They probably already talked to their coaches about it. We are going to go to work and improve the things we have to improve and learn. You have to learn from the things that don't go right. Then, anticipate going forward, because it is all about getting ready for the next challenge, and you have to figure out what is going to come up in the next game."

People love using phrases like, "They won ugly." As a coach, does is bother you when people apply style points to different wins? (Jamison Hensley) "No, I don't care. We'd like to be pretty. Everybody wants to be pretty. That's why you get a haircut. (Jaughter) I don't know. Maybe we're just not that pretty. We never really have been. It's never really been our calling card. But we're tough. I don't even know what that means. I really don't care. We have to get better, that's the bottom line. It's not about being pretty or not pretty or ugly or any term you want to use. It's about just getting better, being efficient, executing and being good. That's what we're chasing."

Coach, what was the idea with the running game pitch-outs? It just didn't seem to materialize. Was that something you saw on film leading into the game? (Jerry Coleman) "Of course. That's really a rhetorical question, so I would say, yes. That's what we saw. We felt like we had a good chance to execute that and get their 'backers running a little bit – they have some fast 'backers in there – and try to cut off the defense with the man scheme and get some pullers out there and get those guys in space – either cut them down and run around them or have them run past it and cut up inside. It's a theme. It's a style. It's a

man-scheme-type of a run. We just couldn't get it done. They outran us a couple of times on the front side. We really couldn't get to the linebackers, and that was the biggest problem. The two inside 'backers did a really nice job defending those plays."

How much have you thought about Clarence Brooks over the past 24 hours? What would he have said after yesterday's game? (Shawn Stepner) "I know what he would have said during the long run. That's the one thing I know, for sure, what he would have said. After the game, he would have been – Clarence Brooks would have been just ecstatic. He would have been laughing and hugging his guys and would have been excited. Then he would have been grumbling about getting better with our run defense. I'm quite sure that's where he would have been. We'll just take that with us. We know that. I don't think any of us really were able to very well express our feelings. Those are just groanings inside that you just try to deal with. We're going to miss him, and we'll just have to figure this out over the next few weeks."

How much can a comeback win like that serve you down the line later this season? (Ryan Mink) "It serves you, first, by the fact that it's a win. It's in the win column, and that's really valuable. We all know that. Secondly, it serves you in a lot of ways. I think Joe [Flacco] expressed it best: It builds you up in terms of you've experience coming back. I think we have to believe that we can come back and win a game. Also, I hope it serves to teach us that we need to start fast. It doesn't serve you well to dig a hole for yourself. And [we must] play fundamental football out of the gates. For whatever reason, I don't know if we were too hyped up or what ... Really, to me, you look at all of that stuff, and it's all just theory anyway. It's fun to speculate about, but how do you ever know? Just coach the result. Coach back from the technique and play better football in the first quarter, [then] we will be in better shape. Probably, those two things [are important] more than anything."

It's a pretty cool thing to say you did, though. You're down 20-0 on the road, and you come back to win that game. That stands for something? Doesn't it? (*Bruce Cunningham*) "Thank you very much! We have a positive thinker back there, alright! (*laughter*) (*points to reporters*) Are you listening? (*laughter*) Are you guys all listening?" (*laughter*)

Seriously, what does that do for your team? (*Bruce Cunningham*) "Oh, there goes the question. (*laughter*) It's a great thing. It really is. You feel good about it; it was a great locker room. Many of you guys were in the locker room – and gals were in the locker room – when that happened. That was a great, amazing moment. It was just one of those things ... I don't care, pretty, ugly, whatever, it was a win, man. It's beautiful. It's a beautiful, beautiful win. You don't come back from 20-0 too often. It was 20-2 with 3:18 left in the second quarter. The other thing was, and here's the part I meant to mention: That was really a very physical game. When I went back to watch the tape this morning, it was a very physical football game. Our guys are limping around here today pretty good, and I'm sure their guys are limping around there pretty good, too. It was a classic AFC North game. That's a physical team, and we won it. In the end, we won it. Now, we have to move on and figure out a way to win the next game. That's really all you think about."

John, what can you tell us about Jacksonville? (Bruce Cunningham) "Young, talented, fast and athletic. [They] played really well against Green Bay – probably should have won. For some reason, they went out there and didn't play very well against San Diego. I'm sure that they're going to feel like their backs are against the wall. When you look at their roster, you can't help but be impressed. We have to get ready for that."

In the physical game, the Browns had several serious injuries. How fortunate do you feel making out of there relatively unscathed? (Edward Lee) "We just have to keep work on getting healthy. We have a few guys that are trying to get back right now, as you know. I'm very hopeful, very hopeful to get those guys back soon. We didn't have anything serious – it doesn't look like – coming out of that game. We are very grateful for that. The recovery stuff that we do, the guys in the weight room flushing it out today, and getting into the recovery room today should help us. And again tomorrow should help us."

Coach, can you talk a little about TE Dennis Pitta yesterday? It looked like the rhythm was right there with QB Joe Flacco once again. (Bill West) "It was kind of neat. Dennis came off after the one he caught up the middle, and he got hit right on the back of his glute. He said he felt it, but it felt solid. I think that was the one where he felt like, 'This is going to be OK.' To have that kind of game, have those number of catches and take the hits that he took in the same stadium where he got hurt the last time is really good for him and for us."

There was a report that OLB Elvis Dumervil is in line to play this week. Is that too premature? Is it possible he could be practicing this week? (Jeff Zrebiec) "It's not too premature. You'll know if he practices, in all honesty. He has to practice. It's

really in Elvis' hands. It's going to be a feel thing for him. There's soundness there, from what I'm told. He feels it. It's just a matter of whether he feels the strength is there, and the explosion, and everything he needs to go out there and compete."

Last year, you started off kind of in the hole, coming back 0-2 from Oakland. Being 2-0, how much of a difference is it, just as far as you talking about guys being in the weight room and so forth? Is it so much of a drastic difference as fans might expect? (Jamison Hensley) "That's a comparison question. (Jaughter) I will say this – I'll answer your comparison question: It's a lot better being 2-0 than 0-2."

But people will say though, just the mentality and the feel and everything, is it as drastic [as they think]? Because I know people say they're just trying to get to the next game, trying to keep it even-keel about things. (Jamison Hensley) "You look in your own life, and when you have some setbacks, I mean ... We lost two close games [to start 2015]. We had one taken from us in the second game – let's be honest about it – and we had the first one in our hands last year. We could have been 2-0 there, [but] we weren't. We were 0-2. We didn't make the plays. This year, however you want to compare it, any way you want, you can say whatever you want, but this year we made the plays and won these two games. So, we feel a lot better about winning the two games. But really, in the end, the task at hand does not change. We have to get ready to play the next game, and we have to get better, because you're not done. You can't play the way you played in this game, whether you won or lost this game, and have any chance to win next week or four weeks from now, because everybody gets better as the season goes along, and you have to keep getting better. My dad said it every single day of our life: 'You either get better, or you get worse. You never stay the same.' And that's true for anything, and that's the way it is for us. We have to get better this week. If we're not getting better, we're getting worse."

Coach, your thoughts about maybe the NFL putting two better cameras in the back of the end zone, having a better angle so they can focus in on that? Some shots were better than others, but the angles yesterday with the cameras weren't very good at all. (Bill West) "Yes, that's something that's been brought up in the owners' meetings often, and [Patriots] coach [Bill] Belichick has been a champion of that, and I support fully what he says, out of fairness. There should be the same number of cameras at every game, and if the network doesn't have them, the NFL should put them in there. [Coach Belichick] says it way more flamboyantly than I do – he had some great lines that we all laughed about – but I'm siding up with coach Belichick on that one. That would be the right thing to do. Every game is just as important to the teams that are playing in the game. I don't know, maybe the networks didn't think our game was as important. I thought the crew did a great job. That crew is a really good crew, and a young crew, and when we had them in the production meeting, I thought they were awesome. But we didn't have as many cameras there, and it made a difference in the replays, absolutely."

John, when defensive coordinator Dean Pees met with the defense in the first half, LB C.J. Mosley said he spoke to the defense firmly without getting fired up. How critical is it to have sort of a calming presence like Dean? (Ed Lee) "Yes, it's good to have Dean on the sideline; I like him down there. And also for the adjustments, and things like that. Dean does a great job of talking to the guys and always gets things corrected, just like that. And the rest of the guys ... [Defensive line coach] Joe [Cullen] does a great job, [linebackers coach Don Martindale] 'Wink' does a great job down there. [Defensive backs coach] Chris Hewitt talks to the [defensive backs] down there, and then having [secondary coach] Leslie [Frazier] in the box is invaluable. So, it's a good group of coaches doing a good job on gameday."

John, going back to where it did look like the Cleveland receiver touched the line in the back of the end zone, did the referee or the official just tell you they just couldn't see or have a definitive look? Is that what the explanation was? (Jamison Hensley) "Yes. They didn't have a camera angle where they could overturn it. They didn't have anything down the line."

Coach, real quickly, the attire yesterday. You were going with the t-shirt. Is that a big change for you? (Jerry Coleman) (laughing) "I like that t-shirt; it had a good feel to it. [It was] just a changeup, just a changeup – trying to be cool. A lot of these guys, the NFL coaches, they're on the sideline and wearing their cool stuff, and I felt like I wasn't cool enough with my golf shirt out there, so I wanted to freshen it up a little bit." (laughter)
