GIANTS



The 2007 season began inauspiciously, with losses in the first two games, but ended as one of the most memorable campaigns in Giants history. The Giants clinched an NFC wild card postseason berth with a victory in Buffalo in their 15th game. The following week, they narrowly lost to the undefeated New England Patriots in the regular season finale to finish 10-6. What followed was one of the greatest postseason runs in NFL history, one that culminated with a 17-14 upset of the Patriots in an exhilarating Super Bowl XLII. Along the way, the Giants set an NFL single-season record with 11 consecutive victories away from their home stadium.

The Giants, seeded fifth in the conference, opened postseason play with a 24-14 wild card victory at Tampa Bay. The following week, the Giants avenged two regular season defeats with a 21-17 triumph over the Cowboys in Dallas in a divisional playoff game.

The Giants captured the conference title with a thrilling 23-20 overtime triumph over the Green Bay Packers in frigid Lambeau Field. The temperature at game time was minus-1 degree with a wind-chill factor of minus-23, making it the coldest game in Giants history. Lawrence Tynes — who missed his previous two attempts, including one on the final play of regulation — kicked a 47-yard field goal in overtime for the victory.

Super Bowl XLII was played in University of Phoenix Stadium in Glendale, Ariz. The Giants were heavy underdogs to a New England team that was 18-0 and was bidding to conclude the second perfect season in NFL history. But it was the Giants who enjoyed a perfect finish. Trailing, 7-3, entering the

fourth quarter, they took their first lead

of the game on Eli Manning's five-yard touchdown pass to David Tyree. The score was set up by a 45-yard catch-and-run by rookie tight end Kevin Boss. New England took a 14-10 lead on a six-yard touchdown pass from Tom Brady to Randy Moss with just 2:42 remaining.

The Giants took possession at their own 17 with 2:39 left in the game and Manning proceeded to lead the offense on one of the great drives in NFL postseason history. The highlight of the 12-play, 83-yard march occurred on third-and-five from the Giants'

44. Manning eluded the grasp of the rushing Patriots line and threw downfield for Tyree, who somehow secured the ball against his helmet for a miracle 32-yard gain. Steve Smith picked up a critical first down before Manning threw the game-winning 13-yard touchdown pass to Plaxico Burress with just 35 seconds remaining. The Giants stopped New England's final possession and secured their third Super Bowl in one of the biggest upsets in the game's history.

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HOME OF THE GIANTS METLIFE STADIUM



In 2010, the Giants moved into a beautiful, new, state-of-the-art stadium built just a few yards from where Giants Stadium stood for more than three decades. MetLife Stadium is the nation's finest football stadium. It seats 82,500 fans and is one of the NFL's most technologically advanced stadiums.

MetLife Stadium took more than 4 million man-hours and \$1.6 billion to build. The stadium features more than 9,000 club seats, 221 suites and 130,000 square feet of state-of-the-art club lounges. The first row of seats is just 46 feet from the sidelines and the sightlines are superb. The Giants' home is 2.1 million square feet, compared to Giants Stadium's 900,000 square feet. It has four 30 feet by 118 feet high-definition video screens, a 350,000 square foot outdoor plaza filled with interactive activities for fans of all ages.

On Feb. 2, 2014, MetLife Stadium hosted a historic event. It was the site of Super Bowl XLVIII, the first Super Bowl to be played outdoors at a cold weather venue. The Seattle Seahawks defeated the Denver Broncos, 43-8.

In its inaugural 2010 season, the Giants' home was known simply as New Meadowlands Stadium. On Aug. 23, 2011 the Giants, Jets and MetLife announced the signing of a 25-year agreement to name the teams' home venue MetLife Stadium.

"Our partnership with the Giants and Jets goes back to 2008 when we became the first cornerstone sponsor here at the stadium," said Steven A. Kandarian, president and chief executive officer of MetLife. "This expanded partnership provides significant benefits for both sides. MetLife secures the naming rights to a world class venue that will extend the reach of our brand to levels unmatched in the industry. And the Jets and Giants gain a sponsor with a history of financial strength and a brand as strong and storied as their own. MetLife Stadium is clearly one of the world's premier sports marketing facilities."

The NFL's premier venue opened for business in 2010. In addition to being the only stadium that is home to two NFL teams and Super Bowl XLVIII, it

hosts dozens of non-NFL events each year including concerts, NCAA football and lacrosse games and international soccer matches.

The entire Meadowlands Sports Complex has been renamed The MetLife Sports Complex.

"It is truly an honor for our team to be affiliated with such a wonderful partner," said John Mara, president and chief executive officer of the Giants. "I know how much MetLife means to so many in New York and New Jersey, as an employer, as a trusted provider of financial services, and as a great corporate citizen. The company's huge presence and influence in our area makes it a natural fit for this stadium and the strength, stability and quality of MetLife matches perfectly with the characteristics that the Giants try to achieve in all aspects of our aspirations. MetLife is a true leader in its industry and brings a powerful, well-known brand that reflects very well on our stadium and what we're trying to accomplish here. For the Giants in particular, MetLife's reputation and long history are very appealing qualities that resonate with us on a very basic level. We are both organizations that value heritage and legacy."

"MetLife Stadium immediately joins the ranks of the most prestigious, high-profile sports-branded venues in the world, and that's the way it should be," said Steve Tisch, the Giants' chairman and executive vice president. "If you look at MetLife and the marketing and branding assets they have, you can understand how proud we feel that they have selected our stadium as the one they want their name on. Clearly MetLife realizes what a unique situation we have: two NFL home teams and twice as many games over the course of the season. And of course, we are very proud that MetLife has recognized just what a fantastic, one-of-a-kind facility this stadium is."

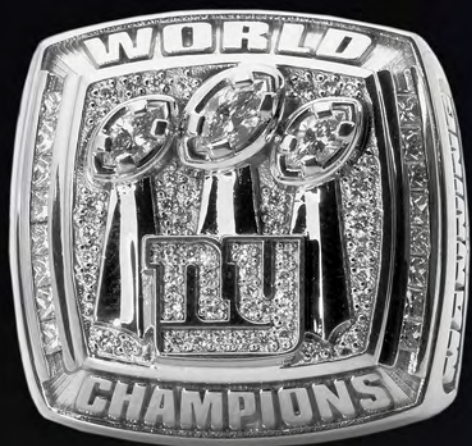

JOHN K. MARA

PRESIDENT AND CHIEF EXECUTIVE OFFICER



John K. Mara is in his 27th season with the Giants. The franchise's President and Chief Executive Officer, he assumed the team presidency upon the passing of his father, Wellington Mara, in 2005. He joined the Giants in 1991 as General Counsel and later added the title of Executive Vice President and Chief Operating Officer.

With team Chairman Steve Tisch, Mara was at the forefront of the planning and negotiations for MetLife Stadium, where the Giants began playing their home games in 2010 after 34 seasons in Giants Stadium. In addition, Mara, Steve Tisch and Jonathan Tisch, as well as Jets owner Woody Johnson, headlined the bid committee that helped convince the NFL owners to award Super Bowl XLVIII to the new stadium. Seattle and Denver played in the game on Feb. 2, 2014. The first Super Bowl to be held in a cold-weather outdoor venue was an overwhelming success, both in the week prior to the game and on game day.

Mara, one of the NFL's most prominent and respected owners, is the chairman of the league's Management Council Executive Committee, and he played an important role in negotiating the 2011 collective bargaining agreement with the NFLPA. He also serves on numerous other NFL committees, including for the last 17 years on the influential Competition Committee, which studies all

aspects of the game and recommends rules and policy changes to NFL clubs.

Mara has been affiliated with the Giants his entire life. The franchise was founded in 1925 by his grandfather,

Tim Mara. Wellington Mara was one of the most influential, respected and beloved executives in NFL history. Since John Mara joined the organization in an official capacity, the Giants have reached the playoffs 10 times, won five NFC East titles and played in three Super Bowls, winning two.

Born in New York City on Dec. 1, 1954, Mara grew up in Westchester County in White Plains and graduated from Iona Prep High School in New Rochelle. He attended Boston College where he received a B.S. degree in marketing, graduating with Cum Laude honors in 1976. Mara earned his law degree from Fordham University in 1979. He specialized in labor and employment law and litigation at two Manhattan firms prior to joining the Giants.

Mara serves on the Board of Directors of Saint Vincent's Hospital in Harrison, N.Y. and Boys Hope Girls Hope of New York.

John and his wife, the former Denise Walter, have five children and 10 grandchildren. The Mara family resides in Harrison, N.Y.



STEVE TISCH

CHAIRMAN AND EXECUTIVE VICE PRESIDENT



Steve Tisch has been involved with the New York Giants since his father, Preston Robert Tisch, purchased 50 percent of the franchise in 1991. He

joined the organization as Executive Vice President in July 2005, and after his father passed away, assumed the additional title of Chairman. Steve worked closely with John Mara on the planning and construction of MetLife Stadium and cites his father's passion for the Giants as a driving force in his efforts to complete the project. Tisch and Mara were named Best Owners in Forbes Magazine's 2011 Best Owners in the National Football League for their success both on and off the field.

In May 2010, Steve joined with his brother Jonathan, John Mara and Jets owner Woody Johnson in the teams' successful bid to bring Super Bowl XLVIII to MetLife Stadium in February 2014. It was the first Super Bowl played in an open-air stadium in a cold weather region.

Outside of the Giants, Steve is a partner at Escape Artists Productions, an independently financed motion picture and television production company. For more than three decades, Tisch has successfully produced compelling stories in film and television, from the critically acclaimed television movie, *The Burning Bed*, to *Risky Business*, the sleeper hit that helped launch Tom Cruise's career. Other notable films include *Forrest Gump*, *American History X*, *The Pursuit of Happyness*, *The Taking of Pelham 123*, *The Back-Up Plan*, *Hope Springs*, *Snatch*, *Lock Stock and Two Smoking Barrels*, *The Equalizer* and *Southpaw*. Tisch is the only person with both an Academy Award and a Super Bowl ring.

Steve is also active in philanthropy, generously contributing his time and resources to a variety of organizations.

In May 2014, at a White House summit on youth and sports concussions, President Obama announced Steve's leadership gift to UCLA for the Steve Tisch BrainSPORT Program. The donation is the single largest gift from an individual to a medical center for a concussion-related initiative. The gift creates the first U.S. fellowship program to train pediatric neurologists who specialize in sports concussions, and establishes the world's most sophisticated research, prevention, diagnosis and treatment program for concussions and brain injuries with a particular emphasis on young athletes.

Recognizing the value of storytelling and its ability to increase dialogue and understanding, Steve made a transformative gift to Tel Aviv University, elevating its world-renowned Department of Film and Television into a full school, now named The Steve Tisch School of Film and Television. The major investment will help attract and expand top level talent, increase scholarships, provide new state-of-the-art equipment, enable building renovations, enhance curriculums, and bring international collaborations. It will help nurture and grow creative, talented and diverse voices from across Israel, the region and the world. Steve was awarded an honorary doctorate degree from Tel Aviv University in 2016.

Steve contributes his time to other worthwhile institutions in the arts, health and education fields. He is on the Boards of The Geffen Playhouse in Los Angeles, the Los Angeles County Museum of Art and The Preston Robert Tisch Brain Tumor Center at Duke University. He is also the naming benefactor of the sports and fitness center at his alma mater, Tufts University.

When asked whether he would rather have his Academy Award for *Forrest Gump* or one of his Super Bowl rings, Steve has said he would give back the Oscar before either of the Giants' titles.



CHRIS MARA

SR. VICE PRESIDENT, PLAYER PERSONNEL



Chris Mara joined the Giants as Vice President of Player Evaluation on July 29, 2003.

He was promoted to Senior Vice President of Player Personnel in 2011.

This is Mara's second tour of duty with the franchise. He joined the Giants staff prior to the 1979 season and over the next 14 years was a member of the club's player personnel department. Mara was a scout during the franchise's first two Super Bowl Championship seasons in 1986 and 1990.

Following his first stint with the Giants, Mara spent eight years (1994-2001) operating ProRate, Inc., an independent football scouting service contracted by as many as 15 NFL franchises. The service provided an evaluation of the free agent market in the NFL.

Mara spent 2001-02 as the President/General Manager of the New Jersey Gladiators of the Arena Football League. Mara oversaw a myriad of responsibilities including ticket sales, operations, and the arena lease. His primary focus was on player personnel and player contracts. Mara brought his extensive knowledge of professional football to the team and revived the struggling franchise in just one season.

After a difficult first season, the Gladiators posted a 9-5 record in 2002 and a first-place finish in the Eastern

Division of the National Conference. Posting the biggest turnaround in AFL history, the Gladiators finished the 2002 regular season with seven more victories than the previous year and qualified for the playoffs for the first time in franchise history.

Mara graduated from Iona Prep in New Rochelle, N.Y. where he was a standout defensive back for three seasons, winning All-Catholic High School Athletic Association recognition after his senior year.

He began his collegiate career at Springfield College, where he was a defensive back on the freshman team and lettered on the varsity golf team. He then transferred to Boston College, where he earned a B.A. in the arts and sciences. During his scholastic and collegiate days, Mara spent many summers working at Giants training camps. During the regular season, he worked with broadcast teams from both CBS-TV and NBC-TV, as well as with visiting and home radio broadcast groups.

Mara was born in New York City. He is married to the former Kathleen Rooney and the couple has four children - Daniel, Kate, Rooney and Conor - and four grandchildren, Judith Kailee, Wellington Rooney, Ann MacKenna, and Blaise Rooney (Daniel's children).



JONATHAN M. TISCH

TREASURER



Jonathan M. Tisch is co-chairman of the board and a member of the Office of the President of Loews Corporation, one of the largest diversified financial holding companies in the U.S., and is also Chairman and CEO of its subsidiary, Loews Hotels.

Under his leadership, Tisch engineered Loews Hotels' expansion and emergence as a leading hotel company by infusing the properties with a widely praised corporate culture that places a high value on partnerships that empower team members, satisfy customers, contribute to communities, and improve the bottom line.

Nationally recognized as a passionate advocate and leader of the multi-billion dollar travel and tourism industry, Tisch founded and served as Chairman of the Travel Business Roundtable, and now serves as Chairman Emeritus of its successor organization, the United States Travel Association.

Tisch is also committed to a vibrant tourism industry in New York City, where for nearly six years he served as Chairman of NYC & Company, the city's official tourism marketing agency. Concurrent with his national efforts to help stimulate travel and tourism in the aftermath of September 11th, Tisch served as Chairman of New York Rising, which played an instrumental role in reviving tourism and the local economy. In recognition for his

leadership and civic involvement, Crain's New York

Business named him one of the first members selected for their Hall of Fame, recognizing individuals who have transformed the City in both their professional work and in their civic and philanthropic activities. Crain's has previously named Tisch one of the "Top Ten Most Influential Business Leaders".

Jonathan is the author of three bestselling books: *The Power of We: Succeeding Through Partnerships*; *Chocolates on the Pillow Aren't Enough: Reinventing the Customer Experience*; and *Citizen You: Doing Your Part to Change the World*. He was also the host of the Emmy-nominated and Gracie Award-winning television series, *Beyond the Boardroom*, where he spoke with some of America's most preeminent CEOs and business luminaries.

Tisch is a champion of corporate responsibility and his community and philanthropic activities are extensive. He served as the vice-chairman of The Welfare to Work Partnership, and currently serves as Vice Chair of the Board of Trustees for Tufts University, where he is also the naming benefactor of the Jonathan M. Tisch College of Civic Life. He served as co-chair of the bid committee established to bring Super Bowl XLVIII to the region and served as co-chair of the historic 2014 NY/NJ Super Bowl Host Committee. He is a co-owner of the 2007 and 2011 Super Bowl Champions New York Football Giants.

JERRY REESE

SR. VICE PRESIDENT AND GENERAL MANAGER



Jerry Reese is in his 11th season as the Giants' Senior Vice President and General Manager. In Reese's first 10 seasons as head of the franchise's football operations, the Giants won Super Bowls XLII and XLVI and had an 88-72 regular-season record, including an 8-2 postseason mark. During his tenure, the Giants have won two NFC East championships, earned four postseason berths and finished .500 or better seven times.

Reese was named the Giants' general manager on Jan. 16, 2007. He succeeded Ernie Accorsi, who had held the position for nine years before retiring. Reese has been a member of the Giants organization since 1994. Prior to becoming the G.M., he spent four seasons as the team's Director of Player Personnel. Reese coordinated the Giants' college scouting, was in charge of the team's draft preparation and ran the draft room as the Giants made their selections. When Accorsi retired, the team's ownership chose Reese as the team's third general manager since 1979, when the late George Young assumed the position. Young held the position until 1997, when Accorsi took over. Accorsi, who had helped convince Reese to leave college scouting and join the pro personnel department of the Giants, promoted him to director of player personnel and advocated that he succeed him.

The selection of Reese was historic, as he was the third African-American general manager in NFL history, joining Baltimore's Ozzie Newsome and Houston's Rick Smith. It was particularly poignant for Reese to learn of his appointment on Martin Luther King, Jr. Day.

"I thought about that a lot and it was absolutely perfect timing for this to happen," Reese said. "I don't mean to sound cliché, but I really feel it's my time to carry the torch. There are many people who went before me who really suffered through this process, and now it's my time. I'm going to be successful — I have to be successful on a lot of levels."

And he has been. Last year, Reese made a series of shrewd offseason moves that helped the Giants finish 11-5 and earn a wild card playoff berth. The Giants won five more games than they had in 2015, the team's greatest one-year improvement since 2005.

In 2016, Reese focused his offseason efforts on a defense that struggled throughout the previous season. The Giants signed defensive linemen Damon Harrison and Olivier Vernon, cornerback Janoris Jenkins, and linebackers Keenan Robinson and Kelvin Sheppard, and selected cornerback Eli Apple 10th overall in the NFL Draft. Last season, Landon Collins, the safety whom Reese traded up to select in the second round of the 2015 draft and Janoris Jenkins were the first Giants to be selected first-team All-Pros since 2011. Jenkins and Collins played in their first Pro Bowl, and Jenkins, Vernon and Dominique Rodgers-Cromartie, a free agent acquisition in 2014, were all named second-team All-

Pro.

More importantly, the play of the newcomers enabled the Giants to have the NFL's most improved defense in 2016.

The Giants were second in the NFL with 284 points allowed, one season after they ranked 30th after giving up 442 points. The 158-point decrease in points allowed was by far the NFL's highest; Philadelphia was second with a 99-point drop. The Giants were the first NFL team to allow at least 158 fewer points than the previous season since the 2002 Indianapolis Colts (173 points). The Giants allowed 17.8 points per game, the lowest average by their opponents since 2002, when they gave up 17.4 points a game.

The Giants allowed an NFL-low 25 offensive touchdowns, including 13 touchdown passes, the league's second-lowest figure.

In addition, the Giants ranked 10th in the NFL, allowing 5,435 yards (339.7 a game), one season after finishing 32nd by yielding 6,725 yards (420.3 a game). The 1,290-yard improvement was the league's best; the Eagles were second with 942 fewer yards allowed. The Giants were the first team to give up at least 1,290 fewer yards than the previous season since the 2013 New Orleans Saints (2,151). They held their final eight opponents to less than 400 total yards, their longest such streak in a single season since 2013. The Giants held their opponents to less than 100 rushing yards in 10 games, their highest total since they did it 10 times in 2001.

In 2015, free agents Shane Vereen, Dwayne Harris, Marshall Newhouse, Jonathan Casillas and J.T. Thomas all signed on the same day, and each contributed



significantly that season. Vereen was second on the team in rushing (260 yards on 61 carries) and receiving (59 catches for 494 yards and four touchdowns). Harris finished third in the NFL with a 28.7-yard average on 22 kickoff returns, including a 100-yard runback vs. Dallas on Oct. 25, and he was seventh in the league with a 10.0-yard average on 34 punt returns, including an 80-yard touchdown against the Jets. Harris was selected to the 2017 Pro Bowl as a special teams standout. Newhouse started 14 games at right tackle, Casillas was the team's second-leading tackler, and Thomas was a consistent contributor despite battling an ankle injury. Punter Brad Wing, obtained in a trade on Sept 4, placed 33 kicks inside the 20-yard line, tying the team record set by Brad Maynard in 1997 and '98. In 2016, Wing set a franchise record with a 40.9-yard net average on 93 punts.

The Giants' 2015 draft has also paid dividends. First-round selection Ereck Flowers started all but one game at left tackle in his first two years. Collins has started every game, and led the Giants in tackles in each of his first two seasons.

In 2014, a strong Giants draft class was highlighted by first-round selection Odell Beckham Jr., who had the greatest season by a rookie wide receiver in NFL history. In just 12 games, Beckham caught 91 passes for 1,305 yards and 12 touchdowns, all franchise rookie records. He was named the Associated Press' Offensive Rookie of the Year, the first Giants player to be so honored in the 58-year history of the award. Beckham is the first Giants player since Pro Football Hall of Famer Lawrence Taylor to make the Pro Bowl in each of his first three seasons; Taylor did it from 1981-83. Beckham's career totals of 288 catches, 4,122 yards and 35 touchdowns all shattered the previous franchise records for a player in his first three NFL seasons.

Starting center Weston Richburg, linebacker Devon Kennard, and defensive tackle Jay Bromley were also members of that draft class.

In 2013, the Giants were 7-9, ending their streak of non-losing seasons at eight in a row, their longest such stretch since they were at least .500 in 10 consecutive seasons from 1954-63.

The 2012 Giants finished 9-7, the same record they had the previous season when they won the Super Bowl for the second time during Reese's tenure. It was the second time in five opportunities the Giants followed a Super Bowl appearance with a winning record (they also did it in 2008); Reese was the general manager each time. One of the highlights of the season was the development of the draft class brought in by Reese and his staff, notably running back David Wilson and wide receiver Rueben Randle. Wilson's promising career ended prematurely when he was forced to retire with a neck injury. Victor Cruz, originally signed as an undrafted free agent in 2010, had his second big season in a row, with 86 catches for 1,092 yards and 10 touchdowns.

Reese and the Giants enjoyed great success in 2011. In the transaction frenzy that followed the end of the lockout, Reese added or re-signed several players who became standouts on the Super Bowl XLVI champions, including running back Ahmad Bradshaw, defensive end Mathias Kiwanuka, offensive lineman Kevin Boothe, safety Deon Grant, center David Baas, punter Steve Weatherford, defensive lineman Dave Tolfelson and defensive tackle Rocky Bernard. Cruz emerged from



obscurity to set a franchise record with 1,536 receiving yards on 82 catches. He also scored a touchdown in the Super Bowl victory over New England. Hakeem Nicks, the Giants' 2009 first-round draft choice, caught 76 passes for 1,192 yards, and led the team in its four-game postseason with 28 receptions, 444 yards and four touchdowns. The Giants added an impressive rookie class that included cornerback Prince Amukamara, fullback Henry Hynoski and linebackers Jacquian Williams, Spencer Paysinger and Mark Herzlich, all of whom contributed for several seasons.

Reese helped put the Giants on the road to a championship soon after becoming general manager in 2007. That year, he re-signed center Shaun O'Hara, which kept an outstanding offensive line intact, and added linebacker Kawika Mitchell via free agency and running back Reuben Droughns and kicker Lawrence Tynes in trades. He drafted eight players — Aaron Ross, Steve Smith, Jay Alford, Zak DeOssie, Kevin Boss, Adam Koets, Michael Johnson and Ahmad Bradshaw — who all played during the postseason. During the season, the Giants added important players like fullback Madison Hedgecock and wide receiver/kickoff returner Domenik Hixon.

In addition to helping the Giants win a championship as rookies, many of those players made important contributions in later years. Smith set the franchise record with 107 receptions in 2009. Bradshaw led the Giants in rushing in three consecutive seasons (2010-12) and twice ran for more than 1,000 yards. DeOssie is a two-time Pro Bowl long snapper.

In 2008, Reese's ability to acquire important players helped the Giants win the NFC East title with a 12-4 record. When Tynes was injured in the preseason, Reese signed 21-year veteran John Carney, whose 143 points were then the second most in Giants history. The Giants also drafted Kenny Phillips, Terrell Thomas and Mario Manningham, all of whom made significant contributions to successful teams.

Reese continued to acquire key players in 2009-10.

Defensive tackle Chris Canty was a stalwart up front, and started all 20 games in the 2011 championship season. Reese shored up a position where the Giants were short-staffed by importing safeties Antrel Rolle and Grant. Those two safeties teamed with Phillips to give the Giants much-improved play at that vital position. Rolle was selected to the NFC Pro Bowl team.

The 2010 first-round draft choice was defensive end Jason Pierre-Paul, whose 4.5 sacks were the most by a Giants rookie since Cornelius Griffin had 5.0 in 2000. Pierre-Paul was one of the very best defensive players in the NFL in the 2011 championship season, when his 16.5 sacks were the fourth-highest total in Giants history. JPP joined Hall of Famers Lawrence Taylor and Michael Strahan as the only Giants with at least 16 sacks in a season. JPP was selected to his first Pro Bowl and was named first-team All-Pro by the Associated Press. He was twice selected NFC Defensive Player of the Week in December — when he was also named NFC Defensive Player of the Month. In 2012, Pierre-Paul played in his second Pro Bowl, this time as a starter.

While serving as the Giants' Director of Player Personnel, Reese oversaw all aspects of the team's college scouting. During his tenure as personnel director, the Giants drafted Osi Umenyiora, David Diehl, David Tyree, Chris Snee, Gibril Wilson, Justin Tuck, Brandon Jacobs, Barry Cofield, Corey Webster and Kiwanuka, as well as Philip Rivers, who was sent to San Diego in the trade that delivered Eli Manning to the Giants. All of those players were prominent in the 2007 championship season and beyond.

Reese originally joined the Giants' scouting department on Dec. 15, 1994. In the spring of 1999, he became Dave Gettleman's assistant in the pro personnel department. In that position, he scouted the Giants' upcoming opponents and evaluated NFL players. Reese was promoted to Director of Player Personnel on May 1, 2002.

Reese came to the Giants after a successful playing and coaching career at the University of Tennessee at Martin. During his college playing career (1981-84), Reese was honored as a two-time All-Gulf South Conference pick. He is among the leaders on UT-Martin's all-time career list in interceptions. Reese led the team with 7 interceptions in 1982 and was UT-Martin's leading tackler in 1984 with 99. Reese was GSC Defensive Player of the Week three times during his career and was named team MVP following his senior season.

Following his playing career, Reese served as a student assistant and as a graduate assistant before becoming a full-time coach of the secondary from 1988-93. He moved to receivers coach and assumed the assistant head coach title in January of 1993.

In 2008, Reese was inducted into the Tennessee Sports Hall of Fame.

Reese has his bachelor's degree in health and physical education and earned his master's degree in education administration and supervision. In the fall of 1995, Reese was inducted into the UT-Martin Hall of Fame.

Reese, a native of Tiptonville, Tenn. is married to the former Gwen Moore. They have two children, Jasmyne Danielle and Jerry II.

BEN McADOO

HEAD COACH



Ben McAdoo had one of the most successful debut seasons by a head coach in Giants history in 2016.

McAdoo, hired as the 17th head coach of the franchise on Jan. 14, 2016, led the team to an 11-5 record and its first postseason berth since 2011. He was the NFL's first rookie head coach to win at least 11 games since Chuck Pagano was 11-5 with the Indianapolis Colts in 2012.

McAdoo tied Dan Reeves (1993) for the most victories by a Giants head coach in his first season with the team. McAdoo was the fourth coach with double-digit victories in his initial Giants season:

McAdoo is the fourth coach in franchise history to lead the team to the playoffs in his first season, joining Allie Sherman (1961), Reeves (1993) and Fassel (1997).

When the Giants defeated Dallas, 20-19, on Sept. 11 and New Orleans, 16-13, the following week, McAdoo joined Reeves (1993) and Joe Alexander (1926) as the only head coaches to win their first two games as Giants head coach.

The Giants finished 11-5 and in second place in the NFC East after finishing 6-10 and in third place in both 2014 and 2015. The five-game improvement in victories was their biggest since 2005, when they were also 11-5 one year after finishing 6-10.

McAdoo led the Giants to a 7-1 record at home, their best mark in the seven-year history of MetLife Stadium (previous best: 6-2 in 2012) and their best home record since they were 7-1 in Giants Stadium in 2008. The Giants won their last six home games, their longest such streak since they won their first six games at home in 2008.

The Giants were 4-4 on the road, their best record as visitors since 2011, when they were 5-3. They were 3-5 on the road in each of the previous four seasons.

The Giants finished 4-2 in NFC East games, their best record within the division since they were 4-2 in 2013. They twice defeated the Dallas Cowboys, the only team to finish ahead of them in the division standings. The Giants' 2-1 record in division road games was their best since they were 2-1 in 2013.

McAdoo was the team's offensive coordinator in 2014-15, when the Giants' offense was one of the most productive in the NFL. When he joined the franchise prior to the 2014 season, McAdoo took command of an offense that had finished 28th in the NFL the previous season. In 2013, the Giants averaged 307.5 yards per game, 83.3 rushing and 224.3 passing. They scored 294 points.

In two seasons with McAdoo formulating game plans and calling the plays, the Giants' offense ranked 10th and eighth, respectively, in the NFL. They averaged 367.2

and 372.3 total yards, 100.2 and 100.6 rushing yards, and 267.0 and 271.7 passing yards. The Giants' passing yardage total was the seventh-highest in the NFL in both 2013 and 2014. Their point totals were 380 in 2014 and 420 in the 2015 season.

The Giants scored at least 24 points in each of their final six games of the 2014 season and the 2015 season opener, their longest such streak since they scored 24 or more points in eight consecutive games from Sept. 29-Nov. 17, 1963.

The Giants' 420 points in 2015 was the fifth-highest total in franchise history, and their 5,952 net yards was the third-highest total. The 2015 Giants set franchise records for pass attempts (623, the old record was 616 in 2003) and completions (392, the old record was 383 in 2014). Their completion percentage of 62.9 was tied for the second-highest in team history; the record of 63.1 was set in 2014. McAdoo's first season with the team.

In 2015, the Giants totaled 4,347 net passing yards, the second-highest total in franchise history. The record of 4,734 was set in 2011. The Giants threw 36 touchdown passes in 2015 (35 by Eli Manning), the second-highest total in franchise history; the 1963 Giants threw 39 touchdown passes.

Last season, McAdoo continued his play-calling role as head coach. With Eli Manning throwing every pass, the Giants had 598 attempts (the fifth-highest total in franchise history) and 377 completions (third-highest total). The Giants' completion percentage of 63.0 was the second highest in franchise history, just behind the record of 63.1 set in 2014 and just ahead of the 62.9 rate in 2015.

The Giants allowed 22 sacks — five fewer than in 2015 — the third-lowest total in the league after Oakland (18) and Pittsburgh (21).

Manning, a two-time Super Bowl MVP, has had three of the finest seasons of his career under McAdoo.

In 2013, the season prior to McAdoo's arrival, Manning completed 58.5 percent of his passes and threw for 3,818 yards, 18 touchdowns and 27 interceptions. Manning's three-year averages under McAdoo are a 62.9 completion percentage, 4,290 yards, 30 touchdown passes and 14.7 interceptions. Manning's 35 touchdown passes in 2015 are a career high and just one shy of the franchise record set by Pro Football Hall of Famer Y.A. Tittle in 1963. In 2016, Manning exceeded 4,000 passing yards for the third consecutive season and the sixth time in his career.

Before joining the Giants, McAdoo — who will be 40 when the 2017 season opens — spent eight years as an assistant coach with the Green Bay Packers, the first six as the team's tight ends coach and the final two as the quarterbacks coach.

During his tenure in Green Bay, the Packers earned six playoff berths, won four NFC North titles and defeated Pittsburgh in Super Bowl XLV.

He began mentoring the Packers' quarterbacks in 2012, one year after Aaron Rodgers was selected the

NFL's Most Valuable Player. Rodgers continued to excel under McAdoo's direction. He was voted the NFC Pro Bowl starter after completing 371 of 552 attempts for 4,295 yards and 39 touchdowns against only 8 interceptions, and leading the league in passer rating for the second consecutive season (108.0).

In 2013, Rodgers missed seven games with a fractured collarbone and McAdoo was forced to prepare three other players to start at quarterback (Seneca Wallace, Scott Tolzien and Matt Flynn). Even with the frequently changing cast at the quarterback position, Green Bay won the NFC North championship with an 8-7-1 record. The Packers' offense finished the season ranked third in the NFL (400.3 yards a game) and, despite missing Rodgers for almost half the season, sixth in passing yards (266.8). When he did play, Rodgers was outstanding, completing 66.6 percent of his passes, throwing for 17 touchdowns against only 8 interceptions and finishing with a passer rating of 104.9.

In McAdoo's final season as the Packers' tight ends coach in 2011, he helped then fourth-year pro Jermichael Finley return to the field following a season-ending knee injury suffered the previous year. Finley was named a Pro Bowl alternate after playing in all 16 games for the first time and setting new career highs with 767 yards and 8 touchdowns, while matching his previous career best with 55 catches. He was the first tight end in Green Bay history with two 55-catch seasons. McAdoo also helped develop second-year tight ends Tom Crabtree and Andrew Quarless.

In 2010, the Packers won the Super Bowl as the NFL's sixth seed with significant contributions from McAdoo's tight ends. Finley got off to a torrid start, posting 21 catches for 301 yards and a touchdown in the opening four games. That included back-to-back 100-yard receiving performances as Finley joined Paul Coffman (1979) as the only tight ends in Packers history to accomplish that feat.

After Finley sustained his knee injury on the opening series at Washington in Week 5, Quarless, then a rookie, and Crabtree, a first-year pro, moved into more significant roles under McAdoo's guidance. Quarless went on to catch 21 passes for 238 yards, the best marks by a Green Bay rookie tight end in each category since Bubba Franks (34-363) in 2000. Quarless' 62 receiving yards at Detroit in Week 14 were the most by a Packers rookie tight end since Ron Kramer had 68 at Detroit on Nov. 28, 1957.

In 2009, McAdoo oversaw one of the most productive seasons by the tight ends in team history. With the emergence of young players Finley and Spencer Havner, along with veteran Donald Lee, Green Bay's tight ends posted a collective 99 receptions for 1,048 yards, franchise records in both categories.

Finley (55 receptions) and Lee (37) became the first tight-end duo in franchise history to each post 35-plus receptions in the same season, and they were one of only two tandems in the league to do so in 2009, along with New Orleans' Jeremy Shockey and David Thomas. With Finley (5 scores) and Havner (4), the Packers were the only team in the NFL to have two tight ends catch at least

4 touchdown receptions apiece.

Finley was a third-round draft choice in 2008 and McAdoo helped him learn the pro game as a rookie, when the first-year pro posted 3 receptions for 64 yards and his first NFL touchdown in the final two games.

In 2007, it was former backup Lee who had a breakout year after moving into the starting role. Lee tallied career highs with 48 catches for 575 yards and 6 touchdowns. In 2008-09, he became the first Packers tight end since Coffman (1981-83) to catch at least 35 passes in three consecutive seasons.

Upon arriving in Green Bay in 2006, McAdoo helped the Packers' tight ends adapt successfully to additional blocking and pass-protection duties they had not been assigned previously. The added assistance helped a young offensive line, which at times had as many as three rookie starters, allow only 24 sacks all season.

Originally named to the tight ends post on Jan. 17, 2006, McAdoo replaced Joe Philbin, who became the team's offensive line coach after Mike McCarthy was introduced as head coach. McAdoo worked for McCarthy at each of his previous NFL spots.

McAdoo came to Green Bay from the San Francisco 49ers, where he served as assistant offensive line/quality control coach in 2005. In that role, he assisted the offensive line and tight ends.

Prior to joining the 49ers, he had a brief stint at Stanford University as tackles and tight ends coach. He resigned after the 2005 recruiting season to take the 49ers position and reunite with McCarthy, then the San Francisco offensive coordinator with whom he worked in New Orleans the previous season.

McAdoo entered the NFL in 2004 with the New Orleans Saints as an offensive assistant/quality control coach. He worked directly with McCarthy and assisted the offensive line and tight ends.

Prior to working in the NFL, McAdoo spent 2003 as an offensive assistant at the University of Pittsburgh, helping the Panthers earn a trip to the Continental Tire Bowl after an 8-5 season. At season's end, the University of Akron hired him as an assistant coach, but he stayed only through the 2004 recruiting period before joining the Saints staff.

Earlier, he served as offensive line/tight ends coach at Fairfield (Conn.) University in 2002. After that campaign, the head coach left the team and McAdoo was appointed assistant head coach before the program was disbanded.

McAdoo began his college coaching career at Michigan State University (2001) as a special teams/offensive assistant on the heels of coaching four years at the high school level. McAdoo spent two years in the Homer Center school district in southwestern Pennsylvania and two years in the Indiana (Pa.) area.

McAdoo attended Indiana University of Pennsylvania (IUP) and earned a degree in health and physical education. Later, he received his master's degree in kinesiology from Michigan State.

McAdoo is married to Toni, a fellow native of Homer City, Pa. They have a daughter, Larkin, and a son, BJ.

MIKE SULLIVAN

OFFENSIVE COORDINATOR



Sullivan was the team's quarterbacks coach. He previously spent eight seasons (2004-11) with the Giants, the first six coaching the team's wide receivers, and the final two as the quarterbacks coach. During that time, the Giants won Super Bowls XLII and XLVI.

Sullivan was also the Tampa Bay Buccaneers' offensive coordinator in 2012-13. He spent the 2014 season as a consultant.

In 2016, outstanding performances by several of Sullivan's players helped the Giants finish 11-5 and earn their first postseason berth in five years.

Eli Manning completed 377 of 598 passes (63.0 percent) for 4,017 yards, 26 touchdowns, 16 interceptions, and a passer rating of 86.0. Manning exceeded 4,000 passing yards for the third consecutive season, and the sixth time in his career. His 63.0 completion percentage was slightly less than his career-best of 63.1, set in 2014.

Odell Beckham, Jr. finished with 101 catches, the third-highest total in the NFL and the second-highest total in Giants' history, behind Steve Smith's 107 receptions in 2009. Beckham's 1,367 receiving yards were also third in the league, the second-highest total of his career, and the third-highest in Giants history. Beckham had 10 touchdown receptions, which placed him fifth in the NFL (two receivers had 14 and two had 12).

Rookie Sterling Shepard, the Giants' second-round draft choice in 2016, finished second on the team with 65 catches for 683 yards and eight touchdowns. He caught at least two passes in every game except the victory in Cleveland on Nov. 27. Shepard's 65 receptions placed him second among NFL rookies behind New Orleans' Michael Thomas, and were the third-highest total by a rookie in Giants history.

In 2015, Sullivan's first season as the Giants' quarterbacks coach since 2011, Manning had one of his finest statistical seasons, completing 387 of 618 passes (62.6 percent) for 4,432 yards, 35 touchdowns and 14 interceptions. Manning's 618 pass attempts and 387 completions were both franchise records. His 4,432 yards were the second-highest total in Giants history. Manning's 35 touchdown passes were a career-high, and left him one shy of the franchise record set by Hall of Famer Y.A. Tittle in 1963.

Manning's 93.6 passer rating was also a career-high. His previous best was 93.1 in 2009.

Sullivan began his two-year stint as Tampa Bay's offensive coordinator in 2012. That season, the Buccaneers set franchise records with 5,820 total yards and 389 points. Their offense ranked ninth in the NFL with an average of 363.8 yards a game. That Tampa Bay team was 10th in passing yardage (248.9 a game) and 15th in rushing yardage (114.8). Quarterback Josh Freeman set franchise records with 4,065 passing yards and 27 touchdown

passes, and running back Doug Martin was selected to the Pro Bowl after setting a team rookie rushing record with 1,454 yards.

Sullivan was the Giants' quarterbacks coach in 2010-11. In those two seasons, Manning completed 61.9 percent of his passes for 8,935 yards, 60 touchdowns, 41 interceptions and a passer rating of 89.2. He threw a then-career best 31 touchdown passes in 2010 and for a career-high 4,933 yards the following season, when the Giants won their second Super Bowl with Manning as quarterback. In 2011, Manning set an NFL record with 15 fourth-quarter touchdown passes.

Sullivan coached the Giants' wide receivers from 2004-09. In the last of those six seasons, the team's wide receivers caught 236 passes. Smith shattered the franchise record with 107 catches and was the first Giants wideout to play in the Pro Bowl in 41 years. Smith's receptions accounted for 1,220 yards and seven touchdowns. Mario Manningham contributed 57 catches and Hakeem Nicks had 47 and six scores in an exceptional rookie season.

In 2008, Smith led the Giants with 57 receptions. Domenik Hixon, who had one career reception entering the season, had a team-high 596 receiving yards on 43 catches. Amani Toomer was second on the team with 48 receptions in his final Giants season. In four seasons under Sullivan's tutelage, Plaxico Burress had 344 catches, 3,681 receiving yards, and caught 33 touchdown passes.

David Tyree, another of Sullivan's players, made one of the greatest plays in Super Bowl history when he improbably secured a Manning pass against his helmet for a 32-yard gain on the Giants' game-winning drive in Super Bowl XLII.

Sullivan was the Jacksonville Jaguars' offensive assistant in 2003 after spending the previous season as Jacksonville's defensive quality control coach under Tom Coughlin. He was the only member of Coughlin's coaching staff retained by the Jaguars in 2003.

Sullivan joined the Jaguars after nine years coaching on the collegiate level. He began his career at Humboldt State University in 1993. He also coached at Army (1995-96 and 1999-2000), Youngstown State University (1997-98) and Ohio University (2001). In 1997, Youngstown State won the Division I-AA national championship under Jim Tressel, who later won a title at Ohio State. At Ohio University, Sullivan coached the defensive backs and tutored the kick blocking units on special teams.

Sullivan was a defensive back at Army, where he received a Bachelor of Science degree in 1989. He also has a master's degree from Humboldt State. Sullivan is a graduate of the U.S. Army Airborne, Ranger and Air Assault schools.

During his first stint with the Giants, Sullivan earned his Blue Belt in Brazilian Jiu-Jitsu.

Sullivan and his wife, Julie, have two daughters, Carmen Enriqueta and Hope Carolyn. Sullivan was born in Santa Maria, Calif.

STEVE SPAGNUOLO

DEFENSIVE COORDINATOR



Steve Spagnuolo is in his third season of his second tenure as the Giants' defensive coordinator. He previously held the position in 2007-08.

In 2016, the Giants fielded the NFL's most-improved defense, one that was a catalyst behind the team's 11-5 record and first postseason berth in five years.

Last season, the Giants' defense achieved top 10 rankings in 12 statistical categories recognized by the NFL, including a top five ranking in eight critical statistical categories: touchdowns allowed (first), red zone efficiency (first), points allowed per game (second), opposing quarterback rating (second), yards allowed per rush (second), third-down efficiency (third), completion percentage (third), and first downs allowed per game (fifth).

The Giants allowed 17.8 points per game, the lowest average by their opponents since 2002, when they gave up 17.4 points a game. They were second in the NFL with 284 points allowed, one season after they were ranked 30th after giving up 442 points. The 158-point decrease in points allowed was by far the NFL's highest. The Giants were the first NFL team to allow at least 158 fewer points than the previous season since the 2002 Indianapolis Colts (173 points).

The Giants allowed an NFL-low 25 offensive touchdowns. They gave up 15 touchdown passes in 2016. That was the NFL's second-lowest total, behind Denver's 13 touchdown passes allowed.

The Giants surrendered 19 points or less nine times, their highest total since 2008, when they also did it eight times. Their record in those games was 8-1. In the final four games of the season, after losing one of the unit's best players in defensive end Jason Pierre-Paul, the defense held their opponents to an average of 13.5 points a game.

In addition, the Giants ranked 10th in the NFL, allowing 5,435 yards (339.7 a game), one season after finishing 32nd by yielding 6,725 yards (420.3 a game). The 1,290-yard improvement was the league's best. They held their final eight opponents to less than 400 total yards, their longest such streak in a single season since 2013.

The Giants held their opponents to less than 100 rushing yards in 10 games, their highest total since they did it 10 times in 2001.

Several of Spagnuolo's players received individual accolades in 2016. Defensive tackle Damon Harrison and safety London Collins were selected to the Associated Press 2016 NFL All-Pro team. They were the Giants' initial first-team All-Pros since defensive end Jason Pierre-Paul in 2011. Defensive end Olivier Vernon, and cornerbacks Janoris Jenkins and Dominique Rodgers-Cromartie were second-team All-Pros. Jenkins and Collins were each selected to their first Pro Bowl.

In 2015, the Giants had 28 takeaways and a plus-7 turnover differential, one season after they had a minus-2 differential. The 28 forced turnovers tied for the NFL's sixth-highest total.

During Spagnuolo's first tenure with the team, the

Giants won Super Bowl XLII and ranked seventh and then fifth in the NFL in total defense. In 37 regular season and postseason games, the Giants' defense allowed 17 points or fewer 19 times. The Giants were 19-0 in those games.

A 36-year coaching veteran, including 19 in the NFL, Spagnuolo (pronounced SPAG-no-low) has coached for teams that have made 9 playoff appearances, won 6 division titles, played in 5 conference championship games, earned 2 conference titles and won a Super Bowl.

Spagnuolo, 57, was first hired by the Giants on Jan. 22, 2007, after an 8-year stint on the Philadelphia Eagles' coaching staff. In his first two games as coordinator, the Giants allowed 45 and 35 points in losses to Dallas and Green Bay, respectively. But Spagnuolo stressed to the players that he had faith in both them and the defensive system. In Week 3, a goal-line stand late in a victory in Washington ignited a 6-game winning streak in which the Giants allowed an average of just 13.2 points a game.

With Spagnuolo as the architect of the defense, the Giants that season ranked in the NFL's Top 10 in eight statistical categories, including a league-high 53 sacks. Spagnuolo's defense did its best work in the four-game postseason, allowing an average of 16.3 points per game. In the Super Bowl, his schemes and adjustments held the 18-0 New England Patriots — who had league-high averages of 411.3 yards and 36.8 points a game in the regular season — to 274 yards and 14 points.

In 2008, the Giants' defense continued to improve, finishing fifth in yards allowed (292.0 per game), helping the Giants to a 12-4 record and an NFC East title. Despite losing standout defensive ends Michael Strahan (retirement) and Osi Umenyiora (preseason injury) the defense finished ninth in rush defense (95.8 yards-per-game) and eighth in pass defense (196.2) and the Giants' 18.4 points allowed per game placed them fifth in the NFL.

Spagnuolo left the Giants in 2009 to become the head coach in St. Louis, where he inherited a 2-14 team and within two seasons had the Rams within one game of a playoff berth, losing in the final game of the 2010 season to finish 7-9. In 2012, he was the defensive coordinator in New Orleans. Spagnuolo led a unit that finished with 15 interceptions, including four that were returned for touchdowns, and forced 11 fumbles to help the Saints finish with a plus-two turnover differential. In Week 15, the Saints defeated Tampa Bay, 41-0, earning their first shutout victory since 1995.

After leaving New Orleans, Spagnuolo spent two seasons on the coaching staff of the Baltimore Ravens, in 2013 as a senior defensive assistant, and the following year as an assistant head coach and secondary coach. Baltimore finished the 2014 season ranked eighth in the NFL in yards allowed (336.9 per game) and sixth in points allowed (16.9).

Prior to his first stint with the Giants, Spagnuolo spent eight seasons with the Eagles, five working with the defensive backs, and the last three as the club's linebackers coach. While he was in that role, middle linebacker Jeremiah Trotter was selected to two Pro Bowl berths. In

2005, Trotter led the Eagles with 169 tackles, including 13 for a loss. That season, Philadelphia led the NFL with 60 tackles for a loss, including 25 by the linebackers.

Spagnuolo spent his entire tenure in Philadelphia working under the team's highly-respected defensive coordinator, the late Jim Johnson. During six of his eight seasons with the Eagles, Spagnuolo coached a player who earned Pro Bowl honors.

The Eagles' defense was one of the NFL's best in those eight seasons. In a six-year period from 1999-2005, Philadelphia's defense ranked first in the NFL in opposing third down percentage (33 percent), second in points allowed (17.0 per game), second in sacks (265) and third in red zone defense (43.3 percent). During this period, the Eagles played in four consecutive NFC Championship Games and one Super Bowl. In 2001, the Eagles' defense allowed no more than 21 points in all 16 regular season games, just the fourth time in league history that was accomplished.

Spagnuolo originally joined the Eagles coaching staff in 1999 as a defensive assistant/quality control coach working specifically with the team's safeties. Two years later, he was promoted to defensive backs coach, where he spent three seasons tutoring Pro Bowlers Brian Dawkins, Bobby Taylor, Troy Vincent, Lito Sheppard and Michael Lewis. In those three seasons, the Eagles pass defense ranked in the NFL's top 10 in three key statistical categories: third-down defense, touchdown passes allowed and net yards per pass attempt.

Prior to joining the Eagles, Spagnuolo coached 15 seasons in college football and two years in NFL Europe. He spent the 1998 season as the defensive coordinator of NFL Europe's Frankfurt Galaxy, who finished second

in the league in total defense en route to a World Bowl appearance. Four of the six linebackers and nine of the 11 defensive starters he tutored went on to play in the NFL. Spagnuolo also served as the defensive line and special teams coach of the Barcelona Dragons in 1992.

A native of Grafton, Mass. Spagnuolo has served as a defensive coordinator on the college level with the University of Connecticut and University of Maine. In addition, he served as assistant coach at the University of Massachusetts, Lafayette College, Rutgers University and Bowling Green University.

Prior to his stint at Maine, Spagnuolo spent four months as a scout for the San Diego Chargers under then-general manager Bobby Beathard. His first NFL experience came in 1983 as an intern with the Washington Redskins under then-assistant general manager Charlie Casserly.

Spagnuolo was a two-year starter at wide receiver for head coach Howard Vandersea at Springfield College, where he was named the school's Male Scholar Athlete of the Year in 1982. He earned a bachelor's degree in physical education from Springfield and a master's degree in sports management from the University of Massachusetts.

Spagnuolo was born in Whitinsville, Mass. He attended Grafton High School, where he is a member of the school's athletic Hall of Fame.

Spagnuolo is married to Maria. They engage in community outreach through The Spagnuolo Foundation, whose mission is centered on the biblical verse Hebrews 11:1 ("Now faith is confidence in what we hope for and assurance about what we do not see.") and is designed to give hope to youth who otherwise may not have the opportunity to pursue and achieve their dreams.

TOM QUINN

SPECIAL TEAMS COORDINATOR

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Tom Quinn is in his 12th season with the Giants and his 11th as the team's special teams coordinator. He spent his first year with the team

as an assistant to Mike Sweatman, who retired following the 2006 season.

In 2016, the 11-5 Giants received significant contributions from several of Quinn's special teams players.

Kickers Josh Brown and Robbie Gould combined to make 21 of 22 field goal attempts, a team-record 95.5 percent success rate. The previous mark of 93.8 percent was set in 2015.

Gould joined the team on Oct. 20 and made all 10 of his field goal attempts in the regular season, increasing his streak to 17 in a row dating back to 2015, when he played for the Chicago Bears. He also hit both of his field goal attempts (from 26 and 40 yards) in the NFC Wild Card Game in Green Bay to improve to a perfect 12 for 12 with the Giants and 8-8 in his postseason career.

In his second season with the Giants, Brad Wing punted 93 times for a 40.9-yard net average that was a single-season Giants record. He broke the former mark of 40.2 yards, set by Jeff Feagles in 2008.

The Giants' net punting average of 40.9 yards was their highest since it became an official statistic in 1976.

Wing was named the NFC Special Teams Player of the Week for Weeks 14 and 15 for his outstanding play in victories vs. Dallas and Detroit. He was the first Giants player to win back-to-back Special Teams Player of the Week awards since they were instituted in 1984.

In a 10-7 victory against the Cowboys, Wing tied his season high with 9 punts and had a 43.2-yard gross average and a 42.9-yard net average, with a long punt of 57 yards. Five of his kicks were downed inside the 20-yard line. Dallas totaled 3 yards on 3 punt returns.

One week later, in a 17-6 victory vs. the Lions, Wing was honored again after he had a 41.0-yard net average on seven punts, including one that was partially blocked and travelled only 18 yards. With the Lions trying to mount a comeback in the second half, Wing booted three consecutive punts that forced them to take possession at their own three, four, and 19-yard lines. Detroit totaled just 11 punt return yards, and scored 3 points on 7 possessions following Wing's punts.

Dayne Harris was selected to his first Pro Bowl after leading the Giants in kickoff and punt returns for the second straight season. He finished fifth in the NFL with a 24.2-yard average on 22 kickoff returns, and he averaged 5.9 yards on 29 punt returns.

In two seasons with the Giants, Harris has a 26.5-yard average on 44 kickoff returns. That places him fourth on the franchise's career list (minimum 40 returns), behind Rocky Thompson (27.2), Joe Scott (27.2), and David Wilson (26.6).

Harris and long-snapper Zak DeOssie tied for the team lead with 7 special teams tackles.

The Giants blocked two field goal attempts in 2016. Pro Bowl cornerback Janoris Jenkins was named NFC Special Teams Player of the Week for his game-turning play in a victory against New Orleans on Sept. 18, when Johnathan Hankins blocked a 38-yard try by New Orleans' Wil Lutz. Jenkins picked up the ball and returned it 65 yards for a touchdown. Jason Pierre-Paul blocked Caleb Sturgis' 40-yard field goal attempt with 1:07 remaining in the second quarter vs. Philadelphia on Nov. 6.

In 2015, Quinn's units finished second in the Dallas Morning News' annual comprehensive ranking of the NFL's special teams. The Giants were seventh in the league with a 10.2-yard punt return average, and 10th with a 24.9-yard kickoff return average. They were fifth in the NFL in kickoff coverage, allowing just 20.3 yards per return.

In his first season with the Giants, Harris finished third in the NFL with a 28.7-yard average on 22 kickoff returns, including a 100-yard runback vs. Dallas on Oct. 25. Harris was seventh in the NFL with a 10.0-yard average on 34 punt returns, including an 80-yard touchdown against the Jets. Harris was the third player in Giants history with kickoff and punt return touchdowns in the same season, and the first to do it since 1955.

Brown played in his first Pro Bowl after scoring 134 points, the highest total of his 14-year career. Brown made 30 of 32 field goal attempts in 2015, a franchise-record 93.8 percent success rate.

Wing, obtained in a trade with Pittsburgh prior to the season, placed 33 kicks inside the 20-yard line, tying the team record set by Brad Maynard in 1997 and 1998.

In 2014, the Giants' kickoff coverage team ranked second in the NFL, holding opponents to an average return of just 18.3 yard. Brown made 24 of 26 field goal attempts, a 92.3 percent success rate that was the highest in Giants history until he topped it last season.

Quinn's special teams finished seventh in the Dallas Morning News' rankings in 2012. That season, the Giants led the NFL with 5 special teams takeaways. Their average drive start following a kickoff was at the 25.2 yard line, which led the NFL. Rookie David Wilson set a franchise record with 1,533 kickoff return yards.

Quinn's special teams underwent significant changes in the Giants' 2011 championship season. Steve Weatherford became the team's punter. Aaron Ross was the most frequently-used punt returner and Devin Thomas and rookies Da'Rel Scott and Jerrel Jernigan combined for 47 kickoff returns. The three leading special teams tacklers — rookies Jacquian Williams (17) and Tyler Sash (15) and veteran Derrick Martin (12) — were newcomers.

In 2010, Zak DeOssie, the snapper on both punts and placekicks, was selected to his second Pro Bowl in three seasons. The Giants' kickoff coverage unit was ranked fourth in the NFL, allowing an average return of only 19.7 yards.

The Giants benefited from outstanding play by Quinn's special teams in 2009. Lawrence Tynes led the Giants and was fifth in the NFL in scoring with 126 points. With Domenik Hixon doing the bulk of the work, the Giants were seventh in the NFL with a 10.9-yard punt return average. On Oct. 18 at New Orleans, Hixon had 303 total yards, shattering Joe Scott's 61-year-old franchise record by 24 yards. The total included 230 kickoff return and 51 punt return yards. Opposing teams averaged only 21.0 yards per kickoff return, the NFL's eighth-best figure.

In 2008, three of the Giants' special teams players — kicker John Carney, Feagles and DeOssie — played for the NFC Pro Bowl team.

Carney was signed just prior to the season because Tynes was sidelined with an injury. Quinn quickly integrated Carney into the kicking unit and the veteran succeeded on 35 of 38 field goals attempts (92.1 percent). Carney's 35 field goals tied the team single-season record, which he shares with Ali Haji-Sheikh (1983) and Jay Feely (2005).

That season, Feagles had a gross average of 44.0 yards and a career-high net average of 40.2 yards on 64 punts. The Giants allowed only 140 punt return yards all season and were ranked third in the NFL in punt coverage, giving up an average of only 5.9 yards a return.

The special teams overcame adversity and performed well in Quinn's first season as coordinator in 2007, when the Giants won Super Bowl XLII. Long-snapper Ryan Kuehl suffered a season-ending injury in training camp, and the Giants used rookie snappers Jay Alford (on placekicks) and DeOssie (for punts) the entire year. Tynes made 23 of 27 field goal attempts (85.2 percent), plus a game-winning 47-yarder in overtime in the NFC Championship Game in Green Bay.

Quinn employed three kickoff returners — Ahmad Bradshaw, Reuben Droughns and Hixon — and the Giants finished seventh in the NFL with a 23.9-yard average. The coverage teams were also strong; Giants opponents averaged only 6.2 yards on 28 punt returns.

Quinn, 49, coached in the collegiate ranks for 15 years before joining the Giants.

He grew up in Southern California, where he played at Foothill High School in Tustin. From 1986-90, Quinn was a linebacker at the University of Arizona, where he played on three bowl teams. He earned a bachelor's degree in interdisciplinary studies in 1990 and a master's in education the following year.

Quinn and his wife, Alison, have a son, Shane, and two daughters, Logan and Riley.

Bobby Blick is in his first season as the Giants' defensive assistant. He succeeds Rob Leonard, who is now the team's assistant defensive line coach.

In 2016, Blick was on the Army West Point Football staff as director of player personnel.

Prior to his arrival at West Point, Blick served as special teams coordinator and director of recruiting at Samford University in Birmingham, Ala.

As special teams coordinator in 2015, Blick was a part of outstanding kickoff and kickoff return units that finished first in the Southern Conference. The kickoff return team was fifth in the nation. Blick's punt and punt return units finished third in the conference.

Samford signed the Southern Conference's top-ranked recruiting class in 2016, when Blick was the school's director of recruiting.

In his first season at Samford in 2014, Blick coached

the tight ends and slot receivers.

Blick went to Samford from Georgia Tech, where he served as the special teams quality control coach during the spring of 2014.

Prior to working at Georgia Tech, Blick coached at Elon University, working with the team's tight ends and running backs from 2011-13.

Blick was an offensive graduate assistant at North Carolina State from 2008-10. During his tenure there, the Wolfpack made two bowl appearances, including a 23-7 win over West Virginia University in the 2010 Champs Sports Bowl. That season, NC State ranked third in the Atlantic Coast Conference in scoring offense, averaging 31.8 points per game, and was fourth in total offense, averaging 338.5 yards per outing. Blick was also an undergraduate assistant at NC State from 2004 to 2007.

Blick graduated from NC State in 2007 with a degree in political science and a concentration in secondary education.

QUARTERBACKS



Frank Cignetti is in his second season as the Giants' quarterbacks coach, his 10th season in the NFL, and his 29th year in coaching.

In 2016, Eli Manning's strong performance was a major reason the Giants finished 11-5, a six-game improvement over the previous season.

Manning completed 377 of 598 passes (63.0 percent) for 4,017 yards, 26 touchdowns, 16 interceptions, and a passer rating of 86.0. He exceeded 4,000 passing yards for the third consecutive season, and the sixth time in his career. Manning's 63.0 completion percentage was slightly less than his career-best of 63.1, set in 2014.

Manning joined Cincinnati's Andy Dalton and Detroit's Matthew Stafford as the only quarterbacks to throw every one of their team's passes in 2016.

In a 17-6 victory against Detroit on Dec. 18, Manning completed his first 11 passes, a career-high to start a game. He had previously completed his first 10 passes on two occasions: Nov. 13, 2011 at San Francisco, and Oct. 19, 2015 at Philadelphia.

Cignetti was the St. Louis Rams' offensive coordinator in 2015. The Rams ranked seventh in the NFL in rushing yards, averaging 122.3 yards a game. Todd Gurley, the team's first-round draft choice that year, developed quickly and finished third in the league with 1,106 rushing yards. He averaged 4.8 yards a carry, and his 10 rushing touchdowns tied for the NFL's second-highest total.

From 2012-14, Cignetti was the Rams' quarterbacks coach. In his final season in that role, he integrated Austin Davis and Shaun Hill into starting roles after Sam Bradford suffered a season-ending torn left ACL in a preseason game. It was the same injury he had suffered the previous year. The duo of Davis and Hill combined for 3,658 passing yards and 20 touchdowns and completed 63.4 percent of their passes, the sixth-highest single season percentage in franchise history.

In 2013, Bradford was enjoying the best season of his career under Cignetti before the torn knee ligament ended it after just seven games. When he suffered his injury, Bradford ranked eighth in the NFL in completions (159) and was tied for fifth in the NFL with 14 touchdown passes. Bradford's 90.9 passer rating was his highest through seven games in his career. Under Cignetti's watch, Kellen Clemens started the final nine games of that season and set career highs in touchdown passes, yards and completions.

In Cignetti's first season working with Bradford, then in his third year, the quarterback threw for 3,702 yards and a career-best 21 touchdown passes.

Cignetti spent the 2011 season as the offensive coordinator at Rutgers. That season, the Scarlet Knights averaged 26.4 points per game, fourth most in the Big East,

and Rutgers ranked third in the conference in passing offense. Mohamed Sanu set a Big East single-season reception record with 115 catches for 1,206 yards.

Cignetti previously served as the offensive coordinator and quarterbacks coach for two seasons at the University of Pittsburgh. In his first season as the Panthers' play caller, they averaged 32.1 points per game, one of the top five figures in school history. Pitt's offensive arsenal included a 1,700-yard rusher in Dion Lewis, and a 1,000-yard receiver in Jon Baldwin. In addition, Bill Stull ranked among the nation's most efficient passers, throwing for more than 2,600 yards and 21 touchdowns.

In 2008, Cignetti was the offensive coordinator and quarterbacks coach at the University of California. The Bears averaged nearly 33 points per game and finished 9-4, including a victory over Miami in the Emerald Bowl. Running backs Jahvid Best and Shane Vereen combined for 2,295 rushing yards. The previous season, Cignetti was the San Francisco 49ers' quarterbacks coach.

Prior to joining the 49ers, Cignetti was the offensive coordinator at North Carolina University (2006) and Fresno State University (2002-05). In 2004, Fresno State averaged 52.8 points over its final six games and became just the sixth team in NCAA history to score 50 or more points in four consecutive games. The Bulldogs twice finished among the nation's top 10 in scoring and third-down conversions during Cignetti's tenure.

Cignetti was the quarterbacks coach of the New Orleans Saints in 2000-01, when he helped Jeff Blake to a career-best passer rating and Aaron Brooks produce some of the best statistics of his career.

Cignetti entered the NFL in 1999 as a quality control assistant with the Kansas City Chiefs.

From 1990-98, Cignetti was on his father's staff at Indiana University of Pennsylvania, his alma mater (and that of Giants head coach Ben McDoo). He served IUP as receivers, secondary and quarterbacks coach before becoming offensive coordinator his final two seasons. During his tenure, IUP twice advanced to the NCAA Division II national title game and earned a berth in the semifinals four times.

Cignetti began his coaching career as a graduate assistant under head coach Mike Gottfried at the University of Pittsburgh in 1989.

At IUP, Cignetti was an all-conference safety before earning his bachelor's degree in 1988. His father, Frank Sr., was a Pitt assistant from 1966-68 and later the head coach at both West Virginia (1976-79) and IUP (1986-2005). In 2013, Frank Sr. was elected to the College Football Hall of Fame.

Cignetti is a Pittsburgh native. He and his wife, Ellen, have one son, Frankie, and three daughters, Alyssa, Gabrielle and Ella.

Joe Danos is in his fifth season as performance manager and strength and conditioning assistant on the Giants' coaching staff.

Danos came to the Giants from Florida State University, where he spent three seasons as an assistant strength and conditioning coach with the football team. Danos joined the Seminoles' staff in January 2010, following head strength and conditioning coach Vic Vitoria from Southern Methodist University, where he spent the previous three years (2007-09) serving as his top assistant.

Prior to his SMU stint, Danos spent two years as an assistant strength coach at Louisiana State University, working with football and several Olympic sports under

the direction of Tom Moffitt. A graduate of LSU with a degree in kinesiology, Danos worked as a student assistant strength and conditioning coach with the Tigers from 2000-04.

Danos also worked for five years as an assistant weightlifting coach to Gayle Hatch, the 2004 USA head Olympic weightlifting coach. Before joining Hatch's staff, Danos competed on the national level for the Gayle Hatch Weightlifting Team in Baton Rouge, where he was a two-time national champion. Danos won the 1996 National Junior Championship and the 1996 AAU Junior Olympic Championship.

Danos grew up in New Orleans, where he attended John Curtis Christian High School.

KEVIN M. GILBRIDE

TIGHT ENDS



Kevin M. Gilbride is in his fourth season as the Giants' tight ends coach and his eighth as a member of the team's coaching staff.

Gilbride has demonstrated an ability to develop players who were selected late in the NFL Draft, or signed as undrafted free agents. In 2016, Will Tye, a second-year undrafted pro from Stony Brook, emerged as the Giants' most consistent tight end. He played in all 16 games with 11 starts, including each of the last 10 games, and finished third on the team with 48 receptions, which gained 395 yards, and included a nine-yard touchdown catch vs. Chicago on Nov. 20. It was the third season in a row an undrafted player led the tight ends in receptions.

Tye's 51-yard reception in the NFC Wild Card in Green Bay was the longest ever by a Giants tight end in a postseason game. The previous long was a 46-yarder by Kevin Boss in Super Bowl XLII on Feb. 3, 2008.

Rookie Jerrell Adams, a sixth-round draft choice in 2016, played in 13 games and caught 16 passes for 122 yards, including a 10-yard touchdown against the Bengals on Nov. 21. He was the third Giants rookie to catch a touchdown pass, joining wide receivers Sterling Shepard and Roger Lewis, Jr. The Giants and Tennessee Titans were only team to have three rookies catch touchdown passes in 2016.

In 2015, Tye began the season on the practice squad. He joined the roster on Oct. 3, and finished fourth on the team with 42 catches for 464 yards, and three touchdowns. Tye led all NFL rookie tight ends in catches and receiving yards, and was tied for the lead in touchdown receptions.

The previous season, Gilbride helped turn a largely anonymous group of tight ends into a productive unit. Larry Donnell finished third on the team with 63 receptions and 623 yards and second with 6 touchdown catches. He entered the season with three receptions and no scores.

On Sept. 25, 2014 at Washington, Donnell caught 7 passes for 54 yards, including touchdown receptions of five, six, and six yards, the latter two in the second quarter. Donnell was the first Giants tight end with 3 touchdown receptions in a game since Dec. 16, 1962, when Joe Walton caught scoring passes of 10, 20 and eight yards from Y.A. Tittle in 41-31 victory over the Dallas Cowboys.

In 2013, Gilbride completed a two-year stint as the Giants' wide receivers coach.

That year, Victor Cruz continued to be one of the NFL's most productive receivers, catching 73 passes for 998 yards and 4 touchdowns, despite missing the final two games with a knee injury. In the season opener in Dallas on Sept. 8, Cruz (118 yards), Hakeem Nicks (114) and Rueben Randle (101) each had at least 100 receiving yards, the first time in franchise history that three different players exceeded the century mark in the same game. Jerrel Jernigan came on at the end of the season and finished

with 29 receptions for 329 yards and two touchdowns and two rushing attempts for 57 yards, including a 49-yard score.

In Gilbride's first year coaching the receivers in 2012, Cruz led the Giants with 86 receptions for 1,092 yards and 10 touchdowns and became just the second Giants wide-out since 1968 to play in the Pro Bowl. Cruz's 86 catches placed him seventh in the NFC and 12th in the NFL and his 1,092 yards were 10th in the conference and 15th in the league. He was one of 10 NFL players with at least 10 touchdown catches.

In 2011, Gilbride held the title of offensive assistant. He joined the coaching staff in 2010 as the team's offensive quality control coach.

Gilbride is the son of former Giants offensive coordinator Kevin Gilbride, who retired after the 2013 season. Prior to joining the Giants, he spent three seasons as the wide receivers coach at Temple University. In 2009, Gilbride was a member of the Temple coaching staff that led the Owls to a 9-4 record - their first winning record since 1990 - and their first bowl game since 1979, the EagleBank Bowl in Washington.

The previous season, Gilbride coached Bruce Francis, who earned the Owls' offensive most valuable player award. Francis, who was an All-MAC selection, became Temple's Division I-A career leader in receiving touchdowns (23). The Owls' leading receiver with 687 yards on 45 catches for a Division I-A school record 13 touchdowns, Francis finished his collegiate career with a reception in a school record 38 consecutive games.

Before his stint at Temple, Gilbride coached the slot receivers and tight ends at Georgetown University in 2006. He also headed the kickoff coverage unit and assisted on punt, kickoff return and punt block. He recruited in Pennsylvania, West Virginia, Florida and Delaware for the Hoyas.

Gilbride was an offensive graduate assistant coach at Syracuse University for two seasons (2004-05), working closely with the tight ends in 2005. The Orange captured a share of the Big East title in 2004 and earned a berth in the Champs Sports Bowl. Gilbride first joined the SU staff as a graduate assistant for video in 2003 before then head coach Paul Pasqualoni moved him into a coaching role.

Gilbride, 37, graduated from the University of Hawaii in 2003 with a bachelor's degree in speech communications. He was a backup quarterback and played on special teams for the Warriors in 2000 after sitting out the 1999 season following his transfer from Brigham Young. He also earned four letters as a baseball player at Hawaii, playing outfield, first base and designated hitter. As a senior, he batted .308, had a .413 on base percentage and did not commit an error.

PATRICK GRAHAM

DEFENSIVE LINE



Patrick Graham is in his second season coaching the Giants' defensive line, his ninth season in the NFL, and his 16th year in coaching.

In 2016, Graham's linemen helped the Giants' defense become the NFL's most improved unit, one that allowed 158 fewer points and 1,290 fewer yards than the previous season. The linemen accounted for 23 of the Giants' 35 sacks, which was 12 more sacks than the team had in 2015.

In his first season with the Giants, defensive tackle Damon Harrison started all 16 regular-season games, plus the NFC Wild Card Game in Green Bay, and finished third on the team with a career-high 86 tackles (55 solo), and a career-best 2.5 sacks. Harrison and safety Landon Collins were the Giants' first AP first-team All-Pros since Jason Pierre-Paul in 2011.

Defensive tackle Johnathan Hankins also started every game and had 43 tackles (29 solo), 3.0 sacks, and a forced fumble.

Defensive End Olivier Vernon — like Harrison, a 2016 free agent acquisition — started all 17 games and led the Giants with 8.5 sacks, the second-highest total of his five-year career. Vernon had at least one sack in five consecutive games from Nov. 6-Dec. 4, and had 7.0 sacks in those contests.

Jason Pierre-Paul started the first 12 games of the season before missing the final four and the Giants' postseason game after undergoing surgery to repair a core muscle injury that he suffered at Pittsburgh (12/4). He finished second on the team with 7.0 sacks. JPP was named the NFC Defensive Player of the Week for his performance at Cleveland on Nov. 27, when had a career-high 3.0 sacks and caught a ball Josh McCown had fumbled in midair — after it was forced by Hankins — and returned it 43 yards for his third career touchdown.

Rookie free agent Romeo Okwara played in all 17 games, with five starts at left defensive end, including the NFC Wild Card Game in Green Bay. He finished the regular season with 21 tackles (nine solo), including a sack. Okwara made his first start vs Dallas on Dec. 11, and was the first rookie free agent defensive lineman to start a game for the Giants since Damane Duckett on Jan. 2, 2005. Okwara had a team and season-high eight tackles (three solo), deflected a pass, and registered his first career sack when he tackled Dak Prescott for a five-yard loss in the second quarter. He

was the first Giants player to record a sack in his initial career start since Pierre-Paul and Dave Tollefson both did it on Sept. 11, 2011 at Washington.

Before joining the Giants, Graham spent seven seasons with the New England Patriots, including three as the team's linebackers coach, and two as the defensive line coach.

Graham coached the Patriots' linebackers in 2011, and in 2014-15. In his final season with New England, the linebackers were key performers on a defense that ranked ninth in the NFL. Jamie Collins led the team with 89 tackles (51 solo), and contributed 5.5 sacks. Dont'a Hightower had 61 tackles (51 solo) and 3.5 sacks. Jerod Mayo had 47 tackles (35 solo).

In 2014, Graham's positional group lost a team captain for the second consecutive season when Mayo tore his patellar tendon. Graham guided Hightower and Collins to breakout seasons, and each player played a pivotal role as the Patriots won Super Bowl XLIX.

Graham finished a two-year stint coaching the Patriots' defensive line in 2013, when tackle Vince Wilfork was lost early in the year with a torn Achilles tendon.

In Graham's first three seasons as a position coach, the Patriots defense helped the club lead the NFL in turnover differential in 2010 and 2012 and finish first in the AFC in 2011.

Graham was a defensive assistant coach in 2010, and a coaching assistant in 2009. He joined the Patriots after two seasons as a graduate assistant at Notre Dame (2007-08), where he worked with the defense. Graham previously spent three seasons coaching at Richmond; one as assistant defensive line coach (2004), and two as tight ends coach (2005-06).

Prior to coaching at Richmond, Graham spent two seasons as a graduate assistant at Wagner College (2002-03).

Graham was a defensive lineman at Yale, where he earned a bachelor's degree in sociology in 2001 — with a concentration of studies in economics and African American studies. A decorated student athlete, Graham earned the Jackie Robinson Foundation Scholarship, Yale University Scholarship, Yankee Gas Scholarship and the State Heisman Trophy.

Graham, 38, is married to Pamela. They have two children, Morgan and Silas.

ADAM HENRY

WIDE RECEIVERS



Adam Henry is in his second season as the Giants' wide receivers coach, his eighth season in the NFL, and his 20th season in coaching.

Henry's wide receivers were productive throughout the 2016 season. For the third time in as many seasons, Odell Beckham, Jr. led the Giants in receptions, receiving yards, and touchdown catches, and was selected to the Pro Bowl. Beckham, who played all 16 games for the first time, finished with 101 catches. That was the third-highest total in the NFL and the second-highest total in Giants' history, behind Steve Smith's 107 receptions in 2009. Beckham's 1,367 receiving yards were also third in the league, the second-highest total of his career, and the third-highest in Giants history. Beckham had 10 touchdown receptions, which placed him fifth in the NFL (two receivers had 14 and two had 12).

Rookie Sterling Shepard, the Giants' second-round draft choice in 2016, finished second on the team with 65 catches for 683 yards and eight touchdowns. Shepard's 65 receptions placed him second among NFL rookies behind New Orleans' Michael Thomas, who had 92, and was the third-highest total by a rookie in Giants history.

Rookie free agent Roger Lewis, Jr. played in each of the final 13 regular-season games with one start, and had seven receptions for 97 yards, and two touchdowns. With Shepard and Lewis, the Giants joined the Jets as the only NFL teams to have multiple rookie wide receivers with two or more touchdown catches.

Henry was the San Francisco 49ers' wide receivers coach in 2015. Veteran Anquan Boldin had an outstanding season under Henry, finishing with 69 catches for 789 yards, and four touchdowns.

Prior to his season in San Francisco, Henry spent three years (2012-14) as the wide receivers coach at Louisiana State University, where he helped develop two of the most successful receivers in school history, Beckham and Jarvis Landry. Both receivers finished their LSU careers ranked among the top-10 in school history in receptions (Beckham 143, Landry 137) and 100-yard games (Beckham 7th, Landry 6th).

In 2014, LSU averaged an SEC-best 15.35 yards per completion. Redshirt sophomore Travin Dural finished the season ranked sixth in the SEC in receiving yards (758) and tied for seventh in receiving touchdowns (seven). Dural's 20.5 yards per reception average was best in the conference among players with at least 35 catches.

The previous season, Beckham and Landry became the first pair of receivers in school history to finish with more than 1,000 yards in the same season. Landry led the Tigers with 77 receptions for 1,193 yards and 10 touchdowns, while Beckham caught 59 passes for 1,152 yards and eight touchdowns. Beckham earned first-team All-America honors as a kick returner and an all-purpose player in 2013, and was the recipient of the 2013 Hornung Award as college football's most versatile player.

After the season, three of Henry's receivers were drafted by NFL teams: Beckham (first round, 12th overall to the Giants), Landry (second round, 63rd overall to Miami), and James Wright (seventh round, 239th overall to Cincinnati). LSU was the only school in the country to have three wide receivers selected during the 2014 NFL draft.

In his first year with the Tigers in 2012, Henry's receiving unit featured four underclassmen and was led by sophomores Beckham and Landry, who combined for 99 receptions for 1,286 yards and seven touchdowns.

Prior to joining LSU, Henry spent five seasons as an assistant coach with the Oakland Raiders. Following two seasons as an offensive quality control coach (2007-08), Henry coached Oakland's tight ends for three years (2009-11). During that time, Henry helped accelerate the development of Zach Miller, who became the first tight end in franchise history to lead the team in receiving for three straight years. Miller set career highs in receptions (66) and receiving yards (805) in 2009, and was selected to the Pro Bowl for the first time the following season, in 2010.

Henry joined the Raiders after 10 years at his alma mater, McNeese State University. He spent his first nine seasons as the wide receivers coach before being promoted to assistant head coach/offensive coordinator in 2006. As the wide receivers coach, Henry helped develop Jermaine Martin, who finished his career as the school's all-time leader in receptions (160) and receiving yards (2,646), as well as B.J. Sams, the 2003 Southland Conference Player of the Year.

Henry was a wide receiver at McNeese State from 1990-93, earning All-Southland Conference honors as a senior. He finished his career with 93 receptions for 1,690 yards and 16 touchdowns, all of which remain in the top-10 in school history. Following his career at McNeese State, Henry signed a free agent contract with the New Orleans Saints in 1994.

A native of Beaumont, Texas, Henry graduated from McNeese State in 1998 and received a master's degree in education in 2001. Henry has three children, Darian, Kynidee and Ava.

CRAIG JOHNSON

RUNNING BACKS



Craig Johnson is in his fourth season as the Giants' running backs coach, his 18th season coaching in the NFL, and his

35th season as a football coach.

In 2016, Johnson coached a group that included three veterans who missed time with injuries, as well as a promising rookie.

Despite sitting out three early-season games with a thumb injury, Rashad Jennings led the Giants with 181 rushing attempts for 593 yards, and three touchdowns. Shane Vereen twice tore his triceps and played in only five games. He had 158 rushing yards and 11 catches. Orleans Darkwa was placed on injured reserve after 10 games with a leg injury. He was second on the team with two rushing touchdowns.

Paul Perkins, the Giants' fifth-round draft choice in 2016, was second on the team with 112 carries for 456 yards. Perkins had personal season-high rushing totals in each of the last five games: 38 yards at Pittsburgh, 45 vs. Dallas, 56 vs. Detroit, 68 at Philadelphia, and 102 in Washington, where he also had a season-high 21 carries. Perkins made his first career start vs. the Redskins, and became the first Giants back to rush for at least 100 yards since Jennings ran for 170 yards in the 2015 season finale vs. the Eagles.

In 2015, Jennings and Vereen had career years under Johnson.

Jennings led the Giants with 195 carries for 863 yards (both career-high totals), and three touchdowns. Jennings' 863 yards were the highest total by a Giants back since Ahmad Bradshaw ran for 1,015 yards in 2012. Vereen was second on the team in rushing (260 yards on 61 carries), and receiving (59 catches for 494 yards and four touchdowns, all career-high totals).

In his first season with the Giants in 2014, Johnson welcomed two backfield newcomers, Jennings and rookie Andre Williams, who helped the team average 100.3 rushing yards a game, a 16.9-yard improvement over the team's output the previous season.

Williams played in all 16 games and led the Giants with 217 rushing attempts, 721 yards and seven touchdowns. He was the first rookie to lead the Giants in rushing since Joe Montgomery in 1999 with 348 yards. Williams' 721 yards are the highest total by a Giants rookie since Ron Dayne had 770 in 2000.

Despite missing five games with knee and ankle injuries, Jennings was second on the team with 639 yards and four touchdowns on 167 carries.

Prior to joining the Giants' staff, Johnson spent three seasons as the Minnesota Vikings' quarterbacks coach. In 2013, injuries led to three different quarterbacks starting at least one game for the Vikings, with both Matt Cassel and Christian Ponder playing in nine games. Cassel, in his first season with the Vikings, led the team with 1,807 passing yards, 11 touchdown passes and an 81.6 passer rating.

Ponder played the best football of his career during a four-game winning streak to close the 2012 season that

enabled Minnesota to earn an NFC Wild Card playoff berth with a 10-6 record.

In the regular-season finale that clinched a spot in the postseason, Ponder threw for three touchdowns and posted a career-high 120.2 passer rating in a victory over Green Bay. Ponder did not throw an interception in the final three games, completed at least 70 percent of his passes in five games, and had four games with a passer rating of 100.0 or better.

Johnson's first year with Minnesota in 2011 was also the rookie season for Ponder, the team's first-round draft choice that year. Under Johnson's tutelage, Ponder threw for 1,853 yards and 13 touchdowns in 11 games. Ponder also finished the season with eight touchdown passes and only one interception in the red zone, where he had a league-leading 114.3 passer rating.

Johnson was the Tennessee Titans' quarterbacks coach from 2002-09, when Steve McNair, Vince Young and Kerry Collins all had Pro Bowl seasons under his direction. McNair was the NFL's Co-Most Valuable Player (with Peyton Manning) in 2003 and Young was voted the 2006 NFL Offensive Rookie of the Year. In 2008, Collins was pressed into action after Young suffered an injury in the season opener and responded by completing 58.3 percent of his passes, leading the team to a 12-3 record as the starter and returning to the Pro Bowl. McNair earned Pro Bowl honors in 2000, 2003 and 2005.

During Johnson's tenure with Tennessee, the team won three AFC South titles and made the playoffs five times with three different starting quarterbacks. In 2010, Johnson was promoted to assistant head coach/running backs after a late-preseason staff shuffle. That year, Pro Bowler Chris Johnson ran for 1,364 yards and led the team with 44 catches.

In his first two years in Tennessee — 2000 and 2001 Johnson was the Titans' offensive quality control and quarterbacks coach.

Before joining the Titans staff, Johnson coached on the collegiate level for 17 years (1983-99) as a quarterbacks coach at the University of Maryland (1997-99), Northwestern University (1992-96), Virginia Military Institute (1989-91), and running backs coach at Rutgers University (1986-88) and Army (1985). Johnson was a graduate assistant in 1983 (University of Wyoming) and 1984 (University of Arkansas). He coached the Maryland quarterbacks and was the team's offensive coordinator in 1997-98. During his five seasons at Northwestern, Johnson helped the Wildcats win consecutive Big Ten titles for the first time in school history in 1995-96. The 1995 Wildcats posted the school's first winning season since 1971 and earned their first trip to the Rose Bowl since 1949. Johnson's pupil, QB Steve Schnur, was a first-team All-Big Ten honoree and the Big Ten Most Valuable Player runner-up in 1996.

Johnson came to Northwestern from VMI, where he was quarterbacks coach and offensive coordinator and helped the school lead the nation in rushing in 1991. Johnson coached the running backs at Rutgers for three seasons

after a one-year stint at Army as a part-time assistant working with the fullbacks. Johnson broke into coaching as a graduate assistant at his alma mater, Wyoming, in 1983.

Johnson and wife, Darlene, have two daughters, Shelby and Sydney.

ROB LEONARD

ASSISTANT DEFENSIVE LINE



Rob Leonard is in his fifth season on the Giants' coaching staff, and his first as the team's assistant defensive line coach. He spent the previous four seasons as a defensive assistant.

Leonard was part of a staff that coached the most-improved defense in the NFL. The unit allowed 158 fewer points and 1,290 fewer yards than it did in 2015. The Giants allowed an NFL-low 25 offensive touchdowns and surrendered less than 20 points eight times, their highest total since 2008, when they also did it eight times. They also had 35 sacks, or 12 more than they had in 2015.

In 2015, the Giants had 28 takeaways and a plus-seven turnover differential, one season after they had a minus-two differential. The 28 forced turnovers tied for the NFL's sixth-highest total.

The Giants finished the 2014 season with 47 sacks, 14 more than they had the previous year and their highest total since they had 48 in 2011. The Giants had at least one sack in all 16 games for the first time since 2007.

In Leonard's first year with the team, the defense ranked eighth in the league in total defense, allowing 332.3 yards a game, a significant improvement over the 2012 season, when the defense was ranked 31st, allowing 383.4 yards per game.

Leonard came to the Giants from North Carolina State, where he was a graduate assistant the previous three seasons.

Leonard began his coaching career in 2009 as a defensive assistant at Cardinal Gibbons High School in Raleigh, N.C.

Leonard played three seasons at NC State after playing the 2004 season at Division III Washington & Jefferson College. The following year, he walked on with the Wolfpack and earned a scholarship while redshirting. In 2006, Leonard played in all 12 games on special teams and was second on the team with 13 special teams stops. Leonard saw action from scrimmage in eight games at free safety and played on special teams in the other four contests in 2007. He ranked third on the team with 219 special teams snaps and second with 10 special teams tackles.

In 2008, the former walk-on was the Wolfpack's starting strongside linebacker and leading tackler with 95. His 801 snaps were the highest total on the team. Leonard tied for third in the ACC in fumbles recovered with three. He led the team with a season-high 13 tackles vs. Florida State and tied for the team lead with 11 against Miami. He got his first career interception, which he returned 23 yards, vs. North Carolina. Leonard was the recipient of the team's Mike Hardy Award, given to the player who plays beyond his capabilities.

Leonard was a four-year letterman at Moon High School in Moon Township, Pa. As a senior, he gained more than 1,500 all-purpose yards and scored 14 touchdowns. Leonard had a team-high seven interceptions and was a unanimous first-team all-conference selection after playing running back, defensive back, kick returner and punter. He was a second-team all-state cornerback.

Leonard and his wife, Anna, have two young sons, Bo and Luke.

BILL MCGOVERN

LINEBACKERS



Bill McGovern, who has more than three decades of coaching experience, is in his second season as the Giants' linebackers coach, and his fifth year in the NFL.

In 2016, the linebackers contributed significantly to the NFL's most-improved defense. Jonathan Casillas, voted the Giants' defensive captain by his teammates, played in all 17 games, including the NFC Wild Card Game. Casillas finished second on the team with 92 tackles (59 solo), while contributing 1.5 sacks, eight passes defended, and a forced fumble. Devon Kennard played in every game and had 58 tackles (38 solo).

McGovern integrated two first-year Giants who played every game, Keenan Robinson and Kelvin Sheppard, into the linebacker corps. Robinson finished fourth on the team with 79 tackles (52 solo), and had seven passes defended. Sheppard had 47 tackles (27 solo) and two passes defended.

Prior to joining the Giants, McGovern spent three seasons as the Philadelphia Eagles' outside linebackers coach. In 2015, starters Connor Barwin and Brandon Graham were two of Philadelphia's most productive and consistent defenders. Barwin started all 16 games and finished with 54 tackles (44 solo), including 7.0 sacks, the team's second-highest total. Graham played all 16 games and had 51 tackles (39 solo), and was right behind Barwin with 6.5 sacks.

In 2014, Barwin was the first Eagles linebacker selected to the Pro Bowl since 2005 (Jeremiah Trotter). Barwin earned second-team All-Pro honors with an NFC-leading 14.5 sacks.

McGovern joined the Eagles in 2013 after a 13-year stint — his second at the school — as Boston College's linebacker coach, including the last four as defensive coordinator. He coached two linebackers who were named

ACC Defensive Player of the Year: Mark Herzlich, who has played for the Giants since 2011, and Luke Kuechly, who was also the recipient of the Bronco Nagurski Trophy as the nation's top defensive player.

Under McGovern's guidance in 2010, Boston College led the nation in rushing defense (82.8 yards per game) and led the ACC in total defense (309.7 yards per game). Nationally, the unit ranked 13th in total defense, and 19th in scoring defense (19.5 points per game).

In 2009, McGovern's first season as coordinator, the Eagles' defense ranked second in the ACC, and 14th in the country, by allowing 103.2 rushing yards a game. That defense also ranked 19th in the nation in points allowed (19.8 per game).

McGovern arrived at Boston College in 2000 after spending the previous three seasons at the University of Pittsburgh as the defensive backs coach — a position he held at BC from 1994-96.

McGovern also coached on the collegiate level at the University of Massachusetts, University of Pennsylvania, and his alma mater, College of the Holy Cross, which was 11-0 when he was on the staff in 1991.

A four-year starter in the secondary at Holy Cross, McGovern set the single-season (11), and career (24) records for interceptions for Division I-AA at the time. As a senior captain, he was a consensus All-America. McGovern was elected to the Holy Cross Hall of Fame in 1996.

McGovern is one of nine children, including seven brothers, of Howard and Terry, who are both enshrined in the Hall of Fame at Bergen Catholic High School, where Bill was a star. The school is located about 20 minutes from MetLife Stadium. McGovern was elected to the Bergen County All-Century Football Team.

McGovern and his wife, Colleen, have three daughters: Amanda, Delaine, and Mackenzie.

DAVID MERRITT, SR.

SECONDARY/SAFETIES



David Merritt is in his 14th season on the Giants' coaching staff and his 12th as the team's secondary coach/safeties. He is the team's longest-tenured coach.

Merritt's safeties were important contributors to the Giants' much-improved defense in 2016.

Second-year pro Landon Collins, who has started every game since his arrival in 2015, was named first-team All-Pro and selected to his first Pro Bowl after leading the team in tackles for the second consecutive season, with 125 (100 solo). He also had five interceptions, four sacks, and 13 passes defended. Collins is the only player in NFL history to have 100 or more solo tackles, and at least 2.0 sacks, five interceptions, and 12 passes defended. His 125 tackles were the most by a safety in Giants history. Collins was a two-time NFC Defensive Player of the Week and the conference's Defensive Player of the Month in November.

For the second year in a row, a rookie under Merritt's tutelage became a starter. Andrew Adams, a free agent from Connecticut, was signed from the practice squad on Sept. 24, and played in the last 14 games, starting the last 13 at free safety. He finished the season with 45 tackles (31 solo), five passes defended, and 1 interception.

In 2015, Collins, the Giants' second-round draft choice was the team's first defensive rookie to start all 16 games since tackle Barry Cofield in 2006, and was the first Giants rookie safety to start every game. Collins led the Giants with 108 tackles (80 solo). He also had nine passes defended, and 1 interception.

The previous season, safeties Antrel Rolle and Quintin Demps ranked second and fifth, respectively, on the Giants in tackles. Rolle started every game at strong safety, while Demps (nine) and Stevie Brown (seven) split the starts at free safety. Demps led the team with four interceptions.

In 2013, Rolle led the Giants in tackles for the third straight season, finishing with 106 (85 solo). He was named AP second-team All-Pro and played in his third Pro Bowl. Merritt overcame the preseason loss of Brown (knee surgery) and molded a unit that helped the Giants finish eighth in the NFL in total defense and 10th against the pass.

The previous year, Rolle and Brown were two of the top performers on the Giants' defense. Rolle led the Giants with 104 tackles (85 solo). Brown intercepted eight passes, the most by a Giant since Willie Williams had 10 in 1968. His 307 interception return yards broke the former Giants' single-season record of 251, set by Hall of Famer Emlen Tunnell in 1949 and matched by Dick Lynch in 1963. Brown was twice selected NFC Defensive Player of the Week.

In 2011, the safeties were one of the most reliable and consistent units on the Super Bowl champion Giants. Rolle and Deon Grant played in all 20 regular season and postseason games - Rolle started every one - and Kenny Phillips missed only one. The three safeties were often on the field at the same time. Rolle led the team with 96 tackles and intercepted two passes, Phillips had 72 tackles and four picks and Grant had 58 tackles, an interception and a sack.

The safeties were the most improved unit on the team in 2010. Rolle and Grant - newcomers that year - teamed with Phillips (who missed most of the previous season after undergoing knee surgery) - to form a versatile and productive trio. Rolle started all 16 games, was the Giants' second-leading tackler with 100, and was voted to the NFC Pro Bowl team. Phillips started 15 games and had 88 tackles. Grant had eight starts and, like Rolle, was often deployed close to the line of scrimmage. He had 68 tackles. The Giants were ranked seventh in the NFL in total defense and ninth in pass defense that season.

In 2009, Merritt molded a functioning safety unit after Phillips was lost for the season following the second game because of knee surgery. Five different players started at safety for the Giants that year, including converted cornerback Aaron Ross. Despite the shuffling, the Giants were ranked 15th in the NFL in pass defense.

Merritt has demonstrated a knack for developing players who were not highly-touted entering the NFL. When the Giants won the NFC East title in 2008, the starting safeties were Michael Johnson, a seventh-round draft choice, and James Butler, who joined the team as an undrafted free agent. That season, Johnson and Butler tied for second on the team with 76 tackles apiece, and combined for five interceptions.

In the Giants' 2007 Super Bowl season, one of the team's best defensive players was free safety Gibril Wilson, who arrived as a fifth-round draft choice. Wilson led the club with 33 postseason tackles, was second with 96 regular season tackles, and was one of the top free agent safeties in 2008.

Merritt assumed his current position prior to the 2006 season. In 2005, he was the Giants' defensive assistant coach. The previous year, he had the additional title of quality control coach. Merritt was hired by Coughlin on Jan. 26, 2004 after spending three seasons with the Jets as a defensive assistant/linebackers coach.

Before joining the Jets, Merritt coached at the collegiate level for four seasons. In 1997, he was the outside linebackers coach at the University of Tennessee-Chattanooga. The following year, Merritt moved to the Virginia Military Institute, where he coached the defensive ends and outside linebackers for 1 season and the defensive line for two.

A linebacker, Merritt was drafted by the Miami Dolphins in 1993. He played for the Arizona Cardinals from 1993-96 and for the Rhein Fire in NFL Europe in 1997. Merritt was an All-ACC linebacker at North Carolina State in 1992, when he led the conference in tackles. He earned a bachelor's degree in political science from NC State.

In 2012, Merritt was a member of the inaugural class of the Millbrook (N.C.) High School Sports Hall of Fame.

Merritt and his wife, Yolonda, have three sons, David Jr., Devin and Dawson, and a daughter, Drayah. He also has an older daughter, Nkechi (Kiki), who lives in Atlanta.

PRATIK PATEL



DIRECTOR OF PERFORMANCE NUTRITION/ASSISTANT STRENGTH AND CONDITIONING

Patel came to the Giants from the University of Oregon, where he was the athletic department's director of sports nutrition since October 2014. Patel's job was to develop and direct the sports nutrition department and manage the daily nutrition needs for Oregon's football, baseball, and men's and women's golf teams along with overseeing his staff, student interns, and needs for the other 15 athletic teams and sports. Patel was able to improve the health and performance of Duck student athletes utilizing the most up-to-date evidenced based literature with cutting-edge science and technology. Patel also worked closely with athletic medicine, strength and conditioning, sports performance, and sports science as an integral piece providing the most comprehensive care for student athletes and promoting data driven decision making in the management of student athlete health and performance.

Prior to his arrival at Oregon, he acted as the sports dietitian to the Michigan State University athletic department serving 23 teams and 720 athletes with a heavy focus on football and men's and women's basketball.

Patel is originally from Shawnee, Kansas and went on to receive his undergraduate degree in dietetics and master's in kinesiology (with emphasis on high-intensity functional training and resistance training) from Kansas State University, where he also acted as the sports dietitian for the men's basketball team. He began his career in sports as an intern learning from staff at the Houston Texans, Kansas City Chiefs and Royals, and the University of Kansas.

Patel has worked with a diverse range of athletes and teams ranging from NFL, NBA, and PGA/LPGA athletes to Olympians to National Championship winners (teams and individual athletes) and a Heisman Trophy winner.

MARKUS PAUL

Markus Paul, a former NFL player who has won five Super Bowl rings as a coach in the league, is in his 11th season as the Giants' assistant strength and conditioning coach. Paul works closely with Aaron Wellman on the physical development of the Giants' players.

Paul was on the staff of the Super Bowl-winning Giants in 2007 and 2011 and won three Super Bowl rings with the New England Patriots in 2001, 2003 and 2004.

Prior to joining the Giants, Paul spent two seasons on the coaching staff of the Jets, in 2005 as the director of physical development and the following year as the head strength and conditioning coach.

Before his tenure with the Jets, Paul was the New England Patriots' assistant strength and conditioning coach, and director of player development. He worked under Mike Woicik, who has trained six Super Bowl championship teams.

Paul's first NFL coaching position was as the New Orleans Saints' assistant strength and conditioning coach in 1998-99.

A defensive back during his playing career, Paul was the Chicago Bears' fourth-round draft choice in 1989. He played with Chicago until 1993, when he appeared in eight games for the Bears and one for the Tampa Bay Buccaneers. Paul played in 71 games with 30 starts at strong or free safety. He intercepted seven passes, which he returned for a total of 100 yards.

A four-year starter at Syracuse University, Paul holds the school record with 19 career interceptions. As a senior in 1988, he was credited with 76 tackles and was named first-team All-America by The Sporting News and Football News. Paul earned a Bachelor of Science degree in retailing.

Paul was raised in Kissimmee, Fla. He has a son, Jaius, and a daughter, Tabitha.

RYAN ROEDER

OFFENSIVE ASSISTANT



Ryan Roeder is in his fifth season as the Giants' offensive assistant coach.

Roeder came to the Giants from Princeton University,

where he served as tight ends coach and directed the kickoff return and punt return units. In 2012, he helped tight end Mark Hayes earn All-Ivy League honors.

In 2009, Roeder coached the wide receivers at the University of Rhode Island, assisting Shawn Leonard in leading the Colonial Athletic Association in touchdown receptions and earning All-CAA League honors.

From 2006-08, Roeder was the offensive graduate assistant at Temple University. Prior to his position at Temple, he served as running backs coach at the University at Albany (2005) and assistant offensive line coach at the College of the Holy Cross (2004).

As a player, Roeder was named first-team All-Northeast Conference quarterback (2002) and served as team captain leading Albany to the 2002 NEC and Eastern College Athletic Conference championships. He passed for 1,366 yards as a senior with eight passing and eight rushing touchdowns. Roeder ranks third on the career passing list and fifth in total offense in the school's record books.

Roeder received his undergraduate degree in a dual major of communications and psychology in 2002, and earned a master's degree in educational administration from the University at Albany in 2009.

Roeder and his wife Megan have two daughters, Lucie (4) and Callie (2), and a son, Jack, born in April.

MIKE SOLARI

OFFENSIVE LINE



Forty-one year coaching veteran Mike Solari is in his 29th season in the NFL and his second as the Giants' offensive line coach. A line coach for

most of his career, Solari has also coached tight ends and special teams, and been an offensive coordinator.

In Solari's 18 seasons serving as an NFL team's primary offensive line coach, his players combined for 25 Pro Bowl appearances and at least one of his players was selected to the Pro Bowl in 15 of those seasons.

Last season, Solari's linemen allowed 22 sacks — five fewer than the Giants surrendered in 2015 — and the third-lowest total in the league after Oakland (18) and Pittsburgh (21).

Injuries forced Solari to use seven different starting offensive line combinations in 2016. The most common lineup, deployed in eight games, had Ereck Flowers and Bobby Hart at left and right tackle, respectively, and Justin Pugh and John Jerry at left and right guard, and Weston Richburg at center. Flowers, Richburg and Jerry started all 17 games. Marshall Newhouse started six games, three apiece at right tackle and left guard. Brett Jones and Adam Gettis each started one game.

Solari spent the 2015 season as the Green Bay Packers' assistant offensive line coach. From 2010-14, Solari coached the San Francisco 49ers' offensive line. During that period, he helped the 49ers rank fifth in the NFL in rushing (132.1 yards per game) and sixth in yards-per-carry (4.47). San Francisco finished among the NFL's top five rushing teams in each of Solari's final three seasons there.

During Solari's tenure with the 49ers, which included three consecutive NFC Championship Game appearances (2011-13) and a berth in Super Bowl XLVII, at least one of his linemen was selected to the Pro Bowl in four of his five seasons. Tackle Joe Staley earned Pro Bowl recognition four times (2011-14), while guard Mike Iupati was voted to play in the game three times (2012-14). In 2014, Solari's line helped the 49ers rank fourth in the NFL in rushing yards (136.0 yards a game), rushing average (4.63 yards a carry) and 10-yard runs (62).

In 2013, San Francisco ranked third in the NFL with 2,201 rushing yards, first in 20-yard runs (20) and fourth in rushing touchdowns (18). Staley was named second-team All-Pro by the Associated Press and was selected to his third straight Pro Bowl.

In 2012, San Francisco was one of just three teams to start the same five offensive linemen for every regular-season game, and each of the five starters was selected to the Pro Bowl as either a participant or an alternate. The 49ers ranked fourth in the league in rushing yards (2,491), and Solari's line earned the Madden Most Valuable Protectors Award.

Prior to joining the 49ers, Solari coached the offensive line for the Seattle Seahawks in 2008-09. Under Solari's direction, tackle Walter Jones was named to the Pro Bowl in 2008, Jones' 12th and final NFL season. Jones was inducted into the Pro Football Hall of Fame in 2014.

Solari was with the Kansas City Chiefs from 1997-2007, serving as the offensive line coach for his first nine seasons with the club (1997-2005) and as the offensive coordinator for the final two years (2006-07). He was one of just six assistant coaches in team history to record more than a decade of service with the franchise. In Solari's nine seasons tutoring the offensive line, the Chiefs ranked first in the NFL over that span in rushing touchdowns (191), fourth in rushing yards (126.8 yards per game), third in scoring (25.0 points per game) fifth in total offense (356.1 yards per game) and sixth in sacks allowed (278).

Solari's lines helped the Chiefs finish in the top five in the league in total offense in five consecutive seasons (2001-05), the only NFL club to accomplish that feat over that span, including No. 1 rankings in 2004 and 2005. At least one of Solari's linemen was named to the Pro Bowl in all nine of his seasons tutoring the group in Kansas City, including a trio of Pro Bowlers in 2004-05 in guards Will Shields and Brian Waters and tackle Willie Roaf. The Chiefs became the first club to accomplish that feat since Dallas had three linemen selected to the Pro Bowl each season from 1992-95.

Solari did his first stint on the 49ers' staff from 1992-96, when he served as the team's tight ends/assistant offensive line coach. He was instrumental in the development of tight end Brent Jones, who was named to the Pro Bowl in four consecutive seasons (1992-95) and earned second-team All-Pro recognition in 1993-94. During Solari's tenure, the 49ers played in three straight NFC Championship Games (1992-94), and defeated the San Diego Chargers in Super Bowl XXIX.

Solari coached on Gene Stallings' staff at the University of Alabama from 1990-91, tutoring the offensive line and helping the Crimson Tide to an 11-1 record and a No. 5 ranking in the final AP poll in 1991. Solari also worked on Stallings' staff with the Phoenix Cardinals in 1989, when he helped guide tackle Luis Sharpe to a Pro Bowl selection.

Solari began his NFL coaching career with the Dallas Cowboys in 1987, serving as assistant offensive line/special teams coach for two seasons.

Solari's coaching career began in 1977 at Mission Bay (Calif.) High, followed by stints at Mira Costa Junior College (1978) and U.S. International (1979). He helped lead Boise State University to the NCAA Division I-AA Championship in 1980 and also coached on the collegiate level at the University of Cincinnati (1981-82), University of Kansas (1983-85) and University of Pittsburgh (1986) before entering the NFL.

As a player, Solari was a two-time letterman as an offensive lineman (1975-76) at San Diego State University, where he was a teammate of former Chiefs head coach Herm Edwards and current Bears head coach John Fox. Solari began his collegiate career at the College of San Mateo (1973-74).

Solari, 62, was born in Daly City, Calif. He and his wife, Patti, have three children, Tamara, Stephanie and Michael.

DWAYNE STUKES

ASSISTANT SPECIAL TEAMS



Dwayne Stukes is in his second season as the Giants' assistant special teams coach.

The Giants had numerous standout special teams performances in 2016.

Kickers Josh Brown and Robbie Gould combined to make 21 of 22 field goal attempts, a team-record 95.5 percent success rate. The previous mark of 93.8 percent was set in 2015.

Gould joined the team on Oct. 20 and made all 10 of his field goal attempts in the regular season, increasing his streak of 17 in a row dating back to 2015, when he played for the Chicago Bears. He also hit both of his field goal attempts (from 26 and 40 yards) in the NFC Wild Card Game in Green Bay to improve to a perfect 12 for 12 with the Giants and eight for eight in his postseason career.

In his second season with the Giants, Brad Wing punted 93 times for a 40.9-yard net average that was a single-season Giants record. He broke the former mark of 40.2 yards, set by Jeff Feagles in 2008.

The Giants' net punting average of 40.9 yards was their highest since it became an official statistic in 1976.

Wing was named the NFC Special Teams Player of the Week for Weeks 14 and 15 for his outstanding play in victories vs. Dallas and Detroit. He was the first Giants player to win

back-to-back Special Teams Player of the Week awards since they were instituted in 1984.

In a 10-7 victory against the Cowboys, Wing tied his season high with nine punts and had a 43.2-yard gross average and a 42.9-yard net average, with a long punt of 57 yards. Five of his kicks were downed inside the 20-yard line. Dallas totaled 3 yards on 3 punt returns.

One week later, in a 17-6 victory vs. the Lions, Wing was honored again after he had a 41.0-yard net average on seven punts, including one that was partially blocked and travelled only 18 yards. With the Lions trying to mount a comeback in the second half, Wing booted three consecutive punts that forced them to take possession at their own three, four, and 19-yard lines. Detroit totaled just 11 punt return yards, and scored three points on seven possessions following Wing's punts.

Dwayne Harris was selected to his first Pro Bowl after leading the Giants in kickoff and punt returns for the second straight season. He finished fifth in the NFL with a 24.2-yard average on 22 kickoff returns, and he averaged 5.9 yards on 29 punt returns.

Harris and long-snapper Zak DeOssie tied for the team lead with 7 special teams tackles.

TIM WALTON

SECONDARY/CORNERBACKS



Tim Walton is in his third season as the Giants' secondary/cornerbacks coach, his eighth season in the NFL, and his 22nd year in coaching. He joined the organization on Jan. 15, 2015.

In 2016, the Giants received important contributions from several of Walton's cornerbacks, including Janoris Jenkins, who was selected to his first Pro Bowl, Dominique Rodgers-Cromartie, and rookie Eli Apple. Jenkins and DRC were selected second-team All-Pros.

Jenkins started all 15 regular-season games in which he played and finished the season with 49 tackles (44 solo), three interceptions, a sack, 18 passes defended, and a forced fumble. He routinely covered the opposition's best receiver and twice held Dez Bryant, Dallas' star receiver, to a single catch.

Rodgers-Cromartie led the Giants and was tied for second in the NFL with six interceptions, and twice had two interceptions in a game (at Los Angeles and at Washington). He was the first Giants player with six interceptions in a season since safety Antrel Rolle in 2013.

Apple, the Giants' first-round draft choice in 2016, played in 14 games with 11 starts and had 49 tackles (41 solo), 7 passes defended, an interception, a forced fumble, and a fumble recovery.

In 2015, Rodgers-Cromartie had one of the finest seasons of his career. DRC played in the Pro Bowl after starting 15 games at left cornerback and contributed 58 tackles (52 solo). Rodgers-Cromartie also had a team-high 13 passes defended, and tied Trumaine McBride for the team lead with three interceptions. He was the first Giants cornerback to play in the Pro Bowl since Mark Haynes made the last of his three consecutive trips in 1984.

DRC scored on a 57-yard fumble return on opening night in Dallas, and on a 58-yard interception return vs. the Cowboys on Oct. 25. He was the first Giants player with two defensive touchdowns in the same season since linebacker Kawika Mitchell in 2007 (also one interception and one fumble return), and the first defensive back to accomplish the feat since Percy Ellsworth in 1998.

Walton was the St. Louis Ram's defensive coordinator in 2013. That season, the Rams finished third in the NFL with 53 sacks. They were 15th in the NFL in total defense, allowing 345.0 yards per game. St. Louis was ninth in rushing yards allowed per game (102.9) and third in opposing yards per carry (3.7). That Rams defense was 13th in the NFL in scoring defense, giving up 22.8 points a game.

Prior to joining the Rams, Walton spent four years as the Detroit Lions' secondary coach. In 2012, he added the title of third down package coach. Walton helped Detroit finish 10th in the NFL that season in third down defense as the Lions allowed opponents to convert just 36.5 percent of their third down attempts. The 2011 Lions led the NFL with

seven defensive touchdowns.

Before his time in Detroit, Walton spent 14 seasons at the collegiate level, where he coached 13 players who were eventually drafted into the NFL, including five first-round selections.

Walton's college tenure included two stints as a defensive coordinator. He held the position at Memphis in 2008 and at Miami (Fla.) in 2007. In total, he spent four seasons with the Hurricanes.

Walton was promoted from secondary coach to defensive coordinator in 2007 and helped propel the defense to a national ranking of 33rd in total defense. In his first three seasons at Miami, he coached the defensive backs and the Miami secondary ranked in the top 10 nationally in pass defense in 2004 (9th when he coached former Giants safety Antrel Rolle) and 2005 (first).

In 2005, Walton's pass defense led the nation, allowing only 152.2 yards per game, and featured All-Americans safety Brandon Meriweather and cornerback Kelly Jennings, as well as freshman All-American Kenny Phillips, who was the Giants' first-round draft choice in 2008.

Walton was at LSU in 2003 and his defensive backs, including former Giants corner Corey Webster, were instrumental in the Tigers winning the 2003 BCS National Championship and a Southeastern Conference title.

In his first stint with the University of Memphis (2000-01), Walton coached the team's defensive backs. In 2000, the Tigers ranked fifth in the nation in total defense (first in rush defense), allowing only 275 yards per game and placed in the top 15 nationally in passing and scoring defense. He left Memphis to coach defensive backs at Syracuse for the 2002 season.

Walton began his coaching career as a defensive graduate assistant at Bowling Green in 1995. He was promoted to running backs coach in 1996 and then moved to coach the defensive backs in 1999.

In addition to his collegiate coaching experience, Walton has had three summer internships with NFL teams. He spent the summer of 1998 serving as a defensive intern with the Chicago Bears, the summer of 2001 as a defensive intern for the Green Bay Packers, and 2004 with the Tampa Bay Buccaneers under current Pittsburgh Steelers Head Coach Mike Tomlin.

As a defensive back at Ohio State University, Walton lettered four seasons and served as co-captain for the Big Ten champions in 1993. During his time with the Buckeyes, OSU went to four bowl games, including the Liberty Bowl in 1990. He earned his bachelor's degree in sociology from OSU in 1994.

Walton and his wife, Tracy, have three children, Trei, Timia and Tyler.

AARON WELLMAN

STRENGTH & CONDITIONING



Aaron Wellman is in his second season as the Giants' strength and conditioning coach and second in the NFL following a 20-year career at

the Division I collegiate level.

Wellman significantly changed the Giants' offseason and in-season training regimens, and the result was a substantial decrease in the number of season-ending injuries suffered by Giants players.

Prior to joining the Giants, Wellman was an assistant director of strength and conditioning at the University of Notre Dame in 2015.

Wellman spent the previous four years (2011-15) as the director of strength and conditioning at the University of Michigan. He was responsible for the yearly programming of strength, speed and football-specific conditioning. Wellman performed movement screenings to evaluate mobility and stability deficits along with subsequent programs to mitigate individual injury risk. He implemented athlete-monitoring systems including GPS and neuromuscular fatigue assessments.

Prior to his tenure at Michigan, Wellman held similar director positions at San Diego State University (2009-11) and Ball State University (2004-09).

Wellman began his strength and conditioning career as a graduate assistant at Indiana University (1996-98). He then spent three years as a full-time assistant strength and

conditioning coach for the Hoosiers, and was primarily involved with the football, baseball and softball teams, as well as developing individual nutrition programs for student-athletes.

Wellman also worked for three years at Michigan State University (2001-03). He was involved with all aspects of the strength and conditioning program for football and assisted with men's and women's basketball and ice hockey.

Wellman is a registered master strength and conditioning coach by the Collegiate Strength and Conditioning Coaches Association (CSCCA), a certified strength and conditioning specialist and personal trainer by the National Strength and Conditioning Association (NSCA) and a specialist in performance nutrition by the International Sports Sciences Association (ISSA).

A native of Ligonier, Indiana, Wellman was a four-year member of the Manchester (Ind.) College football team. He earned his bachelor's degree in exercise science in 1996. Wellman added separate master's degrees from Indiana University in applied sport science (1998) and nutrition science (2009). In July 2017, he received a PhD from Bond University (Queensland, Australia), Faculty of Health Sciences and Medicine.

Wellman and his wife, Shellie, have a son, Grant, and a daughter, Grace.

LUNDA WELLS

ASSISTANT OFFENSIVE LINE



Lunda Wells is in his sixth season on the Giants' coaching staff and his fifth as the team's assistant offensive line coach.

Last season, the Giants allowed 22 sacks — five fewer than the total surrendered in 2015 — and the third-lowest total in the league after Oakland (18) and Pittsburgh (21).

The previous year, the line helped the Giants finish eighth in the NFL with an average of 372.3 yards per game, despite using seven different starting combinations. The team was seventh in the NFL with 271.7 passing yards per game. The Giants scored 420 points in 2015, the fifth-highest total in franchise history, and their 5,956 net yards were the third-highest total in their history. With the line providing consistent protection, Eli Manning set a single-season franchise record with 387 completions, and his 4,432 yards and 35 touchdown passes were both the second-highest totals in Giants history.

In 2014, the line helped the Giants gain an average of 367.2 yards a game, a 59.7 yards per game improvement over their 2013 average of 307.5.

Wells helped the line overcome a series of injuries in 2013, when the Giants were forced to use seven different starting line combinations, the second-highest total in the NFL; Oakland used eight.

One constant was Justin Pugh, who started all 16 games at right tackle. Pugh was the first Giants rookie to start an entire 16-game season since defensive tackle Barry Cofield in 2006; the first offensive lineman to do it since David Diehl 10 years ago; and the first Giants' first round draft choice to do so since Hall of Fame linebacker Lawrence Taylor in 1981.

Pugh was just the fourth Giants first-round draft choice to start every game in their rookie season since the 1970 merger. The others were linebacker Jim Files (1970), guard John Hicks (1974) and Taylor (1981).

Wells joined the Giants in 2012 as an offensive quality control coach. He also helped coach the wide receivers that season. In 2012, the Giants scored 429 points, the second-highest total in franchise history.

Before joining the Giants' staff, Wells spent four seasons at Louisiana State University. In 2008-09, he was

an offensive line assistant. In addition to his practice and game day duties working with the offensive line, Wells' administrative responsibilities included self-scouting, breaking down tape of opponents and developing scouting reports.

In his final two years at LSU, Wells was an assistant to the head coach and an assistant to special teams coach Thomas McGaughey, who was a member of the Giants' coaching staff from 2007-10. Wells worked with LSU head coach Les Miles on game day responsibilities, practice preparation, administrative tasks and recruiting duties, and with McGaughey on self-scouting, breaking down tape of opponents, assisting with the game plan and scouting reports.

In 2010, Wells was an offensive line intern in the Dallas Cowboys' training camp, where he worked alongside coach Hudson Houck.

Wells was the offensive line coach, run game coordinator and head strength and conditioning coach at Scotlandville High School in Baton Rouge, La. in 2006-07. He coached the offensive line and devised the offensive run game plans.

An offensive lineman, Wells played in the Arena Football League for the Grand Rapids Rampage, South Georgia Rampage and Louisiana Swashbucklers. Wells was a four-year starter at guard at Southern University (2002-05). He was voted to the All-Southwestern Athletic Conference first team in 2002 and 2005. Southern won the 2003 SWAC championship. Wells blocked for two quarterbacks who were named SWAC Player of the Year. In addition to his conference title ring, Wells earned a bachelor's degree in criminal justice and, in 2007, a master's degree in criminal justice at Southern.

Wells is a native of Baker, La., just outside Baton Rouge. He was a Class 5A first-team all-state offensive line selection at Baker High School. Wells was recruited by powerhouses like Alabama and Nebraska.

Wells is married to Tiffany. They have two daughters, Adanya Neema and Zalika Nia.

ASSISTANT GENERAL MANAGER



Kevin Abrams is in his 16th season as the Giants' assistant general manager. He previously served three years as the team's salary cap analyst.

Abrams is the team's primary negotiator for player contracts, works with the college and pro personnel departments to evaluate players in preparation for the NFL Draft and free agency, and is responsible for managing the Giants' salary cap, football data analysis, related strategic planning for football operations and coordinating the organization's compliance with the NFL's Collective Bargaining Agreement.

In July of 1999, Abrams was hired to fill the newly-created position of salary cap analyst. He came to the Giants from the NFL Management Council, where he helped to

monitor the league-wide salary cap and analyzed all new player contracts with respect to the rules and regulations of the Collective Bargaining Agreement. Prior to working at the Management Council, Abrams completed internships and graduate assistant work in player personnel, recruiting, public relations and corporate relations with the Washington Redskins, the Ohio University football program, the Buffalo Bills and the London Monarchs.

Abrams was raised in Toronto, Canada. He completed his undergraduate degree at the University of Western Ontario, and earned his master's degree in sports administration from Ohio University, where he is currently a member of the Sports Administration Advisory Board.

Kevin and his wife, Sarah-Jane, live on the Upper West Side of Manhattan with their three children, Joseph, Grace and Cormac.

VICE PRESIDENT, PLAYER EVALUATION



Marc Ross is in his fifth season as the Giants' vice president of player evaluation after serving the previous six years as the team's director of college scouting. Ross is in charge of the Giants' college scouting department and the team's draft. He joined the organization on May 18, 2007 and ran his first organizational draft the next year.

Ross also works on special projects with director of pro personnel Ken Sternfeld.

Since Ross joined the organization, the Giants have found important contributors both early and late in the draft. In 2016, their first-round draft choice was cornerback Eli Apple, who started 11 of the 14 games in which he played. Wide receiver Sterling Shepard, the team's second-round selection, started every game and scored eight touchdowns.

Ereck Flowers, the Giants' first-round selection in 2015, has started all but one game at left tackle. Safety Landon Collins, the second-round choice that year, was a first-team All-Pro in 2016. Odell Beckham Jr., the team's first selection in 2014, is a three-time Pro Bowler whose 288 catches, 4,122 yards, and 35 touchdowns are the best three-year totals in franchise history. That draft also delivered center Weston Richburg and linebacker Devon Kennard.

In previous drafts run by Ross, the Giants selected Terrell Thomas, Hakeem Nicks, Will Beatty, Jason Pierre-Paul, Linval Joseph, Prince Amukamara, Johnathan Hankins, and Justin Pugh, the 2013 first-round draft choice who started all 55 games in which he played in his first four seasons.

Ross came to the Giants from the Buffalo Bills, for whom he spent three seasons as a national college scout. Ross' first NFL job was as a public relations training camp intern with the Giants in 1995. After leaving camp, Ross worked in Columbia University's athletics department.

Ross returned to the NFL with the Eagles' personnel department during the club's 1996 training camp. He was the team's eastern regional scout from 1997 until 2000, when, at age 27, he became the NFL's youngest college scouting director.

After seven years with the Eagles' organization, Ross joined the Bills in the spring of 2004 as a national college scout.

Ross was an All-Ivy League wide receiver at Princeton in 1993 and 1994. He holds five school records, including one as a receiver (a 20.2-yard average per catch in 1993) and four as a punt returner (most career returns, 74; most career return yards, 696; most returns in a season, 32 in 1994 and most yards in a game, 161 on six returns vs. Cornell in 1994).

Ross earned a Bachelor of Arts degree in sociology from Princeton and a master's degree in sport management from the University of Massachusetts in 1997.

Ross was a three-sport star at Archmere Academy in Delaware. In 2014, he was inducted into the school's Sports Hall of Fame.

A native of Sharon Hill, Pa., Ross and his wife, Pualani, have a daughter, Skylar.



KEN STERNFELD

DIRECTOR, PRO PERSONNEL



Ken Sternfeld is in his sixth season as the Giants' director of pro personnel, a position he assumed in 2012 after a 10-year stint as the team's assistant director. Sternfeld and his staff are responsible for scouting the Giants' upcoming opponent and presenting weekly reports to the coaching staff, as well as continually evaluating NFL personnel, including active players and free agents.

Sternfeld joined the Giants on May 12, 2002 after spending 21 years with the New England Patriots in a variety of capacities, primarily in scouting. Prior to joining the Giants, he served as a college scout on the East Coast.

The Giants have made seven playoff appearances and won two Super Bowls during Sternfeld's tenure with the franchise. Sternfeld has more than 20 years of pro and college scouting experience and has contributed to 11 playoff teams and three Super Bowl champions.

Sternfeld has participated in five Super Bowls, and in all of them he either worked for the Patriots or played against them. The first was Super Bowl XX, when the Patriots

played Chicago. Sternfeld was also a member of the Patriots' organization when they played in Super Bowl XXXI in January 1997 and won Super Bowl XXXVI five years later. Sternfeld has participated in two Super Bowls with the Giants, winning the championship in 2007 and 2011.

Sternfeld joined the Patriots as an intern in 1981. The following year, he began a two-year stint as an administrative aide. In 1984, Sternfeld was named the Patriots' ticket office manager, a post he held for three years.

In 1987, he joined the scouting department for five years before returning to the ticket office, where, during his second tenure, franchise tickets sales reached record highs.

Sternfeld returned to the scouting department in January of 1995 and remained there for the rest of his tenure in New England.

Sternfeld is a native of Long Island. He attended Locust Valley (N.Y.) High School (N.Y.) before earning a business degree at Northeastern University.

Sternfeld and his wife Anne have two children, Anna and Tim.



MATT SHAUGER

ASSISTANT DIRECTOR, PRO PERSONNEL



Matt Shauger is in his 13th season with the Giants, and fifth as team's assistant director of pro personnel. He was promoted to his current position in May 2013 after spending the previous seven seasons as a pro scout. He originally joined the club in June 2005 as a pro personnel intern.

Shauger's primary duties include film study of active NFL players and evaluation of free agents, coordinating the schedule of the team's pro scouting department and management of the club's pro scouting database. During the season, he assists the coaching staff with advance scouting of upcoming opponents, including their personnel and

tendencies. He contributed to both the Super Bowl XLII and XLVI championship teams.

Shauger began his pro football career in Europe in 2003 as an assistant in the former NFL International Scouting. Based in the league's international headquarters in London, Shauger aided in the identification and development of non-U.S. playing talent while researching and formulating strategies for globally expanding American football.

Shauger earned a B.S. degree in business administration and sport management from Seton Hall University in 2002. He and his wife, novelist Lisa Van Allen, have a daughter, Evelyn, and reside in Wayne, N.J.



JEREMIAH DAVIS

EXECUTIVE SCOUT

Jeremiah Davis is in his 30th year as a member of the Giants organization, his 28th as a full-time member of the team's scouting department, and his 10th as an executive scout. He joined the Giants in 1988 as a part-time scout after a career as a collegiate coach. Two years later, Davis became a full-time Giants scout.

Davis graduated from Montclair (N.J.) High School, which is located about 20 minutes from the Giants' headquarters. He began his collegiate football career at Washington State University before receiving a Bachelor of Arts degree in criminal law from the University of Wyoming in 1978. Davis subsequently earned a master's degree in sports administra-

Marquis Pendleton is in his second season as the Giants' scout in the BLESTO scouting combine. He succeeded Chris

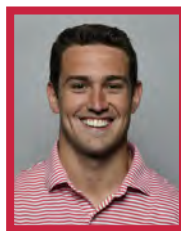
Watts, who is now a scout.

- Beckham had the best 3-season start by a wide receiver in Giants history, and 1 of the best ever in the NFL. His 3-year totals of 288 receptions, 4,122 yards, and 35 touchdowns, all shattered the previous Giants records for a player in his first 3 seasons (Beckham had the 3-year touchdown receptions record with 25 — in his first 2 seasons). On the Giants' career lists, Beckham's 288 catches place him 12th, his 4,122 yards are 15th, and his 35 touchdown receptions leave him in a 4-way tie for 5th.

- Beckham and Miami's Jarvis Landry — his good friend and former LSU teammate — share the NFL record for the most receptions in the first 3 seasons of a career with 288 each. Cincinnati's A.J. Green held the former mark with 260 from 2011-13.

- Beckham's 4,122 yards left him 41 yards short of tying Randy Moss' record for the highest yardage total in the first 3 seasons of a career. Moss also owns the 3-year touchdown record with 43.

- Beckham's 35 touchdown receptions are the most in the NFL since the start of the 2014 season.

- Beckham had 12 touchdown catches as a rookie, 13 in 2015, and 10 in 2016. He is the 5th player in history with double-digit touchdown receptions in each of his first 3 seasons, joining Pro Football Hall of Famer Bob Hayes, John Jefferson, Moss, and New England tight end Rob Gronkowski, who did it from 2010-12.

- Beckham is the first player in NFL history to record at least 80 catches and 1,000 receiving yards in each of his first 3 seasons.

- He is also the only player in history with at least 80 receptions and 10 touchdown catches in each of his first 3 seasons.

- But Beckham didn't complete the circle alone. He is 1 of 3 players in NFL history with at least 1,000 receiving yards and 10 touchdown catches in each of his first 3 seasons, joining John Jefferson (1978-80) and Moss (1998-2000).

- Beckham is the only player ever to begin a career with 3 consecutive seasons of at least 85 receptions, 1,000 yards, and 10 touchdowns.

- Beckham has 13 games with 125 or more receiving yards, the highest total by a player in his first 3 seasons in NFL history. Moss had the previous record with 12.

- Beckham is the first Giants player to make the Pro Bowl in each of his first 3 seasons since Pro Football Hall of Fame linebacker Lawrence Taylor from 1981-83, and the first to make it in 3 consecutive seasons since offensive linemen Shaun O'Hara and Chris Snee from 2008-10.

CAREER HIGHLIGHTS:

- Beckham has played in 43 regular-season games, starting the last 42, and started the 1 postseason game in which he played. His career total of 288 receptions, 4,122 yards, and 35 touchdowns are all Giants records for a player in his first 3 seasons... Beckham caught at least 2 passes in all 43 games in which he's played, and at least 3 in every game but 1... Also has 9 rushing attempts for 47 yards, 33 punt returns for 263 yards (8.2-yard avg.), and he has been sacked once... In his only postseason game, Beckham caught 4 passes for 28 yards, and returned 2 kickoffs for 48 yards.

- In 2016, Beckham played and started in all 16 games for the 1st time in his career. And for the 3rd time in as many pro seasons, he led the Giants in receptions (101), receiving yards (1,367), and touchdown catches (10), and was selected to the Pro Bowl.

- Beckham's 101 catches were the 3rd-highest total in the NFL and the 2nd-highest total in Giants' history, behind Steve Smith's 107 receptions in 2009. Beckham, who caught 91 and 96 passes in his first 2 seasons, has 3 of the 4-highest single-season totals in franchise history.

- Beckham's 1,367 receiving yards were also 3rd in the league, the 2nd-highest total of his career, and the 3rd-highest in Giants history. Victor Cruz set the franchise record with 1,536 in 2011, and Beckham had 1,450 in 2015. Beckham has 2 of the top 3, and 3 of the top 5, single-season receiving yardage totals in Giants history.

- The Giants have had 24 1,000-yard individual receiving seasons in their history; Beckham has 3 of them.

- Beckham's 19 career 100-yard receiving games include 11 games of 140+ yards, which tie him with Atlanta's Julio Jones for first among all players since

Beckham entered the league in 2014. His 3 games of at least 160 yards tie him for 4th, and his two 180+ yard games are 4th.

- In 2016, Beckham had 10 touchdown receptions, which placed him 5th in the NFL (2 receivers had 14 and 2 had 12), but was the lowest total of his 3-year career (he had 13 in 2015, and 12 as a rookie).

- Beckham had 2 receiving touchdowns in 3 different games in 2016, increasing to 9 the number of games in his career in which he's caught multiple scoring passes. That tied the Giants record also shared by Homer Jones and Joe Morrison. The 9 multi-touchdown games leave Beckham tied for 4th among NFL players in their first 3 seasons. Rob Gronkowski had 12, Jerry Rice 11, and Bill Groman 10. Bob Hayes, John Jefferson, and Moss had 9 apiece.

- Beckham has 4 career touchdown receptions of 75 or more yards. Jones owns the Giants record with 6.

- Beckham has 9 career touchdown catches of at least 60 yards, the 2nd-most by a player in his 3 NFL seasons. Harlon Hill recorded 10 touchdowns of 60 or more yards in his first 3 seasons with the Bears from 1954-56.

- The last 7 times a Giants player has scored 2 or more touchdowns in a game, that player was Beckham. Including in that total are a pair of 3-touchdown games.

- For the 3rd time in as many seasons, Beckham led the Giants in total yards, with 1,442. The total included 9 rushing and 66 punt return yards. Beckham had team-high totals of 1,511 and 1,479 yards in 2014, and 2015, respectively.

- Beckham's 60 points led the Giants by 10 points over kicker Robbie Gould. He was the first non-kicker to lead the Giants in scoring since 1992, when running back Rodney Hampton finished with 84 points (14 touchdowns). The last wide receiver to lead the Giants in scoring was Jones in 1967 (also 84 points; he had 13 touchdowns receiving and 1 rushing).

- In the season's first 2 games, Beckham had 4 catches for 73 yards at Dallas (9/11), and 8 receptions for 86 yards vs. New Orleans (9/18).

- With 7 receptions for 121 yards vs. Washington (9/25), Beckham set NFL records for the fewest career games to 200 receptions and 3,000 receiving yards. His first catch vs. the Redskins was a 26-yarder on the opening play of the 2nd quarter. It was his 200th career reception, in his 30th game. That was the fewest number of games a player needed to reach 200 catches in NFL history. The former record of 33 was set in Week 1 by Miami's Jarvis Landry.

- Beckham's 121 receiving yards vs. Washington increased his career total to 3,035 yards in 30 games, which was also an NFL record. The previous record for fewest games to reach 3,000 receiving yards was 31 by Charley Hennigan, whose career began in 1960.

- All 5 players on the receptions list were active in 2016. Beckham was the only active player on the receiving yards list.

- Beckham passed Hakeem Nicks' team records for the highest catch and receiving yardage totals by a Giants player in his first 3 NFL seasons (not first 3 seasons after first playing for another team, as Plaxico Burress did). Beckham then had 206 receptions and 3,035 yards. Nicks' marks were 202 catches and 3,034 yards.

- Beckham became the 23rd player in Giants history with at least 200 receptions.

- Beckham was targeted 9 times and caught 3 passes at Minnesota (10/3), ending his streak of consecutive games with at least 4 receptions at 28. He had last caught fewer than 4 passes on Oct. 12, 2014, when he had 2 receptions in Philadelphia in his 2nd NFL game... Beckham's 23 receiving yards vs. the Vikings were a career-low. His previous low was 28 yards in that 2014 game in Philadelphia... Beckham's longest reception in Minnesota was 10 yards, ending his streak of having at least 1 catch of 15 or more yards at 15 consecutive games.

- Beckham caught 5 passes for 56 yards at Green Bay (10/9), and he ended a career-long 5-game streak without a touchdown that dated back to the 2015 season. He made an acrobatic catch in the back of the end zone for an 8-yard score, the Giants' only touchdown of the game, with 2:54 remaining in the 4th quarter... Beckham was sacked as he looked for someone to throw to by safety Micah Hyde for a 6-yard loss in the 3rd quarter. He was the first Giants player other than a quarterback to be sacked since running back David Meggett vs. Cincinnati on Dec. 11, 1994... With Dwayne Harris in the locker room getting his jaw X-rayed, Beckham was deployed as the punt returner for the first time in 2016 on 1 kick in the 3rd quarter. He had to fair catch the punt.

- Beckham earned his first NFC Offensive Player of the Week award by catching 8 passes for a career-high 222 yards, including 2nd-half touchdowns of 74 and 66 yards, in a 27-23 victory vs. Baltimore (10/16)... The 222 yards was the 2nd-highest total in Giants history, exceeded only by Del Shofner's 269 yards vs. Washington on Oct. 28, 1962. Gene (Choo-Choo) Roberts had owned the 2nd-highest total of 212, which he accomplished at Green Bay on Nov. 13, 1949. Beckham's previous career-best was 185 yards vs. Philadelphia on Dec. 28, 2015, the last game of his Rookie of the Year season.

- Beckham became the first Giants receiver with 2 touchdown catches of 66 or more yards in a game since Homer Jones did it on Sept. 11, 1966. Jones scored on receptions of 75 and 98 yards in a season-opening 34-34 tie with Pittsburgh.

- Beckham's 200-yard receiving game was the first by a Giants player since Oct. 2, 2005, when Plaxico Burress had 204 yards on 10 catches vs. St. Louis. Burress also scored 2 touchdowns and was named Offensive Player of the Week for his 200-yard game... Beckham's 222 yards from scrimmage were the 8th-highest total in franchise history.

- Against Baltimore, Beckham had 6 catches for 211

yards and his 2 long touchdowns in the 2nd half. Beckham's 211 yards were the most in a 2nd half since Miami's Irving Fryar had 211 vs. New England on Sept. 4, 1994...Before Beckham's performance vs. Baltimore, the last player with 200+ receiving yards and at least 2 touchdowns in a second half was Baltimore's Qadry Ismail on Dec. 12, 1999 (210 yards, 3 scores) at Pittsburgh...Beckham was the first Giants player with two 60+ yard touchdown receptions in the 2nd half of a game in 67 years. The last to do it was Roberts, who had scoring catches of 62 and 85 yards vs. the Chicago Bears on Oct. 23, 1949.

- Beckham had another 2-touchdown game while catching 4 passes for 46 yards vs. Philadelphia (11/6)...He scored both of his touchdowns – from 26 and 1 yards - in the first half. Beckham had no first-half touchdowns in the season's first 7 games...Beckham's 2 touchdown receptions increased his career total to 30. He is the 6th player in NFL history to record at least 30 touchdown catches in his first 35 career games, joining Pro Football Hall of Famers Lance Alworth and Bob Hayes, and Cloyce Box, Bill Groman and Harlon Hill.

- Beckham had a game-high 10 receptions for 97 yards in a Monday night victory vs. Cincinnati (11/14). It was his first game with at least 10 catches since Dec. 28, 2014, when he had 12 vs. Philadelphia...The 97 yards were a career-low for Beckham in a 10-catch game. The previous low was 130 yards on 11 receptions at Tennessee on Dec. 7, 2014...Beckham's 97 yards increased his career total to 3,538, in 36 games. He set the NFL record for the fewest number of games to reach 3,500 receiving yards. The former record of 37 games was held by Alworth.

- Beckham was deployed as a defensive back on the final play of the first half, when the Giants line up 5 defenders across the goal line. The play, which began from the 50-yard line with 3 seconds remaining, was a long Andy Dalton pass to A.J. Green that was batted down by Beckham and Dominique Rodgers-Cromartie. Beckham was the first NFL player with a reception and a pass defended in the same game since Atlanta's Julio Jones on Sept. 18, 2014.

- Beckham led the Giants with 6 receptions for 96 yards and 2 touchdowns, on catches of 32 and 4 yards, at Cleveland (11/27). The 2nd score was set up by Beckham's 41-yard catch-and-run, the Giants' longest play of the game.

- It was Beckham's 9th career game with at least 2 touchdowns, tying the franchise record also shared by Homer Jones and Joe Morrison.

- Beckham tied his season-high with 10 catches for 100 yards at Pittsburgh (12/4), to increase his season totals to 75 catches for 1,015 yards and 8 touchdowns. Beckham is the first player in Giants history to begin his career with 3 consecutive 1,000-yard receiving seasons. He is the 5th player in NFL history with at least 1,000 receiving yards in each of his first 3 NFL seasons, joining A.J. Green, John Jefferson, Randy Moss and Mike Evans. Green and Evans are active with Cincinnati and Tampa Bay, respectively, and Evans accomplished the feat when he passed the 1,000-yard mark the week before Beckham.

- Beckham caught 4 passes for 94 yards, including the game-winning 61-yard touchdown, in the Giants' 10-7 victory vs. Dallas (12/11)...Beckham's touchdown was his 34th on a pass from Eli Manning. That is the most by any receiver. Beckham had been tied with Plaxico Burress, who played for the Giants from 2005-08.

- In his 40th career game, Beckham scored his 10th

touchdown that covered 50 or more yards, and his 9th of at least 60 yards. Both figures are NFL highs since he entered the league in 2014...Beckham sailed past the previous Giants' 3-year records of eight 50-yard touchdowns (which was held by Jones) and seven 60-yard scores (Jones and Victor Cruz)...In addition, Beckham's 9 career touchdown catches of at least 60 yards are the 2nd-most by a player in his first 3 seasons in the league. Harlon Hill scored 10 touchdowns of 60 or more yards in his first 3 seasons with the Bears from 1954-56. Three of the 5 players on the list for longest touchdown receptions in the first 3 seasons of a career played for the Giants:

- Beckham led the Giants with 6 receptions for 64 yards, including a 4-yard touchdown with 5:47 remaining, in a 17-6 victory vs. Detroit (12/18). The touchdown was his 10th of the season, and the 3rd time in as many seasons he had double-digit scoring catches...Beckham is also the first Giants player with at least 10 touchdown receptions in 3 different seasons...Beckham also had a 9-yard run on a reverse, and a spectacular 63-yard punt return touchdown that didn't count because Eric Pinkins was penalized for a block in the back.

- In Philadelphia (12/22), wide receivers Beckham (11), Victor Cruz (8), and Sterling Shepard (7) combined for 26 receptions, the highest total of the season for the Giants' three leading wideouts. Their previous high was 20 catches vs. New Orleans (9/18)...Beckham and Cruz had season-high receptions totals. It was Beckham's 7th career double-digit catch game.

- Beckham's 150 yards were his 2nd-highest total of the season, after his 222-yard performance vs. Baltimore. It was his 4th 100-yard game of the season and the 19th of his career, tying Randy Moss for the most by an NFL player in his first 3 seasons...It also broke a tie with Cruz and moved Beckham into sole possession of 2nd place on the Giants' career list. Amani Toomer is first with 22. The Giants are 7-12 when Beckham has at least 100 receiving yards.

- Beckham had 5 catches for 44 yards in the regular-season finale in Washington (1/1), and 4 receptions for 28 yards in the NFC Wild Card Game at Green Bay (1/8)...He also had the first 2 kickoff returns of his career against the Packers, totaling 48 yards.

- Beckham has played in 27 games starting the last 26...His career totals include 187 receptions for 2,755 yards, and 25 touchdowns...He also has 8 rushing attempts for 38 yards (4.8-yard avg.), 23 punt returns for 197 yards (8.6-yard avg.), and 1 pass attempt (which was incomplete).

- Beckham's career totals of 187 catches, 2,755 yards, and 25 touchdowns are all Giants records for a player in his first 2 Giants seasons.

- In 2015, Beckham started all 15 games in which he played. He did not play at Minnesota (12/27) while serving an NFL suspension...Beckham finished the season with 96 receptions for 1,450 yards, both the 2nd-highest totals in Giants history. Steve Smith holds the franchise

record with 107 receptions in 2009, and Victor Cruz owns the yardage mark with 1,536 in 2011... Beckham caught 13 touchdown passes, tying the franchise single-season record set by Homer Jones in 1967.

- Beckham was selected to the Pro Bowl after each of his first 2 seasons, the first Giants player to accomplish that feat since tight end Jeremy Shockey in 2002-03. He was the first Giants wide receiver selected in consecutive seasons since Homer Jones in 1967-68.

- Beckham's 96 receptions were the NFL's 8th-highest total, his 1,450 yards ranked 5th in the league, and his 13 touchdown receptions were 4th (the Jets' Brandon Marshall, Jacksonville's Allen Robinson, and Seattle's Doug Baldwin all had 14).

- Beckham had the 23rd 1,000-yard season in Giants history. He is 1 of 11 players in franchise history to accomplish the feat, and 1 of 7 to do it more than once. Beckham totaled 1,305 yards in his Rookie of the Year season in 2014. Amani Toomer holds the franchise record with five 1,000-yard seasons.

- Beckham had at least 100 receiving yards in a Giants-record 6 consecutive games from Nov. 1-Dec. 14. The streak ended when he had 76 yards vs. Carolina (12/20). The last NFL player with such a streak was Denver's Demaryius Thomas, who had 7 straight 100-yard games in 2014... Beckham concluded the 2014 season with 4 consecutive 100-yard games. He is the first Giants receiver with 4-game streaks of at least 100 receiving yards in back-to-back seasons. The last NFL player to do it was Detroit's Calvin Johnson in 2011-12.

- Beckham averaged 96.7 yards per game, the 2nd-highest figure in Giants history. He holds the record with a 108.8-yard average as a rookie, which topped Victor Cruz's previous Giants record of 96.0 yards, set in 2011.

- Beckham had 13 touchdown catches in 2014 after finishing with 12 as a rookie. He is the 7th player in NFL history with double-digit touchdown receptions in each of his first 2 seasons, and the first since New England tight end Rob Gronkowski did it his first 3 years from 2010-12.

- Beckham is the 2nd player in Giants history with double-digit touchdown catches in back-to-back seasons; Plaxico Burress had 10 in 2006 and 12 in 2007.

- Beckham had touchdown receptions of 87 yards vs. New England (11/15) and 84 yards at Miami (12/14) to become the first player with two 80+-yard scoring catches in a season since Pittsburgh's Martavis Bryant in 2014.

- One week prior to his 84-yard score vs. the Dolphins, Beckham scored on a 72-yard pass from Eli Manning vs. the Jets. He is 1 of just 2 players in Giants history with a touchdown reception of at least 72 yards in back-to-back games. Victor Cruz scored on a 99-yard catch-and-run vs. the Jets on Dec. 24, 2011, and on a 74-yarder the following week vs. Dallas... It was the 2nd time in Beckham's career he had long touchdown receptions in consecutive games. On Dec. 21, 2014 in St. Louis, he scored on an 80-yard play, and a week later, on a 63-yard catch vs. Philadelphia.

- Opened the season with 5 catches for 44 yards at Dallas (9/13)... Had 7 catches for 146 yards, including a 67-yard touchdown... Caught his 100th career pass in his 14th game, an NFL record... Followed with 7 receptions for 79 yards, and scored on a 30-yard pass, vs. Washington (9/24).

- Caught 7 passes for 121 yards and a touchdown vs. San Francisco (10/11), and 7 for 61 yards and the Giants' only

touchdown at Philadelphia (10/19).

- Scored a season-high 3 touchdowns (on receptions of 2, 1 and 50 yards) while catching 8 passes for 130 yards at New Orleans (11/1)... Finished with a season-high 9 receptions for 105 yards, at Tampa Bay (11/8).

- Had 4 receptions for 104 yards, including a career-long 87-yard touchdown catch, vs. New England (11/15)... Tied his season high with 9 catches for 142 yards, including a diving 21-yard touchdown reception, at Washington (11/29)... The following week, he had 6 catches for 149 yards, including a 72-yard touchdown, vs. the Jets (12/6).

- Caught 6 passes for a season-high 166 yards, including touchdowns of 6 and 84 yards, at Miami (12/14)... Contributed 6 catches for 76 yards, including a game-tying 14-yard touchdown, vs. Carolina (12/20)... Finished the season with 5 receptions for 54 yards vs. Philadelphia (1/3).

- In 2014, Beckham had the greatest season by a rookie wide receiver in NFL history, despite playing in only 12 games (he missed the season's first 4 games with a hamstring injury). His season totals of 91 catches for 1,305 yards and 12 touchdowns were all franchise rookie records... Beckham was the first wide receiver in NFL history to reach 1,000 yards after missing the season's first 3 games (he missed the first 4)... He also led the team with 21 punt returns for 171 yards (8.1-yard avg.), with a long return of 25 yards and 11 fair catches... Had 7 rushing attempts for 35 yards, with a long run of 13 yards.

- Beckham set NFL records for most catches and yards in the first 12 games to start a career.

- Beckham was named the Associated Press Offensive Rookie of the Year, the only Giants player to be so honored in the now 61-year history of the award. He was the franchise's first Rookie of the Year since Pro Football Hall of Fame linebacker Lawrence Taylor won the defensive award in 1981. Beckham was the first wide receiver to be named Offensive Rookie of the Year since 2009, when Percy Harvin, then with Minnesota, won the award.

- Beckham was named the NFL Offensive Rookie of the Month in both November and December.

- Rookies Andre Williams and Beckham led the Giants in rushing and receiving yards, respectively. It was the first time rookies led the Giants in rushing and receiving yards in a full season since 1950, when Eddie Price ran for 703 yards and Bob McChesney had 380 receiving yards... The last NFL team with rookies leading in both rushing and receiving yards was the 2012 Cleveland Browns. Trent Richardson rushed for 950 yards and Josh Gordon had 805 receiving yards.

- As a rookie in 2014, Beckham was the Giants' lone representative in the Pro Bowl. He was the first Giants rookie to play in the Pro Bowl since tight end Shockey in 2002. Beckham was the team's first wide receiver in the game since Victor Cruz in 2012. Beckham was the first Giants rookie wide receiver ever selected to the Pro Bowl.

- In 2014, Beckham provided the NFL season's most spectacular moment with his now-famous leaping 1-handed touchdown catch against Dallas on Nov. 23, which made him a national sensation. The incredible catch was selected as the Bridgestone Performance Play of the Year from 20 moments voted on by NFL fans.

- Beckham's 91 catches were then the 2nd-highest total in franchise history, topped only by Steve Smith's 107 receptions in 2009... The 91 receptions led all NFL rookies in 2014. Miami's Jarvis Landry, Beckham's former LSU

teammate, was 2nd with 84 catches.

- Beckham and Landry were the first rookies from the same college to lead their team in receptions in the same season since the 1970 merger.

- Beckham's 91 receptions were tied with Denver's Eddie Royal (2008) for the 2nd-highest total in NFL history for a rookie; Arizona's Anquan Boldin caught 101 passes in 2003.

- Beckham's 1,305 yards were then the 3rd-highest total in Giants history, surpassed only by Victor Cruz's 1,536 yards in 2011 and Amani Toomer's 1,343 yards in 2002... The 1,305 yards topped all NFL rookies in 2014 and were 254 yards more than runner-up Mike Evans of Tampa Bay. Beckham played 3 fewer games than Evans... Beckham's 1,305 receiving yards surpassed Billy Howton (1,231 with Green Bay in 1952) for the most receiving yards in a player's first 12 career games in NFL history.

- Beckham joined Pro Football Hall of Famer Michael Irvin as the only players in NFL history with at least 90 receiving yards in 9 consecutive games. Irvin accomplished the feat in 1995.

- Beckham led all players in receiving yards in each of his last 6 games, the longest streak ever by an NFL rookie. The previous record was 4 straight games by San Diego's John Jefferson in 1978.

- In the Giants' last 4 games, Beckham totaled 130, 143, 148 and 185 yards to become the first player in franchise history with 4 consecutive 100-yard games. Beckham was the first NFL rookie to accomplish the feat since Pittsburgh's Jimmy Orr in 1958. The 4-game streak was not the NFL's longest in 2014; Denver's Demaryius Thomas had 7 consecutive 100-yard games from Oct. 5-Nov. 16.

- Beckham totaled seven 100-yard games, the most by a rookie since Houston's Bill Groman had 9 in 1960. The previous record for 100-yard games by a Giants rookie was 3, by Byron Williams in 1983.

- Beckham averaged 108.8 yards a game, topping Cruz's previous Giants record of 96.0 yards, set in 2011. Beckham's 108.8-yard average is also an NFL rookie record, topping the old mark of 105.2 set by Groman in 1960.

- Beckham was then just the 4th player in franchise history with at least 12 touchdown receptions in a season. Homer Jones set the record with 13 in 1967. Plaxico Burress (2007) and Del Shofner (1962) also had 12... Beckham and Evans each had 12 touchdown catches, the highest total by an NFL rookie since Minnesota's Randy Moss had 17 in 1998... Beckham's 12 touchdown catches were a Giants rookie record and he tied the franchise total rookie touchdown mark set in 1943 by Bill Paschal (10 rushing, 2 receiving).

- Beckham scored 2 or more touchdowns in 4 games, the most multiple-touchdown games by a Giants player since Brandon Jacobs had 5 in 2008.

- Beckham scored 7 touchdowns in the season's final 4 games, the highest 4-game total by a Giants player since Joe Morris scored 10 from Dec. 1-21, 1985.

- In November, Beckham set Giants records for receptions (31) and receiving yards (503) in one calendar month. He then broke both records in a nearly unprecedented December, when he caught 43 passes for 606 yards. Only 2 other players in NFL history gained at least 600 receiving yards in December of 1 season, and all of them did it in the previous 3 years: Detroit's Calvin Johnson in

2012 (707) and Cleveland's Josh Gordon in 2013 (658).

- Beckham also set an NFL record for receiving yards by a rookie in 1 calendar month, December or otherwise. The previous mark was 596 yards by Groman, which had stood since November 1960. After Groman held the record for 54 years, Beckham fell 3 yards short of tying the mark in November before breaking it in December. The only other players to post back-to-back months of 500 or more receiving yards in one season were Calvin Johnson and Andre Johnson (both in 2012).

- Beckham had the league's highest receiving yardage totals in Week 15 (143 vs. Washington) and Week 16 (148 at St. Louis). The only other NFL rookie to lead the league in consecutive weeks was Philadelphia's Joe Don Looney, who had a streak of 3 consecutive weeks in September 1940. Beckham ranked 2nd in receiving yards in Week 17 with a Giants rookie-record 185 vs. Philadelphia. The Jets' Eric Decker had 221 yards on 10 receptions.

- Beckham had at least 10 catches in a game 4 times, the 1st rookie in NFL history to do that. Pittsburgh's Antonio Brown also had four 10-catch games in 2014. Only 5 players have had 10 or more receptions in 2 games during their rookie seasons, and two of them are Giants. In addition to Beckham, they are LaDainian Tomlinson (2001), Giants tight end Jeremy Shockey (2002), Anquan Boldin (2003) and Marques Colston (2006).

- Beckham had 4 games in which he caught at least 10 passes and gained at least 130 yards. No other rookie in NFL history has even 2 such games.

- Beckham was the first rookie in NFL history with at least 130 receiving yards and a touchdown catch in each of 4 consecutive games.

- In the Giants' final 2 games — at St. Louis and vs. Philadelphia — Beckham had touchdown receptions of 80 and 63 yards. He was the first Giants player to have a touchdown catch of at least 63 yards in consecutive games since Cruz on Dec. 24, 2011 and Jan. 1, 2012. Beckham was the first NFL rookie with such long touchdown catches in back-to-back games since Cincinnati's Isaac Curtis on Dec. 9 and 16, 1973 (70 and 77 yards). Since 1973, rookie receivers Jerry Butler (1979) and Eddie Kennison (1996) had 2 long touchdowns in 1 game, but not back-to-back contests.

- Beckham's 1,043 receiving yards over the final 8 games were the 4th-most ever in the 2nd half of a season. The top 3 are Calvin Johnson 1,197 (2012), Jerry Rice 1,083 (1995) and Josh Gordon 1,064 (2013).

- Beckham was named the NFL Offensive Rookie of the Month in both November and December. He was the first Giants player to win the award twice and just the 2nd wide receiver to be so honored; Arizona's Boldin was twice named Offensive Rookie of the Month in 2003. But Beckham was the first wide receiver to be honored in consecutive months.

- The Offensive Rookie of the Month Award was won by a wide receiver in all 4 months of the 2014 season. Carolina's Kevin Benjamin (September) and Buffalo's Calvin Watkins (October) were the other winners.

- After missing the first 4 games with a hamstring injury, Beckham made his NFL debut in MetLife Stadium vs. Atlanta (10/5). He had a team-high-tying 4 receptions, for 44 yards, including the go-ahead 15-yard touchdown with 10:02 remaining. Beckham was the last of the NFL's 32 first-round draft choices to play in a game in 2014.

- Beckham was the first player since Don Herrmann

on Sept. 21, 1969 to score a game-winning, 4th-quarter touchdown for the Giants in his NFL debut. Herrmann caught a 10-yard pass with 59 seconds remaining to defeat Minnesota in Yankee Stadium, 24-23.

- In addition to Beckham's touchdown, rookie running back Andre Williams scored on a 3-yard run. They were the first Giants rookies to score touchdowns by receiving and rushing, respectively, in the same game since George Adams and Mark Bavaro did it twice in 1985: Oct. 20, 1985: Adams scored on a 2-yard run, Bavaro on a 29-yard reception in a 17-3 win over Washington; Nov. 24, 1985: Adams scored on a 37-yard run, Bavaro on a 12-yard reception in a 34-3 win over the Cardinals in St. Louis.

- Beckham started for the first time at Philadelphia (10/12) and had 2 receptions for 28 yards...Started at Dallas (10/19) and had 4 catches for 34 yards, including touchdowns of 9 and 5 yards. He was the first Giants player to score exactly 2 touchdowns in a game since Brandon Jacobs rushed for 2 scores at Chicago on Oct. 10, 2013. Rueben Randle had been the last Giant to catch 2 touchdown passes in a game, on Oct. 6, 2013 vs. Philadelphia. Tight end Larry Donnell had 3 touchdown receptions at Washington (9/25)...Beckham was the first Giants rookie with at least 3 receiving touchdowns through his first 3 games since Bobby Johnson in 1984...In Dallas, Beckham's first career rushing attempt gained 13 yards on the opening play of the 2nd quarter. He also returned 2 punts for 21 yards.

- Beckham caught 8 passes for 156 yards vs. Indianapolis (11/3), his first career 100-yard game. That total included a 59-yard catch...At Seattle (11/9), Beckham caught 7 passes for 108 yards, his 2nd consecutive 100-yard game.

- Beckham finished 7 yards shy of his 3rd consecutive 100-yard game, catching 6 passes for 93 yards, vs. San Francisco (11/16)...He had 10 receptions for 146 yards and 2 touchdowns vs. Dallas (11/23). He was the first Giants player to score 2 touchdowns in a game since... Beckham, at Dallas on Oct. 19, when he caught scoring passes of 9 and 5 yards.

- Beckham closed the month with 7 catches for 90 yards at Jacksonville (11/30).

- Beckham led the NFL with 593 receiving yards in November. He had 38 catches in the month, the 2nd-most in the league behind Denver's Demaryius Thomas' 41, and the most by a rookie... Beckham had at least 90 receiving yards in every game during November and was the first rookie in NFL history with at least 90 receiving yards in 5 games in a calendar month.

- Beckham had three 100-yard games in November and averaged an NFL-best 118.6 yards per game...His 38 catches and 593 receiving yards were both the most ever by a Giant in a calendar month — until he broke both marks in December... Beckham had at least 6 catches in every November game and Beckham and Thomas were the only 2 players in the NFL to have at least 6 receptions in 5 games during the month.

- Beckham joined Hakeem Nicks (October 2009) as the only wide receivers in franchise history to be named NFL Offensive Rookie of the Month.

- Beckham had 11 catches for 130 yards at Tennessee (12/7) where he became the 2nd rookie in NFL history with at least 700 receiving yards in a 6-game span (he had 723). The other was Houston's Bill Groman in 1960... Against the Titans, Beckham threw a long pass to Randle on the Giants' first offensive series, but the receiver was

double covered and it fell incomplete. It was the first pass thrown by a Giants wide receiver since Sept. 21, 1998, when Amani Toomer threw 1 at St. Louis. It was also incomplete.

- Beckham's 11 catches at Tennessee increased his 6-game total to 49 receptions, the highest total in a 6-game span by a rookie in NFL history. Beckham shattered the previous record of 42, set by... Beckham, in the 6 games prior to the victory over the Titans.

- Beckham was both the first Giants player ever and the first rookie in NFL history with 6 consecutive games with 90 or more receiving yards.

- In addition to his 11 receptions vs. the Titans, Beckham had a 9-yard run and threw a pass. He was the first Giants player to catch, run and throw in the same game since Dec. 24, 2005, when Tiki Barber rushed for 80 yards, caught 6 passes and, like Beckham, threw an incomplete pass.

- In that game, Beckham didn't just catch, run and throw. He also returned 4 punts for 49 yards. The last Giant to do all 4 in a game was David Meggett on Nov. 21, 1994. The coincidence is that was the last game before Dec. 7, 2014 in which the Giants defeated the Oilers/Titans franchise. It was also the last time the Giants played a game with a 7-game losing streak against a team with a 6-game losing streak. To end both the 7-game and 20-year streaks, they needed a multi-dimensional performer. In the 13-10 victory in the Astrodome, Meggett rushed for 17 yards, caught 1 pass, threw an incompletion and returned 2 punts. He had 45 all-purpose yards. Beckham had 188.

- In Tennessee, Andre Williams rushed for 131 yards while Beckham had 130 receiving yards. It was the first time in Giants history the team had rookies with 100 rushing yards and 100 receiving yards in the same game. The Giants were the first team in NFL history to have rookies with at least 130 rushing and receiving yards in the same game.

- Against Washington (12/14), Beckham caught 12 passes for 143 yards and scored all 3 of the Giants' touchdowns. The 12 receptions were the most ever by a Giants rookie wide receiver (he tied that mark 2 weeks later). Beckham had set the record the previous week with 11 receptions at Tennessee. The 12 receptions tied the record for all Giants rookies set by tight end Mark Bavaro at Cincinnati on Oct. 13, 1985.

- Beckham became both the first Giants player and the first NFL rookie with at least 12 catches, 140 receiving yards and 3 touchdown catches in a game. The last NFL player to match and/or exceed those numbers had been Kansas City's Dwayne Bowe, who had 13 catches, 170 yards and 3 scores in a victory at Seattle on Nov. 28, 2010.

- While Beckham had 12 receptions vs. Washington, the other 7 Giants to catch passes totaled 11 receptions.

- Beckham's 12 receptions tied the highest total by a wide receiver in franchise history and was the 6th time a Giants player caught at least 12 passes in a game. Hakeem Nicks had been the last to accomplish the feat, with 12 receptions at Houston on Oct. 10, 2010. Toomer was the only other Giants wideout with 12 catches in a game (Sept. 17, 2006 in an overtime victory in Philadelphia). Bavaro and tight end Jeremy Shockey were the others. Running back Tiki Barber owns the team record with 13 catches at Dallas on Jan. 2, 2000.

- Beckham increased his season receiving yardage total to 972, a Giants rookie record. The old mark of 894 was set by Shockey in 2002. Beckham broke the record in 10 games; Shockey played in 15 games in his debut season.
- Beckham was the first rookie in Giants history to catch 3 touchdown passes in a game. The last Giants rookie to score 3 times in a game had been David Wilson, who rushed for 2 touchdowns and returned a kickoff for another against New Orleans on Dec. 9, 2012.
- Beckham became the first rookie with 3 touchdown catches in a game since Detroit tight end Joseph Fauria had 3 at Cleveland on Oct. 13, 2013.
- Beckham had 23 combined receptions vs. Tennessee and Washington, the highest 2-game total in Giants history. The previous record belonged to Barber, who had 21 catches (8 vs. Minnesota on Dec. 26, 1999 and a team-record 13 at Dallas on Jan. 2, 2000).
- In a 37-27 victory at St. Louis (12/21), Beckham had 8 catches for 148 yards and 2 touchdowns, including an 80-yarder, while Rueben Randle added 6 receptions for a career-high 132 yards and a touchdown. It was the first time the Giants had multiple 100-yard receivers since Sept. 8, 2013, when they had a franchise-record 3 at Dallas (Victor Cruz, 119; Hakeem Nicks, 114; and Randle, 101).
- Beckham's 8 receptions increased his season total to 79, the most in NFL history for a player in his first 11 career games.
- Beckham's 79 receptions were a Giants rookie record. He broke the former mark held by Shockey, who caught 74 passes in 2002.
- Beckham was the 11th different Giants player with at least 1,000 receiving yards in a season. Those 11 players had then accomplished the feat a total of 22 times.
- Beckham's 2 touchdowns in St. Louis increased his season total to 11, which broke Bill Swiacki's Giants rookie record for scoring receptions, which had stood since 1948 (when Swiacki caught 10).
- Beckham's 80-yard touchdown reception in the 3rd quarter was the Giants' longest play from scrimmage since Sept. 16, 2012, when Manning and Cruz hooked up for an 80-yard touchdown pass.
- Beckham's 80-yard score was the longest-ever reception by a Giants rookie. The previous long was a 78-yarder by Harry Newman in 1933.
- Beckham and running back Andre Williams (110 rushing yards) each exceeded 100 yards in the same game for the 2nd time. Before 2014, Giants rookies had not had 100 rushing and 100 receiving yards in the same game even once.
- In St. Louis, Beckham had 148 receiving yards and Randle, his former LSU teammate, added 132. It was the first time 2 players from the same team and the same college each had at least 100 receiving yards in the same game since Sept. 23, 2007, when Oregon State's and the Cincinnati Bengals' T.J. Houshmandzadeh (141) and Chad Johnson (138) did it.
- Beckham concluded his extraordinary rookie season with 12 catches for 185 yards and a touchdown vs. Philadelphia (12/28). It was his second 12-catch game of the season. Beckham was the first rookie in NFL history and the first Giants player with two 12-catch games in a season.

- Beckham was also the first NFL rookie with 4 consecutive games with at least 130 receiving yards and a touchdown. He was the first rookie with 3.
- Beckham's 185 yards established a Giants rookie record. The former record of 176 was set by tight end Mark Bavaro at Cincinnati on Oct. 13, 1985. The team rookie wide receiver record had been 169 yards, set by Earnest Gray vs. San Francisco on Oct. 14, 1979.
- Beckham and Randle each exceeded 100 yards in the final 2 games, the first time the Giants had two 100-yard receivers in back-to-back games since Oct. 6 (Lionel Manuel/Bobby Johnson) and Oct. 13 (Manuel/Bavaro), 1985.
- Beckham was named the NFL Offensive Rookie of the Month in December, the 2nd month in a row he received the award. He was the first Giants player to win the award twice and just the 2nd wide receiver to be so honored; Arizona's Anquan Boldin was twice named Offensive Rookie of the Month in 2003. But Beckham was the first wide receiver to be honored in consecutive months.
- Beckham led the NFL in receptions (43), receiving yards (606) and touchdown catches (7) in December.
- His 606 receiving yards were the most by a rookie in any calendar month in NFL history.
- Beckham was the 3rd player — and only rookie — to gain at least 600 receiving yards in a single December, joining Calvin Johnson (707 in 2012) and Josh Gordon (658 in 2013). Both Johnson and Gordon played in 5 December games while Beckham played in 4.
- Beckham had at least 8 catches, 130 yards and a touchdown in all 4 December games.
- In each of his last 6 games, Beckham led all players in receiving yards. That is the longest such streak by a rookie in NFL history.
- Beckham led the NFL with 593 receiving yards in November and joined Calvin Johnson (2012) and Andre Johnson (2012) as the only players in NFL history with back-to-back months with at least 500 receiving yards. Beckham is the only rookie to accomplish the feat.
- Beckham (91) and Randle (71) became the first Giants duo to record at least 70 receptions each since 2011 (Cruz, 82 and Hakeem Nicks, 76).

COLLEGE:

- In 3 years at LSU, Beckham played in 40 games with 34 starts at split end and recorded 143 receptions for 2,340 yards (16.4-yard avg.) and 12 touchdowns... Returned 42 kickoffs for 1,044 yards (24.9-yard avg.) and 62 punts for 557 yards (9.0-yard avg.) with 2 scores... Added 77 yards on 7 carries... Attempted 1 pass, assisted on a tackle and recovered a fumble in the end zone for a touchdown... Beckham ranked 7th in school history with 2,340 yards receiving and his 143 catches placed him 9th... His 1,044 kickoff return yards were the 6th-highest total in school history, while his 557 punt return yards ranked 10th... Finished 5th on the all-time chart with 4,118 all-purpose yards... Beckham never missed game action due to an injury... In 2013, Beckham started all 13 games and compiled career-high totals of 59 receptions for 1,152 yards and 8 touchdowns... Won the Paul Hornung Award, given annually to the nation's most versatile player by the Louisville Sports Commission... Biletnikoff Award semifinalist... First-team All-Southeastern Conference selection by the league's coaches and the Associated Press... Named the SEC's Special Teams Player of the Week vs.

Alabama-Birmingham and named to the Horning Award Honor Roll vs. UAB, Texas Christian and Mississippi State... Beckham (1,152 yards) and Jarvis Landry (1,193 yards) became the first pair of Tigers receivers with 1,000 receiving yards in the same season... It was just the 3rd time in Southeastern Conference history that 2 teammates had 1,000 receiving yards in the same season, joining Florida's Ike Hilliard (1,008) and Chris Doering (1,045) in 1995 and Florida's Jabar Gaffney (1,191) and Reche Caldwell (1,059) in 2001... LSU was the first team in SEC history to feature a 3,000-yard passer (Zach Mettenberger – 3,082 yards), two 1,000-yard receivers (Beckham and Landry) and a 1,000-yard running back (Jeremy Hill – 1,401 yards) in the same season... Beckham's 1,152 yards was the 4th-best total in school history, and his average of 19.5 yards per catch was the 3rd-highest recorded by a Tiger in a season... Added 58 yards on 5 carries and ranked 3rd in the SEC while placing 20th in the nation with a school record-tying 32 kickoff returns for 845 yards (2nd on the school season-record chart)... In 2012, started 12 games at split end and led the team with 713 receiving yards and placed 2nd with 43 receptions (16.6-yard avg.) with 2 touchdowns... in 2011, Beckham earned freshman All-Southeastern Conference honors after catching 41 passes for 475 yards and 2 touchdowns... Ranked 2nd on the team in both receptions and receiving yards and 20 of his 41 catches resulted in a first down... Played in all 14 games with 9 starts.

PERSONAL:

- Beckham attended Isidore Newman High School in New Orleans, the alma mater of Giants quarterback Eli Manning... Joined Manning's oldest brother, Cooper, as the only players in Newman history to break the 1,000-yard receiving mark in a season as he had 50 receptions for 1,010 yards and 19 touchdowns as a senior... Demonstrated his versatility in 2010, when he rushed for 331 yards and 6 scores, passed for 90 yards and another touchdown and returned 2 punts for scores... On defense he intercepted 4 passes... As a junior, Beckham caught 45 passes for 743 yards and 10 touchdowns... Also posted 123 rushing yards and 3 scores on 14 carries as a junior... The U.S. Army All-American Bowl participant (West Roster) was also named to the Press-Register Super Southeast 120 and Times Picayune 2011 Blue-Chip lists along with earning a spot on The Advocate's Super Dozen... A Prep Star All America, Beckham was named to the Louisiana 2A All-State first team as a wide receiver and also earned District 9-2A Offensive MVP honors... Human movement fitness major at LSU... Father, Odell Beckham Sr., played running back at LSU from 1989-92. His dad played in 28 games with 9 starts and rushed for 757 yards and 7 touchdowns in his career... Mother, Heather Van Norman, was an All-American track runner at LSU from 1991-93 during which time she helped lead the Lady Tigers to 5 national championships. Van Norman was a member of 2 NCAA Indoor titles in 1991 and 1993 and 3 straight NCAA Outdoor titles from 1991-93. She left LSU as a 6-time All-America and captured 3 individual NCAA titles as a member of LSU's relay teams during her senior season in 1993.

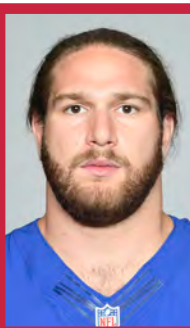

- Originally a 2nd-round (33rd pick overall) draft choice by the Giants in 2015.

GIANTS NOTES:

- In 2016, Collins was named first-team All-Pro by the Associated Press and a starter on the NFC Pro Bowl team. Collins and defensive tackle Damon Harrison were the first Giants selected first-team All-Pro since defensive end Jason Pierre-Paul in 2011... Collins was the first Giants safety to play in the Pro Bowl since Antrel Rolle in 2013.

CAREER HIGHLIGHTS:

- Collins has started all 32 regular-season games and a postseason game since joining the Giants in 2015... In 2016, he led the team in tackles for the 2nd consecutive season, with 125 (100 solo)... The 125 tackles were the most by a safety in Giants history.

- Collins also had 5 interceptions, 4.0 sacks, and 13 passes defended... He is the only player in NFL history to have 100 or more solo tackles, and at least 2.0 sacks, 5 interceptions, and 12 passes defended... Collins was the first NFL safety with 100+ tackles, at least 5 interceptions, and at least 3.0 sacks since Rodney Harrison, then with San Diego, in 2000... He was the only NFL player in 2016 with at least 5 interceptions and at least 4.0 sacks.

- Collins was named the NFC Defensive Player of the Week Award for his performances in Week 7 against the Rams in London (2 interceptions, including 1 he returned for a touchdown, plus 8 solo tackles), and in Week 9 vs. Philadelphia (12 tackles and an interception). The Giants had a bye in Week 8. He was the first Giants player to be named NFC Defensive Player of the Week in consecutive games, the first player in NFL to do it since Charles Tillman in 2012, and first safety since Troy Polamalu in 2010. At the time, Collins was the only NFL player to lead his team in tackles, sacks and interceptions. Collins was the first Giants player with at least 4 interceptions and 3.0 sacks in the same season since Jason Sehorn in 1996.

- Collins was also named the NFC Defensive Player of the Month in November, when, in 4 games, all Giants victories, he had 30 tackles (23 solo), including 1.0 sack, and 3 interceptions... Collins was the first Giants player to win an NFC Defensive Player of the Month Award since Jason Pierre-Paul in December 2011. He was the first Giants safety to be honored. The only other Giants defensive back to win the award was cornerback Jason Sehorn in December 1997.

- Collins opened the 2016 season with 6 solo tackles

and 1 pass defended in a victory at Dallas (9/11)... The following week vs. New Orleans (9/25), he had his first career sack, a 5-yard takedown of Drew Brees that ended the Saints' second possession... Collins was the first Giants safety to register a sack since Craig Dahl tackled New England's Tom Brady for a 5-yard loss on Nov. 15, 2015.

- Collins recorded a 10-yard sack of quarterback Joe Flacco and led the Giants with a career-high 12 tackles (10 solo), including 2 for losses, vs. Baltimore (10/16).

- Against the Rams in London (10/23), Collins scored the Giants' first defensive touchdown of the season when he intercepted a Case Keenum pass that was tipped by wide receiver Tavon Austin and reached the end zone after a spectacular 44-yard return in which he reversed field from right to left, and avoided numerous attempted tackles with 7:10 remaining in the 2nd quarter. It was the Giants' first touchdown by a defensive player since cornerback Trevin Wade scored on a 5-yard fumble return on the game's final play at Tampa Bay on Nov. 8, 2015. It was the Giants' first interception return for a touchdown since Trumaine McBride's 63-yard return at New Orleans on Nov. 1, 2015. Collins later had another interception, and recorded a game-high 8 solo tackles.

- In that game, cornerback Dominique Rodgers-Cromartie picked off Keenum in the end zone on the Rams' final 2 possessions. Collins and DRC were the first pair of teammates with multiple interceptions each in a single game since Seattle's Byron Maxwell and Richard Sherman in Week 15 of the 2013 season - ironically, against the Giants in MetLife Stadium. They are the first Giants duo to accomplish the feat since Kenny Hill and Terry Kinard vs. San Diego on Sept. 14, 1986.

- When the Giants returned to action after their bye vs. Philadelphia (11/6), Collins intercepted his 3rd pass in 2 games when he picked off a Carson Wentz throw intended for Nelson Agholor on the 2nd play of the game. Collins' 3 picks in 2 games duplicates a feat accomplished by Rodgers-Cromartie from Oct. 25-Nov. 1, 2015... In addition to his interception, Collins tied his career-high with 12 tackles (6 solo) and sacked Wentz for a 12-yard loss on the final play of the first half... He was the first Giants player with an interception and a sack in the same game since defensive end Kerry Wynn did it at St. Louis on Dec. 21, 2014, and the first defensive back to do it since safety Antrel Rolle on Oct. 27, 2013, at Philadelphia. Collins also led the Giants with 12 tackles (6 solo) to earn his second consecutive Player of the Week award.

- Collins had 5 solo tackles and an interception vs. Cincinnati (11/14). That gave him at least 1 interception

in each of 3 consecutive games, the first Giants player to do that since linebacker Michael Boley in the first 3 games of the 2012 season against Dallas and Tampa Bay at home, and on the road at Carolina...Collins was the first Giants player with 4 interceptions in a 3-game span since cornerback Phillippi Sparks had 2 picks in each of 2 consecutive games (Nov. 23 and 30, 1997, at Washington and vs. Tampa Bay).

- Collins had 6 unassisted stops and another pick vs. Chicago (11/20)...Against the Bears, Collins made the big play at the end of the game, intercepting a Jay Cutler pass at the Giants' 21-yard line with 1:11 remaining to end the Bears' last threat. Collins had intercepted at least 1 pass in each of 4 consecutive games, tying a Giants record since the NFL merger...He was the first Giants player to do that since Sparks also had a 4-game streak from Oct. 15-Nov. 12, 1995...Spider Lockhart (1970) and Terry Jackson (1978) were the other Giants players with picks in 4 straight games.

- Collins had 5 interceptions in that 4-game span to become the first Giants player to accomplish that feat since Willie Williams from Nov. 24-Dec. 15, 1968. He was the 2nd NFL player to do it in 2016, joining Kansas City cornerback Marcus Peters (Sept. 18-Oct. 16)...Collins was the first NFL player with at least 5 interceptions and at least 3.0 sacks through his team's first 10 games since Green Bay's LeRoy Butler in 1996 (5 interceptions, 3.5 sacks).

- Collins' interception streak ended in the Giants' victory at Cleveland (11/27), but he contributed 7 tackles (6 solo)...He had 6 tackles (4 solo), and an important 4th-quarter fumble recovery vs. Dallas (12/11), 8 tackles (7 solo) vs. Detroit (12/16), and 9 unassisted stops at Philadelphia (12/22)...Picked up his 4th sack of the season when he dropped Kirk Cousins for a 12-yard loss on the 2nd-to-last play of the first quarter at Washington (1/1). Collins' 4.0 sacks led all NFL safeties.

- Collins had 9 tackles (6 solo), including a sack in his postseason debut in the NFC Wild Card Game at Green Bay (1/8).

- As a rookie in 2015, Collins started all 16 games at free safety, the team's first defensive rookie to start every game since tackle Barry Cofield in 2006. Collins was the first Giants rookie safety to start every game...Collins led the Giants with 108 tackles (80 solo). He also had 9 passes defended, 1 interception, and 4 special teams tackles.

- In his NFL debut, Collins had 4 tackles (2 solo) at Dallas (9/13)...First-round draft choice Ereck Flowers also started that game at left tackle. It was the first time the Giants' first and 2nd-round draft choices started the season opener as rookies since Aug. 31, 1997, when wide receiver Ike Hilliard (first round) and running back Tiki Barber (2nd) started in a victory over Philadelphia.

- Collins had 6 tackles in each of the next 4 games, including 6 solo stops vs. Atlanta (9/20)...Finished with a season-high 9 tackles 3 times: 6 solo vs. Dallas (9/25), 4 solo at New Orleans (11/1), and 7 solo vs. Carolina (12/20)...Also had 3 tackles in 3 games...Picked off a Sam Bradford pass for his first career interception at Philadelphia (10/19).

COLLEGE:

- Collins played in 41 games with 23 starts at Alabama...Career totals included 190 tackles (120 solo), 8.5 stops for losses of 22 yards, 4 fumble recoveries, 5 interceptions for 103 return yards, 13 yards on a blocked

- In 2016, played in all 16 games with 1 start (vs. Philadelphia on 11/6)...Caught 1 pass, but made the most of it, scoring a touchdown on a 13-yard throw from Manning with 7:03 remaining in the 2nd quarter at Cleveland (11/27)...Led the Giants in kickoff and punt returns for the 2nd straight season...Finished 5th in the NFL with a 24.2-yard average on 22 kickoff returns...Also averaged 5.9 yards on 29 punt returns...Harris returned 3 kickoffs in 4 games, and had a season-best 34.3-yard average at Green Bay (10/9)...Had a season-long 46-yard runback vs. Chicago (11/20)...Harris' season-long 14-yard punt return was vs. Washington (9/25)...Harris and long-snapper Zak DeOssie tied for the team lead with 7 special teams tackles.

- In his first season with the Giants in 2015, Harris played in 15 games with 6 starts...Inactive vs. Philadelphia (1/3) with a shoulder injury...Recorded a career-high 36 receptions (3 more than he had in his first 4 seasons combined) for 396 yards, and 4 touchdowns, which were also career-highs...Finished 3rd in the NFL with a 28.7-yard average on 22 kickoff returns, including a 100-yard runback for a touchdown vs. Dallas (10/25). That was the 4th-highest average in Giants history among qualifiers for the league title...Also led the team and

was 7th in the NFL with a 10.0-yard average on 34 punt returns, including an 80-yard touchdown vs. the Jets. That was the 5th-highest average in Giants history.

- Harris was the 3rd player in Giants history with kickoff and punt return touchdowns in the same season, and the first to do it in 60 years. In 1951, Pro Football Hall of Famer Emlen Tunnell scored on an 81-yard punt return vs. the Chicago Cardinals on Oct. 14, and a 100-yard kickoff return vs. the New York Yanks on Nov. 4. In 1955, Jimmy Patton scored on a 98-yard kickoff return and a 69-yard punt return, both against Washington on Oct. 30. Patton, of course, is the only player in Giants history with kickoff and punt return touchdowns in the same game.

- Harris is the first player in Giants history to score on a punt return, kickoff return and a reception in the same season.

- Returned a season-high 4 punts, for 66 yards, including a 29-yarder, vs. Atlanta (9/20)...Caught the first 5 passes of his Giants career for 51 yards, at Buffalo (10/4), where he also returned 3 punts for 18 yards...Had a season-high 6 receptions, for 72 yards, and 3 punt returns for 31 yards, vs. San Francisco (10/11)...Recorded 2 receptions for 18 yards, and 2 kickoff returns for 49 yards, at Philadelphia (10/19).

- Caught 2 passes for 43 yards, including a season-long 38-yarder, and returned 3 kickoffs for 149 yards, including a 100-yard game-winning touchdown, vs. Dallas. Harris broke a 20-20 tie when he scored with 7:01 remaining in the game, making it the first kickoff return in Giants history that accounted for the deciding points in the 4th quarter of a game in which the Giants trailed or were tied. The previous such return in the NFL was on Jan. 1, 2006, when the Jets' Justin Miller scored the game-winning points in a 30-26 victory over Buffalo on a 95-yard return with 5:58 remaining...Harris' 100-yard runback tied the franchise record, set by Emlen Tunnell vs. the New York Yanks on Nov. 4, 1951, tied by Clarence Childs vs. Minnesota on Dec. 6, 1964...Harris joined the Giants after 4 seasons with the Cowboys. He was only the 3rd player in NFL history with a kickoff return touchdown vs. a team for which he played the previous season. The others were Bo Roberson (87 yards for Oakland vs. San Diego on Sept. 30, 1962), and Aaron Stecker (98 yards for New Orleans vs. Tampa Bay on Dec. 19, 2004).

- In addition to Harris' kickoff return, the Giants scored against Dallas on Rodgers-Cromartie's 58-yard interception return. It was the first time the Giants scored on interception and kickoff returns in the same game since a victory over the New York Yanks on Nov. 4, 1951, when

Emlen Tunnell returned a kickoff 100 yards, and Tom Landry picked off a pass that he ran back 55 yards for a touchdown. Although it was the first time the Giants hit that daily double in a regular-season game in 64 years, they did it in a postseason game just 15 years earlier. On Jan. 7, 2001, Dixon returned the opening kickoff 97 yards for a score, and Jason Sehorn picked off a pass and ran it back 32 yards for a touchdown.

- Before that victory over Dallas, the Giants had last scored defensive and special teams touchdowns of any kind in the same game on Sept. 5, 1988, when Tom Flynn returned a blocked punt 27 yards for 1 score, and Jim Burt scooped up a fumble and ran it back 39 yards for another touchdown.

- For his exploits vs. the Cowboys, Harris received his 4th NFC Special Teams Player of the Week award, and the first by a Giants returner since 2012 Week 14 (David Wilson).

- Harris had season-high totals of 6 catches and 82 yards, and returned 4 punts for 41 yards, and 2 kickoffs for 38 yards vs. New England. (11/15)...Had 2 receptions for 28 yards at Washington (11/29).

- Against the Jets (12/6) Harris caught 1 pass for 8 yards, returned 4 kickoffs for 104 yards, and ran back 2 punts for 96 yards, including an 80-yard touchdown. Jenkins, Collins and Harris played in the game for the first time. The Giants sent two defensive backs to the Pro Bowl for the first time since 1963, when Erich Barnes and Dick Lynch were selected.

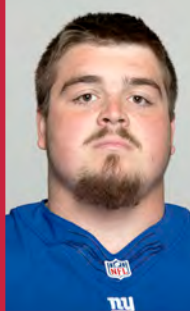

- Kennard had 2.0 sacks at Jacksonville (11/30) and at Tennessee to become the first Giants player with at least 2.0 sacks in back-to-back games since Tuck, who had 4.0 at Washington on Dec. 1 and 2.0 at San Diego on Dec. 8, 2013. Kennard was the first Giants rookie to do it since Jason Pierre-Paul on Nov. 28 and Dec. 5, 2010. Kennard and JPP are the only Giants rookies to have at least 2.0 sacks in back-to-back games...The last Giants linebacker to accomplish the feat had been Armstead on Oct. 3-10, 1999. Kennard was the first Giants rookie linebacker with at least 2.0 sacks in consecutive games and the first NFL rookie linebacker to do it since San Francisco's Aldon Smith in 2011.

- Kennard, Pierre-Paul and Damontre Moore each had 2.0 sacks vs. the Titans. It was the first time the Giants had 3 different players with at least 2.0 sacks since Sept. 30, 2007, when Osi Umenyiora (team-record 6.0), Kiwanuka (3.0) and Tuck (2.0) did it. That night, the Giants set a franchise record with 12.0 sacks, all on Donovan McNabb.

- Kennard made his NFL debut at linebacker and on special teams at Detroit (9/8)...Recorded his first 4 tackles (3 solo) at Dallas (10/19) and followed with 4 tackles (3 solo) vs. Indianapolis (11/3)...Started for the first time and contributed a season-high 9 tackles (7 solo) vs. San Francisco (11/16)...Had 3 solo tackles at Jacksonville...Recorded 7 solo tackles, a half-sack and 1 forced fumble vs. Washington (12/14)...Had 4 solo stops in his final game, at St. Louis (12/21).

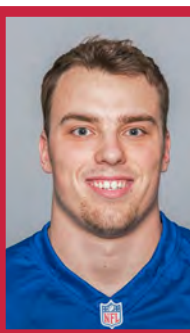

- Lewis caught 1 pass in each of the next 6 games, including a season-long 30-yard touchdown vs. Philadelphia (11/6). He was the first Giants player with 2 touchdown receptions among his first 3 career catches since Johnson in 2008. The previous NFL players to do it were Houston's Jaelen Strong and Tennessee's Dorial Green-Beckham in 2015...Made his first career start vs. Cincinnati (11/14), and caught 1 pass for 2 yards... Lewis caught his final pass, an 8-yarder, at Pittsburgh (12/4).

COLLEGE:

TRANSACTIONS:

- Originally a 1st-round (1st pick overall) draft choice by the San Diego Chargers in 2004. Obtained by the Giants in a trade for quarterback Philip Rivers (whom the Giants had taken with the 4th pick), the Giants' 2004 3rd-round pick, and 2005 first and 5th-round selections.

GIANTS NOTES:

- Followed his father, Archie, and brother, Peyton, into the NFL... Archie was the 2nd pick of the 1971 draft and played 14 years with New Orleans, Houston and Minnesota. Peyton was the first choice of the 1998 draft by the Indianapolis Colts, a 5-time NFL Most Valuable Player, and the winning quarterback in Super Bowl XLI with Indianapolis and Super Bowl 50 with Denver. Peyton Manning is the only quarterback in history to start and win Super Bowls with 2 different teams.

- Manning's arrival marked the first time the Giants came out of a draft with the top player selected since 1965, when they chose Auburn running back Tucker Fredrickson.

- Manning won the Rozelle Trophy as the Most Valuable Player in Super Bowls XLII and XLVI. He is 1 of 5 players in NFL history to win multiple Super Bowl MVP awards, and all of them are quarterbacks (Tom Brady, 4; Joe Montana, 3; Terry Bradshaw and Bart Starr, 2 apiece).

- Manning is the only Giants player to win the Rozelle Trophy multiple times. Previous Giants Super Bowl MVPs include quarterback Phil Simms (Super Bowl XXI) and running back Ottis Anderson (Super Bowl XXV).

- In the Giants' 21-17 victory over New England in Super Bowl XLVI on Feb. 5, 2012, Manning hit 9 different targets while completing 30 of 40 passes for 296 yards, a touchdown and no interceptions (a passer rating of 103.8). It was the 25th time in Super Bowl history a quarterback won the MVP award. Since then, quarterbacks have been awarded 3 of the 5 Super Bowl MVP awards, including Brady twice. Manning is 1 of 20 different quarterbacks to be named the MVP of a Super Bowl.

- Manning was named MVP in Super Bowl XLII after completing 19 of 34 passes for 255 yards, 2 touchdowns and an interception that caromed off Steve Smith's hands. It was the 2nd year in a row a Manning won the award; his brother received the honor after Super Bowl XLI the previous season.

- Manning is 1 of 31 different starting quarterbacks to win a Super Bowl and 1 of 2 Mannings. Peyton won titles with the Colts in 2006 and the Broncos in 2015. The Mannings were the 18th set of brothers to play in the

Super Bowl and the first pair of brothers to play quarterback.

- Manning is 1 of 20 quarterbacks to win a Super Bowl without losing 1.

- Manning is 1 of 12 quarterbacks to win at least 2 Super Bowls.

- Manning is 1 of 8 quarterbacks taken with the first overall selection in the NFL Draft to start a Super Bowl. The others are Terry Bradshaw (4-0 in Super Bowls), Jim Plunkett (2-0), John Elway (2-3), Troy Aikman (3-0), Drew Bledsoe (0-1), Peyton Manning (2-2), and Cam Newton (0-1). The former No. 1 choices are 15-7 in Super Bowls.

- Manning and Brady were the starting quarterbacks in Super Bowl XLVI, as they were in Super Bowl XLII. It was the 3rd starting quarterback rematch in Super Bowl history and each resulted in a sweep. Terry Bradshaw and Pittsburgh defeated Roger Staubach and Dallas in Super Bowls X and XIII, and Troy Aikman and Dallas beat Jim Kelly and Buffalo in Super Bowls XXVII and XXVIII.

- Super Bowl XLVI was the first Super Bowl in which both starting quarterbacks had won a Super Bowl MVP award.

- Manning was the first quarterback to start 2 Super Bowls for the Giants. In their first 4 Super Bowls, 4 different quarterbacks started for the Giants. The others were Phil Simms, Jeff Hostetler and Kerry Collins. The Giants were the first team to start a different quarterback in each of their first 4 Super Bowls. Only 2 other teams have started 4 different quarterbacks in a Super Bowl, though not in the franchise's first 4 games. The Raiders have started Daryle Lamonica, Ken Stabler, Jim Plunkett and Rich Gannon. Washington's 4 Super Bowl quarterbacks were Billy Kilmer, Joe Theismann, Doug Williams and Mark Rypien.

- Manning is the only quarterback to wear No. 10 and win a Super Bowl. The only other starting quarterback to wear No. 10 in a Super Bowl was Minnesota's Fran Tarkenton in Super Bowls VIII, IX and XI.

- Manning has 5 game-winning 4th quarter or overtime drives in the playoffs. He is 1 of 4 quarterbacks since the 1970 merger to accomplish that feat, joining Brady (10), John Elway (6) and Joe Montana (5).

- In 2011, Manning set an NFL record with 15 fourth-quarter touchdown passes. The previous record of 14 was set by Hall of Famer Johnny Unitas in 1959 and tied by Peyton Manning (2002).

- Manning has thrown at least 2 touchdown passes

against each of the NFL's 31 other teams.

- Manning's record as a starter is 108-91 (.543) in the regular season and 8-4 (.667) in the postseason. The 108 victories are the most by a quarterback in Giants history. Manning set the record with his 96th career victory at Tampa Bay on Nov. 8, 2015. Simms, the former record-holder, won 95 games from 1979-93. Manning is 81-67 against the NFC and 27-24 vs. the AFC. He is 40-35 in NFC East games, 57-43 at home and 51-48 on the road.

- Manning's record as a starter in October is 35-12, a .745 winning percentage that is the 5th-highest among quarterbacks with at least 20 starts in the Super Bowl era.

- Manning has started the Giants' last 199 regular-season games, the longest streak among active players regardless of position, and the 3rd-longest streak by a quarterback in NFL history. Only Brett Favre (297) and Peyton Manning (208) started more consecutive games than Manning. Los Angeles' Philip Rivers, the player for whom Manning was traded during the 2004 NFL Draft, enters the 2017 season with the 2nd-longest streak among active players with 176 consecutive starts.

- Manning's 199 regular-season starts place him 3rd among active quarterbacks entering the 2017 season, behind New England's Tom Brady (235) and New Orleans' Drew Brees (232).

- Tom Coughlin was the Giants' head coach during Manning's first 12 seasons. Their 183 starts together is the 3rd-highest total for a quarterback/coach combination in NFL history, exceeded only by New England's Brady and Bill Belichick (235 entering the 2017 season) and Miami's Dan Marino and Don Shula (184 games from 1983-95). Manning and Coughlin hold the record for the longest streak of consecutive starts by a quarterback/coach tandem.

- Manning's 199 consecutive starts is a record for Giants quarterbacks. The previous mark of 69 starts in a row was set by Fran Tarkenton from 1967-71.

- Manning's 199 consecutive starts is easily the longest streak by a Giants player since the 1970 merger. Former offensive lineman David Diehl is second with 120 straight starts from 2003-10.

- Since Manning made his first start on Nov. 21, 2004, 181 other quarterbacks have started an NFL regular-season game, including 33 different starters among the other 3 NFC East teams.

- Manning had played in 199 consecutive games when the 2016 season ended. That was the league's 3th-longest active streak, behind Houston punter Shane Lechler (238) and Dallas tight end Jason Witten (219).

- Manning threw for at least 3,000 yards and 20 touchdowns in 8 consecutive seasons from 2005-12, the 5th-longest such streak in NFL history. Peyton Manning holds the record with 13 seasons in a row.

- Manning and New Orleans' Drew Brees were the only quarterbacks to throw for at least 3,000 yards and at least 20 touchdown passes every season from 2005-12.

- Manning is the first Giants quarterback to throw for more than 3,000 yards in 12 consecutive seasons, the first to have six 4,000-yard seasons (2009-11, 2014-16) and the first to throw at least 20 touchdown passes 8 years in a row.

- Manning's career totals of 6,825 attempts, 4,072 completions, 48,214 yards, 320 touchdowns, and 215 interceptions are all Giants franchise records. He has 2,178 more attempts, 1,496 more completions, 14,752

more yards, 121 more touchdown passes, and 48 more interceptions than anyone else in Giants history. Phil Simms is No. 2 in every category except interceptions, where Charlie Conerly is 2nd.

- Manning's 6,825 attempts, 4,072 completions and 320 touchdown passes all place him 7th in NFL history, and his 48,214 yards are the 8th-highest alltime total.

- Manning holds the Giants career postseason records with 400 pass attempts, 242 completions, 60.5 completion percentage, 2,815 yards and 18 touchdown passes. His 9 postseason interceptions are 1 less than Y.A. Tittle threw.

- Manning's 4,072 regular-season completions have been to 74 different receivers, with Hakeem Nicks (313), Victor Cruz (303), and Odell Beckham, Jr. (288), the top 3 recipients. His 242 postseason completions have gone to 31 different receivers with Nicks (28), Amani Toomer (26), and Cruz (24), the top 3.

- Manning's 320 regular-season touchdown passes have been caught by 45 different receivers, with Beckham (35), Plaxico Burress (33), and Nicks (26), ranking 1-3.

- Manning's career completion percentage of 59.66 is first in Giants history among quarterbacks with at least 1,000 attempts. Kerry Collins is 2nd at 58.51.

- Manning's four 300-yard games in 2016 increased his Giants record total to 43. Simms is 2nd with 21. The Giants are 19-24 when Manning throws for at least 300 yards.

- Manning has led the Giants on 34 regular-season game-winning drives in his career (victories in which he has rallied the Giants from a 4th-quarter deficit or tie to win). That was the 4th-highest total among active quarterbacks at the end of the 2016 season, behind Tom Brady (40), Drew Brees (38), and Ben Roethlisberger (35).

- Manning has been selected to play in 4 Pro Bowls and played in the game 3 times. In his most recent appearance, following the 2015 season, Manning completed 6 of 9 passes for 75 yards and a touchdown. He played in the game following the 2008 and 2012 seasons, and was selected but did not play in the 2011 Pro Bowl because the Giants were in the Super Bowl. When he played in his first Pro Bowl following the 2008 season Manning became the first Giants quarterback to be selected to the game since Simms in 1993.

- Co-recipient (with Larry Fitzgerald) of the 2016 Walter Payton NFL Man of the Year Award.

- Named The Sporting News' 2008 Pro Athlete of the Year.

CAREER HIGHLIGHTS:

- Has played in 201 regular-season games with starts in his last 199 appearances, and has started all 12 postseason games in which he's played. The 201 games played for the Giants is the highest total among active players and leaves him in a tie for 3rd place with George Martin. Hall of Famer Michael Strahan played in a franchise-record 216 games, and Howard Cross played in 207.

- In the regular season, Manning has completed 4,072 of 6,825 passes (59.7%) for 48,214, 320 touchdowns and 215 interceptions for a passer rating of 83.7.

- Manning is first in franchise history in attempts, completions, passing yards, touchdown passes and interceptions.

- Manning's career completion percentage of 59.66 is the highest in Giants history among quarterbacks with at least

1,000 attempts. Kerry Collins is 2nd at 58.51 (1,447-2,473).

- Manning's record as a regular-season starter is 108-91 (.543). The 108 victories are a Giants record. Simms formerly held the mark with 95 triumphs from 1979-93.

- Manning has a franchise-record 43 300-yard games (4 in 2016), eight 400-yard games, one 500-yard game, and a long pass of 99 yards. The Giants are 19-24 in regular-season games in which Manning throws for 300 yards, 4-4 when he throws for 400 yards, and 1-0 when he passes for 500 yards. They are 2-0 in his postseason 300-yard games.

- The Giants are 95-70 when Manning throws at least 1 touchdown pass, 25-6 when he throws exactly 3, 29-13 when he is not sacked, and 50-23 when he is not intercepted.

- Manning holds the Giants career postseason records with 400 pass attempts, 242 completions, 60.5 completion percentage, 2,815 yards and 18 touchdown passes. His 9 postseason interceptions are 1 less than Y.A. Tittle threw.

- Manning has thrown at least 1 touchdown pass to 45 different receivers in regular-season games.

- In 2016, Manning started all 16 games for the 12th consecutive season, and increased his starting streak to 199 consecutive regular-season games, the longest among active players, regardless of position. He was 1 of 14 quarterbacks to start all 16 regular-season games.

- Manning completed 377 of 598 passes (63.0 %) for 4,017 yards, 26 touchdowns, 16 interceptions, and a passer rating of 86.0. Manning exceeded 4,000 passing yards for the 3rd consecutive season, and the 6th time in his career.

- Manning owns the 5 highest single-season completion totals in Giants history: 387 in 2015, 379 in 2014, 377 in 2016, 359 in 2011 and 339 in 2010.

- Manning is 1 of 3 quarterbacks with at least 300 completions in each of the last 8 seasons. The others are Drew Brees and Philip Rivers.

- Manning's 63.0 completion percentage was slightly less than his career-best of 63.1, set in 2014.

- Manning joined Cincinnati's Andy Dalton and Detroit's Matthew Stafford as the only quarterbacks to throw every 1 of their team's passes in 2016.

- Manning is 1 of 7 quarterbacks in NFL history to throw for at least 3,000 yards in 12 different seasons, joining Brett Favre (18), Peyton Manning (16), Tom Brady (13), Dan Marino (13), Drew Brees (12), and John Elway (12).

- Manning is the 4th quarterback to throw for 3,000 yards in 12 consecutive seasons, joining Favre (18 from 1992 to 2009), Peyton Manning (13 from 1998 to 2010), and Brees (13 from 2004-16).

- The 2016 season was the 11th in which Manning threw at least 20 touchdown passes. The only other quarterbacks with more such seasons are Peyton Manning (16), Favre (15), Tom Brady (14), Marino (13), and Brees (13).

- Manning's four 300-yard games in 2016 increased his Giants record total to 43. Phil Simms is second with 21. The Giants are 19-24 when Manning throws for at least 300 yards.

- Manning led the Giants to an 11-5 record and the 6th postseason berth of his career. His record as a starting quarterback is 108-91 in the regular season and 8-4 in the postseason. In the regular season, he is 57-43 at home, including 31-24 in MetLife Stadium, and 51-48 on the road.

- Manning was sacked 21 times, increasing his career

total to 328.

- Manning was 3-1 against rookie quarterbacks Dak Prescott of Dallas and Carson Wentz of Philadelphia, and is 10-5 in his career vs. first-year quarterbacks.

- In the home opener vs. New Orleans (9/18), Manning completed a season-high 78% of his passes (32 of 41), including a 34-yarder to Victor Cruz late in the 4th quarter that set up the game-winning field goal.

- Manning's 350 passing yards vs. Washington (9/25), increased his career total to 45,112. He became the 10th player in NFL history to reach 45,000 career passing yards.

- Manning's 25 completions at Minnesota (10/3) increased his career total to 3,796, and moved him past Vinny Testaverde (3,787) and into 9th place on the NFL's career list.

- Manning's 67-yard completion to rookie Paul Perkins vs. the Vikings was the 2nd-longest of his career to a running back. On Dec. 6, 2009, against Dallas, he threw a 74-yarder to Brandon Jacobs, who, like Perkins, turned a short pass into a long gain. Unlike Perkins, Jacobs scored.

- Manning played in his 200th game in a Giants uniform in Minnesota (189 regular season and 11 postseason). He is the 10th quarterback in NFL history to play at least 200 combined games with 1 team.

- At Green Bay (10/9), Manning completed 18 of 35 passes for 199 yards, 1 touchdown and no interceptions. That ended his streak of consecutive games in which he threw for at least 200 yards at 13. Manning's last sub-200-yard game had been Oct 25, 2015, when he passed for 170 yards in a victory over Dallas.

- Manning started his 200th overall game for the Giants (189 regular season, 11 postseason) in a victory vs. Baltimore (10/16). He is the 6th quarterback in NFL history to start at least 200 games for 1 franchise, joining John Elway (Denver), Brett Favre (Green Bay), Peyton Manning (Indianapolis), Dan Marino (Miami), and Tom Brady (New England). Among the players on that list, Manning is closest to his brother, Peyton, who started 227 games for the Colts.

- In that game, starting quarterbacks Manning and Baltimore's Joe Flacco were each former Super Bowl MVP's (Manning in XLII and XLVI, and Flacco in XLVII). It was the 47th time since the start of the 2010 season that 2 Super Bowl MVP-winning quarterbacks faced each other in a regular-season game – and the 3rd in 2016 for Manning, who previously went up against New Orleans' Drew Brees and Green Bay's Aaron Rodgers. The Giants' victory improved the home teams' record in those games to 37-10.

- Manning is the 6th quarterback with at least 100 victories and 2 Super Bowl triumphs with the same team, joining Terry Bradshaw, Tom Brady, John Elway, Joe Montana and Ben Roethlisberger.

- Manning threw for a season-high 403 yards vs. the Ravens. The Giants are 4-4 when Manning throws for at least 400 yards.

- Against Baltimore, Manning threw touchdown passes of 24 yards to Roger Lewis, Jr. and 75 and 66 yards to Odell Beckham, Jr. The last, on a 4th-and-1 with 1:24 remaining, was the game-winner. East of the first 2 was a milestone achievement. The first was the 300th touchdown pass of Manning's 13-year career; he became the 8th quarterback in history to throw for at least 300 scores. The 2nd broke a tie with Pro Football Hall of Famer John

Elway and moved Manning into sole possession of 7th place on the NFL's career list. Former Giants quarterback Fran Tarkenton is 6th with 342.

- Manning threw his 300th touchdown pass in his 191st game. That is the 6th fastest (or 3rd slowest) to 300 among the 8 players on the list. Peyton Manning and Dan Marino each reached the milestone in their 157th game.

- In a victory vs. the Los Angeles Rams in London (10/23), Manning completed 24 of 37 passes for 196 yards — and did not throw a touchdown pass or interception, and was not sacked. It was just the 2nd time in his career he had zero touchdown passes and interceptions while also avoiding a sack. The previous instance was on Oct. 16, 2011 in a victory over Buffalo — also a game immediately preceding a bye.

- Manning improved his record as a starter vs. the Rams to 5-0. That is his highest number of victories vs. any opponent against which he does not have a defeat. Manning is 4-0 vs. Tampa Bay and 3-0 against Buffalo, Houston, Miami and Oakland.

- Manning has contributed to 5 of what is now a 7-game Giants winning streak against the Rams dating back to 2002. The Giants still trail in the all-time regular-season series, 25-16.

- Twickenham Stadium in London was the 37th different stadium in which Manning has started a regular-season game. Case Keenum was the 84th different starting quarterback he has faced.

- Manning threw a season-high 4 touchdown passes in a 28-23 victory vs. Philadelphia (11/6). Beckham Jr. had 2 of the scores, and rookies Lewis Jr. and Sterling Shepard had the others. Manning completed 22 of 36 passes for 257 yards, and threw 2 interceptions.

- It was the 12th game in which Manning threw exactly 4 touchdown passes; the Giants are 7-5 in those games.

- Manning has thrown at least 4 touchdown passes in a game 14 times (including 1 game apiece with 5 and 6 touchdown passes). That is the 4th-highest total among active quarterbacks, behind Drew Brees (33), Tom Brady (27) and Aaron Rodgers (22). The NFL record is 35 by Peyton Manning.

- Manning's 14 games with 4 or more touchdown passes are twice as many as any other quarterback in Giants history. Hall of Famer Y.A. Tittle had 7 such games.

- Manning threw 2 touchdown pass in the first quarter for the first time since Dec. 30, 2012, when he had 3 in the Giants' previous home victory against the Eagles.

- Manning threw touchdown passes of 26 and 1 yards to Beckham Jr., 30 yards to Lewis Jr., and 32 yards to Shepard. It was the second time in his career he threw 3 scoring pass of 25 or more yards in a game. On Sept. 25, 2011 in Philadelphia, he threw touchdown passes of 40 yards to Brandon Jacobs, and 74 and 28 yards to Victor Cruz.

- In the last 25 seasons, a quarterback has thrown 3 touchdown passes of 25 or more yards in a game vs. the Eagles 3 times: Eli Manning in 2011 and 2016, and Peyton Manning on Nov. 10, 2002.

- In a 21-20 Monday night victory vs. Cincinnati (11/14), Manning completed 28 of 44 passes for 240 yards, 3 touchdowns, and 2 interceptions. At that point, each of the Giants' last 7 touchdowns was on a Manning pass.

- After throwing for 3 scores against the Bengals, Manning has thrown at least 2 touchdown passes against

each of the league's 31 other teams.

- Manning threw a 10-yard touchdown pass to tight end Jerrell Adams for the rookie's 1st NFL score, as well as touchdown passes of 10 yards to Beckham Jr. and the game-winning 3-yarder to Sterling Shepard. The throw to Shepard was Manning's 100th regular-season touchdown pass in MetLife Stadium.

- Manning's Monday night record improved to 9-8.

- In a 27-13 victory at Cleveland (11/27), Manning threw at least 3 touchdown passes for the 5th and last time in 2016, tying the career-high for 3-touchdown games he previously set in 2012, 2014 and 2015.

- Against the Browns, Manning completed 15 of 27 passes for 194 yards, 3 touchdowns and no interceptions for a season-high 115.4 passer rating.

- Manning completed 24 of 39 passes for 195 yards, 2 touchdowns and 2 interceptions at Pittsburgh (12/4). He had thrown for 194 yards the previous week in Cleveland. It was Manning's 2nd consecutive sub-200 yard game, the first time that happened since Oct. 19-25, 2015 vs. Philadelphia and Dallas.

- Manning increased his season total to 3,097 passing yards, his 12th consecutive 3,000-yard season. He is the 4th quarterback in history with at least 12 straight seasons with 3,000 passing yards:

- Manning completed 17 of 28 passes for 193 yards, a touchdown and an interception in a 10-7 victory vs. Dallas (12/11).

- Manning's 28 passes increased his career total to 6,707, which moved him past Vinny Testaverde (6,701) and into 9th place on the NFL's career list.

- Manning's 17 completions increased his career total to 3,997 and moved him past Pro Football Hall of Famer Warren Moon (3,988) and into 7th place on the alltime list.

- In a 17-6 victory vs. Detroit (12/18), Manning completed 20 of 28 passes for 201 yards, touchdowns to Shepard and Beckham, and no interceptions for a passer rating of 115.3 that was just under his season-best 115.4 that he posted in Cleveland.

- Manning completed 71.4% of his passes, his 2nd-highest percentage of the season. He completed 78% of his passes (32 of 41) against New Orleans on Sept. 18.

- Manning completed his first 11 passes, a career-high to start a game. He had previously completed his first 10 passes on 2 occasions: Nov. 13, 2011 at San Francisco, and Oct. 19, 2015 at Philadelphia. The streak ended on a 3rd-down throw to Shane Vereen with 2:03 remaining in the 2nd quarter.

- Manning's 20 completions increased his career total to 4,017. He is the 7th quarterback in NFL history with at least 4,000 completions.

- Manning's 28 passes increased his career total to 6,735. That moved him past Drew Bledsoe (6,727) and into 8th place on the NFL's alltime list.

- The victory vs. Detroit was Manning's 100th start in a home game. He is 57-43.

- Manning made his 198th consecutive regular-season

start and played in his 200th game at Philadelphia (12/22)...He became the 4th player in franchise history to play in at least 200 games, joining Michael Strahan (216), Howard Cross (207), and George Martin (201).

- Manning threw a Giants-record 63 passes. The former record of 62 was set by Phil Simms at Cincinnati on Oct. 13, 1985 (also a loss). Manning's previous career-high was 54 pass attempts vs. San Francisco on Oct. 11, 2015. His previous high in 2016 was 45 passes at Minnesota on Oct. 3.

- The Giants' alltime record when they throw 50 or more passes is 2-23, including 2-21 when one quarterback throws all of the passes.

- Manning completed 38 passes, the 2nd-highest total of his career. He completed 41 passes in the 2015 victory vs. San Francisco...His previous 2016 high total was 32 completions vs. New Orleans.

- In Philadelphia, Manning threw 63 passes without getting sacked. That was the highest number of passes thrown by an NFL quarterback without a sack since Sept. 21, 2008, when Tampa Bay's Brian Griese threw 67 passes in an overtime victory in Chicago. The NFL record is 70 passes without being sacked, set by Bledsoe on Nov. 13, 1994, in New England's overtime victory vs. Minnesota.

- The Giants became the 16th consecutive team to lose when throwing 60 or more passes. The last team to put the ball in the air so often and win was Griese's Buccaneers, who beat the Bears in overtime, 27-24, on Sept. 21, 2008.

- Manning's 13-yard touchdown pass to Sterling Shepard was his 18th in Lincoln Financial Field. That is tied for his highest total in an opposing team's stadium; he has also thrown for 18 scores in Dallas' AT&T Stadium.

- That touchdown pass was the 320th of Manning's career. Exactly 200 of them have been from 1 to 19 yards.

- Manning completed 17 of 27 passes for 180 yards, no touchdowns and no interceptions in the Giants' 19-10 victory in the regular-season finale at Washington (1/1)...It was the 13th time in Manning's 13 seasons he threw neither a touchdown pass nor an interception. The Giants are 8-5 in those games.

- Robbie Gould's 40-yard field goal with 2:12 remaining broke a 10-10 tie, and gave Manning his 34th 4th-quarter, game-winning drive (leading the Giants to victories in games in which they trailed or were tied in the 4th quarter). That is the 4th-highest total among active quarterbacks, behind Tom Brady (40), Drew Brees (38), and Ben Roethlisberger (35).

- Manning earned his 17th victory against Washington, the highest total by any quarterback since the 1970 merger.

- Manning played in his 12th career postseason game in the Giants' 38-13 NFC Wild Card loss at Green Bay (1/8)...That is the 2nd-highest total in Giants history. Pro Football Hall of Famer Lawrence Taylor played in 15 playoff games.

- Manning's NFL-record streak of 5 consecutive road playoff games by a starting quarterback ended.

- Manning is 8-2 in his last 10 postseason starts, and 8-4 overall.

- Manning completed 23 of 44 passes for 29 yards, including a 41-yard touchdown to Tavarres King (which pulled the Giants to within 14-13 with 5:16 remaining in the 3rd quarter), and 1 interception (with 16 seconds left in the game). The late pick ended Manning's streak of 155 consecutive postseason passes without a pick. His most recent postseason interception had also been in Lambeau, on Jan. 15, 2012.

- Manning tied Phil Simms (44 at San Francisco on Dec. 29, 1984), for the 2nd-highest pass attempts total by a Giants quarterback in a playoff game. Manning holds the record with 58 in the 2011 NFC Championship Game, also a road game vs. the 49ers.

- After throwing for 3 scores against the Bengals, Manning has thrown at least 2 touchdown passes against each of the league's 31 other teams.

- In 2015, Manning started all 16 games for the 11th consecutive season, and increased his starting streak to 183 regular-season games in a row. He was 1 of 17 quarterbacks to start all 16 regular-season games.

- Manning played in his 3rd Pro Bowl, and was invited to the game for the 4th time; he also played in the game following the 2008 and 2012 seasons. He was selected to the NFC team in 2011, but did not play in the game because the Giants advanced to Super Bowl XLVI.

- In 2015, Manning completed 387 of 618 passes (62.6%) for 4,432 yards, 35 touchdowns and 14 interceptions.

- Manning's 618 pass attempts and 387 completions were Giants records. He held the previous marks with 601 passes and 379 completions in 2014.

- Manning's completion percentage of 62.6 was slightly below his team-record, 2014 percentage of 63.1.

- Manning's 4,432 yards was the 2nd-highest total in Giants history. He holds the record with 4,933 yards in 2011. Manning owns 6 of the eight 4,000-yard passing seasons in Giants history. Kerry Collins and Phil Simms have 1 apiece.

- Manning's 35 touchdown passes were a career-high, and left him 1 shy of the franchise record set by Hall of Famer Y.A. Tittle in 1963.

- Manning's had a career-high 93.6 passer rating. His previous best was 93.1 in 2009.

- Manning threw 14 interceptions in 2015, the same number he threw in 2009 and 2014. His career low is 10, which he threw in 2008.

- Manning threw for at least 300 yards 6 times, increasing his career total to 39 300-yard games. The Giants were 3-3 in those games in 2015. The six 300-yard games were the 2nd-highest single-season total in Giants history. Manning holds the record with 8 in 2011.

- On Nov. 1 in New Orleans, Manning threw a career-high 6 touchdown passes - 3 to Odell Beckham Jr., 2 to Dwayne Harris, and 1 to Shane Vereen. His previous best was 5 touchdown passes vs. Philadelphia on Dec. 30, 2012.

- The 6 touchdown passes tied for the 2nd-highest total in Giants history. Y.A. Tittle threw for 7 scores at Washington on Oct. 28, 1962, and for 6 vs. Dallas on Dec. 16 1962.

- Manning threw the 6 touchdown passes without an interception, the 15th time in NFL history a quarterback had those impressive numbers. But Manning was the first quarterback to do it in a loss. The previous quarterback with a 6-touchdown, no-interception game was Ryan Fitzpatrick, then with Houston, vs. Tennessee on Nov. 30, 2014. When Tittle set the Giants record with 7 touchdown passes on Oct. 28, 1962, he did not throw an interception.

- Manning followed his 6 touchdown passes in New Orleans with 2 the following week at Tampa Bay. The 8 touchdown throws was the highest 2-game total in 1 season in his career, surpassing the 7 he had on Oct. 25-Nov 7, 2010, when he had 4 at Dallas and 3 in Seattle. He matched that total later in the season when he threw 4 touchdown passes in back-to-back-games - at Miami on Dec. 14 and vs. Carolina the following week - to become the first quarterback in Giants history to accomplish that feat in a single season. Manning actually had a higher total 2-game total when he threw for 5 touchdowns in the 2012 season finale vs. Philadelphia, and 4 in the 2013 opener at Dallas.

- The Giants' win at Tampa Bay on Nov. 8 was Manning's 96th regular-season victory as the Giants' starting quarterback, a Giants record. He had shared the mark with Phil Simms, who won 95 games in 15 seasons from 1979-93.

- Manning threw for a career-high 251 first-half yards vs. New England on Nov. 15. His previous best was 239 in the first half at Washington on Nov. 30, 2008.

- Opened the season by completing 20 of 36 passes for 189 yards at Dallas (9/13)...Completed 27 of 40 passes for 292 yards, including 2 touchdowns, 1 a 67-yarder to Odell Beckham Jr., vs. Atlanta (9/20). Manning surpassed 40,000 career passing yards vs. the Falcons. His 18-yard run tied his career long...Hit 23 of 32 passes for 279 yards and 2 touchdowns in the Giants' first victory of the season, vs. Washington (9/24). Did not throw an interception for the 3rd straight game.

- Completed 20 of 35 passes for 212 yards and 3 touchdowns at Buffalo (10/4)...His long pass was a 51-yard touchdown to Rashad Jennings. Manning threw 142 passes without an interception, his career long streak to start a season, before Bills' Stephon Gilmore picked 1 off late in the game.

- Named NFC Offensive Player of the Week after setting a franchise record with 41 completions on a then career-high 54 passes for a season-high 441 yards and 3 touchdowns vs. San Francisco (10/11)...The former record for completions was 40 by Simms at Cincinnati on Oct. 13, 1985...Manning completed 15 consecutive passes over three series...The deciding score was Manning's 12-yard pass to Larry Donnell with 21 seconds left in the game...The victory was Manning's franchise-record 102nd (including postseason games) as a starting quarterback... Manning threw the 54 passes without being sacked, then the highest total in his career. His previous best was 53 passes without a sack vs. Philadelphia on Dec. 28, 2014.

- Completed 24 of 38 passes for 189 yards, 1 touchdown and 2 interceptions at Philadelphia (10/19)...Hit 13 of 24 passes for 170 yards vs. Dallas (10/25).

- Threw a career-high 6 touchdown passes while completing 30 of 41 throws for 350 yards at New Orleans

(11/1). Manning's 6 touchdown passes tied for the 2nd-highest total in franchise history...Completed 26 of 40 passes for 213 yards, 2 touchdowns, and 2 interceptions at Tampa Bay (11/8)...Manning's 8 touchdown passes vs. the Saints and Buccaneers were the highest 2-game total in 1 season in his career, until he matched it later that season (with 4 apiece at Miami (12/14) and vs. Carolina (12/20)).

- Completed 24 of 44 passes for 361 yards and 2 touchdowns vs. New England (11/15). On the Giants' 2nd play of the game, Manning threw an 87-yard touchdown pass to Odell Beckham Jr...Hit 26 of 51 passes for 321 yards, 2 touchdowns and 3 interceptions at Washington (11/29)... Completed 18 of 34 passes for 297 yards, 1 touchdown and 1 interception vs. the Jets (12/6).

- Was named NFC Offensive Player of the Week for the 2nd time in 2015 after hitting 27 of 31 passes for 337 yards and 4 touchdowns at Miami (12/14)...Manning's 87.1 completion percentage is a career high, and is tied for the 4th-highest single-game percentage in NFL history (minimum 30 attempts)...It was the 5th game in Manning's career in which he completed at least 77% of his passes. All 5 of them were Giants road games... Manning's passer rating of 151.5 was the highest of his career in a game in which he played all 4 quarters... Manning had a perfect 158.3 vs. Oakland Oct. 11, 2009, but he played only the first 5 series before leaving the game in the 2nd quarter.

- Completed 29 of 46 passes for 245 yards with 4 touchdowns and 1 interception vs. Carolina (12/20)... Hit 15 of 29 passes for 234 yards with 1 touchdown and 3 interceptions at Minnesota (12/27)...Completed 24 of 42 passes for 302 yards and 2 touchdowns vs. Philadelphia (1/3).

- In 2014, Manning was 1 of 16 quarterbacks to start every 1 of his team's games.

- Manning completed 379 of 601 passes for 4,410 yards, 30 touchdowns and 14 interceptions...Manning's 601 pass attempts and 379 completions were then Giants records. He held the previous marks with 589 passes and 359 completions in 2011.

- Manning completed a career-high and franchise-record 63.1% of his passes in 2014. Manning's 4,410 passing yards were then the 2nd-highest total in Giants history.

- Manning's 30 touchdown passes were then the 2nd-highest total of his career and the 4th-highest in Giants history...He threw at least 1 touchdown pass in 15 of 16 games in 2014, tying the career high he set in 2005, his 1st full year as a starter. The only game in which he did not throw a touchdown pass was the 27-0 loss at Philadelphia on Oct. 12.

- Manning's 14 interceptions were 13 fewer than he threw in 2013...His passer rating of 92.1 was then the 3rd-highest of his career. In 2014, Manning had 8 games with a rating of at least 100.0, equaling the career high he set in 2009. In 2013, Manning had just 1 game with a rating of at least 100.0 (102.3 in the opener in Dallas).

- Manning had more passing yards than the opposing starting quarterback in each of the Giants' last 9 games. That is 1 shy of the team record of 10 consecutive games, set by Y.A. Tittle in 1963 and equaled by Fran Tarkenton in 1969 and 1971.

- Manning scored on a 1-yard touchdown run in the 4th quarter at Washington (9/25)...It was the 5th rushing

touchdown of his career and first since Sept. 11, 2011, also in FedEx Field. Each of Manning's last 3 touchdowns has been against Washington in September games and were separated by 3 years:

- Dec. 11, 2005 at Philadelphia (1 yard)
- Oct. 28, 2007 at Miami (in London) (10 yards)
- Sept. 4, 2008 vs. Washington (1 yard)
- Sept. 11, 2011 at Washington (2 yards)
- Sept. 25, 2014 at Washington (1 yard)
- In victories over Houston, Washington and Atlanta from Sept. 21-Oct. 5, Manning had passer ratings of 123.2, 117.5 and 104.9. It was the first time he had 3 consecutive ratings of 100.0 or better since Oct. 10-25, 2010, when he had ratings of 104.4 at Houston, 100.4 vs Detroit and 125.8 at Dallas.
- Manning threw 52 passes without an interception vs. Indianapolis (11/3), then the highest number of passes without a pick in franchise history. The previous mark of 51 passes without an interception was set by Scott Brunner vs. the St. Louis Rams on Dec. 26, 1982.
- Manning's 18-yard run vs. the Colts tied his career high and was the Giants' longest rush of the game. He last had the team's longest run on Nov. 6, 2011 at New England, a 12-yarder.
- On Nov. 9 at Seattle, Manning started his 160th career game, breaking the franchise record for quarterbacks set by Phil Simms from 1979-93.
- A 3rd-quarter Manning pass in Seattle was tipped in the end zone by Odell Beckham Jr. and intercepted by safety Earl Thomas. That ended Manning's career-long streak of 176 passes without throwing an interception. That eclipsed Manning's previous best of 124 passes without an interception, set in 2005.
- Manning tied his career high with 5 interceptions vs. San Francisco (11/16)...He entered the game with 6 all season, including 1 in his previous 5 games. Manning also threw 5 interceptions vs. Seattle on Dec. 15, 2013.
- Manning threw the 250th touchdown pass of his career, a 1-yarder to tight end Adrien Robinson, vs. Dallas (11/23). He became the 16th player in NFL history to throw at least 250 touchdown passes.
- Manning won his 90th regular-season game as the Giants' starting quarterback vs. Washington (12/14).
- Manning completed 25 of 32 passes for 391 yards, 3 touchdowns and no interceptions for a passer rating of 148.8 at St. Louis (12/21). The rating was then his career high for a full game. Manning's previous best was a 145.7 rating at Philadelphia on Sept. 25, 2011.
- Manning threw 3 touchdown passes in each game in the victories against Washington and St. Louis, his first back-to-back games with at least 3 scoring passes since Oct. 25 and Nov. 7, 2010, when he threw 4 and 3 at Dallas and Seattle, respectively.
- In the season finale vs. Philadelphia (12/28), Manning completed 28 of 53 passes for 429 yards, 1 touchdown and 1 interception. The 53 passes tied his then career high, set on Nov. 27, 2005 at Seattle and tied on Dec. 16, 2007 vs. Washington.
- Manning's 429 yards were then the 3rd-highest total of his career and the 6th time he threw for at least 400 yards.
- Manning threw for a combined 820 yards against St. Louis and Philadelphia, the 2nd-highest 2-game total in Giants history. Phil Simms passed for 945 yards on Oct. 6 and 13, 1985 (432 vs. Dallas and 513 at Cincinnati).

- In 2013, Manning started all 16 games and completed 317 of 551 passes (57.5%) for 3,818 yards, 18 touchdowns, and a franchise-record 27 interceptions.
- Manning's 551 passes were then the 4th-highest total in team history.
- For the first time since he was a rookie in 2004, Manning threw fewer touchdown passes than interceptions. That season, he threw 6 touchdown passes and 9 picks.
- In 2013, Manning became the Giants' career leader in pass attempts and passing yards to become No. 1 in all of the major passing categories.
- Manning threw 24 passes in the season finale vs. Washington (12/29) to increase his career total to 5,008. He became the 21st player in NFL history to throw at least 5,000 passes. Simms is 2nd in Giants history with 4,647 pass attempts. Manning moved past Simms and into first place in Giants history on Oct. 6, 2013, when he threw 52 passes vs. Philadelphia.
- Manning's franchise-record 27 interceptions increased his career total to a Giants-record 171, 4 more than Charlie Conerly. His previous career high was 25 interceptions in 2010.
- Manning threw a career-high 5 interceptions vs. Seattle on Dec. 15, tying a Giants record previously reached 5 times: Harry Newman vs. Portsmouth on Sept. 24, 1933; Frank Filchock at Washington on Oct. 13, 1946; Charlie Conerly vs. the Chicago Cardinals on Oct. 14, 1951, and vs. Detroit on Dec. 13, 1953; and Jeff Rutledge at New Orleans on Nov. 22, 1987. Manning also threw 5 interceptions vs. San Francisco on Oct. 11, 2015.
- Manning was sacked a career-high 39 times; his previous high was 30 sacks in 2009.
- Manning's first and last passes of the season were each intercepted, the first by DeMarcus Ware at Dallas (9/8), the last by Washington's Josh Wilson (12/29).
- Against Washington, Manning completed 10 of 24 passes for 152 yards, a touchdown and an interception before suffering a sprained ankle that forced him to miss the 2nd half. Manning was hurt with 56 seconds remaining in the 2nd quarter, when his leg got caught under defensive end Chris Baker as he threw an incomplete pass to Peyton Hillis. On the next play, Manning did not move his legs as he threw the pass that was intercepted by Wilson. It was just the 2nd time in his career that Manning left a game early with an injury. On Sept. 9, 2007 in Dallas, Manning bruised his shoulder on a failed 2-point conversion in the 4th quarter. He later threw his 4th touchdown pass of the game, but was replaced by Jared Lorenzen on the Giants' final possession. Manning started the following week vs. Green Bay.
- Manning completed 78.6% of his passes (22 of 28), while Robert Griffin III lagged slightly behind at 75 percent (24 of 32) at Washington (12/1). It was the first time since the 1970 merger that each of the starting quarterbacks in a Giants game completed at least 75% of their passes. Manning's completion percentage of 78.6 was then the 2nd-highest in his career for a full game.
- Completed 23 of 42 passes for 256 yards, 1 touchdown and an interception in an overtime victory at Detroit (12/22), where he led the Giants on an 11-play, 45-yard drive that ended with Josh Brown's game-winning 45-yard field goal with 7:28 elapsed in overtime...Hit 25 of 35 passes for 279 yards, a touchdown and an interception vs. Green Bay (11/17)...Completed

23 of 39 passes for 200 yards and 1 touchdown in the Giants' first victory of the season vs. Minnesota (10/21)... Threw a season-high 52 passes (completing 24 for 334 yards, 2 touchdowns and 3 interceptions) vs. Philadelphia (10/6)... Had season-high totals of 450 yards and 4 touchdown passes in season opener at Dallas (9/8).

- In 2012, started all 16 games and completed 321 of 536 passes (59.9%) for 3,948 yards, 26 touchdowns, 15 interceptions and a passer rating of 87.2. His streak of consecutive 4,000-yard seasons ended at 3.

- Originally a 2nd alternate, he played in his 2nd Pro Bowl after Green Bay's Aaron Rodgers pulled out of the game. Manning also played in the Pro Bowl following the 2008 season. He was selected to the NFC team in 2011, but did not play in the game because the Giants advanced to Super Bowl XLVI.

- Threw a then career-high 5 touchdown passes — 2 to Rueben Randle and 1 apiece to David Wilson, Victor Cruz and Henry Hynoski — vs. Philadelphia (12/30)... It was then the 5th time in history a Giants quarterback threw for at least 5 touchdowns in a game. Hall of Famer Y.A. Tittle set the franchise record with 7 vs. Washington on Oct. 28, 1962. Tittle threw 6 scoring passes vs. Dallas on Dec. 16, 1962 (a total Manning matched on Nov. 1, 2015 in New Orleans). Fran Tarkenton threw 5 touchdown passes vs. St. Louis on Oct. 25, 1970, and Phil Simms threw 5 at St. Louis on Sept. 7, 1980.

- Manning threw 3 touchdowns in a first quarter for the first time in career. His only other 3-touchdown-pass quarter was in the 4th at Seattle on Sept. 24, 2006, when he helped the Giants close a 42-3 deficit to 42-30.

- Manning's 9-yard pass to Domenik Hixon with about 3:30 minutes remaining in the 2nd quarter at Atlanta (12/16) was the 2,577th completion of Manning's career, a Giants record.

- Completed 22 of 35 passes for 259 yards, 4 touchdowns and 2 interceptions for a passer rating of 99.6 vs. New Orleans (12/9)... It was his 7th career 4-touchdown game, tying Tittle's franchise record.

- Completed 16 of 30 passes for 249 yards and 3 touchdowns vs. Green Bay (11/25)... Increased his career total to 200 touchdown passes to pass Simms (199) and become the Giants' all-time leader... Set the record on a 13-yard touchdown pass to Hakeem Nicks in the 3rd quarter... Manning's career-long, 106-pass streak without a touchdown pass ended when he threw a 16-yard score to Randle with 2:38 remaining in the first quarter.

- Hit 10 of 24 passes for 125 yards and 1 interception vs. Pittsburgh (11/4)... Increased his career total to 30,005 yards, passing Randall Cunningham (29,979) to become the 34th quarterback in history with at least 30,000 passing yards.

- Completed 15 of 29 passes for 192 yards, no touchdowns and 1 interception at Dallas (10/28)... Improved his record to 4-0 in Cowboys (now AT&T) Stadium... The Giants trailed in the 4th quarter, 24-23.

- Completed 26 of 40 passes for 337 yards vs. Washington (10/21)... It was his 25th regular-season 300-yard game... Found Victor Cruz deep downfield for a game-winning 77-yard touchdown with 1:13 remaining. It is the longest game-winning touchdown in the final 2 minutes of a game in Giants history.

- Completed 15 of 28 passes for 193 yards, 1 touchdown and no interceptions in a 26-3 rout of the eventual NFC champion 49ers at San Francisco (10/14)... The 193 yards

ending his streak of consecutive regular-season games with at least 200 passing yards at 24, then the 2nd-longest in NFL history.

- Completed 25 of 37 passes for 259 yards, 3 touchdowns to Cruz and 1 interception vs. Cleveland (10/7)... Posted his 24th consecutive 200-yard passing game, then the 2nd-longest streak in NFL history behind Hall of Famer Dan Fouts' 45 in a row from 1980-83... Led Giants on touchdown drives of 92 and 95 yards.

- Completed 24 of 42 passes for 309 yards, 2 touchdowns and 1 interception at Philadelphia (9/30)... It was Manning's 23rd consecutive game with at least 200 passing yards, breaking a tie with New Orleans' Drew Brees (2007-09) to give Manning what was then the 2nd-longest streak in history.

- Completed 77.1% of his passes (27 of 35) for 288 yards and 1 touchdown at Carolina (9/20).

- Passed for a career-high 510 yards while completing 31 of 51 passes, 3 touchdowns and 3 interceptions in a comeback victory vs. Tampa Bay (9/16). It was the first time in Giants history they won a regular season-game in which they threw at least 50 passes... Manning's previous career high was 420 yards vs. Seattle on Oct. 19, 2011... Manning's 51 passes increased his career total to 4,004 to join Simms as the only Giants quarterbacks to throw at least 4,000 passes... Manning's 510 yards were the 2nd-highest total by a quarterback in Giants history, behind Simms' 513 yards at Cincinnati on Oct. 13, 1985. It was the 2nd-highest total by an NFL quarterback in 2012 — and the highest total in a game that was completed in 4 quarters. Houston's Matt Schaub threw for 527 yards in an overtime victory vs. Jacksonville on Nov. 18... Manning became the 9th quarterback in history to throw for at least 510 yards in a regular-season game... Manning, Cruz (11 receptions for 179 yards) and Nicks (10 for 199 yards) joined 3 Hall of Famers — quarterback Norm Van Brocklin and receivers Elroy (Crazy Legs) Hirsch and Tom Fears of the 1951 Los Angeles Rams — as the only teammates in history with 500 passing yards, plus 2 receivers with at least 150 yards, in the same game.

- In 2011, Manning started all 16 regular-season games and 4 postseason games, and set Giants records for pass attempts (589), completions (359) — which he has since broken — and yards (4,933). The yardage total was the 4th-highest in the NFL in 2011, and the 6th-highest in league history. It was Manning's 3rd consecutive 4,000-yard season.

- Manning's 29 touchdown passes were then the 2nd-highest total of his career (31 in 2010) and his 16 interceptions were 9 fewer than he threw the previous season. His passer rating of 92.9 was then the 2nd-highest of his career (93.1 in 2009).

- Manning led the Giants to their 3rd NFC East championship and 5th postseason berth in his first 7 full seasons as the team's quarterback.

- In the Giants' 4-game postseason, Manning completed 106 of 163 passes (65.0%) for 1,219 yards, 9 touchdowns and 1 interception while leading the Giants to their 2nd Super Bowl victory in 5 seasons.

- Manning was 1 of 2 quarterbacks to throw every 1 of his team's passes in 2011. The other was San Diego's Philip Rivers. Manning and Rivers were traded for each other during the 2004 NFL Draft... Manning was the only quarterback to throw every 1 of his team's passes in both the 2010 and 2011 seasons... With Manning throwing

every pass, the Giants shattered a team record with 295.5 passing yards a game. The former record, set in 2009, was 251.2 yards.

- Manning had a career-high eight 300-yard passing games. That increased his career total to 22, breaking Simms' former team record of 21.

- Manning threw for at least 400 yards 3 times: 420 vs. Seattle (10/9), 406 at New Orleans (11/28) and 400 at Dallas (12/11). He was then 1 of 5 players in NFL history with at least three 400-yard passing games in a season: Hall of Famer Dan Marino had 4 in 1984 and 3 in 1986, Dallas' Tony Romo had 3 in 2012, Peyton Manning had 4 and Philip Rivers 3 in 2013.

- The Giants led the NFL with 18 completions of 40 or more yards in 2011. Green Bay and Detroit tied for second with 16.

- Manning was selected to his 2nd Pro Bowl (though he didn't play in the game because the Giants participated in the Super Bowl).

- Manning was the first NFL quarterback to throw at least 4 touchdown passes of at least 72 yards since Kurt Warner of St. Louis in 2000 (6). He was the first Giants quarterback to do it since Earl Morrall threw 4 in 1965.

- Manning threw an NFL-record 15 fourth-quarter touchdown passes in 2011. The previous record of 14 was set by Hall of Famer Johnny Unitas in 1959 and tied by Peyton Manning (2002).

- Manning led the Giants to 5 victories in 2011 in which they trailed in the 4th quarter (not counting a comeback in the NFC Championship Game) - plus 1 in which they were tied. The Giants' 5 victories after trailing in the 4th quarter tied the franchise record set in 2002.

- In the Giants' 21-17 victory against New England in Super Bowl XLVI (2/5/12), Manning completed 30 of 40 passes (75%) for 296 yards, 1 touchdown and no interceptions (a passer rating of 103.8). He was voted the winner of the Pete Rozelle Trophy, awarded to the game's most valuable player. It was his 2nd Super Bowl MVP Award.

- In the Super Bowl, Manning rallied the Giants from a 17-9 3rd-quarter deficit while leading scoring drives on 3 of the team's 4 second-half possessions.

- Manning completed his first 9 passes, a record for consecutive completions to begin a Super Bowl.

- Manning set Giants postseason records with 58 passing attempts and 32 completions in a 20-17 overtime victory at San Francisco in the NFC Championship Game (1/22/12). It was the 1st time in their history the Giants won a game when throwing at least 50 passes; they had been 0-18 in such games (all in the regular season).

- Completed 21 of 33 passes for 330 yards, 3 touchdowns and 1 interception in a 37-20 victory at Green Bay in an NFC Divisional Playoff Game (1/15/12). Manning's 66-yard pass to Hakeem Nicks is the 4th-longest play in Giants postseason history.

- Manning completed 23 of 32 passes for 277 yards, 3 touchdowns and no interceptions in a 24-2 defeat of Atlanta in an NFC Wild Card Game (1/8/12).

- Manning's 72-yard touchdown pass to Nicks vs. Atlanta is tied for the longest postseason play in Giants history. Scott Brunner threw a 72-yard pass to Earnest Gray at San Francisco on Jan. 3, 1982. Manning's previous long post-season pass was a 52-yard touchdown to Amani Toomer in an NFC Divisional Playoff Game at Dallas on Jan. 13, 2008. It was Manning's 5th touchdown pass of more than 70 yards in 2011 and the first caught by someone other

than Victor Cruz.

- Hit 24 of 33 passes for 346 yards, 3 touchdowns and no interceptions in the Giants' 31-14 victory over Dallas (1/1/12) that clinched the NFC East title.

- In a 29-16 victory at the Jets (12/24), Manning threw a short pass to Cruz, who took the ball all the way down the field for a 99-yard touchdown, the longest play in Giants history. The previous long play was a 98-yard pass from Earl Morrall to Homer Jones at Pittsburgh on Sept. 11, 1966. It was the 4th pass of at least 90 yards in Giants history...Manning's previous long throw was a 92-yard touchdown to Mario Manningham at Washington on Jan. 2, 2011...On the same day Manning threw his 99-yard touchdown pass, Carolina's Cam Newton threw a 91-yard touchdown pass to Brandon LeFell. It was the first time in NFL history 2 different quarterbacks threw touchdown passes of at least 90 yards on the same day...Manning's pass to Cruz was the 13th 99-yard touchdown pass (and the 14th 99-yard play from scrimmage) in NFL history. On Sept. 12 that season, New England's Tom Brady and Wes Welker hooked up for a 99-yard touchdown pass against the Dolphins in Miami. The 2011 season was the 1st in NFL history with two 99-yard touchdown passes - and they were thrown by the quarterbacks that started in that season's Super Bowl.

- Manning completed 27 of 47 passes for 400 yards, 2 touchdowns and 1 interception in the Giants' 37-34 victory at Dallas (12/11). Manning led the Giants to 2 touchdowns in the final 3:14 to become the 2nd team in 2011 to win a game by overcoming a deficit of at least 12 points with less than 5 minutes to play in the 4th quarter. Denver did it at Miami on Oct. 23...It was the first time the Giants won under such circumstances since Sept. 21, 1969, when they trailed Minnesota, 23-10, before Fran Tarkenton threw 2 touchdown passes to Don Herrmann in the final 4:48 for a 24-23 victory. The victory in Dallas was the first time in their then 87-year history the Giants won a road game by overcoming a deficit of at least 12 points with less than 5 minutes remaining.

- That victory over the Cowboys was the 2nd game in 2011 in which the Giants won by scoring 2 touchdowns in the final 3:30. They did it at New England (11/6), though the 2nd, game-winning score was necessitated by a touchdown the Patriots scored between the 2 by the Giants. Against the Patriots, Manning completed 20 of 39 passes for 250 yards, 2 touchdowns and no interceptions.

- Manning shattered a team record by completing 21 consecutive passes from late in the 2nd quarter to late in the 4th quarter at New Orleans (11/28). That was tied for the 6th longest streak in NFL history and was the longest since his brother, Peyton Manning, hit 23 straight on Dec. 14 and Dec. 18, 2008 vs. Detroit (6) and Jacksonville (17). It was the longest 1-game streak since David Carr, who was then Manning's backup, completed 22 consecutive passes for Houston vs. Buffalo on Nov. 19, 2006...The previous Giants record of 13 in a row was set by Phil Simms at Cincinnati on Oct. 13, 1985 and tied by Kerry Collins on Sept. 10 and 17, 2000 (at Philadelphia and Chicago). Manning's previous best had been 12 in a row at Atlanta on Oct. 15, 2007.

- Manning threw for a then career-high 420 yards while completing 24 of 39 passes vs. Seattle (10/9)...He was selected NFC Offensive Player of the Week for his performance at Philadelphia (9/25), where he completed 16 of 23 passes for 254 yards, 4 touchdowns and no intercep-

tions in a 29-16 victory. His passer rating of 145.7 was then the 2nd-highest of his career and his highest in a game in which he threw more than 10 passes (he had a 158.3 rating vs. Oakland in 2009, but played only the first 5 series). It was the 5th-highest passer rating by a Giants quarterback since the NFL went to a 16-game schedule in 1978.

- In 2010, Manning started all 16 games and completed 339 of 539 passes (62.9%) for 4,002 yards, 31 touchdowns and 25 interceptions. He had four 300-yard passing games... He was 1 of 4 players to throw every 1 of his team's passes in 2010. The others were Indianapolis' Peyton Manning, Houston's Matt Schaub and St. Louis' Sam Bradford.

- The 339 completions and 62.9 completion percentage were then franchise single-season records. The previous records were 335 completions by Collins in 2002 and the 62.8 completion percentages by Jeff Hostetler in 1991 and Kurt Warner in 2004... Manning's 539 passes were then the 2nd-highest total of his career (he threw 557 passes in 2005) and was the 4th-highest total in Giants history (Collins threw 568 passes in 2001 and 545 in 2002)... His 31 touchdown passes were then the 3rd-highest total in Giants history and the most by a Giants quarterback in 47 years. Y.A. Tittle threw 36 in 1963 and 33 in 1962.

- With his 4,002 yards, Manning became the first Giants quarterback with two 4,000-yard seasons. He threw for 4,021 yards in 2009. Collins (4,073 in 2002) and Simms (4,044 in 1984) are the only other Giants to pass for more than 4,000 yards.

- Manning's 4,002 yards were the 5th-highest total in the NFL. He was among a record 22 quarterbacks to throw for more than 3,000 yards in 2010... Manning's 31 touchdown passes were the league's 4th-highest total. Manning was 1 of 11 quarterbacks to throw for at least 25 touchdowns in 2010.

- Manning tied a franchise record by throwing 25 interceptions, a total previously reached by Frank Filchock in 1946 and Charlie Conerly in 1953.

- Manning threw then career-long touchdown passes on consecutive weeks: an 85-yarder at Green Bay (12/26) and a 92-yarder at Washington (1/2/11), both to Mario Manningham. The 92-yard throw was the NFL's longest play from scrimmage in the 2010 season. It was then the 3rd-longest pass in Giants history, exceeded only by Earl Morrall's 98-yard throw to Homer Jones at Pittsburgh on Sept. 11, 1966 and Norm Snead's 94-yarder to Rich Houston vs. Dallas on Sept. 24, 1972.

- Manning set franchise records for the most attempts (3,169), completions (1,838), passing yards (21,465) and touchdown passes (148) in a player's first 100 games as a Giant.

- Manning threw a then career-high 34 completions vs. Dallas (11/14) and had 33 completions and threw for a season-high 386 yards vs. Tennessee (9/26)... He threw a then career-high 48 passes without being sacked on Nov. 14 vs. Dallas.

- On Nov. 21, Manning started the Giants' game in Philadelphia 6 years to the day after his first game as the Giants' starting quarterback. On Nov. 21, 2004, the Giants lost to Atlanta, 14-10. The Falcons' starting quarterback in that game was Michael Vick, who was the Eagles' starter 6 years later in Philly.

- Manning twice tied his then career-high by throwing 4 touchdown passes: at Dallas (10/25) and vs. Philadelphia

(12/19)... He was sacked just 16 times all season and was not sacked in a 5-game stretch from Nov. 7 through Dec. 5... Had a season-high passer rating of 125.8 at Seattle (11/7), where he completed 21 of 32 passes for 290 yards, 3 touchdowns and no interceptions.

- In 2009, Manning started all 16 games and completed 317 of 509 passes (62.3%) for 4,021 yards, 27 touchdowns, 14 interceptions and a passer rating of 93.1. The completions, percentage, yards, touchdowns and rating were then career highs.

- Manning became the 3rd quarterback in Giants history to throw for more than 4,000 yards in a season, joining Collins (4,073 in 2002) and Simms (4,044 in 1984)... He threw at least 1 touchdown pass in every game except the losses at Denver (11/26) and Minnesota (1/3).

- Manning played only the first 5 series in a 44-7 rout of Oakland (10/11) and left the game with a perfect passer rating of 158.3. He completed 8 of 10 passes for 173 yards, 2 touchdowns and no interceptions. The previous Giants quarterback to finish a game with a perfect rating was Collins at Indianapolis on Dec. 22, 2002, when he completed 23 of 29 passes for 366 yards, 4 touchdowns and no interceptions in a 44-27 victory.

- Manning completed 19 of 26 passes for 268 yards, 3 touchdowns and no interceptions at Washington (12/21) for a passer rating of 144.4 that was then the 2nd-highest of his career, topped only by his 158.3 rating vs. Oakland. His previous best rating on the road was 131.4 at St. Louis on Sept. 14, 2008.

- The game at Washington was the 2nd week in a row Manning threw for 3 scores without an interception and was the 2nd time in Manning's career he threw 3 touchdown passes in consecutive games. He did it at Philadelphia and Seattle on Sept. 17 and 24, 2006.

- When Manning threw his 100th touchdown pass at Dallas, he became the 111th quarterback in NFL history to reach that mark. Eli and Peyton Manning were the first pair of brothers to each throw for 100 touchdowns in their career.

- The Giants had 62 pass plays of 20 or more yards in 2009, which tied them for 5th in the NFL. Manning accounted for 60 of those plays and ranked 5th among the league's quarterbacks.

- Manning threw 3 touchdown passes of at least 60 yards in 2 weeks: 1 vs. Dallas (12/6) and 2 vs. Philadelphia (12/13). He was the first Giants quarterback to throw 2 touchdown passes of 60 or more yards in the same game since Collins did it vs. the Jets on Dec. 5, 1999 (scores of 61 and 80 yards to Amani Toomer). The last Giants quarterback to accomplish the feat in back-to-back games was Simms on Sept. 2 and 9, 1984, also in home games vs. Philadelphia and Dallas.

- Manning rushed for a career-high 34 yards at Philadelphia (11/1), the highest total by a Giants quarterback since Oct. 31, 1999, when Kent Graham ran for 41 yards — also in Philadelphia.

- Manning completed 76 percent of his passes (25 of 33) vs. San Diego (11/8), which then tied for the 2nd-best 1-game mark of his career... His 29 completions vs. Carolina (12/27) were his highest total in Giants Stadium. His previous best was 28 completions vs. the Eagles on Dec. 17, 2006.

- In 2008, Manning started all 16 regular-season games and the NFC Divisional Playoff Game... He led

the Giants to their 4th consecutive postseason berth, a franchise record. Only 1 other QB had then led his team to the playoffs in 4 consecutive seasons — Peyton Manning.

- Manning completed 289 of 479 passes (60.3%) for 3,238 yards, 21 touchdowns and 10 interceptions for a passer rating of 86.4. The completion percentage and rating were then career highs. It was the first time since Manning's rookie season in 2004 — when he started just 9 games — that he did not throw at least 500 passes. The 10 interceptions were his lowest total since he threw 9 as a rookie and were half his 2007 total.

- Manning completed 21 of 34 passes for 305 yards, a touchdown and an interception at Washington (11/30). It was his first 300-yard game since Oct. 15, 2007.

- Manning was named the NFC Offensive Player of the Month in November and Sporting News' 2008 Pro Athlete of the Year.

- In 2007, Manning started all 16 regular-season games and 4 postseason games and led the Giants to victory in Super Bowl XLII...Completed 297 of 529 passes for 3,336 yards, 23 touchdowns and 20 interceptions for a passer rating of 73.9. In 4 postseason games, Manning completed 72 of 119 passes (60.5%) for 854 yards, 6 touchdowns and 1 interception for a rating of 123.2.

- Manning threw 4 touchdown passes while completing 28 of 41 throws for 312 yards at Dallas (9/9). 3 of the scoring passes went to Plaxico Burress, the other to Derrick Ward...Left the game in the 4th quarter with a bruised shoulder...Despite the injury, Manning started the next week vs. Green Bay.

- Led the Giants to their first victory of the season at Washington (9/23), where he completed 21 of 36 passes, including the game-winning 33-yard touchdown pass to Burress in the 4th quarter...Threw 4 touchdown passes vs. New England (12/29). 2 of the scores went to Burress and 1 each to Brandon Jacobs and Kevin Boss...Completed 22 of 32 passes for 251 yards and 1 interception for a passer rating of 118.6.

- Opened postseason play by completing 20 of 27 passes for 185 yards, 2 touchdowns and no interceptions in NFC Wild Card Game victory at Tampa Bay (1/6/08)... Became the 5th Giants QB to win a postseason game since Giants Stadium opened in 1976), joining Phil Simms, Jeff Hostetler, Kerry Collins and Scott Brunner.

- Completed 12 of 18 passes for 163 yards and 2 touchdowns to Toomer in NFC Divisional Playoff Game at Dallas (1/13/08)...His 52-yard touchdown pass to Toomer was then his longest postseason completion...Successfully engineered a 2-minute drive in the 2nd quarter by completing 4 passes for 56 yards on a 7-play 71-yard drive in just 46 seconds that resulted in a 4-yard touchdown pass to Toomer that left the teams tied at halftime, 14-14.

- Played another turnover-free game and completed 21 of 40 passes for 251 yards in minus-23 degree wind chill in the Giants' NFC Championship Game victory at Green Bay (1/20/08)...Increased his streak to 101 consecutive postseason passes without an interception.

- Manning was named the Most Valuable Player of Super Bowl XLII after completing 19 of 34 passes for 255 yards, 2 touchdowns and 1 interception that bounced off Steve Smith's hands in the Giants' victory over the New England Patriots...Led the Giants on their game-winning 4th quarter drive by completing 5 of 9 passes for 77 yards, including the go-ahead 13-yard touchdown pass to Burress with 35 seconds remaining. The most memorable

play on the drive was a 32-yard completion to David Tyree, who secured the ball against his helmet after Manning eluded the grasp of numerous defensive linemen...Threw a 5-yard touchdown pass to Tyree early in the 4th quarter that was set up by passes of 45 yards to Boss and 17 yards to Smith...Manning was intercepted by cornerback Ellis Hobbs with 11:53 remaining in the 2nd quarter. It was the Giants' first offensive turnover in their 4-game postseason. The offense had gone 34 possessions and run 213 plays without turning over the ball. The previous turnover had been in the regular season finale against the Patriots — also an interception by Hobbs of a Manning pass. Manning had thrown 103 consecutive passes without an interception, including 95 in the postseason. He threw 111 postseason passes in a row without a pick.

- In 2006, started all 16 regular-season games and the NFC Wild Card Game...Completed 301 of 522 passes for 3,244 yards, 24 touchdowns and 18 interceptions for a passer rating of 77.0...Manning's 24 touchdown passes matched his 2005 total and left him tied for 4th in the NFL with St. Louis' Marc Bulger...Manning was the first Giants quarterback to throw at least 20 touchdown passes in consecutive seasons since Simms did it 3 years in a row from 1984-86.

- Completed a then career-high 31 passes on 43 attempts for 371 yards with 3 touchdowns, 1 interception and a rating of 111.7 at Philadelphia (9/17)...In overtime, Manning completed all 8 of his passes for 83 yards, including a 31-yard touchdown pass to Burress to give the Giants a 30-24 comeback victory after they trailed by 17 at the start of the 4th quarter.

- Finished with 17 completions on 33 attempts for 172 yards with 3 touchdowns, 0 interceptions, a long pass of 45 yards and a QB rating of 97.0 at Carolina (12/10)... Game-long 45-yard pass to Burress was followed by a 28-yard touchdown pass to the same receiver in the 2nd quarter...Threw a season-long 55-yard touchdown pass to Burress vs. New Orleans (12/24).

- Completed 16 of 27 passes for 161 yards, 2 touchdowns, and 1 interception in the NFC Wild Card Game at Philadelphia (1/7/07)...The Giants scored on their opening possession when Manning threw a 17-yard touchdown pass to Burress...Tied the game at 20-20 with an 11-yard touchdown pass to Burress in the 4th quarter.

- In 2005, started all 16 regular-season games and the NFC Wild Card Game in his first full season as the starting quarterback...Led the Giants to the NFC East championship...Completed 294 of 557 passes for 3,762 yards with 24 touchdowns and 17 interceptions for a passer rating of 75.9...Manning's 24 touchdown passes were the most by a Giants quarterback since Fran Tarkenton had 29 in 1967...Completed 12 of 24 passes for 204 yards, 1 touchdown and no interceptions in a victory at Oakland (12/31) that clinched the division title...Threw a then career-long 78-yard touchdown pass to Burress.

- Scored on a 1-yard quarterback sneak in the 2nd quarter at Philadelphia (12/11), his first career rushing touchdown and the first by a Giants quarterback since Kurt Warner scored on a 1-yard run vs. Cleveland (9/26/04).

- Threw a then career-high 53 passes (completing 29) for 344 yards, 2 touchdowns and 1 interception at Seattle (11/27). The 53 passes were the most thrown by the Giants since Collins had 59 at New England (10/12/03).

- Threw a then career-high 53 passes (completing 29) for 344 yards, 2 touchdowns and 1 interception at Seattle (11/27). The 53 passes were the most thrown by the Giants since Collins had 59 at New England (10/12/03). It was the 12th consecutive game in which Manning threw at least 1 touchdown pass, 3 shy of the Giants record set by Y.A. Tittle from 1962-64.

- Completed 23 of 42 passes for 214 yards, 2 touchdowns and 1 interception vs. Denver (10/23)...Led the Giants on 2 touchdown drives in the 4th-quarter to secure his 2nd career 4th quarter come-from-behind-victory. His 2-yard touchdown pass to Toomer with 5 seconds remaining in the game gave the Giants a 24-23 victory. On the game-winning 83-yard drive, Manning completed 8-of-13 passes for 68 yards.

- Hit 19 of 35 passes for 296 yards and 4 touchdowns vs. St. Louis (10/2) to become the first Giants quarterback to throw 4 touchdown passes in a regular-season game since Collins did it at Indianapolis on Dec. 22, 2002. Collins matched the feat in an NFC Wild Card playoff game at San Francisco (1/5/03).

- As a rookie in 2004, played in 9 games, including starts in the final 7 games...Rookie record as a starter was 1-6...Improved markedly down the stretch and finished with 95 completions in 197 attempts for 1,043 yards, 6 touchdowns and 9 interceptions.

- Earned his first NFL victory in the 2004 season finale vs. Dallas, completing 18 of 27 passes for 144 yards, 3 touchdowns, 1 interception and a rating of 101.5...Manning threw touchdown passes of 2 yards to Visanthe Shiancoe in the 2nd quarter, 15 yards to Tyree and 3 yards to Tiki Barber, both in the 4th quarter. Completed a 23-yard pass to Barber to start the Giants game-winning drive and called a run at the line on which Barber scored the deciding touchdown on a 3-yard run with 11 seconds remaining.

- Completed 16 of 23 passes for 182 yards, 2 touchdowns, 1 interception, a long-pass of 49 yards and a season-high rating of 103.9 vs. Pittsburgh (12/18).

- Made his first NFL start vs. Atlanta (11/21) and completed 17 of 37 passes for 162 yards, 1 touchdown and 2 interceptions. His first NFL touchdown pass was a 6-yarder to Jeremy Shockey. Coincidentally, the initial pro scoring pass for all 3 Manning quarterbacks was 6 yards long. Archie Manning threw a 6-yarder to Dave Parks on Sept. 19, 1971. Peyton Manning's 6-yard touchdown pass went to Marvin Harrison on Sept. 6, 1998.

- Manning was the 18th quarterback to start a game for the Giants since Giants Stadium opened in 1976 (including Craig Morton and Norm Snead, who joined the team earlier and were still on the roster when the stadium opened). He was the 4th quarterback in a row to lose his debut, joining Kerry Collins, Jesse Palmer and Kurt Warner...Of the 14 quarterbacks selected with the No. 1 overall pick in the NFL Draft between 1970-2004, he was the 13th to make his starting debut as a rookie (Cincinnati's Carson Palmer was the exception). The 13 quarterbacks taken with the top pick who started as rookies are 4-9 in their debuts.

- Saw his first NFL regular season action when he replaced Warner with 2:37 remaining in the 4th quarter at Philadelphia (9/12), with the Giants trailing, 31-10. He completed 3 of 9 passes for 66 yards, including a 34-yarder, no touchdowns and no interceptions. Was

sacked once and fumbled after being blindsided by Jerome McDougle. On his 1st career snap, he handed the ball off to Barber, who ran 72 yards for a touchdown. Manning's long completion of 34 yards was a short screen pass to Barber on the final drive of the game.

- Manning was only the 5th quarterback in Southeastern Conference history to throw for more than 10,000 career yards...Left Ole Miss owning 47 school game, season and career records...Completed 829 of 1,363 passes (60.8%) for 10,119 yards, 81 touchdowns and 35 interceptions...Averaged a school-record 7.42 yards per attempt...His passing yards and total offensive yardage ranked 5th in SEC history, while his pass attempts and completions rank 4th...Manning's 81 touchdown tosses ranked 3rd and his 86 total scores (81 passing, 5 rushing) rank 4th in SEC history...Set an Ole Miss career mark for average yards per offensive play (rush or pass), 6.70...His 1,491 career offensive plays rank first in school history...Set school career marks for 300-yard games of total offense (9) and 350-yard games of total offense (6)...Also set Ole Miss career records for consecutive games with a touchdown pass (16) and consecutive 200-yard passing games (11)...Won the Maxwell Award, given to the nation's top collegiate player, and the Johnny Unitas Golden Arm Award, given to the nation's top senior quarterback...Finished 3rd in the 2003 Heisman Trophy balloting...Finalist for the Davey O'Brien Award, presented to the nation's top quarterback, and The Walter Camp Foundation Player of the Year Award...Earned first team All-America honors from Southern Football Weekly, adding 2nd-team accolades from The Sporting News and honorable mention from Sports Illustrated...All-Southeastern Conference first-team pick and named the SEC Offensive Player of the Year by the Associated Press and the league's coaches...Also selected as the SEC Player of the Year by the Commercial Appeal...Earned the Conerly Trophy, given to the top collegiate player in the state of Mississippi (also won the Conerly Trophy in 2001)...Named 1 of 15 scholar-athletes by the National Football Foundation and College Hall of Fame, and received an \$18,000 post-graduate scholarship...Finalist for Draddy Trophy (academic Heisman), given to the top scholar-athlete in the nation...Named to the SEC Good Works Team.

- Perkins had personal season-high rushing totals in each of the last 5 games: 38 yards at Pittsburgh (12/4), 45 vs. Dallas (12/11), 56 vs. Detroit (12/18), 68 at Philadelphia (12/22), and 102 at Washington (1/1), where he also had a season-high 21 carries.
- Perkins made his first career start vs. the Redskins, and became the first Giants back to rush for at least 100 yards since Rashad Jennings ran for 170 yards in the 2015 season finale vs. the Eagles. Had Perkins not crossed the century mark, the Giants would have played an entire season without a 100-yard rusher for the first time since 1996.
- Started the NFC Wild Card Game at Green Bay (1/8), and led the Giants with 30 rushing yards on 10 carries. Also caught 3 passes for 27 yards.

- Pierre-Paul's 50.0 career sacks are the 7th-highest total among Giants player since sacks became an official statistic in 1982.
- Pierre-Paul's 16.5 sacks in 2011 were the 4th-highest total in Giants history.
- In 2011, Pierre-Paul was named first-team All-Pro by the Associated Press.
- In 2010, Pierre-Paul had 2.0 sacks vs. Jacksonville (11/28) and 2.0 vs. Washington (12/5) to become the first rookie in Giants history with at least 2.0 sacks in consecutive games.
- JPP has been named NFC Defensive Player of the Week 4 times. Only Lawrence Taylor (9) & Michael Strahan (5) have more in team history. Pierre-Paul was also the NFC Defensive Player of the Month in December 2011.

CAREER HIGHLIGHTS:

- Has played in 95 regular-season games with 69 starts and started all 4 postseason games in which he's played... Career regular-season totals include 398 tackles (290 solo), 50.0 sacks, 11 forced fumbles, 7 fumble recoveries (1 returned for a touchdown), and 2 interceptions (each returned for a touchdown)... The 50.0 sacks place Pierre-Paul 7th on the Giants' career list; Justin Tuck is 6th with 60.5... In the postseason, JPP has 18 tackles (15 solo) and 1 half-sack.
- In 2016, Pierre-Paul started the first 12 games of the season before missing the final 4 and the NFC Wild Card Game after undergoing surgery to repair a core muscle injury that he suffered at Pittsburgh (12/4)... He was inactive for each of those 5 games... Finished 2nd on the team with 7.0 sacks, and had 53 tackles (35 solo), 8 passes defended, 3 forced fumbles, and 1 fumble recovery that he returned for a touchdown... The 7.0 sacks increased his career total to 50.0, the 2nd-highest total in franchise history (since 1982, when sacks became an official statistic).
- Opened the season with 6 tackles (4 solo) at Dallas (9/11)... Had a season-high 8 tackles (6 solo), 1 forced fumble, and picked up his first sack of the season when he tackled Kirk Cousins for a 6-yard loss vs. Washington (9/25)... Tallied 7 tackles (6 solo) at Green Bay (10/9).
- Tied his career high with 2.5 sacks vs. Chicago (11/20), then broke it with 3.0 sacks the following week at

Cleveland (11/27), where he had 7 tackles (5 solo), forced a fumble that was recovered by Kerry Wynn and, more spectacularly, caught a ball Josh McCown had fumbled in midair - after it was forced by Johnathan Hankins - and returned it 43 yards for his 3rd career touchdown... JPP had scored twice previously on interception returns: a 28-yarder at Dallas on Oct. 28, 2012, and a 24-yarder vs. Green Bay on Nov. 17, 2013. Each of his touchdowns has been in a Giants' victory.

- Pierre-Paul was the first NFL player with at least 3.0 sacks and a fumble-return touchdown of at least 40 yards in the same game since 1982, the first year individual sacks became an official statistic... He was the 9th player with at least 3.0 sacks and a fumble return touchdown of any length; Atlanta's Vic Beasley became the 10th 2 weeks later in Los Angeles... JPP was the first Giants player with at least 3.0 sacks and a touchdown in the same game since George Martin on Nov. 24, 1985, and the first NFL player to accomplish the feat since Dallas' Demarcus Ware on Jan. 2, 2011.

- Pierre-Paul's performance in Cleveland earned him his 4th NFC Defensive Player of the Week Award... He had 3 tackles (1 solo) in Pittsburgh before suffering the core muscle injury that sidelined him for the remainder of the season.

- In 2015, Pierre-Paul missed the first 8 games of the season while recuperating from a July 4 fireworks accident that badly injured his right hand... He was activated on Nov. 7, and started the final 8 games at right defensive end... Finished the season with 26 tackles (21 solo), 1.0 sack, 4 tackles for losses, 6 passes defended, and 2 fumble recoveries.

- Made his season debut at Tampa Bay (11/8) and had 2 solo tackles... Finished with 4 tackles (2 solo) at Washington (11/29) and 6 tackles (5 solo) and a fumble recovery vs. the Jets (12/6).

- Contributed 3 tackles (1 solo) and a fumble recovery at Miami (12/14)... Recorded 3 solo tackles and his only sack of the season, a 9-yard takedown of Cam Newton, vs. Carolina (12/20)... Tallied 6 solo tackles in the season finale vs. Philadelphia (1/3/16).

- In 2014, started all 16 games at right defensive end... Had 1 of his finest seasons, finishing 3rd on the team with 76 tackles (54 solo), and team-high totals of 12.5 sacks, 16 tackles for losses and 21 quarterback hits... Added 3 forced fumbles, 1 fumble recovery and 6 passes defended.

- After compiling just 3.5 sacks in the first 11 games, he had 9.0 sacks in the final 5 games. JPP's total of 12.5

sacks was the 2nd-highest of his career, and the highest total by a Giants player since he had 16.5 in 2011.

- Pierre-Paul had sacks in 7 different games, including 6 with 1.5 or more sacks. The latter figure tied him with Kansas City's Justin Houston for the NFL's 3rd-highest total, behind Houston's J.J. Watt and Baltimore's Elvis Dumervil, who each had 7...JPP had a career-high 2.5 sacks among his 7 tackles vs. Washington (12/14)... Pierre-Paul had 2.0 sacks at Dallas (10/19), at Tennessee (12/7) and vs. Philadelphia (12/28), and 1.5 sacks vs. Arizona (9/14) and at Jacksonville (11/30)...He had 1.0 sack at St. Louis (12/21).

- Pierre-Paul's 2-sack game at Dallas was his first since Dec. 24, 2011, when he had 2 takeaways of the Jets' Mark Sanchez.

- Contributed a season-high 8 tackles (6 solo) and 1 forced fumble at Seattle (11/9)...Had 7 tackles in 4 different games...Also forced fumbles at Tennessee and vs. Washington...Recovered a fumble vs. Dallas (11/23).

- In 2013, JPP played in 11 games with 6 starts, the first time in his career he did not play every game...He missed the entire preseason after undergoing surgery on June 4 to repair a herniated disk in his lower back...Was inactive for the season's final 5 games with a shoulder injury...Finished the season with 37 tackles (28 solo), 2.0 sacks, 5 passes defended and 1 interception.

- JPP was named the NFC Defensive Player of the Week following the Giants' 27-13 win over Green Bay (11/17) after he effectively clinched the win by intercepting a Scott Tolzien pass and returning it 24 yards for a touchdown with 10:49 remaining in the game. At the snap, Pierre-Paul put up his hands and snatched a Tolzien pass that was intended for Andrew Quarless. It was his 2nd career pick and he has scored on both of them; on a similar play in 2012 at Dallas, Pierre-Paul picked off Tony Romo and returned it 28 yards for a score.

- Sacked Terrelle Pryor vs. Oakland (11/10), the game in which he injured his shoulder...Started for the first time at Carolina (9/22), where he had a season-high 7 tackles (6 solo)...Opened the season with 3 tackles (2 solo), including a sack of Romo at Dallas (9/8).

- In 2012, played in all 16 games for the 3rd consecutive season with 15 starts — 14 at right defensive end and 1 at right defensive tackle at San Francisco (10/14)...Started on the NFC Pro Bowl team, his 2nd selection in as many seasons...JPP's 6.5 sacks and 14 tackles for losses led the Giants for the 2nd season in a row...Finished 3rd on the team with 87 tackles (61 solo)...Also had 17 quarterback hits and a team-high 23 quarterback hurries...Had his first career interception, which he returned for a touchdown...Contributed 7 passes defended, 1 forced fumble and 1 fumble recovery.

- Recorded 8 tackles (4 solo) and his first sack of the season, an 8-yard takedown of Josh Freeman, vs. Tampa Bay (9/16)...Credited with a half-sack of Cam Newton and 2 passes defended at Carolina (9/20)...Had a season-high 2.0 sacks (1 each of Alex Smith and Colin Kaepernick) at San Francisco, the first of 4 consecutive games in which he had a sack...Sacked Robert Griffin III and forced a fumble vs. Washington (10/21), sacked Romo at Dallas (10/28) and sacked Ben Roethlisberger vs. Pittsburgh (11/14)...He had a season-high 8 tackles (6 solo) vs. the Steelers...Recovered an Aaron Rodgers fumble vs. Green Bay (11/25).

- Scored his first touchdown on his first career intercep-

tion at the Cowboys when he picked off a Romo pass and returned it 28 yards for a score with 13:05 left in the 2nd quarter. It was the Giants' first defensive touchdown since Michael Boley recovered a fumble and returned it 65 yards vs. St. Louis on Sept. 19, 2011. The score was the team's first interception return for a touchdown since Dec. 21, 2009, when Terrell Thomas brought one back 14 yards at Washington. And it was the first score by a Giants defensive lineman since Osi Umenyiora scored on a 37-yard fumble return vs. the Redskins on Sept. 13, 2009.

- In 2011, JPP established himself as 1 of the NFL's premier defensive ends in his 2nd pro season. Played in all 16 regular season games with 12 starts and started all 4 of the Giants' postseason games...Finished 3rd on the team and first among defensive linemen with 88 tackles (67 solo) and led the team with 23 tackles for losses and 29 quarterback hits...Pierre-Paul was 4th in the NFL with 16.5 sacks, the 4th-highest total in Giants history. He joined Pro Football Hall of Famers Lawrence Taylor and Michael Strahan as the only Giants with at least 16 in a season. Taylor did it once — he had 20.5 sacks in his 1986 MVP season — and Strahan did it twice (an NFL-record 22.5 sacks in 2001 and 18.5 in 2003).

- JPP had 5 multiple-sack games: at Washington (9/11), at Philadelphia (9/25), vs. Seattle (10/9), at Dallas (12/11) and at Jets (12/24)...He had at least a half-sack in 12 of the 16 games.

- Pierre-Paul was selected to his first Pro Bowl and was named 1st-team All-Pro by the Associated Press.

- JPP was twice selected NFC Defensive Player of the Week in December — when he was also named NFC Defensive Player of the Month.

- In a victory in Dallas, Pierre-Paul led the team with 8 tackles (6 solo), including 2 sacks of Tony Romo. The 1st resulted in a safety for the Giants' first points. The 2nd sack was on a 3rd down in the 3rd quarter and forced the Cowboys to punt from their own 43-yard line. Pierre-Paul also forced a Felix Jones fumble that was recovered by Deon Grant and led to a field goal. He secured the victory by blocking Dan Bailey's 47-yard field goal attempt with 1 second left in the game. If good, the kick would have tied the score and sent the game into overtime.

- Was credited with a career-high 16 tackles (11 solo) and a sack vs. Washington (12/18).

- Was again named Player of the Week after his performance at the Jets. Pierre-Paul had 5 tackles (4 solo), including 2 sacks for losses of 14 yards, and 3 quarterback hits. His 1st sack, with 2 seconds to go in the 2nd quarter, resulted in a 7-yard loss and forced the Jets to attempt a 44-yard field goal, which was wide right. His 2nd sack was on the final series and all but ended the Jets' chance for a miracle comeback.

- Pierre-Paul was the first NFC defensive player to win the award twice in 3 weeks since New Orleans safety Malcolm Jenkins was honored in Weeks 12 and 14 of the 2010 season. He was the 1st Giant to be cited twice in 1 season since Umenyiora was named Player of the Week in Weeks 4 and 7 of the 2007 season. Pierre-Paul was the first Giant to be named Defensive Player of the Week twice in a 3-week span of a season since Strahan in 2001 (Weeks 3 and 5).

- Had 8 tackles (6 solo) in the NFC Wild Card Game vs. Atlanta (1/8/12), 2 solo tackles in NFC Divisional Playoff Game at Green Bay (1/15/12) and 6 tackles (5 solo) in

Championship Game at San Francisco (1/22).

- Pierre-Paul had 2 solo tackles and 2 passes defended in Super Bowl XLVI vs. New England (2/5).

- As a rookie in 2010, played in all 16 games as a reserve defensive lineman and on special teams...On defense, finished with 31 tackles (24 solo), including 4.5 sacks, the highest total by a Giants rookie since Cornelius Griffin had 5.0 in 2000...Added 6 passes defended, 17 QB hurries, 11 QB hits, 2 forced fumbles and 2 fumble recoveries...Tied for 3rd on the team with 9 special teams tackles (8 solo).

- Made his NFL debut with 1 defensive tackle and 1 special teams tackle vs. Carolina (9/12)...Had 2 special teams tackles at Houston (10/10) and vs. Detroit (10/17)...Recorded a season-high 7 tackles (6 solo), including his first 2.0 NFL sacks, and 2 forced fumbles vs. Jacksonville (11/28). Forced David Garrard to fumble on each of his first 2.0 career sacks...Added 2.0 sacks the following week vs. Washington (12/5) to become the first rookie in Giants history with at least 2.0 sacks in consecutive games...Recovered 1 fumble in each game vs. the Redskins.

- Originally a first-round (16th pick overall) draft choice by the Arizona Cardinals in 2008...Traded (with a 2nd-round draft choice) to the Philadelphia Eagles for quarterback Kevin Kolb on July 28, 2011...Signed as a free agent by the Denver Broncos on March 14, 2013...Signed as a free agent by the Giants on March 17, 2014.

CAREER HIGHLIGHTS:

- Rodgers-Cromartie has played in 138 regular-season games with 114 starts, and has started all 10 postseason games in which he played...His career totals include 389 tackles (348 solo), 143 passes defended, and 30 interceptions that he has returned for 535 yards (17.8-yard avg.) and 6 touchdowns, 6 forced fumbles, and 1 fumble recovery...In the postseason, he has 34 tackles (32 solo), 3 interceptions and 15 passes defended...Including postseason games, DRC's teams are 24-3 when he intercepts at least 1 pass.

- In 2016, Dominique-Rodgers played in 15 regular-season games with 9 starts, and started the NFC Wild Card Game...Did not play at Minnesota (10/3)...Was selected 2nd-team All-Pro by the AP...Led the Giants and was tied for 2nd in the NFL (with Kansas City's Marcus Peters and Houston's Quintin Demps) with 6 interceptions, and twice had 2 interceptions in a game (at Los Angeles and at Washington). The 6 picks matched the career-high he set as a 2nd-year pro with Arizona in 2009...Rodgers-Cromartie was the first Giants player with 6 interceptions in a season since safety Antrel Rolle in 2013...Also contributed 49 tackles (41 solo), a team-high 21 passes defended, and a sack.

- Rodgers-Cromartie started the season opener in Dallas (9/11) at left cornerback and had 4 solo tackles and 2 passes defended...He had 2 solo stops in each of the next 2 games, vs. New Orleans (10/18) and vs. Washington (10/25)...Started at left corner and recorded a season-high 6 solo tackles, and tied his season-high with 3 passes defended — a total he reached 3 times - vs. Baltimore (10/16).

- In a victory vs. the Rams in London (10/23), DRC had 4 solo tackles, 3 passes defended, and intercepted Case Keenum in the end zone on each of the Rams' final 2 possessions to preserve the Giants' 7-point victory. It was the 4th multiple-interception game of his career and first since Oct. 25, 2015, when he twice picked off Dallas' Matt Cassel in the end zone in MetLife Stadium.

- Safety Landon Collins also intercepted 2 Keenum passes, including 1 he returned for a touchdown...DRC and Collins were the first pair of teammates with multiple interceptions each in a single game since Seattle's Byron Maxwell and Richard Sherman in Week 15 of the 2013 season - ironically,

against the Giants in MetLife Stadium. They were the first Giants duo to accomplish the feat since Kenny Hill and Terry Kinard vs. San Diego on Sept. 14, 1986.

- Rodgers-Cromartie had 5 tackles (3 solo) and 2 passes defended vs. Dallas (12/11), and a season-high 7 tackles (5 solo), 3 passes defended and a game-clinching end zone interception of a Matthew Stafford pass with 1:58 remaining vs. Detroit (12/18)...Contributed 2 solo stops, 2 passes defended, and an interception at Philadelphia (12/22).

- Earned his 2nd career Defensive Player of the Week award for his performance in a season-ending victory at Washington (1/1), intercepting 2 Kirk Cousins passes and picking up the second sack of his 9-year career...Picked off a Cousins pass with 4:06 remaining in the 3rd quarter and another with 1:12 remaining in the 4th quarter to effectively end the game. That increased DRC's total to a team-leading 6 interceptions...Sacked Cousins for a 9-yard loss late in the second quarter. DRC's only other sack was on Nov. 13, 2011, when he played for Philadelphia and dropped Arizona's John Skelton for a 7-yard loss.

- He was previously honored as the NFC Defensive Player of the Week in Week 5 of the 2009 season, when, as a member of the Cardinals, he intercepted a Matt Schaub pass with 2:20 remaining in the 4th quarter and returning it 49 yards for the game-winning touchdown vs. Houston.

- In 2015, Rodgers-Cromartie was selected to play in his 2nd Pro Bowl, and first since 2009...Started all 15 games in which he played at left cornerback...Was inactive vs. Washington (9/24) with a concussion...Finished with 589 tackles (52 solo), 3 interceptions (tying him for the team lead), a team-high 13 passes defended, 2 forced fumbles and 1 fumble recovery. He returned 1 of the interceptions and the fumble for touchdowns.

- DRC scored the Giants' first touchdown of the season at Dallas (9/13) on a 57-yard return of a Cole Beasley fumble that was forced by Trumaine McBride. It was the Giants' first defensive touchdown since Markus Kuhn's 26-yard fumble return at Tennessee on Dec. 7, 2014...Rodgers-Cromartie accounted for the Giants' longest fumble return touchdown since Michael Boley's 70-yarder vs. Pittsburgh on Nov. 4, 2012...It was DRC's first career recovery of an opponent's fumble. His only previous recovery occurred in the final game of his 2008 rookie season with Arizona, when he recovered his own fumble after intercepting a pass by Seattle's Seneca Wallace...Rodgers-Cromartie also had 6 solo tackles in the game...Registered 4 tackles (3 solo) at Buffalo (10/4), 6 tackles (4 solo) vs. San Francisco (10/11), and 4 solo stops at Philadelphia (10/19).

- Rodgers-Cromartie had 2 solo tackles and intercepted

2 Matt Cassel passes vs. Dallas (10/25)...Returned the first of those picks 58 yards for a touchdown...It was the Giants' first touchdown on an interception return since Dec. 22, 2013, when Will Hill picked off a Matthew Stafford pass in Detroit and brought it back 38 yards for a score...DRC's 58-yard runback was the Giants' longest interception return since Terrell Thomas' 65-yarder vs. Oakland on Nov. 10, 2013. It was the Giants' longest touchdown on an interception return since Kevin Dockery's 96-yarder at Dallas on Oct. 23, 2006... The touchdown was the 7th of Rodgers-Cromartie's career (6 interception returns, 1 fumble return). His most recent pick-6 on Oct. 27, 2013 when he was with Denver, against Washington.

- The 2 interceptions tied DRC's career high, achieved twice previously (and matched vs. the Rams on Oct. 23, 2016). He had 2 picks on Nov. 23, 2008, his rookie season, for Arizona at Seattle (Matt Hasselbeck was the quarterback), and Sept. 9, 2012, for Philadelphia at Cleveland (off of Brandon Weeden, who had started the previous 3 games for Dallas before he was replaced by Cassel)...Rodgers-Cromartie was the first Giants defender with 2 interceptions in a game since Trumaine McBride's 2 picks vs. Washington on Sept. 29, 2013.

- DRC had 6 solo tackles at New Orleans (11/1) and a season-high 7 solo stops vs. New England (11/15)...Had 5 stops (2 solo) vs. the Jets (12/6) and 4 solo tackles at Minnesota (12/27).

- In his first season with the Giants in 2014, Rodgers-Cromartie played in all 16 games with 15 starts at left cornerback...Did not start at Dallas (10/19) due to back and hamstring injuries...Finished season with 38 tackles (36 solo), 2 interceptions and a team-high 12 passes defended,

- Made his Giants debut with 4 solo tackles and 2 passes defended at Detroit (9/8)...Collected 5 solo tackles and 2 passes defended vs. Arizona (9/14)...Had 3 solo tackles and intercepted a Ryan Fitzpatrick pass vs. Houston (9/21)...Matched his season high with 5 solo tackles vs. Dallas (11/23)...Intercepted a Zach Mettenberger pass and returned it 16 yards at Tennessee (12/7)...Tallied 4 solo tackles and a pass defended vs. Washington (12/14).

- In 2013, he played in 15 regular-season games with 13 starts at right cornerback and he started all 3 of Denver's postseason games...Finished the season with 31 tackles (25 solo), a team-high 14 passes defended and tied for the Broncos lead with 3 interceptions...Recorded his first Broncos interception when he picked off Eli Manning's pass in the end zone at the end of the first half at the Giants (9/15)...Broke up a pair of passes against his former team in a win vs. Philadelphia (9/29)...Intercepted a Kirk Cousins pass and returned it 75 yards for a touchdown vs. Washington (10/27)...Had a season-high 5 tackles vs. both the Giants (3 solo) and Redskins (4 solo)...Led the team with 4 pass breakups in the AFC Divisional Playoff Game vs. San Diego (1/12)...Had 1 solo tackle in Super Bowl XLVIII vs. Seattle (2/2).

- In 2012, DRC started all 16 games for the 3rd time in his career and totaled 43 tackles (35 solo) and led the Eagles in interceptions (3) and passes defended (16)...Posted his 3rd career multi-interception game and a personal best 7 passes defended in the season opener at Cleveland (9/9)...Intercepted a Manning pass in the end zone on the first play of the 4th quarter vs. the Giants (9/30).

- In 2011, played in 13 games with 3 starts in his first season with the Eagles and recorded 25 tackles (23 solo), 1 sack and 6 passes defended...Also had a special teams tackle...Registered his first career sack vs. John Skelton of Arizona (11/13).

- In 2010, Rodgers-Cromartie started all 16 games for the 2nd consecutive season and contributed 32 tackles (29 solo), 3 interceptions and 19 passes defended...Returned 2 of his interceptions for touchdowns to tie for the NFL lead...Clinched the Cardinals' win vs. New Orleans (10/10) by intercepting Drew Brees on the final play of the game and returning it 28 yards for a score.

- In 2009, he started all 16 games and earned his first career Pro Bowl selection after totaling career bests in tackles (51), interceptions (6), passes defended (39) and forced fumbles (3)...Also blocked a field goal...Started 2 postseason games and had 5 solo tackles, 1 interception and 2 passes defended...Earned NFC Defensive Player of the Week honors after intercepting a Matt Schaub pass with 2:20 remaining in the 4th quarter and returning it 49 yards for the game-winning touchdown vs. Houston (10/11)...Intercepted an Aaron Rodgers pass on the first play from scrimmage in an NFC Wild Card Game vs. Green Bay (1/10)...It was his 3rd career postseason interception, tying Hall of Famer Aeneas Williams for the franchise record.

- As a rookie in 2008, played in 16 regular-season games with 11 starts and started all 4 postseason games, including Super Bowl XLIII...Totalled 43 tackles (38 solo), 4 interceptions for a career-high 157 yards in returns, 27 passes defended and a blocked field goal in the regular season, plus 21 tackles (19 solo), 2 interceptions and 9 passes defended in the postseason...Started for the first time at the Jets (9/28) and recovered a Cardinals onside kick in the 3rd quarter that led to a touchdown...Recorded the first 2 interceptions of his career off Matt Hasselbeck at Seattle (11/16)...Picked off a Marc Bulger pass vs. St. Louis (12/7) and returned it 99 yards for a touchdown to tie for the longest such runback in Cardinals history...Made first career postseason start in an NFC Wild Card Game vs. Atlanta (1/3) and led the team with 21 tackles (19 solo) and an interception...Tallied 5 solo tackles and 2 passes defended in Super Bowl XLIII vs. Pittsburgh (2/1/09).

CAREER HIGHLIGHTS:

- As a rookie in 2016, Shepard started all 16 regular-season games and the NFC Wild Card Game...It was the 2nd consecutive season the Giants' 2nd-round draft choice started every game; safety Landon Collins did it in 2015...Shepard was the Giants' first offensive rookie to start every game of his rookie season since Justin Pugh started every game at right tackle in 2013...He was the first rookie wide receiver to start every game for the Giants since Bobby Johnson in 1984, and the first in the NFL since Buffalo's Sammy Watkins in 2014.

- Shepard finished 2nd on the team with 65 catches for 683 yards and 8 touchdowns...Caught at least 2 passes in every game except the victory in Cleveland on Nov. 27, when he did not have a reception...Shepard placed 2nd among NFL rookies in all 3 major statistical categories, trailing only New Orleans' Michael Thomas, who had 92 catches for 1,137 yards and 9 scores.

- Shepard had 1 of the finest seasons by a rookie wide receiver in Giants history:

- Shepard caught 3 passes for 43 yards, including a

9-yard touchdown, in his NFL debut at Dallas (9/11)...He was the first Giants player to catch a touchdown pass in his first game since Odell Beckham Jr. on Oct. 5, 2014.

- Shepard had season-high totals of 8 receptions for 117 yards vs. New Orleans (9/18), and followed with 5 catches for 73 yards and a 23-yard touchdown vs. Washington (9/25)...His 16 receptions are a record for a Giants rookie in his first 3 games. Bobby Johnson held the former mark with 15 in 1984.

- Shepard was the first player in Giants history to score a touchdown and have more than 100 receiving yards in a game in his first 3 NFL games, and was the first NFL player to do it since Pittsburgh's Martavis Bryant in 2014.

- Also set the 4-game record when he had 4 receptions for 30 yards at Minnesota (10/3)...His 20 catches through 4 games topped Beckham's previous mark of 18.

- In a 27-23 victory vs. Philadelphia (11/6), Shepard caught 3 passes for 50 yards, including a 32-yard touchdown, and rookie free agent Roger Lewis, Jr. had a 30-yard touchdown reception. It was the first time the Giants had 2 rookie wide receivers with touchdown catches in the same game since Oct. 5, 1987 when Lewis Bennett and Reggie McGowan accomplished the feat in a strike replacement game vs. San Francisco. Excluding replacement games, it had last happened on Dec. 12, 1954, when Ken MacAfee and Bob Topp did it at Philadelphia.

- With Victor Cruz sidelined with an ankle injury, the Giants started rookie wide receivers Shepard and Lewis in a Monday night game vs. Cincinnati (11/14)...They were the first pair of rookie wideouts to start for the Giants since Dec. 15, 1984, when Bobby Johnson and Lionel Manuel started the regular-season finale vs. New Orleans. Manuel caught 2 passes for 26 yards, while Johnson had 1 catch for 9 yards.

- Shepard had 4 receptions for 56 yards and a 6-yard touchdown vs. Detroit (12/18), and 7 catches for 61 yards and his 8th score of the season on a 13-yard pass at Philadelphia (12/22)...Had 4 catches for 63 yards in his postseason debut in the NFC Wild Card Game at Green Bay (1/8).

COLLEGE:

- In 4 seasons at Oklahoma, Shepard played in 50 games with 41 starts...Started all 37 games in his final 3 seasons...Career totals included 233 receptions for 3,482 yards (14.9-yard avg.) and 26 touchdowns, with a long catch of 75 yards...Also returned 30 punts for a 7.3 yard average with a long runback of 27 yards...His career receptions (233) and receiving yards (3,482) each rank

2nd in Oklahoma history...Ranks 3rd in school history in career touchdown receptions (26) and 100-yard receiving games (12)...Ranks 3rd in OU history in single-season receptions (86 as a senior)...Shares the school record for single-game receptions (15 vs. Kansas State as a junior).

- As a senior in 2015, he was a semifinalist for the Biletnikoff Award...Named to All-Big 12 first team by the league's coaches, and 2nd team by AP...Started all 13 games at receiver and also served as team's primary punt returner...Caught a career-high 86 passes for 1,288 yards (15.0-yard avg.) and 11 touchdowns, with a long catch of 74 yards...Also returned 30 punts for 148 yards, a 7.9-yard average, with a long of 27 yards...As a junior in 2014, was named to All-Big 12 first team by league's coaches and All-Big 12 2nd team by AP...Semifinalist for Biletnikoff Award...Started all 12 games and finished season with 51 receptions for 970 yards and 5 touchdowns, with a long catch of 75 yards...Also returned 11 punts for 73 yards (6.6-yard avg.)...Tied school record with 15 receptions and tallied 197 receiving yards and a touchdown vs. Kansas State (10/18)...In 2013, started all 12 games in which he played...Did not play vs. Iowa State (11/16) due to injury...Concluded the season with 51 catches for 603 yards and 7 touchdowns with a long reception of 57 yards...As a freshman in 2012, he played in all 13 games with 4 starts...His 621 receiving yards were the 3rd-highest total by an Oklahoma freshman, while his 45 receptions ranked 4th all-time among the school's freshmen...Had his first 3 career catches for 48 yards vs. Florida A&M (9/8)...Made first career start and caught 7 passes for 108 yards, and first career touchdown vs. Kansas State (9/22)...Recorded a season-long 52-yard reception at West Virginia (11/17).

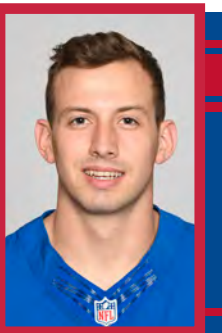

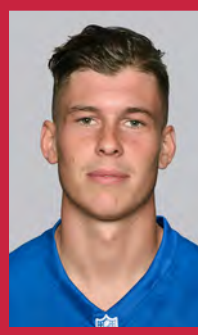

CAREER HIGHLIGHTS:

- Wing has played in 48 regular-season games and 2 postseason games...He has a 45.0-yard gross average and a 39.7-yard net average on 230 punts with 81 punts inside the 20, 18 touchbacks, and a long kick of 74 yards...None of Wing's punts have been blocked...He has 11 postseason punts with a gross average of 38.8 yards and a net average of 34.3 yards, with 4 punts inside the 20.

- In 2 seasons with the Giants, Wing has booted 169 punts, and his gross average of 45.4 yards is the 2nd-highest in team history, behind Steve Weatherford's 46.3-yard average (on 311 punts from 2011-14).

- In 2016, Wing punted 93 times for a 46.2-yard gross average (11th in the NFL) and a 40.9-yard net average (10th in the league)...His net average of 40.9 yards was a single-season Giants record, breaking the former mark of 40.2 yards, set by Jeff Feagles in 2008...Wing is also 6th on the list with a 38.9-yard net average in 2015...Wing placed 28 punts inside the 20-yard line, 5 fewer than he had in 2015, when he tied the franchise record of 33 also held by Brad Maynard (1997 and 98).

- Wing had season-highs in both gross (51.3) and net (50.3) yard averages (minimum 3 punts) on 4 kicks vs. Baltimore (10/16)...Booted a season-long 63-yard punt vs. New Orleans (9/18).

- In a victory at Cleveland (11/27), Wing had a 47.4-yard gross average and a 44.7-yard net average, and placed 5 balls inside the 20-yard line, including 3 inside the 10, and had 2 more downed right at the 20...He had a long kick of 58 yards among his career-high 9 punts, the highest total by the Giants since they punted 10 times at Philadelphia on Oct. 12, 2014...The Browns had 5 net yards on 3 punt returns. After Wing's 9 punts, Cleveland took possession, in order, at its own 20, 20, 4, 12, 15, 37, 8, 5, and 20-yard lines (the last on a touchback with 1:35 remaining).

- Wing was named the NFC Special Teams Player of the Week for Weeks 14 and 15 for his outstanding play in victories vs. Dallas and Detroit. He was the first Giants player to win back-to-back Special Teams Player of the

Week awards since they were instituted in 1984.

- In a 10-7 victory vs. Dallas (12/11), Wing tied his career and season-high with 9 punts and had a 43.2-yard gross average and a 42.9-yard net average, with a long punt of 57 yards. 5 of his kicks were downed inside the 20-yard line. Dallas totaled 3 yards on 3 punt returns.

- In the first half, a Wing punt pinned the Cowboys at their own 3-yard line, where his punt was downed by Dwayne Harris. Wing was even better in the 2nd half, when he punted 4 times and Dallas took possession, in order, at their own 9, 11, 24 and 3-yard lines following those kicks. When the Cowboys stopped the Giants on a 3rd down at the Dallas 36-yard line with 1:15 remaining in the game, they hoped to have 1 more chance to win or tie the game. - Wing was the first Giants punter to receive the Special Teams Player of the Week Award since Feagles in Week 13 of the 2005 season — also for his performance in a December home victory against Dallas.

- One week later, in a 17-6 victory vs. Detroit (12/18), Wing was honored again after he had a 41.0-yard net average on 7 punts, including 1 that was tipped at the line and travelled only 18 yards. With the Lions trying to come back in the 2nd half, Wing booted 3 consecutive punts that forced them to take possession at their own 3, 4, and 19-yard lines. Detroit totaled just 11 punt return yards, and scored 3 points on 7 possessions following Wing's punts.

THE VINCE LOMBARDI TROPHY

The Vince Lombardi Trophy is the trophy awarded each year to the winning team of the National Football League's annual championship game, the Super Bowl. It is considered to be the NFL's most prestigious award. The trophy was originally called the "World Championship Game Trophy" when the Super Bowl was originally named the AFL-NFL World Championship Game. It was renamed in 1970 in honor of legendary Green Bay Packers head coach Vince Lombardi.

Since Super Bowl XXX, it is presented to the winning team's owner on the field following the game. Previously, the trophy was presented inside the winning team's locker room.

Unlike trophies such as the Stanley Cup and the Grey Cup, a new Vince Lombardi Trophy is made every year and the winning team maintains permanent possession of that trophy.

Each trophy is handcrafted by Tiffany & Co. master artisans at their workshop in Parsippany, New Jersey. The trophy depicts a regulation-size football in kicking position that is made entirely of sterling silver. It stands 22 inches (55 cm) tall, weighs seven pounds (3 kg), and takes approximately four months and 72 man-hours to create. The words "Vince Lombardi Trophy" and the NFL logo are engraved on the base. After the trophy is awarded, it is sent back to Tiffany & Co. to be engraved with the winning team's name, score, logo and roster if the team wishes.

This year, the Giants were on the right side of a season-opening one-point game in AT&T Stadium.

The Giants began the Ben McAdoo era Sunday with a pulsating 20-19 triumph over the Dallas Cowboys, a game that was not decided until time expired on the home team as it desperately tried to get off one final snap. The victory was particularly sweet for the Giants, who exactly 52 weeks earlier lost a 27-26 decision here on a touchdown with just seven seconds remaining.

"I thought they played with good discipline and poise," said McAdoo, who became the first Giants coach in eight tries to beat Dallas in a season opener. "They hung in there. We talk about just finding a path to victory. It all doesn't have to look great. There are a bunch of different ways you can find it. They hung in there and did that this afternoon."

"This is big," said quarterback Eli Manning, who threw three touchdown passes. "Big win for this team and the guys that were here last year. Almost a year ago today in the same spot, we had a chance to win and couldn't pull it out. We were down and to score from an offensive standpoint to take the lead, and then for our defense to get two more stops and hold on to that lead, it's big for this team moving forward. It's a big help."

The drama was further enhanced by the man who scored the game-winning touchdown. Victor Cruz, playing in his first game in 700 days (since Oct. 12, 2014), caught Manning's three-yard pass with 6:15 remaining. It was Cruz's first touchdown since Sept. 21, 2014 vs. Houston, and his first vs. the Cowboys since Sept. 8, 2013.

In the end, it was the defense that came up big. Dallas gained just 12 more yards than the Giants, despite running 21 more plays and owning a 13½-minute time of possession advantage.

"It was great to see the defense get a stop there at the end," McAdoo said. "They battled all night. They played a lot of plays tonight and they fought through it."

GIANTS 16, SAINTS 13



MetLife Stadium became home to the Theater of the Bizarre when the Giants hosted the New Orleans Saints on Sunday, until Victor Cruz proved that his new normal is just as good as his old.

The Giants lost fumbles on three consecutive possessions for the first time since 1983. Their only two sacks of Drew Brees were recorded by defensive backs (Landon Collins and Leon Hall) who had never before had their names next to that stat line — and Hall is in his 10th NFL season. The Giants' only touchdown was scored by Janoris Jenkins on a 65-yard return of a blocked field goal, the Giants' first such score since 2008. Josh Brown, who missed just two of 32 field goal attempts in 2015, was wide left on his first try of the season (it was from 53 yards, but Brown was 3-for-3 from long distances last year).

Perhaps most unusual was the final score. The Giants-Saints rivalry had become synonymous with shootouts. The average score of their last four meetings had been 51-32, including a 52-49 Saints victory last year in the Superdome. But this one ended 16-13 when Brown booted his third field goal, a 23-yarder, as time expired.

The Giants, who won at Dallas in their opener, improved to 2-0 for the first time since 2009 as Ben McAdoo joined Joe Alexander (1926) and Dan Reeves (1993) as the only head coaches in Giants history to win their first two games as the franchise's head coach.

"These last two games are very similar to the start of last year, and obviously the finishes are what the difference is," said quarterback Eli Manning, recalling that the Giants lost late leads and fell to Dallas and Atlanta to start the 2015 season. "We are able to find ways to make the plays that we need in crucial moments and a great job of guys making plays and communicating on the sideline."

No one made a bigger play than Cruz. On third-and-eight from the New Orleans 36-yard line with 1:32 remaining, he outmuscle rookie cornerback Ken Crawley for a Manning pass down the right sideline. The 34-yard gain enabled Manning to take a knee three times before Brown's deciding field goal attempt, which was 10 yards shorter than an extra point.

"We didn't want to give Drew (Brees) the ball back," McAdoo said. "He is a heck of a player, a future Hall of Famer, and if you can end the game with a kick, you end the game."

GIANTS VS. REDSKINS

REDSKINS 29, GIANTS 27



The first defeat of the Ben McAdoo era was the kind of punch to the gut that the Giants have absorbed far too frequently in recent seasons.

The Giants lost to the Washington Redskins, 29-27, under a cloudless sky in MetLife Stadium. They owned leads of 11 points in the first quarter and 12 in the second, but fell when Dustin Hopkins kicked his fifth field goal, a 37-yarder with 1:51 remaining in the game.

What most pained the Giants was their belief that the defeat was self-inflicted. They committed three turnovers, including two Eli Manning interceptions, and had just one takeaway, their first of the season. The Giants were flagged for 11 penalties, including one by rookie Andrew Adams that nullified a blocked punt in the fourth quarter. Center Weston Richburg was ejected for twice committing unsportsmanlike conduct penalties.

"They were a more disciplined football team than we were today," McAdoo said. "Minus-two in the turnover ratio. Way too many penalties."

Despite all the negative occurrences, the Giants had a chance to drive down the field and pull the game out after Hopkins' field goal. But Manning was intercepted by rookie linebacker Su'a Cravens with 1:02 remaining, ending their chance to start 3-0.

"When you get penalties and you get a player ejected, that's not good," Manning said. "We're not doing our job. We can't afford to do that. We can't afford to get out of our zone. When we're doing good things, when we're playing and we got an opportunity to extend the lead and I don't know what happened. Just too many self-inflicted mistakes that put us in bad positions."

"We beat ourselves today, 100 percent," guard Justin Pugh said. "We could go out there and play this team, I'll play them right now. We beat ourselves. We hurt ourselves."

Eli Manning played in his 200th NFL game, including playoff contests. In his 13 seasons, the best quarterback in Giants history has learned to analyze and dissect a game as well as anyone. And his evaluation of the team's performance against the Minnesota Vikings was spot on.

"Offensively, we have to be better and score more points," Manning said. "Plain and simple. We're doing some good things, but not good enough, efficient enough. We have to put it all together."

They were unable to do that on Monday night, when they lost to the Minnesota Vikings, 24-10, in brand new and extremely loud U.S. Bank Stadium. A second consecutive loss dropped the Giants to 2-2, while Minnesota improved to 4-0.

The Giants had two turnovers, punted six times (five in the first half), and committed eight penalties. They were a combined two-for-14 on third and fourth-down conversion attempts. Manning completed only one pass longer than 20 yards, and though he lines up with dynamic wide receivers in Odell Beckham Jr. (who had a career-low 23 receiving yards), Victor Cruz and Sterling Shepard, his two longest completions were to running back Paul Perkins and tight end Will Tye. Most importantly, they scored just one touchdown, and that occurred early in the fourth quarter on Orleans Darkwa's 1-yard run. Josh Brown added a 40-yard field goal.

"(We had trouble) just getting into a rhythm," Cruz said. "We couldn't get ourselves going until later in the game. We just have to figure out how to get into a rhythm a little bit quicker, that's all."

The Vikings' defensive focus was to prevent the three wide receivers from hurting them with big plays, and it worked. Cruz, Beckham and Shepard combined to catch 12 passes for 103 yards, an average of just 8.6 yards.

"They played a lot of safety over the top, cover everything underneath," Beckham said. "They covered the single side, safety rolling to the single side. All-in-all they are a great team. They have always been a great team. I guess they just came out and they played Minnesota Vikings defense. They made it difficult for us."

"They played a lot of two-high man coverage," coach Ben McAdoo said. "They played a lot of double teams. ... We have to find the one-on-one coverage." Asked if the Giants did that, McAdoo said, "I think we struggled finding the one-on-one. It reflects in our completion percentage (which was 55.6 percent as Manning hit 25 of a season-high 45 passes)."

Ben McAdoo was confident the Giants' offense was ready to break out. But the Green Bay Packers – with their suffocating, league-best run defense and persistent pass rush, forced the unit to consistently break down Sunday night.

Limited to one touchdown and posting some unsightly offensive numbers, the Giants lost to the Packers in Lambeau Field, 23-16. The Giants dropped to 2-3 with their third consecutive defeat, while Green Bay improved to 3-1.

"We didn't block well enough, didn't make enough throws or contested catches," McAdoo said. "We need to play better. Need to execute better."

"We just need to do more," said wide receiver Odell Beckham, Jr., who scored the team's only touchdown, and his first of the season, with 2:54 remaining. "On offense we need to sustain drives and be more than one-dimensional."

A brief rundown of the numbers: for the third time in five games, the Giants scored no more than one offensive touchdown. They finished with season-low totals of 219 yards and 14 first downs, and were four-for-13 on third-down conversion attempts. They did not snap the ball in the red zone until their eighth possession, one of just two times they traveled inside the 20-yard line. Eli Manning completed barely 50 percent of his passes (18 of 35) for 199 yards, his first sub-200 game since Oct. 25, 2015. He was also sacked three times, including one on which he lost a fumble that led to a Green Bay field goal on the final play of the first half.

"The pocket was hot tonight," McAdoo said.

The ground game was not. The Giants rushed for 43 yards on 15 attempts, a 2.9-yard average. The latter figure can be considered a minor triumph, because Green Bay entered the game allowing league-leading averages of 42.7 rushing yards a game and 1.8 yards a carry. Bobby Rainey led the Packers with just 22 yards.

"They had a good game plan," Manning said of the Packers. "They did a good job trying to take away our receivers and force us to run the ball. They did a good job of disguising a few things. They played well. They got good pressure just bringing four guys a lot of times. We had some opportunities, missed a few throws, didn't capitalize on a few opportunities, had some guys open. Unfortunately, just didn't score when we got down in the red zone enough."

"Their D-line is very good, and they hustle," guard Justin Pugh said. "Those guys never quit on a play. We had to match that intensity tonight. I think we did some good things. Obviously, we didn't run the ball well enough. We have to get back and definitely take a hard look at this tape. See where we can get better at. We're close."

The legend of Odell Beckham, Jr. added another remarkable chapter on Sunday.

He lost a fumble on the Giants' first offensive play of the Giants home game against the Baltimore Ravens. In the second quarter, Beckham suffered a hip pointer that left him lying on his stomach after an incomplete pass and required a visit to the training room for an examination. He finished the half with two catches for 11 yards. While he was out of action, his replacement, rookie Roger Lewis, Jr., scored a touchdown on his first career reception.

So naturally, Beckham took matters into his own hands — and legs — in the second half despite a hip that, “was bothering me all game.” He caught six more passes for 211 more yards, including touchdowns of 75 and 66 yards, the latter on a fourth-and-one with 1:24 remaining to give the Giants a dramatic come-from-behind 27-23 victory over the Ravens in MetLife Stadium.

The Giants are 3-3 after breaking their 3-game losing streak.

Early in the season, Beckham was generating attention for penalties and confrontations with cornerbacks. Now he's back to doing what he does best, making big plays when the Giants must have them and thrilling fans in the stadium and television viewers around the country.

“That’s what we expect him to do,” said Eli Manning, who threw for 403 yards and three touchdowns while winning his 100th regular-season game and tossing his 300th career touchdown pass. “We got some looks that we wanted. We were able to get to a couple plays that we’ve kind of had on the shelf for a few weeks, we just never quite got the looks that we wanted to get to them. Today, we got some of those and converted on them. It was good to see him make some bigtime plays in crucial moments. There’s nothing better than just catching a slant and going (66) yards for a touchdown to get the game-winning play.”

“There’s going to be a lot more downs and a lot more ups,” said Beckham, who finished with eight catches for 222 yards, the second-highest single-game total in Giants history. “Collectively as a team, we fought today for every bit of it. First play, come out, fumble. What are we going to do now? How are we going to overcome adversity? We did that. Now you just have to keep building on it. We’ve had some tough losses. There’s definitely going to be things to correct from this film and things to watch. You just keep it moving.”

That’s what the Giants had to do all day. They fell behind 10-0 early and trailed by three points at halftime. Despite his productivity, Manning threw two interceptions. The Giants rushed for only 38 yards.

GIANTS AT RAMS (LONDON)
OCTOBER 23, 2016
GIANTS 17, RAMS 10



Given the events of Sunday afternoon in Twickenham Stadium, a more appropriate dateline for this story would be LONDON. Giants safety Landon Collins made the game's most influential plays, and was the best player on the field, as the Giants once again made themselves feel right at home in England with a 17-10 victory over the Los Angeles Rams. The Giants improved to 4-3 at the bye with their second straight victory — and second in as many visits to London, where they beat Miami nine years ago.

Rashad Jennings' 1-yard touchdown run with 9:23 remaining was the game-winner — as well as the only points scored in the second half — but it was Collins, the second-year safety, who left the largest imprint on the game.

With the Giants trailing, 10-3, in the second quarter, Collins intercepted a Case Keenum pass that was tipped by intended receiver Tavon Austin and willed his way 44 yards down the field and across the goal line for the game-tying score. It was his first touchdown since his sophomore season at the University of Alabama, when he scored on an interception return at Tennessee.

"(I feel) fantastic," Collins said. "I mean, my first career touchdown in the NFL. Fantastic. A memory I never want to forget. Definitely a game-changing moment for the team. Got the ball back and changed momentum."

But Collins wasn't finished. In the fourth quarter, he picked off another Keenum throw to Austin. He returned that one 18 yards to the Los Angeles 35. Six plays later, Jennings gave the Giants a lead that held up to the end of the game.

When he wasn't picking off passes, Collins was flattening any Rams player who had the misfortune to find the ball in his hands. He led all players with eight solo tackles, most of the jarring variety.

By many measures, this was a bizarre game for the Giants. The defense that finished 32nd in the NFL last season controlled an opponent with an impressive collection of weapons, on a day when the Giants' offense sputtered throughout.

"We try to be top 10 in the NFL in defense," Collins said. "It (was) 32, and we try to make a big difference from that standpoint."

The Giants entered the game with three takeaways in six games, and a minus-10 turnover differential that was the league's second worst. They reversed field with four interceptions (including Dominique Rodgers-Cromartie's two in the end zone on the Rams' final two possessions) and a healthy plus-3 differential.

Ben McAdoo doesn't want to reflect on the Giants' 2015 season. He doesn't want to talk about it. And he certainly doesn't want to respond to questions about it.

"That's in the rearview mirror," McAdoo said late Sunday afternoon. "I'm not answering those questions. We're right here, we're right now."

McAdoo's insistence on living in the present is understandable, especially considering he made his remarks soon after the Giants held off a late charge by the Philadelphia Eagles and earned a 28-23 victory in MetLife Stadium. The Giants' third consecutive victory lifted their record to 5-3, their best midseason record since they were 6-2 in 2012.

But this game had some uh-oh moments down the stretch, the kind that were so prevalent and unpleasant last year, when the Giants lost six games in which they held a lead or were tied in the fourth quarter.

Needing one first down to ice the game, Eli Manning's third-down pass for Will Tye was tipped at the line by Connor Barwin and intercepted by linebacker Jordan Hicks, who returned the ball to the Giants' 34-yard line with 1:48 remaining. When rookie quarterback Carson Wentz quickly connected with Nelson Agholor for a 17-yard gain, the level of nervousness rose throughout MetLife.

But if anyone was still skeptical that this year will be different, the next four plays provided proof. Wentz, under fierce pressure from the Giants' front, threw four consecutive incomplete passes, the last a fourth-down throw in the end zone to Jordan Matthews, who was covered by Trevin Wade. The Giants found a way to win a game they absolutely had to have, a year after they discovered defeat far too often in close games.

"Last year is in the rearview mirror," McAdoo said. "You go back, you learn from the past and you work on today. We believe that we are going to win these football games. We believe that we're a physical team. We've just got to hang onto leads and win the games. We know we're going to get better as the game goes on and we're going to win in the end."

The victory ended the Giants' four-game losing streak to Philadelphia.

Ben McAdoo believes he must coach as aggressively as he asks his players to perform. On Monday night, his unwillingness to play it safe helped produce a Giants' victory.

Trailing by six points and faced with a fourth-and-goal from the Cincinnati 3-yard line early in the fourth quarter, McAdoo had no interest in kicking a short field goal that could have halved the Giants' deficit. He was determined to take the lead.

"We were going to go for it," McAdoo said.

The gamble — though McAdoo likely would not consider it as such — paid off when Eli Manning found rookie Sterling Shepard alone near the goal line. The touchdown pass vaulted the Giants into a 21-20 lead that held up through the end of the game, thanks to strong finishes by both the offense and defense.

"We knew it was going to take touchdowns to beat this team," McAdoo said. "It's a good football team, and we felt like we needed to score touchdowns."

They got three of them, all on Manning passes, including 10-yard scoring tosses to rookie tight end Jerrell Adams and Odell Beckham, Jr. The Giants have won four consecutive games for the first time since midway through the 2013 season. That streak followed an 0-6 start. This one has improved their record to 6-3, and put them in the thick of the NFC postseason race.

McAdoo's bold decision figuratively pushed them over the goal line. And he made his mind up early not to play it safe.

Rashad Jennings — who accounted for 87 of the Giants' season-high 122 rushing yards — was stopped for no gain on the final play of the third quarter, leaving the Giants with second-and-goal from the nine. As the players walked to the other end of the field, McAdoo made his decision.

"Coach McAdoo told me on second down, 'Hey, we're in four-down territory, just so you know,'" Manning said. "... I don't know about (ever hearing that on) second down. I've heard it on third down before. We had the quarter change, so I think he had some time to think and he just wanted me to know, wanted me to tell the offensive guys, receivers, everybody, to know the circumstances that they were in four-down territory."

How appropriate that the Giants ended three successive and successful weeks at home by winning in the kind of difficult conditions that have characterized football in the Jersey Meadowlands since they first played here 40 years ago.

On a cold and blustery day that turned placekicks, punts, passes, and even snaps into an adventure, the Giants — pardon the pun — stormed back from a 7-point halftime deficit to defeat the Chicago Bears, 22-16, Sunday afternoon in MetLife Stadium.

The Giants won their fifth consecutive game — a first since 2010 — and improved their record to 7-3, their best 10-game start in eight years. They won home games in three consecutive weeks for the first time since Oct 21-Nov 4, 1962.

After falling behind, 16-9, the Giants shut out Chicago in the final two quarters.

"I'm proud of the way the guys responded at halftime," coach Ben McAdoo said. (It was) 13-0 in the second half. Came out with the fire burning."

Eli Manning completed 21 of 36 passes for 227 yards and did not throw an interception while passing for two scores. But he found it hard to throw, and Manning has plenty of experience throwing in North Jersey.

"It can be tough," Manning said of the wind. "The first half, I thought it wasn't too bad. We kind of got gusts at times there in the second half. Especially in the fourth quarter, it got pretty constant with the wind. It was just one of those days that it was going to be tough to get the ball down the field. Your throws, you wanted to have a little zip on it, and it's tough to throw deep stuff and long out-breaking routes. I thought we did a good job keeping things over the middle more, trying clean shots. You know when you start throwing over people and put a touch on it, that's when the wind can really affect it, so we didn't have too many of those throws."

Punter Brad Wing had a 42.5-yard net average on six punts and placed two balls inside the 20-yard line, but those aren't the feats McAdoo cited after the game.

"It was very tough to handle the ball," McAdoo said. "Even the last punt that we got off, you saw how it was a tough catch. Catching the snaps today was even a challenge for those guys in the punt game. But the kicking game was a challenge today, the pass was a challenge, and it was nice not to turn the ball over today even in a game like this where the elements factor."

Dominique Rodgers-Cromartie was born in 1986, 21 years after the popular television show "Rawhide" went off the air. But there he was, singing the theme song late Sunday afternoon in Cleveland.

"We are rollin', rollin', rollin'," DRC crooned as he entered the locker room in FirstEnergy Stadium. It likely won't catch on as the Giants' theme song, but the nine-year veteran cornerback spoke — actually, sang — the truth. The Giants stretched their longest winning streak in eight years to six games with a 27-13 victory against the winless Browns. The 8-3 Giants must now prepare for a five-game stretch run that begins with three consecutive first-place teams in Pittsburgh, Dallas and Detroit.

"We have to get better," coach Ben McAdoo said. "We believe that we're going to win the game and find a way to get the game in our favor at the end. We need to get better at getting better as the season goes on."

The Giants had several noteworthy performances. Eli Manning threw three touchdown passes, including two to Odell Beckham, Jr., who had a third score on a punt return nullified by a holding penalty. Dwayne Harris had the other touchdown catch, on his first reception of the season. Jason Pierre-Paul had a career-high 3.0 sacks and returned a fumble 43 yards for a score to become the first player in history to put that daily double together in a game. Punter Brad Wing was a weapon, finishing with a 44.7-yard net average and placing five punts inside the 20, including three inside the 10.

Yet the prevailing opinion in the locker room was that while the players like the feeling of rollin', they are making the journey much more difficult than it needs to be.

The Giants finished with 296 yards and 13 first downs, and owned the ball for just 26:09, a trio of figures that hardly guarantees success in the NFL. Manning completed only 15 passes and missed several open receivers. At one point, he flung a cup to the ground in disgust on the sideline, a rare display of emotion from the 13-year veteran. The Giants were penalized nine times, and Bobby Rainey muffed a fumble that led to both a Cody Parkey field goal and Rainey's removal as the team's punt returner. Jeez, Robbie Gould even missed another extra point attempt, his third in two games.

"It was tough," Manning conceded. "Tough to move the ball consistently. They had a good plan for us. They showed a lot of the same looks. It was just tough to make some plays. Had some opportunities and looks to make some. We had to come up with them. It was one of those days where they were kind of giving us some shots down the field and you have to hit them. We hit a couple of them, but we have to be able to hit more of those. Just be able to find completions and run the ball consistently. Have to move the ball better than we did today."

"I feel like we came out and were sloppy altogether," Pierre-Paul said. "We played on their level. We're going to correct it. Just look at film and correct it. Those guys knew that. Kelvin Sheppard told us that it wasn't a great win and we have to get better. It wasn't a great win and we do have to get better. That's the important thing, just to get better."

The Giants were seeing red after their loss to the Pittsburgh Steelers Sunday in Heinz Field.

The score was 24-14, a 10-point margin the Giants believe they should have erased on two possessions in which they traveled close to the Pittsburgh goal line – the all-important red zone – and walked off the field without scoring a point. Because of that, their six-game winning streak evaporated on a dreary day in southwestern Pennsylvania.

"It really came down to those two red zone trips," said quarterback Eli Manning, who threw an interception to end one, and an incompletion that perhaps should have been caught to conclude the other. "We had no points off of it. The interception and then the fourth down, it's tough out there, but we got down there. We have been really good scoring touchdowns lately, the last three or four games we have been one hundred percent scoring touchdowns, but not today. Not just scoring touchdowns, not getting anything on two drives, that was kind of the game right there."

"We were there," guard Marshall Newhouse said. "There's not much more you can ask for to be in those situations, trying to convert."

"In games like this, those are the points. They have a humming offense over there, too. Those are the points that tie the game up, give us a lead and get us back in the game. This is a needed reality check about how we're executing. It's there. We have the people to do it. We've done it before. It's just critical times coming up with plays. That's really it. We have the guys to do it."

Look, it's not as if the Giants were an offensive juggernaut until they traveled inside the Steelers' 20-yard line. They had relatively meager totals of 234 total yards, 56 rushing yards, 178 passing yards, and 16 first downs. And they did take advantage of two advances into the red zone, when Manning threw touchdown passes of 13 yards to Rashad Jennings in the third quarter and 1-yard to Sterling Shepard in the fourth (alas, with only 26 seconds remaining).

"It's just consistency," coach Ben McAdoo said. "We need to be more consistent. We need to take care of the ball better. That showed up again today. We had two turnovers. One of them was on fourth down, but we need to take care of the ball and play with consistency."

How about that Giants defense?

The unit that was missing its two-time Pro Bowl defensive end, that started three rookies, including two who weren't even drafted, and that got a big play from almost everyone who stepped on the field, throttled the Dallas Cowboys offense Sunday night.

Dallas arrived with an 11-game winning streak and the NFL's fourth-ranked offense, but didn't score a point in the final three quarters as the Giants earned an exciting and fiercely-competitive 10-7 victory.

"Can't say enough about the defense and the effort (with which) they played," coach Ben McAdoo said.

"It's great," said defensive tackle Damon Harrison, "because they have beaten everybody that they play, and it's a high-powered offense with a great rookie quarterback (Dak Prescott) and a great rookie running back (Ezekiel Elliott). For us to come out and hold them to seven points, I have to tip my cap to Coach Spags (defensive coordinator Steve Spagnuolo)."

The Giants won for the seventh time in eight games and swept their season series with Dallas for the first time since 2011. The Cowboys fell to 11-2, with both losses against the Giants.

Dallas scored the only points of the first half on Prescott's 31-yard touchdown pass to a wide open Terrance Williams. The Giants scored their points in the third quarter, on Robbie Gould's 39-yard field goal and Eli Manning's 61-yard touchdown pass to Odell Beckham, Jr.

The rest of the night belonged to the defenses. Each team finished with 260 total yards, they combined for combined for just 25 first downs, and they succeeded on only 3-of-29 third down conversion attempts.

"We played phenomenal," cornerback Janoris Jenkins said. "We all stepped up. DB's, linebackers, defensive line, we all played together. We knew it was going to be a hard-fought game. We have to come out and do it next game."

"We are a tough, resilient group," said linebacker and defensive captain Jonathan Casillas. "We have great character on that side of the ball. Everywhere from the youngest guy Romeo (Okwara) to a guy like Leon Hall, who has played the most out of everybody, DRC (Dominique Rodgers-Cromartie) and him and coming up with huge plays. Like I said, resilient group, man. We had to step up to take the presence for 90 (Jason Pierre-Paul). Ninety is one of the best players in the NFL, JPP. We all had to step up."

Jonathan Casillas has played on two Super Bowl-winning teams, so he knows what it takes to win a championship. The Giants' linebacker and defensive captain believes the first requirement is a suffocating defense, one that keeps the opposing team out of the end zone and saps its will. The kind of defense the Giants have.

Despite missing two key players, despite surrendering what could have been a game-changing big play, the unit dominated the Detroit Lions Sunday in the Giants' 17-6 victory in MetLife Stadium. It was the second consecutive game in which the Giants held their foes to a final score in the single digits. Last week, they beat Dallas, 10-7. It's worth remembering the Cowboys and Lions were a combined 20-5 when they ran into the Big Blue stone wall.

The Giants improved to 10-4 with their eighth victory in nine games.

"As of right now, I think that's what we're looking at ourselves as a championship-caliber defense, a championship-caliber team," Casillas said. "We're starting to get these games together, we're starting to put them together and we're finishing. At the end of the day, December rolls into January and you want to be finishing these games. And when the opponent watches the film the next week, they want to see you finishing, that's a little bit of an intimidation factor."

The offense did its part, even contributing an extra touchdown this week. Eli Manning completed his first 11 passes, a career-high, and threw touchdown passes to Sterling Shepard (six yards in the first quarter) and Odell Beckham, Jr. (who made a nifty one-handed grab for a four-yard score in the fourth). Robbie Gould added a 47-yard field goal.

Punter Brad Wing had another brilliant game, dropping punts on the Detroit four and three-yard lines on consecutive possessions in the second half. He had a 41.0-yard net average, despite an 18-yard punt caused by a partial block.

But the Giants won primarily because the defense created another masterpiece. Detroit's scoring was limited to Matt Prater field goals of 48 and 33 yards. The Giants did not allow an offensive touchdown for the first time since a 36-7 victory at Tennessee on Dec. 7, 2014 (the Titans scored on an interception return) and surrendered no touchdowns for the first time since a 20-6 victory against Washington on Dec. 29, 2013 (the Redskins got two field goals from Kai Forbath).

"The defense, they hold teams to six points, we're going to win a lot of ballgames," coach Ben McAdoo said. "That's tough to do in this league, especially against a team like that with that many weapons. But defense played lights-out today."

It's eerie how silent a large room with grown men can become. Such was the Giants' locker room late Thursday night after their bid to clinch a playoff berth came up short in a 24-19 loss to the Philadelphia Eagles in Lincoln Financial Field.

The 10-5 Giants can have someone else punch their postseason ticket this weekend; they will be in if Atlanta, Green Bay or Tampa Bay lose Saturday, or Detroit falls in Dallas Monday night. They can also clinch with a victory in their season finale on New Year's Day in Washington.

But the Giants wanted to end all the what-ifs by beating the Eagles for the second time this season. Instead, they fell behind, 14-0, kicked field goals on four of their five trips into the red zone, and committed three turnovers, all on Eli Manning interceptions — one that was returned for a touchdown, and one that sealed the 6-9 Eagles' victory with five seconds remaining.

So now the Giants will monitor the results in the NFC on Christmas weekend.

"Hey, it wouldn't be us if it was easy," guard Justin Pugh said. "I wanted to clinch today. I wanted to enjoy my holidays and enjoy that with us going to the playoffs. Now, we have to rely on other teams to help us out. You never want that."

"Everything is still in front of us," linebacker Jonathan Casillas said. "I don't know how it will play out or if we'll need help or whatever but we can still win and get in. I think we're all in for it. It's not hard to motivate this team or to go get this team ready to play. We just have to be able to capitalize on the situations that we're in and play and win. Today, we just started slow and couldn't overcome it."

But they came close. After Manning's fourth-down pass to Sterling Shepard was knocked down by Nolan Carroll with 1:54 left, the Giants quickly forced a punt and took possession at their own 15 with 1:31 remaining and one timeout.

Eli Manning has thrived in those situations his entire 13-year career. He has led 33 career game-winning fourth-quarter drives, including five this season. The Giants were confident this would be the 34th.

"With 10 throwing the football and making smart decisions, that's what you want," wide receiver Victor Cruz said. "That's the guy you want with the ball in his hands making decisions for this team. He's done it time and time again. Unfortunately, we didn't come through. I have all the faith in him, so we'll see what happens."

Anyone who thought the Giants had nothing to play for doesn't know the Giants.

Locked into the fifth seed in the NFC playoffs, the Giants traveled to face a Washington Redskins team that would have virtually secured a postseason berth with a victory. But it was the Giants who played as if they had a lot at stake, and they walked out of FedEx Field with a 19-10 victory.

The Giants finished 11-5 and will visit the Green Bay Packers in an NFC Wild Card Game late Sunday afternoon.

"I like this football team," said Ben McAdoo, who joined Dan Reeves as the only Giants coaches to win 11 games in their debut seasons with the team. "I think we have talented men of integrity in the locker room. That's where it starts and where it ends. We have a good group of guys that's willing to work. They like football, and you saw that today."

It was crystal clear. Washington had averaged 25.7 points through its first 15 games, but managed just 10 against the Giants, none in the first half. Kirk Cousins hadn't thrown more than one interception since opening day, but Dominique Rodgers-Cromartie picked him off twice. Cousins was also sacked four times. The Redskins' dangerous threesome of wideouts — Pierre Garcon, Jamison Crowder and DeSean Jackson, had a combined eight catches for 146 yards and no touchdowns. Washington rushed for only 38 yards and averaged 2.5 yards per carry.

"We're trying to be the best defense," said safety Landon Collins, who had a team-high eight tackles, including a sack. "That's our mindset. We want to be the best and we just keep running for it."

Rodgers-Cromartie sensed frustration in the Redskins' offensive players.

"They're ranked number three team in the league (in yards-per-game)," he said. "Anytime you can hold them a little bit as a player, you're going to get frustrated. I think that's what they did for the most part. We put pressure on them and forced the quarterback to make plays. Normally, he makes plays with his feet, but I think the back end held up and we just got after guys."

PACKERS 38, GIANTS 13



Playing their first postseason game since their dramatic Super Bowl XLVI victory against New England on Feb. 5, 2012, the Giants Sunday played one of their poorest games of the season and lost to the Green Bay Packers, 38-13, in an NFC Wild Card Game in Lambeau Field. None of the Giants' five regular-season losses had been by more than 14 points.

The defeat ended the Giants' NFL-record five-game playoff road winning streak. It also left them with a final record of 11-6.

"We were ready for today and ready for the moment," quarterback Eli Manning said. "No one knows why you don't go out there and play your best. Overall, the Packers played better than we did. That's what it came down to. We did some good things, had some good drives, got close, but they excelled and made some good plays."

"Tough way to end a season," said coach Ben McDoo, who failed to join Dan Reeves as the only coaches to win a playoff game in their first season with the Giants. "Give Green Bay credit. They played well tonight. We struggled to play complete team football in all three phases and we didn't handle the ball particularly well."

"We know where we stumbled," running back Rashad Jennings said. "One mistake here, one mistake there. We weren't able to overcome those mistakes early in the game. We put our defense in tough situations. We knew coming into this game specifically that we had to score points, because they have great offense and we would have to put up points, and we didn't do it."

The Giants had numerous issues to contend with. Uncharacteristically, one of them was special teams play that was not up to the Giants' usual standard. Brad Wing had trouble getting both distance and loft on most of his eight punts and had a 39.0-yard gross average (lowest of the season) and a 32.8-yard net average (third-lowest). The Packers, for example, took advantage of good field position provided by Wing's 37-yard punt to score their first touchdown in the second quarter.

"We knew this game was going to be a big field position game," Wing said. "I feel like I let the team and the organization down in that respect."

2016 PRESEASON REVIEW

DOLPHINS 27, GIANTS 10

Aug. 12, 2016 • MetLife Stadium

The Giants took an early 10-point lead, but never scored again and lost their first preseason game under Ben McAdoo, 27-10, to the Miami Dolphins.

Although they were healthy, neither Eli Manning nor Odell Beckham Jr. played in the game. The Giants announced hours before the game that Manning wouldn't play. OBJ was scheduled to play several snaps, but stayed on the sideline after a severe weather alert delayed the kickoff one hour.

The Giants hurt themselves with four turnovers, including three in the second quarter, when the Dolphins seized control of the game.

Ryan Nassib started at quarterback and led a 9-play, 74-yard drive that ended with Rashad Jennings' 3-yard touchdown run on the game's first possession. Josh Brown's 20-yard field goal made it 10-0 late in the first quarter. The score was set up by Jonathan Casillas' interception of a Matt Moore pass and 19-yard return.

Nassib played the first three quarters and completed seven of 15 passes for 75 yards. He did not throw a touchdown pass, was intercepted twice and fumbled three times, losing one (the Giants lost two of six fumbles). The Dolphins turned those turnovers into 17 second-quarter points on Andrew Franks' 49-yard field goal, Damien Williams' 5-yard touchdown run, and Moore's 51-yard scoring pass to Matt Hazel.

In the second half, Marshall Koehn kicked a 28-yard field goal, and Zac Dysert threw a 16-yard touchdown pass to Thomas Duarte.

Andrew Williams led the Giants with 41 rushing yards on nine carries. Jeremy Davis caught two passes for 21 yards. No other receiver had more than one catch. Linebacker Mark Herzlich topped the team with eight tackles (six solo).

BILLS 21, GIANTS 0

Aug. 20, 2016 • New Era Field

Stymied by an ineffective, mistake-plagued and penalty-prone offense, the Giants fell to the Buffalo Bills, 21-0, in newly-renamed New Era Field. The Giants were shut out in a preseason game for the first time since a 14-0 loss at New England on Aug. 11, 2001.

For the second week in a row, the Giants committed four turnovers. They added 10 penalties. In their four series, Eli Manning and the starting offense netted 23 yards.

In 15 possessions, the team totaled 166 yards - 67 of them on a Bobby Rainey run in the fourth quarter. On that series, the Giants advanced to the Bills' 10-yard line, but failed to score when Tom Obarski's 27-yard field goal attempt sailed wide left. The Giants owned the ball for just one-third of the game (20:15), totaled just seven first downs, and were 1-for-11 on third down conversion attempts.

Punter Brad Wing had a busy day and distinguished himself with a 44.8-yard net average, a long kick of 57 yards, and punts that forced Buffalo to take possession at their five- and the six-yard lines in the second half.

After a scoreless first quarter, the Bills took a 7-0 lead on Tyrod Taylor's 13-yard touchdown pass to LeSean McCoy with 12:52 remaining in the second quarter. After a Giants fumble, Jonathan Williams extended the lead when he dove over the pile for a one-yard touchdown. Jordan Guy's extra point attempt hit the right upright. Late in the quarter, EJ Manuel threw a 19-yard touchdown pass to Greg Little and Dezmin Lewis caught another Manuel throw for a 2-point conversion.

In 13 possessions in the second half - not including a Bills kneedown to end the game - the teams combined for nine punts, three interceptions, and a missed field goal attempt.

2016 PRESEASON REVIEW

GIANTS 21, JETS 20

Aug. 27, 2016 • MetLife Stadium

The Giants overcame a 10-point third-quarter deficit to defeat the Jets, 21-20. The visiting team won the teams' annual preseason game for the eighth consecutive year.

Ryan Nassib threw two touchdown passes to Tavares King, and defensive end Kerry Wynn returned an interception for the Giants' third score.

Victor Cruz played his first game in more than 22 months, and caught one pass for four yards.

After a scoreless first quarter, the Jets took a 7-0 lead when Ryan Fitzpatrick threw a 22-yard touchdown pass to Eric Decker with 5:20 remaining in the second quarter. That score held up until Ross Martin kicked a 55-yard field goal with 5:15 left in the third.

Nassib's 27-yard touchdown pass to King lifted the Giants to within 10-7 late in the third quarter.

Early in the fourth, Jets quarterback Bryce Petty threw a pass to the right side for fullback Tommy Bohanon. The ball was tipped by linebacker J.T. Thomas and secured by a diving Wynn, who jumped up, used a nifty move to sidestep Petty, and raced the length of the field to give the Giants a 14-10 lead.

The Jets jumped back ahead on Christian Hackenberg's 10-yard touchdown pass to Robby Anderson and Martin's 29-yard field goal.

With 2:34 remaining in the game, Davon Coleman tipped a Hackenberg pass that was picked off by safety Andrew Adams, giving the Giants the ball at the Jets' 11. Two plays later, Nassib connected with King for the game-winning, 11-yard touchdown pass.

GIANTS 17, PATRIOTS 9

The Giants concluded their preseason with a substitute-laden squad defeating a Patriots team led by Tom Brady, 17-9. Brady played the entire first half.

Prior to the game, the Giants released a list of 15 players who would not participate in the game. That group included Eli Manning, Odell Beckham Jr., center Weston Richburg, cornerbacks Janoris Jenkins and Dominique Rodgers-Cromartie, defensive ends Jason Pierre-Paul and Olivier Vernon, and defensive tackles Johnathan Hankins and Damon Harrison.

Ryan Nassib started and played most of the game at quarterback. He completed 16 of 29 passes for 210 yards, including a 59-yard touchdown to Tavarres King (who ran 50 yards after catching the ball). Logan Thomas threw a 17-yard pass to rookie Roger Lewis, and Randy Bullock kicked a 25-yard field goal for the Giants.

Bobby Rainey led the Giants with 38 rushing yards on seven carries, and added three catches for 37 yards. He also returned two punts and a kickoff. King had a team-high four receptions for 80 yards.

New England scored on Brady's 7-yard touchdown pass to Keshawn Martin in the first quarter and Stephen Gostkowski's 32-yard field goal in the fourth.

After Lewis scored with 3:09 remaining, the Patriots had a chance to tie the score. With rookie Jacoby Brissett at quarterback, they drove from their own 25 to the Giants' 30. But on fourth-and-one, Brissett's pass for Aaron Dotson deep down the left sideline fell incomplete.

The Giants finished their preseason schedule with a 2-2 record for the second consecutive year.

HISTORY OF THE NEW YORK GIANTS

The city of New York was introduced to professional football on the same day that the city was introduced to the New York Giants. It was a clear sunny October afternoon in 1925 when the Giants took the field to play against the Frankford Yellow Jackets. The Giants lost their home debut by the score of 14-0 to lower their record to 0-3 after opening with two losses on the road. But more importantly, the New York Giants and professional football had arrived.

Tim Mara, a bookmaker (legal at the time) and successful businessman and promoter, purchased the team for a reported \$500. In an era when professional football was in the shadows of baseball, boxing and college football, and professional football teams hailed from the towns of Dayton, Rochester and Columbus, league officials believed that a team in a large market such as New York was exactly what was needed to keep pro football alive.

The Giants struggled financially through the first decade but managed to win their first title in only their third season, going 11-1-1 in 1927. With the fall of the stock market and the Depression that followed, the 1930s were not off to a great start. Tim Mara suffered substantial losses during the crash that threatened the existence of the Giants. With that fear in mind, Tim Mara handed control of the franchise over to his two sons, Jack Mara, who was twenty-two, and Wellington, who was fourteen. Wellington Mara became the youngest owner of a football team and began his storied career as a major player in the Giants organization.

In 1934 the Giants beat the Chicago Bears, 30-13, in nine-degree temperatures at the Polo Grounds in a game that has become famous as the "Sneakers Game." With the Giants trailing 10-3 at the half, head coach Steve Owen provided his squad with basketball shoes to increase traction on the icy turf. The team responded with four touchdowns in the second half to turn the game into a Giants rout.

If there ever were a time for the National Football League and the New York Giants to fold, it would have come during the years of World War II. The NFL decided to

continue during the war despite losing players to military service. Many of the players that stayed behind were older players that were past their prime. Low attendance forced some teams to fold and other teams like the Philadelphia Eagles and the Pittsburgh Steelers to merge into one team. Fortunately, the New York Giants were able to survive the war years and managed to reach three NFL championship games during the 1940s.

The 1950s were filled with Giants players that would become household names and help bring football to a playing field equal to other spectator sports. With the growing inter-

est in professional football, the Giants continued to make strides to attract the most talented players from the college level. By the time the decade was over, Kyle Rote, Eddie Price, Rosie Brown, Frank Gifford, Sam Huff and Tom Landry would send the Giants and professional football into a new era.

The 1960s marked a decade of change for the Giants. Since they were founded in 1925, the Giants had been a talented team filled with success. The 1960s marked a turning point for our country as well as the Giants. After reaching the title games of 1961, 1962, and 1963 the Giants were hit with injuries and a series of retirements to key players that sent the team through a period of mediocrity.

The Giants in the 1970s could best be described as a team in transition. The team called four different stadiums home, played in three different states, and did not play in one postseason game. Teams like the Green Bay Packers, Chicago Bears, and Giants, so strong in the NFL's formative years, gave way to new powers like Dallas, Pittsburgh and Minnesota.

The Giants ended almost two decades of losing with one of their most prosperous decades in the 1980s. After finishing in last place or next-to-last eight times in the 1970s, the Giants appeared in three wild card games and won two NFC East division titles. Through the draft and key trades, the Giants slowly built a winning program. By 1986 the championship pieces fit together

WHY GIANTS? HOW THE NEW YORK FOOTBALL GIANTS GOT ITS NAME

Owner Tim Mara "borrowed" the Giants' name from the city's Major League Baseball team of the same name. This was not unusual among early day pro football franchises. At one time or another there were NFL franchises named the New York Yankees, Brooklyn Dodgers, Cleveland Indians, Cincinnati Reds, and Detroit Tigers.

and the team was back on top with their first Super Bowl appearance and their first world championship since 1956.

The Giants were back on top of the NFL in 1990, winning their second Super Bowl in a dramatic 20-19 win over the Buffalo Bills. The next two years were filled with coaching changes, quarterback controversies, and a step back into the middle of the pack of the National Football League.

In February, 1991, less than a month after winning their second Super Bowl, it was announced that after 66 years of ownership by the Mara family, a 50% interest in the club had been sold to Preston Robert Tisch by Tim Mara. A native of New York City and a lifelong Giants fan, Tisch is one of the country's most successful businessmen.

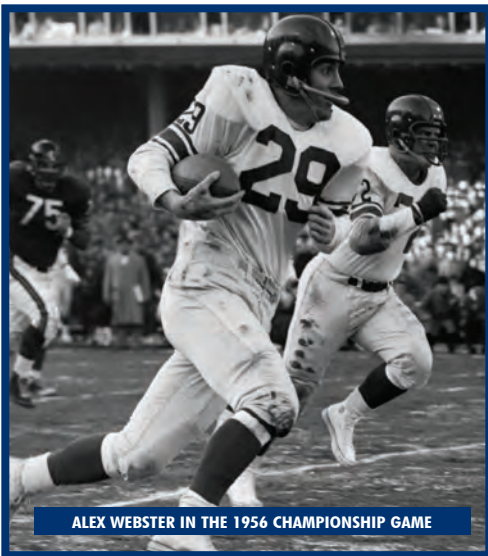
Dan Reeves was hired as coach before the start of the 1993 season, and he helped bring the Giants back into Super Bowl contention. The Giants finished their first season under Reeves tied with the Detroit Lions for the best turnaround in football, going from 6-10 to 11-5. Reeves was named the NFL Coach of the Year by the Associated Press and others for his efforts.

On January 15, 1997, a new chapter in Giants history began when Jim Fassel was named the 15th head coach. In the first season under Fassel's leadership, the Giants captured the NFC East Championship with a 10-5-1 record. The Giants finished the 1997 season with a 7-0-1 Division record to become the first team ever to go undefeated in NFC East Division play. The Giants fell short of a playoff berth in 1998 after overcoming a 3-7 start to finish with an 8-8 record. The Giants were 7-9 in 2000.

In 2000, the Giants returned to the upper echelon of the NFL. They won the NFC East title and earned home field advantage throughout the playoffs with a 12-4 regular season record. The Giants then beat Philadelphia in the divisional playoffs and routed Minnesota, 41-0, in the NFC Championship Game to advance to the Super Bowl for the third time. But they failed to win the game for the first time, falling to the Baltimore Ravens.

The Giants slipped to 7-9 in 2001, losing their last two games to fall out of playoff contention. In 2002, the Giants won their final four regular season games, including an overtime thriller in the regular season finale against Philadelphia, to clinch a wild card playoff berth. In the third period of the postseason game in San Francisco, the Giants led the 49ers, 38-14. But San Francisco rallied for a 39-38 victory.

Because of their impressive stretch run, the Giants began the 2003 season with high hopes. At midseason, they were in the thick of the playoff race with a 4-4 record. But a second-half collapse against Atlanta set the

tone for an eight-game, season-ending losing streak. With two games remaining, the Giants announced that Fassel would not return. On Jan. 6, 2004, Tom Coughlin, a highly-successful head coach at Boston College and with the Jacksonville Jaguars, and a former Giants assistant, was hired as the 16th head coach in Giants history.

In the 2004 NFL Draft, the Giants traded for quarterback Eli Manning, who started the final seven games of his rookie season. The Giants were 6-10 in Coughlin's first year at the helm. In 2005, Manning started every game and the Giants were 11-5 and earned their first playoff berth since 2002 and their first NFC East championship since 2000. The first-place finish was an NFL-record 21st in franchise history. Five Giants were elected to the Pro Bowl, the team's largest contingent since the 1990 Super Bowl champions sent seven. The group was led by running back Tiki Barber, who was second in the NFL in rushing with a team-record 1,860 yards. Barber's 2,390 total yards were the second-highest total in league history. The Giants finished 8-8 in 2006, but made the playoffs as a wild card.

The 2007 season began inauspiciously, with losses in the first two games, but ended as one of the greatest seasons in Giants history. The Giants clinched an NFC Wild Card postseason berth with a victory in Buffalo in their 15th game. The following week, they narrowly lost to the undefeated New England Patriots in the regular season finale to finish 10-6. What followed was one of the greatest postseason runs in NFL history, one that culminated with an upset of the Patriots in an exhilarating Super Bowl XLII. Along the way, the Giants set an NFL

single-season record with 11 consecutive victories away from their home stadium.

The Giants, seeded fifth in the conference, opened post-season play with a 24-14 Wild Card victory at Tampa Bay. Brandon Jacobs scored two touchdowns for the Giants. The following week, the Giants avenged two regular season defeats with a 21-17 triumph over the Cowboys in Dallas in a divisional playoff. Amani Toomer caught two touchdown passes, Jacobs scored on a short run and the defense limited the high-scoring Cowboys to three second-half points.

The Giants captured the conference title with a thrilling 23-20 overtime triumph over the Green Bay Packers in frigid Lambeau Field. The temperature at game time was minus-one degree with a wind-chill factor of minus-23, making it the coldest game in Giants history. Lawrence Tynes — who missed his previous two attempts, including one on the final play of regulation — kicked a 47-yard field goal 2:35 into overtime for the victory. The field goal was set up by Corey Webster's interception of the last pass of Brett Favre's career. Brandon Jacobs and Ahmad Bradshaw scored touchdowns for the Giants and Tynes added field goals of 29 and 37 yards.

Super Bowl XLII was played in University of Phoenix Stadium in Glendale, Ariz. The Giants were heavy underdogs to a New England team that was 18-0 and was bidding to conclude the

second perfect season in NFL history. But it was the Giants who enjoyed a perfect finish. Trailing, 7-3, entering the fourth quarter, they took their first lead of the game on Manning's five-yard touchdown pass to David Tyree. The score was set up by a 45-yard catch-and-run by rookie tight end Kevin Boss. New England took a 14-10 lead on a six-yard touchdown pass from Tom Brady to Randy Moss with just 2:42 remaining.

The Giants took possession at their own 17 with 2:39 left in the game and Manning proceeded to lead them on one of the great drives in NFL postseason history. The highlight of the 12-play, 83-yard march occurred on third-and-five from the Giants' 44. Manning somehow eluded the grasp of the rushing Patriots line and threw downfield for Tyree, who somehow secured the ball against his helmet for a miracle 32-yard gain. Steve Smith picked up a critical first down before Manning threw the game-winning 13-yard touchdown pass to Plaxico Burress with just 35 seconds remaining. The Giants stopped a desperate last New England possession and won their third Super Bowl in one of the biggest upsets in the game's history.

In 2011, the Giants again won the Super Bowl under very similar circumstances, using a last-minute touchdown to defeat New England, 21-17, in Super Bowl XLVI in Indianapolis. Once again, the Giants shocked the football public by winning the Vince Lombardi trophy. After a home loss to Washington on Dec. 18, their record was 7-7. A loss in either of their final two regular season games would have eliminated them from the playoffs. But they defeated the Jets, 29-14, as the visiting team before routing Dallas on New Year's Night, 31-14, to clinch the

NFC East title.

Seeded fourth, the Giants opened the postseason with their third consecutive convincing victory in MetLife Stadium, a 24-2 triumph over the Atlanta Falcons in an NFC Wild Card Game. The following week, Manning threw for 330 yards and three touchdowns, including a Hail Mary to Hakeem Nicks on the final play of the first half, and the Giants crushed the top-seeded and defending champion Green Bay Packers, 37-20, in Lambeau Field. That advanced the Giants to the NFC Championship Game in San Francisco, where they had lost a regular season game two months earlier. This time, Devin Thomas recovered a fumble on a punt return that was forced by Jacquian Williams that led to Tynes' game-winning 31-yard field goal with 7:54 elapsed in overtime and a 20-17 Giants victory.

In the Super Bowl, the Giants jumped ahead, 9-0, before the Patriots scored 17 consecutive points. Two third-quarter field goals by Tynes lifted them to within 17-15. The Giants trailed by that score when they took possession at their own 12-yard line with 3:46 remaining. Manning then reprised the fourth-quarter magic he had used to win the previous Super Bowl and seven games in the 2011 season. He immediately threw a perfect strike down the left sideline to Mario Manningham for a 38-yard gain. He completed five of six passes on the drive and 10 of 14 in the decisive quarter. Ahmad Bradshaw scored the game-winning touchdown by backing into the end zone on a six-yard run with 57 seconds remaining. The defense withstood one last Patriots rally to secure the Giants' second Super Bowl victory in five seasons and fourth overall.

In 2012, the Giants finished with a winning record for the third year in a row, but their 9-7 mark — the same record they had the previous season, when they won the Super Bowl — left them in second place in the NFC East and out of the playoffs. The Giants finished 6-2 at home, their finest home mark since they were 7-1 in 2008. They were 4-4 at home in 2011 championship season. The Giants scored 429 points, the second-highest total in franchise history; the 1963 Giants scored 448. The 2012 season was the fifth in the 88-year history of the franchise in which the Giants scored more than 400 points. The Giants scored a franchise-record 278 points at home, shattering the old mark of 248, set in 2007. They allowed an NFL-low 20 sacks. The Giants' plus-14 turnover differential was their best since they were plus-25 in 1997. The Giants intercepted 21 passes in 2012, their highest total since they had 27 picks, also in 1997.

The 2013 Giants finished 7-9, the team's first losing record since 2004. That broke a streak of eight consecutive seasons in which the Giants finished .500 or better, their longest such stretch since they played 10 seasons in a row without a losing record from 1954-63. The Giants followed an 0-6 start with four consecutive victories. They were the second team in NFL history to lose its first six games and win the next four (joining the 2009 Tennessee Titans). The Giants struggled offensively all season. They ranked 28th in the NFL in both yards per game (307.5) and points per game (18.4). The Giants scored 294 points, their lowest total in Tom Coughlin's 12 seasons as head coach. The Giants committed an NFL-high 44 turnovers. It was their highest turnover total since 1983, when they

had 58 turnovers. The Giants' minus-15 turnover differential was their worst since they were minus-16, also in 1983. The defense, ranked 26th in the NFL entering Week 6, when it was allowing an average of 395.2 yards per game, finished the season ranked eighth, giving up 332.3 yards a game.

In 2014, the Giants were 6-10, their first double-digit loss season since they had the same record in Coughlin's debut season in 2004. They scored 380 points and allowed 400. It was just the fifth time in franchise history they gave up at least 400 points. Under first-year coordinator and future head coach Ben McAdoo, the Giants finished 10th in the NFL in total offense with an average of 367.2 yards a game, a 59.7 yards-per-game improvement over their 2013 average of 307.5. The Giants were ranked 29th in the NFL in total defense, allowing 375.8 yards a game, after finishing eighth (332.3 yards per game) in 2013. The run defense ranked 30th (135.1 yards a game), while the Giants were 18th vs. the pass (240.6).

A disappointing 2015 season led to a significant change in the franchise's coaching hierarchy. The Giants lost six of their last seven games to finish 6-10 for the second consecutive season. It was their first back-to-back double-digit loss seasons since 2003-04 when they were 4-12 in Fassel's final season as head coach and 6-10 in Coughlin's first. Eight of the 10 losses were by six or fewer points. The Giants lost six games in which they held a lead or were tied in the fourth quarter. They finished under .500 for the third consecutive season, the first time that's happened since they had eight straight losing seasons from 1973-80. The Giants missed the playoffs for the fourth consecutive season, their longest drought since they went 17 years about a postseason berth from 1964-80. The day after the season finale, Coughlin stepped down as head coach. Ten days later, McAdoo was hired to replace him after two seasons as the offensive coordinator.

McAdoo's first season was a success. In 2016, the Giants finished 11-5, good for a second-place finish in the NFC East and their first postseason berth in five years. The team's strength that season was its defense. The Giants were second in the NFL with 284 points allowed, one season after they were ranked 30th by giving up 442 points, the second-highest total in franchise history. The Giants allowed 17.8 points per game, the lowest average by their opponents since 2002, when they gave up 17.4 points a game. They gave up an NFL-low 26 touchdowns (including a league-low 25 opposing offensive touchdowns) and just 15 touchdown passes after surrendering 31 the previous year. The Giants allowed less than 20 points eight times, their highest total since 2008, when they also did it eight times. That enabled them to win won an NFL-high six games when scoring no more than 20 points. With a 27-23 victory vs. Baltimore on Oct. 16, the Giants became the third NFL franchise with 700 combined regular-season and postseason victories, joining the Green Bay Packers and Chicago Bears. The 2016 Giants were unable to continue their success in the postseason, losing an NFC Wild Card Game to the Packers in Lambeau Field, 38-13.

1925

Tim Mara purchased a National Football League franchise for New York for \$500. Bob Folwell was named head coach and all-time great Jim Thorpe was signed. Thorpe was later released by the team after the third game of the season. The Giants played their first game at the Polo Grounds, losing to the Frankford Yellow Jackets, 14-0. Later that season, more than 70,000 jammed the Polo Grounds to see the Giants play Red Grange and the Chicago Bears. The Giants went 8-4 in their first season.

1926

Bob Folwell left and was replaced by Dr. Joseph Alexander as head coach. Despite an 8-4-1 record in 1926, Tim Mara lost \$40,000. After the season concluded, the seventh place Giants faced the American Football League champion Philadelphia Quakers. The Giants won convincingly, 31-0.

1927

Earl Potteiger replaced Dr. Joseph Alexander in 1927 and the Giants won their first title with an 11-1-1 record. (Note: until the NFL's playoff system was established in 1933, the team with the league's best record was awarded the championship title.) In the 13-game season the Giants defense posted ten shutouts and allowed only 20 points all year.

1928

After a dismal 4-7-2 season in 1928, Tim Mara decided it was best to clean house. Head coach Earl Potteiger and eighteen players were not asked to return for the following season. Tackle Steve Owen would be the only returning starter from that season. It still ranks as one of the most massive turnovers in football history.

1929

Before the season began, Tim Mara purchased a struggling Detroit Wolverines franchise in order to obtain the rights to quarterback Benny Friedman and the best of the Detroit players for the Giants. LeRoy Andrews became the new head coach. The 13-1-1 Giants averaged 25,000 fans, turned a small profit and narrowly lost the NFL title to the Green Bay Packers, who finished 12-0-1.

1930

For the second consecutive season the Green Bay Packers edged out the Giants for the title. Ownership of the club was turned over to Jack and Wellington Mara, the two sons of the founder. On December 14, the Giants played a team of former Notre Dame All-Stars coached by the legendary Knute Rockne. Fifty-five thousand fans turned out at the Polo Grounds to see the Giants win the contest, 22-0. The proceeds of \$115,153 went to the New York Unemployment Fund to help those suffering due to the Great Depression.

1931

After an All-American season at Washington State, center Mel Hein wrote to three NFL teams offering his service. The Giants bid the most at \$150 per game and Hein was signed to a contract. Former tackle Steve Owen was named head coach. The Giants finished in 5th place with a 7-6-1 record.

1932

Considered a rebuilding year, the Giants finished the season with a 4-6-2 record. On November 20, the Giants faced the defending champion Green Bay Packers. Expected to be an easy win for the undefeated Packers, 8-0-1 at the time, the Giants displayed promise for the future with a hard-fought, 6-0, victory. End Ray Flaherty became the NFL's first official pass-reception champion with 21 catches.

1933

The Giants won the Eastern Division of the newly-divided NFL with an impressive 11-3 record. 1933 was also the year the NFL established a new playoff system and in the league's first championship game, the Giants lost to the Western Division champion Chicago Bears, 23-21, at Wrigley Field in Chicago.

1934

In what is now known as the "Sneakers Game," the Giants defeated the Chicago Bears 30-13 for the NFL title. Trailing 13-3 in the third quarter, some of the Giants players changed into basketball shoes to increase traction on the icy Polo Grounds turf. The Giants responded with a 27-point fourth quarter to capture the championship.

THE "SNEAKERS GAME"



1935

After beginning the season with a 4-3 record, the Giants rolled off five consecutive victories, shutting out their opponents four times, and finished with a 9-3 record and first place in the Eastern Division. The Giants advanced to their third straight NFL championship game, but lost to the Detroit Lions, 26-7, at Detroit.

1936

The initial NFL draft was held in 1936, and the Giants first pick was Art Lewis, a tackle from Ohio University. The Giants finished with a 5-6-1 record, marking only the third time in the team's twelve-year history that it did not have a winning record.

1937

Seventeen rookies helped make up the 25-man roster in 1937, a season that also marked the debut of the now-familiar blue jerseys. The Giants lost to the Washington Redskins on the last day of the season and finished as a runner-up in the Eastern Division with a 6-3-2 record.

1938

A 23-17 victory over the Green Bay Packers produced the Giants third NFL title. A crowd of 48,120 fans attended the title game at the Polo Grounds in New York, a playoff record at the time. With the victory, the Giants earned the distinction of being the first NFL team to win two championship games.

1939

On January 15, the Giants defeated the Pro All-Stars, 13-10, in the first Pro Bowl held at Wrigley Field, Chicago. During the 1939 season, in front of 32,279 fans at Milwaukee State Fair Park, the Green Bay Packers avenged the 1938 loss with a 27-0 drubbing of the Giants in the NFL title game.

1940

The Giants finished third in the East with a 6-4-1 record. Midway through the season, leading rusher Tuffy Leemans was lost for the year with a back injury. Center Mel Hein was the only Giant to win All-Pro honors, accomplishing the feat for the 10th year in a row.

1941

With just 50 seconds to go in the 1941 Eastern Division championship game, the Washington Redskins held a 13-10 lead, but the Giants scored a field goal and a touchdown to win, 20-13, and advance to the NFL title game. In the wake of Pearl Harbor, only 13,341 spectators turned out to see Chicago top the Giants in the title game, 37-9.

1942

After losing many players to the service, the Giants finished with a 5-5-1 record and in third place in the Eastern Division. The Giants recorded a memorable victory in the season opener, defeating the Washington Redskins, 14-7, although they didn't have a first down, gained only one yard rushing and completed just one pass. That pass happened to go for a touchdown. The Giants also scored on an intercepted return and handed the Redskins their only defeat in their championship season.

1943

With the league down to just nine teams due to World War II, the Giants overcame a 2-2-1 start to finish with a 6-3-1 record. The Giants advanced to the Eastern Division championship game where they dropped a 28-0 decision to the Washington Redskins.

1944

Luring quarterback Arnie Herber and back Ken Strong out of retirement, the Giants scored five shutouts en route to the Eastern Division title, but lost the NFL championship game at the Polo Grounds in New York to the Green Bay Packers, 14-7.

1945

The War ended in 1945, but the Giants finished with their worst record to date. The Giants started the year off with a 34-6 win at Pittsburgh, but everything seemed to collapse after the opener. The Giants 3-6-1 record was only one game better than the last place Pittsburgh Steelers.

1946

Quarterback Frankie Filchock, an understudy to Sammy Baugh at Washington, signed with the Giants for a reported \$35,000. Filchock and teammate, back Merle Hapes, were questioned about an attempt by a New York man to fix the championship game with the Chicago Bears. Hapes was suspended indefinitely for the alleged gambling involvement, but Filchock was allowed to continue playing. The Giants went on to lose the title game to Chicago, 24-14.

1947

The Giants went from the title game in 1946 to the cellar, finishing with a 2-8-2 record, including a seven-game losing streak. Halfback Frank Reagan tied for the league lead with ten interceptions for 203 yards. Reagan also tied for the league's punting championship with 61 kicks for a 42.8 average.

YEAR-BY-YEAR HISTORY OF THE NEW YORK GIANTS

1948

The Giants renovation was accelerated in 1948 when they acquired quarterback Charlie Conerly from the Washington Redskins. The franchise reached another milestone in its illustrious existence, but it had nothing to do with their 4-8 record. That season, the Giants signed their first black player, defensive back Emlen Tunnell.

1949

Giants head coach Steve Owen switched from the "A" formation to the "T," which helped the Giants improve to a 6-6 record. Allie Sherman was hired to work with quarterback Charlie Conerly. The Giants shared the Polo Grounds with another NFL team, the New York Bulldogs.

1950

The Giants and New York Bulldogs divided the players of the former All-American Football Conference Yankees. The Giants received a young defensive back from Texas, Tom Landry, and a defensive tackle from Washington, Arnie Weinmeister. The Giants finished with a surprising 10-2 record and tied for first place with the Cleveland Browns, their first season above .500 since the Eastern Division championship season of 1946. The Browns defeated the Giants, 8-3, in the American Conference playoff game.

1951

End Kyle Rote of Southern Methodist was the Giants bonus pick in the draft, but he was injured in the preseason and saw little action. The Giants finished in second place with a 9-2-1 record, behind the only team they would lose to all season, the Cleveland Browns. Fullback Eddie Price led the NFL in rushing with 971 yards.

1952

Tailback Frank Gifford of USC was drafted number one. Playing in his fifth year, Emlen Tunnell gained more yardage on kick returns and interceptions (924) than the league's leading rusher, Dan Towler (894), of the Los Angeles Rams.

1953

Tackle Roosevelt "Rosie" Brown Jr. of Morgan State, a future Hall of Famer, was the Giants 27th pick in the 1953 NFL draft. Steve Owen retired at the end of the season after 23 years as the Giants head coach. Owen was asked to keep his affiliation with the Giants as a scout in the personnel department, a position he held for one year.

1954

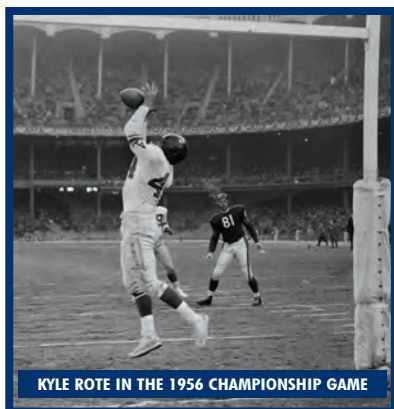
Former Giants end Jim Lee Howell was promoted from end coach to head coach. The Canadian Football League began a series of raids on NFL teams, signing Giants three-time Pro-Bowl defensive tackle Arnie Weinmeister, among others. In an effort to save the Giants and the NFL, Wellington Mara went out and signed the best player in the CFL, Montreal Alouettes halfback Alex Webster.

1955

On August 28, the sudden-death rule was used for the first time in a preseason game between the Giants and the Los Angeles Rams in Portland, Oregon. The Rams won, 23-17, three minutes into overtime. After opening with three straight losses, the Giants got their act together and finished with a 6-5-1 record.

1956

Defensive end Andy Robustelli was obtained from the Los Angeles Rams. The Giants switched their home games from the Polo Grounds to Yankee Stadium. A 47-7 rout of the Chicago Bears produced New York's first NFL championship since 1938. Linebacker Sam Huff, who was originally drafted as an offensive lineman but was switched to MLB when Ray Beck went down with an injury, was voted Rookie of the Year. Frank Gifford was named NFL Player of the Year and tackle Rosie Brown was named the NFL's Lineman of the Year.

1957

The Giants were still in the running for the title in 1957 until they dropped their final three games. For the second straight season Frank Gifford finished in the top ten in both receiving (fourth) and rushing (tenth), with 588 yards receiving and 528 yards rushing. Gifford also completed four of six passes for 143 yards and two touchdowns.

1958

After completing the season at 9-3, the Giants faced a Cleveland Browns team led by running back Jim Brown in the Eastern Conference playoff game. Brown, who had gained an NFL-record 1,527 yards rushing, was held to just eight yards by the stingy New York defense as the Giants prevailed, 10-0. Advancing to the title game, the Giants lost to the Baltimore Colts, 23-17, in the first sudden death overtime in an NFL championship game. That game has been referred to as, "The Greatest Game Ever Played."

YEAR-BY-YEAR HISTORY OF THE NEW YORK GIANTS

1959

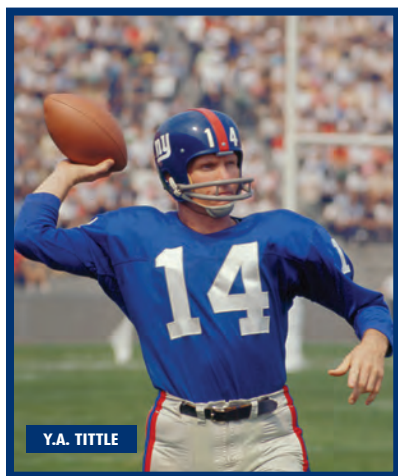
On February 4, assistant offensive coach Vince Lombardi left to join the Green Bay Packers as their new head coach. On February 17, Giants co-founder Tim Mara died. The Baltimore Colts exploded for 24 points in the fourth quarter to defeat New York in the NFL title game for the second straight year.

1960

In February, defensive coach Tom Landry left the team to become the first ever head coach of the expansion Dallas Cowboys. The Giants finished an injury-plagued 1960 season with a 6-4-2 record. Head coach Jim Lee Howell announced his retirement at the end of the season.

1961

The NY logo was added to the helmets for the 1961 season. Allie Sherman replaced the retired Jim Lee Howell as head coach. The Giants obtained quarterback Y.A. Tittle (San Francisco) and end Del Shofner (Los Angeles) in trades. Back Alex Webster gained 928 yards to help the Giants reach the NFL title game. With the league championship on the line, the Giants were no match for the Green Bay Packers, losing 37-0.



1962

Back Frank Gifford, who returned to the team from retirement, quarterback Y.A. Tittle, end Del Shofner and back Alex Webster led the Giants into the NFL title game against the Green Bay Packers. Held in Yankee Stadium, 64,892 fans watched as Green Bay prevailed, 16-7. Defensive end Andy Robustelli was named the NFL's top player.

1963

Quarterback Y.A. Tittle threw 36 touchdown passes and kicker Don Chandler led the league with 106 points (52-pat, 18-fg) in scoring as the Giants romped to their third straight conference

title. Halfback Dick Lynch tied for the league lead with nine interceptions for 251 return yards and a record-setting three touchdowns. With Tittle injured in the second quarter, New York lost yet another bid for the league championship, dropping a 14-10 decision to the Chicago Bears.

1964

Defensive end Andy Robustelli ended his long playing career with the Giants and became a full-time defensive coach. For the first time in 17 years, the Giants finished in last place in their conference with a 2-10-2 record. Backs Alex Webster and Frank Gifford announced their retirement at the end of the season.

1965

Quarterback Y.A. Tittle announced his retirement on January 22 at Mamma Leone's restaurant in New York City. Offensive lineman Jack Stroud also retired. On June 15, Jack Mara died after serving as team president for thirty-one years. The Giants rebounded with a 7-7 record, good enough for second place in the Eastern Conference.

1966

Before the season began, tackle Rosie Brown retired after 13 years of service to the team. The Giants had their worst season to date, finishing with a 1-12-1 record. They allowed a then NFL-record 501 points. Kicker Pete Gogolak became the first American Football League player to cross to the NFL.

1967

On March 7, the Giants announced the acquisition of quarterback Fran Tarkenton from the Minnesota Vikings. To get Tarkenton, the Giants gave up their first and second-round picks in 1967, number one pick in 1968, and second-round pick in 1969. Tarkenton's 29 touchdown passes led the Giants to a 7-7 record and a second place finish in the newly named Century Division of the Eastern Conference.

1968

Opening the season with four straight wins and concluding it with four consecutive losses, the Giants finished with a 7-7 record in Allie Sherman's last season as head coach. End Homer Jones became only the second Giant, behind end Del Shofner, to record 1,000 receiving yards or more in three successive seasons.

1969

The Giants lost, 37-14, to the New York Jets in the first of the annual preseason meetings. Former back Alex Webster replaced Allie Sherman as head coach. After losing seven games in a row, the Giants finished with three straight victories to capture second place in the Century Division with a 6-8 record.

1970

After losing their first three games, the Giants won six in a row, including an upset win over the first place Dallas Cowboys, 23-20. Heading into the final game of the season, the Giants were still in a position to make the playoffs, but they lost a home game

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against the Los Angeles Rams, 31-3, and were left out of the postseason with a 9-5 record. Running back Ron Johnson became the Giants first 1,000-yard rusher, totaling 1,027 yards.

1971

After a disappointing 4-10 finish in 1971, quarterback Fran Tarkenton asked for a trade. The Giants obliged and traded him back to the Minnesota Vikings for quarterback Norm Snead, two additional players and draft choices. Bob Tucker became the first tight end in Giants history to lead the league in receptions with 59 catches.

1972

Quarterback Norm Snead, obtained in the Fran Tarkenton trade, led the league in passing and the Giants finished above .500 for only the second time in nine years with an 8-6 record. On November 26, the Giants offense scored eight touchdowns against the Philadelphia Eagles, setting a Giants all time one-game scoring record. Kicker Pete Gogolak added a pair of field goals to bring the final score to 62-10.

1973

Prior to the final game of the season, head coach Alex Webster announced his retirement. New York lost the game 31-7 to the Minnesota Vikings to close out the year at 2-11-1. After two games at Yankee Stadium, the Giants played the rest of their home games at the Yale Bowl in New Haven, Connecticut.

1974

Bill Arnsparger was named the Giants ninth head coach. Quarterback Norm Snead was traded to the San Francisco 49ers. In addition, quarterback Craig Morton was obtained from the Dallas Cowboys. For the second straight season, the Giants won only two games and finished in fifth place in the NFC East with a 2-12 record.

1975

The Giants finished in fourth place in the NFC East with a 5-9 record. The team played all of its home games at Shea Stadium while they waited for Giants Stadium to open. DE George Martin made the team as an 11th round draft choice out of Oregon.

1976

Larry Csonka, the former Miami running back who had played in the World Football League, signed as a free agent. Snead was reacquired from San Francisco. The Giants moved to Giants Stadium in East Rutherford, New Jersey. Arnsparger was fired in midseason and replaced by assistant coach John McVay, who signed a long-term contract following the 3-11 season.

1977

Morton was traded to Denver. The Giants improved to a 5-9 record. McVay went with Joe Pisarcik and Jerry Golsteyn at

quarterback. Csonka rushed for 100 yards on the last day of the season and finished the year with 464 yards.

1978

The Giants had a 5-3 record at the halfway point of the season but lost seven of its final eight games and finished 6-10. Punter Dave Jennings and linebackers Harry Carson and Brad Van Pelt were named to the NFC Pro Bowl team. McVay was fired in late December. Robustelli, who had been the Giants' director of operations since 1974, resigned. George Young was named general manager in January, 1979. He announced the appointment of San Diego Chargers assistant Ray Perkins as head coach.

1979

Before the season began, tragedy struck as defensive tackle Troy Archer was killed in a traffic accident on June 22. Rookie Phil Simms, a first round choice, took over at quarterback. But the Giants had another 6-10 record. Dave Jennings led the NFC with a 42.7-yard punting average.

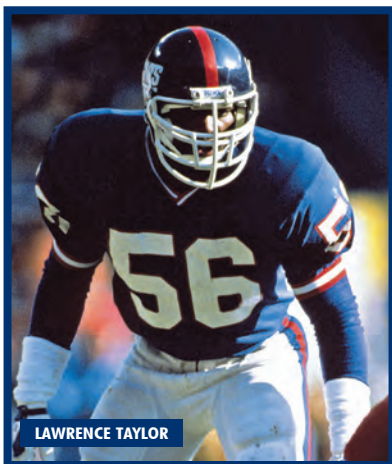
1980

A porous defense allowed opponents to score 425 points, the second-highest total in the NFL. The Giants fell to 4-12. A highlight was a 38-35 defeat of Dallas that ended an eight-game losing streak. Dave Jennings led NFL punters with a 44.8-yard average.

1981

With the second selection in the draft, New York chose Lawrence Taylor, a linebacker from North Carolina. The Giants started slowly, going 2-3, before obtaining running back Rob Carpenter from Houston. Carpenter sparked a three-game winning streak. The Giants lost three straight to drop to 5-6. Second-year quarterback Scott Brunner replaced an injured Phil Simms and the team responded with four victories in the final five weeks, including a 13-10 overtime defeat of Dallas in the season finale that sent them into the playoffs. On December 27, the Giants defeated the Eagles 27-21 in the NFC wild card game. The season ended for New York on January 3 when it was defeated by the 49ers 38-24 in a divisional playoff game.

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1982

A wild and turbulent year in which the NFL players' strike shortened the season to just nine games. The final game played before the strike pitted the Giants and Packers on a Monday night from Giants Stadium in which a power failure caused a blackout during the game. Rob Carpenter was a holdout until late November, returning to play in just the final five games. On December 15, head coach Ray Perkins resigned to accept the head coaching job at Alabama, with defensive coordinator Bill Parcells being named to replace him in 1983. The Giants then lost two straight after the Perkins' announcement, and missed the playoffs on the final day of the season with a 4-5 record. Despite the adversity, four Giants — Lawrence Taylor, Harry Carson, Mark Haynes and Dave Jennings — were named to the Pro Bowl.

1983

After breaking even in their first four games for a 2-2 record, the Giants were decimated by injuries during the rest of the year, with a total of 25 players appearing on the injured reserve list at one time or another. With players such as Harry Carson, Phil Simms and Rob Carpenter missing most of the season, and with the club leading the entire NFL in turnovers with 58 on 31 interceptions and 27 lost fumbles, the record tumbled to 3-12-1. The year was also marred by the tragic deaths of assistant coach Bob Ledbetter and former star running back Doug Kotar. Four players were nonetheless named to the Pro Bowl again—Lawrence Taylor, Harry Carson, Mark Haynes and rookie place-kicker Ali Haji-Sheikh who set an NFL record with 35 field goals.

1984

With Phil Simms enjoying his first full season at quarterback, the Giants earned the NFC Wild Card playoff berth, finishing with a 9-7 mark and second place in the NFC East. Simms set three single-season club records with 286 completions in 533 attempts for 4,044 yards. The Giants knocked off the Los Angeles

Rams 16-13 in that wild card game, then bowed to the eventual Super Bowl champion San Francisco 49ers 21-10 in the divisional playoff. Taylor, Carson and Haynes were again named to the Pro Bowl, while head coach Bill Parcells was named NFC East Coach of the Year and five rookies—Karl Nelson, Gary Reasons, Carl Banks, Perry Williams and Bobby Johnson—were named to the All-NFL Rookie team.

1985

With a final 10-6 mark, the Giants put back-to-back winning seasons on the board for the first time in 22 years, won another trip to the playoffs and had their first home playoff game since 1962, winning 17-3 over the defending Super Bowl champion 49ers. Again, the club lost in the divisional playoffs to the eventual Super Bowl champion team, the Chicago Bears, 21-0. Five players Lawrence Taylor, Harry Carson, Phil Simms, Joe Morris and Leonard Marshall were named to the Pro Bowl. There were 12 team records set by this club, and 16 individual club records. Morris set team records with 1,336 rushing yards and 21 touchdowns. Simms set club marks with 40 completions and 513 passing yards in a game. Marshall added another club mark with 15 1/2 QB sacks in a season, while rookie TE Mark Bavaro, an All-NFL Rookie team choice set a club mark with 12 receptions in one game.

1986

The club's first Super Bowl championship, an all-time final record of 17-2, as well as a club record 12 straight victories, made this year the greatest in team history. The Giants also set a record for all-time composite margin of victory in the playoffs, outscoring three opponents 105-23, for an 82-point domination, the most ever in NFL playoff history. Phil Simms was the MVP of the 39-20 Super Bowl victory over Denver after completing a playoff record 88% of his passes (22-25). Lawrence Taylor was named the league's MVP, Joe Morris broke his own club rushing record with 1,516 yards, and eight players—Taylor, Morris, Harry Carson, Leonard Marshall, Jim Burt, Brad Benson, Mark Bavaro and Sean Landeta, were named to the Pro Bowl. Coach Bill Parcells was a unanimous NFL Coach of the Year in all the national polls, the Giants were 10-0 at home, including regular season and the two playoff games, and the team set attendance records at home and on the road.

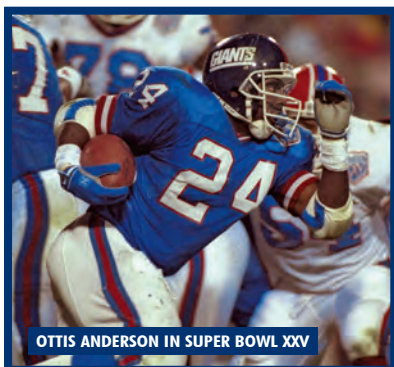
1987

After winning the Super Bowl, the Giants dropped to a 6-9 record, thanks to an 0-5 start in a season that included a players strike and three games with replacement players. In addition, injuries sidelined 11 starters. While the Giants finished with six wins in its final ten games, it was a case of too little, too late. Despite the final record, four players—Lawrence Taylor, Carl Banks, Harry Carson and Mark Bavaro—were selected to the Pro Bowl and all four also were named to various All-NFL teams.

1988

The Giants bounced back and after splitting the first six games, engineered a 7-2 run which had them all alone in first-place in

the NFC East with a 10-5 record heading into the final weekend of the season. But an upset loss to the Jets not only knocked the Giants out of first-place, but also cost them a playoff berth. The Giants 10-6 record gave them a five-year mark of 54-32 (.628), including postseason play. Those 54 victories were the most in club history for any five-year span. Joe Morris set a club record with his third 1,000-plus rushing season and Lionel Manuel had his first 1,000-yard receiving year. Morris also surpassed Alex Webster as the Giants' career rushing leader, moving past the 5,000-yard plateau. Lawrence Taylor was named to his eighth straight Pro Bowl and All-NFL designation and safety Terry Kinard was selected for his first Pro Bowl appearance.

1989

Despite the loss of several starters due to injuries, the Giants won their second NFC East championship in four years with a 12-4 record. Ottis Anderson rushed for 1,023 yards at the age of 32 as the replacement for the injured Joe Morris and rookie David Meggett set club marks with 582 punt return yards and a 12.7 average, while also accounting for 1,807 all-purpose yards. Linebacker Lawrence Taylor equaled an NFL record by being named to his ninth consecutive Pro Bowl, and also ran his league record sack total to 104. Meggett also went to the Pro Bowl and scored a touchdown.

1990

The Giants started the season by winning their first ten games, and eventually won the division with a 13-3 record despite losing Phil Simms late in the year. With Jeff Hostetler at the helm, the club surged through the playoffs to win their second Super Bowl title with a stirring 20-19 win over the Buffalo Bills. Seven Giant players were named to the Pro Bowl, including Lawrence Taylor for a record-setting 10th straight year. Veteran running back Ottis Anderson won Super Bowl MVP honors after rushing for 102 yards. At season's end, the Mara family's sole ownership ended when Tim Mara sold his 50% share of the club to Preston Robert Tisch, who became Chairman and Co-Chief Executive Officer. In May, 1991, head coach Bill Parcells resigned after a career mark of 85-52-1 and was succeeded by offensive coordinator Ray Handley.

1991

In Ray Handley's first year as head coach, the Giants were in contention for another playoff spot late in the year with a 7-5 record, then dropped three straight to finish at 8-8 and out of the playoffs. Jeff Hostetler became the starting quarterback, but was injured late in the season and Phil Simms finished the campaign. Simms added his 15th club record when he passed Charlie Conerly for career TD passes with 179. Rodney Hampton became the fourth back in club history to rush for 1,000 yards when he finished the year with 1,059. Center Bart Oates was named to his second consecutive Pro Bowl.

1992

Ray Handley's team struggled through a 6-10 season as injuries to key players hurt the team. Phil Simms regained his starting quarterback spot, but was limited to starting the first four games before an elbow injury forced him to miss the rest of the season. Before his injury, Simms became just the 14th player in NFL history to surpass 30,000 passing yards. Jeff Hostetler started the next nine games before being forced to the sidelines with a concussion. In the ninth game of the season against Green Bay, Lawrence Taylor injured his Achilles tendon that placed his career in jeopardy. After announcing plans to retire following the season, Taylor re-considered and decided to re-join the Giants. RB Rodney Hampton turned in another outstanding season, rushing for 1,141 yards and earning his first trip to the Pro Bowl. After dismissing Handley, George Young hired former Denver Broncos head coach Dan Reeves to lead the team in 1993.

1993

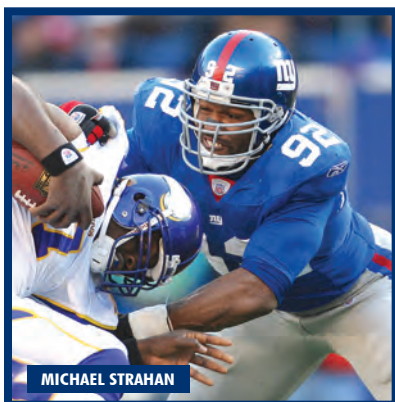
Dan Reeves and a rejuvenated Phil Simms led the Giants to an 11-5 regular season record. The Giants finished second to Dallas

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in the NFC East race, a race that was decided on the final Sunday of the regular season when Dallas defeated the Giants, 16-13, in overtime at Giants Stadium. Reeves became the first Giants head coach to lead his team to the playoffs in his initial campaign since Allie Sherman in 1963. Reeves was selected as NFL Coach of the Year by several organizations, including the Associated Press, which bases its honor on voting by coaches around the league. The Giants earned a wild card berth in the playoffs and defeated the Minnesota Vikings at Giants Stadium, 17-10, in the Wild Card game. San Francisco defeated the Giants, 44-3, at Candlestick Park in an NFC divisional playoff game. Following the San Francisco game, LB Lawrence Taylor announced his retirement, capping a 13-year career that altered the nature of the game. Taylor was elected into the Pro Football Hall of Fame at the conclusion of the 1998 season.

1994

After a 3-7 start, the Giants climbed back into playoff contention with a six-game winning streak that resulted in a 9-7 record. The Giants came into Week 16 needing a victory over the



World Champion Dallas Cowboys, combined with a Tampa Bay Buccaneers victory over the Green Bay Packers, to win a wild card berth. The Giants defeated Dallas, 15-10, but the season ended when the Bucs lost to the Packers, 34-19. Dave Brown won the starting quarterback job in training camp and responded by leading the team to a 9-6 record in games that he started. Rodney Hampton finished the season with 1,075 yards to become the first Giant in history to record four career 1,000-yard seasons. The 1994 season was the first in many years that the Giants roster did not include Lawrence Taylor or Phil Simms. Taylor's jersey number 56 was officially retired at halftime of the Giants-Minnesota Monday Night game on Oct. 10. Simms was released on June 15, prior to the start of training camp.

1995

The Giants concluded the 1995 season with a 5-11 record, their worst mark since 1983 when they were 3-12-1. The Giants lost seven games that were decided on the final drive of the game.

In six of those games, the Giants were either tied or leading at some point in the fourth quarter. A highlight of the 1995 season was the play of Rodney Hampton, who turned in the best season of his six-year career with 1,182 yards rushing on 306 carries. Hampton became the Giants all-time leading rusher (5,989) on 10-29 at Washington on his third carry of the game, a workman-like two-yard run for a first down. Phil Simms jersey number 11 was officially retired at halftime of the Giants-Dallas Monday Night game on Sept. 4, 1995.

1996

For the first time since 1982-83, the Giants finished with a losing record in consecutive seasons as they closed out the 1996 campaign with a 6-10 record. Following the 23-22 defeat to New England in the season finale, the Giants dismissed head coach Dan Reeves. On January 15, the Giants hired Jim Fassel as the 15th head coach in the team's history. The Giants stood at 5-7 on December 1 after a 20-6 upset of the defending world champion Dallas Cowboys and headed into a game against the Philadelphia Eagles with a chance at the NFC playoff field. In one of the lowest moments of the year, the Giants were officially eliminated from playoff contention with a 24-0 loss to the Eagles. The Giants improved to 6-8 but dropped two consecutive home contests and secured a last place finish in the NFC East for the first time in a non-strike season since 1983. The Giants defense played solid all season, but the offense struggled, finishing last in the National Football League. The Giants ground game failed to generate a 100-yard rushing performer and averaged just 100.3 yards per game, the lowest non-strike total since the Giants had 100.3 in 1964. The Giants defense held the opposition to 10 points or less in six games and had a streak of 7.5 straight games (30 quarters) without allowing the opponent's offense a touchdown pass.

1997

In his first season as head coach of the Giants, Jim Fassel led his team to a 10-5-1 record and the team's first NFC East Championship since the 1990 Super Bowl season. The Giants started the year with a 1-3 record before rebounding to become the 15th team in NFL history to finish in first place in their division the season after finishing in last place. The Giants finished the 1997 season with a 7-0-1 Division record to become the first team ever to go undefeated in NFC East Division play. Second-year QB Danny Kanell filled in for an injured Dave Brown and led the Giants to a victory over the Dallas Cowboys in Week Six. Kanell was eventually named the new starting quarterback and finished with a 7-2-1 record. His season was highlighted by a three-touchdown performance at Philadelphia in a key NFC East victory on December 7. The Giants defense blossomed into one of the NFL's strongest, finishing first in the league with a franchise-record 44 takeaways. The Giants defense led the league in interceptions with 27 and finished third in the NFL with 54 sacks. The season ended when the Minnesota Vikings overcame a 19-3 second half deficit to pull out a 23-22 victory at Giants Stadium in a Wild Card game. Fassel was named NFL Coach of the Year by numerous publications, including The Sporting News, which

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is determined by a vote of NFL coaches. Jessie Armstead set a team-record with 134 total tackles and was named a starter on the NFC Pro Bowl squad. DE Michael Strahan set a career-mark in sacks, finishing tied for third in the NFL with 14. Strahan was also named a starter for the NFC Pro Bowl squad. At the end of the season, George Young announced that he was leaving the Giants to become Vice President of Football Operations in the National Football League office. Ernie Accorsi was named the team's new General Manager.

1998

After overcoming a 3-7 start, the Giants remained in the hunt for a playoff berth until the final week and finished with an 8-8 record. The Giants won five out of their last six games, including a 20-16 victory over the previously undefeated (13-0) and eventual Super Bowl Champion Denver Broncos. Entering the final game, the Giants needed a victory over Philadelphia, combined with a Tampa Bay loss and an Arizona loss, to qualify as the third wild card participant in the NFC playoff field. The Giants beat the Eagles at Veterans Stadium, but the Buccaneers and Cardinals were victorious to spoil the Giants playoff hopes. Kent Graham replaced Danny Kanell at quarterback after the team fell to 3-7 and finished with a 5-1 record in the starting role. Gary Brown emerged as the Giants top running back, reaching the 1,000-yard mark with a career-best 1,063 yards that included six 100-yard games. Jessie Armstead and Michael Strahan were selected to represent the NFC in the Pro Bowl for the second straight season. Armstead eclipsed the 100-tackle mark for the third straight year with 101 tackles (75 solos). Strahan set a career-high with 15 sacks as he triggered a Giants defense that led the league with 54 sacks.

1999

For the second straight year, the Giants entered the final week of the regular season with a chance to make the NFL's postseason field. The difference between the two seasons is that in 1998 the Giants won five of their last six games. In 1999, victories over the Jets and at Buffalo raised the Giants' record to 7-6; however, the Giants dropped their last three games to finish 7-9. It was the team's first losing season in three years under head coach Jim Fassel. The final blow was a 26-18 loss at Dallas, a game that followed the Giants' elimination from the playoff race with Green Bay's victory over Arizona earlier in the day. In spite of the obvious disappointment, a few bright spots emerged for the Giants in 1999. The Giants set records on offense, led by Amani Toomer, who established a team single-season record with 79 receptions (breaking Earnest Gray's record of 78 receptions set in 1983). Toomer fell 26 yards shy of the team record of 1,209 receiving yards, set by Homer Jones in 1967. Also, for the first time in the 75-year history of the team, the Giants had four receivers record over 50 receptions in a season: Toomer (79), Ike Hilliard (72), Tiki Barber (66), and Pete Mitchell (58). Jessie Armstead and Michael Strahan were selected to represent the NFC in the Pro Bowl for the third consecutive season. Armstead surpassed the 100-tackle mark for the fourth straight year with 124 tackles (97 solos) and recorded a career-high 9.0 sacks. Strahan recorded 56

tackles (41 solos) and posted 5.5 sacks. QB Kerry Collins started the final six games of the season after replacing Kent Graham in the lineup following the 10th game.

2000

The Giants enjoyed their finest season in a decade, winning the NFC East and home-field advantage in the playoffs with a 12-4 record before defeating Philadelphia and Minnesota to advance to Super Bowl XXXV. The highlight of the season was a 41-0 victory over Minnesota in the NFC Championship game at Giants Stadium. In their first Super Bowl appearance in 10 years, the Giants lost to Baltimore, 34-7. The Giants took a seven-game winning streak into the Super Bowl, a surge that began after Jim Fassel issued his now-famous playoff guarantee on November 22. The Giants finished 7-1 in the division and 7-1 away from Giants Stadium. The seven road victories tied a franchise record set in 1930 (when three of the road games were in Newark, Staten Island and Brooklyn) and marked the first time since 1963 that the Giants lost just one game as visitors. The Giants averaged 125.6 rushing yards a game, a robust 37.5-yard gain over the 1999 average. Quarterback Kerry Collins was sacked 28 times; in 1999 Giants quarterbacks were sacked 42 times. Collins had the best season of his career, setting career highs in passes (529), completions (311), completion percentage (58.8) and touchdown passes (22). Halfback Tiki Barber set a Giants record of 2,085 all-purpose yards (1,006 rushing, 719 receiving, 332 punt returns and 28 on kickoff returns). Amani Toomer caught 78 passes (one less than the franchise record he set in 1999). Ike Hilliard led the team with a 14.3-yard average and eight touchdown catches. The defense was second in the NFL against the run (72.3 yards a game) and fifth in points allowed (15.4 per game). In 359 rushing attempts, opponents had an NFL-best two runs of longer than 20 yards. Jessie Armstead led the team with 102 tackles — his fifth consecutive season with more than a hundred tackles — and was selected to his fourth straight Pro Bowl. Defensive tackle Keith Hamilton had the best season of his nine-year career. He was a dominating run-stopper and he led the Giants with 10 sacks, an impressive feat for a tackle. Defensive end Michael Strahan had perhaps his finest all-around season and raised his sack total from 5.5 in 1999 to 9.5 in 2000.

2001

After a strong 3-1 start, the Giants lost eight of their last 12 games and finished 7-9 and in third place in the NFC East, the third time in as many tries they failed to make the playoffs a season after reaching the Super Bowl. The terrorist attacks in New York and Washington on Sept. 11 — the day after the Giants lost their Monday night opener in Denver — made the rest of season a minor footnote by comparison. After the attacks, many players reached out to victims' families, firefighters, police officers and other rescue workers and their children. Despite the disappointing record, the season included many highlights, notably Michael Strahan setting a new NFL single-season record with 22.5 sacks. Kerry Collins became the first quarterback in league history to throw every one of his team's passes in two consecutive seasons. Collins set team marks for passes (568) and completions (327).

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THE 2000 DIVISIONAL PLAYOFF GAME

Tiki Barber accounted for 1,782 total yards, Mike Barrow set a team record with 135 tackles, Morten Andersen became the second-leading scorer in NFL history, Howard Cross set a new franchise record for games played (207), Amani Toomer caught more than 70 passes for the third season in a row, rookie Rodney Williams established a team record with a 90-yard punt against the Broncos and Jessie Armstead played in his fifth consecutive Pro Bowl (and was joined in Hawaii by Strahan and Ron Stone). Although they struggled with two three-game losing streaks, the Giants thrilled their fans with scintillating last-second victories over Dallas (in overtime), Arizona and Seattle. After the defeat in Denver — and a week off after the NFL's decision not to play the Sunday after the attacks — the Giants won three straight, against Kansas City, New Orleans and Washington. The winning streak was followed by consecutive heartbreaking 1-point losses to St. Louis and Philadelphia, and a defeat at Washington. The Giants then rebounded with victories over Dallas and Arizona before again dropping three straight to Minnesota, Oakland and Dallas. They played their way back into playoff contention with dramatic triumphs over Arizona and Seattle, but closed the season with losses to Philadelphia and Green Bay.

2002

An exciting and rewarding season concluded with the Giants winning their final four regular season games to finish 10-6 and in second place in the NFC East. More importantly, they earned a Wild Card berth in the NFC playoffs, where they lost a heartbreaking 39-38 game to the San Francisco 49ers. But the game did not diminish the season's many team and individual achievements. The Giants made their 26th appearance in the playoffs, tying them with the Dallas Cowboys for the most postseason appearances in NFL history. They finished the regular season ranked sixth in the NFL in total offense, with 364.1 yards a game. It was their highest ranking and most yards per game since the 1985 Giants finished fifth in total offense with 367.8 yards a game. The Giants improved to 19-5 in regular season December games under Jim Fassel. Many individuals enjoyed outstanding seasons. Kerry Collins completed 335 passes, a Giants record, and was 1st in the NFC and 4th in the NFL with 4,073 passing yards,

breaking the previous team record of 4,044, set by Phil Simms in 1984. Collins completed 61.5 percent of his passes, a career-high and the third-best percentage in team history. Tiki Barber was 4th in the NFL and 1st in the NFC with 1,984 yards from scrimmage (1,387 rushing and 597 receiving). He rushed for 1,387 rushing yards, the second-highest total in team history after Joe Morris' 1,516 yards in 1986. Amani Toomer set team records with 82 receptions for 1,343 yards and established a career-high with eight touchdown catches. Pro Bowler Jeremy Shockey caught 74 passes, the fifth-highest total in Giants history, and a team record for both rookies (shattering the mark of 48 set by Bobby Johnson in 1984) and tight ends (eclipsing the 66 passes Mark Bavaro caught in 1986). Michael Strahan was selected to his 4th Pro Bowl in 5 years and from Sept. 22 through Dec. 1, he had at least a half-sack in 10 consecutive games, tying the NFL record set by Denver's Simon Fletcher in 1991 and tied by Tennessee's Jevon Kearse in 1999.

2003

The Giants endured one of their most unpleasant seasons in recent memory, losing their last eight games to finish 4-12. The Giants were 4-4 at midseason. In Game 9, they were tied at halftime with Atlanta, 7-7. But the Falcons scored 20 unanswered second-half points to send the Giants to a defeat from which they would never recover. The Giants finished the season 1-7 at home, the first time since 1983 they won a single home game. Despite their poor record, the Giants had several individual highlights. Michael Strahan led the NFL with 18.5 sacks, the second-highest total of his career, and became the first Giant to twice lead the league in sacks. For the second consecutive year, Strahan and tight end Jeremy Shockey were the only Giants selected to the Pro Bowl. Shockey became the first Giant to be selected to the Pro Bowl in each of his first two seasons since Taylor in 1981-82. Running back Tiki Barber had team-high totals of 1,216 rushing yards (the second-highest total of his career) and 69 receptions. He became the first Giant to lead the team in both rushing and receptions since Joe Dawkins in 1974. Barber finished the season as the franchise's all-time leader in total yards (10,746) and receptions (422) and is second in rushing (5,409 yards). Amani Toomer extended his own team record with his fifth consecutive 1,000-yard season. Quarterbacks Kerry Collins and Jesse Palmer combined to throw a franchise-record 616 passes in 2003. Right guard David Diehl became the first Giants rookie to start all 16 games since Mark Bavaro in 1985. He was one of 14 NFL rookies to start all 16 games in 2003. The team announced with two games remaining that Jim Fassel would not return as head coach. Fassel was replaced by Tom Coughlin on January 6, 2004.

2004

A new era dawned in Giants Stadium in 2004 with the arrival of Tom Coughlin as the 16th head coach in franchise history.

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With Coughlin at the helm, the Giants revamped their roster and started the season 5-2. But the Giants couldn't sustain the momentum and lost eight consecutive games before winning the season finale against the Dallas Cowboys. The Giants finished in second place in the NFC East with a 6-10 record, a two-game improvement over their 2003 mark. Running back Tiki Barber set four significant team records and was selected to his first Pro Bowl. He finished first in the NFL with a Giants-record 2,096 yards from scrimmage. Barber was fifth in the league and second in the conference with a team-record 1,518 rushing yards, two more than Joe Morris' total in 1986. He set the record on a game-winning three-yard run with 11 seconds remaining in the finale against Dallas. Barber tied a career high by averaging 4.7 yards a carry. Barber rushed for at least 100 yards in nine games, breaking the team's previous single-season record of eight, set by Morris in 1986. Barber finished the season with 6,927 career rushing yards, edipsing Hampton's former team record of 6,897. The Giants had other standout performers. Willie Ponder averaged an NFL-best 26.9 yards on kickoff returns, the highest average by a Giant since Leon McQuay averaged 27.6 yards in 1974. The Giants finished first in the NFL with a 25.1-yard kickoff return average, the first time since 1953 they led the NFL in that statistical category. Ponder was the first Giant to lead the NFL in average kickoff return yardage since Clarence Childs in 1964. Jeremy Shockey led the Giants with 61 receptions to become the first tight end to top the team since Mark Bavaro had 55 catches in 1987. Bavaro had 55 catches that season. Shockey's team-leading six touchdown receptions were two more than he had in his first two seasons combined. Amani Toomer led the team's wide receivers with 51 catches for 747 yards. It was the sixth consecutive season Toomer had more than 50 receptions and 700 yards. Eli Manning, selected with the top pick in the 2004 draft and then acquired by the Giants in a trade, started the last seven games and finished the season with 95 completions in 197 attempts for 1,043 yards, six touchdowns and nine interceptions. Osi Umenyiora, a second-year defensive end, led the Giants with 7.0 sacks, six more than he had as a rookie. Linebacker Carlos Emmons led the team with 97 tackles (62 solo) and David Tyree had a team-high 23 special teams tackles.

2005

The 2005 season was marked by soaring success and searing tragedy. The Giants finished 11-5 and earned their first playoff berth since 2002 and their first NFC East championship since 2000 before losing an NFC Wild Card Game to Carolina, 23-0. But the Giants' beloved owners, Wellington Mara and Bob Tisch, passed away within three weeks of each other, both from cancer. Mara, an NFL patriarch who was one of the most respected and influential figures in league history, and who had been with the Giants for their entire 81-year history, died on Oct. 25. Tisch, who purchased 50 percent of the franchise in 1991, was a business titan, renowned philanthropist and nonpareil New York City mover and shaker, died on Nov. 15. The Giants were only the fifth

team in NFL history to have five different players score at least seven touchdowns. Tiki Barber scored 11, and Jeremy Shockey, Plaxico Burress, Amani Toomer and Brandon Jacobs scored seven apiece. The Giants had five players selected to the Pro Bowl, their largest contingent since the 1990 Super Bowl champions sent seven players to Hawaii. The Pro Bowlers were Barber, Shockey, Osi Umenyiora, Michael Strahan and David Tyree.

Barber had the greatest season by a running back in Giants history and was selected NFL Player of the Year by Sports Illustrated and a first-team All-Pro by the Associated Press and Pro Football Weekly. He was second in the NFL with a team-record 1,860 rushing yards, shattering the franchise mark of 1,518 he set in 2004. Barber also had 530 receiving yards to become the only player in NFL history with at least 1,800 rushing yards and 500 receiving yards in the same season. His 2,390 total yards were second-most in NFL history. St. Louis' Marshall Faulk had 2,429 yards in 1999 (1,381 rushing, 1,048 receiving). Barber led the NFL in runs of 20 or more yards (16), 40 or more yards

(seven) and 50 or more yards (five). His 263 scrimmage yards at Oakland, 220 rushing yards against Kansas City and 95-yard run against the Raiders were all NFL single-game highs in 2005. Barber's 95-yard run at Oakland was the longest in Giants history and broke a record that stood for 75 years — Hap Moran's 91-yard run vs. Green Bay on Nov. 23, 1930.

Eli Manning threw 557 passes this season, the second-highest total in team history. His 294 completions place him fourth on the Giants' career list and his 24 touchdown passes were the most by a Giant since Fran Tarkenton had 29 in 1967.

Jacobs was the first Giants rookie to score seven touchdowns since Bobby Johnson in 1984 and the first to rush for seven touchdowns since Bill Paschal ran for 10 scores in 1943.

Umenyiora was selected to his first Pro Bowl and was named first-team All-Pro by both the Associated Press and Pro Football Weekly. He was first in the NFC and second in the NFL with 14.5 sacks, the highest total by a Giants player other than Strahan since Hall of Famer Lawrence Taylor had 15 in 1989.

Strahan was third in the NFC with 11.5 sacks. He and Umenyiora combined for 26 sacks, the most by any pair of NFL teammates.

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Jay Feely led all NFL kickers with a team-record and career-high 148 points, the first Giants kicker to hold the top spot since Dan Chandler in 1963 (106 points). Jeff Feagles played in all 16 games for the 18th consecutive season (third with the Giants). On Nov. 27 in Seattle, Feagles played in his 283rd consecutive game, a new NFL record. Former Minnesota defensive end Jim Marshall had held the old mark of 282 since retiring in 1979.

Tyree was selected to his first Pro Bowl despite missing three games with an elbow injury, the Giants' first special teams player chosen since Reyna Thompson in 1990.

2006

The Giants finished 8-8 and earned their second consecutive postseason berth, the first time they accomplished that feat since 1989-90. The record was incongruously fashioned with a 3-5 home record and a 5-3 mark away from Giants Stadium.

Tiki Barber ended his record-setting career by rushing for 1,662 yards and catching 58 passes. Eli Manning was tied for fourth in the NFL with 24 touchdown passes. Tight end Jeremy Shockey led the team with 66 receptions and was voted to the Pro Bowl for the fourth time in his five-year career. Plaxico Burress caught 10 touchdown passes, the most by a Giant in 26 years, and was right behind Shockey with 63 catches. Linemen Chris Snee, David Diehl, Shaun O'Hara and Kareem McKenzie played solidly while missing just two games among them.

Defensively, middle linebacker Antonio Pierce led the Giants with 159 tackles (38 more than anyone else on the team), including 93 solo. He was selected to play in his first Pro Bowl as an injury replacement for Brian Urlacher. Safeties Gibril Wilson and Will Demps had 121 and 116 tackles, respectively, Osi Umenyiora led the team in sacks for the third consecutive year (despite missing five games) and tackle Fred Robbins had a solid all-around season.

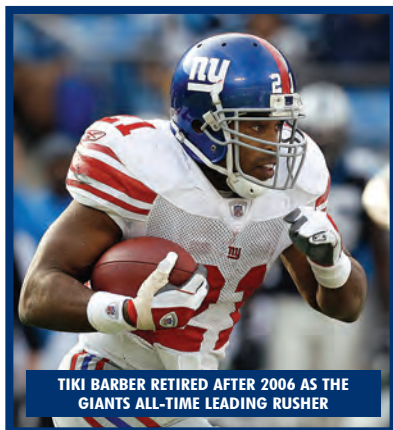
On the debit side, the Giants were never at full strength in the second half of the season because several key players suffered injuries that forced them to go on injured reserve. The group included wide receiver Amani Toomer (knee), seven-time Pro Bowl defensive end Michael Strahan (Lisfranc foot sprain), left tackle Luke Petitgout, three-time Pro Bowl linebacker LaVar Arrington, reserve defensive end Justin Tuck and, late in the year, return specialist Chad Morton.

2007

The 2007 season was one of the most successful, rewarding and memorable in franchise history.

The Giants stumbled to a 0-2 start — then fell behind by two touchdowns at halftime of their third game — before beginning a remarkable turnaround. They rallied to win that game, 14 of their next 18 and concluded the season with an exhilarating and unforgettable 17-14 victory over the New England Patriots in Super Bowl XLII. It was one of the greatest upsets and most exciting championship games in the long history of the National Football League.

Eli Manning threw the game-winning 13-yard touchdown pass to Plaxico Burress with just 35 seconds remaining, giving the Giants a victory over a New England team that entered the



game with an 18-0 record, including a three-point win over the Giants in the regular season finale. After New England had taken a 14-10 lead with just 2:42 remaining in the fourth quarter, Manning completed five passes on an 83-yard drive — including a 32-yarder on the greatest play in Super Bowl history, when he slipped the duties of the Patriots' pass rusher and threw down field to David Tyree, who somehow secured the ball against his helmet and away from safety Rodney Harrison.

Two days after bringing the Vince Lombardi Trophy back to the metropolitan area, the Giants were lauded by more than a million fans at a ticker tape parade up Manhattan's famed Canyon of Heroes, and later at a rally in Giants Stadium.

The Giants triumphed for the third time in four Super Bowl appearances, won their sixth title game and seventh overall championship. They won Super Bowls following the 1986, 1990 and 2007 seasons, NFL Championship Games in 1934, 1938 and 1956 and the league title in 1927, before the advent of championship games.

But this title was the most improbable of all. The Giants were just the fourth team to start a season 0-2 and reach the Super Bowl (and the third to win it). They finished the regular season at 10-6 and became the first six-loss team to win the Super Bowl since the 1988 San Francisco 49ers. The Giants won just three home games — none after October 21 — to become the first team with a losing home record to ever make the Super Bowl. The Giants were the fifth wild card team — and first from the NFC — to win the Super Bowl. They were the third team to reach the Super Bowl by winning three road playoff games, the second such team to win the Super Bowl and the first from the NFC. The Giants sent an NFL single-season record with 11 consecutive victories away from home (seven regular season, four postseason, including the Super Bowl). Many individuals enjoyed outstanding seasons, games or moments. Eli Manning started every game and threw for 3,336 yards and 23 touchdowns to become the first Giants quarterback since Phil Simms (1984-86) to top 3,000 yards and 20 touchdown passes in each of three consecutive seasons. Brandon Jacobs rushed for 1,009 yards despite missing five games and most of a sixth with injuries. Burress was

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unable to practice virtually the entire season because of an ankle injury, but led the team with 70 receptions for 1,025 yards and 12 touchdowns, the highest total by a Giants receiver since Homer Jones had 13 in 1967. Amani Toomer caught 59 passes and became the franchise's all-time leader in receptions with 620. The offensive line — and fullback Madison Hedgecock, acquired off waivers after he was cut by St. Louis — played well throughout the year, a big reason the Giants finished fourth in the NFL in rushing yards, averaging 134.3 a game.

Under new coordinator Steve Spagnuolo, the defense ranked seventh in the NFL, allowing 305.0 yards a game. The Giants led the NFL with 53.0 sacks and set a franchise record with 12 in a victory over Philadelphia on Sept. 30. Osi Umenyiora was third in the NFC and fifth in the NFL with 13.0 sacks and was the lone Giant voted to the Pro Bowl. Justin Tuck became a force on the defensive line and had 10.0 sacks. Michael Strahan, in the final season of his great career, added 9.0 sacks and moved to fifth on the NFL's career list with 141.5. Middle linebacker Antonio Pierce led the Giants with 116 tackles (63 solo). Corey Webster stepped up to play superbly in the playoffs. R.W. McQuarters has intercepted a pass in each of the first three postseason games.

The special teams also played well. Punter Jeff Feagles was one of the NFL's most effective punters in the 20th season of his remarkable career. Kicker Lawrence Tynes, acquired in an offseason trade with Kansas City, succeeded on 23 of 27 field goal attempts and booted the game-winning 47-yarder in overtime in the NFC Championship Game. Domenik Hixon, acquired off waivers in October, became the primary kickoff returner late in the season and brought one back 74 yards for a touchdown in the regular season game against the Patriots.

2008

When the 2008 NFL season began, the Giants had the Vince Lombardi Trophy on display in their lobby and legions of skeptics and doubters who were convinced they had won it more through luck and timing than skill. A popular refrain was that the Giants had simply become a hot team at the right time in the 2007 playoffs. For evidence, the disbelievers cited the Giants' stirring Super Bowl XLII victory over the previously-undefeated New England Patriots. When it was time to make predictions for the 2008 season, most prognosticators placed the Giants second or third in the NFC East.

But the Giants proved them all wrong. No, they didn't win another Super Bowl. But they did capture the division title and the No. 1 seed in the NFC playoffs. They started the season 11-1 and winning 12 regular season games, they became only the fifth defending Super Bowl champion to win more games the season following a championship than they did on their way to winning the title (not counting the strike-shortened 1982 season).

The Giants achieved their success despite losing several key

players from the 2007 championship team, including seven-time Pro Bowl defensive end Michael Strahan (retirement), two-time Pro Bowl defensive end Osi Umenyiora (knee injury suffered in the preseason), four-time Pro Bowl tight end Jeremy Shockey (traded to New Orleans) and wide receiver Plaxico Burress, (who did not play in the season's final month after he was wounded in an accidental shooting).

The day after the season ended with a loss to the Philadelphia Eagles in an NFC Divisional Playoff Game, Coach Tom Coughlin addressed many of the issues that had been raised in training camp.

"What I thought I would start with this morning is to think back to last spring and last summer when all of your questions concerned how this team would respond to winning the Super Bowl," Coughlin said. "Would they be, for lack of a better word, satisfied? Would they be as hungry coming into training camp and beyond training camp as they were in working our way to a Super Bowl championship? I think that our team responded and answered that question. I think we came out, we transitioned, we bridged from the Super Bowl year to the next season very well. Our competitiveness was there, our fire, our attempt to take the success of the Super Bowl season on into the next season was very successful. We were 11-1 and we did come out of camp and play very, very well for a very long time. We, of course, played well and the record stood for that. We didn't finish the season as well as we would have liked to, but I think we answered the questions of what this team was about."

"Twelve and five is not a bad season," general manager Jerry Reese said. "When you set the bar high like that and then all of sudden you get eliminated in the second round it stings. Overall, we had a real good season. It's not where we want it to be, but we said we wanted to be the organization that put our team in position to win the Super Bowl every year. For the last couple of years we have been able to put our team in position to do that. We fell short this time."

The loss to Philadelphia did not mitigate the achievements of a successful regular season. The Giants were one of only two teams to finish in the top nine in both the NFL's offensive and defensive rankings. They rushed for an NFL-leading and

"Giants Stadium, you thought I was never coming back," said Strahan, who had announced his retirement three months previously after 15 stellar seasons with the team. "But I had to come back to celebrate the championship with the greatest fans in all of sports. And for one final time, salute my teammates for an incredible championship run. So what I want you to do is, I want you to get on your feet, I want you to make some noise and I want you to be ready to stomp somebody out and welcome the New York Giants Super Bowl champions."

With that, the 79,742 fans in attendance screamed in delight as the 2008 Giants took the field for the first time. At the other end of the stadium, a championship banner was raised.

2009

When the Giants embarked on their 2009 season, the popular belief was that they could succeed because of the strength of a retooled defense, particularly the reinforced front, and a running game that had been the NFL's best in 2008. If a weakness, or at least a unit with multiple questions, existed, it was the untested group of wide receivers.

But someone shredded that script when the games began. The defense did not play as well as anticipated and the rushing attack wasn't as productive as it had been in previous seasons. But the passing game, with Eli

Manning having the finest year of his career and record-setting Steve Smith leading a group of receivers that exceeded expectations, was the strongest facet of the team.

The Giants' fortunes unfolded in a similarly unexpected fashion. Playing their 34th and final season in Giants Stadium, they hoped to win their second consecutive NFC East title and extend their franchise record with a fifth consecutive postseason berth. The journey began smoothly, as the Giants won their first five games. But they soon took a wrong turn, veered completely off course and ultimately hit a dead end. The Giants won just three times after that burst from the gate and finished with an 8-8 record and in third place in the division. They finished out of the playoffs for the first time since Tom Coughlin's inaugural season as head coach in 2004.

The Giants were hit by a debilitating series of injuries. Safety Kenny Phillips, their first round draft choice in 2008, played superbly in the first two games but missed the rest of the season because of an arthritic condition in his knee that required surgery. Middle linebacker Antonio Pierce, a team leader, captain and the top tackler, sat out the final seven games with a bulging disk in his neck. Two of the free agents acquired to strengthen the defense, Chris Canty and Michael Boley, missed significant chunks of the season with injuries. Defensive tackle Jay Alford missed the entire year with a knee injury. Gerris Wilkinson led the team in special teams tackles when he was placed on injured reserve with a wrist injury. Running backs Brandon Jacobs and Ahmad Bradshaw and defensive end Justin Tuck played hurt most of the year and offensive linemen Rich Seubert and Kareem McKenzie were sidelined at the end of the season with injuries.

franchise record 2,518 yards and also topped the league with a Giants-best 5.0 yards per carry. The Giants were the first team since 1985 to have two running backs rush for 1,000 yards each (Brandon Jacobs and Derrick Ward).

Seven Giants were selected to the NFC Pro Bowl team: quarterback Eli Manning, center Shaun O'Hara, guard Chris Snee, defensive end Justin Tuck, punter Jeff Feagles and kicker John Carney. Two weeks before the game, long-snapper Zak DeOssie was added as the NFC's need player.

Snee and Tuck were named first-team All-Pro by the Associated Press and fullback Madison Hedgecock, O'Hara and Carney finished second in the voting at their positions. O'Hara, Hedgecock and defensive tackle Fred Robbins were named first-team All-Pro by Sports Illustrated and O'Hara and Snee were selected to The Sporting News' All-Pro first team.

The Giants opened their season at home against NFC East rival Washington in the traditional Thursday night opener showcasing the previous season's Super Bowl champions.

Before the game, the Giants' three Super Bowl championship teams were honored during an inspiring and exciting pre-game ceremony that featured a surprise appearance by Michael Strahan.

A huge inflatable replica of the Lombardi Trophy was wheeled out to midfield as the stadium video boards showed highlights from Super Bowls XXI and XXV. Bob Papa, the voice of the Giants, then introduced the players from those teams that were in attendance: Hall of Famer Harry Carson, Stacy Robinson, Karl Nelson, Brad Benson, Bill Ard, Howard Cross, Rodney Hampton, Ottis Anderson, Carl Banks and Mark Bavaro.

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Manning finished the season with 317 completions in 509 attempts (62.3 percent) for 4,021 yards, 27 touchdowns, 14 interceptions and a passer rating of 93.1. The completions, percentage, yards, touchdowns and rating were all career highs. Manning is the third quarterback in Giants history to throw for more than 4,000 yards in a season, joining Kerry Collins (4,073 in 2002) and Phil Simms (4,044 in 1984).

Smith was first in the NFC and second in the NFL with 107 receptions, 25 more than the franchise's previous single-season record-holder (Amani Toomer had 82 in 2002) and 50 more than this season's runner-up, Mario Manningham. Smith's 1,220 receiving yards were the second-highest total in franchise history. Toomer had 1,343 in 2002. Smith joined Toomer, Plaxico Burress (1,214 yards in 2005) and Homer Jones (1,209 yards in 1967) as the only Giants with 1,200-yard receiving seasons. Smith led the NFL with 38 receptions on third down.

Manningham had a break through season with 57 catches (in 14 games) and Hakeem Nicks had 47 receptions for 790 yards, both the third-highest total in history among Giants rookies. Nicks' six touchdown receptions were the most by a Giants rookie since Johnson had seven.

Center Shaun O'Hara and guard Chris Snee were selected to

their second consecutive Pro Bowls and tackle David Diehl to his first. Tight end Kevin Boss had a solid season with 42 catches and five touchdowns. Cornerback Terrell Thomas started every game and led the team with 101 tackles (67 solo). Defensive end Osi Umenyiora returned from the knee surgery that cost him the 2008 season to record a team-high 7.0 sacks, the fifth time in six seasons he has led the team. Kicker Lawrence Tynes scored a career-high 126 points and Chase Blackburn and Bryan Kehl tied for the team lead with 16 special teams tackles.

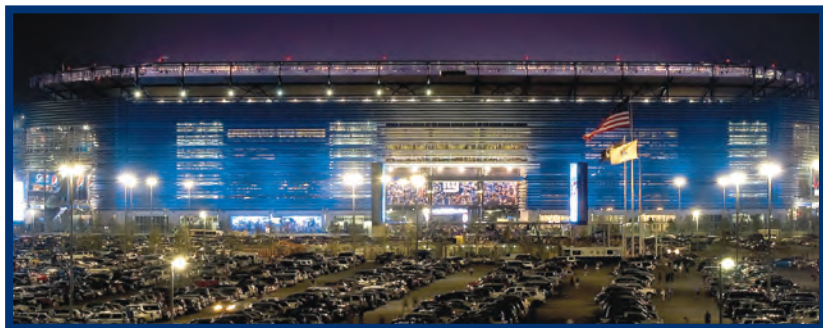
The Giants finished with a record of 155-117 in regular season games in Giants Stadium, including 4-4 in 2009. They were 7-4 in postseason games for a total record of 162-121.

Giants Stadium hosted 477 NFL regular season game played in Giants Stadium, easily the most in league history. Chicago's Wrigley Field is second with 365.

2010

The 2010 season will always elicit mixed reactions from the New York Giants.

Playing their 86th season, the Giants moved into a beautiful new home, New Meadowlands Stadium, which is located just a few yards away from where Giants Stadium, their home from

1976-2009, once stood. The Giants were 10-6, one of a record-tying 13 teams to finish with double-digit victories. They finished the season with the same record as the NFC East champion Philadelphia Eagles, the same record as the eventual Super Bowl XLV champion Green Bay Packers and the same record as the 2007 Giants team that won Super Bowl XLII.

But ultimately, the season did not meet their expectations because the Giants did not make the playoffs. Two losses to the Eagles and another to the Packers in the final seven weeks of the season first cost the Giants the NFC East title and then an opportunity to participate in the postseason. The Giants lost the NFC's last postseason berth on a tiebreaker.

The Giants ended their season with an unusual blend of emotions. They accepted their fate and took responsibility for coming up short, but they were equally defiant in their belief that they are better than a playoff non-qualifier.

"I'm really disappointed to be here talking to you guys about 10-6," general manager Jerry Reese said at his season-ending news conference. "I really felt like we had an opportunity to get into the playoffs and really do some damage when we got there, but it didn't work out that way. I'm really disappointed, even more so than last year because we put ourselves in position and that's what our goal is every year, to put ourselves in a position and we put ourselves in position and we just did not finish the job and that's very disappointing."

Although disappointed at missing the playoffs for the second season in a row, Coach Tom Coughlin had high praise for his players.

"I love this team, I love these guys, I think they're strong character people, we work together on everything, we're all in it together, we're all for one, one for all and that's the way that it has to be," Coughlin said. "It's a group of guys that don't make excuses for anything, they accept responsibility, they accept whatever takes place. They've done an outstanding job this year of adjusting to some very unusual circumstances that surround the game. They've done a good job of that. We've had a couple of huge disappointments, emotionally we weren't to where we should have been. We did come back to a certain level (in the season finale vs. Washington), but it's an outstanding group of guys who by and large are on the same page, they're focused, they come to work, they prepare themselves, they play hard, there are all kinds of personalities just like there always is, but as I said, I'm very, very appreciative of the kind of effort, the attitude, the enthusiasm, and the fact that this year's team was a very responsive team."

The Giants had many impressive statistical achievements in 2010. The offense (fifth) and defense (seventh) each finished in the top 10 of the NFL rankings. Eli Manning set franchise records for completions and completion percentage and became the first Giants quarterback

with two 4,000-yard seasons and the second with more than 30 touchdown passes. Ahmad Bradshaw (1,235) and Brandon Jacobs (823) rushed for a combined 2,058 yards. Despite missing three games with injuries, Hakeem Nicks had one of the finest seasons by a wide receiver in Giants history with 79 catches for 1,052 yards and 11 touchdowns. Mario Manningham caught 60 passes, including 85- and 92-yard touchdowns. Osi Umenyiora (10 forced fumbles) and Justin Tuck (five fumble recoveries) tied for the team lead with 11.5 sacks.

But those players and the rest of the team and coaches ultimately exited the season with an empty feeling.

"Overall, I'm disappointed in the outcome of the season," said quarterback Eli Manning, who threw for 4,002 yards and 31 touchdowns, but also tossed 25 interceptions. "We thought we had potential. We thought we had players to make it in the playoffs and make a run, and we didn't accomplish that. We didn't play well enough at times of the season to make it into the playoffs."

"We had a good year," Tuck said. "Ten and six is nothing to hold your head down about. Obviously, it wasn't good enough, and we always have a goal of reaching the playoffs and going deep in the playoffs and hopefully winning the Super Bowl. It didn't happen this year, but we're not going to hold our heads about it. We had opportunities, and you try your best to learn from them. Hopefully, that's being carried over to next year and it gets us to work a little harder in running and work a little harder in lifting and propel us to where we want to be next year."

2011

Late in the afternoon on Dec. 18, 2011, the Giants trudged off the field in MetLife Stadium after a lackluster 23-10 loss to the Washington Redskins. The Giants had not scored a touchdown until 33 seconds remained in the defeat, their fifth in a six-game stretch that included a four-game losing streak. More importantly, the Giants fell to 7-7 and were one defeat from missing the playoffs for a third consecutive season.

But instead of continuing their freefall, the Giants rose up and concluded the season with one of the most inspiring and memorable runs in the 87-year history of the franchise, one that ended with a victory over New England in Super Bowl XLVI—their second championship in five seasons.

The surge began with a Dec. 24 victory over the Jets in which the Giants were the visiting team. Eight days later, the Giants routed Dallas in a winner-take-all showdown for the NFC East title. The Giants finished 9-7 and became the first team to win the division with fewer than 10 wins since the 1970 merger.

The Giants opened their playoff run with a 24-2 rout of Atlanta in MetLife Stadium. They followed that up with road victories that avenged regular season losses to Green Bay and San Francisco, the latter a 20-17 overtime thriller in the NFC

Championship Game.

That advanced the Giants to the Super Bowl, where they found a familiar foe in the Patriots, the same team they defeated four years earlier in Super Bowl XLII. This time, Ahmad Bradshaw scored the game-winning touchdown on a six-yard run with 57 seconds remaining and the defense knocked down Tom Brady's last-play pass into the end zone to clinch the 21-17 victory.

Eli Manning completed 30 of 40 passes for 296 yards to win his second Super Bowl MVP award as the Giants became the first seven-loss team to win a Super Bowl.

During the regular season, the Giants set franchise records with 6,161 total yards and 4,734 net passing yards. Manning set Giants marks with 589 passes and 359 completions. Wide receiver Victor Cruz established a team record with 1,536 receiving yards while catching 82 passes. Hakeem Nicks had 1,192 yards to give the Giants two 1,000-yard receivers for the first time in franchise history.

Ahmad Bradshaw missed four games with a foot injury, but led the team with 659 rushing yards and nine touchdowns.

Second-year pro Jason Pierre-Paul had 16.5 sacks, the fourth-highest total in team history.

2012

The 2012 Giants finished 9-7 and in second place in the NFC East. It was the eighth consecutive season in which the Giants finished

.500 or better, their longest such streak since they played 10 seasons in a row without a losing record from 1954-63. The Giants finished with a winning record for the third consecutive season, the first time they had done that since 1988-90 (when they were 10-6, 12-4, 13-3).

Despite extending those streaks, they did not earn a post-season berth. The Giants lost control of their playoff destiny with back-to-back late-season defeats in Atlanta and Baltimore. They routed Philadelphia in their finale, but soon learned they were eliminated when Chicago beat Detroit.

The Giants compiled numerous impressive statistics in 2012. They scored 429 points, the second-highest total in franchise history; the 1963 Giants scored 448. The 2012 season was the fifth in the 88-year history of the franchise in which the Giants scored more than 400 points. The Giants scored a franchise-record 278 points at home, shattering the old mark of 248, set in 2007. In their last three home games—victories over Green Bay, New Orleans and Philadelphia—the Giants scored 38, 52 and 42 points.

The 2012 team allowed an NFL-low 20 sacks. The Giants were fourth in the NFL in both takeaways (35, four more than

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they had in 2011) and turnover differential (plus-14, a significant improvement over 2011's plus-7). The plus-14 was the Giants' best turnover differential since they were plus-25 in 1997. The Giants intercepted 21 passes in 2012, their highest total since they had 27 picks, also in 1997.

The Giants finished the 2012 season with 72 penalties for 578 yards, both franchise-low totals for a 16-game schedule.

Eli Manning passed Phil Simms and became the Giants' career leader in completions (2,612) and touchdown passes (211).

Four Giants were selected to the Pro Bowl: Manning, guard Chris Snee, wide receiver Victor Cruz and defensive end Jason Pierre-Paul.

2013

In 2013, a strong finish was not enough for the Giants to overcome a poor start and they finished 7-9, their first losing record since they were 6-10 in 2004. They were third in the NFC East for the second season in a row.

The Giants put themselves in a deep hole by losing their first six games for the first time since 1976, when they lost their first nine games. They did, however, follow their 0-6 start with four consecutive victories to become just the second team in NFL history to lose its first six games and win the next four (the other team was the 2009 Tennessee Titans). Overall, the Giants won seven of their last 10 games.

All nine of the Giants' losses were to teams that finished .500 or better, the first time that happened since their 5-11 season in 1995. The Giants lost home games to both of the teams that played in Super Bowl XLVIII, Seattle and Denver.

The offense struggled much of the season. The Giants' offense ranked 28th in the NFL in both yards per game (307.5) and points per game (18.4). The Giants scored 294 points, their lowest total in Tom Coughlin's 10 seasons as head coach. They were shutout at Carolina and vs. Seattle, the first time since 1996 they did not score twice in the same season. The Giants scored more than 27 points just once, in their 36-31 opening night loss in Dallas.

The Giants committed an NFL-high 44 turnovers. It was their highest turnover total since 1983, when they had 58 turnovers. The Giants' minus-15 turnover differential was their worst since they were minus-16, also in 1983.

Defensively, the Giants improved throughout the season. The defense ranked 26th in the NFL entering Week 6, when it was allowing an average of 395.2 yards per game, finished the season ranked eighth, giving up 332.3 yards a game. That was a significant improvement over the 2012 season, when the defense was ranked 31st, allowing 383.4 yards per game. The unit was 14th in the league against the run (108.9 yards a game) and 10th vs. the pass (223.3). The Giants were 18th in scoring defense, allowing 23.9 points a game. Entering Week 6, they were 32nd and last in scoring defense, giving up 36.4 points a game.

The defense was not responsible for nine of the 42 touchdowns allowed by the Giants, who surrendered an NFL-high nine return touchdowns (three apiece on interceptions, fumble returns and punt returns).

2014

The 2014 Giants finished 6-10, their first double-digit loss season since 2004 and their first back-to-back losing seasons since 2003-04. They were a streaky team, with a seven-game losing streak surrounded on both sides by three-game winning streaks.

The Giants were the third-place team in the NFC East for the second year in a row. They were 2-4 in NFC East games. The Giants swept Washington and were swept by Dallas and Philadelphia.

The Giants scored 380 points and allowed 400. It was just the fifth time in franchise history they gave up at least 400 points. The offense finished 10th in the NFL with an average of 367.2 yards a game, a 59.7 yards-per-game improvement over their 2013 average of 307.5. It was the team's largest one-year jump since 2005, when the Giants were ranked fourth in the league with an average of 361.7 yards a game. That was a 66.6 yards-per-game increase over their 2004 average of 295.1.

The Giants set franchise records for completed passes with 383 (shattering the former mark of 359, set in 2011) and completion percentage with 63.1 (the former record of 62.9 was set in 2010). They finished with their second-highest totals in franchise history in passes attempted (607) and net passing yards (4,272).

The Giants' defense allowed 6,012 net yards, the third-highest total by their opponents in franchise history. They yielded 6,134 yards in 2012 and 6,022 in the 2011 championship season.

The Giants were ranked 29th in the NFL in total defense, allowing 375.8 yards a game, after finishing eighth (332.3 yards per game) in 2013. The run defense ranked 30th (135.1 yards a game), while the Giants were 18th vs. the pass (240.6). The Giants finished the season with 47 sacks, their highest total since they had 48 in 2011.

2015

The Giants were 6-10 for the second season in a row in 2015, their first back-to-back double-digit loss seasons since 2003-04 when they were 4-12 in Jim Fassel's final season as head coach and 6-10 in Tom Coughlin's first. Eight of the 10 losses were by six or fewer points. The Giants lost six games in which they held a lead or were tied in the fourth quarter.

The Giants finished under .500 for the third consecutive season, the first time that's happened since they had eight straight losing seasons from 1973-80. They missed the playoffs for the fourth consecutive season, their longest drought since they went 17 years about a postseason berth from 1964-80.

The 2015 Giants scored 420 points, the fifth-highest total in franchise history. Their 331 first downs were tied for the fourth-highest total in team history, and were just five fewer than their 2014 total. The Giants' 5,956 net yards were the third-highest total in their history.

With an average of 372.3 yards per game, the Giants finished eighth in the NFL in total offense, one season after finishing 10th in yardage. It is their first back-to-back top 10 finishes since they had a streak of four consecutive seasons from 2008-11.

AP

In 2015, the Giants set franchise records for pass attempts (623, the old record was 616 in 2003), and completions (392, the old record was 383 in 2014). The Giants totaled 4,347 net passing yards, the second-highest total in franchise history. The record of 4,734 was set in 2011. The Giants threw 36 touchdown passes in 2015 (35 by Eli Manning), the second-highest total in franchise history; the 1963 Giants threw 39 touchdown passes.

The Giants allowed 442 points the second-highest total in franchise history (501 in 1966).

2016

The Giants sharply improved their fortunes in Ben McAdoo's first season as head coach in 2016, when they finished the regular season with an 11-5 record and in second-place in the NFC East, after finishing 6-10 each of the previous two years. The five-game improvement in victories is their biggest since 2005, when they were also 11-5 one year after finishing 6-10. The Giants qualified for their first playoff berth since 2011, when they won Super Bowl XLVI. It was their 32nd postseason appearance, tying them with Dallas and Green Bay for the most in NFL history. The Giants'

season ended with a 38-13 loss to the Packers in an NFC Wild Card Game. The Giants finished 7-1 at home, their best record in the seven-year history of MetLife Stadium (previous best: 6-2 in 2012) and their best home record since they were 7-1 in Giants Stadium in 2008. They won their last six home games, their longest such streak since they won their first six games at home in 2008. The Giants finished 4-2 in NFC East games, their best record within the division since they were 4-2 in 2013. Their 2-1 record in division road games was their best since they were 2-1 in 2013. With their 27-23 victory against Baltimore on Oct. 16, the Giants became the third NFL franchise with 700 combined regular-season and postseason victories. At the conclusion of their 92nd season, the Giants were 708-597-33. The Packers were 764-575-37, and the Chicago Bears were 761-586-42. The Giants had a vastly-improved defense in 2016. They were second in the NFL with 284 points allowed, one season after they were ranked 30th after giving up 442 points. The Giants allowed 17.8 points per game, the lowest average by their opponents since 2002, when they gave up 17.4 points a game.

STADIUMS OF THE NEW YORK GIANTS

The Giants shared the Polo Grounds with the New York Baseball Giants from the time they entered the league in 1925 until they moved to the larger Yankee Stadium for the start of the 1956 season.

In 1973, the Giants announced plans to move to a new stadium in New Jersey for the 1976 season, and the city of New York announced that Yankee Stadium was planning a two-year renovation after the 1973 baseball season. The Giants were allowed to play their first two games of the 1973 season at Yankee Stadium before moving to a new location.

The Giants spent the offseason searching for a place to play their games. The Giants' first choice was the Yale Bowl, but the Yale Bowl representatives turned down the team's first request because it would have meant a blackout for the local schedule due to the blackout rule. The Giants' next choice was to play at Princeton University, but they also turned down the Giants. Things were so bad that when the league announced the 1973 schedule, it didn't even say where the games would be played. In light of the Giants' problems, Commissioner Pete Rozelle, with the help from national politicians, modified the blackout rule so that the rule was only in effect if the game was not sold out in advance. With the rule change came a change of heart by the Yale Bowl representatives. It was official. The Giants would play their first two games of the 1973 season at Yankee Stadium and would play the rest of the schedule and the 1974 season at the Yale Bowl in New

Haven, Connecticut.

After the 1974 season, it was announced that the Giants were going back to New York City to play at Shea Stadium until the opening of Giants Stadium in 1976. The Giants played the first four games of the 1976 season on the road just in case there were any delays with the opening of the new stadium. The Giants made their debut at Giants Stadium on October 10, 1976 against the Dallas Cowboys before a sellout crowd.

In 2010, the Giants moved into beautiful, new, state-of-the-art MetLife Stadium built just a few yards from where Giants Stadium sat for more than three decades. The nation's finest football stadium, it seats 82,500 fans. It is one of the NFL's most technologically advanced stadiums and took more than four million man-hours and \$1.6 billion to build. The stadium features 10,000 club seats, 222 suites and 130,000 square feet of state-of-the-art club lounges. The first row of seats is just 46 feet from the sidelines and the sightlines are superb. The site of Super Bowl XLVIII, Giants' new home is 2.1 million square feet, compared to Giants Stadium's 900,000 square feet. It has four 30' by 118' high definition video screens, a 350,000 square foot outdoor plaza filled with interactive activities for fans of all ages.

In 2014, MetLife Stadium hosted Super Bowl XLVIII, the first outdoor Super Bowl hosted in a "cold weather" city.

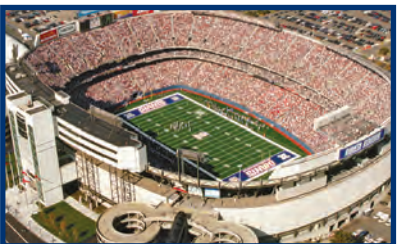

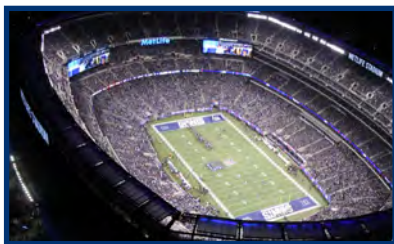

COMMEMORATIVE PATCHES

The Giants have celebrated two major anniversaries by wearing uniform patches on its jerseys. The first was in 1999 for its 75th season, the second coming in 2004 commemorating 80 years.

Over the years, the team has honored deceased players and administrators by wearing memorial patches. In 1986, the team wore a patch in remembrance of Carl "Spider" Lockhart. In 2001, a "GBY" patch honored longtime general manager George Bernard Young.

Most recently, Wellington T. Mara was remembered during the 2005 season with a "WTM" patch after his passing, and a few weeks later, Preston Robert Tisch was added to a patch with Wellington Mara separated by the NY logo.

The Giants honored Hall of Famer, player and coach, Rosie Brown with a "79" decal on the back of their helmets in after his passing in 2004.

In addition, the team has also worn patches in Super Bowls XXV, XLII and XLVI. Those patches were representations of the NFL's Super Bowl logos for those years.

In 2014, the team wore a patch commemorating its 90th season in the league.

For the 2015 season, the team wore a "ATM" patch on its jerseys honoring the passing of Ann Mara, wife of Wellington Mara.

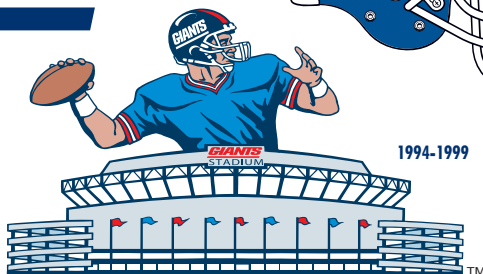

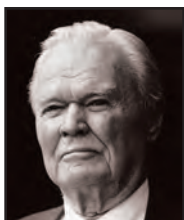

Wellington Mara, along with CB Mike Haynes, Coach Don Shula and C Mike Webster, was a member of the four-man 1997 class of the Pro Football Hall of Fame. Mara and his father Tim, who was the founder of the Giants and a charter member of the Hall of Fame, were the first father and son to be accorded pro football's highest honor. Mara was one of the most influential and beloved figures in American sports history. His entire working lifetime was dedicated to the Giants and the NFL and he helped the Giants produce 21 NFL/NFC first place finishes, 27 postseason appearances and six NFL championships during a 68-season tenure that began with his graduation from Fordham in 1937. Mara passed away on Oct. 25, 2005.

Tim Mara introduced the city of New York to pro football when he purchased the franchise for a reported \$500 in 1925, thus giving the National Football League a vital showcase in the nation's largest city. Mara withstood heavy financial losses his first year until the Giants were saved in the last home game of the season. Mara needed a good showing at the gate to keep the team alive. The Chicago Bears arrived at the Polo Grounds with the most heralded college player of the era, Red Grange, who helped draw a crowd of more than 70,000 people. After seeing so many people attend a Giants game, Mara decided that professional football could be a big success under the right circumstances. Mara bore the brunt of the fight against the rival American Football League in 1926 and the All-American Football Conference from 1946-49. He helped build the Giants into a perennial powerhouse and was honored in 1963 as one of 17 charter members of the Pro Football Hall of Fame.



MORRIS (RED) BADGRO

END

USC

ENSHRINED IN 1981

Badgro joined the Giants in 1930 and played six seasons at end. He made a name for himself as a superior defender, excellent blocker and big-play receiver. Badgro helped lead the Giants to the NFL's inaugural championship game in 1933 and he scored the first touchdown in the league's championship game history on a 29-yard pass from Harry Newman in the second quarter. Badgro tied for the NFL receiving title in 1934 with 16 receptions for 206 yards, including one touchdown. He was named to the All-NFL team three times: 1931, 1933 and 1934. Before joining the Giants, Badgro played with the Red Grange-led New York Yankees in the American Football League (12 games in 1927 and one game in 1928). He played pro baseball for three seasons, the first with the Tulsa in the minor leagues and then with the St. Louis Browns for two seasons. Badgro has the distinction of being the oldest player ever to be elected into the Hall of Fame. He was 77 when he was enshrined in 1981.

ROOSEVELT BROWN

TACKLE
MORGAN ST.
ENSHRINED IN 1975

Brown played for the Giants from 1953 through 1965 after joining the team as a 27th round draft choice, regarded as one of the greatest “sleeper” picks of all time. Brown held the starting tackle spot for 13 straight seasons. During that period, he was named to the Pro Bowl nine times and was selected All-NFL eight consecutive seasons. In 1956, when the Giants won the league title, Brown was named Lineman of the Year by the Associated Press. Brown was a big, strong blocker who had the speed to make a block downfield. He was also used along the defensive front on goal-line stands. Brown helped the Giants advance to the NFL Championship game in 1956, 1958, 1959, 1961, 1962 and 1963. After his playing career, Brown continued his Giants affiliation as a coach before being appointed as a scout, where he has served since the 1971 season. He was immediately named assistant line coach by the Giants after a phlebitis condition forced him to retire in 1966.



ROSIE BROWN IN 1953



HARRY CARSON
LINEBACKER
SOUTH CAROLINA STATE
ENSHRINED IN 2006

Carson played his entire 13-year NFL career with the Giants. An inside linebacker, he was selected to play in nine Pro Bowls, including seven in a row from 1982-88. Carson led the Giants in tackles six times, was a two-time All-NFL first team selection and was a leader throughout his career and the sole captain of the 1986 Super Bowl champions. Carson joined the Giants as a fourth-round draft choice in 1976 from South Carolina State, where he never missed a game in four seasons, was a two-year captain and a Little All-America selection by the Associated Press. A defensive end in college, Carson successfully moved to linebacker with the Giants so quickly and so successfully that he was voted to NFL All-Rookie team. Carson played 173 games in a Giants uniform — tying him with Keith Hamilton for seventh all-time — and he was a punishing run defender who also intercepted 11 passes. Carson had 17 sacks, 14 fumble recoveries and seven forced fumbles. He had 25 tackles (20 solo) in a Monday night game against Green Bay in 1982 and seven tackles in the Giants’ 39-20 victory over Denver in Super Bowl XXI. During his prime, Carson was the best run-stopping linebacker in the NFL. In the seven seasons from 1981 to 1987, Giants’ opponents averaged only 3.59 yards per rushing attempt, a remarkable achievement for so long a period. During that period, Carson was credited with 856 tackles, including 627 unassisted tackles.

FRANK GIFFORD
HALFBACK, FLANKER
SOUTHERN CALIFORNIA
ENSHRINED IN 1977

Gifford played for the Giants from 1952-64, although he voluntarily retired in 1961 due to a serious injury suffered the previous season. He was known as one of the most versatile backs in NFL history. Gifford was the first choice in the draft by the Giants in 1952 after an All-America career at Southern California. He totaled 9,862 combined yards during his career. He rushed for 3,609 yards rushing, caught 367 passes and scored 484 points. Gifford was named to the Pro Bowl as a defensive back in 1953 and as an offensive back the following year - a first in NFL history. He played in seven Pro Bowls and was named All-NFL four times and NFL Player of the Year in 1956. Gifford holds the Giants record with 78 touchdowns. A true triple-threat back, Gifford threw 14 touchdown passes in 60 attempts on the halfback option. He retired after the 1960 season and returned in 1962 at a new position, flanker. The Giants reached the NFL Championship game five times during his career, including their victory in 1956.

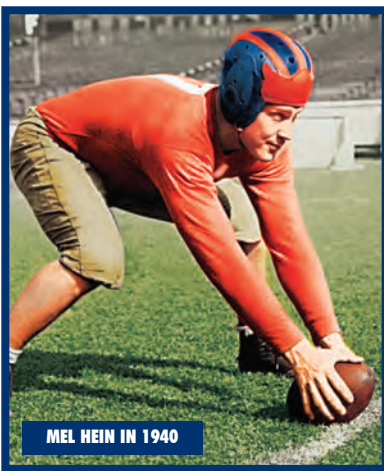

ENSHRINED IN 1963

Hein joined the Giants in 1931 and played 15 seasons, a team record matched only by Phil Simms and Michael Strahan. He was named All-NFL eight consecutive years from 1933-40. Following a successful college career at Washington State, Hein wrote to three NFL clubs offering his services. He joined the Giants after the team submitted the high-

est salary bid at \$150 per game. Hein was a 60-minute regular for 15 years, playing in 170 games. He never missed a game in high school, college or the NFL. Hein took time out only in two games and was injured only once. He was named the league's Most Valuable Player in 1938 after anchoring a line that helped guide the Giants to the NFL Championship with a 23-17 victory over the Green Bay Packers in the Polo Grounds.

CAL HUBBARD

TACKLE
GENEVA
ENSHRINED IN 1963

Hubbard played for the Giants from 1927-28 and again in 1936. He was one of the 17 charter members

of the Pro Football Hall of Fame in 1963. Hubbard was named All-NFL six years in a row from 1928-33. He played for the Green Bay Packers from 1929-35 and the Pittsburgh Pirates in 1936 before returning to the Giants. He was acquired before the start of the 1927 season in order to help beef up the Giants defense. That season, the defense surrendered only 20 points as the Giants captured their first NFL championship. He went to Green Bay in 1929 in a move that would haunt the Giants, as Hubbard led the Packers to a 12-0-1 record to edge out the 13-1-1 Giants for the league title. The Packers handed the Giants their only loss of the season by a 20-6 score.



TOM LANDRY

COACH
TEXAS
ENSHRINED IN 1990

Landry was with the Giants as a defensive back from 1950-55 and an assistant coach from 1954-59. The

Giants' 1956 championship team not only consisted of players that would eventually be elected to the Pro Football Hall of Fame, but it also had one of history's greatest coaching staffs. Head coach Jim Lee Howell had Vince Lombardi coaching the offense and Landry coaching the defense. When the Dallas Cowboys entered the league in 1960, Wellington Mara recommended the Cowboys hire Landry as head coach. Landry coached the Cowboys from 1960 through 1988 and led Dallas to two Super Bowl victories and five NFC titles. Landry coached the Cowboys to 20 consecutive winning seasons.



SAM HUFF

LINEBACKER
WEST VIRGINIA
ENSHRINED IN 1982

Huff became an immediate star at middle linebacker after he was drafted by the Giants in the third round

in 1956 following an All-America career at West Virginia. He played in five Pro Bowls and was named All-NFL four years. Huff won recognition for his great individual efforts against the premier running backs of his era, including Jim Brown of Cleveland, Rick Casares of Chicago and Alan Ameche of Baltimore. He was named the NFL's Outstanding Lineman in 1959. Huff anchored a defense that helped the Giants reach the championship game in 1956, 1958, 1959, 1961, 1962 and 1963. He was traded to the Washington Redskins prior to the 1964 season and has been a color analyst on the Redskins radio broadcasts for many years.



ALPHONSE (TUFFY) LEEMANS

HALFBACK, FULLBACK
G. WASHINGTON/
OREGON
ENSHRINED IN 1978

Leemans played for the Giants from 1936-43. He was personally scouted

by Wellington Mara and was a second-round draft choice in the inaugural NFL draft in 1936 out of George Washington. Mara sent a telegram setting up a meeting with Leemans to convince him to accept a career in the NFL with the Giants. Leemans was the 1936 College Football All-Star game MVP. He led NFL rushers as a rookie in 1936 with 830 yards on 206 attempts. Leemans was named All-NFL in 1936 and 1939. An aggressive, dedicated do-everything team leader, he totaled 3,142 yards rushing, 2,324 yards passing, 442 yards receiving and threw 16 touchdown passes during his career.

VINCE LOMBARDI

COACH
FORDHAM
ENSHRINED IN 1971

Lombardi was an offensive assistant coach with the Giants from 1954-58 and the head coach of the Green Bay Packers (1959-67) and Washington Redskins (1969). With Lombardi running the offense, the Giants captured the NFL championship in 1956. In 10 years as head coach, Lombardi had a 105-36-6 record. He directed the Packers to five NFL championships in seven years (1961-62 and 65-66-67) and victories in Super Bowls I and II, a feat without equal in pro football history. A guard, Lombardi played his collegiate football at Fordham, where he was one of the legendary "Seven Blocks of Granite."



BILL PARCELLS

COACH
WICHITA STATE
ENSHRINED 2013

Parcells was head coach of the Giants for eight years (1983-90) and later held the same position with the New England Patriots, New York Jets and Dallas Cowboys. He led the Giants to victories in Super Bowls XXI and XXV and is one of 13 head coaches with more than one Super Bowl victory. With the Giants, Parcells was 77-49-1 (.610) in the regular season and 8-3 (.727) in the postseason for an overall mark of 85-52-1 (.620). In 19 seasons as a head coach, Parcells was 172-139-1 (.569) in the regular season and 11-8 (.579) in the postseason. His overall record was 183-138-1 (.570). The 172 regular-season victories are the 10th-highest total in NFL history, as are the 183 total victories.



STEVE OWEN

COACH
PHILLIPS UNIVERSITY
ENSHRINED IN 1966

Owen was a four-time All-NFL tackle who played for the Giants from 1926-31, plus a one-game return in 1933. He captained the 1927 team that won the NFL title and held its foes to a record-low total of 20 points. But Owen made his greatest imprint on the sideline, where he coached the Giants for 23 years. He was a co-coach with Benny Friedman in 1930, then assumed the full head coaching responsibility in 1931, a position he kept until 1953. Owens had a coaching record of 153-100-17 and won eight division and two NFL titles. The 153 victories are a Giants record. Some of his coaching innovations include the A-formation offense, the umbrella defense and the two-platoon system.



ANDY ROBUSTELLI

DEFENSIVE END
ARNOLD COLLEGE
ENSHRINED IN 1971

Robustelli was drafted by the Los Angeles Rams in 1951 and played on two Rams championship teams. In 1956, Wellington traded for Robustelli, who provided a tremendous lift in the Giants' title drive that season. Robustelli, who stayed with the Giants through the 1964 season, played on a winning team in 13 of his 14 pro seasons. He played in eight NFL championship title games and seven Pro Bowls. Robustelli was named All-NFL seven times, two with the Rams and five with the Giants. Robustelli was a durable player who missed only one game in his 14-year career.

KEN STRONG
HALFBACK
NEW YORK UNIVERSITY
ENSHRINED IN 1967

Strong played for the Giants from 1933-35, in 1939 and from 1944-47.

He excelled in every phase of the game - blocking, running, passing, punting, placekicking and defense. At the time of his retirement, Strong was the Giants' career scoring leader with 324 points on 13 touchdowns, 35 field goals and 141 extra points. He scored 17 points to pace the Giants to the 1934 championship game over the Chicago Bears in the famous "Sneakers Game." Strong scored a league-high 64 points in 1933 and was All-NFL in 1934. He began his career with the Staten Island Stapletons in 1932. After four seasons, he joined the Giants. In 1936, he began a two-year stint in the rival AFL. Strong served as a placekicking specialist only when he returned to the Giants from 1944 until 1947. He scored 479 points in his career.



MICHAEL STRAHAN
DEFENSIVE END
TEXAS SOUTHERN
ENSHRINED IN 2014

Strahan played his entire career with the Giants from 1993-2007. A standout as

both a run stopper and pass rusher, Strahan joins Hall of Famer Mel Hein and Phil Simms as the only players in Giants history to play 15 years with the team. Strahan played in a franchise-record 216 regular-season games. He was a four-time first-team All-Pro (1997, 1998, 2001 and 2003), a seven-time Pro Bowler and the 2001 NFL AP Defensive Player of the Year. Strahan had 141.5 career regular season sacks, which is the Giants' franchise record and the fifth-highest total in NFL history. Strahan holds the NFL single-season record with 22.5 sacks in 2001. He also led the NFL in 2003 with 18.5 sacks and is the only Giants player to twice lead the league in sacks. Strahan was a captain of the 2007 Giants team that won Super Bowl XLII.



LAWRENCE TAYLOR
LINEBACKER
NORTH CAROLINA
ENSHRINED IN 1999

Taylor joined the Giants as the second overall selection of the 1981

NFL Draft and played his entire 13-year career for the team. When Taylor retired, he was the NFL's No. 2 all-time sack leader in the NFL with 132.5. That total does not include the 9.5 he accumulated as a rookie in 1981 before the sack was an official NFL statistic. Taylor established an NFL record by appearing in 10 consecutive Pro Bowls from 1981-1990. He was named the NFL Rookie of the Year in 1981 and the NFC's Defensive Player of the Week nine times (the award was established in 1984), as well as the conference's Defensive Player of the Month twice, in October 1986 and September 1989. Taylor was a unanimous choice to the NFL's All-1980s team. He was a unanimous selection as the NFL's Most Valuable Player in 1986, when he had a career-high 20.5 sacks, 105 tackles, five passes defended and two forced fumbles.

Y.A. TITTLE
QUARTERBACK
LOUISIANA ST.
ENSHRINED IN 1971

The Giants engineered one of the best trades in their long history prior to the 1961 season when they sent guard Lou Cordileone to the San Francisco 49ers for Tittle. The then 35-year old Tittle promptly led the Giants to their 12th Eastern Division championship. Tittle played two seasons in the All-American Conference and 11 in the NFL before joining the Giants. In 1962, Tittle set an NFL record by throwing 33 touchdown passes and tied another mark with seven scoring throws in one game. Tittle had his greatest year as a pro in 1963, when he led the league in passing with 221 completions in 367 attempts for 3,145 yards. His 36 touchdown passes broke his own league mark and set a Giants record that still stands. Tittle's career totals include 2,427 completions, 33,070 yards, 242 touchdowns and 13 games with more than 300 yards passing. He was the NFL Player of the Year in 1957, when he led the 49ers to a tie for the Western Division title, and won the honor again in 1961 and 1963, as he took the Giants to Eastern championships. Tittle was named All-NFL in 1957, 1962 and 1963, and also played in six Pro Bowls.



EMLÉN TUNNELL
DEFENSIVE BACK
TOLEDO/IOWA
ENSHRINED IN 1967

Tunnell was signed by the Giants as a free agent out of Iowa in 1948 and played 11 seasons for the teams.

Ignored in the NFL draft, Tunnell walked into the Giants office and asked Tim Mara for a tryout. Tunnell was the first African-American player signed by the Giants. He holds Giants records with 74 interceptions and 261 punt returns. In 1952, Tunnell gained more yards (923) on interceptions and kickoff returns than the NFL rushing leader did running the ball. He earned the nickname "offense on defense." Tunnell was named All-NFL four times and played in nine Pro Bowls.



ARNOLD WEINMEISTER
DEFENSIVE TACKLE
WASHINGTON
ENSHRINED IN 1984

Weinmeister played for the Giants from 1950-53.

He was one of the first defensive players to captivate the masses in the same manner a star running back or quarterback could. A big and extremely fast player with great ability to diagnose plays, Weinmeister began his pro career with the New York Yankees in the All-American Football Conference in 1950. He moved to the NFL during the 1950 merger. Weinmeister played two ways in the AFC, but was used exclusively on defense in the NFL.

LARRY CSONKA

**FULLBACK

ENSHRINED IN 1987**

Csonka played for the Giants from 1976-78. He was originally drafted by the Miami Dolphins in the first round in 1968. Csonka left the Dolphins following the 1974 season and played for the Memphis Southmen of the World Football League in 1975. He returned to the Dolphins to finish his career in 1979. A five-time Pro Bowl selection, Csonka put together three consecutive 1,000-yard seasons (1971-73) as Miami advanced to the Super Bowl each year. He excelled in those Super Bowls, averaging 6.3 yards a carry and rushing for more than 100 yards in two of them. Csonka finished his career with 8,081 yards, a 4.3-yard average and 64 touchdowns.



RAY FLAHERTY

**END, COACH
GONZAGA
ENSHRINED IN 1976**

Flaherty played for the Giants from 1928-29 and 1931-35 and helped the Giants advance to the NFL Championship Game in 1933, 1934 and 1935. He spent the 1930 season coaching at Gonzaga. Flaherty finished with an 80-37-5 record as a coach with the Boston Redskins, Washington Redskins, New York Yankees and Chicago Hornets. Flaherty introduced the screen pass in the 1937 title game when the Washington Redskins scored a 28-21 victory over the Chicago Bears. He suggested to Coach Steve Owen that the Giants wear sneakers in the icy conditions at the Polo Grounds in the 1934 championship game, known as the "Sneakers Game."



BENNY FRIEDMAN

**QUARTERBACK
MICHIGAN
ENSHRINED IN 2005**

Friedman, a two-time All-America quarterback at Michigan, played with the Cleveland Bulldogs (1927), Detroit Wolverines (1928), Giants (1929-1931) and Brooklyn Dodgers (1932-1934). Following the 1928 season New York Giants owner Tim Mara purchased the Detroit franchise just to secure the services of Friedman. A versatile player, Friedman could run, kick and pass the ball better than any player who preceded him. From 1927-30, Friedman threw 11, 9, 20, and 13 touchdown passes, leading the league each year. In 1928, he topped the league in both rushing touchdowns and touchdown passes; no other player has ever accomplished that feat. His 20 touchdown passes in 1929, including four in one game, were both NFL records for years. Although very durable, a knee injury coupled with the rigors of serving as an assistant coach at Yale, Friedman's productivity dropped in 1931. Still the player-coach managed to earn third-team All-NFL honors that year and second-team All-NFL honors in 1933.



JOE GUYON

**HALFBACK
CARLISLE
ENSHRINED IN 1966**

Guyon played for the Giants during the championship season in 1927. His career highlight was catching a touchdown pass that gave the Giants a win over the Bears for the 1927 NFL championship. He also played for the Canton Bulldogs in 1920, the Cleveland Indians in 1921, Oorang Indians from 1922-23, the Rock Island Independents in 1924 and the Kansas City Cowboys from 1924-25.

Henry played for the Giants during the championship season in 1927. He was the largest player of his time at 250 pounds. Henry was the bulwark of the Canton Bulldogs' championship lines in the 1920s. He played for the Canton Bulldogs and the Pottsville Maroons in addition to the Giants.



ARNIE HERBER
QUARTERBACK
REGIS COLLEGE
ENSHRINED IN 1966

Herber played for the Giants in 1944 and 1945. Pro football's first great long passer, Herber was the NFL passing leader in 1932, 1934 and 1936. Herber came out of retirement in 1944 to lead the Giants to the NFL Eastern Division crown. He also played for the Green Bay Packers from 1930-40, and ranks fifth in Packers annals with 64 career touchdowns.



DON MAYNARD
WIDE RECEIVER
TEXAS WESTERN
ENSHRINED IN 1987

Maynard played for the Giants in 1958. He went on to play for the New York Titans from 1960-62, the New York Jets from 1963-72 and the St. Louis Cardinals in 1973. He caught 633 passes for 11,834 yards (18.7-yard average) and 88 touchdowns. He had at least 50 catches and 1,000 yards in five different seasons. Maynard caught eight passes for 118 yards, including the winning touchdown, against Oakland in the AFL Championship game to help the Jets advance to Super Bowl III.



HUGH McELHENNY
HALFBACK
WASHINGTON
ENSHRINED IN 1970

McElhenny played for the Giants in 1963, when he helped them advance to the championship game. His career totals include 5,281 yards rushing and 360 points. On his first play as a professional, McElhenny scored on a 40-yard touchdown run. He also played with the San Francisco 49ers from 1952-60, the Minnesota Vikings from 1961-62 and the Detroit Lions in 1964.



FRAN TARKENTON
QUARTERBACK
GEORGIA
ENSHRINED IN 1986

Tarkenton played for the Giants from 1967-71. He began his career with the Minnesota Vikings in 1961 before moving to the Giants in 1967 and back to the Vikings in 1972 in blockbuster trades. He retired as the NFL's record holder for career passing yards with 47,003. An elusive scrambler, Tarkenton rushed for 3,674 yards and 32 touchdowns. A four-time All-NFL and nine-time Pro Bowl selection, he led the Vikings to Super Bowl appearances in 1973, 1974 and 1976.



JIM THORPE
HALFBACK
CARLISLE
ENSHRINED IN 1963

Thorpe played for the Giants during their first season in 1925. He was a charter inductee into the Pro Football Hall of Fame in 1963. Thorpe was the biggest name in football at the time the Giants signed him at the age of 37. He also played for the Canton Bulldogs, Cleveland Indians, Oorang Indians, Toledo Maroons, Rock Island Independents and the Chicago Cardinals. He was the first president of the American Professional Football Association in 1920.

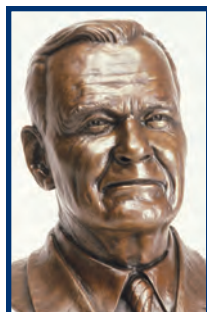

Owens 19 team records for the Giants, including all-time records with 2,576 completions in 4,647 attempts for 33,462 yards...Owns a .597 winning percentage (95-64, including 6-4 in postseason play) as a starter over his 15-year career...Named MVP of the Super Bowl after leading the Giants to a 39-20 victory over Denver in Super Bowl XXI.

14 WARD CUFF

Cuff joined the Giants as a fourth-round draft choice from Marquette in 1937 and excelled at several positions in a stint that ended in 1945. A wingback, fullback, halfback, defensive back and kicker, he rushed for 1,766 yards on 330 carries (a 5.3-yard average) and caught 101 passes for 1,477 yards. Cuff scored 18 touchdowns (six rushing, 12 receiving) and made 31 of 70 field goal attempts and 98 of 102 extra point tries. He also had a 12.1-yard punt return average and 13 interceptions.

*14 Y.A. TITTLE

Tittle played for the Giants from 1961-64 season...In 1962, Tittle completed 200 passes in 375 attempts for 3,224 yards...His 33 touchdowns that season set an NFL record and his seven touchdown passes against Washington tied another mark...Had his greatest year as a pro in 1963, leading the league in passing with 221 completions in 367 attempts for 3,145 yards and 36 touchdowns.

16 FRANK GIFFORD

Played for the Giants from 1952-64, though he voluntarily retired in 1961 season because of an injury...Made the Pro Bowl as both an offensive back and defensive back...Seven-time Pro Bowler and 1956 NFL player of the year...Holds three Giants records: Touchdowns (78), highest average gain (500 attempts) rushing (4.3 yards) and most receiving yards (5,434)...Is fifth on team's all-time rushing list with 3,609 yards and second with 367 receptions...Totaled 9,753 yards in his career.

32 AL BLOZIS

Made an immediate impression on the Giants after arriving in 1942 and quickly earned a starting assignment at tackle...Played in the 1944 championship game with the Giants, he then was sent almost immediately overseas where as a lieutenant in the army he was killed in action in France a brief six weeks later.

40 JOE MORRISON

Was a back and an end for the Giants from 1959 through 1972...Was a dominant figure during his 14-year career with the Giants, accumulating 2,472 yards rushing with 18 touchdowns...A versatile player, Morrison played six different positions: fullback, halfback, flanker, tight end, split end and defensive back.

42 CHARLIE CONERLY

Played for the Giants from 1948 through 1961...Represented the Giants in three Pro Bowls (1951, 1952 and 1957) and was named the NFL's Most Valuable Player in 1959...Ended his career with 1,418 completions and 19,488 yards, both Giants records at the time of his retirement.

50 KEN STRONG

Played for the Giants from 1933-35, 1939 and 1944-47...At the time of his retirement, Strong was the Giants all-time leading scorer with 324 points on 13 touchdowns, 35 field goals and 141 extra points...He scored 17 points to lead the Giants to victory in the 1934 Championship game against Chicago.

56 LAWRENCE TAYLOR

Finished his 13-year career (1981-93) as the No. 2 all-time quarterback sack leader in the NFL with 132.5...Established an NFL record by appearing in 10 consecutive Pro Bowls from 1981-90...Finest statistical season was in 1986 with a career-high 20.5 sacks, 105 total tackles, five passes defended and two forced fumbles...Earned unanimous selection as the NFL's Most Valuable Player in 1986.

GIANTS IN THE RING OF HONOR



In 2010, the Giants unveiled their Ring of Honor, which commemorates some of the most prominent and influential figures in the 87-year history of the franchise. The original class of 30 players, coaches, executives and owners was joined by five more honorees in 2011. These men have helped the Giants win eight NFL championships and more than 650 games and contributed to them becoming one of the most respected and admired organizations in professional sports.

The names of the men in the Ring of Honor are prominently displayed at each Giants home game in MetLife Stadium above the club level on each sideline.

CLASS OF 2010

TIM MARA

Tim Mara introduced the city of New York to pro football when he purchased the franchise for a reported \$500 in 1925, thus giving the National Football League a vital showcase in the nation's largest city. Mara withstood heavy financial losses his first year until the Giants were saved in the last home game of the season. Mara needed a good showing at the gate to keep the team alive. The Chicago Bears arrived at the Polo Grounds with the most heralded college player of the era, Red Grange, who helped draw a crowd of more than 70,000 people. After seeing so many people attend a Giants game, Mara decided that professional football could be a big success under the right circumstances. He bore the brunt of the fight against the rival American Football League in 1926 and the All-American Football Conference from 1946-49. Mara helped build the Giants into a perennial powerhouse and was honored in 1963 as one of 17 charter members of the Pro Football Hall of Fame.

WELLINGTON MARA

It is impossible to overstate the influence Wellington Mara had on the Giants and in the NFL. He was one of the most important and influential figures in the history of professional football, a man credited with many of the ideas and innovations that have made the NFL the nation's most popular professional sports league. Mara is the most beloved and influential Giant in history and one of the most significant figures not just in the NFL, but in American sports. He was a vital member of the franchise for each of its first 81 years until his death in 2005. Mara was instrumental in helping the Giants make 26 postseason appearances, including 18 divisional championships and six NFL championships, among them the Super Bowl XXI and Super Bowl XXV titles. Despite his ties to the team, Mara was recognized for always putting the league's interests ahead of what was best for the Giants. He was an invaluable contributor to the NFL as a member of many ownership committees. In 1997, Mara was elected to the Pro Football Hall of Fame, joining his father, Tim Mara, as the first father-son duo elected to the Hall.

JACK MARA

During the very first game the Giants ever played in 1925, Jack Mara followed each play along the sidelines as he held the first down marker. It wasn't long before he held far more important jobs in the organization. Mara was only 22 years old in 1930 when his father, Tim, turned over the ownership of the Giants to him and his younger brother Wellington, who was all of 14. He served as the team's president for 31 years and was in charge of the Giants' business operations. Jack Mara was the driving force behind one of the most significant decisions in franchise history, to move the Giants' home games to Yankee Stadium from the crumbling Polo Grounds prior to the 1956 season. Tim Mara detested Yankees owner

Dan Topping, so it was Jack who negotiated the deal that saved the financial future of the franchise. Jack Mara also lobbied the owners to share television revenue, which helped create the parity that has made pro football America's favorite spectator sport.

BOB TISCH

Preston Robert Tisch — “Bob” to everyone who knew him — realized a longtime dream in 1991, when he became co-owner of the Giants. Soon after the Giants won Super Bowl XXV, Tisch completed negotiations with Tim Mara (son of Jack Mara) and his family for a 50 percent interest in the team. That commenced Tisch's career as an owner of a professional sports franchise, one of many he simultaneously pursued. Tisch led an extraordinarily accomplished life. He was an enormously successful businessman, an extremely generous philanthropist, a postmaster general, a friend of presidents, governors and mayors and a nonpareil New York City mover and shaker. But nothing gave Tisch more pleasure and pride than being the co-owner of the Giants and working on several influential NFL ownership committees. As a member of the National Football League's Finance and Super Bowl Policy Committees, he attained a prominence in the sports arena equal to his position in the world of business.

GEORGE YOUNG

George Young was hired as the Giants general manager on Feb. 14, 1979 and stayed in that position through the 1997 season. He led the franchise out of the bleak 1970s and brought in great players such as Taylor, Simms, Joe Morris, Mark Bavaro and Carl Banks. Young hired Parcells, the head coach of two Super Bowl champions. During his tenure, the Giants earned eight playoff berths, highlighted by victories in Super Bowls XXI and XXV, and compiled an overall record of 155-139-2. He was named NFL Executive of the Year an unprecedented five times — 1984, 1986, 1990, 1993, and 1997. Young also served as chairman of the NFL's Competition Committee.

STEVE OWEN

Owen was a four-time All-NFL tackle who played for the Giants from 1926-31, plus a one-game return in 1933. He captained the 1927 team that won the NFL title and held its foes to a record-low total of 20 points. But Owen made his greatest imprint on the sideline, where he coached the Giants for 23 years. He was a co-coach with Benny Friedman in 1930, then assumed the full head coaching responsibility in 1931, a position he kept until 1953. Owen had a coaching record of 153-100-17 and won eight division and two NFL titles. The 153 victories are still the Giants record. Some of his coaching

innovations included the A-formation offense, the umbrella defense and the two-platoon system. Owen was inducted into the Pro Football Hall of Fame in 1966.

JIM LEE HOWELL

Jim Lee Howell was the Giants' head coach from 1954-60. He quickly added two future Hall of Fame coaches to his staff, Vince Lombardi to lead the offense and Tom Landry, whom he converted from a player, to coach the defense. In Howell's seven seasons as head coach, the Giants played in three NFL Championship Games and defeated George Halas's Chicago Bears, 47-7, in 1956. Howell's regular season record was 53-27-4 record, a .630 winning percentage. He coached six future Pro Football Hall of Fame players in Huff, Robustelli, Brown, Tunnell, Gifford and Don Maynard. Howell stayed with the Giants as Director of Player Personnel until his retirement in 1981.

BILL PARCELLS

When Parcells began coaching the Giants in 1983, the team had finished with a winning record just once in the previous 10 seasons. Parcells led the Giants to the playoffs in his second and third seasons. In 1986, he coached one of the greatest teams in Giants history. That year, the Giants won their last 12 games and finished 17-2, including a 39-20 rout of the Denver Broncos in Super Bowl XXI. Four years later, Parcells led the Giants to a 20-19 victory over the favored Buffalo Bills in Super Bowl XXV. He left the team after that season with a 77-49-1 regular season record. The 77 victories are the second-most in team history, behind Owen's 153. Parcells holds the Giants' record with eight postseason wins.

MEL HEIN

Hein joined the Giants in 1931 and played 15 seasons, a team record matched only by Simms and Strahan. He was named All-NFL eight consecutive years from 1933-40. Following a successful college career at Washington State, Hein wrote to three NFL clubs offering his services. He joined the Giants after the team submitted the highest salary bid at \$150 per game. Hein was a 60-minute regular for 15 years, playing in 170 games. He never missed a game in high school, college or the NFL. Hein took time out only in two games and was injured only once. He was named the league's Most Valuable Player in 1938 after anchoring a line that helped guide the Giants to the NFL Championship with a 23-17 victory over the Green Bay Packers in the Polo Grounds. Hein was a member of the Pro Football Hall of Fame's inaugural class in 1963.

GIANTS IN THE RING OF HONOR

KEN STRONG

Strong played for the Giants from 1933-35, in 1939 and from 1944-47. He excelled in every phase of the game - blocking, running, passing, punting, placekicking and defense. At the time of his retirement, Strong was the Giants' career scoring leader with 324 points on 13 touchdowns, 35 field goals and 141 extra points. He scored 17 points to pace the Giants to the 1934 championship game over the Chicago Bears in the famous "Sneakers Game." Strong scored a league-high 64 points in 1933 and was All-NFL in 1934. He began his career with the Staten Island Stapletons in 1932. After four seasons, he joined the Giants. In 1936, he began a two-year stint in the rival AFL. Strong served as a placekicking specialist only when he returned to the Giants from 1944 until 1947. He scored 479 points in his career. Strong was enshrined in the Pro Football Hall of Fame in 1967.

TUFFY LEEMANS

Leemans played for the Giants from 1936-43. He was personally scouted by Wellington Mara and was a second-round draft choice in the inaugural NFL draft in 1936 out of George Washington. Mara sent a telegram setting up a meeting with Leemans to convince him to accept a career in the NFL with the Giants. Leemans was the 1936 College Football All-Star game MVP. He led NFL rushers as a rookie in 1936 with 830 yards on 206 attempts. Leemans was named All-NFL in 1936 and 1939. An aggressive, dedicated do-everything team leader, he totaled 3,142 yards rushing, 2,324 yards passing, 442 yards receiving and threw 16 touchdown passes during his career. He was enshrined in the Pro Football Hall of Fame in 1978.

EMLEN TUNNELL

Tunnell was signed by the Giants as a free agent out of Iowa in 1948 and played 11 seasons for the team. Ignored in the NFL draft, Tunnell walked into the Giants office and asked Tim Mara for a tryout. Tunnell was the first African-American player signed by the Giants. Fifty-two years after playing his last game for the team, he still holds Giants records with 74 interceptions and 261 punt returns. In 1952, Tunnell gained more yards (923) on interceptions and kickoff returns than the NFL rushing leader did running the ball. He earned the nickname "offense on defense." Tunnell was named All-NFL four times and played in nine Pro Bowls. Tunnell was enshrined in the Pro Football Hall of Fame in 1967.

FRANK GIFFORD

A Pro Football Hall of Fame inductee in 1977, Gifford played for the Giants from 1952-64, although he voluntarily retired in 1961 due to a serious injury suffered the previous season. He was known as one of the most versatile backs in NFL history.

Gifford was the first choice in the draft by the Giants in 1952 after an All-America career at Southern California. He totaled 9,862 combined yards during his career. He rushed for 3,609 yards, caught 367 passes and scored 484 points. Gifford was named to the Pro Bowl as a defensive back in 1953 and as an offensive back the following year - a first in NFL history. He played in seven Pro Bowls and was named All-NFL four times and NFL Player of the Year in 1956. Gifford holds the Giants record with 78 touchdowns. A true triple-threat back, Gifford threw 14 touchdown passes in 60 attempts on the half-back option. He retired after the 1960 season and returned in 1962 at a new position, flanker. The Giants reached the NFL Championship game five times during his career, including their victory in 1956.

ROSIE BROWN

Roosevelt Brown played for the Giants from 1953 through 1965 after joining the team as a 27th round draft choice, regarded as one of the greatest "sleeper" picks of all time. Brown held the starting tackle spot for 13 straight seasons. During that period, he was named to the Pro Bowl nine times and was selected All-NFL eight consecutive seasons. In 1956, when the Giants won the league title, Brown was named Lineman of the Year by the Associated Press. Brown was a big, strong blocker who had the speed to make a block downfield. He was also used along the defensive front on goal-line stands. Brown helped the Giants advance to the NFL Championship game in 1956, 1958, 1959, 1961, 1962 and 1963. After his playing career, Brown continued his Giants affiliation as a coach before being appointed as a scout, a position he held from 1971 until his death in 2004. He was immediately named assistant line coach by the Giants after a phlebitis condition forced him to retire in 1966. Brown was inducted into the Pro Football Hall of Fame in 1975.

SAM HUFF

Huff became an immediate star at middle linebacker after he was drafted by the Giants in the third round in 1956 following an All-America career at West Virginia. He played in five Pro Bowls and was named All-NFL four times. Huff won recognition for his great individual efforts against the premier running backs of his era, including Jim Brown of Cleveland, Rick Casares of Chicago and Alan Ameche of Baltimore. He was named the NFL's Outstanding Lineman in 1959. Huff anchored a defense that helped the Giants reach the championship game in 1956, 1958, 1959, 1961, 1962 and 1963. He was traded to the Washington Redskins prior to the 1964 season and has been a color analyst on the Redskins radio broadcasts for many years. Huff was enshrined in the Pro Football Hall of Fame in 1982.

ANDY ROBUSTELLI

Robustelli was drafted by the Los Angeles Rams in 1951 and played on two Rams championship teams. In 1956, Wellington Mara traded for Robustelli, who provided a tremendous lift in the Giants' title drive that season. Robustelli, who stayed with the Giants through the 1964 season, played on a winning team in 13 of his 14 pro seasons. He played in eight NFL championship title games and seven Pro Bowls. Robustelli was named All-NFL seven times, two with the Rams and five with the Giants. Robustelli was a durable player who missed only one game in his 14-year career. He was the Giants' general manager prior to George Young. He was a 1971 Pro Football Hall of Fame inductee.

Y.A. TITTLE

The Giants engineered one of the best trades in their long history prior to the 1961 season when they sent guard Lou Cordileone to the San Francisco 49ers for Tittle. The then 35-year old Tittle promptly led the Giants to their 12th Eastern Division championship. Tittle played two seasons in the All-American Conference and 11 in the NFL before joining the Giants. In 1962, Tittle set an NFL record by throwing 33 touchdown passes and tied another mark with seven scoring throws in one game. Tittle had his greatest year as a pro in 1963, when he led the league in passing with 221 completions in 367 attempts for 3,145 yards. His 36 touchdown passes broke his own league mark and set a Giants record that still stands. Tittle's career totals include 2,427 completions, 33,070 yards, 242 touchdowns and 13 games with more than 300 yards passing. He was the NFL Player of the Year in 1957, when he led the 49ers to a tie for the Western Division title, and won the honor again in 1961 and 1963, as he took the Giants to Eastern championships. Tittle was named All-NFL in 1957, 1962 and 1963, and also played in six Pro Bowls. He was inducted into the Pro Football Hall of Fame in 1971.

HARRY CARSON

Carson played his entire career with the Giants from 1976-88. An inside linebacker, he was selected to play in nine Pro Bowls, including seven in a row from 1982-88. Carson led the Giants in tackles six times, was a two-time All-NFL first team selection and was the sole captain of the 1986 Super Bowl champions. Carson joined the Giants as a fourth-round draft choice from South Carolina State, where he never missed a game in four seasons, was a two-year captain and a Little All-America selection by the Associated Press. A defensive end in college, Carson successfully moved to linebacker with the Giants so quickly and so successfully that he was voted to the NFL All-Rookie team. Carson played 173 games in a Giants uniform — tying him with Keith Hamilton for seventh all-time — and he was a punishing

run defender who also intercepted 11 passes. Carson had 17 sacks, 14 fumble recoveries and seven forced fumbles. He had 25 tackles (20 solo) in a Monday night game against Green Bay in 1982 and seven tackles in the Giants' 39-20 victory over Denver in Super Bowl XXI. During his prime, Carson was the best run-stopping linebacker in the NFL. In the seven seasons from 1981 to 1987, Giants' opponents averaged only 3.59 yards per rushing attempt, a remarkable achievement for so long a period. During that period, Carson was credited with 856 tackles, including 627 unassisted tackles. He was enshrined in the Pro Football Hall of Fame in 2006.

LAWRENCE TAYLOR

Taylor joined the Giants as the second overall selection of the 1981 NFL Draft and played his entire 13-year career for the team. When Taylor retired, he was the NFL's No. 2 all-time sack leader in the NFL with 132.5. That total does not include the 9.5 he accumulated as a rookie in 1981 before the sack was an official NFL statistic. Taylor established an NFL record by appearing in 10 consecutive Pro Bowls from 1981-1990. He was named the NFL Rookie of the Year in 1981 and the NFC's Defensive Player of the Week nine times (the award was established in 1984), as well as the conference's Defensive Player of the Month twice, in October 1986 and September 1989. Taylor was a unanimous choice to the NFL's All-1980s team. He was a unanimous selection as the NFL's Most Valuable Player in 1986, when he had a career-high 20.5 sacks, 105 tackles, five passes defended and two forced fumbles. He was inducted into the Pro Football Hall of Fame in 1999.

AL BLOZIS

Al Blozis played just three seasons for the Giants, 1942-44. He immediately made a favorable impression on the team after arriving in 1942 and quickly earned a starting assignment at tackle. Blozis played in the 1944 championship game against Green Bay. Immediately after the Giants' loss to the Packers, Blozis was sent overseas to fight in World War II. An Army lieutenant, he was killed in action in France just six weeks later. The Giants retired Blozis' No. 32 jersey.

CHARLIE CONERLY

Conerly is often called the best Giants player not in the Pro Football Hall of Fame. He played his entire career with the Giants from 1948-61 and was a vital member of the 1956 NFL Championship team. Conerly was the NFL Rookie of the Year in 1948, the league's Most Valuable Player in 1959 and a Pro Bowler in 1950 and '56. Conerly ranks third in franchise history in pass attempts (2,833), fourth in completions (1,418), third in yards (19,488) and third in touchdown passes (173).

DICK LYNCH

Lynch was traded to the Giants by the Washington Redskins following the 1958 season for a 1960 fourth-round draft choice. He played for the Giants from 1959-66, a period in which the team played in four NFL Championship Games. Lynch played in 97 regular season games for the Giants (109 in his career) and intercepted 35 passes. In both 1961 and 1963, he led the NFL with nine interceptions. In '63, he also led the league with 251 return yards and three touchdowns. Lynch scored seven career touchdowns, four on interception returns and three on fumble returns.

Although he had a great playing career, Lynch is best known to legions of Giants fans for his 40 years as the analyst on the team's radio broadcast. His last game in the booth was the Giants' epic Super Bowl XLII victory over New England. Lynch died nine months later. "Dick was such an important part of our organization for so many years that we really considered him part of the family," John Mara said.

JOE MORRISON

Morrison was a back and an end for the Giants from 1959 through 1972. A dominant figure during his 14-year career, he totaled 2,472 rushing yards and 18 touchdowns. He also caught 395 passes — the third-highest total in franchise history — for 4,993 yards and 47 scores. A versatile player, Morrison played six different positions: fullback, halfback, flanker, tight end, split end and defensive back. Morrison's No. 40 jersey has been retired by the franchise.

PETE GOGOLAK

Gogolak played for the Giants from 1966-74 and is the highest-scoring player in the history of the franchise with 646 points — 120 more than runner-up Brad Daluiso. He also owns the franchise records for field goals (126) and extra points (268). Beyond his prowess as a kicker, Gogolak is a significant figure in the history of pro football. When he moved from the Buffalo Bills to the Giants, Gogolak became the first prominent player to leave the upstart American Football League for the NFL. Wellington Mara signed him after watching rookie Bob Timberlake miss 13 consecutive field goal attempts. Gogolak was also pro football's first soccer style kicker. Prior to Gogolak, placekickers approached the ball straight on, with the toe making first contact with the ball. Gogolak, who was born and played soccer in Hungary, approached the ball at an angle and kicked it with his instep — the style all kickers use today.

GEORGE MARTIN

Martin joined the Giants as an 11th-round draft choice in 1975, the 262nd overall pick. A long shot to survive his first train-

ing camp, Martin stayed with the Giants for his entire 14-year career. He played in 201 regular season games to become one of just three players in team history to cross the 200-games barrier (Strahan played in 216 games and Howard Cross played in 207). Martin was a leader and catalyst on the 1986 Super Bowl champions (he sacked John Elway for a safety in Super Bowl XXI). He had a knack for making the big play, scoring six touchdowns, a record for NFL defensive linemen since broken by Miami's Jason Taylor. Martin also caught a touchdown pass when he lined up as a tight end in 1980. He is perhaps happiest that he is joining his close friend Carson in the Ring of Honor.

PHIL SIMMS

Simms was George Young's first draft choice in 1979 and he played his entire 15-year with the Giants. He overcame a series of injuries early in his career to become the most productive quarterback in team history. Simms holds the Giants career records for pass attempts (4,647), completions (2,576), yards (33,462) and touchdowns (199). He was 95-64 (.597) as a regular season starter and 6-4 in the playoffs. But Simms is best remembered for his almost flawless performance in leading the Giants to victory in Super Bowl XXI. He completed 22 of 25 passes — including all 10 of his throws in the second half — for 268 yards, three touchdowns and no interceptions in a 39-20 rout of the Denver Broncos. In one of the easiest votes in history, he was selected the game's Most Valuable Player.

MICHAEL STRAHAN

Few players in Giants history were as dependable and productive as Strahan. He seldom missed a practice and played in a franchise-record 216 regular season games. Beginning in 1996, he played in 136 consecutive games before tearing his pectoral muscle midway through the 2004 season. Strahan was selected to seven Pro Bowls, was named the 2001 NFL Defensive Player of the Year and was the Giants' Most Valuable Player that year and in 1998. He was a captain on the 2007 Super Bowl championship team. His 141.5 sacks are the highest official total in team history (Taylor had 142.0 but 9.5 as a rookie in 1981, the year before sacks became an official statistic) and the fifth-highest total in NFL history. He set the league's single-season sack record with 22.5 in 2001 and his NFL-best 18.5 sacks in 2003 made him the Giants' only two-time league leader in that category. Strahan's 868 tackles indicates he was also an excellent defender against the run.

JESSIE ARMSTEAD

Armstead, a five-time Pro Bowler, was the 207th player chosen in the 1993 draft, and the last of the Giants' seven selec-

tions (the first-round pick had been used on quarterback Dave Brown in the previous year's supplemental draft). Three of the seven players taken were linebackers: Marcus Buckley (No. 66) and Tommy Thigpen (No. 123), who never did much, and Armstead, who did it all. Armstead's draft was the last that had an eighth round. He was a special teams dynamo and top-flight reserve his first three seasons before becoming the starting weakside linebacker in 1996. Armstead had a team-high 114 tackles, the first of five consecutive seasons with more than 100. The next year, he had a career-best 134 stops, was selected to his first Pro Bowl and was a catalyst as the Giants won the NFC East title. In 2000 he had one of his best seasons and the Giants routed Minnesota, 41-0, in the NFC Championship Game.

AMANI TOOMER

Toomer joined the Giants in 1996 as a second-round draft choice from Michigan and played his entire 13-year career with the team. He played in 190 regular season games, the fourth-highest total in Giants history. He also played in 11 postseason games, scoring two touchdowns in the Giants' victory over the Cowboys in a 2007 NFC Divisional Playoff Game and finishing with a team-high six receptions in the Super Bowl XLII triumph over New England. Toomer holds franchise records for catches (668), receiving yards (9,497), touchdown catches (54) and 100-yard receiving games (22). He finished his career with 82 more receptions than runner-up Barber (586) and 4,063 more yards than former record-holder Gifford (5,434). Toomer caught at least one pass in a Giants-record 98 consecutive games before the streak ended in the 2005 season opener vs. Arizona. He holds the Giants' single-season record with 1,343 receiving yards in 2002. Toomer had the three highest single-season receptions totals in team history until Steve Smith shattered his former mark of 82 with 107 catches last year. Toomer also holds the Giants' postseason records for receptions (44), yards (608) and touchdowns (seven). No one else in Giants playoff history has more than three postseason touchdown catches. In addition, Toomer is second in Giants history with 10,924 total yards (Barber is first with 17,359). His total includes 1,060 yards on punt returns, 257 yards on kickoff returns and 110 yards rushing.

TIKI BARBER

Barber joined the Giants as a second-round draft choice in 1997. When he retired following his 10th season in 2006, his name was all over the franchise's record book. Barber owns the Giants marks for rushing attempts in a career (2,217) and in a season (357 in 2005) and rushing yards in a career (10,440), a season (1,860 in 2005) and a game (234 at Washington on Dec. 20, 2006 in his final regular season game). Barber has the top three and four of the top five single-season rushing totals in Giants history and the two highest game totals. His 38

100-yard games are twice as many as No. 2 Joe Morris and his nine 100-yard games in 2004 is another record. Barber has the longest run from scrimmage in Giants history (95 yards at Oakland on Dec. 31, 2005) and his 55 rushing touchdowns are another one of his records. Barber's 17,359 all-purpose yards give him another record. He owns the Giants' top five single-season total yardage figures. Another one of his records is 13 catches at Dallas on Jan. 2, 2000. Barber is also second in franchise history with 586 career receptions. He was selected to three Pro Bowls (2004-06).

CLASS OF 2011

ALEX WEBSTER

Webster played his entire 10-year career (1955-64) for the Giants. He played in 109 games and 47 years after his retirement, he is fourth on the Giants' career lists with 4,638 rushing yards and 1,196 carries. He also caught 240 passes for 2,679 yards and scored 56 touchdowns (39 rushing, 17 receiving). Webster was the second-leading rusher and scorer and the third-leading receiver for the 1956 NFL champion Giants. He was selected to the Pro Bowl in 1958 and 1961, when he ran for a career-high 928 yards. Webster was the Giants' head coach from 1969-73. Webster passed away on March 3, 2012, just three months after being inducted into the Ring of Honor.

BRAD VAN PELT

Van Pelt played for the Giants from 1973-83, when the team had only one winning record, but he was one of the team's very best players. Van Pelt joined Carson, Brian Kelley and later Lawrence Taylor to form the famed group of linebackers known as the "Crunch Bunch." He was selected to play in the Pro Bowl every season from 1976-80. Van Pelt played in 143 games for the Giants in four home stadiums - Yankee Stadium, Yale Bowl, Shea Stadium and Giants Stadium—and for five head coaches - Bill Arnsparger, John McVay, Ray Perkins and Bill Parcells. He had 16 interceptions for the Giants. Van Pelt died on Feb. 17, 2009.

CARL BANKS

Banks was the third overall selection of the 1984 NFL Draft and played for the Giants through the 1992 season. He was one of the premier run-stoppers of his era, a standout on the teams that won Super Bowls XXI and XXV, a Pro Bowler in 1987 and a member of the NFL 1980's All-Decade Team. Banks played in 126 regular season games and had 36.0 sacks, three interceptions and approximately 500 tackles. Banks is still closely affiliated with the Giants; since 2007, he has been an analyst on the Giants' radio broadcasts.

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MARK BAVARO

Bavaro is one of the finest all-around tight ends in Giants history. An outstanding blocker, he is also 10th on the franchise's career list with 266 receptions and 15th with 3,722 yards. Bavaro was a starter on the Giants' 1986 and 1990 Super Bowl championship teams and a Pro Bowler in 1986 and '87. In the Giants' first Super Bowl season, Bavaro led the team with 66 catches — twice as many as any teammate — for 1,001 yards to become the only tight end in Giants history with 1,000 receiving yards in a season.

DAVE JENNINGS

Jennings is the most prolific punter in Giants history. A member of the team from 1974-84, Jennings holds the franchise records for punts (931) and yards (38,792). He was selected to play in the Pro Bowl in 1978, '79, '80 and '82. He punted a career-high 104 times in 1979, twice punted for more than 4,000 yards in a season and had a career-best 44.8-yard average in 1980.

CLASS OF 2015

CHRIS SNEE

Snee joined the Giants as a second-round draft choice in 2004 from Boston College. That preseason, he became the starter at right guard and stayed in that position for 10 years. Snee was a two-time Super Bowl champion, a four-time Pro Bowler and an All-Pro in 2010. He started all 141 regular-season games and 11 postseason games in which he played. From 2005-11, he started 101 consecutive regular-season games (plus seven postseason games) before missing a game with a concussion. Snee missed only 19 games in his 10 seasons, including 13 in 2013, his final year.

OSI UMENYIORA

Umenyiora was a member of the Giants Super Bowl XLII and XLVI championship teams. A second-round draft choice in 2003, he played 10 seasons for the Giants. Umenyiora was selected to two Pro Bowls and is fourth on the franchise's career list with 75.0 regular-season sacks. XLVI. He was the only member of the 2007 world champions to play in the Pro Bowl. That season, the Giants had an NFL-high 53 sacks, thanks largely to their three outstanding defensive ends. Umenyiora led the way with 13.0. Tuck, another two-time Pro Bowler, had 10.0, and Strahan had 9.0 in his final season. On Sept. 23, 2007, Umenyiora set the Giants' single-game franchise record with 6.0 sacks of Philadelphia's Donovan McNabb in Giants Stadium. In 10 postseason games, Umenyiora had 5.5 sacks, tying him with Tuck for fourth on that franchise list.

JOHN JOHNSON

Johnson joined the team as an athletic trainer in 1948. He retired at age 90 following the 2007 season, ending a remarkable 60-year career with the franchise. Johnson was on the Giants' sideline for 874 regular-season and 34 postseason games, and he attended thousands of practices. Johnson worked with 12 head coaches, from Steve Owen to Tom Coughlin, and helped keep the Giants running through those 908 games. Generations of players revered Johnson for his wisdom, his friendship and his unique ability to perfectly tape an ankle. Johnson passed away on Feb. 28, 2016, a month shy of his 99th birthday.

JACK LUMMUS

Lummus' entire Giants career consisted of nine games in 1941. He was a 6-3, 200-pound two-way end who that season caught one five-yard pass for a Giants team that finished 8-3 before losing to the Bears in the NFL Championship Game on Dec. 21, two weeks after the attack on Pearl Harbor. On Jan. 30, 1942, with the United States fully engaged in World War II, Lummus gave up his football career to enlist in the Marine Corps Reserves. He was killed in the Battle of Iwo Jima in 1945. He becomes the second member of the Ring of Honor who was killed in a World War II battle. Al Blozis, an Army lieutenant, lost his life in combat in France just six weeks after he played in the 1944 NFL Championship Game vs. Green Bay.

CLASS OF 2016

TOM COUGHLIN

Coughlin was the Giants' head coach from 2004-15. His signature achievements were the Giants' victories against the New England Patriots in Super Bowls XLII and XLVI. Coughlin was just the second man to coach the Giants for at least 12 seasons. Only Hall of Famer Steve Owen, who reigned for 23 full seasons from 1931-53, led the team for a longer time period. With the Giants, Coughlin was 102-90 in the regular season, and 8-3 in the postseason. The 102 victories are second in franchise history to Owen's 151. Coughlin led the Giants to three NFC East titles and five playoff berths. His eight postseason triumphs tie him with Bill Parcells for the most ever by a Giants coach. Coughlin was the team's wide receivers coach from 1988-90, a tenure that ended with the team's victory in Super Bowl XXV.

ERNIE ACCORSI

Accorsi was the Giants' general manager from 1998-2006 after serving as an assistant under George Young for four

seasons. In Accorsi's nine years as G.M., the Giants won two NFC East titles, earned four postseason berths, and advanced to Super Bowl XXXV. He was instrumental in hiring two-time Super Bowl-winning coach Tom Coughlin. Accorsi made the most significant trade in Giants history when he acquired Eli Manning in a draft day deal in 2004. Manning led the Giants to a pair of Super Bowl victories and is without peer among quarterbacks in Giants history. Accorsi also brought in several other key players to the team that won Super Bowl XLII, including Antonio Pierce, Osi Umenyiora, and Plaxico Burress.

JUSTIN TUCK

A third-round draft choice from Notre Dame in 2005, Tuck played in 127 regular-season games with 90 starts in nine Gi-

ants seasons. He was a defensive catalyst on the teams that won Super Bowl XLII and Super Bowl XLVI, a two-time Pro Bowler, and four-time team captain. Tuck was credited with more than 500 tackles. His 60.5 sacks are officially the sixth-highest total in franchise history. Tuck also played in 10 postseason games. He had 5.5 sacks, including two sacks of Tom Brady in each of the Super Bowl victories, when a dominant defensive line was one of the vital components of the Giants' success.

The Giants' season ended with a shocking and heartbreaking defeat as they wasted a 38-14 third-quarter lead and fell to the 49ers. Four touchdown passes by Kerry Collins — three to Amani Toomer and one to Jeremy Shockey — a touchdown run by Tiki Barber and Matt Bryant's field goal gave the Giants what seemed to be a commanding 24-point lead with 4:27 left in the third quarter. But the 49ers mounted a quick and complete comeback. Terrell Owens caught a 26-yard touchdown pass from Jeff Garcia, who then ran 14 yards for another score. The Giants hurt themselves with five turnovers, including three Eli Manning interceptions on consecutive possessions in the second half (two by Marlon McCree and one by Ken Lucas). Steve Smith caught a touchdown pass and ran in for another score and John Kasay kicked three field goals for the Panthers. Before the Giants opened postseason play in an NFC Wild Card Game at Tampa Bay, Tom Coughlin had a simple message for his players: "Let's keep playing." So they did. Carrying their season-long road success into the playoffs, the Giants prevailed, 24-14, over the NFC South champion Buccaneers. They broke a four-game postseason losing streak that began in Super Bowl XXXV — in Raymond James Stadium, the home of the Bucs. The Giants also won their first playoff road game since the 1990 NFC Championship Game in San Francisco. They defeated Bucs quarterback Jeff Garcia, who had beaten them in the playoffs with the 49ers in 2002 and Philadelphia in 2006. Brandon Jacobs scored two touchdowns for the Giants, one on a five-yard reception, the other on an eight-yard run. Jacobs became the first Giants player in history with a rushing and receiving touchdown in the same postseason game. Amani Toomer caught a touchdown pass and Lawrence Tynes kicked a 25-yard field goal for the Giants. Eli Manning completed 20 of 27 passes for 185 yards, the two touchdowns and no interceptions as the Giants won a postseason game for the first time with him taking the snaps. The Giants entered the game with a minus-nine turnover differential, or minus-24 relative to the Bucs' plus-15. Yet they had three takeaways to none for the Bucs. The first, a fumble recovery by Corey Webster on the second-half kickoff, led to Tynes' field goal. The second, a Webster interception in the end zone, likely denied the Bucs points. The third, a pick by R.W. McQuarters with 1:53 remaining, sealed the deal. The Giants played without center Shaun O'Hara (knee) and cornerback Sam Madison (abdominal). But Grey Rugeamer

and Webster filled in superbly (the corner holding Joey Galloway to one nine-yard reception). They were among a large cast of key contributors. Toomer had a game-high seven catches for 74 yards. Rookie Ahmad Bradshaw came off the bench to rush for a game-high 66 yards. Michael Strahan had a career postseason high of nine tackles (eight solo). Gerris Wilkinson, who started for Kawika Mitchell (knee) had seven tackles (five solo). Tank Daniels had two special teams tackles and forced the fumble that Webster recovered. Zak DeOssie also had two special teams tackles. The offensive line allowed only one sack. Tampa Bay took an early lead on Earnest Graham's one-yard run, but Jacobs' two touchdowns gave the Giants a 14-7 halftime advantage. The first score successfully concluded an eight-play, 53-yard drive that took 4:04 to complete. Manning completed five passes for 49 yards in the series. Toomer accounted for 40 yards on three catches. On their next series, the Giants drove 65 yards in seven plays. The biggest play of the series was Manning's 21-yard pass to Steve Smith on third-and-two. Tynes' field goal and Toomer's touchdown midway through the fourth quarter extended the Giants' lead to 24-7 before Tampa Bay added a late score. Toomer scored at the end of a 15-play, 92-yard drive that featured 38 yards rushing by Bradshaw and three Toomer receptions for 27 yards.

The Giants avenged their only road defeat of the season, a 45-35 opening-night loss, with a 21-17 victory over the top-seeded Dallas Cowboys in an NFC Divisional Playoff Game in Texas Stadium. The Cowboys had defeated the Giants twice in the regular season. The Giants became the first team to beat the NFC's No. 1 seed in the divisional round since the current postseason format (six teams from each conference) was adopted in 1990. Amani Toomer scored a pair of touchdowns on receptions of 52 and four yards from Eli Manning. Brandon Jacobs' one-yard touchdown run with 13:29 remaining provided the Giants with the game-winning points. But the victory was not assured until R.W. McQuarters intercepted Tony Romo's pass for Terry Glenn in the end zone with nine seconds remaining. It was the game's only takeaway. Manning had a career-high 132.4 passer rating after completing 12 of 18 passes for 163 yards, the two scores to Toomer and no interceptions. The Giants played with a severely depleted secondary. Sam Madison (stomach) and Kevin Dockery (hip flexor) were inactive. A third cornerback, Aaron Ross, left the game for good in the third quarter with a shoulder injury. That left Corey Webster, McQuarters and Geoffrey Pope — who spent the entire regular season on the practice squad before joining on the active roster on Dec. 31 — as the only healthy corners. All played extensively in the second

half. The secondary, aided by a relentless second-half pass rush, stayed strong throughout the game. The Cowboys scored on Tony Romo's five-yard touchdown pass to Terrell Owens and Marion Barber's one-yard run in the second quarter and Nick Folk's 34-yard field goal in the third. Romo completed 18 of 36 passes for 201 yards and his 64.7 rating was less than half of Manning's. Toomer turned a short Manning pass into a 52-yard touchdown on the Giants' fifth offensive play. After Dallas took a 14-7 lead, Manning led the Giants on a 71-yard drive in the final minute of the half that ended with a four-yard scoring pass to Toomer and a 14-14 halftime tie. Folk gave the Cowboys a 17-14 lead before Jacobs' touchdown on the third play of the fourth quarter gave the Giants the lead for good. But the Cowboys had one last chance when they took possession at the Giants' 48-yard line with 1:50 remaining. Dallas soon faced second-and-11 at the 23. Two incomplete passes left them staring at a fourth down with the seasons of both teams hanging in the balance. Owens was double covered, so Romo threw to the center of the end zone for Terry Glenn. But McQuarters stepped up and picked off the pass, sending the Giants to the NFC Championship Game.

The coldest game in Giants history was also one of the most memorable and satisfying the franchise has ever played. The Giants overcame the elements — and the Packers — to defeat Green Bay in overtime, 23-20, in the NFC Championship Game in frigid Lambeau Field. Lawrence Tynes provided the game-winning points when he kicked a 47-yard field goal with 2:35 elapsed in overtime. Tynes had missed his previous two attempts, including one on the final play of regulation. It was the first time in the history of Lambeau that a visiting player had kicked a field goal of more than 40 yards in a postseason game. The score was set up by Corey Webster's interception on the second play of overtime. The temperature at game time was minus-one degree with winds of 12 miles-an-hour — a numbing wind chill of minus-23. In terms of temperature alone, this was the third-coldest NFL game on record. At the famed Ice Bowl between the Packers and Dallas Cowboys in Lambeau on Dec. 31, 1967, it was 13 below zero at kickoff. In the 1981 Chargers-Bengals AFC Championship Game in Cincinnati, it was nine below. Brandon Jacobs (one-yard run) and Ahmad Bradshaw (four-yard run) scored touchdowns and Tynes added a 29-yard field goal for the Giants. Eli Manning set career postseason highs with 40 passes, 21 completions and 251 yards. Plaxico Burress established a franchise postseason record with 11 catches, for 151 yards. The old mark of 10 was set by Ike Hilliard in the 2000 NFC Championship Game victory over Minnesota. Defensively, the Giants held Green Bay to 28 rushing yards, forced Favre into two late interceptions and limited the Packers to one suc-

cessful third down conversion on 10 tries. The Giants dominated the game statistically, outgaining Green Bay (380-264), rolling up 11 more first downs (24-13) and owning the ball for 40:01 to just 22:34 for the Packers. The Packers scored on Driver's 90-yard catch-and-run and Favre's 12-yard touchdown pass to Donald Lee, plus field goals by rookie Mason Crosby of 36 and 37 yards. Crosby's second field goal, with 11:46 remaining in the fourth quarter, tied the score at 20-20. The Giants had a chance to prevent the score when R.W. McQuarters intercepted a Favre pass at the eight-yard line. But McQuarters was hit by Ryan Grant and fumbled and the ball bounced right to Packers tackle Mark Tauscher, who plucked it out of the air at the 19. It was the Giants' first turnover of the postseason... In overtime, Favre threw a pass to Driver, but Webster stepped up and picked off the ball, returning it nine yards to the Green Bay 34-yard line. Ahmad Bradshaw gained five yards on two runs before Manning's pass for Steve Smith fell incomplete. Tynes then sent the Giants to the Super Bowl with one of the biggest field goals in franchise history.

Super Bowl XLII had a perfect ending, but the unexpected twist was that it belonged to the Giants. Eli Manning engineered a fourth quarter comeback drive for the ages and concluded perhaps the greatest postseason run in NFL history as the underdog Giants upset the previously undefeated New England Patriots, 17-14, in Super Bowl XLII in University of Phoenix Stadium in Glendale, Ariz. The Giants won their third championship of the Super Bowl era — the first in 17 years - and seventh overall in what will surely be remembered as one of the most exciting title games in NFL history. It was the first of 42 Super Bowls in which the lead changed hands three times in the fourth quarter. Plaxico Burress scored the game-winning points with only 35 seconds remaining on a 13-yard pass from Manning. The score concluded a 12-play, 83-yard drive that commenced immediately after New England had taken a 14-10 lead with less than three minutes remaining. Manning, voted the game's most valuable player, completed 19 of 34 passes for 255 yards, two touchdowns and an interception, which deflected off Steve Smith's hands. David Tyree scored the Giants' first touchdown and made an unbelievable catch on the game-winning drive. Ahmad Bradshaw and Brandon Jacobs combined for 87 rushing yards. Amani Toomer caught six passes for 84 yards and Smith added five for 50 yards.



Lawrence Tynes kicked a 32-yard field goal, which ultimately proved to be the deciding points. The Giants' defense was magnificent. New England averaged almost 37 points a game in the regular season. The Giants held them to 14. The Patriots averaged 411.3 yards a game, but totaled only 274 in the Super Bowl. The Patriots rushed for only 45 yards and did not have a run longer than nine yards. Tom Brady was sacked five times. Brady's six-yard touchdown pass to Randy Moss gave the Pats a 14-10 lead with just 2:42 remaining. Cornerback Corey Webster slipped on the play and New England reached the end zone at the end of a 12-play, 80-yard drive. Manning responded by completing five of nine passes for 77 yards on the game-winning drive. The one everyone will long remember came on a third-and-five from the Giants' 44. Manning, seemingly about to be sacked, escaped, steadied himself and fired a pass down the middle of the field for Tyree, who was closely covered by safety Rodney Harrison. Both players jumped for the ball, which somehow landed on top of Tyree's helmet. But the receiver wrestled the ball away from Harrison for what may well be the greatest catch in Super Bowl history. The 32-yard gain gave the Giants a first down at the New England 24. Three plays later, Smith picked up a huge first down and Manning followed with the game-winning throw to Burress.

The Giants picked a bad day to have a bad day and saw their championship reign come to an end in a 23-11 home loss to the Philadelphia Eagles. The Giants lost just two home games in the 2008 season - both to Philadelphia. They outgained the Eagles, 307-276, including 138-59 on the ground, but were doomed by an inability to take advantage of opportunities in dose. The Giants advanced as far as Philadelphia's 17-yard line three times - and had a first down on the 11 on their initial possession - but settled for field goals each time. The Giants converted only three of 13 third down opportunities. Their last five possessions ended, in order, with a missed field goal, twice on downs, an interception and a fumble. The Giants scored on John Carney field goals of 22, 34 and 36 yards and a safety when Donovan McNabb was penalized for intentional grounding in the end zone. Carney also missed field goal attempts of 46 and 47 yards. Philadelphia got a one-yard touchdown run from McNabb, a one-yard scoring pass to tight end Brent Celek and David Akers field goals of 25, 35 yards and 20 yards. The Giants used a smothering defense and an opportunistic, big-play offense to rout the Falcons, 24-2, their first postseason victory since Super Bowl XLII and their first home playoff win since the 2000 NFC Championship Game triumph over Minnesota. Eli Manning threw three touchdown passes - four and 72 yards to Hakeem Nicks and 27 yards to Mario Manningham. The Giants also got a 22-yard field goal from Lawrence Tynes. Manning completed 23 of 32 passes for 277 yards. Brandon Jacobs ran for a career postseason high 92 yards and Ahmad Bradshaw added 63 as the Giants ran for 172 yards, 50 more than their previous high total in the 2011 season. The Giants' 442 net yards was their third-highest total in a postseason game. The defense was even more dominant. The unit did not allow a point - the Falcons' only score was on a safety. Atlanta rushed for only 64 yards, including 41 on 15 carries by Michael Turner, who ran for 1,340 yards in the regular season. The Giants stopped the Falcons on 10 of 14 third down attempts and all three of their fourth-down conversion tries, including a pair of fourth-and-one quarterback sneaks by Matt Ryan.

For the second time in five seasons, the Giants traveled to Wisconsin in January and stunned a higher-seeded Green Bay Packers team. They rode a terrific defensive effort and three Eli Manning touchdown passes to defeat the top-seeded, 15-1, defending Super Bowl Champion Packers, 37-20, an NFC Divisional Playoff Game in Lambeau Field. It was the third time the Giants eliminated the defending Super Bowl champions from the playoffs. In 1985, they defeated the 49ers in an NFC Wild Card Game in Giants Stadium, 17-3 and five years later, they beat the Niners in San Francisco in the NFC Championship Game. The Giants again showed they know how to play exciting NFC championship games. More importantly, they know how to win them. Just as they did four years earlier, the Giants advanced to the Super Bowl with a thrilling overtime victory on the road in the conference title game. In rainy and windy Candlestick Park, Lawrence Tynes kicked a 31-yard field goal with 7:54 elapsed in the extra period to give the Giants a 20-17 victory over the San Francisco 49ers. The game-winning kick was set up by an overtime takeaway when Devin Thomas recovered a Kyle Williams fumble on a punt return that was forced by Jacquian Williams. In the fourth quarter, Thomas had recovered a Kyle Williams fumble on a punt, setting up Eli Manning's 17-yard touchdown pass to Mario Manningham. The officials originally ruled that Williams didn't touch the ball and that Thomas had merely downed it. Tom Coughlin challenged the ruling and after review, referee changed the call to a fumble and a recovery. Manning threw for 316 yards and two touchdowns while setting Giants postseason records with 58 passes and 32 completions. The other touchdown was scored by Bear Pascoe, his first as a professional. Tynes kick another 31-yard field goal. Victor Cruz had 10 receptions for 142 yards, including eight for 125 in the first half. The Giants won their fourth Super Bowl and eighth championship in franchise history in a game that was eerily similar to their victory over the same opponent in Super Bowl XLII four years before. Eli Manning completed his first nine passes and 30 of 40 overall for 296 yards and a touchdown to win his second Pete Rozelle Trophy as the game's Most Valuable Player. He was at his best in the fourth quarter, when he hit 10 of 14 passes for 118 yard, including a pinpoint 38-yarder to Mario Manningham to start the game-winning 88-yard, nine-play masterpiece that was completed in 2:49. Despite being sack five times, Green Bay quarterback Aaron Rodgers threw for 362 yards, and became the first Giants opponent to throw four touchdown passes in a playoff game. Randall Cobb scored on three of them, another record, including one on a Hail Mary on the final play of the first half. Davante Adams caught Rodgers' other touchdown pass. Aaron Ripkowski scored on a one-yard run and Mason Crosby kicked a 32-yard field goal for Green Bay's other points. The Giants took an early 6-0 lead on Robbie Gould field goals of 26 and 40 yards. Their only other score was Eli Manning's 41-yard touchdown pass, which pulled the Giants to within 14-13 in the third quarter. But the Packers scored the game's final 24 points.
