THIS WEEK'S GAME

The Cardinals travel to Minnesota this week to take on the Vikings in the first of back-to-back road games for Arizona (Week 12 @ Atlanta). The Cardinals and Vikings are squaring off for the seventh time in the last nine years and Arizona is looking for its first road win at Minnesota since 1977.

This week's matchup against the Vikings begins a four game stretch vs. teams that currently hold a winning record and have combined for a 21-15-1 mark so far this season. Three of those contests - and five of Arizona's final seven games overall - will take place on the road. The Cardinals are making their first-ever appearance at U.S. Bank Stadium on Sunday.

Following a bye in Week 9, the Cardinals opened the second half of the 2016 schedule with a 23-20 victory over the San Francisco 49ers last week at University of Phoenix Stadium. Arizona took an early 14-0 lead and led 20-10 at the end of the first half but - aided by three second half turnovers by the Cardinals - San Francisco tied the game at 20 with just under two minutes remaining in regulation. Arizona was able to respond on the game's closing drive, going 69 yards in 12 plays in the final 1:55. K Chandler Catanzaro connected on a 34-yard FG as time expired to even the Cardinals record at 4-4-1 on the year. RB David Johnson went over 100 yards from scrimmage for the ninth consecutive game and scored both a rushing and receiving TD in a game for the first time in his career. QB Carson Palmer threw for a season-high 376 yards as a pair of Arizona WRs, Larry Fitzgerald (12 for 133) and Michael Floyd (5 for 101) went over 100 yards receiving.

The defensive effort was led by LB Chandler Jones and DT Calais Campbell. Jones took down 49ers QB Colin Kaepernick twice for his first multi-sack game as a member of the Cardinals. Campbell finished with three tackles, a sack, a tackle for loss and six QB pressures.

Minnesota fell to 5-4 on the year following a 26-20 loss to Washington at FedEx Field. Down 14-0 early in the second quarter, the Vikings fought back to take a 20-14 lead entering halftime. However, the Redskins scored the game's final 12 points on four FGs to seal the victory.

Next week Arizona travels to Atlanta to take on the NFC South-leading Falcons. Minnesota heads to Detroit for an appearance on Thanksgiving day.

THE HIGHLIGHTS

- --This week the Cardinals travel to Minnesota to face the Vikings. It will mark Arizona's first appearance at U.S. Bank Stadium, leaving the Colts Lucas Oil Field as the only current venue in which the Cardinals have yet to play.
- —The Cardinals enter this week's game with a 6-0 record against teams from the NFC North under head coach **Bruce Arians**, including a 1-0 record vs. Minnesota.
- --The contest between Arizona and Minnesota this week features two of the league's top defenses. The Cardinals have the NFL's #2 ranked defense (295.2 ypg) and #3 ranked scoring defense (17.8 ppg). The Vikings defense is ranked #3 overall (308.8 ypg) and #1 in scoring defense (16.9 ppg).
- --Arizona has an 11-2 record in the month of November under Arians.
- --Last week, WR **Larry Fitzgerald** became the third-youngest player in NFL history to reach 14,000 career receiving yards while also moving up to sixth place on the NFL's all-time receiving yardage list.

–In his 14 career starts dating back to Week 13 of 2015, RB **David Johnson** leads the NFL in scrimmage yards (1,871), rushing yards (1,202) and TDs (15).

CARDS-VIKINGS CONNECTIONS

<u>Vikings Connections</u>
Cardinals Assistant Head Coach/Offense **Tom Moore** was an assistant with the Vikings from 1990-93, serving as assistant head coach/QBs in 1990, assistant head coach/offensive coordinator in 1991 and then as WRs coach from 1992-93, where he helped Hall of Famer Cris Carter earn his first Pro Bowl selection in 1993. A native of Owatonna, MN and an All-American QB at Rochester (MN) High School, Moore was inducted into the Rochester, Minnesota Sports Hall of Fame in 2005. He also served two stints as offensive coordinator at the University of Minnesota, from 1972-73 and then again from 1975-76.

Cardinals CBs coach **Kevin Ross** was the Vikings assistant secondary coach from 2003-05. Prior to that, he also coached for the Vikings during 2002 training camp as part of the NFL's Minority Coaching Program.

Cardinals Assistant Director of Pro Scouting Malik Boyd played for the Vikings from 1994-95 and later served as a Vikings scouting intern in

Cardinals Director of College Scouting $\mbox{Dru Grigson}$ signed with the Vikings as a rookie free agent in 2003.

Minnesota Connections

Cardinals WR Larry Fitzgerald was a ball boy for the Vikings while he was growing up in the mid-90's. While he was helping the team, Fitzgerald befriended WRs Cris Carter and Randy Moss, who went on to teach Fitzgerald some of the tricks of the trade. Born in Minneapolis, MN, Fitzgerald attended Academy of the Holy Angels High School and was a two-time All-State and prep All-America receiver.

Cardinals WR Michael Floyd is from St. Paul, MN and attended Cretin-Derham Hall High School where he was twice named Minnesota's Gatorade Player of the Year and Associated Press Minnesota Player of the Year. He was also named the High School Athlete of the Year for the St. Paul area by the St. Paul Pioneer Press as a senior in recognition of his play in football and basketball.

Cardinals Executive VP/Chief Operating Officer Ron Minegar served as the director of corporate sales for the Minnesota Timberwolves and Target Center from 1991-95. Minegar left the Timberwolves to be the VP of business operations for the Minnesota Moose, an expansion franchise in the International Hockey League. He earned a Master's degree in Business Administration from the Carlson School of Management at the University of Minnesota and still has a home in Apple Valley, MN.

Cardinals Assistant Special Teams/Assistant TEs coach Steve Heiden is from Rushford, MN and began his coaching career as tight ends coach at Concordia University in St. Paul in 2012.

Cardinals Assistant Equipment Manager Steve Christensen is from St. Cloud, MN.

<u>Arizona Connections</u>
Vikings DE **Everson Griffen** is from Avondale, AZ and attended Agua Fria High School, where he was a Consensus All-American. He was named Super Prep and Scout.com Player of the Year as well as the Gatorade Circle of Champions Player of the Year for Arizona.

Vikings P **Jeff Locke** graduated from Mountain Ridge High School in Glendale, where he was a Parade All-American and was selected to play in the Under Armour All-American Game.

From 1998-99, Vikings Assistant Special Teams coach **Ryan Ficken** played WR at Arizona State University.

Vikings Chief Operating Officer **Kevin Warren** is a native of Tempe, AZ and played basketball at Grand Canyon University. He went on to earn his MBÁ from Arizona State University in 1988. His father, Morrison, played football at Arizona State in the 1940s and was inducted into the ASÚ Sports Hall of Fame in 2009.

<u>College/Pro Connections</u>
Vikings Head Coach **Mike Zimmer** coached Cardinals DT **Frostee Rucker** from 2008-11 as the defensive coordinator of the Bengals. Rucker then played for the Browns while Vikings Interim Offensive Coordinator Pat Shurmur was Cleveland's head coach in 2012.

From 2010-14, Cardinals G Mike Jupati and Vikings G Alex Boone were teammates with the 49ers.

Cardinals QB Drew Stanton and Vikings QB Shaun Hill were teammates with the Lions from 2010-11.

Cardinals WR **Michael Floyd** (2008-11) played at Notre Dame with Vikings TE **Kyle Rudolph** (2008-10) and S **Harrison Smith** (2007-11).

Cardinals DT Robert Nkemdiche and Vikings WR Laquon Treadwell were part of the same recruiting class at Ole Miss in 2013 that was ranked among the best in the nation, and they were teammates with the Rebels from 2013-15 before being selected in the first round of the 2016 draft.

CARDS VS. VIKINGS - THE SERIES

This week's matchup between the Cardinals and Vikings marks the 25th alltime regular season meeting between the two teams in a rivalry that dates back to 1963. The Vikings hold a 13-11 advantage in the all-time series

This week's contest marks the Cardinals first visit to the newly-opened U.S. Bank Stadium and their fourth regular season visit to Minnesota in the last seven years. Arizona is looking for its fifth-ever road win against the Vikings and first since 1977. The Cardinals won their first four road games in the series vs. Minnesota but have dropped seven in a row heading into this week.

The 2016 season represents the seventh time the Cardinals and Vikings have squared off in the last nine years. They faced each other in five consecutive seasons between 2008 and 2012. The two teams met in Week 14 last season at University of Phoenix Stadium when the Cardinals held on for a 23-20 victory.

Bruce Arians

Two-time NFL Coach of the Year (2012, 2014), Bruce Arians is in his fourth season in Arizona and 24th season coaching in the NFL. Arians became an NFL head coach for the first time when the Cardinals hired him on January 17, 2013. Arizona has posted a 39-20-1 record (including postseason) under Arians, who is just the 10th coach in NFL history to post three straight 10+ win seasons in his first three years as a head coach in the NFL. Including his tenure as interim head coach with Indy in 2012, Arians has posted a 47-21-1 regular season record as head coach. Among active NFL head coaches, only Bill Belichick (53) and Pete Carroll (50) have more wins in his last 69 games.

Hired as the ninth head coach in Vikings franchise history on January 15, 2014, Mike Zimmer is in his third season at the helm in Minnesota and 23rd season as a coach in the NFL. Coming off a 2015 campaign in which he led the Vikings to an 11-5 record and first division title since 2009, Zimmer has the Vikings at 5-4 and in second place in the NFC North this season. Zimmer has a 23-18 record in the regular season as head coach in Minnesota. Prior to taking over with the Vikings, Zimmer spent the previous 14 seasons as a defensive coordinator with Dallas (2000-06), Atlanta (2007) and Cincinnati (2008-13). Zimmer has been a part of 12 playoff teams in his NFL tenure and teams that have won eight division titles.

LAST WEEK'S GAME

CARDINALS 23, 49ers 20

November 13, 2016 - University of Phoenix Stadium (65,127)

Coming off their bye, the Cardinals opened the 2nd half of the season at home against the 49ers. They took a 14-0 lead early in the 2nd quarter but allowed SF to stay close and the Niners eventually tied the game at 20 with 1:55 left. However, that was enough time for AZ to move into position for a game-winning FG try and Chandler Catanzaro's 34-yarder won it as time expired. The victory upped the Cards record to 4-4-1 and kept them in the thick of the playoff race while SF dropped its 8th straight to fall to 1.8

game-winning FG try and Chandler Catanzaro's 34-yarder won it as time expired. The victory upped the Cards record to 4-4-1 and kept them in the thick of the playoff race while SF dropped its 8th straight to fall to 1-8.

The 49ers seemed intent on not letting the Cards beat them on the ground which opened up AZ's passing game. Larry Fitzgerald caught 12 passes for 133 yards while fellow WR Michael Floyd also eclipsed 100 yards (5-101). Both delivered athletic and critical receptions throughout the game including on the game-winning drive. Carson Palmer threw for 376 yards while David Johnson scored 2 TDs. The team's traded punts on the game's first 4 drives before AZ opened the scoring with a 3-yard Palmer-to-Johnson TD pass on 3rd-n-goal. Later in the 1st quarter, Jeremy Kerley fumbled a SF punt return and Gabe Martin recovered at the AZ44. A defensive pass interference call on the next snap moved it 38 yards to the SF 18 and on the next play Johnson burst down the left sideline, diving to the pylon for another TD. The Niners answered on the ensuing drive by moving 75 yards in 6 plays and Kerley's 17-yard TD catch of a Colin Kaepernick pass made it 14-7. After the teams traded FGs, AZ led 17-10 with 1:32 remaining in the 1st half and got the ball back at its own18 and 2 timeouts. Palmer then completed 7 of 8 passes for 68 yards – including 3 for 40 yards to Floyd – as part of an 81-yard drive that ended with a 19-yard Catanzaro FG as the half expired.

The Cards were poised to add to their 20-10 lead early in the 3rd when a flea flicker to Fitzgerald picked up 33 yards to the SF7 but 2 plays later Palmer lost a fumble on a sack by LB Eli Harold. The 49ers would convert the turnover into a 53-yard Phil Dawson FG that made it a 7-point game. Late in the 3rd Palmer appeared to hit WR JJ Nelson for a key pick-up but instead the pass ricocheted off Nelson's chest to S Fric Reid for an INT. The 49ers did not capitalize and with 3:24 left, the Cards held a 20-13 lead and had it near midfield. But Palmer was INT'd by

NATIVE SONS RETURN

When the Cardinals travel to Minnesota to take on the Vikings this week, two of the most highly decorated prep athletes ever to come out of the Twin Cities - WRs Larry Fitzgerald and Michael Floyd - will be facing their hometown team in their home state. Both are natives of Minnesota, where they were also All-State and All-American WRs during their prep careers.

Floyd grew up in St. Paul and attended Cretin-Derham Hall High School, which is less than 10 miles from Fitzgerald's prep alma mater, Academy of the Holy Angels, in Minneapolis.

BOTH HAVE TIES TO THE VIKINGS

Fitzgerald grew up around the Vikings organization, serving as a ball boy for the team during the tenure of Dennis Green. Including preseason, this week's trip will mark the seventh time Fitzgerald has played against the Vikings in Minnesota. His 172-yard performance on 11/26/06 remains his career-high for receiving yards in the regular season.

Floyd - who is making his third trip back to Minnesota (2012, 2014) - also has history with the Vikings organization. In 2007 he was named to the Vikings High School All-State team, and he served as the honorary captain for the Vikings-Bears Monday Night showdown in Week 15 that season.

FIRST TIME AT U.S. BANK STADIUM

The Cardinals will make their first appearance at the newly-opened U.S. Bank Stadium this Sunday when they take on the Vikings. That will leave the Colts Lucas Oil Stadium as the only current venue in the NFL in which the Cardinals have yet to play.

WEEK 11 - HEISMAN WINNING QBS COLLIDE

When Arizona and Minnesota face off on Sunday, there will be a battle of former Heisman Trophy winners who were selected first overall in the NFL Draft - Cardinals QB Carson Palmer (2002 Heisman winner; 1st overall selection in 2003) and Vikings QB Sam Bradford (2008 Heisman winner; 1st overall selection in 2010).

Palmer and Bradford are two of nine Heisman Trophy winners active in the NFL. They are two of just four active Heisman winners who were drafted first overall, joining Bucs QB Jameis Winston and Panthers QB Cam Newton.

After facing Bradford this week, Palmer will have faced all three other QBs in a span of nine games this season. This week's game marks the third time in the last four seasons Palmer and Bradford have squared off.

Palmer and Bradford are among 19 former Heisman winners selected first overall in the NFL Draft, dating back to the University of Chicago's Jay Berwanger in 1936.



A RECORD PACE CONTINUES

RB **David Johnson** totaled 101 yards from scrimmage (55 rushing, 46 receiving) against the 49ers last week. In doing so, <u>he extended his franchise record for consecutive games with 100+ yards from scrimmage to nine games. Johnson's nine consecutive games with 100+ yards from scrimmage is the longest active streak in the NFL.</u>





With his performance against the 49ers last week, <u>Johnson became the first NFL player to post 100+ yards from scrimmage in each of the first nine games of a season since Edgerrin James did so with Indianapolis in 2005.</u>

His 1,213 scrimmage yards in 2016 are the most in franchise history through the first nine games of a season and they also rank second in the NFL in 2016.

Now in his second season, Johnson has made just 14 starts in his NFL career. He has posted 100+ yards from scrimmage in 13 of those contests. The lone exception was the 2015 regular season finale vs. Seattle (59 yards) when he had just two touches in the second half.

In his 14 career regular season starts dating back to Week 13 of '15, Johnson leads the NFL in scrimmage yards (1,871), rushing yards (1,202) and TDs (15).

Johnson ranks fourth in the NFL with 760 rushing yards this season. He leads all NFL RBs in receiving yards (453) this season and ranks second in receptions (40) behind Pittsburgh's Le'Veon Bell (45).

PLAYER OF THE MONTH

RB **David Johnson** was named the "NFC Offensive Player of the Month" for his performance in October, becoming just the third player in franchise history to be named "Offensive Player of the Month" and the first RB to do so.



Johnson finished the month of October with an NFLhigh 726 yards from scrimmage (488 rushing, 238 receiving) while tying for the NFL lead with five rushing

TDs and ranking third in the league with 488 rushing yards. He was the only player in the NFL who totaled 100+ yards from scrimmage in five games during the month of October and Johnson (3) joined Ezekiel Elliott (3), De-Marco Murray (3) and Jordan Howard (3) as the only players in the NFL to rush for 100+ yards in at least three games last month. Johnson averaged 145.2 yards from scrimmage in his five games in October, including a season-high 185 yards in Week 5 at San Francisco on Monday Night Football and 171 yards in Week 7 vs. Seattle on Sunday Night Football.

Besides Johnson, the Cardinals have had a Player of the Month eight other times since the award began in 1986: Lomax (October, 1988), Esiason (November, 1996), S Kwamie Lassiter (November, 2001), K Neil Rackers (October and December, 2005), PR Patrick Peterson (November, 2011), ST Justin Bethel (December, 2014) and S Tyrann Mathieu (November, 2015).

Last season Johnson was selected as the NFL's "Rookie of the Month" for December/January. He was also named "NFC Offensive Player of the Week" for his performance in Week 5 at San Francisco.

23 TDS IN 25 GAMES

RB **David Johnson** scored two TDs against the 49ers last week, a three-yard TD reception in the first quarter and an 18-yard TD run in the second quarter. It was his first career game with both a rushing and receiving TD.

Johnson now has 23 career TDs in 25 games, extending his franchise record for a player in his first two seasons.

Last week's game was Johnson's seventh career multi-TD performance. That is the most in the NFL dating back to last season. No other player in the NFL has more than five.

JOHNSON JOINS ELITE COMPANY

In his career, Johnson has 17 rushing TDs, five receiving TDs and one kickoffreturn TD. He is one of three players in NFL history – Pro Football Hall of Famer Gale Sayers and Abner Haynes – to have at least 15 rushing TDs, five receiving TDs and a kickoff-return TD in his first two NFL seasons.

DOUBLE-DIGIT TOUCHDOWNS IN FIRST TWO SEASONS

Following his two-TD performance against the 49ers last week, Johnson now has 10 TDs on the season (9 rushing, 1 receiving). He is the first player in franchise history to post 10 TDs in each of his first two seasons (had franchise rookie-record 13 TDs in 2015).

Johnson now joins Larry Fitzgerald (3 straight from 2007-09), Stump Mitchell (2 straight in 1984-85) and Roy Green (2 straight in 1983-84) as the only players in team history with 10+ TDs in consecutive seasons.

Johnson is just the eighth Cardinals player – and first since Anquan Boldin (10) in 2008 – to score at least 10 TDs in the first nine games of a season.

Johnson is the only player in Cardinals history to post 100+ rushing yards and three or more rushing TDs in a game multiple times in their career.

In addition to being the only player in Cardinals history to have multiple games with 100+ yards rushing yards and three TD runs, Johnson is the first NFL player with two such games within his first two seasons since Adrian Peterson, who had two such games in his rookie season in 2007.

CARDS HIT WITH INJURIES

In the Cardinals Week 8 game at Carolina, both T Jared Veldheer (triceps) and TE **Ifeanyi Momah** (wrist) suffered season-ending injuries and were placed on injured reserve. They became the 9th and 10th Arizona players to be placed on injured reserve this season.

Veldheer had started all 43 games (including postseason) at left tackle since signing with the Cardinals as a free agent in 2014.

All-Pro S Tyrann Mathieu also suffered a shoulder injury in Carolina that kept him out of last week's game vs. San Francisco.

Of the 53 players on the Cards Week 1 roster, 11 (20.7%) are no longer on the active roster, including four players who were in the starting lineup in Week 1 (Veldheer, G Evan Mathis, TE Troy Niklas and S Tyvon

Arizona has had 24 players combine to miss 69 games due to injury so far this season, with Mathieu, Veldheer, Momah and CB **Tharold Simon** missing their first game last week vs. San Francisco.

A DECADE OF DISTINCTION

The Cardinals have been in the Bidwill family since Pro Football Hall of Famer Charles Bidwill purchased the team in 1933. Charles' son Bill handled day-to-day operations for decades before passing the torch to his son, Michael, who is now in his 10th season as team President.

Since Michael Bidwill took over as President in 2007, the Cards have gone .500 or better in seven of nine seasons (just twice in previous 20 years) and posted four double-digit win seasons (none in previous 20).



The 2015 season was a banner year for the organization as the team won the NFC West, set a franchise record for wins in the regular season (13) and earned the first postseason bye in team history.

Of the Cardinals seven all-time postseason wins, five have come during Bidwill's nine years as team President. Arizona has played in nine postseason contests since Bidwill took over in 2007. The Cardinals played just seven total playoff games in their entire history prior to his tenure.

Michael spearheaded the effort that led to the creation of University of Phoenix Stadium, which preceded that aforementioned run of on-field success. The Cardinals have sold out all 112 games played (preseason and post-season included) and the stadium since it opened in 2006; in 18 years at Sun Devil Stadium, just 12 games were sold out in time to be televised locally.

The Cardinals success under Bidwill has greatly elevated the team's popularity both locally and nationally. That fact is best measured in the record-setting ratings for Cardinals game broadcasts. Locally, the team established a host of franchise record for the TV broadcasts in both 2015 and 2014. Nationally, the team's exposure is at an all-time high. Having never appeared in more than three primetimes games in a single season, the Cardinals played an unprecedented five primetime games during the 2015 regular season and posted a perfect 5-0 record those matchups.

Michael was also the driving force behind the critically-acclaimed series "All Or Nothing" that debuted on Amazon Video in July of this year.

Michael was pivotal not only in helping Arizona land Super Bowl XLIX - the second in eight seasons at University of Phoenix Stadium — but he also secured the 2015 Pro Bowl. Played a week apart, the game delivered a record economic impact of \$720 million to the region.

KEIM LAYS THE FOUNDATION

The Cardinals are coming off three consecutive 10+ win seasons in **Steve Keim**'s first three years as GM. As soon as he was elevated to the position in January of 2013, Keim began re-shaping the roster.

The overhaul during his first three years was dramatic – and resulted in a 34-14 record in that span. During his first 36 months as GM, Keim made 592 roster moves, including 182 moves in 2015 as the Cards established a franchise record for wins (13).



He was named Pro Football Talk's Executive of the Year in both 2013 and 2014, and added Sporting News Executive of the Year in 2014.

The 2015 campaign was one of the most successful seasons in franchise history. In addition to establishing a record for wins, the team also set franchise marks for total offense, points scored and total TDs. Arizona had the NFL's #1 ranked offense last season, and the Cardinals finished with a defense that ranked in the top five as well. The roster that has accomplished those feats was built from the

PUTTING TOGETHER A PRO BOWL ROSTER

All seven Arizona players selected to the Pro Bowl in 2015 - special teamer Justin Bethel, DT Calais Campbell, WR Larry Fitzgerald, G Mike Iupati, S Tyrann Mathieu, QB Carson Palmer and CB Patrick Peterson - are back this season.

In the offseason, the Cardinals acquired 2015 Pro Bowl LB **Chandler Jones** in a trade with the Patriots. The team also signed G **Evan Mathis** (2013 and 2014 Pro Bowler) in free agency.

Arizona has nine players on its roster who have been selected to the Pro Bowl, including eight who were chosen in 2015.

During each of his first three offseasons as GM, Keim signed a free agent who went on to make the Pro Bowl that season (Mike Iupati-2015, Antonio Cromartie-2014, John Abraham-2013). The Cardinals were the only team in the NFL to accomplish such a feat.

Long History with the Organization

Keim was promoted to General Manager on January 8, 2013 after 14 seasons in the Cardinals organization.

The 43-year old originally joined Arizona in May, 1999 as a college scout in the east. He was promoted to Director of College Scouting in 2006, Director of Player Personnel in 2008, and then was promoted to Vice President, Player Personnel in May, 2012.

NINE DAYS - TWO GREAT HIRES

In a nine-day span in January of 2013, Cardinals President **Michael Bidwill** hired GM **Steve Keim** (Jan. 8) and head coach **Bruce Arians** (Jan. 17). In the resulting three seasons, the Cardinals won more games (34) than any other three-year span in franchise history.

In January of 2013 there were eight head coach openings. None were hired later than Arians and four of the eight no longer hold those jobs. Keim was one of seven GMs hired in January of 2013. On the seven, only he and Carolina's Dave Gettleman had their teams in the postseason in both 2014 and 2015.

TWO-TIME COACH OF THE YEAR

Bruce Arians was named the Associated Press 2014 NFL Coach of the Year after leading the Cardinals to an 11-5 record and a berth in the postseason.

It marked the second time in three years Arians was awarded NFL Coach of the Year honors (Indianapolis, 2012). He became the first coach in NFL history to be named Coach of the Year multiple times in a three-year span with multiple teams.

Arians is one of 12 coaches in NFL history to win the award multiple times and the sixth to be honored with multiple teams. He is also one of just six coaches in NFL history to earn AP Coach of the Year honors twice in a three-year span.

In 2012, Arians was named NFL Coach of the Year after serving 12 games as the Colts interim head coach while Chuck Pagano was treated for leukemia. He led the Colts to a 9-3 record and a playoff berth while tying the NFL record for the most wins ever by an interim coach.

Arians and the Panthers Ron Rivera have combined to win the last four AP Coach of the Year awards.

A STRONG 1ST IMPRESSION

Now in his fifth NFL season and fourth season with the Cardinals, James Bettcher is in his second year as the team's defensive coordinator. After he was promoted to the position in February of 2015, Bettcher led one of the league's highest-rated units.

Under their first-year coordinator the Cardinals defense was a major factor in the team's 13-3 record in 2015. Arizona finished the 2015 season with the NFL's fifth-ranked defense.

A QUICK ASCENT

Bettcher was elevated to defensive coordinator in just his fourth season as an NFL coach, having entered the league in 2012. After nine years in the college ranks, he was hired by the Colts to serve as special assistant to the head coach/outside linebackers coach. When Bruce Arians was hired as head coach in Arizona in 2013, he named Bettcher his linebackers coach, a position he held for two seasons before his promotion to defensive coordinator in 2015.

ATHLETIC TRAINER PROGRAM IN AZ

The NFL Foundation, in collaboration with Gatorade, the National Athletic Trainers' Association (NATA), the Korey Stringer Institute (KSI) and the Professional Football Athletic Trainers Society (PFATS), recently announced the launch of a pilot program to provide funding to public high schools with football programs that have limited or no access to an athletic trainer. The program is an expansion of the athletic trainer initiatives developed and implemented by the NFL Foundation and its partners over the past two years.

The NFL Foundation will award up to 150 grants to high schools in the four pilot states – Arizona, Illinois, Oklahoma and Oregon. Each grant will be in the amount of \$35,000 awarded over a three-year period to fund an athletic training program.

"This is an initiative that was originally developed at the team level in which the Cardinals participated and our community has benefitted," said Cardinals President and NFL Foundation board member Michael Bidwill. "The NFL Foundation is excited to expand the athletic trainer pilot program so that more high schools and athletes can benefit from it. NFL teams have long recognized the value and expertise of athletic trainers and this program will help provide similar support at the high school level."

YEAR 2 OF THE BIDWILL FELLOWSHIP

Prior to the 2015 season, the Cardinals established the Bill Bidwill Coaching Fellowship, a program to provide recently-retired NFL players with the opportunity to gain coaching experience at the highest level. The inaugural participant was former Pro Bowl LB Levon Kirkland, who returned for his second season in 2016 assisting LBs coach Bob Sanders as the OLBs coach.



As Cardinals owner, Bill Bidwill has long been at the forefront in providing opportunities to individuals re-

gardless of race or gender. In 2010, he was honored with the Fritz Pollard Alliance's Paul "Tank" Younger Award for promoting diversity in the NFL. In 1978, Adele Harris became the first African American female executive in the NFL when she was hired as the Cardinals director of community relations. In 1981, Bidwill hired attorney Bob Wallace, making him the first African American to handle contract negotiations for an NFL club.

Arizona was also the first NFL team with an African American GM-head coach tandem (Rod Graves/Dennis Green, 2004), and from 2013-14 the Cardinals were the only NFL team whose offensive and defensive coordinators were both African American (Harold Goodwin & Todd Bowles).

FROM 32ND TO 1ST UNDER GOODY

When Harold Goodwin was named the Cardinals Offensive Coordinator in 2013, he was handed the reins of an offense that - in 2012 - finshed the year as the league's 32nd ranked unit. Things changed quickly under his watch.

In 2015 - his third at the helm of the offense - the Cardinals had the top ranked offense in the NFL for the first time in franchise history. The team also set team single-season records for points (489), TDs (59), TD passes (35), total net yards (6,533), first downs (373) and first downs passing (237).

• After finishing the 2014 season ranked 31st in the NFL in rushing, ranked 8th overall in 2015. Marked the first time since 1984 (9th overall) that the Cardinals finished a season ranked in the top 10 in the NFL in rushing.

• Scored at least 30 points in a franchise record nine games in 2015. Arizona's nine games with 30+ points were the most in the NFL.

• Averaged an NFL-high 6.28 yards per play (6,533 yards on 1,041 plays). The Cards easily led the NFL in average yards per pass play (7.84) last season.

The Cardinals gave up just 27 sacks on 562 pass attempts in 2015. Arizona's

27 sacks allowed tied for the fourth-fewest in the NFL last season.

A Decade With Arians

The 2016 season is the 10th consecutive season Goodwin has worked under Bruce Arians. The two previously coached together with Pittsburgh (2007-11) and Indianapolis (2012). Goodwin served as an offensive assistant with the Steelers and was the Colts offensive line coach.

ALL 23 COACHES RETURN

All 23 members of the Cardinals coaching staff in 2015 are back for the 2016 season.

--Fitzgerald has 36 TD receptions in the 2^{nd} quarter and 31 in the 4^{th} quarter. He has more TDs - of any kind - in both the 2^{nd} and 4^{th} quarters than any other active player in the NFL. His 23 TDs in the 3^{rd} quarter are tied with Vikings RB Adrian Peterson for the most in the NFL.

--Fitzgerald also has 32 career go-ahead TD receptions. Among active NFL players, only Antonio Gates (38) has more.

--Gates (109), Fitzgerald (103) and Peterson (102) are the only active players in the NFL with at least 100 TDs. All three have played their entire careers with one team.

<u>Combined with his 10-catch outing in Week 8 at Carolina, Fitzgerald now has 10+ receptions in back-to-back games for the first time in his career.</u> Fitzgerald joins Anquan Boldin (2 straight in 2005 and 2008) as the only players in franchise history with 10+ receptions in back-to-back games in a season.



DOMINANT IN THE POSTSEASON

During the 2008 postseason, WR Larry Fitzgerald had the most prolific playoff run of any wide receiver in NFL history. He shattered NFL records for receiving yards in a single postseason (546), receptions (30) and TDs (7). Fitzgerald recorded four 100-yard games in the postseason as well, a new NFL record for consecutive games with 100-yards receiving.

In the Divisional matchup vs. Green Bay last season, Fitzgerald looked just as dominant. He caught eight passes for 176 yards and scored the game-winning TD in the Cardinals OT victory over the Packers. His 176 receiv-



<u>ing yards set a new franchise postseason record.</u> Fitzgerald surpassed his own franchise record of 166 yards at Carolina (1/10/09) in the 2008 Divisional round.

<u>Fitzgerald is the only player in NFL history to average at least 100+ receiving yards and a TD in every game played in the postseason.</u>

<u>Fitzgerald has more receiving yards (942) than any player in NFL history through his first nine career postseason games.</u>

The win over Green Bay marked Fitzgerald's fifth career 100-yard game in the playoffs. Only Jerry Rice (8) and Michael Irvin (6) have more 100-yard receiving games in the postseason than Fitzgerald.

Fitzgerald has 150+ receiving yards in three postseason games in his career. He is the only player in NFL history with at least three games of 150+ receiving yards in the playoffs.

Fitzgerald and Hall of Fame WR Fred Biletnikoff (2 straight in 1968) are the only players in NFL history with 150+ receiving yards in back-to-back postseason games.

Fitzgerald had 170 yards and a TD receiving in the second half/OT against the Packers. No player in NFL history had more receiving yards in the second half/OT of a postseason game. The previous record was 157 yards by Jerry Rice on 1/22/89 vs. Cincinnati in Super Bowl XXIII.

Fitzgerald now has at least one TD reception in six of nine playoff games. He is one of just seven players in NFL history with at least 10 TD receptions in the postseason. Only Hall of Fame WRs Jerry Rice (22) and John Stallworth (12) have more TD receptions in the postseason.

Of the seven players in NFL history that have at least 10 career TD receptions in the postseason, only Fitzgerald (9) has played in fewer than 15 career playoff games.

HEADING TO THE HALL?

Below is a look at the career of Larry Fitzgerald through his first 195 career games compared to the 25 modern era WRs currently in the HOF and where they stood at that point in their career.

At this point in his career, Fitzgerald has more receptions (1,086) than all of the receivers enshrined in Canton had through 195 games except for Marvin Harrison (1,102 in 190 career games). Fitzgerald also has more receiving yards (14,053) than all HOF receivers through 195 games played except Jerry Rice (16,918) and Harrison (14,580 in 190 career games).

In fact, Fitzgerald's career numbers already surpass those of many receivers that are currently in the HOF. He has more career receptions than 21 of the 25 receivers in the HOF: Swann (336), Hayes (371), Pihos (373), Lavelli (386), Hirsch (387), Fears (400), Warfield (427), McDonald (495), Mitchell (521), Stallworth (537), Alworth (542), Biletnikoff (589), Berry (631), Maynard (633), Taylor (649), Irvin (750), Joiner (750), Lofton (764), Largent (819), Monk (940) and Reed (951).

He has more career receiving yards than 22 of the 25 receivers in the HOF: Fears (5,397), Swann (5,462), Pihos (5,619), Lavelli (6,488), Hirsch (7,029), Hayes (7,414), Mitchell (7,954), McDonald (8,410), Warfield (8,565), Stallworth (8,723), Biletnikoff (8,974), Taylor (9,110), Berry (9,275), Alworth (10,266), Maynard (11,834), Irvin (11,904), Joiner (12,146), Monk (12,721), Largent (13,089), Reed (13,198), Carter (13,899) and Lofton (14,004).

A Career Full of Accomplishments:

- Franchise career leader in receptions (1,086), receiving yards (14,053), receiving TDs (103), total TDs (103) and 100-yard receiving games (42). His seven 1,000-yard seasons are also a franchise record.

FLOYD GOES FOR 100

Fifth-year WR **Michael Floyd** - the Cardinals first round selection (13th overall) in the 2012 NFL Draft - caught five passes for 101 yards against the 49ers last week, including a key 26-yard reception on the Cardinals game-winning drive in the fourth quarter.

It was Floyd's 12th career 100-yard outing and first of the 2016 season.

Dating back to last season, Floyd now has 100+ receiving yards in six of his last 17 regular season games. Prior to that 17-game stretch, Floyd had posted 100+ receiving yards six times in 55 career games.

FLOYD HAULS IN 22ND TOUCHDOWN VS. THE JETS

Floyd caught his 20th career TD pass in Arizona's victory over the Buccaneers in Week 2. It was a one-yard reception from QB Carson Palmer in the second quarter, the shortest TD catch of his career.

In Week 4 vs. the Rams, Floyd hauled in TD reception #21 when he caught a 5-yarder from Palmer in the second quarter. In Week 6 vs. the Jets, Floyd hauled in his third TD reception of the season - and 22nd of his career - with a nine-yarder in the fourth quarter.

Prior to this season, Floyd had made a habit of covering long distances on his receptions in the NFL - especially his TD catches. Last season, he posted a teamhigh nine receptions of 30+ yards, including catches of 49, 45, 41 and 32 yards in the final four games.

Of his 22 career TD receptions, 13 have covered at least 20 yards.

NELSON HEATING UP IN 2016

Second-year WR J.J. Nelson - the team's fifth round selection (159th overall) in the 2015 NFL Draft out of Alabama-Birmingham - had one of the best games of his NFL career against the Panthers in Week 8, hauling in a career-high eight receptions for 79 yards and a career-high two TDs. Prior to his outing against the Panthers, Nelson's career-high for receptions in a game was four - and he had just two TD receptions in 17 career games.

With injuries hitting the Cardinals WR corps, Nelson has been given a bigger role in the offense and has responded with his production. He has 13 receptions for 192 yards and two TDs in the last three games - after totaling just four receptions for 35 yards in his first five games played this season (missed Week 2 with a shoulder injury).



Against Seattle in Week 7, Nelson hauled in three receptions for a game-high 84 yards, including a 40-yard reception in overtime.

For the season, Nelson has 17 receptions for 243 yards and two TDs, and is averaging 14.3 yards per catch.

Nelson Shined When Called Upon as a Rookie

Nelson seizing his opportunities this season isn't a surprise, as he did the exact same thing as a rookie in 2015, when he saw an increased role against the Bengals in Week 11 due to an injury to WR Michael Floyd. Nelson responded with four receptions for a game-high 142 yards (35.5 avg.) against Cincinnati, including a 64-yard TD catch in the third quarter. Nelson's 142 receiving yards were the most by a rookie in a game in 2015.

Last year, Nelson had 11 receptions for 299 yards and two TDs. He averaged 27.2 yards per catch. Nelson's 11 receptions in '15 covered 38, 20, 12, 23, 64, 36, 19, 19, 34, 22 and 12 yards.

BROWN BREAKS OUT AGAINST THE RAMS

After missing the vast majority of training camp and preseason action due to a concussion, WR **John Brown** got off to a slow start in 2016. Through the first three games he totaled eight receptions for 92 yards.

That changed in Week 4 against the Rams. <u>Brown</u> more than equaled those totals in the first half vs. <u>Los Angeles, when he had eight receptions for 95 yards at the halfway point.</u> Brown finished the game having tied a career high with 10 receptions for 144 yards. It marked his fourth career 100-yard outing.



After catching just two passes total in the first two

games this season, Brown has at least four receptions and 49 yards receiving in four his last six outings. When Brown missed the Cardinals Week 7 game vs. Seattle due to hamstring issues, it was the first game he has missed in his NFL career.

Brown Shines in First Two Seasons

In his first two seasons NFL seasons, Brown - the team's third round selection (91st overall) in the 2014 NFL Draft - was a potent weapon in the Arizona passing attack.

In his first 31 career games, he registered 113 receptions for 1,699 yards and 12 TDs. In franchise history, only three players had more receptions than Brown in their first two seasons (Larry Fitzgerald-161, Anquan Boldin-157, Frank Sanders-121).

Brown entered the league with a record-breaking season as a rookie in 2014, setting an NFL rookie record with four game-winning TD receptions. In 2015, despite being hampered by a hamstring injury, he totaled 65 receptions for 1,003 yards and seven TDs. Brown posted the biggest game of the season - and his career - in Week 6 at Pittsburgh, when he hauled in a career-high 10 receptions for a career-high 196 yards.

A PAIR OVER 1,000

WRs **Larry Fitzgerald** (1,215) and **John Brown** (1,003) both went over 1,000 yards receiving in 2015. It represented just the fifth time in team history - and first time since 2009 - that the Cardinals had multiple receivers go over 1,000 yards in a single season.

For Fitzgerald, it was his seventh career 1,000-yard season. Of the five seasons in which the Cardinals had multiple 1,000-yard receivers, Fitzgerald has been involved in four of them.

A PRO BOWL TALENT

CB Patrick Peterson earned his fifth Pro Bowl selection - and fourth at cornerback - (Kick Returner, 2011; Cornerback, 2012-15) in 2015. He was also named first-team All-Pro at corner for the second time in his career (2013, '15).

He joins RBs Jim Brown, Barry Sanders and Emmitt Smith as the only players in NFL history to be chosen to five Pro Bowls before their 26th birthday. He is the only defensive player in NFL history to earn that distinction.



He has proven to be one of the most unique talents in NFL history. His most important role has been as a shutdown CB in the AZ secondary.







Peterson Back-to-Back Games with INT - Keeps Climbing Franchise List Combined with his INT of Jameis Winston in Week 2, Peterson's one-handed, highlight reel interception against the Bills in Week 3 gave him an INT in back-to-back games for the first time since the 2013 season.

It also gave him 19 INTs for his career, tied for 16th on the franchise all-time list.

MATHIEU OUT WITH SHOULDER INJURY

S **Tyrann Mathieu** had started every game this season and had just recently begun to display the form that made him a Defensive Player of the Year candidate in 2015 when he suffered a should injury against the Panthers in Week 8 that kept him out of last week's game vs. San Francisco.

Working his way back from the knee injury that ended his 2015 campaign early, Mathieu began playing his normal safety spot closer to the line of scrimmage for the first time in Week 5 at San Francisco. In the Cardinals victory over the Jets in Week 7 he led the team with six tackles, two passes defensed and also recorded his first INT of the 2016 campaign.



All-Pro Season Cut Short in 2015

Mathieu had an All-Pro season in '15 despite the torn ACL he suffered while recording an INT at Philly in Week 15. Mathieu was named to his first career Pro Bowl and earned first-team All-Pro honors from the Associated Press.

In 14 games played last season, Mathieu registered 89 tackles, a team-high 16 passes defensed, 5 INTs (TD), 11 tackles for loss and a forced fumble. His five INTs were tied for third in the NFC at the time of the injury.

MATHIEU'S 2015 SEASON HIGHLIGHTS

NFC Player of the Month

Mathieu was named the "NFC Defensive Player of the Month" for his performance in November. He helped lead the Cardinals to an undefeated record in November (4-0) by posting 27 tackles (24 solo), two INTs and five passes defensed. He became just the second player in team history to be named "Defensive Player of the Month" (Kwamie Lassiter, 2001).

Wreaking Havoc in the Division

In five division games last season, Mathieu registered four INTs (1 TD), 33 tackles, eight passes defensed and a forced fumble. Mathieu finished the Cardinals Week 12 victory over San Francisco with a career-high 13 tackles, an INT, two passes defensed and a tackle for loss.

Shining in Primetime

Mathieu finished the Sunday Night Football matchup against the Eagles in Week 15 with five tackles, an INT and a pass defensed. In the Cardinals five primetime wins this season Mathieu had 34 tackles, four tackles for loss, a sack, two INTs and six passes defensed.

A Career Performance Against the Niners in Week 3

Mathieu played the best game of his NFL career against the 49ers in Week 3, finishing with five tackles, a tackle for loss and two INTs. He returned the first of his two INTs 33 yards for a TD. Mathieu was named NFC Defensive Player of the Week for his effort against the Niners.

COOPER MATCHES CAREER TOTAL

On September 2nd the Cardinals acquired fourthyear CB **Marcus Cooper** in a trade with the Kansas City Chiefs. Just 16 days later, seeing his first action at CB vs. Tampa Bay (played 5 snaps on special teams in the season opener), <u>Cooper established a</u> <u>career-high with two INTs against the Buccaneers</u> <u>and earned NFC Defensive Player of the Week honors for the first time in his career.</u>



He returned his second INT 60 yards for a TD in the third quarter to give the Cardinals a 33-7 lead.

After hauling in his third INT of the season in the fourth quarter of the Cardinals win in San Francisco in Week 5, Cooper has as many INTs in his last eight games (3) as he had in his entire NFL career (40 games).

Cooper is one of 12 players with at least three INTs this season.

In acquiring Cooper earlier this season, the Cardinals sent a conditional seventh round pick in the 2018 NFL Draft to the Chiefs. Cooper originally entered the league as a seventh round selection (252nd overall) by the 49ers in the 2013 NFL Draft. He was released and claimed on waivers by the Chiefs were he appeared in 39 games (11 starts) between 2013-15.

JONES HAVING AN ALL-PRO YEAR

When the Cardinals completed a trade with the Patriots to acquire Pro Bowl LB **Chandler Jones** in March, they acquired one of the NFL's premier pass rushers. Through the first nine games this season, Jones has more than lived up to his billing as one of the league's premiere perimeter defenders.

Through nine games, Jones has 32 tackles, nine tackles for loss, a team-high 7.0 sacks, two forced fumbles, two fumble recoveries, nine QB pressures and a team-high 17 QB hits. <u>According to ProFootballReference.com</u>, Jones is the only player in the NFL this season with at least 7.0 sacks, two forced fumbles and two fumble recoveries.



In the Cardinals victory over the 49ers last week, Jones recorded four tackles, 2.0 sacks, two tackles for loss and two QB hits. It marked his 11th career multi-sack performance and first as a member of the Cardinals.

AMONG THE NFL SACK LEADERS

Since entering the NFL in 2012, Jones has collected 43.0 sacks, 12 forced fumbles, four fumble recoveries and 247 tackles.

He joins Houston's J.J. Watt, Denver's Von Miller, Washington's Ryan Kerrigan and Cincinnati's Carlos Dunlap as the only five players in the NFL with 200+tackles, 40+ sacks and 10+ forced fumbles since 2012.

Dating back to the 2013 season, his second in the NFL, Jones now has 37.0 sacks. That is the fifth-best total in the NFL during that span.


With the Cardinals in 2016, Jones had at least one sack in each of the first four games of a season for the first time in his career.

A VERSATILE DEFENDER

When the Cardinals selected **Deone Bucannon** in the first round (27th overall) of the 2014 NFL Draft, he became just the second safety ever selected by the team in the first round - and first since 1978.

As a rookie in 2014, Bucannon was named the PFWA's All-Rookie team at safety after recording 75 tackles, 2.0 sacks, a forced fumble and a fumble recovery. What made Bucannon so unique during his inaugural season was his ability to play inside the box as a dollar linebacker.

Bucannon flourished in that role again last season as the team utilized a player with a rare combination of size and speed.



<u>In his second NFL season, Bucannon led the team with 127 total tackles</u>. He also tied for the team lead with 17 tackles for loss, while adding three forced fumbles, two fumble recoveries, three sacks and an INT he returned 39 yards for a TD. Bucannon led or tied for the team lead in tackles in eight of 16 games last season and he had at least seven tackles in 12 of 16 games.

According to Stats, Inc., Bucannon and Carolina first-team All-Pro LB Thomas Davis were the only players in the NFL last season with 100+ tackles, 3.0+ sacks, an INT, and at least three forced fumbles.

In Week 5 at San Francisco this season, Bucannon established a new career high with 15 total tackles. Two games later he matched that total, as he finished the game against the Seahawks in Week 7 with 15 tackles. After totaling 21 tackles through the first four games, Bucannon now has 53 tackles in the last five contests - including three games with 10+ tackles.

GOLDEN BEGINS ON A SACK SPREE

Second-year LB **Markus Golden** registered 2.0 sacks of 49ers QB Blaine Gabbert in Week 5, giving him <u>at least one sack in each of the first five games this season. That represents the longest streak in franchise history to begin a season and it tied the second-longest streak in franchise history overall.</u>

The streak came to an end in Week 6 vs. the Jets.

Despite playing in just nine games this season, Golden has already established a career-high with 6.0 sacks (had 4.0 in 15 games as a rookie in 2015). He joined DE Curtis Greer (6.5 in 1983) as the only players in franchise history with at least 6.0 sacks through the first five games of a season.

Both Golden and teammate Chandler Jones enter Week 11 among the top-10 in the NFC in sacks.

Before he was held without a sack in Week 6 against the Jets, Golden had at least a partial sack in seven consecutive games dating back to last season. He has 9.0 sacks in his last 14 games overall, after totaling 1.0 sack in his first nine career games.

Golden also finished the game vs. San Francisco with career-highs in both tackles (11) and sacks (2.0) while adding three tackles for loss.

Through the first nine games this season, Golden has totaled 40 tackles, nine tackles for loss, 6.0 sacks, a pass defensed, two forced fumbles, 14 QB pressures and 11 QB hits.

CAMPBELL'S HISTORIC PERFORMANCE

DT **Calais Campbell** posted one of the best games of his NFL career in the Cardinals victory over San Francisco in Week 5. His final tally was four tackles, 2.0 sacks, two tackles for loss, two QB hits, an INT and a safety.

Since individual sacks became an official statistic in 1982, Campbell became just the second player with 2.0+ sacks, an INT and a safety in a game, joining Baltimore's Adalius Thomas (2.0 sacks, INT, safety) who did so on 9/17/06 vs. Oakland.





ONE OF THE BEST IN THE GAME

In December of 2015, CB Justin Bethel signed a three-year contract extension that keeps the three-time Pro Bowler in Arizona through the 2018

The Cardinals sixth-round selection (177th overall) in the 2012 NFL Draft, Bethel has been named to the Pro Bowl as a special teamer each of the last three seasons. During his first three NFL seasons, Bethel registered 54 special teams tackles, a fumble recovery and three blocked FGs. He led the team with 14 special teams tackles again last season. No other player on the team had more than seven.



- <u>Career Highlights</u>
 •The Cardinals first selection of the sixth round (177th overall) of the 2012 draft, Bethel has played in all 72 games in four-plus seasons and totaled 74 special teams tackles, three blocked FGs, three forced fumbles and two fumble recoveries on special teams. He has led the team in special teams tackles each of the last three years, including a career-best 21 in 2013.
- Joins current Cardinals radio analyst Ron Wolfley (1986-89) as the only players in franchise history to earn multiple Pro Bowl selections as a special teams player.
- Saw most significant playing time on defense of his career in 2015, starting five games during the season and both playoff contests. Totaled 29 tackles, two INTs (one returned for TD) and nine passes defensed.
- Signed three-year contract extension with the Cardinals on 12/5/15 that keeps him under contract through the 2018 season.

ARIZONA BLOCK PARTY

Dating back to 2008, the Cardinals have blocked an NFL-high 19 FG attempts. After registering three blocked kicks in '14, Arizona registered multiple kicks in seven consecutive seasons (2008-14), including five seasons with at least three blocks in that span.

Just like the attempt in Dallas, Houston was attempting a FG on the final play of the first half. With the Texans leading 17-14, Randy Bullock lined up for a 40-yard attempt with four seconds remaining in the second quarter. Bethel came off the edge to blocked the attempt, and Arizona would come back to win the game by three points (27-24).

9/15/13 vs. Detroit

The Cardinals trailed the Lions 21-19 early in the fourth quarter when Bethel blocked a 47-yard FG attempt by Detroit's David Akers. Two possessions later, Arizona scored the go-ahead TD in the 25-19 win.

Campbell with a Half Dozen

Standing 6-8, Campbell has blocked six FG attempts in his career, the most recent coming in Week 1 of the '12 season vs. Seattle.

During the 2011 season, Campbell tied Seattle's Red Bryant for the NFL lead with three blocked FGs.

Game 1 Patriots 23, CARDINALS 21

September 11, 2016 - University of Phoenix Stadium (64,864)

Facing the Patriots on Sunday Night Football, the Cardinals suffered a season-opening loss at home reaching the Patriots on Sunday Night Poolibal, the Cardinals stuffered a season-opening loss at nome after missing a go-ahead FG try from 47 yards out with 41 seconds remaining. Arizona had clawed back from an early deficit to take a 1-point 4th quarter lead on the second of Larry Fitzgerald's two TDs. They were the 99th and 100th career scores for the future Hall of Famer who finished with 81 yards on 8 catches. But the Patriots answered. Making his 1st career start while filling in for a suspended Tom Brady, QB Jimmy Garoppolo led the Pats on a scoring drive and they went ahead 23-21 on a FG with 3:44 to go. When AZ could not convert its FG try on the ensuing drive, the game was decided in favor of the undermanned Pats, who were without Brady, TE Rob Gronkowski and a number of others.

The Patriots scored on their first two possessions of the game to take a 10-0 lead. First Garoppolo capped an 8-play, 74-yard drive with a 37-yard TD pass to an open WR Chris Hogan down the left sideline. Then Steven Gostkowski's 47-yard FG on the next drive made it 10-0. Arizona's first 3 offensive possessions ended in punts before momentum turned with an Arizona takeaway. With 10:30 to go before Chandler Jones recovered in NE territory. A celebration penalty pushed it back to the AZ46 but the Cards were still in business. They moved to the NE3 in 10 plays - 6 of which were David Johnson runs – before Palmer connected with Fitzgerald on a TD to make it 10-7 at the half.

Patriots

Palmer connected with Fitzgerald on a TD to make it 10-7 at the half.

New England opened the 3rd quarter by moving 75 yards in 9 plays and went ahead 17-7 on an 8-yard LeGarrette Blount TD run. A Cards punt turned it back to NE with 7:00 to go in the 3rd. However, a Blount fumble forced by DT Frostee Rucker on the next snap was recovered by DT Calais Campbell at the NE33. Five plays later, David Johnson punched it in from a yard out to trim the deficit to 17-13. A 53-yard Gostkowski FG with 12:35 remaining made it 20-14. On the next drive, an incredible run from Johnson covered 45 yards to the NE 12; he initially was stopped at the line of scrimmage, spun outside, steadied himself with a hand on the ground and raced down the right sideline. Four plays later, a sliding, over-the-shoulder TD catch from Fitzgerald in the corner of the end zone put AZ up 21-20 with 9:46 left. The Pats, who were 10-16 on 3rd down in the game converted 3 straight on the next drive as they moved 61 yards who were 10-16 on 3^{rd} down in the game, converted 3 straight on the next drive as they moved 61 yards for a go-ahead FG that proved to be the game-winner.

Six seconds into the 2nd quarter, Fitzgerald's 4-yard TD catch opened the scoring. On the 2nd play of the next series, Winston's pass intended for Vincent Jackson was INT'd by Cooper who returned it to the TB19 and set-up a 22-yard Chandler Catanzaro FG. Down 10-0, the Bucs advanced to the AZ29 with 3:06 left before halftime and faced a 2nd-n-9. However Winston had the ball jarred loose in the pocket by a teammate and S Tony Jefferson recovered at the AZ32. A key 27-yard completion to WR Jaron Brown on 3rd-n-10 took it to the TB40, a 16-yard David Johnson run took it to the 25, and a 24-yard pass to Fitzgerald – initially ruled a TD – took it to the one. Palmer's TD pass to WR Michael Floyd on 3rd down made it 17-0 with 1:30 til intermission. Three Tampa incompletions ran just :17 off the clock and after the punt, AZ took over at its own 16 with 1:05 left. It was more than enough time for another TD as Palmer connected deep with WR Jaron Brown on a 51-yard scoring strike that made it 24-0 at the half.

In week 4, Arizona hosted the Rams for the first time since their move to Los Angeles. Like most In week 4, Arizona nosted the Rams for the first time since their move to Los Angeles. Like most match-ups between the clubs, it was a close, physical affair that came down to the wire. AZ led in most statistical categories (26-12 in 1st downs, 420-288 in total yards) but it was the Rams who made more pivotal plays and secured a win that upped their record to 3-1 and dropped the Cards to 1-3. WR John Brown led all receivers (10-144) and RB David Johnson had 124 scrimmage yards (83 rushing/41 receiving), becoming the 1st player in franchise history with 100+ in each of the season's 1st 4 games.

The scoring began when LA struck late in the 1st quarter. On 3rd-n-7 from his own 35, Rams QB Case

The Cards forced a 3-n-out on the subsequent Rams drive and regained possession at their own 20 with 1:48 left before intermission. Game 5 CARDINALS 33, 49ers 21 October 6, 2016 - Levi's Stadium (70,178)

This Thursday night tilt in San Fran was a match-up of 1-3 teams desperate for a win. The Cardinals were on the road with just three days of preparation and without starting QB Carson Palmer who suffered a concussion the previous Sunday. But Arizona came through with a series of game-changing plays and again relied heavily on the combination of 13th-year WR Larry Fitzgerald and 2nd-year RB David Johnson. Those two combined for 266 of AZ's 296 yards from scrimmage and scored all 4 Cardinals TDs. Defensively, AZ sacked 49ers QB Blaine Gabbert 7 times – 2 each for DT Calais Campbell & LB Markus Golden - and also came up with 3 key takeaways. Cards back-up QB Drew Stanton delivered a mistakefree, 2-TD game and was sacked just once. All of it added up to a 33-21 Cardinals victory.

While the teams would ultimately combine to score 54, points were hard to come by early as the game's first 9 possessions ended in punts. San Fran got on the scoreboard late in the 2nd quarter thanks to a 10-play, 87-yard TD drive that ended with a 9-yard Gabbert TD pass to WR Jeremy Kerley; it was the 4th connection between the two on the drive. San Fran held onto that 7-0 at the 2:00 warning and faced a 3rd-n-10 at its own 24. But Cards LB Chandler Jones then batted Gabbert's pass in the air and Campbell snatched it for an INT that gave AZ the ball at the SF21. On the very next snap, Stanton and Fitzgerald

hooked up on a 21-yard TD pass that tied the game going into intermission.

On the opening kickoff of the 2nd half, TE Ifeanyi Momah delivered an impressive and athletic play on kick coverage when he forced and recovered a fumble by Niners KR Chris Davis setting AZ up at the SF14. It appeared AZ would have to settle for a FG but a running-into-the-kicker penalty gave the Cards a fresh set of downs. They quickly took advantage on the next snap when Johnson ran it in from 4 yards out to give AZ a 14-7 lead. After a San Fran 3-n-out, the Cards moved 71 yards in 6 plays and went up 21-7 midway through the 3rd on a 21-yard Stanton pass to Fitzgerald. San Fran responded with its own lengthy drive, an 11-play, 82-yarder that ended with Carlos Hyde's 1-yard TD run. Down just 7, the 49ers soon got the ball back but on the 1st play of the 4th quarter, CB Marcus Cooper recorded his 3rd INT in 4 games and returned it to the SF24. That led to a 36-yard Catanzaro FG that again made it a two-score game. Another 3-n-out by the Niners was followed by a long AZ drive that consumed nearly half of the 4th quarter. On it the Cards passed once - a 21-yard catch-n-run by Johnson - and rushed 11 times including Johnson's 2-yard TD plunge that made it 31-14. The Niners added a late TD on a 1-yard Gabbert run but the Cards added the game's final points with 1:17 left when Campbell sacked Gabbert in the end zone for a safety.

Game 6 CARDINALS 28, Jets 3 October 17, 2016 - University of Phoenix Stadium (64,709)

In a Monday night home game against the Jets and former coordinator Todd Bowles, the Cards controlled the game from beginning to end. NY entered the night with the NFL's #2 ranked run defense, allowing just 68.4 rushing yards/game and had surrendered just 1 rushing TD in 5 games. But despite starting 2 back-up guards, the Cards offense was committed to the run and RB David Johnson rushed for 111 yards and 3 TDs. Overall, AZ enjoyed a 171-33 edge in rushing yards and did not give up a sack or commit a turnover. The defense surrendered just 230 total yards while recording a pair of takeaways and limiting the Jets to 2 for 13 on third down. It all added up to a decisive 25-point win that evened Arizona's record at 3-3 and gave the Cards their first win since 1975 over the Jets, who fell to 1-5 after dropping their

4th straight.

The Cards opened the scoring on their 2nd offensive possession of the game. On the first play after taking over at their own 42 following a Jets punt, Johnson patiently picked his way past several tackles at the line of scrimmage and exploded for a 58-yard TD jaunt down the left sideline. His run gave AZ its first points in the1st quarter in 2016. The Jets trimmed it to 7-3 early in the 2nd quarter when Nick Folk's 39-yard FG capped a 7-play, 50-yard drive. On the ensuing drive, AZ moved 75 yards in 11 plays and punctuated it with a 2-yard Johnson TD run. The Cards took that 14-3 lead into the halftime locker room.

After the Jets opened the 3rd quarter with a 3-n-out, AZ took over at its own 32. The Cards would chew more than half of the 3rd quarter off the clock with a 14-play drive that ended with Johnson's 3rd rushing TD of the game, this one from 2 yards out. Down 21-3, the Jets moved deep into AZ territory on their next possession but on 3rd nor from the A714 safety DJ Swearinger INT'd a Ryan Fitznatrick pass in the end

of the game, this one from 2 yards out. Down 21-3, the Jets moved deep into AZ territory on their next possession but on 3rd-n-7 from the AZ14, safety DJ Swearinger INT'd a Ryan Fitzpatrick pass in the end zone to kill the threat. For the 2nd straight possession, the Cards would launch a 14-play drive, this time moving 89 yards thanks in large part to four John Brown receptions that gained 47 yards. It ultimately ended when Carson Palmer and WR Michael Floyd connected on a 9-yard TD pass. Fitzpatrick was then pulled in favor of Geno Smith for what would be NY's final possession of the game. It ended when safety Tyrann Mathieu intercepted Smith to cap the complete team win.

Palmer returned to action after missing the previous game (concussion) and completed 23 of 34 passes for 213 yards; he had a TD but no INTs and was not sacked. Larry Fitzgerald was again the game's leading receiver with 6 catches for 49 yards. Referee Jerome Boger and his crew also played a prominent role in the game, marching off 19 total penalties for 147 yards.

The Cards hosted Seattle in a pivotal week 7 showdown on Sunday Night Football. A Seahawks win would give them a 5-1 record and commanding lead atop the NFC West. An AZ win would pull the Cards to within half a game of the division lead approaching the season's midway point. But in one of the most unusual and unbelievable games in recent memory, the teams would leave University of Phoenix Stadium with neither a victory nor defeat. They fought to a 3-3 tie through 4 quarters before each squad hit a FG on its opening possession of overtime. Improbably, though, the teams would trade misses on short gamewinning FG tries to close the extra period and the contest ended in a rare 6-6 tie. It was the first tie in Seahawks history and Arizona's first since 1986.

By nearly every statistical measure, the Cardinals dominated the game. They ran 90 offensive plays to Seattle's 57, owned a huge time of possession advantage (46:21-28:39) and against the league's #11 defense had a 443-257 edge in total yards. RB David Johnson carried much of the offensive load with 131 rushing yards and 58 receiving. Defensively, Arizona was completely dominant. AZ forced punts on the 1¹⁸¹ nine Seattle possessions and didn't allow Seattle to cross midfield until a 4¹⁹ quarter blocked punt set them up at the 22. But the Cardinals could not capitalize and let multiple opportunities for points slip away. The first of those came early in the 2¹⁰¹ quarter when they reached the SEA21 but Chandler Catanzaro's 39-yard FG try was blocked by LB Bobby Wagner who leapt over the long snapper. It was initially penalized but the flag was picked up by referee Terry McAulay. A 46-yard Catanzaro FG on the next AZ possession would put the Cards up 3-0. They had a chance to add to the lead right before the half after reaching the SEA25 but a Seattle sack resulted in the half expiring before the Cards could try a FG.

On their opening drive of the 3¹⁰ quarter, the Card

FG try with just seconds remaining was wide left and the game ended deadlocked at 6.

Game 8 Panthers 30, CARDINALS 20 October 30, 2016 - Bank of Stadium (74,088)

A week after battling the Seahawks for 75 minutes in a 6-6 Sunday night tie, the Cardinals traveled across the country for an early Sunday game against the Panthers who were coming off a bye. A rematch of the previous year's NFC Championship Game, Carolina scored the game's initial 24 points. The first 7 of them came on the contest's opening drive when officials mistakenly awarded Carolina a 46-yard fumble return TD on a play that was actually an incomplete forward pass. Two short Jonathan Stewart TD runs and a Graham Gano FG made it 24-0 with 2:45 left in the 1st half. But the Cards gamely battled back and while they outscored the Panthers 20-6 the rest of the way, it was not enough to make up the entire deficit. The loss dropped AZ to 3-4-1 at the season's midway point while Carolina improved to 2-5.

On the 5th play of the game, Carson Palmer was under pressure and tossed a short pass forward to David Johnson that fell incomplete. However, referee Walt Coleman and umpire Carl Paganelli ruled it a fumble that LB Thomas Davis returned 46 yards for a TD. Despite a technical issue that kept the network feed from the instant replay booth, replay official Lou Nazzaro chose to confirm the ruling on the field rather than stop the game for Coleman to review it. The Cards would then pick up just 2 first downs on their next 4 possessions - all of which ended in punts - while the Panthers added to their early lead. With 2:45 left in the 1st half and down 24-0, the Cards moved 75 yards in 9 plays as Palmer's 5-yard TD pass to

The Panthers added Gano FGs on their opening 2 drives of the 3rd quarter to go up 30-7. After a Panther 3-n-out, AZ found itself with a 1st-n-10 at the Carolina 46 to start the 4th quarter. But Coleman and his crew flagged the Cards on 3 straight plays to kill that drive. Their next would start at their own 8 but Palmer moved them 92 yards in 14 plays and with 5:01 left, another TD pass to Nelson made it 30-20 after the 2-point try failed. With3:19 left, a Stewart fumble forced and recovered by S Tony Jefferson gave it to AZ at the CAR40. However, on the next play Palmer was INT'd at the line by DT Kony Ealy to dash any comeback hopes. Palmer would finish with 363 yards passing and 3 TDs but was under duress much of the afternoon and was sacked 8 times. Game 9 CARDINALS 23, 49ers 20 November 13, 2016 – University of Phoenix Stadium (64,709)

Coming off their bye, the Cardinals opened the 2nd half of the season at home against the 49ers. They took a 14-0 lead early in the 2nd quarter but allowed SF to stay close and the Niners eventually tied the game at 20 with 1:55 left. However, that was enough time for AZ to move into position for a game-winning FG try and Chandler Catanzaro's 34-yarder won it as time expired. The victory upped the Cards record to 4-4-1 and kept them in the thick of the playoff race while SF dropped its 8th straight to fall to 1-8.

The 49ers seemed intent on not letting the Cards beat them on the ground which opened up AZ's passing game. Larry Fitzgerald caught 12 passes for 133 yards while fellow WR Michael Floyd also eclipsed 100 yards (5-101). Both delivered athletic and critical receptions throughout the game including on the vital game-winning drive. Carson Palmer threw for 376 yards while David Johnson scored 2 TDs.

The team's traded punts on the game's first 4 drives before AZ opened the scoring with a 3-yard Palmer-to-Johnson TD pass on 3rd-n-goal. Later in the 1st quarter, Jeremy Kerley fumbled a SF punt return and Gabe Martin recovered at the AZ44. A defensive pass interference call on the next snap moved it 38 yards to the SF 18 and on the next play Johnson burst down the left sideline, diving to the pylon for another TD. The Niners answered on the ensuing drive by moving 75 yards in 6 plays and Kerley's 17-yard TD catch of a Colin Kaepernick pass made it 14-7. After the teams traded FGs, AZ led 17-10 with 1:32 remaining in the 1st half and got the ball back at its own18 and 2 timeouts. Palmer then completed 7 of 8 passes for 68 yards – including 3 for 40 yards to Floyd – as part of an 81-yard drive that ended with a 19-yard Catanzaro FG as the half expired.

The Cards were poised to add to their 20-10 lead early in the 3rd when a flea flicker to Fitzgerald picked up 33 yards to the SF7 but 2 plays later Palmer lost a fumble on a sack by LB Eli Harold. The 49ers would convert the turnover into a 53-yard Phil Dawson FG that made it a 7-point game. Late in the 3rd Palmer appeared to hit WR JJ Nelson for a key pick-up but instead the pass ricocheted off Nelson's chest to S Eric Reid for an INT. The 49ers did not capitalize and with 3:24 left, the Cards held a 20-13 lead and had it near midfield. But Palmer was INT'd by LB Gerald Hodges and the 49ers took over at their own 43 with 3:13 remaining. By the 2-minute warning they had reached the AZ4 and on 3rd-n-2 from there, Kapernick ran it in to tie the game at 20. After the kickoff, the Cards took over at their own 15 with 1:51 left and 3 timeouts. Palmer would complete 4 of his next 6 passes for 60 yards to move into FG range. The first of those completions was a huge leaping catch by Floyd near the sideline that moved it from the AZ15 to 41. AZ ultimately advanced to the SF16 before Catanzaro hit the 34-yard game-winner at the gun.
