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ARIZONA CARDINALS (5-6-1) VS. MIAMI DOLPHINS (7-5) Hard Rock Stadium | Dec. 11, 2016 | 11:00 AM



THIS WEEK'S GAME

The Cardinals return to the road this week as they face the Miami Dolphins at Hard Rock Stadium. The game marks Arizona's first trip to Miami since 2004 and the Cards are looking for their fourth straight win in the series. Miami is the only team Arizona has yet to face during the tenure of head coach Bruce Arians.

Arizona comes into the game off a 31-23 victory over Washington last week at University of Phoenix Stadium. Carson Palmer threw three second-half TD passes to help the Cardinals earn the win and improve to 5-6-1 on the season. David Johnson continued his stellar season by scoring two TDs and totaling 175 yards (84 rushing, 91 receiving), giving him 12 straight games with 100+ yards from scrimmage to begin the season. WR Larry Fitzgerald had 10 receptions to move into third place on the NFL's all-time list with 1,106 career catches, passing Hall of Famers Cris Carter and Marvin Harrison in the process.

After taking a 10-6 lead into halftime, the Cardinals fell behind for the first time in the game when the Redskins scored on the opening possession of the second half. A turning point came later in the third quarter when Calais Campbell sacked Redskins QB Kirk Cousins and forced a fumble. Markus Golden recovered and returned to the 10-yard line, setting up a go-ahead TD three plays later.

The Cardinals scored TDs on both of their fourth-quarter possessions, the second of which included converting a 4th-n-1 from their own 34 with a one point lead and then a 42-yard TD pass from Palmer to J.J. Nelson with 1:56 left to make it an eight-point advantage. The Redskins moved inside the 30 on their ensuing drive, but Patrick Peterson intercepted Cousins with 41 seconds left to secure the victory.

Miami saw its six-game winning streak come to an end last week with a 38-6 loss to Baltimore. The loss dropped Miami to 7-5, currently one game out of a Wild Card berth in the AFC.

Next week, the Cardinals host New Orleans in their final regular season home game while the Dolphins play at the Jets on Saturday night.

THE HIGHLIGHTS

--This week's game between the Cardinals and Dolphins marks the 12th all-time meeting between the two teams and the first since 2012. Miami is the only NFL team the Cards have yet to face in **Bruce Arians'** tenure with the team.

--WR **Larry Fitzgerald** has at least one reception in 191 consecutive games, the third-longest streak in NFL history. That streak began the last time the Cardinals played the Dolphins in Miami (Week 9 of 2004).

--RB **David Johnson** leads the NFL in scrimmage yards (1,709) and total TDs (15), ranks 3rd in the NFL in rushing yards (1,005), 3rd in rushing TDs (11) and leads all NFL RBs in receptions (64) and receiving yards (704) in 2016.

--The Cardinals (11 INTs and 10 TDs allowed) and Broncos (12 INTs and 10 TDs allowed) are the only teams in the NFL this season that have more INTs than TD passes allowed.

--QB **Carson Palmer** has a .683 winning percentage (33-15-1) as the Cardinals starting QB. Dating back to 2013, only Tom Brady (.768) and Russell Wilson (.725) have a better winning percentage among starting QBs.

--CB **Patrick Peterson** sealed last week's win over the Redskins with his 20th career INT. In franchise history, only 10 players have more career INTs than Peterson.

Dolphins Connections

Cardinals General Manager **Steve Keim** had a brief stint in the NFL as a free agent with the Dolphins in 1996.

Cardinals T **Ulrick John** spent parts of the 2015 and 2016 seasons on the Dolphins practice squad. He was signed by the Cardinals from Miami's practice squad on October 8.

Cardinals LBs coach **Bob Sanders** served in the same role with the Dolphins from 2001-04, after he was an assistant coach at the University of Florida for 11 seasons from 1990-2000.

Cardinals Area Scout **John Ritcher** worked as a scouting assistant with the Dolphins in 2011.

Cardinals Football Operations Coordinator **Matt Caracciolo** was a scouting intern with the Dolphins from 2003-04.

Cardinals Connections

Dolphins LB **Donald Butler** was with the Cardinals during training camp in 2016, before being released in final roster cuts on September 3.

Dolphins C/G **Anthony Steen** signed with the Cardinals as a rookie free agent in 2014 and spent most of that season and the first two weeks of the 2015 on Arizona's practice squad.

Miami/Florida Connections

Cardinals DT **Olsen Pierre** went to Miami from 2011-14, playing in 40 games and totaling 96 tackles, nine tackles for loss, 2.5 sacks and two forced fumbles.

Cardinals Pass Rush Specialist **Tom Pratt** played LB at Miami from 1953-56, earning All-American honors in 1956. He then stayed on at his alma mater as an assistant coach from 1957-60. He was inducted into the University of Miami Sports Hall of Fame in 1991.

The following Cardinals are from the state of Florida: WR **John Brown** (Homestead), DT **Rodney Gunter** (Lake Hamilton) and DT **Ed Stinson** (Homestead).

Cardinals T **D.J. Humphries** played college football at Florida from 2012-14, starting 19 of 29 games played before declaring for the NFL Draft after his junior season. While with the Gators, he was a teammate of Dolphins LB **Jelani Jenkins** and DT **Leon Orr**.

Cardinals Bill Bidwill Fellowship/OLBs coach **Levon Kirkland** was an assistant coach at Florida A&M from 2013-14.

Cardinals Special Teams Coordinator **Amos Jones** served as an assistant at Eau Gallie High School in Melbourne, FL from 1993-94.

Arizona Connections

Dolphins DT **Earl Mitchell** played at the University of Arizona from 2006-09, appearing in 49 games with 37 starts. He played FB/H-back for his first two years before moving to defense as a junior.

Dolphins RB **Damien Williams** played at Arizona Western College from 2010-11 prior to transferring to Oklahoma.

Dolphins College Scout **Lenny McGill** played football at Arizona State from 1990-93, earning honorable mention All-Pac-10 as a senior. He also lettered three seasons on the Sun Devils' track and field team.

Dolphins President and CEO **Tom Garfinkel** was the chief operating officer for the Arizona Diamondbacks from 2006-09.

College/Pro Connections

Dolphins Offensive Coordinator **Clyde Christensen** coached for the Colts from 2002-15, serving with Cardinals Assistant Head Coach/Offense **Tom Moore** from 2002-10 and then with Head Coach **Bruce Arians**, Offensive Coordinator **Harold Goodwin** and Defensive Coordinator **James Bettcher** in 2012. Christensen first coached with Arians at Temple from 1983-85, when he was on the staff alongside Cardinals Special Teams Coordinator **Amos Jones** and DBs coach **Nick Rapone**.

Cardinals QBs coach **Freddie Kitchens** and Dolphins Head Coach **Adam Gase** were graduate assistants at LSU in 2000. Gase later served as QBs coach with the Detroit Lions in 2007 when Cardinals QB **Drew Stanton** was a rookie.

Cardinals S **Tyrann Mathieu** (2010-11), LB **Kevin Minter** (2010-12) and CB **Tharold Simon** (2010-12) were teammates with Dolphins WR **Jarvis Landry** (2011-13) at LSU.

Cardinals RB **Andre Ellington** (2008-12) and K **Chandler Catanzaro** (2009-13) played with Dolphins DE **Andre Branch** (2007-11) and CB **Byron Maxwell** (2006-10) at Clemson.

Cardinals DT **Ed Stinson** (2009-13) played at Alabama with Dolphins RB **Kenyan Drake** (2012-15) and C/G **Anthony Steen** (2009-13).

Cardinals S **Tony Jefferson** (2010-12) played with Dolphins WR **Kenny Stills** (2010-12), DT **Jordan Phillips** (2011-14) and RB **Damien Williams** (2012-13) at Oklahoma.

In 2004, Cardinals C **A.Q. Shipley** and Dolphins DE **Cameron Wake** played together at Penn State.

Cardinals DT **Robert Nkemdiche** and Dolphins G/T **Laremy Tunsil** were part of the same recruiting class at Ole Miss in 2013, and they were teammates with the Rebels from 2013-15 before both being selected in the first round of the 2016 draft.

SERIES BREAKDOWN

The Cardinals and Dolphins meet for just the 12th time in a series that dates back to 1972. Miami holds an 8-3 advantage in the all-time series, but after meeting the first eight meetings between the two teams, Arizona has taken three in a row. Three of the last four games in this series have been decided by three points or fewer.

This week, the Cardinals make their sixth-ever trip to Miami and first since 2004. Arizona has played a road game in all 30 other NFL cities (and one game in Mexico) since the last time it played in Miami.

The Cardinals enter this week's matchup with a three-game winning streak against the Dolphins that dates back 1999. The last time Arizona played in Miami (Week 9 of the 2004 season), the Cardinals earned their first-ever road win against the Dolphins when WR Larry Fitzgerald caught a TD pass with 19 seconds remaining to secure the 24-23 come-from-behind victory.

Two-time NFL Coach of the Year (2012, 2014), **Bruce Arians** is in his fourth season in Arizona and 24th season coaching in the NFL. Arians became an NFL head coach for the first time when the Cardinals hired him on January 17, 2013. Arizona has posted a 40-22-1 record (including postseason) under Arians, who is just the 10th coach in NFL history to post three straight 10+ win seasons in his first three years as a head coach in the NFL. Including his tenure as interim head coach with Indy in 2012, Arians has posted a 48-23-1 regular season record as head coach. Among active NFL head coaches, only Bill Belichick (56) and Pete Carroll (52) have more wins in his last 72 games.

Named the 12th head coach in Dolphins history on January 9, 2016, **Adam Gase** is in his first season as a head coach and his 14th season in the NFL coaching ranks. Gase joined the Dolphins after three seasons as the offensive coordinator in Chicago (2015) and Denver (2013-14). During his first season as offensive coordinator in Denver, the Broncos set NFL records in both points (606) and touchdowns (76). A native of Ypsilanti, MI, Gase began his coaching career as a graduate assistant at LSU in 2000. His first job in the NFL came in 2003 as a scouting assistant with the Detroit Lions. He spent five seasons in Detroit and one season (2008) in San Francisco before joining the Broncos staff as wide receivers coach in 2009.

BACK TO WHERE THE STREAK BEGAN

The last time the Cardinals played in Miami was in Week 9 of the 2004 season. Looking back, it represents a significant game in the career of WR **Larry Fitzgerald**.

It was the eighth game of his rookie season. The week prior, Fitzgerald was held without a catch against the Bills in Buffalo. It was the first - and only - time in his career he has been held without a catch.

Beginning with that game at Miami in '04, when he had five receptions for 92 yards, Fitzgerald has at least one reception in 191 consecutive games, the third-longest streak in NFL history.

That last time the Cardinals played in Miami, Fitzgerald entered the game with 26 receptions for 371 yards and two TDs in seven career games. He enters this week's contest with 1,106 receptions for 14,246 yards and 103 TDs in 198 career games.

Speaking of Fitzgerald...

The All-Pro wideout - now in his 13th NFL season - is the only player on either roster who was with their current team the last time the Cardinals and Dolphins squared off in Miami.

In fact, Fitzgerald and Cardinals QB **Carson Palmer** are the only players on either roster who were even in the NFL the last time the two teams met at what is now Hard Rock Stadium.

A Pair of 2015 Draft Picks

This week's game between the Cardinals and Dolphins features two of the NFL's top running backs - who were among the 22 RBs selected in the 2015 NFL Draft and who are also in their first season as full-time starters.

Arizona RB **David Johnson** was the seventh RB selected in 2015 when the Cardinals took him in the third round (86th overall) out of Northern Iowa. Johnson leads the NFL in scrimmage yards in 2016 and ranks third in rushing with 1,005 yards.

Miami RB **Jay Ajayi** was the 14th RB selected in last year's draft when the Dolphins selected him in the fifth round (149th overall) out of Boise State. Ajayi ranks seventh in the NFL with 908 rushing yards in 2016.

A LASTING LEGACY AT MIAMI

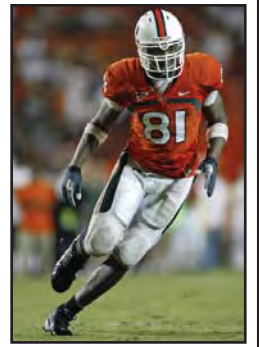
DT **Calais Campbell** has left quite a legacy at his alma mater, the University of Miami. A standout defensive tackle for the Hurricanes from 2004-07, Campbell finished his career having started 25 of 36 games played with 158 tackles, 19.5 sacks, 39 tackles for loss and 30 QB pressures.

Campbell's contributions to school didn't end when he was drafted by the Cardinals in 2008. In January of 2015, Campbell donated \$1.6 million to the University of Miami. It was the largest gift from a former student athlete in the school's history.

"For me, it's a representation of just how much the school means to me and to be able to be a part of it," Campbell said of the donation.

The donation was made to establish an endowed scholarship for defensive linemen at the school. Miami re-named its defensive line meeting room in honor of Campbell, who became sixth former Hurricane to have an area of the football offices named after him.

This week's game will mark Campbell's first game in Miami since he was drafted by the Cardinals in '08.



POMPAÑO'S PREP STAR

CB **Patrick Peterson** was one of the most highly prized recruits in the country playing at Blanche Ely High School in Pompano Beach, FL, roughly 35 miles north of Miami.

Peterson was named the USA Today Defensive Player of the Year as a senior in 2007 and was named to the Parade All-America team and the USA Today All-America Team. He was also selected to play in the U.S. Army All-American Bowl and was one of six finalists for the U.S. Army Player of the Year Award.

This week's game will be Peterson's first game in the Miami area since his days at Blanche Ely.



LAST WEEK'S GAME

CARDINALS 31, Redskins 23
December 4, 2016 – University of Phoenix Stadium (64,939)

In a week 13 match-up of NFC teams fighting for their playoff lives, the Cards moved to 5-6-1 with a 31-23 home win over Washington. The Redskins fell to 6-5-1 with the loss. The tight contest featured four 2nd-half lead changes and not surprisingly came down to a handful of key plays. One of the biggest came with 3:47 left to play and AZ holding a 1-point lead. Facing a 4th-n-1 at their own 34, the Cards decided to go for it and RB David Johnson ran for a 14-yard gain. On a 2nd-n-10 three plays later Carson Palmer delivered the dagger with a 42-yard deep strike to WR JJ Nelson. Johnson topped 100 scrimmage yards for the 12th straight game, finishing with 84 and a TD rushing, and 91 with a TD receiving. Larry Fitzgerald had a game-high 10 receptions for 78 yards and eclipsed several career milestones; he moved past Cris Carter & Marvin Harrison into 3rd on the NFL's all-time receptions list, passed Andre Johnson and moved into 10th in receiving yardage, and became the youngest in NFL history to reach 1,100 career receptions.

For the 2nd straight week the Cardinals scored a TD on the game's opening series. This time it was David Johnson 1-yard run that capped a 15-play, 75-yard drive. Washington would pull to within 7-6 thanks to a pair of Dustin Hopkins FGs on consecutive drives in the 2nd quarter. Chandler Catanzaro's 28-yard FG in the closing seconds of the 1st half gave AZ a 10-6 lead at intermission.

Washington got the ball to start the 3rd quarter and on their 2nd snap, QB Kirk Cousins connected with WR DeSean Jackson on a deep ball down the middle. That 59-yard completion took it to the AZ5 and Cousins' 1-yard sneak put Washington up 13-10. AZ's next drive ended when Catanzaro just missed from 53 yards out. The Cards, however, would quickly get ball back when DT Calais Campbell sacked Cousins forcing a fumble that LB Markus Golden returned to the WAS10. That set-up a 6-yard Palmer TD pass to WR Michael Floyd. Trailing 17-13, the Redskins then moved 75 yards in 8 plays and re-took the lead late in the 3rd when Cousins hit WR Jamison Crowder down the seam with a 26-yard TD pass on 3rd down. AZ would respond with its own 75-yard drive and moved back in front thanks to a 25-yard Johnson catch-n-run TD down the right sideline. A 53-yard Hopkins FG made it a 1-point game with 6:01 remaining. Four plays into the ensuing drive, the Cards executed that crucial 4th down play and subsequent deep TD that put them up 8 with 1:56 left. It was still a one possession game when the Redskins took over at their own 25 with 2 timeouts. Washington advanced to the AZ 28 with :52 left when Patrick Peterson picked off Cousins to seal the victory.

12 STRAIGHT WITH 100+

RB **David Johnson** totaled 175 yards from scrimmage (84 rushing, 91 receiving) against the Redskins last week. In doing so, he extended his franchise record to 12 consecutive games with 100+ yards from scrimmage. Johnson now joins Edgerrin James (2000 and 2005 with Indianapolis) as the only players in NFL history with 100+ scrimmage yards in each of his team's first 12 games of a season. James (13 in a row in 2005) holds the longest streak in NFL history to open a season.



Johnson now has 1,709 yards from scrimmage (1,005 rushing, 704 receiving) this season, the most in the NFL. He has 102 more yards than any other player in the NFL.

Johnson (1,005 rushing; 704 receiving) joins Marshall Faulk (1,037 rushing; 786 receiving in 1998) as the only players in NFL history with 1,000+ rushing yards and 700+ receiving yards through the first 12 games of a season. PLAYER OF THE MONTH

RB **David Johnson** was named the "NFC Offensive Player of the Month" for his performance in October, becoming just the third player in franchise history to be named "Offensive Player of the Month" and the first RB to do so.

Johnson finished the month of October with an NFL-high 726 yards from scrimmage (488 rushing, 238 receiving) while tying for the NFL lead with five rushing TDs and ranking third in the league with 488 rushing yards. He was the only player in the NFL who totaled 100+ yards from scrimmage in five games during the month of October and Johnson (3) joined Ezekiel Elliott (3), DeMarco Murray (3) and Jordan Howard (3) as the only players in the NFL to rush for 100+ yards in at least three games last month. Johnson averaged 145.2 yards from scrimmage in his five games in October, including a season-high 185 yards in Week 5 at San Francisco on Monday Night Football and 171 yards in Week 7 vs. Seattle on Sunday Night Football.

Besides Johnson, the Cardinals have had a Player of the Month eight other times since the award began in 1986: Lomax (October, 1988), Esiason (November, 1996), S Kwamie Lassiter (November, 2001), K Neil Rackers (October and December, 2005), PR Patrick Peterson (November, 2011), ST Justin Bethel (December, 2014) and S Tyrann Mathieu (November, 2015).

Last season Johnson was selected as the NFL's "Rookie of the Month" for December/January. He was also named "NFC Offensive Player of the Week" for his performance in Week 5 at San Francisco.

A DECADE OF DISTINCTION

The Cardinals have been in the Bidwill family since Pro Football Hall of Famer Charles Bidwill purchased the team in 1933. Charles' son Bill handled day-to-day operations for decades before passing the torch to his son, Michael, who is now in his 10th season as team President.

Since **Michael Bidwill** took over as President in 2007, the Cards have gone .500 or better in seven of nine seasons (just twice in previous 20 years) and posted four double-digit win seasons (none in previous 20).

The 2015 season was a banner year for the organization as the team won the NFC West, set a franchise record for wins in the regular season (13) and earned the first postseason bye in team history.

Of the Cardinals seven all-time postseason wins, five have come during Bidwill's nine years as team President. Arizona has played in nine postseason contests since Bidwill took over in 2007. The Cardinals played just seven total playoff games in their entire history prior to his tenure.

Michael spearheaded the effort that led to the creation of University of Phoenix Stadium, which preceded that aforementioned run of on-field success. The Cardinals have sold out all 113 games played (preseason and post-season included) and the stadium since it opened in 2006; in 18 years at Sun Devil Stadium, just 12 games were sold out in time to be televised locally.

The Cardinals success under Bidwill has greatly elevated the team's popularity both locally and nationally. That fact is best measured in the record-setting ratings for Cardinals game broadcasts. Locally, the team established a host of franchise record for the TV broadcasts in both 2015 and 2014. Nationally, the team's exposure is at an all-time high. Having never appeared in more than three primetime games in a single season, the Cardinals played an unprecedented five primetime games during the 2015 regular season and posted a perfect 5-0 record those matchups.

Michael was also the driving force behind the critically-acclaimed series "All Or Nothing" that debuted on Amazon Video in July of this year.

Michael was pivotal not only in helping Arizona land Super Bowl XLIX - the second in eight seasons at University of Phoenix Stadium - but he also secured the 2015 Pro Bowl. Played a week apart, the game delivered a record economic impact of \$720 million to the region.

KEIM LAYS THE FOUNDATION

The Cardinals are coming off three consecutive 10+ win seasons in **Steve Keim's** first three years as GM. As soon as he was elevated to the position in January of 2013, Keim began re-shaping the roster.

The overhaul during his first three years was dramatic - and resulted in a 34-14 record in that span. During his first 36 months as GM, Keim made 592 roster moves, including 182 moves in 2015 as the Cards established a franchise record for wins (13).

He was named Pro Football Talk's Executive of the Year in both 2013 and 2014, and added Sporting News Executive of the Year in 2014.

The 2015 campaign was one of the most successful seasons in franchise history. In addition to establishing a record for wins, the team also set franchise marks for total offense, points scored and total TDs. Arizona had the NFL's #1 ranked offense last season, and the Cardinals finished with a defense that ranked in the top five as well. The roster that has accomplished those feats was built from the ground up by Keim and his staff.

- Of the 53 players on the Cardinals current roster, 35 appeared in at least one game for Arizona last season.

- Of the 37 players who started at least one game for Arizona last season, 27 are on the current roster.

- Of the 53 players on the Cardinals current roster, 48 were acquired by Keim during his time as GM.

- As of this week, the Cardinals have made a total of **204** roster moves dating back to January of this year.

PUTTING TOGETHER A PRO BOWL ROSTER

All seven Arizona players selected to the Pro Bowl in 2015 - special teamer **Justin Bethel**, DT **Calais Campbell**, WR **Larry Fitzgerald**, G **Mike Iupati**, S **Tyrann Mathieu**, QB **Carson Palmer** and CB **Patrick Peterson** - are back this season.

In the offseason, the Cardinals acquired 2015 Pro Bowl LB **Chandler Jones** in a trade with the Patriots. The team also signed G **Evan Mathis** (2013 and 2014 Pro Bowler) in free agency.

Arizona has nine players on its roster who have been selected to the Pro Bowl, including eight who were chosen in 2015.

During each of his first three offseasons as GM, Keim signed a free agent who went on to make the Pro Bowl that season (Mike Iupati-2015, Antonio Cromartie-2014, John Abraham-2013). The Cardinals were the only team in the NFL to accomplish such a feat.

Long History with the Organization

Keim was promoted to General Manager on January 8, 2013 after 14 seasons in the Cardinals organization.

The 43-year old originally joined Arizona in May, 1999 as a college scout in the east. He was promoted to Director of College Scouting in 2006, Director of Player Personnel in 2008, and then was promoted to Vice President, Player Personnel in May, 2012.



NINE DAYS - TWO GREAT HIRES

In a nine-day span in January of 2013, Cardinals President **Michael Bidwill** hired GM **Steve Keim** (Jan. 8) and head coach **Bruce Arians** (Jan. 17). In the resulting three seasons, the Cardinals won more games (34) than any other three-year span in franchise history.

In January of 2013 there were eight head coach openings. None were hired later than Arians and four of the eight no longer hold those jobs. Keim was one of seven GMs hired in January of 2013. On the seven, only he and Carolina's Dave Gettleman had their teams in the postseason in both 2014 and 2015.

In franchise history, only Ken Whisenhunt (49) and Don Coryell (42) have more wins than Arians among head coaches.

TWO-TIME COACH OF THE YEAR

Bruce Arians was named the Associated Press 2014 NFL Coach of the Year after leading the Cardinals to an 11-5 record and a berth in the post-season.

It marked the second time in three years Arians was awarded NFL Coach of the Year honors (Indianapolis, 2012). He became the first coach in NFL history to be named Coach of the Year multiple times in a three-year span with multiple teams.

Arians is one of 12 coaches in NFL history to win the award multiple times and the sixth to be honored with multiple teams. He is also one of just six coaches in NFL history to earn AP Coach of the Year honors twice in a three-year span.

A STRONG 1ST IMPRESSION

Now in his fifth NFL season and fourth season with the Cardinals, **James Bettcher** is in his second year as the team's defensive coordinator. After he was promoted to the position in February of 2015, Bettcher led one of the league's highest-rated units.

Under their first-year coordinator the Cardinals defense was a major factor in the team's 13-3 record in 2015. Arizona finished the 2015 season with the NFL's fifth-ranked defense.

A QUICK ASCENT

Bettcher was elevated to defensive coordinator in just his fourth season as an NFL coach, having entered the league in 2012. After nine years in the college ranks, he was hired by the Colts to serve as special assistant to the head coach/outside linebackers coach. When Bruce Arians was hired as head coach in Arizona in 2013, he named Bettcher his linebackers coach, a position he held for two seasons before his promotion to defensive coordinator in 2015.



FROM 32ND TO 1ST UNDER GOODY

When **Harold Goodwin** was named the Cardinals Offensive Coordinator in 2013, he was handed the reins of an offense that - in 2012 - finished the year as the league's 32nd ranked unit. Things changed quickly under his watch.

In 2015 - his third at the helm of the offense - the Cardinals had the top ranked offense in the NFL for the first time in franchise history. The team also set team single-season records for points (489), TDs (59), TD passes (35), total net yards (6,533), first downs (373) and first downs passing (237).

Cardinals 2015 Offensive Highlights

- Outscored opponents 489-313 in 2015. That +176 point differential was the second-best total in franchise history (+184 in 1925).
- After finishing the 2014 season ranked 31st in the NFL in rushing, ranked 8th overall in 2015. Marked the first time since 1984 (9th overall) that the Cardinals finished a season ranked in the top 10 in the NFL in rushing.
- Scored at least 30 points in a franchise record nine games in 2015. Arizona's nine games with 30+ points were the most in the NFL.
- Averaged an NFL-high 6.28 yards per play (6,533 yards on 1,041 plays). The Cards easily led the NFL in average yards per pass play (7.84) last season.
- The Cardinals gave up just 27 sacks on 562 pass attempts in 2015. Arizona's 27 sacks allowed tied for the fourth-fewest in the NFL last season.

A Decade With Arians

The 2016 season is the 10th consecutive season Goodwin has worked under Bruce Arians. The two previously coached together with Pittsburgh (2007-11) and Indianapolis (2012). Goodwin served as an offensive assistant with the Steelers and was the Colts offensive line coach.



HOF SEMI-FINALISTS ANNOUNCED

In early November, the 26 semifinalists for the Hall of Fame's Class of 2017 were announced. Four individuals with ties to the Cardinals were on the list, highlighted by Cardinals Ring of Honor member QB **Kurt Warner**, who was among the 10 finalists for the HOF last year.

Warner spent five seasons (2005-09) in Arizona, starting 57 of 61 games while leading Arizona to its first-ever Super Bowl appearance in Super Bowl XLIII following the 2008 season. Warner led the Cardinals to back-to-back NFC West titles in 2008-09 while re-writing the franchise record books in the process.

A two-time NFL MVP and Super Bowl XXXIV MVP, Warner played 12 seasons in the NFL with the Rams (1998-2003), Giants (2004) and Cardinals (2005-2009). He is one of just three QBs in NFL history (Peyton Manning and Craig Morton) to take two different teams to the Super Bowl.

A veteran of 11 NFL seasons, RB **Edgerrin James** played three seasons (2006-08) with Arizona where he twice topped 1,000 yards rushing (1,159 yards in 2006 and 1,222 yards in 2007). His 1,222 yards in '07 rank as the fifth-best single-season total in franchise history.

A four-time Pro Bowler, James ranks 11th in NFL history with 12,246 career rushing yards and he twice led the NFL in rushing yards in the regular season (1999-2000). He was the 1999 NFL AP Offensive Rookie of the Year and was named the the Pro Football Hall of Fame's 1st-Team All-2000s Team. James spent his first seven NFL seasons with Indianapolis, where he the team's first round (4th overall) selection in the 1999 NFL Draft. He rush for 1,000+ yards in seven of his 11 NFL seasons.

Also up for HOF consideration in 2017 are former coach **Don Coryell** and former G **Alan Faneca**. Coryell coached the Cardinals from 1973-77 and his 42 wins as head coach rank as the second-highest total in franchise history. Coryell led the Cards to three consecutive seasons (1974-76) with double-digit wins and won back-to-back division titles in 1974-75. Faneca was a nine-time Pro Bowl guard who spent 13 seasons in the NFL, including his final season (2010) in Arizona where he started all 16 games.

DOMINANT IN THE POSTSEASON

During the 2008 postseason, WR **Larry Fitzgerald** had the most prolific playoff run of any wide receiver in NFL history. He shattered NFL records for receiving yards in a single postseason (546), receptions (30) and TDs (7). Fitzgerald recorded four 100-yard games in the postseason as well, a new NFL record for consecutive games with 100-yards receiving.



In the Divisional matchup vs. Green Bay last season, Fitzgerald looked just as dominant. He caught eight passes for 176 yards and scored the game-winning TD in the Cardinals OT victory over the Packers. *His 176 receiving yards set a new franchise postseason record.* Fitzgerald surpassed his own franchise record of 166 yards at Carolina (1/10/09) in the 2008 Divisional round.

Fitzgerald is the only player in NFL history to average at least 100+ receiving yards and a TD in every game played in the postseason.

Fitzgerald has more receiving yards (942) than any player in NFL history through his first nine career postseason games.

Fitzgerald and Hall of Fame WR Fred Biletnikoff (2 straight in 1968) are the only players in NFL history with 150+ receiving yards in back-to-back postseason games.

Fitzgerald had 170 yards and a receiving TD in the second half/OT against the Packers. No player in NFL history had more receiving yards in the second half/OT of a postseason game. The previous record was 157 yards by Jerry Rice on 1/22/89 vs. Cincinnati in Super Bowl XXIII.

Fitzgerald now has at least one TD reception in six of nine playoff games. He is one of just seven players in NFL history with at least 10 TD receptions in the postseason. Only Hall of Fame WRs Jerry Rice (22) and John Stallworth (12) have more TD receptions in the postseason.

Of the seven players in NFL history that have at least 10 career TD receptions in the postseason, only Fitzgerald (9) has played in fewer than 15 career playoff games.

HEADING TO THE HALL?

Below is a look at the career of **Larry Fitzgerald** through his first 198 career games compared to the 25 modern era WRs currently in the HOF and where they stood at that point in their career.

At this point in his career, Fitzgerald has more receptions (1,106) than all of the receivers enshrined in Canton had through 198 games. Fitzgerald also has more receiving yards (14,246) than all HOF receivers through 198 games played except Jerry Rice (17,018) and Marvin Harrison (14,580 in 190 career games).

In fact, Fitzgerald's career numbers already surpass those of many receivers that are currently in the HOF. He has more career receptions than 24 of the 25 receivers in the HOF: Swann (336), Hayes (371), Pihos (373), Lavelli (386), Hirsch (387), Fears (400), Warfield (427), McDonald (495), Mitchell (521), Stallworth (537), Alworth (542), Biletnikoff (589), Berry (631), Maynard (633), Taylor (649), Irvin (750), Joiner (750), Lofton (764), Largent (819), Monk (940), Reed (951), Brown (1,094), Carter (1,101) and Harrison (1,102).

He has more career receiving yards than 22 of the 25 receivers in the HOF: Fears (5,397), Swann (5,462), Pihos (5,619), Lavelli (6,488), Hirsch (7,029), Hayes (7,414), Mitchell (7,954), McDonald (8,410), Warfield (8,565), Stallworth (8,723), Biletnikoff (8,974), Taylor (9,110), Berry (9,275), Alworth (10,266), Maynard (11,834), Irvin (11,904), Joiner (12,146), Monk (12,721), Largent (13,089), Reed (13,198), Carter (13,899) and Lofton (14,004).

A Career Full of Accomplishments:

FLOYD GETS TD #23 IN WEEK 13

Fifth-year WR **Michael Floyd** - the Cardinals first round selection (13th overall) in the 2012 NFL Draft - hauled in a crucial six-yard TD reception in the third quarter against Washington last week that gave Arizona a 17-13 in a back-and-forth matchup.

It was Floyd's fourth TD reception of the season and the 23rd TD catch of his career.

A BREAK FROM THE NORM FOR FLOYD

All four of Floyd's TD receptions this season have come from fewer than 10 yards out. His four TD catches have consisted of 1, 5, 9 and 6 yards.

That is a distinct break from his first four seasons. Of his first 19 career TD receptions, 13 covered at least 20 yards. He averaged 29.1 yards TD reception and just three of his 19 TD catches covered fewer than 10 yards.

FLOYD OVER 100

Floyd caught five passes for 101 yards against the 49ers in Week 10, including a key 26-yard reception on the Cardinals game-winning drive in the fourth quarter.

It was Floyd's 12th career 100-yard outing and first of the 2016 season.

Dating back to last season, Floyd has 100+ receiving yards in six of his last 20 regular season games. Prior to that 20-game stretch, Floyd had posted 100+ receiving yards six times in 55 career games.



GRESHAM ON A HOT STREAK

Following five seasons (2010-14) with the Cincinnati Bengals, where he was twice named to the Pro Bowl, TE **Jermaine Gresham** signed with the Cardinals in 2015 and went on to catch 18 passes for 223 yards and a TD last season.

He has already surpassed those totals in 2016, with 27 receptions for 264 yards and two TDs.

Much of that production has come in the team's last six games. Last week against the Redskins, Gresham equaled a season-high with five receptions for a season-high 52 yards. Through the first six games this season, Gresham had six total receptions for 59 yards and no TDs. In his last six games, he has 21 receptions for 204 yards and two TDs.

BROWN BREAKS OUT AGAINST THE RAMS

WR **John Brown** has endured an injury-plagued 2016 campaign - his third in the NFL - dating back to a concussion he suffered in training camp. Through the first three games this season, Brown totaled eight receptions for 92 yards.

Then Brown has a breakout game in Week 4 against the Rams and he began to look like the 1,000-yard receiver from a year ago. Brown finished the game vs. Los Angeles having tied a career high with 10 receptions for 144 yards. It marked his fourth career 100-yard outing.

In October it was discovered that Brown carries the sickle-cell trait and the complications that have arisen from that diagnosis have limited his availability in the last two months. Brown missed the Week 7 contest vs. Seattle and was forced out of the Cardinals Week 12 game in Atlanta. It also significantly limited his playing time in last week's game vs. Washington. So far this season, Brown ranks fourth on the team with 31 receptions and fourth with 399 receiving yards.

Brown Shines in First Two Seasons

In his first two seasons NFL seasons, Brown - the team's third round selection (91st overall) in the 2014 NFL Draft - was a potent weapon in the Arizona passing attack.

In his first 31 career games, he registered 113 receptions for 1,699 yards and 12 TDs. In franchise history, only three players had more receptions than Brown in their first two seasons (Larry Fitzgerald-161, Anquan Boldin-157, Frank Sanders-121).

NELSON SEALS IT VS. WASHINGTON

Second-year WR **J.J. Nelson** - the team's fifth round selection (159th overall) in the 2015 NFL Draft out of Alabama-Birmingham - had one catch against the Redskins last week but he made it count.

His lone reception in the win was his biggest of the season, as he hauled in a 42-yard TD catch with just under two minutes remaining that gave the Cardinals an eight-point lead.

It was Nelson's third TD reception of the season, all three of which have come in the last five games. Nelson has more TD receptions in his last five games (3) than he had in his previous 17 career games (2).

With injuries hitting the Cardinals WR corps, Nelson has been given a bigger role in the offense and has responded with his production. He has 17 receptions for 264 yards and three TDs in the last six games - after totaling just four receptions for 35 yards in his first five games played this season (missed Week 2 with a shoulder injury).

Against Seattle in Week 7, Nelson hauled in three receptions for a game-high 84 yards, including a 40-yard reception in overtime.

For the season, Nelson has 21 receptions for 315 yards and three TDs, and is averaging 15.0 yards per catch.

Nelson Shined When Called Upon as a Rookie

Nelson seizing his opportunities this season isn't a surprise, as he did the exact same thing as a rookie in 2015, when he saw an increased role against the Bengals in Week 11 due to an injury to WR Michael Floyd. Nelson responded with four receptions for a game-high 142 yards (35.5 avg.) against Cincinnati, including a 64-yard TD catch in the third quarter. Nelson's 142 receiving yards were the most by a rookie in a game in 2015.

A PRO BOWL TALENT

CB **Patrick Peterson** earned his fifth Pro Bowl selection - and fourth at cornerback - (Kick Returner, 2011; Cornerback, 2012-15) in 2015. He was also named first-team All-Pro at corner for the second time in his career (2013, '15).

He joins RBs Jim Brown, Barry Sanders and Emmitt Smith as the only players in NFL history to be chosen to five Pro Bowls before their 26th birthday. He is the only defensive player in NFL history to earn that distinction.

The Cardinals selected CB **Patrick Peterson** with the fifth overall pick in the 2011 NFL Draft and in his first five NFL seasons he earned five Pro Bowl selections and was named first-team All-Pro three times. He has proven to be one of the most unique talents in NFL history. His most important role has been as a shutdown CB in the AZ secondary.

Peterson has started all 92 games at CB in his NFL career. Despite opposing QBs avoiding his side of the field, Peterson has registered 20 INTs since 2011, the third-highest total in the NFL during that span among active players.

PETERSON SEALS IT WITH 20TH CAREER INTERCEPTION

Peterson sealed last week's win over the Redskins with his 20th career INT. With the Cardinals clinging to an eight-point lead and the Redskins at the AZ 28-yard line with 48 seconds remaining, Peterson made a diving INT on a Kirk Cousins pass attempt and ended Washington's comeback attempt. Only 10 players in franchise history have more career INTs than Peterson, who is now tied for the team lead with three INTs in 2016.

JEFFERSON RAISES HIS GAME

S **Tony Jefferson** had the best season of his career in 2015, starting seven of 16 games played during the regular season and both playoff contests and setting career highs with 75 tackles, two INTs, two sacks, five passes defended and three forced fumbles.



Jefferson is having an even better season in 2016. Through the first 12 games the fourth-year safety has recorded 76 tackles, ranks second on the team with 11 tackles for loss, and has added two sacks, three passes defended, two forced fumbles, two fumble recoveries and three QB hits. Jefferson's 76 tackles this season are a new career high.

According to Stats, INC., Jefferson's 11 tackles for loss are the most in the NFL among defensive backs this season. No other defensive back in the NFL has more than six.

Originally signed by the Cardinals as a rookie free agent out of Oklahoma in 2013, Jefferson has appeared in every game (60 regular season; 3 postseason) during his first three-plus NFL seasons. Jefferson's 12 starts in 2016 already represent a career-high for a single season, nearly doubling his previous high (7) from a year ago.

MATHIEU RETURNS WITH AN IMPACT

S **Tyrann Mathieu** had started every game this season and had just recently begun to display the form that made him a Defensive Player of the Year candidate in 2015 when he suffered a shoulder injury vs. the Panthers in Week 8 that has kept him out of three of the last four games.



Working his way back from the knee injury that ended his 2015 campaign early, Mathieu began playing his normal safety spot closer to the line of scrimmage for the first time in Week 5 at San Francisco. In the Cardinals victory over the Jets in Week 7 he led the team with six tackles, two passes defended and also recorded his first INT of the 2016 campaign.

In his first game back from the shoulder injury at Atlanta in Week 12, Mathieu registered two tackles, a tackle for loss, a sack and a pass defended in perhaps his most productive outing of the season. However, he re-injured the shoulder, forcing him out of action in last week's game vs. Washington.

All-Pro Season Cut Short in 2015

Mathieu had an All-Pro season in '15 despite the torn ACL he suffered while recording an INT at Philly in Week 15. Mathieu was named to his first career Pro Bowl and earned first-team All-Pro honors from the Associated Press.

In 14 games played last season, Mathieu registered 89 tackles, a team-high 16 passes defended, 5 INTs (TD), 11 tackles for loss and a forced fumble. His five INTs were tied for third in the NFC at the time of the injury.

MATHIEU'S 2015 SEASON HIGHLIGHTS

NFC Player of the Month

Mathieu was named the "NFC Defensive Player of the Month" for his performance in November. He helped lead the Cardinals to an undefeated record in November (4-0) by posting 27 tackles (24 solo), two INTs and five passes defended. He became just the second player in team history to be named "Defensive Player of the Month" (Kwamie Lassiter, 2001).

Wreaking Havoc in the Division

In five division games last season, Mathieu registered four INTs (1 TD), 33 tackles, eight passes defended and a forced fumble. Mathieu finished the Cardinals Week 12 victory over San Francisco with a career-high 13 tackles, an INT, two passes defended and a tackle for loss.

A Career Performance Against the Niners in Week 3

Mathieu played the best game of his NFL career against the 49ers in Week 3, finishing with five tackles, a tackle for loss and two INTs. He returned the first of his two INTs 33 yards for a TD. Mathieu was named NFC Defensive Player of the Week for his effort against the Niners.

JONES HAVING AN ALL-PRO YEAR

When the Cardinals completed a trade with the Patriots to acquire Pro Bowl LB **Chandler Jones** in March, they acquired one of the NFL's premier pass rushers. So far this season, Jones has more than lived up to his billing as one of the league's premiere perimeter defenders.

Through 12 games, Jones has 41 tackles, a team-high 12 tackles for loss, a team-high 8.0 sacks, three forced fumbles, two fumble recoveries, 11 QB pressures and 19 QB hits. According to ProFootballReference.com, Jones and Oakland's Khalil Mack are the only players in the NFL this season with at least 8.0 sacks, three forced fumbles and two fumble recoveries.

In the Cardinals matchup against the Vikings in Week 11, Jones recorded five tackles, a sack, two tackles for loss and a forced fumble. That came one week after he posted his 11th career multi-sack performance and first as a member of the Cardinals.

AMONG THE NFL SACK LEADERS

Since entering the NFL in 2012, Jones has collected 44.0 sacks, 13 forced fumbles, four fumble recoveries and 256 tackles.

He joins Houston's J.J. Watt, Denver's Von Miller, Washington's Ryan Kerrigan and Cincinnati's Carlos Dunlap as the only five players in the NFL with 200+ tackles, 40+ sacks and 11+ forced fumbles since 2012.

Dating back to the 2013 season, his second in the NFL, Jones now has 38.0 sacks. That is the sixth-best total in the NFL during that span.

A VERSATILE DEFENDER

When the Cardinals selected **Deone Bucannon** in the first round (27th overall) of the 2014 NFL Draft, he became just the second safety ever selected by the team in the first round - and first since 1978.

As a rookie in 2014, Bucannon was named the PFWA's All-Rookie team at safety after recording 75 tackles, 2.0 sacks, a forced fumble and a fumble recovery. What made Bucannon so unique during his inaugural season was his ability to play inside the box as a dollar linebacker.

Bucannon flourished in that role again last season as the team utilized a player with a rare combination of size and speed.

In his second NFL season, Bucannon led the team with 127 total tackles. He also tied for the team lead with 17 tackles for loss, while adding three forced fumbles, two fumble recoveries, three sacks and an INT he returned 39 yards for a TD. Bucannon led or tied for the team lead in tackles in eight of 16 games last season and he had at least seven tackles in 12 of 16 games.

According to Stats, Inc., Bucannon and Carolina first-team All-Pro LB Thomas Davis were the only players in the NFL last season with 100+ tackles, 3.0+ sacks, an INT, and at least three forced fumbles.

In Week 5 at San Francisco this season, Bucannon established a new career high with 15 total tackles. Two games later he matched that total, as he finished the game against the Seahawks in Week 7 with 15 tackles. After totaling 21 tackles through the first four games, Bucannon now has 73 tackles in the last eight contests - and leads the team with 94 tackles on the season.



GOLDEN BEGINS ON A SACK SPREE

Second-year LB **Markus Golden** registered 2.0 sacks of 49ers QB Blaine Gabbert in Week 5, giving him at least one sack in each of the first five games this season. That represents the longest streak in franchise history to begin a season and it tied the second-longest streak in franchise history overall.

The streak came to an end in Week 6 vs. the Jets.

Despite playing in just 12 games this season, Golden has already established a career-high with 7.0 sacks (had 4.0 in 15 games as a rookie in 2015). He joined DE Curtis Greer (6.5 in 1983) as the only players in franchise history with at least 6.0 sacks through the first five games of a season.

Before he was held without a sack in Week 6 against the Jets, Golden had at least a partial sack in seven consecutive games dating back to last season. He has 9.0 sacks in his last 16 games overall, after totaling 1.0 sack in his first nine career games.

Golden also finished the game vs. San Francisco with career-highs in both tackles (11) and sacks (2.0) while adding three tackles for loss.

Through the first 12 games this season, Golden has totaled 50 tackles, 11 tackles for loss, 7.0 sacks, a pass defensed, two forced fumbles, a fumble recovery, 17 QB pressures and 16 QB hits.



HISTORIC PERFORMANCE IN WEEK 5

Arizona's longest tenured defensive player (only All-Pro WR Larry Fitzgerald has spent more seasons with the team), DT **Calais Campbell** is in his ninth season with the Cardinals and has appeared in 134 games with the team.

Perhaps none of those games was more impressive than the outing he put together in the Cardinals victory over San Francisco in Week 5. His final tally was four tackles, 2.0 sacks, two tackles for loss, two QB hits, an INT and a safety.

Since individual sacks became an official statistic in 1982, Campbell became just the second player with 2.0+ sacks, an INT and a safety in a game, joining Baltimore's Adalius Thomas (2.0 sacks, INT, safety) who did so on 9/17/06 vs. Oakland.

Campbell has 4.0 sacks so far this season and 52.5 sacks for his career. He sits alone in third place on the franchise career sacks list.

ONE OF THE BEST IN THE GAME

In December of 2015, CB **Justin Bethel** signed a three-year contract extension that keeps the three-time Pro Bowler in Arizona through the 2018 season.



The Cardinals sixth-round selection (177th overall) in the 2012 NFL Draft, Bethel has been named to the Pro Bowl as a special teamer each of the last three seasons. Now in his fifth NFL season, Bethel has registered 76 special teams tackles, three blocked FGs and a blocked PAT on special teams. He has led the Cardinals in special teams tackles each of the last three seasons and leads the way in 2016 with nine through 12 games.

Career Highlights

- The Cardinals first selection of the sixth round (177th overall) of the 2012 draft, Bethel has played in all 76 games in four-plus seasons and totaled 76 special teams tackles, three blocked FGs, a blocked PAT, three forced fumbles and two fumble recoveries on special teams. He has led the team in special teams tackles each of the last three years, including a career-best 21 in 2013.
- Posted the first blocked PAT of his career in the Cardinals matchup vs. the Vikings in Week 11.
- Joins current Cardinals radio analyst Ron Wolfley (1986-89) as the only players in franchise history to earn multiple Pro Bowl selections as a special teams player.
- Saw most significant playing time on defense of his career in 2015, starting five games during the season and both playoff contests. Totaled 29 tackles, two INTs (one returned for TD) and nine passes defended.
- Signed three-year contract extension with the Cardinals on 12/5/15 that keeps him under contract through the 2018 season.

9/15/13 vs. Detroit

The Cardinals trailed the Lions 21-19 early in the fourth quarter when Bethel blocked a 47-yard FG attempt by Detroit's David Akers. Two possessions later, Arizona scored the go-ahead TD in the 25-19 win.

Campbell with a Half Dozen

Standing 6-8, Campbell has blocked six FG attempts in his career, the most recent coming in Week 1 of the '12 season vs. Seattle.

During the 2011 season, Campbell tied Seattle's Red Bryant for the NFL lead with three blocked FGs.

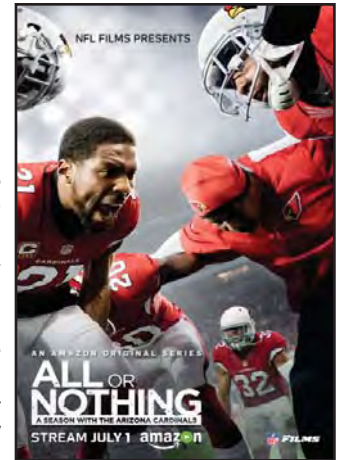

Game 1

Patriots 23, CARDINALS 21

September 11, 2016 – University of Phoenix Stadium (64,864)

Facing the Patriots on Sunday Night Football, the Cardinals suffered a season-opening loss at home after missing a go-ahead FG try from 47 yards out with 41 seconds remaining. Arizona had clawed back from an early deficit to take a 1-point 4th quarter lead on the second of Larry Fitzgerald's two TDs. They were the 99th and 100th career scores for the future Hall of Famer who finished with 81 yards on 8 catches. But the Patriots answered. Making his 1st career start while filling in for a suspended Tom Brady, QB Jimmy Garoppolo led the Pats on a scoring drive and they went ahead 23-21 on a FG with 3:44 to go. When AZ could not convert its FG try on the ensuing drive, the game was decided in favor of the undermanned Pats, who were without Brady, TE Rob Gronkowski and a number of others.

The Patriots scored on their first two possessions of the game to take a 10-0 lead. First Garoppolo capped an 8-play, 74-yard drive with a 37-yard TD pass to an open WR Chris Hogan down the left sideline. Then Steven Gostkowski's 47-yard FG on the next drive made it 10-0. Arizona's first 3 offensive possessions ended in punts before momentum turned with an Arizona takeaway. With 10:30 to go before half and AZ trailing 10-0, LB Markus Golden sacked Garoppolo forcing a fumble that former Patriot Chandler Jones recovered in NE territory. A celebration penalty pushed it back to the AZ46 but the Cards were still in business. They moved to the NE3 in 10 plays - 6 of which were David Johnson runs - before Palmer connected with Fitzgerald on a TD to make it 10-7 at the half.

New England opened the 3rd quarter by moving 75 yards in 9 plays and went ahead 17-7 on an 8-yard LeGarrette Blount TD run. A Cards punt turned it back to NE with 7:00 to go in the 3rd. However, a Blount fumble forced by DT Frostee Rucker on the next snap was recovered by DT Calais Campbell at the NE33. Five plays later, David Johnson punched it in from a yard out to trim the deficit to 17-13. A 53-yard Gostkowski FG with 12:35 remaining made it 20-14. On the next drive, an incredible run from Johnson covered 45 yards to the NE 12; he initially was stopped at the line of scrimmage, spun outside, steadied himself with a hand on the ground and raced down the right sideline. Four plays later, a sliding, over-the-shoulder TD catch from Fitzgerald in the corner of the end zone put AZ up 21-20 with 9:46 left. The Pats, who were 10-16 on 3rd down in the game, converted 3 straight on the next drive as they moved 61 yards for a go-ahead FG that proved to be the game-winner.

Game 2

CARDINALS 40, Buccaneers 7

September 18, 2016 – University of Phoenix Stadium (64,230)

The Cardinals evened their record at 1-1 thanks to a 33-point home win over Tampa Bay. It was scoreless after one quarter but AZ exploded for 24 straight in the 2nd thanks to Carson Palmer TD passes to 3 different receivers and a FG. In all the Cards enjoyed a 5-0 edge in takeaways (4 Jameis Winston INTs and a fumble). The defensive hero was CB Marcus Cooper, who was acquired by the Cards in a trade with KC 16 days earlier. The 4th year player recorded a pair of INTs, including one that he returned 60 yards for a TD. Larry Fitzgerald led all receivers with 6 catches for 81 yards and a TD while David Johnson had 143 scrimmage yards (98 receiving & 45 rushing). Palmer recorded win #30 in his 40th game as Cardinals starter and moved into 16th on the NFL's all-time passing yardage list passing Joe Montana.

The first of AZ's 5 total takeaways came on Tampa's opening drive of the game when Patrick Peterson picked a Winston deep pass intended for Mike Evans at the goal-line. Six seconds into the 2nd quarter, Fitzgerald's 4-yard TD catch opened the scoring. On the 2nd play of the next series, Winston's pass intended for Vincent Jackson was INT'd by Cooper who returned it to the TB19 and set-up a 22-yard Chandler Catanzaro FG. Down 10-0, the Bucs advanced to the AZ29 with 3:06 left before halftime and faced a 2nd-n-9. However Winston had the ball jarred loose in the pocket by a teammate and S Tony Jefferson recovered at the AZ32. A key 27-yard completion to WR Jaron Brown on 3rd-n-10 took it to the TB40, a 16-yard David Johnson run took it to the 25, and a 24-yard pass to Fitzgerald - initially ruled a TD - took it to the one. Palmer's TD pass to WR Michael Floyd on 3rd down made it 17-0 with 1:30 til intermission. Three Tampa incompletions ran just :17 off the clock and after the punt, AZ took over at its own 16 with 1:05 left. It was more than enough time for another TD as Palmer connected deep with WR Jaron Brown on a 51-yard scoring strike that made it 24-0 at the half.

Tampa opened the 3rd quarter with an 11-play, 75-yard drive that ended with their lone score of the day, a 19-yard TD pass from Winston to Evans. On the next play from scrimmage, David Johnson gathered in a short check-down from Palmer and took it 58 yards to the TB17. It led to another Catanzaro FG that made it 27-7. Tampa then moved to the AZ41 before Cooper struck again; he caught a Winston pass deflected by DT Josh Mauro and returned it 60 yards for a TD. Arizona added another TD early in the 4th when Chris Johnson's 3-yard run capped a 65-yard drive and provided the game's final score.

Game 3
Bills 33, CARDINALS 18
September 25, 2016 – New Era Field (68,647)

In a week 3 road game against Buffalo, the Cardinals fell behind early and could never catch up. The Bills notched their first win of the year with the 33-18 victory while Arizona fell to 1-2.

After the teams exchanged punts on the game's first 4 series, Buffalo took over at its own 22. On the first play, QB Tyrod Taylor rushed 49 yards to the AZ29 setting up a 19-yard Dan Carpenter FG. Buffalo's next drive started near midfield and one play after a 24-yard completion to WR Robert Woods took it to the AZ24, LeSean McCoy ran 24 yards for a TD. Leading 10-0, the Bills took over at the AZ 39 following a 31-yard Brandon Tate return of a Drew Butler punt; Butler injured his ankle on the play and K Chandler Catanzaro had to handle punting duties the rest of the way. The Bills could not capitalize on that field position though, as Patrick Peterson's 1-handed INT while tip-toeing down the right sideline ended the threat. AZ couldn't stop Buffalo on its next drive that also began with a short field. After taking over at their own 48, the Bills went up 17-0 when McCoy's 5-yard TD run capped a 6-play, 52-yard scoring drive. To that point, the Cardinals offense had failed to pick up a first down on its first 6 possessions of the game. However AZ would trim the deficit to 17-7 late in the 2nd with a lengthy 17-play drive that consumed 9:34 and ended with David Johnson's 4-yard scoring run.

While AZ got the ball to start the 3rd, it was the Bills who got the first points when Taylor scrambled for a 20-yard TD on 3rd-n-4. Now trailing 23-7, the Cards advanced to the BUF7 but could not convert on 2nd-n-1 or 3rd-n-1. On the ensuing FG try, a high snap was ultimately recovered but Buffalo's Aaron Williams at the 47 and he raced 53 yards for a TD to make it 30-7 with 2:25 left in the 3rd. Forced to go no-huddle, the Cards quickly moved 83 yards in 6 plays and David Johnson's 22-yard TD run made it 30-16 after the 2-point try was unsuccessful. Catanzaro then hit a 60-yard FG - one yard shy of the club record - that made it a 14-point game with 10:36 remaining. Four plays into the next Bills drive, AZ let a golden opportunity slip through its hands when Tyrann Mathieu forced a Taylor fumble but could not gather the loose ball before it went out of bounds. Another Carpenter FG with just inside of 5 minutes to play made it 33-16 and while a late Arizona safety and long return on the free kick would make it interesting, the Cards would not seriously threaten.

Game 4
Rams 17, CARDINALS 13
October 2, 2016 – University of Phoenix Stadium (64,622)

In week 4, Arizona hosted the Rams for the first time since their move to Los Angeles. Like most match-ups between the clubs, it was a close, physical affair that came down to the wire. AZ led in most statistical categories (26-12 in 1st downs, 420-288 in total yards) but it was the Rams who made more pivotal plays and secured a win that upped their record to 3-1 and dropped the Cards to 1-3. WR John Brown led all receivers (10-144) and RB David Johnson had 124 scrimmage yards (83 rushing/41 receiving), becoming the 1st player in franchise history with 100+ in each of the season's 1st 4 games.

The scoring began when LA struck late in the 1st quarter. On 3rd-n-7 from his own 35, Rams QB Case Keenum threw a 13-yard pass to WR Brian Quick who broke a tackle and took it the rest of the way for a 65-yard TD. On Arizona's next series, a pair of Larry Fitzgerald receptions (22 yards) and Chris Johnson runs (26) along with a Rams personal foul took it to the LA13. Chris Johnson then ran it in from there but the TD was negated by a holding penalty. As a result, Chandler Catanzaro's 25-yard FG made it 7-3. On the next drive, a 23-yard reception by TE Lance Kendricks took it to the LA48 and on 3rd-n-12 from the LA46, Keenum found an open Kenny Britt on a 34-yarder to the AZ20. That led to a 29-yard Greg Zuerlein FG that extended the LA lead to 10-3. With 3:00 to go in the 1st half, the Cards had advanced to the LA33 but Palmer's deep pass was INT'd in the end zone by CB Trumaine Johnson. The Cards forced a 3-n-out on the subsequent Rams drive and regained possession at their own 20 with 1:48 left before intermission. Thanks largely to three John Brown receptions (15, 20, 18 yards) the Cards moved 80 yards in 8 plays and Palmer capped the drive with a 5-yard TD pass to WR Michael Floyd that tied the game at 10.

The Rams got the ball to start the 3rd quarter. After reaching the AZ43, Chandler Jones sacked Keenum forcing a fumble that he recovered himself. The Cards soon returned the favor. After they had reached the LA26, Palmer was sacked forcing a fumble recovered by the Rams at their own 31. Late in the 3rd, the Cards again marched deep into LA territory. The biggest play came on 3rd-n-3 from the AZ39 when Palmer lofted a 24-yard pass to WR JJ Nelson who tapped his toes at the LA37. A 24-yard David Johnson catch-n-run took it to the LA4 but AZ had to settle for another short Catanzaro FG that put the Cards up 13-10 on the last play of the 3rd quarter. Early in the 4th, the Rams went for it on 4th-n-5 at the AZ39 but turned it over on downs when Patrick Peterson knocked down a deep pass attempt. Three plays later though a David Johnson fumble turned it back over to the Rams at their own 41. LA would punt it back to the Cards but on 3rd-n-6 at the AZ39, Palmer was sacked and suffered a head injury that would sideline him for the rest of the day. Adding insult to the injury, Tavon Austin returned the ensuing punt 47 yards to the 34 and a tacked-on facemask penalty took it to the AZ19 with 5:09 left. Five plays later, Keenum's 4-yard TD pass to Quick made it 17-13 with 2:36 left. Drew Stanton came on to replace Palmer but on his 6th play was INT'd by S Mark Barron. After a 3-n-out and 3 AZ timeouts, the Cards took over at their own 31 with 1:01 left but they could not advance further than the LA37.

Game 5

October 6, 2016 – Levi's Stadium (70,178)

This Thursday night tilt in San Fran was a match-up of 1-3 teams desperate for a win. The Cardinals were on the road with just three days of preparation and without starting QB Carson Palmer who suffered a concussion the previous Sunday. But Arizona came through with a series of game-changing plays and again relied heavily on the combination of 13th-year WR Larry Fitzgerald and 2nd-year RB David Johnson. Those two combined for 266 of AZ's 296 yards from scrimmage and scored all 4 Cardinals TDs. Defensively, AZ sacked 49ers QB Blaine Gabbert 7 times – 2 each for DT Calais Campbell & LB Markus Golden - and also came up with 3 key takeaways. Cards back-up QB Drew Stanton delivered a mistake-free, 2-TD game and was sacked just once. All of it added up to a 33-21 Cardinals victory.

While the teams would ultimately combine to score 54, points were hard to come by early as the game's first 9 possessions ended in punts. San Fran got on the scoreboard late in the 2nd quarter thanks to a 10-play, 87-yard TD drive that ended with a 9-yard Gabbert TD pass to WR Jeremy Kerley; it was the 4th connection between the two on the drive. San Fran held onto that 7-0 at the 2:00 warning and faced a 3rd-n-10 at its own 24. But Cards LB Chandler Jones then batted Gabbert's pass in the air and Campbell snatched it for an INT that gave AZ the ball at the SF21. On the very next snap, Stanton and Fitzgerald hooked up on a 21-yard TD pass that tied the game going into intermission.

On the opening kickoff of the 2nd half, TE Ifeanyi Momah delivered an impressive and athletic play on kick coverage when he forced and recovered a fumble by Niners KR Chris Davis setting AZ up at the SF14. It appeared AZ would have to settle for a FG but a running-into-the-kicker penalty gave the Cards a fresh set of downs. They quickly took advantage on the next snap when Johnson ran it in from 4 yards out to give AZ a 14-7 lead. After a San Fran 3-n-out, the Cards moved 71 yards in 6 plays and went up 21-7 midway through the 3rd on a 21-yard Stanton pass to Fitzgerald. San Fran responded with its own lengthy drive, an 11-play, 82-yarder that ended with Carlos Hyde's 1-yard TD run. Down just 7, the 49ers soon got the ball back but on the 1st play of the 4th quarter, CB Marcus Cooper recorded his 3rd INT in 4 games and returned it to the SF24. That led to a 36-yard Catanzaro FG that again made it a two-score game. Another 3-n-out by the Niners was followed by a long AZ drive that consumed nearly half of the 4th quarter. On it the Cards passed once - a 21-yard catch-n-run by Johnson - and rushed 11 times including Johnson's 2-yard TD plunge that made it 31-14. The Niners added a late TD on a 1-yard Gabbert run but the Cards added the game's final points with 1:17 left when Campbell sacked Gabbert in the end zone for a safety.

Game 6
CARDINALS 28, Jets 3
October 17, 2016 – University of Phoenix Stadium (64,709)

In a Monday night home game against the Jets and former coordinator Todd Bowles, the Cards controlled the game from beginning to end. NY entered the night with the NFL's #2 ranked run defense, allowing just 68.4 rushing yards/game and had surrendered just 1 rushing TD in 5 games. But despite starting 2 back-up guards, the Cards offense was committed to the run and RB David Johnson rushed for 111 yards and 3 TDs. Overall, AZ enjoyed a 171-33 edge in rushing yards and did not give up a sack or commit a turnover. The defense surrendered just 230 total yards while recording a pair of takeaways and limiting the Jets to 2 for 13 on third down. It all added up to a decisive 25-point win that evened Arizona's record at 3-3 and gave the Cards their first win since 1975 over the Jets, who fell to 1-5 after dropping their 4th straight.

The Cards opened the scoring on their 2nd offensive possession of the game. On the first play after taking over at their own 42 following a Jets punt, Johnson patiently picked his way past several tackles at the line of scrimmage and exploded for a 58-yard TD jaunt down the left sideline. His run gave AZ its first points in the 1st quarter in 2016. The Jets trimmed it to 7-3 early in the 2nd quarter when Nick Folk's 39-yard FG capped a 7-play, 50-yard drive. On the ensuing drive, AZ moved 75 yards in 11 plays and punctuated it with a 2-yard Johnson TD run. The Cards took that 14-3 lead into the halftime locker room.

After the Jets opened the 3rd quarter with a 3-n-out, AZ took over at its own 32. The Cards would chew more than half of the 3rd quarter off the clock with a 14-play drive that ended with Johnson's 3rd rushing TD of the game, this one from 2 yards out. Down 21-3, the Jets moved deep into AZ territory on their next possession but on 3rd-n-7 from the AZ14, safety DJ Swearinger INT'd a Ryan Fitzpatrick pass in the end zone to kill the threat. For the 2nd straight possession, the Cards would launch a 14-play drive, this time moving 89 yards thanks in large part to four John Brown receptions that gained 47 yards. It ultimately ended when Carson Palmer and WR Michael Floyd connected on a 9-yard TD pass. Fitzpatrick was then pulled in favor of Geno Smith for what would be NY's final possession of the game. It ended when safety Tyrann Mathieu intercepted Smith to cap the complete team win.

Palmer returned to action after missing the previous game (concussion) and completed 23 of 34 passes for 213 yards; he had a TD but no INTs and was not sacked. Larry Fitzgerald was again the game's leading receiver with 6 catches for 49 yards. Referee Jerome Boger and his crew also played a prominent role in the game, marching off 19 total penalties for 147 yards.

**Game 7
CARDINALS 6, Seahawks 6 (OT)**

October 23, 2016 – University of Phoenix Stadium (65,089)

The Cards hosted Seattle in a pivotal week 7 showdown on Sunday Night Football. A Seahawks win would give them a 5-1 record and commanding lead atop the NFC West. An AZ win would pull the Cards to within half a game of the division lead approaching the season's midway point. But in one of the most unusual and unbelievable games in recent memory, the teams would leave University of Phoenix Stadium with neither a victory nor defeat. They fought to a 3-3 tie through 4 quarters before each squad hit a FG on its opening possession of overtime. Improbably, though, the teams would trade misses on short game-winning FG tries to close the extra period and the contest ended in a rare 6-6 tie. It was the first tie in Seahawks history and Arizona's first since 1986.

By nearly every statistical measure, the Cardinals dominated the game. They ran 90 offensive plays to Seattle's 57, owned a huge time of possession advantage (46:21-28:39) and against the league's #1 defense had a 443-257 edge in total yards. RB David Johnson carried much of the offensive load with 113 rushing yards and 58 receiving. Defensively, Arizona was completely dominant. AZ forced punts on the 1st nine Seattle possessions and didn't allow Seattle to cross midfield until a 4th quarter blocked punt set them up at the 22. But the Cardinals could not capitalize and let multiple opportunities for points slip away. The first of those came early in the 2nd quarter when they reached the SEA21 but Chandler Catanzaro's 39-yard FG try was blocked by LB Bobby Wagner who leapt over the long snapper. It was initially penalized but the flag was picked up by referee Terry McAulay. A 46-yard Catanzaro FG on the next AZ possession would put the Cards up 3-0. They had a chance to add to the lead right before the half after reaching the SEA25 but a Seattle sack resulted in the half expiring before the Cards could try a FG.

On their opening drive of the 3rd quarter, the Cards advanced to the SEA18 and opted to go for it on 4th-n-1 but Johnson was stopped for no gain. As the Arizona D continued to shut down the Seahawks dangerous offense, the Cards clung to that 3-0 lead late into the game. But with 4:44 to go and the Cards stalled at their own 38, Seattle's Tanner McEvoy blocked Ryan Quigley's punt and the Seahawks took over at the AZ22. The Cards D forced them to settle for a 40-yard Steven Hauschka FG that tied it with 4:00 remaining. Each team would get the ball back one more time in regulation but neither could get into scoring position and the game went to overtime.

The Cards won the toss and got the ball first. They would move to the 27 but couldn't convert on a 3rd-n-5 from there and Catanzaro's 45-yard FG made it 6-3. The Seahawks had a chance to respond and did. After moving 57 yards in 9 plays to the AZ18, Hauschka's 36-yarder tied it at 6-6. The next score by either team would win it and it looked that would be AZ. A 27-yard completion to TE Ifeanyi Momah took it to the SEA48 and then on 3rd-n-7 from the 45, JJ Nelson's catch-n-run took it to the 5. A Johnson sweep appeared to score but was marked out at the 1. After a delay of game penalty, Catanzaro was sent out for a 24-yard game-winner but his try hit the left upright. Seattle then took over at its own 20 with 3:19 left. A deep pass to Jermaine Kearse gained 31 yards to the AZ43 and two plays later, a 27-yard completion to Doug Baldwin took it to the 9. It appeared Seattle would escape with the victory but Hauschka's 28-yard FG try with just seconds remaining was wide left and the game ended deadlocked at 6.

**Game 8
Panthers 30, CARDINALS 20**

October 30, 2016 – Bank of Stadium (74,088)

A week after battling the Seahawks for 75 minutes in a 6-6 Sunday night tie, the Cardinals traveled across the country for an early Sunday game against the Panthers who were coming off a bye. A rematch of the previous year's NFC Championship Game, Carolina scored the game's initial 24 points. The first 7 of them came on the contest's opening drive when officials mistakenly awarded Carolina a 46-yard fumble return TD on a play that was actually an incomplete forward pass. Two short Jonathan Stewart TD runs and a Graham Gano FG made it 24-0 with 2:45 left in the 1st half. But the Cards gamely battled back and while they outscored the Panthers 20-6 the rest of the way, it was not enough to make up the entire deficit. The loss dropped AZ to 3-4-1 at the season's midway point while Carolina improved to 2-5.

On the 5th play of the game, Carson Palmer was under pressure and tossed a short pass forward to David Johnson that fell incomplete. However, referee Walt Coleman and umpire Carl Paganelli ruled it a fumble that LB Thomas Davis returned 46 yards for a TD. Despite a technical issue that kept the network feed from the instant replay booth, replay official Lou Nazzaro chose to confirm the ruling on the field rather than stop the game for Coleman to review it. The Cards would then pick up just 2 first downs on their next 4 possessions - all of which ended in punts - while the Panthers added to their early lead. With 2:45 left in the 1st half and down 24-0, the Cards moved 75 yards in 9 plays as Palmer's 5-yard TD pass to WR JJ Nelson made it 24-7 at intermission.

The Panthers added Gano FGs on their opening 2 drives of the 3rd quarter to go up 30-7. Late in the quarter, Palmer again capped a 75-yard drive with a TD pass to a wide receiver, this time a 17-yarder to John Brown that made it 30-14. After a Panther 3-n-out, AZ found itself with a 1st-n-10 at the Carolina 46 to start the 4th quarter. But Coleman and his crew flagged the Cards on 3 straight plays to kill that drive. Their next would start at their own 8 but Palmer moved them 92 yards in 14 plays and with 5:01 left, another TD pass to Nelson made it 30-20 after the 2-point try failed. With 3:19 left, a Stewart fumble forced and recovered by S Tony Jefferson gave it to AZ at the CAR40. However, on the next play Palmer was INT'd at the line by DT Kony Ealy to dash any comeback hopes. Palmer would finish with 363 yards passing and 3 TDs but was under duress much of the afternoon and was sacked 8 times. AZ was also hampered by 10 total penalties flagged by Coleman and his mates.

Game 9

CARDINALS 23, 49ers 20

November 13, 2016 – University of Phoenix Stadium (64,709)

Coming off their bye, the Cardinals opened the 2nd half of the season at home against the 49ers. They took a 14-0 lead early in the 2nd quarter but allowed SF to stay close and the Niners eventually tied the game at 20 with 1:55 left. However, that was enough time for AZ to move into position for a game-winning FG try and Chandler Catanzaro's 34-yarder won it as time expired. The victory upped the Cards record to 4-4-1 and kept them in the thick of the playoff race while SF dropped its 8th straight to fall to 1-8.

The 49ers seemed intent on not letting the Cards beat them on the ground which opened up AZ's passing game. Larry Fitzgerald caught 12 passes for 133 yards while fellow WR Michael Floyd also eclipsed 100 yards (5-101). Both delivered athletic and critical receptions throughout the game including on the vital game-winning drive. Carson Palmer threw for 376 yards while David Johnson scored 2 TDs.

The team's traded punts on the game's first 4 drives before AZ opened the scoring with a 3-yard Palmer-to-Johnson TD pass on 3rd-n-goal. Later in the 1st quarter, Jeremy Kerley fumbled a SF punt return and Gabe Martin recovered at the AZ44. A defensive pass interference call on the next snap moved it 38 yards to the SF 18 and on the next play Johnson burst down the left sideline, diving to the pylon for another TD. The Niners answered on the ensuing drive by moving 75 yards in 6 plays and Kerley's 17-yard TD catch of a Colin Kaepernick pass made it 14-7. After the teams traded FGs, AZ led 17-10 with 1:32 remaining in the 1st half and got the ball back at its own 18 and 2 timeouts. Palmer then completed 7 of 8 passes for 68 yards – including 3 for 40 yards to Floyd – as part of an 81-yard drive that ended with a 19-yard Catanzaro FG as the half expired.

The Cards were poised to add to their 20-10 lead early in the 3rd when a flea flicker to Fitzgerald picked up 33 yards to the SF7 but 2 plays later Palmer lost a fumble on a sack by LB Eli Harold. The 49ers would convert the turnover into a 53-yard Phil Dawson FG that made it a 7-point game. Late in the 3rd Palmer appeared to hit WR JJ Nelson for a key pick-up but instead the pass ricocheted off Nelson's chest to S Eric Reid for an INT. The 49ers did not capitalize and with 3:24 left, the Cards held a 20-13 lead and had it near midfield. But Palmer was INT'd by LB Gerald Hodges and the 49ers took over at their own 43 with 3:13 remaining. By the 2-minute warning they had reached the AZ4 and on 3rd-n-2 from there, Kaepernick ran it in to tie the game at 20. After the kickoff, the Cards took over at their own 15 with 1:51 left and 3 timeouts. Palmer would complete 4 of his next 6 passes for 60 yards to move into FG range. The first of those completions was a huge leaping catch by Floyd near the sideline that moved it from the AZ15 to 41. AZ ultimately advanced to the SF16 before Catanzaro hit the 34-yard game-winner at the gun.

Game 10

Vikings 30, CARDINALS 24

November 20, 2016 – US Bank Stadium (66,808)

In week 11, the Vikings hosted Arizona in their inaugural season at US Bank Stadium. The game pitted a pair of the league's top defensive teams each needing a victory to keep up with the rest of the NFC playoff pack. Against the NFL's #1 scoring defensive unit, the Cardinals produced 24 points and again enjoyed a sizable advantage in nearly every statistical category. However the Vikings produced a pair 100-yard returns within a 3-and-a-half minute stretch in the late 2nd/early 3rd to seize control. While AZ fought back and closed it to within 6, they couldn't muster a TD on either of 2 late game possessions and fell 30-24. The defeat dropped the Cards to 4-5-1 while Minnesota improved to 6-4.

Minnesota's 1st drive of the game started at the AZ44 after a Cards punt. They took advantage by moving the 44 yards in 5 plays and Sam Bradford's 16-yard pass to WR Adam Thielen gave the hosts an early 7-0 lead. The Cards answered with an 11-play, 75-yard drive that RB David Johnson capped with his 1-yard TD run. After a Vikings 3-n-out, Johnson carried 8 times for 54 yards on the next drive helping to set-up Chandler Catanzaro's 34-yard go-ahead FG. Midway thru the 2nd, the Vikes had advanced to the AZ31 when they ran a flea-flicker out of the wildcat formation that resulted in a 29-yard pass interference penalty that moved it to the 2. On the next play, RB Matt Asiata ran it in and the score was 13-10 after Justin Bethel blocked the PAT. The Cards were on the verge of moving back on top when they advanced to the MIN9 on the next drive but on 3rd-n-goal from there, disaster struck. Running a quick out, WR John Brown was held up by Captain Munnerylyn at the goal-line and Xavier Rhodes picked off Carson Palmer's pass intended for Brown. No flag was thrown and Rhodes returned it 100-yards for a TD in a momentous swing that made it 20-10 with 3 minutes left in the 1st half. The resilient Cards battled back. Four Johnson plays gained 42 yards (2-18 rushing/2-24 receiving) moving it to the MIN29. From there Palmer found Jermaine Gresham down the middle and the TE fought his way to the end zone for a TD.

As the 2nd half started the Cards trailed by just 3 and kicked off to the Vikings. However Cordarrelle Patterson fielded the kickoff 4 yards deep and raced 104 yards for a TD. Now down 10, the Cards needed a comeback. With 5:30 left in the 3rd they took over at their own 31 and on the 1st play Palmer went deep down the middle to Floyd but the pass was INT'd by Rhodes. The Vikings converted the takeaway into a Kai Forbath FG that made it 30-17. Later a Chandler Jones sack of Bradford caused a fumble that Deone Bucannon recovered at the MIN27 and 6 plays later, Palmer tossed a 4-yard TD pass to Johnson to make it 30-24 midway thru the 4th. The Cards would twice get the ball back but the Vikings pass rush made it impossible to erase the deficit and MIN held on for the 6-point decision.

November 27, 2016 – Georgia Dome (69,233)

In week 12 at Atlanta, a Cards defense ranked #1 in the NFL in yards allowed faced a Falcons offense ranked #1 in points per game. Early on, Arizona's offense matched Atlanta's and scored on its 1st two drives for the first time in 2016. But ultimately missed opportunities, drops and untimely penalties proved to be the Cardinals undoing and they fell to 4-6-1 after being outscored 21-6 in the 2nd half.

The Cards began the game by taking the opening kickoff and moving 75 yards in 9 plays; Carson Palmer's 1-yard TD pass to TE Jermain Gresham gave them their 1st opening drive score of the season. The Falcons answered on the ensuing series when Devonta Freeman's 1-yard run capped an 11-play, 75-yard drive. After the teams traded FGs, the game was tied at 10 when a short punt gave Atlanta the ball at the AZ45. Two plays later Matt Ryan hit WR Taylor Gabriel on a quick screen that he took 35 yards for a TD. Leading 17-10, Atlanta was at the AZ35 late in the 1st half when Ryan's pass bounced from WR Julio Jones to Cards S DJ Swearinger for an INT. AZ took over at its own 37 with :25 left and quickly moved into position for a 54-yard Chandler Catanzaro FG that made it 17-13 as the half expired.

Atlanta added to its lead on its 2nd possession of the 3rd quarter when Tevin Coleman's 2-yard TD run made it 24-13. Earlier in the drive the Cards had a chance to take it away when Swearinger had his hands on a Ryan pass but could not hold on for the INT. Down 11, the Cards had the ball at the ATL40 early in the 4th and went for it on 4th-n-7 but Michael Floyd couldn't hold onto Palmer's pass and they turned it over on downs. The AZ defense forced a Falcons punt on the next ATL possession but DT Calais Campbell jumped offside to extend the drive. It ultimately ended with another Ryan-to-Gabriel TD on a screen pass and the Falcons led 31-13 midway thru the 4th. With 4:44 left, Palmer's 3-yard TD pass to David Johnson made it 31-19 after the 2-point try failed. Atlanta recovered the ensuing on-side kick try and converted the short field into another Freeman TD run 6 plays later.

RB David Johnson again led the way for the Cardinals with 58 rushing yards and another 103 on 8 catches. It put him over 100 combined yards for the 11th time in 2016, making him just the 2nd player in NFL history to top that century mark in his team's 1st 11 games of the season (Edgerrin James 2000 & '05). Larry Fitzgerald extended his streak of games with a reception to 190, tying Marvin Harrison for the 3rd longest in NFL history. He also passed Tim Brown and moved into 5th place on the NFL's all-time receptions list.

CARDINALS 31, Redskins 23
December 4, 2016 – University of Phoenix Stadium (64,939)

In a Week 13 match-up of NFC teams fighting for their playoff lives, the Cards moved to 5-6-1 with a 31-23 home win over Washington. The Redskins fell to 6-5-1 with the loss. The tight contest featured four 2nd-half lead changes and not surprisingly came down to a handful of key plays. One of the biggest came with 3:47 left to play and AZ holding a 1-point lead. Facing a 4th-n-1 at their own 34, the Cards decided to go for it and RB David Johnson ran for a 14-yard gain. On a 2nd-n-10 three plays later Carson Palmer delivered the dagger with a 42-yard deep strike to WR JJ Nelson. Johnson topped 100 scrimmage yards for the 12th straight game, finishing with 84 and a TD rushing, and 91 with a TD receiving. Larry Fitzgerald had a game-high 10 receptions for 78 yards and eclipsed several career milestones; he moved past Cris Carter & Marvin Harrison into 3rd on the NFL's all-time receptions list, passed Andre Johnson and moved into 10th in receiving yardage, and became the youngest in NFL history to reach 1,100 career receptions.

For the 2nd straight week the Cardinals scored a TD on the game's opening series. This time it was David Johnson 1-yard run that capped a 15-play, 75-yard drive. Washington would pull to within 7-6 thanks to a pair of Dustin Hopkins FGs on consecutive drives in the 2nd quarter. Chandler Catanzaro's 28-yard FG in the closing seconds of the 1st half gave AZ a 10-6 lead at intermission.

Washington got the ball to start the 3rd quarter and on their 2nd snap, QB Kirk Cousins connected with WR DeSean Jackson on a deep ball down the middle. That 59-yard completion took it to the AZ5 and Cousins' 1-yard sneak put Washington up 13-10. AZ's next drive ended when Catanzaro just missed from 53 yards out. The Cards, however, would quickly get ball back when DT Calais Campbell sacked Cousins forcing a fumble that LB Markus Golden returned to the WAS10. That set-up a 6-yard Palmer TD pass to WR Michael Floyd. Trailing 17-13, the Redskins then moved 75 yards in 8 plays and re-took the lead late in the 3rd when Cousins hit WR Jamison Crowder down the seam with a 26-yard TD pass on 3rd down. AZ would respond with its own 75-yard drive and moved back in front thanks to a 25-yard Johnson catch-n-run TD down the right sideline. A 53-yard Hopkins FG made it a 1-point game with 6:01 remaining. Four plays into the ensuing drive, the Cards executed that crucial 4th down play and subsequent deep TD that put them up 8 with 1:56 left. It was still a one possession game when the Redskins took over at their own 25 with 2 timeouts. Washington advanced to the AZ 28 with :52 left when Patrick Peterson picked off Cousins to seal the victory.
