BALTIMORE RAVENS (5-4) AT DALLAS COWBOYS (8-1)

WEEK 11: SUNDAY, NOVEMBER 20, 2016 • 1 P.M. ET • AT&T STADIUM (80,000)



JUST THE FACTS

- This Sunday at AT&T Stadium, the Baltimore Ravens, winners of two-consecutive contests, battle the Dallas Cowboys, who are riding the NFL's longest active winning streak at eight games. Kickoff for this matchup between division leaders is set for 1 p.m. ET.
- Baltimore leads the all-time series vs. the Cowboys, posting a 4-0 mark. The Ravens last faced Dallas in 2012, winning 31-29. Baltimore has only played in Dallas once before, in what was the final game ever at Texas Stadium during the 2008 campaign. (The Ravens, in **John Harbaugh's** first season, beat the Cowboys, 33-24.)
- On Thursday, Nov. 10, the Ravens produced a 22-0 second-half run, pulling away from the Cleveland Browns in a 28-7 win at M&T Bank Stadium. Baltimore forced 3 Browns' turnovers in the final two quarters, with the defense also limiting Cleveland to just 37 yards. (For the game, the Ravens held Cleveland to 144 yards of offense.) The Ravens gained 396 yards while dominating time of possession (38:36 to 21:24), with **QB Joe Flacco** throwing 3 TD passes and completing throws to nine different receivers for 296 yards. Veteran **WR Steve Smith Sr.** led the charge with 5 catches for 60 yards and 1 score, while on defense, **OLB Terrell Suggs** posted 1 sack, 1 FF and 1 PD.
- Last Sunday at Pittsburgh, Dallas bested the host Steelers in a thrilling 35-30 game. Standout rookie RB Ezekiel Elliott led the way with 209 yards from scrimmage (114 rushing & 95 receiving) and 3 TDs.
- After playing Dallas, the Ravens return home for back-to-back contests with Cincinnati (Nov. 27) and Miami (Dec. 4). Baltimore then travels to New England for a Monday Night Football special on Dec. 12.

HARBS SAYS

JOHN HARBAUGH ON THE RAVENS BUILDING CONFIDENCE EACH WEEK:

"To gain real confidence, you have to do something. I think, as a team, we've been fighting and competing and working hard. When you lay a foundation of effort, and you have a bunch of men of faith and character who believe in one another and live their faith out the way our guys do, that's really important. Then, when you do something with it, when you have success like we have the last couple of weeks, that brings something more to the table."

INJURY UPDATE

- Pro Bowlers **OLB Elvis Dumervil** (foot, four-straight games) and **G Marshal Yanda** (shoulder) missed the Cleveland game on Nov. 10, as did fellow starter **CB Shareece Wright** (thigh, three-straight games). **TE Crockett Gilmore** (thigh) and rookie second-round pick **OLB Kamalei Correa** (thigh) have missed two-consecutive games. It was announced Monday that starting **LG Alex Lewis** will be out for several weeks after suffering a high ankle sprain vs. the Browns.
- The Ravens have 14 players on Injured Reserve, including standout **TE Benjamin Watson**, who tore his Achilles tendon on Aug. 27. Other key contributors on IR include **DT Carl Davis** and **TE Maxx Williams**.

NOTE THE QUOTE

S ERIC WEDDLE ON THE GROWTH OF BALTIMORE'S YOUNG DEFENDERS:
"They're growing, right before your eyes. Tavon [Young], [Michael] Pierce, Timmy [Jernigan], even [Za'Darius Smith] and C.J. [Mosley]. Those are all young, talented, eager players. Look at us from the first time we played until now – just the growth, the confidence, the belief in each other. We're looking at each time we go out there, and we don't want to give an inch. We want to create turnovers. We want to finish each drive, and that's showing right now. We've just got to keep harping on the little things and keep pushing each other to be great."

WHAT'S GOING ON?

WR Steve Smith Sr. is 3 catches shy of reaching 1,000 for his career. In Baltimore's Week 10 win over Cleveland, the 16-year veteran posted 5 receptions for 60 yards and 1 TD, moving into eighth on the NFL's all-time receiving yards chart (14,349) by passing WR Reggie Wayne.

SPOTLIGHT: C.J. MOSLEY



Pos: LB **Ht:** 6-2 **Wt:** 241 **Exp. (NFL/Ravens):** 3/3

What's your favorite part about the LBs group? "I love that we are a big family. I don't think there is anything that could break us. Zach [Orr] and I have had a strong bond ever since we got here [in 2014], and Albert [McClellan] and Coach 'Wink' [Don Martindale] were here before us. We have a strong family, and the rookies, 'Peanut' [Patrick Onwuasor] and 'K.C.' [Kamalei Correa] are becoming part of it. We know each other's instincts on the field and our personalities off the field."

What teammate is the most influential? "Obviously, 'Sizz' [Terrell Suggs]. It is not even close. You never know what is going to come out of his mouth – it can be funny, it can be serious, it can be whatever. But no matter what he is saying, everyone is listening when he talks. He is the most inspirational teammate I've ever been around."

What has caused the defense to improve so much at creating turnovers? "It comes with the scheme. We aren't worried about what other teams do, we are playing our type of football and playing how we want to play. Also, we have a lot of playmakers. You can't make plays without playmakers. We have guys who have great range in the secondary, we have fast 'backers, and our defensive line is great. We have defensive linemen tipping balls, getting turnovers and picking up fumbles. All of us are focused on making plays."

How has "D" coordinator Dean Pees helped you adjust to the NFL so quickly? "The system we had at Alabama transferred over to what we do with the Ravens. This is the best situation I could have walked into. Even this year, Coach Pees has kept it simple, because he knows what we are good at. We are a team that likes to stop the run, and once we get them backed up, we like to bring pressure and be aggressive. That is what we have been doing, and it has been working."

If you didn't play LB, what position would you play? "I was a decent running back in high school, so that is probably what I would play. Being a linebacker, you have to have running back vision. A lot of the reads that running backs make are similar to the reads that we have to make. The only thing is, knowing how I like to hit running backs makes me unsure if I'd want to play running back in the NFL."

What is your favorite trait of head coach John Harbaugh? "His competitiveness. He is going to ride or die with his players. No matter if we win or lose, if it is a good season or bad season, he is always going to be the same. We went through a 5-11 season last year, and you would not even be able to tell by the way he has coached us this year. He is always going to keep it real with you. He is real competitive, and he just has that fire in his heart."

NOTE OF THE WEEK I

Sunday will feature the NFL's No. 1 overall defense of Baltimore, including the top-ranked run-stopping unit, against Dallas' No. 1 rushing offense. The Cowboys are averaging 161.0 rushing yards per game, while Baltimore has permitted just 71.3 ground yards a contest. Here is a breakdown of the Ravens' top-ranked run "D":

NOTE OF THE WEEK II

The Ravens haven't allowed opposing offenses to stay on the field very long this season. Baltimore's third-down defense ranks No. 1 in the NFL, while the Ravens have also forced a league-best 31 three-and-outs (tied with Car. and Hou.). Additionally, Baltimore has allowed opponents to hold the ball for an average of 27:51, marking the NFL's third-best defensive time of possession mark.

NOTE OF THE WEEK III

Sunday's game will feature the two most accurate kickers in NFL history. Dallas **K Dan Bailey** currently ranks No. 1 with a 90.4% career mark, while Baltimore **K Justin Tucker** stands No. 2 at 89.4%. This season, Tucker has been perfect, hitting on all 22 of his FGAs (tied, Adam Vinatieri for the NFL's top percentage), while Bailey is 17-of-19 for an 89.5 success rate.

QUOTE THE RAVENS

OLB Terrell Suggs on playing with a torn biceps in the Ravens' 28-7 win over Cleveland:

"I only know one way to play. It wasn't anything that I haven't done before; I have played with a torn biceps before. I have come back from a torn Achilles before, so I guess it is just in my DNA. My mom and dad did something special when they made me. Ozzie [Newsome] knew what he was doing when he drafted me. I have Raven in my DNA. I only know one way to play."

S Eric Weddle on how much of a lift OLB Terrell Suggs gives the team, especially playing with torn biceps:

"'Sizz' is a once-in-a-generation-type player. You just can't replicate what he brings. Not just on the field, but his whole belief, his mantra, his aura about himself that he brings to our defense. He just brings that confidence to all of us. As an older guy, you get someone like that, you can really lean on them. You can look them in the eyes and say, 'Hey, we need a play right now. We need to pick each other up.' And he's right there with you. So, I'm at the end of the [Cleveland] game, and I'm like, 'Sizz, we've got to go out there; we've got to show them we can finish this thing.' He comes up with a huge sack/forced fumble. It's a joy to play with him and a joy to play with these guys. We're an unselfish group that plays for each other, and we're showing how we play."

CSNMidAtlantic.com's Clifton Brown on rookie RB Kenneth Dixon after his breakout game vs. Cleveland:

"This is the Kenneth Dixon the Ravens saw when they scouted him and what we saw in the preseason when he was the Ravens' best back. He really hasn't been healthy since then. Now that he looks healthy again, I think he and Terrance West can really be a good one-two punch going down the stretch. Two young backs, fresh legs running with a lot of fire. West made people miss [Thursday]. I thought he looked good tonight as well. But Kenneth Dixon, I think, seems ready now to make a consistent contribution to this offense. That's a good sign for the Ravens."

Head coach John Harbaugh on the Ravens' offense building off its performance vs. Cleveland:

"We're in a building process with our team, but most certainly with our offense, which has the furthest distance to go probably. We just have to keep coaching, keep practicing, keep playing and keep deciding what's going to be right for us to run offensively and keep improving. That's going to be a process. We had some success in the second half, and that was really important for us to do that. Hopefully, we'll all look back at this [Cleveland game] at the end of the season and say this was a turning point for the offense."

WR Steve Smith Sr. on the Ravens building off a win vs. Cleveland:

"This can propel itself to give us momentum. We are going into a hostile environment. Dallas has a good team. They are a young, talented team. So yes, we need to build on this. We also have to have a short memory and erase everything we have done the last week and work just as hard as if we have something to prove, because we actually do."

NFL.com's Chris Wesseling on WR Steve Smith Sr.:

"Steve Smith still has the most vicious stiff-arm maneuver of any wide receiver in the league. Up to 14,349 receiving yards in his career, the 37-year-old star bypassed Reggie Wayne for eighth place on the all-time list [vs. Cleveland last week]. Next on the list: Marvin Harrison's 14,580 and the 1,000-catch mark. Smith is sitting on 997 receptions after notching five for 60 yards and a touchdown versus the Browns. He's a no-brainer Hall of Famer."

Baltimore Sun columnist Childs Walker on the Ravens:

"We know who the 2016 Ravens are now – a defensive terror with an erratic offense that will play meaningful games in December. Compared to 2015, that sounds pretty good. You can't read too much into a second-half explosion over the lowly Browns. But the Ravens did what they needed to in winning a game decisively for the first time since the 2014 playoffs. The schedule is about to get a whole lot harder, but the Ravens look like they'll contend to the end in a diminished AFC North."

DT Timmy Jernigan on the Ravens' interior defensive line:

"It's hard to stop all three of us [Michael Pierce, Brandon Williams], and at the end of the day, it's kind of like pick your poison. You never know whose Sunday it's going to be. I think 'Big Mike' is just about at the same level as me and Brandon. That kid is special, and he's on his way to a great career."

CB Jimmy Smith on rookie CB Tavon Young's performance in the Ravens' past two victories:

"For a rookie ... I'm not even going to say he's a rookie. He's an excellent football player. No stage is too big for him. This Thursday night game [against Cleveland], he played against their [top receiver, Terrelle Pryor] all game. And he had a standout game."

BaltimoreRavens.com's John Eisenberg on the Ravens' emerging offensive weapons and their contributions against the Browns:

"The usual veteran suspects led the way – Mike Wallace, Steve Smith Sr., Dennis Pitta – but what I liked about this night were the contributions of "generation next." Darren Waller, a second-year tight end, caught the touchdown that broke the 18-possession end zone blackout, and he did it on a third-down play, with another field goal looming. I'd call that the key play of the game. Breshad Perriman also caught his first-career touchdown, and [RB Kenneth] Dixon, well, he bristled like an electric wire all night, totaling 80 rushing and receiving yards on just 11 touches."

CONNECTIONS

PRO CONNECTIONS

- Ravens team president **Dick Cass** represented Cowboys owner **Jerry Jones** in the acquisition of the team and Texas Stadium in 1989 when Cass was a partner at the Washington, D.C.-based law firm Wilmer, Cutler and Pickering. Cass also advised Jones on a variety of matters, including sponsorship contracts, the Collective Bargaining Agreement and salary cap, NFL broadcast arrangements, NFL Internet policies, stadium financing, estate planning, local broadcast partnerships and the NFL substance abuse programs.

- Cowboys director of college scouting **Lionel Vital** served as the Ravens' national scout from 2005-07 and as a scout during the team's inaugural season of 1996.

- Ravens assistant director of pro personnel **Chad Alexander's** late father, **Hubbard Alexander**, won three Super Bowls with the Cowboys as the team's WRs coach (1992-93 and 1995).

COLLEGE CONNECTIONS

- Ravens **T Rick Wagner** and Cowboys **C Travis Frederick** were teammates on Wisconsin's offensive line from 2009-12, opening lanes for Baltimore running backs coach **Thomas Hammock's** (Wisconsin, 2011-13) Badger tailbacks.

- Ravens **T Ronnie Stanley** (2012-15) and Cowboys **G Zack Martin** (2009-13) started together on a Notre Dame offensive line that allowed just eight sacks in 2013, ranking second fewest in the FBS.

- Ravens offensive line coach **Juan Castillo** attended Texas A&I (now Texas A&M-Kingsville), where he was a three-year letterman (1978-80) at linebacker.

WEEK 10 RECAP: BAL. 28, CLE. 7

The Ravens produced a 22-0 second-half run, pulling away from the Browns in a 28-7 victory at M&T Bank Stadium on Thursday, Nov. 10. The win gave Baltimore sole possession of first place in the AFC North. The Ravens turned over the Browns 3 times in the final two quarters, when they limited Cleveland to just 37 yards. For the game, the Ravens' tough defense held the Browns to 144 yards of offense. The Ravens gained 396 yards while dominating time of possession (38:36 to 21:24). **QB Joe Flacco** threw 3 touchdown passes, completing throws to nine different receivers. Down 7-6 at the half, the Ravens used their first possession in the third quarter to secure a 13-7 lead. Flacco found **TE Darren Waller** in the back of the end zone for that 4-yard score. The only misstep in that half came when the Ravens reached the Browns' 15-yard line on the next series, but Flacco was intercepted in the end zone by CB Joe Haden. Baltimore started that drive after intercepting QB Josh McCown, who had replaced starting QB Cody Kessler. McCown's second pass was stolen by **CB Jerraud Powers**. McCown threw a second INT in the fourth quarter that was grabbed by **S Eric Weddle**. That started a 12-play, 90-yard drive that ended with Flacco finding **WR Breshad Perriman**, who made a spectacular reaching catch, for a 27-yard TD. Flacco's other TD came in the third period to **WR Steve Smith Sr.** (11 yards), who moved into eighth place on the all-time receiving yards list (passing Reggie Wayne). Cleveland's lone score was Kessler's 25-yard TD strike to rookie TE Seth DeValve in the second quarter. Ravens **K Justin Tucker's** 2 field goals (25 and 40 yards) were the only points generated by Baltimore in the first half. Pro Bowl **OLB Terrell Suggs**, playing with a torn biceps, recorded his sixth sack of the season, added a pass defense and forced a fumble on McCown that was recovered by rookie **OLB Matthew Judon**. Since 2008, when **John Harbaugh** became Baltimore's head coach, the Ravens own a 16-2 advantage over the Browns.

RAVENS 31, COWBOYS 29 – 10/14/12 IN BALTIMORE

In a game that was not decided until Dallas K Dan Bailey missed a 51-yard FG attempt with 2 seconds left in the game, the Ravens stopped the visiting Cowboys, 31-29. It was the Ravens' 14th-consecutive regular season victory at home. After building a 24-13, third-quarter lead on WR Jacoby Jones' NFL-record-tying 108-yard kickoff return, the Cowboys came back to within 1 point (24-23) on QB Tony Romo's 7-yard TD to WR Dez Bryant and Bailey's 34-yard FG. The Ravens responded with a 10-play, 73-yard TD drive that finished with RB Ray Rice's 1-yard score, giving Baltimore a 31-23 lead with 4:41 left in the game. Dallas then responded with its own long drive (18 plays, 80 yards) that ended with a Romo-to-Bryant 4-yard TD pass, which made the score 31-29 with 32 seconds left in the fourth quarter. The Cowboys' 2-point attempt failed, but Dallas recovered the ensuing onside kick at its own 46-yard line. A pass interference call on CB Chykie Brown put the Cowboys in position to try the 51-yarder. The Ravens took a 17-10, first-half lead on a 38-yard **K Justin Tucker** FG, a 1-yard Rice TD run and a 19-yard **QB Joe Flacco** TD dart to WR Torrey Smith. Flacco completed 17 of 26 passes for 234 yards and a 106.9 QB rating, while Romo was 25-of-36 for 261 yards and 2 TDs (97.1). Impressively, Dallas held the ball 40:03 of the game, rushing for 227 yards, the most ever against a Ravens' defense. RB DeMarco Murray rushed 14 times for 93 yards, and RB Felix Jones added 92 yards on 18 tries. Bryant caught 13 for 95 yards, while WR Anquan Boldin led the Ravens with 5 receptions for 98 yards.

In a magnificent effort showcasing thrilling performances by their defense, offense and special teams units, the Baltimore Ravens won Super Bowl XXXV with a 34-7 victory over the New York Giants. Allowing the Giants a meager 152 total net yards, New York's attack crossed midfield just twice, while Baltimore's "D" posted 4 INTs. LB Ray Lewis was named the game's MVP, capping an accolade-filled season in which he was also tabbed the NFL's Defensive Player of the Year.



QB Joe Flacco - 2012 Super Bowl XLVII MVP

Baltimore defeated San Francisco, 34-31, in Super Bowl XLVII, capturing the franchise's second World Championship. After an amazing first-half performance, the Ravens took a commanding 28-6 lead. But following a bizarre, 34-minute power outage that halted play, the 49ers stormed back into contention. Clinging to a 34-29 edge late in the game, the Ravens stood firm on a pivotal goal-line stand, jamming SF on four-straight plays inside the 7-yard line. QB Joe Flacco was named the game's MVP.

FOUR-STRAIGHT TOP 5s

In 2015, senior NFL writer Rick Gosselin of *The Dallas Morning News* ranked the Ravens' special teams unit No. 1 in the NFL in his annual comprehensive ratings system based on 22 categories, assigning points according to each standing — 1 for best, 32 for worst. 2015 marked the fourth-straight year in Gosselin's Top 5, as Baltimore was No. 5 in 2014, No. 5 in 2013, and in 2012, earned the No. 2 spot.

RAVENS THRIVE UNDER ROSBURG



Special teams coordinator/associate head coach **Jerry Rosburg**, a 38-year coaching veteran, has guided a strong special teams group since arriving in Baltimore in 2008. Here are several standout notes:

SIX PRO BOWLERS

• Six Ravens have earned Pro Bowl honors while playing for Rosburg: ST **Brendon Ayanbadejo** (2008), **K Billy Cundiff** (2010), **RS Jacoby Jones** (2012), **K Justin Tucker** (2013), **LS Morgan Cox** & **P Sam Koch** (2015).

PRIME PUNTER & KICKER

• Earning his first Pro Bowl nod in 2015, **P Sam Koch's** 46.7 gross average ranked No. 9 in the NFL, while his 42.9 net average was No. 2. In 2014, Koch posted the NFL's No. 3 gross (47.4) and No. 1 net (43.3) averages. Both marks are career highs and Ravens records. Pro Bowl **K Justin Tucker**, who Rosburg scouted and helped sign as a rookie free agent, owns the NFL's most FGs (152) since entering the NFL in 2012. With an 89.4% career success mark, "Tuck" is the second-most accurate kicker in league history (Dan Bailey, 90.4).

RAVENS BIG RETURNS

• Led by Pro Bowl **RS Jacoby Jones** in the 2012 Super Bowl season, Baltimore ranked first in the NFL in KOR average (27.3). Jones, who became the first player ever to record dual KORs of at least 105 yards in a career, tied for a league-leading 3 kick return TDs (2 KORs & 1 PR). He also tied an NFL record for longest KOR in a Super Bowl with his 108-yard KOR-TD. (In 2014's game at Pit., he added another 108-yarder to his resume, marking 4 total KOR-TDs over 100 yards in his career.)

ROSBURG'S PAST

• Prior to Baltimore, Rosburg built a successful NFL special teams resume with the Browns (2001-06) and Falcons (2007). Over a five-year span (2002-06), Cleveland's special teams were ranked as the top NFL unit in *The Dallas Morning News'* annual comprehensive report.

RAVENS BLOCK PARTY

• Dating back to 2014, the Ravens have produced 12 blocked kicks (breakdown detailed below), ranking as the NFL's No. 1 figure. In fact, Baltimore already has 4 blocks in 2016 — 1 punt, 1 PAT and 2 FGAs.

MORNHINWEG NAMED O.C.



Marty Mornhinweg was elevated to offensive coordinator on Oct. 10, prior to the start of Week 6. A 22-year NFL coaching veteran, Mornhinweg, who joined Baltimore as QBs coach in 2015, is a former head coach of the Detroit Lions (2001-02). He has also served as offensive coordinator for the New York Jets (2013-14), Philadelphia Eagles (2004-12) and San Francisco 49ers (1997-2000).

- Throughout his NFL coaching career, five quarterbacks have earned Pro Bowl honors under Mornhinweg's direction: Michael Vick, Donovan McNabb, Steve Young, Jeff Garcia and Brett Favre.
- In his most recent role as an offensive coordinator (Jets: 2013-14), the team's run game ranked as the NFL's third best (138.7 ypg) unit during his time. Prior to joining NYJ, Mornhinweg served 10 seasons (2003-12) in Philly, including nine (2004-12) as the "O" coordinator/assistant head coach. He and **John Harbaugh** spent five seasons (2003-07) together on the Eagles' coaching staff.
- His first NFL coordinator job came with the San Francisco 49ers (1997-2000), where in 1998, the team set franchise marks in total yards (6,800), first downs (381) and rushing yards (2,544).

RAVENS OFFENSIVE BESTS

In 2015, with **Marty Mornhinweg** serving as the Ravens' quarterbacks coach, Baltimore posted the second-most net yards in team history. The Ravens also set a franchise record by averaging 266.9 passing yards per game. In the Week 2 game at Oakland, Baltimore tallied 493 net yards, the sixth-best mark in team history.

Dean Pees, a 13-year NFL-coaching veteran, became the Ravens' defensive coordinator in 2012 and helped guide Baltimore to its second World Championship in Super Bowl XLVII. Pees, who was New England's "D" coordinator from 2006-09, heads a Ravens' squad that in 2015 ranked No. 8 in total defense (10th passing & 12th rushing). Pees also leads a unit that, during the **John Harbaugh** Era (2008-16), has allowed the NFL's second-fewest points (19.0) per game, the third-fewest yards (314.0) per game and the fewest overall TDs (272).

• In the Ravens' last 10 playoff games (since the 2010 season), Flacco is 196-of-327 for 2,563 yards, 24 TDs and 4 INTs (104.1 rating). He has led the Ravens to a 7-3 record in these contests.

• In Baltimore's last six playoff games (5-1 record), Flacco has thrown 17 TDs and 2 INTs. Completing 119 of 200 passes for 1,691 yards, he owns a magnificent 111.1 QB rating.

- Flacco has thrown at least 2 TDs in eight-straight playoff games, marking the longest streak in NFL postseason history.
- Flacco has 25-career postseason TD passes, tied (Brett Favre) for second most in a QB's first eight seasons. (Tom Brady is first - 26.)
- Flacco's streak of 197 passes without throwing an INT in the postseason (from 1/22/12 to 1/10/15) is the second longest in NFL playoff history (Drew Brees, 226). Joe Montana (179 from 1989-91) and Steve Young (173 from 1994-96) are third and fourth, respectively.
- Among active QBs, Flacco's 25 playoff TD passes rank fourth most (Tom Brady - 56, Peyton Manning - 40 & Aaron Rodgers - 27).

THE RETURN SPECIALIST



On Sept. 5, the Ravens signed four-time Pro Bowler **RS/WR Devin Hester Sr.**, who has produced the most return TDs (20) in NFL history, to a one-year contract. Hester Sr., who is in his 11th season, is arguably the best return specialist in NFL history. Here are a few notes about his impressive career:

- He has posted the most return touchdowns (20) in NFL history, registering an NFL-record 14 punt return touchdowns, and then adding 5 kickoff return TDs and 1 missed FG return TD (108 yards).
- Seeing action in 152 career games (47 starts), he has also tallied 255 receptions for 3,311 yards (13.0 avg.) and 16 touchdowns, also posting 116 rushing yards and one touchdown on 36 carries.
- Hester Sr.'s 11.8-yard career punt return average ranks ninth in NFL history, while his 3,631 PR yards stand third. For kickoff returns, Hester Sr. owns a 25.0-yard career average, gaining 7,196 yards (12th most in NFL history).
- His four Pro Bowls occurred in 2006, 2007, 2010 and 2014. He was named to the All-Decade Team (2000s) by ESPN and *The AP*, and he has been tabbed All-Pro three times (2006, 2007 & 2010).

WR Mike Wallace has proven to be a dramatic free agent addition for the Ravens. Wallace's team-high 673 receiving yards rank 15th in the NFL entering Week 11, while his 4 receptions of 50-plus yards rank No. 1. In Week 9 vs. Pittsburgh, he became the third player in NFL history to record 2 TD catches of 95-or-more yards when he produced the longest offensive play in Ravens regular season history with a 95-yard catch and sprint. Wallace's 12-career receiving TDs of at least 50 yards rank as the NFL's third most since he entered the league in 2009.

JUST FOR KICKS



Pro Bowl **K Justin Tucker** ranks as the NFL's second-most accurate kicker of all time. He has connected on 152 of 170 FGAs to produce an 89.4 success rate.

- To kick off 2016, Tucker was named AFC Special Teams Player of the Month (Sept.) after going 9-of-9 on FGAs, including 2 game-winners. Tucker is a three-time AFC Player of the Month, which ties him with S Ed Reed & K Matt Stover for the most in Ravens history. Tucker has also earned six AFC Special Teams Player of the Week honors.

- In 2013, Tucker made his first Pro Bowl by setting team records in FGs made (38) and FGAs (41), with both figures tying (Stephen Gostkowski) for the NFL's most. Tucker also had a franchise-record 140 points (tied for sixth in NFL).

- Tucker made 33-straight FGs at one point during the 2013 season, ranking as the NFL's sixth-longest streak of all time.

- His 6 FGs on 12/16/13 at Det. set a team record and a single-game NFL high in 2013. Against the Lions, he became the first NFL kicker ever to connect from the 20-, 30-, 40-, 50- & 60-yard range in a game.

- Tucker's 94.1 career FG% when kicking on grass (64-of-68) ranks as the NFL's best percentage on grass of all time. (The next best is Jay Feely at 86.8%.)

- Tucker's 91.7 career FG% (77-of-84) in the second half/overtime ranks as the NFL's best second half/OT mark of all time.

- In 2015's Week 2 game at Oak., **K Justin Tucker** became the fastest in NFL history to reach 100 FGs made, doing so in his 50th game. (Hall of Famer Jan Stenerud is the second fastest at 53 games.)

- At Miami on 12/6/15 in his 60th game, "Tuck" became the fastest kicker in NFL history to reach 500 points, surpassing Stenerud (61 games). Tucker is the second-fastest kicker in NFL history to reach 400 points, doing so in his 48th game. (Stenerud did so in 47 games.)

IN MEMORIAM: CLARENCE BROOKS

Clarence Brooks, the Baltimore Ravens' longest-tenured assistant coach, passed away on Sept. 17 at a hospital in Weston, Fla., following a battle with esophageal and stomach cancer. He was 65. The beloved Brooks – referred to by most as “C.B.”

– originally joined the organization in 2005 and served 11 seasons as defensive line coach. This past spring, while undergoing intense treatment for his illness, he transitioned into a senior defensive assistant role, but still spent as much time as he possibly could working with players and fellow coaches, including during the Ravens' recent training camp. Brooks was a 24-year NFL coaching veteran and one of six assistant coaches retained by head coach John Harbaugh upon his 2008 Baltimore arrival.

In addition to the Ravens, “C.B.” coached for the Miami Dolphins (2000-04), Cleveland Browns (1999) and Chicago Bears (1993-98). Brooks also spent 17 years in the collegiate ranks holding coaching positions at Arizona (1990-92) – where he was instrumental in the notable “Desert Swarm” defense that led the nation in scoring defense in 1992 – Syracuse (1981-89) and his alma mater Massachusetts (1976-80).

During Brooks' Baltimore tenure as defensive line coach (2005-15), the Ravens allowed the NFL's fewest rushing touchdowns (89), second-fewest points per game (18.9) and the league's second-fewest rushing yards per game (94.2).

Head Coach John Harbaugh:

“Our heartfelt condolences and love go out to Justa and the Brooks family on the passing of Clarence. We loved that man! He is at peace now through the grace of Jesus Christ. He fought the good fight and won. One of the finest coaches I have ever met, he changed the lives and influenced players and coaches for the better. He was a great man, loving husband and devoted father. He was as tough and determined in adversity as you'll ever see and as loyal a friend as there is. ‘C.B.’ will forever walk as a loved and cherished member of the Ravens family.”

General Manager & Executive Vice President Ozzie Newsome:

“Very few, if any, coaches influenced their players – on and off the field – like Clarence Brooks. How fortunate are the Ravens to have had this special person in our lives for the past 12 years? He was a teacher, a friend, a father figure to many and a great football coach. A lot of our defensive success over the years is due to his ability to get the most out of his players on the defensive line. This is a sad, sad day for our team and extended family. Our hearts ache for Justa and the rest of Clarence's family.”

Owner Steve Bisciotti:

“The Bisciottis are so sad to hear about Clarence's passing. He was the sweetest man I've ever met in football. He was also as tough as nails and was as respected by everyone on our team as any coach who ever touched the Ravens. His impact was more than people on the outside could know. He will be so missed.”

President Dick Cass:

“Clarence had a special rapport with his players. He was both beloved as coach and as a person. His infectious laugh and welcoming smile will be greatly missed, not by just the players and his fellow coaches, but by everyone in our building.”

DT Brandon Williams:

“Coach Brooks was like a father figure to me and every other player he coached. He made me the player I am today, but more importantly, helped me to be the man I am today. He always got the best out of you. He saw the potential in every player and did everything in his power to help you be the best you could be – on and off the field. Every day I walked in this building, no matter what was going on, he could always make me smile. I will miss him, and my heart goes out to the entire Brooks family.”

DE Lawrence Guy:

“Coach Brooks was a heck of a coach, but an even better man. He cared so much about all of us and could always pull the best out of you in any situation. Through him, I learned how to prepare better, practice better and play better. I will truly miss his coaching, his fellowship and his mentorship. Rest well, ‘C.B.’”

OLB Terrell Suggs:

“Clarence Brooks was a rare, special coach. We had a relationship that became more than football; he was family. He was every bit the definition of the word ‘coach.’ He was firm and demanding when he needed to be, but was a father figure and caring at the same time. I will definitely miss my friend.”

Linebackers Coach Don Martindale:

“Clarence Brooks is one of the finest human beings I have ever met. Selfishly speaking, you would like to say he was your best friend, but he was really everybody's best friend. We are happy he is not suffering anymore. I love him like a brother, and I am going to miss him terribly.”

Former Ravens Head Coach Brian Billick (Who Hired Brooks in 2005):

“Whew, this hurts. What a man, what a coach, what an inspiration. Beyond being one of the best position coaches in the league, Clarence was one of the most respected people in the NFL. He was a great teacher and friend. His positive and upbeat, yet stern, way was special. The proof is in the pudding. Look at how players improved under him. It would be tough to find a more respected assistant in the NFL. My heart reaches out to Justa and his family.”

Former Ravens DT Haloti Ngata:

“I am deeply saddened by the news of ‘C.B.’ passing away. I hope that I can help continue his legacy by the way I live and play. I played under ‘C.B.’ for nine years. In that time, he helped me go to five Pro Bowls and win a Super Bowl ring. He deserves a lot of that credit. He worked so hard with me and my Ravens teammates. This is tough news to swallow. I will miss you, Coach. Thank you for everything you taught me through the years – on and off the field. I love you, Clarence.”

Former Browns, Ravens & Dolphins DE Rob Burnett:

“I cried a few weeks ago when I found out about Clarence and his fight against cancer, and I immediately reached out to Justa and ‘C.B.’ His death rips at my heart. I loved Clarence. He was more than my coach. He was my friend, a mentor and a motivator. This is a sad day for all of those fortunate enough to have known this great person.”

JOHN HARBAUGH MONDAY PRESS CONFERENCE: WEEK 11 VS. COWBOYS

Opening statement: “Players will be back tomorrow after playing two, obviously, very physical games – very physical games – in five days. They should be refreshed and ready to go in a lot of ways. Coaches have been preparing for Dallas as well. Coaches had a couple of days off over the weekend. [I have] just one long-term injury to report, which would be Alex Lewis, as you know, from the game. It’s a high ankle sprain, so that’s usually a six-week injury.”

Speaking of offensive linemen, the Dallas offensive line gets a lot of credit for allegedly being the best. Is there any one guy who stands out, or is it just five guys executing on all cylinders? (Joe Platania) “They have three first-round picks. I think [they are] five really good players, very well coached. I think they know who they want to be in terms of the type of offense they want to be, and they’re built, in a lot of ways, around that offensive line. It’s an excellent group. They have the No. 1 rushing offense in the NFL for a reason, and a lot of that reason is the offensive line. But, the running back [Ezekiel Elliott] is not too bad either.”

In the time since you have started coaching, kickers have gotten more and more accurate, especially from longer distances. You were a special teams coach. Why do you think that is? (Childs Walker) “Probably like anything else, they just get better at teaching it. More kickers get better training probably at a younger age. There are probably more kicking coaches out there teaching guys. I think a lot of kids are better equipped early on, in terms of the proper techniques. They’re not just going out there and kicking the ball and that’s their technique. We see a lot of college kickers who are very advanced. Probably just like everything else, everything seems to get better with time.”

John, you have talked about the goal for the team to get better. Have you seen that in the past couple of weeks? (David Ginsburg) “We have seen improvement. We’ve seen improvement. It doesn’t always show up on gameday. Obviously, there have been stretches where it certainly didn’t look like we were making any progress. More of that showed up in the past two weeks. We have a long way to go. We need to continue to improve in every single area. The offense, I think, is something that most people are looking at from a statistical standpoint of how we’ve done. That probably still has had the furthest way to go and can continue to get a lot better, but we have seen progress in little areas along the way. You just hope that a lot of getting better in a lot of different areas make us a lot better as a whole, and that’s what we’re looking for.”

John, you mentioned G Alex Lewis’ injury. Does that make him an IR candidate, or do you think you have the roster flexibility to wait and see on him? (Jeff Zrebiec) “There’s nothing eminent along those lines. We’re going to try to see where that goes in the next few weeks. Hopefully we get him back.”

What about G Marshal Yanda? He has missed three of the last four. Is he on track to come back soon? (Jeff Zrebiec) “We’ll let you know as we go. We’ll see how he progresses.”

QB Joe Flacco talked about interceptions after the game. When a QB is throwing more interceptions than he would like, is there a fine line between telling the player to be cautious without losing the aggressiveness? (Jamison Hensley) “I think that quarterbacks have to work that out for themselves. That’s always the issue. You could start whipping the ball around there haphazardly, and some good things would happen, and some bad things would happen. It’s definitely an art. It’s definitely a science. It’s a very difficult position to play. It happens fast. Good decision-making under fire is just something that you see when you see it. Joe is definitely his own harshest critic. He looks at those things very hard and studies them very hard. Nobody wants to play better quarterback for the Baltimore Ravens than Joe Flacco. We all want every guy to play really well, but when it’s your spot ... It’s no different for me or for any player or any coach; you take it to heart. He really works really hard at it. I’m very confident that he’ll do great. He has to clean some things up, but if you look back, that’s looking back. You have to look forward and apply going forward two things: The fact that we need to move the ball; we need to make first downs, but we also need to do it in a way that we protect the football. As you said, that’s always going to be the challenge for a quarterback.”

Speaking of quarterbacks, what do you think of Cowboys QB Dak Prescott as a first-year player? He seems pretty fearless and makes big plays for them. (Todd Karpovich) “He’s playing really well. Obviously, he’s gotten a lot of attention. They have a great record, and their offense is ranked No. [3] in the league. He’s a big part of that, certainly. He has made a lot of great decisions [with] very few interceptions, I think [two] for the season. They’ve supported him with protection and a great run game. They have some pretty good targets out there to throw to. He’s the guy that’s making it all go, because he’s the quarterback. It’s going to be a challenge for us, and we’re going to do everything we can to try and slow him down a little bit.”



Are these the type of matchups that excite you? With their offense and your defense, is this something you look forward to? (Jerry Coleman) “I think it excites anybody to compete. Certainly, that particular part of the game – that matchup – is going to be huge in the game. It’s going to be very important. It might be the most important part of the game. We’re excited about it, but we get excited about every one of these games. We were pretty excited about Thursday night. We were pretty darn excited about the Sunday afternoon before that against our archrival. This is another one, going down and playing the team with ... Do they have the best record in football, right? [They are] the team with the best record in football, with the best offense in football. Sure, we’re looking forward to that.”

Coach, at the beginning of the year, you said that the potential of this team was limitless and you were waiting for players to step up and be playmakers. Are you starting to see players do that? (Rich Sayers) “We are starting to see some plays being made. The guys making the plays ... I’m excited that Breshad [Perriman] made that catch, and I’m excited it wasn’t overturned. I thought he had control of it, and that’s what they’re looking at. Do you have control? That’s going to be the thing that’s going to be grey. The thing that they probably tried to do is not overturn when they don’t have clear, compelling evidence, as far as overturning. I was just happy to see him make the adjustment and make the play. It was a great play. A couple of crossing routes ... Breshad had one; Mike Wallace had another one ... I thought the running backs ran well. To see those things start to happen, to your point about playmakers, is really important. We have guys ... I’ve told you this before: I believe in our guys. I really believe our guys have the potential to do a lot of great things, but as Mike Wallace pointed out, potential doesn’t mean anything until you do it. You have to do something with it. That’s the way our guys are thinking. They want to make the plays, and that’s what’s important.”

Can you talk a little about DT Michael Pierce, as far as him making plays? Do you see the three guys in there, him, DT Timmy Jernigan and DT Brandon Williams, lifting each other up and feeding off of each other? (Cliff Brown) “They probably are. They work great together. Brandon Williams is relatively young in the league. What is it, his third year or his fourth year? He’s pretty young, yet he’s kind of the leader of that group inside. Timmy Jernigan is just playing at a high level – high-intensity level, big motor. Then for Michael Pierce to be able to get in there with those two guys, and as you said, be able to learn from those guys, but also see how it’s done up close and personal from two young guys, to me, that’s pretty awesome. Those guys, all three of them, have played really well.”

Ever since you have been here and even historically, the Ravens have always been so strong against the run. What do you think is the specific key to that? I know there a lot of things that are involved, but is there a specific key where you have to start at to be very good against the run? (Jamison Hensley) “Yes, we have our beliefs and our philosophy. Certainly, the Ravens, since 1996, have chased that. I think that is something that Ozzie [Newsome] certainly believes in, too. Ozzie and I have had many conversations about how we want to play and who we want to be and how to get there. That is something that has been here for quite a while. I think Ozzie has always drafted toward big, physical guys up front. We have always had them, and we have them now. We have had our lulls at times, where we have not defended the run, but we have always wanted to get back and defend the run well. We do not want to have that problem. But you know what? I’m telling you what – that article – I’m really not interested in being quoted in the article about how good the run defense is, because we have a game to play next week, and we are playing against a really good run offense. After that game, it will be another one. Until the season is over and until you can look at the stats looking back on the season, to me, you just have to keep on improving. Believe me, we can get better at our run defense. As well as they are playing, it can be even better, and that is what we are chasing.”

You guys went up-tempo, no-huddle in the second half last week. Is that something you would like to do even more of, or is it kind of game by game? (Garrett Downing) “I think it is all game plan. You try to have as many tools as you can at your disposal, and that is something – no-huddle offense. There are different versions of no-huddle offenses that teams run around the league. That is one of our versions; it is a little bit faster-paced-type of a deal. [There is] not a lot of motion and calling plays and running them quickly. I like that; I have always been a fan of it. I think Joe [Flacco] likes it. It is certainly something that we are going to do from time to time and maybe more often than we have in the past.”

After four losses in a row, you win two games in five days. What did that do for the tone in this building? (Bruce Cunningham) “I don’t know about the tone in the building; I don’t see too many people. Sometimes I say ‘hi,’ and they say ‘hi,’ and we just keep walking. I did see ... It is funny, because when you lose a couple, you either get ... Either people kind of look down and don’t say much to you; they don’t know what to say, or they say, ‘Are you doing OK?’ (laughter) I hate that, ‘Are you doing OK?’ [I say], ‘Yeah, I’m doing fine. We are working, we are fighting, we are trying! How are you doing? Are you doing OK?’ (laughter) But everybody is good. We have a great building. The thing I love about our building is whether we win a couple games in five days or we lose four games in a row – which was really tough; there is nothing tougher, really, that we have had here in the nine years than that stretch – our building doesn’t crack. We do not have people in our building grumbling. We do not have any of that. We just have a bunch of



great people that want to do whatever they can do to help. That is what I love about the Ravens. That is what I love about the organization that [owner] Steve Bisciotti has put together. To me, that is how you weather tough times as a group or an organization or as a family.”

How about in the locker room? How did that tone change? (Bruce Cunningham) “Same thing. Yes, everybody was happier. We certainly had a much more fun [locker room]. As you know, the post-game locker room was a lot more fun the past two weeks. Yes, it is a lot more fun to win, and guys enjoy that. But from work ethic, the thing I know about our guys is that our guys are not going to all of a sudden say, ‘Hey, we have arrived,’ by any stretch. Our guys are going to go to work and know that the last win does not mean much if you do not win the next one. You have to stack wins to be successful, and that is what we are aiming to accomplish.”

It has been a while since we have asked about OLB Elvis Dumervil, but how is he progressing, and have you gotten a sense that he is close to getting back on the practice field? (Luke Jones) “I do have a sense of that. Yes, I do have a sense that he is getting close. The best guy to ask is him. So when you get a chance ... He will probably say, ‘Coach [Harbaugh] takes care of all that.’ We have a good system worked out. *(laughter)* There is an old book called ‘Catch-22.’ Do you remember that one? He is getting closer. I am hoping it is very close. We will just have to see. When he starts practicing, you will know. It should be right there.”

Will you use the emphasis this week in practice with the guys that the Dallas Cowboys are the only team that has never beat the Ravens? (Bill West) “No, probably not. Is that true? How many games have there been?” *(Reporter: “Four. You are 4-0 against Dallas.”)* “That is great. Does that count in this year’s standings? Does that help us in any way? No. So, we need to be 1-0 against them this year. That is the goal: 1-0 against them this year.”

Since you do play them once every four years and you have probably been asked this before, but I don’t remember the last time you answered it ... Do you recall Jason Garrett interviewed here before you? Do you ever think back if the roles were reversed or if you were not here, how would life would have been for John Harbaugh or what it would have been like if Jason Garrett elected to go with the Ravens? (Jerry Coleman) “No, I do not give that much thought.”

You do not give that much thought, even when sitting on the beach alone? (Jerry Coleman) “What are you, my psychologist?” *(laughter)* *(Reporter: “I’m trying to dig deep and see if there is a moment of reflection.”)* I would like to think if it had not worked out for this ... To me, it is really kind of a moot point, because it worked out exactly the way it was supposed to work out. I am a person of faith, so I would say [it worked out] exactly the way God had it all planned out. But if it had not been, it would have been planned out another way, and it would have been even more spectacular. That is how I look at it. But God does it just the way he is supposed to do it. He makes it perfect. It can’t be any better than the way it goes.”

It has been sort of a crazy year thus far, but here you stand at 5-4 and in first place of the division. Do you tell the guys, or think about the fact, that you control your own destiny? And albeit a tough schedule down the stretch, the AFC North is yours to take. (David Ginsburg) “We do. That is something that is really important to us. We look at it that way. Whether it is in the game or whether it is in the season, you want to get the lead. When you get the lead, you want to keep the lead. When you keep the lead, you want to extend the lead. That is what we aim to do in every game – not always successfully, but that is our goal. Certainly, that is going to be the objective during the course of the season. That bit of wisdom came from Jack Harbaugh, sitting right there in the back of the room. We have heard that many times since we were kids. That is what we are trying to do.”

You have used T James Hurst as an extra blocker. How challenging has it been not having that third guy to use as a blocking tight end in the tight end group? I know TE Nick Boyle is eligible in one more game. Has it been tough to overcome that, not having that third tight end to be a blocker? (Jeff Zrebiec) “Sure, you would rather have the blocking tight end available or a couple of those guys available. I think Dennis [Pitta] and Darren [Waller] have been thrown up in there. Darren, surprisingly, does a pretty darn good job for a guy who has played wide receiver his whole life. If you watch the tape, you will see that he does pretty darn well. He is only going to improve, and Dennis the same. Dennis fights like crazy in there. But Dennis is more of a receiver, obviously. We are looking forward to getting Crockett [Gillmore] back, and hopefully it will work out with Nick [Boyle]. In the meantime, you figure out another way to do it. That is where James [Hurst] has come in, and James has done well.”
