GETTING TO NIPPERT STADIUM

The physical address for Nippert Stadium is 99 West Corry Street Cincinnati, OH 45219

FROM I-71 South (from Columbus): For Campus Green, Eden, Stratford, University and Woodside take I-71 south to exit 3B – Martin Luther King Drive. Turn right on to MLK and follow the signs to your designated parking facility. Pass holders in CCM, Calhoun, Corry and Varsity Village should take I-71 south to exit 3A – Taft Road. Stay on Taft approximately seven blocks to the intersection of Jefferson Avenue. Depending on your designated parking facility, turn right onto Jefferson or continue straight.

FROM I-71 North: Take I-71 north until it merges with I-75 just south of Florence, KY. Stay on I-75 after you cross the Ohio River. Follow directions from I-75.

FROM I-75 North or South: Take exit 3 – Hopple Street. At the end of the ramp, turn left (north exit) or right (south exit). Hopple Street becomes Martin Luther King Drive. Follow Martin Luther King Drive up the hill to Clifton Avenue. Enter your designated parking facility off MLK or Jefferson Ave.

FROM U.S. 50 (East): U.S. 50 to Taft Road (Taft later becomes one-way going west). Stay on Taft to the intersection of Jefferson Avenue. Depending on your designated parking facility, turn right onto Jefferson or continue straight.

FROM I-74 (Indianapolis and the West): Take I-74 to I-75 South. Follow directions from I-75.

Gameday media parking is located in Clifton Court Garage (321 Clifton Court). Enter campus off Clifton Avenue before MLK.

On practice days, media are asked to park in Corry Garage for the Sheakley Athletics Center and Varsity Village Garage for Nippert Stadium practices.

MEDIA CREDENTIALS

Requests for official working media credentials should be directed to the UC Sports Communications Office. All requests should be received no later than noon, four days prior to the game. Visit the football page at GoBEARCATS.com to request credentials online. Season credentials will be available for pickup prior to the first game. No credentials will be mailed after Tuesday preceding the game. Thereafter, credentials may be picked up on gameday at the media will call located by gate 6.

SCOUTING PASSES

Professional scouts may obtain credentials through UC's Sports Communications Office. Scouts will be issued seating in the press box on a space-available basis.

SIDELINE PASSES

The University of Cincinnati follows NCAA guidelines regarding media representatives on the sidelines. Photographers and videographers are permitted to shoot between the 25-yard lines and the goal lines on both sidelines and behind the restraining line in the end zone.

PRESS BOX SERVICES

Complete stats, scoring summaries, running play-by-play, quickie stats and post-game notes and quotes are provided by the UC Sports Communications Office. Pregame food service is available beginning approximately two hours prior to kickoff, while beverages are available throughout the contest. This service is provided as a courtesy to working media. In addition, concession areas are available within the stadium confines. Wireless internet is available in the press box at Nippert Stadium. Members of the UC Sports Communications staff will be available to assist you. There is no access fee.

GOING GREEN

Starting with the 2010 season, the University of Cincinnati no longer prints media guides. A record book/media supplement is available on the football page at www.GoBEARCATS.com.

WEEKLY MEDIA LUNCHEON

UC holds a weekly media luncheon each Tuesday in the second floor Bob Goin Team Room of Richard E. Lindner Center. Lunch is served at 11:30 a.m., selected players are available for one-on-one interviews from 11:45-noon, and head coach Luke Fickell takes the podium at noon.

PRACTICES

During a typical Saturday game week, media may interview players and coaches immediately following practice on Tuesday. Practice is generally closed to the public. Anyone hoping to observe practice should contact UC Sports Communications in advance. Failure to do so may result in an individual's removal from the venue. During regular-season practices, unless otherwise noted, still and television photographers will be allowed to shoot stretching and the first 20 minutes (four periods). At the conclusion of practice, head coach Luke Fickell will address the media on the field. First-year players, including freshmen and transfers, will be made available to the media at the coach's discretion.

INTERNET POLICIES

Live updating of websites, blogs and social network feeds is not allowed during practices.

POSTGAME INTERVIEWS

The UC locker room will remain closed following all football games. Media should request players through UC Sports Communications during the fourth quarter. Media will be allowed to enter the field (for home games) late in the fourth quarter but will not be allowed to conduct interviews with UC football players on the field (home or away). Only the originating television and radio networks will be allowed to conduct interviews on the field.

There will be a 10-15 minute cooling off period between the end of the game and start of the postgame interview sessions. Coach Fickell will address the media in the designated interview area following home games. Players will be brought into the interview area as soon as possible.

Postgame availability on the road will be determined on gameday. Please see football contact Ryan Koslen for details.

AMERICAN ATHLETIC TELECONFERENCE

The American Athletic Conference will coordinate a weekly teleconference of the league's 12 head football coaches, beginning Monday, Aug. 28, and continuing each Monday through the 2017 season. Each coach will be available for 10 minutes. Media members who wish to access the teleconference should contact Chuck Sullivan at the American Athletic Conference for the phone number.

RADIO

University of Cincinnati fans have had no trouble tracking the Bearcats due to their radio network.

700 WLW begins its 24th season as the Bearcats' broadcast partner. The station's 50,000-watt signal can project UC games to 38 states and a third of Canada, and worldwide via Iheart.com, making it possible for UC football fans to hear every game.

Through its partnership with IMG College, UC games are picked up weekly by SiriusXM and online via TuneIn.com. Check GoBEARCATS.com, SiriusXM.com or TuneIn.com weekly to find out the channel for a UC game.

WLW augments the broadcast coverage with pregame and postgame programming. Additionally, head coach Luke Fickell is featured on an hour-long show each week from the original Montgomery Inn, allowing Cincinnati fans to meet the coach and ask their questions up close and personal while enjoying the world's greatest ribs.

DAN HOARD – Play-by-Play

Dan Hoard is in his 17th season as the Voice of the Bearcats, handling the play-by-play duties for the football and men's basketball teams. Hoard, also the radio announcer for the Cincinnati Bengals, first served as UC's over-the-air voice in 1996 and handled the play-by-play on the local television telecasts from 1996-2000. He took over the radio play-by-play duties in 2000.



Jim Kelly, Jr.

JIM KELLY, JR. – Color Analyst

Jim Kelly, a standout receiver for the Bearcats in the mid-1970's, returns for his 26th season as an analyst. Jim is the son of the late Jim Kelly, Sr., who was associated with UC for over 40 years as an athlete, assistant coach, and administrator. Kelly, Jr. followed in his father's footsteps as an athlete and started three seasons as a wide receiver for UC in the mid-1970's.



Tony Pike

TONY PIKE – Sideline Reporter

Former UC signal-caller Tony Pike joined the radio team in 2015 as the Bearcats' sideline reporter. Pike, a standout QB who helped lead UC to the 2009 Orange Bowl and 2010 Sugar Bowl had a brief NFL career cut short due to an elbow injury. The Cincinnati native is now the general manager of Beacon Elite Sports Training in Sharonville.



Mo Egger

MO EGGER – Host and Engineer

Mo Egger is the host, producer, and engineer on UC broadcasts. He is the morning sports anchor on 700 WLW, and hosts afternoons on ESPN 1530 and late nights and weekends on national ESPN Radio shows. A New Jersey native and a graduate of the University of Dayton, he has been with Clear Channel since 1997 and has worked on UC broadcasts since 2001.

TELEVISION

When it comes to television, the University of Cincinnati has one of the most extensive television packages in the country as its partners cover not only the state of Ohio, but the nation.

The 2017 football season will be the fourth under the American Athletic Conference's comprehensive television partnerships with ESPN and CBS Sports.

The new arrangements began with the 2013-14 basketball season and will be in place through the 2019-20 academic year. The contracts provide for unprecedented exposure on two of the industry leaders in sports television.

In football, the contract calls for all conference-controlled games — which encompasses all conference games and home non-conference games — to be televised. Nearly 90 percent of those games will be carried on either national broadcast or national cable platforms.

In addition to contracted games on ABC, ESPN, ESPN2, ESPNU and ESPNNews, American Athletic Conference teams will regularly appear on CBS Sports Network through a sub-licensing agreement with ESPN.

Additional non-conference games will be available on Watch ESPN and the ESPN app — ESPN's live multi-screen sports network, giving fans an online destination that delivers thousands of global sports events annually. It is accessible online at WatchESPN.com, on smartphones and tablets via the ESPN app and streamed on televisions through Amazon Fire TV and Fire TV Stick, Apple TV, Chromecast, Roku, Xbox 360 and Xbox One. The network is currently available to more than 99 million homes at no additional cost to fans who receive their high-speed Internet connection or video subscription from an affiliated service provider. The network is also available at no cost to approximately 21 million U.S. college students and U.S.-based military personnel via computers, smartphones and tablets connected to on-campus educational and on-base military broadband and Wi-Fi networks. ESPN, Inc., is the world's leading multinational, multimedia sports entertainment company featuring a portfolio of more than 50 multimedia sports assets. The company is comprised of eight U.S. 24-hour television networks and five HD simulcast services. Based in Bristol, Connecticut, ESPN is 80-percent owned by ABC, Inc., which is an indirect subsidiary of The Walt Disney Company. The Hearst Corporation holds a 20 percent interest in ESPN.

CBS Sports Network is available to 100 million homes and may be seen on a digital basic cable package in all American Athletic Conference markets. Talent for The American's weekly game on CBS Sports Network includes Dave Ryan on play-by-play, Corey Chavous as the analyst and Melanie Collins as the reporter.

Through a new partnership with SIDEARM Sports, GoBEARCATS.com was relaunched in July 2017 and features a fresh, updated look along with a best in class web experience for recruits, fans and donors alike. The responsive layout and design scales to fit the user device on desktop, tablet and mobile so fans will be able to access information easily on the go. The new website includes larger photos and easier navigation between pages, including consolidated information so fans can find the schedules, social content, photo galleries and video content for all Bearcats sports.

AMERICAN ATHLETIC CONFERENCE



The American Athletic Conference consists of 13 prestigious institutions: the University of Central Florida, the University of Cincinnati, East Carolina University, the University of Connecticut, the University of Houston, the University of Memphis, the U.S. Naval Academy (in football only), the University of South Florida, Southern Methodist University, Temple University, Tulane University, the University of Tulsa, and Wichita State University (as of July 1, 2017).

Under the leadership of commissioner Mike Aresco, the American Athletic Conference has written an impressive list of accomplishments, both in the competitive arena and the classroom. The American has taken its place at the forefront of intercollegiate athletics, with a collection of national team and individual championships and football and men's and women's basketball postseason victories that place The American among the elite Division I FBS conferences.

The league has produced four NCAA championship teams – UConn men's basketball in 2014 and UConn women's basketball in 2014, 2015 and 2016 – in addition to two New Year's Six bowl champions, five NCAA individual championships, and one Rhodes Scholar. Additionally, American Athletic Conference teams have advanced to the College World Series, reached the semifinal and final rounds of the NIT, qualified for the match play round of the NCAA Men's Golf Championship and registered top-10 finishes at the NCAA Cross Country and Outdoor Track and Field championships.

The American Athletic Conference was one of six finalists for the 2016 Sports Business Journal Sports League of the Year award, along with Major League Baseball, Major League Soccer, NASCAR, the National Basketball Association and the PGA Tour.

In football, Temple and Navy were ranked in the final College Football Playoff poll of the 2016 season, marking the second straight season that The American finished with at least two ranked teams. Seven teams from The American played in bowl games, while three teams (USF, Temple, Tulsa) finished with at least 10 wins.

The American has had a combined 15 teams play in bowl games in the last two seasons, highlighted by Houston's win against Florida State in the 2015-16 Chick-fil-A Peach Bowl. Houston's finish at No. 8 nationally in 2015 gave The American a top-10 team in the final national polls for the second time in three seasons after UCF finished No. 10 in the 2013 rankings after the Knights' Fiesta Bowl win against Baylor. Additionally, Memphis, Navy, USF and Temple have all finished in the top 25 of either the CFP, Associated Press or USA Today polls as members of The American.

Individual teams in The American have enjoyed unprecedented success since the conference's formation. Houston went 13-1 in the 2015 football season, setting a school record for wins, while Navy won a program-record 11 games in its first season in the conference, also in 2015. The 2014 season saw Memphis finish with 10 wins in football for the first time since 1938, while Temple enjoyed its first 10-win season in 2015.

Beyond the gridiron, The American sent four teams to the 2016 NCAA Men's Basketball Championship, and the league had the best men's basketball postseason record of any conference in 2014. Since the conference's formation in 2013-14, teams from The American have registered top-10 national rankings in football, men's basketball, women's basketball, baseball, men's soccer, men's golf, and men's track and field. Student-athletes from The American won three NCAA individual titles in track and field in 2016-17 as Cincinnati's Annette Echikunwoke won the indoor weight throw, Tulsa's Marc Scott won the outdoor 10,000-meter title, and Houston won the crown in the outdoor 4x100-meter relay.

Under The American's banner, SMU advanced to the NCAA Men's Basketball Championship for the first time since 1993. The UConn women's basketball team won its NCAA-record ninth, 10th and 11th national championships and broke its own NCAA record with a 111-game winning streak that spanned three seasons. UCF, East Carolina and Houston have all achieved top-10 rankings in baseball in the past three years. Tulsa placed sixth at the 2016 NCAA Men's Cross Country Championship, while USF finished the 2014-15 season at No. 8 in the final men's golf national ranking.

American Athletic Conference student-athletes have distinguished themselves in all facets of intercollegiate athletics. Temple linebacker Tyler Matakovich won the Bednarik Award and the Nagurski Trophy as the nation's top defensive player in 2015, while Navy quarterback Keenan Reynolds finished fifth in the Heisman Trophy voting. UConn basketball standout Breanna Stewart finished her career as the most decorated player in college basketball history as she was chosen as the consensus national player of the year for the third time and became the first player to be named four times as the Most Outstanding Player at the Final Four. Reynolds and Stewart were selected as the winners of the 2016 AAU James E. Sullivan Award as the nation's top amateur athletes, marking only the second time in the 86-year history of the award that multiple winners were chosen.

Additionally, SMU's Avery Acker was chosen as the Division I women's volleyball Academic All-America of the Year in 2015, while Navy offensive guard E.K. Binns and East Carolina wide receiver Zay Jones have both been named as finalists for the 2016 Campbell Trophy, which is presented by the National Football Foundation to the top scholar-athlete in college football. Tulsa cross country standout Kirk Smith was chosen as a Rhodes Scholar in the fall of 2016, while two student-athletes from The American earned NCAA Postgraduate Scholarships in the conference's first three years.

American Athletic Conference alumni have made their mark in professional sports as well. UCF quarterback Blake Bortles was selected by the Jacksonville Jaguars with the No. 3 pick in the 2014

NFL Draft. More recently, a number of American Athletic Conference athletes have been selected in the first round of the professional entry drafts in football, basketball, baseball and soccer. The American has had two first-round picks in each of three of the last four seasons, while the conference produced four first-round picks, including the top three selections, in the 2016 WNBA Draft.

The American Athletic Conference holds media rights partnerships with ESPN and CBS Sports which provide the conference with outstanding national exposure on the two industry leaders in sports television. The football portion of the contract calls for nearly 90 percent of conference-controlled games on national broadcast or national cable platforms. The first two American Athletic Conference Football Championships were televised by ABC as part of Championship



Saturday.

In men's basketball, the television deal calls for all conference-controlled games to be televised, with more than 63 percent slotted for national broadcast or national cable – a minimum of 107 games. The entire postseason tournament is televised, including the championship game, which is on ABC or ESPN. Sixty percent of the American's women's basketball games are carried on national cable, regional sports networks or ESPN3, while the conference has a multi-year agreement with CBS Sports Network for coverage of select baseball games.

American Athletic Conference teams have access to the pinnacle of college football's postseason structure. An American representative would be chosen for the College Football Playoff semifinals if it is among the top four teams in the CFP selection committee's final ranking. Otherwise, the league would place its champion in a New Year's Bowl if it is ranked higher than the champions of Conference USA, the Mid-American Conference, the Mountain West Conference and the Sun Belt Conference.

Additionally, The American holds primary or secondary partnerships with 12 bowls for the current six-year cycle, ensuring multiple annual matchups against the nation's top conferences and providing desirable postseason destinations to member institutions and their fans.

The American Athletic Conference serves its membership from a state-of-the-art office located in Providence, R.I. The location of the conference headquarters – just steps from the city's Amtrak station and 10 minutes from T.F. Green International Airport – gives the conference easy access to its member schools. The conference headquarters also serves as the home of the American Digital Network, which provides live coverage of all 21 conference championships.

PRESEASON NOTEBOOK

// NEW MAN IN CHARGE

- Luke Fickell takes over as Cincinnati's head coach in 2017. Fickell had served as the defensive coordinator at Ohio State from 2005-16, with the exception of the 2011 season, when he was the Buckeyes' head coach. Fickell, a native of Columbus, Ohio, has spent his entire coaching career in the state of Ohio.

// A BRIEF LOOK BACK

- Cincinnati won three of its first four games in 2016, but managed one win in the final eight games as the Bearcats missed the postseason for the first time since 2010.
- A big reason for the late-season skid was a lack of points from the offense. UC totaled 13 points in three games, 14 quarters or 205:08 of game action, spanning BYU-UCF-Memphis and was held under 10 points four times in 2016.

// LOOKING AHEAD

OFFENSE

- Cincinnati had three players start at quarterback during the 2016 season. QB Hayden Moore, who started seven games, is the most experienced of the signal-callers.
- RB Mike Boone saw his 2016 season cut short due to a foot injury. Boone rushed for 749 yards and seven touchdowns in 2015, but was limited to nine games last year.
- The Bearcats return two of their top three receivers from last season as WR Devin Gray (860 yards, five TDs) and WR Khalil Lewis (605 yards, 5 TDs) are back.
- OT Korey Cunningham, who started every game last season anchors the offensive line.

DEFENSE

- Cincinnati loses its top three tackles leaders from last season.
- The Bearcats will feature an experience secondary that includes returning starters in CB Grant Coleman, S Tyrell Gilbert and S Carter Jacobs. Gilbert had three interceptions last year.
- Cincinnati will replace all three starting linebackers from last year, including Eric Wilson, who led The American with 129 tackles.
- DT Cortez Broughton earned second-team all-conference honors as a sophomore after he registered 2.5 sacks and 5.0 tackles for loss on the interior line.

SPECIAL TEAMS

- K Andrew Gantz, a two-time all-conference selection, was limited to two games last season due to a leg injury, but returns as one of The American's top placekickers.
- K Josh Pasley hit five kicks in the 2017 spring game, including a 52 yarder just before halftime.
- The Bearcats will go with a new punter in 2017 with true freshman James Smith, an Australian with a big leg, getting the first look.

// UNDER CENTER

- Moore was tabbed as the leader in the QB competition coming out of spring football, but a battle with sophomore Ross Trail and redshirt freshman Jake Sopko will play itself out through training camp.
- Moore has 10 career starts under his belt and threw for 11 TDs a year ago, including a 371-yard performance in the season finale at Tulsa with TD throws of 38, 82 and 70

yards. He also had a 29-yard TD reception on a throwback pass.

- Trail made two starts in 2016, rushing for two TDs and throwing another.
- Sopko has yet to take a collegiate snap after redshirting in 2016.

// QUITE A TRANSFORMATION

- LT Korey Cunningham has come a long way since his arrival in Cincinnati.
- When the 6-6, 318 lb senior arrived from Montevallo, Alabama, he was a 225 lb tight end.
- In 2016, the 12-game starter was on the field for 831 of UC's 850 offensive plays.

// WHO'S NEXT?

- The unsung heroes of a college football team make up the scout team. Complied of mostly walk-ons and players who are redshirting, the offensive and defensive scout teams are responsible for giving the first team a first-hand look at what they will face in an upcoming game, giving the look of the opponent's offense and defense.
- It also gives fans and coaches a peek at who the team's future stars will be.
- In 2016, LB Joel Dublanko was a unanimous choice for the defensive scout team player of the year while RB Gerrid Doaks and TE Bruno Labelle shared the offensive honor.

// LEWIS RETURNS AT RECEIVER

- Khalil Lewis finished the campaign with 48 receptions for 605 yards and five touchdowns.
- The speedster also was a threat out of the backfield, setting a career high with his 79-yard run on a jet sweep at Purdue.
- Lewis finished with five or more receptions on five occasions and had his first career TD in the season opener against UT Martin.
- He had a career game against East Carolina, hauling in 11 passes for 150 yards and three TDs.
- Lewis also returned six kickoffs, averaging 16.3 yards per return with a season long 24-yard effort against BYU.

// GRAY LOOKS TO BUILD ON SOLID JUNIOR CAMPAIGN

- Wide Receiver Devin Gray burst onto the UC scene in 2016, becoming the first UC wideout in 129 years to tally 100 or more receiving yards in his Bearcats debut.
- He hauled in a team-high 58 receptions for 860 yards and five TDs, averaging 14.8 yards per catch.
- Gray led the squad in receiving in five games, breaking the 100-yard mark on three occasions.
- He opened the year with five catches for 111 yards against UT Martin, tallied seven receptions for 105 yards against BYU and closed out the campaign with a career best 143 yards receiving on five catches at Tulsa.
- Gray found the end zone five times, twice in the first half at Temple, setting a career mark.
- The 82-yard TD ball from QB Hayden Moore to Gray at Tulsa was UC's longest play from scrimmage in 2016.

// BROUGHTON LEADS THE DEFENSIVE FRONT

- Second-Team All-AAC honoree Cortez Broughton started all 12 games for the Bearcats and was a disruptive force up the middle. He finished the season with 42 tackles,

including a season-high five stops against USF.

- He added five tackles for a loss, two-and-a-half sacks, a pair of pass break ups and his first career interception, against Miami (Ohio) as UC won the Victory Bell for the 11th straight year. He helped lead a defensive front that improved 15 spots in the NCAA FBS rush defense rankings, 16 spots in scoring defense, 58 spots in team tackles for loss and 24 spots in sacks.

// MOUHON COMES INTO HIS OWN

- DE Kevin Mouhon had a breakout year, ranking fifth on the squad with 50 tackles. He was among the leaders in the American all season long with his team-high 9.5 tackles for a loss.
- He added a QB sack, three QB hurries, a pair of passes defended and a forced fumble.
- He hit a career mark with seven stops against BYU, three of his four tackles against USF were TFLs and he had five games totaling five or more tackles.

// CLEVER HEADLINE GOES HERE

- In the season finale at Tulsa, UC played its first overtime game since a 2013 overtime loss to Louisville and its 13th extra time contest overall.
- UC is 6-7 all time in OT games, 3-5 in games that go one OT, 3-5 on the road and 3-6 in conference OT games.
- UC finished the season with a losing record and will miss a bowl game for the first time since 2010.
- UC ended the season on a five-game losing streak and dropped seven of their final eight games. Seven of the team's eight losses came in conference play.

// ONE-MAN SHOW

- WR Thomas Geddis had a breakout game in the 2016 finale at Tulsa.
- Geddis caught a 38-yard TD reception to put UC on the board with 8:31 in the first quarter. It was his first career TD reception and a career-long catch. The true freshman entered the game with one reception for 14 yards.
- Geddis had two catches for a career best 86 yards and TD in the first half and finished with his first career 100-yard game, hauling in three balls for 104 yards and TD.

// STRONG FINISH TO 2016 FOR COPELAND

- DT Marquise Copeland had eight tackles in the season finale at Tulsa and tallied 39 of his 59 tackles in the final six games of the 2016 season.

// YOU GIVETH, WE TAKETH

- UC had three takeaways in the season finale at Tulsa, a fumble recovery and two interceptions.
- UC finished 2016 with 24 takeaways (17 INT/7 FR) and 21 sacks after forcing only 14 takeaways (9 INT/5 FR) and 13 sacks during the 2015 season.
- UC forced at least one turnover in 10 of 12 games and finished 57th in the FBS turnover margin rankings, a 67-place jump over 2015 when the Bearcats were one of the worst teams in the FBS (124).
- UC tied for 20th in the FBS in turnovers gained.

// HE'S SHIFTY

- Despite being limited to nine game due to injury in 2016, RB Mike Boone still showed the explosive nature that makes him a threat every time he touches the ball.
- Boone had a season- and career-long 60-yard kickoff return in the first quarter at Temple, setting the Bearcats up inside the Owls 30.
- It was UC's longest kickoff return since Ralph David Abernathy IV had a 90-yard runback for a TD in the 2011 Auto-Zone Liberty Bowl.
- He made his first career start against East Carolina, rushing 14 times for a season-best 88 yards.
- He has averaged almost six yards a carry [5.8] for his career and 61.6 yards per game along with 20 TDs.

// TRIVIA QUESTION

- Can you name the only non-quarterback on the roster with a career TD pass?
- If you guessed TE Tyler Cogswell, you're correct.
- Cogswell, a former HS QB, completed a 29-yard throwback pass to Moore in the first quarter of the 2016 finale at Tulsa.
- It was the first career pass and passing TD for Cogswell and the first career reception and receiving TD for Moore.
- The last time a non-QB threw a TD was RB Tion Green completing a 1-yard TD pass to DJ Dowdy at BYU in 2015.

// SOMETHING TO BUILD ON

- WR Jerron Rollins caught a 70-yard TD pass from QB Hayden Moore in the third quarter at Tulsa, his first career TD.
- Rollins had caught four balls this season for 15 yards entering the game. He had three catches for 84 yards.

// GETTING EXPLOSIVE

- One of the biggest differences from 2015's record-setting offense to the 2016 team is explosive plays.
- UC had 115 plays of 20 or more yards in 2015, with 18 going for TDs. In 2016, UC had 62 explosive plays and eight Touchdowns.

// GANTZ COMING OFF THE SHELF

- K Andrew Gantz missed most of the 2016 season due to a torn muscle in his hip.
- Gantz was limited to two games, making both field goals he attempted as well as going 6-for-6 on PATs.
- He is only the second placekicker in school history to tally a pair of 100-plus point scoring seasons and the first to do it in consecutive seasons [2014 & 15].
- Gantz totaled a school-record 112 points by kicking a year ago and 100 points in 2014. Former Groza Award winner Jonathan Ruffin tallied 104 points in 2000 and 101 points in 2002.

// BREAKING A LONG STREAK

- With a 38-20 win at Purdue in 2016, UC registered its first road win against a current Big Ten opponent in 59 years.
- UC's last road win against the B1G came on Nov. 9, 1957 when the Bearcats shutout Indiana, 21-0, in Bloomington.

// FROM HOCKEY SKATES TO FOOTBALL CLEATS

- He did not play in high school and spent time after graduation playing hockey in the Southern Professional Hockey League. The big man was an enforcer on ice.
- His first exposure to playing football occurred when he joined the Bearcats during training camp in the fall of 2015.

// THE FRENCH CANADIAN CONNECTION

- TE Bruno Labelle, a native of Quebec, Canada, had a dream of playing NCAA FBS football since he was young.
- Discovered by the Bearcats during a summer prospect camp on campus, Labelle earned a scholarship offer and enrolled at UC in January 2016, going through spring ball.
- The redshirt freshman calls football as his third language as he's fluent in both English and his native French.

// MEDARIS ELIGIBLE THIS FALL

- WR Rashad Medaris is eligible this fall after sitting out 2016 following a transfer from Western Illinois.
- Medaris is the brother of former UC standout WR Anthony McClung and was a Class 6A All-State Selection out of Pike

HS in 2014. Medaris had 88 receptions for 1,218 yards and 12 TDs during his two year HS career.

// TROUT NETS A LANDING SPOT AT UC

- OL Kyle Trout will be eligible to play this fall as a graduate transfer from Ohio State.
- Trout earned his degree in family resource management from OSU in three years and is a junior with two years left.
- Trout played in nine games for the Buckeyes in 2016, seeing action in eight straight to end the season, including the College Football Playoff game against Clemson.
- The Lancaster, Ohio native was a four-star recruit out of high school.

// A LEGEND RETURNS HOME

- RB coach Gino Guidugli, a member of UC's James P. Kelly Sr. Athletics Hall of Fame and a charter member of Nippert Stadium's Ring of Honor, returned to his alma mater after spending six seasons at Central Michigan.
- Guidugli was named CMU's offensive coordinator and quarterbacks coach following the 2016 campaign after previously serving as the running backs coach and recruiting coordinator.
- Prior to joining the coaching ranks, Guidugli played professionally in the Arena and Canadian Football Leagues.
- He still holds seven UC school records and is the only signal-caller in school history to throw for 3,500 or more yards in a season and had 14 career 300-yard passing games.

// FORMER BEARCATS DOT THE FOOTBALL STAFF

- Guidugli is not the only former Bearcat on the coaching staff. Joker Phillips [WR] and Ron Crook [OL] had previous stints on the coaching staff while Austin Bujnoch [offensive GA], Adam Dempsey [defensive intern] and Doug Rosfeld [director of player development] all played for the Red & Black.

// HIGH TECH EQUIPMENT

- Cincinnati is one of a handful of teams to wear the Russell Athletic CarbonTek shoulder pad system. The pads are a collaboration between Russell Athletic and Boeing that uses excess carbon fiber from 787s.

// PROTECT THIS HOUSE

- UC announced a long-term partnership with Under Armour, naming the global performance brand as the its official outfitter starting July 1, 2015.
- As part of the multi-year agreement, Under Armour will exclusively design and supply the footwear, apparel and equipment for training and gameday uniforms for each of UC's 19 men's and women's varsity athletic teams beginning in the 2015-16 season.

// TAKE ME TO HIGHER GROUND

- For the past 18 years, the UC football has called the Higher Ground Conference and Retreat Center in West Harrison, Ind., its preseason training home.
- The 280-acre facility is located about 30 miles from campus and has served as the Bearcats training camp location since the lead up to the 1999 season.
- Among many amenities, Higher Ground features a pair of 100-yard turf practice fields, ample living and meeting spaces and no distractions from football.

Carson Field at Nippert Stadium has been the venerable home of the University of Cincinnati football team since 1901 and provides the Bearcats with one of the best home-field environments in college football.

The third-oldest NCAA FBS stadium entered a new era in 2015 following the completion of a 20-month, \$86-million, privately funded renovation and expansion project. The reopening of Nippert Stadium coincides with the 100th anniversary of the 1915 original construction of the facility.

UC has used the Nippert site as a playing field since 1901, making it the second-oldest playing site in the nation for college football behind Penn's Franklin Field [1895]

Among NCAA FBS schools, Nippert is the third-oldest stadium still in use, behind Bobby Dodd Stadium (Georgia Tech - 1913), Davis Wade Stadium (Mississippi State - 1914) and ahead of Ole Miss' Vaught-Hemingway Stadium [1915] and Wisconsin's Camp Randall Stadium [1917].

Through numerous renovations, the structure situated in the middle of the Clifton campus has retained its early-century brickwork, wrought-iron gates, and trim giving Nippert a comfortable old-time stadium charm and appeal, while remaining a classic showplace for college football.

Both east and west concourses were completely renovated and widened and fans will find new concession stands and restrooms throughout the stadium, including ADA accessible seating and facilities. Concession stands feature the usual stadium staples along with offerings from premium local vendors. Nearly 75 permanent point-of-sale concession locations are available on gamedays.

East-side patrons with seats in Herschede-Shank Pavilion will notice the skywalks connecting O'Varsity Way to the upper deck, allowing them to bypass the main concourse and have a quick and easy route to and from their seats. Electronic ribbon boards will be installed on the face of the press box and Herschede-Shank Pavilion. These feature statistics, graphics, out-of-town scores and more.

All the seating benches are covered by red and silver Perma-Cap vinyl bleacher covers by Hussey Seating. The covering gives the bleachers a different look and includes a CPAW painted in the south end zone student section.

The most striking changes, however, sits five stories above the west concourse. At 105,000 square feet and 130 yards long, the five-story West Pavilion rises out of the stadium concourse in glass and angles which contain a host of new premium seating along with state-of-the-art press facilities.

The curvature of the facility matches that of Herschede-Shank Pavilion on the east side of the stadium and contains four levels; a press and operations level, suite level, scholarship club level, and patio suites mezzanine level.

UC went from having nearly no premium seating options to the addition of 1,100 scholarship club seats and 53 indoor and outdoor suites of varying sizes. A skywalk connects Tangeman University Center to the West Pavilion with premium area customers able to access the facility on gameday from the other side of campus.

In addition, three new lighting poles were installed along with new lights on existing poles and on the roof facing of the press box. The stadium lighting averages 165 footcandles, a vast improvement over the previous number.

The 2015 project was the latest in a series of enhancements that began in 1916 when construction began on a permanent brick-and-concrete stadium structure, which was completed, section-by-section, as funds were raised.

In 1936, the playing field was lowered 12 feet to allow spectator seating to increase to 24,000.

The Reed Shank Pavilion was added in 1954 to bring the capacity to 28,000. In 1991, the capacity was upped to 35,000 through extending the upper deck, now called the Herschede-Shank Pavilion.

In 2005, a permanent grandstand added new and improved seating and gameday locker rooms in the North end zone along with a new videoboard, doubling the previous display.

Artificial turf was first installed in 1970 and in 2000, the stadium became one of the first in the U.S. to utilize FieldTurf, a grass-like synthetic surface.

Prior to the 2013 season, UBU Sports' Speed Series S5-M synthetic turf system was installed as the playing surface at Nippert. The stadium's field orientation was shifted slightly north and west to even out the sideline areas and add a run-off area around the south end zone.

The stadium served as home for the Cincinnati Bengals, in 1968 and 1969, while their original permanent home at Riverfront Stadium was being constructed. It is currently the home field for FC Cincinnati, a professional soccer team in the United Soccer League.

The playing surface was widened and a new perimeter wall was constructed following the 2016 season, giving Nippert the ability to play host to international friendly matches on a FIFA regulation field.

Nippert has also served as a venue for concerts by Britney Spears, Michael Jackson, NSYNC, Janet Jackson, KT Tunstall, The North Mississippi All-Stars, The Roots, the Cincinnati Opera Company and many more.

Two US Presidents have spoken at the stadium. On Oct. 16, 1936, President Franklin Roosevelt, running for a second term, appeared at Nippert Stadium and spoke from an open car in the rain to a crowd estimated at 15,000 and on Nov. 2, 2008, President Barack Obama held a campaign rally at Nippert two days before the 2008 Presidential Election to an estimated 27,000 attendees.

USA Today named Nippert as the best home-field venue in the former BIG EAST Conference and ESPN's Scott Van Pelt cited Nippert as a "one of the gems of college football".

WHAT'S IN A NAME?

- » During the season-ending clash with rival Miami (Ohio) in 1923, Jimmy Nippert sustained a spike wound injury and died a month later from blood poisoning. His grandfather, James N. Gamble of Procter and Gamble, provided the funds needed to complete the horseshoe-shaped structure, and the James Gamble Nippert Memorial Stadium was dedicated on Nov. 8, 1924.
- » The stadium's founder was Arch Carson, who as captain and principal organizer played a significant role in starting football on the UC campus in 1885. In 1901 as physical director of the university, Carson guided the construction of the field which was later named for him -- the playing surface is still called Carson Field.

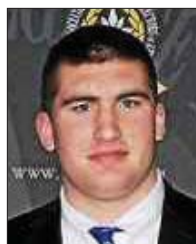

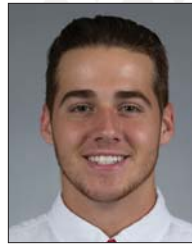

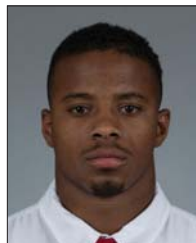

Veteran defensive coordinator and Ohio native Luke Fickell was named the University of Cincinnati's 42nd football head coach in December 2016.

The 43-year old Fickell is an experienced 18-year coaching veteran at the Football Bowl Subdivision level.

His impressive resume includes being on the staff of two national championship winning teams, seeing 12 of his players selected in the NFL Draft, and coordinating outstanding defenses over the last 12 seasons as a co-coordinator or defensive coordinator.

He is also an excellent recruiter with strong Midwest and Florida relationships, a national presence when needed and a discerning eye for talent. He was named the American Football Coaches Association assistant coach of the year in 2010 and he was named a "top recruiter" in 2012 by both Rivals and ESPN.

While recognized as a respected mentor to his student-athletes while sharing life experiences as a former standout football player, college graduate, NFL player and as a husband and father, Fickell is most-noticed as a developer of talent and of really good defenses.

In 2005, he helped guide a defensive unit to fifth in the NCAA in total defense and first in rushing defense. In 2007 the team was first in total defense, first in scoring defense and first in pass defense. In 2009 and 2010, the Buckeyes were fifth and fourth, respectively, in total defense.

During Ohio State's undefeated, 12-0 season of 2012, Fickell's defense capped a season-long path of improvement by ranking second-nationally in total defense during the month of November. In 2013, Ohio State was 10th against the rush after ranking 14th against the run in 2012.

During OSU's 2014 national championship season, the defense improved each week. The unit recorded the first shutout in a conference championship game in Power Five history with a 59-0 victory over Wisconsin while limiting Heisman Trophy finalist Melvin Gordon to 2.9

yards per carry and the team to just 258 total yards. In the College Football Playoff semifinal win over No. 1 Alabama, the defense forced seven Alabama punts, had three interceptions in the last 18 minutes of the game and effectively nullified the talents of Heisman Trophy finalist receiver Amari Cooper.

And finally, in the national championship game vs. Oregon and Heisman Trophy-winning quarterback Marcus Mariota, the defense held the Ducks 100 yards below its offensive average and surrendered just 10 points off four Ohio State turnovers.

Ohio State's 2015 unit ranked ninth nationally in total defense, second in scoring defense, sixth in pass efficiency defense and was a major reason the team went 12-1 on the season.

The 2016 Buckeyes earned a spot in the College Football Playoff semifinal against Clemson after finishing the regular season 11-1 and ranked No. 3 in CFP poll. OSU won five consecutive games to close the season and boast the nation's No. 4 total defense (282.3 yards per game allowed), including the No. 1 pass efficiency defense and the No. 3 scoring defense (14.2). DE Tyquan Lewis was the Big Ten's Smith-Brown Defensive Lineman of the Year and was one of the OSU defense's four first-team all-conference selections. S Malik Hooker earned multiple first-team all-america honors. DE Sam Hubbard, a Cincinnati native, was tabbed as an Academic All-American.

His NFL Draft selections include first-round picks A.J. Hawk, Bobby Carpenter, Ryan Shazier and Darron Lee, NFL standout James Laurinaitis and Joshua Perry, Anthony Schlegel, Larry Grant, Marcus Freeman, Austin Spitzer, Ross Homan and Brian Rolle.

In May of 2011 he was asked to take over an Ohio State program staggered by the loss of a beloved head coach, the unexpected departure of a star quarterback and on the cusp of NCAA penalties, and he steadied the situation with an impressive willingness to take on a challenge.

Fickell was much more than a just a steadying influence in 2011, though. He was a leader through one of the most difficult times in Ohio State athletics history. He kept the team focused and, despite 53 games missed by starters, the constant molding of two first-year quarterbacks and inexperience and youth up and down the lineup, he had the Buckeyes in control of their Big Ten championship destiny well into November.

Prior to Fickell's appointment to serve as head coach in 2011, he had been promoted to assistant head coach in March 2011.

Fickell's coaching career began at Ohio State. After spending a year on the injured reserve list with the New Orleans Saints, he was hired in 1999 as a graduate assistant at Ohio State by his college coach, John Cooper.

Fickell's first full-time coaching position came in 2000 under Lee Owens at Akron, spending two years as defensive line coach. Jim Tressel brought him to Ohio State as special teams coordinator in 2002 and he also worked with the defensive front. He was named linebackers coach in 2004 and added co-defensive coordinator duties to his resume in 2005.

A native of Columbus, Ohio, Fickell is a graduate of DeSales High School, where he was a three-time, undefeated state wrestling champion, and he is a 1997 graduate of Ohio State. He played for the Buckeyes from 1992-96, redshirting the first year and then starting the next four seasons at nose guard. He started a school-record 50 consecutive games between 1993 and 1996.

Fickell concluded his Ohio State career with 212 total tackles, including 26 tackles-for-loss and six sacks. During his four years in the starting lineup, the Buckeyes

posted a record of 41-8-1 with a pair of Big Ten co-championships. With the win over Arizona State in the Rose Bowl, the Buckeyes finished the 1996 season with a sparkling 11-1 record and were second in the nation in both major polls in the final rankings.

Fickell graduated from Ohio State in 1997 with a degree in exercise science.

Luke and his wife, Amy, a graduate of Ohio State's physical therapy school, have six children: Landon, Luca, twin sons Aydon and Ashton, and twin sons Laykon and Lucian.

Mike Denbrock joined the University of Cincinnati football coaching staff in January 2017 and will serve as the offensive coordinator and quarterbacks coach.

A veteran of 30-plus years in the coaching profession, Denbrock has worked as both an offensive and defensive coordinator and coached every position on the offensive side of the ball.

Most recently, Denbrock was at Notre Dame from 2010-16 in a variety of roles. He coached tight ends (2010-11), outside receivers and was the passing game coordinator (2012-13), served as offensive coordinator and wide receivers coach (2014) and was the associate head coach and wide receivers coach (2015-16). During his second stint with the Fighting Irish, Denbrock coached in six bowl games, including the 2012 BCS National Championship.

Known as a dynamic recruiter, Denbrock is a strong offensive mind who had success as the Irish's primary play caller the past two seasons as the offense averaged 443 yards per game and close to seven yards per play over the past 25 games. In 2012, he was tabbed as one of the top 25 recruiters in the nation by Rivals.com and one of country's top 50 recruiters by 247Sports.com.

Denbrock had a trio of strong wideouts at Notre Dame in 2016, including Torii Hunter Jr., Equanimeous St. Brown, and freshman Kevin Stepherson.

Hunter had 38 catches and three TDs in an injury-shortened season. St. Brown led the Irish with 58 receptions for 961 yards and nine touchdowns. He ranked fifth in the nation in receiving yards among sophomores and freshmen, while he ranked among the country's top 40 receivers in both receiving touchdowns and receiving yards. Stepherson ranked as one of the Top-30 receivers in the NCAA FBS, averaging almost 18.5 yards per reception (18.48).

In 2015, he guided the Irish offense to 466.4 yards of total offense per game in 2015, including three games with over 500 yards of total offense (Texas, UMass and Stanford). UND averaged more yards of total offense per game just once (2005) since setting the school record of 510.5 yards of total offense per game (1970).

Notre Dame had seven offensive plays of at least 70 yards, which tied for the most in the FBS, and a school-record 13 offensive TDs of at least 50 yards.

Will Fuller's NFL Draft selection at No. 21 overall was the third highest for a Notre Dame wide receiver over the last three decades. Fuller's 1,258 receiving yards in 2015 ranked second in school history, his seven 100-yard receiving games ranked third and his 14 TD grabs ranked fifth. Fuller was the fourth player in school history to record consecutive 1,000-yard receiving seasons while his 29 TD receptions were the most and his 2,352 receiving yards were the second-most for an Irish player over a two-year span in school history.

He acted as Notre Dame offensive coordinator and wide receivers coach in 2014, with the Irish scoring at least 27 points a school-record 11 times in 2014 and averaging 33.0 points per game -- most since 2005 (36.7) -- and 444.6 yards of total offense per game -- most since 2009 (451.75). Fuller

set Irish sophomore records in touchdown receptions (15), catches (76) and receiving yards (1,094) in 2014.

Denbrock returned to Notre Dame in 2010 and spent the next two seasons coaching the Irish tight ends. He was selected by Tom Lemming as one of the 2011 Assistant Coaches of the Year.

He coached 2011 Mackey Award finalist Tyler Eifert to one of the best seasons ever by a Notre Dame tight end. Eifert, now playing with the Cincinnati Bengals, ranked second on the Irish with 63 receptions for 803 yards and five TDs in 2011. Those marks were Notre Dame single-season records for receptions and receiving yards by a tight end and led all FBS tight ends in 2011 in both receptions and receiving yards. He was selected to the 2011 Walter Camp Football Foundation All-America first team and became the first Irish tight end named first-team All-American since Derek Brown in 1991.

Denbrock mentored 2010 preseason All-American Kyle Rudolph as he collected 28 receptions for 328 yards and three touchdowns in first six games before a hamstring injury ended his season.

Before his time at Notre Dame, Denbrock spent the 2009 season as the associate head coach at Indiana State University and was the offensive line coach at the University of Washington from 2005-08.

He coached offensive tackles and tight ends during his first stint at Notre Dame from 2002-04. The offense produced 1,000-yard rushers in 2002 (Ryan Grant) and 2003 (Julius Jones).

He worked with the offensive tackles and tight ends at Stanford in 2001, developing Kwame Harris (2003 first-round NFL Draft pick) into one of the top offensive tackles in the Pac-10 Conference.

He joined the AFL's Buffalo Destroyers's inaugural coaching staff in 1999 and was the assistant head coach, defensive coordinator and offensive and defensive line coach.

He was an assistant at Grand Valley State from 1992-98, coaching the quarterbacks (1992-95) before moving to the defensive side of the ball as coordinator and linebackers coach (1996-98).

Between 1992-95, the Lakers' offense rated first in the Midwest Intercollegiate Football Conference in both total and scoring offense each season. He guided a GVSU defensive unit that ranked among the nation's top 30 in total defense, scoring defense and rushing defense each season.

His first full-time coaching assignment came in 1990-91 as the tackles and tight ends coach at Illinois State after working as a graduate assistant at Michigan State for two years, working with quarterbacks and receivers in 1988 and offensive line in 1989.

He broke into coaching as a graduate assistant with the offensive tackles and tight ends from 1986-87 at his alma mater, Grand Valley State. Denbrock was a tight end at GVSU from 1982-85, earning a bachelor's degree in communications in 1987.

Denbrock and his wife Dianne have a son, Chance.

Marcus Freeman was named to the University of Cincinnati football staff in January 2017. He is the defensive coordinator and linebackers coach.

Freeman joins the Bearcats staff after a four-year stint at Purdue. He coached linebackers all four seasons and served as the Boilermakers co-defensive coordinator in 2015.

Freeman turned Purdue's linebacking corps from one of the biggest questions marks to one of its strengths over the past four seasons.

Markus Bailey was an Honorable Mention All-Big Ten selection in 2016. Bailey led the Boilermakers with 97 total tackles, 61 solo stops, and four interceptions in 2016. Starting all 12 games, he tallied six tackles for loss and a pair of pass breakups.

Jimmy Herman earned Purdue's Guy "Red" Mackey Award and the Noble E. Kizer Award, for exemplifying the overall success of the University's intercollegiate athletics program and earning the highest GPA among football players over the 2016 calendar year, respectively. Herman posted 138 tackles over his final two seasons.

Ja'Whaun Bentley, a USA Today Freshman All-American in 2014, averaged 6.7 tackles per game under Freeman's coaching and was voted a captain by his teammates prior to the 2015 season. Danny Ezechukwu broke out with a 43-tackle season as a redshirt freshman in 2014 and followed it up with 79 stops in 2015, the most by any of Purdue's linebackers and second on the team. He added 52 stops in 2016, finishing among the top-four tacklers on the team.

Freeman coached linebackers at Kent State from 2011-12. Under Freeman's direction, inside linebacker Luke Batton earned second team All-Mid-American Conference honors in 2012 after finishing with 143 total tackles, including 80 solo stops. Outside linebacker C.J. Malauulu was a third team all-conference selection in 2012, recording 72 total tackles. The pair swapped places on the all-conference team in 2011, with Malauulu garnering second team recognition and Batton third team.

Freeman started his coaching career as a graduate assistant coach at his alma mater, Ohio State, in 2010. The Buckeyes went 12-1 with a victory in the Sugar Bowl.

A four-year letterwinner for the Buckeyes from 2004 to 2008, Freeman played for UC Head Coach Luke Fickell and earned second team All-Big Ten honors in 2008 while helping lead Ohio State to four conference titles, three BCS bowls and two trips to the national title game during his career.

He played in the 2009 Senior Bowl and was a fifth-round draft pick of the Chicago Bears, spending time with the Bears, Buffalo Bills and Houston Texans before a medical condition ended his playing career.

A 2007 Ohio State graduate, he earned Academic All-Big Ten and academic all-district honors. In 2011, he earned a master's degree in sports management from Ohio State.

He graduated from Wayne High School in Huber Heights, Ohio, and was a Parade All-American.

Freeman and his wife Joanna have six children, Bria, Vinny, Siena, Gino, Nico and Capri.

Doug Phillips joined the University of Cincinnati football staff in January 2017 as the special teams coordinator.

Phillips returns to an on-field role after spending the 2016 season at Iowa State as the director of player personnel. The Youngstown, Ohio native and former high school head coach has nearly 25 years of football coaching experience, including six seasons at the NCAA FBS and FCS level and has coached in three national championship games.

He was a high school administrator from 2008-15, serving as a principal and superintendent, most recently as the superintendent at West Branch Local Schools in Beloit, Ohio. Phillips was also an assistant principal and principal for the Dickson County school district in Dickson, Tenn., and principal at Dalton Local Schools (outside of Canton, Ohio) from 2009-12.

He coached the defensive ends and served as Bowling Green's recruiting coordinator from 2007-08, helping the Falcons share the 2007 MAC East title and earn a bowl bid.

Phillips helped coach Diyral Briggs, from Mount Healthy HS, to his second consecutive first-team All-Mid-American Conference honor in 2008. Briggs finished the year with 9.5 sacks, most in the conference. Briggs also set career-highs in tackles for loss with 13.5. In two years under Phillips Briggs recorded 14.5 sacks, second-highest in the league during that span.

Phillips joined the Falcons staff after spending the 2006 season as the defensive quality control coach at Ohio State working with UC Head Coach Luke Fickell. He was part of a staff which won the Big Ten championship and played in the BCS title game. The Buckeyes were fifth in the country in scoring defense that season. On the field, he assisted with the Buckeye linebackers which included All-American and Bronko Nagurski Trophy winner James Laurinaitis.

He worked and coached for 15 years at the high school level, including nine as a head coach. A native of New Middletown, Ohio, Phillips served as head football coach at Springfield Local HS (1997-2000) and Salem HS in Salem, Ohio (2001-05), turning around both programs.

Phillips led his high school alma mater, Springfield Local, to back-to-back state playoff appearances. His 1999 team won the first of consecutive league championships

and made the first of two playoff appearances, while his 2000 squad went undefeated in the regular season and returned to the postseason, where it to the state quarterfinals. After four years at Springfield Local (1997-2000) Phillips moved onto Salem High School, where he spent five seasons (2001-05) and guided his teams to better records every season, culminating with a league runner-up finish in 2005. In addition, he guided the school to consecutive winning records in 2004 and 2005, a feat that was accomplished for the first time in 30 years at the school.

Phillips received his start in college football from 1991-92 at Youngstown State with Jim Tressel. He coached tight ends, defensive backs and running backs/kickers during his stay. Under Tressel, Phillips has coached in three national championship games including 2006 at OSU and in 1992 and 1991 at YSU. The Penguins won the NCAA FCS title in 1991.

While an undergraduate student at Toledo, Phillips got his coaching career started at Toledo St. Francis DeSales and Sylvania Northview. After earning a bachelor's degree in education from UT in 1991, he received a master's degree in educational administration from Youngstown State in 1995.

Offensive line coach Ron Crook joined the University of Cincinnati staff in January 2017.

The 27-year veteran of the coaching ranks starts his second stint with the Bearcats after serving as a graduate assistant working with the offensive line in 1993. He has mentored offensive linemen from coast-to-coast, with stops at West Virginia, Stanford, Harvard, Illinois, West Liberty State, Glenville State, Clarion and West Virginia Tech.

Crook has coached 35 all-conference players, nine All-Americans, nine NFL players, spent five years as a special teams coordinator and three coaching tight ends, has been part of nine championship-winning teams and worked with a pair of teams that made the NCAA Division II playoffs.

He came to UC after spending four seasons coaching the offensive line at WVU. During his time with the Mountaineers, Crook coached six All-Big 12 players and three NFL players.

West Virginia (10-3) finished the 2016 season with its ninth 10-win season in school history and had a 7-2 mark in Big 12 Conference action, tying for second place.

Senior center Tyler Orlosky was named to the Senior CLASS All-America First Team, the first such award winner in WVU history. Orlosky, who also was named to the Associated Press, Football Writers' Association, USA Today, CBSSports.com, SBNation, Athlon Sports and SI.com All-American teams, played in 50 career games and started 42 for the Mountaineers, all at center. He is a two-time team captain, one of three finalists for the 2016 Rimington Trophy and was a unanimous first-team All-Big 12 selection. He was a three-time Academic All-Big 12 selection.

The Mountaineers' offense was ranked No. 12 nationally in first down offense, No. 18 in total offense, No. 25 in rushing offense, No. 36 in passing yards per completion and No. 43 in passing offense.

In 2015, WVU's offense was No. 17 nationally in rushing offense, No. 18 in first down offense and No. 23 in total offense while averaging 228.2 yards per game rushing, No. 2 in the Big 12. Orlosky earned Second-Team All-Big 12 honors.

In 2014, WVU offense was ranked No. 9 nationally in passing offense, No. 11 in first down offense, No. 12 in total offense and No. 34 in scoring offense. Mark Glowinski and Quinton Spain were named Second-Team All-Big 12 and Glowinski was a fourth round NFL Draft choice of Seattle Seahawks

In 2013, Spain was selected Second-Team All-Big 12 and tackle Curtis Feigt was All-Big 12 Honorable Mention.

While at Stanford, he helped lead the Cardinal to a two-year record of 23-4, the 2012 Pac-12 Conference Championship and an appearance in two straight BCS Bowls, including a 20-14 win over Wisconsin in the Rose Bowl on Jan. 1, 2013.

Crook was key in the development of unanimous All-American tight end and two-time Mackey Award Finalist Zach Ertz, who ranked first in 2012 among FBS tight ends with 837 receiving yards and 66 receptions (both marks are Stanford

single-season tight end records).

Ertz and Levine Toilolo were named to the Mackey Award Midseason Watch List, the only pair of teammates in the nation to receive that distinction. Either Ertz or Toilolo led Stanford in receiving in 10-of-13 games in 2012

In 2011, Stanford's tight end trio of Coby Fleener, Ertz and Toilolo were widely considered the best unit in the nation, as the three players combined to catch 86 passes for 1,356 yards and 20 touchdowns. The trio accounted for more than half of Stanford's touchdown receptions (38) during an 11-2 campaign. Fleener, who led the Cardinal with 10 touchdown grabs, was named a Sporting News All-American in addition to earning first team all-conference honors, while Toilolo was an honorable mention all-conference selection. Fleener was drafted in the second round by the Indianapolis Colts in 2012, finishing with 26 catches for 281 yards and two touchdowns.

Prior to his arrival at Stanford, Crook spent eight seasons (2003-10) as offensive line coach at Harvard. The Crimson's offensive line helped pave the way for Clifton Dawson (2003-06) to set the Ivy League's all-time career rushing record with 4,841 yards, breaking the former mark held by Cornell's Ed Marinaro. Eight of Crook's players earned first team All-Ivy honors a combined 11 times, including tackle James Williams, who was a three-time All-America and first team All-Ivy selection.

In 2009, four of Harvard's linemen earned all-league honors while Treavor Scales was named the Ivy League's Rookie of the Year. In addition, Crook tutored Frank Fernandez, who was selected to play in the 2007 Hula Bowl.

Prior to his appointment at Harvard, Crook served on the coaching staff at Illinois from 2002, where he assisted with the offensive line. He worked closely with All-Big Ten players Dave Diehl and 2001 All-America Tony Pashos, who were both selected in the 2003 NFL Draft.

As a graduate assistant coach at Cincinnati in 1993, Crook helped the Bearcats to an 8-3 finish.

Crook also served as the offensive line coach and offensive coordinator at West Liberty State, helping the Hilltoppers to the 2000 WVIAC title. A decade earlier, Crook broke into the collegiate coaching ranks at West Liberty, where he served as a student assistant, working primarily with the tight ends. He also served as the offensive line coach for three seasons (1990-92).

Crook was part of coaching staffs at West Virginia Tech (1999), Glenville State (1997-98) and Clarion College (1994-96). He was part of NCAA Division II playoff teams at Glenville State and Clarion.

After his playing days ended at West Liberty State, he served as the Hilltoppers' offensive line coach for three seasons. He earned his bachelor's degree in physical education from WLU in 1991.

Crook and his wife, Stacy have three children - Andrew, Cian and Kenley.

Former University of Cincinnati standout quarterback Gino Guidugli joined the Bearcats football staff in February 2017 as the running backs coach.

Guidugli, a member of UC's James P. Kelly Sr. Athletics Hall of Fame and a charter member of Nippert Stadium's Ring of Honor, returned to his alma mater after spending six seasons at Central Michigan.

He was named CMU's offensive coordinator and quarterbacks coach following the 2016 campaign after previously serving as the running backs coach and recruiting coordinator. He originally joined the Chippewas staff in 2009 as a graduate assistant.

The Chippewas averaged nearly six yards a play and almost 400 yards per game in 2016 on the way to a berth in the Miami Beach Bowl. Guidugli mentored a pair of NFL running backs during his time in Mt. Pleasant, Thomas Rawls and Zurlon Tipton.

CMU's 2015 offense ranked fifth in the Mid-American Conference, averaging over 400 yards per game. It was a year of transition for the running backs with the emergence of the likes of Martez Walker, Jahray Hayes and Romello Ross.

In 2014, Guidugli mentored Thomas Rawls, who rushed for 1,103 yards and scored 10 touchdowns and earned Second Team All-MAC honors before going on to play in the National Football League. In his first season (2013), Guidugli led a deep stable of running backs that averaged 132.8 yards per game and scored 16 TDs on the ground.

He started his coaching career as a graduate assistant at CMU from 2009-11, assisting with the wide receivers and defensive scout team.

Prior to joining the coaching ranks, Guidugli played professionally in the Arena and Canadian Football Leagues. He had two stints with the Green Bay Blizzard of AFL2 in 2007 and 2009. He played for the AFL's New York Dragons in 2008, the CFL's British Columbia Lions in 2007 and 2008 before closing out his pro career with the AFL's Milwaukee Mustangs, passing for 4,872 yards and 86 touchdowns in 2012.

Guidugli led Cincinnati to three bowl berths during his four-year career as a starter, earning the Claude Rost

Team MVP award in 2001 and 2004, the MVP of the 2004 Fort Worth Bowl, a three-time Conference USA Scholar Athlete and a Freshman All-America selection.

He still holds UC's career records for passing yards (11,453), attempts (1,556), completions (880) and TD passes (78), along with the single-season marks for passing yards (3,543), attempts (472) and completions (258). He is the only signal caller in school history to throw for 3,500 or more yards in a season and had 14 career 300-yard passing games.

He was tabbed for the Nippert Stadium Ring of Honor in 2005 and inducted into the James P. Kelly Sr. UC Athletics Hall of Fame in October 2013.

Guidugli earned his bachelor's degree in business marketing from Cincinnati in 2005 and his master's degree in sport administration from Central Michigan in 2012.

The Fort Thomas, Kentucky, native was a standout basketball and football player at powerhouse Highlands HS and was part of three state championship football teams. He still ranks in the KHSAA record books as one of the top QBs in the state's history.

He and his wife, Michelle, have two sons, Ryland and Ezra. His brother Ben played at Cincinnati from 2007-10 and was a key part of two conference championship teams and later played in the NFL for the St. Louis Rams.

Willie Martinez, a veteran of 30-plus years in the defensive coaching ranks, joined the University of Cincinnati staff in 2017 as the cornerbacks coach.

Martinez, who spent 14 years coaching in the Southeastern Conference, joins the Bearcats after a four-year stint at Tennessee, most recently serving as the Volunteers assistant head coach and secondary coach.

He has coached or played in 19 bowl games, been a part of five conference title winning squads and won a national championship while a defensive back at Miami (Fla.) in 1983.

Over the last 14 seasons, Martinez has mentored 13 all-conference selections, six All-Americans, 16 student-athletes chosen in the NFL Draft and had 14 players he coached on NFL rosters during the 2016 season.

During his time at Tennessee, he coached standout defensive back Cameron Sutton, a shutdown corner for the Vols from 2013-16. Sutton set UT's career mark for passes defended (37), was a 2015 Sporting News First-Team All-America selection at punt returner, a member of the SEC All-Freshman squad in 2013 and played in the 2017 Reese's Senior Bowl. Another of Martinez's charges, safety Evan Berry, was 2015 Consensus All-America selection at kick returner.

Martinez's defensive backs averaged over 13 interceptions per season while at Tennessee and his 2014 squad had 16 picks to rank 15th nationally and third in the SEC. Nigel Warrior (2016) and Todd Kelly Jr. (2014) both earned spots on the SEC All-Freshman Team under Martinez's tutelage.

In his first season at UT, helped the defense to force five W. Kentucky turnovers in a span of six plays over five consecutive series, including an NCAA-record four turnovers on consecutive defensive plays, highlighted by back-to-back pick-6s by Justin Coleman and Sutton.

He coached at Auburn in 2012, serving as secondary coach after spending the 2010-11 seasons as the defensive backs coach at Oklahoma, helping Sooners to a 23-5 record and the Big 12 Championship in 2010.

The Sooners, led by Consensus All-America safety Quinton Carter, led the Big 12 in scoring defense (22.1) and finished eighth in the NCAA in pass efficiency defense in 2010. DB Tony Jefferson was the conference's 2010

Co-Defensive Freshman of the Year and an honorable mention all-league selection.

Prior to Oklahoma, Martinez worked as Georgia's secondary coach from 2001-09 while earning a promotion to defensive coordinator in 2005. He helped the Bulldogs to 90 wins, two SEC titles, three division crowns, seven bowl victories and six top 10 finishes, including No. 2 in 2007 and No. 3 in 2002

As Georgia's defensive coordinator from 2005-09, he guided the defense to several national top statistical rankings including eighth in scoring defense in 2005, fifth in passing defense, eighth in total defense in 2006 and eighth in sacks in 2007

Martinez joined the Bulldogs after spending 1998-2000 at Central Michigan. He served as assistant head coach and secondary coach at Central Michigan in 2000 as the Chippewas led the NCAA in passing defense (149.7 yards per game) and was the secondary coach from 1998-99.

He was the secondary coach at Eastern Michigan in 1997, defensive coordinator and secondary coach at UCF in 1995-96, secondary coach Central Michigan in 1994 when the Chippewas won the Mid-American Conference Championship, and defensive coordinator and secondary coach at Grand Valley State in 1992-93

Martinez coached in the Florida high school ranks in 1991 at Olympic Heights H.S. and in 1990 at Boca Raton H.S. In 1988 served as the quarterbacks and receivers coach at Bethune-Cookman, helping the Wildcats to a Mid-Eastern Athletic Conference Championship. He began his coaching career as a graduate assistant at his alma mater, Miami (Fla.) from 1985-86.

A native of Hollywood Hills, Fla., Martinez played defensive back for four seasons at Miami, where he won the 1983 National Championship and earned a bachelor's degree in 1985. He was an all-state selection and area defensive player of the year as a standout quarterback and defensive back at Hollywood Hills HS from 1977-81.

Martinez and his wife Kim have three children, Christina, Ashley and William.

Joe "Joker" Phillips, a nearly 30-year veteran of the collegiate and NFL ranks, joined the University of Cincinnati football staff in 2017 as wide receivers coach.

Phillips has extensive experience coaching receivers, with stops at Kentucky, Cincinnati, Minnesota, Notre Dame, South Carolina, Florida and in the NFL.

He spent the 2016 season as an offensive quality control coach at Ohio State. This is Phillips' second stint on UC's campus after spending the 1997 season coaching the Bearcats wide receivers and 1998 mentoring the defensive backs.

Phillips spent the 2015 season as the wide receivers coach for the Cleveland Browns and has developed 11 wide receivers into NFL draft picks, including Troy Williamson (first round), Randall Cobb (second round), Steve Johnson (seventh round) and David Givens (seventh round).

He served as the wide receivers coach and recruiting coordinator at Florida in 2013 following three seasons (2010-12) as the head coach at Kentucky. He was 13-24 leading his alma mater and was Kentucky's first African-American head football coach and only the second in the history of the Southeastern Conference when he was hired in 2010. He became the first coach in Kentucky history to lead the team to a bowl game in his first season (BBVA Compass Bowl), and he won more games than any first-year UK coach since Blanton Collier in 1954.

A Kentucky grad, Phillips spent 19 years coaching at the school between two stints (1989-98 and 2003-12). He began his coaching career as a graduate assistant at UK in 1988 and spent 13 seasons coaching the school's wide receivers, including adding offensive coordinator and head coach of the offense responsibilities. As offensive coordinator in 2007, he guided Kentucky's offense to a school record 475 points. That season he also helped the Wildcats defeat No. 1 LSU, 43-37.

Phillips has also had stints at Cincinnati (1997-98), Minnesota (1999-2000), Notre Dame (2001) and South Carolina (2002).

In 1997, Phillips coached standout wide receiver Chad Plummer, who helped lead Cincinnati to its first bowl win since 1951 in the 1997 Humanitarian Bowl. Plummer was later selected by the Denver Broncos in the sixth round of the 1999 NFL Draft.

At Minnesota, he guided All-Big Ten wide receiver Ron Johnson, who went on to play for the NFL's Baltimore Ravens. In his year at Notre Dame, Phillips placed two wideouts in the NFL, Javin Hunter and David Givens.

Phillips returned to UK from South Carolina, where he coached the wide receivers under head coach Lou Holtz in 2002. Gamecocks newcomer Troy Williamson earned SEC All-Freshman honors that year and went on to become the No. 7 pick in the first round of the 2005 NFL Draft.

In addition to his coaching, Phillips also is known as a highly effective recruiter. He has been identified as one of the nation's top recruiters by SI.com and Rivals.com.

As a wide receiver at Kentucky, Phillips finished his career fifth on the school receiving list with 75 receptions for 935 yards and nine touchdowns. He played two seasons in the NFL with Washington (1985 and 1987) and spent one year (1986) with the Toronto Argonauts of the Canadian Football League. He earned his bachelor's degree in advertising from UK in 1986.

Phillips participated in football, basketball and track at Franklin-Simpson High School. He was an all-state selection in football, playing quarterback and cornerback, and was an all-region selection in basketball.

Born Joe Phillips Jr., the native of Franklin, Kentucky, was nicknamed Joker as a baby by his grandfather to help distinguish Joker from his father, Joe Sr.

Veteran coach Jon Tenuta joined the University of Cincinnati staff in January 2017 and coaches the safeties.

With 35 seasons of collegiate coaching, Tenuta has a wealth of FBS coaching experience, including being the defensive coordinator at various BCS stops: Kansas State, Ohio State, North Carolina, Georgia Tech, Notre Dame and Virginia. Tenuta also served Marshall and SMU as defensive coordinator as well during the 1980s and has been a defensive coordinator in 19 of his 35 seasons as a collegiate coach.

He wrapped up his third season as the associate head coach for the defense and the defensive coordinator at Virginia in 2015.

His 2015 defense was led by first-team All-ACC honorees Quin Blanding and Micah Kiser. It's the first time UVA has had two sophomores earn first-team All-ACC honors since Terry Kirby and Chris Slade in 1990. The duo finished the regular season No. 1 and No. 2 in the ACC in tackles, the only set of teammates across the 10 FBS conferences to accomplish the feat. Through the regular season Kiser led the ACC with 117 tackles, while Blanding finished No. 2 for the second year in a row with 115 tackles. Defensive tackle David Dean earned All-ACC honorable mention in 2015 after concluding his career No. 4 all-time among UVA's defensive tackles with 25.5 tackles for loss.

In 2014 Tenuta's defense featured seven starters that earned All-ACC honors. Highlighting the defensive was one of the ACC's best safeties units. Blanding, a Freshman All-American, was No. 2 in the ACC with 123 tackles and Anthony Harris was No. 6 with 108 stops. No other safety duo in the league combined for more tackles. Blanding led the nation's freshmen in tackles and was named the ACC Defensive Rookie of the Year for his exploits. Blanding and Harris earned All-ACC honors along with Maurice Canady, Henry Coley, David Dean, Eli Harold and Max Valles.

During Tenuta's first season on Grounds he oversaw a defense that featured Harris, a first-team All-American, who led the nation with eight interceptions. The All-ACC first-team honoree was third on the team with 80 tackles in 2013. Under Tenuta's tutelage defensive lineman Brent Urban led the nation in pass breaks for a defensive lineman, despite missing four games with an injury.

Prior to UVA Tenuta came from NC State, where his defense included David Amerson, who led the nation in 2011 with 13 INTs.

Tenuta has coached in 17 bowl games during his career and served as the interim head coach for Georgia Tech at the 2007 Humanitarian Bowl. After he arrived at Notre Dame, he helped the Irish defense improve in all defensive categories and coached 2012 Heisman Trophy runner-up Manti-Teo to a freshman All-American season.

While at Georgia Tech, 18 Yellow Jacket defenders earned first- or second-team All-Atlantic Coast Conference recognition and 18 players from his first four units were either drafted or signed to NFL free-agent contracts. In the six years Tenuta was in Atlanta, his defenses were ranked nationally in total, scoring and rushing defense, including 20th or better against the run the last five years.

In 2001, Tenuta guided the ACC's top-rated defense at North Carolina during his only season in Chapel Hill.

Tenuta spent five seasons at Ohio State and he helped develop several All-Americans and first-round NFL draft picks. Ohio State's pass defense was consistently ranked among the nation's best during that span. He was on the defensive staff during UC Head Coach Luke Fickell's senior year, mentoring the defensive backs.

In 1989, he was an assistant coach at SMU, where he helped Forrest Gregg rebuild the program. Tenuta also has had stops at Maryland [graduate assistant], Vanderbilt (DBs) and Oklahoma (DBs).

Tenuta has coached more than 30 players who went on to play professional football.

A three-year letterwinner as a defensive back at Virginia (1978, '79, '80), he won the team's John Acree Memorial Football Trophy and Kevin Bowie Award. Tenuta graduated with a degree in physical education and health in 1982.

He met his wife, Dori, while at UVA. They have three sons: Zach, Matt and Luke. Son Matt is a left-handed pitcher in the Kansas City Royals' organization and spent the 2016 season with the Wilmington Blue Rocks of the Class-A Advanced Carolina League.

Al Washington came to the University of Cincinnati in January 2017 as the defensive line coach.

The 10-year coaching vet spent the past five seasons at his alma mater, Boston College, where he coached defensive line, running backs and special teams. Washington was the special teams coordinator and defensive line coach in 2016 after mentoring the running backs from 2013-15 and serving as the assistant defensive line and special teams coach in 2012.

Boston College ranked as one of the nation's top defenses, finishing the regular season ranked ninth in the nation and second in the ACC in total defense allowing just 314.2 yards per game. BC allowed just 108.5 rushing yards per game in the regular season, seventh-best nationally and first in the conference. BC is also among the top-20 defenses nationally in sacks (second, 3.62 per game) and tackles-for-loss (sixth, 8.2 per game).

Washington coached defensive end Harold Landry, an All-American who led the nation with 16.5 sacks in 2016. He also led the country with seven forced fumbles as well en route to Walter Camp and Associated Press All-America honors.

Landry finished 2016 with one of the best seasons of any defensive player in the FBS. An AP All-ACC first-team selection, Landry was also selected as the Division I Gold Helmet of the Year Award recipient, given annually to the top player in New England by the New England Football Writers' Association and the recipient of the 78th annual George "Bulger" Lowe Award, "New England's Heisman Trophy" and one of America's oldest college football accolades. Landry, who collected All-ACC second-team honors by the media and coaches, was one of six finalists for the Ted Hendricks Award, given annually to the nation's top defensive end.

The Eagles' special teams unit ranked 12th in the nation and third in the ACC in punt returns (12.35 ypr), third in the ACC in kickoff return defense (18.44 ypr) and sixth in the league in kickoff returns (22.77 ypr). Return man Tyler Rouse, in his first year returning punts, finished seventh in the FBS rankings and third in the ACC, averaging 13.04 yards per run back.

Washington helped develop 2013 Heisman Trophy finalist and the Atlantic Coast Conference's first Doak Walker Award recipient in running back Andre Williams, who became the 16th player in Football Bowl Subdivision history to rush for 2,000 yards in the regular season and who established four of the top five single-game rushing records in school history in 2013.

He coached a running backs corps that contributed to an Eagle rushing attack that averaged 212.5 yards per game in 2013, a mark good for second in the ACC and

20th among all teams in college football; the average was a 121.5-yard spike from the previous season's average, marking the largest one-year improvement in ACC history.

The running backs to improve the rushing average to 254.7 yards per game, second in the conference and 14th in the nation; the yardage total of 3,311 broke BC's single-season record total.

Washington mentored freshman running back Jon Hilliman, who led the Eagles with 13 rushing touchdowns, set the BC freshman record with 210 carries, finished second on the team with 860 yards and earned All-ACC Third-Team honors and ECAC Co-Rookie of the Year accolades.

He was instrumental to a program that achieved back-to-back seven-win seasons in 2013 and 2014 and advanced to the 2013 AdvoCare v100 Independence Bowl and the 2014 New Era Pinstripe Bowl on the heels of a 2-10 campaign in 2012; the five-win improvement from 2012 to 2013 tied for fourth-best in the FBS.

Washington returned to Boston College after serving as linebackers coach at Elon University for one season (2011) under the direction of head coach Jason Swepson. Swepson is a 1992 BC graduate who served as running backs coach at his alma mater for eight seasons (1999-2006).

At Elon he worked with a talented group of linebackers that included 2011 All-American and All-SoCon selection Joshua Jones as well as SoCon All-Freshman Team member Jonathan Spain. Linebacker Jonathan Spain also collected freshman All-America accolades.

Prior to his time at Elon, Washington spent the previous two seasons as the defensive line coach at Slippery Rock University which won 12 games in that span, including a pair of wins against top-25 foes. Coached all-PSAC conference defensive ends Pat Marsilio and Jeff Thomspon.

Before heading to Elon, he served as NC State's defensive graduate assistant in 2008.

He broke into coaching at Division III's Rensselaer Polytechnic Institution (RPI) in 2007. Washington helped lead RPI to an 8-2 record, a Liberty League championship and a berth in the NCAA Division III playoffs; was a member of the 2007 Liberty League Coaching Staff of the Year.

Washington was a three-year starter at defensive tackle and four-year letterman at Boston College from 2002-05. He earned BC's Paul Cavanaugh Award in 2006, given annually to the player whose on and off the field accomplishments speak volumes about his commitment to the Eagles.

Washington, a native of Columbus, Ohio, and his wife Melissa live in Cincinnati.

Mason came to UC after two years at Ohio State as a graduate assistant coach at Ohio State. He worked with current UC Head Coach Luke Fickell and the Buckeyes' linebackers.

Mason previously spent six seasons in the collegiate ranks with positions at Bluffton (2009-11), Kent State (2012) and the 2013 and 2014 seasons as a graduate assistant coach on Darrell Hazell's staff at Purdue University. He also worked with Hazel at Kent State.

A native of Zionsville, Ind., Mason is a 2009 graduate of Denison University with degrees in economics and history. He spent two seasons as a running back with the football program before an injury forced him from the game, but into coaching as he spent his final two seasons in Granville as a student coach.

Brady Collins was named the director of football sports performance at the University of Cincinnati in January 2017.

He joins the Bearcats staff after spending the past two seasons at Ohio State as a strength and conditioning coach with the football program. It was his second stint with the Buckeyes, as he served as a strength and conditioning intern for five Olympic sports and football in 2009.

A 2009 graduate of Otterbein College, he played four seasons of football and was team captain as a senior, helping lead the Cardinals to the 2009 Division III playoffs. Collins went south after graduation and his Ohio State position to further his career.

In August 2009 Collins was a volunteer strength coach at the University of Kentucky and later spent part of that summer interning for the Cincinnati Bengals. He became a graduate assistant coach at Kentucky in 2010 and a year later was named an assistant strength coach, working with the football program and also the NCAA champion Wildcats' basketball team.

In January 2013 he moved further into SEC country, accepting an assistant strength and conditioning position at Mississippi State University, where he stayed for two-and-a-half years before he was hired back at Ohio State in January 2015 by Mickey Marotti.

Collins grew up in Galena, Ohio, and is a graduate of Olentangy HS. He has degrees in health promotion and sports sciences from Otterbein and he has a master's in kinesiology from Kentucky.

He is Strength and Conditioning Coach Certified (SCCC), is a Certified Strength and Conditioning Specialist (CSCS) through the National Strength and Conditioning Association, and a Certified Sport Performance Coach with United States of America Weightlifting (USAW).

Robert Stiner joined the strength and conditioning staff at the University of Cincinnati in 2017 as an assistant director of football sports performance.

Stiner joined the Bearcats after spending the 2016 season at Florida International University. Prior to his stint with the Panthers, Stiner was the director of strength and conditioning at the University of Central Arkansas from 2014-16.

While at UCA, Stiner oversaw and directed the strength and conditioning program, working with the football, baseball, men's and women's basketball, men's soccer and track and field squads. He also established and implemented nutrition protocols for student-athletes and designed training programs for the Conway SWAT Team and UCA Police Department and Central Arkansas Police Academy.

He came to UCA from Mississippi State where he was assistant strength and conditioning coach from 2012-14. Stiner had previous stops as an intern at LSU (2011-12), strength and conditioning graduate assistant at Valdosta State (2009-11) along with internships at Baylor (2010) and the U.S. Olympic Training Center in Colorado Springs, Colorado (2009).

Stiner started his coaching career as a volunteer strength and conditioning assistant at Valdosta State and Belhaven in 2008.

Assistant Strength Coach

Parker Showers joined the University of Cincinnati in August of 2015 as an Assistant Strength and Conditioning Coach.

Showers is directly involved as an assistant strength and conditioning coach for football. In addition to football duties, Showers directs and coordinates strength, speed, agility, and conditioning for women's tennis and cheer.

Showers started his career as an Assistant Strength & Conditioning coach at Villanova University in August of 2013 working with men's lacrosse while also assisting with football. In addition he was directly in charge of programming and training for track sprinters, swimming & diving, softball, water polo, cheer, and tennis.

In May 2014 Showers began working as a Graduate Assistant Strength and Conditioning Coach with University of Akron football team. In this position he assisted in all facets of strength, speed, agility, injury prevention and conditioning during the annual in-season and off-season training regimes.

Showers is a Certified Strength and Conditioning Coach through the NSCA and he is a certified Sports Performance Coach through United States Weightlifting. He earned a Master's of Science in Exercise Physiology from the University of Akron in 2015 and Bachelor's in Business Administration from Lycoming College in 2013.

ATHLETICS ADMINISTRATION



MIKE BOHN

Director of Athletics

Mike Bohn was named the director of athletics at the University of Cincinnati on Feb. 6, 2014

Bohn's career spans thirty-plus years and includes record-setting achievements at multiple institutions.

His time in the Queen City has been impactful on and off the field. Bohn oversaw the opening of the \$86-million Nippert Stadium Renovation & Expansion project, is spearheading an \$87-million fundraising campaign to renovate Fifth Third Arena and has positioned UC as one of the top schools in the American Athletic Conference under his 'Class of the League' initiative.

Bohn has also implemented facility improvements at Gettler Stadium, Marge Schott Stadium and the Trabert-Talbert Tennis Center.

Academically, student-athletes have achieved record-setting GPA's, achieving a 3.0 mark in 2014, 3.1 in 2014 and 3.2 in 2016. Bearcats student-athletes have hit the 3.0 GPA mark or better as a whole in 17 consecutive grading periods. UC's APR sits a four-year average of 983 with a most recent scored of 987 from 2014-15.

Four athletics programs, men's track & field, women's cross country, tennis and volleyball, received Public Recognition Awards from the NCAA based upon their academic excellence from the most recent multiyear Academic Progress Rate [2015-16]. Each of the four teams carry APR scores that rank among the Top 10 percent of their respective sports.

The veteran athletics administrator has been active in the community and is one of the most sought-after speakers in Cincinnati, often sharing his message of team building and collaboration with everyone from Fortune 500 companies to numerous student organizations on campus.

He is active with the Cincinnati YMCA, helping to establish a partnership between the department of athletics and organization to provide basketball and soccer equipment to young athletes. He served as the 2016 chair of the Salvation's Army's local campaign and also works with the local chapter of the USO on initiatives.

In 2015, Bohn was honored as an active member of Pi Kappa Alpha's Alpha Xi Chapter for his efforts in bringing college athletics and greek life closer together. The chapter has since established the Mike Bohn Leadership Award, presented annually to an active member for excellence in leadership.

Bohn hired football head coach Luke Fickell in December 2016 and also tabbed Mandy Commons-DiSalle (swimming and diving), Maureen Housom (dance), Susan Seaton (track and field) and Eric Toth (tennis) to run their respective programs during his tenure.

UC received a certificate of excellence from the Tucker Center for Research on Girls & Women in Sport at the University of Minnesota and is the only institution to receive an "A" grade from the Women in College Coaching Report Card in each year from 2014-17.

He has helped establish a long-term partnership with Under Armour to serve as UC's official apparel provider, was instrumental in bringing USL soccer club FC Cincinnati to its current home in Nippert Stadium, negotiated off-site playing agreements for the men's basketball team at Northern Kentucky's BB&T Arena and the women's basketball and volleyball squads at St. Ursula Academy's Gymnasium and Convocation Center during the 2017-18 season and has expanded a beneficial relationship with longtime UC partner Pepsi, who owns pouring rights in UC's athletics venues.

As director of athletics at the University of Colorado from 2005 to 2013, Bohn successfully led their transition to the Pac-12 Conference. CU won four conference championship titles within two years, including the first for men's basketball in over 43 years. Meanwhile, Bohn enhanced academic support for scholar-athletes, resulting in



departmental highs for APR and GPA.

He oversaw several multi-million dollar capital projects and facility upgrades, as well as secured the largest corporate sponsorship in school history. In 2008, CU garnered national attention for launching the first zero-waste stadium initiative at the college or professional level. In 2013, CU was named the most economically efficient athletics department in the nation by the Laboratory for the Study of Intercollegiate Athletics at Texas A&M.

Prior to the University of Colorado, Bohn served as director of athletics at San Diego State University. Under his watch, SDSU football increased season ticket sales by 27% and game-day attendance by 59%, in addition to setting a SDSU single-game attendance record of 57,000 against Idaho State. The SDSU baseball team set a NCAA single-game attendance record of 40,000.

As director of athletics at the University of Idaho from 1999 to 2003, Bohn successfully led their transition to the Division I-A ranks from the Big Sky Conference. Under Bohn, UI began construction on the Vandal Athletics Center, the first athletic facilities improvement in two decades. Additionally, he spearheaded a 20% increase in the Vandal Scholarship Fund and a \$350,000 surge in annual corporate support.

Bohn spent three years at Colorado State University as associate director of athletics. At CSU, he was responsible for all external revenue-producing operations, including: ticket sales; fundraising through the Greater Ram Club; licensing; corporate sales; signage; capital campaigns; broadcasting rights fees; and special events.

Prior to CSU, Bohn served as Director of Marketing for the College Football Association. The CFA, the precursor to the current Bowl Championship Series, consisted of six major football conferences encompassing 67 universities. Bohn assisted with the CFA's administration of a \$67 million television package involving ABC, ESPN and ESPN2.

He began his athletic administrative career at the Air Force Academy, where he played a major role in increasing football season ticket sales from 6,000 to 20,000 and in implementing a fundraising campaign that generated \$16 million for stadium improvements.

Bohn received a bachelor's degree from the University of Kansas, where he was recruited as a quarterback and also played baseball, and a master's degree in sports administration from Ohio University.

He is married to the former Kim Zeren, and they have a son, Brandon, and a daughter, Michaelyn Tynan, along with a son-in-law, John Tynan and grandsons, Chase and Luke Tynan.





DR. NEVILLE G. PINTO

President

Neville Pinto was appointed by the University of Cincinnati Board of Trustees to serve as the university's 30th President. He took office on Feb. 20, 2017.

Recently, President Pinto served as acting president and professor of chemical engineering at the University of Louisville. He has spent his entire career as a university teacher, researcher and administrator. Prior to joining the University of Louisville, Pinto served for 26 years on the faculty in chemical engineering at the University of Cincinnati, where he established the Adsorption and Ion Exchange Laboratory, which focused on research in biochemical and environmental engineering. His research included purification of genetically engineered drugs, the study of bio-membranes, and air and water purification. His laboratory attracted over \$6 million in external research funding and trained 32 graduate students including 16 PhD students, many of whom have moved on to become leaders in industry and academia.

Earlier in his career at the University of Cincinnati, Pinto held a number of administrative posts, including Department Head for Chemical Engineering, Assistant Dean for Graduate Studies in the College of Engineering, and, most recently, Vice Provost and Dean of The Graduate School. As Dean, he had a leadership role in attracting major external awards totaling over \$10 million to the University of Cincinnati to support graduate and STEM education.

Pinto joined the University of Louisville as Dean of the J.B. Speed School of Engineering in 2011. While dean, his accomplishments included overseeing a major expansion in the enrollment of the college and spearheading the development of the Belknap Engineering and Applied Sciences Research Park. He significantly strengthened the university's relationship with GE, to develop a partnership that has led to significant educational and career opportunities for students and encouraged the company to bring its FirstBuild microfactory to campus. This effort earned the Silver Fleur-de-Lis award from Greater Louisville Inc. in 2015.

Between May 2015 and July 2016, Pinto served as Interim Executive Vice President and University Provost at UoL. During this period, he finalized the 21st Century University Plan and launched major initiatives to strengthen educational excellence, student success and access, research and community engagement. He was appointed Acting President in 2016.

Pinto was elected Fellow of the Graduate School of the University of Cincinnati based on outstanding scholarly attainment and was elected to the National Academy of Inventors in recognition of U.S. patents awarded. He has variously been active in the American Institute of Chemical Engineers, American Society for Engineering Education, American Chemical Society and is a member of the Tau Beta Pi Engineering Honor Society. He is also the recipient of numerous outstanding teaching and service awards.

Pinto was born in Mumbai, India. He was educated at the Indian Institute of Technology, New Delhi, where he earned his bachelor's degree in chemical engineering. He earned his MS and his PhD in chemical engineering at Penn State University.

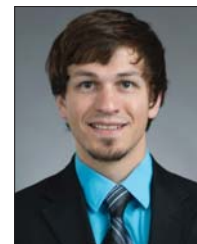

// FOOTBALL CLOSES DISAPPOINTING 2016 CAMPAIGN

- » Not a lot went right for the University of Cincinnati football team in 2016. The Bearcats started the season 3-1 with a road win at Big Ten Conference program Purdue and picked up their 11th-straight win over longtime rival Miami (Ohio). The rest of the way saw UC's offense sputter, a litany of injuries to key starters and reserves and only one win in the final eight games of the season. Tommy Tuberville stepped down as head coach on Dec. 4 and Luke Fickell was named his replacement on Dec. 10.

// STREAKS, STORYLINES, SIDEBARS - WRAPUP EDITION

- » UC's defense forced 24 turnovers (17 INT, 7 FR) and 19 sacks after forcing 14 turnovers (9 INT, 5 FR) with 13 sacks in 2015 season.
- » UC finished the season with a 4-8 mark, lost its last five games and seven of its last eight, missing a bowl game for the first time since 2010.
- » Seven of the team's eight losses came in AAC play.
- » Tommy Tuberville stepped down after four years at the helm of the Bearcats program on Dec. 4. He had 29 wins, a 2014 American Athletic Conference title and three bowl appearances.
- » Ohio native Luke Fickell, the former defensive coordinator at Ohio State with 18 years of FBS experience, was tabbed as the 42nd head coach in program history on Dec. 10, 2016.

- » UC's 24 first-half points were its most points in any half this season and UC's 37 points was its second-best output of the year, behind the 38 points scored at Purdue.

- » UC set a season high with 534 yards of total offense, surpassing the 513 set against East Carolina.

// A GLIMPSE OF THE FUTURE

- » Of UC's 21 receptions in Tulsa, 14 were caught by players who return to the team in 2017.

// ONE-MAN SHOW

- » WR Thomas Geddis caught a 38-yard TD reception to put UC on the board with 8:31 in the first quarter.
- » It was his first career TD reception and a career-long catch. The true freshman entered the game with one reception for 14 yards.
- » Geddis had two catches for a career best 86 yards and TD in the first half and finished with his first career 100-yard game, hauling in three balls for 104 yards and TD.

// DUSTING OFF A CLASSIC

- » TE Tyler Cogswell, a former HS QB, completed a 29-yard throwback pass to QB Hayden Moore in the first quarter.
- » It was the first career pass and passing TD for Cogswell and the first career reception and receiving TD for Moore.
- » The last time a non-QB threw a TD was RB Tion Green completing a 1-yard TD pass to DJ Dowdy at BYU in 2015.

// COMING ON STRONG

- » DT Marquise Copeland had eight tackles in the season finale at Tulsa and tallied 39 of his 59 tackles in the final six games.

// WELCOME TO THE SHOW

- » QB Hayden Moore threw an 82-yard TD strike to WR Devin Gray with 9:56 left in the second quarter at Tulsa.
- » It was the UC's longest play from scrimmage in 2016, a career-long pass for Moore and a career-long reception for Gray.
- » It was UC's longest scoring play and play from scrimmage since an 88-yard TD pass from QB Gunner Kiel to WR Mekale McKay vs. Temple in 2015.
- » Moore finished the game 20-of-37 for a season-high 371 yards and three TDs.

- » Gray tallied three catches for 110 yards and a TD in the first half, his third career 100-yard game and only one off his single-game career best of 111 yards in the 2016 opener vs. UT Martin.
- » He finished with five catches for 143 yards and a TD.

// NOT TO BE OUTDONE ...

- » WR Jerron Rollins caught a 70-yard TD pass from QB Hayden Moore in the third quarter at Tulsa, his first career TD.
- » Rollins had caught four balls this season for 15 yards entering the game. He had three catches for 84 yards.

// YOU GIVETH, WE TAKETH

- » UC had three takeaways in the season finale at Tulsa, a fumble recovery and two interceptions.
- » UC finished 2016 with 24 takeaways (17 INT/7 FR) and 21 sacks after forcing only 14 takeaways (9 INT/5 FR) and 13 sacks during the 2015 season.
- » UC forced at least one turnover in 10 of 12 games and finished 57th in the FBS turnover margin rankings, a 67-place jump over 2015 when the Bearcats were one of the worst teams in the FBS (124).
- » UC tied for 20th in the FBS in turnovers gained.

// SENIOR SEND-OFF

- » UC honored its 17-member senior class prior to the Friday night game against Memphis.
- » The class includes: DT Hakeem Allonce, C Deyshawn Bond, LB Franklin Brusciannelli, RB Deionte Buckley, DT Chris Burton, WR Nate Cole, TE DJ Dowdy, S Zach Edwards S, RB Tion Green, QB Gunner Kiel, LB Antonio Kinard, OG Ryan Leahy, DT Alex Pace, OG Idarius Ray, DT Sione Tongamoa, S Mike Tyson and LB Eric Wilson.

// GETTING EXPLOSIVE

- » One of the biggest differences from 2015's record-setting offense to the 2016 team is explosive plays.
- » UC had 115 plays of 20 or more yards in 2015, with 18 going for TDs. In 2016, UC had 62 explosive plays and eight Touchdowns.

// FINALLY A DRIZZLE!

- » UC went 205:08 of game time between touchdowns, spanning 14 quarters from the second half of the Temple game to the fourth quarter against Memphis.
- » A 10-yard pass from Hayden Moore to Devin Gray snapped the drought with 13:13 against the Tigers.

// REMEMBERING A LEGENDARY VOICE

- » The Bearcats' opening drive of the BYU game was played without public announcements. This was done to honor long-time public address announcer Paul Bailey, the 10-year voice of the Bearcats who passed away unexpectedly the previous week. UC drove 59 yards on seven plays with Josh Pasley kicking a 23-yard field goal.

// THE GOOD & THE BAD

- » Comparing numbers from UC's final 2015 and 2016 NCAA ranks, you see stark improvements and fall offs.
- » The biggest gains were marked by the 85-place improvement in turnovers gained and 67-place jump in turnover margin where a year ago, UC was one of the worst teams in the FBS.
- » The offense was not as explosive and scored less than the record-setting group from 2015, but UC has improved its red zone offense.
- » The defense was down statistically in some areas, but has improved its numbers in nearly every category.
- » On special teams, UC improved its kick return game and kickoff coverage.

// WHAT'S THE OPPOSITE OF PLENTIFUL?

- » UC totaled 13 points in three games spanning BYU-UCF-Memphis and was held under 10 points four times in 2016. The last time UC failed to hit double digits in four games during a season was 1994.
- » It's the fewest points (13) for UC in consecutive games since the Bearcats tallied 16 points in the final five games of the 1989 season. From Oct. 21 to Nov. 18, UC lost 69-3 at West Virginia, 31-0 at Akron, 31-0 at Kentucky, 13-10 vs. Morehead State and 56-3 against Northern Illinois.

// BREAKING OUT

- » WR Kahlil Lewis set career highs against East Carolina with 11 catches for 150 yards and three TDs.
- » He is UC's first receiver with three receiving TDs in a game since Chris Moore had three at Ohio State on Sept. 27, 2014.
- » Lewis was the first UC WR to tally 150 or more yards in a game since Moore and Max Morrison had 153- and 162-yards receiving, respectively, at Memphis in 2015.

THE 1924 BEARCATS

The University of Cincinnati football team, under the direction of Luke Fickell, will play its 130th season of football in 2017.

The Bearcats program dates to 1885 and ranks as one of the 10 oldest in major college football and holds an all-time mark of 599-578-51. UC has won a conference championship in five of the last nine seasons and played in a bowl game in eight of the last 10 years. The Bearcats have won 94 games over the last 11 years, the most among the current American Athletic Conference. In 2010, UC reached as high as No. 3 in all three major polls (Associated Press, USA Today, Bowl Championship Series).

UC's football program is one of the nation's oldest — only Rutgers (1869), Michigan (1879), Navy (1880), and Minnesota (1883), among NCAA Football Bowl Subdivision institutions, predate Cincinnati, which began the sport in 1885.

UC has been involved in several historic college football milestones starting with Dec. 8, 1888. That day, the Bearcats and Miami (Ohio) University engaged in the first college football game played in the state of Ohio, launching a rivalry that is tied for the oldest in the game among major universities — North Carolina vs. Wake Forest began playing that same year. The Battle for the Victory Bell is the fifth-most played rivalry series in college football.

A few years later in 1897, UC received an invitation to visit New Orleans to play a football game as a reward for a successful season, a precursor to the current postseason football bowl games.

In the 1930s, a UC football player wore a device with his helmet to protect his broken nose. The device was a forerunner of the now standard face mask. The first soccer-style place kick was also attempted by a Bearcat, Hank Hartong, in the early 1960s.

Coaching luminaries have patrolled the sidelines at Cincinnati. College Football Hall of Fame coach Frank Cavanaugh began his 24-season career at UC. Sid Gillman, a member of the College and NFL Halls of Fame, was the architect of one of the top eras of Cincinnati football history. He directed the Bearcats to three conference titles and a pair of bowl game appearances during his six seasons (1949-54) before leaving for the professional ranks. Cincinnati, with Gillman developing the passing offenses which would make him successful in the pro ranks, became known for its aerial attack in the early 1950s. That notoriety continued long after his departure.

In 1968, the Bearcats were the nation's top passing team with quarterback Greg Cook leading the NCAA in total offense, while receiver/kicker Jim O'Brien captured the national scoring title. A year later, Cook earned Rookie of the Year honors as a Cincinnati Bengal, and two years later, O'Brien kicked the game-winning field goal for the Baltimore Colts in Super Bowl V.

With more than 100 players advancing into the professional ranks and nine earning Super Bowl wins, 41 earning all-America honors, and 11 garnering academic all-America recognition, Cincinnati football has clearly made an important impact on college football with its long history of accomplishments.

// BOWL-CATS Cincinnati has been to 13 bowl games over the last 16 seasons and 17 in the program's 127 seasons. UC played in the first Bowl Championship Series game in school history, taking on Virginia Tech in the 75th FedEx Orange Bowl on Jan. 1, 2009.

// ALL-AMERICA TRADITION Forty-one Bearcats have earned All-America recognition. Mike Woods garnered first-team honors in 1977, earning him an appearance on Bob Hope's television special. Punter Kevin Huber became the first two-time First-Team Associated Press all-American in UC history when he earned the honor in 2007 and 2008.

// "THE TOE" Jonathan Ruffin received the Lou Groza Award as the nation's top kicker in 2000 after booting a record 26 field goals. He was presented the award by ESPN's Chris Fowler. Ruffin was also a consensus all-American that year.

// TROPHY GAMES The Bearcats are involved in three trophy games. Cincinnati's annual clash with the Miami RedHawks is tied for the third-most-played series in college football history and the second-longest active rivalry in the FBS. The winner of the yearly fall battle claims the Victory Bell. The winner of the UC-Louisville contest takes home the Keg of Nails, while the winner of the UC-Pittsburgh game stakes claim to the River City Rivalry Trophy. UC currently holds two of the three trophies.

// UPSET CATS UC football has been dangerous to top teams over the years, knocking off the likes of No. 8 Wisconsin, 17-12, at home in 1999, going to defending national champion Penn State in 1983 and upending the Nittany Lions, 14-3, and dominating Virginia Tech, 16-0, in 1995 while allowing just 41 yards of offense. However, possibly the biggest upset in UC history came in 2006 as the Bearcats beat its highest-ranked opponent in Nippert Stadium history, blowing away then-No. 7 Rutgers, 30-11.

// CHAMPIONSHIP FOOTBALL With an 86-43 record since the 2007 season, the Bearcats have become relevant on the national stage once again. In 2008, UC claimed the BIG EAST Conference title, the school's first outright conference crown since 1946. The Bearcats climbed as high as No. 12 in the Associated Press, and USA Today Top 25 polls on the way to a school-record 11 wins. In 2009, UC set a school-record with 12 wins, finished No. 3 in the final Bowl Championship Series rankings, won its second-straight BIG EAST crown, and played in the Allstate Sugar Bowl. The Sugar Bowl appearance closed out the school's first-ever string of four straight bowl appearances. In 2011, UC won its third BIG EAST crown in four years and finished ranked in both the final Associated Press and USA Today Coaches polls. In 2012, UC became the only FBS AQ school in the country to win its fourth conference title over the past five years. The Bearcats played in the Belk Bowl in 2012 and 2013 and the Military Bowl in 2014, marking bowl appearances in eight of the past nine seasons. With UC's 2015 berth in the Hawai'i Bowl, the Bearcats made a bowl game in five straight years for the first time in school history.

1885 UC fielded its first football team under the organization of Arch Carson, who served as the first coach. The team won a pair of games over a club from neighboring Mt. Auburn.

1888 Cincinnati and Miami faced off in Oxford for the first college football game in the state of Ohio. The game ended in a scoreless tie but launched a rivalry that is tied for the honors of being the oldest among major college schools.

1897 Following a 7-1-1 season--the lone loss was to the fabled Carlisle Indians--Cincinnati was invited to celebrate New Years in New Orleans and play a contest against the host Southern Athletic Club. A day after their victory, the Bearcats accepted a challenge from LSU and also defeated the Tigers.

1898 Frank Cavanaugh, immortalized as the Iron Major, began his head coaching career at Cincinnati. He was elected to the National Football Foundation Hall of Fame at the conclusion of his illustrious career.

1901 Cincinnati played its first home game at the current site of Nippert Stadium, defeating Hanover, 18-0.

1912 Cincinnati scored a school-record 124 points in a shutout win over Transylvania. Ike Stewart and Bob Heuck each tallied six TDs and Alonzo Wells kicked 12 PATs, all UC records.

1914 Cincinnati teams first used the nickname Bearcats.

1915 Construction began on permanent stadium seating and facilities.

1922 George McLauren, another UC mentor to be elected to the College Football Hall of Fame, began his four-season tenure as UC's head coach.

1923 Nippert Stadium was the site of the first night football game in the Midwest as Cincinnati defeated Kentucky Wesleyan, 17-0. In the season-ending game vs. Miami, Jimmy Nippert sustained a spike wound and died a month later of blood poisoning. His grandfather, James Gamble, donated the money needed to finish the stadium construction.

1924 Nippert Stadium was dedicated.

1933 UC won the first of two straight Buckeye Athletic Association titles.

1934 UC played its first Homecoming game, defeating Marshall, 7-0.

1935 The Bearcats' first NFL players, Bill Feldhaus (Detroit) and Ray Nolting (Chicago), lead UC to a 7-2 record before embarking on their pro careers.

1942 UC hosted No. 2 Georgia at Nippert Stadium. The Bulldogs won, 35-13, and won the Rose Bowl a few months later. The other lone blemish on UC's 8-2 record was to Sugar Bowl victor Tennessee.

1943-44 Football suspended due to World War II.

1946 Cincinnati defeated defending Big 10 Conference champion Indiana in the season opener en route to a 9-2 record. The season was capped by the Bearcats' first bowl appearance. UC defeated Virginia Tech, 18-6, in the Sun Bowl.

1947 UC won its first Mid-American Conference championship. The Bearcats won four crowns in their six-year association with the league.

1949 Sid Gillman took over as head coach and promptly piloted UC to a Mid-American Conference title and a win over Toledo in the Glass Bowl. Tom O'Malley's 1,617 passing yards led the nation.

1950 The Bearcats advanced to the Sun Bowl but are edged by West Texas State, 14-13.

1951 UC posted an all-time best record of 10-1. Gene Rossi and Bob Stratton became the first Bearcats to earn all-America recognition.

1953 Cincinnati led the nation in both total offense (409.5 yards per game) and total defense (184.3), a feat accomplished by only three other teams in college football history.

1954 Sid Gillman left for the Los Angeles Rams after directing UC to an 8-2 ledger. In six seasons under the eventual college and pro hall of fame coach, the Bearcats posted a 50-13-1 record and won three Mid-American Conference titles.

1956 UC led the nation in punt return average at 17.7 yards per return.

1959 Dave Canary became the first of 11 Bearcats to earn academic all-America honors. Canary eschewed pro football possibilities to pursue a successful acting career and became a regular in several TV series. Teammates Jack Lee and Jim Leo were named MVP of the Senior Bowl and College All-Star games, respectively.

1963-64 Cincinnati won back-to-back Missouri Valley Conference titles under Chuck Studley, who went on to become head coach of the Houston Oilers. UC compiled a 14-6 record during those two seasons.

1968 Cincinnati led the nation in passing offense, averaging 335.8 yards per game. Greg Cook led the nation in total offense, amassing 3,210 yards, while receiver/kicker Jim O'Brien was the nation's leading scorer with 142 points.

1970 Bob Bell became the second Bearcat in as many seasons to be a first-round selection in the NFL Draft.

1976 Cincinnati defeated Arizona State and Vanderbilt en route to a 9-2 ledger. Co-Captain Mike Woods earned first-team all-America honors and was a second-round draft pick by the Baltimore Colts.

1983 UC opened the season with a 14-3 upset of defending national champion Penn State at Beaver Stadium.

1985 The Bearcats upset a pair of 1984 bowl teams, Virginia Tech and Boston College.

1986 UC hosted the No. 1 Miami Hurricanes at Nippert Stadium. The Hurricanes validated its ranking with a 45-13 win.

1992 Nippert Stadium reopened to full use following an extensive renovation. The Bearcats hosted No. 8 Penn State in the season opener, and nearly pulled off the upset before falling, 24-20.

1995 Robert Tate led the nation in kickoff return average, averaging 34.3 yards on 15 returns. Tate was named both Offensive and Special Teams MVP in Conference USA.

1996 Cincinnati began competition in Conference USA. The Bearcats posted back-to-back crowds of 30,729 for Kentucky and 30,887 for Miami University, breaking the old stadium attendance record.

1997 Cincinnati ended a draught of 47 seasons without a bowl game appearance when it was selected to play in the inaugural Humanitarian Bowl. The Bearcats defeated Utah State, 35-19, to finish the year at 8-4.

1999 Cincinnati upset No. 8 Wisconsin, 17-12 in Nippert Stadium.

2000 UC won five of its last six games to finish second in Conference USA and earn a bid to play Marshall in the Motor City Bowl. Jonathan Ruffin became a first consensus first-team all-America choice and received the 2000 Lou Groza Award after leading the nation in field goals.

2001 The Bearcats opened the season against No. 25 Purdue in front of a sellout Nippert Stadium crowd. UC won its first four league games en route to a second-place finish in Conference USA and second straight trip to the Motor City Bowl. Quarterback Gino Guidugli is named the C-USA Freshman of the Year after setting school and league freshman records by throwing for 2,573 yards and 16 touchdowns.

2002 Cincinnati set school and Conference USA single-game attendance marks when 66,319 packed Paul Brown Stadium to see UC play eventual national champion Ohio State. UC won its final five league games to claim a share of the C-USA title, its first league championship since 1964. Quarterback Gino Guidugli threw for 3,543 yards, one of five season records set by the sophomore. UC earned a bowl bid for a record third straight year, playing in the New Orleans Bowl.

2004 The Bearcats recovered from a 2-4 start to win five of their last six games, including a convincing 52-24 victory over No. 21 Southern Miss. UC was selected for the Fort Worth Bowl where the Bearcats defeated Marshall, 32-14.

2005 Cincinnati began play in the BIG EAST Conference

2006 The Bearcats posted a 7-5 regular-season mark, playing a schedule that featured five teams ranked in the Top 10 at the time they faced UC. After a couple of near misses against those ranked foes, UC downed No. 7 Rutgers, 30-11, before a national television audience. Cincinnati earned a berth in the inaugural International Bowl in Toronto, Ont. The UC squad earned a 27-24 win over Western Michigan.

2007 The program equaled the school single-season record for wins, posting a 10-3 record and earning a No. 17 ranking in the final Associated Press poll. It marked the first time UC ended the season among the nation's Top 25 programs. Three Bearcats earned all-America honors, including punter Kevin Huber, who was the school's second consensus selection.

2008 The Bearcats had a banner season that included 11 wins, the program's first BIG EAST Conference Championship, a final ranking of No. 17 in both the Associated Press and USA Today Top 25 polls, and a Bowl Championship Series appearance in the 75th FedEx Orange Bowl on Jan. 1, 2009. Five UC players earned all-America honors while punter Kevin Huber became the first two-time First Team Associated Press all-America selection in school history.

2009 Cincinnati ran off a school-record 12-straight wins, achieved a best-ever ranking of No. 3 in the country (AP/USA Today/BCS) and won its second-straight BIG EAST Conference Championship before falling to Florida in the 2010 Allstate Sugar Bowl. Wide receiver Mardy Gilyard re-wrote parts of the UC record book on the way to earning AFCA First-Team All-America honors.

2010 In 2010, the Bearcats led the BIG EAST in scoring offense (27.1 ppg), total offense (417.3 ppg), passing offense (260.7 ypg), first downs (21.9 pg), third-down conversions (45.6 pct.), and touchdown passes (27). Wide receiver Armon Binns and quarterback Zach Collaros were both First-Team All-BIG EAST selections while five other teammates earned All-BIG EAST honors.

2011 UC was the most improved NCAA FBS AQ team in 2011, finishing with a 10-3 mark, a Top-25 final ranking, winning its third BIG EAST Conference title in four years and knocking off SEC foe Vanderbilt in the 2011 AutoZone Liberty Bowl, the program's first bowl win over a BCS opponent. Eight student-athletes earned All-BIG EAST accolades in 2011, including BIG EAST Offensive Player of the Year Isaiah Pead and BIG EAST Co-Defensive Player of the Year Derek Wolfe. Wolfe, a senior defensive tackle, earned spots on five All-America teams and JK Schaffer was named the 2011 American Eagle Outfitters BIG EAST Football Scholar-Athlete of the Year.

2012 UC closed out its sixth 10-win season in 125 years of football. The Bearcats were one of only four NCAA FBS AQ programs to have won 10 games in five of the past six seasons, joining Alabama, Oklahoma and Oregon. UC also won its fourth conference championship in the past five seasons and earned a victory over Duke in a thrilling come-from-behind effort in the 2012 Belk Bowl.

2013 UC had the most prolific offense in school history leading the newly formed American Athletic Conference in total offense (472.1) and rushing offense (168.3) with the offense totaling a school-record 6,137 yards. The Bearcats' defense was one of the best in the country, ranking in the top 10 nationally in both rushing defense (6th, 104.5 ypg) and total defense (9th, 315.6 ypg). Nine student-athletes earned all-conference honors.

2014 UC finished out the campaign with a 9-4 record, an American Athletic Conference Championship and a matchup against Virginia Tech in the 2014 Military Bowl presented by Northrop Grumman, benefiting the USO. Cincinnati rebounded from a 2-3 start and finished the regular season 9-3 on a seven-game winning streak with a share of the conference crown, UC's fifth league title in seven years and 14th all-time. The Bearcats placed seven student-athletes on the all-conference team, including OL Eric Lefeld, UC's first three-time, first-team all-league selection since OL Jason Fabin [1995-97]

2015 The 2015 UC squad finished 7-6, played in the Hawai'i Bowl, had the most prolific offense in school history, set 18 school records and finished No. 6 in the NCAA FBS in total offense, averaging 537.8 yards per game. WR Shaq Washington set UC's school-records for career (240) and single-season (90) receptions while Chris Moore hauled in a UC record 26 touchdown passes during his career.

2016 Not a lot went right for the University of Cincinnati football team in 2016. The Bearcats started the season 3-1 with a road win at Big Ten Conference program Purdue and picked up their 11th-straight win over longtime rival Miami (Ohio). The rest of the way saw UC's offense sputter, a litany of injuries to key starters and reserves and only one win in the final eight games of the season. Tommy Tuberville stepped down as head coach on Dec. 4 and Luke Fickell was named his replacement on Dec. 10.



BOWL HISTORY



Cincinnati's proud football history includes a number of firsts, possibly including the first postseason bowl game.

The NCAA Official Football Records recognizes the Rose Bowl, which was started in 1902, as being the first collegiate bowl game. A manuscript written by former UC athletic director Bill Schwarberg points to a bowl appearance by Cincinnati that pre-dates the Rose Bowl by five years.

Schwarberg, who played for the Bearcats from 1933-36 and served as interim Director of Athletics in 1976, cited a record in the University's McMicken Review. It indicated that following the 1897 season, Cincinnati became the first institution from Ohio to make a trip south to play in a postseason game.

Cincinnati posted a 7-1-1 record that year, which included a 34-0 win over Ohio State. The lone team to beat UC was the powerful Carlisle Indians.

Shortly after Thanksgiving, management of the Cincinnati team received an invitation from the Southern Athletic Club to play a game in New Orleans on New Year's Day. A travel party of 14, which included the substitutes and the coach and manager, departed for New Orleans on Dec. 30 where they were hosted by the Southern Athletic Club. Accounts of the game have UC winning with ease by a score of 16-0.

At a victory party that evening, players from Louisiana State challenged the Bearcats to a game the next day in Baton Rouge. UC accepted the challenge and overwhelmed the LSU team, 28-0. Accounts of the trip describe lavish entertainment provided during the trip.

If this was indeed UC's first bowl game, it was 49 years before the Bearcats again experienced postseason play.

The post-World War II influx of veterans into colleges rejuvenated college athletics, and with that came a surge of new bowls. Cincinnati capped a successful 1946 season with a trip to the Sun Bowl in El Paso, Texas. There, the Bearcats defeated Virginia Tech, 18-6.

UC made appearances in the Glass Bowl in Toledo in 1949 and returned to the Sun Bowl at the end of the 1950 campaign.

Cincinnati then went 47 years without a bowl appearance. That drought was broken when the Bearcats played in the inaugural Humanitarian Bowl in Boise, Idaho in 1997.

With Conference USA developing alliances with five bowls, the Bearcats made three straight bowl appearances in 2000, 2001 and 2002--the first two in the Motor City Bowl in Detroit and the third in the New Orleans Bowl.

In 2004, UC was selected to represent Conference USA in the PlainsCapital Fort Worth Bowl, the Bearcats' fourth bowl appearance in the past five years. UC defeated Marshall, 32-14, in that contest.

After the 2006 season, Cincinnati earned its first BIG EAST Conference bowl appearance after knocking off Connecticut in the season finale. In unusual circumstances following Mark Dantonio and his staff's departure to Michigan State before the bowl game, UC hired Brian Kelly from Central Michigan who came in and in just 34 days prepared UC and defeated Western Michigan University, 27-24, in the inaugural International Bowl in Toronto, Ontario.

Following a 9-3 regular season in 2007, the Bearcats earned victory number 10 in the Papajohns.com Bowl with a 31-21 win against former Conference USA foe Southern Mississippi.

UC made history again in 2008, following a school-record 11 wins in the regular season and the programs' first BIG EAST Championship. The Bearcats earned their first ever trip to a Bowl Championship Series Game, taking on Virginia Tech in the 75th FedEx Orange Bowl.

The Bearcats followed up their 2008 successes by winning their second-straight BIG EAST Championship in 2009 after a perfect 12-0 regular season. Climbing to No. 3 in the final Bowl Championship Series rankings, UC earned a spot in the 2010 Allstate Sugar Bowl against the Florida Gators, coached by UC alum Urban Meyer.

UC has an 8-9 all-time bowl record and has played in the postseason in nine of the last 11 years.

The University of Cincinnati has been well-represented on the lists of professional and college coaching greats, a legacy which continues into 2016 with a proliferation of former Bearcats mentors, assistant coaches and players in the NFL, CFL and major university ranks.

Sid Gillman has long been the standard-bearer for Bearcat coaching greats. Gillman, whose 50-13-1 record in his six seasons in the late 1940s and early 1950s is one of the winningest marks at UC, is one of the few coaches to earn induction into both the college and professional football halls of fame. His UC success vaulted him into the NFL, with the Los Angeles Rams.

Two other members of the College Football Hall of Fame, Frank Cavanaugh and George Little, launched their head coaching careers at UC. Cavanaugh, the legendary "Iron Major" for his accomplishments as a coach and war hero at Army, in 1898, and Little, who earned fame at Michigan and Wisconsin, in 1914-15. Former UC assistants Dick MacPherson and Don Nehlen are also in the College Football Hall of Fame. MacPherson, a UC assistant in the early 1960s, concluded a distinguished career at Syracuse. Nehlen, on the 1963 UC staff, was West Virginia's winningest coach following his 21 seasons there.

One-time Bearcats mentors Homer Rice (1967-68), and Chuck Studley (1961-66) were NFL head coaches at Cincinnati and Houston, respectively, as were former assistants Leeman Bennett (Atlanta) and Jack Faulkner (Denver).

Nick Skorich, a member of the UC Athletic Hall of Fame for his football prowess in the 1940s, was head coach of the Philadelphia Eagles and Cleveland Browns.

Numerous former UC players or assistants went on to head coaching jobs in the college or NFL ranks and a pair of former Bearcats, John Harbaugh (Baltimore Ravens) and Mike Tomlin (Pittsburgh Steelers), are current NFL head coaches. Harbaugh was a UC assistant from 1989-96 and Tomlin was on the UC staff from 1999-2000.

Rex Ryan, a UC assistant from 1996-97, spent seven years as an NFL head coach with the New York Jets and Buffalo Bills.

Harbaugh has assistants on his staff with UC ties. Jerry Rosburg (1992-95) is in Baltimore as the Associate Head Coach/Special Teams and has coached in the NFL for over 10 years. Don Martindale (1997-98), a former UC defensive line coach, joined the Ravens staff in 2012 coaching the inside linebackers and offensive assistant Craig Ver Steeg was on the UC staff from 1990-93 and has coached nearly 30 years at all levels of football. Chris Hewitt was defensive back for UC from 1993-96 and is Harbaugh's secondary coach.

The Tampa Bay staff features a former UC letterwinner in offensive line coach George Warhop (1981-82), former defensive coordinator Mark Duffner and former offensive coordinator Mike Bajakian. Warhop, a center during his time at UC, has coached in the NFL for 17 seasons during stints for the Cleveland Browns, Arizona Cardinals, Dallas Cowboys, and St. Louis Rams. Duffner coached at UC from 1977-80 and was a collegiate head coach at Holy Cross and Maryland. Bajakian was the Bearcats OC from 2010-12 and coaches the Buccaneers QBs.

Arizona has a trio of former Bearcats coaches on its sidelines with special teams coordinator Amos Jones (1999-2002), assistant OL coach Larry Zierlein (1997-2000) and tight ends coach Rick Christophel (1983). Zierlein won Super Bowl XLIII with the Pittsburgh Steelers in 2008. Christophel was the head coach at Austin Peay from 2007-12.

Former UC aide Bill Sheridan (1989-91) is the linebackers coach for the Detroit Lions after serving two seasons as defensive coordinator for the Tampa Bay Buccaneers. Former OC Zac Taylor is the assistant wide receivers coach for the Los Angeles Rams.

Greg Seamon was UC's offensive coordinator from 1995-87, spent 12 years with the Cincinnati Bengals and is now the tight ends coach for the Cleveland Browns.

Kevin Coyle (1978-79) is the Cincinnati Bengals defensive backs coach., Dan Roushar (2005-06) is a 31-year coaching veteran entering his fourth season as offensive line coach of the New Orleans Saints and Mike Solari (1981-82) is the offensive line coach for the New York Giants.

In Canada, former Bearcats player and coach Dave Ritchie directed British Columbia and Winnipeg to Grey Cup titles, the Canadian Football League's Super Bowl, and former UC quarterback Danny Barrett spent six years as the head coach of the Saskatchewan Roughriders (2000-06). Barrett is now the running backs coach for the Miami Dolphins.

Bob Wylie has four decades of coaching football under his belt that includes 18 years at the professional level. He coached at UC in the mid 1990s and spent time as the Oakland Raiders offensive line coach. He currently is the offensive line coach for the Cleveland Browns and formerly worked for the Winnipeg Blue Bombers in the Canadian Football League, Blesto and consulted with EA Sports on the Madden Football video game franchise.

UC's representation in the college coaching ranks is highlighted by a trio of former assistants. Paul Dietzel, an aide to Gillman in 1949-50, directed LSU and its namesake Chinese Bandits defense to the national title in 1958 and later coached at Army and South Carolina.

Four former UC assistants are current head coaches at the collegiate level, including Kim Dameron (Eastern Illinois), Mark Elder (Eastern Kentucky), Jimbo Fisher (Florida State) and Pat Narduzzi (Pittsburgh).

Other UC assistants to garner head coaching positions include Dave Baldwin (San Jose State), Bob Diaco (UConn), Duffner (Holy Cross, Maryland), Foge Fazio (Pittsburgh), Joker Phillips (Kentucky), Charley Molnar (UMass), Jeff Quinn (Buffalo), Chuck Stobart (Toledo, Utah, Memphis), Don Treadwell (Miami OH), Lou West (Indiana State), TJ Weist (UConn) and Ron Zook (Florida, Illinois).

Joe Morrison, a standout as a Bearcats player and later for the New York Giants in the NFL, achieved similar success during his 15 seasons as a major college head coach at Tennessee-Chattanooga, New Mexico and South Carolina.. His grandson Max was a four-year wide receiver on UC from 2011-15.

Urban Meyer, a Bearcat in the mid-1980s and later a student assistant coach, carved out an impressive career at Florida following successful stints at Bowling Green and Utah, spent a year as a college football analyst for ESPN and is now the head coach at Ohio State.

Several former UC assistants are coordinators at NCAA FBS schools including, Baldwin (OC Oregon State), Tim Banks (DC Penn State), Kerry Coombs (ST Ohio State), Diaco (DC Nebraska), Dan Enos (Arkansas), Eddie Gran (HC Offense Kentucky), Tyson Helton (PGC USC) and William Inge (Co-DC Indiana).

Bill Davis, a quarterback at UC (1985-88) spent 22-years as an NFL assistant, most recently serving as defensive coordinator of the Philadelphia Eagles. He previously was a coordinator for the Arizona Cardinals and San Francisco 49ers. He replaced current UC Head Coach Luke Fickell on the defensive staff at Ohio State.

Some former players in coaching roles include Blue Adams, the cornerbacks coach at USF, Ryan Manalac as the linebackers coach at Valparaiso, All-American DB Mike Mickens as the defensive backs coach at Bowling Green, De'Angelo Smith as the cornerbacks coach at Ohio and standout DE Walter Stewart coaches ends at Eastern Kentucky.

Former UC letterwinner Dana Bible recently wrapped up a storied career as a collegiate assistant, with his last stops coming as the OC at NC State and as a senior advisor to former 49ers Head Coach Chip Kelly.

Tom Rossley, who set many UC receiving records, spent nearly four decades in the coaching ranks at the college and NFL levels, including a stint as head coach at SMU and six seasons as the offensive coordinator for the Green Bay Packers. He most recently was the quarterbacks coach at Texas A&M.
