COWBOYS & GIANTS

- Series Notables:**
- * The Cowboys have only faced two teams - Washington (112) and Philadelphia (110) - more than they have faced the Giants (108) in the regular season.
 - * The Cowboys longest win streak in the series is 12 games from 1974-80 - the second-longest win streak over a single opponent in Dallas history. The Cowboys had a 13-game win streak against the Arizona Cardinals from 1990-96.
 - * These teams tied their first ever meeting 31-31 in 1960, marking Dallas' only non-loss of its inaugural season.
 - * Dallas and New York have faced off in the playoffs only once in the series history - a 2007 NFC Divisional Playoff Game.
- A Cowboys Win Would:**
- * Improve Dallas' record to 12-1 for only the second time (2007) in franchise history.
 - * Give the Cowboys their 12th straight win to establish the longest win streak, including combined regular seasons, in franchise history and tie the longest win streak including combined regular and postseasons (11/7/71-9/24/72).
 - * Mark the first time in franchise history that Dallas has started the season 0-1 and gone on to win the next 12 games. They would also become only the second team in NFL history to accomplish that feat (1969 Minnesota Vikings).
 - * Up the Cowboys record against the NFC East in 2016 to 4-1 and allow Dallas to claim the NFC East divisional crown for the 19th time - 23rd overall divisional title - and first since 2014.
 - * Snap a two-game losing streak against the Giants.
 - * Give the Cowboys their seventh road win of the season to become the fourth team in franchise history to accomplish that feat, joining the 1968, 2007 and 2014 teams while tying the 1968 and 2007 teams for the second-most road wins.

- ★ Tied Michael Irvin with his 65th career touchdown grab, second all-time in Cowboys history.
- ★ Bryant is averaging a career-high 17.1 yards-per-reception through 12 games, which ranks sixth in the league this season.
- ★ He is one-of-five players in 2016 to have three catches of 50-plus yards, despite playing in only nine games thus far. Only Mike Wallace has more catches (four) to go for 50-plus.
- ★ Bryant has converted 78.4% of his catches for first downs in 2016, the sixth-best percentage in the league and just one percentage point behind teammate Terrance Williams, who ranks fourth with a 79.3% conversion rate.

Dak Prescott scored a 108.3 rating against Minnesota to mark his 10th game with a 100.0 rating, surpassing Russell Wilson (9 – 2012) for the most by a rookie quarterback in a single season in NFL history.

The Cowboys have scored points on 48.8% of their drives in 2016, second in the league to Atlanta's 52.7%. Since 2000, only two teams have finished a season with a scoring efficiency above 50% - the 2007 Patriots and the 2011 Saints.

Head Coach Jason Garrett coached in his 100th regular season game and earned his 56th regular season victory at Minnesota, which are both second all-time in Cowboys history.

UPCOMING MILESTONES AND CURRENT NOTES

With the 2016 season in the home stretch for the Dallas Cowboys, the following information pertains to the most current notes and page location in the release for the remainder of the information, as well as upcoming milestones:

2016 DALLAS COWBOYS CURRENT TEAM HIGHLIGHTS:

- * The Cowboys offense is third in the NFL with 283 total first downs and leads the league with 116 rushing first downs (**FIRST DOWN COWBOYS - page 25**).
- * The Dallas offense has produced the second-ranked rushing attack by averaging 155.8 yards-per-game (**RUSHING TO THE TOP - page 25**).
- * Dallas is second in the league with 20 rushing touchdowns (**214 + 46 + 25 = RUSHING TDS - page 26**).
- * The Cowboys have 55 big play runs of 10-or-more yards - tied for the league lead. Dallas also has 13 rushes of 20+ yards to tie for second (**BIG PLAY RUNS - page 27**).
- * The offensive unit leads the NFL with a commanding 32:20 time of possession mark (**OFFICIAL TIMEKEEPERS OF THE NFL - page 27**).
- * The Cowboys offense boasts 30 drives of five-or-more minutes - 26 for scores, both tops in the NFL in 2016. The unit also has had 15 drives go five-or-more minutes and result in touchdowns, best in the league (**DRIVE FOR FIVE - page 27**).
- * The Cowboys have recorded 29 drives of 10-or-more plays to boast the most in the NFL (**TEN PLAYS-OR-MORE - page 27**).
- * The Dallas offense has scored on 60 of its 123 drives for a 48.8% scoring efficiency rate to place second the NFL, while also boasting the second-highest touchdown efficiency rate (31.7%) (**FINISHING DRIVES WITH SCORES - page 27**).
- * The Cowboys rank fourth in red zone touchdown efficiency at 66.0% (31-of-47) (**RED ALERT - page 27**).
- * Dallas' offense is fifth in the league with a 46.1 third down percentage (65-of-141) (**THIRD-AND-NO PROBLEM - page 27**).
- * The Cowboys are one-of-four teams to give up 20-or-more points to opposing team's offenses five times-or-less this season and are tied for the third-fewest games in the NFL with five (**20 POINT LIMIT - page 29**) and are also ranked fifth in the NFL with 19.0 points allowed-per-game (**POINTS HARD TO COME BY - page 29**).
- * The defensive unit of Dallas has allowed only 28 runs of 10-plus yards to opposing offenses - tied for seventh in the NFL (**LIMITING BIG PLAYS - page 29**).
- * The Dallas defense is one-of-three teams in the NFL to not allow a 100-yard rusher in a single game (**NO HUNDREDS EXCHANGED HERE - page 29**).

- * A win against the Giants would give the Cowboys their 12th straight win to establish the longest winning streak, including combined seasons, in franchise history and tie for the longest win streak including combined regular seasons and postseasons (**WINNING STREAK AT 11 - page 7**).
- * A victory over the Giants would also allow Dallas to claim the NFC East divisional crown for the 19th time - 23rd overall divisional title - and first since 2014.

 - * Dez Bryant (65) needs one touchdown reception to break a tie with Michael Irvin (65) for sole possession of the second-most touchdowns in franchise history (**DEZZLING PERFORMANCES - page 21**).
- Ezekiel Elliott - RB**
 - * Ezekiel Elliott (1,285) can break into the Cowboys top-10 rushing yards in a single season, and with 113 yards can pass Tony Dorsett's 1985 total (1,307), 1983 total (1,321), 1978 total (1,325), Emmitt Smith's 1998 total (1,332) and 1999 total (1,397) for ninth all-time in team history.
 - * Elliott (12) needs one rushing touchdown to break a tie with Tony Dorsett (12 - 1977) and Herschel Walker (12 - 1986) for the most rushing touchdowns by a Cowboys rookie (**EAT, ZEKE, EAT - page 24**). He would also break into the Cowboys top-10 most rushing touchdowns in a single season.
 - * With two rushing touchdowns, Elliott would notch his fifth multi-score game of the season to extend his team rookie record and tie the second-most by a rookie runner in NFL history (**EAT, ZEKE, EAT - page 24**).
 - * With one touchdown Elliott (13 - 12 rush; 1 rec.) will tie Walker (14 - 12 rush; 2 rec.) for the most total touchdowns by a rookie in team history.
 - * With one game of 100-or-more scrimmage yards, Elliott (nine) will reach his 10th of the season and tie for the sixth-most games by a rookie in NFL history (**ZEKE & DESTROY - page 25**).

Chris Jones - P

- * Chris Jones (105) needs two punts downed inside the 20-yard line to pass Toby Gowin (106) for fourth all-time in a career in franchise history.

DeMarcus Lawrence - DE

- * DeMarcus Lawrence (9.0) needs one sack to become the 39th player in franchise history to reach 10.0 career sacks.

Dak Prescott - QB

- * With a win, Dak Prescott (11) will increase his streak of consecutive wins as the starting quarterback to 12 while extending the second-longest winning streak by a rookie quarterback during the Super Bowl era behind Ben Roethlisberger (13 - 2004) (**THE DAK KNIGHT RISES - page 8**).
- * Prescott (2,974) needs 26 passing yards to become the 16th NFL rookie quarterback to pass for 3,000 yards and the ninth quarterback - first rookie - in team history.
- * With one passing touchdown, Prescott (19) will become the 14th NFL rookie quarterback to register 20 passing scores, and the eighth quarterback in franchise history to pass for 20-or-more touchdowns in a single season.
- * With a 100.0 rating, Prescott will post his 11th game of the season to extend his NFL rookie record and break a tie with Tony Romo (10 - 2007; 10 - 2014) for the most by any Cowboys quarterback in a single season (**PRESCOTT RAINGS AT 100.0 - page 9**). It will also mark his sixth consecutive game with a 100.0 rating to surpass Roethlisberger (5 - 2004), Robert Griffin III (5 - 2012) and his own early season mark (5 - 2016) to establish the longest streak by a rookie quarterback in NFL history.
- * With a completion percentage of 70.0-or-better, Prescott will add his eighth of the season to extend his NFL rookie quarterback record and tie Troy Aikman (8 - 1993) and Tony Romo (8 - 2012) for the most by a Cowboys quarterback in team history (**COOL HAND DAK - page 9**).
- * Prescott (5) needs one rushing touchdown to break a tie with Don Meredith (5 - 1966) for for the most rushing scores by a Dallas quarterback in a single season in franchise history (**RAYNE MAN - page 26**).

Jason Witten - TE

- * Jason Witten (11,768) needs 137 yards to pass Michael Irvin (11,904) for the most receiving yards by a Dallas Cowboy in franchise history (**QUICK WITT-ED - page 17**).
- * Witten (1,072) needs seven receptions to pass Terrell Owens (1,078) for seventh on the league's all-time pass receptions list (**LEADING MAN - page 16**).
- * Witten (52) needs eight receptions to reach 60 on the season for the 13th consecutive season (**60X12 - page 17**).
- * Witten (553) needs 47 yards to reach 600 receiving yards on the season for the 13th consecutive season (**600X12 - page 18**).

2016 DALLAS COWBOYS MOST RECENT NOTES AT MINNESOTA (12/1) - TEAM:

- * The win over Minnesota gave the Cowboys their 11th straight to extend the franchise's longest regular season winning streak during a single season in team history. The win also tied the longest win streak, including combined seasons, in team history (**WINNING STREAK AT 11 - page 7**).
- * In NFL history, the Cowboys became the fifth team to start the season 0-1 and go on to win the next 11 games - first since the 1997 San Francisco 49ers - and also tied the second-longest win streak in NFL history following an 0-1 start (**WINNING STREAK AT 11 - page 7**).
- * With the win, Dallas snapped a five-game road losing streak when facing the Vikings - including playoffs - with the last win in Minnesota on Sept. 17, 1995

Jason Garrett - Head Coach

- * This was Jason Garrett's 100th regular season game as head coach and his record during the regular season is now 56-44 (**WINNING HEAD COACH - page 4**).

Dez Bryant - WR

- * Dez Bryant caught four passes for 84 yards and a touchdown with his score serving as the 65th of his career to tie Michael Irvin (65) for the second-most touchdowns in franchise history (**DEZZLING PERFORMANCES - page 21**).
- * Bryant hauled in a season-long catch for 56 yards to serve as his third catch of 50-plus yards - tied for second-most by an NFL receiver in 2016 (**50 CENT - page 21**).

Ezekiel Elliott - RB

- * Ezekiel Elliott rushed 20 times for 86 yards and a touchdown and caught four passes for 19 yards (105 total scrimmage yards).
- * Elliott once again was the lead rusher in the game to mark his 11th straight game as the lead rusher for both teams to extend an NFL rookie record.
- * Elliott's 1,285 yards are the second-most overall by an NFL player in his first 12 career games in NFL history (**COMPARING ROOKIE RUSHERS - page 24**).
- * In total, it was Elliott's ninth 100-yard scrimmage game of the season - tied for the third-most by a rookie since 2000 (**ZEKE & DESTROY - page 25**).
- * Elliott's rushing touchdown gave him 12 on the season to tie Tony Dorsett (12 - 1977) and Herschel Walker (12 - 1986) for the most rushing touchdowns by a Cowboys rookie (**EAT, ZEKE, EAT - page 24**) while tying for seventh-most by any Cowboys rusher in team history in a single season.
- * Elliott's 13 total touchdowns (12 rushing; one receiving) are now tied for the second-most total scores by a Cowboys rookie in franchise history.

Dak Prescott - QB

- * By making his 12th start and 12th game played, Dak Prescott surpassed Troy Aikman (11/11 - 1989) for the most starts and most games played by a Cowboys rookie quarterback in team history (**DAK ATTACK - page 8**).
- * With the win, Prescott improved to 11-1 to boast the second-most wins (11) by a rookie quarterback through his first 12 starts behind Ben Roethlisberger (12 - 2004) and the second-most wins overall by a rookie quarterback in a single season in the Super Bowl era (Roethlisberger - 13, 2004) (**DAK ATTACK - page 8**).
- * Prescott completed 12-of-18 passes for 139 yards with one touchdown and no interceptions for a 108.3 quarterback rating.
- * Prescott scored a 108.3 rating to mark his 10th game - fifth consecutive - with a 100.0 rating to pass Russell Wilson (9 - 2012) for the most by a rookie quarterback in a single season in NFL history. He also tied Tony Romo (2007 and 2014) for the most by any Cowboys quarterback in a single season in team history (**PRESCOTT RATINGS AT 100.0 - page 9**).

Jason Witten - TE

- * Jason Witten failed to catch a pass, snapping a franchise-record streak that was the fourth-longest by a current NFL player and was tied for the 24th-longest in NFL history (**CATCH STREAK COMES TO AN END - page 18**). The last time Witten did not record a catch was at the N.Y. Giants (11/2/08), and during that span he recorded 678 receptions for 7,236 yards (10.7 avg.) and 39 touchdowns.

HEAD COACHES

JASON GARRETT (57-45, 6th Year)

Jason Garrett was named the eighth head coach in Dallas Cowboys history on January 5, 2011. Garrett became the first former Dallas Cowboys player to become the team's head coach. As a backup quarterback during his playing career in Dallas, he started nine-of-23 games played and was a member of teams that won six division titles and three Super Bowl championships. The 2015 season was a challenge as injuries sidelined two of Dallas' top playmakers - Tony Romo and Dez Bryant - for a majority of the season and the club finished with a 4-12 record. Romo (collarbone) started only four games and finished the year on Reserve/Injured and Bryant (foot) was slowed through a majority of his nine starts, also finishing on IR. Garrett saw four different players start at quarterback for the club for only the second time in team history. Veterans Brandon Weeden (three) and Matt Cassel (seven) started the majority of games while Kellen Moore made the first two starts of his career. The running game saw a burst through the second half of the season as Darren McFadden posted his second career 1,000-yard season (1,089) to mark the first time in club history two different running backs each rushed for 1,000 yards in consecutive seasons. Despite the struggles, Dallas still sent five players to the Pro Bowl - Tyron Smith (third), Travis Frederick (second), Zack Martin (second), Dan Bailey (first) and Sean Lee (first).

Garrett was elevated to the Cowboys top job after taking over as the team's interim head coach midway through 2010. He guided the club to a 5-3 mark to finish the season after the team started 1-7. He led Dallas to an 8-8 record, narrowly missing the playoffs and an NFC East Division title in each his first three full seasons as head coach (2011-13). With Garrett at the helm of the offense, the unit reached new heights from 2007-13, ranking among st the NFL's top-10 in total offense in five of his seven years at the helm: 2013 (10th), 2012 (6th), 2010 (10th), 2009 (2nd) and 2007 (2nd). Inclusively from the start of the 2007 season, the club has averaged 364.9 total yards-per-outing (sixth in the NFL) and 24.3 points-per-game (eighth). Since his arrival in 2007, not only has the team set single-season records in numerous offensive categories, but the club's cumulative numbers for total net yards (52,540), gross passing yards (38,325) and total points (3,498) are among the best totals over a nine-year span in the history of the organization. Under Garrett's tutelage, 13 different offensive players have earned 34 total trips to the Pro Bowl.

BEN MCADOO (8-4, 1st Year)

Ben McAdoo was hired as the 17th head coach in Giants history on Jan. 14, 2016. McAdoo was the team's offensive coordinator in 2014-15. He succeeded Tom Coughlin, who coached the team for 12 seasons, including two that ended with Super Bowl victories. When he joined the franchise prior to the 2014 season, McAdoo took command of an offense that had finished 28th in the NFL the previous season. In two seasons with McAdoo formulating game plans and calling the plays, the Giants offense ranked 10th and eighth, respectively, in the NFL. The 2015 Giants completion percentage of 62.9 was tied for the second-highest in team history; the record of 63.1 was set in 2014, McAdoo's first season with the team. In 2015 the Giants totaled 4,347 net passing yards, and 36 touchdown passes, both the second-highest totals in franchise history. Before joining the Giants, McAdoo spent eight years (2006-13) as an assistant with the Green Bay Packers, the final two as the quarterbacks coach. During his tenure, the Packers earned six playoff berths, won four NFC North titles and defeated Pittsburgh in Super Bowl XLV. He began mentoring the Packers quarterbacks in 2012, one year after Aaron Rodgers was selected as the NFL's Most Valuable Player. Rodgers continued to excel under McAdoo's direction as he was voted the NFC Pro Bowl starter after completing 371-of-552 attempts for 4,295 yards and 39 touchdowns against only eight interceptions, and led the league in passer rating for the second consecutive season (108.0). In 2013 Rodgers missed seven games with a fractured collarbone and McAdoo was forced to prepare three other players to start at quarterback (Seneca Wallace, Scott Tolzien and Matt Flynn). Even with the frequently changing cast of quarterbacks, Green Bay won the NFC North championship with an 8-7-1 record. The Packers' offense finished the season ranked third in the NFL (400.3 yards a game) and, despite missing Rodgers for almost half the season, sixth in passing yards (266.8). When he did play, Rodgers completed 66.6 percent of his passes, throwing for 17 touchdowns against only eight interceptions and finishing with a passer rating of 104.9. He spent his first six years in Green Bay coaching the tight ends. He also was an NFL assistant with the New Orleans Saints (2004) and San Francisco 49ers (2005). McAdoo coached collegiately at Stanford (2005), Akron (2004), Pittsburgh (2003), Fairfield (2002) and Michigan State (2001).

WINNING HEAD COACH

Dallas Cowboys Head Coach Jason Garrett had his best season as a head coach by wrapping up the 2014 regular season with a record of 12-4 - the fifth coach to reach 12 wins-or-better in a season in team history. He also secured his first NFC East Division title as the head coach. Against the N.Y. Giants (10/19/14), Garrett passed former head coaches Bill Parcells and Wade Phillips (both with 34) with his 35th regular season win as the head coach of the Dallas Cowboys to place fourth in team history. He passed Barry Switzer (40) for third with his 41st victory at Washington (12/28/14), then tied Jimmy Johnson (44) for the second-most victories at Miami (11/22/15), and passed Johnson at Washington (12/7/15). Garrett won his 50th regular season game at Green Bay (10/16/16) to become only the second head coach in franchise history to reach 50 wins.

Following a 4-12 record in 2015, and an 11-1 start to 2016, Garrett's current regular season record as the head coach of the Dallas Cowboys stands at 56-44, with the second-most wins all-time in team history:

PLAYOFF BOUND COWBOYS

Following the victory at the Minnesota Vikings (12/1) on Thursday night, coupled with the Washington Redskins loss to the Arizona Cardinals in Week 13, the Dallas Cowboys became the first team in the NFL to clinch a playoff berth in 2016. By doing so, the Cowboys will be making their 32nd postseason appearance, first since 2014, and the most by any team in league history:

INSIDE THE SERIES HISTORY

The two teams have faced each other 108 times in the regular season - two times per season as part of the NFC East since 1970 - and once in the playoffs - a 2007 Divisional Playoff Game.

FIRST TIME...LAST TIME

The first time these two clubs met, the Dallas Cowboys were entering their 11th week of existence. After going 10 games without a win, Dallas faced the N.Y. Giants on Dec. 4, 1960 in New York. The Cowboys walked away from the game with their first non-loss of the season, battling to a 31-31 tie in front of 55,033 fans.

The last time these two clubs met was the 2016 season opener in Dallas. Trailing 20-19 in the fourth quarter, the Cowboys were unable to complete the comeback when Terrance Williams was tackled in bounds as the clock expired and the Giants walked away with the victory in front of 92,867 at AT&T Stadium.

Dan Bailey - K

In 11 games is 18-of-20 on field goals (90.0%) with a long of 56 and has made all 32 PATs. Recorded a series-high four field goals, including a series-long kick of 56 yards along with one PAT in the first game in 2016.

In 12 games caught 58 passes for 874 yards (15.1 avg.) and six touchdowns. Had his first career 100-yard game (104, 11/14/10) and returned a punt 93 yards for his second career punt return score (10/25/10). Has three 100-yard outings against the Giants, including a series-high 151 in 2014 (10/19/14). Was held to one catch for eight yards in the first meeting of 2016.

Brandon Carr - CB

In 10 games - nine with Dallas - has 39 tackles, six breakups and two interceptions including one for a 49-yard touchdown.

Barry Church - S

Has totaled 79 tackles, four tackles for loss, four pass breakups, one interception, two forced fumbles and a fumble recovery for his first career score in 11 career games. Was second on the defense with 12 stops in the first game this season.

Tyrone Crawford - DT

Has notched 19 tackles, one sack, a tackle for loss and five quarterback pressures in six games. Made two stops in the first game against the Giants in 2016.

Ezekiel Elliott - RB

Made his NFL debut in the 2016 series opener against the Giants to the tune of 51 yards on 20 carries with one touchdown.

Anthony Hitchens - LB

Has totaled 31 tackles, a tackle for loss and a pressure in five games. Had six tackles in the first game of 2016.

Sean Lee - LB

Has logged 80 tackles, five tackles for loss and two pass breakups in nine games. Led the defense with 15 stops in the first game of the 2016 series.

Alfred Morris - RB

In nine games - eight with Washington - amassed 576 yards on 133 carries with two touchdowns. Made his Cowboys debut in the first game this season and rushed seven times for 35 yards.

Dak Prescott - QB

Made his NFL debut and first career start in the first game this season and completed 25-of-45 passes for 227 yards.

Tony Romo - QB

In 17 games played, is 9-6 as a starter, completing 386-of-572 passes (67.5%) for 4,639 yards, 41 touchdowns and 21 interceptions. Has six 300-yard games, has four-touchdown games during four instances and a 400-yard game.

Terrance Williams - WR

Produced 17 catches for 242 yards and one touchdown in seven games. Made three catches for 34 yards in the first game.

Jason Witten - TE

Caught 142 passes for 1,463 yards and 13 touchdowns in 27 career games. Established an overall team and league tight end record with 18 catches and a career-best 167 yards (10/28/12). Led the team with nine catches for 66 yards in the first game.

SUNDAY NIGHT LIGHTS

This week's game at the New York Giants is Dallas' third-of-four scheduled Sunday night contests in 2016, and is its first of two straight games on Sunday Night. Following this week's game, the Cowboys will host the Tampa Bay Buccaneers on Sunday Night Football after the game was flexed by the NFL.

No team in the NFL has played more Sunday Night games than Dallas' 58 (N.Y. Giants are closest with 49), and Dallas' 29 wins are the most on Sunday Night by any team.

The Cowboys had a six-game Sunday Night win streak - the longest Sunday night win streak in club history - snapped in 2009. Twice, Dallas won three straight - their first three Sunday Night games and three games spanning 1991-1995. The Cowboys lost eight consecutive Sunday Night games - six on the road - from 1999-2006 for their longest series losing streak. The Cowboys have won both of their Sunday Night contests of 2016 with wins at home against the Chicago Bears in Week 3 and Philadelphia Eagles in Week 8.

Dallas has played 30 Sunday Night road games (14-17). This week's matchup marks the 12th time Dallas will take on New York on Sunday night, with a 6-5 record (2-2 on the road). Dallas has faced the N.Y. Giants (11 times) more than any other opponent.

PICK A DAY, ANY DAY

This week's game is Dallas' fourth of six scheduled primetime games in 2016. This season is the 11th straight in which Dallas plays three-or-more primetime games. The Cowboys picked up an extra primetime game when their matchup against Tampa Bay was flexed from noon to Sunday Night. It is the first time in NFL history that a team has played four consecutive night games.

In total, Dallas has played in 156 primetime kickoffs - 80 Monday night, four on Thursday, one each Wednesday and Friday, 12 Saturday and 58 on Sunday. The Cowboys hold a 83-73 record in primetime games. Dallas' longest primetime win streak was 11 games (2006-08) and its longest losing streak was six (2010-11). Dallas won 12 straight primetime road games from 2005-09. The Cowboys were 1-2 in home primetime games during the 2015 season, and are 3-0 in 2016.

DALLAS LAST GAME

The Dallas Cowboys defeated the Vikings 17-15 on Thursday Night Football. The game was a struggle from the beginning for the Cowboys, as they were forced to punt on their first two drives with their third series ending on a Lucky Whitehead fumble. Meanwhile, Minnesota kicked a 48-yard field midway through the frame to take an early lead. But in the second quarter, Dak Prescott and the Dallas offense seemed to find their form. Taking over at their own 16-yard line, the Cowboys were able to march 84 yards to the end zone in eight plays to put seven points on the board with Ezekiel Elliott plunging in for the score. It was his 12th rushing touchdown of the season, tying the Cowboys rookie record held by both Tony Dorsett and Herschel Walker.

After a 7-3 lead at the halfway point, the Cowboys came out for the third quarter and again struggled. They punted on their first possession of the second half and then saw another fumble, this time by Prescott. Minnesota added two more field goals to take the lead back at 9-7, but Prescott connected with Bryant for an eight-yard score to regain a 14-9 lead, and a Dan Bailey field goal upped the lead to eight at 17-9 late in the fourth quarter. The Vikings got one more chance, with just 2:09 remaining. The team rolled right down the field and eventually reached the end zone on a three-yard pass from Sam Bradford to Jerick McKinnon. But Bradford's pass attempt sailed high on the two-point conversion, and after the onside kick failed, Dallas had its 17-15 victory.

NEW YORK LAST GAME

The New York Giants lost 24-14 on the road to the Pittsburgh Steelers. Pittsburgh built a 14-0 lead through the first half. In the first quarter, a holding call on Ereck Flowers in the end zone resulted in a safety, then Randy Bullock connected on a 44-yard field goal to give Pittsburgh a 5-0 advantage. The Steelers added to their lead in the second quarter behind a 22-yard passing touchdown from Ben Roethlisberger-to-Antonio Brown and a 34-yard field goal by Bullock.

New York got on the board in the third quarter when Rashad Jennings caught a 13-yard touchdown from Eli Manning to cut the lead to 14-7. Pittsburgh countered with 10 more points on a 20-yard Roethlisberger touchdown pass to Ladarius Green and a 38-yard field goal by Bullock to push the score to 24-7. The Giants added one more score on a Manning-to-Sterling Shepard passing touchdown to trim the lead to 24-14, but it wasn't enough as Pittsburgh held on for the victory.

ON THE ROAD TO SUCCESS

Since the AFC/NFC merger in 1970, the Dallas Cowboys boast the most road wins (188) and highest win percentage (.519) in the NFL. Dallas is 6-0 in road games and one of only three teams (New England, Oakland) that remains undefeated on the road in 2016:

The Cowboys finished the 2014 regular season with an undefeated 8-0 record on the road - the only squad with a perfect mark away from home in the NFL. The Cowboys eight road wins were the most in team history during the regular season since the NFL began a 16-game schedule. They were the second team in franchise history to win all road games in a season, joining the 1968 team, which won all seven of its road games during a 14-game season. In NFL history, they were the sixth team since the 1970 NFL merger to form a perfect 8-0 record on the road, joining the 2007 New England Patriots, the 2001 St. Louis Rams, the 1984, 1989 and the 1990 San Francisco 49ers.

Dallas continued its road victory streak into 2015, winning the first contest away from home at Philadelphia (9/20) before falling to the Saints at New Orleans (10/4) in overtime, ending the road run. Dating back to the Cowboys final road game of the 2013 season at Washington (12/22), Dallas won 10 consecutive regular season road games to tie a franchise-high with both the 2006-07 and 1968-69 squads for the longest road win streak in team history.

SOLD OUT STADIUMS

The Cowboys have played in front of sold out stadiums in 434 of their last 436 games (including playoffs) and in 236 consecutive games. They played in front of sold out crowds in 153 consecutive games at Texas Stadium (including playoffs) - dating back to Dec. 16, 1990 against Phoenix, their last home non-sellout. Dallas opened what is now named AT&T Stadium with the largest crowd to witness a regular season NFL game with 105,121 tickets distributed and have 64 straight sellouts (including playoffs). The Cowboys have sold out each of their last 216 home games.

On the road, Dallas has played in front of sold out crowds in 118 straight games (including playoffs), dating back to its last road non-sellout - at Arizona (10/20/02).

DAK TO THE FUTURE

The Dallas Cowboys selected Rayne Dakota "Dak" Prescott in the fourth round of the 2016 NFL Draft (135th overall), allowing the Mississippi State product to become the first quarterback drafted by Dallas since Stephen McGee in 2009, and only the fifth since Jerry Jones bought the team in 1989. Dallas' intention was to groom Prescott for the future and slowly bring him along at the position. However, Prescott's trajectory took a quick turn, beginning in training camp after veteran and projected No. 2 backup quarterback Kellen Moore suffered a season-ending leg injury during the first week of camp on Aug. 2. Prescott then battled first-year player Jameill Showers for the No. 2 role for the right to backup Tony Romo. However, before the decision could be made, Romo went down with a back injury during the third preseason game at Seattle (8/25), forcing Prescott to enter the game with the first unit. With Romo recovering from injury, Prescott assumed the role as the starting quarterback for Dallas.

Prescott dazzled in the preseason, and in three games completed 39-of-50 passes (78.0%) for 454 yards with five touchdowns and no interceptions for a 137.8 quarterback rating to lead all NFL quarterbacks. His five scoring tosses led the NFL, while he finished second with a 78.0 completion percentage, and his 454 passing yards placed him seventh (fourth in the NFC). Prescott also added 53 rushing yards on seven carries with two scores.

Amongst league quarterbacks in 2016, Prescott ranks second in yards-per-attempt (8.31), third in quarterback rating (108.6) and fifth in completion percentage (67.9) while completing 243-of-360 passes for 2,974 yards with 19 touchdowns and two interceptions. He leads all NFL rookies in wins (11), passing yards, completion percentage, passing touchdowns, rating, rushing touchdowns (five) and rushing yards (217).

Prescott has started all 12 games of the 2016 season for Dallas to become the first rookie quarterback in team history to accomplish that feat, while his 11-1 record is the best in franchise history. Prescott is the second rookie with an 11-game win streak since the 1970 NFL merger, behind Ben Roethlisberger (13 - Pittsburgh 2004), and only the second rookie in NFL history to win 11 of his first 12 career starts, joining Roethlisberger (12 straight - 2004).

His season-highs of completions (27 - vs. Bal, 11/20), attempts (45 - vs. NYG, 9/11), passing touchdowns (3 - three times, last vs. Baltimore, 11/20), quarterback rating (141.8 - @ Cle, 11/6) and completion percentage (79.1 - vs. Chi, 9/25) are all franchise rookie single-game records. He also has an NFL record 10 games with a 100.0 rating, seven games with a 70.0 completion percentage and three games with three touchdowns which are all team records by a rookie quarterback. He also set NFL records for most pass attempts without an interception (176) to begin a career, most consecutive games (10) with at least 225-plus passing yards, most consecutive games (two) with 300-plus yards, two touchdowns and no interceptions and tied the NFL record for most consecutive games (five) with two-plus passing scores.

This season he has set Cowboys single-season rookie quarterback records for wins (11), consecutive wins (11) - also the longest by any Cowboys quarterback - passing yards (2,982), completions (243), attempts (358), completion percentage (67.9), consecutive games with 225-plus passing yards (10), passing touchdowns (19), rating (108.6), games with a 100.0 rating (10), consecutive games with a 100.0 rating (five), games with 70.0 percent (seven), rushing attempts (47) and touchdowns (five).

THE DAK KNIGHT RISES

Down 23-13 in the fourth quarter against Philadelphia (10/30), Dak Prescott rallied the team to force overtime and threw the game-winning five-yard touchdown pass to Jason Witten to complete the comeback win. By doing so, he became the first Cowboys rookie quarterback to overcome a deficit of at least 10 points in the fourth quarter in franchise history. It also marked his sixth consecutive win - tied for the third-longest streak by a league rookie in the Super Bowl era. Prescott has since extended his win streak to 11 following the victory at Minnesota (12/1) to rank as the second-most consecutive wins by an NFL rookie quarterback:

COOL HAND DAK

Dak Prescott's accuracy has been on display since taking over the reigns of the Dallas offense, and his 67.9 completion percentage (243-of-358) currently ranks fifth in the NFL. He has already registered seven games with a completion percentage of 70 percent-or-better for the most games - and longest consecutive (four) in team history - by a rookie in a season in NFL history. He had a completion percentage of 73.3 at Washington (9/18) before topping a 79.2 mark against Chicago (9/25) to set the highest mark in franchise history. Prescott completed 72.7 percent at San Francisco (10/2/16), then had a 75.0 mark against Cincinnati (10/9). Prescott's mark of 77.8 at Cleveland (11/6) was the second-highest by a Cowboys rookie. He had a 75.0% mark against Baltimore (11/20), then 70.8% against Washington (11/24) to claim the most by an NFL rookie all-time with seven games over 70.0%:

Prescott registered a 103.7 quarterback rating in his second career game at Washington (9/18), then topped that with a 123.6 rating against Chicago (9/25) - the then highest in franchise history. Prescott had this third consecutive game with a 100.0 rating with a 114.7 mark at San Francisco (10/2), then his fourth with a 117.9 rating against Cincinnati (10/9). Prescott had a 117.4 rating at Green Bay (10/16) to mark his fifth straight game with at least a 100.0 rating for the longest streak by a rookie quarterback in NFL history, the most total games by a rookie in franchise history, and tied the second-longest streak in team history by a Cowboys quarterback overall. He failed to record a 100.0 rating against Philadelphia (10/30) to end his streak at five games. He currently is on a five-game streak following 100.0 ratings at Cleveland (11/6), at Pittsburgh (11/13), against Baltimore (11/20), against Washington (11/24) and at Minnesota (12/1). RAYNE-ING 300-YARD PASSING DAYS

Rayne Dakota "Dak" Prescott notched his first career 300-yard passing game at Pittsburgh (11/13) when he reached 319 yards to record the second-highest passing yards by a Cowboys rookie quarterback while also becoming only the third rookie in team history to throw for 300 yards in a single game. He doubled up his efforts the following week against Baltimore (11/20), once again reaching the 300-yard mark with 301 yards against the Ravens to tie the third-highest mark. In total, his two 300-yard passing games are the most by a Cowboys rookie quarterback in a single season:

His two-game streak of consecutive games with 300 passing yards allowed him to become the fourth quarterback - first rookie - to have a streak of two-or-more games with 300-plus passing yards in team history. It was the 15th time that such a streak has occurred in team history, and the first since Tony Romo had a two-game streak against Pittsburgh (12/16/12) and against New Orleans (12/23/12).

In total, Prescott's performances against the Steelers (319 yards, two touchdowns, no interceptions) and the Ravens (301 yards, three touchdowns and no interceptions) allowed him to become the first rookie in NFL history to pass for 300-plus yards, two-plus touchdowns and no interceptions in consecutive games.

TDS AND ROOKIES

At Green Bay (10/16) Dak Prescott tossed a season-high three touchdowns to mark only the third time a rookie threw for three-or-more scores in team history. They also tied for the second-most scores by a Dallas rookie in a single game in franchise history. He threw two more against Philadelphia (10/30), then matched his career mark with three at Cleveland (11/6) to establish a franchise record with the most games with three-plus passing touchdowns by a Cowboys rookie quarterback with two. Prescott added his third game with three-plus scores against Baltimore (11/20) to extend his team record:

Dak Prescott became the first Dallas Cowboys rookie quarterback - and third overall rookie, joining running backs Julius Jones (November 2004) and DeMarco Murray (November 2011) - to win NFL Offensive Rookie of The Month honors for the month of November.

During the month of November, Prescott led the Cowboys to a 4-0 record, while leading the league with a 125.4 passer rating, finishing third in the league in completion percentage (73.1%), second in yards-per-attempt (8.92), fifth in touchdown passes (nine) and tied for first with no interceptions (among passers with at least 50 attempts). Additionally, Prescott's performances against the Steelers (319 yards, two touchdowns, no interceptions) and the Ravens (301 yards, three touchdowns and no interceptions) allowed him to become the first rookie in NFL history to pass for 300-plus yards, two-plus touchdowns and no interceptions in consecutive games. He also recorded three games with a QB rating over 100.0 in the month, which gave him nine such games on the season - tied for the most by a rookie quarterback in NFL history (Russell Wilson, 2012). Through the four games, Prescott attempted 119 passes without an interception, to mark his second streak of at least 100 passes without an interception.

50 YARDS-OR-MORE FOR SCORES

Dak Prescott showcased his ability to air the ball out at Pittsburgh (11/13), as he tossed an 83-yard scoring strike to Ezekiel Elliott for the longest pass by a rookie in team history, then later hit Dez Bryant for a 50-yard touchdown. With both passes traveling 50 yards-or-more, it allowed him to become the first rookie in team history to throw two scores of 50-or-more yards and the first in league history since Teddy Bridgewater (Minnesota) in 2014.

Overall, the 83-yard completion was the longest passing touchdown by a Cowboy since Tony Romo threw an 85-yard touchdown to Bryant against Washington (11/22/12). By making the connection with fellow rookie Elliott, it marked the longest by a rookie quarterback/rookie receiver tandem in team history, and was the longest rookie combo in the NFL since 1986, when Indianapolis Colts quarterback Jack Trudeau threw an 84-yard scoring strike to wide receiver Bill Brooks at San Francisco (10/5/86).

PASS NO PICK NFL RECORD

After 45 attempts against the N.Y. Giants (9/11) and 30 attempts at Washington (9/18), Dak Prescott's combined number of 75 surpassed Warren Moon's (72 - 1984) for the most pass attempts through a player's first two career games without an interception in NFL history. At San Francisco (10/2) he didn't throw a pick on 32 attempts to move up to 131 passes without an interception - tied for second-most by a player to begin his career, most by a rookie and were also the most by a player in his first four career games. He upped his streak against Cincinnati (10/9) to 155 passes - second-most by a quarterback to start his career, and most by a rookie. At Green Bay (10/16), Prescott surpassed Tom Brady (162) with his 163rd passing attempt without an interception to establish an NFL record, but he was picked off in the third quarter to end his streak at 176 pass attempts:

Tony Romo climbed to 30,000 passing yards following his 176-yard performance at Tennessee (9/14/14), and now has 34,154 for his career. By reaching 30,000 career passing yards Romo became the second Cowboys quarterback to reach that milestone (Troy Aikman - 32,942), the 38th player in NFL history and only the fifth undrafted player to do so. Tony Romo entered the 2015 season tops in club history with 33,626 passing yards and 242 touchdown passes, and second in attempts (4,255) and completions (2,779). Through his career Romo has steadily climbed the club's all-time quarterback charts, making strides in 2012 by moving into second for completions, then established the club mark in touchdown throws against Philadelphia (12/2/12) to break Aikman's old record of 165. He also moved up the ladder in all-time wins and starts amongst Cowboys quarterbacks, passing Danny White (62) in 2013 to claim the third-most wins as a Dallas quarterback, and passed Roger Staubach (114) for second-most quarterback starts in team history against the N.Y. Romo closed out the 2014 regular season with a 100.0 rating in each of his last four games. After posting a 103.3 rating against the N.Y. Giants (9/13/15), Romo extended his streak of consecutive games with a rating of 100.0-or-better to five - the second-longest streak of his career (seven - 2007). In 2014 he had his first game over 100.0 at St. Louis (9/21) with a 116.8 rating, then had a 137.4 rating the next week against New Orleans (9/28). At Seattle (10/12) Romo finished with a 110.2 rating, then registered his next game against the N.Y. Giants (10/19) with a 135.7 rating. He had his fifth 100.0 rating game of 2014 at Jacksonville (11/9) with a 138.8 rating - the 10th-highest of his career and the 60th of his career. At the N.Y. Giants (11/23) he recorded a then season-high 143.4 rating for the fifth-highest of his career. CALL IT A COMEBACK

Since taking over as the Dallas Cowboys starting quarterback during the 2006 season, Tony Romo has been at the helm of some thrilling wins for the club. Included in his 78 wins as a starter are 24 occasions in which he led the team to a come-from-behind victory in the fourth quarter or overtime during the regular season. Romo's 24 wins are a franchise-best, and in 2012 he had three straight games in which he had a come-from-behind win and followed that up with two in 2013.

Romo had three late comebacks in 2014 highlighted by his performance at St. Louis (9/21) as the team battled back from 21 points down to overcome the most points to win a game in a non-overtime game in franchise history. He wasted no time to earn his first comeback win in the fourth quarter or overtime in 2015, coming back from a 10-point deficit in the season opening game against the N.Y. Giants (9/13)

HOME SWEET HOME

In 2015, Tony Romo opened the seventh season at what is now AT&T Stadium against the N.Y. Giants (9/13), marking his 42nd game in the stadium since it opened in 2009. With Romo as the starting quarterback, Dallas holds a 25-18 record at its home venue. Romo's personal stats at the stadium are quite impressive. For his career, Romo has completed 992-of-1,493 passes for 11,787 yards, with 83 touchdowns and 46 interceptions. Below is a year-by-year look at Romo's work at AT&T Stadium:

CLIMBING THE TE CHARTS

Since entering the league in 2003, Jason Witten has proven his skills as an offensive weapon. He has provided Dallas with the full package at tight end. In his 14th season, Witten has caught 1,069 passes for 11,735 yards and 62 touchdowns. He is the second all-time leading tight end in career receptions and receiving yards.

To open the 2011 season Witten became the seventh tight end in league history to reach 7,000 receiving yards. His work through the 2011 season allowed him to crack the top-five on the tight end receiving yards list. In 2012 against Tampa Bay (9/23), Witten moved into third all-time. He then crossed the 8,000-yard mark against Chicago (10/1) with his 15th career 100-yard game. He opened the 2013 season by crossing the 9,000-yard threshold.

By mid-November of 2011, Witten passed Ozzie Newsome (662) for third on the all-time receptions list. With four catches at Seattle (9/16) in 2012, he became the third tight end in league history with 700 career catches. His seven catches in the finale at Washington (12/30) made him the third tight end in league history to reach 800 career receptions. In Week 2 of 2013 at Kansas City (9/15) Witten passed Shannon Sharpe (817) for second in catches.

In 2014 he reached 10,000 career receiving yards on a 34-yard catch against Houston (10/5) to become only the third tight end in NFL history to reach that mark. The very next game at Seattle (10/12) he caught his 900th career pass on a three-yard scoring strike from Romo in the second quarter to become the second tight end in league history, the first Dallas Cowboy and the 16th overall player to reach 900. In 2015 he had 27 yards against the N.Y. Giants (10/19) to pass Sharpe (10,060) for the second-most receiving yards by an NFL tight end. Witten surpassed 11,000 career receiving yards against Carolina (11/26) to become only the second tight end in NFL history to do so. He reached 1,000 career receptions at Washington (12/7), becoming the 12th player in NFL history - second tight end - to reach that mark.

Coming off a 2010 season in which he registered a career-high and club tight end record-tying nine touchdowns, Jason Witten became the seventh Dallas Cowboy with 40 career touchdown catches in 2011. Later that same season, Witten tied Billy Joe DuPree (41) for sixth in club history. He then broke that tie in 2012 with a scoring grab against Chicago (10/1) to give him sole possession of sixth. He reached 48 against Minnesota (11/3/13) to tie Drew Pearson for fifth, then tied Frank Clarke for fourth with two more snags at the N.Y. Giants (11/24/13). Witten tied Tony Hill for third with a score at Chicago (12/9/13) and passed him with one against Green Bay (12/15/13). His 61st served as the game-winner in overtime against Philadelphia (10/30/16) to become the first game winner by a tight end in overtime since Billy Joe DuPree in the franchise's first overtime game against St. Louis (9/28/75):

LEADING MAN

Already placing in the top-two in career receptions and receiving yards all-time among league tight ends, Jason Witten is climbing the NFL's all-time receptions and receiving yards charts among all position players. Witten opened 2016 ranked 10th in receptions (1,020) and 32nd in receiving yards (11,215).

In league all-time receiving yards, he climbed up to 30th all-time when he passed Keenan McCardell (11,373) and Rod Smith (11,389) at San Francisco (10/2), then moved past Muhsin Muhammad (11,438) for 29th against Cincinnati (10/9). He passed Calvin Johnson (11,619) for 28th at Cleveland (11/6).

Witten began the 2016 season with nine catches in the season opener against the N.Y. Giants (9/11) to surpass Isaac Bruce (1,024) for 10th on the NFL's all-time receptions list. He then passed Andre Johnson (1,062) for ninth at Pittsburgh (11/13) and moved into eighth place after passing Reggie Wayne (1,070) against Washington (11/24):

THAT'S A BUNCH OF WITT

After coming into the league as Dallas' third round draft pick in 2003, Jason Witten has strung together a Hall of Fame career. He has appeared in the most Pro Bowls by a Cowboys tight end (10, seven consecutive - 2004-10 and three consecutive 2012-14), and is tied for the second-most by any Dallas player in team history, is tops on the club's all-time receptions chart and second on the receiving yards chart. In 2012 he took the top spot on the club's receptions chart from Michael Irvin at Atlanta (11/4). Witten took 151 games to reach the top of the team's receptions chart which was faster than Irvin (159). When compared to the two other NFL tight ends with at least 750 catches - Tony Gonzalez and Shannon Sharpe - Witten also reached the mark faster - Gonzalez (163 games), Sharpe (169).

Witten hit 950 career receptions after an eight catch performance against the N.Y. Giants (9/13/15). By reaching that mark in his 192nd career game, he did it faster than Gonzalez (198 games) - the only other tight end to reach 950 career receptions.

He surpassed 1,000 career receptions at Washington (12/7/15) with five catches against the Redskins, reaching that mark in his 203rd game to become the sixth-fastest NFL player to do so, and the fastest tight end.

Witten accounts for 649 catches and 7,287 yards of Tony Romo's 2,826 completions and 34,154 yards. Both numbers are more than any other player that has caught a pass from Romo.

In 2012 Witten caught 13 passes against Chicago (10/1) which was third in his career and tied for third among any Cowboys pass catcher and tied for eighth by an NFL tight end. He then bettered that with a club-record 18-catch game against the N.Y. Giants (10/28). His 18 receptions tied for third in a game in NFL history and were the most by a tight end in league history:

In 2010 Witten became the fifth Cowboy to top 6,000 career yards. He opened 2011 with 110 yards at the N.Y. Jets (9/11) to become the fifth Cowboy to reach 7,000. His 94-yard outing against Detroit (10/2) put him past Bob Hayes (7,295) for fourth all-time in club history. He took third from Drew Pearson with four catches for 24 yards against Philadelphia (12/24). In 2012 Witten topped 8,000 yards with his 112-yard game against Chicago (10/1). Witten opened 2013 with 70 yards against the N.Y. Giants (9/8) to become the second Cowboy and third tight end to reach 9,000 career receiving yards. In 2014 he reached 10,000 career yards after a 59-yard performance against Houston (10/5) to become the third tight end - and second Cowboy - to reach that mark. Jason Witten is known to be a reliable source for receptions for a quarterback. For the 12th time - and 12th consecutive season - Witten reached 40 receptions eight games into the 2015 season with six grabs against Philadelphia (11/8/15) to become only the second tight end in NFL history (Gonzalez) to accomplish that feat. Giants (11/2/08), and during that time he posted 678 receptions for 7,236 yards (10.7 avg.) and 39 touchdowns until that streak came to an end at Minnesota (12/1/16) when he failed to make a reception for the first time in 130 games. He reached that mark in his 181st game, the fastest tight end - and eighth-fastest player overall - in NFL history to reach that mark. BY DESIGN

After trading up in the 2010 NFL Draft to select Dez Bryant in the first round with the 24th overall pick, the Dallas Cowboys have seen nothing but production from the wide receiver. Despite his rookie season being cut short due to injury, Bryant was third on the team with 561 yards and six touchdowns and fourth with 45 catches. His reception total was second all-time among club rookies, his touchdowns were third and receiving yards fifth.

He improved upon those numbers in his second season (2011), catching 63 passes for 928 yards and nine touchdowns before topping club receiving charts in 2012 with 1,382 yards (fourth in club history) and 12 touchdowns (tied for fifth) on 92 catches (seventh).

Bryant finished 2013 as the team leader in receptions (93) yards (1,233) and touchdowns (13). He continued in 2014 where he left off, leading the team with 88 receptions for 1,320 yards and a franchise-best 16 touchdowns. He fought through foot and ankle injuries and was limited to nine games in 2015, catching a career-low 31 passes for 401 yards and three touchdowns. In 2016 he leads the team with six touchdowns, is second on the team with 634 yards and third with 33 receptions.

Now in his seventh season, Bryant has totaled 449 receptions for 6,459 yards and 65 touchdowns. His totals all rank amongst the top five spots in club history through a player's first seven seasons:

With the selection of Dez Bryant in the first round of the 2010 NFL Draft, the Dallas Cowboys added to their lineage of home-grown talent at wide receiver. Bryant was issued the jersey number 88 to follow in the footsteps of two of the previous 88s in club history - Drew Pearson (1973-83) and Michael Irvin (1988-99).

His progress as a rookie was slowed after landing on IR with an ankle injury suffered at Indianapolis (12/5/10). He returned in 2011 with 63 catches for 928 yards and nine touchdowns. In 2012 Bryant notched his first career 1,000-yard receiving season with a career-best 1,382 yards on 92 catches and 12 touchdowns. In 2013 Bryant led the team in receiving yards (1,233) with his second consecutive 1,000-yard season while also leading with a career-high in catches (93) and a then career-high in touchdowns (13).

Bryant came on strong in 2014, leading the team with 88 receptions for 1,320 yards and a club-record 16 touchdowns.

He looked to return to form in 2015 following a contract extension, but suffered a foot injury against in the season opener against the N.Y. Giants (9/13) that would linger for the rest of the season, limiting him to nine games. Bryant finished the year with 31 receptions for 401 yards and three touchdowns.

Bryant had his first notable game of the 2016 season at Washington (9/18) with seven receptions for 102 yards - his 16th career 100-yard game. Bryant caught his 60th career touchdown against Chicago (9/25) as part of a three reception, 40-yard game, then had his best game of the year to date against Philadelphia (10/30) with 113 yards on four receptions and a score while crossing the 6,000-yard threshold. Bryant made six receptions for a team-high 116 yards and a score at Pittsburgh (11/13) for his 18th career 100-yard game, then hauled in two touchdowns for his 14th career multi-score game on six receptions with 80 yards against Baltimore (11/20). Bryant tied Michael Irvin with his 65th touchdown reception for second-most all-time in team history at Minnesota (12/1) along with four catches and 84 yards.

Bryant is currently second on the team with 634 yards, third with 37 catches and six touchdowns, the most on the club.

DEZ-STRUCTIVE

Since entering the league as the Dallas Cowboys first round draft choice in 2010, Dez Bryant has continued his rise each season as arguably one of the league's best receivers. He has reached the century mark in 18 career games, and has steadily improved his output in each season of his early pro career.

As a rookie in 2010 he logged his first career 100-yard game with a 104-yard output at the N.Y. Giants (11/14/10). After no 100-yard games in 2011, he returned in 2012 to log a career-best five games including a career-best 224-yard effort against New Orleans (12/23/12). It was the 10th 200-yard game in team history and was the fourth highest number in a game in franchise record books. In 2013 he turned in his first Pro Bowl campaign highlighted by four games with 100 yards, including a season-best 153 yards against Green Bay (12/15/13). He tied his effort in 2014 as he once again recorded four games north of the century mark, with his centerpiece game of 2014 coming across the pond in London, England with a 158-yard effort at Jacksonville (11/9/14) - the second-highest yardage output of his career.

After returning from a foot injury he suffered in Week 1, Bryant notched his lone 100-yard game of the 2015 season with 104 yards against Philadelphia (11/8) on five catches with one touchdown to break a tie with Miles Austin (14) for the sixth-most career 100-yard receiving games in team history.

He added his first 100-yard game of the 2016 season with 102 yards at Washington (9/18), then had his second with 113 yards against Philadelphia (10/30). Bryant's third came at Pittsburgh (11/13) with a 116-yard effort.

To date, Bryant's 18 career 100-yard outings are good for sixth in team history:

Dez Bryant finished 2012 with 92 receptions, a career-high 1,382 yards and 12 touchdowns. From Weeks 8-13, he opened the flood gates of production. Over that span, he led the league with six touchdown catches, was third with 475 yards and seventh with 29 catches. He logged three 100-yard games, including back-to-back 145-yarders against Cleveland (11/18) and Washington (11/22).

Bryant tied a club record with a touchdown catch in seven consecutive games. On Thanksgiving Day against Washington, he had two scoring grabs then did the same the next week against Philadelphia (12/2/12), the sixth time in team history - fifth different player - a Dallas Cowboy had back-to-back multi-touchdown games. Bryant repeated the feat in 2013 with another pair in two games - at San Diego (9/29) and against Denver (10/6). He did it again in 2014 with two at Jacksonville (11/9) and two at the N.Y. Giants (11/23) to become the first player in team history to boast three instances of back-to-back multi-touchdown games:

In 2012 Bryant had two scores against New Orleans (12/23). His two touchdown catches came on consecutive drives, both from 58 yards. Bryant became the first league pass catcher with 55-plus yard touchdown grabs on consecutive drives since Buffalo's Lee Evans (at Houston, 11/19/06) did it.

Bryant's two touchdown catches against the Saints was his fourth multi-touchdown game of the season, sixth of his career. Bryant's four in 2012 were a single-season club best, while his six career tied for sixth.

Bryant finished 2013 with three multi-score games. He had two scores at Jacksonville (11/9) for his first multi-touchdown game of 2014 to give him 10 for his career and break a tie with Frank Clarke, Tony Hill and Michael Irvin (all with nine) for sole possession of second in club history.

In 2014 he posted a career-high tying four multi-touchdown games with two at Jacksonville (11/9), two at the N.Y. Giants (11/23), a career-high three at Philadelphia (12/14) and two at Washington (12/28) to give him 13 for his career.

Dez Bryant has showcased his explosive playmaking ability during the 2016 season, in particular, with his threat to make long catches. Specifically, Bryant is one-of-five league receivers to have caught three-or-more passes that have traveled 50 yards-or-more, and his three receptions are tied for the second-most by an NFL receiver:

Bryant hauled in his first pass of 50-plus yards against Philadelphia (10/30) when he caught a 53-yarder. At Pittsburgh (11/13) he took a pass 50-yards for a score. He registered his third reception of 50-plus yards at Minnesota (12/1) when he caught a season-long 56-yarder.

THE REAL DEAL T-WILL

After concluding his third pro season, Terrance Williams has emerged as one of the Cowboys top receiving targets, particularly in catching touchdowns. After posting five scores as a rookie in 2013, he proved as a threat to score again in 2014 by surpassing his rookie total with eight touchdowns in 2014, good for second on the team. His three scores in 2015 tied for second on the squad, and he has two so far in 2016. Together, his 18 career touchdowns are tied for fifth-most by a Cowboys receiver during his first four pro seasons:

Williams caught five touchdowns as a rookie to tie for fourth in team history by a player in his first pro season. His rookie year was highlighted by a streak of four consecutive games with a touchdown pass to mark the longest streak of his career.

He increased his scoring production in 2014 with eight touchdowns, including a stretch of three straight games with a scoring grab: at St. Louis (9/21/14), against New Orleans (9/28/14) - where he had two touchdowns to tally the first multi-touchdown game of his career - and against Houston (10/5/14) to record the second-longest touchdown streak of his career. He recorded his second career multi-touchdown game with two scoring catches against Indianapolis (12/21/14).

Williams amped it up for the 2014 postseason, scoring three of the team's four receiving touchdowns while finishing second with 130 receiving yards and tied for fourth with four receptions. His three touchdowns tied for the postseason lead amongst all NFL receivers and also tied for the most by a Cowboys receiver in a single postseason in team history:

Williams notched three scores in 2015. He hauled in his first score of 2016 on a 20-yard reception at San Francisco (10/2), then added his second on an acrobatic, toe-tapping reception for a score against Washington (11/24).

TERRANCE THE TERRIFIC

Terrance Williams serves as a deep threat option to compliment Dez Bryant. Since entering the league in 2013, Williams led all Cowboys receivers in each of his first three pro seasons in receiving average (from players with at least 15 catches). He has maintained a top average and currently ranks second on the team in 2016 with a 13.6 average. His career average of 16.0 is the ninth-highest in the league from 2013-16 among active receivers with at least 50 catches during that span:

In 2015 Williams posted nine games with an average of 15.0-or-better, and three games with an average of 20.0-or-better. He posted career-highs with eight catches for 173 yards in the season finale against Washington (1/3/16), while his 21.6 average was the third-highest number of his career (with at least three receptions). It was also Williams' second career 100-yard receiving game, and his 173 yards were the most by a Cowboys receiver since Bryant had 224 against New Orleans (12/23/12).

Against Chicago (9/25) Williams caught four passes for 88 yards for a 22.0 average - highest of the 2016 season. He then had a season-high five grabs for 70 yards and a 14.0 average against Cincinnati (10/9). Williams boasted an 18.8 average on four catches for 75 yards at Green Bay (10/16).

COLE WORLD

Cole Beasley has steadily increased his production at the receiver position since entering the league as an undrafted free agent in 2012. Since then, he has become an automatic weapon in the Cowboys passing game, collecting 203 receptions for 2,122 yards and 16 touchdowns in his career.

He finished the 2015 season with a team-best five touchdowns, tied for second with 52 receptions and third with 536 yards - all-career-highs. Included his highlight season was a breakout game against Philadelphia (11/8/15), hauling in nine passes for 112 yards - both career-highs - and a career-high tying two touchdowns. It was his first career 100-yard receiving game, while his two scores marked his second career multi-touchdown game. Beasley also tied his career-best with five first downs, including two on third down, and hauled in a 30-yard pass in the fourth quarter that was the second-longest catch of his career. He matched his career-high in the 2015 season finale against Washington (1/3/16), hauling in two scores - his third career multi-touchdown game - on five receptions for 53 yards.

Beasley continues to be one of Dallas' top options in the passing game in 2016. Through 12 games he leads the team with 60 receptions for 670 yards and is second with five touchdowns. Beasley also currently leads all Cowboys receivers with 41 first downs to tie for 14th in the NFL, including 17 on third down - tied for fourth in the NFL - on 20 overall receptions on third down - tied for seventh in the league.

He collected eight passes for 65 yards - both second on the team - with a team-high and career-high tying five first downs in the season opener against the N.Y. Giants (9/11). Beasley was second on the team in receptions (five), yards (75) and receiving first downs (four) at Washington (9/18). He once again led the team with seven receptions - two on third down - for 73 yards against Chicago (9/25), then posted a team-high 66 yards - including a career-long catch of 47 yards - on three receptions with two first downs and one on third down at San Francisco (10/2). Beasley was second on the team with four catches for 53 yards - including four for first downs with one on third down - and his first touchdown of the season against Cincinnati (10/9). Beasley led the team with six receptions for 58 yards - including four for first downs - and two touchdowns at Green Bay (10/16). His two scores marked his fourth career multi-touchdown game. At Cleveland (11/6) Beasley caught six passes for 56 yards and one touchdown, with four of his catches going for first downs, including three on third down. He contributed five catches for 59 yards with five first downs including two on third down while also hauling in a score against Baltimore (11/20). He established a career-high for receiving yards with his yardage performance against the Ravens while also becoming the 30th player in team history to reach 2,000 career receiving yards. Beasley made five grabs for 56 yards against Washington (11/24) to allow him to become the 21st player in team history to reach 200 career receptions.

'BEAS' IN THE TRAP

On third down, Cole Beasley has recorded 17 first downs to tie for fourth in the NFL on 20 receptions - tied for seventh - for 219 yards (11.0 avg.) through Week 13 in 2016. More specifically, Beasley's receiving output has accounted for 20-of-65 completions (30.8%) and 219-of-817 passing yards for Dallas Cowboys rookie quarterback Dak Prescott, who is eighth in the league with a 101.4 rating on third down.

Over the past two seasons (14 - 2015; 17 - 2016), Beasley's 31 first downs on third down rank 13th in the NFL.

Overall, Beasley has produced his highest yards-per-catch (11.1) output, tied for his highest amount in touchdowns (seven) second-highest receiving yardage amount (789) and receptions (71) on third down throughout his career.

THE BOOK OF EZEKIEL

For only the second time in franchise history, the Dallas Cowboys used a top-five pick to choose Ezekiel Elliott out of Ohio State with the fourth overall selection in the 2016 NFL Draft. Dallas selected Tony Dorsett with the second pick in the 1977 NFL Draft. The former Buckeye has started since Week 1 as the team's feature runner.

Limited during training camp due to a hamstring injury, Elliott saw action in only one game during the preseason at Seattle (8/25). In one half against the Seahawks first team defense, Elliott rushed seven times for 48 yards (6.9 avg.).

Elliott has come on strong to begin his pro career, as he currently leads the NFL in rushing yards (1,285), attempts (263) and runs of 10-plus (37), and is second in rushing touchdowns (12) and fourth in rushing average (4.9) - all tops by a rookie rusher:

Through his first season, Elliott has produced five 100-yard rushing games - most by a Cowboys rookie. Against Chicago (9/25) he rushed 30 times for 140 yards. His 140-yard rushing output marked his first career 100-yard game, and he became the 10th rookie running back in team history to reach 100. It was also the 24th time that a Cowboys rusher went over the century mark, and the first time Dallas had a rookie do it since DeMarco Murray had 135 yards against Buffalo (11/13/11). He posted 138 yards on 23 carries with one score at San Francisco (10/2) for his second 100-yard game. Against Cincinnati (10/9) Elliott rushed for 134 yards on 15 carries with two touchdowns, then rushed for a season-high 157 yards - fourth-most by a Cowboys rookie - on 28 carries at Green Bay (10/16), who entered the game with the NFL's No. 1 rushing defense. It was also the fourth game in a row that he rushed for over 100 yards - the first time that a rookie rusher accomplished that feat in team history and tied for the second-longest streak in team history overall. By compiling 157 yards, it also marked the first time in NFL history that a rookie runner posted four consecutive games with 130-plus yards. Elliott rushed 21 times for 114 yards and two touchdowns at Pittsburgh (11/13) for his fifth career 100-yard game:

Ezekiel Elliott put up close to historic numbers for the month of October, rushing for 525 yards on 88 carries (6.0 avg.) with three touchdowns. He rushed for 130-plus yards in three straight games in October to improve his streak to four straight 130-yard games - the first rookie in NFL history to accomplish the feat. Elliott's average of 131.2 rushing yards-per-game through the month have him on pace to edge out Eric Dickerson's rookie rushing record (1,808 in 1983). His 525 rushing yards led the league for the month, also making him one of two players to top 500 rushing yards in October. Elliott hauled in 10 passes for 125 yards to give him 650 scrimmage yards (third in the month) while his 162.5 scrimmage yards-per-game also leads the league.

This is only the third time that a Cowboy has won the NFL Rookie of The Month award, as Elliott joins Julius Jones (November 2004) and DeMarco Murray (November 2011).

COMPARING ROOKIE RUSHERS

The Dallas Cowboys selected Ezekiel Elliott with the fourth overall pick of the 2016 NFL Draft to start from day one and have an immediate impact. So far in 2016, the former Ohio State Buckeye has rushed 263 times for a league-leading 1,285 yards (4.9 avg.) and 12 touchdowns.

Elliott recorded another 'monster' game against Cincinnati (10/9), rushing 15 times for 134 yards and two touchdowns. His two scores marked his first career multi-touchdown game, and he became the 12th Cowboys rookie running back to accomplish that feat - 21st time by a rookie runner - in team history. Elliott rushed 18 times for 92 yards and two touchdowns for his second career multi-score game at Cleveland (11/6), then added two more rushing scores at Pittsburgh (11/13) on 21 carries for 114 yards to become the seventh Cowboys running back - second rookie (Julius Jones, 2004) - to post consecutive games with two-or-more rushing touchdowns, and the first league rookie to accomplish that feat since Trent Richardson (Cleveland) in 2012. It was also his third multi-touchdown game of the season to tie for the most by a rookie runner in team history before he set the rookie mark for the Cowboys, and tie for seventh overall by an NFL rookie rusher, with his fourth game against Washington (11/24) with two touchdowns on 20 carries for 97 yards:

ZEKE & DESTROY

Ezekiel Elliott became a one-man wrecking crew at Pittsburgh (11/13), contributing three of the Dallas' four touchdowns in the victory against the Steelers including two rushing scores and his first career receiving score. Elliott helped clinch the win when he scored twice in the final period, as he became the first player to score two go-ahead touchdowns in the final two minutes of the fourth quarter of the same game since Buffalo's Ahmad Rashad in 1974 at Oakland (9/16/74).

His three total scores allowed him to become the seventh Cowboys rookie to have three touchdowns in a game in team history, and the first player to rush for a touchdown (two) and catch a touchdown (one) in a single game since DeMarco Murray at Washington (12/22/13).

Elliott's receiving touchdown came on an 83-yard strike from Dak Prescott in the first quarter to serve as the second-longest scoring catch by a rookie in team history:

Combined with his 60-yard rushing touchdown against Cincinnati (10/9), Elliott became the first rookie running back in the league to boast a 60-plus touchdown run and an 80-plus touchdown catch in a single season since Gale Sayers in 1965.

Elliott also finished second on the team with 95 receiving yards against the Steelers - seventh-highest by a rookie runner in team history. His 209 combined yards (114 rush; 95 rec) allowed him to become the sixth Cowboys rookie to have at least 200 yards in a single game in team history, tied with Julius Jones for the fourth-highest tally and the most total scrimmage yards against the Steelers by a visiting opponent at Heinz Field:

COWBOYS RB = WEEK 10 OPOTW

Dallas Cowboys rookie running back Ezekiel Elliott was named the NFC's Offensive Player of the Week following Dallas' thrilling come-from-behind win at Pittsburgh (11/13) in Week 10. He rushed for 114 yards and two touchdowns while also catching two passes for 95 yards, including an 83-yard catch-and-run for a touchdown. Both of Elliott's rushing touchdowns came in the final two minutes of the game, making him the first player to score two touchdowns in the final 2:00 of the fourth quarter since Ahmad Rashad in 1974. His 83-yard scoring catch was the second-longest by a rookie in team history, and the longest by a running back since Herschel Walker had an 84-yarder in 1986. On the day, Elliott was responsible for 209 scrimmage yards (114 rush, 95 pass) - tied for fourth in team history among rookies. He is also the seventh Cowboys rookie with three touchdowns in a single game.

Elliott is the first Cowboy to win the honor since Dez Bryant in Week 15 of 2014, and the first running back since Emmitt Smith in Week 8 of 2002.

DALLAS ROOKIE RUNNERS 1ST STARTS

Dallas Cowboys rookie running back Ezekiel Elliott immediately entered the 2016 season as the team's starting running back. With his start against the N.Y. Giants (9/11) he became only the fourth rookie running back in team history to start a season opener, joining Calvin Hill (1969), Ron Springs (1979) and Derrick Lassic (1993) while his totals were the most carries (20) and the third-highest rushing yards (51) by a Cowboys rookie rusher to start a season opener:

RUSHING TO THE TOP

Over the last few seasons, the Dallas Cowboys have established an identity on offense with their rushing attack, finishing each of the previous two seasons (2014-2nd; 2015-9th) in the top-10 in the NFL in rushing. The Cowboys are out to accomplish the same feat in 2016 and are currently second in the league by averaging 155.8 yards-per-game:

RAYNE MAN

Rayne Dakota "Dak" Prescott had one rush for a six-yard touchdown - his first career score (passing or rushing) - in the third quarter at Washington (9/18). It marked only the third time a Dallas quarterback scored a rushing touchdown in a game during his rookie campaign. He had another rushing touchdown against Chicago (9/25) to mark his second consecutive game with a rushing score - first time in team history that a rookie quarterback accomplished that feat. He added his third rushing score against Cincinnati (10/9) to mark the most by a Cowboys quarterback since Danny White had four in 1983, while also tying the third-highest total by a Cowboys quarterback in a single season. Prescott added his fourth rushing score against Philadelphia (10/30) to tie for the second-most in a single season. He notched his fifth rushing score of the season against Washington (11/24) to tie Don Meredith (5 - 1966) for the most by a Cowboys quarterback in a single season in franchise history:

The Dallas Cowboys rushing attack has produced 12 touchdowns behind a stable of rushers as Ezekiel Elliott (nine), Alfred Morris (two), Lance Dunbar (one) and quarterback Dak Prescott (four) have all contributed to the running cause. The 16 total rushing touchdowns have already surpassed the eight scores that the 2015 team had all last season.

Along with Elliott and Prescott's rushing scores at Washington (9/18), former Redskin Morris added to the rushing attack with a game-clinching four-yard touchdown in the fourth quarter against his ex-team. Collectively, it marked the first time that the Dallas offense had boasted three different players with at least one rushing touchdown since Miles Austin, Marion Barber III and Tashard Choice each had one against New Orleans (11/25/10). The Cowboys repeated that feat for the second consecutive game against Chicago (9/25), as Morris, Prescott and Dunbar - who scored his first career touchdown - each got into the endzone. It marked the first time that has happened in consecutive weeks in team history since the 1983 season (11/20 against Kansas City and 11/24 against St. Louis). Elliott scored the team's lone rushing touchdown at San Francisco (10/2), before the squad added three more (Elliott - two; Prescott - one) against Cincinnati (10/9). Prescott added his fourth of the season against Philadelphia (10/30). Elliott posted two touchdowns in back-to-back games at Cleveland (11/6) and at Pittsburgh (11/13). Elliott notched his fourth multi-touchdown game with two against Washington (11/24) while Prescott also contributed with his fifth rushing score of the season. At Minnesota (12/1) Elliott added his 12th rushing touchdown of the season to tie for the most by a rookie in franchise history.

Through 13 weeks of the NFL season, Dallas is second in the league with 20 rushing touchdowns:

As an unexpected surprise, the 2016 NFL Draft brought two new rookie starters on opening day. Ezekiel Elliott was drafted with the fourth overall pick with the intention of starting from day one, but fourth round selection Dak Prescott worked his way up the ladder following injuries to backup Kellen Moore in training camp and starter Tony Romo during the preseason. With Moore out for the year, and Romo mending a back injury until his return, Prescott will take the helm as the team's starting quarterback.

Due to the circumstances, the combination of number 21 (Elliott) and number 4 (Prescott) - which ironically is the area code for Dallas - allowed the Cowboys to open the season with a rookie quarterback and rookie running back for only the second time in team history when Roger Staubach and Calvin Hill started the 1969 opener. The Cowboys won that game against the St. Louis Cardinals with Staubach passing for 220 yards and a touchdown, while Hill rushed 18 times for 70 yards. Against the N.Y. Giants (9/11/16), Prescott passed for 227 yards on 25-of-45 passes with no touchdowns and no interceptions, while Elliott rushed 20 times for 51 yards and his first career touchdown.

The Cowboys also became the first team to start two rookies in the offensive backfield since the 2012 Washington Redskins rolled out rookies Robert Griffin III and Alfred Morris.

Overall, the Cowboys have featured a rookie QB/RB duo five-times in their history, and suffered their first loss in a game that featured a rookie backfield against the N.Y. Giants (9/11):

Following the fifth game of the season which saw rookie quarterback Dak Prescott pass for 227 yards and rookie running back Ezekiel Elliott rush for 134 yards against Cincinnati (10/9), Prescott had 1,239 passing yards along with 546 rushing yards for Elliott at that point of the season. With those totals, the Cowboys became the first team in NFL history to boast a rookie quarterback with at least 1,000 passing yards and a rookie running back with at least 500 rushing yards in the first five games of a season.

At Cleveland (11/6), Prescott passed for 274 yards to reach 2,020 yards on the season, while Elliott rushed for 92 yards to give him 891 in 2016. Combined, it allowed Dallas to become the first franchise in NFL history to boast a rookie 2,000-yard passer and a rookie with 800+ rushing yards in a team's first eight games. The duo also reached another milestone against the Browns after Prescott tossed three touchdowns and Elliott had two rushing touchdowns to allow Dallas to become the second team in NFL history to have a rookie throw for three touchdowns and a rookie rush for two touchdowns in a single game since November 21, 1948, when New York Giants rookie quarterback Charlie Conerly threw three touchdown passes and rookie running back Ray Coates rushed for two touchdowns in the Giants' 49-3 win at Green Bay:

Prescott and Elliott once again combined for a dramatic win at Pittsburgh (11/13) for the team's club-tying eighth straight victory. During the waning seconds of the first quarter, Prescott connected with Elliott for an 83-yard touchdown. The pass served as the longest by a rookie quarterback/rookie receiver tandem in team history, and was the longest from a rookie passer to a rookie teammate since the Indianapolis Colts in 1986 when Jack Trudeau connected with Bill Brooks for an 84-yard touchdown at San Francisco (10/5/86). It was longest pass and longest pass for a touchdown by a rookie quarterback in team history, the second-longest reception by a rookie and the longest scoring connection since Dez Bryant caught an 85-yard touchdown from Tony Romo against Washington (11/22/12).

With Elliott surpassing 1,000 yards against the Steelers, combined with Prescott passing for 2,000 yards, the duo became only the second rookie quarterback and rookie running back teammates in NFL history with at least 2,000 passing yards and 1,000 rushing yards in a season, joining Robert Griffin III (3,200 passing yards) and Alfred Morris (1,613 rushing yards) who did so with Washington in 2012.

BIG PLAY RUNS

After only three combined runs of 10+ yards in the first two games, the Cowboys ground game has since made longer runs throughout the course of a game. Against Chicago (9/25) the offense produced five runs of 10-plus, including one run over 20 yards. They added four more at San Francisco (10/2) including two 20+ runs by Ezekiel Elliott (23, 26). Against Cincinnati (10/9) the offense tacked on five including a 60-yard romp by Elliott - the longest run from scrimmage since 2014. At Green Bay (10/16) the offense tallied six 10-plus runs, including three 20-plus runs. Dallas ripped off a season-high nine runs of 10+ against Philadelphia (10/30), with one for 20-plus. At Cleveland (11/6) the offense ripped off seven runs of 10-plus, then they had two at Pittsburgh (11/13) that both went for scores. Against Baltimore four went for 10-or-more, including one for a score, before the offense reeled off six of 10-plus, including two of 20-plus, against Washington (11/24). The offense recorded four at Minnesota (12/1).

For the 2016 season, Dallas' 55 runs of 10-plus yards are tied for the NFL lead, led by Elliott's league-high 37:

Over the last few seasons, the Dallas Cowboys offense has made a focal point in time of possession, controlling the clock for a season average of 32:26 in 2014 - highest in the NFL - and tied for 11th in the league with an average of 30:59 per-game in 2015.

Dallas is continuing its trend in 2016, as the offensive unit currently leads the NFL with a 32:20 mark:

The unit has posted eight games with at least 30:00 minutes of possession to tie for the second-most in the NFL in 2016.

Dallas' offense clocked in at 36:43 against the N.Y. Giants (9/11), including a season-high 8:25 on the opening drive. At Washington (9/18) the offense had a 32:51. Against Chicago (9/25) the unit clocked in at 35:19 to mark its third consecutive game to go over 30:00. The unit dialed in at 36:27 at San Francisco (10/2). They grinded out a final tally of 33:57 against Philadelphia (10/30). The offense had a season-high mark of 39:39 at Cleveland (11/6). The offense had its seventh game at Pittsburgh (11/13) with a 30:24 time of possession, and its eighth against Baltimore (11/20) with 35:39.

DRIVE FOR FIVE

While the Dallas Cowboys offense continues to be atop the league in time of possession, the squad also boasts 30 drives of five-or-more minutes with 26 going for scores, both tops in the NFL in 2016. Specifically, the unit also has had 15 drives go five-or-more minutes and result in touchdowns, best in the league:

Dallas had four drives of 10+ plays against the N.Y. Giants (9/11) including two drives that each went 15 plays to mark a season-high. They had four again at Washington (9/18), then three against Chicago (9/25), at San Francisco (10/2) and against Philadelphia (10/30). Dallas' offense is tied for the league lead by recording seven-games with 50.0 percent-or-better on third downs in 2016.

Dallas produced a 59.0% third down conversion rate in the season opener against the N.Y. Giants (9/11), including a season-best 10 first downs on 17 attempts. They produced their second consecutive game at Washington (9/18) after going six-of-12 (50.0), then were four-of-eight (50.0) against Cincinnati (10/9). At Cleveland (11/6) the unit was successful on a season-high 66.7% (eight-of-12). They added their fifth game with a 53.8% mark (seven-of-13) at Pittsburgh (11/13), and their sixth against Baltimore (11/20) with a 58.3% mark (seven-of-12). Dallas hit its seventh game of the season with a 50.0% mark (four-of-eight) against Washington (11/24).

FOLLOW THE LEE-DER

Dallas Cowboys linebacker Sean Lee returned to the field in 2015, this time coming back from a torn ACL he suffered in a spring practice that took away his 2014 season. Before that, Lee had bounced back in 2013 to tally a team-best 123 tackles after landing on Reserve/Injured with a toe injury in 2012.

Having manned the middle linebacker spot since his rookie season, Lee moved to a new position in 2015 with a shift over to the weakside spot to further utilize his speed and playmaking ability in the Cowboys 4-3 defense. Lee led the squad with a career-high 156 tackles along with his first career sacks (2.5), a team and career-high 11 tackles for loss, six pressures, an interception and five pass breakups. He was named to his first Pro Bowl as an injury replacement for Justin Houston (Kansas City).

Known to always be around the ball, Lee has collected 12 interceptions since entering the league as Dallas' 2010 second round draft choice to mark the most on the team and is tied for the most amongst league linebackers in the NFL during that span. His 12 are also fifth among linebackers in team history. Lee has intercepted a career-high four passes twice in season during his career - leading the team in 2013 and tying for the team lead in 2011 - to tie for sixth-most in a single-season in team history:

Lee leads the 2016 team with 134 tackles and 10 tackles for loss, while also adding two pass breakups and a pressure.

In the season opener against the N.Y. Giants (9/11), Lee led the team with 15 tackles. He topped the defense again with 10 stops at Washington (9/18) along with a breakup. He tied for the team lead with 10 stops at San Francisco (10/2) along with a tackle for loss. Lee made 15 tackles against Cincinnati (10/9), then notched 14 stops and a breakup at Green Bay (10/16). Lee had 10 tackles including two for loss against Philadelphia (10/30). He made eight stops and a tackle for loss at Cleveland (11/6), then had nine tackles, including two for loss, at Pittsburgh (11/13). Lee posted five stops against Baltimore (11/20) to give him 103 tackles on the year to mark his third consecutive season - fourth overall - with 100-plus stops. He notched a season-high 20 tackles - his third career game with 20-plus stops - against Washington (11/24) along with a tackle for loss and a pressure. Lee provided 10 tackles and two tackles for a loss at Minnesota (12/1):

"CINDERELLA MAN"

Tyrone Crawford, dubbed "Cinderella Man" by Dallas Cowboys Defensive Coordinator Rod Marinelli, leads the team in 2016 with 3.5 sacks and a career-best two fumble recoveries, is second with a career-high six tackles for loss and 13 quarterback pressures and has also logged 18 tackles. He spent the previous two seasons (2014-15) playing defensive tackle, including last season where he logged a career-high 5.0 sacks, but has moved back to defensive end in 2016 where he was originally slotted to play as a 2012 draft pick by the Cowboys.

Crawford collected his first sack of the season at Washington (9/18) along with a pressure, then posted two tackles, two tackles for loss, a pressure and recovered his first career fumble against Chicago (9/25). He had his second sack of the season at San Francisco (10/2) along with two quarterback hurries and four stops. Crawford registered his second career multi-sack game with 1.5 takedowns against Philadelphia (10/30) while also collecting his second career fumble. He recorded a season-high four pressures against Washington (11/24) along with a tackle for loss.

CHURCH IN SESSION

Barry Church has consistently been one of Dallas' top defensive performers and leaders. He has posted over 100+ tackles in each of the last three seasons (2013-15) - the longest such streak since Bradie James recorded six seasons (2005-10) with 100+ tackles - while finishing as either the leading and second-leading tackler in each of those seasons.

Church made his mark on the Cowboys defense in 2013, turning in a team-leading, and career-best 147 tackles, bouncing back after missing the majority of the 2012 season after suffering a ruptured Achilles tendon three weeks into the season. He posted eight games with 10-or-more tackles in 2013 - most on the defense - including a career-high 17 at New Orleans (11/10/13). Overall, his tackle totals were the third-most by a Cowboys safety, and the 11th-most overall by any Cowboys defender, dating back to 1989:

He finished 2014 atop Dallas' defense with 110 tackles - his second consecutive season with 100+ stops - to become the first player to lead the team in tackles in back-to-back seasons since James' six seasons streak (2005-10). It was also the first time a Dallas defender posted consecutive 100+ tackle seasons since James had six in a row from 2005-10.

In 2015, Church finished second on the team with 136 tackles to mark his third consecutive 100-plus tackle season, the longest streak since James' six (2005-10).

He began 2016 not unlike the past few seasons, amassing 12 stops in the season opener against the N.Y. Giants (9/11) - good for second on the squad. Church made six stops, a pass breakup and an interception - fourth of his career - at Washington (9/18). He had 13 tackles and two pass breakups - both season-highs - to lead the team against Chicago (9/25). Church made 10 stops and two tackles for loss at San Francisco (10/2), then had 11 tackles against Cincinnati (10/9). He totaled eight stops, his second interception of the season - tied a career-high - and also had a breakup and a forced fumble. Church made four stops to surpass 500 tackles for his career against Philadelphia (10/30) before leaving the game with an arm injury and missed the games at Cleveland (11/6), at Pittsburgh (11/13), against Baltimore (11/20) and against Washington (11/24) with a fractured forearm. He returned to action at Minnesota (12/1) and promptly led the defense with a season-high tying 13 tackles.

Church currently leads the team with two interceptions and is tied for second with 77 tackles. He has also logged four pass breakups, and also has two tackles for loss and a forced fumble.

BYRON THE BREAKUP ARTIST

Byron Jones was a standout defensive player in the Cowboys secondary as a rookie in 2015, finishing the season fifth on the team with 76 tackles, adding two tackles for loss, and first on the defense with 12 passes defended. Jones was the first Cowboys rookie defender to lead the team in pass breakups since Derek Ross (12) in 2002, and is the only rookie defender in Cowboys history to finish the season with 75-plus tackles and lead the team in breakups (Cowboys did not track PBUs before 1984):

Jones returned to swatting passes to start 2016, breaking up one pass against the N.Y. Giants (9/11) in the season opener along with seven tackles. He had six stops and a breakup at Washington (9/18). Jones made five tackles, a breakup and a forced fumble against Chicago (9/25). He had six stops and a breakup against Cincinnati (10/9), then at Green Bay (10/16) contributed four stops and a breakup. Jones posted nine tackles - good for second on the team - against Philadelphia (10/30). He led the team at Pittsburgh (11/13) with a career-high 12 tackles and tackle for loss. Jones finished second on the squad against Washington (11/24) with 11 stops, a tackle for loss and a breakup, then made eight stops and a breakup at Minnesota (12/1).

For the 2016 season, Jones currently is tied for the team lead in pass breakups with seven. He is also tied for second on the team with 77 tackles.

UNLEASH MALIEK

Maliek Collins had 2.0 sacks against Cody Kessler at Cleveland (11/6) to mark the first time a rookie defender recorded two-plus sacks in a single game since DeVonte Holloman had 2.0 against Philadelphia (12/29/13). DeMarcus Ware owns the rookie record with 3.0 sacks against Carolina (12/24/05). He picked up his third sack of the season at Minnesota (12/1) along with three tackles.

On the season, Collins is tied for second with 3.0 sacks and is fourth with nine quarterback pressures, while he also has 22 tackles and a tackle for loss in his first pro season.

COWBOYS DL = WEEK 6 NFC DPOTW

The Dallas Cowboys added David Irving via the Kansas City Chiefs practice squad last season as a rookie. In 12 games in 2015 he became a rotational player on the defensive line, summing up 14 tackles, a half sack, two tackles for loss, 14 quarterback pressures and a blocked field goal.

He returned in 2016 to contribute more to the defense and thus far leads the team with a career-high 16 quarterback pressures and three forced fumbles, is tied for third with four tackles for loss and has also made five tackles, a sack, three pass break-ups and a fumble recovery.

In the season opener against the N.Y. Giants (9/11) he posted three tackles and a tackle for loss. Irving led the team with a career-high four pressures against Chicago (9/25). He had his best game to date at Green Bay (10/16), notching a tackle, a sack, a tackle for loss, a breakup, a fumble recovery and three forced fumbles. His three forced fumbles tied for third-most all-time in a single game in NFL history, and he became the second Cowboy to do accomplish that feat, joining DeMarcus Ware (2005).

For his efforts against the Packers, Irving was named the NFC Defensive Player of The Week for Week 6, becoming the first Dallas defender to win the award since Sean Lee did it last season (Week 2 - 2015) and the first defensive lineman since Leon Lett (Week 5 - 1996).

Irving tied his career-best with four pressures at Minnesota (12/1).

20 POINT LIMIT

Through 12 games played, the Dallas Cowboys defensive unit is allowing only 19.0 points-per-game to rank fifth in the league. The defense had a streak of not allowing a team to score more than 17 points in four consecutive games (9/25/16-10/30/16) to mark the longest such streak in a single season since the 2009 team had a streak of five games in 2009 (11/1-11/26).

Additionally, Dallas is one of four teams to give up 20-or-more points to opposing team's offenses five times-or-less this season - tied for the third-fewest games in the NFL.

TAKEAWAYS FROM "MIGHTY ORPHANS"

Dallas Cowboys Defensive Coordinator Rod Marinelli has dubbed his defense "The Mighty Orphans" in respect of his group of defenders that are made up of "castaways" in the NFL that are not top draft picks or major free agent signees. Instead, they are a core group of men who will fight on every snap, a mantra that Marinelli distills upon his unit.

The nickname, one that Marinelli gives with respect, is based on the book the "Twelve Mighty Orphans" written by Jim Dent, which tells the story of the Masonic Orphanage in Fort Worth, TX. During the 1930s and '40s, the orphanage, under coach Rusty Russell, played high school football with a limited enrollment of 150 and little to no budget as they went on to tie Corsicana in the 1932 high school state championship game.

With that nickname and mantra, the defense has been opportunistic with 11 takeaways (7 fumble recoveries; 4 INTs) through 13 weeks to tie for 27th in the NFL.

The unit had two takeaways (two fumble recoveries) against Chicago (9/25). At Green Bay (10/16) the defense gathered a season-high four takeaways (3 fum; 1 INT) to mark the most in a single game since four at Washington (12/28/14).

SHUTOUTS AND SACKS

The Dallas Cowboys defense turned in its best performance against Cincinnati (10/9). The unit held the Bengals offense scoreless through the third quarter to mark the first shut-out through three quarters since at Philadelphia (9/20/15). It was also the fifth consecutive game that the Cowboys have held their opponent scoreless during at least one quarter in 2016 to join the 1975 team as the only two times that has happened in franchise history. The defense extended that streak at Green Bay (10/16), holding the Packers offense scoreless in the third quarter to match the 1975 defense as the only two teams to accomplish that feat through the first six games. At Cleveland (11/6), the defense shut out the Browns offense in the second half while also limiting their offense to 33 yards.

The defense also logged four sacks on Cincinnati's Andy Dalton - the most since logging five against New England (10/11/15) - with Terrell McClain leading the way with a career-high 1.5, while Benson Mayowa and Cedric Thornton each had one and Jack Crawford had a half sack. The unit produced three sacks against Philadelphia (10/30) with Tyrone Crawford producing his second career multi-sack game with 1.5 takedowns while Orlando Scan-drick added one and Thornton had a 0.5 sack. The defense tied its season high with four quarterback takedowns at Cleveland (11/6) led by the first two of Maliek Collins' career, while Justin Durant (1.0), Anthony Hitchens (0.5) and Damien Wilson (0.5) also contributed. The unit collected three sacks at Minnesota (12/1) with Collins, Hitchens and Mayowa each finding their way to a Viking quarterback.

On the year, the defensive unit has produced 23.0 sacks with Tyrone Crawford leading the way with 3.5.

LIMITING BIG PLAYS

The defense of Dallas has made it a point of emphasis of limiting opposing team's offenses on big plays. Through 13 weeks of the 2016 NFL season, the Cowboys are tied for the seventh-fewest plays of 10-plus runs allowed (28):

NO HUNDREDS EXCHANGED HERE

Through 13 weeks of the 2016 season the defense of the Dallas Cowboys are one of only three units (New England and San Diego) in the National Football League to not allow a 100-yard rusher.

BAILEY FROM 50

For his career, Dan Bailey is 24-of-32 (75.0) from 50-plus yards, and sits atop the club's charts for 50-yarders in a season (six - 2013) and career, while he also tied a franchise-long 56-yard field goal twice - at Seattle (10/12/14) and against the N.Y. Giants (9/11/16). He also boasts the second-highest percentage of field goals from this range in NFL history with a 75.0 clip.

Bailey has hit two 50+ field goals in a game four times (three times in 2013), including most recently in the 2016 season opener against the N.Y. Giants (9/11/16), to tie Eddie Murray (at Minnesota, 12/12/93) for the most in a single game.

At Kansas City (9/15/13) Bailey was true on three tries, including a pair from 50-plus yards (51 and a career-long 53). Bailey's two 50-yard field goals marked the second time in team history a kicker hit two 50-plus tries in the same game. The first was Eddie Murray at Minnesota, 12/12/93 (51 and 52 yards). Bailey did it twice more after nailing two 53-yarders at Detroit (10/27) and two 50-yarders against Green Bay (12/15).

In 2014, Bailey finished five-of-seven (71.4) on field goals from 50 yards-or-more during the regular season for the second-most field goals made in a single season in team history.

He was five-of-six from 50 yards in 2015, the second-highest percentage (83.3) in team history in a single season from 50-yards, and tied for the second-most made in a single season.

Bailey opened 2016 with four field goals against the N.Y. Giants (9/11), with two from 50 yards (including a career and franchise-long to tying 56-yarder) to tie for the most 50-yard field goals in a single game in team history. He is three-of-three in 2016 from 50 yards.

GAME-WINNING KICKS

In his rookie season, Dan Bailey was called upon six times to win or tie the game with his foot. Four times he came through for Dallas. Bailey's four game-winning field goals were the most by a Dallas Cowboy in a single season and the most by a rookie in NFL history.

In 2012 Bailey had four opportunities to do the same, and he came through in three games including two in overtime. He added one game-winner in 2013 with a 35-yarder at the N.Y. Giants (11/24).

Bailey was one-of-two during the 2014 season.

His only game-winner of the 2015 season came at Washington (12/7) where he nailed a 54-yarder - tied for the second-longest kick of his career, and the longest game-winner of his career.

In team history, there have now been 39 instances in which a kicker was true on a game-winning field goal with 2:00-or-less left in the fourth quarter or in overtime.

Bailey has rang true with 10 game-winners - and a franchise-best five in overtime - to serve as the most in team history:

BAILEY'S BOOTS

Since joining the Dallas Cowboys as an undrafted free agent in 2011 as the club's kicker, Dan Bailey has recorded 23 games with three-or-more field goals - the most in team history. He also has seven games with four-or-more field goals - tops in team history.

Bailey had five games with three-or-more field goals as a rookie in 2011, including his first game with four-or-more when he struck a career-best six against Washington (9/26/11). He matched that total with five games in 2012, while also adding one game with four field goals at Carolina (10/21/12). For the third consecutive season in 2013 he notched five games with three-or-more field goals, with a season-high five field goals made against Green Bay (12/15/13). In 2014 and 2015 he recorded three each, while he added one four field goal game in 2014 and a career-high two in 2015.

Bailey began 2016 with a bang, connecting on all four field goal attempts against the N.Y. Giants (9/11) to break a tie with Rafael Septien for his 22nd game with three-or-more field goals to establish a team record, while also extending his team record with his seventh career game with four-or-more field goals made: On the season he has recorded four games with three-or-more field goals, and one game with four-plus:

MORE RELIABLE IS BETTER

Dan Bailey came to Dallas in 2011 as a rookie free agent and immediately earned his spot as the club's place kicker, finishing the season 32-of-37 (86.5%) on field goals for the second-best field goal percentage by a rookie in franchise history. His 32 field goals made were also a club rookie record. He had a streak of 26 consecutive made which were the most by a rookie in NFL history.

In his second season he finished with a 93.5 (29-of-31) field goal percentage - second in team history. He went 28-of-30 (93.3) in 2013, hitting 30 consecutive field goals from 2013 into 2014 to establish a team record. Bailey finished 2014 25-of-29 (86.2) with a career-high 56 extra points to tie the third-most in team history. He was 30-of-32 with field goal tries and hit all 25 PATs in 2015, and is 21-of-23 on field goals while connecting on all 36 PATs for 99 points in 2016.

For his career, Bailey has converted 165-of-182 tries (90.7%), and his field goals made are the most in team history. Bailey has also hit all 240 PAT tries - second in franchise history:

MAKING THE POINT

Dan Bailey has been a scoring machine since entering the league in 2011 as the former undrafted free agent has totaled 735 points to rank third in team history:

In 2014 Bailey passed Michael Irvin (392), Bob Hayes (456) and Tony Dorsett (516) for third on Dallas' all-time points list. He also reached 400 points during the season to become the second kicker (Rafael Septien - 874) in team history - fifth player overall - to do so. At Philadelphia (12/14/14) he reached 500 career points. Bailey in his 62nd game to become the second-fastest kicker in NFL history to hit that mark. He reached 600 points against Carolina (11/26/15). Bailey crossed off 700 points at Cleveland (11/6/16) to become the third Cowboy - second kicker (Septien) - to reach that number.

CAN'T MISS KICKER

The Dallas Cowboys feature one of the league's most dependable kickers, as the former 2011 undrafted free agent has hit true on 150-of-165 field goals for his career. During that time, Dan Bailey has challenged some of the franchise's longest consecutive field goal records, including 26 in a row in his first season to tie the second-longest streak in team history and mark the longest streak of field goals made by a rookie in team and NFL history. He then hit 21 in a row in between his second and third seasons (2012-13) - the third-longest in team history.

However, after that streak was snapped, Bailey quickly embarked on a new field goals streak in 2013 and extended it into the 2014 season. He opened the season with one field goal made against San Francisco (9/7) to extend his streak to 22 straight field goals made and move to the third-longest streak. Bailey then hit all four of his tries at Tennessee (9/14/14) to extend his field goals made to 26 in a row, tying Chris Boniol (1995) and his 2011 total for the second-longest streak in team history. He had two field goals at St. Louis (9/21/14) to reach 28 in a row and pass Boniol's 1995 total of 27 to establish the longest streak of field goals made in team history. He continued that streak up to 30 successful kicks before missing a 53-yarder against Houston (10/5/14).

Bailey had a streak of 21 consecutive field goals made - tied for fifth-longest in team history - that began with three made at Washington (12/28/14) in 2014 and continued with 18 straight in 2015 until he missed his first one at Tampa Bay (11/15) to end the streak:

After connecting on his first field goal at Seattle (10/12/14), Dan Bailey reached 100 career field goals made. His trek to 100 was made during his 54th career game, allowing him to become the second-fastest kicker in NFL history to get to that milestone:

In 2015, Bailey made 30-of-32 field goals (career-high 93.8) to tie for the league lead in field goal percentage, tied for fifth in field goals made and was 12th with 115 total points to earn his first trip to the Pro Bowl.

He is 21-of-23 on field goals (91.3%) with 36 PATs in 2016 to rank third in PATs, sixth in field goal percentage, tied for eighth in points (99) and tied for 13th in field goals made.

THIRTY-SOMETHING

After connecting on two-of-three field goals at Buffalo (12/27/15), Dan Bailey reached 30 field goals on the season for the second time of his career. It was also only the fourth time a Dallas kicker had reached 30 field goals made and the first since his 2011 season when he made 32 field goals:

JONES-ING TO PUNT

Dallas Cowboys punter Chris Jones had a career year in 2015. The fourth-year pro ranked third with a career-high 42.5 net average and was 20th with a 45.2 gross while his 27 punts downed inside opponents' 20-yard line tied for 14th.

In 2016, Jones is ninth with a 46.4 gross average, is tied for 11th with a 40.7 net average and has 17 punts downed inside the 20-yard line.

He logged a career-best 55.3 gross average along with a season-long punt of 63 yards on four boots at San Francisco (10/2).

For his career, Jones boasts a 45.3 gross average and a net average of 40.5, with 105 punts downed inside the 20-yard line - good for fifth all-time in team history.

The Dallas Cowboys drafted nine players - five defensive, four offensive - in the 2016 NFL Draft. It was the third consecutive season the team leaned more towards defense, as 17 of the last 26 picks by Dallas in the last three drafts (2014-16) have been on that side of the ball. The new class started off with Dallas' first round choice - running back Ezekiel Elliott - who was selected with the fourth overall pick to mark just the second time in team history that the club has selected a running back with a top-five pick (Tony Dorsett, No. 2 overall - 1977).

PRO: The Dallas Cowboys brought back veteran linebacker Justin Durant to infuse some leadership and add depth at the second level of their defense in 2016. The Cowboys originally landed Justin Durant through free agency in 2013. Durant, a 10th-year pro, first came to Dallas after starting 68 of his 79 career games, playing in both Jacksonville (2007-10) and Detroit (2011-12). He started six of the 10 games he played in 2013, missing five games with a hamstring injury that landed him on Reserve/Injured, and tallied 30 tackles. 



PRO: The Dallas Cowboys signed veteran quarterback Mark Sanchez prior to the start of the 2016 regular season in an attempt to shore up the quarterback position behind rookie Dak Prescott with an established veteran presence. Sanchez, originally a first round draft pick (fifth overall) of the New York Jets, is an eighth-year player with 75 games played in his career, compiled 15,126 yards through the air on 1,285-of- 2,267 passing (56.7%) with 86 touchdowns against 84 interceptions. As a rookie in 2009, Sanchez started 15 games for the N.Y. Jets and experienced great success, leading the team to the AFC Championship game, a feat which he duplicated in his second season with the team. His postseason numbers rank among some of the games' greats at the position, with a 60.5% completion rate to go along with 1,155 yards and nine touchdown passes against three interceptions as well as a 94.3 quarterback rating, seventh all-time in postseason play, in six games. Sanchez was released by the N.Y. Jets in 2014 after missing the entire 2013 season with a shoulder injury, and signed with Philadelphia, where he started 10 games in two seasons. He was traded to Denver at the beginning of the 2016 offseason, but was released after training camp and signed with Dallas. His leadership and experience will be valuable for the Cowboys as a mentor to Prescott, who is in line to start the season after Tony Romo suffered an injury in the preseason.

Streaking Cowboys survive self-destruction in 17-15 win vs. Vikings

MINNEAPOLIS - Sometimes when it's your year and destiny is seemingly on your side, things fall your way even if it appears all is about lost. Consider the Dallas Cowboys on Thursday night at U.S. Bank Stadium. The mojo that had been fueling their rise all season was sputtering. Dueling rookie of year candidates in quarterback Dak Prescott and running back Ezekiel Elliott were all but shut down by the Minnesota Vikings and boisterous crowd. Turnovers and miscues abounded.

But just when you thought Cowboys' luck had run out and their streak was about to end, the improbable happened. A Cowboys team that hadn't forced a turnover since Halloween, a span of four games, got a forced fumble when linebacker Kyle Wilber knocked the ball loose from Adam Thielen.

Prescott tossed an 8-yard touchdown pass to receiver Dez Bryant on the next play, sparking the Cowboys to a 17-15 victory, while extending their team-record winning streak to 11 games.

"It's really good we can come up with a takeaway," Wilber said. "Coach Garrett asked me did you get it out. I said I got it out, but I didn't know if his knee went down first."

The win ended a string of three games in 12 days, starting with the Baltimore Ravens and Washington Redskins on Thanksgiving. The Cowboys have 10 days off before playing at the New York Giants on Dec. 11.

"I thought our defense did a fantastic job keeping the score down," Cowboys coach Jason Garrett said. A 33-yard field goal by Dan Bailey made it 17-9. The Cowboys had a chance to ice the game, but a slide by Prescott came up inches short of the first down and then Elliott was knocked for a loss, giving the ball back to the Vikings with 2:09 left in the game. Quarterback Sam Bradford, who left the game in the second quarter but returned after halftime, then led the Vikings 65 yards on eight plays.

A 3-yard touchdown pass to Jerick McKinnon narrowed the score to 17-15 with 25 seconds left.

But the 2-point pass was high, allowing the Cowboys to survive. "It was a hard-fought battle," Garrett said. "It wasn't our prettiest performance on offense." It's fitting considering the Cowboys have not allowed a 2-point conversion in six tries against them this season. The Cowboys recorded a season low in points, yards and passing yards. They lost the battle of time of possession. They were one of nine on third downs. They had 10 penalties for 78 yards. They had four fumbles, losing two.

Yet, the Cowboys are still streaking. The Cowboys (11-1) still have the best record in the NFL and can clinch at least a wild-card playoff berth this weekend with a loss by the Washington Redskins or a loss or tie by the Tampa Buccaneers.

"It's pretty cool, but we've got to keep on fighting," receiver Dez Bryant said. "The plan is way much bigger than being 11-1. It's pretty cool situation, but there is more ball left and we have to stay grounded because this success thing is kind of tricky. You can't get too high. That's the beginning of falling off. That's something that we're not going to do. We're going to stay together and keep on fighting and we're just going to keep hoping for the best."

Speaking of destiny?

The victory snapped a five-game losing streak in Minnesota.

The Cowboys' last road win in the series was in 1995, the last year of the three Super Bowl titles in the 1990s.

Getting there won't be easy, just like getting a win Thursday night wasn't.

In addition to struggling on offense because of bad field position and bad play, they seemingly did everything they could to lose the game with a host of turnovers and penalties, allowing the Vikings to take a 9-7 lead in the third quarter.

A holding penalty on tackle Doug Free wiped out a 42-yard gain from Elliott. A hands to the face penalty on cornerback Orlando Scandrick nullified a potential game-turning interception from Anthony Hitchens.

A clipping penalty on tight end Gavin Escobar set up a drive-killing third-and-29. Receiver Lucky Whitehead killed a Cowboys drive with fumble on a reverse. And even Elliott had a fumble earlier in the game that was given back to the Cowboys after a review by the officials that he recovered the ball.

The team's much-maligned defense kept the Cowboys in the game as it continued to hold the Vikings to field goals.

Down 7-3 at halftime, the Vikings got a 36-yard field in the third quarter and a 33-yarder early in the fourth from Kai Forbath.

The latter came after a first down run by Elliott was called back because of a holding call on Escobar. Free then gave up a sack to defensive Brian Robison, who forced a fumble from Prescott. But the defense held the Vikings to a field goal.

And even when the Cowboys seemingly set themselves up to go ahead midway through the fourth, they bit themselves again.

A first down pass to tight end Jason Witten was called back because of a holding penalty on Elliott.

The ensuing punt resulted in the huge play by Wilber.

The returner was initially ruled down, but Garrett challenged the call and it was reversed on replay.

It was the second turnover reversed by replay in favor of the Cowboys and it proved quite ominous.

Prescott tossed a hitch pass to Bryant on the next play. He outran the defenders to the end zone.

Prescott completed 12 of 18 passes for a season-low 139 yards and a touchdown. Elliott rushed 20 times for 86 yards and a touchdown. He now has 12 rushing touchdowns in the season to tie Tony Dorsett's rookie record set in 1977. The Cowboys' offense totaled a season-low 264 yards and the Vikings controlled ball for 33:17 of the game. Yet, the Cowboys survived and they are still streaking. Credit Wilbur's forced fumble. Credit the defense, which recorded three sacks for coming up with timely plays and keeping the Vikings out of the end zone for much of the night. And then not giving up on the 2-point after they allowed the late touchdown.

"You've got to fight," Garrett said. "You've got to battle. It's the foundation of what we do. It was not our prettiest game. Different people stepped up. Different units stepped up. Special teams and defense were outstanding in critical moments. Offense did what it needed to do at critical times. It was a great team win for us."

Perhaps no one had a better perspective on the Cowboys' ability to win and survive more than Bryant and Witten.

Bryant's touchdown catch was the 65th of his career, tying Hall of Famer Michael Irvin for second most in Cowboys history.

But, as he told Irvin after the game, the record means nothing to him as the Cowboys have bigger goals in mind.

"He talked about the record and he talked about our previous conversations in the offseason, talking about the squad and stuff like that," Bryant said of Irvin. "He was excited about the touchdown record. Like I told him, that's not what's important right now. Our goal is way much more bigger than that. We're dealing with something that's way much more bigger than records and all that kind of stuff."

We're a football team and that's the most beautiful thing that we got. We stick with one another throughout the good and the bad and y'all witnessed that tonight and those are the type of things that we care about is pulling out victories like this."

Interestingly enough, Witten didn't have a catch against the Vikings. It snapped a streak of 130 games with a catch dating back to the 2008. It was the longest streak in Cowboys history and the fourth-longest active streak in the NFL.

Most important to Witten Thursday was him catching the on sides kick attempt by the Vikings after their failed 2-point conversion, allowing the Cowboys to kneel on the ball to end of the game.

"Those records really don't mean anything," Witten said. "I still have a lot of confidence in my ability and feel I can play at a high level. A big part of that is making catches. It's just one of those games. Those things happen. You go through it. It's not on one particular situation. That's just the way the game went. I'm thankful and excited to be 11-1, much more than having a catch. That's a big win for our team to get 11 in a row. You just continue to grind it out and find a way."

The Cowboys have been finding a way all season. That's been their real mojo.

Cowboys' defense again is saving grace as it refuses to break

MINNEAPOLIS The Dallas Cowboys' defense may not like the 'bend-but-don't-break' title bestowed upon them. But it's fitting and they lived up to it once again on Thursday night. The defense bent, but didn't break, in the Cowboys' 17-15 victory over the Minnesota Vikings at U.S. Bank Stadium.

"I thought the defense did a fantastic job all night long of really keeping the score down," Cowboys coach Jason Garrett said. "Even though they moved the ball at different times, we played really good situational defense."

The Cowboys' defense gave up a late touchdown drive to the Vikings, who had a chance to tie the game if they converted a 2-point conversion.

The Vikings went the distance, scoring a pass from Sam Bradford to Jerick McKinnon. But the 2-point conversion was pushed back to the 7 because of a false start penalty, and Bradford airmailed tight end Kyle Rudolph as the Cowboys held on for the win.

In the end, it was a trademark effort by the Cowboys' defense. Opponents are now 0-for-6 on 2-point conversions.

The 318 yards the Cowboys allowed — 65 of it coming on the Vikings' final drive — was the fewest they have allowed in four games.

While the Cowboys still didn't have a takeaway on defense, the pass rush improved and they made key stands throughout the night — particularly after the offense coughed up the ball.

Early in the second quarter, Cowboys receiver Lucky Whitehead fumbled and the Vikings took over at their own 34. But the Cowboys' defense gave up only one first down on that drive and forced the Vikings to punt.

"We had to hold it down on the defensive side and our offense got rolling later in the game," end Tyrone Crawford said. "We did it all as a team."

Late in the third quarter, Cowboys quarterback Dak Prescott was stripped of the ball and the Vikings took over on the Cowboys' 19. But the defense made another impressive stand and forced the Vikings to settle for a field goal.

In fact, the Vikings managed only three field goals on the night until the late TD drive.

The Cowboys' pass rush also showed some life after they went without a sack in last week's game against the Redskins. The Cowboys had two sacks on the night, one by defensive tackle Maliek Collins and the other by linebacker Anthony Hitchens.

More important, the Cowboys were able to get pressure on Bradford. Defensive end DeMarcus Lawrence had several pressures, as Pro Football Focus credited him with five in the first half alone.

The only thing missing for the Cowboys' defense were takeaways once again. They did force a turnover on special teams, but whiffed on two chances in the first half.

Safety Byron Jones had an interception fall through his hands, and Hitchens saw an interception taken away because of a hands to the face penalty on cornerback Orlando Scandrick.

Still, it was a solid night for a defense that has many wondering if they will be the downfall of the Cowboys.

The Vikings had only 126 total yards of offense in the first half, including only 25 rushing.

**Dez Bryant: Cowboys must stay grounded after win vs. Vikings,
plan is 'way much bigger' than 11-1**

MINNEAPOLIS -- Dez Bryant had the Cowboys' two biggest catches Thursday night at Minnesota and equaled a Hall of Famer, but the receiver didn't really want to talk about his numbers.

Instead, Bryant wanted to keep the focus on the 11-1 Cowboys and not individual success.

"We're dealing with something that's way much more bigger than records and all that kind of stuff," Bryant said. "We're a football team, and that's the most beautiful thing that we got. We stick with one another throughout the good and the bad, and y'all witnessed that tonight and those are the type of things that we care about is pulling out victories like this."

Bryant finished with four catches for 84 yards and a touchdown against the Vikings. The 8-yard touchdown catch in the fourth quarter put the Cowboys ahead, 14-9. The TD was also Bryant's 65th in his career, tying him with Michael Irvin for second in franchise history. Bob Hayes had 71. Irvin was at the game Thursday broadcasting for the NFL Network. Bryant was the last Cowboys player to run on the field after the team left the locker room before the game because he spent time talking to Irvin. Then, after Bryant's fourth-quarter touchdown, Irvin met him on the sideline and gave him a hug.

"He talked about the record, and he talked about our previous conversations in the offseason, talking about the squad and stuff like that," Bryant said about the conversation. "He was excited about the touchdown record. Like I told him, that's not what's important right now. Our goal is way much more bigger than that."

Bryant set up the Cowboys' first touchdown in the second quarter with a great grab on a deep pass from Dak Prescott.

Bryant was matched up most of the game against standout Minnesota cornerback Xavier Rhodes, who is tied for fourth in the NFL with four interceptions. On second-and-9 from the Cowboys' 43, Prescott saw a look from the Vikings that the Cowboys had planned for all week. Bryant was lined up on the left side near Cole Beasley. Rhodes was in off coverage -- about 7 yards off the line of scrimmage at the snap -- and Minnesota had safety help in the middle of the field with safety Harrison Smith shading toward Bryant. At the snap, Rhodes dropped off Bryant even more and Bryant ran up field. Bryant faked as if he were going to cut to his right toward the middle of the field, and Smith bit. The hitch-and-go route worked perfectly, with Bryant running right past Smith to open field.

"We had a plan from Day 1 in our game plan, and it hit," Prescott said. "The safety jumped it, and Dez was wide open, and I was able to get him the ball."

Prescott put a little too much on the pass, but Bryant was able to pull it in with his fingertips while on the run. Bryant's momentum took him to the ground. He regained his feet and made it to the 1-yard line for a season-long 56-yard catch.

Ezekiel Elliott punched it into the end zone on the next play.

Vikings Hall of Fame receiver Cris Carter has criticized Bryant at times, saying he's not a good route runner.

Bryant was asked why teams continue to try to cover him by playing off of him near the line of scrimmage at the snap, and the receiver brought up Carter.

"I'm not throwing shots at Cris Carter, but I think I'm a good route runner," Bryant said. "They don't know what they be talking about. I can't believe that. It bothers me, because I was a huge fan [of his]. But he talked bad, just to get his name out there. He is a wideout. He needs to go watch film. I run hell of routes. If you watched the last five games, you will see that."

Bryant was then asked what move he used to get open on the 56-yard catch.

"I want you to go ask Cris Carter that," he quipped.

What's Bryant's answer?

"I made a little move on the safety," he said. "That is all it was."

Bryant's 8-yard touchdown in the fourth quarter came on a simple swing pass to him in the left flat. The Cowboys had first-and-goal from the 8. Rhodes lined up against Bryant, but he was at the 2-yard line at the snap.

Prescott made a quick pass to Bryant, who beat Rhodes to the left corner of the end zone.

"That's something also that we seen," Bryant said. "They play a lot of off coverage and he felt like if they wanted to play off let's have that, we were going to take it and do something with it."

Cowboys are forced to wrestle with a disturbing revelation: Dak Prescott is human

MINNEAPOLIS -- When the discussion turns to the best team in the NFL at the moment, this is not a game the Cowboys want to submit as evidence. When players and fans are tempted to view this 11-game winning streak as a sign of invincibility, they can reflect on what happened Thursday night and return to reality. The Cowboys came up with their worst performance of an otherwise magical season at U.S. Bank Stadium. When quarterback Sam Bradford sailed a pass high on Minnesota's two-point attempt in the waning seconds, the Cowboys heaved a sigh of relief for this 17-15 victory.

It's hard to say Dallas had no business winning the game. The Vikings were so dreadful they can't exactly lay claim to the victory, although they are right to complain about the officials failing to penalize Cowboys defensive tackle Cedric Thornton with a blow to Bradford's head on that final, fateful two-point conversion attempt with 25 seconds remaining.

Let's just say the Cowboys won in spite of themselves.

"It was far from perfect," said receiver Dez Bryant, who came up with two big plays to prevent the Cowboys from losing this game. "I'm pretty sure every guy in this locker room feels like it.

"We're not going to take that away from the win. We're excited, but we're also ready to get back and learn from our mistakes."

Mistakes were plentiful. A Dallas team that has overcome untimely penalties all season was almost overwhelmed by them this evening. Being hit with 10 flags for 78 yards doesn't come close to illustrating the impact of those miscues.

Running back Ezekiel Elliott had a 42-yard run wiped out by a holding call on veteran right tackle Doug Free. A defense desperately seeking turnovers had an interception by linebacker Anthony Hitchens negated because cornerback Orlando Scandrick was called for a hand to the face penalty. Remove those two flags and this game would probably have played out like so many before them for Dallas. But it didn't. The Cowboys endured one self-inflicted wound after another, had a third-and-29 at one point and lost a key third-and-8 conversion to tight end Jason Witten in the fourth quarter because Elliott was called for holding.

"I'm really proud of our team that we stuck with it, even though it wasn't pretty in a lot of ways," said Witten, who finished without a reception. Another disturbing revelation came out of this game.

It turns out Dak Prescott is human. The rookie quarterback had given little evidence of that in the previous 11 games.

But on this night he struggled. Prescott completed 12 of 18 passes for a season-low 139 yards. He didn't throw an interception, but he lost a fumble on a strip sack -- his fourth of the season -- late in the third quarter to give the Vikings the ball on the Cowboys' 19-yard line. Minnesota kicked a field goal less than a minute later to take a 9-7 lead.

Dallas held an eight-point lead with 2:24 left. On third-and-1, which has been close to automatic for the Cowboys this season, Prescott was unable to hold onto the snap from center Travis Frederick. Elliott recovered, but the Cowboys were forced to punt, leading to Minnesota's only touchdown drive of the evening.

That aborted play meant the normally efficient Cowboys' offense was 1 of 9 on third-down conversions.

In fairness, Prescott did come up with some key plays to keep the Cowboys on the winning side of the ledger. His only third-down conversion came on third-and-13 in the second quarter when he ran for 14 yards. Four plays later, he hit Bryant over the top for a 56-yard gain to set up Elliott's 1-yard touchdown plunge on the next play.

After reserve linebacker Kyle Wilber forced and recovered a fumble on a punt to give the Cowboys the ball on the 8-yard line, Prescott wasted no time in hitting Bryant for an 8-yard touchdown and a 14-9 lead.

Prescott was far from spectacular, but he did enough. Barely. Minnesota, meanwhile, gained more yards than the Cowboys. The Vikings won the time of possession and the turnover battle. But in the end they were just as bumbling, if not moreso, than Dallas. A Cowboys team that had lost 13 of 15 games stretching back into last season now finds itself with an 11-game winning streak and control of the conference. Dallas will clinch a playoff spot this weekend if Tampa Bay loses or ties or Washington loses. That would be impossible to believe if you only used Thursday's game as a barometer.

"It was the definition of a team win," safety Barry Church said.

It was, as long as one other word is inserted.

Ugly.

What's trending after Cowboys win

Applying pressure: Up

The Cowboys' inability to apply pressure on opposing quarterbacks has been a sore point. On this night it was Sam Bradford who was sore. A defense that scraped together just two sacks in the previous three games had three (Anthony Hitchens, Benson Mayowa and Maliek Collins) with DeMarcus Lawrence coming close on two others.

Tough night: Down

Doug Free has had a solid season, but Thursday night's game is one he'd like to forget. The veteran right tackle was called for holding on a 43-yard run by Ezekiel Elliott. He let defensive end Brian Robison blow by him late in the third quarter, resulting in a strip sack of Dak Prescott that led to a Vikings field goal.

Style points: Down

A Cowboys offense that has been dominant for most of the season was nothing of the sort this night. A group that recently tied an NFL record by going eight consecutive games with 400 or more yards had just 264 yards against Minnesota's defense. Dallas scored a season-low 17 points and was just 1-of-9 on third-down conversions.

Another efficient day Dak Prescott's passer rating was 108.3 on Thursday. That gives him another rookie record with his 10th game with a quarterback rating of 100 or better. The rundown:

Dak Prescott doppelganger be damned, Kyle Wilber had his big moment in Cowboys' win **DMN**

MINNEAPOLIS – Kyle Wilber isn't used to having 20 reporters waiting at his locker after a game. The veteran linebacker faced that situation after Thursday night's 17-15 win over the Minnesota Vikings.

"I thought y'all confused me for Dak," Wilber said, referring to Dak Prescott.

Many think the two look alike. Reporters have mistaken Wilber for the team's rookie quarterback in the past.

But Thursday night was different. They were there because Wilber was responsible for one of the game's biggest plays.

With just under 11 minutes remaining, the Cowboys punted, trailing 9-7. The Vikings' Adam Thielen fielded it at the Minnesota 11. The Cowboys' Vince Mayle was the first to wrap him up. Wilber was next to finish off the tackle.

On the way down, Wilber knocked the ball loose, and then recovered it.

"Mayle did a great job of laying out and putting his hands on him," Cowboys special teams coordinator Rich Bisaccia said. "Kyle finished with a punch with his right hand, just like they do every day in practice."

The runner was ruled down by contact, but Cowboys coach Jason Garrett challenged the ruling after consulting with Wilber. The call was overturned.

"I was just trying to do my job," Wilber said. "It feels great."

The Cowboys got the ball at the Vikings' 8. Prescott found Dez Bryant for an 8-yard score on the next play.

Turnovers have been tough to come by for the Cowboys. They have forced 11. The Chicago Bears are the only NFC team with less. Dallas failed to force one during the entire month of November. Twelve games into the season and Wilber is now the team's only linebacker to record a takeaway this season.

But don't expect people to stop confusing him for Prescott.

Wilber said it happens every day. Fans yell it from the stands before and after games. Fans have surrounded his car. Recently, a FedEx worker didn't believe him when he said he wasn't Prescott.

Worker: "Hey, you look like Dak."

Wilber: "I'm not Dak."

Worker: "Let me see your driver's license."

Wilber: "I had to give it to him."

Cowboys' monthlong takeaway drought ends just in time

MINNEAPOLIS The Dallas Cowboys finally snapped their takeaway drought, and it couldn't have come at a better time. The Cowboys didn't force a takeaway in their four games in November, and missed chances early against the Minnesota Vikings on Thursday night.

Until early in the fourth quarter when the Cowboys punted.

Linebacker Kyle Wilber forced and then recovered a fumble by Vikings returner Adam Thielen with 10:39 left in the game. Officials initially ruled Thielen down but overturned the call after it was challenged by Cowboys coach Jason Garrett. It was Garrett's first successful challenge this year after going 0-for-2 in his first two tries.

That gave the Cowboys the ball at the Vikings 8, and they scored on the next play on a pass from Dak Prescott to Dez Bryant for a 14-9 lead.

"(Vince) Mayle got there first and tried to get him by the knees, and I just tried to get the ball out. That's what coach emphasizes to us – take away the ball and make a play on special teams that makes a difference," Wilber said.

It was a desperately needed takeaway for a team that hadn't had one in a month.

The Cowboys' defense had chances in the first half but couldn't capitalize.

Safety Byron Jones dropped a potential interception in the second quarter when the Vikings ran their "wildcat" formation and running back Jerick McKinnon threw a poor pass intended for tight end Kyle Rudolph.

Jones read the play perfectly but couldn't come away with it.

On the Vikings' next offensive series, linebacker Anthony Hitchens intercepted a pass by Sam Bradford. But that was wiped away on a penalty by cornerback Orlando Scandrick.

Witten streak ends Jason Witten's franchise-record catch streak ended at 130 consecutive games. The tight end caught a pass on third-and-eight in the fourth quarter, but a holding penalty on Ezekiel Elliott negated the play.

Officially, Witten was not targeted in the game.

The last time Witten didn't catch a pass was Nov. 2, 2008, in a game against the Giants.

Witten had 678 receptions for 7,236 yards and 39 touchdowns during the streak.

Fumble or not? The Cowboys came into the game with only seven giveaways. But they had two fumbles Thursday, losing one. Ezekiel Elliott fumbled on the Cowboys' sixth play from scrimmage on a hit by Linval Joseph. Officials initially ruled a recovery by Vikings linebacker Anthony Barr. But replay overturned the lost fumble.

Elliott has fumbled four times this season but lost just one, in Week 2 against the Redskins.

Receiver Lucky Whitehead was not so fortunate. On the second play of the second quarter, facing a third-and-one, Whitehead got the ball on an end around.

He picked up six yards but lost the ball on a hit by defensive end Everson Griffen. Linebacker Eric Kendricks recovered for Minnesota.

Escobar's bad night The Cowboys have only two tight ends on their roster after Geoff Swaim was lost for the year after being injured in the Philadelphia game. Gavin Escobar played only 29 snaps the first eight games. He had played 47 the past three. The Cowboys worried about his blocking – and it came back to bite them Thursday.

Escobar was penalized for a chop block on defensive end Brian Robison, negating a 7-yard Ezekiel Elliott run. The spot foul resulted in a 14-yard penalty, and the Cowboys ended up punting.

Escobar was called for a holding penalty on the Cowboys' next series on an Elliott run, and Dak Prescott fumbled when sacked on the next play.

Briefly

- Cowboys' opponents are 0-for-6 on 2-point tries this season.
- The Cowboys' 11th consecutive win tied the franchise record for longest winning streak, including combined seasons. The Cowboys have not lost since a 20-19 defeat to the New York Giants in the season opener.

It was ruled a first down on the field. But the Vikings challenged the play and it was reversed, as Prescott was ruled down where he began his slide and not where he landed.

Then on third-and-one, he fumbled the center exchange from Travis Frederick, resulting in running back Ezekiel Elliott being dropped for a loss, forcing a Cowboys punt.

The Vikings would score on the ensuing drive, but the Cowboys survived when the two-point try failed.

But rather than blame Prescott for the early slide, coach Jason Garrett applauded him for making an amazing play.

"I thought he made an amazing play," Garrett said. "Let's start with that. I thought it was an amazing football play to do what he did. The awareness. He knew the situation. He didn't want to throw the ball away to stop the clock. He captures the edge.

Somehow he has the wherewithal to try to stay in bounds in this situation. Those plays happen fast.

"He did a really good job handling that whole play. He has done a good job all year long sliding at the sticks.

"Somehow, some way tonight they felt like he was short of the sticks on that particular play. I thought he made an amazing play. Unfortunately, he slid a tick too short."

Ezekiel Elliott's pace has slowed, now behind Murray's team mark

But having gone a third consecutive game without 100 yards, Elliott is on pace to gain 1,713 yards this season. That would tie Emmitt Smith for third in team history. Smith had 1,713 in 1992.

Murray had 1,845 yards in 2014 when he won offensive player of the year, and Smith had 1,773 in 1995.

Elliott caught four passes for 19 yards Thursday, giving him 105 yards from scrimmage. It marks the ninth 100-yard scrimmage game for Elliott.

"Oh, man, we knew it was going to be a tough game," Elliott said. "We knew they had a great defense. They have one of the best fronts we've seen all year. They're big, athletic. They got good jumps off the ball. We knew we had to come out and limit our mistakes, but we didn't do a good job of that. Honestly, this is not the best game we've played, but it doesn't matter. We showed up and made the plays we needed to, and we got the win."

The Dallas faithful even made a difference on the game-winning play. With Minnesota trying to tie the game on a two-point conversion in the final minute, Cowboys fans got loud enough to force right tackle Jeremiah Sirles to false start.

Ezekiel Elliott noticed.

The extra five yards made things more difficult on Vikings quarterback Sam Bradford, who threw over the head of tight end Kyle Rudolph after being pressured by defensive tackle Cedric Thornton.

Remember, the Cowboys had a 40-1 ratio according to reports at Cleveland.

And 49ers players complained about Cowboys fans taking over a game earlier in the season in San Francisco.

Jason Witten's catch streak ends at 130 games, but he's 'playing for much more than catches'

MINNEAPOLIS -- Cowboys tight end Jason Witten's streak of 130 games with a catch ended Thursday night at Minnesota. It snaps a franchise record and was the fourth-longest by a current NFL player and tied for the 24th longest in NFL history. The last time Witten didn't record a catch came back on Nov. 2, 2008 against the New York Giants. He's since recorded 678 receptions for 7,236 yards and 39 touchdowns.

Witten had one catch negated by a penalty Thursday.

"Those records really don't mean anything," Witten said. "I still have a lot of confidence in my ability and a big part of that is making catches. ... It's just the way the game went. ..I'm thankful and excited to be 11-1 much more than having a catch."

Witten said he didn't remember his last catch-less game in 2008.

"It's a long time," Witten said. "Of course you like to get a catch but I don't remember it and I probably won't remember this one other than we got a win. I'm playing for much more than catches."

Witten, did however, make a grab of sorts. He recovered Minnesota's onside kick attempt at the end of the game.

Briefly: Penalties everywhere

Escobar earned a flag for clipping on a run by Ezekiel Elliott that cost the Cowboys 14 yards. He earned another flag late in the quarter for holding, costing Dallas another 10 yards.

In the fourth quarter, Elliott drew his own flag for holding, wiping out a completion on third down from Dak Prescott to tight end Jason Witten that would've given the Cowboys a first down.

The Cowboys finished with 10 penalties for 78 yards.

Minnesota penalty trouble: A holding penalty late in the first quarter cost Minnesota a chance at finding the end zone first. The Vikings were driving, 3rd and 1 from Dallas' 21. Zach Line, an SMU product, carried the ball up the middle for four yards. But guard Alex Boone was called for a holding penalty to negate the play. Sam Bradford couldn't complete a pass to Kyle Rudolph on the next play. The Vikings had to settled for a 48-yard field goal from Kai Forbath and a 3-0 lead.

The Cowboys also experienced a costly holding penalty early. Dallas running back Ezekiel Elliott broke a 43-yard run to the Minnesota 13 at the end of the first quarter. But right tackle Doug Free drew a flag for a holding penalty. Free and Cowboys coach Jason Garrett visibly disagreed with the call.

Cowboys' defense stellar at stopping two-point attempts

MINNEAPOLIS The Dallas Cowboys' defense doesn't have a great pass rush and doesn't take the ball away often. But they have excelled in one area – preventing two-point conversions. The Cowboys have not allowed an opposing team to convert a two-point conversion this season. The Minnesota Vikings became the latest to fail at that on Thursday night, as the Cowboys have now stopped all six two-point tries against them. But the stop against the Vikings proved to be a game-deciding play. Minnesota had just scored a touchdown to make it a 17-15 game, and a successful two-point conversion likely would have meant overtime. The Cowboys, though, stepped up. They got pressure on Vikings quarterback Sam Bradford, who airtailed a pass intended for Kyle Rudolph. "That just goes back to our preparation throughout the week," cornerback Brandon Carr said. "We've been repping these situations from two-minute to all types of end of game situations since Day 1. And they show up. Coach always preaches about it. "They show up in the ball game." The Pittsburgh Steelers were 0-for-4 in their two-point attempts against the Cowboys, and the Washington Redskins failed on their only try during the Thanksgiving Day game. Minnesota became the latest. The Vikings had a false start penalty that pushed them back to the 7, and Bradford found himself under heavy pressure early in the play. Cowboys defensive tackle Cedric Thornton was the first to Bradford, who wanted to get a facemask or hands to the face penalty on the play. But that penalty wasn't called and the Cowboys' defense celebrated what would become their 11th straight victory. "The D-line just played hard all night and made plays throughout the night and really did a good job finding a way to get pressure," linebacker Sean Lee said. "I think that kept points off the board."

Dez ties Michael Irvin's TD mark but says Cowboys' goal is bigger

MINNEAPOLIS It was fitting that Hall of Fame receiver Michael Irvin was on hand at U.S. Bank Stadium for the 17-15 victory against the Minnesota Vikings when Dez Bryant caught the 65th touchdown pass of his career. It tied Bryant with Irvin for second-most TD catches in Cowboys history. Irvin, who wore No. 88 before Bryant, gave him a hug and encouraging words as he walked to the sideline after the touchdown. But, as he told Irvin after the game, the record means nothing to him, as the Cowboys, who extended their win streak to 11 games and have the league's best record at 11-1, have bigger goals. "He talked about the record and he talked about our previous conversations in the offseason, talking about the squad and stuff like that," Bryant said of Irvin. "He was excited about the touchdown record. Like I told him, that's not what's important right now. Our goal is way much more bigger than that." Hall of Famer Bob Hayes is the team's all-time leader with 71, and Bryant is sure to match him as well. But Bryant continues to be focused on what the Cowboys have going on and the dream of reaching the Super Bowl for the first time since 1995, the last of three Super Bowl title teams Irvin was a part of. "I'm not even looking at that," Bryant said. "Like I said what we have in this locker room is bigger than the record." Bryant caught four passes for 84 yards against the Vikings, including a 56-yarder to set up a touchdown when he put a double move on safety Harrison Smith. He was especially passionate about the later, considering that Vikings Hall of Fame receiver Cris Carter had criticized his route running. Bryant says he has lost respect for Carter. "It bothers me because I was a huge fan," Bryant said. "But he talked bad ... just to get his name out there. He is a wideout. He needs to go watch film. I run helluva routes. If you watched the last five games you will see that." Since returning from a hairline fracture in his knee, causing him to miss three games, Bryant has 22 catches for 400 yards and five touchdowns over the past six games.

Eye surgery causes Vikings coach Mike Zimmer to miss game against Cowboys

Mike Zimmer did not coach for the Minnesota Vikings in Thursday night's game against Dallas at U.S. Bank Stadium after having emergency eye surgery Wednesday night. Special teams coordinator Mike Priefer served as interim head coach. General manager Rick Spielman made the announcement in a conference call Thursday morning.

"The most important thing is the concern for Coach Zimmer and his health," Spielman said. "I expressed to him specifically that potentially going blind in one eye is not worth one game in the NFL."

Wednesday's surgery was to repair a detached retina in Zimmer's right eye, his third surgery since early November. Spielman said Zimmer had been doing fine all week until he had trouble seeing during a team walk-through Wednesday afternoon. Zimmer scratched his right eye during the Vikings' 20-10 loss at Chicago on Oct. 31 and had surgery to fix a torn retina on Nov. 1. He had a second surgery on Nov. 8.

Spielman said the third surgery was scheduled after a follow-up visit to the doctor on Thursday morning. Thursday was the first time Zimmer has missed a game in 23 years as an NFL assistant and head coach.

"As much as he wants to be out there coaching, it's in his best interests to get this taken care of," Spielman said.

"As hard-headed as he is, and as tough-minded as he is, we've had some pretty significant talks, one-on-one, heart-to-heart, on what is important in life. ... You have to look out for what's best for you, and that's the No. 1 concern. He finally came to realize that, but it's difficult for him to handle, because of his personality, because of his perseverance, because of him wanting to be out there."

Spielman declined to speculate on whether Zimmer could miss more than Thursday's game, saying the Vikings are taking his situation a day at a time.

Zimmer was a Dallas assistant from 1994-2006, serving as defensive coordinator the final seven seasons.

Wilber's forced fumble highlights solid night for Cowboys' special teams

MINNEAPOLIS The Dallas Cowboys work on taking the ball away on a daily basis. It's part of what they call their EDDs (every day drills).

So it's no surprise that linebacker Kyle Wilber had his eye on punching the ball loose early in the fourth quarter when the Cowboys were forced to punt. And he did just that, stripping the ball from Vikings returner Adam Thielen and recovering it. Receiver Vince Mayle had Thielen wrapped up, and Wilber got there just before Thielen's knee hit the ground. Thielen had been initially ruled down, but coach Jason Garrett challenged and the call was overturned.

The Cowboys scored the go-ahead touchdown on the next play and ended up holding on for a 17-15 victory on Thursday night at U.S. Bank Stadium.

"Mayle got there first and tried to get him by the knees, and I just tried to get the ball out," Wilber said. "That's what coach emphasizes to us – take away the ball and make a play on special teams that makes a difference. So I'm just trying to do my job."

Said special teams coordinator Rich Bisaccia: "Mayle did a great job of laying out and putting his hands on him, and Kyle finished with a punch with his right hand, just like they do every day in practice."

The entire special teams did their job for the Cowboys all night.

Outside of Thielen, the Vikings have a dangerous return man in Cordarrelle Patterson. Patterson had a touchdown return against them in the 2015 preseason.

On Thursday night, though, Patterson only had three kickoff returns for 80 yards, including a long of 35.

"I told them after the game, every time he touches the ball, I age 5 years on the sideline," Bisaccia said, smiling. "He hit us for a big one in a preseason game a year ago, so we have a lot of respect for him and the way he plays. ... I thought we did a good job."

Vikings came to plunder, but Cowboys survive another test

MINNEAPOLIS Absent their Norse ruler, Zimmer the Ill-Tempered, the Minnesota Vikings took the field Thursday night visibly primed to plunder, pillage and de-Prescott the Dallas Cowboys.

They almost pulled it off.

In due part to the miracle of super-high-definition television, review officials were able to determine that a fourth quarter punt return by Adam Thielen was, instead, a fumble and a Dallas recovery, setting the scene for Dak Prescott's winning touchdown pass to Dez Bryant.

The 17-15 victory was the Cowboys' 11th in a row, but clearly it came with furrowed brows and sweaty palms. The Vikings defense — and their stunning new home, U.S. Bank Stadium — performed as advertised.

With viking horns and a stadium record throng of 66,860 ringing in its ears, the Cowboys offense managed only 13 first downs and 264 yards — by far its lowest production of the season.

Three quarters into the loud night, the game had seen only one touchdown, and the Cowboys' only noteworthy plays had been a 14-yard scramble by Prescott and a 56-yard, down-the-middle diving grab by Dez Bryant.

THE 17-15 VICTORY WAS THE COWBOYS' 11TH IN A ROW, BUT CLEARLY IT CAME WITH FURROWED BROWS AND SWEATY PALMS. THE VIKINGS DEFENSE — AND THEIR STUNNING NEW HOME, U.S. BANK STADIUM — PERFORMED AS ADVERTISED.

And it wasn't getting any quieter. Before the game, the Vikings paid tribute on the stadium's giant video board to their absent leader, head coach Mike Zimmer, who underwent emergency eye surgery Wednesday.

Zimmer's message on the video: Do your job. And the Vikings' defense stoutly did.

As many Cowboys fans may have noticed, Zimmer, Bill Parcells' former defensive coordinator in Dallas, can be prickly and intense at times. But he has fast become one of the league's best head coaches.

Robbed of Adrian Peterson and starting quarterback Teddy Bridgewater, Zimmer somehow has kept the Vikings afloat at 6-6. They've done it with defense, the NFL's third-best in both fewest yards allowed and turnovers.

Aside from Bryant's 56-yard catch and a 30-yard run by Ezekiel Elliott, Prescott and the Cowboys' offense labored all night long. Prescott was sacked three times and fumbled twice, losing one of them and having the other overturned by replay. Penalties added to the burden.

"It certainly wasn't our prettiest performance on offense," said coach Jason Garrett. "Our inability to convert on third downs and the penalties that we had that got us behind the chains all night."

On a cold night on the Mississippi, the heat was turned on Prescott from the opening possession. The Cowboys, except for the end of each half, had the football 11 times during the night, and eight of them began inside their 30-yard line. Only one Dallas drive netted more than 37 yards.

And when you're only making 13 first downs over 60 minutes, you need help.

Some of it came from Minnesota punter Jeff Locke, whose best kicks kept back-spinning in the visitors' favor.

The other helping hand came from the combination of the Cowboys' bend-but-don't-implode defense and the sputtering inconsistencies of the Vikings offense, quarterbacked by Sam Bradford.

Bradford threw for 247 yards, completing 32 of 45, but it was Prescott who consistently seemed to keep the Cowboys focused and chipping away.

"It wasn't a clean game," Prescott confessed, "but nobody ever flinched, blinked or thought anything different was going to happen besides us winning the game and making the plays to do that."

The rookie quarterback nearly made one of those with a cool-headed scramble down the right sideline for an apparent first down with 2:24 to go. Not only did Prescott appear to have the first down, which might have protected a 17-9 victory, but he also slid and remained in bounds, keeping the clock moving.

"I thought it was an amazing football play — the awareness — to do what he did," Garrett observed.

A challenge by the Vikings, however, determined that Prescott had started his slide before the first-down marker. The Vikings got the ball back for one last drive.

"They came out and they punched," Minnesota cornerback Captain Munnerlyn said. "We punched back. In the end it just slipped away."

The Vikings rightly howled about a personal foul that wasn't called on their attempted game-tying two-point conversion. But on a night when 18 total penalties were called against the two teams, singing out the few that weren't called seemed an exercise in frustration.

In any case, the Cowboys defense thwarted the two-point attempt and saved the night, as tough a night as they've had all season. The road to 11-1 and the top of the NFC figured to have its Vikings and potholes.

For the rookie Prescott, however, it was another night, another lesson. Even on a night when he and the young Cowboys weren't at their best, they found a way. Again.

If defense wins championships, Minnesota game showed there's still hope for the Cowboys

MINNEAPOLIS — If defense wins championships, there's still hope for the Dallas Cowboys. Barely. And only against certain offenses, I suppose.

It's not that defense is ever going to be the overwhelming strength of this team. But on a night where Dak Prescott fumbled and Lucky Whitehead fumbled and Ezekiel Elliott fumbled (but got it back) and Dak fumbled again (but Zeke got that one, too), the Cowboys needed considerably more help from their defense than usual to escape with a 17-15 victory and their 11-game win streak intact.

For 58 minutes, Dallas kept the Vikings out of the end zone and held a 17-9 lead. Then this defense did what it did all too often in the lost season of 2015. It wilted at the absolute worst time.

Sam Bradford marched the Vikings 65 yards in nine plays for the home team's only touchdown with 25 seconds to go.

The partisan crowd of 66,860 at U.S. Bank Stadium (although there were plenty of Cowboys fans too) let out their heartiest cheer. But Dallas still had one card up its sleeve.

The Cowboys somehow have established themselves as the masters of the two-point conversion defense. Remember Pittsburgh where Ben Roethlisberger and the Steelers' went 0-for-4 on two-point tries in a 35-30 defeat?

Well, the Vikings never really had a chance after tackle Jeremiah Sirles was called for a false start. Moved back to the seven-yard line, Bradford drew heavy pressure before firing the ball out the back of the end zone. Cowboys tackle Cedric Thornton clearly hit Bradford in the helmet on the play, but no flag was thrown.

Long winning streaks usually contain a bit of luck, too.

The Cowboys collected three sacks and hit Bradford or hurried him on numerous other plays, taking advantage of Minnesota's awful situation at tackle -- one that may have driven coordinator Norv Turner to abandon ship a month ago.

"We were able to rush four instead of three tonight and that helps," defensive end Tyrone Crawford said. "With Barry Church back, we felt comfortable with four. We had to hold it down on the defensive side."

Dallas will maintain its perch high atop the NFC at 11-1, perhaps gaining even more ground this weekend when the New York Giants, their closest competitors at 8-3, travel to Pittsburgh. But this game looked absolutely nothing like what we have seen since mid-September. In the first 10 games of this franchise-record win streak, the Cowboys scored at least 24 points in each victory. They scored 30 or more half the time.

It wasn't until a late fumbled punt recovered by Kyle Wilber at the Vikings' eight-yard line that the Cowboys surged into double digits Thursday night. Dez Bryant's eight-yard touchdown pass from Prescott gave Dallas a 14-9 lead.

Dan Bailey added a field goal and it looked like the Cowboys' eight-point lead would hold up against a Vikings' offense that is something short of electric without Adrian Peterson. But it hadn't been this kind of awful this season.

A team that scored 30 two weeks ago against Arizona and scored 31 earlier this season against Houston, the Vikings have always managed at least 10 points. So playing against what is supposed to be an average defense that lives off its ball-control offense, you would have expected Minnesota to produce more than three Kai Forbath field goals.

But that was it for 58 minutes.

The last drive was something else. Although the Cowboys seemed to pressure Bradford on most plays, receivers found ample running room against Dallas' soft coverage.

And so it became a game once again, but that's what happens on the road. It's probably something you should expect against a team that was the NFC's hot team before the Cowboys became the NFC's hot team. Minnesota was 5-0 before it all came unglued, and now the Vikings at 6-6 are probably a long shot to make the playoffs.

The Cowboys can actually clinch a spot this weekend if either Tampa Bay or Washington gets beat, and while that's probably not cause for a parade -- reaching the post-season has been a foregone conclusion for at least a month, right? -- it tells you something about how consistently this team has performed. Clinching a playoff berth with a quarter of the season remaining is rare, even for the finest teams.

It's next week that the Cowboys can do even more damage when they travel to New York. A win over the Giants would have Dallas on the doorstep of wrapping up the top seed for the NFC playoffs, which has to be the only goal for this team right now. On Thursday night, the Cowboys flirted with being described as a complete team as they held Minnesota to field goals almost the entire night. They didn't finish the job, no. But their shortcomings -- minor compared to the rest of the conference -- are merely the things that keep you from perfection. Winning remains well within their grasp.

Cowboys show only perfect game will beat them

MINNEAPOLIS -- Context is everything, in football and in life, and so it was fascinating Thursday night to hear two entirely different perspectives on the events at U.S. Bank Stadium.

In the winning team's locker room, the Dallas Cowboys were celebrating the return of their defense and the emerging grittiness of their competitive spirit.

"We were able to execute our game plan perfectly," Cowboys safety Barry Church said. "Once we got them bogged down, we had them."

In the losing team's locker room, the Minnesota Vikings were lamenting another punchless offensive performance and suggesting the outcome would have been different were it not for any one of a series of errors.

"That was a game we should have won," Vikings defensive end Everson Griffen said. "We fought and it was self-inflicted."

So which was it? Did the Cowboys take another step on their march to the Super Bowl in a 17-15 victory over the Vikings? Or were they simply fortunate to have faced a flawed team that was playing without the head coach, offensive coordinator, quarterback, running back and offensive tackles with which it opened training camp?

The answer, from my perspective, is both. The Cowboys, who pushed their winning streak to 11 games, are having the NFL's best season. But they were on the ropes Thursday night in a number of instances, and only the Vikings' offensive ineptitude -- and a key special-teams fumble -- got them home.

Amid all the debate about how good the Cowboys might be, we can say this: You're toast if you make mistakes against them.

"Really what they're doing right now is finishing," Vikings linebacker Chad Greenway said. "That's why their record is what it is. That's why they're a good football team. As long as they do that, they're a team that can go as far as they want to go. They make the plays when they have chances. The couple instances we had, we missed them."

Indeed, the Vikings entered the game averaging an NFL-worst 4.74 yards per play, and they once again struggled for every first down they could muster Thursday night. The Cowboys' defense, which had given up an average of 24.3 points and 409.8 yards in its previous three games, looked revived by comparison.

In truth, the Vikings missed on multiple chances to exploit the Cowboys in ways that the Washington Redskins, Baltimore Ravens and Pittsburgh Steelers had in recent weeks. Receiver Cordarrelle Patterson had a 31-yard reception in the first quarter wiped out by penalty, and Charles Johnson dropped what would have been at least a 25-yard gain on second-and-18 in the fourth quarter.

Tight end Kyle Rudolph couldn't bring in a difficult but catchable pass in the end zone in the second quarter. Right tackle Jeremiah Sirles jumped offside to push back a two-point conversion attempt that ultimately failed. Punt returner Adam Thielen lost a fumble at the Vikings' 8-yard line in the fourth quarter, and cornerback Xavier Rhodes inexplicably lined up 10 yards off receiver Dez Bryant on the next play.

Quarterback Dak Prescott noticed it right away, feeding Bryant a quick pass as the Cowboys scored what would be the winning touchdown.

Did the Cowboys create those opportunities? For the most part, a dispassionate observer would say, the answer is no. But they accepted them all, capitalized on enough and overcame a few of their own -- two turnovers, 10 penalties -- to win.

"It wasn't a clean game but nobody ever flinched," Prescott said. "Nobody blinked or thought anything else was going to happen other than we were going to win and make the plays to do that."

Back in the Cowboys' locker room, tight end Jason Witten was expounding on the pleasant surprise this season has turned into. What began with devastation -- quarterback Tony Romo's preseason back injury -- has progressed to the point where the Cowboys could earn the NFL's first 2016 playoff spot. (They'll clinch if either the Redskins or Tampa Bay Buccaneers lose this weekend.)

During the offseason, Witten recalled, the Cowboys analyzed their 4-12 performance in 2015. Half of their losses, they realized, were by one score or less. They weren't as far off, they concluded, as their record indicated.

"We spent a lot of time ... talking about one-possession games in the fourth [quarter]," Witten said. "We came up on the other side of them a lot. A lot of the time, you reflect back and you say, 'They were 4-12.' But you don't think that 10 or 11 of those games were one possession. I'm really proud of our team, that we stuck with it, even though it wasn't pretty in a lot of ways."

The Cowboys are unquestionably good. On Thursday night, they were fortunate. In a league in which games are decided by seemingly random events as much as they are by clear superiority, you need both attributes to be great. The Cowboys are just about there. So it goes.

For third time in 12 days, Cowboys find a way to win

MINNEAPOLIS -- Sean Lee's voice was scratchy from a cold he picked up a couple of days ago, but he sounded worse than he felt. On Thursday, the Dallas Cowboys won their third game in 12 days, beating the Minnesota Vikings 17-15.

"We found ways to win tough games against good teams," Lee said. "That's, I think, a sign of what our team has been all year."

On Nov. 20, they beat the Baltimore Ravens 27-17, dominating the time of possession and Dez Bryant grabbing two touchdown passes. Four days later, they beat the Washington Redskins 31-26, despite their defense giving up more than 500 yards.

On Thursday against the Vikings, the offense had its roughest outing of 2016, with season lows in points, yards (264) and first downs (13), but the defense had timely stops and the special teams came up with the most important play of the game: a Kyle Wilber forced fumble and recovery on Adam Thielen in the fourth quarter.

One play later, Bryant had an 8-yard touchdown to give the Cowboys a 14-9 lead with 10 minutes, 22 seconds to play.

"This team is not just one unit," Wilber said. "It's all three of our units fighting for each other. If the offense lags, the defense has to pick it up. If the defense lags, special teams has to pick it up. It's the epitome of a team win."

It's what will make the Cowboys a tough out the rest of the way.

"I like to use the word 'fight' as much as 'resilience,'" coach Jason Garrett said. "We just kept battling. We kept fighting. And individually guys came back, the units came back to overcome different things. As a team we kept picking each other up.

Scratch and claw and fight, it's the foundation of what we try and do each and every day with the Cowboys."

Mostly this season the Cowboys have won with their offense. But Thursday they struggled. Ezekiel Elliott finished with 86 yards on 20 carries and had a 42-yard run wiped out by a penalty, but his runs were hard. Bryant had his fourth touchdown in the past five games and had a 56-yard catch, but the Cowboys could not sustain their work for long stretches.

That they won without their offense starring shows they have a variety of ways to win games.

Before Thursday, the fewest yards they had in a game were 328 in the season-opening loss to the New York Giants. Before Thursday, the fewest points were 19 against the Giants. Before Thursday, the fewest first downs were 21 against the Cincinnati Bengals. Before Thursday, the worst third-down production was a 3-for-11 showing against the Green Bay Packers.

Penalties took away big plays at big times. While the defense did not record a takeaway, it was able to record three sacks and hit Minnesota quarterbacks Sam Bradford and Shaun Hill nine more times. The Cowboys made the Vikings work for their yards and then were able to withstand a possible two-point play that would have tied the game with 25 seconds to go.

Teams are now 0-for-6 against the Cowboys on two-point plays on the season.

"It comes down to the fight part of it," cornerback Brandon Carr said. "It's two points and the game is on the line. We all stand up and don't want the ball caught up on us."

The Cowboys are off until Monday, a well-deserved break. By the time they report back to work, they could have a playoff spot clinched if the Redskins or Buccaneers lose Sunday, but at different corners of the locker room Thursday they talked about bigger things to come. If their seasons ends with a Super Bowl, they can look at this 12-day stretch as a defining period.

"I think the way we won all three of them, they were different games and that's hard to do," tight end Jason Witten said. "I think that's the thing that says the most about our team. Just the ability to lock in to that game and out it behind you and move forward. Now we can take a deep breath a little bit. Not relax. We understand there's more down the stretch. These next four will be big games."

Cowboys show toughness when things weren't easy

MINNEAPOLIS -- Jason Garrett likes to talk about toughness and finishing. His Dallas Cowboys showed their toughness by winning their third game in 12 days on Thursday night, 17-15 over the Minnesota Vikings. They showed they could finish by stopping a two-point conversion with 25 seconds left to secure their 11th straight win.

In their previous 10 games the Cowboys made things look rather easy offensively. This one was anything but.

The Vikings limited Dallas to season lows in yards, points, first downs and third-down conversions, but the Cowboys left U.S. Bank Stadium triumphant as a much-needed 10-day break awaits. With the win, the Cowboys are in position to clinch a playoff spot on Sunday if the Tampa Bay Buccaneers lose or tie, or if the Washington Redskins lose. But they won't have the NFC East under control because the New York Giants, whom the Cowboys play on Dec. 11 at MetLife Stadium, are still in it, having won six straight. The break comes at a good time for Dallas.

A team that entered Thursday without a turnover in 178 snaps turned the ball over twice, with Lucky Whitehead and Dak Prescott fumbling. A team that kept penalties to a minimum for most of the season committed them at the wrong time, one negating a 42-yard run by Ezekiel Elliott and the other wiping out what would have been Jason Witten's only catch of the game. A team that had always figured things out never quite could Thursday.

But the game changed when the Cowboys did another thing they don't normally do: take the ball away.

It wasn't the defense that forced the turnover -- it was the special teams. And the team needed a replay challenge from Garrett for it to come. It was clear Kyle Wilber poked the ball free from Adam Thielen on Chris Jones' punt, and it was clear Wilber recovered the ball. It took the Cowboys one play to take the lead for good, with Prescott and Dez Bryant connecting on an 8-yard touchdown. It was Bryant's fifth touchdown in the past five games and the 65th of his career, tying Michael Irvin for second-most in team history. The next time the Cowboys got the ball, Elliott ripped off a 30-yard run to set up Dan Bailey's 39-yard field goal with 4:15 to play. But with a chance to end the game, Prescott fumbled a snap on third-and-1. Elliott recovered the ball, but the Cowboys were forced to punt and hope their defense would make a play. Minnesota was able to get within the two-point try of tying the game, but while the defense bent in giving up Jerick McKinnon's touchdown catch, it did not break on the two-point attempt. Cedric Thornton pressured Sam Bradford, his former Philadelphia Eagles teammate, into a high throw.

It wasn't easy, but it's not supposed to be easy. All that matters is the Cowboys have all but clinched a playoff appearance with their 11th win in a row.
