



WASHINGTON REDSKINS (2-2) VS. BALTIMORE RAVENS (3-1) Sunday, October 9, 2016 · 1 p.m. ET · M&T Bank Stadium (71,008)

JUST THE FACTS

• For the second-consecutive week, the Baltimore Ravens (3-1) will play host at M&T Bank Stadium when they welcome the Washington Redskins (2-2) to Charm City for a "Beltway Battle" that kicks off at 1 p.m. The Ravens are currently tied with Pittsburgh atop the AFC North, while Washington, which has won two-straight games, is tied for third in the competitive NFC East.

• In the Baltimore-Washington series history, the Ravens lead 3-2. Interestingly, these two teams have only met once in Baltimore, a game that the Ravens won 24-10 in head coach John Harbaugh's debut season of 2008. Baltimore and Washington last played during the Ravens' 2012 Super Bowl-winning campaign, when the Redskins emerged with a 31-28 OT win at FedEx Field on Dec. 9.

• Last Sunday against Oakland, in a game that saw each team score a pair of touchdowns in the fourth quarter, the Ravens lost for the first time in 2016 when the Raiders won, 28-27. Baltimore's attempt to set up a possible game-winning field goal failed after **QB Joe Flacco**'s pass to **WR Kamar Aiken** at the Raiders' 32-yard line with 43 seconds remaining fell incomplete. The Ravens took a 27-21 lead on **RB Terrance West**'s 3-yard TD run with 3:36 remaining in the game. But Oakland **QB Derek Carr**, who threw 4 TD passes in the contest, then directed a six-play, 66-yard TD drive that ended with a 23-yard strike to **WR Michael Crabtree** with 2:12 left.

• Last Sunday, the Redskins beat the visiting Browns, 31-20, at FedEx Field behind QB Kirk Cousins, who was 21-of-27 for 183 yards and 3 TDs, including 2 to standout TE Jordan Reed.

HARBS SAYS

JOHN HARBAUGH ON THE RAVENS' PURSUIT OF PROGRESS & SUCCESS: "We see progress. That's what we chase – from offseason, to training camp, through preseason games and now game by game, practice by practice. We always heard this from our dad: 'You never stay the same. You either get better, or you're getting worse.' Part of that is playing winning football and finding ways to make good, clean plays with the game on the line. Don't give games away. We strive to have the right ingredients all the time, and that includes late in fourth quarters."

INJURY UPDATE

The Ravens have 11 players on Injured Reserve, including standout **TE Benjamin Watson**, who tore his Achilles tendon on Aug. 27. Key contributors **CB Kyle Arrington**, **DT Carl Davis** and **S Matt Elam** are also on IR, as is third-round rookie draft pick **DE Bronson Kaufusi**, who broke his ankle during training camp. The following players did not play in Week 4 vs. Oakland due to injury: **RB Kenneth Dixon** (knee), **CB Sheldon Price** (thigh) and first-round pick **LT Ronnie Stanley** (foot). **TE Maxx Williams** (knee) left the game and did not return.

NOTE THE QUOTE

HALL OF FAMER MICHAEL IRVIN ON WHETHER HE BELIEVES WR STEVE SMITH SR. IS A FUTURE HALL OF FAME INDUCTEE:

"No doubt I see him there. He's an incredible player, and he's been an incredible player for a long time. There's no doubt in my mind that, one day, he shall definitely wear a gold jacket."

WHAT'S GOING ON?

WR Steve Smith Sr., who is just over 10 months removed from a 2015 season-ending Achilles tendon tear, is back in full force for the Ravens. Through four games, the remarkable wideout leads Baltimore in catches (24) and receiving yards (281), figures that include last Sunday's 111-yard output (on 8 receptions) vs. Oakland. Against the Raiders, Smith Sr. produced the 51st 100-yard receiving game of his career, which currently ties (Andre Johnson & Terrell Owens) for fourth in NFL history. As a Raven, Smith Sr. owns eight 100-yard games, a mark that ranks second in team history (WR Mark Clayton, nine).

Why do you think that you have emerged as such a third-down target? "As a receiver, third downs are where you make your money. If you can be a guy that is reliable

on third down, it goes a long way. That is the most critical down in football in terms of being able to sustain drives and move the ball, so it is definitely a time where I hope to make plays."

This offseason, you played basketball to help rehab your hip injury. What is it about basketball you like? "I've always liked basketball; it has always been a fun sport to play. I played in high school. I played a lot this offseason because it was the best thing I could do to simulate physical activity. It gave my hip a lot of work against other people, and it was good for me to see how it responded. I also just enjoy sports in general, so it was really good to get some exercise. I also was able to get [former Ravens TE] Todd Heap to come and play with me on the basketball court and schooled him a bunch of times." (laughter)

What is your favorite country you've visited? "The Dominican Republic is awesome. I went there for my Mormon mission trip when I was younger, and I went back there for my honeymoon. It has great beaches and good weather."

What is something that the average NFL fan doesn't realize about the tight end position? "Most people don't realize that tight ends have to be one of the best athletes on the team. We have to do it all. We have to block guys that are bigger than us, and we still have to run routes against other guys. We really are asked to do a lot, and that makes playing the tight end position extremely difficult."

You have a son and twin daughters. How hard is it to balance being a father and playing in the NFL? "There are definitely a lot of challenges in being an NFL dad. A lot of my teammates get to go home and rest after a long day of practice and workouts. For those of us that are fathers, our day just starts when we get home. I have three kids under three, and they are always running wild when I get home. Being able to sustain the energy is definitely the hardest part."

One thing fans like is your hair. Does your three-year old son have the same style as you? "He definitely does. (laughter) We take pride in our hair, and my son has great hair. We are trying to teach him early to style it properly and maximize his potential, physically." (laughter)

Which teammate is likely to be a future NFL coach? "Eric Weddle."

Who is your favorite tight end of all time? "Todd Heap."

QUOTH THE RAVENS

Browns head coach Hue Jackson on the Ravens' defense:

"They are right back to being the Ravens of the old times. They are a very good defensive front; they have some good players in the secondary. I remember playing them in the past, and it used to feel like there were 13 guys out there instead of 11. They are playing with that swagger and confidence again, and they are a very good defensive football team."

OLB Terrell Suggs on bouncing back from the Raiders loss:

"We have to capitalize on our opportunities. There is nothing [fans and media] can say that we don't already know. But like I said, we are a veteran team, and we're not going to get down on ourselves. This one sucks, because we fought all the way back and took the lead. Especially this city and this team, we don't like losing games on defense. But we are going to get better and continue to work. It is just one missed opportunity."

DT Timmy Jernigan on the loss to Oakland and being a defense that wins games in the clutch:

"[Giving up a late lead] is not the way we want to be remembered. We've come too far, and we're too proud, to have that on our record. It's a team game, and we need to get back to what worked for us the first three games. There's a lot of pride in this locker room, and there are good things ahead for this team."

CB Jimmy Smith on dropping a game to Oakland but still being 3-1 with much of the season ahead:

"Absolutely, we're 3-1 with an opportunity to win the game at the end [vs. Oakland]. We're not down on ourselves at all. We know we have the potential to be a really, really good team, and once we start realizing that, we're going to take off."

ILB Zachary Orr on the impact of S Eric Weddle:

"We joke around and say that is 'Coach Weddle.' He really is a coach on the field. He is constantly talking to all of us, not just to me, but C.J. [Mosley] as well and other DBs. He is just constantly reminding us, little tips [such as], 'Get your depth here; this is what they like to do.' In the heat of battle, it is great to have someone like that who can remind you of little tips that the offense likes to do. It has been great, and we love having him back there. It doesn't hurt that he is a playmaker as well."

John Harbaugh on how S Eric Weddle fits with the Ravens:

"He has an enthusiasm for the work day. He loves football. He loves every part of the work day. He loves every part of being in here and being a football player. There's never something that you look at him and he's not excited to do. That is infectious. That's something that makes us all better, and to me, that's one of the things that a great leader does, and he has those qualities. He fits in with how we do things around here perfectly. I give Ozzie [Newsome] all the credit in the world. That was a great signing."

CSN Mid-Atlantic's Cliff Brown on Joe Flacco's leadership:

"For the first five years of his career, Flacco played with Ravens legends Ray Lewis and Ed Reed, and he allowed them and other veterans to set the emotional pulse for the team. Now Smith and linebacker Terrell Suggs remain the loudest voices in the locker room, but when Flacco speaks, players listen." **Head coach John Harbaugh on owner Steve Biscotti's leadership:** "Steve is such a creative, outside-the-box thinker, and he's going to challenge us in, really, every direction. He's going to push the envelope. He's going to suggest things that really just make you scratch your head, because he really wants to push the thinking. To me, that's what a great leader does."

NFL Media's Mike Mayock on Baltimore's personnel department:

"I think the Ravens front office is as solid as any in the National Football League. It's not just [general manager and executive vice president] Ozzie [Newsome] who is outstanding. It's [assistant general manager] Eric DeCosta, it's [director of college scouting] Joe Hortiz. These guys are outstanding. They've stood the test of time. I think when you really go through their draft and understand what's happened, they are one of the solid drafting teams in the league, and they will continue to be so."

Special teams coordinator/associate HC Jerry Rosburg on K Justin Tucker winning AFC Special Teams Player of the Month (Sept.):

"He's deserving of it because he's not only made long kicks, but he's been very consistent, and his kickoffs have been just as ordered. He's been clutch. He's made some big kicks in big moments. That's really the sign of a great kicker, someone who can come in in the fourth quarter and pin a game down for you."

Bengals DT Geno Atkins on matching up against G Marshal Yanda:

"When I tell my son or daughter about football, I'll tell them that he was one of the best guards I went up against in the league. He's got nastiness, he's physical, and he has finesse. He's strong, but if you try to beat him with a little finesse, he can handle that, too, because he's got good feet. He's got the whole package."

DT Timmy Jernigan on OLB Terrell Suggs mentoring him:

"He brings a special type of energy with him. He is definitely one of those guys that is almost like having a coach with you. When we are out there together, and he sees something, sometimes he is telling me, 'The play is coming to you.' Off of that, before the ball snaps, it is easy to make pre-snap reads and things like that, especially with a guy like Suggs beside you. He hasn't told me anything wrong in three years. Every time he has been beside me and said, 'This is what is about to happen,' it has happened."

RB Terrance West on playing for the Ravens, his hometown team:

"Throughout my career – high school, college – I've always had obstacles I have had to overcome. I was in Cleveland, I went to Tennessee, now I'm with the Baltimore Ravens. I want to make this my last stop."

PRO CONNECTIONS

 Ravens assistant GM Eric DeCosta received his first NFL experience as a training camp intern in the Redskins' player personnel department.

• Ravens president **Dick Cass** represented the estate of Jack Kent Cooke in the sale of the Redskins to **Dan Snyder**.

• Ravens assistant special teams coach **Chris Horton** was selected by Washington in the seventh round of the 2008 NFL Draft. Horton played safety for the Redskins from 2008-11, earning NFC Defensive Player of the Week and Month honors during his rookie season.

• Redskins quarterbacks coach **Matt Cavanaugh** was Baltimore's offensive coordinator from 1999-2004. Cavanaugh was a member of the Ravens' Super Bowl XXXV Super Bowl Championship team and helped coach a running backs group that recorded a then-franchise record 2,199 yards during the 2000 season.

• Ravens **ILB Zachary Orr**'s father, **Terry**, played tight end for Washington from 1986-93, seeing action in 105 games and producing 52 catches for 939 receiving yards and 10 TDs.

• Ravens assistant O-line coach **Todd Washington** and Redskins head coach **Jay Gruden** were both members of the Buccaneers Super Bowl XXXVII Championship team. Washington was a C/G (1998-2002) for Tampa Bay, while Gruden served as an offensive assistant (2002-08).

• During the 1996 season, Ravens offensive coordinator **Marc Trestman** held the same position with the 49ers while Redskins quarterbacks coach **Matt Cavanaugh** was the QBs coach. Trestman was a senior assistant (2001) and offensive coordinator/QBs coach (2002-03) for Oakland while Redskins offensive line coach **Bill Callahan** served as the Raiders' offensive coordinator/offensive line coach (1999-2001) and head coach (2002-03).

COLLEGE CONNECTIONS

• Redskins **TE Vernon Davis** (2003-05) was a consensus All-American and All-Atlantic Coast Conference first-team selection at Maryland. Davis is one of the most decorated players in Terrapins' history and was the No. 6 pick in the 2006 NFL Draft.

WEEK 4 RECAP: OAK. 28, BAL. 27

In a battle that saw each team score a pair of touchdowns in the fourth quarter, the Ravens lost for the first time in 2016 when the Raiders won, 28-27, at M&T Bank Stadium last Sunday. Baltimore's attempt to set up a possible game-winning field goal failed after QB Joe Flacco's pass to WR Kamar Aiken at the Raiders' 32-yard line with 43 seconds left fell incomplete. The Ravens took a 27-21 lead on RB Terrance West's 3-yard TD run with 3:36 remaining in the game. Oakland QB Derek Carr, who threw 4 TD passes in the contest, then directed a six-play, 66-yard TD drive that ended with a 23-yard bullet to WR Michael Crabtree in the end zone with 2:12 left. Crabtree, who caught 7 balls for 88 yards, scored 3 TDs in the hard-fought game. Carr was 25-of-35 for 199. Twenty-two penalties were called in the game, 10 for 105 yards against the Ravens, including 5 for offensive holding. The Raiders took a 14-6 first-half lead on a pair of Carr TD throws, the first to WR Seth Roberts (6 yards) and the second to Crabtree (5 yards). K Justin Tucker's 2 FGs (24 and 43 yards) provided the Ravens' points. The Ravens closed the gap to 14-12 in the third quarter with a 1-yard Flacco dive on a fourth-down play. The 2-point conversion was unsuccessful. Oakland extended the lead to 21-12 on Crabtree's second TD from Carr, this one from 13 yards. Venerable WR Steve Smith Sr. brought the Ravens right back with an impressive 52-yard catch (from Flacco) and run. The Ravens played without two starters on the offensive line (LT Ronnie Stanley and LG Alex Lewis). Smith Sr. caught 8 passes for a game-high 111 yards, while FB Kyle Juszczyk produced career highs with 6 grabs for 56 yards. Flacco completed 32 of 52 for 298 yards to nine different receivers, and West ran for a career-best 113 yards (5.4 avg.) and 1 TD (21 rushes).

REDSKINS 31, RAVENS 28 – 12/9/12 AT WASHINGTON

The host Redskins produced a furious rally to tie the contest, 28-28, in regulation and then won, 31-28, in the extra period on K Kai Forbath's 34-yard field goal. Baltimore took an 8-point lead (28-20) with 4:47 left in regulation on RB Ray Rice's 7-yard TD run. Washington then produced an impressive 13-play, 85-yard drive that finished with backup QB Kirk Cousins hitting WR Pierre Garcon with an 11-yard TD strike. Cousins then scored on a QB draw for the 2-point conversion to tie the game at 28. Twice in that series the Ravens sent Redskins starting QB Robert Griffin III to the sideline with injuries, setting up Cousins' heroics. The Ravens took a 21-14 halftime lead on 3 **OB Joe Flacco** TD throws: 2 to WR Anguan Boldin (19 and 31 yards) and the other to TE Dennis Pitta (14 yards). The Redskins scored on a 4-yard Griffin-to-WR Joshua Morgan throw and a 1-yard RB Alfred Morris run. The Redskins came within 1 (21-20) in the third quarter on a pair of Forbath FGs (48 and 49 yards). In the overtime, Baltimore won the toss. but punted after not making a first down. CB Richard Crawford then returned the kick 64 yards to set up the winning FG. Flacco completed 16 of 21 passes for 182 yards and a 121.4 QB rating. His 2 third-quarter turnovers (INT and a fumble) set up 2 Redskins FGs. Rice ran 20 times for 121 yards and caught 3 passes for 15 more. Morris rushed for 122 yards for the 'Skins, while Griffin III was 15-of-26 for 246 yards and a 102.4 rating. Boldin (10,072) passed the 10,000-yard career receiving milestone during his team-leading 78-yard performance (3 catches). OLB Paul Kruger has tallied at least 1 sack in five-straight games, tying former Ravens' OLB Adalius Thomas (who did it twice, 2005 and 2006) for a team record.

John Harbaugh has led the Ravens to a playoff berth in six (2008-12 and 2014) of his eight full seasons in Baltimore, and in 2012, captured the franchise's second Super Bowl championship. • Harbaugh, Tom Landry (Dallas) and Tom Coughlin (Jaguars/ Giants) own the most road playoff wins (7) by a HC in NFL history.

• Including playoffs (10-5), the Ravens are 90-57 since 2008, ranking as the NFL's fourth-most total wins. He has led the Ravens to 80 regular season wins, tying (Ind.) for fifth most since 2008.

FOUR-STRAIGHT TOP 5s

In 2015, senior NFL writer Rick Gosselin of The Dallas Mornina News ranked the Ravens' special teams unit No. 1 in the NFL in his annual comprehensive ratings system based on 22 categories, assigning points according to each standing -1 for best, 32 for worst. 2015 marked the fourth-straight year in Gosselin's Top 5, as Baltimore was No. 5 in 2014, No. 5 in 2013, and in 2012, earned the No. 2 spot.

RAVENS THRIVE UNDER ROSBURG



Special teams coordinator/associate head coach Jerry Rosburg, a 38-year coaching veteran, has guided a strong special teams group since arriving in Baltimore in 2008. Here are several standout notes:

SIX PRO BOWLERS

• Six Ravens have earned Pro Bowl honors while playing for Rosburg: ST Brendon Ayanbadejo (2008), K Billy Cundiff (2010), RS Jacoby Jones (2012), K Justin Tucker (2013), LS Morgan Cox & P Sam Koch (2015).

PRIME PUNTER & KICKER

• Earning his first Pro Bowl nod in 2015, P Sam Koch's 46.7 gross average ranked No. 9 in the NFL, while his 42.9 net average was No. 2. In 2014, Koch posted the NFL's No. 3 gross (47.4) and No. 1 net (43.3) averages. Both marks are career highs and Ravens records. Pro Bowl K Justin Tucker, who Rosburg scouted and helped sign as a rookie free agent, owns the NFL's most FGs (141, tied with NE's Stephen Gostkowski) since entering the NFL in 2012. With an 88.7% career success mark, "Tuck" is the second-most accurate kicker in league history.

RAVENS BIG RETURNS

• Led by Pro Bowl RS Jacoby Jones in the 2012 Super Bowl season, Baltimore ranked first in the NFL in KOR average (27.3). Jones, who became the first player ever to record dual KORs of at least 105 yards in a career, tied for a league-leading 3 kick return TDs (2 KORs & 1 PR). He also tied an NFL record for longest KOR in a Super Bowl with his 108vard KOR-TD. (In 2014's game at Pit., he added another 108-yarder to his resume, marking 4 total KOR-TDs over 100 yards in his career.)

ROSBURG'S PAST

• Prior to Baltimore, Rosburg built a successful NFL special teams resume with the Browns (2001-06) and Falcons (2007). Over a fiveyear span (2002-06), Cleveland's special teams were ranked as the top NFL unit in The Dallas Morning News' annual comprehensive report.

TRESTMAN GUIDES THE "O"

Marc Trestman was hired as the Ravens' offensive coordinator on Jan. 20, 2015, replacing Gary Kubiak. In his first Baltimore season, Trestman's offense produced the second-most total yards (5,749) in team history and the most passing yards (4,271) despite using four different starting QBs.

 During Trestman's time in the NFL, he has helped teams to eight playoff appearances, two conference championship games and a Super Bowl berth (XXXVII as offensive coordinator of the Raiders).

• In the five seasons prior to his Chicago arrival, Trestman was a head coach in the Canadian Football League, leading the Montreal Alouettes to back-to-back Grey Cup Championships in 2009 and 2010. He was named the CFL's Coach of the Year in 2009.

• In its first year (2013) under Trestman, Chicago's "O" posted several records by gaining a franchise-best 6,109 net yards. The 2013 Bears also finished second in team history with 445 points.

• QB Josh McCown had a career year in 2013, setting the singleseason franchise records in passer rating (109.0) and completion pct. (66.5). In 2013, Pro Bowl RB Matt Forte ranked second in the NFL with 1,339 rushing yards and was third in yards from scrimmage (1,933), while Pro Bowl WRs Alshon Jeffery & Brandon Marshall were sixth and 11th, respectively, in NFL receiving yards.

PEES LEADS THE "D"



Dean Pees, a 13-year NFL-coaching veteran, became the Ravens' defensive coordinator in 2012 and helped guide Baltimore to its second World Championship in Super Bowl XLVII. Pees, who was New England's "D" coordinator from 2006-09, heads a Ravens' squad that in 2015 ranked No. 8

in total defense (10th passing & 12th rushing). Pees also leads a unit that, during the John Harbaugh Era (2008-16), has allowed the NFL's second-fewest points (19.0) per game, the third-fewest yards (314.4) per game and the second-fewest overall TDs (261).



THE RETURN SPECIALIST

On Sept. 5, the Ravens signed four-time Pro Bowler **RS/WR Devin Hester Sr.**, who has produced the most return TDs (20) in NFL history, to a one-year contract. Hester Sr., who is in his 11th season, is arguably the best return specialist in NFL history. Here are a few notes about his impressive career:

- ✓ He has posted the most return touchdowns (20) in NFL history.
- ✓ Hester Sr. has registered an NFL-record 14 punt return touchdowns, adding 5 kickoff return touchdowns and 1 missed field goal return touchdown (108 yards).
- ✓ Seeing action in 148 career games (47 starts), he has also tallied 255 receptions for 3,311 yards (13.0 avg.) and 16 touchdowns, also posting 116 rushing yards and one touchdown on 36 carries.
- ✓ Hester Sr.'s 12.0-yard career punt return average ranks seventh in NFL history, while his 3,580 punt return yards (on 298 returns) stand fourth. (Both marks rank best among active players.)
- ✓ For kickoff returns, Hester Sr. owns a 25.0-yard career average, gaining 7,107 yards (12th most in NFL history).
- ✓ In 2014 with Atlanta, he recorded 45 kickoff returns for 1,128 yards (25.1 avg.) and 18 punt returns for 240 yards (13.3 avg.) and 1 touchdown, en route to earning Pro Bowl honors.
- His four Pro Bowls occurred in 2006, 2007, 2010 and 2014. He was named to the All-Decade Team (2000s) by ESPN and The AP, and he has been tabbed All-Pro three times (2006, 2007 & 2010).



SOARING WITH SAM

2015 Pro Bowler **Sam Koch** owns a 45.2 career gross average and 39.3 career net, both marks that rank first in Ravens history. In 2014, Koch posted a career-high and Ravens franchise-record 47.4-yard gross average and a 43.3-yard net average, shattering his previous personal bests.

Ravens special teams coordinator/associate head coach Jerry Rosburg on P Sam Koch's innovative punting methods:

"He's a unique punter. He's changing the way the game is going to be played. It's remarkable to me that more have not necessarily followed the lead. Perhaps that's an indication of how difficult it is to do what he's doing, because you don't see much of it – even from the highly-skilled professionals that we see on a weekly basis."

ESPN.com's Kevin Seifert on Koch's arsenal of punts:

"Some are designed to hook toward the sideline with maximum hang time. Others use an intentionally low trajectory to aid coverage teams. He has a knuckler and one kick that drops, from the returner's perspective, roughly in the shape of the letter "S." He's debuted a "boomerang" punt that does just what you would imagine it might. Most, but not all, of these punts are intended to discourage a clean catch and minimize the return.

"It's not unusual for NFL punters to develop a "changeup" of sorts, but no one has ever had multiple options at the ready. ... The NFL changes every day, but there are only a few moments in each generation when it transforms. This is one of them. In plain sight, Sam Koch and the Ravens have introduced a new way to punt."

INSIDE THE 20 SUCCESS

P Sam Koch is the Ravens' all-time leader in punts inside the 20 (currently has 284 during his career). In 2010, he posted a career-high 39 boots inside the 20, which were the NFL's second most and tied for eighth best all time in league history.

three-time AFC Player of the Month, which ties him with S Ed Reed & K Matt Stover for the most in Ravens history. Tucker has also earned six AFC Special Teams Player of the Week honors.

• In 2013, Tucker made his first Pro Bowl by setting team records in FGs made (38) and FGAs (41), with both figures tying (Stephen Gostkowski) for the NFL's most. Tucker also had a franchise-record 140 points (tied for sixth in NFL).

• Tucker made 33-straight FGs at one point during the 2013 season, ranking as the NFL's fifth-longest streak of all time.

IN MEMORIAM: CLARENCE BROOKS

Clarence Brooks, the Baltimore Ravens' longest-tenured assistant coach, passed away on Sept. 17 at a hospital in Weston, Fla., following a battle with esophageal and stomach cancer. He was 65. The beloved Brooks – referred to by most as "C.B."

- originally joined the organization in 2005 and served 11 seasons as defensive line coach. This past spring, while undergoing intense treatment for his illness, he transitioned into a senior defensive assistant role, but still spent as much time as he possibly could working with players and fellow coaches, including during the Ravens' recent training camp. Brooks was a 24-year NFL coaching veteran and one of six assistant coaches retained by head coach John Harbaugh upon his 2008 Baltimore arrival.

In addition to the Ravens, "C.B." coached for the Miami Dolphins (2000-04), Cleveland Browns (1999) and Chicago Bears (1993-98). Brooks also spent 17 years in the collegiate ranks holding coaching positions at Arizona (1990-92) – where he was instrumental in the notable "Desert Swarm" defense that led the nation in scoring defense in 1992 – Syracuse (1981-89) and his alma mater Massachusetts (1976-80).

During Brooks' Baltimore tenure as defensive line coach (2005-15), the Ravens allowed the NFL's fewest rushing touchdowns (89), second-fewest points per game (18.9) and the league's second-fewest rushing yards per game (94.2).

Head Coach John Harbaugh:

"Our heartfelt condolences and love go out to Justa and the Brooks family on the passing of Clarence. We loved that man! He is at peace now through the grace of Jesus Christ. He fought the good fight and won. One of the finest coaches I have ever met, he changed the lives and influenced players and coaches for the better. He was a great man, loving husband and devoted father. He was as tough and determined in adversity as you'll ever see and as loyal a friend as there is. 'C.B.' will forever walk as a loved and cherished member of the Ravens family."

General Manager & Executive Vice President Ozzie Newsome:

"Very few, if any, coaches influenced their players – on and off the field – like Clarence Brooks. How fortunate are the Ravens to have had this special person in our lives for the past 12 years? He was a teacher, a friend, a father figure to many and a great football coach. A lot of our defensive success over the years is due to his ability to get the most out of his players on the defensive line. This is a sad, sad day for our team and extended family. Our hearts ache for Justa and the rest of Clarence's family."

Owner Steve Bisciotti:

"The Bisciottis are so sad to hear about Clarence's passing. He was the sweetest man I've ever met in football. He was also as tough as nails and was as respected by everyone on our team as any coach who ever touched the Ravens. His impact was more than people on the outside could know. He will be so missed."

President Dick Cass:

"Clarence had a special rapport with his players. He was both beloved as coach and as a person. His infectious laugh and welcoming smile will be greatly missed, not by just the players and his fellow coaches, but by everyone in our building."

DT Brandon Williams:

"Coach Brooks was like a father figure to me and every other player he coached. He made me the player I am today, but more importantly, helped me to be the man I am today. He always got the best out of you. He saw the potential in every player and did everything in his power to help you be the best you could be – on and off the field. Every day I walked in this building, no matter what was going on, he could always make me smile. I will miss him, and my heart goes out to the entire Brooks family."

DE Lawrence Guy:

"Coach Brooks was a heck of a coach, but an even better man. He cared so much about all of us and could always pull the best out of you in any situation. Through him, I learned how to prepare better, practice better and play better. I will truly miss his coaching, his fellowship and his mentorship. Rest well, 'C.B.'"

OLB Terrell Suggs:

"Clarence Brooks was a rare, special coach. We had a relationship that became more than football; he was family. He was every bit the definition of the word 'coach.' He was firm and demanding when he needed to be, but was a father figure and caring at the same time. I will definitely miss my friend."

Linebackers Coach Don Martindale:

"Clarence Brooks is one of the finest human beings I have ever met. Selfishly speaking, you would like to say he was your best friend, but he was really everybody's best friend. We are happy he is not suffering anymore. I love him like a brother, and I am going to miss him terribly."

Former Ravens Head Coach Brian Billick (Who Hired Brooks in 2005):

"Whew, this hurts. What a man, what a coach, what an inspiration. Beyond being one of the best position coaches in the league, Clarence was one of the most respected people in the NFL. He was a great teacher and friend. His positive and upbeat, yet stern, way was special. The proof is in the pudding. Look at how players improved under him. It would be tough to find a more respected assistant in the NFL. My heart reaches out to Justa and his family."

Former Ravens DT Haloti Ngata:

"I am deeply saddened by the news of 'C.B.' passing away. I hope that I can help continue his legacy by the way I live and play. I played under 'C.B.' for nine years. In that time, he helped me go to five Pro Bowls and win a Super Bowl ring. He deserves a lot of that credit. He worked so hard with me and my Ravens teammates. This is tough news to swallow. I will miss you, Coach. Thank you for everything you taught me through the years – on and off the field. I love you, Clarence."

Former Browns, Ravens & Dolphins DE Rob Burnett:

"I cried a few weeks ago when I found out about Clarence and his fight against cancer, and I immediately reached out to Justa and 'C.B.' His death rips at my heart. I loved Clarence. He was more than my coach. He was my friend, a mentor and a motivator. This is a sad day for all of those fortunate enough to have known this great person."

RAVENS IN OUR COMMUNITY

PLAY 60 CHALLENGE

The 2016 Ravens PLAY 60 Challenge is being offered to all Baltimore County public elementary and middle school students. In partnership with the American Heart Association, local students will be encouraged to be physically active for at least 60 minutes every day over a four-week, incentive-based period. During the program, in-classroom tracking materials and individual student guides will be distributed to help students record their physical activity. By reaching specified benchmarks, students will be rewarded with prizes and a chance to be honored at the 2017 Ravens PLAY 60 game. Top performers from participating schools will also be invited to attend a prize luncheon held at M&T Bank Stadium in the spring of 2017.





For the seventh-consecutive year, the Ravens have partnered with the Carroll County School District to execute the PLAY 60 Challenge through Project ACES (Active Children Excel in School), a program whose mission and goals align directly with the NFL PLAY 60 campaign. The Project ACES program reaches 26 elementary schools and impacts approximately 12,000 students throughout Carroll County. The kids have the opportunity to challenge themselves and their classmates to get active during the two-week period. Collective and individual prizes are available for topperforming schools and those who log the most minutes or show most improvement.

PLAY 60 FESTIVAL

The Baltimore Ravens hosted their first PLAY 60 Festival to kick off the year-round efforts of the NFL PLAY 60 campaign. More than 300 children from various Baltimore City after-school programs, including Living Classrooms and Education-Based Latino Outreach (EBLO), were led through football drills and activities under the instruction of USA Football coaches and Playworks Maryland. Members of the Ravens' 2016 rookie class, including **WR Chris Moore**, **WR/RS Keenan Reynolds**, **C Matt Skura** and **CB Tavon Young** (all pictured below), joined Ravens cheerleaders and mascot Poe in helping launch this year's program.







JOHN HARBAUGH MONDAY PRESS CONFERENCE: WEEK 5 VS. WASHINGTON

Opening statement: "First of all, on behalf of the Ravens Family, I want to extend our heartfelt sympathies and condolences to Joe Bauer and his family for what happened at the game Sunday, which is absolutely inexcusable. Here's a man and a family that have been longtime season-ticket holders, that know the people here that work in the building, that love the Ravens and have been to countless numbers of games at M&T Bank Stadium without incident. All of a sudden, there's an incident where a 58-year-old gentleman is assaulted by somebody. That's just not what we're about. We're a family. It's a family atmosphere. We believe in having kids in the stands. That's why our cheerleaders are gymnasts. That's why we have a band. It's all about family environment. That's why we play the music that we play. It's for families. That's what the Baltimore Ravens are about. I'm the coach, but I'm the one doing the press conference, and Kevin [Byrne, senior vice president of public and community relations] asked me to say something. I just want to say, on behalf of the organization – Steve Bisciotti most especially – that's not going to be OK. Whatever security has to be out there – whatever has to be done – will be done, because this is just not what we're about, and we're not going to have it at M&T Bank Stadium. Our prayers are with Joe and his family, and our thoughts are with him, and we'll be pulling for him."

Raiders QB Derek Carr stayed very clean in the pocket yesterday. I don't believe there was a sack or quarterback hit. Were they throwing anything exotic or different as far as blocking schemes at your guys? (*Joe Platania*) "No. That's what they do. He's been sacked twice all year. He's rarely touched. The ball comes out really quickly, and that's the way they've set their offense up. I give them credit, Bill Musgrave and the coaches there. I feel like they've built an offense that is very quarterback-friendly. They have a big, physical offensive line. They stay in front of you. They grab you. They chip with tight ends, they chip with backs. They do everything they can to keep the quarterback clean. Then Derek gets the ball out fast, and when he doesn't, he moves. That's the way they're built. They did it very well, and we weren't able to counter it as effectively as we'd hoped to."

John, you and QB Joe Flacco and other players talked about putting the pressure on yourselves instead of your opponent. That's a broad concept, but how do you correct that going forward? (*Childs Walker*) "The first thing is you don't have self-inflicted wounds. That's the No. 1 thing – the penalties. I think we had five holding penalties, two of which I can coach off of, three of which there's really nothing I can say to the guys about. It doesn't matter. They're holding penalties, and you're second-and-20 or whatever. That's where it starts. You cannot ... We overcame it once or twice, but you can't overcome it five times. We don't want to overcome it any times. We don't want pre-snap penalties. We don't need holding penalties. The interesting thing was, a number of them were on plays that got out for some yards, too. It's not just 10 yards. It is also the yards you gain that you lose. Those can be drive killers. That's what Joe was talking about, and that's what I was talking about last night with our team. That's what we have to eliminate. We're way better on offense than we've showed, because we're way more capable of playing winning football. We have to do it more often."

Were there one or two penalties that were beyond befuddling? The OLB Terrell Suggs or DT Brandon Williams offside penalty when they probably knew that was coming, or WR Mike Wallace with the double unsportsmanlike penalty? The unsportsmanlike stuff must really ticks you off. (Jerry Coleman) "Just what you said. You answered you question very well, and I agree with you."

Was there one that stood out? (Jerry Coleman) "No, you said it. You mentioned them. Those are the ones that stood out. I agree with that."

Was getting RB Terrance West more carries the plan going in, or did that evolve throughout the game? (*Cliff Brown*) "I think that was more of the plan going in because of what we did. We went ahead and brought 'Buck' [Javorius Allen] up, and the thought there was to give 'Buck' a chance. He's been working hard, and he's a talented guy, and [we wanted to] give him a chance to get in there and see what he could do. And [we wanted to] give Terrance more carries and give him a chance to see what he could do. I thought it worked well. He did a good job and ran hard. He's more ticked off at himself about the fumble. Give Jeremy Zuttah tons of credit for the hustle and the effort play to get on that ball. That was a great play by Jeremy, which goes to the next point, I think, which is that we are playing really hard, really physical, fast football. We're capable of being an excellent offense – a really good offense – and we're going to get there. Our guys are capable of doing it. I'm going to keep pushing them and prodding them and encouraging them. We're going to keep working hard to get to the point where we translate plays and yards into points. That's what we need to do, especially early in the game, which we didn't. We did it late, but not early in the game this game."

Was that a discussion at halftime to try to get RB Terrance West the ball more and run a little bit more in the third quarter? (*Luke Jones*) "No, we're not going to say, 'Hey, we need to get so and so the ball more,' at halftime. We're looking more at scheme stuff. We want to run the ball more and we want to run it effectively. Really, what you talk about is how we're going to do it. It's not so



much, 'We have to run the ball more.' It's really more about how are we going to run the ball better? If we didn't run the ball well, what was stopping us? How do we need to formation it or how do we need to block it? Or who is making the plays and how do we counter that? You have about eight minutes in there to make some decisions, and that's really what you get to is how we're going to scheme it up. The same thing goes for the passing game and the protection part of it. That's happening on defense, too, and it's also happening on special teams."

Did RB Terrance West do enough yesterday to be the main guy going forward? *(Jamison Hensley)* "I'm not going to say that. I'm not going to get into all of that. That's all great to write about, but it's nothing for us to waste any energy on. We're going to put the guys out that are playing well. Our guys know this: If you're playing hard, you're playing smart, and you're playing fundamentally sound, and you're productive, you have a chance of being out there again, because everybody is counting on everybody else to get the job done. If one of those things falls down, then you leave the door open for another guy to get their opportunity."

At the end of the game, was there any consideration to let K Justin Tucker try if from 67 yards for the field goal? (*Garrett Downing*) "No. No, not really. I felt like we needed to try to get the first down there. I can see your point, but that would have been asking a lot on a grass field that was a little soft."

On the final touchdown by Raiders WR Michael Crabtree, S Lardarius Webb was out and S Kendrick Lewis was in. Did that cause any confusion there with a communication breakdown? *(Jerry Coleman)* "No. They played the proper coverage. They just didn't play it well – neither one of them."

John, is TE Maxx Williams' knee injury serious or a day-to-day issue? (*Luke Jones*) "To be determined. It's the same thing he's had. It's a cartilage issue that he has in there. It's not something that can be fixed until it's fixed. It's just something he has to play with and play through. The doctors have to tell us what the best course of action is going forward. He can still play. Is it the best thing for him and all of that? We'll have to figure that out."

What did you see from CB Jerraud Powers in his first game playing, and do you see him and CB Tavon Young continuing to split snaps? (*Ryan Mink*) "They were in different personnel groups that we had. We are trying to play as many defensive players that we can, and you probably have noticed that. We are playing packages, and I don't know what the exact split was with those guys, but like you said, it was fairly balanced. I thought they both played well. Jerraud played solid; he did OK. We will see where it goes."

Going back to pass rush, do you look at what happened yesterday as a one-game aberration, or do you say, "Maybe we need to tinker with some things in the pass rush?" (Ed Lee) "We aren't going to change anything. We have a system, and we have a plan in place. We are not going to panic. We didn't get to the quarterback. There are a few tweaks that we are talking about making that you won't notice, just in terms of how we call things or how we execute things that we will work on. We are capable of having a great pass rush, and we plan on having a great pass rush."

Beyond some of the self-defeating stuff that you alluded to with the offense, QB Joe Flacco did talk about feeling like things aren't quite clicking overall yet. Do you share that feeling? Do you not see the offense that you envisioned going into the season yet? (*Childs Walker*) "Of course [I share that feeling]. I think everybody sees it. The end result is something that we all can look at – fans and coaches and players and everybody. We know what we want it to feel like and look like from a production standpoint, and we are not there. We have to dive down inside and find a way to get it there. We are capable of doing it. I have my ideas. [Offensive coordinator] Marc [Trestman] has his ideas; all the coaches [have ideas]. We talked to Joe, we talked to different players, but we are not going to ... One thing you don't do is you don't overreact. That is the starting point; you don't overreact. That is when things get rough. We have a good plan. We have an idea, but after four weeks, I think you start to get an idea of what you are really good at, especially with our receivers coming to the table late through training camp and all that. I feel like we all can see now what we have and how to utilize these guys. I want to get consistent at what we were doing. I want us to get out there and look certain and understand how we are going to execute things and get good at it."

You had talked about a 50-percent ratio, or close to it, with run-pass. That is what you had yesterday. I believe it was 50 on the button. I think it was 52 passing attempts, 26 runs. (*Jerry Coleman*) "Is that 50-50?"

Well, I have to work on my math. The essence of my question is, did QB Joe Flacco throw the ball too many times? (*Jerry Coleman*) "It depends on your perspective, I guess. It depends on your opinion, your math. We are trying to win the game, and twominute drills ... I never know how to answer that question. It is a nice, broad, open-ended, worthless question, which I love you for, actually. You are quite good at it. You are the master at that question."

With RB Kenneth Dixon getting healthier, you possibly have four running backs now. Does RB Justin Forsett have a spot on this roster going forward with the numbers and the young players and him being inactive? (*Jamison Hensley*) "Of course. Justin Forsett is a highly-respected, highly-valued guy in my eyes and the eyes of all of us. It is a competitive world that we are in. It is a competitive league; it is a competitive sport. He knows that as well as anybody. It doesn't diminish him in any way. It just enhances him, in my mind, in terms of how he handles it. We will just have to see. All those personnel things are all to be determined. You can't say anything about where anything is going to go, because you just don't know. None of us have the ability to see in the future, so we will see how it plays out."

Have you made a decision on TE Darren Waller, because he is coming off the suspension. Is he someone you intend to put on the **53-man roster?** (*Luke Jones*) "We will see. We will see how that plays out. You don't have to for a week, I think, is the rule. We will just have to see where we go with that and what we are able to do."

What changed in the fourth quarter to become so much more successful on the ground, as opposed to the first three quarters? *(Kyle Barber)* "We blocked better, maybe. Things are going to open up a little bit when you are down. They expect you to throw it, [so] you run it a little bit. I think that helped a little bit."

How do you think you match up with the Washington Redskins? (*Bill West*) "They are really good. I am impressed with them. I think that they ... We played them before, and it is pretty clear how they want to play. They want to be physical and tough and play hard. The quarterback has always played well against us before. Well, maybe the one time we played him, he played well. They have a lot of good players, a lot of skill guys – DeSean Jackson and Co., Jordan [Reed]. I love the running back. Some people make fun of me for saying I love a player, but I really have a lot of respect for the young running back [Matt Jones] out of Florida. I personally liked him in the draft a lot. I though the would be a good player. He is [a good player], for the record, for all the scouts out there. [They have] a good, physical offensive line, and it is an important game for us."

QB Joe Flacco has talked at times about wanting to have more chunk plays and taking shots. When he is getting hit a lot, does that make it more difficult to go with plays like that? Are the two related? (*Cliff Brown*) "We called a bunch of them. There is no doubt about that. We threw a few of them. Some of them we weren't able to get off, and some of them, we had to checkdown. We have to keep calling them. We have speed out there, and we have to start hitting them – not just the chunk plays, but the seams, the overs, the high-lows. We had a few of them. Obviously, Steve's [Smith Sr.] play was a big play. That goes back to the earlier question that we had earlier, just in terms of being better. We just have to get better, whatever we decide to do. Joe is making a great point; you have to get big plays in this league. That is what we are searching for. We really think we have the players to do it."

How much do you think the time off helped guys like T Ronnie Stanley and G/T Alex Lewis? (Ed Lee) "Ronnie Stanley and Alex Lewis are working really hard to get back. Alex was out there and played on field goal. We had him in a backup role. We just felt like without the practice time, with him coming off a concussion, [not having many] reps – all those kind of things for a rookie – [they make it] a little tough to put him in the starting spot. We just felt like the guys at practice would be a little better in that role. He is back. Ronnie, we just have to keep working on his foot. I know Ronnie says he could have played, and he probably could have. He could probably play this week, so we will just have to see how we decide to do it, along with what the doctors say, and we will figure it out. You want to do what is best for the team short term and long term and what is best for the player short term and long term. Our guys' health is really important to us. We are not throwing guys out there before they are ready. That is not what we do. We want guys to be healthy, because it makes them better players for one thing. Also, it is just the right thing to do."
