## MIAMI DOLPHINS (7-4) VS. BALTIMORE RAVENS (6-5)

WEEK 13: SUNDAY, DEC. 4, 2016 • 1 P.M. ET • M&T BANK STADIUM (71,008)



### JUST THE FACTS

- This Sunday at M&T Bank Stadium, the Baltimore Ravens, winners in three of their past four games, host the Miami Dolphins, who are riding the AFC's best winning streak with six-straight victories. Kicking off at 1 p.m. in Baltimore, where the Ravens are 4-2 this season, this game marks the fourth-consecutive year these two teams have met.
- Miami leads the all-time regular season series, 6-5. However, when including playoffs, Baltimore holds the overall edge at 7-6. In regular season play, the Ravens have won four of the past five matchups.
- Last Sunday vs. Cincinnati, the Ravens upended the visiting Bengals, 19-14, to remain tied with Pittsburgh atop the AFC North. (Baltimore currently holds the head-to-head tiebreaker, however.) The Ravens built a 16-3 halftime lead after limiting Cincinnati to 115 total yards in the opening half. **K Justin Tucker** was spectacular, hitting 4 FGs on the day, including 3 from 50-plus yards (52, 57 & 54) in the first half. (Tucker became just the ninth player in NFL history to record 3 FGs from 50-plus in a single game.) **OLB Terrell Suggs** led Baltimore's defense by posting 2 sacks, 2 FFs and 1 PD. Returning from injury after missing five-straight games, **OLB Elvis Dumervil** registered a strip-sack of QB Andy Dalton to help close out the contest, which was sealed when Ravens **P Sam Koch** took a safety as the clock ran out.
- After Miami, Baltimore travels to New England for a Monday Night Football special on Dec. 12. The Ravens then return home to face Philadelphia on Dec. 18 and conclude the regular season with back-to-back division battles at Pittsburgh (Dec. 25) and at Cincinnati (Jan. 1).

### HARBS SAYS

#### John Harbaugh on leadership in life also applying to football:

"There's always another generation coming up the pike. I could get philosophical here and talk about how we've got kids, and we meet our kids' friends, and I'm incredibly impressed with them. Old people used to lament, 'The world is going to hell in a handbasket!' Then you meet the kids, and you're like, 'They're so much smarter than we were and so much better adjusted than we were, and they have so much more to deal with than we did – so many more challenges – and they handle them so well.' To me, that applies to football. Terrell Suggs has emerged as a phenomenal leader, and Marshal Yanda. I could go on. The next generation is coming up, and there's going to be a phenomenal group of leaders in that generation, too. If you're around our locker room, you see who those guys are."

### INJURY UPDATE

Standout starting **CB Jimmy Smith** (back) and starting **LG Alex Lewis** (ankle) have missed consecutive games. (Lewis will be out for several weeks with a high-ankle sprain.) Against Cincinnati, **TE Crockett Gilmore** (thigh) missed his fourth-consecutive game, while **RB Lorenzo Taliaferro** (thigh) was out for his second straight. The Ravens have 14 players on Injured Reserve, including standout **TE Benjamin Watson**, who tore his Achilles tendon on Aug. 27. Other key contributors on IR include **DT Carl Davis** and **TE Maxx Williams**.

### NOTE THE QUOTE

#### S ERIC WEDDLE ON THE IMPACT OF OLB TERRELL SUGGS:

"'Sizz' is a once-in-a-generation-type player. You just can't replicate what he brings. Not just on the field, but his whole belief, his mantra, his aura about himself that he brings to our defense. He just brings that confidence to all of us. You know, as an older guy, when you get someone like that, you can really lean on him. You can look them in the eyes and say, 'Hey, we need a play right now. We need to pick each other up.' And he's right there with you."

### WHAT'S GOING ON?

**K Justin Tucker** is the only NFL kicker to remain perfect this season, hitting on all 27 of his FG attempts. Dating back to 2015, Tucker has made 34-consecutive FGs, a streak that ranks as the sixth longest in NFL history. In 2016, Tucker's 27 FGs lead the NFL, while he has also connected on an NFL-high 7 boots from 50-plus yards.

## SPOTLIGHT: ALBERT McCLELLAN



**Pos:** LB **Ht:** 6-2 **Wt:** 250 **Exp. (NFL/Ravens):** 6/6  
**College:** Marshall **Hometown:** Lakeland, FL

**What traits make you fit on the Ravens' defense?** "I can play multiple positions, and I have the Baltimore attitude. I think my character just fits in here. I think both the way I play and my mentality fit with this organization."

**What does a Baltimore attitude consist of?** "It means we don't put up with any nonsense, but at the same time, we still show respect. We always want to earn our respect; it isn't just given to us. We are not going to back down from any challenge, we are going to step up to the plate, and the attitude we have means that you hold your end of the rope and take care of your own job."

**You say the Ravens set the standard in regards to special teams. Why?** "I think that we spend a lot more time here on special teams than most teams do. We are bullies at the end of the day. I don't mean that in a bad way, but we are that dog that nobody in the neighborhood wants to mess with or nobody wants to see let off of the chain. That is what we are. As far as setting the standard for the league, a lot of teams mimic us. Jerry [Rosburg] and coach [John] Harbaugh are really passionate about special teams, and it shows. As an organization, special teams has always been a point of emphasis."

**How important is it for young players to understand the importance of special teams?** "If you love the game, you will understand how important special teams are. Special teams are a huge phase of the game. You can win and lose games off of plays made on special teams. Everyone should know the importance of special teams."

**After six seasons, how do you use being undrafted as motivation?** "When you are an undrafted guy, you have to be the first one in the building and the last one out. You can never feel comfortable. You can look at the number of people who don't make it when they are undrafted, but you always want to be the one that beats the odds. The odds said that we wouldn't make the team. A lot of teams looked over us. It is up to you as an individual to prove those teams wrong and prove you are as good as all of those guys who went before you."

**What is your favorite hobby?** "I like to fish. It is relaxing, and it is a mind game. A lot of people think you are just throwing something in the water, but it is a lot more difficult than that. Fishing is a real challenge. Plus, it is outdoors. Who does not want to be outdoors?"

**Who is your favorite Raven ever?** "I would have to go with the hometown hero, Ray Lewis. We went to the same high school [Kathleen, in Lakeland, FL]. I saw him play when he was in high school when I was young, and I have been a fan ever since."

## NOTE OF THE WEEK I

Even while playing with a torn biceps he suffered in Week 6 at NYG, **OLB Terrell Suggs** has been outstanding in leading the Ravens' No. 2 defense this season. Here are several Suggs' fast facts entering Week 13:

- ✓ Suggs owns a team-high 8 sacks, which tie for the NFL's 10th most.
- ✓ Of Suggs' 8 sacks, 6 have come in the fourth quarter, tying Seattle's Cliff Avril for the NFL's most.
- ✓ Suggs' 3 forced fumbles tie for the NFL's sixth most.
- ✓ Suggs has registered 8.5 sacks in seven career games vs. Miami. He has posted at least 1 sack in six-straight contests against the Dolphins.
- ✓ Suggs' 114.5 career sacks (a Ravens' franchise record) rank fifth most among active players.
- ✓ Suggs needs 2 sacks to reach double-digit sacks for the seventh time in his career.
- ✓ Suggs is 1 tackle shy of 850 for his career (second in team history).

## NOTE OF THE WEEK II

In addition to making 34-consecutive FG attempts, the NFL's longest active streak and sixth-best run of all time (detailed on page 1), below are several more facts about the remarkable 2016 season **K Justin Tucker** is producing:

- ✓ Tucker's 27 FGs made rank No. 1 in the NFL. He's a perfect 27-of-27 this season, and he is also 15-of-15 on PATs.
- ✓ Tucker's 7 FGs of 50-plus yards are a Ravens' single-season record. They also tie (seven players) for the fourth most in NFL single-season history (record is 10 by Blair Walsh in 2012).
- ✓ An NFL-high 18 of Tucker's 27 FGs made this season have come from 40 yards or beyond. (Next best is 13 by Matt Prater.)
- ✓ Last week vs. Cincy, Tucker became just the ninth kicker in league history to make 3 FGs of 50-plus yards in a single game (52, 57 & 54). He is also the first kicker in NFL history to make 3 FGs of 50-plus yards in the first half of a game.
- ✓ Tucker (89.7% on 157-of-175 kicking) is the second-most accurate kicker in NFL history behind Dan Bailey at 90.6%.
- ✓ Since he entered the NFL in 2012 as a rookie free agent, Tucker's 157 FGs rank No. 1 in the NFL.
- ✓ Since PATs were moved back in 2015, Tucker (44-of-44) and Dan Bailey (59-of-59) are the NFL's only kickers yet to miss.

## NOTE OF THE WEEK III

Sunday will feature the NFL's Top 2 defenses on third down. The Ravens, who rank No. 2 in the NFL allowing 297.8 total yards per game, are also No. 2 on third down, while Miami's defense has produced the league's No. 1 third-down mark.

# QUOTH THE RAVENS

## **The MMQB's Peter King on K Justin Tucker:**

"It's notable that the snapper (Morgan Cox) and holder (Sam Koch) are fabulous and really consistent.

Tucker won this before halftime, with field goals from 52, 57 and 54 yards in the first half against Cincinnati. So he had the wind with him. Watching this game, the kick from 57 would have been good from 65, easy, and the kick from 54, would have been good from 70, easy. Tucker is the best kicker in football right now (18-for-18 beyond 40 yards), perfect on 15 PATs and [27] field goals. It's not up for debate."

## **Ravens WRs coach Bobby Engram on Baltimore signing WR Mike Wallace, who leads the Ravens with 792 receiving yards:**

"I don't really go off of what people say. I go off of what guys do. We studied the tape, and I think everybody in the building knew he was still a good football player. You bring him here to an organization like the Ravens – the culture here, the toughness, the kind of guys we have in our locker room and just the men of character we have throughout the building – I think he has thrived in this environment."

## **OLB Terrell Suggs on S Eric Weddle:**

"I like that he is kind of a wild card. He is kind of 'one of those guys.' The word that comes to mind is 'Raven.' He has kind of that Raven persona. He is a little weird. You have to like a guy like that who has a little bit more to him and is a little edgy. That is always good when it comes on the football team, too."

## **Starting ILB Zachary Orr on the Ravens organization giving him a chance as an undrafted guy in 2014:**

"They gave me a chance to show what I can do. They didn't coach me any different than they coached C.J. Mosley, a first-round draft pick. They didn't coach me any different than Albert McClellan or Daryl Smith or Terrell Suggs or Elvis Dumervil. They all coached everybody the same. That is the great thing about it. I have heard in other places players are basically 'training camp bodies.' But here, they coach every player like you are actually on the team, and you are a Raven."

## **PressBox's Joe Platania on undrafted rookie DT Michael Pierce:**

"Despite his size, Pierce combines former Ravens nose tackles Haloti Ngata's quick feet with Kelly Gregg's tenacity and teammate Brandon Williams' strength, all necessary ingredients to fit into the Ravens' run-stuffing tradition. Even though Baltimore primarily plays a 3-4 defense, there have been times when Williams and Pierce have been on the field together in an alignment reminiscent of the team's 4-3 era that lined up Tony Siragusa and Sam Adams in the middle of a stout front seven."

## **Jets WR Brandon Marshall on Ravens WR Steve Smith Sr.:**

"That's my big brother. He's awesome. Forget his talent; I just love his fire and his passion. That's what makes him great. That's the thing that separates him from, not only every other receiver in the league, but every other player. I don't know if any other guy in the league is as fiery as Steve is."

## **QB Joe Flacco on rookie RB Kenneth Dixon:**

"He is just a good runner. He has good vision. He has the suddenness to make people miss when he gets in space. If we can keep him going, it is definitely going to be good for us."

## **Head coach John Harbaugh on the Ravens' rookie class receiving lots of playing time:**

"I think you have to have a mix of rookies in there. We had a big rookie class, and a lot of those guys are playing. In this case, I think it's a good thing, because it's not like they're playing completely out of necessity. To me, the guys who are playing are playing because they've earned the playing time and are playing well. It depends on the reason the rookies aren't playing. If they weren't playing because they weren't good enough, that would be good. If they were playing because you didn't have anybody else, that wouldn't be good. Our guys are playing because they're good enough, and we feel good about that."

## **Cowboys head coach Jason Garrett on the influence Ravens GM and EVP Ozzie Newsome has had:**

"Ozzie is just a legend. He is a legendary guy, a legendary player. He was part of the first draft class when my dad joined the staff with Cleveland in 1978. He and Clay Matthews were the first two selections that they had. So when you think about drafting well, right from the start – those are two incredible football players. Ozzie, when we were young following the Browns as close as you can follow, he was everybody's favorite player. He was such a great player and such a great guy. He might be the greatest example of all of a guy who has transitioned from a Hall of Fame playing career to a Hall of Fame career as an executive. What he has done with the Ravens is off the charts. They have been as good as an organization as there is in football over the last 20 or so years, and Ozzie has a lot to do with that."

## **RB Kenneth Dixon on the Ravens' running back group:**

"We're close in our room. No one man ever gets the glory. It gets spread out among all the running backs. We give coach [Thomas] Hammock all the credit. We're all a group, and we're all out there together. We're all a part of the show, holding it high and tight."

## **Steelers head coach Mike Tomlin on the Ravens' offensive versatility:**

"They are capable of being a two-tight end group. They are capable of being a three-wide receiver group. They are capable of being a two-running back group. When you think about the ways they attack you offensively, you think about how versatile they are. They are capable of attacking you in a variety of ways, whether it is on first or second down, or whether it is on a possession down."

## **Rookie WR Chris Moore on the importance of special teams:**

"They emphasize it a lot here. It's very important. Special teams is an important part of the game, especially here with the Ravens. Whenever I'm on the field, I'm giving it everything I have, because I know that's where I can make an impact every game. I might not be able to catch touchdowns, but I can scoop and score them."

## WEEK 12 RECAP: BAL. 19, CIN. 14

The Ravens dominated the first half, limiting Cincinnati to 115 yards and taking a 16-3 lead, and then held on for a 19-14 victory over the Bengals at M&T Bank Stadium last Sunday. The win snapped a five-game losing streak against their division rivals and kept the Ravens in a first-place tie with Pittsburgh in the AFC North. **K Justin Tucker** tied the NFL record with three 50-plus-yard field goals, all in the first half, keeping his perfect season intact (27 of 27 on FGAs and 15 of 15 for PATs.) Tucker converted 52-, 57-, 54- and 36-yard FGs in the contest. The Ravens opened the game with an 11-play, 75-yard touchdown drive that ended with a **QB Joe Flacco-to-WR Breshad Perriman** 14-yard touchdown score. Tucker's first FG made the score 10-0 after the initial quarter. A K Mike Nugent 23-yard FG made the score 10-3 in the second period before Tucker added 57- and 54-yarders to end the half. Cincinnati closed the gap to 16-9 in the third when QB Andy Dalton directed an 11-play, 86-yard TD series that ended with a 3-yard TD pass to TE Tyler Eifert. (Dalton was 7-of-9 for 94 yards on the drive, but Nugent missed the PAT.) With seven minutes left in the game, Tucker's fourth FG (36 yards) gave the Ravens a 19-9 lead before a Nugent 36-yarder with 2:50 left in the game made it 19-12. Baltimore **P Sam Koch** ran out the clock, taking a safety on the game's final play to make the margin 19-14. **OLB Terrell Suggs** was spectacular, producing 2 sacks and 2 FFs, helping limit the Bengals to just 64 rushing yards. Flacco completed 25 of 36 passes for 234 yards to nine different receivers. Rookie **RB Kenneth Dixon** caught 4 for 31 yards and added a game-high 49 rushing yards. Dalton was 26-of-48 for 283 yards, with six of those passes going to RB Jeremy Hill for 61 yards. Hill managed only 21 yards on 12 rushing attempts.

# LAST GAME VS. DOLPHINS

## DOLPHINS 15, RAVENS 13 – 12/6/15 IN MIAMI

For an NFL-record 12th time in 12 games, the outcome of the Ravens' game was in doubt the final series of the contest. This time the Ravens dropped a 15-13 decision in Miami. The difference in the game came in a 20-second period in the final 2 minutes of the first half when Miami turned 2 QB Matt Schaub INTs into 15 points. With 1:54 remaining in the second quarter, DT Jordan Phillips tipped a Schaub pass that was intercepted by S Reshad Jones at the Ravens' 38-yard line. On the next play, QB Ryan Tannehill hit leaping rookie WR DeVante Parker for a TD. Three plays later, Schaub's pass was batted in the air by DE Derrick Shelby, who grabbed the deflection and raced 22 yards for a TD. A 2-point conversion (RB Jay Ajayi) gave the Dolphins a 15-0 advantage. The Ravens did respond with a 7-play drive that ended with a 38-yard **K Justin Tucker** FG, making the score 15-3 at the half. The Ravens missed two opportunities to score earlier in the game. The first came in the initial quarter when Schaub hit WR Daniel Brown with a 52-yard TD throw that was nullified on a disputed offensive pass interference call on Brown. On the next series, Schaub directed a 15-play, 75-yard drive that stalled on a failed fourth-down conversion at the Dolphins' 2-yard line. Baltimore lost, despite outgaining Miami 375 to 219 yards, with Schaub throwing for 308 yards (32 of 46). Dolphins RB Lamar Miller did rush for 113 yards (on 20 carries), while Tannehill was held to 9-of-19 for 86 yards. **RB Javorius "Buck" Allen**, who accounted for 170 yards, brought the Ravens within 5 points (15-10) in the third quarter when he scampered 41 yards to the end zone on a short Schaub pass. (Allen came within one catch of tying the Ravens' record of 13 catches in a game.) After a 31-yard Tucker FG made the score 15-13 with 10:17 left in the contest, the Ravens' best opportunity to win came after Miller fumbled at the Miami 41 with 4:17 left in the game. **S Kendrick Lewis** forced the turnover that was recovered by OLB Courtney Upshaw. After gaining just 4 yards in three plays, Tucker's FG attempt from 55 yards was wide right.

**LB Ray Lewis - 2000 Super Bowl XXXV MVP**

In a magnificent effort showcasing thrilling performances by their defense, offense and special teams units, the Baltimore Ravens won Super Bowl XXXV with a 34-7 victory over the New York Giants. Allowing the Giants a meager 152 total net yards, New York's attack crossed midfield just twice, while Baltimore's "D" posted 4 INTs. LB Ray Lewis was named the game's MVP, capping an accolade-filled season in which he was also tabbed the NFL's Defensive Player of the Year.



**QB Joe Flacco - 2012 Super Bowl XLVII MVP**

Baltimore defeated San Francisco, 34-31, in Super Bowl XLVII, capturing the franchise's second World Championship. After an amazing first-half performance, the Ravens took a commanding 28-6 lead. But following a bizarre, 34-minute power outage that halted play, the 49ers stormed back into contention. Clinging to a 34-29 edge late in the game, the Ravens stood firm on a pivotal goal-line stand, jamming SF on four-straight plays inside the 7-yard line. QB Joe Flacco was named the game's MVP.

## FOUR-STRAIGHT TOP 5s

In 2015, senior NFL writer Rick Gosselin of *The Dallas Morning News* ranked the Ravens' special teams unit No. 1 in the NFL in his annual comprehensive ratings system based on 22 categories, assigning points according to each standing — 1 for best, 32 for worst. 2015 marked the fourth-straight year in Gosselin's Top 5, as Baltimore was No. 5 in 2014, No. 5 in 2013, and in 2012, earned the No. 2 spot.

## RAVENS THRIVE UNDER ROSBURG



Special teams coordinator/associate head coach **Jerry Rosburg**, a 38-year coaching veteran, has guided a strong special teams group since arriving in Baltimore in 2008. Here are several standout notes:

### SIX PRO BOWLERS

• Six Ravens have earned Pro Bowl honors while playing for Rosburg: ST **Brendon Ayanbadejo** (2008), **K Billy Cundiff** (2010), **RS Jacoby Jones** (2012), **K Justin Tucker** (2013), **LS Morgan Cox** & **P Sam Koch** (2015).

### PRIME PUNTER & KICKER

• Earning his first Pro Bowl nod in 2015, **P Sam Koch's** 46.7 gross average ranked No. 9 in the NFL, while his 42.9 net average was No. 2. In 2014, Koch posted the NFL's No. 3 gross (47.4) and No. 1 net (43.3) averages. Both marks are career highs and Ravens records. Pro Bowl **K Justin Tucker**, who Rosburg scouted and helped sign as a rookie free agent, owns the NFL's most FGs (157) since entering the NFL in 2012. With an 89.7% career success mark, "Tuck" is the second-most accurate kicker in league history (Dan Bailey, 90.6).

### RAVENS BIG RETURNS

• Led by Pro Bowl **RS Jacoby Jones** in the 2012 Super Bowl season, Baltimore ranked first in the NFL in KOR average (27.3). Jones, who became the first player ever to record dual KORs of at least 105 yards in a career, tied for a league-leading 3 kick return TDs (2 KORs & 1 PR). He also tied an NFL record for longest KOR in a Super Bowl with his 108-yard KOR-TD. (In 2014's game at Pit., he added another 108-yarder to his resume, marking 4 total KOR-TDs over 100 yards in his career.)

### ROSBURG'S PAST

• Prior to Baltimore, Rosburg built a successful NFL special teams resume with the Browns (2001-06) and Falcons (2007). Over a five-year span (2002-06), Cleveland's special teams were ranked as the top NFL unit in *The Dallas Morning News'* annual comprehensive report.

### RAVENS BLOCK PARTY

• Dating back to 2014, the Ravens have produced 12 blocked kicks (breakdown detailed below), ranking as the NFL's No. 1 figure. In fact, Baltimore already has 4 blocks in 2016 — 1 punt, 1 PAT and 2 FGAs.

# COORDINATORS: MORNHINWEG / PEES NOTES

## MORNHINWEG NAMED O.C.



**Marty Mornhinweg** was elevated to offensive coordinator on Oct. 10, prior to the start of Week 6. A 22-year NFL coaching veteran, Mornhinweg, who joined Baltimore as QBs coach in 2015, is a former head coach of the Detroit Lions (2001-02). He has also served as offensive coordinator for the New York Jets (2013-14), Philadelphia Eagles (2004-12) and San Francisco 49ers (1997-2000).

- Throughout his NFL coaching career, five quarterbacks have earned Pro Bowl honors under Mornhinweg's direction: Michael Vick, Donovan McNabb, Steve Young, Jeff Garcia and Brett Favre.
- In his most recent role as an offensive coordinator (Jets: 2013-14), the team's run game ranked as the NFL's third best (138.7 ypg) unit during his time. Prior to joining NYJ, Mornhinweg served 10 seasons (2003-12) in Philly, including nine (2004-12) as the "O" coordinator/assistant head coach. He and **John Harbaugh** spent five seasons (2003-07) together on the Eagles' coaching staff.
- His first NFL coordinator job came with the San Francisco 49ers (1997-2000), where in 1998, the team set franchise marks in total yards (6,800), first downs (381) and rushing yards (2,544).

### MORNHINWEG'S NFL OFFENSIVE COORDINATOR ROLES

#### 1997-2000: 49ers – Offensive Coordinator/QBs Coach

- During this span, SF offense ranked third in total net yards (364.6 ypg), including third in rushing (131.4 ypg) and fifth in passing (233.2 ypg).
- In 1999, the 49ers boasted the NFL's No. 1 rush offense (130.9 ypg).
- In 1998, SF offense ranked No. 1 in the NFL (425.0 ypg), including first in rushing (159.0 ypg) and second in passing (266.0 ypg).

- Under Mornhinweg's guidance, 10 different offensive players earned a total of 17 Pro Bowl honors.
- Philly set a then-franchise best with 6,386 total net yards in 2011.
- In his first season (2004) guiding the offense, Philadelphia advanced to Super Bowl XXXIX.

#### 2013-14: NY Jets – Offensive Coordinator

- Jets ranked third in the NFL rush offense (138.7 ypg) during this span.
- In 2014, helped guide a rushing attack that finished third in the NFL (142.5 ypg) behind RBs Chris Ivory and Chris Johnson.

## RAVENS OFFENSIVE BESTS

In 2015, with **Marty Mornhinweg** serving as the Ravens' quarterbacks coach, Baltimore posted the second-most net yards in team history. The Ravens also set a franchise record by averaging 266.9 passing yards per game. In the Week 2 game at Oakland, Baltimore tallied 493 net yards, the sixth-best mark in team history.

## PEES LEADS THE "D"



**Dean Pees**, a 13-year NFL-coaching veteran, became the Ravens' defensive coordinator in 2012 and helped guide Baltimore to its second World Championship in Super Bowl XLVII. Pees, who was New England's "D" coordinator from 2006-09, heads a Ravens' squad that currently ranks No. 2 in the NFL in total defense, including No. 1 vs. the run. Pees also leads a unit that, during the **John Harbaugh** Era (2008-16), has allowed the NFL's second-fewest points (19.0) per game, the third-fewest yards (314.8) per game and the fewest overall TDs (276).

• In the Ravens' last 10 playoff games (since the 2010 season), Flacco is 196-of-327 for 2,563 yards, 24 TDs and 4 INTs (104.1 rating). He has led the Ravens to a 7-3 record in these contests.

• In Baltimore's last six playoff games (5-1 record), Flacco has thrown 17 TDs and 2 INTs. Completing 119 of 200 passes for 1,691 yards, he owns a magnificent 111.1 QB rating.

- Flacco has thrown at least 2 TDs in eight-straight playoff games, marking the longest streak in NFL postseason history.
- Flacco has 25-career postseason TD passes, tied (Brett Favre) for second most in a QB's first eight seasons. (Tom Brady is first - 26.)
- Flacco's streak of 197 passes without throwing an INT in the postseason (from 1/22/12 to 1/10/15) is the second longest in NFL playoff history (Drew Brees, 226). Joe Montana (179 from 1989-91) and Steve Young (173 from 1994-96) are third and fourth, respectively.
- Among active QBs, Flacco's 25 playoff TD passes rank fourth most (Tom Brady - 56, Peyton Manning - 40 & Aaron Rodgers - 27).
- Flacco's 3,223 career passing yards in the playoffs rank sixth most among active quarterbacks.
- Flacco's 10 career playoff victories are the most among NFL quarterbacks since he entered the league in 2008.
- Flacco has seven career road wins in the playoffs (including two apiece in each of the 2008 and 2012 campaigns), ranking as the most by a QB in league history (Eli Manning is next with five).

## THE RETURN SPECIALIST



On Sept. 5, the Ravens signed four-time Pro Bowler **RS/WR Devin Hester Sr.**, who has produced the most return TDs (20) in NFL history, to a one-year contract. Hester Sr., who is in his 11th season, is arguably the best return specialist in NFL history. Here are a few notes about his impressive career:

- He has posted the most return touchdowns (20) in NFL history, registering an NFL-record 14 punt return touchdowns, and then adding 5 kickoff return TDs and 1 missed FG return TD (108 yards).
- Seeing action in 154 career games (47 starts), he has also tallied 255 receptions for 3,311 yards (13.0 avg.) and 16 touchdowns, also posting 116 rushing yards and one touchdown on 36 carries.
- Hester Sr.'s 11.8-yard career PR average ranks ninth in NFL history, while his 3,680 PR yards stand third. For kickoff returns, Hester Sr. owns a 24.9-yard career average, gaining 7,276 yards (12th most in NFL history). His 25.6 KOR average ranks fifth in the NFL in 2016.
- His four Pro Bowls occurred in 2006, 2007, 2010 and 2014. He was named to the All-Decade Team (2000s) by ESPN and *The AP*, and he has been tabbed All-Pro three times (2006, 2007 & 2010).

## JUST FOR KICKS



Pro Bowl **K Justin Tucker** ranks as the NFL's second-most accurate kicker of all time. He has connected on 157 of 175 FGAs to produce an 89.7 success rate.

- To kick off 2016, Tucker was named AFC Special Teams Player of the Month (Sept.) after going 9-of-9 on FGAs, including 2 game-winners. Tucker is a three-time AFC Player of the Month, which ties him with S Ed Reed & K Matt Stover for the most in Ravens history. Tucker has also earned six AFC Special Teams Player of the Week honors.

- In 2013, Tucker made his first Pro Bowl by setting team records in FGs made (38) and FGAs (41), with both figures tying (Stephen Gostkowski) for the NFL's most. Tucker also had a franchise-record 140 points (tied for sixth in NFL).

- Tucker made 33-straight FGs at one point during the 2013 season, ranking as the NFL's seventh-longest streak of all time. (Tucker's current streak of 34 ranks sixth all time.)

- His 6 FGs on 12/16/13 at Det. set a team record and a single-game NFL high in 2013. Against the Lions, he became the first NFL kicker ever to connect from the 20-, 30-, 40-, 50- & 60-yard range in a game.

- Tucker's 94.4 career FG% when kicking on grass (68-of-72) ranks as the NFL's best of all time. (The next best is Jay Feely at 86.8%.)

- Tucker's 91.8 career FG% (78-of-85) in the second half/overtime ranks as the NFL's best second half/OT mark of all time.

# IN MEMORIAM: CLARENCE BROOKS

**Clarence Brooks**, the Baltimore Ravens' longest-tenured assistant coach, passed away on Sept. 17 at a hospital in Weston, Fla., following a battle with esophageal and stomach cancer. He was 65. The beloved Brooks – referred to by most as “C.B.”

– originally joined the organization in 2005 and served 11 seasons as defensive line coach. This past spring, while undergoing intense treatment for his illness, he transitioned into a senior defensive assistant role, but still spent as much time as he possibly could working with players and fellow coaches, including during the Ravens' recent training camp. Brooks was a 24-year NFL coaching veteran and one of six assistant coaches retained by head coach John Harbaugh upon his 2008 Baltimore arrival.

In addition to the Ravens, “C.B.” coached for the Miami Dolphins (2000-04), Cleveland Browns (1999) and Chicago Bears (1993-98). Brooks also spent 17 years in the collegiate ranks holding coaching positions at Arizona (1990-92) – where he was instrumental in the notable “Desert Swarm” defense that led the nation in scoring defense in 1992 – Syracuse (1981-89) and his alma mater Massachusetts (1976-80).

During Brooks' Baltimore tenure as defensive line coach (2005-15), the Ravens allowed the NFL's fewest rushing touchdowns (89), second-fewest points per game (18.9) and the league's second-fewest rushing yards per game (94.2).

## **Head Coach John Harbaugh:**

“Our heartfelt condolences and love go out to Justa and the Brooks family on the passing of Clarence. We loved that man! He is at peace now through the grace of Jesus Christ. He fought the good fight and won. One of the finest coaches I have ever met, he changed the lives and influenced players and coaches for the better. He was a great man, loving husband and devoted father. He was as tough and determined in adversity as you'll ever see and as loyal a friend as there is. ‘C.B.’ will forever walk as a loved and cherished member of the Ravens family.”

## **General Manager & Executive Vice President Ozzie Newsome:**

“Very few, if any, coaches influenced their players – on and off the field – like Clarence Brooks. How fortunate are the Ravens to have had this special person in our lives for the past 12 years? He was a teacher, a friend, a father figure to many and a great football coach. A lot of our defensive success over the years is due to his ability to get the most out of his players on the defensive line. This is a sad, sad day for our team and extended family. Our hearts ache for Justa and the rest of Clarence's family.”

## **Owner Steve Bisciotti:**

“The Bisciottis are so sad to hear about Clarence's passing. He was the sweetest man I've ever met in football. He was also as tough as nails and was as respected by everyone on our team as any coach who ever touched the Ravens. His impact was more than people on the outside could know. He will be so missed.”

## **President Dick Cass:**

“Clarence had a special rapport with his players. He was both beloved as coach and as a person. His infectious laugh and welcoming smile will be greatly missed, not by just the players and his fellow coaches, but by everyone in our building.”

## **DT Brandon Williams:**

“Coach Brooks was like a father figure to me and every other player he coached. He made me the player I am today, but more importantly, helped me to be the man I am today. He always got the best out of you. He saw the potential in every player and did everything in his power to help you be the best you could be – on and off the field. Every day I walked in this building, no matter what was going on, he could always make me smile. I will miss him, and my heart goes out to the entire Brooks family.”

## **DE Lawrence Guy:**

“Coach Brooks was a heck of a coach, but an even better man. He cared so much about all of us and could always pull the best out of you in any situation. Through him, I learned how to prepare better, practice better and play better. I will truly miss his coaching, his fellowship and his mentorship. Rest well, ‘C.B.’”

## **OLB Terrell Suggs:**

“Clarence Brooks was a rare, special coach. We had a relationship that became more than football; he was family. He was every bit the definition of the word ‘coach.’ He was firm and demanding when he needed to be, but was a father figure and caring at the same time. I will definitely miss my friend.”

## **Linebackers Coach Don Martindale:**

“Clarence Brooks is one of the finest human beings I have ever met. Selfishly speaking, you would like to say he was your best friend, but he was really everybody's best friend. We are happy he is not suffering anymore. I love him like a brother, and I am going to miss him terribly.”

## **Former Ravens Head Coach Brian Billick (Who Hired Brooks in 2005):**

“Whew, this hurts. What a man, what a coach, what an inspiration. Beyond being one of the best position coaches in the league, Clarence was one of the most respected people in the NFL. He was a great teacher and friend. His positive and upbeat, yet stern, way was special. The proof is in the pudding. Look at how players improved under him. It would be tough to find a more respected assistant in the NFL. My heart reaches out to Justa and his family.”

## **Former Ravens DT Haloti Ngata:**

“I am deeply saddened by the news of ‘C.B.’ passing away. I hope that I can help continue his legacy by the way I live and play. I played under ‘C.B.’ for nine years. In that time, he helped me go to five Pro Bowls and win a Super Bowl ring. He deserves a lot of that credit. He worked so hard with me and my Ravens teammates. This is tough news to swallow. I will miss you, Coach. Thank you for everything you taught me through the years – on and off the field. I love you, Clarence.”

## JOHN HARBAUGH MONDAY PRESS CONFERENCE: WEEK 13 VS. DOLPHINS

**Opening statement:** “Good to see everybody – appreciate you guys being here once again. We just want to ask for, really, some prayers for [former Ravens tight end] Konrad Reuland. He was put into the UCLA medical center intensive care unit today. He had an aneurism in his brain. He’s going to undergo surgery tomorrow. He’s in intensive care today and tonight. We just ask that you remember him in your prayers. Konrad Reuland, a tremendous guy, and our thoughts and prayers are with his family tonight and tomorrow through the surgery.”

“About the game, I thought we played well. We had a chance to look at the tape. Pretty much what we saw after the game [was] a lot of little things here and there to build on and also to improve on, but our guys found a way to win the game. They played extremely hard. In the end, [they] played winning football. Our leadership showed up throughout the course of the game in terms of just continuing to fight and stick together and focus through every play. One thing that was significantly better was our pass coverage. I thought our defensive backs did a much better job in man-to-man coverage than the week before. They had been doing a good job at times throughout the course of the season – for most of the season – playing man coverage, but yesterday they really stepped it up and had some good reps out there. That was good to see [and] gave our pass rush some time. Then pushing the pocket, the batted balls, keeping [Andy Dalton] in the pocket for the most part, we wanted to keep him in the pocket. When he got out of the pocket, that was a problem, and we have to continue to work on that. At the end we did a good job of keeping him in there when they got the ball down close. That was really important for us. Those are some things on defense. Special teams, we had the last play. No big returns against us. Had a couple of pretty good returns, but we would also say we can improve there. Our core units can play a lot better than they are. We need to keep building on that, but they’re fighting. Offensively, the same thing. We found a way to win the game, did some good things, especially in the first half. In the second half, we hit a lull, and we have to find a way to build on that, keep it going, and really finish the game off with touchdowns so we can extend leads. That’s what we really haven’t been able to do on offense. We have to figure out a way to do that.”

**Even though K Justin Tucker was flawless, it’s late November, it’s getting colder, and this is the first time you have had a grass field since 2002. Have you started to see the weather affect things on the playing surface? (Joe Platania)** “The middle of the field was a little bit ... Grass doesn’t grow as well [this time of year]. Once it gets so cold, it doesn’t grow at all. It was a little sandy out there. I thought Justin did a tremendous job with his footing. To be able to hit those long kicks – it was a soft field – and to be able to hit those long kicks was really just phenomenal. Our grounds crew does a great job. I’m sure they have something in store for the next two games. I’m sure they’ll have that field in tip-top shape for the last two home games.”

**Obviously, you want touchdowns, but is it nice to have someone who can virtually give you three points almost anywhere inside the 50-yard line if a drive does stall? (David Ginsburg)** “It is big. I think most teams would be punting those balls. I thought about punting those balls, too, with the conditions, because it was a little windy out there to go with the soft field. [Justin Tucker] was so confident, and he made them. He got the job done. When you extend the field goal range 8, 10 yards like that, that’s a big deal for a football team in terms of scoring points.”

**Where do you see any signs of improvement with the offense? The last few weeks the numbers dictate different, especially on third down. (Jerry Coleman)** “As a coach, you’re not just looking at numbers. You’re looking at what you’re trying to build and how guys are doing in practice every single day, where we missed a little bit here and there and what we need to game-plan for the next week. You’re trying to win football games. That’s really what we’re trying to do. I’d love to see the numbers be through the roof, but numbers don’t win games. You have to score more points than the other team to win games. Everybody knows that. We need to score more points as an offense. That’s the bottom line. We just have to continue to find a way to do that. I believe we can do it. I know we can do it. Making plays here and there, blocking a little bit better, seeing some reads, calling some plays, building a good game plan, those are all things that you try to do.”

**Are there things that you think you got away from that were successful during that opening drive? (Jerry Coleman)** “No, not per se.”

**Were you able to ascertain why you weren’t able to duplicate what you did on that opening drive? (Jerry Coleman)** “Yes, we were.”

**Can you explain or expand? (Jerry Coleman)** “Not really. Not in any way that I can explain it to you that would make any sense. We just have to execute better. We have to get first downs. We have to stay out of the hole. You get on the 10-yard line. You make a couple of first downs. You get into that plus-fringe range. You have to make a play. I think you’ve asked me this question every single



week, and I've given you the same answer. There's never any one thing. You have to execute these plays in these situations. Sometimes it's a block. Sometimes it's a catch that's not made. Sometimes it's a route that's not run. Sometimes it's a read that's not seen. Sometimes it's a penalty. Those are all of the things that go into it, because we have 11 guys out there trying to get the job done. That's the best I can do to explain it. If we sit down and watch the tape, I can show you every situation. But you go out on the practice field and you're not going to play the same game the next week. We have to get better across the board. We have to find the things that we can do well that we can execute in those situations that are going to give our opponent trouble, that are going to minimize mistakes and bad plays on our part, and all that goes into that. You're going to do it against an evolving-type of a defense. You're not going to see the same defense. You're not going to see the same schemes, and they're going to be scheming up ways to attack your weaknesses, and you have to account for that, too. That's what makes football great. That's what makes it so challenging. That's our challenge on offense, to get it to the point where the results are what you and I and everybody else want to see, which is yards and points and winning football that we can extend leads in the second half."

**John, how would you rate QB Joe Flacco's slides recently? (Jamison Hensley)** "You don't slide on your knee. He and I have had that conversation. He can be mad at me now, because I said it publicly, but we all played baseball. He wants to talk about a pop-up slide. Maybe that's what he did in high school, but you can't do a pop-up slide on a knee brace. It's just as simple as that. You've got to get down there on those glutes. That's what has to happen. It's not the first time he'll have heard that."

**When he does those slides, I think a lot of people wonder if he's injured. Does that go through your mind when he does that? (Jamison Hensley)** "I just want to see him not drive his brace into the ground. It's how he's always slid. He's always slid that way with, what he would describe as a pop-up slide, but it's not working with the knee brace. I see the same thing that everybody else sees, and he knows it."

**We saw you handle the nickel slot a little bit differently with S Lardarius Webb sliding in there and S Matt Elam coming in. What was the thought around trying that? (Luke Jones)** "Those are different packages that we had in. Some of the packages are more passing. Some of them are more running. Some of them have to do with pressures. Some of them are more base calls. [We were] just trying to have guys out there for what they do best and try to get our matchups as best as we can. That's really what it was. We try to put guys in positions to do what they do best."

**With all of the batted passes on their last drive, was that an adjustment made on the sidelines to counteract their quick pass game, or did it just work out that way? (Ryan Mink)** "We talked about it on the sideline, but we've been talking about it all week. They're definitely a rhythm passing team. Andy [Dalton] gets the ball out really quickly in rhythm to his first and second read really well, so the ball is coming out. You're not always going to be able to get there. You have to try to get as much push and get your hands up. I think we just did a better job of it. We were talking about it, and we did a better job of it toward the end of the game. We put our big guys in more towards the end, too. Our taller guys were in there, too. We put Brent [Urban] in there and Lawrence Guy in there. [Matthew] Judon got one. [Terrell] Suggs got one. They did a good job."

**Forgetting pure statistics, how close do you think this defense is to rivaling some of the historically great defenses the Ravens have had? (Stan Charles)** "That's a great question. I would like to think that this defense can be that caliber of a defense. That's what you work for and strive for, but when you're in the middle of it, it's really not what you think about, because that's big-picture stuff. What we're trying to do is look at the details in the end that will help us get to that point. We're not there yet, I don't think, to those defenses. I'm talking about two defenses, maybe three, in the last 15, 16 years. We can get there. It's going to come down to how well we cover people in the back end, how well we cage quarterback – keep them in the pocket and get to them – and also stopping the run."

**When you came here, you inherited Ray Lewis and Ed Reed. Do you see leaders like that, forget [OLB Terrell] Suggs and [OLB Elvis] Dumervil who are veterans, but do you see a new breed of Raven leaders on defense now? (Stan Charles)** "I do. I get asked that question a lot, and I think it is something the fans think about a lot, so it's really a good question. It's no different than life. There's always another generation coming up the pike. I could get kind of philosophical here and talk about how we've got kids, and we meet our kids' friends, and I'm incredibly impressed with them. Old people used to lament, 'The world is going to hell in a hand basket!' and all of that stuff. Then you meet the kid, and you're like, 'They're so much smarter than we were, and so much better adjusted than we were, and they have so much more to deal with than we did – so many more challenges – and they handle them so well!' I have a lot of faith in humanity, and I have a lot of faith in God to make things OK. To me, that applies to football. You can lament that Ray Lewis is not here and Ed Reed ... And even Terrell Suggs, who has emerged as a phenomenal leader, [and] Marshal Yanda ... The next generation is coming up, and there's going to be a phenomenal group of leaders in that generation, too. I think you see, if you're around the locker room, you see who those guys are. That would be my long answer to that question."



**Obviously, with OLB Elvis Dumervil, that forces a decision otherwise. What does OLB Za'Darius Smith have to do better so he is not a gameday inactive? (Jeff Zrebiec)** "Well, it is competitive. There is a lot that goes into it. It is really not so much about Za'Darius and what he was or was not doing, it is more about the fact that we had to have a certain number of guys up in certain spots to play positions. We have five outside 'backers; it is hard to get five outside 'backers up. Probably, truthfully, Matt Judon had done a little bit more over the course of the last three, four or five games. That is competitive. [Smith] has to fight and fight his way back in there some way or another, do a little more on special teams, if he can. That is true for anybody. It is a good problem to have. I think Za'Darius Smith is a ... I love the guy. I think he is a really good football player. He comes to work every day. He has a tremendous attitude. He works really hard, and he is very talented. He has played well; he has played very well. It is a good problem to have. I want competition for those 46 spots, and those guys need to be fighting to be up on gameday."

**You guys used the no-huddle offense against the Browns and then again, yesterday. Is that something that is a function of the defense that you are facing, or are you just trying it out to see if that is the personality of your offense? (Gerry Sandusky)** "It is probably both. It has to do with what we try to do – getting back to Jerry [Coleman's] question – to try and win games, to try and move the ball, try and change the tempo up a little bit. There are different types of no-huddle offenses that we use. We used two types of them yesterday; we did not get to another one. We are looking at that and saying, 'How do we get to that one more?' Maybe that would have helped us. I like no-huddle. I like going fast. I think it is tough on the defense. I think it is challenging on the defense, but it presents some problems for the offense, too. You have to cover those as well. I think Joe [Flacco] functions well in the no-huddle. But you look at Miami, who we are playing this week, and they were in the no-huddle offense for the first five or six weeks and really struggled. They have gone to a huddle offense almost exclusively since then, and they have won six in a row. It is different from week to week, from team to team. We just have to find our way that way. That is something that, to me, is good for us. We are not going to be exclusively a no-huddle team. That would take us down a road that I think would create problems for us that we do not want, but we need to mix it up."

**Speaking of Miami, they had a really dominant running game, and then yesterday, the 49ers tried to stack the box and QB Ryan Tannehill threw for three touchdowns. How versatile do you see their offense? (Todd Karpovich)** "I have not really watched them on tape that much. From what I understand ... I am reading about them right now and watching highlights like you are. I will have a better answer for you on Wednesday. Tannehill has done a great job all year. Obviously, he has not made a lot of mistakes since they have started winning – more touchdown passes with fewer interceptions. They have run the ball. Their offensive line has been a little banged up I think, so they are probably hoping to get those guys healthy. They have three really good receivers and a great running back. It is a good combination of players."

**How much satisfaction do you take in the way the game ended yesterday, especially with the execution and you having a special teams background? (Shawn Stepner)** "It is pretty much a play that every special teams coach has in his playbook, so I do not think it is anything revolutionary by any stretch. I was really happy with the way the guys executed it. I was really proud of that; I thought they did a great job of finishing the game. That is a big play. You do not really want to punt, because they are rushing you, and they could block it, and you really don't want to put it back there in [Adam] 'Pacman' Jones' hands in that situation, either, if you don't have to, because he could take it back, and you have to cover it. So it is better to take the safety if you think you can run all the time off the clock. But 11 seconds is a long time to run off the clock. Our guys did a good job of getting all the time off the clock. Further on special teams, we have to get better on special teams. We have a lot of work to do, and we are going to work again this week on it."

**Is 11 seconds the max you think for that kind of play? (Jamison Hensley)** "I don't know. That would have been more Sam [Koch] ... It was more than 11 seconds."

**When you get late into the season like this and you get into December, are they [the Dolphins] at a disadvantage when they come north and play in cold weather, in your opinion? (Bruce Cunningham)** "I don't know. That would be a great question. I have never coached a southern team coming north before."

**With G Marshal Yanda making the switch to the left side and G Vladimir Ducasse stepping in, how do you think he is playing and how is the unit as a whole? (Cliff Brown)** "I feel like the offensive line is playing better. I think when you watch them on tape, we are better than we were three or four weeks ago. Ronnie [Stanley] continues to improve as a rookie. Marshal [Yanda] did another solid job on the left side. Jeremy Zuttah played very well at center. I think Rick Wagner has had his two best games of the year the last two weeks. When Geno Atkins and [Domata] Peko don't dominate the game, and when you do a good job of keeping those guys at bay and keeping them out of your backfield, that is a successful game for your offensive line – especially for your centers and guards."



**When it comes to CB Jimmy Smith, I know you were optimistic in saying it could be a possible game-time decision. Then, he was listed as doubtful. Once you get into that doubtful category – as you know – it is a 25 percent chance of the guy playing. Is that essentially him being ruled out? There has not been an occasion this year where you have used a guy who has been doubtful.**

**(Jerry Coleman)** “That is a great question for the league and how that all works. Twenty-five percent is 25 percent. The trainers do that. That comes up, what, on Friday? I was hopeful he would get back. He ran again on Saturday, and he tried to see how well he ran on the ground, and it was better, but it was not good enough to play. That is where we were at.”

**It sounds like CB Jimmy Smith is closer than he has been in the past few weeks. (Jerry Coleman)** “He is close. He has been able to run for about a week, so we will see.”

**From your perspective, how has the secondary had to adjust without CB Jimmy Smith in there? (Ed Lee)** “Guys have had to step up. That is the thing. The point I was making earlier was that they did a much better job of adjusting this week than the week before. Guys played better. We covered tighter. We were more aggressive. I just liked the mentality way better back there this week than last week. The technique was much better. They played with more confidence. That is how they should play. We have good players. We have a number of guys that can cover back there, and I would like to see them play into their capabilities, which they did a much better job of yesterday.”

**Can you talk a little bit about WR Breshad Perriman making another big catch in the end zone and doing a great job getting his feet down? (Bill West)** “That was great. He had one earlier in the year where he didn’t get his feet down, and that was a tough one for us; it probably cost us the game. You always love a player that learns from those opportunities. He has gotten his feet down a couple times since then. Yesterday he got his feet down, and he made a great catch two weeks ago. Those are the kind of plays that we need from Breshad, and he has worked really hard at practice to improve every single game. But he is going to be the first one to tell you on that deep crossing route, he wants to make that catch, and he is capable of making that one, too. He is a big-play threat. We need to keep building on that for him.”

**You have had some off-the-field conversations with K Justin Tucker. Is he quirky, interesting, deep? It just seems like a lot of the guys yesterday were talking about him being a little cocky. He has a broad range of interests. How do you find him to be? (Dave Ginsburg)** “I do not want to label anybody. Justin is Justin. To me, it is all positive. He is a 27-year-old guy. He is a performer. He is a very confident guy. To me, you can call that whatever you want, in terms of cocky or confident. Or, what is the balance there? I do not personally think he has a hint of arrogance in him at all. I think he is a fundamentally-humble person who loves life, loves to perform and has a lot of confidence. He has earned the confidence, because he has worked so hard, and he is talented. We try to keep him in place and whip him in shape every now and then and make fun of him every opportunity we can. He has a great sense of humor and takes it well.”

**When you watch TE Dennis Pitta right now on film, does your mind still kind of think about him being a guy who is removed from two hip surgeries? Or is it to the point now where you watch him and it is just normal? (Jamison Hensley)** “You don’t think about that part of it anymore. It is just trying to find a way to make plays and win games and how he fits in and how we can get him the ball, how he can block and do all things he can do as a tight end. That is all we really think about now. We are kind of past that other part of it now.”

**There have been a lot of discussions about WR/RS Devin Hester Sr. with his health, primarily before the bye week. What have you seen from him since then? Of course, he had the long punt return yesterday. (Luke Jones)** “I do think he is a lot healthier. He had some soft tissue injuries that he was dealing with, which I guess is not completely unexpected. He looks better now, to me, in practice. He is moving a lot better. That goes to catching the ball and making plays. He is starting to get his burst back, which is a good thing for us.”

**How would you rate the running game yesterday? (Bill West)** “We need the running backs to be a big part of what we are doing, and they had about 140 yards yesterday of total offense. That is big for us. Those two guys are talented guys. Terrance [West] did what he has been doing so well. Kenneth Dixon stepped up and showed a little more of his ability. That was good to see. If those guys can be a one-two punch for us, we will take it. It has been positive. It was positive yesterday.”
