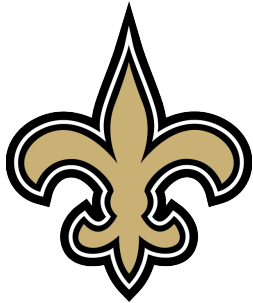

THE MATCHUP

Following a dominating 41-23 victory at the San Francisco 49ers for their fourth win in five games, the New Orleans Saints (4-4) will look to start the second half of the 2016 season on a winning note when they host the defending Super Bowl champion Denver Broncos (6-3).

In looking to move above the .500 mark for the first time since 2013, New Orleans will face a stiff test in their attempt to do so. In a five-day period, New Orleans will face the Super Bowl champion Broncos on Sunday, Nov. 13, followed by the Super Bowl 50 runner-up Carolina Panthers on Thursday, Nov. 17 at Bank of America Stadium. After losing their first three contests, New Orleans has gotten back in the thick of the NFC Conference race by playing sound football, spurred by an improved running game on offense and an increasingly opportunistic defense.

With a 571 total net yard output on Sunday against San Francisco, the seventh-highest single game total in franchise history, New Orleans moved into first place in the NFL offensively (434.5 yards per game). While QB **Drew Brees** put up a standout performance with 323 yards passing, three touchdowns, zero interceptions and a 122.1 passer rating, the running game came up big with 248 yards, the 10th-highest total in franchise history and the highest by New Orleans since 1990. The duo of **Mark Ingram** (158) and **Tim Hightower** (87) combined for 245 yards.

The Saints top-ranked offense closes the first half of the season with Brees enjoying another standout campaign, completing 242-of-347 passes (69.7%) for 2,689 yards with 21 touchdowns, only five interceptions and a 106.7 passer rating as he ranks at or near the top in virtually every statistical category.

Defensively, New Orleans won the turnover battle 4-0 on Sunday at Levi's Stadium. The first takeaway took place late in the first quarter when LB **Craig Robertson** picked off QB Colin Kaepernick to put New Orleans in position for their second touchdown, a one-yard connection between Brees and WR **Michael Thomas**. Just as important though were the fumble recoveries by S **Kenny Vaccaro** and LB **Nate Stupar**, as both occurred inside the New Orleans 10-yard line and prevented the 49ers from putting points up on the scoreboard.

Dating back to their days coming out of the old AFL, the Broncos have been a team that the Saints have had difficulties in finding success against, trailing the all-time series 8-2. New Orleans' last win in the series took place in 1994, with four straight Broncos wins taking place in that time. Denver will be looking to put behind a 30-20 loss on Sunday night at the Oakland Raiders that put the Silver and Black one game ahead of the defending World Champions in a competitive AFC West.

Around The NFC South: The Tampa Bay Buccaneers (3-5) will host the Chicago Bears (2-6), the Panthers (3-5) will host the Chiefs (6-2) and the Atlanta Falcons (6-3) will travel to Philadelphia (4-4).

THE COACHES

New Orleans Saints Head Coach **Sean Payton** has posted an 91-61 regular season record and a 6-4 postseason mark, guiding the team to the postseason five times, to the NFC Championship twice and to the Super Bowl XLIV Championship. He's the club's lone head coach to open a season with 13 straight victories and post a 13-game winning streak and has the franchise's top winning percentage (.599). Payton's 53-31 (.631) home record and 44-39 (.530) mark away from the Mercedes-Benz Superdome are the club's top all-time winning percentages in both categories. On Oct. 2, 2016 at San Diego, he captured his 94th victory as head of the New Orleans Saints, surpassing Jim Mora (93 victories from 1986-96) for the most victories by a head coach in team history despite having coached 13 fewer games than Mora. In his first season with the club in 2006, he took the Saints to the NFC Championship and was named NFL Coach of the Year by most major media outlets. The Saints are the only team to finish in the top 10 in net yards per game each season since 2006, including finishing second in 2015 with 403.8 ypg. Payton was hired as New Orleans' 14th head coach on January 18, 2006, after serving on Dallas' staff from 2003-05 under Pro Football Hall of Fame Head Coach Bill Parcells. Prior to joining the Cowboys, Payton served on the New York Giants coaching staff from 1999-2002, including the final three seasons as offensive coordinator. His tenure was highlighted by a Super Bowl berth in his first full season calling plays. Payton's prior NFL coaching experience came as quarterbacks coach for Philadelphia from 1997-98. He played quarterback at Eastern Illinois, where he passed for 10,665 yards, then the third-highest total in NCAA Division 1-AA history. The three-time *Associated Press* All-American selection had professional stints with Chicago of the Arena Football League, Ottawa of the Canadian Football League and the Chicago Bears in 1987. Starting his college coaching career at San Diego State, Payton wrapped two stints as an assistant with the Aztecs (1988-89 and 1992-93) around a stop at Indiana State (1990-91). He moved to Miami (Ohio), where he coached quarterbacks from 1994-95 before doing the same at the University of Illinois in 1996.

The 15th head coach in Broncos history, **Gary Kubiak** enters his 22nd overall season with the club after spending 11 years as its offensive coordinator (1995-2005) and nine seasons as a backup quarterback (1983-91). The 2016 campaign marks Kubiak's 10th season as an NFL head coach, having worked eight years in that capacity with the Houston Texans (2006-13) before returning to lead the Broncos in 2015. A 24-year coaching

veteran and four-time Super Bowl champion, Kubiak begins his second season as head coach of the Denver Broncos after being named to that position on Jan. 19, 2015. In Denver's first season with Kubiak at the helm, the team finished the regular season with a 12-4 record, capturing a fifth consecutive AFC West Division title and the conference's No. 1 seed. The Broncos' 24-10 win against the Carolina Panthers in Super Bowl 50 made Kubiak just the fourth head coach in league annals to win a World Championship in his first year as head coach of a team. After appearing in three Super Bowls for Denver in the late 1980s, Kubiak also became the first individual to win a Super Bowl as head coach of a team he played for. Before returning to Denver as its head coach, Kubiak spent the 2014 season as Baltimore's offensive coordinator. Kubiak spent the previous eight years (2006-13) as the Texans' head coach, leading the franchise to a 61-64 (.488) regular-season record and a 2-2 (.500) mark in the playoffs. Before his time in Houston, Kubiak spent 11 years (1995-2005) as the Broncos' offensive coordinator, helping Denver lead the NFL in scoring (24.8 ppg) and total yards (360.3 ypg) during that span. He also coached quarterbacks for his first eight seasons (1995-02) in Denver. Kubiak's first NFL job came with San Francisco, where he coached quarterbacks for the Super Bowl-champion 49ers during the 1994 season.

SERIES HISTORY

The Broncos lead the series, 8-2, including four-consecutive victories against New Orleans. The Saints will be looking for their first win against the Broncos since 1994, their current longest gap without a win against an opponent. The Saints' 42-0 victory over Denver in 1988 is the club's second-greatest margin of victory over an opponent in franchise history. New Orleans QB Bobby Hebert completed 20-of-23 passes in the contest, then a club record for completion percentage (87.0). In the 1994 season-ending 30-28 win at Mile High Stadium, WR Torrance Small hauled in six passes for 200 yards, the second-highest receiving yardage total in team record books.

Only three of the 10 games in the series have been decided by a touchdown or less, the 1994 and 2008 thrillers, which were each decided by two points. The Saints are 1-2 at the Mercedes-Benz Superdome vs. the Broncos. This will be Denver's first visit to New Orleans since a 34-13 Broncos win on November 21, 2004.

Phillips served in the same position in New Orleans from 1981-1985 under his father Bum Phillips and was the interim Head Coach for the final four games of the 1985 campaign...Broncos center **Dillon Day** attended West Monroe High School in Monroe, LA...New Orleans LS **Justin Drescher** is a Colorado Springs native, who handled long snapping duties at the University of Colorado from 2006-09...Saints quarterback **Garrett Grayson** played at Colorado State with Broncos linebacker **Shaquil Barrett**, running back **Kapri Bibbs** and offensive guard **Ty Sambrailo** in the 2013 season...Denver wide receivers coach **Tyke Tolbert** served as tight ends coach/recruiting coordinator at the University of Louisiana-Lafayette from 1999-2001 and served as tight ends coach at Northeast Louisiana University from 1995-97 after previously serving as a graduate assistant in Monroe in 1994 and started his coaching career as a graduate assistant at LSU after being a three-year letterman for the Tigers...Saints safety **Jairus Byrd** and center **Max Unger** played with Broncos safety **T.J. LAST MEETING

Broncos 34, Saints 14; Oct. 28, 2012 @ Sports Authority Field at Mile High – Difficulties on third down and an explosive Broncos offense combined to sink the Saints.

Peyton Manning engineered an 11-play, 98-yard drive that ended with a one-yard TD run by **Willis McGahee** to give Denver the early lead. The Saints would then get on the scoreboard when QB **Drew Brees** connected with RB **Darren Sproles** for a 29-yard touchdown to tie the score.

Manning converted a Saints turnover to seven points on a 13-yard TD pass to **Eric Decker**. A 33-yard FG by Denver K **Matt Prater** gave Denver a 17-7 lead as the first half expired.

Denver broke open the contest in the third as Manning led them on an 11-play, 93-yard drive that ended with a one-yard TD from Manning to **Demaryius Thomas**. The Broncos would take a 31-7 edge at the start of the fourth on a two-yard TD pass from Manning to Decker.

GAME SUMMARIES

WEEK 1: Oakland Raiders 35, Saints 34; September 11, 2016 @ Mercedes-Benz Superdome – In the season kickoff for both clubs, Oakland scored a touchdown with 47 seconds remaining and followed the score with a two-point conversion to prevail in a shootout in the Mercedes-Benz Superdome.

The Saints had taken a 34-27 lead with 6:03 remaining when RB **Travaris Cadet** scored on a two-yard TD throw from QB **Drew Brees**. But the Raiders put together an 11-play, 75-yard drive on their final possession. The march was capped by a 13-yard TD throw from QB **David Carr** to WR **Seth Roberts** and Carr drilled a successful throw to WR **Michael Crabtree** in the end zone for the subsequent two points to put the Raiders ahead. Brees drove New Orleans to the Oakland 43 in the game's final seconds, but a 61-yard field goal attempt went wide left.

CONTINUED - Week One

The Raiders took a 3-0 lead in the first quarter on a 47-yard FG by K **Sebastian Janikowski**. The Saints responded by a successful 42-yard kick by rookie K **Wil Lutz**. Oakland took the lead back late in the opening quarter on a six-yard touchdown run by RB **Latavius Murray**.

New Orleans then tied the score on a nine-play, 75-yard drive that ended early in the second quarter on a one-yard touchdown pass from Brees to WR **Willie Snead IV**. New Orleans took a 17-10 lead going into halftime when Brees connected with WR **Brandin Cooks** for a 15-yard TD.

In what would seem like rough sailing, starting a drive at their own two-yard line midway through the third quarter, Brees connected with Cooks on a throw that turned into a 98-yard TD, the longest offensive play in franchise history, breaking a record that stood since the franchise's inaugural season in 1967. Following an Oakland FG, New Orleans went into the fourth quarter with a 24-13 edge.

A wild fourth quarter put the Raiders back in the contest, starting with their first drive of the period that ended with a two-yard TD run by RB **Jamize Olawale**. While Lutz powered a 20-yard field goal through despite getting touched by the Raiders, the 27-19 cushion wouldn't last long though as Oakland rookie RB **Jalen Richard**, a Louisiana native, burst through for a 75-yard TD, followed by a successful two point conversion from Carr to WR **Amari Cooper**. With the Saints then starting at their 16, Brees completed a pass to Snead for a gain of 43 yards to the Oakland 26, but he fumbled. Rookie WR **Michael Thomas** alertly recovered the ball and one play later, Brees tossed the touchdown to Cadet that gave the Saints a seven-point lead before Oakland's final rally.

WEEK 2: New York Giants 16, Saints 13; September 18, 2016 @ MetLife Stadium – Already down one starter in **Delvin Breaux** with a fibula injury, a trio comprised of **Ken Crawley**, **De'Vante Harris** and **Sterling Moore** put up a gritty performance against a New York receiving trio comprised of **Odell Beckham Jr.**, **Victor Cruz** and **Sterling Shepard**, keeping them out of the end zone after **P.J. Williams** was forced to depart.

In the second quarter, S **Kenny Vaccaro** stripped the ball from Giants RB **Shane Vereen** and it was picked up by LB **James Laurinaitis** at the Saints 36-yard line. On the Giants' subsequent possession, QB **Eli Manning** completed a pass to Cruz that gave the wideout open

space, but S **Jairus Byrd** and Crawley remained in pursuit and dislodged the ball, which was picked up by Harris at the Saints 16. With the Giants receiving a final possession in the second quarter and in a matchup of the sons of former Saints teammates, LB **Michael Mauti** sacked Manning up the middle and forced him to cough the ball up and it was recovered by DE **Paul Kruger** at the Giants 25-yard line.

Adversity would hit again when a 38-yard field goal attempt by K **Wil Lutz** was blocked by Giants defensive tackle **Jonathan Hankins** and was recovered and returned by CB **Janoris Jenkins** 65 yards for a touchdown. However New Orleans got the ball back and QB **Drew Brees** completed passes of 17- and 23-yards to help set up a 39-yard field goal by Lutz with seven seconds left in the half to trail by only four points.

The Giants got the ball at the half and advanced to the Saints 35-yard line, but a 53-yard field goal attempt went wide left. While K **Josh Brown** connected on a 48-yard kick later in the third quarter, Brees and the Saints got the ball back and engineered a nine-play, 74-yard drive that ended with a 17-yard connection where WR **Willie Snead IV** made a jumping grab in the end zone to tie the score. When the Giants got the ball back, they advanced to the one-yard line, but the Saints defense stopped them on two straight run plays and a pass attempt, forcing a 19-yard field goal. Lutz later tied the score at 13-apiece with a 45-yard kick. Following the field goal, the Giants got the ball back with 2:54 remaining at their 25-yard line. Manning completed a pass for a 34-yard gain to Cruz at the Saints-two yard line and the Giants would milk the clock until there were two seconds left and Brown drilled a 23-yard field goal to secure the home-opening victory for the Giants.

WEEK 3: Atlanta Falcons 45, Saints 32; September 26, 2016 @ Mercedes-Benz Superdome – New Orleans' season continued to get off to a rocky start as they fell to the Falcons on a Monday Night Football contest at the Mercedes-Benz Superdome.

The Saints scored first in the contest on their first drive on a two-yard touchdown pass from QB **Drew Brees** to TE **Coby Fleener**. The New Orleans defense then got off to a solid start when a three-and-out was forced, capped by a sack by DT **Nick Fairley** and DE **Cameron Jordan** on third down. However, the Falcons would get the ball back on a fumble on the punt play and three plays later, RB **Tevin Coleman** tied the score on a two-yard touchdown run.

CONTINUED - Week Three

The rushing TD would be the start of an offensive onslaught for Atlanta as it would mark the first of five-consecutive offensive TDs on a performance where the Falcons would rush for 217 yards, the highest total against the Saints since 2014. Atlanta added a 90-yard interception return for a TD by Falcons LB **Deion Jones**.

Brees completed 36-of-54 passes for 376 yards with three touchdown passes. Fleener led the team in receiving yardage with seven grabs for 109 yards, including the first quarter touchdown grab. It was the first 100-yard performance of his Saints career and the fourth of his career. RB **Mark Ingram** had his most productive performance of the season when he carried 15 times for 77 yards and rushed for a two-point conversion and also caught four passes for 30 yards, including the first touchdown reception of his career.

Falcons QB **Matt Ryan** completed 20-of-30 passes for 240 yards with two TDs and a 113.2 quarterback rating. RB **Devonta Freeman** had 207 total yards from scrimmage, rushing for 152 and catching 55 more on five passes, as he led the Falcons in both rushing and receiving.

WEEK 4: New Orleans Saints 35, San Diego Chargers 34; October 2, 2016 @ Qualcomm Stadium – The Saints took their first win of the season at San Diego, battling to a 35-34 victory that saw New Orleans gain three takeaways in the last 6:50 of the contest, resulting in 14 points that helped them really from a 13-point deficit.

New Orleans started off fast as QB **Drew Brees**, in his first game at the Chargers since playing for them from 2001-05, engineered an 11-play, 75-yard drive that ended with a one-yard TD run by RB **Mark Ingram**. The two clubs then traded punts, but on San Diego's final possession of the first quarter, QB **Philip Rivers** completed a 20-yard touchdown to TE **Hunter Henry** to tie the score.

The Saints got the ball back and in a drive that ran into the second quarter, New Orleans advanced 75 yards in 14 plays, ending with a four-yard touchdown pass from Brees to FB **John Kuhn**. But the New Orleans defense would then struggle on a 57-yard completion for a touchdown from Rivers to WR **Dontrelle Inman** two plays later to tie the score and the Chargers took advantage of a Brees interception and a costly defensive offside penalty to score 10 more points and go into halftime with a 24-14 lead.

In the start to the second half, after forcing San Diego to

punt for the first time since their first possession of the contest, New Orleans took advantage of field position starting at the San Diego 48-yard line and Kuhn punched in a one-yard touchdown to put the Saints back within three.

At the start of the fourth quarter, a defensive holding penalty assessed to New Orleans S **Vonn Bell** put the Chargers at the New Orleans one, allowing RB **Melvin Gordon** to run for a one-yard TD. Brees then tossed an interception two plays later that was returned to the New Orleans 26-yard line. However, the New Orleans defense held the Chargers to a field goal, giving them only a 13-point lead after DE **Cameron Jordan** sacked Rivers on third down. After an unsuccessful New Orleans drive, San Diego got the ball back, but Bell forced Gordon to cough up the ball, which was recovered by DE **Darryl Tapp** at the San Diego 13-yard line. Following three running plays, Brees completed a five-yard TD to WR **Michael Thomas** to put New Orleans within six with 4:50 to play on fourth down. When the Chargers got the ball back, WR **Travis Benjamin** fumbled on the first play and the ball was picked up by LB **Nate Stupar** at the SD 31-yard line.

New Orleans first advanced to the Chargers 21-yard line on a nine-yard rush and on third-and-one a nine-yard completion from Brees to WR **Tommy Lee Lewis** put the Saints at the 13. After converting another first down, Kuhn punched the ball in from the one-yard line with his third TD and on the ensuing drive, a sack by DT **Nick Fairley** and interception by CB **B.W. Webb** extinguished San Diego's comeback hopes.

WEEK 6: Saints 41, Carolina Panthers 38; October 16, 2016 @ Mercedes-Benz Superdome – The Saints behind QB **Drew Brees**, WR **Brandin Cooks** and the number two ranked offense and scoring unit in the NFL, beat the Panthers, 41-38 in a shootout where New Orleans got the final edge on a 52-yard field goal by K **Wil Lutz** at a sold-out Mercedes-Benz Superdome.

New Orleans got the ball first and Brees drove the Saints down the field in a 12-play, 75-yard drive that ended with a two-yard TD run by TE **Coby Fleener** on fourth-and-one. Late in the second quarter, Brees completed a pass to Cooks that the speedy wideout converted into an 87-yard TD, the second-longest passing play of the 2016 season across the NFL, as well as the sixth-longest passing play in franchise history.

On New Orleans' next possession, Brees found WR **Michael Thomas** for a nine-yard touchdown with 13:47 left in the first half. After the Panthers got to within 21-10, Lutz hit a 33-yard field goal near the end of the first half to give the Saints a 24-10 halftime lead.

Midway through the third quarter, Panthers QB **Cam Newton** completed a one-yard pass to TE **Ed Dickson** to put the Panthers within seven. But on the next drive, Brees threw his third touchdown pass, a 50-yard connection with Fleener.

Carolina scored two touchdowns at the start of the fourth quarter, but missed the extra point following their second score, allowing New Orleans to hold onto a 31-30 lead. New Orleans upped the lead back to 38-30 on an eight-yard touchdown pass from Brees to TE **Josh Hill**, but the Panthers tied the score late on a two-yard Newton touchdown run and a successful two-point conversion. When New Orleans got the ball back, Brees led the Saints on an 11-play, 41-yard drive that ended with Lutz's successful kick. Brees finished the game 34-of-49 for 465 yards with four touchdowns and a 118.2 rating and Cooks had seven grabs for a career-high 173 yards with the scoring grab.

WEEK 7: Kansas City Chiefs 27, Saints 21; October 23, 2016 @ Arrowhead Stadium- New Orleans dropped to 2-4 as a comeback from a third quarter 21-7 deficit fell short with a 27-21 final at Arrowhead Stadium, snapping a two-game win streak.

Getting the Chiefs defense off the field quickly, New Orleans scored on their opening drive for the club-record fourth consecutive contest, as QB **Drew Brees** drove New Orleans down the field on a 10-play, 80-yard drive, ending with a nine-yard TD pass to WR **Brandin Cooks**.

The Chiefs would answer quickly with a touchdown of their own as RB Spencer Ware would take an Alex Smith screen pass 46 yards for a touchdown. The Chiefs would score again after S Daniel Sorensen returned a Brees interception that was tipped 48 yards for a touchdown. After a Saints punt, the Chiefs would add a quick score on a 38-yard touchdown pass from Smith to Tyreek Hill.

Down 21-7 coming out of halftime, the Saints fought back with a 75-yard drive, capping it with a three-yard TD pass from Brees to RB **Mark Ingram** to pull within seven. The Saints defense would force a punt and a 39-yard Cairo

Santos field goal making it 24-14 with 3:26 to play in the third, but after an Ingram fumble at the Kansas City 13-yard line midway through the fourth quarter, time was at a premium for the Saints. After a defensive stop, Brees threw a 10-yard TD pass to WR **Brandon Coleman** to pull within a field goal with 2:33 left in the fourth quarter to cut Kansas City's lead to 24-21. After an unsuccessful onside kick and being hurt by a personal foul penalty assessed to DT **Nick Fairley**, the best the Saints could do would be to hold the Chiefs to a 41-yard field goal by Santos, extending the lead to 27-21. With 28 seconds remaining, the Saints started their last drive at their 25-yard line and would fall short after making it to midfield as time expired.

WEEK 8: Saints 25, Seattle Seahawks 20; October 30, 2016 @ Mercedes-Benz Superdome – The Saints snapped the Seahawks' four-game unbeaten streak and improved to 3-4 following a 25-20 victory last Sunday at the Mercedes-Benz Superdome.

After the Saints and Seahawks traded punts to start the contest, RB **Mark Ingram** fumbled the ball on New Orleans' second offensive series and it was picked up by Seattle S **Earl Thomas** at the Saints 34-yard line and returned it for a touchdown. New Orleans finally started to find their groove offensively with a 15-play, 83-yard drive that featured two key third down conversions in New Orleans territory and ended with a 22-yard field goal by K **Wil Lutz**. The Seahawks took a 14-3 lead with 9:53 remaining in the second quarter on a two-yard rushing touchdown by RB **Christine Michael**. The Saints would move within one at the end of the first half when Lutz booted a 53-yard field goal and QB **Drew Brees** ran a one-yard quarterback sneak for a touchdown.

Getting the ball coming out of the second half, the Seahawks extended their lead to 17-13 on a 44-yard field goal by K **Steven Hauschka**, when they put together an 11-play, 49-yard drive, keyed by 31 rushing yards by Michael on five carries. The Saints responded with an 11-play, 74-yard drive that ended with a 21-yard field goal by Lutz. The key play came on a 38-yard completion from Brees to WR **Brandon Coleman**, coming on a flea flicker play which put the Saints in field goal range. After the New Orleans defense then forced a three-and-out, New Orleans got their first lead with 12:24 left in the contest on a two-yard touchdown from Brees to WR **Brandin Cooks**, capping a nine-play, 71-yard drive, where the signal-caller completed four-of-four passes, totaling 30 yards with a 28-yard rush by RB **Tim Hightower** mixed in.

On the next drive, New Orleans would allow the Seahawks to advance as far as their three-yard line, but kept the Seahawks out of the end zone, forcing a 21-yard Hauschka field goal and keeping a 22-20 lead.

New Orleans then got the ball back with 6:38 left in the contest and on a key third-and-five play from the Seattle 44-yard line, Brees connected on a 20-yard completion to Cooks in the middle of the field that would help set up a 41-yard field goal by Lutz, his fourth of the game, extending New Orleans' lead to 25-20 with 1:57 left. On their final drive, Seattle would advance to the New Orleans 10-yard line, with Seahawks QB **Russell Wilson** keeping his team's hopes alive with a third-and-six completion to WR **Doug Baldwin** for a 27-yard gain. The Saints were not done from a defensive standpoint though as they successfully kept the Seahawks out of the end zone, as Seattle WR **Jermaine Kearse** failed to make a tough catch in the back of the end zone as time expired.

New Orleans failed to reach 400 yards of offense after outputs of 523 yards and 463 yards in the past two contests, but a balanced offensive approach of 35 passes and 35 runs proved to be successful as a team scored on Seattle's traditionally stingy defense on six-consecutive offensive possessions for the first time since December 27, 2009. Brees completed 27-of-35 passes for 265 yards with one touchdown, no interceptions and a 107.4 passer rating. Hightower carried 26 times for 102 yards as a Saint reached the century mark for the first time this season. It marked the sixth 100-yard rushing game of Hightower's career and second as a Saint. He fell just two carries short of matching the career-high 28 attempts he set as a Saint last season at Tampa Bay on Dec. 13, 2015.

Cooks caught four passes for 44 yards with the touchdown, while fellow WRs **Willie Snead IV** and **Michael Thomas** had six grabs apiece. LB **Nate Stupar** had his first-career interception, picking off Wilson in the second quarter. Lutz was four-for-four on field goal attempts, including a 53-yard conversion in the second quarter, marking his third make of 50-plus yards this season, one shy of the franchise record in a season. He also became the first Saints kicker to make four field goals in a contest since K Zach Hocker converted on four attempts at Arizona on Sept. 13, 2015.

Week 9: Saints 41, San Francisco 49ers 23; November 6, 2016 @ Levi's Stadium— The Saints continued to stay hot beating the San Francisco 49ers 41-23 using a dominant and balanced offensive attack.

After an opening drive punt for the Saints, San Francisco would strike first, with K **Phil Dawson** drilling a 49-yard field goal to take an early 3-0 lead. New Orleans would respond with a scoring drive of their own as RB **Tim Hightower** would cap a 10-play, 83-yard drive with a four-yard touchdown run to put the Saints ahead 7-3. The Saints would get the ball back quickly thanks to LB **Craig Robertson** interception of QB **Colin Kaepernick**. QB **Drew Brees** and the offense would capitalize quickly with Brees finding WR **Michael Thomas** for a one-yard touchdown. After a defensive stop on a fourth-and-one, New Orleans would again put points on the board, this time on a RB **Mark Ingram** five-yard touchdown reception.

However, the 49ers would answer quickly with Kaepernick connecting with RB **DuJuan Harris** on a 47-yard screen pass for the touchdown, bringing the score to 21-10. The prolific first half scoring would continue for the Saints as Ingram would burst through for a career-long 75-yard touchdown run giving New Orleans a commanding 28-10 lead. The 49ers would chip away at the Saints lead with Dawson converting on a 48-yard field goal. Following a Saints three-and-out, Kaepernick would find TE **Vance McDonald** for a 65-yard score, making it a one score game at 28-20. With 1:16 remaining in the opening half, Brees and company drove 71 yards, setting K **Wil Lutz** up for a 26-yard field goal to give them a 31-20 halftime lead.

After the 49ers drove 60 yards on the opening second half drive, Saints LB **Nate Stupar** forced a fumble of RB **Mike Davis**, with Stupar recovering the fumble at the New Orleans one-yard line. After the Saints were unable to capitalize on the turnover, San Francisco would add a 46-yard field goal by Dawson making it 31-23. Following a missed field goal by Lutz and a punt by San Francisco, the Saints found the end zone on a 32-yard pass from Brees to Thomas, his second scoring grab of the game. The Saints defense continued their second half resurgence when S **Kenny Vaccaro** recovered a Kaepernick fumble at the New Orleans eight-yard line. On San Francisco's final drive, Vaccaro forced a fumble of Harris that would be recovered by S **Vonn Bell**, capping a season-best +4 turnover differential for the game.

MAKING A RUN FOR IT

On Nov. 6 at San Francisco, New Orleans rushed for 248 yards, the most they've rushed for in a game in 2016 and most they've rushed for in a game since they rushed for 249 yards at Cincinnati on Nov. 4, 1990. It was the 10th-highest rushing total in franchise history. This resurgence in the running game has New Orleans ranked fifth in the NFL in rushing yards per game since Oct. 23. Over this time, they have rushed for at least 100 yards rushing in three-consecutive contests, doing so for the first time since they rushed for 100 yards or more in three straight from Oct. 26-Nov. 9, 2014.

Defensive Coordinator Dennis Allen - Father, Grady, played for the Atlanta Falcons from 1968-72.

Offensive Coordinator Pete Carmichael - Father, Pete, served as an assistant coach in the NFL from 1994-2003 with the Jacksonville Jaguars and the Chicago Bears.

Secondary Coach Aaron Glenn - Younger brother, Jason, was a linebacker and sixth-round draft pick of the Lions in the 2001 NFL Draft, playing six seasons in the NFL with the New York Jets, Dolphins and Vikings.

Assistant Head Coach/Linebackers Joe Vitt – Son, Joey, is an area scout for New Orleans.

Assistant General Manager/College Scouting Director Jeff Ireland – Stepson of Kansas City Chiefs Hall of Fame LB/C E.J. Holub and the grandson of former Eagles player and Bears personnel executive Jim Parmer.

National Scout Terry Wooden – Brother, JoJo, is director of player personnel for the San Diego Chargers.

S Jairus Byrd – Father, Gill, played for the San Diego Chargers from 1983-92 and is a 12-year National Football League coaching veteran, last serving as cornerbacks coach of the Tampa Bay Buccaneers in 2015.

DB Ken Crawley – Cousin, Stephon Morris, spent the 2012 season with the New England Patriots.

DB De’Vante Harris – Father, Rod, was a wide receiver, playing three seasons in the NFL and spending the 1989 season with New Orleans where he would appear in 11 games, handling the club’s kickoff and punt return duties.

RB Mark Ingram – Father, Mark Ingram Sr., was a 10-year NFL veteran who played for the New York Giants, Dolphins, Packers and Eagles.

DE Cameron Jordan – Father, Steve, had a 13-year career as a tight end with the Minnesota Vikings, with six Pro Bowl selections.

DE Paul Kruger – Brother, Dave, signed with Cleveland as an undrafted free agent and participated in Browns training camp in 2013, while his other brother, Joe, was selected by Philadelphia in the seventh round of the 2013 draft (212th overall).

TE Michael Mauti – Father, Rich, played eight years in the NFL as a wide receiver and special teams contributor, including seven with the Saints from 1977-83, closing out his career with the Washington Redskins in 1984.

QB Luke McCown – Older brother, Josh, plays QB for the Cleveland Browns.

T Andrus Peat – Father, Todd, played six National Football League seasons with the Phoenix Cardinals and the Los Angeles Raiders.

LB Nate Stupar – Older brother, Jonathan, played two seasons in the NFL from 2009-10, while his uncle, Jeff Hostetler, won two Super Bowl titles with the New York Giants, as part of a 12-year career in the league.

WR Michael Thomas – Uncle, Keyshawn Johnson, is a former wide receiver, spending 11 seasons in the NFL, earning three Pro Bowls and the Super Bowl XXXVII title.

STARTING OUT FAST

On Oct. 23 at Kansas City, the New Orleans offense orchestrated a 10-play, 80-yard drive that culminated in a nine-yard touchdown pass from QB Drew Brees to WR Brandin Cooks. The score marked the fourth-consecutive game in which the Saints had scored a touchdown on their opening possession, a new franchise-best. The previous franchise-best was a three-game streak which they have accomplished twice since 2006. TEAM NOTES

ROSTER ROLL CALL

Of the 53 players on the current Saints roster, 30 were on the active roster, a reserve list or the practice squad at the end of the 2015 season. Among newcomers, the roster includes five unrestricted free agents, five veteran free agents, five draft picks, six rookie free agents and one veteran claimed off of waivers.

Of the 53 players, 29 have less than four years of previous NFL experience, including 11 who are in their first NFL season. Below is a breakdown of the Saints roster by years of experience (year entering): 16 years-1, 13 years-1, 11 years-5, 8 years-7, 7 years-1, 6 years-5, 5 years-3, 4 years-9, 3 years-2, 2 years-7, rookies-11.

HIGHER EDUCATION

40 colleges and universities are represented on the Saints' 53-man roster. Of that total, 10 are represented by multiple Saints, with two apiece from Alabama, California, Colorado, Georgia, Ohio State, Penn State, Oregon, Southern Methodist, Stanford and Texas.

MY HOMETOWN

Saints players come from 20 different states, Washington D.C., Germany and Nigeria. Of the 53 players currently on the team's active roster, the state which claims the most members of the team is Texas with nine (quarterbacks Drew Brees and Luke McCown, long snapper Justin Drescher, defensive back De'Vante Harris, running back Daniel Lasco, running back, return specialist Marcus Murphy, punter Thomas Morstead, LB Craig Robertson and safety Kenny Vaccaro).

PRACTICE MAKES PERFECT

A spot on the practice squad is another avenue to get onto the active roster and have the opportunity to contribute. New Orleans has eight players on their current 53-man roster who moved up after being on a practice squad before being promoted. Below is an overview of these players with extensive practice squad experience.

WR **Brandon Coleman** was originally signed by New Orleans out of Rutgers following the 2014 NFL Draft. Coleman spent the majority of his rookie campaign on the practice squad before being elevated to the active roster

for the regular season finale. Coleman won a roster spot on the 2015 opening day roster, going on to make 30 receptions for 454 yards (15.4 avg.) with two TD grabs. He has appeared in eight games in 2016 (two starts), catching 17 passes for 195 yards and one TD with one special teams stop.

An eight-year NFL veteran, T **Tony Hills** has persevered on three practice squads and after starting the 2015 season on the Baltimore practice roster, the former University of Texas standout was signed to the Saints active roster. Now in his second season with New Orleans, Hills has appeared in six games, seeing extensive time at left tackle on Oct. 16 against Carolina in place of an injured Peat.

G/C **Senio Kelemete** participated on the Saints practice squad in 2013 after spending the 2012 campaign on the Arizona Cardinals active roster. In 2015, he started three games at right guard, one at left guard and started the season's final contest against Atlanta at left tackle. It was his first career start at the position. In 2016, he has played in seven-of-eight contests with three starts.

Originally signed as an undrafted free agent out of Shippensburg University by the Pittsburgh Steelers following the 2005 NFL Draft, FB **John Kuhn** would begin his NFL career on the practice squad of the Steelers from 2005-06, before being elevated to the Steelers active roster. In 2016, he has rushed 10 times for 22 yards with three touchdowns and has added eight catches for 36 yards with one TD over eight games played with two starts.

Initially signed to the Cleveland Browns practice squad after competing on a tryout basis during his rookie season in 2011, the versatile LB **Craig Robertson** would seize this opportunity, making the 53-man roster the following season. In 2016 over eight starts, he has posted 80 tackles (62 solo), one interception, one fumble recovery, five passes defensed and two special teams stops.

WR **Willie Snead IV** first entered the NFL as an undrafted free agent with Cleveland in 2014 out of Ball State. Appearing in 15 games last season, including eight starts, Snead made 69 receptions for 984 yards (14.3 avg.) and three TDs. In seven games with two starts in 2016, he has recorded 37 receptions for 475 yards and two touchdowns.

LB **Nate Stupar** came to the NFL as a seventh-round draft pick of the Raiders in the 2012 NFL Draft (230th overall), later signing to their practice squad. The former Penn State standout would also spend time on the practice squads of the Eagles and 49ers. In 2016, he has played in eight contests with five starts and has posted 40 tackles (29 solo), one INT, two forced fumbles, two fumble recoveries, two passes defensed and six special teams stops.

CB **B.W. Webb** joined the Saints in Week Two of the 2016 season after previous stints with the Tennessee Titans (2015), Pittsburgh Steelers (2014) and Dallas Cowboys (2013). Originally drafted by the Cowboys in the fourth round (114th overall) of the 2013 NFL Draft, this fourth-year cornerback has logged 41 career games (five starts), 46 total tackles (39 solo), two interceptions, 13 pass defenses and six special teams stops. In six games with three starts for New Orleans in 2016, he has tallied 12 tackles (10 solo), one interception and a team-best nine passes defended.

BUCKING THE ODDS

Players whose names are not called in the NFL Draft each spring face challenging odds in sticking on a team, with every snap or drill in OTAs, minicamps and training camp under evaluation. Yet the current 2016 53-man roster features 17 undrafted players who bucked the odds, seven of whom started at least one contest for the Saints prior to this season. Undrafted players on the current Saints 53-man roster with NFL experience include CB **Delvin Breaux**, RB **Travaris Cadet**, Coleman, LS **Justin Drescher**, DE **Kasim Edeballi**, LB **Dannell Ellerbe**, TE **Josh Hill**, G **Tim Lelito**, CB **Sterling Moore**, Robertson and Snead IV.

A New Orleans native who suffered a serious neck injury as a high school senior at McDonogh 35 that did not allow him to play football at LSU where he was committed, the persistent Breaux took a route through the Gridiron Developmental Football League, the AFL and the CFL. Going on to start all 16 contests in 2015, Breaux finished with 49 tackles (38 solo), a team-high three interceptions, 23 passes defended and one fumble recovery. Breaux was voted by his teammates as the club's 2015 Ed Block Courage Award winner. On Nov. 6 against San Francisco, he returned from a six game absence due to a broken fibula. He has made two tackles over two starts in 2016.

Signed out of Appalachian State, Cadet has played in 56 career games (three starts) and has carried for 69 yards on 24 attempts, made 81 receptions for 667 yards with four TDs and returned 63 kickoffs for 1,531 yards (24.3 avg.). Over eight games played with one start in 2016, he has rushed twice for four yards, caught 19 passes for 108 yards with one TD and returned 10 kicks for 144 yards (14.4 avg.), also adding two special teams stops.

Signed as an undrafted free agent out of the University of Colorado in 2010 by Atlanta and picked up by New Orleans at midseason, Drescher has handled long-snapping duties for 94 consecutive games, adding four special teams stops.

A Hamburg, Germany native who started playing football in middle school prior to further developing his skills in prep school in New Hampshire, Edeballi was signed following the 2014 NFL Draft out of Boston College and in two seasons has played in all 40 games with two starts, posting 46 tackles (32 solo), eight sacks, five passes defended, one forced fumble, one fumble recovery and 22 special teams stops. In 2016, he has seen action in all eight games with one start and has totaled 10 tackles (seven solo), one sack, two passes defended and four special teams stops.

Signed as an undrafted free agent by Baltimore out of Georgia in 2009, Ellerbe has appeared in 69 games with 35 starts, posting career totals of 345 tackles (254 solo), 6.5 sacks, three interceptions, 13 passes defended, a forced fumble, four fumble recoveries, 18 special teams stops and a coverage forced fumble. On Oct. 30 against Seattle, he made his season-debut, making the start and posting seven tackles, including five solo stops.

A 2013 undrafted free agent signing by New Orleans out of Idaho State, Hill has played in 51 career games with 18 starts and has posted 44 catches for 412 yards (9.4 avg.) with nine touchdowns and 25 special teams stops. In 2016, he has caught eight passes for 72 yards with one touchdown over five games played, all starts.

Signed as a free agent out of Grand Valley State in 2013, Lelito has appeared in 55 regular season contests and two playoff games over his four-year career while making 20 starts. He has appeared in all eight games in 2016 (five starts), last opening up as extra blocker on Nov. 6 at San Francisco.

Moore comes to New Orleans after spending the 2016 offseason and preseason with Buffalo and the 2015 campaign with Tampa Bay. The 5-10, 202-pound Southern Methodist product has started 23-of-61 career games while accumulating 141 tackles, five interceptions, 29 passes defended, seven forced fumbles and three fumble recoveries. Over five games played in 2016 (four starts), he has registered 17 tackles (14 solo), one interception, four passes defended and one forced fumble.

Since 2006, the New Orleans Saints have allowed the fewest sacks in the National Football League, surrendering only 259 quarterback takedowns in 168 games.

Ahead is a synopsis of several returning players and newcomers through the draft, free agency and trade to the 2016 Saints offensive line:

LT Terron Armstead - The club's first third round draft choice in 2013 out of Arkansas-Pine Bluff, Armstead impressed scouts by running the fastest 40-yard dash time (4.71) by an offensive lineman in the history of the NFL Scouting Combine. He has opened 34 regular season games and two postseason contests for New Orleans. In 2016, he has opened five-of-eight games at left tackle, missing three contests due to a knee injury.

G Jahri Evans - The 2006 fourth round draft choice made a rapid ascent from his small school roots at Bloomsburg into one of the NFL's top interior linemen and the top guard in team history. Evans's been named to six Pro Bowls since 2009, as well as being named an AP first-team All-Pro selection from 2009-12 and a second-team selection in 2013. Overall, Evans has started 161 contests at right guard for New Orleans, the ninth-highest total for games

played in team record books. In 2016, he has opened all eight games at right guard.

C/G Senio Kelemete - Originally a fifth round selection of the Arizona Cardinals (151st overall) in the 2012 NFL Draft, since first joining the New Orleans practice squad at the start of the 2013 season, this fourth-year offensive lineman has displayed the versatility to play every position on the offensive line. The 6-foot-3, 300-pounder played in all 16 games for the first time in his career in 2015 and opened five games, including contests at both guard positions and at right tackle. He has appeared in seven games in 2016 with three starts.

G Tim Lelito - Originally signed as an undrafted free agent out of Grand Valley State in 2013, this lineman proved the jump was not too big from Division II to the NFL as he's started at all three interior positions. In 2015, Lelito won the starting left guard slot in the preseason, but ended up seeing significant action at both guard spots. He opened 11 contests at left guard and two at right guard. He has appeared in all eight games in 2016 (five starts).

T Andrus Peat - A first round selection (13th overall) in the 2015 NFL Draft out of Stanford, Peat was considered one of the top college offensive linemen in 2014. In his rookie campaign, Peat saw action in 12 contests with eight starts, being inserted into several offensive packages, including two starts at left tackle in place of an injured Armstead. In 2016, he has started seven contests, opening four games at left guard, while making three starts at left tackle in place of an injured Armstead.

RT Zach Strief - This 2006 seventh round pick out of Northwestern has appeared in 148 regular season games with 84 starts and played in 10 postseason contests, four which he has opened. He has become even more durable with age, appearing in and starting 42 consecutive postseason and regular season contests at his right tackle position, before missing last season's Week 16 contest against Jacksonville with an elbow injury. He has made all eight starts at right tackle in 2016.

C Max Unger - After being acquired by the Saints via trade at the start of the 2015 offseason, Max Unger anchored the middle of the New Orleans line, including being the lone offensive linemen to open all 16 contests. Originally a second round draft pick of the Seahawks in 2009, Unger has been named a first-team All-Pro by the *Associated Press* in 2012 and is a two-time Pro Bowler, helping the Seahawks to two Super Bowl appearances and a victory in Super Bowl XLVIII. For the 2016 season, he was voted one of two offensive team captains. Unger has opened all 91 games he has played in since 2009, including all eight in 2016.

DEFENSIVE NOTES

DEFENSIVE DRAFT

Over the last two NFL Drafts, New Orleans has shown a commitment to improving the defense, with four players selected over the last two drafts on the current Saints 53-man roster. Below is an overview of these four players:

LB Stephone Anthony, Clemson (D1b-15) - In his rookie campaign, Anthony started all 16 games at middle linebacker and led the team with a club rookie record 144 tackles (99 solo), while adding one sack, one interception, two forced fumbles, one fumble recovery, one defensive touchdown, one defensive two-point conversion off of a blocked PAT attempt, five passes defended and one special teams stop. His total stops led NFL rookies and he was a consensus All-Rookie selection. In the club's Week 13 contest against Carolina, he took a blocked PAT kick attempt back 82 yards for the two-point conversion, marking the first time in NFL history that a blocked PAT kick attempt led to a two-point conversion since the rule change before the 2015 season. In six games played with two starts in 2016, he has posted five tackles (three solo), including one tackle for loss.

S Vonn Bell, Ohio State (D2b-16) - Selected by New Orleans in the second round (61st overall) of the 2016 NFL Draft, Bell was a consensus All-American and one of the top rated defensive backs in the NFL Draft. As a senior, the Rossville, Ga. native was a Jim Thorpe Award semifinalist after recording 65 tackles and adding two interceptions, one brought back for a TD, one fumble recovery and 11 passes defended. He started 28 games his final two years at Ohio State, and posted career totals of nine interceptions, 176 stops, 24 passes defended, two fumble recoveries and four tackles behind the line of scrimmage. Over eight games played with five starts in his rookie campaign, he has recorded 46 tackles (27 solo), one half sack, one forced fumble, one fumble recovery and five special teams stops.

DT Tyeler Davison, Fresno State (D5b-15) - This run-stopping widebody defensive lineman played in 53 career games at Fresno State and made 28.5 stops for a loss and 14.5 sacks. In 2015, Davison played in all 16 games with five starts, finishing his rookie campaign with 26 tackles (15 solo) and 1.5 sacks. In seven games played in 2016, all starts, he has totaled 14 tackles (seven solo).

DL David Onyemata (D4-16) - Possessing a unique combination of size and speed, this Lagos, Nigeria native turned in a productive college career north of the border at

the University of Manitoba, as the first member of the Bisons program to be drafted. In 37 career games, he posted 166 tackles, 9.5 sacks, two passes defended, one forced fumble and one fumble recovery. Over eight games played in 2016, he has tallied 12 tackles (seven solo).

DT Sheldon Rankins - Drafted by New Orleans 12th overall in the 2016 NFL Draft out of Louisville, Rankins played in 46 games along the defensive line at Louisville, producing 133 tackles (72 solo), 31.5 tackles for loss and 18 sacks during his collegiate career. A two-time All-Atlantic Coast Conference selection, Rankins racked up a career-high 58 tackles, 13 tackles for loss, six sacks, one pass defended and one fumble recovery returned 46 yards for a touchdown as a senior in 2015. After a leg injury forced him to miss the first seven games of 2016, Rankins made his career debut on Nov. 6 at San Francisco, posting two tackles (one solo).

NEW FACES ON DEFENSE

Along with the NFL Draft, New Orleans used free agency to add pieces to their defense, bringing players from other teams, as well as other leagues to help create the perfect mixture of veteran leadership and young talent in the Saints locker room. Below is an overview of those players:

DT Nick Fairley - Fairley comes to New Orleans after spending the past five seasons contributing to the defensive line rotations of the Detroit Lions (2011-14) and St. Louis Rams (2015). He has recorded 189 tackles (113 solo), 17.5 sacks, four passes defended, five forced fumbles and four fumble recoveries over 69 games played with 38 starts. Originally a first round draft pick of Detroit in 2011 out of Auburn, Fairley has started all eight games in 2016, posting 26 tackles (16 solo) and 3.5 sacks.

S Roman Harper - Re-signed this offseason with New Orleans, where he established himself as one of the NFL's most physical defensive backs, Roman Harper is the only safety in team history to have been selected to two Pro Bowls. His 18 career sacks rank first among active defensive backs and are tied for ninth all-time. The Prattville, Ala. native is now in his 11th season, after playing his first eight in New Orleans and his last two with the Carolina Panthers. In 2015, Harper started all 16 regular season games at safety, finishing with 73 tackles (58 solo), a career-high two fumble recoveries and seven passes defended as he helped Carolina advance to the Super Bowl. In 2016, he has posted seven tackles (four solo) and three special teams stop over eight games played with one start.

DEFENSIVE NOTES

DE Paul Kruger - Winning Super Bowl XLVII in New Orleans as a member of the Baltimore Ravens after the 2012 season, Kruger comes to New Orleans after spending the previous three campaigns with the Cleveland Browns. Originally drafted by the Baltimore Ravens in the second round (57th overall) of the 2009 NFL Draft out of Utah, Kruger has appeared in seven games with five starts for the Black and Gold in 2016, registering 20 tackles (11 solo), 1.5 sacks, one pass defended and one fumble recovery.

LB Craig Robertson - Robertson joins the Saints after spending his first five NFL seasons with the Cleveland Browns. He has tallied 394 tackles (263 solo), four sacks, seven interceptions, 20 passes defended, two forced fumbles, six fumble recoveries, one touchdown and 35 special teams stops over 66 games with 45 starts. In 2015, he appeared in 12 games with nine starts and totaled 50 tackles (30 solo), one INT, five passes defended, one forced fumble, one fumble recovery and nine special teams stops. Starting all eight contests in 2016, he has totaled a team-high 80 tackles (62 solo), one fumble recovery, five passes defended and three special teams stops.

LB Nate Stupar - The former Penn State standout has appeared in 51 career contests with eight starts for four clubs and has posted career totals of 71 tackles (54 solo), one interception, one sack, two passes defended, two forced fumbles, three fumble recoveries and 34 special teams stops. In his first season with the Black and Gold, he has played in eight games with five starts and has posted 40 tackles (29 solo), one interception, two forced fumbles, two fumble recoveries and six special teams stops.

DE Darryl Tapp - Originally selected by the Seattle Seahawks in the second round (53rd overall) of the 2006 NFL Draft out of Virginia Tech, Tapp comes to New Orleans to add depth to the club's defensive line rotation after initially participating in the Saints' minicamp on a tryout basis. The Portsmouth, Va. native has played in 154 career NFL games with 37 starts and has recorded totals of 314 tackles (242 solo), 28.0 sacks, two interceptions, one returned for a touchdown, 20 passes defended, 11 forced fumbles, 10 fumble recoveries and 11 special teams tackles over 11 seasons, including stints with the Seattle Seahawks, the Philadelphia Eagles, Washington Redskins and Detroit Lions. In eight games played in 2016 (one start), he has recorded 17 tackles (seven solo), one half sack and one fumble recovery.

SPECIAL TEAMS NOTES

Under the guidance of Greg McMahon, in his 11th season on the coaching staff and his ninth as coordinator and his assistant Stan Kwan, the Saints special teams is once again one of the team's most consistent position groups.

- **K Wil Lutz** is in his first season with New Orleans, joining the team after originally being signed by the Baltimore Ravens as an undrafted free agent out of Georgia State following the 2016 NFL Draft. Over his rookie campaign, he has connected on 13-of-18 (72.2 pct.) FG attempts, including a career-long 57-yard field goal against Atlanta on Sept. 26, the third-longest made field goal in franchise history, matching Kai Forbath's 57-yarder at Houston last year. He is also 27-for-27 on PAT attempts. On Oct. 16 against Carolina, he kicked a 52-yard game-winning field goal with :13 remaining to collect the first game-winning FG of his career, the longest game-winning kick by a Saint since 1984. He was named the NFC Special Teams Player of the Week, becoming the first rookie kicker in Saints team history to be recognized by the league as a Special Teams Player of the Week. On Oct. 30 against Seattle, he was four-for-four on FG attempts, including a 53-yard conversion in the second quarter, marking his third make of 50-plus yards this season, one shy of the franchise record in a season. Following his performance, he was awarded his second NFC Special Teams Player of the Week, becoming the second Saints kicker to receive the honor twice in the same season (John Carney, 2001).

- **P Thomas Morstead**, who has been a weapon in the field position game with his strong leg, outstanding placement abilities and booming kickoffs, returns for his eighth year with New Orleans. Over his eight-year career, the club's fifth-round draft choice (164th overall) in 2009 from Southern Methodist University, has posted a club-record career gross average of 47.0 on 440 punts, ranked third all-time in the NFL (compiled by the NFL since 1939), with a team-best career 41.2 net average, which is ranked second all-time (compiled by NFL since 1976) and has placed 148 punts inside the 20-yard line, while also booming 258 kickoffs in the end zone for touchbacks. Morstead has recorded three of the top ten all-time single-season net yardage figures (compiled by the NFL since 1976). In Week One against the Raiders, he played in his 111th career game, moving him into sole possession of 31st in club record books in games played, surpassing a tie with Tommy Barnhardt for most games played by a punter. In 2016, he has punted 30 times for 1,523 yards (50.8 avg.) and has placed 12 of his punts inside the 20-yard line.

QUARTERBACKS

DREW BREES

- Since signing with the New Orleans Saints as an unrestricted free agent in 2006 from the San Diego Chargers, Drew Brees has thrown for 4,000 or more yards each season, became the only quarterback to throw for 5,000 yards four different times, set the league single-season yardage record in 2011 (broken by Peyton Manning in 2013) and ranked at or near the top in every passing category, both in single-seasons and over the 10-year period, breaking nearly every club record.

- He opened the 2016 season against Oakland going 28-of-42 for 423 yards, four TDs and a 131.3 passer rating. With 4,306 passing yards on kickoff weekend for his career, he joined Peyton Manning as the only QBs in NFL history to throw for at least 4,000 yards on opening weekend over their careers. It was also his sixth-consecutive week one game with at least 300 yards passing, surpassing a record held by Kurt Warner (1999-2003).

- Since 2006, he leads the NFL with 51,244 passing yards, 369 touchdown passes, 6,623 attempts, 4,482 completions, a 67.7% completion percentage, 94 games with at least 300 yards passing, 15 with at least 400 yards passing, 387 completions of 25 yards or more and stands at fourth in the league with a 99.4 passer rating.

- Brees has been selected to play in a club-record eight Pro Bowls as a Saint, with nine overall berths in the NFL's all-star game twice as a starter. His seven consecutive selections as a Saint is tied for first in franchise history with Pro Football Hall of Fame tackle William Roaf.

- Brees has posted a 98-68 regular season record in contests he has started since signing with the Saints in 2006. In 2015 at Atlanta, he recorded his 100th career victory as a Saints quarterback. Including his six playoff victories, his 104 total wins in a Saints uniform make him the winningest quarterback in franchise history. Overall, Brees' win total as a member of the Saints ranks fourth among all NFL QBs since 2006.

- In his 16-year NFL career where he's appeared in 225 games with 224 starts, Brees has completed 5,607-of-8,432 passes (66.5%) for 63,592 yards, 449 touchdown passes and a 96.3 passer rating. He's the NFL's all-time most accurate passer, is ranked third in completions, third in TD passes, third in passing yardage and seventh in passer rating. In Week Two at the New York Giants, he surpassed Dan Marino (61,361) to move into third place on the NFL's all-time passing yardage list.

BY THE NUMBERS

3 – Brees, Dan Marino and Peyton Manning are the only three NFL players to throw for 40 or more touchdowns twice. Also the number of NFC Offensive Player of the Month awards won by Brees in his 15-year career, the most monthly awards won by a Saint in team history.

4 – NFL-record number of consecutive games that Brees threw for 350 yards in 2011. Also the NFL-record number of seasons that Brees has thrown for at least 5,000 yards (2008, 2011-13), throwing for 5,162 yards in 2013.

6 – The NFL-record number of seasons Brees has led the NFL in passing yardage, including 2015 (4,870). Also, the streak of consecutive games in which Brees did not throw an INT between 2015-16, matching a franchise record. The streak was broken on Sept. 26 against Atlanta.

7 – The NFL-record number of regular season contests where Brees has thrown five TDs and zero interceptions.

8 – The NFL-record number of times he reached the 350-yard mark in 2011. Also the franchise-record number of seasons that Brees has been selected to the Pro Bowl. Also, the number of seasons overall and NFL-record consecutive campaigns (2008-15) that Brees has thrown for at least 30 touchdowns.

9 – NFL-record stretch of consecutive games with at least 300 yards passing, which he's accomplished twice. Also the number of consecutive wins for Brees as a starter on Monday Night Football, tied for second all-time. Brees is only the second player in NFL history to throw for 4,000 yards in nine straight seasons.

10 – Number of consecutive seasons Brees has thrown 25 touchdown passes, making him only the second player in history to do so, joining Peyton Manning.

11 – Number of seasons Brees has thrown 25 or more touchdown passes, tied for second in NFL record books with Tom Brady and Brett Favre.

12 – 2015 was Brees' 12th-consecutive season with 3,000 yards passing. Only Favre (18) and Manning (13), have thrown for 3,000 yards in more consecutive seasons.

13 – With 13 300-yard passing games in 2011, Brees set the NFL single-season record, surpassing the one he previously tied with 10 in 2008. In 2015, Brees become the fifth player to have 13 3,000-yard passing seasons, joining Favre (18), Manning (16), Dan Marino (13) and Brady (13).

15 – The number of times Brees has thrown for at least 400 yards, passing Manning (14) for most in league history.

BY THE NUMBERS

20 – Franchise-record NFC Player of the Week awards won by Brees as a Saint and the most conference Player of the Week honors since 2006. Including his tenure in San Diego, his 22 conference Player of the Week awards rank third all-time behind Manning (27) and Brady (24).

29 – Regular season contests by Brees with at least four TD passes, ranked second behind Manning (35). Also, the number of successful drives in the fourth quarter or overtime engineered by Brees for a TD or field goal in the regular season to lead the Saints to victory since joining the club in 2006, the NFL's third-highest total over this period.

45 – Consecutive regular season contests between 2012-15 with at least one TD pass, fifth-best in league history. Streak ended on November 29, 2015 at Houston.

47 – Consecutive regular season contests from Sept. 8, 2011– Nov. 21, 2013 when he'd thrown for at least 200 yards, a span of three seasons. Brees is currently on a 43-game streak.

53 – The number of 350-yard games over his career.

54 – Consecutive regular season contests between 2009-12 with at least one TD, the longest streak in history, surpassing the record held by Johnny Unitas. It was set on October 7, 2012 vs. San Diego. The streak ended on Nov. 29, 2012 when he did not throw a touchdown at Atlanta. Also, the NFL-record number of games with at least 30 completions, ahead of Manning (38).

56 – Players that Brees' 449 career touchdowns have gone to with both the Saints and San Diego. On Oct. 2 at San Diego FB John Kuhn became the 56th player, as well as the 41st different Saint.

57 – The NFL-record number of consecutive regular season contests where Brees had thrown at least 20 completions until Oct. 13, 2013 at New England.

66.5 – Career completion percentage, ranked first in National Football League record books.

67.7 – Franchise-record completion percentage as a Saint, ranked first in the NFL since 2006.

71.2 – Brees' National Football League single-season record completion percentage in 2011.

84 – Number of regular season games by Brees as a Saint where he's posted a rating of 100 or more (min. 10 attempts) owning a 67-17 record in these contests. This is the highest total among QBs since 2006. He's reached the milestone 101 times over his 16-year career.

94 – Number of club-record regular season contests by Brees with 300 yards or more passing as a Saint, the highest total since 2006. Brees has reached the 300-yard mark an NFL-record 101 times.

98 – In the team's season opener against Oakland, he connected with WR Brandin Cooks on a 98-yard touchdown, the longest pass play of his career, the longest pass play in franchise history and the longest scoring offensive play in franchise history. Also, the club-record regular season victories as a starting QB. Including the playoffs, Brees has compiled a 104-72 record as the Saints' starter. His 104 total wins currently rank fourth among all NFL signal-callers since 2006.

135 – Regular season games Brees has with two or more TDs in his 16-year career, the second-most by an active player behind Tom Brady (142). Since joining the Saints in 2006, Brees has 110 contests with multiple touchdown passes, first in the NFL.

205 – October 4, 2015 vs. Dallas, with an 80-yard TD pass to RB C.J. Spiller, Brees reached 400 TD passes in his 205th career game, the quickest a player has reached 400 TD passes (Peyton Manning, 209).

305 – Career-best consecutive attempts in which he had not thrown an interception, becoming just the fourth player in NFL history to have a streak of at least 300 attempts. Streak ended on Sept. 26 against Atlanta.

369 – Touchdown passes as a Saint, ranked first in club records and in the NFL during this time period, including seven in 2015 vs. the New York Giants to tie an NFL record. With 449 career TD passes, he ranks third.

63,592 – In 2015 vs. Detroit, Brees eclipsed 60,000 passing yards for his career, becoming just the fourth player to reach the mark, as well as the fastest.

LUKE McCOWN

• McCown is in his 13th NFL season and fourth with New Orleans. Originally a fourth round selection (106th overall) in the 2004 NFL Draft by Cleveland, the former Louisiana Tech standout has played in 63 career games with 10 starts with the Browns, the Tampa Bay Buccaneers, the Jacksonville Jaguars, the Atlanta Falcons and the Saints. He has completed 216-of-356 passes for 2,070 yards with nine touchdowns and a 71.3 rating.

RUNNING BACKS

TRAVARIS CADET

• Cadet returned to New Orleans for the final two games of the 2015 season, after splitting the beginning of the year between the New England Patriots and San Francisco 49ers. Originally signed by the Saints as an undrafted free agent out of Appalachian State following the 2012 NFL Draft, Cadet spent his first three seasons with the Black and Gold, proving to be effective at running back, wide receiver and return specialist. In 2016, he has rushed for four yards on two attempts, made 19 receptions for 108 yards with one touchdown, and added 144 yards on 10 kickoff returns over eight games played with one start.

TIM HIGHTOWER

• Originally a 2008 fifth-round pick (149th overall) of Arizona, Hightower became the lead back in 2015 after an injury to RB Mark Ingram and posted the third-highest rushing yards total in the league from his first start in the team's Week 14 matchup at Tampa Bay through the end of the season. Over eight games with one start in 2016, he has rushed for 276 yards on 68 carries, caught four passes for 21 yards and returned one kickoff for 16 yards, adding one special teams stop. On Oct. 30 against Seattle, he carried it a season-high 26 times for a season-best 102 yards, including a long-rush of 28 yards. It was New Orleans' first 100-yard rushing performance of the season and marked the sixth 100-yard rushing game of Hightower's career and second as a Saint.

MARK INGRAM

• One of the club's two first round draft picks in 2011, the 2009 Heisman Trophy winner has been an integral part of the rushing attack since his arrival in New Orleans. Before being sidelined in 2015, Ingram rushed for 769 yards and six TDs on 166 attempts, and added a career-high 405 yards receiving on a career-best 50 catches. His 1,174 total yards from scrimmage marked a new career-high. He has started six games in 2016, while appearing in all eight, accumulating 497 yards on 104 attempts (4.8 avg.) with two TDs and 167 yards on 24 receptions with three TDs. On Oct. 2 at San Diego, he surpassed Rueben Mays to move into fifth place on the franchise's all-time rushing yards list. On Nov. 6 at San Francisco, he recorded his first 100-yard rushing game of 2016, including a career-long 75-yard touchdown that was the fourth-longest rush in Saints history.

• Lasco comes to New Orleans after finishing his college career with 2,395 career all-purpose yards over 41 games and 15 starts, including 1,872 rushing yards and 18 TDs on the ground to rank 10th on Cal's all-time list. Healthy after being limited due to injuries in his senior campaign, Lasco seeks a return to the form of his junior season, when he rushed for 1,115 yards and tallied 1,471 total yards from scrimmage. Appearing in six games in his rookie campaign, he has carried it 11 times for 32 yards and has made two receptions for 11 yards, while adding six special teams stops. Coleman finished the 2015 season with 30 receptions for 454 yards and two touchdowns. Over eight games played with two starts in 2016, he has made 17 receptions for 195 yards and one touchdown, adding one special teams stop. On Sept. 26 against Atlanta, he posted a season-high seven receptions for a season-high 78 yards.

BRANDIN COOKS

• The club's first-round selection in the 2014 NFL Draft, Cooks recorded his first-career 1,000-yard season in 2015, leading the team in receiving with 84 grabs for 1,138 yards (13.5 avg.) and a team-leading nine TDs. His 84 receptions were the most by a Saints receiver since Marques Colston hauled in 84 in 2010. In Week One against the Raiders, he was on the receiving end of a 98-yard TD, the longest pass play in franchise history and the longest scoring offensive play in franchise history. • After concluding a collegiate career at Ball State that saw him leave the school ranked second in club record books in receptions (223) and receiving yardage (2,991), Snead then entered the NFL as an undrafted free agent with Cleveland in 2014. Earning a roster spot in the 2015 preseason, the Muskegon Heights, Mich. native appeared in 15 games with eight starts and made 69 receptions for 984 yards (14.3 avg.) and three TDs. He began his second

season in the NFL by catching nine passes for a career-high 172 yards and one TD in Week One against Oakland. Over seven games played with two starts in 2016, he has caught 37 passes for 475 yards (12.8) and two TDs.

• Originally a second-round draft pick of Indianapolis in 2012, Fleener has career totals in 68 games with 48 starts of 211 receptions for 2,513 yards (11.9 avg.) with 19 touchdowns, along with one rush for two yards and one rushing score. In his first season with the Black and Gold, he has appeared in eight games with three starts, catching 28 passes for 359 yards (12.8 avg.) with two touchdowns, while adding one rush for two yards and one TD. On Oct. 16 against Carolina, Fleener recorded his first-career rushing TD on his first-career rushing attempt. It was the first rushing TD recorded by a Saints tight end since Henry Childs on October 31, 1976 against Atlanta. Fleener also became the first tight end with both a rushing TD and receiving TD in the same game since New England TE Rob Gronkowski did so on Dec. 4, 2011 against Indianapolis.

• Signed as an undrafted free agent from Idaho State, Hill has posted 44 grabs for 412 yards with nine touchdowns, while adding 25 special teams stops over his four-year career. In 2016, he has caught eight passes for 72 yards and one touchdown over five games played, all starts.

DEFENSIVE ENDS**KASIM EDEBALI**

• Signed by the Black and Gold as an undrafted free agent out of Boston College, Kasim Edebali first made the club's 53-man roster out of training camp in 2014 and has played in all 40 games since, making 46 tackles (32 solo), eight sacks, five passes defensed, one forced fumble, one fumble recovery and 22 special teams stops. In 2015, the Hamburg, Germany native played in all 16 games with one start, totaling 18 tackles (14 solo), a career-high five sacks, three passes defensed, one fumble recovery and six special teams stops. Over eight games played with one start in 2016, he has posted 10 tackles (seven solo), one sack, two passes defensed and four special teams stops.

CAMERON JORDAN

• New Orleans' first choice in the 2011 NFL Draft (24th overall) out of California came to the Saints after a college career where he was one of the nation's elite pass rushers. In 2015, he started all 16 games, posting 61 tackles (39 solo), 10 sacks, seven passes defensed, a forced fumble and two fumble recoveries. With 10 sacks on the season, it marked the second time in his career that he posted a double-digit sack season, becoming the ninth Saint to have multiple double-digit sack seasons. His efforts were rewarded with a Pro Bowl nomination, the second of his career. In eight games played in 2016, all starts, Jordan has tallied 3.0 sacks, 32 total tackles (13 solo), one forced fumble and two passes defensed. On Oct. 2 at San Diego, the two-time team captain's half sack forced a field goal in the red zone that kept the deficit under two touchdowns to force the stunning comeback.

DEFENSIVE ENDS

- Jordan has posted 42.0 sacks since he entered the NFL in 2011 and over the past four seasons is only the second player, joining Houston's J.J. Watt to have 40 takedowns and 20 passes defended. During this time, the Saints own a 22-10 record when he corrals a signal-caller, and they boast a 7-0 mark when he tallies two or more sacks. On the season, he has posted 3.0 sacks.

PAUL KRUGER

- Kruger comes to New Orleans after spending the last three seasons with Cleveland. Originally drafted by the Baltimore Ravens in the second round (57th overall) of the 2009 NFL Draft out of Utah, Kruger has posted 238 tackles (147 solo), 35.0 sacks for a total loss of 214.0 yards, two interceptions, 24 passes defended, seven forced fumbles and five fumble recoveries over 106 games played with 58 starts. Over seven games played in 2016, five starts, he has registered 20 tackles (11 solo), 1.5 sacks, one pass defended and one fumble recovery.

DEFENSIVE TACKLES

TYELER DAVISON

- After being selected in the fifth round (154th overall) of the 2015 NFL Draft, Davison quickly impressed in the preseason, earning a spot on the 53-man roster. Appearing in all 16 games with five starts in his rookie season, he posted 26 tackles (15 solo) and 1.5 sacks for a total loss of eight yards. He has started seven games in 2016, posting 14 tackles, seven of which have been solo tackles.

NICK FAIRLEY

- With a commitment to improving the defense during the offseason, the former Auburn standout was signed as an unrestricted free agent from the Rams, after originally being drafted in the 2011 NFL Draft 13th overall by the Detroit Lions. Over his five-year career, Fairley has played in 69 games with 38 starts and has recorded 189 tackles (113 solo), 17.5 sacks, four passes defended, five forced fumbles and four fumble recoveries. The Mobile, Ala. native has started all eight games for the Black and Gold in 2016, recording 26 tackles (16 solo) and 3.5 sacks. On Oct. 2 at San Diego, he recorded a crucial takedown of QB Philip Rivers on the Chargers' final drive to help secure a Saints victory. In just eight games, he is already 2.5 sacks away from tying his career-high six sacks set in 2013.

JOHN JENKINS

- With Jenkins' imposing size, tremendous strength and the ability to take on multiple blockers, Jenkins has been a contributor to the Saints defensive front since originally being selected by New Orleans in the third round (82nd overall) of the 2013 NFL Draft. Over his career, the former Georgia standout has posted totals of 148 tackles (77 solo), 1.5 sacks, one forced fumble, one fumble recovery and one pass defended over 49 games played with 22 starts. In seven games played with one start in 2016, Jenkins has tallied 12 tackles (eight solo).

YOUTH ALONG THE LINE

New Orleans used the 2016 NFL Draft to strengthen their defensive line, using two of their first four picks on the front four.

DAVID ONYEMATA

- Onyemata was chosen with the team's fourth round pick (120th overall) after a stellar career at the University of Manitoba of the CIS, becoming the first member of the Bisons program to be drafted. In 37 career games, he posted 166 tackles, 9.5 sacks, two passes defended, one forced fumble and one fumble recovery. As a senior, the Lagos, Nigeria native was named a Canada West all-star for the second straight campaign, an all-Canadian for the first time and claimed the J.P. Metras Trophy as the top down lineman in CIS football. He finished second in the conference and ninth in the country with five sacks in eight league games and also ranked second in Canada West in tackles for a loss (7.5) and 12th in overall tackles (38.5). Overall in nine contests, all which he started at nose tackle, Onyemata made 50 stops, five sacks, one pass defended, one forced fumble and one fumble recovery. Over eight games played in his rookie season, he has collected 12 tackles (seven solo).

SHELDON RANKINS

- The third defensive lineman selected in the 2016 NFL Draft (12th overall), Rankins played in 46 games along the defensive line at Louisville, producing 133 tackles (72 solo), 31.5 tackles for loss and 18 sacks during his collegiate career. In his senior campaign, the former Cardinals standout racked up a single-season career-high 58 tackles (28 solo), six sacks, one pass defended and a fumble recovery returned 46 yards for a touchdown. Rankins was named second-team All-Atlantic Coast Conference following his efforts. Missing the first seven games of his rookie season, Rankins made his career debut on Nov. 6 at San Francisco, posting two tackles (one solo).

LINEBACKERS

The Saints used free agency to really revamp the linebacker corps, mixing in key offseason acquisitions with returning veterans.

STEPHON ANTHONY

- In his rookie campaign, Anthony won a starting job at MLB during the preseason and started all 16 games. Anthony led the team with a franchise rookie-record 144 tackles, including 99 solo stops, ranked first among NFL rookies. He was a consensus All-Rookie selection. In 2015 against Carolina, he forced a fumble and returned it 31 yards for his first TD, and followed that up with an 82-yard two-point conversion return after a blocked PAT kick attempt, marking the first time in history that a PAT had been blocked for a two-point conversion since the rule change before the 2015 season. In his sophomore season, he has appeared in six games (two starts) and has posted five tackles (three solo), including one tackle for loss.

DANNELL ELLERBE

- Acquired from Miami in an offseason trade in 2015, this Georgia product enters his eighth season in the NFL and his second with New Orleans. With three clubs, he's appeared in 69 career regular season contests with 35 starts and has posted 345 tackles (254 solo), 6.5 sacks, three interceptions, 13 passes defensed, one forced fumble, four fumble recoveries, 18 special teams stops and one coverage forced fumble. In his first season with the Saints, he posted 45 tackles (39 solo), a pass defensed, his first career forced fumble and a fumble recovery over six games played with four starts. On Oct. 30 against Seattle, he made his season-debut, making the start and recording seven tackles, including five solo stops.

MICHAEL MAUTI

- Mauti, a Mandeville native who was originally selected by the Minnesota Vikings in the seventh round (213th overall) of the 2013 NFL Draft, returned to join his hometown team and made solid contributions on both defense and special teams when he was acquired off of waivers from Minnesota at the conclusion of the 2015 preseason. The son of former Saints wideout and special teams ace Rich Mauti, Michael Mauti has appeared in 47 career games with two starts in four NFL seasons and has tallied 42 tackles (27 solo), one sack, one forced fumble, 35 special teams stops and one

blocked punt he recovered for a touchdown. In his first season with the Black and Gold, the Penn State alum played in all 16 contests with two starts and recorded a career-high 26 tackles (19 solo), a team-high 12 special teams stops, while also blocking a punt and recovering it for a touchdown. Over eight games played in 2016, he has registered 14 tackles (seven solo), one sack, one forced fumble and a team-best seven special teams stops.

- This former North Texas standout, in his first season with the Saints, has totaled 394 tackles (263 solo), four sacks, seven interceptions, 20 passes defensed, two forced fumbles, five fumble recoveries, one TD and 35 special teams stops over 66 games with 45 starts. In 2015, he appeared in 12 games with nine starts and totaled 50 tackles (30 solo), one INT, five passes defensed, one forced fumble, one fumble recovery and nine special teams stops. In 2016, he has started eight games and has posted a team-leading 80 tackles (62 solo), one interception, five passes defensed, one fumble recovery and three special teams stops.

NATE STUPAR

• Drafted by Oakland in the seventh round of the 2012 NFL Draft (230th overall) when Saints defensive coordinator Dennis Allen was the head coach of the Raiders, Stupar has appeared in eight games with five starts in his first season in New Orleans, posting 40 tackles (29 solo), one interception, two forced fumbles, two fumble recoveries, two passes defended and six special teams stops. On Oct. 30 against Seattle, he intercepted QB Russell Wilson in the second quarter to post his first-career interception.

BACK-TO-BACK PICKS

On Nov. 6 at San Francisco, Robertson intercepted QB Colin Kaepernick in the first quarter, his first interception as a Saint and the seventh of his career. It was his first pick since Jan. 3, 2016 against Pittsburgh as a member of the Browns.

In the previous week's matchup vs. Seattle, Stupar intercepted QB Russell Wilson in the second quarter to post his first-career interception.

These two interceptions by Saints linebackers marked the first time that linebackers have recorded interceptions for the Saints in back-to-back games since Scott Shanle intercepted Matt Ryan at Atlanta on Nov. 13, 2011 and Will Herring intercepted Eli Manning against the New York Giants on Nov. 28, 2011.

CORNERBACKS**DELVIN BREAUX**

• Over eight years after suffering a serious neck injury in a high school football game for McDonogh 35, Breaux realized his dream when he signed a contract with his hometown team following a journey that took him through the GDFL, the AFL and the CFL. In the 2015 season opener, the New Orleans native became the first Saints CB to start in his NFL debut since Tracy Porter in 2008. Overall, in 16 contests, all starts, he made 49 tackles (38 solo), three interceptions, a club-best 23 passes defended and the fumble recovery. He was voted as the team's Ed Block Courage Award winner following the season. On Nov. 6 at San Francisco, Breaux returned from a six game absence due to a broken fibula to make the start. Over two starts in 2016, he has tallied two solo tackles.

KEN CRAWLEY

• Originally signed by New Orleans as an undrafted free agent out of the University of Colorado following the 2016 NFL Draft, this Washington D.C. native played in 47 games and recorded 201 tackles (165 solo), eight tackles for loss, one forced fumble, a fumble recovery, three interceptions and 36 passes defended over his collegiate career. Over eight games played with five starts in 2016, he has recorded 41 tackles (34 solo), one forced fumble and eight passes defended.

STERLING MOORE

• Moore comes to New Orleans after spending the 2016 offseason and preseason with Buffalo and the 2015 campaign with Tampa Bay. The 5-10, 202-pound Southern Methodist product has started 23-of-61 career games while accumulating 141 tackles, five interceptions, 29 passes defended, five forced fumbles and three fumble recoveries. Over five games played in 2016 (four starts), he has registered 17 tackles (14 solo), one interception, four passes defended and one forced fumble.

B.W. WEBB

• Originally drafted by the Cowboys in the fourth round (114th overall) of the 2013 NFL Draft, Webb has logged 12 tackles (10 solo), one interception and a team-best nine passes defended over six games played with three starts for the Saints in 2016. Over eight games played with five starts in his rookie campaign, he has totaled 46 tackles (27 solo), one half sack, one forced fumble, one fumble recovery and five special teams stops.

JAIRUS BYRD

• Signed by New Orleans as a free agent from the Buffalo Bills in 2014, Byrd has been selected to three Pro Bowls. He has appeared in 98 career games with 90 starts, posting totals of 485 tackles (351 solo), four sacks, 23 INTs, 38 passes defended, 14 forced fumbles and six fumble recoveries. A second round draft pick (42nd overall) in 2009, Byrd has started all eight contests in 2016, recording 45 tackles (35 solo). On Oct. 30 against Seattle, he posted 10 tackles, tying for the most tackles he has posted in any game as a Saint, while his eight solo tackles were the most solo tackles in a game for his Saints career.

ROMAN HARPER

• Re-signed this offseason to the team where he established himself as one of the NFL's most physical defensive backs, Harper remains the only safety in team history to have been selected to two Pro Bowls. His 18 career sacks rank first among active DBs and are tied for ninth all-time. The Prattville, Ala. native has played in 148 career regular season games with 137 starts and has recorded 880 tackles (629 solo), 18 sacks, 11 INTs, 68 passes defended, 13 forced fumbles, five fumble recoveries and 42 special teams stops over 11 NFL seasons. In eight games played with one start in 2016, he has tallied seven tackles (four solo) and three special teams stops, contributing on both defense and special teams.

• The club's first-round draft pick in the 2013 NFL Draft after being a first-team All-American selection at the University of Texas, Vaccaro started all 16 games for the first time in his career in 2015, posting 136 tackles (87 solo), three sacks, five passes defended, two forced fumbles and his first career fumble recovery. • Lutz is in his first season with New Orleans, joining the team after originally being signed by the Baltimore Ravens as an undrafted free agent out of Georgia State following the 2016 NFL Draft. FG attempts, including a 57-yard field goal on Sept. 26 against Atlanta, the third-longest made field goal in franchise history, matching Kai Forbath's 57-yarder at Houston last year. He is also a perfect 27-of-27 on PAT attempts. On Oct. 16 against Carolina, he connected on a 52-yard game-winning field goal with :13 remaining to collect the first game-winning field goal of his career, the longest game-winning kick by a Saint since 1984. For his efforts in Week Six, he was named the NFC Special Teams Player of the Week. Following his four-for-four performance against Seattle on Oct. 30, he was once again named the NFC Special Teams Player of the Week, joining John Carney (2001) as the only Saints kickers to receive the honor twice in the same season.

P THOMAS MORSTEAD

• Morstead, the club's fifth round draft pick in 2009, was among the nation's top punters at SMU and has continued that trend as a Saint where he's posted career club-best 47.0 gross and 41.2 net punting averages. In Week One against Oakland, he played in his 111th career game, moving him into sole possession of 31st in club record books in games played, surpassing a tie with Tommy Barnhardt for most games played by a punter. In 2016, he has punted 30 times for 1,523 yards (50.8 avg.) and has placed 12 of his punts inside the 20-yard line.

FOLLOW THE LEADER

Thomas Morstead is the team's all-time leader in gross and net averages. His 43.2 net in 2012 ranks sixth all-time and he also has the seventh and eighth-highest figures. Morstead's career 41.2 net average ranks second in NFL record books since the statistic was first compiled in 1976. SAINTS POSTGAME NOTES

- With the win, New Orleans improves to 4-4. The Saints return to action next Sunday, Nov. 13 when they host the defending Super Bowl 50 champion Denver Broncos at the Mercedes-Benz Superdome. Kickoff is 12:00 p.m.
- New Orleans improves to .500 for the first time since they defeated the New York Giants 52-49 to move to 4-4 on Nov. 1, 2015. The win moves the Saints into sole possession of second place in the NFC South.
- With the win, the Saints collect their first win at Levi's Stadium on their first trip to the three-year old facility. New Orleans has now won regular season games in 54 stadiums, winning 17 of those contests on their first try.
- The win improves Head Coach Sean Payton's record against the 49ers in the regular season to 6-1, with his .857 winning percentage against San Francisco being his best against an opponent that has played Payton and the Saints at least five times during the head coach's tenure.
- New Orleans is now 23-11 when Payton has coached the Saints in his first time in a Stadium (including home games at Wembley Stadium and the Superdome).
- New Orleans scored 31 points in the first half, improving to 36-2 since 2006 when scoring at least 21 points in the opening half. It marked the fifth time in franchise history that the Saints have scored 30 or more points in the first half, going 4-1 in those games. It was their most points scored in a half since they scored 34 points in the first half against Indianapolis on Oct. 23, 2011.
- The 51 combined points in the opening half between the Saints (31) and 49ers (20) made the first half the highest scoring first half in the NFL this season. It was just the second game in the last eight seasons with a halftime score of at least 30-20, with the other coming in 2014 (Pittsburgh 35, Indianapolis 20).
- The Saints rushed for 248 yards on the day, the most they've rushed for in a game in 2016 and most they've rushed for in a game since they rushed for 249 yards at Cincinnati on Nov. 4, 1990. It was the 10th-highest rushing total in franchise history.
- QB **Drew Brees** played in his 225th-career regular season game, putting him in sole possession of 10th place in games played for NFL signal-callers. He was 28-of-39 for 323 yards and three touchdowns, posting his 101st game with at least 300 passing yards.
- **Brees** now has 55 career games with 300 or more passing yards and three or more passing touchdowns, the most in NFL history.

- Today marked **Brees'** 30th career game with at least 300 passing yards, three touchdowns with zero interceptions, the most in NFL history.
- **Brees** posted a passer rating of 122.1, marking his fourth-consecutive game with at least a 100.0 passer rating. The last stretch in which he did that was a five-game stretch from Dec. 13, 2015-Sept. 11, 2016. Brees has had stretches of at least four games with a 100.0 passer rating seven times in his career, all as a member of the Saints.
- RB **Mark Ingram** rushed for a career-long 75-yard touchdown in the second quarter, his second rushing score of the season and 28th of his career. The rush was the fourth-longest in Saints franchise history and longest since Deuce McAllister's 76-yard rushing touchdown at Philadelphia on Nov. 23, 2003. With his 28th rushing touchdown, Ingram moved into a tie with Chuck Muncie (1976-80) and Pierre Thomas (2007-14) for third on the franchise's all-time rushing touchdowns list.
- **Ingram** finished with 158 yards and the touchdown on 15 carries and added two receptions for 13 yards with a receiving touchdown, the third of his career. It was Ingram's first 100-yard rushing game of 2016, seventh of his career and first since Oct. 25, 2015 at Indianapolis.
- With seven 100-yard rushing games, **Ingram** is now tied with RB Chuck Muncie for fifth-most 100-yard rushing games in franchise history.
- WR **Michael Thomas** posted two touchdown receptions, including a 32-yard scoring grab in the fourth quarter. It was his first multi-touchdown of his career. He caught five passes for 73 yards and the two scores. It was the first two-touchdown game by a Saints rookie since Brandin Cooks (one receiving, one rushing) on Oct. 26, 2014 against Green Bay, and first two-touchdown receiving game for a Saints rookie since Kenny Stills on Oct. 27, 2013 vs. Buffalo.
- RB **Tim Hightower** made his first start of the season, rushing for 87 yards and one touchdown on 23 attempts. The rushing score was his fifth as a member of the Saints and the 29th of his career.
- WR **Brandin Cooks** finished with 66 yards on five receptions, including a long-catch of 28 yards.
- TE **Coby Fleener** caught three passes for 42 yards with a long-reception of 26 yards.
- LB **Craig Robertson** made the start, recording an interception of QB Colin Kaepernick in the first quarter, his first interception as a Saint and the seventh of his career. It was his first pick since Jan. 3, 2016 against Pittsburgh as a member of the Browns. He added five tackles (three solo) and two passes defended.
- LB **Nate Stupar** forced his second-career fumble, also recovering it to post his third-career fumble recovery, adding six solo tackles.
- Together with **Stupar's** interception last week against Seattle, it marked the first time that linebackers have recorded interceptions for the Saints in back-to-back games since Scott Shanle intercepted Matt Ryan at Atlanta on Nov. 13, 2011 and Will Herring intercepted Eli Manning against the New York Giants on Nov. 28, 2011.

- DT **Sheldon Rankins**, New Orleans' first round draft pick in the 2016 NFL Draft, made his first appearance of the season, posting one solo tackle.
- S **Kenny Vaccaro** forced a fumble in the fourth quarter, his fourth-career forced fumble and second this season. He added a team-high nine solo tackles.
- DE **Cameron Jordan** split a sack of Kaepernick, finishing with two total tackles.
- S **Vonn Bell**, who collected the other half of that split sack, tallied four tackles (three solo) and one fumble recovery, the first sack and fumble recovery of his career.
- S **Jairus Byrd** tallied eight tackles, seven of which were solo stops.

Opening comments:

“It was a good win. There were a lot of things that I’m sure when we watch the film we’ll have to clean up. But I thought, you know, we kind of hung in there when they came back the second quarter, third quarter and then, you know, we’re able to make enough plays in the end both defensively and offensively. We struggled a little bit in the kicking game and yet that’s a result of a lot of the guys that are playing a lot more downs on defense than special teams. So, we’ve got to be better at finding guys that can fill in, and that’s something or else that’s going to get us beat in a bigger game.”

Was it good to see New Orleans Saints RB Mark Ingram bounce back?

“It was fantastic. You know it was, he did a really good job. Guys up front played real well. Yeah, it was good to see him, especially early on. That was, I think, the first play of the drive. And you know, I’m sure when we watch it there are a lot of things well on that play.”

How important was it to win a game decisively and you know, not come down to the last second?

“Yeah, we don’t go into the game saying we need to win a game decisively. So, and for a good portion of that game it wasn’t decisively, but it was good to finish a game, and I think that would be a better way to phrase it.”

I saw you talk to New Orleans Saints WR Michael Thomas after his second touchdown catch. What have you thought of what he’s done and that catch?

“He’s doing well. Yeah, it was a good play by him. [New Orleans Saints QB] Drew [Brees] gave him a chance to make a play on the ball and you know, he just keeps impressing and he’s very conscientious. Those guys, all of them, those guys all are very competitive and want opportunities and we were able to make enough of them.”

How do you think New Orleans Saints CB Delvin Breaux looked? Are you guys managing him a little bit?

“Yeah, he had a series where he came out, a series and a half, which based on his snap count it was part of the plan, and same thing with [New Orleans Saints DT] Sheldon [Rankins]. I thought he played pretty well. Alright, thank you.”

How important do you feel like it was for you and for the team to win in a resounding fashion after a lot of the wins have been nail biters?

“It felt good to finally get into a four minute drive and run the ball the way we did really all day long, to secure the victory that way and go to a knee. It’s always nice to expect that it’s going to go down to the wire, you expect you’ll have to make plays at the end of the game and win. I mean, really throughout the whole game, you look at both sides of the ball with the defense coming up with some big turnovers and our ability to sustain drives to really control the game. I felt like up front and run the ball very effectively with both [New Orleans Saints RB] Mark [Ingram] and [New Orleans Saints RB] Tim [Hightower] and making some plays in the passing game as well. It was a well-rounded win.”

This is four out of five now. Are you getting the sense this team feels what it can be?

“Yeah, we do. Each week we get much better and it’s not you see the product on game day but it starts with our week of preparation. It starts with our week of proactive habits, how we prepare ourselves throughout the week, just the dynamics amongst the team as well. Anytime you have a new team, a young team, you have to find your way around a little bit early on and really learn how to win and be a pro. It’s just a process. I feel like we’ve got great veteran leadership on the team, but you’ve got some new faces. As you just pull it all together throughout the season, I feel like our best is yet to come. I feel like we’re starting to really find somethings that we’re really good at and really understand how to win. At the same time, I feel like there’s more. There’s more that we can accomplish and we can continue to become more efficient with certain things so we’re certainly not satisfied.”

You’ve been with Mark Ingram since he was a rookie. Talk about what was gratifying for you with him today.

“Listen, I know this about Mark; he’s a competitor and whenever he’s challenged he’s going to step up to the challenge. He certainly stepped up today in a big way. I love his makeup. Tim Hightower, too. Talk about the best teammates you could ever ask for when it comes to their work preparation, their mindset, and their attitude, and how they are on game day. Certainly their productivity. That was a tough situation last week where Mark gets taken out and Tim comes in and plays fantastic. Today, we obviously needed both of them. Mark came up with some huge runs. Obviously none bigger than that 75-yard run on that one play on the first drive during the second quarter. So, listen, I can’t say enough about Mark and the way that he responded after last week. Especially what he’s meant to us after the last few years. He’s been such a mainstay and he’s been really productive and really tough. I’ve watched him evolve as a running back and he’s always been a very natural runner, but what he does in the passing game, what he does in the protections, the kind of guy he is, there’s not a guy on the team that doesn’t love Mark Ingram. He’s the life of the party for us too. At practice, in the locker room, just keeping it light. He’s a great teammate all the way around.”

New Orleans Saints WR Michael Thomas amazed us with his touchdown. What did you see on the play?

“That was one where you just throw it up to the big man and let him make the play. He sure did, didn’t he? The ball’s juggling and going around and he was able to snatch it before he hit that ground hard and held onto it. He continues to grow and develop each and every week. That whole unit is really something else, that whole receiver unit.”

Tim Hightower told us the first thing he did was go over and tell Mark Ingram how proud he is of him. What does that say about the dynamic of those two guys regardless of their touches?

“I would say this; they motivate one another. There’s a drive, they’re happy for the other guy as they are for anybody when something good happens. They’re there for each other. I think they understand the big picture too, like man, we need both of you guys. There’s some days where maybe it’ll be Tim’s day last week and some days where it’ll be Mark’s day. At the end of the day you need both these guys. They both contribute so much, but it takes a special mindset and personality for that. I can’t say all running backs would be that way, but those guys are solid. They’re special.”

You’ve been a consistently elite quarterback in this league. What drives you and continues to drive you?

“I want to win. I want to win a championship. I want to see this team come together and do something special. We’re just going to take it one step at a time here. We’ve won four out of five and I think we’ve really grown over the last five weeks. I’m just excited about the second half of the season. Here we are halfway through at 4-4 and I feel like our best has yet to come. We’ve got some momentum now. The schedule doesn’t get any easier. We’ve got the defending champs coming to town in Denver, and then we’re on a short week at Carolina, a divisional opponent. You have to continue to find ways to win each and every week. At times do it with different guys, some young guys, guys get banged up and other

step into different roles that maybe they weren't anticipating at the beginning of the season. That's the nature of this business. You've got to step up and I feel like our guys have done a great job with that. I also know how much we need to continue to improve to get to where we want to go."

What does it say about Michael Thomas as a rookie to come in and earn that kind of trust from you throwing up balls and knowing he can come down with them?

"There's chemistry there, there's timing, there's all these things that just take time. With repetition you build that trust and we're building it. I think with each guy you've got a great skill set with the wide receiving corps and you try to spread the ball around to get those guys in position to succeed. I love looking at the sheet at the end of the game and each guy's got seven catches, six catches, five catches. It just so happened that Michael Thomas had two touchdowns today but in the past it's been [New Orleans Saints WR Brandin] Cooks, it's been [New Orleans Saints WR Willie] Snead, but that's the way our offense works. You never know whose day it's going to be but you give them opportunities."

Former NFL running back Marcus Allen had a chance to talk to the team last night. What was your biggest take-away from that and what was the message coming into today's game?

"Yeah, I've known Marcus for a long time, ever since I was a young player in this league. You know, I've been around it enough to know first of all, he's one of the greatest players to play the game in a running back position. He played longer than I think any running back's ever played at 16 years. So, it was funny he was talking about that and he actually asked me, 'You know, who's the oldest guy in the room?' last night. I got to raise my hand and say 16 years, so that kind of matches him at this point. But he had great words for us, great words. One of it was just talking about being a pro and how to conduct yourself and you know, what this game is all about. The relationships and the opportunity to win and we do it for each other and there was a lot of really great messages. I mean he's one of the best who ever played and you know, it was solid gold last night everything he had to say. It was awesome."

Did San Francisco 49ers QB Colin Kaepernick look a little more like the Kaepernick you remember maybe from previous--?

"He seemed to play really well today. You know, it's hard to keep up with the other side of the ball, but obviously they moved the ball at times, really well today. And obviously, he ended up with a ton of passing yards. Yeah they, we figured coming off the bye week they'd be rested and reenergized and ready to roll, which they were. But, I thought our defense did a pretty good job getting some pretty critical turnovers. You know, some good times for us offensively being able to cash in on those, it was good."

What improvements have you seen in the football team between the first quarter of the season and the second quarter?

“We are rushing the football more efficiently. Our time of possession and ball security numbers those I think are better. I also think when you look at those snaps defended. When I talk about that offense and defense complementary game, I would be willing to bet a considerable number of snaps we have defended in weeks 1-4, that number would be higher than 5-6-7-8. So that time of possession and all of the other things kind of fall in place there as well.”

When you drafted Michael (Thomas) and Vonn (Bell) from Ohio State, you said that they came from a big time program. Do you think that that helped them adapt as quickly as they seemed to have adapted?

“I would say yes. There is that level of competition and expectation that not only the major college level but I think a winning environment, which they have. It has helped them I’m sure.”

How important is Vonns’ (Bell) relationship with Roman Harper and how has that helped him with his performance?

“I think that the real big plus is that Roman provides a steady eye. He is smart, and outside of even the football. Just the day-to-day caring for your teammates and there is some wisdom that he impacts young players with. Not just in his position group either but throughout the roster.”

Can you explain how Marcus Allen came and talked to the team?

“That was just our thing. We will sometimes have a guest speaker. It worked out that he was in the area and we have done that before and he was outstanding.”

What has made the running game better over the past couple of weeks?

“I don’t know specifically. We have been in different types of games I would say then the first quarter of the season. When you fall behind it is a little bit more difficult to do. But we were ahead against Oakland and I think there has been a good balance. I think our players have fed off that too.”

So you are saying that you have been more opportunistic than earlier in the season in terms of trying to work the run game in?

“I don’t know if I am saying that. I think in the last four games we have probably called more running games (run plays). The Atlanta game is one where you are chasing and you are not having the same touches. I think the third down number, there is a handful of numbers that lead to more attempts and I think those have helped us. If you say opportunistic in regards to us being better and those number, I think there has been an improvement in the efficiency there and we have probably called more and the balance that we have played with.”

Do you think that when a turnover happens during a game, do the guys think it is a feeding frenzy and they think they can go and get more?

“It is certainly something they believe, they understand and they know the significance of possession in a NFL game. When there is one turnover you do the math and that’s why that statistic is so telling. That was good to see the takeaways yesterday and the (ball) security on the other side.”

Would you rather play Mark Ingram and Tim Hightower every week and have an alternation of duties like on Sunday?

“We will do what we need to do each and every week. It was good to see Mark run (well) just (as) a week before Tim gave us a jolt. We will look at each game and plan accordingly.”

Have you had a chance to review the defense’s overall performance yesterday?

“Yes. Otherwise I’m trying to figure out why I would be on the phone with you guys right after we talked yesterday.”

How did you come out of that? (Watching the defenses film)

“I think there is a period in that first quarter where we struggled with some big plays that were disappointing. Explosive plays that look too easy. “No, I don’t think so. There is a schedule we will follow coming off the road game in California and we will adjust with a quick turnaround.”

What gives you the confidence that this season you can get above .500?

“It’s a new year, new team a lot of guys with great character, a lot of guys are resilient and I feel like our team is just getting closer, we all love each other, care about each other and we go out every week trying to prepare ourselves to win each day, each rep and ultimately win the day so we can continue to improve and continue to get better and like I said we have lots of character, lots of those things in this locker room, coaching staff. Did yesterday’s interception work out exactly the same way that you thought it would?

“In a way, yes. I was just a hole-dropper and reading (Colin) Kaepernick’s eyes. His eyes took me right where I needed to be.”

What did you see in the second half that enabled you to slow them down offensively?

“I think the most important thing was that we just wanted to limit their explosive plays. Their explosive plays were mistakes on our end. I think in the second half we really tightened up and made sure that we didn’t have any mistakes so we can finish the game the way that we wanted to finish the game.”

Was there something that they were doing that was kind of unexpected that created those explosive plays against you guys?

“No, it was just mistakes on our end. It wasn’t anything that we didn’t expect. It’s just something where we’re still growing as a defense week-by-week, meshing together and you’re going to have that where you just have mistakes like that. It’s our job as a defense to limit those mistakes because mistakes in this league go for touchdowns. That was evident on both those plays.”

Do you get the overall sense that this defense is not only getting healthier but is moving in the right direction?

“Yes, I do feel like we are growing. I also feel like this team is playing complementary football. There were times when they had a couple of long drives – sometimes you get a little gassed

when the defense is on the field for a while. Our offense did a great job of running the ball, controlling the clock and letting us have time to rest. When you have that, you have a chance to be good when you get back onto the field and you're fresh."

How big was that strip fumble and recovery by Nate (Stupar) with your backs on your goal line in the third quarter?

"That is huge. That was very big on that play. It was definitely big for us as a defense."

Now that you are at 4-4, what is your approach as a team as you go through this second half of the season?

"To be honest, it's a one-game season for us. We have to take it week-by-week. We did a good job working our way back to 4-4. It doesn't mean anything if we don't capitalize. We have to keep the same focus that we have these past few weeks. It is just one game at a time and one play at a time."

You guys have two pretty tough opponents in a five-day stretch coming up; what do you think will be your guys approach?

"We are not focused on the two opponents. We are focused on just one at a time. We will focus on the next one when that game comes around. Right now, we're just focused on the Broncos. We are focused on just trying to play the best football that we can play."

What are the biggest differences that you have seen between the first quarter of the season and the second quarter of the season?

"The confidence you see in guys. Guys know that something is going to happen for us and we just have to fly around to the ball and just make something happen. Guys trust that and guys really believe it. It is something that they believe even in practice as well. Just the confidence, in not only older guys but young guys too, has really grown between the first half and the second half of the season thus far."
