JUST THE FACTS

- After starting the season 3-0, the Baltimore Ravens look to rebound from three-consecutive losses when they travel to face the New York Jets on Sunday, Oct. 23. This game, which kicks off at 1 p.m., marks the Ravens' second-straight week playing at MetLife Stadium following last Sunday's nail-biting 27-23 defeat to the New York Giants.
- The Giants' combination of WR Odell Beckham Jr. and QB Eli Manning proved too much for the Ravens in Week 6. Manning hit Beckham with a short pass on fourth-and-1 with 1:24 left in the game, trailing 23-20, and the spectacular wideout raced 66 yards for the winning score. That was Beckham's second long TD of the day, after he caught a Manning strike for a 75-yard score in the third quarter to give New York its first lead of the game at 17-13. Already playing without five starters, including Pro Bowler ILB C.J. Mosley, the Ravens lost two more defensive standouts during the second half: CB Jimmy Smith (concussion) and OLB Terrell Suggs (arm). Playing under new offensive coordinator Marty Mornhinweg, RB Terrance West produced 87 vards and 2 TDs on 23 carries, while QB Joe Flacco was 26-of-48 for 307, including 4 passes to WR Mike Wallace for 97 yards. The Ravens' defense produced 3 take-aways on the day, while their offense did not turn the ball over. However, for just the second time in team history, Baltimore lost a game when having at least a +3 turnover differential.
- The Ravens have won eight-consecutive games vs. NYJ, producing an overall 8-1 edge in the all-time series. Baltimore's eight-game streak ties for the NFL's fourth-longest active run by a team vs. one opponent.
- On Monday night, the Jets dropped their fourth-straight game in a 28-3 decision at Arizona. Following Sunday's game in New Jersey, Baltimore will have its bye next weekend, while NYJ travels to Cleveland.

HARBS SAYS

JOHN HARBAUGH ON PERSEVERANCE & FINDING WAYS TO IMPROVE:

"I'm excited about where the season is going to go, without question." We know exactly what needs to be done, in terms of what needs to be corrected, but we have to get it corrected. It's not a mystery. It's not new, and it's not news. It's the same thing it has been. We will keep pounding away at the things we have to do better and the things we have to eliminate from our team to play winning football."

INJURY UPDATE

- Five Pro Bowlers OLB Elvis Dumervil (foot), RS Devin Hester Sr. (thigh), LB C.J. Mosley (thigh), WR Steve Smith Sr. (ankle) and G Marshal Yanda (shoulder) – all missed Sunday's game at the Giants. Starting LT Ronnie Stanley (foot) was also out, missing his third-straight contest. CB Jerraud Powers (groin), CB Jimmy Smith (concussion) and **OLB Terrell Suggs** (arm) all left the NYG game and didn't return.
- The Ravens have 14 players on Injured Reserve, including standout TE Benjamin Watson, who tore his Achilles tendon on Aug. 27. Key contributors DT Carl Davis, S Matt Elam and TE Maxx Williams are also on IR, as is third-round rookie draft pick DE Bronson Kaufusi.



NOTE THE QUOTE

S ERIC WEDDLE ON THE RAVENS' MINDSET MOVING FORWARD:

"The biggest thing for us, as an older guy, you don't waver. I'm not going to come in and be all mad and get pissed off at my teammates. It's a long season. It's about being consistent. It's about understanding the details, the little things. It's about taking care of yourself and taking care of your job first. Don't try to do more than you're supposed to do within the defense. Play for each other. I believe in this team, the organization, the coaches. We're just in a rough patch right now. It's just going to take one game to get us over the hump. Everything is right there for us. But, if we don't take advantage of the situation and look at yourself first, we're going to waste this opportunity."

WHAT'S GOING ON?

After registering a single-season franchise low in turnovers forced (14) in 2015, the Ravens this past offseason worked with an added emphasis to create more take-aways. Their efforts are beginning to pay off, with Baltimore posting the NFL's fifth-most take-aways (11, tied) entering Week 7. The Ravens' 8 INTs stand as the NFL's third most.

SPOTLIGHT: BRANDON WILLIAMS



Pos: DT Ht: 6-1 Wt: 340 Exp. (NFL/Ravens): 4/4 College: Missouri So. St. Hometown: St. Louis, MO

Despite having D-I scholarship offers to play guard, you chose to play D-II so you could play DT. Why? "I wanted to hit people instead of get hit. (laughter) On offense, you have to protect someone behind you who makes a hell

of a lot more money than you. If anything goes wrong, and someone gets by you, it is your fault. On defense, I can mess up and go in the wrong gap, but if I fight hard enough, I can still make a play. It is kind of one of those, 'Aww, you shouldn't have done that. But, good play!'"

Pete Prisco from CBS Sports named you the NFL's most underrated player. Is there a specific accolade you want? "The best accolades I can receive are being a great father, a great fiancé, and a great future husband. Football is fun, but it isn't forever. Those types of things are."

Can you have a dominant game without recording stats? "Absolutely. All my linebackers – from Daryl Smith to C.J. Mosley – have made plays. If I am taking up double-teams, and my linebackers can get 10 tackles a game, then I'm doing a great job. It is my role to get people off of my linebackers. Now, they still have to make those plays, but I don't have to make every stat to have a great game. You can make a play without actually making 'the play.' If I take up two or three blockers, and a linebacker blitzes and gets a sack, that is a play I made."

Do you collect anything? "It is one of those weird things, but I collect ragdolls. My fiancé's father calls sacks, 'ragdolls,' because you grab the quarterback and you shake them like a ragdoll. After every sack I get, her stepmom sews me a rag doll of the quarterback. She sends me a ragdoll with the quarterback's jersey and their helmet. Every quarterback I have sacked, I have a ragdoll of them on my mantle."

In what ways do you spend time outdoors? "I hunt and I fish. It was one of those things I had to get used to, because in football, my game is all about attacking. But in hunting and fishing, you have to be patient and let things come to you. The biggest thing is it gets your mind off what you are thinking about. You feel like you are one with nature."

Being from St. Louis, did you know anything about the Ravens when you got drafted? "The main thing people know about is their defense. Getting picked to come on one of the most ferocious defenses in the league made me ecstatic. I was like, 'I'm a defensive player, and they are picking me to add to that defense?' You start thinking about how you can make the team better. I loved every moment about it."

What players did you look up to growing up? "Warren Sapp, for sure. When I first started playing football in eighth grade, he was the reason I wore 99. I also loved Jerome Bettis growing up, because I was the fat kid who wanted to run the ball."

QB Joe Flacco on the Ravens battling forward:

"We've been here before. It's a tough league. There are a lot of tough games and a long road ahead. We've got to stay as confident as we can, and we've got to move forward and just keep our head down. Our division is still up for grabs, and a lot of things are, so we've got to keep fighting and do our best to win games."

John Harbaugh on offensive coordinator Marty Mornhinweg:

"I think his style is obvious. It's enthusiastic. He's very direct. He's very straightforward. The things I've always admired about him [are that] he's a very descriptive teacher. He paints a really good picture for the guys. That's a gift."

QB Joe Flacco on offensive coordinator Marty Mornhinweg:

"Marty is an exciting guy. He is confident, and he brings a lot of confidence to the room. He is very sure in what he is doing and what we are doing. I think he gets everybody going and gives everybody a good outlook on the game plan."

Raiders QB Derek Carr on playing OLB Terrell Suggs:

"Man, he's a Hall of Famer to me. The guy is ridiculous. I have the utmost respect for him. I loved him when he was in college. I love watching him play in the NFL. ... He's just one of those guys [who is] one of the best to ever do it."

S Eric Weddle on how his new teammates have accepted him:

"They welcomed me like I have been a Raven my whole life. It meant a lot to me. I knew what I could bring to the team, on and off the field. When I first got here, I didn't want to push anything about what I've done or who I am. I just wanted to work, build relationships with my teammates and earn their trust. I think it caught them off guard with how much I was willing to help them and teach them and give them anything I have learned over the years that has helped me get to where I'm at. Once they knew it wasn't a facade or a front I was putting up, it made us even closer."

OLB Terrell Suggs on S Eric Weddle:

"I like that he is kind of a wild card. He is kind of 'one of those guys.' The word that comes to mind is 'Raven.' He has that Raven persona. He is a little weird. In meetings, he will pull out this big brush and start brushing his beard. You have to like a guy like that who has a little bit more to him and is a little edgy. That is always good when it comes to the football team, too."

The Baltimore Sun's Childs Walker on S Eric Weddle:

"Weddle has played terrific all-around football and helped stabilize a defensive backfield that had been troubled for years. He is, as he told me in an offseason interview, a very different player from Ed Reed, the gold standard at safety for this franchise and for an entire NFL generation. We probably won't see any wildly improvised interception returns from the 10-year veteran. But, Weddle almost always seems in position to make the correct play, either in run support or coverage."

RB Terrance West on playing for his hometown team Ravens:

"Throughout my career – high school, college – I've always had obstacles I have had to overcome. I was in Cleveland, I went to Tennessee, now I'm with the Baltimore Ravens. I want to make this my last stop."

WR Mike Wallace on eliminating penalties:

"If we eliminate those penalties, we're like 6-0. We do these [mistakes] every single game. We all have a hand in our offense. It just has to get better. If we take that away, we're in it every single game. We just have to get better, myself included. I had a penalty [Sunday vs. NYG]. That's just our season, honestly. If we clean that up, we're a much, much better football team, and we don't have to sit in here and worry about any bad questions. It will be all good questions. We all have a hand in it, and we have to eliminate those penalties."

John Harbaugh on working to limit big plays and coaching up the secondary to perform at a high level:

"We're going to work at it. We're going to look for guys. We're going to teach our guys. We're going to coach our guys. Our guys are going to work hard at it. We have good guys. I believe we have talented guys. We have guys who are fully capable of covering people out there. But we don't have our eyes in the right spot all the time, so I want disciplined guys back there, and those are the guys that are going to play going forward."

LB Zachary Orr on the defense's mentality:

"As a defense, whenever we're the last people on the field, we want to make plays. We emphasize throughout the whole game, throughout the whole season, that we need to make more plays. Coach [John] Harbaugh said that very clearly – we're looking for playmakers – and that's what we're trying to do."

Giants head coach Ben McAdoo on the Ravens' defensive front:

"I see a very physical, heavy-handed unit up front. It all starts with that front. They have a lot of pass rushers you have to account for. [Timmy] Jernigan is playing at a high level. They're doing a nice job, schematically, getting after you."

DT Timmy Jernigan on defensive line coach Joe Cullen's energy:

"I love it. He is high-energy. It is easy to come out and get going, just being around him. There isn't any such thing as half-days or taking plays off or anything like that. He is always in your ear. It doesn't matter who it is, whether it is me, whether it is '55' [Terrell Suggs] or anybody. He is going coach you until you can't be coached anymore."

PRO CONNECTIONS

- Jets assistant head coach/inside LBs coach **Mike Caldwell** spent one season of his playing career as a linebacker with the Ravens (1996).
- Jets **WR Jeremy Butler** entered the NFL as a 2014 rookie free agent with Baltimore. In 2015, he saw action in eight games, posting 31 catches for 363 yards. Butler was released from the team following the 2016 training camp.
- Ravens special teams coordinator/associate head coach **Jerry Rosburg** was the Browns' special teams coordinator (2001-06), while Jets head coach **Todd Bowles** served as defensive nickel package coach (2001-03) and secondary coach (2004) in Cleveland. Jets assistant CBs coach **Daylon McCutcheon** (1999-2006) ended his playing career in 2006 after eight seasons at cornerback for the Browns.
- Jets offensive coordinator **Chan Gailey** was the Bills' head coach for three seasons (2010-12), during which time Ravens **WR Kamar Aiken** signed as a rookie free agent and played two seasons (2011-12).

During that time, Jets **RB Matt Forte** (2008-15) and **WR Brandon Marshall** (2012-14) were also on the Bears' roster before joining the Jets.

WEEK 6 RECAP: NYG 27, BAL. 23

The Giants' combination of WR Odell Beckham Jr. and QB Eli Manning proved too much for the Ravens, who lost, 27-23, at MetLife Stadium last Sunday. It was Baltimore's third-consecutive loss after starting the season 3-0. Manning hit Beckham with a short pass on a fourth-and-1 with 1:24 left in the game, trailing 23-20, and the spectacular wideout raced 66 yards for the winning touchdown. That was Beckham's second long TD of the day, after he caught a Manning strike for a 75yard score in the third quarter to give New York its first lead of the game at 17-13. Beckham, who grabbed just 2 passes for 11 yards in the first half, finished with a career-best 222 yards (8 catches), the fourth most ever against the Ravens. Manning completed 32 of 46 for 403 yards. Already playing without five starters, including Pro Bowl ILB C.J.Mosley, the Ravens lost two more defensive standouts during the second half: CB Jimmy Smith (concussion) and OLB Terrell Suggs (arm). Playing its first game under new offensive coordinator Marty Mornhinweg, Baltimore jumped to a 10-0, first-quarter lead on a 23yard K Justin Tucker field goal and a 1-yard RB Terrance West TD that followed a Beckham fumble at the Giants' 30-yard line. A Manning-to-WR Roger Lewis Jr. 24-yard TD throw made the score 10-7 at the half. New York opened the second half with a 15-play drive that ended with a 21-yard Josh Brown FG to tie the game at 10. Following Beckham's first TD in the third quarter, Baltimore drove to the Giants' 1, but was stopped on a fourth-down attempt. Tucker's 35-yard FG got the Ravens within 1 point, 17-16, with 9:14 remaining in the contest. A 31yard Brown FG extended the NY lead to 20-16 at the 5:54 mark, but a West 2-yard TD run gave the Ravens a 23-20 advantage with 2:04 left in the final guarter. West finished with 87 yards on 23 carries. Flacco was 26-of-48 for 307 yards, including 4 balls to WR Mike Wallace for 97 yards. Twenty-two penalties were called, 15 for 111 yards against the Ravens and 7 for 119 yards against the Giants.

RAVENS 19, JETS 3 – 11/24/13 IN BALTIMORE

On a cold and windy day with gusts over 30 miles per hour, the Ravens found a way to beat the Jets, 19-3, at M&T Bank Stadium. K Justin Tucker converted all 4 of his field goal attempts, including blasting a 53-yarder through the swirling winds in the third quarter. The Ravens' defense was outstanding, getting 3 take-aways, including a pair of interceptions by CB Corey Graham off Jets rookie QB Geno Smith. OLB Terrell Suggs added a fumble recovery on a botched snap. The Jets were limited to just one third-down conversion in 12 attempts while being held to 118 passing yards (220 total net yards). Twenty-nine of New York's passing yards came on the game's last series in the final minute of play. It marked the seventh time this season when the Ravens' defense allowed one or no touchdowns. New York's lone scoring drive came on its second possession of the game when K Nick Folk completed a nine-play, 55-yard series with a 27-yard FG. Tucker then hit 3-consecutive FGs before the end of the second quarter to give Baltimore a 9-3 halftime lead. Tucker's 53-yarder made it 12-3 in the third period, which ended with QB Joe Flacco's throw that cut through the wind and landed into WR Jacoby Jones' hands for a 66-yard touchdown. Flacco completed 17 of 26 passes for 273 yards with 1 TD and 1 INT for a 97.1 QB rating. Jones caught 4 passes for 103 yards, adding 108 more yards on five punt returns and 38 more on two KORs. TE Ed Dickson and TE Dallas Clark each caught 3 balls for 55 and 24 yards, respectively. The Jets' Smith was limited to nine completions on 22 attempts for only 127 yards. The Ravens improved to 8-1 all time against the New York Jets, producing their eighth-consecutive win.



LB Ray Lewis - 2000 Super Bowl XXXV MVP

In a magnificent effort showcasing thrilling performances by their defense, offense and special teams units, the Baltimore Ravens won Super Bowl XXXV with a 34-7 victory over the New York Giants. Allowing the Giants a meager 152 total net yards, New York's attack crossed midfield just twice, while Baltimore's "D" posted 4 INTs. LB Ray Lewis was named the game's MVP, capping an accolade-filled season in which he was also tabbed the NFL's Defensive Player of the Year.



QB Joe Flacco - 2012 Super Bowl XLVII MVP

Baltimore defeated San Francisco, 34-31, in Super Bowl XLVII, capturing the franchise's second World Championship. After an amazing first-half performance, the Ravens took a commanding 28-6 lead. But following a bizarre, 34-minute power outage that halted play, the 49ers stormed back into contention. Clinging to a 34-29 edge late in the game, the Ravens stood firm on a pivotal goal-line stand, jamming SF on four-straight plays inside the 7-yard line. QB Joe Flacco was named the game's MVP.

HEAD COACH JOHN HARBAUGH

COACH HARBS



John Harbaugh has led the Ravens to a playoff berth in six (2008-12 and 2014) of his eight full seasons in Baltimore, and in 2012, captured the franchise's second Super Bowl championship. Under his guidance, the Ravens have secured an appearance in three AFC Championships (2008, 2011 & 2012). Here are several Harbaugh quick hits:

- The Ravens are one of only five teams with at least six playoff berths in the past eight seasons: GB (7), NE (7), Bal. (6), Cin. (6) and Ind. (6).
- The Ravens' 10 playoff wins since '08 are two more than the next teams' wins (New England & Seattle, both 8).
- Harbaugh is the only head coach in NFL history to win a playoff game in each of his first four and five seasons.
- John and his brother, Jim

(formerly of the 49ers), are the only head coaches to advance to three conference title games in the first five years as NFL bosses.

- Harbaugh is the only head coach in NFL history to win a playoff game in six of the first seven seasons of a coaching career.
- In 2012, John Harbaugh became the third coach (with Bill Cowher & Chuck Knox) since the 1970 merger to guide his team to the playoffs in each of his first five seasons.
- Harbaugh, Tom Landry (Dallas) and Tom Coughlin (Jaguars/ Giants) own the most road playoff wins (7) by a HC in NFL history.
- Including playoffs (10-5), the Ravens are 90-59 since 2008, ranking as the NFL's fourth-most total wins. He has led the Ravens to 80 regular season wins, ranking sixth most since 2008.

Since 2014, the Ravens have produced the NFL's most blocked kicks (10), including 2 this season: **DE Lawrence Guy**'s blocked PAT in Week 2 at Cleveland, which was returned by **CB Tavon Young** for 2 points and changed the game's momentum; and **DE Brent Urban**'s FG block in Week 3 at Jacksonville, which set up **K Justin Tucker**'s game-winning FG.

FOUR-STRAIGHT TOP 5s

In 2015, senior NFL writer Rick Gosselin of *The Dallas Morning News* ranked the Ravens' special teams unit No. 1 in the NFL in his annual comprehensive ratings system based on 22 categories, assigning points according to each standing — 1 for best, 32 for worst. 2015 marked the fourth-straight year in Gosselin's Top 5, as Baltimore was No. 5 in 2014, No. 5 in 2013, and in 2012, earned the No. 2 spot.



RAVENS THRIVE UNDER ROSBURG

Special teams coordinator/associate head coach **Jerry Rosburg**, a 38-year coaching veteran, has guided a strong special teams group since arriving in Baltimore in 2008. Here are several standout notes:

SIX PRO BOWLERS

• Six Ravens have earned Pro Bowl honors while playing for Rosburg: ST Brendon Ayanbadejo (2008), K Billy Cundiff (2010), RS Jacoby Jones (2012), K Justin Tucker (2013), LS Morgan Cox & P Sam Koch (2015).

PRIME PUNTER & KICKER

• Earning his first Pro Bowl nod in 2015, **P Sam Koch**'s 46.7 gross average ranked No. 9 in the NFL, while his 42.9 net average was No. 2. In 2014, Koch posted the NFL's No. 3 gross (47.4) and No. 1 net (43.3) averages. Both marks are career highs and Ravens records. Pro Bowl **K Justin Tucker**, who Rosburg scouted and helped sign as a rookie free agent, owns the NFL's most FGs (145) since entering the NFL in 2012. With an 89.0% career success mark, "Tuck" is the second-most accurate kicker in league history (Dan Bailey, 90.1).

RAVENS BIG RETURNS

• Led by Pro Bowl RS Jacoby Jones in the 2012 Super Bowl season, Baltimore ranked first in the NFL in KOR average (27.3). Jones, who became the first player ever to record dual KORs of at least 105 yards in a career, tied for a league-leading 3 kick return TDs (2 KORs & 1 PR). He also tied an NFL record for longest KOR in a Super Bowl with his 108-yard KOR-TD. (In 2014's game at Pit., he added another 108-yarder to his resume, marking 4 total KOR-TDs over 100 yards in his career.)

ROSBURG'S PAST

• Prior to Baltimore, Rosburg built a successful NFL special teams resume with the Browns (2001-06) and Falcons (2007). Over a five-year span (2002-06), Cleveland's special teams were ranked as the top NFL unit in *The Dallas Morning News*' annual comprehensive report.

RAVENS BLOCK PARTY

• Dating back to 2014, the Ravens have produced 10 blocked kicks (breakdown detailed below), ranking as the NFL's No. 1 figure. In fact, Baltimore already has 2 blocks in 2016 - 1 PAT and 1 FGA.

MORNHINWEG NAMED O.C.



Marty Mornhinweg was elevated to offensive coordinator on Oct. 10, prior to the start of Week 6. A 22-year NFL coaching veteran, Mornhinweg, who joined Baltimore as QBs coach in 2015, is a former head coach of the Detroit Lions (2001-02). He has also served as offensive coordinator for the

New York Jets (2013-14), Philadelphia Eagles (2004-12) and San Francisco 49ers (1997-2000).

- Throughout his NFL coaching career, five quarterbacks have earned Pro Bowl honors under Mornhinweg's direction: Michael Vick, Donovan McNabb, Steve Young, Jeff Garcia and Brett Favre.
- In his most recent role as an offensive coordinator (Jets: 2013-14), the team's run game ranked as the NFL's third best (138.7 ypg) unit during his time. Prior to joining NYJ, Mornhinweg served 10 seasons (2003-12) in Philly, including nine (2004-12) as the "O" coordinator/assistant head coach. He and John Harbaugh spent five seasons (2003-07) together on the Eagles' coaching staff.
- His first NFL coordinator job came with the San Francisco 49ers (1997-2000), where in 1998, the team set franchise marks in total yards (6,800), first downs (381) and rushing yards (2,544).

Dean Pees, a 13-year NFL-coaching veteran, became the Ravens' defensive coordinator in 2012 and helped guide Baltimore to its second World Championship in Super Bowl XLVII. Pees, who was New England's "D" coordinator from 2006-09, heads a Ravens' squad that in 2015 ranked No. 8

in total defense (10th passing & 12th rushing). Pees also leads a unit that, during the **John Harbaugh** Era (2008-16), has allowed the NFL's second-fewest points (19.1) per game, the third-fewest yards (315.3) per game and the second-fewest overall TDs (266).

- In his final six games of 2012 (including playoffs and dating back to 12/23 of the regular season), Flacco was 102-of-170 for 1,483 yards, 13 TDs and 0 INTs, producing a 113.9 passer rating.
- Flacco, Joe Montana (1989) and Kurt Warner (2008) are the only QBs in NFL history to throw 11 TDs in a single postseason. Neither Flacco nor Montana threw an INT in their postseasons.

- In the Ravens' last 10 playoff games (since the 2010 season), Flacco is 196-of-327 for 2,563 yards, 24 TDs and 4 INTs (104.1 rating). He has led the Ravens to a 7-3 record in these contests.
- In Baltimore's last six playoff games (5-1 record), Flacco has thrown 17 TDs and 2 INTs. Completing 119 of 200 passes for 1,691 yards, he owns a magnificent 111.1 QB rating.
- Flacco has thrown at least 2 TDs in eight-straight playoff games, marking the longest streak in NFL postseason history.
- Flacco has 25-career postseason TD passes, tied (Brett Favre) for second most in a QB's first eight seasons. (Tom Brady is first 26.)
- Flacco's streak of 197 passes without throwing an INT in the postseason (from 1/22/12 to 1/10/15) is the second longest in NFL playoff history (Drew Brees, 226). Joe Montana (179 from 1989-91) and Steve Young (173 from 1994-96) are third and fourth, respectively.
- Among active QBs, Flacco's 25 playoff TD passes rank fourth most (Tom Brady 56, Peyton Manning 40 & Aaron Rodgers 27).
- Flacco's 3,223 career passing yards in the playoffs rank sixth most among active quarterbacks.
- Flacco's 10 career playoff victories are the most among NFL quarterbacks since he entered the league in 2008.
- Flacco has seven career road wins in the playoffs (including two apiece in each of the 2008 and 2012 campaigns), ranking as the most by a QB in league history (Eli Manning is next with five).

THE RETURN SPECIALIST



On Sept. 5, the Ravens signed four-time Pro Bowler **RS/WR Devin Hester Sr.**, who has produced the most return TDs (20) in NFL history, to a one-year contract. Hester Sr., who is in his 11th season, is arguably the best return specialist in NFL history. Here are a few notes about his impressive career:

- ✓ He has posted the most return touchdowns (20) in NFL history.
- ✓ Hester Sr. has registered an NFL-record 14 punt return touchdowns, adding 5 kickoff return touchdowns and 1 missed field goal return touchdown (108 yards).
- Seeing action in 149 career games (47 starts), he has also tallied 255 receptions for 3,311 yards (13.0 avg.) and 16 touchdowns, also posting 116 rushing yards and one touchdown on 36 carries.
- Hester Sr.'s 12.0-yard career punt return average ranks sixth in NFL history, while his 3,580 punt return yards (on 299 returns) stand fourth. (Both marks rank best among active players.)
- ✓ For kickoff returns, Hester Sr. owns a 25.0-yard career average, gaining 7,126 yards (12th most in NFL history).
- ✓ In 2014 with Atlanta, he recorded 45 kickoff returns for 1,128 yards (25.1 avg.) and 18 punt returns for 240 yards (13.3 avg.) and 1 touchdown, en route to earning Pro Bowl honors.
- ✓ His four Pro Bowls occurred in 2006, 2007, 2010 and 2014. He was named to the All-Decade Team (2000s) by ESPN and *The AP*, and he has been tabbed All-Pro three times (2006, 2007 & 2010).

SOARING WITH SAM



2015 Pro Bowler Sam Koch owns a 45.3 career gross average and 39.3 career net, both marks that rank first in Ravens history. In 2014, Koch posted a career-high and Ravens franchise-record 47.4yard gross average and a 43.3-yard net average, shattering his previous personal bests.

Ravens special teams coordinator/associate head coach Jerry Rosburg on P Sam Koch's innovative punting methods:

"He's a unique punter. He's changing the way the game is going to be played. It's remarkable to me that more have not necessarily followed the lead. Perhaps that's an indication of how difficult it is to do what he's doing, because you don't see much of it – even from the highly-skilled professionals that we see on a weekly basis."

ESPN.com's Kevin Seifert on Koch's arsenal of punts:

"Some are designed to hook toward the sideline with maximum hang time. Others use an intentionally low trajectory to aid coverage teams. He has a knuckler and one kick that drops, from the returner's perspective, roughly in the shape of the letter "S." He's debuted a "boomerang" punt that does just what you would imagine it might. Most, but not all, of these punts are intended to discourage a clean catch and minimize the return.

"It's not unusual for NFL punters to develop a "changeup" of sorts, but no one has ever had multiple options at the ready. ... The NFL changes every day, but there are only a few moments in each generation when it transforms. This is one of them. In plain sight, Sam Koch and the Ravens have introduced a new way to punt."



INSIDE THE 20 SUCCESS

P Sam Koch is the Ravens' all-time leader in punts inside the 20 (currently has 289 during his career). In 2010, he posted a career-high 39 boots inside the 20, which were the NFL's second most and tied for eighth best all time in league history.

- In 2013, Tucker made his first Pro Bowl by setting team records in FGs made (38) and FGAs (41), with both figures tying (Stephen Gostkowski) for the NFL's most. Tucker also had a franchise-record 140 points (tied for sixth in NFL).
- Tucker made 33-straight FGs at one point during the 2013 season, ranking as the NFL's sixth-longest streak of all time.
- His 6 FGs on 12/16/13 at Det. set a team record and a single-game NFL high in 2013. Against the Lions, he became the first NFL kicker ever to connect from the 20-, 30-, 40-, 50- & 60-yard range in a game.
- Tucker's 93.8 career FG% when kicking on grass (60-of-64) ranks as the NFL's best percentage on grass of all time. (The next best is Jay Feely at 86.8%.)
- Tucker's 91.6 career FG% (76-of-83) in the second half/overtime ranks as the NFL's best second half/OT mark of all time.

TUCK IS THE FASTEST

- In 2015's Week 2 game at Oak., K Justin Tucker became the fastest in NFL history to reach 100 FGs made, doing so in his 50th game. (Hall of Famer Jan Stenerud is the second fastest at 53 games.)
- At Miami on 12/6/15 in his 60th game, "Tuck" became the fastest kicker in NFL history to reach 500 points, surpassing Stenerud (61 games). Tucker is the second-fastest kicker in NFL history to reach 400 points, doing so in his 48th game. (Stenerud did so in 47 games.)



SECOND IN LEAGUE HISTORY

K Justin Tucker is the NFL's second-most accurate kicker of all time, hitting on 145 of 163 FGAs to produce an 89.0 success rate. Tucker has scored 53 points this season, ranking as the NFL's fifth most, while he is a perfect 15-of-15 on FGs, including 3-of-3 on FGAs of 50+ yards, with those 3 makes ranking second most (Adam Vinatieri, 5) in the NFL entering Week 7.

IN MEMORIAM: CLARENCE BROOKS





Clarence Brooks, the Baltimore Ravens' longest-tenured assistant coach, passed away on Sept. 17 at a hospital in Weston, Fla., following a battle with esophageal and stomach cancer. He was 65. The beloved Brooks – referred to by most as "C.B."

– originally joined the organization in 2005 and served 11 seasons as defensive line coach. This past spring, while undergoing intense treatment for his illness, he transitioned into a senior defensive assistant role, but still spent as much time as he possibly could working with players and fellow coaches, including during the Ravens' recent training camp. Brooks was a 24-year NFL coaching veteran and one of six assistant coaches retained by head coach John Harbaugh upon his 2008 Baltimore arrival.

In addition to the Ravens, "C.B." coached for the Miami Dolphins (2000-04), Cleveland Browns (1999) and Chicago Bears (1993-98). Brooks also spent 17 years in the collegiate ranks holding coaching positions at Arizona (1990-92) – where he was instrumental in the notable "Desert Swarm" defense that led the nation in scoring defense in 1992 – Syracuse (1981-89) and his alma mater Massachusetts (1976-80).

During Brooks' Baltimore tenure as defensive line coach (2005-15), the Ravens allowed the NFL's fewest rushing touchdowns (89), second-fewest points per game (18.9) and the league's second-fewest rushing yards per game (94.2).

Head Coach John Harbaugh:

"Our heartfelt condolences and love go out to Justa and the Brooks family on the passing of Clarence. We loved that man! He is at peace now through the grace of Jesus Christ. He fought the good fight and won. One of the finest coaches I have ever met, he changed the lives and influenced players and coaches for the better. He was a great man, loving husband and devoted father. He was as tough and determined in adversity as you'll ever see and as loyal a friend as there is. 'C.B.' will forever walk as a loved and cherished member of the Ravens family."

General Manager & Executive Vice President Ozzie Newsome:

"Very few, if any, coaches influenced their players – on and off the field – like Clarence Brooks. How fortunate are the Ravens to have had this special person in our lives for the past 12 years? He was a teacher, a friend, a father figure to many and a great football coach. A lot of our defensive success over the years is due to his ability to get the most out of his players on the defensive line. This is a sad, sad day for our team and extended family. Our hearts ache for Justa and the rest of Clarence's family."

Owner Steve Bisciotti:

"The Bisciottis are so sad to hear about Clarence's passing. He was the sweetest man I've ever met in football. He was also as tough as nails and was as respected by everyone on our team as any coach who ever touched the Ravens. His impact was more than people on the outside could know. He will be so missed."

President Dick Cass:

"Clarence had a special rapport with his players. He was both beloved as coach and as a person. His infectious laugh and welcoming smile will be greatly missed, not by just the players and his fellow coaches, but by everyone in our building."

DT Brandon Williams:

"Coach Brooks was like a father figure to me and every other player he coached. He made me the player I am today, but more importantly, helped me to be the man I am today. He always got the best out of you. He saw the potential in every player and did everything in his power to help you be the best you could be — on and off the field. Every day I walked in this building, no matter what was going on, he could always make me smile. I will miss him, and my heart goes out to the entire Brooks family."

DE Lawrence Guy:

"Coach Brooks was a heck of a coach, but an even better man. He cared so much about all of us and could always pull the best out of you in any situation. Through him, I learned how to prepare better, practice better and play better. I will truly miss his coaching, his fellowship and his mentorship. Rest well, 'C.B.'"

OLB Terrell Suggs:

"Clarence Brooks was a rare, special coach. We had a relationship that became more than football; he was family. He was every bit the definition of the word 'coach.' He was firm and demanding when he needed to be, but was a father figure and caring at the same time. I will definitely miss my friend."

Linebackers Coach Don Martindale:

"Clarence Brooks is one of the finest human beings I have ever met. Selfishly speaking, you would like to say he was your best friend, but he was really everybody's best friend. We are happy he is not suffering anymore. I love him like a brother, and I am going to miss him terribly."

Former Ravens Head Coach Brian Billick (Who Hired Brooks in 2005):

"Whew, this hurts. What a man, what a coach, what an inspiration. Beyond being one of the best position coaches in the league, Clarence was one of the most respected people in the NFL. He was a great teacher and friend. His positive and upbeat, yet stern, way was special. The proof is in the pudding. Look at how players improved under him. It would be tough to find a more respected assistant in the NFL. My heart reaches out to Justa and his family."

Former Ravens DT Haloti Ngata:

"I am deeply saddened by the news of 'C.B.' passing away. I hope that I can help continue his legacy by the way I live and play. I played under 'C.B.' for nine years. In that time, he helped me go to five Pro Bowls and win a Super Bowl ring. He deserves a lot of that credit. He worked so hard with me and my Ravens teammates. This is tough news to swallow. I will miss you, Coach. Thank you for everything you taught me through the years — on and off the field. I love you, Clarence."

Former Browns, Ravens & Dolphins DE Rob Burnett:

"I cried a few weeks ago when I found out about Clarence and his fight against cancer, and I immediately reached out to Justa and 'C.B.' His death rips at my heart. I loved Clarence. He was more than my coach. He was my friend, a mentor and a motivator. This is a sad day for all of those fortunate enough to have known this great person."

JOHN HARBAUGH MONDAY PRESS CONFERENCE: WEEK 7 AT JETS

Opening statement: "Good to see everybody – appreciate you being here. Obviously, again, [it was] a very disappointing loss and the third one in a row, so we have to right the ship and get back to playing the kind of football that we're capable of playing, and even better. I don't think we've played the kind of football we're capable of playing yet, by far, this year. I'm very confident in our guys and our ability to play really good [football and in] our ability to coach really well. I'm excited about where the season is going to go, without question. I know exactly what needs to be done, in terms of what needs to be corrected, but we have to get it corrected. It's not a mystery. It's not new, and it's not news. It's the same thing it's been. We will keep just pounding away at the things we have to do better and the things we have to eliminate from our football to play winning football. No matter how long it takes us in practice, or no matter who it takes us to do it with, we're going to continue to do that. We're going to get that done. That's where we're at. As far as injuries, nothing major to report, in terms of longterm injuries. I told you that I'd report the long-term injuries. Anything that's short-term that opponents are going to read, and read between the lines and try to figure out whether a guy is going to play this week or not, I'm not going to get into that. [Terrell] Suggs has a biceps injury. He has played with that injury before. He has a chance to come back soon. How soon remains to be determined. I'm not going to say anything for this week yet. I think this week would be tough for him, but I don't put anything out of Terrell Suggs' possible ability to overcome. We'll see how that goes. [There is] nothing else, off the top of my head, that would put guys out for next week at this time. Marshal Yanda would be a stretch, also, with his situation. We'll see how that one goes. Other than that, [there is] nothing else that wouldn't be there this week."

Obviously, penalties and mistakes bog any offense down, and one week is not the biggest sample size. But did you see enough from offensive coordinator Marty Mornhinweg's offense to be optimistic going forward? (Joe Platania) "I'm very optimistic going forward. I'm optimistic, because I know we have the players in place that can do it and that we have the coaches in place that can do it. I know Marty can do it, but the players have to get that fixed. As coaches and position coaches, we have to get that fixed. The holding penalties, they have to stop. There's no reason for the holding penalties. We can look at ... Over the course of the last three or four games, we can look at 60 percent of them and say without question that that should not happen. There might be 30 or 40 percent that you go, 'Eh, that could get called,' but that's the way it is around the league. You can't put yourself in a position to hold somebody. Move your feet, get on your target. If you're inside the framework, you have to know when to let go. You see it all around the league; people teach holding. They teach it very well, because they're not holding to the point where they impact the defender enough to get called. Our guys are not doing that. The one on Alex [Lewis] on the left side, he's in good position. His hands are inside and everything. Joe [Flacco] breaks out of the pocket. He [Lewis] has to feel that and let him go. Joe is going to outrun the defensive end anyway. And Crockett [Gillmore], you move your feet the right way. You come off the ball the way you're supposed to, and you don't get pushed back. Then he's pushing you, and you have him in the framework, you have to release him. You can't keep pulling the guy back. I don't mind talking about that. Those have to be fixed. You don't jump offside, and you line up the right way. That is the biggest issue we have on offense. I think the question was asked, 'Why are we bogged down?' It's because of that. We're sitting there at first-and-20. It will continue to be addressed, and it will get corrected, because you have to play winning football. You can't lose the game if you want to win the game."

John, you have never used injuries as an excuse, but is it difficult to win without all of these frontline guys? And then you have to adjust on the fly when you lose guys like OLB Terrell Suggs and CB Jimmy Smith in game, which is difficult to do. (David Ginsburg) "Right, that's absolutely true. It's the challenge of the sport, especially in the National Football League. It's just the way it is. Everybody is dealing with it. From one week to the next, different teams have different challenges. This was our toughest week, no question, but yet, and still to my eye, we should have won the football game with the guys that were playing. We don't put anybody on the field that we don't believe is capable of winning. If they prove us wrong, then we're going to have to put somebody else out there. But the guys that go out there and play are guys that we put out there, because we believe that they can win the game for us."

Coach, you talked about Giants WR Odell Beckham Jr. and not letting him beat you. Looking back on it, is there something you guys could have done better with him? (Jerry Coleman) "Yes, we should have done a better job with him. We said we were going to know where he was at all times, and to my eye, we didn't know where he was at all times. That's not OK. He's not the only weapon they have, but when a player goes for that kind of yards on you ... The whole thing with our defense right now, if you want to talk about our defense, is four plays. It's four plays. It's four plays that have to be played better – schemed better – and they can't happen. When we don't allow those things to happen, we're giving up 260, 270 [yards] a game. When



you allow those things to happen, someone throws for over 400 on you. It's the same thing that happened the first eight games last year that we got corrected. It's the same thing that cannot continue to happen. It's not going to continue to happen, and those guys that allow it to happen are not going to be out there."

Specifically, on the last touchdown when you guys were in single-high, was that a case of the linebacker not getting a good enough drop and the safety not coming up? There was just a lot of space when Beckham made that catch. (Luke Jones) "It was man coverage, so the linebackers were up covering their guys. That's what happened. I think if you look at the call itself ... If you want to talk about the call ... If you want to put people back there to keep it from going to the house – and that's what ended up happening – you play some form of spot-drop Cover 3 or spot-drop Cover 2, tackle him and the drive continues on. The thinking there ... Dean's [Pees] thinking there was that it's fourth-and-1; let's win the game right now. We bat a ball down, he throws one high or he throws one low, someone gets in the throwing lane, you win the game; you're off the field. It's done. It was an aggressive call. It wasn't played very well, and you can say it wasn't a good call because of the result if you want, but that was the idea behind the call."

You always talk about – especially on fourth-down calls – when it doesn't happen, people will be upset about it. With what you have done in the past, is that a pretty logical call on the fourth-and-1 call, the first play of the fourth quarter? (Jamison Hensley) "All the numbers will tell you that you have to go for that. If you want to talk about the analytics and the numbers and all that – which I'm not saying that is what we live and die by – but it is the call you make, because you back them up, you pin them down, and the chances of getting at least three [points] coming back are really good. The chances of getting more than that are good as well. You expect to score from the one-half-yard line with four tries. If you want to ask about one, ask about the other fourth down. That is the one to ask about. That is on your own 35-yard line with four-and-a-half minutes left, but we converted that one. But you didn't ask about that one. They had three fourth-down conversions, I think, that led to scores. If they go for those and don't get them, then people are asking them about those. It goes back to the original premise of your question, which is your point."

Can you see why people may only ask about the earlier ones only because of the fact these games are traditionally close and had it come down to a field goal ... It may not have come down to a field goal. (Jerry Coleman) "We tried a fake field goal last week, and we ended up losing by six. If we would have got the touchdown there, we would have won the game. But no one said, 'Well, it was good to go for the fake there, because you ended up losing by six.' Last week, we say, 'The game would have played out differently,' and this week we say, 'The game would have played out the same way.' How would the game have played out? I don't know how the game would have played out. But you are on fourth down on your own half-yard line. Most of the time, we are going to give our guys a chance to make that play. We are not in to throwing up the white flag there. Should we have based on the fact that we couldn't score? That is what ticks me off about it. We can't score from the half-yard line with our offense? Are you kidding me? That is what ticks me off. If I have to throw up the white flag because our offense can't score from a foot-and-a-half out ... If that is the coach that you want, if that is what we have to do, then we will do it. I'm going to coach this team to score from the half-yard line. That is the way we are going to do it."

The offensive line situation changing didn't affect any thinking whatsoever? Because you were not with your strongest offensive linemen. (Jerry Coleman) "Our offensive line did a good job. They did a good job yesterday; they played well. I was proud of those guys."

OLB Terrell Suggs has his injury and OLB Elvis Dumervil is out. Are you satisfied with the pressure you are getting on quarterbacks? Is getting pressure on quarterbacks a concern without those two guys? (Cliff Brown) "It is always important to get pressure on quarterbacks. We have to try and do that. The ball was out quick yesterday. We had [one] sack; we had a few more hits. We probably did about as well as we could do. There were a couple time [Eli Manning] held it, where I was disappointed we did not get to him quicker than we did. I would have liked to have a few more batted balls with the ball being out so quickly. But they are smart, they understand what they are doing, and they got the ball out really quickly. I thought that was a good job by Eli."

Surgery for OLB Terrell Suggs is not an option right now? (Jeff Zrebiec) "I don't know. I haven't talked to ... I don't think so. I have not been told that."



Is one of your reasons for optimism that all of the games have been close, and if you guys get a few plays here and there, you guys could be on your way to correcting it? (Dave Ginsburg) "Yes. I don't think I have to stand up here and justify my reason for being optimistic. If you study us ... Anybody that wants to write the doom and gloom article – that is fine. Write it. But look around the league. This is the National Football League; this is a tough league. Put yourself in any other city, and ask yourself what article you would be writing. It would be three or four cities that everyone thinks things are great. There will be about 28 cities where everyone will be wringing their hands. We are one of the 28 right now. I am not wringing my hands, because I know what kind of players we have. I know what kind of coaches we have. I know what kind of league this is. This is a long season. There are 10 games left to play. There are 10 opportunities for us to get rolling. The thing that I'm most excited about is that our problems are easily correctable. It is not like we are sitting here thinking, 'We don't have the players to do this. We don't have this guy or that guy, or we can't stop anybody.' We don't have those kinds of issues. Our issues are selfinflicted. If they are self-inflicted, we can fix them. We fix them ourselves. It is just our job to do that. If I have any frustration, it is the fact that it has taken this long. I expected us to play winning football from Day One. We won four preseason games, and we won our first three games. We had issues in those games, as well, but we found a way to win them. But we still have not been playing the kind of football that I know we are capable of paying. My reason for optimism, or just the fact that I am excited about what we are going to accomplish this year, is just based on the fact that we know how good we can be. We have to play that way."

You know your injury situation, and in Pittsburgh, QB Ben Roethlisberger just had knee surgery. Sometimes in the NFL season, is it almost the race of attrition and who can weather injuries the most? (Jamison Hensley) "The NFL season is definitely one of who can persevere. Who can persevere? Along the way, you have to win games to do that. Our disappointment right now is that we didn't win any of these last three games. If we win one of them, we are 4-2. If we win two of them, we are 5-1. But that is looking back. What are you going to do about it? We know why we did not win them: penalties and big plays. [We] fix the problems and go play the next game."

I know coaches have previously installed some sort of discipline system. Is that something you are considering? (Ed Lee) "We have a discipline system in place – a very effective one. What are you talking about? Like running a lap?"

Kind of like a fine jar or something like that. (Ed Lee) "You can't do that. That is against the NFL rules. I would be all for it. I would definitely be all for a fine jar. (laughter) That is a good suggestion."

Is RB Lorenzo Taliaferro returning to practice this week? (Jeff Zrebiec) "Yes, he is."

Then you will evaluate RB Lorenzo Taliaferro over the next couple weeks? (Jeff Zrebiec) "Yes we will."
