BALTIMORE RAVENS (7-5) AT NEW ENGLAND PATRIOTS (10-2)

WEEK 14: MONDAY, DEC. 12, 2016 • 8:30 P.M. ET • GILLETTE STADIUM (66,829)



JUST THE FACTS

- On Monday, Dec. 12, the Baltimore Ravens (7-5) and New England Patriots (10-2) square off at Gillette Stadium in a matchup featuring division leaders who have each won four of their past five games. Kickoff for this primetime battle is set for 8:30 p.m.
- Including playoffs, the Ravens and Patriots have met eight times since **John Harbaugh** became head coach in 2008. Baltimore is 3-5 in those games, with six of the contests being played in Foxborough, where the Ravens are 2-4. However, in those six tilts at Gillette Stadium, Baltimore has outscored New England, 153-135, with the Ravens' four defeats decided by an average of 4 points.
- Last Sunday in the Ravens' 38-6 home win over Miami, **QB Joe Flacco** completed a career-high 36 passes for 381 yards and 4 touchdowns, helping Baltimore produce a season-high 496 yards of offense. The Ravens halted Miami's six-game winning streak after jumping out to a 24-0 first-half lead, which continued through the third quarter. **TE Dennis Pitta** registered 2 TD catches, finishing with 9 receptions for a game-high 90 yards, while **RB Terrance West** added 1 rushing and 1 receiving score. In holding the Dolphins to 277 yards and a season-low 6 points, Baltimore sacked QB Ryan Tannehill twice and posted 3 INTs (**S Lardarius Webb**, **S Eric Weddle** and **CB Jeraud Powers**).
- After playing New England, the Ravens return home to face Philadelphia (Dec. 18) and then close out the regular season with back-to-back games at Pittsburgh (Christmas Day) and at Cincinnati (Jan. 1).

HARBS SAYS

John Harbaugh on the Ravens' December football mentality:

"You should be, at this point in time, more of a finished product than what you were early on. You learn a lot about yourself in September and October, and you try to win some games as you do it. By now, we understand our strengths and weaknesses, and we continue to improve. It's about finding a way to win football games. It's football in the sense of you don't make mistakes, you create mistakes, you play field position, your guys make plays to win football games in critical situations, and you win games in the fourth quarter. I think defense and special teams are big. Run game is important. Completing passes is important. You have to open people up. You have to get strikes, and you have to put yards up in the passing game. But in the end, the best way to describe it more so than ever is it's about playing winning football."

INJURY UPDATE

Starting **LG Alex Lewis** (ankle) has missed three-consecutive games. **TE Crockett Gillmore** (thigh) missed his fifth-consecutive contest last Sunday vs. Miami, while **RB Lorenzo Taliaferro** (thigh) was out for his third straight. The Ravens have 14 players on Injured Reserve, including **TE Benjamin Watson**, who tore his Achilles tendon on Aug. 27. Other key contributors on IR include **DT Carl Davis** and **TE Maxx Williams**.

NOTE THE QUOTE

JOE FLACCO ON TAKING ADVANTAGE OF MEANINGFUL DECEMBER GAMES:

"The biggest thing is trying to somehow get it through to the young guys how unique of an opportunity we have. Getting to the playoffs is a big-time accomplishment, and to position yourself in December to play these meaningful games is also a big-time accomplishment. You can't take it for granted. You've got to keep your focus 100 percent of the time. When we do talk about it, it's trying to translate that feeling to the young guys. When you're a young player, sometimes you might think, 'Oh, there's always tomorrow,' and in this league, you never know when you're going to get your golden opportunity, so you have to take every little thing as a big opportunity and make the most of it."

WHAT'S GOING ON?

Baltimore and New England's defenses are tied as the NFL's No. 2 scoring units, allowing just 17.3 points per game. (Seattle is first at 16.2.) The Ravens, however, rank No. 1 in yards allowed per game and have produced the league's top rushing defense, which has held opponents to under 65 rushing yards in nine of 12 games this season.

SPOTLIGHT: TERRELL SUGGS

Where does the defense's never-settle attitude originate?
 "I think we should always be striving for perfection. I've had the privilege of being around some gods – some football gods. I know we're capable of it, because I watched them do

it. There's always something to improve on. As long as I'm here, I'm going to want perfection, especially on defense. If you win the Super Bowl, then yes, you were perfect. If not, you were not good at all."

Where does your football passion come from? "My dad told me – I was eight years old – he told me I was going to be a football player. I said, 'No, I'm going to be a basketball player.' But lo and behold, I became a football player. He prophesized it. I didn't really have a choice; my dad signed me up for football, and I had to go. He signed me up when I was eight for a league with 10-year-olds, and the rest is history."

What have you seen from rookie OLB Matthew Judon? "I see a lot of myself, like a younger me. He's a very fun kid to be around, and he can play. The kid can play. The only thing he lacks right now is experience, and that was all of us in our rookie year."

How has your relationship with John Harbaugh evolved over the years?
 "We have two strong personalities, and it works. At first, it was like he was John Harbaugh, and I was 'Sizzle.' You had your world, I had mine, and we're going to try to coexist. Now, we just click. I'm very grateful for him. Through time, we both matured, we learned a lot about each other and learned from each other. Most importantly, I trust him now. When he first got here, I didn't know if I could trust this new coach, but I trust him. I trust he will do what's best for the team, and not only that, what's best for me."

You have achieved almost every milestone possible for a defensive player. What is next? "I feel like I'm in constant competition with my past. I feel like the 34-year-old 'Sizzle' has to outplay the 28- and the 29-year-old 'Sizzle.' He is truly my foe. I really am competing with him, and I want to be better than him, especially with my football IQ and things I know about the game now that I didn't know back then. I've had the pleasure of playing with a few Hall of Famers. I've had the pleasure of being in that elite company, and I want to be on the Ravens' Mount Rushmore, too."

You are in production of your third feature film. What's the update? "I have to finish the script. I can't right now, because I'm in-season, and all I'm focused on is football. We have two scripts done and ready. They are both in the same comedy-drama realm about relationships, but I don't want to be seen as a one-trick pony. The next one is kind of an urban action flick. I call it an 'urban "Departed,"' if you will."

What is it about filmmaking that interests you? "Creating. It's the imagination part of it. It's having something in your head and converting it to paper and then it coming to life. It's one of the most surreal things. It's very flattering to have your ideas realized like that. You picture it, but having it actually work out on film is amazing. I love film, not just sports."

NOTE OF THE WEEK II

K Justin Tucker is a perfect 28-of-28 on FGAs this season and has connected on 35-consecutive boots dating back to 2015, tying (Adam Vinatieri, 2013-14) to produce the fifth-longest streak in NFL history. What makes Tucker's feat especially impressive is that he is 8-for-8 on kicks from 50-plus yards. His 8 "fifties" tie for the second most in NFL single-season history (listed below).

QUOTH THE RAVENS

G Marshal Yanda on the Ravens' going 4-1 over the last five weeks:

"We all understand it is December football, and you have to win a lot of games down the stretch to become relevant. That playoff itch is definitely in the back of us, and bringing everybody along with us is as important as ever. ... We never get too high or too low. We weren't down a month ago, and we're not too high right now. We just keep building on it, week by week. We have a heck of an opponent next week [in New England]; we understand that. We just keep going to work; we're going to keep working."

S Eric Weddle on the Ravens' playing "playoff football":

"I've been talking about it all season, that it's a process. This team is going to fight and scratch. We believe in each other, and we're going to continue to get better, or try to, as the season goes on. We played our best to date [against Miami], and we've got to play better next week. [The Dolphins win is a] huge, huge confidence builder and playoff football. We've been playing playoff football for the last four weeks, so it's nothing new to us."

QB Joe Flacco on the Dec. 4 Miami victory serving as a "breakout" game that provides confidence to the offense:

"I think it gives the guys a lot of confidence to see it and have done it. Now, we have to go up into a hostile place in New England that we really enjoy playing [at]. It's going to be another important game in December up there on a Monday night, and it's going to be a lot of fun. I'm looking forward to it, big time."

CB Jimmy Smith on the Ravens' defensive backfield:

"We're just trying to make sure when it's time to go, that we know where we're going – and that's to the playoffs. We feel like a No. 1 defense, and we know that defense wins championships. So when we go through these next four games, we know it's going to rely on us to carry us through and win these games."

Rookie OLB Matthew Judon on how the team came back from a four-game losing streak in October:

"We've always known what we had to do, and we know now that everything is still in front of us. It's our job to go take it. We were never shaken. We were never broken. And we never got down on each other. The offense never got down on us, and we never got down on the offense. So now, we've got to play all three phases and take them one-by-one. It's that time of year."

John Harbaugh on K Justin Tucker's confidence and bravado:

"To me, it is all positive. He is a 27-year-old guy. He is a performer. He is a very confident guy. To me, you can call that whatever you want, in terms of cocky or confident. I do not personally think he has a hint of arrogance in him at all. I think he is a fundamentally-humble person who loves life, loves to perform and has a lot of confidence. He has earned the confidence, because he has worked so hard, and he is talented. We try to keep him in place and whip him in shape every now and then and make fun of him every opportunity we can. He has a great sense of humor and takes it well."

The Baltimore Sun's Childs Walker on G Marshal Yanda:

"Of the many traits that have marked Yanda as a great player over the years, one is his ability to shift positions without losing effectiveness. That versatility is a product of his intelligence and his underappreciated athleticism. He's also a straight-up tough dude, much like Terrell Suggs on the other side of the ball. Only the elite of the elite guards earn serious Hall of Fame consideration. Yanda belongs in that realm."

Defensive coordinator Dean Pees on the value of NT Brandon Williams, who is playing at a Pro Bowl level:

"Stats are stats, and some guys are put in positions to make more plays than other guys. There were a couple of years ago that I can remember Haloti [Ngata] didn't have a bunch of stats, and everybody wondered, 'Was his value diminishing?' [It was] not to the coaches that were watching the film. If you can't single-block a nose tackle, you can make those linebackers look awfully good. Those guys are so valuable to us. Like I've said before, it's kind of like building a baseball team; it's right up the middle. It starts there, and then it goes out to the edges, and then you fill in from there. He's just been a great asset."

NT Brandon Williams on the Ravens' family values that allow all defensive players to contribute:

"We're family. That's from the top to the bottom. It starts with [owner] Steve Bisciotti and goes down. That's just how the Ravens are. We're a family. When guys come in, we bring them under our wing. We nurture them. We tell them what to do, and we bring them into the big family. 'L.G.' [Lawrence Guy], when he came in, he knew the plan. He was just that kind of guy. It starts with our GM Ozzie [Newsome] picking and finding guys who fit this system."

ESPN.com's Matt Bowen on calling S Eric Weddle the best run support safety in the NFL:

"Weddle isn't a blow-up hitter, but playing the run at the safety position is more about angles to the ball and the ability to wrap up on contact. Just get the dude down. Weddle consistently keeps the ball on his inside shoulder (prevents the cutback), and he understands how to fill when rolling down into the box. That means he closes with speed, eliminates the distance to the ball carrier and comes to balance (square up, bend the knees and control the feet) before shooting the arms on contact. ... Players like Weddle have an enormous amount of value, especially on a defense like the Ravens, which likes to show multiple looks. This allows Weddle to add as an extra defender versus the run. Tackle, tackle, tackle – you've got to have a safety who can do it to win on defense."

Temple head coach Matt Rhule on rookie CB Tavon Young whom Rhule coached last season:

"He's one of the most competitive players I've ever been around, and that competitive nature doesn't just lend itself to going out and covering Antonio Brown. That's how he goes about getting better every day. He's a guy that studies the game, loves the game, studies himself. He made it cool and acceptable and fun for guys to want to get coached. ... There are some teams that won't draft a [cornerback] under 5-11, 6-foot. He landed in a great spot. The Ravens are obviously a team that knows defensive personnel as well as any team in the National Football League."

- ✓ Under **John Harbaugh**, the Ravens are 7-4 on Monday Night Football, with 10 of those 11 games being played on the road (6-4 away record). (The Ravens' last home MNF game was the 2012 Week 1 opener vs. Cin.)
- ✓ Baltimore's 10 Monday Night Football games played on the road since 2008 tie (NYG) for the NFL's most. By comparison, New Orleans has played 11 home games on MNF, while Washington has played 10 MNF at home.

KEY CONNECTIONS

PRO CONNECTIONS

- Baltimore general manager and executive vice president **Ozzie Newsome** began his front office career as a special assignment scout with the Browns in 1991, when Patriots head coach **Bill Belichick** was at Cleveland's helm. Two years later (1993), Belichick promoted Newsome to assistant to head coach/offense/pro personnel.
- Ravens defensive coordinator **Dean Pees** spent six seasons (2004-09) in New England, including his final four years as "D" coordinator.
- Patriots head coach **Bill Belichick's** first NFL coaching job was with the Baltimore Colts in 1975 as a special assistant to then-head coach Ted Marchibroda. Baltimore finished 10-4 that season and was crowned AFC East Division champion.
- Former Patriots special teams coach and current area scout **Scott O'Brien** coached the Browns' special teams from 1991-95 and made the move to Baltimore with the franchise in 1996, spending three seasons guiding the Ravens' special teams (1996-98).
- Ravens **WR Kamar Aiken** spent time on New England's practice squad and active roster during the 2012-13 seasons.
- Patriots offensive coordinator **Josh McDaniels** was the Broncos' head coach from 2009-10, when Ravens ILBs coach **Don Martindale** was Denver's LBs coach (2009) and defensive coordinator (2010), and **OLB Elvis Dumervil** posted his first 17-sack season in 2009.

WEEK 13 RECAP: BAL. 38, MIA. 6

QB Joe Flacco completed a career-high 36 passes, including 4 touchdown throws, to lead the Ravens to a smothering 38-6 victory over the visiting Dolphins at M&T Bank Stadium last Sunday. The Ravens, who have won four of their last five contests, stopped Miami's six-game winning streak. Baltimore jumped out to a 24-0 first-half lead, which continued through the third quarter. Miami's lone score came early in the final period when QB Ryan Tannehill hit WR DeVante Parker with an 8-yard TD dart. Flacco finished the contest 36-of-47 for 381 yards, including 9 for 90 and 2 TDs to **TE Dennis Pitta**. The Ravens opened the game with an 8-play, 79-yard drive that ended with a 3-yard Flacco-to-**RB Terrance West** TD. Baltimore was impressive again on its second possession, which finished with a 13-yard Flacco-to-Pitta TD for a 14-0, first-quarter advantage. The Ravens' second-quarter initial score, finishing a drive that covered 88 yards, ended with another Flacco-to-Pitta TD (9 yards). A 55-yard **K Justin Tucker** field goal made the score 24-0 at the half. On two of the first-half TD series, the Ravens converted fourth-and-1 and fourth-and-2 plays near midfield. Flacco's fourth TD pass went to **WR Breshad Perriman**, who turned on the jets for a 53-yard score. West added his second TD on a 9-yard run with 5:55 left in the game to make the final 38-6. The Ravens sacked Tannehill twice and intercepted him three times (**S Lardarius Webb** with a spectacular end zone grab, **S Eric Weddle** and **CB Jerraud Powers**). Miami totaled 277 yards, while the Ravens produced 496. Flacco completed passes to 10 different players, including 6 each to **WRs Mike Wallace** (59 yards) and **Steve Smith Sr.** (53). West (50) and **RB Kenneth Dixon** (56) combined for 106 rushing yards.

PATRIOTS 35, RAVENS 31 – 1/10/15 AT NEW ENGLAND (DIVISIONAL PLAYOFF)

The Ravens' bid to play in their fourth AFC Championship game in seven seasons came to an abrupt end in Foxborough with a narrow 35-31 defeat. New England erased two 14-point Baltimore leads to win the battle, becoming the first team in NFL history to accomplish the feat. The Ravens jumped out to a 7-0 lead on a **QB Joe Flacco**-to-**WR Kamar Aiken** 19-yard touchdown pass on the game's opening drive. On Baltimore's next series, after forcing a Patriots' punt, Flacco engineered an 11-play, 79-yard drive, culminating with a **WR Steve Smith Sr.** 9-yard touchdown catch. QB Tom Brady then answered with a 4-yard touchdown rush to make the score 14-7. With 3:37 to go in the first half, New England tied the game with a Brady-to-**WR Danny Amendola** 15-yard TD. But, following a LB Daryl Smith interception, Baltimore re-gained the lead on a TE Owen Daniels 11-yard touchdown catch from Flacco with :10 left in the half. Pro Bowl RB Justin Forsett, who rushed for 129 yards in the game, caught a 16-yard pass from Flacco for a touchdown to open the scoring in the second half, giving the Ravens a 28-14 edge. New England stormed back again, however, scoring TDs on its next two drives. First, a 5-yard TE Rob Gronkowski slant pass made it 28-21, and then WR Julian Edelman, a former QB at Kent State, connected with Amendola on a 51-yard touchdown, Edelman's first-career NFL touchdown pass. Flacco then threw his first postseason interception since 2011, snapping a streak of 197-consecutive attempts without a pick. The Baltimore defense, which held New England to a franchise postseason-low 14 rushing yards (on 13 carries) stopped the Patriots on the next series. Then, the Ravens, who were 4-of-5 in the red zone, had to settle for a **K Justin Tucker** 25-yard field goal early in the fourth quarter, giving Baltimore a 31-28 advantage. New England took its first lead of the game on a Brady-to-**WR Brandon LaFell** 23-yard pass at the 5:13 mark, which ended up being the decisive scoring play. Flacco and the Ravens had two more chances, but a S Duron Harmon INT in the end zone and a deflected Hail Mary pass sealed the Patriots' victory.

In a magnificent effort showcasing thrilling performances by their defense, offense and special teams units, the Baltimore Ravens won Super Bowl XXXV with a 34-7 victory over the New York Giants. Allowing the Giants a meager 152 total net yards, New York's attack crossed midfield just twice, while Baltimore's "D" posted 4 INTs. LB Ray Lewis was named the game's MVP, capping an accolade-filled season in which he was also tabbed the NFL's Defensive Player of the Year.



QB Joe Flacco - 2012 Super Bowl XLVII MVP

Baltimore defeated San Francisco, 34-31, in Super Bowl XLVII, capturing the franchise's second World Championship. After an amazing first-half performance, the Ravens took a commanding 28-6 lead. But following a bizarre, 34-minute power outage that halted play, the 49ers stormed back into contention. Clinging to a 34-29 edge late in the game, the Ravens stood firm on a pivotal goal-line stand, jamming SF on four-straight plays inside the 7-yard line. QB Joe Flacco was named the game's MVP.

FOUR-STRAIGHT TOP 5s

In 2015, senior NFL writer Rick Gosselin of *The Dallas Morning News* ranked the Ravens' special teams unit No. 1 in the NFL in his annual comprehensive ratings system based on 22 categories, assigning points according to each standing — 1 for best, 32 for worst. 2015 marked the fourth-straight year in Gosselin's Top 5, as Baltimore was No. 5 in 2014, No. 5 in 2013, and in 2012, earned the No. 2 spot.

RAVENS THRIVE UNDER ROSBURG



Special teams coordinator/associate head coach **Jerry Rosburg**, a 38-year coaching veteran, has guided a strong special teams group since arriving in Baltimore in 2008. Here are several standout notes:

SIX PRO BOWLERS

• Six Ravens have earned Pro Bowl honors while playing for Rosburg: ST **Brendon Ayanbadejo** (2008), **K Billy Cundiff** (2010), **RS Jacoby Jones** (2012), **K Justin Tucker** (2013), **LS Morgan Cox** & **P Sam Koch** (2015).

PRIME PUNTER & KICKER

• Earning his first Pro Bowl nod in 2015, **P Sam Koch's** 46.7 gross average ranked No. 9 in the NFL, while his 42.9 net average was No. 2. In 2014, Koch posted the NFL's No. 3 gross (47.4) and No. 1 net (43.3) averages. Both marks are career highs and Ravens records. Pro Bowl **K Justin Tucker**, who Rosburg scouted and helped sign as a rookie free agent, owns the NFL's most FGs (158) since entering the NFL in 2012. With an 89.8% career success mark, "Tuck" is the second-most accurate kicker in league history (Dan Bailey, 90.7).

RAVENS BIG RETURNS

• Led by Pro Bowl **RS Jacoby Jones** in the 2012 Super Bowl season, Baltimore ranked first in the NFL in KOR average (27.3). Jones, who became the first player ever to record dual KORs of at least 105 yards in a career, tied for a league-leading 3 kick return TDs (2 KORs & 1 PR). He also tied an NFL record for longest KOR in a Super Bowl with his 108-yard KOR-TD. (In 2014's game at Pit., he added another 108-yarder to his resume, marking 4 total KOR-TDs over 100 yards in his career.)

ROSBURG'S PAST

• Prior to Baltimore, Rosburg built a successful NFL special teams resume with the Browns (2001-06) and Falcons (2007). Over a five-year span (2002-06), Cleveland's special teams were ranked as the top NFL unit in *The Dallas Morning News'* annual comprehensive report.

RAVENS BLOCK PARTY

• Dating back to 2014, the Ravens have produced 12 blocked kicks (breakdown detailed below), ranking as the NFL's No. 1 figure. In fact, Baltimore has a league-best 4 blocks in 2016 — 1 punt, 1 PAT and 2 FGAs.

MORNHINWEG NAMED O.C.



Marty Mornhinweg was elevated to offensive coordinator on Oct. 10, prior to the start of Week 6. A 22-year NFL coaching veteran, Mornhinweg, who joined Baltimore as QBs coach in 2015, is a former head coach of the Detroit Lions (2001-02). He has also served as offensive coordinator for the NY Jets (2013-14), Philadelphia (2004-12) and San Francisco (1997-2000).

- Throughout his NFL coaching career, five quarterbacks have earned Pro Bowl honors under Mornhinweg's direction: Michael Vick, Donovan McNabb, Steve Young, Jeff Garcia and Brett Favre.
- In his most recent role as an offensive coordinator (Jets: 2013-14), the team's run game ranked as the NFL's third best (138.7 ypg) unit during his time. Prior to joining NYJ, Mornhinweg served 10 seasons (2003-12) in Philly, including nine (2004-12) as the "O" coordinator/assistant head coach. He and **John Harbaugh** spent five seasons (2003-07) together on the Eagles' coaching staff.
- His first NFL coordinator job came with the San Francisco 49ers (1997-2000), where in 1998, the team set franchise marks in total yards (6,800), first downs (381) and rushing yards (2,544).

- In 2014, helped guide a rushing attack that finished third in the NFL (142.5 ypg) behind RBs Chris Ivory and Chris Johnson.

RAVENS OFFENSIVE BESTS

In 2015, with **Marty Mornhinweg** serving as the Ravens' quarterbacks coach, Baltimore posted the second-most net yards in team history. The Ravens also set a franchise record by averaging 266.9 passing yards per game. This season, with Mornhinweg as the team's O.C., Baltimore racked up the sixth-most single-game yards in team history during a 38-6 Week 13 victory over Miami.

PEES LEADS THE "D"



Dean Pees, a 13-year NFL-coaching veteran, became the Ravens' defensive coordinator in 2012 and helped guide Baltimore to its second World Championship in Super Bowl XLVII. Pees, who was New England's "D" coordinator from 2006-09, heads a Ravens' squad that currently ranks No. 1 in the NFL in total defense, including No. 1 vs. the run. Pees also leads a unit that, during the **John Harbaugh** Era (2008-16), has allowed the NFL's second-fewest points (18.9) per game, second-fewest yards (314.5) per game and the fewest overall TDs (277).

• In the Ravens' last 10 playoff games (since the 2010 season), Flacco is 196-of-327 for 2,563 yards, 24 TDs and 4 INTs (104.1 rating). He has led the Ravens to a 7-3 record in these contests.

• In Baltimore's last six playoff games (5-1 record), Flacco has thrown 17 TDs and 2 INTs. Completing 119 of 200 passes for 1,691 yards, he owns a magnificent 111.1 QB rating.

- Flacco has thrown at least 2 TDs in eight-straight playoff games, marking the longest streak in NFL postseason history.
- Flacco has 25-career postseason TD passes, tied (Brett Favre) for second most in a QB's first eight seasons. (Tom Brady is first - 26.)
- Flacco's streak of 197 passes without throwing an INT in the postseason (from 1/22/12 to 1/10/15) is the second longest in NFL playoff history (Drew Brees, 226). Joe Montana (179 from 1989-91) and Steve Young (173 from 1994-96) are third and fourth, respectively.
- Among active QBs, Flacco's 25 playoff TD passes rank fourth most (Tom Brady - 56, Peyton Manning - 40 & Aaron Rodgers - 27).

THE RETURN SPECIALIST



On Sept. 5, the Ravens signed four-time Pro Bowler **RS/WR Devin Hester Sr.**, who has produced the most return TDs (20) in NFL history, to a one-year contract. Hester Sr., who is in his 11th season, is arguably the best return specialist in NFL history. Here are a few notes about his impressive career:

- He has posted the most return touchdowns (20) in NFL history, registering an NFL-record 14 punt return touchdowns, and then adding 5 kickoff return TDs and 1 missed FG return TD (108 yards).
- Seeing action in 155 career games (47 starts), he has also tallied 255 receptions for 3,311 yards (13.0 avg.) and 16 touchdowns, also posting 116 rushing yards and one touchdown on 36 carries.
- Hester Sr.'s 11.7-yard career PR average ranks 10th in NFL history, while his 3,683 PR yards stand third. For kickoff returns, Hester Sr. owns a 24.9-yard career average, gaining 7,293 yards (12th most in NFL history). His 25.1 KOR average ranks fifth in the NFL in 2016.
- His four Pro Bowls occurred in 2006, 2007, 2010 and 2014. He was named to the All-Decade Team (2000s) by ESPN and *The AP*, and he has been tabbed All-Pro three times (2006, 2007 & 2010).

WR Mike Wallace, who is in his first season with the Ravens, ranks 13th in the NFL with a team-high 851 receiving yards on 57 catches through 12 games. Since he entered the NFL in 2009, Wallace, Rob Gronkowski, Jordy Nelson and Calvin Johnson (retired) are the only players to produce at least 50 receiving TDs and sport a 15.0 ypc average. (Wallace has an impressive 53 TDs & a 15.2 avg.)

WR Mike Wallace has proven to be a dramatic free agent addition for the Ravens. Wallace's team-high 851 receiving yards rank 13th in the NFL entering Week 14, while his 4 receptions of 50-plus yards rank No. 1. In Week 9 vs. Pittsburgh, he became the third player in NFL history to record 2 TD catches of 95-or-more yards when he produced the longest offensive play in Ravens regular season history with a 95-yard catch and sprint. Wallace's 22-career receptions of at least 50 yards rank as the NFL's second most since he entered the league in 2009.

JUST FOR KICKS



Pro Bowl **K Justin Tucker** ranks as the NFL's second-most accurate kicker of all time. He has connected on 158 of 176 FGAs to produce an 89.8 success rate.

- To kick off 2016, Tucker was named AFC Special Teams Player of the Month (Sept.) after going 9-of-9 on FGAs, including 2 game-winners. Tucker is a three-time AFC Player of the Month, which ties him with S Ed Reed & K Matt Stover for the most in Ravens history. Tucker has also earned seven AFC Special Teams Player of the Week honors, including in Week 12 this season after a 4-FG game (3 from 50+) vs. Cincy.

- In 2013, Tucker made his first Pro Bowl by setting team records in FGs made (38) and FGAs (41), with both figures tying (Stephen Gostkowski) for the NFL's most. Tucker also had a franchise-record 140 points (tied for sixth in NFL).

- Tucker's current streak of 35-consecutive FGs made ties for fifth all time. He made 33-straight FGs at one point during the 2013 season, which now stands as the seventh-longest streak of all time.

- His 6 FGs on 12/16/13 at Det. set a team record and a single-game NFL high in 2013. Against the Lions, he became the first NFL kicker ever to connect from the 20-, 30-, 40-, 50- & 60-yard range in a game.

- Tucker's 94.5 career FG% when kicking on grass (69-of-73) ranks as the NFL's best of all time. (The next best is Jay Feely at 86.8%.)

- Tucker's 91.8 career FG% (78-of-85) in the second half/overtime ranks as the NFL's best second half/OT mark of all time.

- In 2015's Week 2 game at Oak., **K Justin Tucker** became the fastest in NFL history to reach 100 FGs made, doing so in his 50th game. (Hall of Famer Jan Stenerud is the second fastest at 53 games.)

- At Miami on 12/6/15 in his 60th game, "Tuck" became the fastest kicker in NFL history to reach 500 points, surpassing Stenerud (61 games). Tucker is the second-fastest kicker in NFL history to reach 400 points, doing so in his 48th game. (Stenerud did so in 47 games.)

TUCK'S TERRIFIC 2016

In addition to making 35-consecutive FG attempts, the NFL's longest active streak and fifth-best (tied) run of all time (detailed below in grey box), here are several more facts about the remarkable 2016 season **K Justin Tucker** is producing:

- ✓ Tucker's 28 FGs made rank No. 1 in the NFL (tied with Dustin Hopkins). He's a perfect 28-of-28 this season, and he is also 20-of-20 on PATs.
- ✓ Tucker's 8 FGs of 50-plus yards are a Ravens' single-season record. They also tie Morten Andersen (1995) and Jason Hanson (2008) for the second most in NFL history (record is 10 by Blair Walsh in 2012).
- ✓ An NFL-high 19 of Tucker's 28 FGs made this season have come from 40 yards or beyond. (Next best is 14 by Matt Prater.)
- ✓ In Week 12 vs. Cincy, Tucker became just the ninth kicker in league history to make 3 FGs of 50-plus yards in a single game (52, 57 & 54). He is also the first kicker in NFL history to make 3 FGs of 50-plus yards in the first half of a game. (These feats earned him AFC ST POW honors.)
- ✓ Since PATs were moved back in 2015, Tucker (49-of-49) and Dan Bailey (61-of-61) are the NFL's only kickers yet to miss.

IN MEMORIAM: CLARENCE BROOKS

Clarence Brooks, the Baltimore Ravens' longest-tenured assistant coach, passed away on Sept. 17 at a hospital in Weston, Fla., following a battle with esophageal and stomach cancer. He was 65. The beloved Brooks – referred to by most as “C.B.”

– originally joined the organization in 2005 and served 11 seasons as defensive line coach. This past spring, while undergoing intense treatment for his illness, he transitioned into a senior defensive assistant role, but still spent as much time as he possibly could working with players and fellow coaches, including during the Ravens' recent training camp. Brooks was a 24-year NFL coaching veteran and one of six assistant coaches retained by head coach John Harbaugh upon his 2008 Baltimore arrival.

In addition to the Ravens, “C.B.” coached for the Miami Dolphins (2000-04), Cleveland Browns (1999) and Chicago Bears (1993-98). Brooks also spent 17 years in the collegiate ranks holding coaching positions at Arizona (1990-92) – where he was instrumental in the notable “Desert Swarm” defense that led the nation in scoring defense in 1992 – Syracuse (1981-89) and his alma mater Massachusetts (1976-80).

During Brooks' Baltimore tenure as defensive line coach (2005-15), the Ravens allowed the NFL's fewest rushing touchdowns (89), second-fewest points per game (18.9) and the league's second-fewest rushing yards per game (94.2).

Head Coach John Harbaugh:

“Our heartfelt condolences and love go out to Justa and the Brooks family on the passing of Clarence. We loved that man! He is at peace now through the grace of Jesus Christ. He fought the good fight and won. One of the finest coaches I have ever met, he changed the lives and influenced players and coaches for the better. He was a great man, loving husband and devoted father. He was as tough and determined in adversity as you'll ever see and as loyal a friend as there is. ‘C.B.’ will forever walk as a loved and cherished member of the Ravens family.”

General Manager & Executive Vice President Ozzie Newsome:

“Very few, if any, coaches influenced their players – on and off the field – like Clarence Brooks. How fortunate are the Ravens to have had this special person in our lives for the past 12 years? He was a teacher, a friend, a father figure to many and a great football coach. A lot of our defensive success over the years is due to his ability to get the most out of his players on the defensive line. This is a sad, sad day for our team and extended family. Our hearts ache for Justa and the rest of Clarence's family.”

Owner Steve Bisciotti:

“The Bisciottis are so sad to hear about Clarence's passing. He was the sweetest man I've ever met in football. He was also as tough as nails and was as respected by everyone on our team as any coach who ever touched the Ravens. His impact was more than people on the outside could know. He will be so missed.”

President Dick Cass:

“Clarence had a special rapport with his players. He was both beloved as coach and as a person. His infectious laugh and welcoming smile will be greatly missed, not by just the players and his fellow coaches, but by everyone in our building.”

DT Brandon Williams:

“Coach Brooks was like a father figure to me and every other player he coached. He made me the player I am today, but more importantly, helped me to be the man I am today. He always got the best out of you. He saw the potential in every player and did everything in his power to help you be the best you could be – on and off the field. Every day I walked in this building, no matter what was going on, he could always make me smile. I will miss him, and my heart goes out to the entire Brooks family.”

DE Lawrence Guy:

“Coach Brooks was a heck of a coach, but an even better man. He cared so much about all of us and could always pull the best out of you in any situation. Through him, I learned how to prepare better, practice better and play better. I will truly miss his coaching, his fellowship and his mentorship. Rest well, ‘C.B.’”

OLB Terrell Suggs:

“Clarence Brooks was a rare, special coach. We had a relationship that became more than football; he was family. He was every bit the definition of the word ‘coach.’ He was firm and demanding when he needed to be, but was a father figure and caring at the same time. I will definitely miss my friend.”

Linebackers Coach Don Martindale:

“Clarence Brooks is one of the finest human beings I have ever met. Selfishly speaking, you would like to say he was your best friend, but he was really everybody's best friend. We are happy he is not suffering anymore. I love him like a brother, and I am going to miss him terribly.”

Former Ravens Head Coach Brian Billick (Who Hired Brooks in 2005):

“Whew, this hurts. What a man, what a coach, what an inspiration. Beyond being one of the best position coaches in the league, Clarence was one of the most respected people in the NFL. He was a great teacher and friend. His positive and upbeat, yet stern, way was special. The proof is in the pudding. Look at how players improved under him. It would be tough to find a more respected assistant in the NFL. My heart reaches out to Justa and his family.”

Former Ravens DT Haloti Ngata:

“I am deeply saddened by the news of ‘C.B.’ passing away. I hope that I can help continue his legacy by the way I live and play. I played under ‘C.B.’ for nine years. In that time, he helped me go to five Pro Bowls and win a Super Bowl ring. He deserves a lot of that credit. He worked so hard with me and my Ravens teammates. This is tough news to swallow. I will miss you, Coach. Thank you for everything you taught me through the years – on and off the field. I love you, Clarence.”

Former Browns, Ravens & Dolphins DE Rob Burnett:

“I cried a few weeks ago when I found out about Clarence and his fight against cancer, and I immediately reached out to Justa and ‘C.B.’ His death rips at my heart. I loved Clarence. He was more than my coach. He was my friend, a mentor and a motivator. This is a sad day for all of those fortunate enough to have known this great person.”

JOHN HARBAUGH MONDAY PRESS CONFERENCE: WEEK 14 AT PATRIOTS

Opening statement: “Good to see you guys – appreciate you being here. Obviously, [it was] a very exciting afternoon yesterday for us and for our fans. I thought our fans were tremendous. They did a great job, especially on third down, of making it loud. They had some pre-snap penalties that were probably directly attributable to the crowd noise. That’s a big deal. I think our fans are starting to get excited about us. We’ll go take care of business and continue to get better as a football team, get them more excited, and make our place an even tougher and tougher place to play. That was a great thing to see.”

When it comes to the Patriots, everyone knows about head coach Bill Belichick, QB Tom Brady and TE Rob Gronkowski, even though he is out. Is there anything about the Patriots this year that fans don’t know about? (Joe Platania) “We’re just starting to study them. I don’t have an overview of them yet. We’re just starting to dig in and look at them. That might be a good question toward the end of the week to answer. I don’t have that great of an understanding of them just yet.”

Looking at the film ahead of the Dolphins game, was there something you saw you could exploit in the middle of the field with their linebackers? (Jerry Coleman) “That’s all a part of the game-planning process. You’re always looking for opportunities. Sometimes it works out, and sometimes it doesn’t. The structure of their defense is like any defense. There are strengths and there are other things that are left vulnerable. Sometimes you have to catch them in the right coverage or the right front or the right pressure with the right play. You’re always chasing that. We were able to find some of those things, certainly yesterday, in that part of the field with some of the two-deep coverages where the linebackers were playing aggressive. But there were other times where they covered things very well. It was just a give and take that usually happens in a football game. The credit goes to Joe [Flacco] and to the players just for the way they executed. They really executed exceptionally well, really, throughout the course of the game – beginning to end. It was very sharp. It was very precise. We’ve talked about that many times in there, that we were chasing that kind of precision. To see it – not just to see it, but to see it consistently from the beginning of the game to the end of the game – was something that’s been in our vision for a while. To see it happen was really good.”

You always strive to get better every week. You have won four out of five, and you’re playing very well. Do you like where you stand right now, in terms of the strength of the team? (David Ginsburg) “Sure. We like the fact that we’re in it. We like the fact that we’re in a fight for the division championship. That’s our first goal – the starting point of everything we try to accomplish one week at a time. Now we have our toughest challenge. We’re going to need to play our best football on Monday night up in New England to win that football game. We do believe we have a chance to do that based on where we’re at right now. That’s what we’re shooting for.”

OLB Terrell Suggs is playing really well right now. How impressed are you with his level of play, based on his injury and everything he has had to overcome this year? (Garrett Downing) “Very impressed, very impressed with Terrell Suggs. All of the things you just mentioned speak volumes, but what speaks the loudest is just what you see on tape. He’s doing it from the first play to the last play. Put the last three plays on when you get a chance, and just watch him play the last three plays on defense when the outcome of the game is very much in hand. Just watch how hard he played in those three plays. I think that tells the whole story.”

I know you haven’t had a chance to really look at the Patriots yet, but in a more general sense, that’s been a lively rivalry for you. You have had a lot of moments with New England, haven’t you? (Bruce Cunningham) “There’s a lot of respect for New England. Obviously, a lot of respect for coach [Bill] Belichick and for Tom Brady and all of those players. A guy like Rob Ninkovich comes immediately to mind. They’ve just got ... Julian Edelman ... You can name them. They have great players. They have a great organization. They do a great job, obviously, year-in and year-out, because they’re always at the top, and they’ve earned it. That’s something that we’ve been honored enough to be in some big games against them over the years. We feel like that’s a place we want to be, and we’re excited about the opportunity.”

They were almost always great games, weren’t they? (Bruce Cunningham) “Yes, they’ve always been pretty much great games. I think there’s been one blowout on our side and one blowout on their side over the years.”

John, when you go back and you look at the penalties from yesterday, some of the same things keep coming up. I know you had a talk with DT Timmy Jernigan. We have asked you about it with WR Steve Smith Sr. and some of the personal fouls



that he has accumulated and how it hurts a team. How do you express that to a veteran who knows better? (Jerry Coleman) "I have my ways of expressing it to those guys. They understand where we're coming from on it. It's communication, it's relationship, and that's what it is."

The fact that it's 15 yards and hurts a team, is it more of a situation where you say, "Hey, you've been in the league a long time," and this is more selfish than anything else? (Jerry Coleman) "I have conversations between me and them. You framed the question in a personal way, and I would probably say that that's a personal conversation I have with those guys. Those two names that you mentioned [Steve Smith Sr. and Timmy Jernigan] are two guys in different places in their careers, but I still have great respect for both of those guys. No way are they intending to hurt the team in any way. Just the opposite, they want to help the team in any way they can, and I respect that about them. That's where that stands. We communicate about that. They don't want to hurt the team. They want to help the team. That's how it works."

Talk a little bit about QB Joe Flacco in the hurry-up offense yesterday. Was that something that he and offensive coordinator Marty Mornhinweg went over that they decided to go with? He and the offense looked much more comfortable. (Bill West) "We've been in that offense for a few weeks to different degrees. Last week we ran it a lot, and we ran it a lot again this week. There were a couple instances where we added some wrinkles that were a little bit different this week, probably, than in the past. I'm sure that will be the same next week. That's game-planning stuff. That's been good for us recently. It's a direction that we'll probably continue to go. We got in the huddle toward the end of the game, too. We can get in the huddle and play out of the huddle, really, anytime we want. It just depends on the game, who you're playing and what you think is going to be most effective. It's, for the most part, the same plays. We've always had the ability to do that. Joe and Marty moving in that direction the last couple of weeks has been a real plus for us."

I know your focus is on New England this week. When you looked at the schedule and saw the last four games of the season, with three on the road, how big of a challenge is it to finish out that way? (Jamison Hensley) "You have to play these games. They were going to be on our schedule. Who we were going to play and where we were going to play them is part of it, so it really ... In all honesty, it doesn't matter where you play them. You play them. I'm happy to be playing them right now. I'm excited to be playing them right now when it counts the most. I'm excited about it, and I'm glad they fell right where they did. It's an opportunity. It's an honor to get to play. It's an honor to get to coach these games. What degree of a challenge is it? It's a big challenge. It's a huge challenge. We feel like we have just the men for the job in this room right here."

WR Kamar Aiken's role this year has been quite different than it was last year. The last couple of weeks, he's had two catches for first downs in the first quarter. Has there been a concerted effort to get him more involved? (Luke Jones) "Not really. We don't really talk in those terms too much. The offense is the offense, and we move guys around. I think Marty [Mornhinweg] does a great job with the offensive coaches of hashing all of that out in the normal game-planning process about who is going to be where and for what reason. The reasons are to have the best opportunity to have a successful play. There's a lot that goes into that. There's much more that goes into it, probably, than people understand. Then it plays out. Joe [Flacco] reads it out based on what you end up getting. You may not get the coverage you expected. You may not have the matchup you expected. Any number of things can happen. Joe goes through his progressions, sees the field and throws it to who he sees as being the best option – in the heat of battle – just like that. Kamar came up those two times, as you said, earlier in the game, maybe a little more often than in the past. That's a good thing, because Kamar is a good player. I like when he catches the ball. We have a lot of weapons, and that's a real plus for us."

S Eric Weddle made a comment about DB/RS Lardarius Webb stepping up to the challenge of playing safety, and obviously, everyone saw the play he made yesterday. Can you talk about Webb evolving as a safety and what you are seeing from him at that spot? (Cliff Brown) "I think it is a day-by-day, hour-by-hour thing at a position like this. He is playing in the NFL. We are talking about playing a position at the highest level. Although he had played [safety] in college, it had been a long time. But 'Webby' brings some intangibles to the table. He is a natural cover man. He has always been a very good cover man, and he has natural ball skills. Now, it is just being in the right spot in all situations. No two plays are the same. Every play plays out differently, but there are principles that can be applied in all of these different situations, and I think he is really starting to understand how to apply the principles to the different situations that come up. That play [the interception] was a great example of it. You are not going to see a better play in football from a safety than what you saw from 'Webby' on that play right there."



ILB Zachary Orr led the team in tackles again yesterday. I think he is top 10 in the NFL in tackles. He is not really in the spotlight as much as other guys, but watching the film, what kind of impact is he making every game? (Todd Karpovich)

“Like I have said before, Zach is playing very good football; he is making a name for himself. He is making a bunch of plays, because he is a good football player, and he is playing on a good defense, and he is flying around. He is coachable. He has talent. He is a very explosive athlete. He is a very smart football player, and he studies really hard. He plays every play as hard as he can, and it is paying off for him and for us.”

A few Dolphins players were complaining about the grass. Your guys have not seemed to have a footing problem at all this year. How has it held up, in your mind, throughout the course of the season? (Jeff Zrebiec) “I think it has held up quite well. It was re-sodded for this game. You saw the stretch in the middle that was re-sodded. I thought [head groundskeeper/senior director of fields & grounds] Don [Follett] did a great job of getting the field ready. It felt good when I walked on it; I didn’t slip. But our players didn’t slip either; our guys were prepared for it. That is an individual thing as a player. You have to go out there and find your footing in pregame. Our guys did a good job of that.”

There is a lot to like about the way QB Joe Flacco played yesterday. He had 36 completions, [and threw to] 10 different receivers. What did you see that you really liked? If anything, can he do even better than what he did yesterday? (Dave Ginsburg) “Execution was good all the way around. It is a team effort; it is a team game for execution to happen. It shows up most obviously with the quarterback. Joe played just extremely well. I thought all the guys around him played extremely well, too. It came together yesterday, and that is one game. We will be looking to try to improve, because we are going to have to improve just to stay the same. We think you have to get better every single time you step on the field in anything, really, and that is what our guys are going to try to do.”

Can you talk a little about WR Breshad Perriman? He has scored a touchdown in three of the last four games. He was able to show his speed yesterday. He has been criticized by fans and everybody, but he was able to show his speed yesterday. (Bill West) “It was great to see Breshad have an opportunity to show everybody how fast he is. Those defenders probably had the angle on him there. I would think that most people watching – including myself from the angle I had – thought that he was going to get boxed in. He did not get boxed in; he just outran the angles. That was exciting to see. He did it with confidence. He is a quiet guy, he works really hard, and it really matters to him. He is only to continue to keep improving because of how hard he works.”

With S Eric Weddle, everyone sees what he can do on the field and what plays he makes, but what are some of the intangibles you see with him that helps make the secondary defense better? (Jamison Hensley) “I see all of the intangibles that you guys see. He has a great attitude. He has great work ethic. He has a great enthusiasm for everything he does. He makes it his business to bring that to the table every day. My dad says, ‘Attack every day with an enthusiasm unknown to mankind.’ Why wouldn’t you? I think anyone that looks at it differently is selling themselves short and missing out a little bit on these few precious moments that we are given on this earth. That is how I look at it. I think Eric Weddle – I will tell you this – I think he believes that with all his heart. He is that way at 5:30 in the morning in the weight room. He is that way at 6:30 at night when he is just finishing up his work on tape. That is how he lives his life. He is that way when he has his kids in the building. That is how he lives.”

I think a lot of Ravens fans have seen QB Joe Flacco get hot, and they have seen how well he can play when he gets hot. Was there a part of you yesterday when you were watching the game or when you were watching the tape today and you said, “Here is the quarterback that I have seen before do this,” and that he can get on this run and this can be the start of that? (Ryan Mink) “I do not look at it like that. I think it is good to look at it that way, and that is fun. But I look at like, ‘OK, what are we going to do on the next play? How are we going to execute, and how can we get everyone to improve and get better?’ I think Joe ... It is a competitive endeavor out here. It is not like golf, where you go out there and all of a sudden your swing starts grooving [like], ‘I am going to make a bunch of putts in a row.’ There is an opponent over there that is trying to take away your swing. They are blocking your putt. You have to find a way to maneuver through. They are attacking you, and you are heading down for your ball and they are tackling you. It is a different sport. It is not just about getting into a groove. If it was like that, then it would not be football. It is tough, because every single play presents a new challenge against a tough opponent that is doing everything they can within their intellect and their physical opportunity to thwart your efforts. We just have to find a way to win the next play. That is what we are trying to do.”



A few weeks ago, there may have been some in this room that thought this team did not have a chance to go anywhere in this season. Now you guys are entrenched in first place and have a chance and are taking on a New England team that has lost one of its star players in TE Rob Gronkowski. Do you feel that the AFC is virtually wide open right now and it has changed from a few weeks ago? **(Jerry Coleman)** “Just like a few weeks ago, I did not think of it in those terms. I do not think of in those terms now. It is not what we think about. It is kind of what we were just talking about: It is more about trying to be the best we can the next play and execute and play good football. Things will fall the way they fall. It is a competitive deal for us.”

You have cited how well T Rick Wagner has been playing in recent weeks. He suffered a serious injury [in 2014]. Is health the biggest thing as to why he is playing well? What do you think has keyed that? **(Jeff Zrebiec)** “I think so. Health – on top of that, because you are healthy – [you have] the ability to train every single day on your techniques. He has been able to stack a number of practices with the other offensive lineman and with [offensive line coach] Juan [Castillo] on fundamentals and techniques that are paying off. That is how it works. It is no different than learning how to do any skill. To play a piano, you have to practice. If your fingers are all broken, it is tough to get your practice in, and you probably are not going to perform as well. He has been able to stack throughout the course of the season a lot of really high-effort practices, and it is paying off for him.”

A lot of has been mentioned recently about RB Kenneth Dixon’s increased role in the running game. Has RB Terrance West managed to maintain his level of play while Dixon has come along? **(Joe Platania)** “Well, you watch it. Don’t you think he has? I think he has. I actually would say he has gotten better. He is improving. He is a young player. Both of those two guys have improved really every single outing and every single day at practice in a lot of little ways. To me, they are both playing at a high level.”

Do you think the dab [dance] may be the good luck charm? **(Bill West)** “Will you see it again? No. *(laughter)* I thought it was ... [Senior VP of public and community relations] Kevin [Byrne] showed it to me, and I had a good teacher, right Kevin? A lovely young lady [Amanda from Make-A-Wish last Friday], a huge Ravens fan. She showed a lot of spunk. She got into the huddle with the guys and showed them how to dab. She is a big Joe Flacco fan. I watched her do it with such flair! With that kind of the flair, I kind of just tried to do it like she did. But thank you for the compliment. *(laughter)* Maybe I will ... If we win the AFC North, how about that? We will do it then. Is that good? Is that fair? Let’s make it worthwhile.” *(laughter)*

Is there any chance on some of the guys that have been missing lately? TE Crockett Gillmore, RB Lorenzo Taliaferro, G/T Alex Lewis? Or are they still a good ways away? **(Jeff Zrebiec)** “Alex is a good ways away, because it is a high ankle [sprain]. The other two guys are hamstrings. You never know with hamstrings. You think they are close, and then they try it and it grabs on them. We will just see where that goes.”
