PACKERS VISIT PHILADELPHIA FOR PRIMETIME MATCHUP

The Green Bay Packers stay on the road to play the Philadelphia Eagles in the last game of a three-game road trip.



- ▶ This is the 24th consecutive season (1993-2016) that Green Bay is appearing on *Monday Night Football*, the second-longest streak in the league behind only Denver's 25-year span (1992-2016). It is the Packers' lone *MNF* appearance this season.
- ▶ Green Bay is 30-31-1 all-time on *MNF* and has won its past two appearances.
- ▶ It is the fourth meeting between the two teams on *MNF*. They last played against each other on *MNF* in 2006, a 31-9 Eagles victory in Philadelphia.
- ▶ Monday is the last of five primetime games that were scheduled for Green Bay this season.
- ▶ The Packers won the last matchup against the Eagles, 53-20, at Lambeau Field in 2014.
- ▶ Green Bay won each of its last two games at Philadelphia, 21-16 in the 2010 Wild Card playoffs and 27-20 during the 2010 regular season.
- ▶ The Packers lead the regular-season series against the Eagles, 25-14.
- ▶ Including the postseason, Green Bay has won four of the last five matchups against Philadelphia.
- ▶ Eagles head coach Doug Pederson played quarterback from the Packers from 1996-98 and 2001-04.
- ▶ Monday will be the third time in the last four seasons Green Bay and Philadelphia have played each other.
- ▶ The Packers have posted 400-plus total yards of offense in three straight games, just the second time in the last seven seasons that Green Bay has done that (Weeks 8, 10-11 in 2014).
- ▶ The Packers have scored 23 or more points in seven of the last eight games. Dating back to Week 3, they are tied for the second-most 23-plus point games in the NFL, trailing only the Dallas Cowboys, who have eight (according to pro-football-reference.com).
- ▶ Under Head Coach **Mike McCarthy**, Green Bay is 83-43-1 during the regular season against NFC opponents. The Packers' 83 wins and .657 winning percentage both rank No. 1 among NFC teams over that span.
- ▶ Green Bay is 35-28 on the road against NFC teams since 2006, a .556 winning percentage that ranks No. 2 in the NFC, trailing only the Dallas Cowboys (37-26, .587).
- ▶ The Packers are playing three road games in a row for the first time since 2012 and only the third time in the last 19 seasons (also 1998).
- ▶ Green Bay will return to Lambeau Field next Sunday to play its first home game in nearly a month when they host the Houston Texans in their last scheduled matchup against an AFC opponent.
- ▶ The Packers will finish the regular season with four games against NFC foes, including the last three against division opponents.

WITH THE CALL

ESPN is in its 11th season as host of the most successful series in sports television history, *Monday Night Football*. Play-by-play man **Sean McDonough** is joined by analyst **Jon Gruden** for the 47th season of *MNF* broadcasts, with **Lisa Salters** reporting from the sidelines.



- ▶ Milwaukee's WTMJ (620 AM), airing Green Bay games since November 1929, heads up the Packers Radio Network that is made up of 50 stations in five states. **Wayne Larrivee** (play-by-play) and two-time Packers Pro Bowler **Larry McCarren** (analyst) call the action. McCarren first joined the team's broadcasts in 1995 and enters his 22nd season calling Packers games. After originally being paired together in 1999, McCarren and Larrivee enter their 18th season of broadcasts together.
- ▶ Westwood One Sports will air the game on radio across the country. **Kevin Harlan** (play-by-play) and **Boomer Esiason** (analyst) will call the action, with **Steve Tasker** reporting from the sidelines and **Jim Gray** hosting the pregame and halftime shows.
- ▶ The broadcast is also available on Sirius Satellite Radio (WTMJ feed).

- ▶ QB **Aaron Rodgers** threw for 371 yards in Week 10 and 351 yards in Week 11, marking only the third time in his career he has thrown for 350-plus passing yards in back-to-back games (2009, 2011).
- ▶ Rodgers' 722 passing yards in Weeks 10-11 led the NFL.
- ▶ According to the Elias Sports Bureau, Green Bay recorded 23-plus first downs in five consecutive games (Weeks 5-9) in a single regular season for the first time in franchise history.
- ▶ In Week 10, WRs **Davante Adams** (six receptions for 156 yards) and **Jordy Nelson** (12 receptions for 126 yards, one TD) became the second pair of teammates to record 120-plus receiving yards in the same game this season (New Orleans WRs Willie Snead and Brandin Cooks in Week 1).
- ▶ The Packers' six individual 10-catch games have come via four different players (Davante Adams-two, Ty Montgomery-two, Randall Cobb, Jordy Nelson). According to the Elias Sports Bureau, four different players having at least one 10-catch game is tied for the most in a single season in NFL history (2015 New England Patriots / 2013 Atlanta Falcons / 2010 Indianapolis Colts / 2002 St. Louis Rams / 1991 Buffalo Bills).
- ▶ Green Bay's six individual 10-catch games are the most in a single season in franchise history (five in 2004 / three in 2014, 1993, 1942).

STAT OF THE WEEK

- ▶ In Week 11, TE **Jared Cook** registered 105 yards and one touchdown on five receptions (17.5 avg.). According to the Elias Sports Bureau, Cook became only the second TE (Benjamin Watson) to register a 100-yard receiving game with three different franchises.
- ▶ Dating back to 1996, Cook's 17.5 yards-per-catch average was the third highest by a Green Bay tight end in single game (min. five receptions), according to STATS (Jermichael Finley, Oct. 5, 2009, six for 128 yards, 21.3 avg. / Richard Rodgers, Dec. 3, 2015, eight for 146 yards, 18.3 avg.)

GROUP EFFORT

The Packers have history of relying on many receivers over the years and this season is no different.

- ▶ The Packers are one of three teams in the NFL (New Orleans and Washington) to have three players with 45-plus receptions and 500-plus receiving yards each this season (**Davante Adams** - 53 rec. for 663 yds. / **Jordy Nelson** - 53 rec. for 663 yds. / **Randall Cobb** - 48 rec. for 517 yds.).
- ▶ Nelson (nine) and Adams (six) are the **only teammate duo in the NFL** with six-plus touchdown catches this season.
- ▶ Nelson ranks **No. 1 in the NFL** in receiving touchdowns this season and Adams is **tied for No. 4**:

- ▶ For the first time in his career, Nelson posted a touchdown reception in each of the first four games of the season, becoming the first Packer to do so since WR Bill Schroeder in 2001.
- ▶ Nelson's five touchdown receptions in the first four games of this season were tied for the fourth most in franchise history.
- ▶ Rodgers and Nelson have connected for the 54 touchdowns, the second most by a duo in team history behind QB Brett Favre and WR Antonio Freeman (57 TD passes).
- ▶ In Week 9, the Packers had four players with a reception of 20-plus yards (Nelson, Adams, TE **Richard Rodgers**, WR **Jeff Janis**).
- ▶ With 12 receptions for 74 yards (6.2 avg.) in Week 8, Adams became the first Packer to have back-to-back games with 12-plus catches, and his 25 over Weeks 7-8 were a franchise record for most over a two-game span.
- ▶ Week 8 also saw three Packers post their first career TD catches in the game at Atlanta (Janis, **Geronimo Allison**, **Trevor Davis**), which was the first time an NFL team had done that since the Jets on Oct. 23, 2000.
- ▶ Allison and Davis became first rookie duo to both have a TD catch in a game for the Packers since Max McGee and Joe Johnson on Dec. 12, 1954.
- ▶ According to the Elias Sports Bureau, in Week 7 the Packers became just the second team in NFL history to feature three players with 10-plus catches in a game (Adams, 13; Cobb, 11; Montgomery, 10), joining the New England Patriots (Leroy Thompson, Ben Coates, Michael Timpson) vs. Minnesota on Nov. 13, 1994.
- ▶ Adams' 13 receptions for 132 yards (10.2 avg.) and two touchdowns against Chicago tied for the second-most receptions in a single game in franchise history (Don Hutson, 13 receptions vs. Cleveland, Oct. 18, 1942, and 14 vs. N.Y. Giants on Nov. 22, 1942).
- ▶ Montgomery became the first Packer to post back-to-back games with 10-plus catches (10 vs. Dallas in Week 6) since WR Sterling Sharpe in 1993 (Oct. 10, Oct. 24). Adams joined him in Weeks 7 (13) and 8 (12). The only other player to accomplish that feat in a single season in team annals is Hutson in 1942 (Nov. 15, Nov. 22).
- ▶ Montgomery recorded 60 yards rushing and 66 yards receiving in Week 7, becoming the first Green Bay player since RB Ahman Green (63 rushing/68 receiving) at Detroit on Sept. 24, 2006, to register 60-plus rushing yards and 60-plus receiving yards in a game.

- ▶ The Packers rank **No. 6 in the NFL** in third-down conversions:

- ▶ The Packers rank **No. 8 in the NFL** in average time of possession (31:10) this season.
- ▶ Green Bay is **No. 8 in the league** in rushing yards/play (4.55) this season.
- ▶ WR **Jordy Nelson** leads the NFL in receptions and receiving touchdowns in the red-zone this season:

- ▶ Green Bay has had one or more players register 10-plus receptions and/or 100-plus receiving yards in seven of the last eight games.
- ▶ In Week 11, QB **Aaron Rodgers** registered a passer rating of 115.0 at Washington, his third game this season (129.3 vs. Detroit / 125.5 at Atlanta) with a passer rating of 115.0-plus, tied for the sixth most in the NFL.
- ▶ In Week 10, WR **Davante Adams** became the only Packer player to register three receptions of 35-plus yards in the same game (dating back to 1991).
- ▶ According to STATS, Rodgers has registered 21 passing touchdowns in the red zone, tied with Drew Brees for **No. 1 in the NFL**.
- ▶ Rodgers' 46 completions in the red zone rank **No. 2 in the NFL** behind Brees.
- ▶ WR **Trevor Davis** registered a 55-yard punt return against Atlanta, the longest punt return by Green Bay since DB **Micah Hyde** returned a punt 55 yards for a touchdown vs. Detroit on Dec. 28, 2014.
- ▶ In Week 7, Green Bay recorded 32 first downs, the most by the Packers since Nov. 27, 1983, at Atlanta (32). It tied for the second most in franchise history. Green Bay also possessed the ball for 39:36, the best mark by the team since Oct. 27, 2013, at Minnesota (40:54).
- ▶ LB **Blake Martinez** recorded his first career interception in the Week 7 victory over the Chicago Bears.
- ▶ The Packers have eclipsed 400 total net yards five times this season (406 vs. N.Y. Giants and Chicago Bears / 405 vs. Indianapolis / 402 at Tennessee / 424 at Washington), tying (New Orleans) for the third most games with 400 total net yards in the NFL this season (Washington, six; Dallas, eight).
- ▶ P **Jacob Schum** set career highs (min. four punts) in Week 10 by posting a 50.5-yard gross average on four punts. In Week 9, he set a career best (min. four punts) with a 47.5-yard net average on four punts.
- ▶ Since Week 6, Schum ranks No. 2 in the league (min. 12 punts) with a 49.3-yard gross average over that span, trailing only San Diego's Drew Kaser (50.1). He ranks No. 7 over that span with a 42.9-yard net average.

AT THE HELM

Having led Green Bay to the playoffs in eight of his first 10 seasons as head coach, **Mike McCarthy** is joined by Vince Lombardi and Mike Holmgren as the only coaches to guide the Packers to a Super Bowl win with a victory over Pittsburgh in Super Bowl XLV.

- ▶ McCarthy guided the Packers to a franchise-record fourth consecutive division title in 2014.
- ▶ With a win at Tampa Bay in Week 16 of the 2014 season, McCarthy passed Lombardi for the No. 2 spot in team history as far as overall victories:

- ▶ The 116 overall wins are the most in the NFC and the third most in the NFL since 2006 (NE 144 and IND 118).
- ▶ McCarthy reached 100 career wins (including playoffs) in just his 155th game. He was the fastest to reach 100 wins in the NFL since George Seifert in 1996 (132 games).
- ▶ McCarthy's 104 regular-season wins in his first 10 years as a head coach (2006-15) rank No. 3 in NFL history:

3. Mike McCarthy, GB	104

- ▶ McCarthy recorded his third regular season with 12-plus wins in 2014 (2007, 2011), passing Curly Lambeau (1929, 1931), Lombardi (1962, 1966), Holmgren (1996-97) and Mike Sherman (2001-02) for the most by a coach in franchise history.
- ▶ McCarthy has guided the Packers to five seasons with 11-plus wins (2007, 2009, 2011-12, 2014), passing Lombardi (1961-63, 1966) and Holmgren (1995-98) for the **most by a coach in franchise history**.
- ▶ McCarthy's seven regular seasons with 10-plus wins are a franchise record (since 1921).
- ▶ McCarthy joined Pittsburgh's Bill Cowher (2005) as the only Super Bowl-winning coaches to lead their respective teams to three road wins as the No. 6 seed in the postseason en route to a world title.
- ▶ Including playoffs, McCarthy has a 116-68-1 record since taking over as head coach in 2006, a .630 winning percentage that ranks **No. 2 among current NFL head coaches** (minimum 75 games):

- ▶ McCarthy coached in his 134th game in Week 13 at Detroit in 2013 (including playoffs), moving him past Bart Starr for No. 2 in team history:

- ▶ In the Week 6 victory over the San Diego Chargers in 2015, McCarthy earned the 100th regular-season win of his career in just his 150th game, making him the seventh-fastest coach in NFL history and the fastest current NFL coach to reach the 100-win plateau:

- ▶ Since McCarthy took over in 2006, the Packers rank **No. 2 in the NFL** in regular-season winning percentage:

WINNING WAYS

- ▶ The Packers are the only NFC team and one of two teams in the league (New England) to make the playoffs each of the past seven seasons (2009-15). Those seven appearances were more than the rest of the NFC North Division combined during that span (Minnesota-three / Detroit-two / Chicago-one).
- ▶ Below are the head coaches who have led a single franchise to seven or more consecutive playoff appearances:

- ▶ There were seven teams in the NFL with five-plus playoff appearances from 2009-15, with only two in the NFC (**Green Bay** and New England, seven / Cincinnati, six / Baltimore, Denver, Indianapolis and Seattle, five).
- ▶ From 2009-12, Green Bay posted four straight 10-win seasons, **tying a franchise record** that was done three other times in club annals (1929-32, 1995-98, 2001-04). The Packers' win total of 47 from 2009-12, ranks second in franchise history for a four-year period.
- ▶ Green Bay's six 10-win regular seasons since 2009 are **No. 2 in the NFL**:

RODGERS AND TOUCHDOWNS

QB **Aaron Rodgers** has found a way to find the end zone a lot in his career, and that has continued this season.

▶ Rodgers ranks **No. 2 in the NFL** this season in passing touchdowns:

Player	TD Passes (2016)
1. Drew Brees, NO	26
2. Aaron Rodgers, GB	25

4. Marcus Mariota, TEN	23

▶ Rodgers registered four touchdown passes in the first half of the Week 3 victory over Detroit. It was the second time in his career that he recorded four-plus touchdowns in the first half (six vs. Chicago, Nov. 9, 2014).

▶ Rodgers has thrown four-plus touchdowns in a game 18 times, one shy of QB Brett Favre's franchise mark (19 games), the sixth most in NFL history and **No. 3 among active quarterbacks**:

▶ Rodgers is **tied for No. 2 in the NFL** this season with five games with three-plus passing touchdowns. He ranks **No. 2 in the league** in games with three-plus passing touchdowns since 2008:

▶ Rodgers registered three-plus passing touchdowns in three consecutive games (Weeks 7-9), totaling 10 touchdowns and one interception over that span. It marked the fifth time in his career that Rodgers registered three-plus passing touchdowns in three or more games in single season (five: games six-10 in 2011 / four: games four-seven in 2012 and 2014 / three: games 14-16 in 2012). According to pro-football-reference.com, Rodgers is the only quarterback in the NFL to record three consecutive games with three-plus touchdown passes this season.

▶ Rodgers is **tied for No. 1 in the NFL this season** (Tom Brady) in games with three-plus passing touchdowns and zero interceptions (four). **Dating back to 2008, Rodgers leads the NFL** in games with three-plus TDs and zero INTs:

▶ Dating back to 1960, Rodgers' 60 rushing yards in Week 8 were the second most in a single game by a Green Bay quarterback, trailing only the 88 yards on eight carries (11.0 avg.) by Don Majkowski at Detroit, Sept. 30, 1990.

▶ Rodgers joined Cam Newton (Dec. 20, 2015, at NYG) as the only QBs over the past four seasons (2013-16) to post four-plus passing TDs and 60-plus rushing yards in the same game.

▶ By rushing for 43 yards on six carries (7.2 avg.) in Week 9, Rodgers recorded over 40-plus rushing yards in back-to-back games for the first time in his career.

▶ Rodgers went over the 30,000-yard passing mark for his career in 2015 in Week 6 vs. San Diego. He reached the mark on his 3,652nd attempt, the fewest attempts needed in NFL history, as he bested the previous record held by QB Johnny Unitas (3,695 attempts).

▶ Rodgers reached the mark in his 116th career game, the fourth fewest in NFL history.

▶ Rodgers reached 250 touchdown passes in Week 12 of 2015. He did in his 121st career game, surpassing MIA QB Dan Marino (128) for the NFL record.

- Peppers is the first player in NFL history with 100 career sacks and four interception returns for touchdowns. In 2014, he became the first linebacker in Packers' history to post two interception returns for touchdowns in the same season.
- Peppers is the **only player in NFL history** to register at least 10 interceptions and 100.0 sacks (since 1982).

PERRY LEADS THE RUSH

Packers LB **Nick Perry** has led a pass rush that has recorded multiple sacks in eight of 10 games and includes two-plus sacks by six players.

- ▶Perry has registered a team-high seven sacks, **tied for No. 14 in the NFL** in 2016.
- ▶Perry has registered a half-sack or more in seven games this season, **tied for No. 3 in the NFL**.

- ▶In Week 6, Perry registered his first career interception and added a sack, making him the first Green Bay LB to post both in a game since **Clay Matthews** at the N.Y. Giants on Dec. 4, 2011.
- ▶Perry matched his career high with a team-best two sacks in Week 3 vs. Detroit.
- ▶Perry has at least one two-sack game in each of the last four seasons (2013-16), the lone Packer to accomplish that feat over that span.

CONTINUAL IMPACT

In his career, DT **Mike Daniels** has seen his playing time steadily increase as well as his production. After playing in 14 games as a rookie in 2012, he has played in every game since the start of the 2013 season.

- ▶In Week 2 at Minnesota, he recorded a sack and tied for the team lead with four QB hits. In Week 3, he led the Packers with two QB hits, and in Week 8 he registered a sack.
- ▶In 2015, Daniels led the Packers' defensive line in tackles (66) and sacks (four). He finished third on the team with 12 QB hits.
- ▶In Week 5 versus St. Louis last season, he tied for the team lead with a career-best nine tackles (eight solo).
- ▶Daniels registered his first career interception in Week 16 at Arizona (2015), returning it 23 yards. According to STATS LLC, it was the first interception by a Packers DT since Cullen Jenkins on Oct. 18, 2009. Dating back to 1960, his 23-yard interception return was the longest by a Green Bay DT on an interception.
- ▶He led Green Bay's defensive line with 5.5 sacks and was the team leader in quarterback hits (19) and pressures (22) during the 2014 regular season.
- ▶Daniels is third on the Packers with 18.0 sacks since the start of the 2013 season (Peppers-22.0 / Matthews-28.0). He ranks **No. 11 among NFL defensive tackles** over that span, according to STATS LLC:

ON THE RISE

S **Ha Ha Clinton-Dix** has been a presence on the Packers defense since his rookie season.

- ▶After starting 10 of 16 games and both postseason contests as a rookie, he has started every game since 2015.
- ▶According to STATS, he is one of seven safeties with one or more forced fumbles and multiple interceptions this season.
- ▶In 2016, he posted a career high in Week 9 with two interceptions and became the first Green Bay safety to register two INTs in a game since **Morgan Burnett** did so vs. Minnesota on Dec. 2, 2012. He joined CB Al Harris (vs. New Orleans, Oct. 9, 2005) as the only players to post two INTs in a first quarter for the Packers since 1993.
- ▶His three career postseason interceptions **rank No. 1 among safeties** since he entered the league in 2014, according to STATS.
- ▶Clinton-Dix finished second on the team with 95 tackles (73 solo) in 2014 and led the Packers with 117 tackles (97 solo) last season.
- ▶He registered a total of three interceptions last season (including play-offs). He tied for fourth on the team with two during the regular season and registered one in the postseason.
- ▶According to STATS, his three sacks during the 2015 regular season were tied for the fifth most in a single regular season by a Packers safety (since 1982) and the most since Mark Roman recorded 3.5 in 2004.
- ▶Clinton-Dix's three sacks also tied for **No. 3 in the NFL** in 2015 among safeties.
- ▶During the 2015 regular season, he registered eight-plus tackles in eight games, including setting career highs in both total tackles (12) and solo tackles (11) in the Week 10 game vs. Detroit, in which he also registered an interception.

RACKING UP POINTS

K **Mason Crosby** is moving his way up the record books.

- ▶Crosby passed Ryan Longwell in Week 2 of the 2015 season to become the franchise career points leader:

- ▶Crosby (317) eclipsed Longwell (277) for the most field goal attempts in Packers' history.
- ▶Crosby (1,340) passed Longwell (1,119) for the most points scored in the regular and postseason combined in franchise history.
- ▶Dating back to 2013, Crosby has made 102 field goals during the regular season, **tied for No. 6 in the NFL** over that span.
- ▶Crosby recorded 108 points during the 2015 regular season, giving him the ninth 100-point season of his career and passing Ryan Longwell (1997-2004) for the franchise record.
- ▶In Week 11 of 2015, he tied the single-game team record with five field goals and became the first player in NFL history to have five field goals of 40-plus yards in a game. In the same game, Crosby connected on a 52-yard field goal, extending his career franchise record for the most 50-yard FGs to 26.

ON THE ROAD AGAIN

Green Bay went 7-1 away from Lambeau Field in 2011, with the seven road wins setting a single-season franchise record.

- ▶ The Packers have been able to stay above the .500 mark on the road during Head Coach **Mike McCarthy's** tenure, a notable achievement in the National Football League.
- ▶ Since 2006, McCarthy's first season as the head coach in Green Bay, only nine of 32 NFL teams have regular-season road records above .500.

323 AND COUNTING

Another packed house at Lambeau Field against the Indianapolis Colts in Week 9 brought the stadium's consecutive-sellouts streak to 323 regular-season games (not including replacement games).

- ▶ The league's longest-tenured stadium, Lambeau Field is hosting its 60th season of football in 2016. For the victory over Dallas in the Divisional round of the 2014 playoffs, Packers fans set a new Lambeau Field paid attendance record (79,704).
- ▶ Across American professional sports, only Boston's Fenway Park (1912) and Chicago's Wrigley Field (1914) have longer tenures.

THE LAMBEAU ADVANTAGE

The crown jewel of the National Football League, Lambeau Field has long been known as one of the tougher venues to play in, particularly during the harsh Wisconsin winter.

- ▶ Re-establishing home-field advantage after a 4-4 mark in 2008 was one of the goals of 2009, and with the Packers finishing 6-2 at home, they accomplished that goal. Green Bay followed that up with a 7-1 mark at Lambeau Field in 2010, a perfect 8-0 record in 2011, the first undefeated home mark since 2002, and a 7-1 mark in 2012. The Packers were one of two teams to finish undefeated at home during the 2014 regular season (Denver).
- ▶ Head Coach **Mike McCarthy** stated consistently upon his arrival in Green Bay that one of the team's goals would be to reclaim the mystique of playing at Lambeau Field. Mission accomplished. The team is 62-22-1 (.735) at home in the regular season since 2006, **No. 2 in the NFL**.
- ▶ Since **Ron Wolf** and **Mike Holmgren** began the revitalization of the franchise in 1992, Green Bay owns the best home record in the NFL. A look at the top regular-season home W-L records since the '92 season:

- ▶ However, Green Bay has remained among the most successful teams since the advent of free agency in 1993. The Packers have won 10 or more games 15 times since '93 and captured 10 division crowns.

A LOOK AT THE SCHEDULE

The Green Bay Packers' 96th NFL regular-season schedule is headlined by five prime-time games (subject to flexible scheduling).

- ▶ Green Bay's schedule includes five games against 2015 playoff teams. Three of those contests (Minnesota, Houston, Seattle) will be at Lambeau Field, while two (Minnesota, Washington) will come on the road.
- ▶ The Packers kicked off their season on the road for the fourth consecutive year, the longest streak in team history, opening with two road games for the first time since 1924. Green Bay traveled to Jacksonville, playing on the road against an AFC team in Week 1 for the first time since facing the New England Patriots in 1985.
- ▶ Green Bay faced division opponents in Weeks 2-3. They began with a trip to Minnesota to face the Vikings in a prime-time game and returned to Lambeau Field last week for the home opener against the Detroit Lions.
- ▶ For the second time in four years, the Packers had their bye in Week 4.
- ▶ Green Bay returns to action with three consecutive home games against NFC teams over a 12-day span. In Week 5, the Packers played on Sunday night against the New York Giants. It was the Giants' first regular-season game at Lambeau Field since 2010. In Week 6, Green Bay played the Dallas Cowboys for the fourth consecutive season (including playoffs) and for the second straight year at home in the regular season. Green Bay finished the homestand playing the Chicago Bears on a Thursday night for the second consecutive season (11th straight year in primetime).
- ▶ Four of the Packers' next five games will be on the road, including three road games in a row for the first time since 2012.
- ▶ After a trip to play the Atlanta Falcons in Week 8, Green Bay faced the Indianapolis Colts at home for the first time since 2008. The Packers made just their third regular-season visit to Tennessee to play the Titans in Week 10.
- ▶ Green Bay will play two prime-time road games in a row, first traveling to play against the Washington Redskins on a Sunday night in Week 11 and then going to Philadelphia to face the Eagles on *Monday Night Football* in Week 12. It marks the 24th consecutive season (1993-2016) that Green Bay is appearing on *MNF*.
- ▶ Green Bay will play its first game at home in almost a month when it faces the Houston Texans in Week 13 for just the second time ever at Lambeau Field.
- ▶ Week 14 brings a familiar matchup as the Packers welcome the Seattle Seahawks to Lambeau Field for the second consecutive year. Including the postseason, Green Bay and Seattle will meet for the fifth time in five years.
- ▶ For the first time since 2006, the Packers will finish the regular season with three straight games against NFC North opponents.
- ▶ In Week 15, Green Bay will travel to Chicago to play the Bears. The Packers have won four consecutive games against the Bears in December, three of which were played in Chicago.
- ▶ Green Bay returns home to play the Vikings in Week 16 on Christmas Eve, playing on a Saturday for the first time since 1997. The Packers last played on Christmas Eve in 2004, a 34-31 victory at Minnesota. Including playoffs, Green Bay has a 8-2-1 mark (.773) against the Vikings at Lambeau Field under McCarthy.
- ▶ The Packers will finish the regular season in Detroit for the first time since 1993. Green Bay has won seven of 10 games at Ford Field under McCarthy. It will be only the third time the Packers have played at the Lions during the regular season in the month of January (1983, 1994).

BREAKING DOWN THE ROSTER

The Packers have a 53-man roster that is composed of 24 offensive players, 26 defensive players and three specialists.

- ▶ Of the 53 players on the roster, 48 began their pro careers with the Packers (90.6 percent) and 36 of them (67.9 percent) were draft picks of the Packers. Dating back to 2009, Green Bay has selected nine players in the first round, seven of which are still on the team.
- ▶ Green Bay has 14 players on the roster that began their careers as undrafted free agents, with 12 of those originally signed by Green Bay.
- ▶ Six 2016 undrafted rookie free agents are currently on the roster (WR Geronimo Allison, S Kentrell Brice, S Marwin Evans, CB Josh Hawkins, RB Don Jackson, FB Joe Kerridge).
- ▶ 39.6 percent of the players (21 of 53) on Green Bay's roster entered the league as a sixth-round or seventh-round pick or as an undrafted player.
- ▶ The Packers have five players on the roster that played in the NFL prior to the 2009 season. Three of those players were draft picks of the Packers (QB Aaron Rodgers, K Mason Crosby and WR Jordy Nelson) and two (Rodgers, Nelson) have made at least one Pro Bowl.
- ▶ Only 19 of the 53 players on the roster (35.8 percent) were selected in the first three rounds of the draft, with 17 being drafted by the Packers.
- ▶ Of the 53 players on the roster, 43 of them (81.1 percent) are 28 years old or younger (as of Nov. 28) and 24 players (45.3 percent) are 24 years old or younger.

PACKERS STARTERS – OFFENSE

WR Jordy Nelson, 9th Year, Kansas State, D2a-08

- ▶ Ranks No. 1 in the NFL with nine receiving touchdowns this season.
- ▶ Has 58 career receiving TDs, ranking No. 4 in Packers history. Trails Donald Driver (61) for the third most.
- ▶ For the first time in his career, posted a touchdown reception in each of the first four games of the season, becoming the first Packer to do so since WR Bill Schroeder in 2001.
- ▶ His five touchdown receptions in the first four games this year tied for the fourth most in franchise history.
- ▶ Missed all of the 2015 season due to a knee injury.
- ▶ Finished the 2014 regular season ranked fourth in receiving yards (1,519), seventh in receptions (98) and tied for second in receiving touchdowns (13). Earned first selection to the Pro Bowl.
- ▶ Led the team in 2013 with 85 catches for 1,314 yards and eight TDs. Ranked No. 10 in the NFL that season in receiving yards.
- ▶ With 15 TD catches in 2011, became only the third player in franchise history to catch 15 or more TDs in a season, joining WRs Sterling Sharpe (18 in 1994) and Don Hutson (17 in 1942).

LT David Bakhtiari, 4th Year, Colorado, D4a-13

- ▶ Has started all but two games at LT since the start of the 2013 regular season. Missed the final two games of the 2015 regular season due to injury.
- ▶ Started all 16 games at left tackle in 2013, the only rookie in the NFL to do so in 2013 and the first Packer rookie to do so since the league went to a 16-game schedule in 1978.
- ▶ Became just the fourth Green Bay rookie to start at LT in the season opener since the 1970 AFL-NFL merger and the first since 1985.

LG Lane Taylor, 4th Year, Oklahoma State, FA-13

- ▶ Has played in 40 regular-season games for Green Bay with 12 starts.
- ▶ Made the first starts of his career in 2015, opening at RG at Detroit in Week 13 in place of an injured T.J. Lang and at LG in Week 17 vs. Minnesota with Josh Sitton sliding to LT in place of an injured David Bakhtiari.
- ▶ A four-year letterman at OSU, starting 47 of 50 games played at right guard. Unanimous first-team All-Big 12 selection by the conference's coaches as a senior.

C JC Tretter, 4th Year, Cornell, D4b-13

- ▶ Started the first seven games this season before a knee injury sidelined him for Weeks 9-11. Set career highs with 16 games played and three starts (all at C) during the 2015 regular season. Also started at LT in the NFC Wild Card game at Washington.
- ▶ Has seen game action at C, LG and both T spots during his career.
- ▶ Was on track to be the starting C in 2014, opening at that position for the first three preseason games, but sustained a knee injury vs. Oakland (Aug. 22) that would sideline him for the first half of the season. Returned to play in the final eight games and both postseason contests.
- ▶ Grew from a high school quarterback, running back and slot receiver into an All-American LT in college, starting 20 consecutive games in his final two seasons at Cornell.

RG T.J. Lang, 8th Year, Eastern Michigan, D4-09

- ▶ Has started games at four different positions on the line as a pro (56 at RG, 27 at LG, five at RT, two at LT). Played C in Week 10 in 2013.
- ▶ Has started 87 contests since 2011, most by a Packers' offensive player.
- ▶ Started games at both tackle spots in his first season (2009) and became the first Packers rookie to start consecutive games at left tackle since Chad Clifton in 2000.
- ▶ Began his college career as a defensive lineman, but converted to the offensive line as a sophomore and started 36 straight games (10 at RT, 26 at LT) over his final three years.

RT Bryan Bulaga, 7th Year, Iowa, D1-10

- ▶ Has started 37 of 42 games since the start of the 2014 season.
- ▶ Missed the second part of the 2012 season after suffering a hip injury vs. Arizona on Nov. 4 and missed all of the 2013 season after injuring his knee on Aug. 3.
- ▶ Started 37 games at RT in his first three seasons in the league.
- ▶ Started the final 12 games of 2010 and the entire postseason at right tackle after taking over for veteran Mark Tauscher (shoulder).
- ▶ Named to the *Pro Football Weekly*/PFWA All-Rookie team in 2010.
- ▶ Capped his rookie season by becoming the youngest player at the time, according to STATS LLC, to ever start in the Super Bowl (21 years, 322 days).

TE Jared Cook, 8th Year, South Carolina, FA-16

- ▶ In Week 11, registered 105 yards and a touchdown on five receptions (17.5 avg.). According to the Elias Sports Bureau, Cook became only the second TE (Benjamin Watson) to register a 100-yard receiving game with three different franchises.
- ▶ Signed with the Packers as a free agent in March 2016 after spending three seasons with the St. Louis Rams (2013-15) and four with the Tennessee Titans (2009-12).
- ▶ Has posted at least 35 receptions in each of the last five seasons (2011-15), one of only five active tight ends in the NFL to do so (Antonio Gates, Jimmy Graham, Rob Gronkowski, Greg Olsen).
- ▶ Holds the single-game franchise record for the most receiving yards by a tight end for both the Titans (169 vs. Jacksonville, Dec. 24, 2011) and the Rams (141 vs. Arizona, Sept. 8, 2013).

WR Randall Cobb, 6th Year, Kentucky, D2-11

- ▶ Ranks No. 3 on the team with 48 receptions this season.
- ▶ Posted the 12th 100-yard receiving game of his career in Week 4 (108 on nine receptions) and tied his single game-high for receptions (11 for 95 yards and a TD) in Week 7.
- ▶ Led the team in receptions (79), was No. 2 in receiving yards (829) and was No. 3 in touchdown receptions (six) in 2015.
- ▶ Set a new single-season career high with five 100-yard receiving games during the 2014 season (three-2012). Earned first trip to the Pro Bowl.
- ▶ His career-best 91 receptions in 2014 were the seventh most in team history.
- ▶ Finished the regular season tied for fourth in the NFL with 12 touchdown receptions in 2014.
- ▶ Before suffering a knee injury in Week 6 in 2013, led the team in receptions with 29 and was No. 2 in receiving yards with 378.
- ▶ Set a franchise single-season record with a league-high 2,342 combined net yards in 2012, topping the previous team mark of 2,250 yards by RB Ahman Green in 2003.

QB Aaron Rodgers, 12th Year, California, D1-05

- ▶ In 129 regular-season starts (84-45 record), has posted 46 games with 300-plus passing yards, 75 without an interception and 71 with a 100-plus passer rating (min. 15 attempts).
- ▶ Earned his fifth selection to the Pro Bowl in 2015, passing Bart Starr (1960-62, 1966) for the second-most selections by a Green Bay quarterback behind Brett Favre's nine (1992-93, 1995-97, 2001-03, 2007).
- ▶ His career passer rating of 103.4 ranks No. 1 in NFL history.
- ▶ Finished the 2014 regular season ranked No. 2 in the NFL in passer rating (112.2), touchdown percentage (7.3), No. 1 in interception percentage (1.0) and No. 3 in touchdown passes (38).
- ▶ Recorded a passer rating of at least 120.0 in seven regular-season games in 2014, setting a single-season career high and tying for the third most in a single season in the NFL, dating back to 1960.
- ▶ Posted 21,332 passing yards from 2008-12, which ranks No. 1 in league history for the most passing yards by a QB in his first five seasons as a starter (previous record was Peyton Manning, 20,618, 1998-2002).
- ▶ In 2011, set an NFL record with a 122.5 passer rating and set franchise marks for TD passes (45), passing yards (4,643), completion percentage (68.3), yards per attempt (9.25) and 300-yard games (eight) on his way to earning NFL Most Valuable Player honors from *The Associated Press*.

RB James Starks, 7th Year, Buffalo, D6-10

- ▶ Has started 11 of 69 career games played during the regular season.
- ▶ Set career highs in starts (four), rushing yards (601), receptions (43), receiving yards (392), receiving TDs (three) and yards from scrimmage (993) last season.
- ▶ In 2015, he put together two of the finest rushing games of his career. In Week 2, he carried the ball 20 times for 95 yards (4.8 avg.), and in Week 6, he racked up 112 yards on just 10 carries (11.2 avg.), becoming the first Packers player to rush for 100-plus yards on 10 or fewer carries since RB Brandon Jackson at Washington on Oct. 10, 2010 (115 yards on 10 carries). He also registered a 65-yard touchdown against San Diego, the longest by a Green Bay player since RB DeShawn Wynn's 73-yard touchdown vs. Detroit on Dec. 28, 2008.
- ▶ Led the NFL with 315 rushing yards during the 2010 playoffs.

FB Aaron Ripkowski, 2nd Year, Oklahoma, D6a-15

- ▶ Set career highs with 34 yards on six carries (5.7 avg.) in Week 8.
- ▶ Played in 15 games as a rookie, seeing action primarily on special teams.
- ▶ Tied for No. 4 on the team with nine special teams tackles last season.



PACKERS STARTERS – DEFENSE

DE Kenny Clark, Rookie, UCLA, D1-16

- ▶ Tied for No. 2 (Guion) on the Packers' defensive line in tackles (25).
- ▶ Became the youngest player to appear in a season opener for the Packers since Arnie Herber (20 years old) in 1930.
- ▶ Earned third-team All-America honors from *The Associated Press* and first-team All-Pacific-12 recognition from the coaches and media as a junior in 2015.
- ▶ Was a team co-captain in '15 and recorded career highs in tackles (75), tackles for a loss (11) and sacks (six). Also ranked third on the team with five pass breakups.

NT Letroy Guion, 9th Year, Florida State, FA-14

- ▶ Has started 29 of the 38 regular-season games he has played in since the start of the 2014 season.
- ▶ Signed with Green Bay during the 2014 offseason after spending his first six NFL seasons with the Minnesota Vikings.
- ▶ Started all 28 games he appeared in for Minnesota in 2012-13, recording 72 tackles (32 solo) and three sacks over that span.
- ▶ Was the only Viking to block a field goal in both 2011 and 2012.

DT Mike Daniels, 5th Year, Iowa, D4a-12

- ▶ Ranks third on the team with 18.0 sacks since the start of the 2013 regular season (LB Julius Peppers-22.0 / LB Clay Matthews-28.0).
- ▶ Leads the Packers' defensive line in tackles (28).
- ▶ Led the defensive line in both tackles and sacks each of that last two seasons.
- ▶ Returned a fumble 43 yards for a TD vs. Detroit in Week 14 of 2012, the longest fumble return for a TD by a rookie in franchise history.
- ▶ Starred as an interior pass rusher at Iowa, posting a team-high 24.5 tackles for a loss and 13 sacks from 2010-11.

LOLB Nick Perry, 5th Year, Southern California, D1-12

- ▶ Leads the team with a career-high seven sacks this season.
- ▶ Registered multiple sacks in each of his first five seasons in the NFL and has posted a two-sack game in each of the last four seasons (2013-16).
- ▶ Has totaled six sacks in five playoff games, including 3.5 in the 2015 postseason which tied Clay Matthews (2010) for the franchise record in a single postseason.
- ▶ His six postseason sacks rank No. 3 in franchise history behind Matthews (10) and Reggie White (eight) and are the most in team history (since 1982) by a player in his first five games with Green Bay.

ILB Jake Ryan, 2nd Year, Michigan, D4-15

- ▶ Leads the team with 61 tackles on the season.
- ▶ Started the final five games of the regular season and both playoff contests in 2015.
- ▶ Recorded a team-best nine tackles (eight solo) and one fumble recovery in Week 13 last season at Detroit in his first pro start.
- ▶ Served as a team captain for his final two seasons at Michigan and was a three-time winner (2012-14) of the Roger Zatkoff Award, given to the Wolverines top linebacker. He was the only player to win the award (est. 1991) three times.
- ▶ Joined LB John Anderson (first round, 26th overall) as the only Michigan linebackers ever drafted by Green Bay.
- ▶ Started 41 of 46 games played in college, appearing at inside linebacker as a senior after spending his first three seasons at outside linebacker and defensive end.

ILB Blake Martinez, Rookie, Stanford, D4a-16

- ▶ Ranks No. 2 on the team with 58 tackles this season.
- ▶ Became the first rookie to start on defense for Green Bay in Week 1 since Nick Perry in 2012.
- ▶ Finished collegiate career with 257 tackles (137 solo), 13.5 tackles for a loss, 6.5 sacks, five interceptions and five forced fumbles in 51 games played.
- ▶ Started all 27 games played in his final two seasons, leading the team in tackles as a junior (102) and senior (141).
- ▶ Led the Pacific-12 and ranked No. 7 nationally with 141 tackles (75 solo) as a senior, averaging a conference-best 10.1 tackles per game.

ROLB Clay Matthews, 8th Year, Southern California, D1b-09

- ▶ For the first time in his career, recorded at least one sack in each of the first three regular-season games he played in.
- ▶ Selected to his sixth Pro Bowl and first as an inside linebacker in 2015 after recording 6.5 sacks (second on the team), 15 QB hits (No. 1 on the team), and a career-high 85 tackles (No. 2 on the team).
- ▶ With 70.5 career sacks, passed Reggie White (68.5) for the second most sacks in Packers history (Kabeer Gbaja-Biamila, 74.5).
- ▶ With a team-high 11.0 sacks in 2014, is tied for the most 10-plus sack seasons in franchise history (four).
- ▶ Is the only player in franchise history to score a defensive TD (interception or fumble return) in each of his first three seasons in the NFL (2009-11).

LCB Damarious Randall, 2nd Year, Arizona State, D1-15

- ▶ Played in 15 games with nine starts (six at LCB, two at RCB, one in the slot) in 2015 and tied for the team lead and No. 2 among NFL rookies with three interceptions, including one he returned for a TD. Finished with a team-best 16 passes defended.
- ▶ Named the NFL's Defensive Rookie of the Month for November 2015, joining CB Casey Hayward (October 2012) as the only Green Bay defensive backs to win the award.
- ▶ Earned first-team All-Pacific-12 honors at safety as a senior in 2014 after he led the Sun Devils in tackles (106) and passes defended (12) and tied for the team lead with three interceptions.

RCB Quinten Rollins, 2nd Year, Miami (Ohio), D2-15

- ▶ Has started six of the seven games (three at LCB, three as the third CB) he has appeared in this season. Missed Weeks 6-8 with a groin injury.
- ▶ Played in 14 games with four starts (two at LCB, two at RCB) in 2015.
- ▶ Tied for No. 3 on the team and No. 4 among NFL rookies with two interceptions last season.
- ▶ Returned his first career interception 45 yards for a touchdown, becoming the first Packers rookie to record a pick-six since S Marques Anderson in 2002 (vs. Detroit, Nov. 10).
- ▶ Played one season of college football and was named Mid-American Conference Defensive Player of the Year and first-team All-MAC.

SS Morgan Burnett, 7th Year, Georgia Tech, D3-10

- ▶ Tied for No. 1 among NFL safeties with a career-best three sacks this season.
- ▶ Missed five games due to injury in 2015, but finished No. 4 on the team with 54 solo tackles.
- ▶ Totaled a team-high 125 tackles in 2014, the second most of his career (137 in 2012). Ranked No. 2 on the team with 106 tackles (77 solo) in 2013, despite missing the first three games due to injury. Recovered three fumbles, including one for a TD, and added nine passes defended.
- ▶ Participated in all 1,088 plays for Green Bay's defense in 2012, one of only four non-OL in the NFL to appear in 100 percent of his team's snaps.
- ▶ Started the first four games of the 2010 season at SS before sustaining a season-ending knee injury vs. Detroit in Week 4.

FS Ha Ha Clinton-Dix, 3rd Year, Alabama, D1-14

- ▶ According to STATS, he is one of only seven safeties with one or more forced fumbles and multiple interceptions this season.
- ▶ Posted a career high in Week 9 with two INTs and became the first Green Bay safety to register two INTs in a game since Morgan Burnett did so vs. Minnesota on Dec. 2, 2012. He joined CB Al Harris (vs. New Orleans, Oct. 9, 2005) as the only players to post two INTs in a first quarter for the Packers since 1993.
- ▶ Led the team in tackles in 2015 with 117 (97 solo) and was tied for fourth on the team in interceptions (two).
- ▶ According to STATS, his three sacks during the 2015 regular season tied for the fifth most in a single regular season by a Packers safety (since 1982) and the most since Mark Roman recorded 3.5 in 2004.
- ▶ Started every game in 2015 after starting 10 of 16 games as a rookie when he finished second on the team in tackles (95).
- ▶ Was a consensus All-America selection in 2013 as a junior, earning first-team recognition from *The Associated Press*, the Football Writers Association of America and *Sporting News*.

MEDIA INFORMATION & POLICIES

MIKE McCARTHY PRESS CONFERENCES

During the regular season (for a Sunday game), the head coach will be available in the Media Auditorium on Monday, Wednesday, Thursday and Friday. One-on-one interviews with McCarthy should be arranged through Jason Wahlers.

PLAYER INTERVIEWS

The team's locker room will generally be open Monday, Wednesday, Thursday, Friday and following games.

- ▶ At the conclusion of all games, the locker room will be opened following the NFL's standard "cooling-off period."
- ▶ All interviews with players on the practice squad or injured reserve need to be requested and approved through the P.R. department.
- ▶ Any requests to interview players other than at the aforementioned times should be directed to a member of the Packers' P.R. department.

ASSISTANT COACH AVAILABILITY

All by request only, through the P.R. department

- ▶ Coordinators – Edgar Bennett (offense, bottom left), Dom Capers (defense, bottom middle) and Ron Zook (special teams, bottom right) – will continue to serve as primary spokesmen in their respective areas.
- ▶ During the regular season, assistants generally will be available on Thursdays at the podium in the Media Auditorium with offense and defense rotating every other week. During a week when offensive coaches are available, Capers will also be available on Thursday to represent the defense. When defensive coaches are available, Bennett will also be available on Thursday to represent the offense. On Mondays, the coordinators will be available at the podium in the Media Auditorium.
- ▶ Following games, Head Coach Mike McCarthy will be the only coach available to the media.
- ▶ However, position coaches are available for questions on specific players and the position group only. Broader interview topics need to be directed to the respective coordinators.
- ▶ No assistant coach should be contacted directly by telephone (at his desk, home or on his cell phone), or by email. All interviews must be arranged through the P.R. department.
- ▶ Sarah Quick (920-569-7213) serves as the primary contact for assistant coaches. In her absence, feel free to contact another member of the P.R. staff.

PRACTICE ACCESS, PHOTOGRAPHY AND SOCIAL-MEDIA GUIDELINES

- ▶ During the regular season, practices will be open to state media who regularly cover the team for designated periods during the first half of each session, similar to previous seasons. Also as in

prior years, photo opportunities will be limited to the beginning portions of practice.

- ▶ The team reserves the right to limit photography to certain periods for competitive reasons. This restriction applies to both training-camp and regular-season practices.
- ▶ During practice periods in which B-roll and still photography are NOT permitted, the media may not utilize camera phones either. The P.R. staff will alert the media of the permissible "shooting" periods before and during each practice.
- ▶ Video of practice, press conferences or locker-room interviews by an individual or media outlet may not be posted at any time on social-media sites or live-broadcasting applications (this includes applications such as Facebook, Twitter, Vine, Instagram, Snapchat, Ustream, Periscope and Meerkat, etc).
- ▶ No still photography is permitted in the locker room at any time. Signs, notes and other personal items or information posted in and around the locker room at player lockers are not to be photographed or captured on video.

ONLINE-CONTENT POLICY

According to the 2016 NFL non-game online content policy, accredited organizations may distribute online non-game audio and video content, including interviews, press conferences and team practices at NFL venues, acquired as a result of credentialed access ("Game Information") to games or club/league facilities provided that such distribution: is 90 seconds maximum per day (180 seconds in two-team markets – 90 seconds per team); may not be "archived" (i.e., made available for on-demand public access) for more than 24 hours; appears in an editorial context only (no sponsorship, merchandising or advertising integrated with or around the content); is not posted live; and is accompanied by links back to NFL.com and to the club website.

The 90-second limit does not include video/audio material that is composed entirely of a credentialed media employee providing commentary or analysis ("talking head" reporting), including pregame or postgame stand-up material shot on the field or other facility location.

While a game is in progress, any forms of accounts of the game must be sufficiently time-delayed and limited in amount (e.g., score updates with detail given only in quarterly game updates, fewer than 10 photographs during the game) so that the accredited organization's game coverage cannot be used as a substitute for, or otherwise approximate, authorized play-by-play accounts.

The Packers have their own social-media and online-content policies for practice reporting, which will be communicated by the P.R. staff for both training camp and the regular season. Members of the media are encouraged to contact the public relations staff with any questions.

CONFERENCE CALLS

The Packers' P.R. department will arrange a conference call with the head coach and a key player of the opposing team each week during the regular season. These conference calls will be made from the media workroom, and generally will be held on Wednesday.

In the Lee Rummel Press Box at Lambeau Field, more than a dozen "co-op" phones are available to media throughout the box. If dedicated service is desired, please contact Scott Guth of Dataline Services seven to 10 days prior to the game at 920-569-7090 or sguth@datalineservicesinc.com. Instruments also may be obtained through Guth, upon request.

Dedicated internet service also may be ordered through Dataline Services – on a game-by-game or full-season basis – for installation in either the Lee Rummel Press Box or in the downstairs Photo/Media Workrooms.

As assigned by the Professional Football Writers of America (PFWA), the Green Bay pool reporter for the 2016 season is Tom Silverstein of the *Milwaukee Journal Sentinel*. Pete Dougherty of the *Green Bay Press-Gazette* is the alternate.

PHOTO CREDENTIALS

Photo credentials will not be issued to freelance photographers unless on a specific assignment from an accredited organization. Credentials are not provided to "grips" due to on-field space limitations.

CREDENTIALS

All credential requests are acquired through an online credential link, which should be obtained by contacting Sarah Quick, assistant director of public relations. Requests may be sent via email (Sarah Quick; quicks@packers.com). Credentials will not be mailed, unless the requesting outlet provides a Federal Express or UPS number, and if scheduled in advance, should be picked up in person at the Packers' corporate offices, located in the Lambeau Field Atrium. Credentials not obtained prior to gameday will be left at Media Will Call on the south side of the stadium near the Shopko Gate. Media Will Call opens three hours prior to kickoff.

JACKSONVILLE: QB — Aaron Rodgers was far from impressed with his season opener. He was concerned that Green Bay's offense wasn't effective early and had some struggles in the red zone. Nonetheless, the Packers' harshest critic was a big reason they won a close game on the road in sweltering heat. Rodgers threw two touchdown passes and ran for another score, leading Green Bay to a 27-23 victory against the Jacksonville Jaguars in the team's season opener Sunday.

Rodgers looked every bit like a two-time league MVP. He extended plays with his feet, escaped sacks and was accurate all over the field. Rodgers completed 20 of 34 passes for 199 yards, with TD passes to Jordy Nelson and Davante Adams. He was sacked once for no yards and didn't turn it over.

He helped the Packers win their second opener in the last five years. This one came on a hot and humid day that left some players cramping and others completely exhausted.

Nelson played his first game since tearing the anterior cruciate ligament in his right knee in the 2015 preseason. The injury significantly impacted Rodgers, who lost his best deep threat, and the offense, which fell to 23rd in the league and led for 25th in passing.

Nelson finished with six receptions for 32 yards, including a 6-yard TD in the second quarter.

The Jaguars mounted a late drive that came up short on a fourth-and-1 play at the Packers' 14. The Jaguars had converted their previous three fourth-down plays, but Allen Hurns failed to move the sticks on a bubble screen.

Blake Bortles completed 24 of 39 passes for 320 yards with a touchdown and an interception.

With 13 seconds left in the first half, Adams hauled in a 29-yarder that was vintage Rodgers, who managed to get rid of the ball with a defender tugging at his jersey and still got enough on it to reach the end zone.

Jaguars running back Chris Ivory was hospitalized Sunday with a "general medical issue" and was inactive for the opener. Ivory was taken by ambulance from the team hotel to a local hospital early Sunday. He was limited in three practices this week because of a calf injury, but the team said that was not related to his hospital stay.

Jaguars receiver Allen Robinson finished with six catches for 72 yards, but there were nine more passes thrown his way.

MINNEAPOLIS -- Sam Bradford had a Minnesota debut almost as dazzling as the new \$1.1 billion building itself, completing 22 of 31 passes for 286 yards, two touchdowns and no turnovers to lead the Vikings to a 17-14 victory over the Green Bay Packers on Sunday night just 15 days after he arrived in a trade.

The defense did the rest, harassing Aaron Rodgers for five sacks and two fourth-quarter turnovers that quashed the comeback and sent the crowd of 66,813 into a deafening frenzy in the third quarter, with a tight knee injury, and only 19 yards on 12 carries, but the Vikings (2-0) proved they still have a lot of options. Stefon Diggs caught nine passes for 182 yards and a touchdown. They held the Packers (1-1) to 65 total yards in the first half, withstanding an early touchdown pass by Rodgers to Jordy Nelson on a drive aided by two penalties by cornerback Terence Newman.

Tray Wayne, who had two penalties himself, intercepted Rodgers' pass in Vikings territory with 1:30 left to seal the victory. The previous drive was killed with a strip sack by Brian Robison, when Shamar Stephen recovered at the Minnesota 44 with 6:53 remaining.

Rodgers, who ran for 29 yards and a touchdown, began to find a groove throwing the ball down the stretch. He finished 12 for 21 for 154 yards in the second half, but Bradford was the better quarterback on this night.

The Vikings, who aggressively traded two premium draft picks including next year's first-rounder to Philadelphia to fetch Bradford after Teddy Bridgewater went down with a massive left knee injury, boldly eschewed a field-goal try early in the second quarter.

Bradford found Diggs for a 4-yard completion on fourth-and-1 from the 18. Then he hit Kyle Rudolph for an 8-yard touchdown pass three plays later.

Bradford was hit hard on his non-throwing hand by Packers outside linebacker Clay Matthews while following through on a pass at one point during the drive. He visited the locker room briefly for further examination but never missed a snap, despite significant swelling beneath his left pinky. There were only a couple of instances that even hinted of nervousness for Bradford and the offense, when one throw on the first drive sailed well past, where Rudolph's route ended and another later in the first quarter was in the air too quickly for Rudolph to turn around.

GREEN BAY, Wis. — The timing is back for quarterback Aaron Rodgers and the rest of Green Bay's offense. The Packers' pass defense might need a little work, though.

Rodgers threw for 205 yards and four touchdowns, including two in the first half to Jordy Nelson, and the Packers snapped out of their offensive funk before holding off the Detroit Lions for a 34-27 win Sunday.

Rodgers was 15 of 24, leading the Packers to touchdowns on their first three series. Nelson had 101 yards on six catches, returning to the form that made him one of the NFL's best receivers before missing the 2015 season with a knee injury.

They moved the ball on the Lions' short-handed defense with ease in the first half. The Packers (2-1) led 31-10 at halftime before the Lions slowly chipped away.

Marion Jones' 35-yard touchdown catch with 3:34 left got Detroit (1-2) within seven. But Rodgers had a critical 11-yard run on third-and-8 from the Packers' 27 with 3:22 left to effectively seal the win.

Jones had a career-high 205 yards on six receptions. Matthew Stafford passed for 385 yards and three scores for the Lions, who held advantages in total yardage (418-324) and time of possession, holding the ball for 35 minutes.

But the Packers burned the secondary with big plays to build a big lead, and Eddie Lacy ran for 103 yards on 17 carries.

Coach Mike McCarthy and Rodgers heard questions about the out-of-sync passing game following the 17-14 loss last week to Minnesota.

Now the Packers head into an early bye week with renewed confidence after a successful opener at Lambeau field.

The Lions gained chunks of yardage in the second half after being forced to play catch-up following Green Bay's big early lead. The Packers' defense was also missing four starters, including linemen Clay Matthews.

Stafford found holes over the middle of the field. He connected with Jones for a 23-yard completion on the first play from scrimmage in the second half to the Detroit 46.

But Green Bay's staunch run defense had another big day, albeit against a Lions offense playing without injured tailback Ameer Abdullah. Detroit managed just 50 yards on 23 carries, with a team-high 38 yards on 10 carries by Dwayne Washington.

Jones gave the Lions a boost going into halftime with a 73-yard touchdown pass from Stafford to get Detroit within 31-10. He stiff-armed cornerback Josh Hawkins before sprinting untouched 45 yards into the end zone.

The Packers' offense accomplished two of McCarthy's bigger goals for this week: Receivers worked the middle of the field, and Lacy got more carries in the running game. Nelson was lined up in the slot on his 8-yard touchdown catch in the first quarter, when Rodgers pump-faked, then stepped up in the pocket to find Nelson. Lacy looked rejuvenated as he bounced off defenders for a 25-yard run in the second quarter.

GREEN BAY, Wis. (AP)—The Green Bay Packers got pushy on both sides of the line of scrimmage against the New York Giants. The offensive line kept Aaron Rodgers clean in the pocket and helped drive the running attack. The defensive line is playing so well that the MVP quarterback is taking notice.

A little more consistency in the passing game, and the Packers could be a force again in the playoffs. Rodgers threw for 259 yards and two touchdown passes, and Green Bay's defense disrupted Eli Manning and limited Odell Beckham Jr. in a 23-16 win on Sunday night.

Manning was 18 of 35 for 199 yards and was sacked three times. The Giants (2-3) lost their third straight game, and the offense has struggled in road losses at Minnesota and Green Bay the last two weeks.

The Packers' defense contained the Giants in the red zone, holding New York to three field goals until late in the fourth quarter. Green Bay's second-ary played well, especially considering the Packers' (3-1) were without starting cornerbacks Sam Shields (concussion) and Damarius Randall (groin). The Packers had another stellar day against the run, albeit against a team that was missing head running back Rashad Jennings (thrudd). The Giants managed just 43 yards on 15 carries against a defense ranked first against the run coming into the night.

Mike Daniels and Leroy Guillon led the effort on the defensive line, with first-round draft pick Kenny Clark becoming a key sub. The line only figures to only get stronger with the expected return of top backup Mike Pennel next week from a four-game suspension for violating the league's substance-abuse policy.

Beckham finished with five catches for 56 yards, but did get his first touchdown catch of the season.

The 8-yard score stood on replay review after the receiver jumped high in the air for Manning's pass and was ruled inbounds after straddling the back line of the end zone.

Randall Cobb was the Packers' most consistent receiver with nine catches for 108 yards. With the Giants' missing starting safety Nat Berne because of an injury, Cobb excelled in his specialty of working the middle of the field and turning short passes into long gains.

Cobb appeared to be OK on the sideline after taking a hit to the back of his head or neck from safety Landon Collins on a 13-yard catch on third-and-10 with about 2 minutes left.

Giants cornerback Janoris Jenkins had two interceptions in the first half, one coming on third-and-6 at the Giants 21 after a pass deflected off receiver Jordy Nelson's hands. It was Jenkins' first two-interception game since his rookie season with St. Louis, when he had two against Arizona on Nov. 25, 2012.

GREEN BAY, Wis. (AP) — Rookie Dak Prescott is starting an impressive case to remain the starting quarterback of the Dallas Cowboys. He's off to quite the start in his NFL career after taking over following veteran Tony Romo's preseason back injury. Prescott threw for 247 yards and three touchdowns, and the Cowboys forced four turnovers in a 30-16 win over the Green Bay Packers. Prescott was 18 of 27 and struck off two touchdowns and an interception to lead the Cowboys (5-1) to their fifth straight win. Prescott showed some poise in the fourth quarter while matching the Cowboys on a seven-play, 75-yard drive that ended with a 4-yard touchdown pass to Cole Beesley for an 18-point lead with 10:26 left. Romo seems to be getting closer to returning. After a bye, Dallas next plays on Oct. 30 against Philadelphia. Prescott looked on a Packers secondary that played much of the game without their top three cornerbacks because of injuries. His fourth-quarter touchdown pass left Packers fans at Lambeau stunned. They were booing at times following another choppy game for Green Bay's offense. The four turnovers were a season high for Green Bay (3-2).

The Packers had the fun times on the day, losing three. Even two-time NFL MVP quarterback Aaron Rodgers wasn't immune from the jeering. Rodgers finished 31 of 42 for a season-high 294 yards. The Packers didn't get into the end zone until Rodgers and Cobb connected on a 6-yard touchdown pass with 6:53 left to get within 27-16. Rodgers accounted for two turnovers with an interception to go with a fumble on first-and-goal at the Cowboys' 1 with 1:10 left in the third quarter. Prescott threw the first interception of his career after he was picked off on third-and-8 from the Dallas 6, knowing out of his end zone with 20 seconds left in third quarter. Safety Morgan Burnett had the diving interception.

Prescott's NFL record streak for a quarterback at the start of his career without an interception ended at 176 pass attempts. He broke the mark of 182 previously held by New England's Tom Brady earlier in the game. Drops were a problem again at times for Packers receivers. Timing may have been off on a couple other throws. Rodgers and McCarthy said the Packers would figure out the problems after watching the film.

It was Green Bay's worst defeat at home with Rodgers as the starting quarterback since a 37-20 loss to the Giants in the 2011 NFC Divisional playoffs. Dallas denied Green Bay's league-best run defense. The Cowboys rushed for 93 yards in the first half against the Packers, which was already a season high against Green Bay. The Packers had been allowing 42.8 yards per game entering Sunday. Dallas was averaging a league-best 155.2 yards per game.

Rookie Ezekiel Elliott finished with 157 yards on 28 carries, giving him 703 yards rushing, in the second-most in a player's first six career games, behind only Eric Decker (787). Elliott also became the only rookie to rush for at least 130 yards in four consecutive games.

GREEN BAY WINS (AP) — Aaron Rodgers set a record. The Chicago Bears lost another quarterback. After a slow start in the red zone, the Green Bay Packers picked up the pace in the second half to overpower their offensively-challenged NFC North foe, they got 326 yards and three touchdowns. Davante Adams and Ty Montgomery emerged as playmakers in the second half and Packers beat the Bears, 26-10, on Thursday night.

Rodgers was 28-of-56, setting a franchise mark for completions in a game. It was the Packers' first contest without injured running back Eddie Lacy. The Packers (4-2) moved efficiently on short gains most of the night, but couldn't break into the end zone until Adams caught the first of his two touchdown receptions with 9:11 left in the third quarter for a 13-10 lead.

Rodgers and Adams combined again for a 4-yard score on the first play of fourth quarter for a 10-point lead.

Chicago turned to third-stringer Matt Barkley. An offense that was already 31st in the league in scoring got worse. Barkley was 6 of 15 for 81 yards and two interceptions. Kaden Cary had 48 yards on 10 carries, including a 24-yarder. Receiver Alshon Jeffery was held to three catches for 33 yards against a Packers secondary without his top three cornerbacks because of injuries.

It got 50 yard for the Bears that Rodgers had more completions (37) than the Bears had offensive plays (36) by 5:31 of the fourth quarter.

That 37th completion for Rodgers was a 2-yard touchdown pass to Randall Cobb for a 16-point lead.

Adams, Montgomery and Cobb each finished with at least 10 receptions.

They were 4 of 11 for 49 yards.

Howe left early in the second quarter after getting hit by Julius Peppers and Clay Matthews on an incomplete on third-and-6 from midfield. Adams had 13 catches for a career-high 132 yards. Adams had just been cleared earlier Thursday from the NFL's concussion protocol after leaving the loss Sunday to Dallas.

Cobb finished with 11 catches for 95 yards.

Montgomery, who got the start in the backfield with running backs Lacy (ankle) and James Starks (knee) out, finished with 10 catches for 66 yards and nine carries for 60 yards.

The Bears' only touchdown came from rookie pass-rushing linebacker Leonard Floyd, who forced Rodgers to fumble on third-and-10 from the 15 on a sack. Floyd recovered the ball in the end zone for a 10-6 lead, 30 seconds into the third quarter. Floyd had been limited in practice this week with a calf injury.

The Packers moved effectively with short passes in the first half but stalled on three drives inside the 22. Mason Crosby salvaged two series with field goals, but the Packers went scoreless on another drive when Montgomery was stopped on a fourth-and-goal run from the 1.

GREEN BAY, which led 6-3 at the half, exploited the Bears' underneath coverage. They also threw short passes as a substitute for the running game.

ATLANTA (AP) — The Atlanta Falcons found themselves in another tight game. This time, they came through with the winning play. After two excruciating losses, the Falcons rallied for a 35-32 victory over the Green Bay Packers when Matt Ryan threw an 11-yard touchdown pass to Mohamed Sanu with 31 seconds remaining Sunday.

With Julio Jones shut down in the second half, Ryan turned to Sanu to bail out Atlanta (5-3). He caught five passes for 50 yards on the final possession, the last of them a touchdown pass in the back of the end zone after he got matched against linebacker Jake Ryan.

The Green Bay player didn't have a chance. Sanu raced past him and hauled in the pass right in front of the goalposts, the ball easily clearing Ryan's outstretched hands.

The Falcons were coming off a 26-24 loss at Seattle and a 33-30 overtime setback to San Diego in which they squandered a 17-point lead at home. Given what happened a year ago — Atlanta started the season 6-1, then lost six in a row and missed the playoffs — it was imperative to turn things around against the Packers. It didn't look good when Aaron Rodgers threw his fourth touchdown pass, putting the Packers ahead with 3:58 remaining. Sanu had nine catches for 84 yards, both season highs in his first year with the Falcons. Atlanta needed every one of them, since Jones was held to three catches for 29 yards and targeted only once in the second half — a dropped pass on the final possession.

But Jones helped Sanu get open on the winning play, drawing two defenders when they lined up on the same side of the field.

Ryan was 28 of 55 for 288 yards and three touchdowns.

Rodgers threw for 246 yards, tearing up with a bunch of young receivers as the banged-up Packers played without six starters. Linebacker Clay Matthews and receiver Randall Cobb were among those who couldn't go because of hamstring injuries.

Three Green Bay receivers — Geronimo Allison, Trevor Davis and Jeff Janis — got their first career touchdown. Allison, in fact, had just been promoted from the practice squad and never caught a pass in an NFL game. Ditto for Davis, a rookie who had mainly been used as a returner.

The Packers took a 32-26 lead after the Falcons were caught with too many men on the field, giving Green Bay a first down rather than having to go for a fourth-and-1. Rodgers was tied for a 7-yard touchdown with 3:58 remaining, followed by a 2-point conversion.

It wasn't enough. Sanu's touchdown tied the game, and Matt Bryant booted through the winning extra point. Bryant had already become the Falcons career leading scorer, passing Moran Anderson, with a PAT after Atlanta's first TD.

Adrian Clayborn had the first muffed-sack game of his six-year NFL career, bringing down Rodgers twice in the second half. Vic Beasley Jr. also had a sack, giving him 6½ over the last four games and 7½ for the season.

Rodgers was also Green Bay's leading rusher with a career-high 60 yards on six carries. He broke his previous best of 57 yards in 2012, and posted the highest rushing total by a Packers quarterback since Don Majkowski's 88-yard effort in 1990.

GREEN BAY, Wis. (AP) — Jordan Todman set the tone early for the Indianapolis Colts on special teams and Andrew Luck made the clutch throws late.

In between, the defense made just enough plays to hold off Green Bay despite the Packers' frantic fourth quarter.

The Colts survived for a 31-26 win on Sunday after letting an 18-point lead with 9:35 left nearly disappear.

Todman had a 99-yard return for a touchdown on the opening kickoff. Frank Gore rushed for two touchdowns and Luck shook off two interceptions in the first quarter to finish with 281 yards passing and a touchdown.

Indianapolis (4-5) heads into a bye week with a confidence-building victory after withstanding Aaron Rodgers' comeback attempt.

Rodgers' 3-yard touchdown pass to Randall Cobb with 3:29 left got Green Bay (4-4) within five, capping a 14-point spurt in four-plus minutes. Rodgers finished 26 of 43 for 297 yards with three scores and an interception.

Luck responded on the Colts' next drive with what Pagano called "two unbelievable plays."

The quarterback dodged a potential sack by blitzing safety Ha Ha Clinton-Dix to throw a 20-yard pass on third-and-10 with 3:07 left to tight end Jack Doyle.

Luck also found T.Y. Hilton for a 27-yard completion on third-and-2 with two minutes left to put the game away. He finished 23 of 36, throwing both interceptions to Clinton-Dix.

The Colts, who had allowed an NFL-worst 31 sacks coming into the game, gave their quarterback decent protection. Luck was sacked twice.

Luck maneuvered out of other tight spots, including a 7-yard scramble on a bootleg on third-and-1 with 37 seconds left in the second quarter. He deftly engineered a 15-play, 96-yard drive that ended with an 8-yard touchdown pass to Dante Wierzbicki with 11 seconds left to give Indianapolis a 24-10 halftime lead.

Familiar problems surfaced early for the Packers, who lost their second straight game. The offense had trouble getting going until the fourth quarter.

But the defense gave up at least 30 points for a second straight game, and special teams also hurt them.

Todman's kickoff return to open the game seemed to be a Green Bay buzz-killer.

Josh Ferguson had the block on Clinton-Dix at around the Colts 25 to spring Todman on the opening kickoff. It was the first kickoff return for a touchdown against Green Bay since Nov. 9, 2014, when the Chicago Bears' Chris Williams returned one for a score.

Todman added a 61-yard kickoff return in the second quarter.

17 Davante Adams, WR, 3rd Year, Fresno State

• With 88 catches in 2014-15, joined WRs Randall Cobb (105 in 2011-12) and Greg Jennings (98 in 2006-07) as the only Packers over the last 25 seasons to register 85-plus receptions in their first two seasons in the league.

• Caught a career-high 50 passes for a career-best 483 yards (9.7 avg.) and a TD last season despite missing three games due to an ankle injury.

• Played in all 16 games with 11 starts as a rookie in 2014, hauling in 38 receptions for 446 yards (14.2 avg.) and three TDs.

• Set franchise postseason single-game records for the most catches and receiving yards by a rookie when he posted seven grabs for 117 yards (16.7 avg.) and a TD in a 2014 NFC Divisional playoff victory vs. Dallas.

2016 SEASON: Has played in all 10 games with nine starts and is tied for the team lead with 53 catches for 663 yards (12.5 avg.) and a career-high six TDs...Is tied for No. 4 in the NFL in TD catches and joins WR Jordy Nelson (nine) as the only teammate duo in the NFL this season with six-plus TD receptions each.

► **At Jacksonville (Sept. 11):** Started as the team opened with three WRs and finished with three catches for 50 yards (16.7 avg.), highlighted by his 29-yard TD catch with 13 seconds in the first half that gave the Packers a 21-17 lead that they would not relinquish...With CB Davon House on his back, made a diving grab in the end zone for the longest TD catch of his career in the regular season as QB Aaron Rodgers fought off a sack attempt from CB Jalen Ramsey.

Detroit (Sept. 25):** Caught two passes for 23 yards (11.5 avg.) in 25 snaps of action, highlighted by a 14-yard TD grab on Green Bay's opening drive...Beat CB Quandre Diggs on a slant and then shook off a tackle attempt near the goal line from S Glover Quin to get into the end zone... Also had a 9-yard catch late in the game that helped the Packers clinch the win and run out the clock.

Giants (Oct. 9):** Started as the third WR and posted a season-high five receptions for a season-best 85 yards (17.0 avg.) and a TD...His 17.0-yard receiving average was his second-best single-game mark (min. three rec.) behind only his six-catch, 121-yard effort (20.2 avg.) vs. New England on Nov. 30, 2014...Caught a 29-yard TD pass midway through the second quarter, matching the longest TD reception of his career...Beat CB Michael Hunter down the right sideline and hauled in the pass from Rodgers near the 10-yard line, keeping his feet in bounds for the final few yards as he extended the ball past the pylon.

► **Vs. Dallas (Oct. 16):** Started as the third WR and had two receptions for 34 yards (17.0 avg.)...Left the game to be evaluated for a concussion after absorbing a big hit on his 12-yard catch on a third-and-11 in the third quarter, and did not return.

• Was named the league's Most Valuable Player by *The Associated Press* in

2014 for the second time in his career (2011), becoming the eighth player in league history to win the honor multiple times.

- Is the only quarterback in league history to record a 100-plus passer rating in six consecutive seasons (2009-14), with no other QB doing so in more than four straight years.
- Is one of only eight quarterbacks in NFL annals with 30,000-plus passing yards and 2,000-plus rushing yards.

• Registered 10 TD catches in 2014-15, tied for the most by a Green Bay TE in his first two seasons since the 1970 AFL-NFL merger (Bubba Franks, 2000-01). His eight TD receptions in '15 were tied for the fifth most in a season by a Packers TE.

• Set a single-game franchise record for tight ends with 146 receiving

yards last season at Detroit in Week 13, highlighted by his game-winning 61-yard TD catch on the final play of the game.
