## ARIZONA CARDINALS (6-8-1) VS. LOS ANGELES RAMS (4-11) L.A. Memorial Coliseum | Jan. 1, 2017 | 2:25 PM



### THIS WEEK'S GAME

The Cardinals conclude the 2016 season this week with a trip to Los Angeles to face the Rams at the LA Memorial Coliseum. It will be the Cardinals first road game against the Los Angeles Rams since 1994, when they met in Anaheim in the season opener.

Last week, Arizona defeated the Seahawks 34-31 at CenturyLink Field to improve its record to 6-8-1. The victory marked the Cardinals second straight win at Seattle and third in the last four years. QB Carson Palmer improved to 3-0 as Arizona's starting QB in Seattle.

The Cardinals jumped out to a 14-0 lead after Palmer connected with J.J. Nelson on an 80-yard TD pass in the second quarter and they held a 14-3 lead at the half. The Seahawks offense found its stride in the second half, but the Cardinals continued to answer and held a 31-18 lead with 4:10 remaining. However, Seattle stormed back to tie the game at 31 with one minute left, missing an extra point that would have given them the lead. Palmer then led Arizona down the field, connecting with RB David Johnson on two passes for a total of 42 yards and K Chandler Catanzaro drilled a 43-yard FG as time expired to deliver the victory.

Johnson totaled 136 yards from scrimmage (95 rushing, 41 receiving), giving him 100+ scrimmage yards for the 15th consecutive game, which ties Barry Sanders (1997) for the longest streak in NFL history in a single season. He also ran for three TDs, setting new single-season franchise records with 20 total TDs and 16 rushing TDs.

The Cardinals defense sacked Seahawks QB Russell Wilson six times. LB Markus Golden led the way with two to give him 10.0 sacks on the season, while DT Rodney Gunter had a sack on a fourth-and-goal in the second quarter and also blocked a FG attempt in the first quarter.

Los Angeles (4-11) lost its sixth straight game last week, falling 22-21 to the 49ers. The Rams held a 21-7 lead in the fourth quarter before San Francisco rallied, scoring a TD and a go-ahead two-point conversion with 31 seconds remaining.

## CARDS-RAMS CONNECTIONS

### Rams Connections

Cardinals College Scouting Coordinator **Debbie Pollom** spent 21 seasons (1992-2012) with the Rams organization, including the final 12 years as Director of Scouting Administration.

Cardinals Area Scout **John Mancini** is in his fourth year with the Cardinals after spending the previous 18 seasons with the Rams, including from 1997-2012 in the team's personnel department.

Cardinals Scout **Darius Vinnett** signed with the Rams as a rookie free agent in 2007 and played in eight games that season.

### Cardinals Connections

Rams Interim Head Coach **John Fassel** is the son of former NFL head coach Jim Fassel, who was the Cards offensive coordinator in 1996.

Rams Asst. Head Coach **Dave McGinnis** was the Cardinals head coach from 2000-03 after serving as defensive coordinator from 1996-2000.

Rams LBs coach **Frank Bush** served as LBs coach with the Cardinals from 2004-06 and added the title of assistant head coach in 2006.

Rams Senior Defensive Assistant **Chuck Cecil** spent the 1993 season with the Cardinals and played his college football at the University of Arizona. After beginning his career as a walk-on at Arizona, he went on to earn All-American honors and was named Pac-10 Defensive Player of the Year in 1987. He was inducted into the Wildcats Hall of Fame in 1993.

Rams Assistant D-Line coach **Clyde Simmons** played for the Cardinals from 1994-95, starting all 32 games in two seasons and collecting 17.0 sacks. His 11.0 sacks in 1995 are tied for the 10th-highest single-season total in Cardinals history.

Rams SS **T.J. McDonald** is the son of former Cardinal safety Tim McDonald, who played for the team from 1987-92. Tim McDonald was a teammate of Cardinals RBs coach **Stump Mitchell** from 1987-89 and then played with Cardinals D-Line coach **Brentson Buckner** in San Francisco from 1998-99.

Rams Director of Pro Personnel **Ran Carthon** is the son of former Cardinals running backs coach **Maurice Carthon** (2007-08).

### Los Angeles/California Connections

Cardinals QB **Carson Palmer** (1998-2002) and DT **Frostee Rucker** (2003-05) both played their college football at USC. Palmer won the Heisman Trophy with the Trojans in 2002 while Rucker was part of USC's back-to-back national championship teams in 2003 and 2004.

The following Cardinals are from the Los Angeles area: G **Taylor Boggs** (Pasadena), LS **Aaron Brewer** (Fullerton), TE **Darren Fells** (Fullerton), QB **Carson Palmer** (Rancho Santa Margarita) and DT **Frostee Rucker** (Tustin).

Cardinals Pass Rush Specialist **Tom Pratt** served as the defensive line coach with the Kansas City Chiefs when they played the Green Bay Packers in Super Bowl I at the L.A. Memorial Coliseum.

Rams SS **Maurice Alexander** played at Arizona Western College from 2009-10 before transferring to Utah State, where he was a teammate of Cardinals RB **Kerwyn Williams** in 2011.

Rams G **Cody Wichmann** was born in Tucson.

Rams RBs coach **Skip Peete** is a Phoenix native, and he played two seasons at the University of Arizona from 1981-82.

Rams Defensive Quality Control coach **Jeff Imamura** was the D-line coach at Northern Arizona from 2000-02.

Rams National Scout **Ted Monago** graduated from Arizona State University and was a walk-on defensive back from 1990-92. He then spent two years (1994-96) as a graduate assistant and quality control coach for the ASU football team.

## SERIES BREAKDOWN

This week's matchup between the Cardinals and Rams marks the 76th all-time meeting between the two teams during the regular season. The Cardinals hold a 37-36-2 advantage in the series and have won 14 of the last 20 matchups.

The rivalry between the Cardinals and Rams dates back to 1937 when the Cardinals were located in Chicago and the Rams were based in Cleveland. Since the division realignment in 2002, the Cards hold a 16-13 advantage against the Rams.

Arizona has a 19-19 record when playing on the road in the series, and has won nine of its last 11 away from home. This week, the Cardinals play at L.A. Memorial Coliseum for the first time since 1989 (vs. the Raiders) and for the first time against the Rams since 1979. The Cardinals last win against the Rams at Memorial Coliseum came in 1976.

## CARDS RESUME RIVALRY IN L.A.

This week's matchup between the Cardinals and Rams marks the 76th all-time regular season meetings between the two teams in a rivalry that dates back to 1937, when the Cardinals were based in Chicago and the Rams played in Cleveland.

### Notes on the Series Between the Cardinals and Los Angeles Rams

- The Cardinals will play road game the Los Angeles Rams since September 4th, 1994 when they squared off in Anaheim. That was also the first game the Cardinals ever played as the "Arizona Cardinals." The team spent its first six seasons in Arizona as the Phoenix Cardinals.

- On Sunday, it will have been 8,155 days (or 22 years, 3 months, 28 days) since the Cardinals last played a road game against the Los Angeles Rams.

- There are four players on the Cardinals current roster who were born within a month of that game being played, including two who weren't even born yet.

DT **Robert Nkemidiche** (9/19/94) was born 15 days after the game

T **Givens Price** (10/3/94) was born 29 days after.

LB **Scooby Wright III** (8/28/94) was exactly one week old

WR **Marquis Bundy** (8/5/94) was 30 days old.

- This week's game will mark the Cardinals 13th regular season appearance at the L.A. Memorial Coliseum and first since 12/10/89 when they faced the then-L.A. Raiders. The Cardinals first played at the Coliseum on 11/17/46 vs. the Rams. That was the year (1946) the Rams relocated to Los Angeles from Cleveland.

- The Cardinals and Rams faced each other 30 times in the regular season between 1946-94 when the Rams were based in Los Angeles. They also met in an NFC Divisional playoff matchup during the 1975 season.

- The Cardinals hold a 12-17-2 record against the L.A. Rams.

## FITZ VS. THE RAMS & OTHER NOTES

In 25 career games against the Rams, WR **Larry Fitzgerald** has compiled 158 receptions for 1,847 yards and 16 TDs. Fitzgerald has more receptions (158) against the Rams than he has against any other NFL franchise.

In fact, in NFL history only Jerry Rice (175 vs. Falcons; 166 vs. Rams) has more receptions against any single opponent.

## RETURN TO THEIR COLLEGE GLORY

The Cardinals season finale is also a homecoming of sorts for QB **Carson Palmer** and DT **Frostee Rucker**. Both are from the Los Angeles area and attended USC, where they played at the L.A. Memorial Coliseum. Today will mark their first game back at the stadium since their college careers ended more than a decade ago.

Palmer, a native of Rancho Santa Margarita, went to USC from 1998-2002 and left as one of the premier players in the school's decorated history. He set more than 20 school records during his career with the Trojans, and became the fifth player (and first QB) in program history to win the Heisman Trophy when he received the award as a senior in 2002.



Overall, Palmer played in 53 games and threw for 11,818 yards and 72 TDs on 927-of-1,569 passing during his five years as a Trojan, ending his college career as the Pac-10 Conference's all-time leader in passing yards, total offense, completions and attempts. As a senior, he helped start USC's run of seven consecutive BCS bowl appearances when he led the team to an 11-2 record and a victory in the Orange Bowl. Prior to this week's game, Palmer's last appearance at the Coliseum was a memorable one, as he went 32-of-46 for 425 yards and four TDs to lead the sixth-ranked Trojans to a dominant 44-13 win over No. 7 Notre Dame on Nov. 30, 2002. The win secured their Orange Bowl bid and helped propel Palmer to the Heisman Trophy.

Rucker, a Tustin native, played at USC from 2002-05, sitting out his first season as a transfer from Colorado State before helping the Trojans go 37-2 over his three years of action. They went 12-1 and earned a share of the national championship in 2003, finished 13-0 and won another national title in 2004 and had a 12-0 regular season in 2005 before losing the BCS Championship Game to Texas. Rucker's last game at the Coliseum was on Dec. 3, 2005 when he started at defensive end and helped the Trojans earn a 66-19 victory over No. 11 UCLA to clinch their spot in the national championship game.



## LAST WEEK'S GAME

### CARDINALS 34, Seahawks 31 December 24, 2016 – CenturyLink Field (69,050)

This week 16 Christmas eve game in Seattle was a match-up of teams in different situations. The Cards had been eliminated from postseason contention the week before while Seattle had a #2 seed and first-round bye on the line. But an Arizona team depleted on both sides of the ball built an early lead thanks to a smothering defense that sacked Russell Wilson 5 times in the 1st half. They would lose the lead late but rally to hand SEA its only home loss of the season. Carson Palmer played a turnover free-game and was sacked just once behind a makeshift offensive line that helped the offense score 34 points against a Seattle D ranked #2 in the NFL in points allowed (16.8). RB David Johnson would score 3 times to set franchise single-season records for overall and rushing TDs. He also gained over 100 scrimmage yards for the 15th straight game to tie Barry Sanders' NFL record.

Calais Campbell provided the game's 1st big play on SEA's opening drive when he recovered a fumble at the SEA23. An 11-yard JJ Nelson catch took it to the 2 and Johnson ran it in from there. Late in the 1st, DT Rodney Gunter blocked Steven Hauschka's 45-yard FG try to preserve the 7-0 lead. It remained that way until late in the 2nd when Palmer went deep to JJ Nelson for an 80-yard TD pass, the longest by an opponent at CenturyLink Field. Down 14-0, the Seahawks responded. A play after a 31-yard Doug Baldwin completion moved it to the AZ29, Wilson completed a pass to WR Tyler Lockett that was initially ruled a TD but after replay review was spotted at the 1. From there the Cards D stopped SEA on 3 straight plays setting up 4th-n-goal from the 1. SEA went for it but Gunter knifed up the middle to drop Wilson for a 7-yard loss. Two plays later, a flawed exchange led to a fumble that SEA recovered at the AZ9 with :32 left in the half. The AZ defense again rose up and after 3 straight incompletions, Hauschka's 27-yard FG made it 14-3 at intermission.

Late in the 3rd, Alex Okafor blocked a SEA punt and on the ensuing series Johnson's 1-yard TD run capped a 9-play, 61-yard drive to make it 21-10. Seattle answered when Baldwin turned in a 42-yard catch-n-run for a TD that closed it to 21-18 with 6:47 left. On the next 2 plays from scrimmage, Johnson ran 33 yards to the SEA42 and Nelson took a 41-yard catch to the 1; Johnson's 3rd rushing TD of the game again made it a 10-point game. The Cards then stopped SEA on a 4th-n-1 from their own 42 and it led to a 42-yard Catanzaro FG that made it 31-18. Down 13, the Seahawks stormed back. Jimmy Graham's 37-yard TD catch-n-run cut it to 6 with 2:48 to go and then Wilson found WR Paul Richardson with a 5-yard TD pass. However, Hauschka's PAT missed wide left and the game remained tied at 31 with a minute left. AZ would take over at its own 25 and 1 timeout. A pair of Johnson receptions then covered 13 & 29 yards while an 8-yard catch by Larry Fitzgerald took it to the SEA25. With the clock running down, Catanzaro rushed onto the field and hit the game-winner from 43 yards as time expired.

### WITH A WIN THIS WEEK...

- Arizona would have its first win against the Los Angeles Rams since 1993. The Cardinals would have their first win against the Rams at the Memorial Coliseum since 1976.
- The Cardinals would have 41 regular season wins under **Bruce Arians**.
- Arizona would have six consecutive road wins against division opponents dating back to last season. The Cardinals would also have three consecutive road wins against the Rams.

### MILESTONES WITHIN REACH

#### **WR Larry Fitzgerald**

- With a reception, Fitzgerald would extend his consecutive games with a catch streak to 195 straight.
- With 20 receiving yards, Fitzgerald would have 1,000 receiving yards for the season. It would mark his eighth career 1,000-yard campaign, extending his franchise record.
- With eight catches, Fitzgerald would have 110 receptions in 2016. That would represent a new franchise single-season record, eclipsing the mark he established just last year (109).

#### **RB David Johnson**

- With 100+ scrimmage yards, Johnson would become the first player in NFL history to post 100+ scrimmage yards in all 16 games in a season.
- If Johnson reaches 100+ scrimmage yards, his 16 straight games doing so would tie Lydell Mitchell (16, 1975-76) for the second-longest streak in NFL history behind only Marcus Allen (17 straight, 1985-86).
- Johnson needs 59 receiving yards to become the first player in NFL history with 1,000+ rushing yards, 900+ receiving yards and 20+ TDs in a single season.
- With a receiving TD, Johnson would join Marshall Faulk (2000), Ahman Green (2003) and O.J. Simpson (1975) as the only players in NFL history with 15+ rushing TDs and 5+ receiving TDs in a season.

#### **QB Carson Palmer**

- With 300 passing yards, Palmer would have 23 career 300-yard passing performances as a member of the Cardinals, the most in franchise history.
- With two TD passes, Palmer would have 25 TD passes on the season. He would join Kurt Warner (2) as the only QBs in franchise history to throw 25+ TD passes in multiple seasons.

#### **DT Calais Campbell**

- With a sack, Campbell would have 56.0 sacks for his career. It would also give him at least 7.0 sacks in a season for the fifth time in his career. He would join Freddie Joe Nunn (5) as the only players in franchise history with at least 7.0 sacks in five different seasons.

#### **LB Chandler Jones**

- With a sack, Jones would have 10.5 sacks in 2016. Combined with Markus Golden (10.0 sacks) it would mark just the third time in franchise history (1983, 1984) the Cardinals had multiple players post 10+ sacks.

#### **WR J.J. Nelson**

### RB DAVID JOHNSON

Johnson earned his first career Pro Bowl selection in 2016, becoming the first Cardinals RB selected to the Pro Bowl in 26 years (Johnny Johnson in 1990). He is just the sixth Cardinals RB since the 1970 AFL-NFL merger to be selected to the Pro Bowl: Terry Metcalf (1974, '75, '77), Ottis Anderson (1979, '80), MacArthur Lane (1970), Jim Ottis (1975), Johnny Johnson (1990).

*Johnson is the first Northern Iowa player to be selected to the Pro Bowl since former Cardinals QB Kurt Warner in 2008 and just the third Pro Bowler ever from that school (LB Bryce Paup).*

## RIVALRY GOES INTERNATIONAL IN 2017

After this week's game, the Cardinals have just one more scheduled appearance at L.A. Memorial Coliseum (in 2018) before the Rams are slated to open their new stadium in time for the 2019 season.



The Cardinals will host Rams at University of Phoenix Stadium in 2017 but their next road game against the division foe will be played in London, England at Twickenham Stadium.

Arizona will be the visiting team and the game will be played in either Week 7 or Week 8 of the regular season (October 22<sup>nd</sup> or 29<sup>th</sup>).

"In 2014, I attended the Raiders-Dolphins game at Wembley Stadium and experienced first-hand the incredible enthusiasm U.K. fans have for the NFL," said Cardinals President **Michael Bidwill**. "I also encountered a huge number of Cardinals fans asking when our team would be playing there. I know this is great news for them as well as the U.S. members of the Red Sea who couldn't have a cooler destination to see a road game."

### Cardinals History Playing Abroad

• **August 16, 1976 (Tokyo, Japan)** - In a preseason matchup, the Cardinals and Chargers square off in the first-ever NFL game held outside North America. Cardinals prevail 20-10 in front of a crowd of 38,000 fans at Korakuen Stadium.

• **August 6, 1983 (London, England)** - The 1983 preseason saw the first-ever NFL game in England as the Cardinals faced the Vikings in front of 32,847 fans at Wembley Stadium.

• **October 2, 2005 (Mexico City, Mexico)** - The Cardinals and 49ers square off Mexico City in the first-ever NFL regular season game outside of the United States. Arizona defeated San Francisco 31-14 in front of an NFL-record crowd of 103,467 at Estadio Azteca.

## CARDS HIT HARD BY INJURIES

Arizona has had 29 different players combine to miss 141 games due to injury this season.

With S **Tyrann Mathieu** (shoulder) being placed on injured reserve last week and S **Tony Jefferson** (knee) and G **Taylor Boggs** (shoulder) going on IR this week, the Cardinals have now had 16 players land on IR in 2016.

Arizona had four players make their Cards debut last week: CB **Harlan Miller**, G **Cole Toner**, WR **Jeremy Ross** and S **Trevon Hartfield**. Arizona has now had 69 different players appear in at least one game this season. In 2015, 56 players in appeared in a game for the Cardinals.

*Miller, the Cardinals sixth round draft pick (205th overall) in 2016, was forced into action at safety last week and played all but one of the Cards defensive snaps in the game. Miller had never practiced or played at safety since being drafted by Arizona.*

## CARDINALS WIN AT CENTURYLINK

With its 34-31 victory over the Seahawks last week, Arizona handed Seattle (7-0 heading into the game) its only home loss of the season. Seattle entered the game as the only team in the NFL without a home loss in 2016.



The Cardinals improved to 3-1 on the road against the Seahawks under head coach **Bruce Arians**. Dating back to 2013, Arians' first season with the Cardinals, Arizona has as many wins in Seattle (3) as the rest of the NFL combined (3) during that span. Seattle is 1-3 at home against the Cardinals and 25-3 against the rest of the NFL during that span.

Seahawks QB **Russell Wilson** fell to 2-3 at home against the Cardinals. Wilson entered last week's game with a 2-2 record (.500) at home against the Cardinals and a 32-3 record (.914) at home against the rest of the NFL in the regular season.

Combined with their victory over the Seahawks in Week 10 at Seattle last season, the Cardinals have scored 73 points and eight TDs in the last two games at CenturyLink Field. Over the last two seasons (2015-16), Seattle allowed a total of 291 points in 16 total home games. In their two games vs. the Cardinals, Seattle allowed an average of 36.5 points per contest. In their 14 other home games, Seattle allowed an average of 15.6 points per game.

In the last five seasons (2012-16) spanning 40 games, the Seahawks have allowed 30+ points in a home game just four times. Arizona has 34+ points in each of its last two games at Seattle.

Last week, QB **Carson Palmer** improved to 3-0 on the road against the Seahawks as the Cardinals starting QB. Seattle is 0-3 at home against Palmer in that span and 26-3 (.897) against all other NFL QBs.



Palmer is the only QB in the NFL to win three games against the Seahawks at CenturyLink field since it opened in 2002.

In his last two games at CenturyLink Field, Palmer completed 45 of 73 pass attempts (61.6%) for 647 yards, 4 TDs, 1 INT and a passer rating of 102.9. He led game-winning drives in the fourth quarter in both of those contests. In last Saturday's game, Palmer led the 31st game-winning drive of his career and his 11th as a member of the Cardinals.

### HIGHLY RATED AT CENTURYLINK FIELD

Palmer posted a passer rating of 111.7 in last week's win over the Seahawks. It marked his 25th outing with a passer rating of 100.0+ as a member of the Cardinals.

Palmer's 111.7 rating last week was the highest for an opposing QB at CenturyLink Field in over three seasons. The only QB to post a higher rating over the last four seasons (2013-16) was TB's Mike Glennon (123.1) on 11/3/13.

### PALMER CONNECTS DEEP TO NELSON

In the second quarter of last week's win, Palmer connected with WR **J.J. Nelson** on an 80-yard TD pass to give the Cardinals a 14-0 lead. It was the longest TD pass ever by a Seahawks opponent at CenturyLink Field (which opened in 2002). It was the longest pass play against the Seahawks since 1989, when Chiefs QB Rich Gannon connected with Andre Rison for 80 yards.

LB **Markus Golden** (10.0), LB **Chandler Jones** (9.5) and DT **Calais Campbell** (6.5) lead the Cardinals in sacks in 2016. If Jones gets a half-sack this week vs. Los Angeles, it would mark just the third time in franchise history (3 players in 1983; 2 players in 1984) that the Cardinals had at least two different players with at least 10.0 sacks in a season.

If Campbell gets a sack this week, it would mark just the third time in franchise history (4 players in 1983; 3 players in 1984) that the Cardinals had three different players with at least 7.0 sacks in a season.

## JOHNSON GETS TO 15 IN A ROW

In Week 15 vs. New Orleans, RB **David Johnson** became the first player in NFL history to post 100+ yards from scrimmage in each of the first 14 games of a season. He has now extended that record to 15 games.



Johnson piled up 136 yards from scrimmage (95 rushing, 41 receiving) and three TDs against the Seahawks last week. He now joins Barry Sanders (15 straight in 1997) as the only players in NFL history to have 100+ scrimmage yards in at least 15 consecutive games in a single season.

Johnson is just the fourth different player in NFL history with at least 1,200 rushing yards and 800 receiving yards in the same season, joining Pro Football Hall of Famer Marshall Faulk (1998-2000), Le'Veon Bell (2014) and Steven Jackson (2006).

Johnson (2,074 yards; 20 TDs) is the first NFL player since LaDainian Tomlinson in 2006 to put up 2,000+ scrimmage yards and 20+ TDs in a season.

With 1,233 yards through 15 games, Johnson is on pace to rush for 1,315 yards in 2016. Should he reach that total, it would represent the fourth-highest single-season total in franchise history.

If he reaches 1,300 rushing yards in 2016, he would join Ottis Anderson as the only players in team history to rush for 1,300+ yards in a season.

## AWARDS PILING UP FOR DAVID

RB **David Johnson** was named "NFC Offensive Player of the Week" for his performance in the Cardinals 31-23 victory over Washington in Week 13. Johnson totaled 175 yards (84 rushing, 91 receiving) and two TDs (1 rushing, 1 receiving) against the Redskins.

It was Johnson's second "Offensive Player of the Week" award this season after he was selected following the Cardinals Week 5 win at San Francisco.

Johnson's two "Offensive Player of the Week" selections this season are tied for the most in team history by a running back (Ronald Moore). He also becomes the first Cardinals player since Kurt Warner in 2009 to be named "Offensive Player of the Week" twice in the same season.

It also marked Johnson's third overall selection as "Player of the Week" after he was previously awarded as "Special Teams Player of the Week" as a rookie kick returner in 2015.

### NFC PLAYER OF THE MONTH IN OCTOBER

Johnson was named the "NFC Offensive Player of the Month" for his performance in October, becoming just the third player in franchise history to be named "Offensive Player of the Month" and the first RB to do so.

Johnson finished the month of October with an NFL-high 726 yards from scrimmage (488 rushing, 238 receiving) while tying for the NFL lead with five rushing TDs and ranking third in the league with 488 rushing yards. He was the only player in the NFL who totaled 100+ yards from scrimmage in five games during the month of October and Johnson (3) joined Ezekiel Elliott (3), DeMarco Murray (3) and Jordan Howard (3) as the only players in the NFL to rush for 100+ yards in at least three games last month. Johnson averaged 145.2 yards from scrimmage in his five games in October.

Besides Johnson, the Cardinals have had a Player of the Month eight other times since the award began in 1986: Lomax (October, 1988), Esiason (November, 1996), S Kwamie Lassiter (November, 2001), K Neil Rackers (October and December, 2005), PR Patrick Peterson (November, 2011), ST Justin Bethel (December, 2014) and S Tyrann Mathieu (November, 2015).

Last season Johnson was selected as the NFL's "Rookie of the Month" for December/January.

He has more TDs - of any kind - in both the 2<sup>nd</sup> and 4<sup>th</sup> quarters than any other active player in the NFL. His 23 TDs in the 3<sup>rd</sup> quarter are tied with Vikings RB Adrian Peterson for the most in the NFL.

--Fitzgerald also has 32 career go-ahead TD receptions. Among active NFL players, only Antonio Gates (38) has more.

--Gates (110), Fitzgerald (103) and Peterson (102) are the only active players in the NFL with at least 100 TDs. All three have played their entire careers with one team.

## HEADING TO THE HALL?

Below is a look at the career of **Larry Fitzgerald** through his first 201 career games compared to the 25 modern era WRs currently in the HOF and where they stood at that point in their career.

At this point in his career, Fitzgerald has more receptions (1,120) than all of the receivers enshrined in Canton had through 201 games. Fitzgerald also has more receiving yards (14,346) than all HOF receivers through 201 games played except Jerry Rice (17,361) and Marvin Harrison (14,580 in 190 career games).

In fact, Fitzgerald's career numbers already surpass those of many receivers that are currently in the HOF. He has more career receptions than 24 of the 25 receivers in the HOF: Swann (336), Hayes (371), Pihos (373), Lavelli (386), Hirsch (387), Fears (400), Warfield (427), McDonald (495), Mitchell (521), Stallworth (537), Alworth (542), Biletnikoff (589), Berry (631), Maynard (633), Taylor (649), Irvin (750), Joiner (750), Lofton (764), Largent (819), Monk (940), Reed (951), Brown (1,094), Carter (1,101) and Harrison (1,102).

He has more career receiving yards than 22 of the 25 receivers in the HOF: Fears (5,397), Swann (5,462), Pihos (5,619), Lavelli (6,488), Hirsch (7,029), Hayes (7,414), Mitchell (7,954), McDonald (8,410), Warfield (8,565), Stallworth (8,723), Biletnikoff (8,974), Taylor (9,110), Berry (9,275), Alworth (10,266), Maynard (11,834), Irvin (11,904), Joiner (12,146), Monk (12,721), Largent (13,089), Reed (13,198), Carter (13,899) and Lofton (14,004).

### A Career Full of Accomplishments:

- Franchise career leader in receptions (1,120), receiving yards (14,346), receiving TDs (103), total TDs (103) and 100-yard receiving games (42). His seven 1,000-yard seasons are also a franchise record.
- Fitzgerald (10) joins Hall of Famer Jerry Rice (13) as the only wide receivers in NFL history to be named to the Pro Bowl at least 10 times.
- Fitzgerald had more receptions in his first 200 career games (1,116) than any player in NFL history.
- One of just five players in NFL history to record at least 1,400 receiving yards in a season four times in their career: Jerry Rice (6), Randy Moss (4), Marvin Harrison (4) and Andre Johnson (4).

## MAN OF THE YEAR

In December, WR **Larry Fitzgerald** was named the "Arizona Cardinals/Walter Payton NFL Man of the Year" presented by Nationwide. Nationwide provided \$10,000 to Fitzgerald for receiving this honor.

The award recognizes a player's off-the-field community service as well his playing excellence. Fitzgerald will receive a \$50,000 donation to the charity of his choice and an additional \$50,000 donation in his name to implement the Character Playbook program in Arizona.

One of the NFL's most popular athletes since the Cardinals made him the third overall selection in the 2004 NFL Draft, the nine-time Pro Bowler has become one of the most accomplished wide receivers in league history.

Fitzgerald's playing excellence is matched by his conduct on and off the field. Following the 2014 season, was named the inaugural winner of the Art Rooney NFL Sportsmanship Award, presented to an NFL player who demonstrates on the field qualities of great sportsmanship, including fair play, respect for opponents and integrity in competition. He was selected as the Cardinals nominee for the Salute To Service award in '14 in recognition of his support for the Armed Forces and in 2012 was named the recipient of the 14th Annual Arthur S. Arkush Humanitarian Award by Pro Football Weekly.

Through his two foundations—the Larry Fitzgerald First Down Fund and the Carl Fitzgerald Memorial Fund, Fitzgerald has helped thousands by providing funds for positive activities for kids across the country. He has also done charity work around the globe, working with the Starkey Hearing Foundation all over Africa and with Oxfam America in Ethiopia. Fitzgerald has also been honored for his work in furthering awareness for breast cancer research and for his longtime support of the men and women in serving in the Armed Forces.

Fitzgerald is one of 32 NFL "Man of the Year" winners to qualify for the league's national 2016 "Walter Payton NFL Man of the Year" award. The overall winner will be announced in Houston at NFL Honors, and will receive a \$500,000 donation to the charity of his choice and a \$500,000 donation in their name to expand Character Playbook across all NFL markets. In 2012, Fitzgerald was one of three finalists for the "Walter Payton NFL Man of the Year" Award.



## NELSON KEEPS ON SCORING

Second-year WR **J.J. Nelson** had three receptions for 132 yards (44.0-yard avg.) against the Seahawks last week, including a career-long 80-yard TD catch in the second quarter.

Last week's performance marked Nelson's second career 100-yard game and first since he posted 142 yards vs. Cincinnati on 11/22/15.

### SEVEN TDs IN THE LAST EIGHT GAMES FOR NELSON

After hauling in an 80-yard TD reception last week, Nelson now has a career-high seven TDs (6 receiving, 1 rushing) in 2016. *All seven of those TDs have come in the last eight games. Nelson has over three times as many TDs in his last eight games (7) than he had in his previous 17 career games (2).*



With injuries hitting the Cardinals WR corps, Nelson has been given a bigger role in the offense and has responded with his production. He has 26 receptions for 442 yards and six receiving TDs in the last eight games - after totaling just four receptions for 35 yards in his first five games played this season (missed Week 2 with a shoulder injury).

### NELSON'S HISTORIC GAME VS. THE DOLPHINS

Nelson had a 56-yard TD run in the first quarter and an eight-yard TD reception in the fourth quarter against the Dolphins in Week 14.

*The TD run was the first of his career and it tied Bobby Joe Conrad (56-yarder on 9/27/59 vs. Washington) for the longest TD run in franchise history by a wide receiver.*

*Nelson became the first Cardinals WR since Mal Kutner (10/24/48 vs. Boston) to post a rushing TD and receiving TD in the same game.*

### NELSON SHINES WHEN CALLED UPON AS A ROOKIE

Nelson seizing his opportunities this season isn't a surprise, as he did the exact same thing as a rookie in 2015, when he saw an increased role against the Bengals in Week 11 due to an injury to WR Michael Floyd. Nelson responded with four receptions for a game-high 142 yards (35.5 avg.) against Cincinnati, including a 64-yard TD catch in the third quarter. Nelson's 142 receiving yards were the most by a rookie in a game in 2015.

## GRESHAM ON A HOT STREAK

Following five seasons (2010-14) with the Cincinnati Bengals, where he was twice named to the Pro Bowl, TE **Jermaine Gresham** signed with the Cardinals in 2015 and went on to catch 18 passes for 223 yards and a TD last season. He has surpassed those totals in 2016, with 37 receptions for 391 yards and two TDs.

Much of that production has come in the team's last nine games. In Week 14 vs. the Dolphins, Gresham tied his season-high with five receptions totaling 45 yards. *It gave him five receptions in three consecutive games, after never totaling more than four catches in any of his first 25 games with the Cardinals.*

Through the first six games this season, Gresham had six receptions for 59 yards and no TDs. In his last nine games, he has 31 catches for 331 yards and two TDs.

## BROWN FIGHTING THROUGH IN 2016

WR **John Brown** has fought through an injury-plagued 2016 campaign - his third in the NFL - dating back to a concussion he suffered in training camp.

In October it was discovered that Brown carries the sickle-cell trait and the complications that have arisen from that diagnosis have limited his availability in the last two months. Brown missed the Week 7 contest vs. Seattle and was forced out of the Cardinals Week 12 game in Atlanta. It also significantly limited his playing time the last four weeks. So far this season, Brown is tied for third on the team with 37 receptions and ranks fourth with 492 receiving yards.

## A GAME-WINNER FOR PALMER

After the Seahawks tied the game at 31 with 1:22 remaining in regulation last week in Seattle, QB **Carson Palmer** led an 8-play, 50-yard drive that resulted in the game-winning FG as time expired.

It was Palmer's 31st career game-winning drive in the regular season and his 11th as a member of the Cardinals. It was Palmer's second game-winning drive in his last two games at CenturyLink Field.

## A DECADE OF DISTINCTION

The Cardinals have been in the Bidwill family since Pro Football Hall of Famer Charles Bidwill purchased the team in 1933. Charles' son Bill handled day-to-day operations for decades before passing the torch to his son, Michael, who is now in his 10th season as team President.



Since **Michael Bidwill** took over as President in 2007, the Cards have gone .500 or better in seven of nine seasons (just twice in previous 20 years) and posted four double-digit win seasons (none in previous 20).

The 2015 season was a banner year for the organization as the team won the NFC West, set a franchise record for wins in the regular season (13) and earned the first postseason bye in team history.

Of the Cardinals seven all-time postseason wins, five have come during Bidwill's nine years as team President. Arizona has played in nine postseason contests since Bidwill took over in 2007. The Cardinals played just seven total playoff games in their entire history prior to his tenure.

Michael spearheaded the effort that led to the creation of University of Phoenix Stadium, which preceded that aforementioned run of on-field success. The Cardinals have sold out all 114 games played (preseason and post-season included) and the stadium since it opened in 2006; in 18 years at Sun Devil Stadium, just 12 games were sold out in time to be televised locally.

The Cardinals success under Bidwill has greatly elevated the team's popularity both locally and nationally. That fact is best measured in the record-setting ratings for Cardinals game broadcasts. Locally, the team established a host of franchise record for the TV broadcasts in both 2015 and 2014. Nationally, the team's exposure is at an all-time high. Having never appeared in more than three primetimes games in a single season, the Cardinals played an unprecedented five primetime games during the 2015 regular season and posted a perfect 5-0 record those matchups.

Michael was also the driving force behind the critically-acclaimed series "All Or Nothing" that debuted on Amazon Video in July of this year.

Michael was pivotal not only in helping Arizona land Super Bowl XLIX - the second in eight seasons at University of Phoenix Stadium - but he also secured the 2015 Pro Bowl. Played a week apart, the game delivered a record economic impact of \$720 million to the region.

## KEIM LAYS THE FOUNDATION

The Cardinals posted three consecutive 10+ win seasons in **Steve Keim's** first three years as GM. As soon as he was elevated to the position in January of 2013, Keim began re-shaping the roster.



The overhaul during his first three years was dramatic - and resulted in a 34-14 record in that span. During his first 36 months as GM, Keim made 592 roster moves, including 182 moves in 2015 as the Cards established a franchise record for wins (13).

He was named Pro Football Talk's Executive of the Year in both 2013 and 2014, and added Sporting News Executive of the Year in 2014.

The 2015 campaign was one of the most successful seasons in franchise history. In addition to establishing a record for wins, the team also set franchise marks for total offense, points scored and total TDs. Arizona had the NFL's #1 ranked offense last season, and the Cardinals finished with a defense that ranked in the top five as well. The roster that has accomplished those feats was built from the ground up by Keim and his staff.

### KEIM DEALING WITH CHANGES

The Cardinals roster has been hit hard by injuries in 2016. Arizona has had 29 players combine to miss 141 total games to injury and Keim been busy re-shuffling the roster all season. As of this week, the Cardinals have made a total of **227** roster moves dating back to January. That includes having placed seven of the Cardinals Week 1 starters on injured reserve.

## 23 HOME WINS SINCE 2013

Arizona's home finale against the Saints marked the 114th consecutive sellout at University of Phoenix Stadium, where the Cardinals have posted 23 home wins dating back to 2013. Arizona's 23 home wins under **Bruce Arians** are fourth-most in the NFL during that span.

## NINE DAYS - TWO GREAT HIRES

In a nine-day span in January of 2013, Cardinals President **Michael Bidwill** hired GM **Steve Keim** (Jan. 8) and head coach **Bruce Arians** (Jan. 17). In the resulting three seasons, the Cardinals won more games (34) than any other three-year span in franchise history.

In January of 2013 there were eight head coach openings. None were hired later than Arians and five of the eight no longer hold those jobs. Keim was one of seven GMs hired in January of 2013. On the seven, only he and Carolina's Dave Gettleman had their teams in the postseason in both 2014 and 2015.

## TWO-TIME COACH OF THE YEAR

**Bruce Arians** was named the Associated Press 2014 NFL Coach of the Year after leading the Cardinals to an 11-5 record and a berth in the post-season.

It marked the second time in three years Arians was awarded NFL Coach of the Year honors (Indianapolis, 2012). He became the first coach in NFL history to be named Coach of the Year multiple times in a three-year span with multiple teams.

Arians is one of 12 coaches in NFL history to win the award multiple times and the sixth to be honored with multiple teams. He is also one of just six coaches in NFL history to earn AP Coach of the Year honors twice in a three-year span.

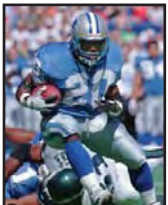
## A PRO BOWL TALENT

CB **Patrick Peterson** earned his sixth Pro Bowl selection - and fifth at cornerback - (Kick Returner, 2011; Cornerback, 2012-16) this season. In 2015, he was also named first-team All-Pro at corner for the second time in his career (2013, '15).

Peterson joins RBs Jim Brown, Barry Sanders and Emmitt Smith as the only players in NFL history to be chosen to six Pro Bowls before their 27th birthday. He is the only defensive player in NFL history to earn that distinction.

The Cardinals selected CB **Patrick Peterson** with the fifth overall pick in the 2011 NFL Draft and in his first five NFL seasons he earned five Pro Bowl selections and was named first-team All-Pro three times. He has proven to be one of the most unique talents in NFL history. His most important role has been as a shutdown CB in the AZ secondary.

Peterson has started all 95 games at CB in his NFL career. Despite opposing QBs avoiding his side of the field, Peterson has registered 20 INTs since 2011, tied for third in the NFL during that span among active players.

### PETERSON SEALS IT WITH 20TH CAREER INTERCEPTION

Peterson sealed Arizona's Week 13 win over Washington with his 20th career INT. With the Cardinals clinging to an eight-point lead and the Redskins at the AZ 28-yard line with 48 seconds remaining, Peterson made a diving INT on a Kirk Cousins pass attempt and ended Washington's comeback attempt. *Only 10 players in franchise history have more career INTs than Peterson.*

## CAREER SEASON ENDS FOR JEFFERSON

S **Tony Jefferson** had the best season of his career in 2015, starting seven of 16 games played during the regular season and both playoff contests and setting career highs with 75 tackles, two INTs, two sacks, five passes defended and three forced fumbles.

*Jefferson was having an even better season in 2016.* Through 15 games the fourth-year safety recorded 92 tackles, ranks second on the team with 13 tackles for loss, and added two sacks, five passes defended, two forced fumbles, two fumble recoveries and three QB hits. *Jefferson's 92 tackles this season set a new career high.*



In last week's game at Seattle, Jefferson suffered a knee injury that will force him to miss the season finale in Los Angeles this week. Originally signed by the Cardinals as a rookie free agent out of Oklahoma in 2013, Jefferson has appeared in every game (63 regular season; 3 postseason) during his first three-plus NFL seasons. This Sunday's game against the Rams will be the first missed game of his career.

### A BIG VOID IN THE SECONDARY

Jefferson is another big loss for the Cardinals secondary. He has developed into one of the best running-stopping safeties in the NFL this season. *According to Stats, INC., Jefferson's 13 tackles for loss are nearly double what any other defensive back in the NFL has posted this season.*

No other DB in the league has more than seven.

## SHOULDER INJURY SIDELINES MATHIEU

S **Tyrann Mathieu** had started every game this season and had just recently begun to display the form that made him a Defensive Player of the Year candidate in 2015 when he suffered a shoulder injury vs. the Panthers in Week 8 that resulted in him missing four games and ultimately getting him placed on injured reserve last week.

Working his way back from the knee injury that ended his 2015 campaign early, Mathieu began playing his normal safety spot closer to the line of scrimmage for the first time in Week 5 at San Francisco. In the Cardinals victory over the Jets in Week 7 he led the team with six tackles, two passes defended and also recorded his first INT of the 2016 campaign.

*In his first game back from the shoulder injury at Atlanta in Week 12, Mathieu registered two tackles, a tackle for loss, a sack and a pass defended in perhaps his most productive outing of the season.* However, he re-injured the shoulder in practice, forcing him out of action for two games. He returned vs. New Orleans, but the injury has ultimately ended his season.

### All-Pro Season Cut Short in 2015

Mathieu had an All-Pro season in '15 despite the torn ACL he suffered while recording an INT at Philly in Week 15. Mathieu was named to his first career Pro Bowl and earned first-team All-Pro honors from the Associated Press.

In 14 games played last season, Mathieu registered 89 tackles, a team-high 16 passes defended, 5 INTs (TD), 11 tackles for loss and a forced fumble. His five INTs were tied for third in the NFC at the time of the injury.

## JONES AT 9.5 SACKS IN 2016

When the Cardinals completed a trade with the Patriots to acquire Pro Bowl LB **Chandler Jones** in March, they acquired one of the NFL's premier pass rushers. So far this season, Jones has more than lived up to his billing as one of the league's premiere perimeter defenders.

Through 15 games, Jones has 55 tackles, owns the team-lead with 17 tackles for loss, ranks second on the team with 9.5 sacks, and has added three forced fumbles, two fumble recoveries, 14 QB pressures and 20 QB hits. According to ProFootballReference.com, Jones and Oakland's Khalil Mack are the only players in the NFL this season with at least 9.0 sacks, three forced fumbles and two fumble recoveries.



In the Cardinals matchup against the Vikings in Week 11, Jones recorded five tackles, a sack, two tackles for loss and a forced fumble. That came one week after he posted his 11th career multi-sack performance and first as a member of the Cardinals.

### AMONG THE NFL SACK LEADERS

Dating back to the 2013 season, his second in the NFL, Jones has 39.5 sacks. That is the fifth-best total in the NFL during that span.

## GOLDEN'S BREAKOUT SEASON

Second-year LB **Markus Golden** recorded 2.0 sacks against the Seahawks last week, giving him 10.0 sacks on the season. He became the first Cardinals player to record double-digit sacks in a season since John Abraham (11.5) in 2013. Golden also became the 10th different player in franchise history to record 10.0 or more sacks in a season.

Golden has totaled 60 tackles, 16 tackles for loss, 10.0 sacks, a pass defensed, three forced fumbles, a fumble recovery, 19 QB pressures and 20 QB hits through 15 games this season.

Golden's 2.0-sack performance last week was the second of his career, and second this season (2.0 vs. SF in Week 5). It also gave him 4.0 sacks in the last five games.

#### GOLDEN'S HOT START

Golden had at least one sack in each of the first five games this season. That represents the longest streak in franchise history to begin a season and it tied the second-longest streak in franchise history overall.

## CAMPBELL CLIMBS INTO SECOND

DT **Calais Campbell** registered two sacks of Saints QB Drew Brees in Week 15, giving him 6.0 sacks on the season and 54.5 sacks for his career. After adding a half-sack last week in Seattle, Campbell sits alone in second place on the franchise all-time sacks list.

Prior to 2016, Campbell was the only defensive lineman in team history to record at least 6.0 sacks in six different seasons. He has extended that team record to seven seasons with 6.5 sacks in 2016.

The 2016 season marks the sixth time Campbell has posted 50+ tackles and 6.0 sacks. His five consecutive seasons with 50/6.0 from 2009-2014 represent a franchise record.

The game vs. New Orleans marked Campbell's 10th career game with at least 2.0 sacks - and second this season (2.0 at San Francisco in Week 5). In team history, only Simeon Rice (15), Freddie Joe Nunn (13) and Curtis Greer (11) had more games with 2.0+ sacks than Campbell.

Campbell finished the game vs. the Saints with six tackles, 2.0 sacks, two tackles for loss, two QB pressures, two QB hits and a fumble recovery he returned 53 yards for his first career TD. It was his first TD since his senior year at South (Aurora, CO) High School when he played tight end.

#### A BIG PERFORMANCE VS. THE 49ERS

Arizona's longest tenured defensive player (only All-Pro WR Larry Fitzgerald has spent more seasons with the team), Campbell is in his ninth season with the Cardinals and has appeared in 137 games with the team.

Perhaps none of those games was more impressive than the outing he put together in the Cardinals victory over San Francisco in Week 5. His final tally was four tackles, 2.0 sacks, two tackles for loss, two QB hits, an INT and a safety.

Since individual sacks became an official statistic in 1982, Campbell became just the second player with 2.0+ sacks, an INT and a safety in a game, joining Baltimore's Adalius Thomas (2.0 sacks, INT, safety) who did so on 9/17/06 vs. Oakland.

#### Defending the Pass

Dating back to 2011, Campbell has registered 35 passes defensed. Among all NFL defensive linemen, only Houston's J.J. Watt and the NY Giants Jason Pierre-Paul have more in that span. Campbell is tied for third on the team with seven passes defensed in 2016.

## GUNTER'S BIG GAME IN SEATTLE

Second-year DT **Rodney Gunter** had his most productive game as a pro in the Cardinals victory over Seattle last week. He finished the game with four tackles, a sack, a tackle for loss, a QB hit and a blocked FG. Gunter was involved in two of the game's biggest plays.

With the Cardinals leading 7-0 in the first quarter, Seattle had the ball on the AZ 18-yard line. After a Markus Golden sack on third down, Gunter blocked Seattle's 45-yard FG attempt. It was the first blocked FG of his career.

Gunter posted his second career sack (first since 11/22/15 vs. Cincinnati) on a pivotal play in the second quarter. Arizona was leading 14-0 and Seattle had the ball on the AZ 1-yard line. On 4th-n-1, Gunter came through the middle and sacked Russell Wilson for a seven-yard loss, ending the Seahawks scoring threat.

## CONNECTING FROM LONG RANGE

K Chandler Catanzaro connected on a 60-yard FG in the fourth quarter against the Bills in Week 3, the second-longest FG in franchise history (Jay Feely, 61 yards). In Week 14 at Miami, Catanzaro hit a 56-yarder in the second quarter that represents the third-longest FG in team annals.

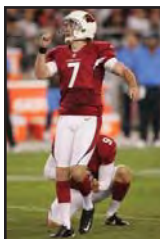

## ONE OF THE BEST IN THE GAME

In December of 2015, CB Justin Bethel signed a three-year contract extension that keeps the three-time Pro Bowler in Arizona through the 2018 season.



The Cardinals sixth-round selection (177th overall) in the 2012 NFL Draft, Bethel was named to the Pro Bowl as a special for three consecutive seasons (2013-15). Now in his fifth NFL season, Bethel has registered 79 special teams tackles, three blocked FGs and a blocked PAT on special teams. He has led the Cardinals in special teams tackles each of the last three seasons and leads the way in 2016 with 12 through 15 games.

### Career Highlights

- The Cardinals first selection of the sixth round (177th overall) of the 2012 draft, Bethel has played in all 79 games in four-plus seasons and totaled 79 special teams tackles, three blocked FGs, a blocked PAT, three forced fumbles and two fumble recoveries on special teams. He has led the team in special teams tackles each of the last three years, including a career-best 21 in 2013.
- Posted the first blocked PAT of his career in the Cardinals matchup vs. the Vikings in Week 11.
- Joins current Cardinals radio analyst Ron Wolfley (1986-89) as the only players in franchise history to earn multiple Pro Bowl selections as a special teams player.
- Saw most significant playing time on defense of his career in 2015, starting five games during the season and both playoff contests. Totaled 29 tackles, two INTs (one returned for TD) and nine passes defended.
- Signed three-year contract extension with the Cardinals on 12/5/15 that keeps him under contract through the 2018 season.

## ARIZONA BLOCK PARTY

Dating back to 2008, the Cardinals have blocked an NFL-high 20 FG attempts. After registering three blocked kicks in '14, Arizona registered multiple kicks in seven consecutive seasons (2008-14), including five seasons with at least three blocks in that span.

With Arizona holding a 14-10 lead, Cowboys K Dan Bailey lined up for a 35-yard FG attempt with just three seconds remaining in the first half. Bethel came around the end and blocked the kick, preserving the Cards four-point lead.

#### 11/10/13 vs. Houston

Just like the attempt in Dallas, Houston was attempting a FG on the final play of the first half. With the Texans leading 17-14, Randy Bullock lined up for a 40-yard attempt with four seconds remaining in the second quarter. Bethel came off the edge to blocked the attempt, and Arizona would come back to win the game by three points (27-24).

#### 9/15/13 vs. Detroit

The Cardinals trailed the Lions 21-19 early in the fourth quarter when Bethel blocked a 47-yard FG attempt by Detroit's David Akers. Two possessions later, Arizona scored the go-ahead TD in the 25-19 win.

### Campbell with a Half Dozen

Standing 6-8, Campbell has blocked six FG attempts in his career, the most recent coming in Week 1 of the '12 season vs. Seattle.

During the 2011 season, Campbell tied Seattle's Red Bryant for the NFL lead with three blocked FGs.

### Quarterbacks

**QB Zac Dysert** – Spent most of the season on practice squad. Served as backup QB in Week 5 and elevated to roster again in Week 15.

**QB Carson Palmer** – Improved to 3-0 with Cardinals at Seattle with win in Week 16, when he had 284 yards and a TD and led game-winning FG drive in final minute. Threw for 318 yards and two TDs in Week 15 vs. NO, his 49<sup>th</sup> career 300-yard game and 22<sup>nd</sup> with the Cardinals (tied for most in team history). Ranks 14<sup>th</sup> all-time in passing yards and TD passes.

### Game 1

#### Patriots 23, CARDINALS 21

September 11, 2016 – University of Phoenix Stadium (64,864)

Facing the Patriots on Sunday Night Football, the Cardinals suffered a season-opening loss at home after missing a go-ahead FG try from 47 yards out with 41 seconds remaining. Arizona had clawed back from an early deficit to take a 1-point 4<sup>th</sup> quarter lead on the second of Larry Fitzgerald's two TDs. They were the 99<sup>th</sup> and 100<sup>th</sup> career scores for the future Hall of Famer who finished with 81 yards on 8 catches. But the Patriots answered. Making his 1<sup>st</sup> career start while filling in for a suspended Tom Brady, QB Jimmy Garoppolo led the Pats on a scoring drive and they went ahead 23-21 on a FG with 3:44 to go. When AZ could not convert its FG try on the ensuing drive, the game was decided in favor of the undermanned Pats, who were without Brady, TE Rob Gronkowski and a number of others.

The Patriots scored on their first two possessions of the game to take a 10-0 lead. First Garoppolo capped an 8-play, 74-yard drive with a 37-yard TD pass to an open WR Chris Hogan down the left sideline. Then Steven Gostkowski's 47-yard FG on the next drive made it 10-0. Arizona's first 3 offensive possessions ended in punts before momentum turned with an Arizona takeaway. With 10:30 to go before half and AZ trailing 10-0, LB Markus Golden sacked Garoppolo forcing a fumble that former Patriot Chandler Jones recovered in NE territory. A celebration penalty pushed it back to the AZ46 but the Cards were still in business. They moved to the NE3 in 10 plays - 6 of which were David Johnson runs - before Palmer connected with Fitzgerald on a TD to make it 10-7 at the half.

New England opened the 3<sup>rd</sup> quarter by moving 75 yards in 9 plays and went ahead 17-7 on an 8-yard LeGarrette Blount TD run. A Cards punt turned it back to NE with 7:00 to go in the 3<sup>rd</sup>. However, a Blount fumble forced by DT Frostee Rucker on the next snap was recovered by DT Calais Campbell at the NE33. Five plays later, David Johnson punched it in from a yard out to trim the deficit to 17-13. A 53-yard Gostkowski FG with 12:35 remaining made it 20-14. On the next drive, an incredible run from Johnson covered 45 yards to the NE 12; he initially was stopped at the line of scrimmage, spun outside, steadied himself with a hand on the ground and raced down the right sideline. Four plays later, a sliding, over-the-shoulder TD catch from Fitzgerald in the corner of the end zone put AZ up 21-20 with 9:46 left. The Pats, who were 10-16 on 3<sup>rd</sup> down in the game, converted 3 straight on the next drive as they moved 61 yards for a go-ahead FG that proved to be the game-winner.

### Game 2

#### CARDINALS 40, Buccaneers 7

September 18, 2016 – University of Phoenix Stadium (64,230)

The Cardinals evened their record at 1-1 thanks to a 33-point home win over Tampa Bay. It was scoreless after one quarter but AZ exploded for 24 straight in the 2<sup>nd</sup> thanks to Carson Palmer TD passes to 3 different receivers and a FG. In all the Cards enjoyed a 5-0 edge in takeaways (4 Jameis Winston INTs and a fumble). The defensive hero was CB Marcus Cooper, who was acquired by the Cards in a trade with KC 16 days earlier. The 4<sup>th</sup> year player recorded a pair of INTs, including one that he returned 60 yards for a TD. Larry Fitzgerald led all receivers with 6 catches for 81 yards and a TD while David Johnson had 143 scrimmage yards (98 receiving & 45 rushing). Palmer recorded win #30 in his 40<sup>th</sup> game as Cardinals starter and moved into 16<sup>th</sup> on the NFL's all-time passing yardage list passing Joe Montana.

The first of AZ's 5 total takeaways came on Tampa's opening drive of the game when Patrick Peterson picked a Winston deep pass intended for Mike Evans at the goal-line. Six seconds into the 2<sup>nd</sup> quarter, Fitzgerald's 4-yard TD catch opened the scoring. On the 2<sup>nd</sup> play of the next series, Winston's pass intended for Vincent Jackson was INT'd by Cooper who returned it to the TB19 and set-up a 22-yard Chandler Catanzaro FG. Down 10-0, the Bucs advanced to the AZ29 with 3:06 left before halftime and faced a 2<sup>nd</sup>-n-9. However Winston had the ball jarred loose in the pocket by a teammate and S Tony Jefferson recovered at the AZ32. A key 27-yard completion to WR Jaron Brown on 3<sup>rd</sup>-n-10 took it to the TB40, a 16-yard David Johnson run took it to the 25, and a 24-yard pass to Fitzgerald - initially ruled a TD - took it to the one. Palmer's TD pass to WR Michael Floyd on 3<sup>rd</sup> down made it 17-0 with 1:30 til intermission. Three Tampa incompletions ran just :17 off the clock and after the punt, AZ took over at its own 16 with 1:05 left. It was more than enough time for another TD as Palmer connected deep with WR Jaron Brown on a 51-yard scoring strike that made it 24-0 at the half.

Tampa opened the 3<sup>rd</sup> quarter with an 11-play, 75-yard drive that ended with their lone score of the day, a 19-yard TD pass from Winston to Evans. On the next play from scrimmage, David Johnson gathered in a short check-down from Palmer and took it 58 yards to the TB17. It led to another Catanzaro FG that made it 27-7. Tampa then moved to the AZ41 before Cooper struck again; he caught a Winston pass deflected by DT Josh Mauro and returned it 60 yards for a TD. Arizona added another TD early in the 4<sup>th</sup> when Chris Johnson's 3-yard run capped a 65-yard drive and provided the game's final score.

**September 25, 2016 – New Era Field (68,647)**

In a week 3 road game against Buffalo, the Cardinals fell behind early and could never catch up. The Bills notched their first win of the year with the 33-18 victory while Arizona fell to 1-2.

After the teams exchanged punts on the game's first 4 series, Buffalo took over at its own 22. On the first play, QB Tyrod Taylor rushed 49 yards to the AZ29 setting up a 19-yard Dan Carpenter FG. Buffalo's next drive started near midfield and one play after a 24-yard completion to WR Robert Woods took it to the AZ24, LeSean McCoy ran 24 yards for a TD. Leading 10-0, the Bills took over at the AZ 39 following a 31-yard Brandon Tate return of a Drew Butler punt; Butler injured his ankle on the play and K Chandler Catanzaro had to handle punting duties the rest of the way. The Bills could not capitalize on that field position though, as Patrick Peterson's 1-handed INT while tip-toeing down the right sideline ended the threat. AZ couldn't stop Buffalo on its next drive that also began with a short field. After taking over at their own 48, the Bills went up 17-0 when McCoy's 5-yard TD run capped a 6-play, 52-yard scoring drive. To that point, the Cardinals offense had failed to pick up a first down on its first 6 possessions of the game. However AZ would trim the deficit to 17-7 late in the 2<sup>nd</sup> with a lengthy 17-play drive that consumed 9:34 and ended with David Johnson's 4-yard scoring run.

While AZ got the ball to start the 3<sup>rd</sup>, it was the Bills who got the first points when Taylor scrambled for a 20-yard TD on 3<sup>rd</sup>-n-4. Now trailing 23-7, the Cards advanced to the BUF7 but could not convert on 2<sup>nd</sup>-n-1 or 3<sup>rd</sup>-n-1. On the ensuing FG try, a high snap was ultimately recovered but Buffalo's Aaron Williams at the 47 and he reced 53 yards for a TD to make it 30-7 with 2:25 left in the 3<sup>rd</sup>. Forced to go no-huddle, the Cards quickly moved 83 yards in 6 plays and David Johnson's 22-yard TD run made it 30-16 after the 2-point try was unsuccessful. Catanzaro then hit a 60-yard FG - one yard shy of the club record - that made it a 14-point game with 10:36 remaining. Four plays into the next Bills drive, AZ let a golden opportunity slip through its hands when Tyrann Mathieu forced a Taylor fumble but could not gather the loose ball before it went out of bounds. Another Carpenter FG with just inside of 5 minutes to play made it 33-16 and while a late Arizona safety and long return on the free kick would make it interesting, the Cards would not seriously threaten.

**October 2, 2016 – University of Phoenix Stadium (64,622)**

In week 4, Arizona hosted the Rams for the first time since their move to Los Angeles. Like most match-ups between the clubs, it was a close, physical affair that came down to the wire. AZ led in most statistical categories (26-12 in 1<sup>st</sup> downs, 420-288 in total yards) but it was the Rams who made more pivotal plays and secured a win that upped their record to 3-1 and dropped the Cards to 1-3. WR John Brown led all receivers (10-144) and RB David Johnson had 124 scrimmage yards (83 rushing/41 receiving), becoming the 1<sup>st</sup> player in franchise history with 100+ in each of the season's 1<sup>st</sup> 4 games.

The scoring began when LA struck late in the 1<sup>st</sup> quarter. On 3<sup>rd</sup>-n-7 from his own 35, Rams QB Case Keenum threw a 13-yard pass to WR Brian Quick who broke a tackle and took it the rest of the way for a 65-yard TD. On Arizona's next series, a pair of Larry Fitzgerald receptions (22 yards) and Chris Johnson runs (26) along with a Rams personal foul took it to the LA13. Chris Johnson then ran it in from there but the TD was negated by a holding penalty. As a result, Chandler Catanzaro's 25-yard FG made it 7-3. On the next drive, a 23-yard reception by TE Lance Kendricks took it to the LA48 and on 3<sup>rd</sup>-n-12 from the LA46, Keenum found an open Kenny Britt on a 34-yarder to the AZ20. That led to a 29-yard Greg Zuerlein FG that extended the LA lead to 10-3. With 3:00 to go in the 1<sup>st</sup> half, the Cards had advanced to the LA33 but Palmer's deep pass was INT'd in the end zone by CB Trumaine Johnson. The Cards forced a 3-n-out on the subsequent Rams drive and regained possession at their own 20 with 1:48 left before intermission. Thanks largely to three John Brown receptions (15, 20, 18 yards) the Cards moved 80 yards in 8 plays and Palmer capped the drive with a 5-yard TD pass to WR Michael Floyd that tied the game at 10.

The Rams got the ball to start the 3<sup>rd</sup> quarter. After reaching the AZ43, Chandler Jones sacked Keenum forcing a fumble that he recovered himself. The Cards soon returned the favor. After they had reached the LA26, Palmer was sacked forcing a fumble recovered by the Rams at their own 31. Late in the 3<sup>rd</sup>, the Cards again marched deep into LA territory. The biggest play came on 3<sup>rd</sup>-n-3 from the AZ39 when Palmer lofted a 24-yard pass to WR JJ Nelson who tapped his toes at the LA37. A 24-yard David Johnson catch-n-run took it to the LA4 but AZ had to settle for another short Catanzaro FG that put the Cards up 13-10 on the last play of the 3<sup>rd</sup> quarter. Early in the 4<sup>th</sup>, the Rams went for it on 4<sup>th</sup>-n-5 at the AZ39 but turned it over on downs when Patrick Peterson knocked down a deep pass attempt. Three plays later though a David Johnson fumble turned it back over to the Rams at their own 41. LA would punt it back to the Cards but on 3<sup>rd</sup>-n-6 at the AZ39, Palmer was sacked and suffered a head injury that would sideline him for the rest of the day. Adding insult to the injury, Tavon Austin returned the ensuing punt 47 yards to the 34 and a tacked-on facemask penalty took it to the AZ19 with 5:09 left. Five plays later, Keenum's 4-yard TD pass to Quick made it 17-13 with 2:36 left. Drew Stanton came on to replace Palmer but on his 6<sup>th</sup> play was INT'd by S Mark Barron. After a 3-n-out and 3 AZ timeouts, the Cards took over at their own 31 with 1:01 left but they could not advance further than the LA37.

**CARDINALS 33, 49ers 21**  
**October 6, 2016 – Levi's Stadium (70,178)**

This Thursday night tilt in San Fran was a match-up of 1-3 teams desperate for a win. The Cardinals were on the road with just three days of preparation and without starting QB Carson Palmer who suffered a concussion the previous Sunday. But Arizona came through with a series of game-changing plays and again relied heavily on the combination of 13<sup>th</sup>-year WR Larry Fitzgerald and 2<sup>nd</sup>-year RB David Johnson. Those two combined for 266 of AZ's 296 yards from scrimmage and scored all 4 Cardinals TDs. Defensively, AZ sacked 49ers QB Blaine Gabbert 7 times – 2 each for DT Calais Campbell & LB Markus Golden - and also came up with 3 key takeaways. Cards back-up QB Drew Stanton delivered a mistake-free, 2-TD game and was sacked just once. All of it added up to a 33-21 Cardinals victory.

While the teams would ultimately combine to score 54, points were hard to come by early as the game's first 9 possessions ended in punts. San Fran got on the scoreboard late in the 2<sup>nd</sup> quarter thanks to a 10-play, 87-yard TD drive that ended with a 9-yard Gabbert TD pass to WR Jeremy Kerley; it was the 4<sup>th</sup> connection between the two on the drive. San Fran held onto that 7-0 at the 2:00 warning and faced a 3<sup>rd</sup>-n-10 at its own 24. But Cards LB Chandler Jones then batted Gabbert's pass in the air and Campbell snatched it for an INT that gave AZ the ball at the SF21. On the very next snap, Stanton and Fitzgerald hooked up on a 21-yard TD pass that tied the game going into intermission.

On the opening kickoff of the 2<sup>nd</sup> half, TE Ifeanyi Momah delivered an impressive and athletic play on kick coverage when he forced and recovered a fumble by Niners KR Chris Davis setting AZ up at the SF14. It appeared AZ would have to settle for a FG but a running-into-the-kicker penalty gave the Cards a fresh set of downs. They quickly took advantage on the next snap when Johnson ran it in from 4 yards out to give AZ a 14-7 lead. After a San Fran 3-n-out, the Cards moved 71 yards in 6 plays and went up 21-7 midway through the 3<sup>rd</sup> on a 21-yard Stanton pass to Fitzgerald. San Fran responded with its own lengthy drive, an 11-play, 82-yarder that ended with Carlos Hyde's 1-yard TD run. Down just 7, the 49ers soon got the ball back but on the 1<sup>st</sup> play of the 4<sup>th</sup> quarter, CB Marcus Cooper recorded his 3<sup>rd</sup> INT in 4 games and returned it to the SF24. That led to a 36-yard Catanzaro FG that again made it a two-score game. Another 3-n-out by the Niners was followed by a long AZ drive that consumed nearly half of the 4<sup>th</sup> quarter. On it the Cards passed once - a 21-yard catch-n-run by Johnson - and rushed 11 times including Johnson's 2-yard TD plunge that made it 31-14. The Niners added a late TD on a 1-yard Gabbert run but the Cards added the game's final points with 1:17 left when Campbell sacked Gabbert in the end zone for a safety.

**Game 6**  
**CARDINALS 28, Jets 3**  
**October 17, 2016 – University of Phoenix Stadium (64,709)**

In a Monday night home game against the Jets and former coordinator Todd Bowles, the Cards controlled the game from beginning to end. NY entered the night with the NFL's #2 ranked run defense, allowing just 68.4 rushing yards/game and had surrendered just 1 rushing TD in 5 games. But despite starting 2 back-up guards, the Cards offense was committed to the run and RB David Johnson rushed for 111 yards and 3 TDs. Overall, AZ enjoyed a 171-33 edge in rushing yards and did not give up a sack or commit a turnover. The defense surrendered just 230 total yards while recording a pair of takeaways and limiting the Jets to 2 for 13 on third down. It all added up to a decisive 25-point win that evened Arizona's record at 3-3 and gave the Cards their first win since 1975 over the Jets, who fell to 1-5 after dropping their 4th straight.

The Cards opened the scoring on their 2<sup>nd</sup> offensive possession of the game. On the first play after taking over at their own 42 following a Jets punt, Johnson patiently picked his way past several tackles at the line of scrimmage and exploded for a 58-yard TD jaunt down the left sideline. His run gave AZ its first points in the 1st quarter in 2016. The Jets trimmed it to 7-3 early in the 2<sup>nd</sup> quarter when Nick Folk's 39-yard FG capped a 7-play, 50-yard drive. On the ensuing drive, AZ moved 75 yards in 11 plays and punctuated it with a 2-yard Johnson TD run. The Cards took that 14-3 lead into the halftime locker room.

After the Jets opened the 3<sup>rd</sup> quarter with a 3-n-out, AZ took over at its own 32. The Cards would chew more than half of the 3<sup>rd</sup> quarter off the clock with a 14-play drive that ended with Johnson's 3<sup>rd</sup> rushing TD of the game, this one from 2 yards out. Down 21-3, the Jets moved deep into AZ territory on their next possession but on 3<sup>rd</sup>-n-7 from the AZ14, safety DJ Swearinger INT'd a Ryan Fitzpatrick pass in the end zone to kill the threat. For the 2<sup>nd</sup> straight possession, the Cards would launch a 14-play drive, this time moving 89 yards thanks in large part to four John Brown receptions that gained 47 yards. It ultimately ended when Carson Palmer and WR Michael Floyd connected on a 9-yard TD pass. Fitzpatrick was then pulled in favor of Geno Smith for what would be NY's final possession of the game. It ended when safety Tyrann Mathieu intercepted Smith to cap the complete team win.

Palmer returned to action after missing the previous game (concussion) and completed 23 of 34 passes for 213 yards; he had a TD but no INTs and was not sacked. Larry Fitzgerald was again the game's leading receiver with 6 catches for 49 yards. Referee Jerome Boger and his crew also played a prominent role in the game, marching off 19 total penalties for 147 yards.

**CARDINALS 6, Seahawks 6 (OT)**

**October 23, 2016 – University of Phoenix Stadium (65,089)**

The Cards hosted Seattle in a pivotal week 7 showdown on Sunday Night Football. A Seahawks win would give them a 5-1 record and commanding lead atop the NFC West. An AZ win would pull the Cards to within half a game of the division lead approaching the season's midway point. But in one of the most unusual and unbelievable games in recent memory, the teams would leave University of Phoenix Stadium with neither a victory nor defeat. They fought to a 3-3 tie through 4 quarters before each squad hit a FG on its opening possession of overtime. Improbably, though, the teams would trade misses on short game-winning FG tries to close the extra period and the contest ended in a rare 6-6 tie. It was the first tie in Seahawks history and Arizona's first since 1986.

By nearly every statistical measure, the Cardinals dominated the game. They ran 90 offensive plays to Seattle's 57, owned a huge time of possession advantage (46:21-28:39) and against the league's #1 defense had a 443-257 edge in total yards. RB David Johnson carried much of the offensive load with 113 rushing yards and 58 receiving. Defensively, Arizona was completely dominant. AZ forced punts on the 1<sup>st</sup> nine Seattle possessions and didn't allow Seattle to cross midfield until a 4<sup>th</sup> quarter blocked punt set them up at the 22. But the Cardinals could not capitalize and let multiple opportunities for points slip away. The first of those came early in the 2<sup>nd</sup> quarter when they reached the SEA21 but Chandler Catanzaro's 39-yard FG try was blocked by LB Bobby Wagner who leapt over the long snapper. It was initially penalized but the flag was picked up by referee Terry McAulay. A 46-yard Catanzaro FG on the next AZ possession would put the Cards up 3-0. They had a chance to add to the lead right before the half after reaching the SEA25 but a Seattle sack resulted in the half expiring before the Cards could try a FG.

On their opening drive of the 3<sup>rd</sup> quarter, the Cards advanced to the SEA18 and opted to go for it on 4<sup>th</sup>-n-1 but Johnson was stopped for no gain. As the Arizona D continued to shut down the Seahawks dangerous offense, the Cards clung to that 3-0 lead late into the game. But with 4:44 to go and the Cards stalled at their own 38, Seattle's Tanner McEvoy blocked Ryan Quigley's punt and the Seahawks took over at the AZ22. The Cards D forced them to settle for a 40-yard Steven Hauschka FG that tied it with 4:00 remaining. Each team would get the ball back one more time in regulation but neither could get into scoring position and the game went to overtime.

The Cards won the toss and got the ball first. They would move to the 27 but couldn't convert on a 3<sup>rd</sup>-n-5 from there and Catanzaro's 45-yard FG made it 6-3. The Seahawks had a chance to respond and did. After moving 57 yards in 9 plays to the AZ18, Hauschka's 36-yarder tied it at 6-6. The next score by either team would win it and it looked that would be AZ. A 27-yard completion to TE Ifeanyi Momah took it to the SEA48 and then on 3<sup>rd</sup>-n-7 from the 45, JJ Nelson's catch-n-run took it to the 5. A Johnson sweep appeared to score but was marked out at the 1. After a delay of game penalty, Catanzaro was sent out for a 24-yard game-winner but his try hit the left upright. Seattle then took over at its own 20 with 3:19 left. A deep pass to Jermaine Kearse gained 31 yards to the AZ43 and two plays later, a 27-yard completion to Doug Baldwin took it to the 9. It appeared Seattle would escape with the victory but Hauschka's 28-yard FG try with just seconds remaining was wide left and the game ended deadlocked at 6.

**Game 8**  
**Panthers 30, CARDINALS 20**  
**October 30, 2016 – Bank of Stadium (74,088)**

A week after battling the Seahawks for 75 minutes in a 6-6 Sunday night tie, the Cardinals traveled across the country for an early Sunday game against the Panthers who were coming off a bye. A rematch of the previous year's NFC Championship Game, Carolina scored the game's initial 24 points. The first 7 of them came on the contest's opening drive when officials mistakenly awarded Carolina a 46-yard fumble return TD on a play that was actually an incomplete forward pass. Two short Jonathan Stewart TD runs and a Graham Gano FG made it 24-0 with 2:45 left in the 1<sup>st</sup> half. But the Cards gamely battled back and while they outscored the Panthers 20-6 the rest of the way, it was not enough to make up the entire deficit. The loss dropped AZ to 3-4-1 at the season's midway point while Carolina improved to 2-5.

On the 5<sup>th</sup> play of the game, Carson Palmer was under pressure and tossed a short pass forward to David Johnson that fell incomplete. However, referee Walt Coleman and umpire Carl Paganelli ruled it a fumble that LB Thomas Davis returned 46 yards for a TD. Despite a technical issue that kept the network feed from the instant replay booth, replay official Lou Nazzaro chose to confirm the ruling on the field rather than stop the game for Coleman to review it. The Cards would then pick up just 2 first downs on their next 4 possessions - all of which ended in punts - while the Panthers added to their early lead. With 2:45 left in the 1<sup>st</sup> half and down 24-0, the Cards moved 75 yards in 9 plays as Palmer's 5-yard TD pass to WR JJ Nelson made it 24-7 at intermission.

The Panthers added Gano FGs on their opening 2 drives of the 3<sup>rd</sup> quarter to go up 30-7. Late in the quarter, Palmer again capped a 75-yard drive with a TD pass to a wide receiver, this time a 17-yarder to John Brown that made it 30-14. After a Panther 3-n-out, AZ found itself with a 1<sup>st</sup>-n-10 at the Carolina 46 to start the 4<sup>th</sup> quarter. But Coleman and his crew flagged the Cards on 3 straight plays to kill that drive. Their next would start at their own 8 but Palmer moved them 92 yards in 14 plays and with 5:01 left, another TD pass to Nelson made it 30-20 after the 2-point try failed. With 3:19 left, a Stewart fumble forced and recovered by S Tony Jefferson gave it to AZ at the CAR40. However, on the next play Palmer was INT'd at the line by DT Kony Ealy to dash any comeback hopes. Palmer would finish with 363 yards passing and 3 TDs but was under duress much of the afternoon and was sacked 8 times. AZ was also hampered by 10 total penalties flagged by Coleman and his mates.

**Game 9****CARDINALS 23, 49ers 20****November 13, 2016 – University of Phoenix Stadium (64,709)**

Coming off their bye, the Cardinals opened the 2<sup>nd</sup> half of the season at home against the 49ers. They took a 14-0 lead early in the 2<sup>nd</sup> quarter but allowed SF to stay close and the Niners eventually tied the game at 20 with 1:55 left. However, that was enough time for AZ to move into position for a game-winning FG try and Chandler Catanzaro's 34-yarder won it as time expired. The victory upped the Cards record to 4-4-1 and kept them in the thick of the playoff race while SF dropped its 8th straight to fall to 1-8.

The 49ers seemed intent on not letting the Cards beat them on the ground which opened up AZ's passing game. Larry Fitzgerald caught 12 passes for 133 yards while fellow WR Michael Floyd also eclipsed 100 yards (5-101). Both delivered athletic and critical receptions throughout the game including on the vital game-winning drive. Carson Palmer threw for 376 yards while David Johnson scored 2 TDs.

The team's traded punts on the game's first 4 drives before AZ opened the scoring with a 3-yard Palmer-to-Johnson TD pass on 3<sup>rd</sup>-n-goal. Later in the 1<sup>st</sup> quarter, Jeremy Kerley fumbled a SF punt return and Gabe Martin recovered at the AZ44. A defensive pass interference call on the next snap moved it 38 yards to the SF 18 and on the next play Johnson burst down the left sideline, diving to the pylon for another TD. The Niners answered on the ensuing drive by moving 75 yards in 6 plays and Kerley's 17-yard TD catch of a Colin Kaepernick pass made it 14-7. After the teams traded FGs, AZ led 17-10 with 1:32 remaining in the 1<sup>st</sup> half and got the ball back at its own 18 and 2 timeouts. Palmer then completed 7 of 8 passes for 68 yards – including 3 for 40 yards to Floyd – as part of an 81-yard drive that ended with a 19-yard Catanzaro FG as the half expired.

The Cards were poised to add to their 20-10 lead early in the 3<sup>rd</sup> when a flea flicker to Fitzgerald picked up 33 yards to the SF7 but 2 plays later Palmer lost a fumble on a sack by LB Eli Harold. The 49ers would convert the turnover into a 53-yard Phil Dawson FG that made it a 7-point game. Late in the 3<sup>rd</sup> Palmer appeared to hit WR JJ Nelson for a key pick-up but instead the pass ricocheted off Nelson's chest to S Eric Reid for an INT. The 49ers did not capitalize and with 3:24 left, the Cards held a 20-13 lead and had it near midfield. But Palmer was INT'd by LB Gerald Hodges and the 49ers took over at their own 43 with 3:13 remaining. By the 2-minute warning they had reached the AZ4 and on 3<sup>rd</sup>-n-2 from there, Kaepernick ran it in to tie the game at 20. After the kickoff, the Cards took over at their own 15 with 1:51 left and 3 timeouts. Palmer would complete 4 of his next 6 passes for 60 yards to move into FG range. The first of those completions was a huge leaping catch by Floyd near the sideline that moved it from the AZ15 to 41. AZ ultimately advanced to the SF16 before Catanzaro hit the 34-yard game-winner at the gun.

**Game 10****Vikings 30, CARDINALS 24****November 20, 2016 – US Bank Stadium (66,808)**

In week 11, the Vikings hosted Arizona in their inaugural season at US Bank Stadium. The game pitted a pair of the league's top defensive teams each needing a victory to keep up with the rest of the NFC playoff pack. Against the NFL's #1 scoring defensive unit, the Cardinals produced 24 points and again enjoyed a sizable advantage in nearly every statistical category. However the Vikings produced a pair 100-yard returns within a 3-and-a-half minute stretch in the late 2<sup>nd</sup>/early 3<sup>rd</sup> to seize control. While AZ fought back and closed it to within 6, they couldn't muster a TD on either of 2 late game possessions and fell 30-24. The defeat dropped the Cards to 4-5-1 while Minnesota improved to 6-4.

Minnesota's 1<sup>st</sup> drive of the game started at the AZ44 after a Cards punt. They took advantage by moving the 44 yards in 5 plays and Sam Bradford's 16-yard pass to WR Adam Thielen gave the hosts an early 7-0 lead. The Cards answered with an 11-play, 75-yard drive that RB David Johnson capped with his 1-yard TD run. After a Vikings 3-n-out, Johnson carried 8 times for 54 yards on the next drive helping to set-up Chandler Catanzaro's 34-yard go-ahead FG. Midway thru the 2<sup>nd</sup>, the Vikes had advanced to the AZ31 when they ran a flea-flicker out of the wildcat formation that resulted in a 29-yard pass interference penalty that moved it to the 2. On the next play, RB Matt Asiata ran it in and the score was 13-10 after Justin Bethel blocked the PAT. The Cards were on the verge of moving back on top when they advanced to the MIN9 on the next drive but on 3<sup>rd</sup>-n-goal from there, disaster struck. Running a quick out, WR John Brown was held up by Captain Munnerylyn at the goal-line and Xavier Rhodes picked off Carson Palmer's pass intended for Brown. No flag was thrown and Rhodes returned it 100-yards for a TD in a momentous swing that made it 20-10 with 3 minutes left in the 1<sup>st</sup> half. The resilient Cards battled back. Four Johnson plays gained 42 yards (2-18 rushing/2-24 receiving) moving it to the MIN29. From there Palmer found Jermaine Gresham down the middle and the TE fought his way to the end zone for a TD.

As the 2<sup>nd</sup> half started the Cards trailed by just 3 and kicked off to the Vikings. However Cordarrelle Patterson fielded the kickoff 4 yards deep and raced 104 yards for a TD. Now down 10, the Cards needed a comeback. With 5:30 left in the 3<sup>rd</sup> they took over at their own 31 and on the 1<sup>st</sup> play Palmer went deep down the middle to Floyd but the pass was INT'd by Rhodes. The Vikings converted the takeaway into a Kai Forbath FG that made it 30-17. Later a Chandler Jones sack of Bradford caused a fumble that Deone Bucannon recovered at the MIN27 and 6 plays later, Palmer tossed a 4-yard TD pass to Johnson to make it 30-24 midway thru the 4<sup>th</sup>. The Cards would twice get the ball back but the Vikings pass rush made it impossible to erase the deficit and MIN held on for the 6-point decision.

**November 27, 2016 – Georgia Dome (69,233)**

In week 12 at Atlanta, a Cards defense ranked #1 in the NFL in yards allowed faced a Falcons offense ranked #1 in points per game. Early on, Arizona's offense matched Atlanta's and scored on its 1<sup>st</sup> two drives for the first time in 2016. But ultimately missed opportunities, drops and untimely penalties proved to be the Cardinals undoing and they fell to 4-6-1 after being outscored 21-6 in the 2<sup>nd</sup> half.

The Cards began the game by taking the opening kickoff and moving 75 yards in 9 plays; Carson Palmer's 1-yard TD pass to TE Jermain Gresham gave them their 1<sup>st</sup> opening drive score of the season. The Falcons answered on the ensuing series when Devonta Freeman's 1-yard run capped an 11-play, 75-yard drive. After the teams traded FGs, the game was tied at 10 when a short punt gave Atlanta the ball at the AZ45. Two plays later Matt Ryan hit WR Taylor Gabriel on a quick screen that he took 35 yards for a TD. Leading 17-10, Atlanta was at the AZ35 late in the 1<sup>st</sup> half when Ryan's pass bounced from WR Julio Jones to Cards S DJ Swearinger for an INT. AZ took over at its own 37 with :25 left and quickly moved into position for a 54-yard Chandler Catanzaro FG that made it 17-13 as the half expired.

Atlanta added to its lead on its 2<sup>nd</sup> possession of the 3<sup>rd</sup> quarter when Tevin Coleman's 2-yard TD run made it 24-13. Earlier in the drive the Cards had a chance to take it away when Swearinger had his hands on a Ryan pass but could not hold on for the INT. Down 11, the Cards had the ball at the ATL40 early in the 4<sup>th</sup> and went for it on 4<sup>th</sup>-n-7 but Michael Floyd couldn't hold onto Palmer's pass and they turned it over on downs. The AZ defense forced a Falcons punt on the next ATL possession but DT Calais Campbell jumped offside to extend the drive. It ultimately ended with another Ryan-to-Gabriel TD on a screen pass and the Falcons led 31-13 midway thru the 4<sup>th</sup>. With 4:44 left, Palmer's 3-yard TD pass to David Johnson made it 31-19 after the 2-point try failed. Atlanta recovered the ensuing on-side kick try and converted the short field into another Freeman TD run 6 plays later.

RB David Johnson again led the way for the Cardinals with 58 rushing yards and another 103 on 8 catches. It put him over 100 combined yards for the 11<sup>th</sup> time in 2016, making him just the 2<sup>nd</sup> player in NFL history to top that century mark in his team's 1<sup>st</sup> 11 games of the season (Edgerrin James 2000 & '05). Larry Fitzgerald extended his streak of games with a reception to 190, tying Marvin Harrison for the 3<sup>rd</sup> longest in NFL history. He also passed Tim Brown and moved into 5<sup>th</sup> place on the NFL's all-time receptions list.

**CARDINALS 31, Redskins 23**

**December 4, 2016 – University of Phoenix Stadium (64,939)**

In a Week 13 match-up of NFC teams fighting for their playoff lives, the Cards moved to 5-6-1 with a 31-23 home win over Washington. The Redskins fell to 6-5-1 with the loss. The tight contest featured four 2<sup>nd</sup>-half lead changes and not surprisingly came down to a handful of key plays. One of the biggest came with 3:47 left to play and AZ holding a 1-point lead. Facing a 4<sup>th</sup>-n-1 at their own 34, the Cards decided to go for it and RB David Johnson ran for a 14-yard gain. On a 2<sup>nd</sup>-n-10 three plays later Carson Palmer delivered the dagger with a 42-yard deep strike to WR JJ Nelson. Johnson topped 100 scrimmage yards for the 12<sup>th</sup> straight game, finishing with 84 and a TD rushing, and 91 with a TD receiving. Larry Fitzgerald had a game-high 10 receptions for 78 yards and eclipsed several career milestones; he moved past Cris Carter & Marvin Harrison into 3<sup>rd</sup> on the NFL's all-time receptions list, passed Andre Johnson and moved into 10<sup>th</sup> in receiving yardage, and became the youngest in NFL history to reach 1,100 career receptions.

For the 2<sup>nd</sup> straight week the Cardinals scored a TD on the game's opening series. This time it was David Johnson 1-yard run that capped a 15-play, 75-yard drive. Washington would pull to within 7-6 thanks to a pair of Dustin Hopkins FGs on consecutive drives in the 2<sup>nd</sup> quarter. Chandler Catanzaro's 28-yard FG in the closing seconds of the 1<sup>st</sup> half gave AZ a 10-6 lead at intermission.

Washington got the ball to start the 3<sup>rd</sup> quarter and on their 2<sup>nd</sup> snap, QB Kirk Cousins connected with WR DeSean Jackson on a deep ball down the middle. That 59-yard completion took it to the AZ5 and Cousins' 1-yard sneak put Washington up 13-10. AZ's next drive ended when Catanzaro just missed from 53 yards out. The Cards, however, would quickly get ball back when DT Calais Campbell sacked Cousins forcing a fumble that LB Markus Golden returned to the WAS10. That set-up a 6-yard Palmer TD pass to WR Michael Floyd. Trailing 17-13, the Redskins then moved 75 yards in 8 plays and re-took the lead late in the 3<sup>rd</sup> when Cousins hit WR Jamison Crowder down the seam with a 26-yard TD pass on 3<sup>rd</sup> down. AZ would respond with its own 75-yard drive and moved back in front thanks to a 25-yard Johnson catch-n-run TD down the right sideline. A 53-yard Hopkins FG made it a 1-point game with 6:01 remaining. Four plays into the ensuing drive, the Cards executed that crucial 4<sup>th</sup> down play and subsequent deep TD that put them up 8 with 1:56 left. It was still a one possession game when the Redskins took over at their own 25 with 2 timeouts. Washington advanced to the AZ 28 with :52 left when Patrick Peterson picked off Cousins to seal the victory.

**Game 13**  
**Dolphins 26, CARDINALS 23**  
**December 11, 2016 – Hard Rock Stadium (65,750)**

On a rainy South Florida afternoon in week 14, the Cardinals & Dolphins battled for their playoff lives. The weather made conditions very challenging and the 2 teams combined for five 1<sup>st</sup> quarter turnovers. By the start of the 4<sup>th</sup> quarter, the Dolphins led by 12 and had the Cards pinned at their own 1. But despite that poor field position, the inclement weather and a rash of in-game injuries, the Cards would battle back to tie the game. It was Miami however that would come up with the key plays late as back-up QB Matt Moore came on in place of injured starter Ryan Tannehill (knee). He led MIA into position for a short FG that won it as time expired. The loss dropped AZ to 5-7-1 and all but ended any postseason hopes.

On the game's opening drive LB Mike Hull intercepted a Carson Palmer pass that deflected off Larry Fitzgerald and led to a 28-yard Tannehill TD pass to WR Kenny Stills. AZ answered immediately when WR JJ Nelson took a reverse and raced 56 yards for a TD that made it 7-6 after the PAT try was wide left. The teams would then trade turnovers the rest of the quarter as each side lost a fumble and threw an INT. Early in the 2<sup>nd</sup>, MIA went up 14-6 when Tannehill capped a 5-play, 43-yard drive with a 7-yard TD pass to TE Dion Sims. Later in the quarter, AZ moved to the MIA14 but a sack backed them into a 41-yard FG that was no good after hitting the left upright. A quick Dolphins 3-n-out gave AZ another chance for points before intermission and Chandler Catanzaro's 56-yard FG made it 14-9.

Miami got the ball to open the 3<sup>rd</sup> quarter. They quickly faced a 3rd-n-7 from their own 26 when Jarvis Landry caught a short pass, broke 2 tackles and took it all the way down the left sideline for a 71-yard gain to the 3. That set up a 3-yard TD pass from Tannehill to RB Damien Williams that made it 21-9. That score remained as the Cards offense could get little traction. Meanwhile the Dolphins lost Tannehill to a knee injury late in the 3<sup>rd</sup> quarter. With 13:48 to play, the Cards were backed up to their own 1 and down 12. But in 12 plays, they covered 99 yards and ended the drive with Palmer's TD pass to WR Brittan Golden on 3<sup>rd</sup>-n-goal from the 9. A successful PAT would have trimmed it to 5 but the try was blocked and S Walt Aikens returned it for a 2-point conversion that instead made it 23-15. After forcing a Miami 3-n-out, AZ's offense took over at midfield with 5:14 to play and down 8. In 6 plays they advanced to the MIA8 and on 3<sup>rd</sup>-n-4 from there, Palmer hit Nelson with another TD pass. He followed with a successful 2-point conversion to David Johnson that tied the game at 23 with 3:01 remaining. The AZ defense again forced a 3-n-out but when the Cards could not pick up a 1<sup>st</sup> down on the subsequent possession they too had to punt. With 1:29 left Moore & the offense took over at the AZ47. A 12-yard pass to Stills took it to the 30 and on the next snap the 2 connected on a pass play to the 1. Two unsuccessful running plays nearly exhausted the clock but MIA stopped it with :01 left and Andrew Franks' 21-yard FG won it.

**Saints 48, CARDINALS 41**  
**December 18, 2016 – University of Phoenix Stadium (65,072)**

In their final home game of '16, the Cards found themselves in a shootout with the Saints. They combined for 89 total points, the NFL's most in 2016. In the end, AZ could not match QB Drew Brees, who finished with 389 yards and 4 TDs. His Cardinal counterpart Carson Palmer was also sharp, passing for 318 yards with 2 TDs and no INTs. RB David Johnson continued his brilliant play running for 2 TDs to give him 13 rushing TDs for the year, and 17 overall that tied the franchise's single-season record. With 108 yards from scrimmage he became the 1<sup>st</sup> in NFL history with 100+ in 14 straight to start a season.

On the game's opening drive, RB Kerwynn Williams took a direct snap and raced around the right side for a 49-yard TD run, most of it without a left shoe. The Saints answered with a FG and on the 2<sup>nd</sup> play of the next drive Larry Fitzgerald lost the ball after a reception. The Saints took over at the AZ30 and capitalized with a 10-yard Brees TD pass to RB Travaris Cadet. Midway thru the 2<sup>nd</sup> quarter, LB Markus Golden knocked the ball from Brees and DT Calais Campbell returned the fumble 53 yards for a TD that made it 13-10 AZ after the PAT failed. Less than a minute later Brees went deep to Brandin Cooks for a 65-yard TD. The pair connected again on the next NO possession, this time on a crossing pattern that went 45 yards for a TD that made it 24-14 with 1:51 left in the half. That was enough time for Palmer to lead an 80-yard drive that ended on a 10-yard TD pass to WR JJ Nelson.

The Saints added a 39-yard FG to make it 27-20 9 minutes into the 3<sup>rd</sup> but the Cards answered with a 62-yard scoring drive that Johnson capped with a 2-yard game-tying TD run. AZ forced the Saints to settle for a FG on the next drive but Justin Bethel was lined up in the neutral zone and 3 plays later former Cardinal Tim Hightower put NO back on top with a 3-yard TD run. The back-n-forth continued when Johnson's 7-yard TD run made it 34-34 with 8:57 to play. On those 2 AZ TD drives, Palmer was 7-7 passing for 99 yards. But Brees and the Saints kept rolling. Michael Thomas' 4-yard TD catch made it 41-34. When WR Brittan Golden fumbled it over to NO on the 3<sup>rd</sup> play of the next drive, the Saints took over at the AZ29. On 3<sup>rd</sup> down, LB Kevin Minter sacked Brees back to the AZ38 but referee Carl Cheffers threw a highly-controversial roughing the passer flag. A minute later, Hightower's 2-yard TD run made it 48-34. The Cards would not quit as Palmer's 30-yard TD pass to John Brown pulled AZ to within 7 with 2:19 left but an unsuccessful on-side kick and one Saints 1<sup>st</sup> down put the game away.

**Game 15**  
**CARDINALS 34, Seahawks 31**  
**December 24, 2016 – Century Link Field (69,050)**

This week 16 Christmas eve game in Seattle was a match-up of teams in different situations. The Cards had been eliminated from postseason contention the week before while Seattle had a #2 seed and first-round bye on the line. But an Arizona team depleted on both sides of the ball built an early lead thanks to a smothering defense that sacked Russell Wilson 5 times in the 1<sup>st</sup> half. They would lose the lead late but rally to hand SEA its only home loss of the season. Carson Palmer played a turnover free-game and was sacked just once behind a makeshift offensive line that helped the offense score 34 points against a Seattle D ranked #2 in the NFL in points allowed (16.8). RB David Johnson would score 3 times to set franchise single-season records for overall and rushing TDs. He also gained over 100 scrimmage yards for the 15<sup>th</sup> straight game to tie Barry Sanders' NFL record.

Calais Campbell provided the game's 1<sup>st</sup> big play on SEA's opening drive when he recovered a fumble at the SEA23. An 11-yard JJ Nelson catch took it to the 2 and Johnson ran it in from there. Late in the 1<sup>st</sup>, DT Rodney Gunter blocked Steven Hauschka's 45-yard FG try to preserve the 7-0 lead. It remained that way until late in the 2<sup>nd</sup> when Palmer went deep to JJ Nelson for an 80-yard TD pass, the longest by an opponent at CenturyLink Field. Down 14-0, the Seahawks responded. A play after a 31-yard Doug Baldwin completion moved it to the AZ29, Wilson completed a pass to WR Tyler Lockett that was initially ruled a TD but after replay review was spotted at the 1; on the play Lockett was lost for the game and season with a broken leg. From there the Cards D stopped SEA on 3 straight plays setting up 4<sup>th</sup>-n-goal from the 1. SEA went for it but Gunter knifed up the middle to drop Wilson for a 7-yard loss. Two plays later, a flawed exchange led to a fumble that SEA recovered at the AZ9 with :32 left in the half. The AZ defense again rose up and after 3 straight incompletions, Hauschka's 27-yard FG made it 14-3 at intermission.

Late in the 3<sup>rd</sup>, Alex Okafor blocked a SEA punt and on the ensuing series Johnson's 1-yard TD run capped a 9-play, 61-yard drive to make it 21-10. Seattle answered when Baldwin turned in a 42-yard catch-n-run for a TD that closed it to 21-18 with 6:47 left. On the next 2 plays from scrimmage, Johnson ran 33 yards to the SEA42 and Nelson took a 41-yard catch to the 1; Johnson's 3<sup>rd</sup> rushing TD of the game again made it a 10-point game. The Cards then stopped SEA on a 4<sup>th</sup>-n-1 from their own 42 and it led to a 42-yard Catanzaro FG that made it 31-18 with 4:10 to play. Down 13, the Seahawks stormed back. Jimmy Graham's 37-yard TD catch-n-run cut it to 6 with 2:48 to go and then Wilson found WR Paul Richardson with a 5-yard TD pass. However, Hauschka's PAT missed wide left and the game remained tied at 31 with a minute left. AZ would take over at its own 25 and 1 timeout. A pair of Johnson receptions then covered 13 & 29 yards while an 8-yard catch by Larry Fitzgerald took it to the SEA25. With the clock running down, Catanzaro and the FG unit rushed onto the field and hit the game-winner from 43 yards as time expired.
