NEW ENGLAND PATRIOTS (7-2) at SAN FRANCISCO 49ERS (1-8) Sunday, Nov. 20, 2016 • Levi's Stadium (68,500) • 4:25 p.m. ET

The New England Patriots will attempt to get back in the win column this week when they travel to face the San Francisco 49ers at Levi's Stadium. This week's game will be the Patriots' first-ever game at Levi's Stadium, which opened in 2014. It will be the Patriots first game at the 49ers since a 30-21 win at Candlestick Park on Oct. 5, 2008, New England's only win at San Francisco.

A victory over the 49ers will give the Patriots its eighth win of the year and guarantee a finish with a record of .500 or better for the 16 consecutive year. Each of the other 31 NFL teams has had at least one losing season since 2001.

BROADCAST INFORMATION

TELEVISION: This week's game will be broadcast by CBS and can be seen locally on WBZ-TV Channel 4 in Boston. Greg Gumbel will handle play-by-play duties with Trent Green as the color analyst. Jamie Erdahl will work the sidelines. The game will be produced by Jim Rikhoff and directed by Suzanne Smith.

<u>NATIONAL RADIO:</u> This week's game will be broadcast to a national audience on **Westwood One Sports and Compass Media Networks**. **Tom McCarthy** and **Mark Malone** will call the game for **Westwood One** while **Chris Carrino** and **Brian Baldinger** will handle broadcast duties for **Compass Media**.

LOCAL RADIO: 98.5 FM, The Sports Hub, is the flagship station for the Patriots Radio Network. Play-by-play broadcaster **Bob Socci** will call the action along with former Patriots quarterback **Scott Zolak**, who will provide color analysis. Produced by **Marc Cappello**.

The New England Patriots fought back from a 31-3 third quarter deficit to tie the San Francisco 49ers in a Sunday Night Football game played on a cold and rainy night, but the comeback effort fell short in a 41-34 loss. The Patriots lost at home in December for the first time in 21 games.

New England nearly equaled the greatest comeback in NFL history, as only one time in league history has a team rallied to win a regular season game in which they trailed by 28 points. The Patriots faced a 31-3 deficit following a 27-yard scoring reception by San Francisco's Michael Crabtree with 10:21 remaining in the third quarter. The Patriots proceeded to score touchdowns on four straight possessions to tie the game at 31, but San Francisco regained the momentum and held on for a 41-34 win. The only time in NFL history that a team has won a game in which they trailed by 28 points was on Dec. 7, 1980, when the 49ers trailed the New Orleans Saints 35-7 at halftime and came back for a 38-35 win.

The Patriots scored 34 points against the 49ers after San Francisco entered the game allowing an NFL-low 14.2 points per game.

San Francisco forced four turnovers with two forced fumbles and two interceptions by QB Tom Brady. Despite the turnovers, Brady completed 36-of-65 pass attempts for 443 yards, including 367 yards on 26 completions in the second half. San Francisco QB Colin Kaepernick passed for four touchdowns in the 49ers victory, including two 30-yard touchdown passes.

San Francisco led 17-3 at the half, and they appeared to take command of the game after RB Frank Gore picked up a Kaepernick fumbled snap and scored on a 9-yard run, followed by Crabtree's 27-yard score to take the 31-3 lead. The 49ers defense set up both of San Francisco's touchdowns in the third quarter. S Dashon Goldson returned RB Steven Ridley's fumble 66 yards to the New England 3 before Gore found the end zone. DE Aldon Smith grabbed a pass out of TE Aaron Hernandez's hands for his first career interception.

The Patriots rallied with 28 straight points, including 24 points in the fourth quarter, to tie the game. Brady was 14-of-27 for 195 yards with one touchdown in the final quarter. The Patriots gained 195 yards to the 49ers 58, and the Patriots had 14 first downs to the 49ers' one. The Patriots scored on a 6-yard run by RB Danny Woodhead, a 1-yard run by Brady, a 5-yard touchdown pass from Brady to Hernandez and a 1-yard run by Woodhead to tie the game.

After the Patriots tied the game, RB LaMichael James returned the ensuing kick 62 yards and on the next play Kaepernick connected with Crabtree for a 38-yard touchdown to reclaim the lead at 38-31. The Patriots were stopped on a fourth-down play from their own 12-yard line with 2:24 to play and San Francisco kicked a field goal to take a 41-38 lead. New England kicked a 41-yard field goal on the next drive but was unable to convert an onside kick, allowing San Francisco to run out the final 36 seconds to secure the win.

After New England won Super Bowl XLIX with a goal-line play, Seattle avenged that loss with their own goal-line stand to secure a 31-24 win over the Patriots in a Sunday Night Football matchup at Gillette Stadium.

Down 31-24 late in the game, the Patriots drove 78 yards to the Seattle 1-yard line and had four chances to get the ball in the end zone. QB Tom Brady's fourth-down fade pass to TE Rob Gronkowski fell incomplete with 14 seconds to play. Seattle ran two plays from the 1-yard line to secure the victory.

Seattle WR Doug Baldwin caught three touchdown passes from QB Russell Wilson, including 15-yard pass with 4:24 to go in the fourth quarter.

The Patriots opened the game with a nine-play, 75-yard drive that ended with a 1-yard touchdown run by RB LeGarrette Blount, the first of his three rushing touchdowns. Seattle scored on its next three drives to take a 12-7 lead with two field goals and a touchdown. Before the end of the half, Blount culminated an 81-yard drive with a 1-yard score for a 14-12 lead with 1:05 to play. However, Seattle drove to the New England 18-yard line before Wilson connected with Baldwin for a touchdown and a 19-14 lead at the break.

The lead changed hands three times in the second half, in a seesaw battle before Seattle finally scored the final nine points to take the lead.

After stopping Seattle to open the second half, the Patriots converted three third downs and moved to the 13-yard line where Blount scored his third rushing touchdowns on a 13-yard run to lift the Patriots to a 21-19 lead. Seattle answered with a field goal drive for a 22-21 lead. New England took the ensuing drive and began a drive that ended early in the fourth quarter with a field goal to regain the lead at 24-22. Wilson completed a 38-yard pass to RB C.J. Prosise on a third-and-six to help set up a field goal for a 25-24 lead.

A key sequence occurred in the ensuing kick. Rookie CB Cyrus Jones had a 43-yard kickoff return. He fumbled on the play but S Nate Ebner was able to recover at the Seattle 43-yard line. Two plays later, Brady hit WR Julian Edelman for a short pass but Edelman was hit on the play and fumbled, allowing the Seahawks to take over. The Seahawks converted the turnover into a touchdown pass to extend their lead to 31-24. Seattle attempted a two-point play, that failed, allowing the Patriots a chance to tie the game with a touchdown and extra point.



PATS SET INT RECORD

The Patriots set an NFL record by going 258 pass attempts to start the season without an interception to surpass the 2008 Washing Redskins, who went 251 pass attempts without an interception to start the season. Jacoby Brissett (55), Jimmy Garoppolo (60) and Tom Brady (143) combined for the record.

BENNETT GOES OVER 100 AGAIN

TE Martellus Bennett set a single-season best with his third 100-yard game of the 2016 season after finishing with 102 yards on seven receptions. He had 114 vs. Miami on Sept. 18 and 109 vs. Buffalo on Oct. 2. He had two 100-yard games in 2014. Overall, Bennett now has five career 100-yard games.

McCLELLIN BLOCKS XP

LB Shea McClellin blocked a second-quarter extra point attempt. It is the first blocked kick of his career and the first blocked extra point since LB Jamie Collins blocked an extra point at Indianapolis on Oct. 18, 2015.

FLOWERS DOUBLES UP AGAIN

DL Trey Flowers had his second straight two-sack game after finishing with two sacks for 15 yards. He had a 7-yard sack in the first quarter and an 8-yard sack in the third quarter. Flowers registered his first two career sacks in the win at Buffalo on Oct. 20.

BRADY ECLIPSES 300 PASSING YDS

Tom Brady completed 23-of-32 passes for 316 yards for his fourth 300-yard game of 2016. Overall, Brady has 75 career 300-yard games, third in NFL history to the 102 by Drew Brees and the 93 by Peyton Manning.

HIGHTOWER NETS 10 TACKLES

LB Dont'a Hightower finished with a team-leading 10 total tackles. It is his 15th career 10-plus tackle game and his second of the 2016 season. He had 13 total tackles in the win vs. Cincinnati on Oct. 16.

DL Trey Flowers made his first NFL start. He had his second straight two-sack game.

ROOKIE DB CYRUS JONES RETURNS TO ACTION

Rookie DB Cyrus Jones returned to action after missing the last three games. He was used as a kick returner and a punt returner.

*The Patriots can pass the Oakland Raiders (1973-1977) as the only team to advance to six straight Conference Championship games.

*The Patriots have won seven straight division titles (2009-15) to match the Los Angeles Rams (1973-79) for the most consecutive division titles and look to pass that mark in 2016.

*The Patriots have 15 straight winning seasons and need one more to tie the San Francisco 49ers (1983-98) and the Dallas Cowboys (1970-85) for the most consecutive winning seasons since the 1970 merger.

*The Patriots have qualified for the playoffs for seven straight seasons and can become the fifth team in NFL history to play in a postseason game in at least eight consecutive seasons in 2016.

*The Patriots have advanced in the postseason for five straight seasons and need to advance in the postseason in 2016 to match the record of six straight seasons of postseason advancement by the Dallas Cowboys (1991-96).

BILL BELICHICK

*Bill Belichick (6) needs to reach one more Super Bowl as a head coach to break a tie with Don Shula (6) for the most conference titles.

*Belichick has four Super Bowl wins as a head coach to match Pittsburgh's Chuck Noll for the most wins. With one more Super Bowl win, Belichick will have the most wins by a head coach in Super Bowl history.

*Belichick is tied with Tom Landry and Don Shula with 13 division titles and needs one more division title to set the record for most among all head coaches.

*Bill Belichick passed Curly Lambeau for fourth place and now has 230 regular seasons wins. He is behind Don Shula (328), George Halas (318) and Tom Landry (250).

*Belichick's Patriots teams have twice recorded five straight years of playoff advancement (2003-07 and 2011-15), tying the NFL record. If the Patriots advance in 2016, they will set the NFL record. John Harbaugh (2008-12), Mike Holmgren (1993-97), John Madden (1973-77) and Andy Reid (2000-04) also won a playoff game in five consecutive seasons.

TOM BRADY

* Tom Brady (176) needs four more wins to become just the third NFL quarterback with 180 career regular-season wins to join Brett Favre (186) and Peyton Manning (186).

*Brady has 198 wins overall (176 in the regular season and 22 in the postseason) and needs three more wins to become the all-time leader for most wins by an NFL quarterback. Peyton Manning (200: 186 in the regular season and 14 in the postseason) and Brett Favre (199: 186 in the regular season and 13 in the postseason) have the most wins in NFL history by a starting quarterback.

*If Brady reaches 30 or more touchdowns passes in 2016, he will become just the fourth player in NFL history with 30 or more touchdown passes in seven seasons, joining Brett Favre (9), Peyton Manning (9) and Drew Brees (8).

*Brady is tied with Peyton Manning with four seasons with 35 or more touchdowns and needs to reach 35 touchdowns in 2016 for his fifth season with 35 or more touchdowns to become the all-time leader in this category.

*Brady is currently fifth on the NFL's all-time list with 59,663 career passing yards and needs 337 yards to become the fifth NFL player to reach 60,000 passing yards.

*Brady has passed for 4,000 yards eight times in his career and if he reaches 4,000 yards in 2016, he will be the third player to reach nine seasons with 4,000 yards, joining Peyton Manning (14) and Drew Brees (10).

*Brady led the NFL with 36 touchdowns passes in 2015, his fourth time leading the NFL in touchdowns. He tied Drew Brees, Len Dawson, Brett Favre, Peyton Manning, Johnny Unitas and Steve Young for most seasons leading the NFL in touchdown passes.

*Brady is in his 17th season in 2016 and became the longest tenured Patriots player, surpassing the 16 seasons by Steve Grogan (1975-90).

*Brady's 17 seasons with one team are tied for the most by an NFL quarterback with John Brodie (San Francisco) and Dan Marino (Miami).

STEPHEN GOSTKOWSKI

*If Stephen Gostkowski leads the NFL in scoring in 2016, he will set the NFL mark for most seasons leading the NFL in scoring with six, moving past Don Hutson [5] and Gino Cappelletti [5]. Gostkowski has led the NFL in scoring in 2008 and 2012-15.

*Stephen Gostkowski has led the NFL in scoring in each of the last four seasons (2012-15). He can become just the second player to lead the NFL in scoring in five straight seasons in 2016, joining Don Hutson (1940-44).

 * In 2015, Gostkowski became the first NFL player with four seasons of 150 or more points and can add to that in 2016.

*Gostkowski has the second-best field goal percentage in NFL history from 50 yards or more (76.0 percent (19-of-25).

*Gostkowski (4) needs one more 30-field goal season to tie David Akers and John Carney for the most in NFL history with five seasons of 30 or more field goals.

*Gostkowski has led the NFL in field goals three times (2008, 2013 and 2014). If he leads the NFL in field goals in 2016, he will join Lou Groza (5), Jack Manders (4), Ward Cuff (4) and Mark Moseley (4) as the only NFL players to lead the NFL in field goals in at least four seasons.

ROB GRONKOWSKI

*Rob Gronkowski moved past Stanley Morgan with 69 total touchdowns to become the Patriots all-time leader in touchdowns.

*Gronkowski (68) moved past Stanley Morgan (67) to become the all-time leader in receiving touchdowns for the Patriots.

*Gronkowski (6,095) moved past Irving Fryar vs. Cincinnati (10/16/16) and is now in fourth place on the Patriots all-time receiving list. He is ranked 14th all-time among NFL tight ends in receiving yards.

*Gronkowski has 6,095 receiving yards and needs 474 yards to move past Heath Miller (6,569) for 10th place all-time among tight ends.

*Gronkowski needs one more 1,000-yard season to join Tony Gonzalez and Jason Witten for the most 1,000-yard seasons by an NFL tight end with four.

*Gronkowski has an NFL-leading five seasons with 10 or more touchdowns by a tight end and can add to his record in 2016.

Since Robert Kraft purchased the team in 1994, the Patriots have experienced one of the most dramatic turnarounds in the history of sports. Now in his 23rd season of ownership, Kraft has transformed one of the league's least successful clubs into what observers view as a model NFL franchise. In the five seasons immediately preceding his purchase (1989-93), the Patriots were a moribund team, winning just 19 of 80 games [.238 pct.] and logging the worst record in the NFL over that span. When he bought the franchise on Jan. 21, 1994, Kraft

announced his intention to bring a championship to New England, a tall order considering the team's previous success rate. But under Kraft's leadership, the Patriots have won more division titles (15), conference crowns (7) and Super Bowl championships (4) than any other NFL team. Super Bowl XLIX was the seventh Super Bowl appearance since Kraft purchased the team, a period during which no other team has earned more than four berths. In Kraft's 22 seasons, the Patriots have qualified for the playoffs 17 times, more than doubling the franchise's accomplishments during its first 34 seasons.



Tom Brady will take on the 49ers in his home region of the San Francisco Bay Area for the first time in his career.

Growing up roughly 20 miles south of San Francisco in the city of San Mateo, California, Tom Brady surely holds many memories from time spent as a young spectator at 49ers games. When Brady was just four years old, he attended the 1981 NFC Championship Game with his family. He sat in the stands at Candlestick Park when while his childhood idol, Joe Montana found Dwight Clark for the winning touchdown, now widely known as, "The Catch," that sent the 49ers to the Super Bowl. Today, like Montana, Brady has built his own NFL career of dominance and success, but there is still one experience the Patriots quarterback has yet to have had in his old hometown. That is, playing a game against the 49ers on their home field. The 49ers have traveled to Foxborough twice in Brady's career, but on the one recent occasion that the Patriots played at Candlestick Park in 2008, the quarterback was sidelined with an injury. After 17 seasons in the NFL, this week's game will mark the first time No. 12 will play the red and gold at San Francisco, creating yet another football memory to add to Brady's list in the Bay Area.

BY THE NUMBERS

The Patriots forced two fumbles on kickoffs in the 27-0 win vs. Houston on Sept. 22, 2016. WR Chris Hogan caught two 40-yard passes (63 and 43) at Cleveland (10/9/16) to become the first Patriots player to do so in a game since Rob Gronkowski (50 and 49) at Washington (12/11/11). Stephen Gostkowski executed a successful onside kick vs. Washington (11/08/15) and vs. Philadelphia (12/06/15). It was his third (Cleveland - 12/08/13) and the fourth in team history. The first came when Jim Lee Hunt recovered a Gino Cappelletti kick at the end of the first half in a 26-10 win vs.

TE Martellus Bennett had his fifth career 100-yard game and his third of the 2016 season after finishing with 7 receptions for 102 yards vs. Seattle (11/13/16).

The Patriots have scored on their opening offensive possession of the game in five of nine games so far in 2016,

The Patriots became the first team in $\overline{\text{NFL}}$ history in 2014 to earn five straight first-round byes and extended that record with their sixth straight bye in 2015. Dallas and San Francisco earned four straight byes from 1992 through 1995 and Denver earned four straight from 2012-15.

The Patriots and Green Bay Packers are the only teams that have made the playoffs in each of the last seven seasons (2009-2015).

The Patriots have now had at least one rookie free agent make the team in 13 straight seasons (D.J. Foster, Woodrow Hamilton and Jonathan Jones), the second-longest streak to 17 by Indianapolis.

The Patriots have gone 15 straight seasons without being swept by a division opponent after beating each of the AFC East teams in 2015, extending the longest such streak since the 1970 NFL merger.

The Patriots have held their opponent under 30 yards rushing a total of 17 times after holding Cleveland (10/9/16) to just 27 yards rushing.

The Patriots have scored in the final possession of the first half and the opening possession of the second half 20 times since 2009, first in the NFL. New Orleans is second with 14 such scoring drives. 21.6

TE Rob Gronkowski is first in the NFL in 2016 with a 21.6 average per reception.

He was with Kansas City for two Super Bowls, losing Super Bowl I and winning Super Bowl IV. Said Bolden about his grandfather, "I remember being six years old, him popping in a highlight film of Super Bowl I and IV. I've seen that tape at least 500 times."

BOLDEN BLOCK PARTY

Brandon Bolden blocked his first NFL punt in the win at San Diego (12/7/14) to give the Patriots a first down at the Chargers 25-yard line. It was the Patriots first blocked punt since Patrick Chung blocked a punt at Miami on Oct. 4, 2010.



OVERCOMING ADVERSITY

On April 20, 2011, just days before Texas Christian offensive line prospect Marcus Cannon was to enter the NFL Draft, he was diagnosed with non-Hodgkin's lymphoma, a treatable form of cancer found in lymph tissue. A little more than one week later, the Patriots selected Cannon in the fifth round (138th overall) of the draft with the knowledge of his illness. The Patriots placed Cannon on the Reserve/Non Football Injury list to start the 2011 season while he received treatment and recovered. Cannon was activated to the 53-man roster later that year and is now in his fifth season with the team. Cannon made a full recovery and was named the Patriots 2011 Ed Block Courage Award winner - an annual award presented to select players in the National Football League who are voted by their teammates as role models of inspiration, sportsmanship and courage.

FROM STANDOUT QB TO WR

Edelman began his college football career with a year at the College of San Mateo [Calif.] before transferring to Kent State where as a senior he completed 56 percent of his passes [153 of 275 passes for 1,820 yards] with 13 touchdowns. He was also the leading rusher, gaining 1,551 yards on 215 attempts [an average of 7.5 yards per carry] and scoring 13 touchdowns. His offensive numbers broke Kent State's single-season record for total offense set by Joshua Cribbs in 2003. Said head coach Bill Belichick on the versatility of Edelman: "He played the quarterback position in college at Kent State and all the positions really that he's played in the NFL – covering kicks, returning kicks, slot receiver, outside receiver, slot defender – he didn't do any of those things in college. I think that really speaks to his versatility and how much he's grown as a player and how many things he's learned how to do that he really didn't have much experience with in college. I'd say that's pretty unusual, especially to be as competent in them as he is."

EDELMAN TAKES HIS FATHER'S ADVICE

If there is one thing Julian Edelman has never lacked, it's athletic ability. A dual-threat quarterback at Kent State and former baseball standout in high school, Edelman once wowed Toronto Blue Jays players with his impressive footwork while fielding ground balls in an appearance at batting practice in 2011.

This natural ability may have been overlooked by NFL scouts, who let him fall to the Patriots in the seventh round of the 2009 NFL Draft. Edelman remains focused on the lessons his father, Frank Edelman, taught him at a young age. "I'm still constantly trying to learn," Edelman told *The Boston Herald.* "My dad always put it in my head, when you're green, you're growing, when you're ripe, you're lost. When you're done learning, you're done."



GAROPPOLO MAKES FIRST START

Jimmy Garoppolo became just the fifth quarterback in the last 30 years to make his first regular-season start in a season-opening night game (Sept. 11, 2016 vs. Cardinals). Aaron Rodgers was the last (2008, win vs. Minnesota), with Philip Rivers (2006), David Carr (2002) and Brian Griese (1999) before him. Despite a successful three-year lacrosse career at Penn State, Hogan, also a standout football player in high school, said that playing college football was always in the back of his mind. Having redshirted his sophomore year of lacrosse, Hogan had an extra year of athletic eligibility following his fourth academic year at Penn State. As the football itch still lurked in the back of his mind, Chris played his final year of eligibility with the Monmouth football team, and at the end of the season, joined in on some workouts with teammates who were training for the NFL Combine.

"I honestly didn't know if I had what it took to play in the NFL," Hogan wrote in the Tribune. "Still, it was one of those things where I didn't want to look back in five years and be like, 'Man, I wish I would've tried.'"

Chris did not get invited to compete in that year's Combine, but turned heads during a Pro Day held at Fordham. Later that summer, he signed with the San Francisco 49ers as an undrafted free agent.

ELECTED TEAM LEADER

Patriots wide receiver Matthew Slater has been named to five straight Pro Bowls (2011-15) for his special teams work, but perhaps more revealing of his value to New England is the fact that he was elected a captain by his teammates for the sixth straight season in 2016.

The special teams ace was willing to share his advice on being a great captain with high school football players in a story published by *The Boston Globe*. "I think first and foremost, you have to be able to put others before yourself. Being a captain and leadership is about serving, and to me, that means a great deal of sacrifice – putting aside personal agendas for the greater common goal. Leadership is equated with sacrifice. I think you have to be willing to do whatever it takes for the unit to succeed. I think you need to lead by example. A lot of times, it's about what you do, not what you say."

SLATER'S EMERGENCE WAS SPECIAL

Bill Belichick acknowledged Matthew Slater's role as a gunner on special teams: "Matt is one of the best in the league," Belichick said. "Any time the punt return team has to double somebody, that makes it one less guy they can use somewhere else in the return. He almost always draws two guys out there unless they're in an eight-man rush. Most of the time, there's two guys out there — fourth-and-short, where they're trying to protect the box — but he draws a lot of double teams, and deservedly so. He does an outstanding job of covering punts."



WHITE HAS CAREER DAY

James White set career highs with 10 receptions and 115 receiving yards vs. Philadelphia (12/6/15). White's 115 receiving yards are the second-highest such total for a Patriots running back since the 1970 AFL-NFL merger, trailing only Shane Vereen's team-record 153 receiving yards vs. Cleveland on Dec. 8, 2013. White's 10 catches are the third highest such total of the Bill Belichick era for a running back (since 2000), trailing only Shane Vereen's club record 12 catches vs. Cleveland on Dec. 8, 2013, and Kevin Faulk's 11 catches vs. Tampa Bay on Sept. 3, 2000.

On July 18, Nate Ebner was selected to the 2016 U.S. Olympic Rugby squad and after he was given an excused leave of absence from his football obligations in Foxboro, suited up for Team USA in Rio de Janeiro in August. The Dublin, Ohio native was introduced to the sport of rugby around the age of six and developed a passion and a talent that stemmed from his father and role model, Jeff Ebner, who played the game at the University of Minnesota. Nate did not play football in high school but was a two-time MVP of the USA Rugby team at the Junior World Cup and a standout on the U19 and U20 national teams.

Although his parents were divorced, Nate and his father remained very close. "We were super tight," Nate told the Boston Globe. "I would put my father-son relationship against anyone's. He taught me how to be a man." The two often spent time working together at the family's auto reclamation business, Ebner & Sons in Springfield, Ohio, and would also train in the gym together behind the motto, "Finish Strong," - a message Jeff always preached to his son.

Nate played rugby at Ohio State during his first two years of college, but as an All-American on the school's club team, he decided to walk on to the Buckeyes football team and finish his career with his sights set on reaching the NFL.

As a first round draft pick, Dont'a Hightower is used to high expectations. Hightower went to training camp with jersey #45 but was switched to jersey #54 prior to the start of his rookie year in 2012. Former LB Tedy Bruschi wore #54 for 13 seasons.

Hightower understands the importance of the number and hopes to live up to its legacy. "I definitely feel honored to be able to wear this number," Hightower said. "I've read that Tedy didn't want it to be retired and he hoped another



linebacker would come in and be able to wear this number and be able to play as well. I feel honored. Tedy was a great player, and he means a lot to this organization. I'm definitely proud to be able to wear this number."

THE SKINNY ON LONG

★ In 2013, Long climbed Mt. Kilamanjaro with former teammate James Hall. While on the trip, Chris noticed the horrible water conditions facing the children and natives to Tanzania. Through his charitable organization, the Chris Long Foundation, Long started the Waterboys Initiative to help raise money and build wells in East Africa that could provide a source of clean water in poor areas.

DOUBLE TROUBLE: DB DEVIN McCOURTY

After being selected by the Patriots in the first round of the 2010 NFL Draft, DB Devin McCourty became part of a select group in league history. McCourty's identical twin brother, Jason, is a cornerback with Tennessee, selected in the sixth round of the 2009 NFL Draft. The two are the 12th set of twins to play in the NFL. Devin redshirted for the 2005 season and therefore was a year behind his brother in eligibility. McCourty is the second twin to suit up for the Patriots, after CB Kato Serwanga was a member of the team from 1998-2000. His twin brother, Wasswa, played for San Francisco and Minnesota from 1999-2001. According to McCourty's mother, the two can only be told apart by tiny scars on their faces left by chickenpox. The McCourty twins are one of two active sets of twins playing in the NFL.

WHERE DID HE COME FROM?

Rob Ninkovich's journey to the Patriots was not easy. He entered the league as a fifth-round pick by the Saints in 2006 and was waived four times by New Orleans and Miami before landing in New England on Aug. 2, 2009. He spent the 2009 offseason trying to make the New Orleans team as a long snapper. Before coming to the Patriots, he had appeared in just eight games over three seasons. He doubled that total in his first year in New England, appearing in 15 games in 2009 and his role on the team has grown since, earning a starting role at linebacker in 2010 and 2011 before moving to a starting role on the defensive line in 2011.

CAREER DAY IN BUFFALO

Ninkovich finished with a three-sack game for the first time in his career in the win at Buffalo (10/12/14), He has had two two-sack performances - vs. Miami (1/2/11) and at Carolina (11/18/13).

CRAZY EIGHTS

Ninkovich had eight sacks in three consecutive seasons from 2012-14, becoming the first Patriots player to have at least eight sacks in three consecutive seasons since Pro Football Hall of Famer Andre Tippett achieved the feat from 1985-87 (1985, $16\frac{1}{2}$, 1986, $9\frac{1}{2}$ and 1987, $12\frac{1}{2}$).

NINKOVICH SCORED AS A TE IN COLLEGE

Ninkovich played some at tight end in college at Purdue and caught two touchdown passes with a 2-yard touchdown pass from Buffalo QB Kyle Orton and a 1-yard touchdown pass from former New York Giants and Indianapolis QB Curtis Painter.

DB LOGAN RYAN AND DB DURON HARMON

CLASSMATES REUNITE IN NEW ENGLAND

Defensive backs Logan Ryan and Duron Harmon are used to working together. Ryan and Harmon began their college football careers together as members of the same recruiting class at Rutgers University and developed a close friendship during their four years in Piscataway, N.J. As fate would have it, Ryan and Harmon would begin their NFL journeys together as well when the Patriots selected the two defensive backs just eight picks apart in the third round of the 2013 NFL Draft.

Reunited once again, the former Scarlet Knights are excited and eager to make their mark, just as they did at Rutgers. "We talked before the draft and said how good it would be to play on the same team again, and for it to happen again, it's exciting and it's a blessing," Harmon told *The Boston Globe.* "It's great [we're contributing], because at the end of the day you want to play, and to contribute to a team like this, it's fun."

RYAN RETURNS... TO SCHOOL

When Logan Ryan decided to leave Rutgers and enter the NFL Draft after his redshirt junior season in 2012, he made a promise to his parents that after his rookie year, he would return to school and earn his degree.

Ryan kept his promise and graduated in the spring of 2014 with a degree in labor relations and a minor in psychology.

"I committed to Rutgers, not only as a football player, but as a student, so I was going to make sure I finished that end too," Ryan told NJ.com.

"It's a big accomplishment in my life. I held my word to my parents and stuck with it and I'm fortunate. It took a lot of work, but I was able to go back and finish and walk in graduation."

RYAN'S FIRST PICK FOR SIX

Ryan returned his first NFL interception 79 yards for a touchdown N.Y. Jets on Oct. 20, 2013. SCORING FLURRY

The Patriots scored three touchdowns in a 57-second span during the final two minutes of the first half against Chicago on Oct. 26, 2014 to turn a 17-7 lead into a 38-7 cushion. It was the fastest three-touchdown flurry in the NFL since the Patriots had three touchdowns in 52 seconds against the New York Jets on Nov. 22, 2012. The Patriots are one of three teams to score three touchdowns in under a minute since the 1970 merger, and are the only team to have achieved the feat twice.

★ After the Patriots defense forced a quick three-and-out, a 42-yard Julian Edelman punt return gave New England possession at the Chicago 9-yard line, and Brady found Brandon LaFell for a 9-yard touchdown on the next play to give the Patriots a 31-7 lead with 1:07 left in the first half.

 \star On the Bears' first play following the LaFell touchdown, Zach Moore forced a Jay Cutler fumble that was recovered by Rob Ninkovich and returned for a 15-yard touchdown and a 38-7 Patriots lead with 55 seconds left in the first half.

A COMEBACK FOR THE AGES

The Patriots came back from a 24-point deficit to defeat the Broncos, 34-31, in overtime in a Sunday Night Football matchup on Nov. 24, 2013, marking the largest comeback win in team history, after trailing 24-0 at halftime.

New England's previous best comeback win was from a 23-0 deficit to win, 38-23, vs. Seattle (9/16/84). The Patriots also came back from 22 points down to win at the New York Giants, 23-22 (12/21/96). The Patriots have come from 21 points down to win four times, most recently vs. Buffalo (1/1/12).

PATRIOTS IN THE PLAYOFFS

The Patriots have qualified for the playoffs 23 times in their 56-year history. Seventeen of those playoff berths have come in the 22 seasons since Robert Kraft purchased the team in 1994, a dramatic contrast to the six total playoff berths the team earned in its first 34 years of existence. The Patriots have won 18 division crowns, including 13 in the last 15 seasons, and have qualified as a Wild Card team four times (1976, 1985, 1994 and 1998). The Patriots also qualified for the playoffs in 1982 during the strike season.
