ALL-TIME SERIES

The Panthers lead the all-time series 20-12, with Tampa Bay having won the first matchup this season, a 17-14 victory on Monday Night Football. Prior to that game, Carolina had won the past six contests, sweeping the series from 2013-15. Tampa Bay took both matchups in 2012: 16-10 in Tampa and 27-21 in Charlotte. In 2011, the Panthers won, 38-19, in Tampa, and 48-16, in Charlotte. Tampa swept the 2010 series, 20-7 at Carolina and 31-16 in Tampa. The Panthers won both meetings of the 2009 season, 28-21, in Tampa, with the game-winning touchdown in the final minute of the game. and the second meeting by a score of 16-6 in Charlotte. Both teams won at home in 2008, including a 27-3 Buccaneers victory in Tampa (10/12/08) in the first meeting and a 38-23 Buccaneers loss in Charlotte (12/8/08) on Monday Night Football. In 2007, Tampa Bay defeated the Panthers in Carolina, 20-7, and then fell 31-23 in the last week of the regular season with Tampa Bay resting most of its starters to prepare for the playoffs. In 2006, the Panthers won 26-24 at Tampa Bay (9/24/06) and 24-10 at Carolina (11/13/06). The teams split the two meetings in 2005: Carolina won 34-14 at Tampa Bay (11/6/05) and the Buccaneers prevailed 20-10 at Carolina (12/11/05). Tampa Bay won three in a row from 1998-02 and started the series 4-1 before losing five consecutive meetings from 2003-05. Tampa Bay won both meetings in 2002, a 12-9 win at Carolina (10/27/02) and a 23-10 win at home (11/17/02). The Buccaneers were Carolina's fourth opponent in the Panthers' inaugural season in 1995, and Tampa Bay earned a 20-13 victory at Clemson Memorial Stadium (10/1/95). The following year, Carolina downed Tampa Bay 24-0 (12/1/96) on its way to the NFC Championship Game in just its second year of existence. The Buccaneers captured the last meeting prior to the 2002 season, 16-13, in 1998 at home.

- On the opening drive of the game, the Saints faced third-and-five at the Buccaneers 46-yard line, when LB Lavonte David sacked QB Drew Brees for a four-yard loss, forcing a punt. David now has 3.0 sacks this season and 16.0 in his career.

- Tampa Bay scored its first points of the game on a 12-yard touchdown pass from QB Jameis Winston to TE Cameron Brate, finishing a four-play, 39-yard drive that lasted 1:13.

- Brate now has eight receiving touchdowns this season, tied for the most ever by a Buccaneers tight end in a single season. His eight receiving touchdowns are tied for the ninth-most in a season in franchise history.

- In the second half, RB Jacquizz Rodgers scored Tampa Bay's second touchdown of the day, rushing for a three-yard touchdown to cap a 10-play, 75-yard drive that lasted 5:23. It is Rodgers' second rushing touchdown this season and the seventh of his career. He finished the game with 63 yards on 15 carries.

- The Buccaneers scored on their next possession, driving 75 yards in eight plays, taking 4:28. The drive ended with a 34-yard touchdown pass from Jameis Winston to WR Mike Evans. Evans now has 11 receiving touchdowns this season, tied for the second-most in a single season in team history.

LAST GAME REGAP

NEW ORLEANS – In Week 16, the Tampa Bay Buccaneers traveled to New Orleans to face division rival New Orleans, but the Buccaneers were unable to sweep the Saints after beating them at home just 13 days before. After Tampa Bay won the coin toss and elected to defer, both teams exchanged punts before the Saints were able to put together an 11-play, 91-yard drive topped with a six-yard run by running back Mark Ingram to take New Orleans to a 7-0 lead with 1:01 left in the first quarter. With 12:03 left in the first half, quarterback Jameis Winston found tight end Cameron Brate for a 12-yard touchdown to tie the score at 7-7. On the ensuing drive, New Orleans responded with a 42-yard field goal by kicker Wil Lutz to put the Saints back in the lead at 10-7. Lutz struck again with 0:03 left on the clock in the first half by kicking a 34-yard field goal to take the score to 13-7 headed into the locker room. On the Buccaneers first possession of the second half, a pass from Winston intended for wide receiver Mike Evans was intercepted by New Orleans safety Jairus Byrd and returned to the TB 14. On the next play, Ingram ran the ball into the end zone for a 14-yard touchdown to take the score to 20-7 early in the second half. The

Buccaneers responded with a 75-yard drive with running back Jacquizz Rodgers finding the end zone for a 3-yard rushing touchdown. Kicker Roberto Aguayo's extra point was good and the Buccaneers tightened the margin to just six points. On the next drive, New Orleans running back Tavaris Cadet responded with a 11-yard touchdown grab to cap a 75-yard drive. Ingram found the end zone for the two-point conversion, taking the score to 28-14. The Buccaneers responded with 34-yardtouchdown pass to Evans to put the Buccaneers down just seven points at the end of the third quarter. On the opening drive of the fourth quarter, the Saints set up Lutz for a 21-yard field goal to take the score to 31-21. On the following drive, the Buccaneers moved the ball down the field, but a pass intended for wide receiver Russell Shepard was intercepted by Byrd again at the NO 28. The Saints were forced to punt on their next possession before Aguayo made a 35-yard field goal, taking the score to 31-24. The Saints were able to run the clock out to secure the win in New Orleans, dropping the Bucs to 8-7.

Tampa Bay 17, Carolina 14 (October 10, 2016)

CHARLOTTE, N.C. - In Week 5, the Tampa Bay Buccaneers traveled to face division rival Carolina on Monday Night Football. Both teams were entering the game with injuries, including Tampa Bay being out five starters and Carolina out four, most notably starting quarterback and reigning league MVP Cam Newton. After the Panthers won the toss and elected to defer, the Buccaneers opened the game with a 15-play, 58yard drive capped with a 35-yard field goal from kicker Roberto Aguayo to take the Buccaneers to an early lead at 3-0. During the second quarter, Carolina punt returner Ted Ginn muffed a punt and the ball was recovered by Buccaneers wide receiver Russell Shepard. Unable to capitalize off of the turnover, Tampa Bay was forced to punt and then was able to turn over the ball again with an interception by linebacker Daryl Smith on a pass intended for Carolina wide receiver Kelvin Benjamin from quarterback Derek Anderson. The Bucs were able to take advantage of the turnover by setting up Aguayo for a 35-yard field goal, taking the score to 6-0 into the half. The Panthers started off strong in the third quarter by putting together a 75-yard drive totaling 5:48 topped with a 1-yard run by running back Cameron Artis-Payne, taking the score to 7-6. On Carolina's next possession, Artis-Payne came in clutch again with a 12-yard touchdown to take the score to 14-6 with 6:03 left in the third. On the ensuing drive, the Buccaneers moved the ball down the field quickly including a 38yard pass to tight end Cameron Brate and ended with a 26-yard pass to wide receiver Mike Evans for the touchdown. Quarterback Jameis Winston threw to wide receiver Adam Humphries for the two-point conversion to tie the game at 14-14 late in the third quarter. During the fourth quarter, Carolina had the chance to take the lead with 8:45 left on the clock, but a pass intended for tight end Greg Olsen on the TB 1 was intercepted by cornerback Brent Grimes to keep the Buccaneers in the game. Then with 0:03 seconds left on the clock, Aguayo sealed the deal for the Buccaneers with a 38-yard field goal, taking the final score to 17-14, improving Tampa Bay's record to 2-3 and undefeated in the NFC South.

REGULAR SEASON HIGHLIGHTS

The first game in the series took place at Clemson's Memorial Stadium, and the Buccaneers came away with a 20-13 victory, despite a strong effort from the expansion Panthers (10/1/95)... Carolina actually outgained Tampa Bay 393-310 but were victimized by a John Booty interception and three lost fumbles... QB Casey Weldon subbing for an injured Trent Dilfer, provided the winning points in the fourth quarter with a one-yard TD... Tampa Bay allowed just 215 total yards, but it was Carolina's defense that did in the Bucs in a 24-0 shutout in a driving rain at Ericsson Stadium (12/1/96)... Panthers DE Shawn King sacked Dilfer, forced a fumble and returned the fumble 12 yards for a score... Two Tampa Bay interceptions led to Carolina touchdowns in the second half... QB Trent Dilfer rallied Tampa Bay to two touchdowns in the last five minutes in a tight 16-13 win over Carolina at Raymond James Stadium (10/18/98)... Tampa Bay K Martin Gramatica connected on all four of his field goal attempts, including a game-winning 47-yard field goal with five seconds remaining, to lift the Buccaneers to a 12-9 win at Ericsson Stadium (10/27/02)... A tenacious Bucs defense forced four turnovers and held the Panthers to a season-low 130 total yards... Tampa Bay's defense produced four turnovers and four sacks in a 23-10 win over Carolina at home, giving Tampa Bay its best start in team history at 8-2 (11/17/02)... QB Brad Johnson threw touchdown strikes to WR Keyshawn Johnson (23 yards) and WR Keenan McCardell (36 yards) at Carolina (11/9/03)... Tampa Bay set an NFL record with a sack in its 69th consecutive game... CB Tim Wansley recorded two INTs, one for a touchdown , in the game... In a 21-14 loss, WR Michael Clayton broke the all-time record for receiving yards in a season by a rookie, surpassing WR Lawrence Dawsey (11/28/04)... WR Michael Clayton set the rookie record for touchdown receptions in a season, after hauling in two touchdowns, to give him six on the year in a 37-20 loss (12/26/04)... In a 20-10 victory at Carolina, CB Ronde Barber recorded his 20th career sack, making him the only cornerback in NFL history to have 20 sacks and 20 interceptions in a career (12/11/05)... CB Ronde Barber moved into a tie on the Buccaneers' all-time interception list, after notching his 31st career interception on Monday Night Football (11/5/06)... WR Ike Hilliard caught seven balls for 114 yards, and Tampa Bay gained 189 yards on the ground to highlight a complete team effort and a 20-7 Buccaneer win (9/30/07)... In a 27-3 win, rookie LB Geno Hayes recorded his first career blocked punt and touchdown, as he recovered the ball and returned it 22 yards for the score (10/12/08)... Tampa Bay's defense allowed just 40 yards on the ground, forcing three interceptions along with the blocked punt... RB Warrick Dunn rushed for a game-high 115 yards on 22 carries (5.2 avg), marking the 30th 100-yard rushing game in his career... WR Antonio Bryant had a record-setting performance with nine receptions for a career-high 200 vards, the second-highest receiving vards total in franchise history, and two touchdowns (12/8/08)... Rookie QB Josh Freeman threw for 321 yards, while RB Carnell Williams ran for 92, but turnovers proved to be costly, as the Panthers knocked-off the Bucs at Raymond James Stadium by a score of 16-6 (12/6/09)...

A strong defensive performance keyed the Tampa Bay victory, as Carolina RBs DeAngelo Williams and Jonathan Stewart were limited to just 97 yards and no touchdowns on 25 carries, and recorded four sacks on Carolina QBs Matt Moore and Jimmy Clausen (9/19/10)... Buccaneers QB Josh Freeman threw two touchdown passes, and TE Kellen Winslow led the Buccaneers receivers with four receptions for 83 vards... RBs LeGarrette Blount and Cadillac Williams combined for 153 rushing yards and two touchdowns, as the Buccaneers defeated the Panthers 31-16 to sweep the season series (11/14/10)... K Connor Barth went four for four on field goal attempts, the shortest of which was 44 yards, and the longest of which was 50 vards, in a Panthers win (12/4/11)... The Tampa defense held Carolina to 10 yards total rushing, tying a franchise record for fewest rushing yards allowed, in a Buccaneers 16-10 win (9/9/12)... RB **Doug Martin** set the pace for the offense, rushing for 138 yards on 24 carries... After trailing 21-10 with six minutes remaining in the game, the Buccaneers scored twice to tie the game, including a touchdown drive that began with 1:02 remaining, capped off by a 24-yard touchdown pass and subsequent 2-point conversion, both from QB Josh Freeman to WR Vincent Jackson... After winning the overtime coin toss, Martin and the Bucs marched down the field, sparked by Martin's 11- and 27-yard rushes to start the period, and won the game on the first overtime touchdown in franchise history, a 15-yard strike from Freeman to TE Dallas Clark (11/18/12)... QB **Mike Glennon**, in the first primetime start of his career, set career highs in passing yards (275), while also setting Buccaneers rookie records for completions (30) and attempts (51) in a Buccaneers loss (10/24/13)... LB Lavonte David recorded 12 tackles, including one sack, in the game... The Buccaneers defense recorded two interceptions of Panthers QB Cam Newton in the loss, one each for LB Lavonte David and S Keith Tandy (12/1/13)... Opening the 2014 season in Tampa, Carolina took a 17-0 lead before two fourth quarter touchdown passes from Buccaneers QB Josh McCown closed the gap, but the Panthers added a field goal and held on for a 20-14 victory... DT Gerald McCoy recorded one sack, dropping Panthers QB Derek Anderson for a nine-vard loss (9/7/14)... LB Danny Lansanah recorded a career-best 1.5 sacks, S Bradley McDougald registered a career-high 15 tackles and LB Lavonte David added 12 tackles, one sack, one pass defensed and one forced fumble, but the Panthers prevailed, 19-17 (12/14/14)... DIRK KOETTER



Dirk Koetter was named the 11th head coach in franchise history on January 15, 2016. He is in his second season with the team, after serving as offensive coordinator in 2015.

In his first season with Tampa Bay (2015), Koetter helped pilot one of the most successful offenses in the NFL and one of the best in team history. The team set the franchise record for total yards (6,014 - 357.0 per game), while posting the second-most rushing yards

(2,162 - 135.1 per game) and second-most passing yards (3,852 - 240.8 per game), along with the fifth-most total points (342 - 21.4 per game). Tampa Bay ranked fifth in the NFL in yards per game (375.9), fifth in rushing yards per game (135.1) and second in the league in rush average (4.75). It marked the first time in franchise history that the Buccaneers have finished in the Top five in total offense.

Much of Tampa Bay's offensive success in 2015 came at the hands of rookie quarterback Jameis Winston, who accounted for 28 total touchdowns (22 passing, six rushing). Koetter also helped guide Winston to 4,042 passing yards, which were the second-most in a single season in team history and the third-most by a rookie in NFL history. Winston's 22 passing touchdowns were tied for the fourth-most in a single season in team history and the fourth-most by a rookie in NFL history. His six rushing touchdowns and 28 combined touchdowns were the most in a single season by a Buccaneers quarterback, while his 28 total touchdowns were tied for the third-most by a rookie in NFL history.

Prior to Koetter's arrival, the Buccaneers ranked 29th in rushing and tied for 29th in sacks allowed in 2014. This past season, under Koetter's guidance, the unit completed an impressive turnaround. Despite starting two rookies on the offensive line, Tampa Bay still managed to block for the NFL's second-leading rusher (Doug Martin -1,402 yards) and tied for the fourth-fewest sacks in the league. While Martin was a large part of the team's success running the ball, he was aided by running back Charles Sims, who totaled 1,090 scrimmage yards (107 rushes for 529 yards, 51 catches for 561 yards). Sims averaged 6.9 yards per touch, the most by any player in the NFL with at least 150 touches since 2011 (Darren Sproles in 2011, 7.6 avg.). Martin and Sims' combined 2,566 yards from scrimmage were the most by a running back duo in the NFL in 2015 and set a franchise record for backfield teammates. Koetter also played a key role in revamping the Buccaneers' passing game. Part of the team's success passing the ball came from targeting top wide receiver Mike Evans, who caught 74 passes for 1,206 yards. His 1,206 yards are the seventh-most in a single season in team history and stood as the 11th-most in the league last season. Sims' 561 receiving yards were the fourth-most by a running back in the NFL in 2015, while his four receiving touchdowns set a franchise record and tied for the second-most in the league by a running back.

Koetter joined the Buccaneers after three seasons working as the offensive coordinator for the Atlanta Falcons (2012-14). During his three seasons with Atlanta, the team cumulatively ranked second in the NFL in completion percentage (67.4), third in third-down conversion percentage (44.1), fourth in passing yards (277.2 per game), ninth in passing touchdowns (86), ninth in passer rating (93.9), 10th in points (24.0 per game) and 10th in total yardage (363.5 per game), while posting the second-fewest penalties (243) and penalty yards (2,043), seventh-fewest turnovers (69) and the ninth-lowest interception percentage (2.4) in the league. Koetter was part of the Falcons staff that went 13-3 in 2012 and played in the NFC Championship Game.

Under Koetter, Falcons quarterback Matt Ryan posted the three of the four highest passing yardage seasons in franchise history, as well as three of the five highest completion percentage seasons. In 2012, Ryan set franchise records and personal bests in passing yards (4,719), completion percentage (68.6) and passing touchdowns (32), while recording the second-highest passer rating mark in Falcons history (99.1). Atlanta wide receivers also flourished under Koetter, with Julio Jones setting a franchise record and ranking third in the NFL in receiving yards in 2014 with 1,593 yards. In those three seasons, the Falcons had a different player lead the team in receiving yards each season (Roddy White, 2012; Harry Douglas, 2013; Jones, 2014).

While Koetter was in charge of the Falcons' offense, he coached three players to Pro Bowl appearances (Julio Jones, 2012, 2014; Tony Gonzalez, 2012-13; Matt Ryan, 2012), with Gonzalez earning first-team All-Pro honors in 2012. In his first season with Koetter in 2012, Gonzalez set a franchise record for receiving yards by a tight end, recording 93 catches for 930 yards – the most he had recorded in either category since 2008. That same season, Jones and White combined for 2,549 receiving yards, the most by a duo in the NFL.

Prior to joining the Falcons, Koetter spent five seasons as the offensive coordinator of the Jacksonville Jaguars (2007-11). In his five years with the Jaguars, the team cumulatively ranked third in the NFL in rushing yards (132.0 per game) and sixth in rushing average (4.41). Koetter's Jacksonville offenses also showed a penchant for taking care of the football, tallying the seventh-fewest turnovers in the league during that time.

DIRK KOETTER

Koetter had immediate success in Jacksonville, with his 2007 team setting franchise records in points (25.7 per game, sixth in the NFL) and total offense (357 yards per game, seventh in the NFL). In his first season as the starter, quarterback David Garrard ranked third in the NFL and set a franchise record in passer rating (102.2), throwing a league-low three interceptions, while leading the team to a Wild Card playoff berth and a win over the Pittsburgh Steelers. In 2008, Garrard threw for a career-best 3,620 yards and in 2010 he tossed 23 touchdowns, a career high and a franchise record.

While with the Jaguars, Koetter coached four different players to six Pro Bowl selections, including running back Maurice Jones-Drew, who earned three trips to the Pro Bowl and led the NFL in rushing in 2010 en route to earning an All-Pro selection. Koetter also helped tight end Marcedes Lewis earn a Pro Bowl berth following the 2010 season, when Lewis caught 10 touchdown passes, then tied for the most in a season in Jaguars history.

Before joining the Jaguars, Koetter spent 22 years at the collegiate level, the final six as the head coach at Arizona State (2001-06). In his six seasons with the Sun Devils, Koetter led the team to four bowl games, posting a 40-34 record. Working as both the head coach and offensive coordinator, he helped Arizona State average nearly 30 points per game over six seasons, while ranking in the top 20 in the nation in passing offense in five of his six years. In addition, five of the six Sun Devil teams during Koetter's tenure produced a 1,000-yard receiver and quarterbacks that threw for 20 or more touchdowns in five of six seasons.

Koetter's first head coaching opportunity came at Boise State, where he spent three seasons (1998-2000), finishing with a 26-10 record and two consecutive bowl wins. He was a two-time Big West Coach of the Year and two-time conference champion.

A native of Pocatello, Idaho, Koetter played collegiately at Idaho State (1978-81), helping his team to a Division I-AA national championship as a senior. He graduated with a bachelor's degree in physical education and earned a master's in athletic administration a year later. After getting his master's, he became the head coach at Highland (Idaho) High School, where he worked from 1983-84, going 19-4 and winning the 1984 state championship.

In 1985, Koetter worked as the offensive coordinator at San Francisco State and from 1986-88 was the offensive coordinator and quarterbacks coach at the University of Texas EI-Paso. He then served as offensive coordinator/quarterbacks coach at Missouri from 1989-93 and offensive coordinator at Boston College (1994-95) and Oregon (1996-97).

Koetter, 57, and his wife, Kim, have two daughters, Kaylee and Kendra, and two sons, Derek and Davis.

Ron Rivera was named the fourth head coach in Carolina Panthers' history on Jan. 11, 2011.

A two-time NFL Coach of the Year, Rivera inherited a 2-14 Carolina team as a rookie head coach in 2011 and guided them back to relevance in 2015 as Carolina won their second NFC Championship in franchise history, third consecutive NFC South division title and appeared in Super Bowl 50.

Carolina finished the season with a franchise-best 17-2 record.

In 2014, Rivera led the Panthers to a second consecutive NFC South Championship and a win in the Divisional Round against Arizona. In 2013, Rivera led the Panthers to a 12-4 record, including a franchiserecord eight consecutive wins and an NFC South Championship, which helped him land the NFL Coach of the Year award.

Before joining the Panthers, Rivera worked with the San Diego Chargers from 2007-10, coaching inside linebackers before taking over as defensive coordinator midway through the 2008 season. With Rivera's guidance, the pass defense steadied itself - intercepting nine passes and yielding 229.6 passing yards per game and 11 touchdown passes over the final eight games. Those numbers contrasted to the first half of the season when San Diego notched just seven picks and was victimized for 265.1 yards per game and 14 touchdowns through the air.

From 2004-06, Rivera oversaw the Chicago Bears defense, engineering the unit to two top-five finishes in the league. Under Rivera's direction, five different defensive players went to the Pro Bowl: linebacker Lance Briggs, safety Mike Brown, defensive tackle Tommie Harris, linebacker Brian Urlacher and cornerback Nathan Vasher.

In his first season as a defensive coordinator in 2004, Rivera presided over a defense that produced nine more takeaways and 17 more sacks than the previous year and scored a franchise record and NFC high six defensive touchdowns. The Bears also thrived on third down and buckled down inside their own 20-yard line, ranking first in the NFL in third-down efficiency (30.5%) and topping the NFC in red zone defense (42.6%). Prior to becoming a defensive coordinator, Rivera spent five seasons from 1999-2003 as the linebackers coach for the Philadelphia Eagles, who advanced to the NFC Championship game in each of his final three seasons. Twice during Rivera's tenure with the Eagles, the team finished second in the NFL in scoring defense and in 2001 held all 16 of its opponents to less than 21 points - making them just the fourth team in NFL history to do so.

Rivera gained his first coaching experience with the Bears as defensive quality control coach from 1997-98.

He is just the third Latino head coach in NFL history, joining Tom Flores with the Oakland Raiders from 1979-87 and Seattle Seahawks from 1992-94 and Tom Fears with the New Orleans Saints from 1967-70.

JASON LIGHT

Jason Licht was named the fifth general manager of the Tampa Bay Buccaneers on January 21, 2014. Now in his 20th NFL season, including one as a coach, Licht has had a proven track record of success. Since joining the Miami Dolphins front office in 1995, teams that Licht has been a part of have won over 53 percent of their games, including eight seasons with double-digit victories, while making nine playoff appearances and winning eight division titles, four conference championships and one Super Bowl title. DE **Robert Ayers Jr**. comes to Tampa Bay after spending the previous two seasons with the New York Giants (2014-15). In 2015, Ayers set career highs in sacks (9.5), tackles for loss (11) and forced fumbles (2). His team-leading 9.5 sacks in 2015 are the most by any player that entered free agency this offseason and his 22 quarterback hits were the

12th-most in the league last season. Ayers recorded at least one sack in each of the final five games, with his 7.5 sacks in Weeks 13-17 standing as the second-most in the league during that time. He has been one of Pro Football Focus' top six 4-3 defensive ends each of the past two seasons. Originally a first-round selection by the Denver Broncos in 2009, he spent his first five seasons with Denver (2009-13). In his seven-year career, Ayers has played in 96 regular season games, with 39 starts, totaling 204 tackles, 41 tackles for loss, 26.5 sacks, 11 passes defensed, six forced fumbles and three fumble recoveries. He has also played in six career postseason contests, with one start, notching nine tackles, three tackles for loss and 3.0 sacks.



CB **Brent Grimes** joins the Buccaneers after three seasons with the Miami Dolphins (2013-15). Prior to his time with Miami, Grimes spent six seasons with Atlanta (2007-12) where current Buccaneers defensive coordinator Mike Smith served as the Falcon's head coach from 2008-12. In his nine-year career, Grimes has 90-of-106 regular

season games he has played in, totaling 401 tackles, 99 passes defensed, 26 interceptions (357 return yards, two touchdowns), two forced fumbles and one fumble recovery. A four-time Pro Bowl selection (2010, 2013-15) and a 2014 Second-Team Associated Press All-Pro, Grimes' 26 interceptions

are tied for the seventh-most among active players. Since joining Miami in 2013, Grimes has totaled 13 interceptions, tied for the fourth-most in the league during that time. A two-time Defensive Player of the Week (NFC Week 15, 2010; AFC Week 9, 2014), Grimes was named the NFL Alumni Defensive Back of the Year following the 2011 season.



LB **Daryl Smith** comes to Tampa Bay after three seasons with the Baltimore Ravens (2013-15). He originally entered the league as a second-round selection (39th overall) of the Jacksonville Jaguars in the 2004 NFL Draft, spending his first nine seasons with Jacksonville (2004-12). In his 12-year career, Smith has started 172-of-174

regular season games played, totaling 1,046 tackles, 68 passes defensed, 30.5 sacks, 13 forced fumbles, 11 interceptions (87 return yards, one touchdown) and six fumble recoveries (82 return yards, one touchdown). He has also started all five postseason contests he has appeared in, notching 43 tackles, two forced fumbles, one pass defensed, one sack and one interception. Since joining Baltimore in 2013, Smith ranks fifth in the NFL in total tackles (371) and his 29 passes defensed are tied for the most by a linebacker during that span. Smith and Buccaneers linebacker Lavonte David are the only two players to total at least 5.0 sacks, five interceptions, four forced fumbles and 25 passes defensed over the past three seasons. Smith ranks fourth among active players in total tackles and is one of only four active players to record at least 30 sacks and 10 interceptions (Karlos Dansby, Julius Peppers, Lawrence Timmons). His 68 passes defensed are the second-most by an active linebacker.

CB **Vernon Hargreaves III** was chosen 11th overall out of the University of Florida, where he started 35-of-37 career games, totaling 121 tackles, three tackles for loss, 28 passes defensed, nine interceptions (returned 191 yards), two fumble recoveries and one forced fumble. He was named a unanimous All-American

after his junior season, while earning first-team All-SEC all three seasons he played, including unanimous selections following both his junior and sophomore campaigns. The Tampa native was one of three finalists for the Jim Thorpe Award in 2015, given annually to the best defensive back in college football, and was a semifinalist for the Chuck Bednarik Award in both 2014 and 2015, presented annually to the best defensive player in the country.



DE **Noah Spence** was chosen 39th overall out of Eastern Kentucky, where he spent his redshirt junior season (2015), totaling 63 tackles, 22.5 tackles for loss, 11.5 sacks, three forced fumbles and two fumble recoveries. In his one season at Eastern Kentucky, the Harrisburg, Pennsylvania native was named an FCS

All-American by the Associated Press, STATA, Walter Camp Foundation and College Sporting News, while being chosen as the FCS National Defensive Performer of the Year by the College Football Performance Awards. Prior to his time at Eastern Kentucky, Spence played two seasons at Ohio State (2012-13), earning first-team All-Big Ten honors from the league's media and second-team honors from the league's coaches as a sophomore, when he posted 14.5 tackles for loss and 8.0 sacks.



K **Roberto Aguayo** was selected 59th overall out of Florida State, where he finished his career as the most accurate kicker in NCAA history, connecting on 267-of-276 kicks attempted (.9673 conversion rate), surpassing the previous record of .9667, set by former Nebraska kicker Alex Henery. Aguayo earned first-team

All-American honors all three seasons he played, joining Deion Sanders as the only two players in school history to do so. The Mascotte, Florida native won the Lou Groza Award as a redshirt freshman in 2013, was a finalist in 2014 and a semifinalist in 2015.



DB **Ryan Smith** was chosen in the fourth round (108th overall) out of North Carolina Central, where he started 42of-45 career games, totaling 263 tackles, seven tackles for loss, 31 passes defensed, eight fumble recoveries, seven interceptions, one forced fumble and one blocked kick. He also returned 14 kickoffs for 394 yards and one

touchdown. A native of Upper Marlboro, Maryland, Smith set North Carolina Central records in both solo tackles (168) and kickoff return average (28.1).



OL **Caleb Benenoch** was selected in the fifth round (148th overall) from UCLA, where he started the final 35 games of his collegiate career, spending time at both tackle and guard. In 2015, the Katy, Texas native was part of an offensive line that surrendered just 14 sacks, the second-lowest total in school history. He earned

honorable mention All-Pac-12 status as a sophomore (2014), after helping block for running back Paul Perkins, who led the league in rushing and recorded the second-highest single-season rushing total in school history.



LB **Devante Bond** was chosen 183rd overall out of the University of Oklahoma, where he played two seasons (2015-15), appearing in 21 games, with eight starts, notching 72 tackles, 11 tackles for loss, 3.0 sacks, two passes defensed, one forced fumble and one fumble recovery, to go along with two blocked kicks. Prior to

his time at Oklahoma, the Sacramento, California native played at Sierra Community College for two seasons, tallying 77 tackles, 27.0 tackles for loss, four passes defensed and three fumble recoveries.

At Cleveland (11/2), Evans recorded seven catches for 124 yards and two touchdowns, becoming only the second Buccaneers rookie with 100 or more yards and two or more touchdowns in a single game (Horace Copeland, 104 yards & two touchdowns at Atlanta, 10/31/93).

Also, at only 21 years and 73 days old, Evans became the youngest player in NFL history with 100 or more yards and two or more touchdowns in a single game.

Against Atlanta (11/9), Evans posted 125 receiving yards, the fifth-most by a rookie in franchise history and became the first Bucs rookie with consecutive 100-yard games.

ALEXANDER THE GREAT

Buccaneers General Manager Jason Licht spent 12 of his first 13 draft picks with Tampa Bay on offense. But in a case of quality over quantity, Licht's first (and only) selection on the defensive side of the ball came in the fourth round of the 2015 NFL Draft, with the Buccaneers selecting LB Kwon Alexander out of LSU. Alexander immediately took over as the starter at middle linebacker and has made his presence known and earned PFWA All-Rookie honors.

ALEXANDER VS. 2015 DRAFT CLASS DEFENDERS

In his first two seasons, Alexander has started all 25 games he has played, totaling 218 tackles, 17 for loss, 13 passes defensed, 6.0 sacks, three interceptions (one returned for touchdown), three forced fumbles and two fumble recoveries. Below is a chart that shows where he stands among defenders from his draft class.

Since the start of the 2015 season, Alexander one of three players in the NFL to record 220+ tackles, 6+ sacks and 3+ interceptions (also Lavonte David & Lawrence Timmons).

ALEXANDER IN BUCCANEERS HISTORY

While Alexander has proven himself an adept tackler, ranking second on the team, he has made his biggest contributions to the team by forcing turnovers. Despite playing only 12 games as a rookie, he created three takeaways (two interceptions, one fumble recovery).

Alexander's two interceptions are tied for the eighth-most by a rookie in team history and are tied for the most ever by a Buccaneers rookie linebacker (also Hugh Green and Dave Lewis).

Alexander tied with former linebackers Keith Browner (2.0 in 1984) and Mason Foster (2.0 in 2011) for the second-most sacks by a rookie linebacker in team history. Alexander joins former S David Greenwood as the only rookies in team history to have at least 2.0 sacks and two interceptions in their first season.

STRENGTH OF THE SOUTH

Over the previous 14 seasons, one could argue that the toughest division in the NFL is the NFC South. Since realignment in 2002, the NFC South is one of only four divisions in the NFL to have every team earn a division championship, and is the only division to have each of its teams make a conference championship appearance. The NFC East, NFC West and AFC West are the only other divisions to have all four teams earn a division championship since realignment.

The NFC South has also been represented eight times in a conference championship game, tied for the best in the NFC and tied for the second-most in the NFL. The NFC South is also tied for the second-most appearances in the Super Bowl (4), the second-most by any NFC division. It is also tied for the most different teams to the Super Bowl of any division, sending three different teams (Tampa Bay, Carolina, New Orleans), a feat that only the NFC West has matched (Arizona, San Francisco and Seattle).

The NFC South is also the only division to have more than one team win a Super Bowl (Tampa Bay, New Orleans), since 2002. The NFC South has had a very even split of division champions, with three of the four teams winning three times each and the Panthers having captured five division titles.

In 2010, the NFC South recorded another impressive feat, as they were the only division to have three teams finish with a winning record, with three of the four teams finish with a double-digit win total (Atlanta - 13-3; New Orleans - 11-5; Tampa Bay - 10-6). It marked just the second time, dating back to realignment in 2002, that a division has had three teams with double-digit wins in the same season (also the AFC South in 2007). The feat was matched by the NFC North in 2012, the NFC West in 2013 and the AFC North in 2014.

In 2008, the NFC South again showed its overall strength, as it finished as one of only three divisions in the League to have three of its four teams with a record of 9-7 or better (also AFC East and NFC East) and is one of two divisions to have all of its teams at 8-8 or better (also NFC East). The NFC South also finished with a remarkable 27-5 overall home record in 2008, the best combined home winning percentage by a division in NFL history (.844), with the next best division last season, the NFC East, holding an 23-9 record at home. The South was also a near-perfect 11-1 at home when facing other South division opponents in 2008. The Bucs contributed significantly to that mark, as they finished 6-2 at home, winning their first six games at Raymond James Stadium in 2008.

RAYMOND JAMES STADIUM RENOVATIONS

BUCCANEERS DEBUT VIDEO BOARDS & HALL OF FAME CLUBS



On Friday, August 26, the Tampa Bay Buccaneers played their first home game of the 2016 preseason against the Cleveland Browns, offering Buccaneers fans their first opportunity to see the team's all-new video boards and sound system, as well as the team's premium seating Hall of Fame Club. These upgrades are just part one of the comprehensive renovations scheduled for Raymond James Stadium.

Two new main video displays, one towering over each end zone, measure 60 feet high by 160 feet wide for 9,600 square feet each. Four tower displays have also been installed, one in each corner of the stadium, and measure approximately 61 feet high by 43 feet wide for 2,304 square feet each. The total display area of 28,416 square feet is third largest in the NFL.

- End zone displays: 60 feet high by 160 feet wide a total of 9,600 square feet
- Tower displays: 61 high by 43 feet wide a total of 2,304 square feet
- Total display size: 28,416 square feetthird-largest in NFL
- Sound system: distributed audio throughout the stadium

These displays' excellent image clarity and contrast, sun-cutting brightness, and industry-leading environmental protection will keep them operating as expected in the harsh coastal elements. They are capable of variable content zoning which allows them each to show one large image or to show multiple windows with any variety of live video, instant replays, up-to-the-minute statistics, game information, graphics, animations and sponsorship messages.

This installation also features four additional scoreboard displays – two above each main display – measuring approximately 7 feet high by 45 feet wide. Two ribbon displays, one on each sideline's seating fascia, each measure 6 feet high by 680 feet long. All six displays feature 15HD pixel layouts and provide the ability to supplement content on the main displays as well as highlight sponsors throughout events.

The team also be debuted the Hall of Fame Clubs – an all-new, premium seating concept featuring all-inclusive food and drink options, air-conditioned comfort and one of the best views of the action on the field. The new clubs – which are located on the suite level of Raymond James Stadium – will be limited to 240 seats and feature expansive, 9,500 square-foot, open-floor designs, including prime food and drink options as well as a full liquor bar for purchase.

Membership in the Hall of Fame Clubs provide VIP access to all Raymond James Stadium events

including all Buccaneers home games, USF home football games, the Outback Bowl, Monster Jam, concerts and other special events included in one price. Members will also have the option to purchase their seats for the 2017 College Football National Championship Game.

TREASURE CHESTS 5K RUN/WALK & CORPORATE CHALLENGE



On Saturday, October 29, the Tampa Bay Buccaneers hosted the fourth annual Treasure Chests 5K Run/Walk & Corporate Challenge around the grounds of Raymond James Stadium, kicking off the Buccaneers' involvement in the NFL-wide Breast Cancer Awareness activities.
