SINCE 2014, TEMPLE FOOTBALL HAS...

- Beaten an SEC team (Vanderbilt) for the first time in 76 years (Florida in 1938).
- Posted the largest margin of victory in 40 seasons – a 59-0 shutout over Delaware State.
- Beaten a ranked team at home for the first time ever (#21 East Carolina in 2014 and #21 Memphis in 2015) and just the third and fourth times ever beating a ranked team. Previous time was 16 years ago.
- Beaten a ranked team in each of the past three seasons.
- Beat Penn State for the first time in 74 years and 40 tries.
- Beat Cincinnati for the first time in 30 years and six tries.
- Won three consecutive games on the road for the first time in 45 years.
- Started a season 7-0 for the first time ever.
- Became ranked in the Top 25 for the first time since 1979 (36 years).
- Won a game as a ranked team (at East Carolina, at SMU, vs. UConn) for the first time in 74 years.
- Had ESPN's College Gameday broadcast a Temple football game for the first time ever...from Philadelphia, no less.
- Played in Temple's first-ever ranked vs. ranked football games – against Notre Dame and at Houston.
- Ranked in the Top 25 for four consecutive weeks and for seven weeks total - both for the first time ever.
- Had a national award winner - Bronko Nagurski and Chuck Bednarik Award - for the first time since 1974 (when Steve Joachim won the Maxwell Award).
- Had a player earn first-team All-American honors for the first time since 1986.
- Become bowl eligible for three consecutive season for the second time in school history.
- Posted back-to-back road game shutouts for the first time since 1925.
- Had three shutouts in a season for the first time since 1945.
- Won 20 games in a two-year span for the first time ever.
- Posted 10 wins for only the second and third times (1979, 2015, 2016).
- Won its first Conference Championship since 1967 and its first Conference Championship Game ever.

1st Season at Temple

Geoff Collins accepted the head coaching position at Temple University on December 14, 2016, becoming the 27th head football coach in Owls' history. Armed with 23 years of coaching experience, Collins has proven to be a driven leader who is not bashful about the word love. He has demonstrated a love for his players and they have reciprocated that passion in their actions and words.

"I could not speak more highly of Coach Collins," said Houston Texans' LB Benardrick McKinney who played for Collins at Mississippi State. "He has done so much for shaping the player I am today. He coached aggressively with a tremendous amount of energy and fun. He loved his players. Coach Collins would do anything for us, on and off the field. Not only did he train us to be the best defensive players we could be on the field, but also the best men we would be off the field."

Collins' creative spirit has paid dividends on and off the field. Whether devising original game-plans, creating new methods to teach, or splashy ways to pursue recruits, Collins' ideas are mimicked throughout college football.

He has been recognized as one of the leading assistant coaches in the nation numerous times and is the only coach to be a Broyles Award nominee, given to the nation's best assistant coach, at three schools [FIU (2010), MSU (2014) and Florida (2015)].

"The excitement over Temple football has been growing for years, and Geoff is going to ensure that Temple's reputation for quality on the field and in the classroom is going to continue," said President Richard M. Englert. "Our student-athletes are great representatives of this university and make me proud every time I see them play."

"Geoff Collins is an extraordinary leader, and it's clear he is the right person to take an already successful program and advance it to the next level," added the University's Board of Trustees Chairman Patrick J. O'Connor. "We are thrilled to have him join the Temple University community."

Collins is an alumnus of Western Carolina University, where he played defensive back and linebacker. Collins has coached all over, beginning at his alma mater, and most recently working in the SEC at both Florida, where he helped the Gators to back-to-back SEC East Division Titles, and Mississippi State in the role of defensive co-

ordinator. Over the course of his career, Collins has helped guide 31 of his student-athletes to careers in the National Football League.

"As soon as I met with Geoff I knew right away that this was the right coach at the right time for Temple University," said Director of Athletics Dr. Patrick M. Kraft. "Well beyond Geoff's acumen as a coach of hard, physical football, he shares our values of embracing the student-athlete and demanding excellence in all that we do."

Collins first began at Florida in 2015, hired by Jim McElwain to be on his initial staff at the school. Collins' opportunity to serve as defensive coordinator at Florida was his second defensive coordinator job in the SEC, as he held the same title at Mississippi State for two seasons.

The Florida defense was relentless under the guidance of Collins, finishing the season ranked eighth nationally in 2015. His Gators' defense was also ranked third in the SEC during that time, only allowing 310.2 yards per game. Collins' defense also set a number of other records during his time in Gainesville, including being one of only seven FBS teams in the last 20 years to not allow a touchdown against three FBS Power 5 schools on the road, in a single season.

In the 2015 season alone, Collins helped prepare three players who eventually earned first-team All-SEC honors, including CB Jalen "Teez" Tabor, DL Jon Bullard, and CB Vernon Hargreaves. Hargreaves was also a consensus first team All-American in 2015. In total, five of Collins' defensive players were selected in the 2016 NFL Draft; two first round selections (CB Vernon Hargreaves and S Keanu Neal) along with DT Jonathan Bullard (3rd), LB Antonio Morrison (4th), and DE Alex McCalister (7th), along with Brian Poole who started for the Falcons in the Super Bowl after joining Atlanta as a rookie free agent.

The Florida team capitalized on the success of its defense in 2016, finishing 8-4 on the year and earning its second straight SEC East Division Title. The unit finished among the nation's best in multiple categories - first in pass efficiency (92.87), second in pass defense (148.5), third in defensive scores (5), fourth in red zone defense (71.8), fifth in total defense (293.0), sixth in scoring defense (16.8 ppg), and seventh in first downs allowed (206). Collins also helped three of his players earn All-SEC selections in the 2016 season. Florida's defensive unit developed seven more draft picks in 2017, including four in the first two rounds.

Prior to his time at Florida, Collins was a member of the coaching staff at Mississippi State. Originally hired to serve as the linebackers coach and co-defensive coordinator for the 2011 season, Collins was promoted to the position of defensive coordinator in 2013.

Mississippi State had tremendous success while he was on the coaching staff, most notably the 2014 season, when the Bulldogs when they were ranked #1 in the country for most of the season and finished with a 10-3 record. This 10-win season was the best finish at the school in 15 years, and concluded with a berth in the Orange Bowl. Collins' defense was dominant that season, producing the most sacks in the SEC (37), as well as the #1 ranked red zone defense and ninth ranked scoring defense in the country.

The season prior, Mississippi State went 7-6 and defeated Rice in the Liberty Bowl, 44-7. Collins' unit was one of the best in the SEC. In his first season as full-time defensive coordinator, his defense ranked among the SEC's top five in a number of categories, including fourth in total defense (349.3 yards per game), fourth in rushing defense (144.2 yards per game) and fifth in passing defense (205.2 yards per game). He also held his last three opponents during the 2013 season to just 11.3 points per game.

In 2012, the Bulldogs finished the year 8-5 and made an appearance in the Gator Bowl. That year, Collins tutored DB Darius Slay, a second team All-SEC selection. Along with Slay, who was picked in the second round of the NFL Draft, Collins helped prepare a number of other Mississippi State players for careers in the NFL, including Jim Thorpe Award winner CB Jonathan Banks (2nd round), Will Redmond (3rd round), and DT Josh Boyd (5th round).

During his first season on the staff, Mississippi State finished the season 7-6 as the Bulldogs went to the Music City Bowl, defeating Wake Forest, 25-17. In Collins' first season as a co-defensive coordinator for the Bulldogs, he helped mentor DT Fletcher Cox, a first team All-American and first team All-SEC selection in 2011. Cox was selected 12th overall in the first round of the NFL draft by the Philadelphia Eagles, and earned All-Pro honors in 2014 and 2015.

Collins' ability to mold a defense was evident well prior to his time in Mississippi State and Florida. Before coaching in the SEC, he sharpened his teeth as the defensive coordinator and linebackers coach at Florida International University in 2010. During that season, his defense was ranked first in the Sun Belt Conference in total defense, scoring defense, pass defense efficiency, and turnover margin. This, off of the prior year when the team was ranked 119th in total defense nationally. This dramatic turnaround led Collins to be named a finalist for the Broyles Award in 2010, an award for the top assistant in college football.

Before joining the staff at FIU, Collins was a linebackers coach and recruiting coordinator under head coach George O'Leary at UCF for two seasons. In 2009, he was part of a staff that led the Knights to an 8-5 record and a berth in the St. Petersburg Bowl. Even though UCF did not make a bowl game in 2008, he had the defense ranked second in Conference USA in total and scoring defense.

Collins also spent some time working at both the University of Alabama and Georgia Tech. In 2007, he worked at Alabama as the director of player personnel under head coach Nick Saban and had the #1 recruiting class in the country. That class included Mark Ingram Jr., the 2008 Heisman Trophy winner and the first-ever by an Alabama

player. He spent the 2006 season at Georgia Tech as director of player personnel. Georgia Tech secured their best recruiting class in team history that year as well.

Between the years of 2002 and 2005, Collins was the defensive coordinator at his alma mater Western Carolina. Collins' defense was continually ranked near the top nationally at the FCS level while under his guidance. In 2005, the team was ranked first nationally in pass defense and 18th in total defense. The team also led the So-Con conference in rushing defense for the first time in program history in that season.

From 1999-2000, Collins served as a graduate assistant at Georgia Tech under O'Leary. During that time, the Yellow Jackets had a 25-12 record, including reaching three consecutive bowl games. In Collins' last season at Georgia Tech he was promoted to tight ends coach under current Houston Texans' head coach Bill O'Brien and the Yellow Jackets defeated the Stanford Cardinal in the 2001 Seattle Bowl, 25-12.

Collins got his chance at being a defensive coordinator at Albright College from 1997-1998. Before that, he was a linebackers coach for the Fordham Rams for the 1996 season. In 1995, he was an assistant coach for Franklin High School in North Carolina. He began his coaching career at his alma mater, Western Carolina University, contributing as a student assistant during the 1993 and 1994 seasons.

Collins played college football at WCU as an outside linebacker and defensive back from 1989-1992. He totaled 194 career tackles during his four year career with the Catamounts. As a junior, he was the team's fifth-leading tackler (68), while registering 6.0 tackles-for-loss. As a senior, he helped Western Carolina to a 7-4 record, totaling 62 total tackles and 5.0 tackles-for-loss.

The Conyers, Ga., native was born April 10, 1971. He and his wife, Jennifer (formerly Haynes), have one daughter, Astrid (one).

LB BENARDRICK MCKINNEY – Originally recruited as a two-star quarterback out of high school, he developed into a 2014 First-Team All-SEC selection and 2012 Freshman All-SEC selection. Named an All-American by numerous media outlets and left school after his junior year in 2014 for the NFL Draft. MSU's leading tackler in 2013 and 2014 and ended his career with 244 tackles.

CB DARIUS SLAY – Second Team All-SEC selection in 2012. Played two seasons at MSU and finished his career with six interceptions. Drafted 36th overall in the 2013 NFL Draft by the Detroit Lions.

DL FLETCHER COX – First Team All-American and All-SEC in 2011. Amassed 114 tackles, 24.5 tackles-for-loss and 8.5 sacks during his career. Selected with the 12th pick in the 2012 NFL Draft. Named a Second Team All-Pro after the 2014 season.

FLORIDA

CB VERNON HARGREAVES – Was a three-time All-American and All-SEC Selection at corner back. Played three seasons at UF prior to declaring for the NFL Draft after his junior year. Was selected in the first round by the Tampa Bay Buccaneers with the 11th overall pick.

DB BRIAN POOLE – Despite joining Atlanta as an undrafted free agent, made the transition to the pro game quickly and helped the Falcons to the Super Bowl in his rookie year. Played in all 16 games with nine starts during the regular season and played in all three playoff games starting two, including SBLL.

LB ALEX ANZALONE – A tremendous leader who, despite missing most of his freshman and junior years to shoulder injury, was a second day draft choice by the New Orleans Saints.

CB TEEZ TABOR – Was a first team All-SEC player as a sophomore in 2015 and junior in 2016. Declared for the NFL Draft as a junior and was selected by Detroit in the second round (53rd overall).

CB QUINCY WILSON – Played in 39 games in three seasons recording six interceptions. Earned second team All-SEC honors as a junior.

10th Season at Temple

Ed Foley begins his 10th season at Temple after being retained by Geoff Collins. Collins will be the fourth Owls' head coach Foley has worked under. He was named interim head coach after Matt Rhule's departure, and led the Owls in the 2016 Military Bowl presented by Northrup Grumman. Once again he leads the tight ends and special teams units. Previously he served as the Owls' recruiting coordinator and tight ends coach/assistant offensive line coach for three seasons.

Special teams continued to build on its success in his second year at the helm. Over the past two seasons no school has more than Temple's 12 blocked kicks, or 17 over the past three seasons. Since 2013, the Owls are tied for the most blocked kicks in the nation while Sharif Finch is the current NCAA leader in career blocked kicks among active players with five. Foley helped mentor freshman kicker Aaron Boumerhi to second-team all-conference honors after being substituted for Austin Jones when he went down with an ACL injury at Memphis. With a combined 21-of-25 on the season for Jones and Boumerhi, Temple's kickers ranked at the top of the conference in FG percentage. Also, as a tight end coach, he helped Colin Thompson earn honorable mention all-conference.

In 2015, he made an immediate impact on special teams in his first year as the coordinator. Temple blocked an NCAA leading seven kicks, Jahad Thomas tied a team record with a 100-yard kickoff return for a touchdown, and Austin Jones set the school record for field goals made (23) and points by a kicker (113).

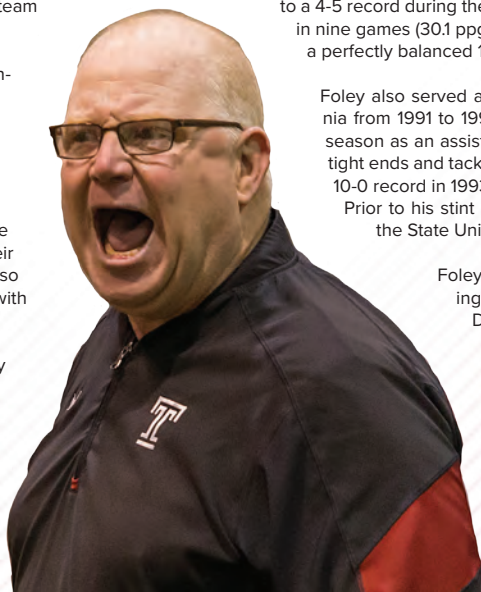
In 2013, Foley helped develop former QB Chris Coyer into a tight end. That progress was hindered due to nagging injuries but Coyer closed out his senior campaign with 129 receiving yards and a TD in the season finale.

In 2010, Foley's tight ends and offensive line helped the team to an 8-4 regular-season record. The Owls recorded back-to-back winning seasons for the first time since 1978-79. A school record six offensive players earned All-MAC accolades, including first-team honorees TE Evan Rodriguez, OL Colin Madison, and OL Darius Morris. Madison and Morris became the first repeat first-team All-MAC recipients in school history.

In 2009, the tight ends and offensive line helped TU win a single-season record nine consecutive games en route to a 9-4 overall record and first-place tie in the MAC East. Five offensive players were named All-MAC, including senior TE Steve Maneri and four linemen. Juniors Colin Madison and Darius Morris earned First Team accolades.

In his first season with the Owls in 2008, Foley helped Temple to its most wins in nearly two decades. The Owls out-scored their opponents for the season for the first time since 1990. Foley also helped Temple bring in its fourth highly touted recruiting class with Al Golden being the head coach.

A native of Cherry Hill, NJ, Foley returned to the City of Brotherly Love after spending two seasons at Hofstra as the assistant head coach, offensive coordinator, and offensive line coach. The Pride offense blossomed under Foley in his first year as coordinator, increasing its yardage total from 269 to 388 yards per contest from the previous year. The Pride's scoring output also increased from 16.8 to 26.9 points per game. Foley also brought balance to the Pride attack as Hofstra's rushing total was its highest since 2000 (145 yards/game) and its passing attack netted 243 yards per contest. Charles Sullivan left as the all-time leader in receptions and yards



after catching 86 balls for 991 yards under Foley's tutelage.

Prior to joining the Pride, Foley served seven years at Fordham University, including two seasons as head coach from 2004-05. After a 5-6 record in 2004, a season in which the Rams dropped four games by a touchdown or less, Fordham slipped to a 2-9 mark in 2005. As Fordham's offensive coordinator and offensive line coach from 1999 through 2003, Foley helped rejuvenate a program that rose to the top of the Patriot League in 2002, when it won its first-ever league title with a 10-3 record. In 2003, the Rams compiled a 9-3 overall record and had 12 players named to the All-Patriot League Team, including six members on the offense, four of whom were named to the first team.

Under Foley's guidance, the Fordham offense set numerous team and individual records. The Rams set a team record for most rushing yards in a season in 2003, gaining 1,657 yards, while also setting a school record for most pass completions in a season with 255. In 2002, Fordham led the Patriot League in passing offense and scoring offense, while finishing second in total offense and setting a team record for most points in a season. In addition to winning the Patriot League title that season, the Rams advanced to the NCAA I-AA Playoffs, where they defeated Northeastern University in the first round.

In 2001, Foley helped the Fordham offense develop its first 1,000-yard rusher on the NCAA Division I-AA level, as well as the first-ever 1,000-yard receiver in Fordham's history. The Rams had the second-ranked passing offense in the Patriot League in 2001 as well as the second-best scoring offense. In 2000, Foley's offense established a running game that generated 1,635 yards (an average of 148.6 per game), the most for a Fordham team on the I-AA level until the 2003 team gained 1,657.

Foley arrived at Fordham after spending the 1998 season as the offensive coordinator and offensive line coach at Jacksonville University, which sponsored a football team that year for the first time in the school's history. Foley helped lead the Dolphins to a 4-5 record during their inaugural season, as the offense scored 271 points in nine games (30.1 ppg). The Dolphin attack averaged 380 yards per game, a perfectly balanced 190 yards rushing and passing per game.

Foley also served as an assistant coach at the University of Pennsylvania from 1991 to 1993, and again from 1995 to 1997, spending the 1994 season as an assistant at Williams College. At Penn, Foley coached the tight ends and tackles for five years and helped the Quakers to a perfect 10-0 record in 1993, when they also won the Ivy League Championship. Prior to his stint at Penn, Foley served as the offensive line coach at the State University of New York (SUNY) at Albany for two years.

Foley was a three-year starter at Bucknell University, playing offensive guard for one season and center for two. During his junior year, he was named the team's top lineman, and he served as a captain during his senior year. He earned a bachelor's degree in psychology from Bucknell in 1989 and a master's degree in educational psychology at SUNY Albany in 1991.

Foley and his wife Rebecca have two sons, Charlie (17) and Luke (10), and a daughter Sara (8). His brother Glenn was a seven-year NFL veteran quarterback, playing with the New York Jets and Seattle Seahawks from 1993 to 2000.

1st Season at Temple

Taver Johnson joined the Temple University staff in January 2017 as the defensive coordinator under new head coach Geoff Collins.

Johnson came to Temple with 23 years of coaching experience, spending the previous three years as Purdue's defensive backs coach. He mentored a talented group that saw a defensive back finish first on the team in tackles during his first two seasons - safeties Landon Feichter with 105 in 2014 and Leroy Clark with 88 in 2015.

Prior to joining the Boilermakers, Johnson was the defensive backs coach at the University of Arkansas in 2013 after spending the 2012 season as an assistant head coach and linebacker's coach. Under his guidance, safety Alan Turner recorded a team-high 97 tackles during the 2013 season.

Before crossing state borders, the Ohio native coached 13 years in his home state. From 2007-11 he was the defensive backs coach at Ohio State under former head coach Jim Tressel. During Johnson's tenure Ohio State landed nine Big Ten All-Academic DBs, four first-team All-Big Ten DBs, and two consensus All-American DBs in Malcolm Jenkins (2008) and Chimdi Chekwa (2010). Five players from Johnson's secondary, including Jenkins, went on to be drafted into the NFL.

Under Johnson's leadership, Jenkins accumulated 57 tackles, 4.0 TFLs, nine pass breakups, three interceptions, three forced fumbles, and two blocked kicks during his All-American campaign. He also earned the Jim Thorpe award in 2008 while earning first-team All-Big 10 honors in 2007 and 2008.

Prior to Ohio State, Johnson spent six seasons at Miami (Ohio) University. He started as the Redhawks' linebackers coach from 2000-2003 before being promoted to assistant head coach/defensive coordinator two seasons later (2005-06). In his first three years, he built a championship defense, which eventually climbed to the 35th total defense, 22nd scoring defense, and the 19th rushing defense in 2003. In 2005 the unit was fifth in the nation in turnover margin.

During that 2003 season, the team went undefeated in conference play and maintained a 13-1 overall record. After a 21-3 loss at Iowa, the Redhawks began a 13-game winning streak that began with a 44-14 dismantling at Northwestern and concluded with a MAC championship and a 48-29 victory over Louisville in the GMAC Bowl. Under Johnson's guidance, three linebackers propelled to first-team All-MAC status during his first four years with Ohio.

Among his stops, he spent the 2004 season in the NFL as Cleveland Browns special teams coach and the 1999 season as a defensive graduate assistant at Notre Dame.

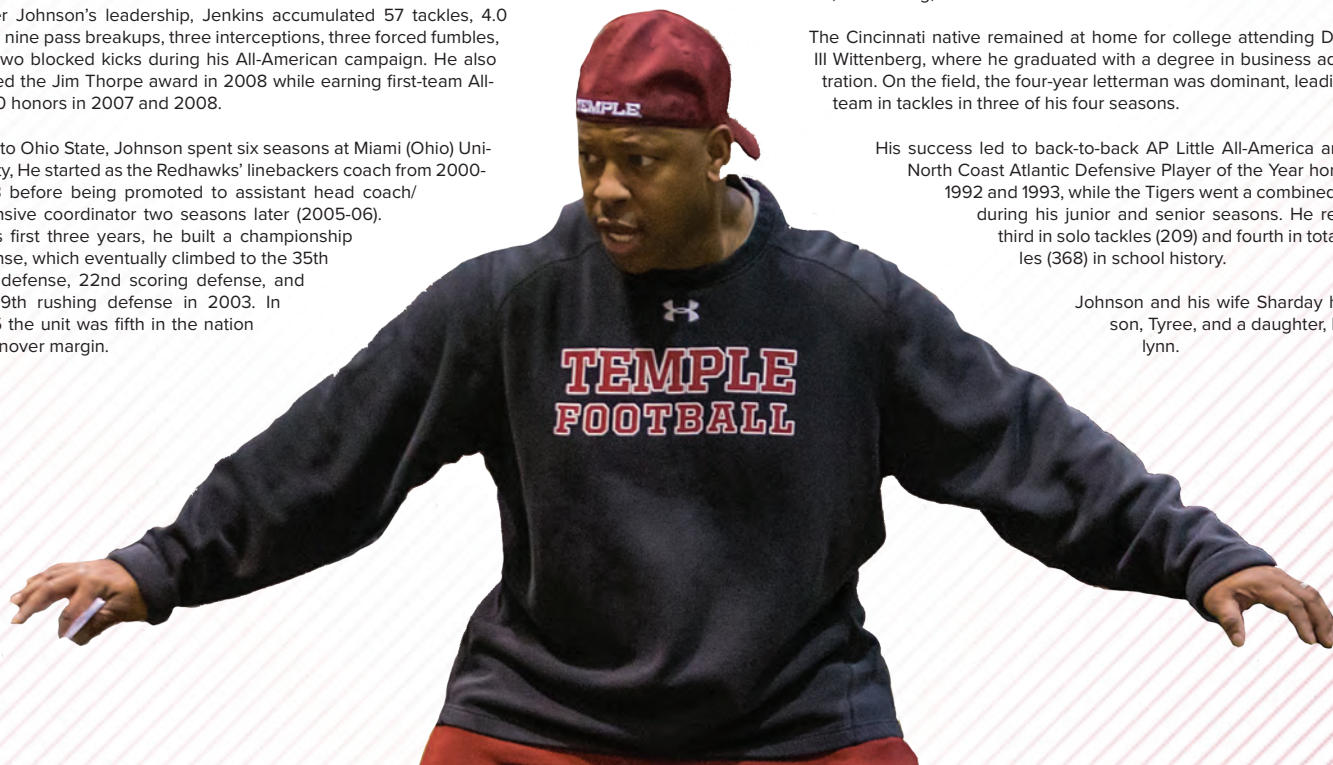
Before making his way to Notre Dame, Johnson coached at DIII Millikin, taking on three roles as linebackers coach (1996-98), strength and conditioning coach (1996), and defensive coordinator (1998).

In 1998, Johnson tutored four all-conference players - LB Bob Meyer (1st), DT Carlos Burns (1st), Servera Gilbert (1st), and DB Tony Frierdich (2nd) - to turn the unit into the second best defense in the College Conference of Illinois and Wisconsin, and first in scoring defense. This helped lead the team to an 8-2 record and an NCAA playoff berth. The Big Blue eventually fell in the first round to Johnson's alma mater, Wittenberg, 13-10.

The Cincinnati native remained at home for college attending Division III Wittenberg, where he graduated with a degree in business administration. On the field, the four-year letterman was dominant, leading the team in tackles in three of his four seasons.

His success led to back-to-back AP Little All-America and All-North Coast Atlantic Defensive Player of the Year honors in 1992 and 1993, while the Tigers went a combined 17-2-1 during his junior and senior seasons. He remains third in solo tackles (209) and fourth in total tackles (368) in school history.

Johnson and his wife Sharday have a son, Tyree, and a daughter, Brooklyn.

1st Season at Temple

Dave Patenaude, who has spent the past five seasons as the offensive coordinator/quarterbacks coach for Coastal Carolina, enters the same role for the Owls on head coach Geoff Collins' new coaching staff.

This past season, Patenaude propelled the Chanticleers to a 10-2 record for their third 10-win season in the past five years. The offense averaged 37.3 PPG while finishing in the FCS top five for multiple offensive categories. That season, Patenaude mentored two All-Americans including De'Angelo Henderson, who left Coastal Carolina as the all-time leader in eight different rushing categories and was a finalist for the Walter Payton FCS offensive player of the year twice.

From 2013-15, Patenaude tutored quarterback Alex Ross, who became the most decorated quarterback in Coastal Carolina's history. At the conclusion of his career, Ross became the first quarterback to be a three-time first team Big South selection and win the conference's offensive player of the year twice. Ross broke almost every single passing and total offensive record for the Chanticleer, while breaking multiple conference records as well. He set Big South career marks for total offense, touchdowns responsible for, and most rushing touchdowns by a quarterback. He was a 2015 finalist for the Walter Payton FCS offensive player of the year during his senior season.

Coastal Carolina had seven All Big South players on offense during the 2014 season and two All-Americans, which included Ross and offensive lineman Chad Hamilton. That year, the Chanticleers finished first in nine different offense categories in the Big South and had the 13th highest scoring offense in the FCS. CCU continued building from its 2013 season as the offense was FCS top five in five different categories along with having broken 25 of the school's single-season offensive records. Patenaude also produced another finalist for the Walter Payton FCS offensive player of the year in Lorenzo Taliaferro, as he ranked third in the FCS in rushing touchdowns and yards that season.

Patenaude's ability to run an efficient offense became evident in his first season with CCU. In 2012, Coastal Carolina came close to breaking many program highs including rushing for 2,590 yards -- then second-best total in program history and passing for 3,101 yards. They posted a then school-record 5,691 yards of total offense, ranking first in the Big South and 18th nationally with an average of 437.8 yards of total offense per game.

Prior to CCU, Patenaude spent two seasons as the offensive coordinator and quarterbacks coach for Georgetown. In 2011, the Hoyas went 8-3, which was a four-game improvement over the previous year,

and ended up being a runner-up in the Patriot League behind Lehigh. In his first year at Georgetown, Patenaude helped the Hoyas achieve one of the team's most productive offense seasons in the previous 10 years with 3,230 yards.

Patenaude arrived at Georgetown after spending three years on Hofstra's coaching staff. When he initially joined the Pride, Patenaude served as the quarterbacks coach and passing game coordinator during the 2007 season under current Temple coach Ed Foley who was offensive coordinator at the time. The following season, Patenaude was promoted to offensive coordinator and stayed in that role from 2008-09, until the program shut down. During the 2008, the Pride ranked top five in the conference for rushing and was ranked 7th in total offense. In 2007, he mentored senior Brian Savage (Houston Texans' QB Tom Savage's brother) to fourth in the conference and 15th in the FCS in total offensive yards.

For three years, Patenaude served as a part of Holy Cross coaching staff. During the 2004-05 season, he was the team's running back coach and tutored RB Steve Silva, who was a two time All-American RB during those years and led the nation in all-purpose yards during the 2005 season. The 2006 season saw Patenaude switch to wide receivers coach and he added special team's coordinator to his decorated resume.

Patenaude served as the head coach of the University of New Haven during the 2002-03 season before the program was dropped. During his time there, he led the Chargers to five wins and helped mentor OL Phil Bogle to reach the NFL, the school's first player to go pro since 1996.

Prior to reaching a head coaching position, Patenaude spent four years on Columbia's coaching staff. He served as the wide receivers coach from 1998-2000 and added coaching the quarterbacks during the 2000 season. In 2001, he was promoted to offensive coordinator for the Lions, where he helped the offense average 28.6 points over its last four games.

Prior to going to Columbia, he spent four seasons at Fordham University. During his time with the Rams, Patenaude served many different roles as he was hired as a tight ends coach (1994), became special teams coordinator and wide receivers (1995-97) and quarterback coach as an extra role during his final two seasons (1996-97). It was during this time that he first worked with Temple head coach Geoff Collins.

Patenaude began his collegiate coaching career in 1991 as running backs coach at the United States Coast Guard Academy. After one season at the Coast Guard Academy in New London, Conn., he moved on to Springfield (Mass.) College, where he served as wide receivers and running backs coach in 1992 and 1993. While at Springfield, he completed a master's degree in physical education and sports management.

A 1990 graduate of Central Connecticut University, Patenaude was a three-year starting quarterback and free safety for the Blue Devils. He and his wife, Christine, have two daughters, Eva (12) and Estelle (7).

1st Season at Temple

Stan Hixon joined the Temple Owls in March 2017 as wide receivers coach. A 36-year coaching veteran with 10 seasons in the NFL where he helped both Houston and Washington reach the playoffs, he spent the 2016 season consulting at both the professional and college ranks.

Hixon is reunited with Temple head coach Geoff Collins. Hixon was the Georgia Tech wide receivers coach in 1999 while Collins was a graduate assistant. Hixon has spent many years under Bill O'Brien and Chan Gailey, two of Collins' mentors.

Hixon spent four seasons under O'Brien including two with the Houston Texans after following him from Penn State.

In 2014, Hixon coached one of the top wide receiver duos in the NFL in DeAndre Hopkins and Andre Johnson. Under Hixon, Hopkins had a breakout second season in the pros, setting career highs with 76 receptions for 1,210 yards and six touchdowns. He also managed to eclipse 2,000 yards receiving for his career and became the second-youngest player in NFL history to do so. Additionally, veteran Andre Johnson led the team with 86 receptions and had 936 yards receiving in his 12th season in the league. Johnson and Hopkins had the third-most combined yards receiving of any teammates in the AFC with 2,146 in 2014. Johnson departed in 2015 as a free agent but Hopkins continued to develop setting team records in receptions (111), receiving yards (1,521) and touchdowns (11) en route to the playoffs and his first Pro Bowl berth.

In his time at Penn State (2012-13), Hixon coached Allen Robinson to two of the most prolific seasons for a wide receiver in PSU history as Robinson set school records with 97 receptions and 1,432 yards during the 2013 season. Robinson finished his three-year career at Penn State ranked second in career receptions (177) and third in receiving yardage (2,474) despite only having three catches for 29 yards in the season prior to Hixon's arrival.

Hixon spent the 2010 and 2011 seasons as wide receivers coach of the Buffalo Bills under Gailey. In 2010, he helped Stevie Johnson breakout on the NFL scene, posting career highs and leading the Bills in receptions (82), receiving yards (1,073), and touchdowns (10) and was only the fourth wide receiver to post 1,000 yards and 10 touchdowns in a season in team history.



From 2004-09 Hixon was with the Washington Redskins where he guided a veteran unit, led by Santana Moss and Antwaan Randle El. Under Hixon's tutelage in 2008, WR Moss had 79 receptions for 1,044 yards and six touchdowns. This marked the third 1,000-yard receiving season of Moss's career, and his second with 75 or more catches. Additionally in 2008, Randle El recorded 53 receptions for 593 yards and four touchdowns. Hixon guided Moss to a breakout season in 2005 that ended with his first trip to the Pro Bowl. Moss set a new Redskins' franchise record with 1,483 receiving yards on the season finishing second in the NFL.

Prior to joining the Redskins, Hixon coached four years at LSU (2000-03), where he coached eight players at the college level that went on to careers in the NFL. He served as associate head coach in addition to wide receivers coach and was part of the Tigers' 2003 NCAA National Championship team. Under Hixon's guidance, three Tigers had 1,000-yard receiving seasons and he had a player named All-SEC three times.

In 2001, Hixon coached Josh Reed to one of the most dominating seasons ever by a receiver in SEC history. Reed caught a school-record 94 passes for an SEC-record 1,740 yards and seven touchdowns. He was named an All-American and won the Fred Biletnikoff Award, given to college football's top wide receiver. Reed completed his three-year college career, two of which were coached by Hixon, with a then-SEC record 3,001 receiving yards on 167 receptions.

Prior to LSU, Hixon coached wide receivers at Georgia Tech (1995-99), developing a pair of All-ACC receivers in Kelly Campbell and Dez White. He previously coached running backs for two seasons at Wake Forest (1993-94).

Hixon served as wide receivers coach at South Carolina (1989-92), producing All-American Robert Brooks and Eddie Miller, and at Appalachian State (1983-88). He began his college coaching career overseeing running backs at Morehead State (1980-82).

Hixon was a standout receiver at Iowa State. He starred in the Peach Bowl in 1977 and the Hall of Fame Bowl in 1978. A native of Lakeland, Fla., he earned his bachelor's degree in physical education from Iowa State and earned his master's degree at Morehead State. Hixon and his wife, Rebecca, have three children - son Drew and daughters Adele and Avis - and seven grandchildren.

PROMINENT PLAYERS COACHED

HOUSTON

WR ANDRE JOHNSON - A seven-time Pro Bowl selection who hold nearly every Houston Texans' receiving record. Played 12 years with Houston after being the #3 selection in the NFL Draft in 2003. Retired in 2016 ranked #11 all-time in the NFL in receptions (1,062), and #10 in receiving yards (14,185), along with 70 career touchdowns.

WR DEANDRE HOPKINS - Left Clemson after three seasons as the school's all-time leader in receiving yards (3,020) and touchdown receptions (27). Was Houston's first round selection in 2013 (27th overall). Under Hixon's guidance caught 187 passes for 2,731 yards and 17 touchdowns in two seasons en route to a Pro Bowl berth and second team All-NFL recognition.

WASHINGTON

WR SANTANA MOSS - A 14-year NFL veteran who completed his career with 732 receptions for 10,283 yards and 66 touchdowns. His most productive season was 2005, his first with Hixon, when he caught 84 passes for 1,483 yards and 9 scores en route to his first Pro Bowl. His 1,483 yards set a Redskins' record and was the second most in the NFL that season.

WR ANTWAAN RANDLE EL - A former college quarterback and first team All-American, he carved out a nine-year NFL career as a wide receiver and returner.

BUFFALO

WR STEVIE JOHNSON - An eight-year NFL receiver who amassed 336 catches for 4,267 yards and 31 touchdowns in his career. In his two years with Hixon (2010-11), had his best seasons and nearly half of his career totals (158-2,077-17TDs).

PENN STATE

WR ALLEN ROBINSON - During 2013 season was named first-team All-American by Sporting News and second-team All-American by Phil Steele. During 2013 season, he had 97 receptions for 1,432 receiving yards and 6 touchdown receptions, while starting all 12 regular season games.

LSU

WR MICHAEL CLAYTON - During his career, he caught 182 passes for 2,582 yards and 21 TDs, which was the most by any Tiger at the time. He is the only player in LSU history to have at least 700 yards receiving in three straight seasons, and named all-SEC three times.

WR JOSH REED - He was awarded the Biletnikoff Award in 2001 as the best receiver in college football. He was a first-team all-SEC selection in 2000 and 2001, and a consensus All-American in 2001. He holds the SEC season record for receiving yardage per game (145.0 in 2001) and is second in career receiving yardage per game (96.8).

GEORGIA TECH

WR DEZ WHITE - One of 10 semifinalists for the Biletnikoff Award during 1999 season. Second-team all-Atlantic Coast Conference selection and the Yellow Jackets leading receiver with 46 catches for 973 yards and nine touchdowns

1st Season at Temple

Tony Lucas joined Temple University as the running backs coach under head coach Geoff Collins.

Lucas spent the previous four seasons (2013-16) at Delaware in the same position (2013-2016), where he turned the Blue Hens into a top-five rushing attack in the Colonial Athletic Association (CAA).

In his first year at Delaware, the offense ranked fourth in the CAA in rushing, which helped the offense finish second in the conference in scoring. He mentored RB Andrew Pierce, who was named second-team All-CAA, and put on the Walter Payton Award Watch List during his senior season.

In 2014, the unit was led by the dynamic duo of Jalen Randolph and Wes Hills who kept the Blue Hens' ground game among the top five in rushing average in the CAA and sixth in total offense. The pair combined for 15 TDs and 1,603 rushing yards.

During the 2015 season, Lucas helped mentor the young running back tandem of redshirt freshman Thomas Jefferson and sophomore Kareem Williams. The two kept the Blue Hens' running game ranked second in the CAA and 17th in the NCAA (219.4 yards per game).

A balanced attack was established from the Blue Hens' rushing game in 2016, where Hills, Jefferson and Randolph each compiled over 600 yards on the ground and combined for 20 touchdowns. The trio propelled the rushing offense finish second in the CAA for the second-straight year.

Under Lucas' mentoring, Randolph became a three-time COSIDA District 2 first-team All-Academic (2014, 2015, and 2016) and three-time CAA All-Academic selection (2013, 2014, and 2015). Hills was a

third-team CAA all-conference in 2016, while Jefferson earned CAA co-rookie of the year honors and was put on the CFPA FCS National Freshman Performer of the Year Watch List in 2015.

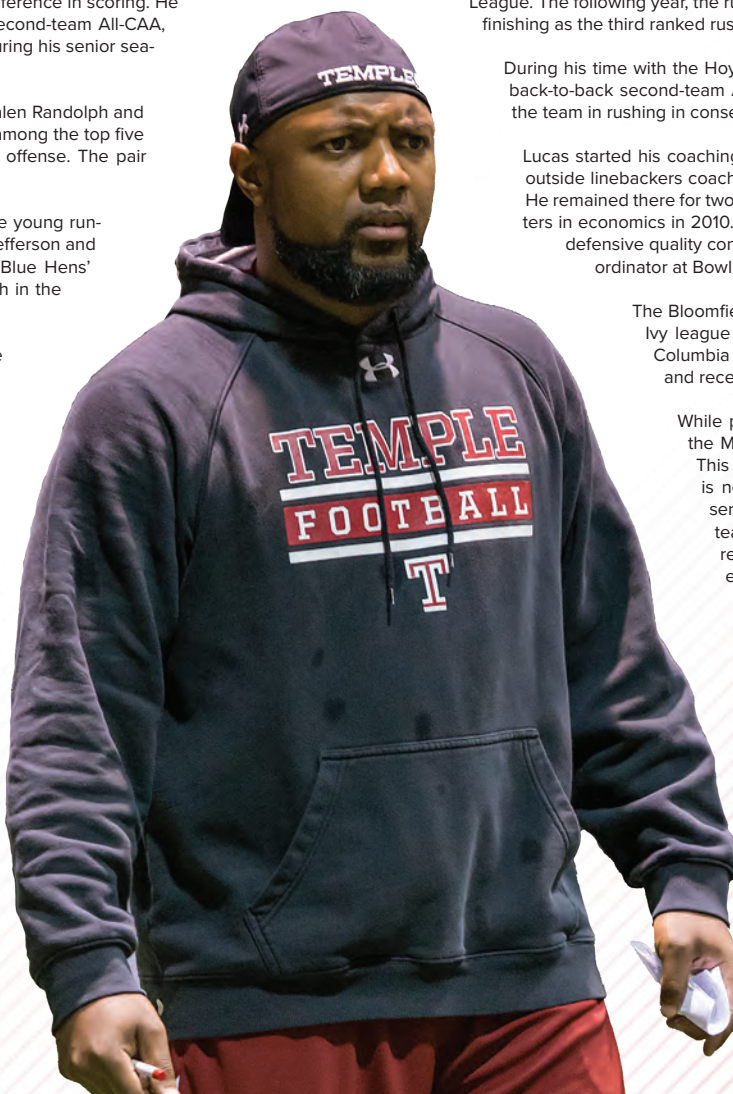
Prior to Delaware, Lucas spent two seasons (2011-12) at Georgetown University, where he was part of new Temple offensive coordinator Dave Patenaude's staff. In Lucas' first season as the running backs coach, the Hoyas went 8-3 behind the second ranked rushing offense (147.5) and scoring offense (27.0) in the Patriot League. The following year, the running attack continued its stellar play, finishing as the third ranked rushing offense in the conference (146.1).

During his time with the Hoyas, Lucas guided Nick Campanella to back-to-back second-team All-Patriot League honors after he led the team in rushing in consecutive years.

Lucas started his coaching journey as a graduate assistant and outside linebackers coach at Division III Trinity College in 2008. He remained there for two seasons, while he completed his masters in economics in 2010. Later that year, he left to become the defensive quality control coach and assistant academic coordinator at Bowling Green.

The Bloomfield, Conn. native's roots stem from the Ivy league where he played defensive back for Columbia University. He majored in economics and received his bachelor's degree in 2003.

While playing at Columbia, Lucas was given the Maniatty-Remmer Unsung Hero Award. This award is given to a player whose role is not always obvious to the outside observer, but without his contributions, the team would not be as successful. The recipient is one who strives to be a leader and performs his assignments to the best of his ability without expecting or requiring any public recognition.

1st Season at Temple

Jim Panagos begins his first season at Temple University as the defensive line coach under head coach Geoff Collins.

Prior to joining Temple, Panagos gained over 10 years of experience in coaching defensive lines, first serving at UCF for five years (2007-2011) and then Rutgers for four years (2012-2015), and one year at Pittsburgh (2016).

At Rutgers in 2012, Panagos made an immediate impact on the Scarlet Knights as the defensive unit finished fourth in the nation in scoring defense (14.15 points allowed/game) and 10th in total defense. The defensive line played a huge part in the scheme by cumulating 7.3 tackles-for-loss (16th ranked in the country) and holding opponents to 97.2 rushing yards per game (sixth). He also tutored DT Scott Vallone, who had a career-high 52 tackles and first-team All-Big East honors.

Then in 2014, Panagos steered DT Darius Hamilton and DE Kemoko Turay to all-conference honors during the Knights transition from the Big East to the Big Ten. Hamilton led the defense with 11.5 tackles-for-loss, including a career-best six sacks. Turay picked up a team-high 7.5 sacks, ranking eighth among Big Ten players.

Prior to Rutgers, he spent five years with the UCF. There he helped the program to three bowl appearances, including a 10-6 victory over Georgia in the 2010 Liberty Bowl where the Knights were ranked 24th in the country. His front four created havoc for QB Aaron Murray, forcing him into two interceptions, to go along with three sacks.

In his first season, the defense recorded 39 sacks (15th in the country). During the 2009 season, the defense erupted for 38 sacks (7th in the country), held opposing offenses to 82.5 rushing YPG (3rd in the nation) and finished 11th in the nation in TFLs.

FootballScoop.com named Panagos its National Defensive Line Coach of the Year in 2009. Bruce Miller (13) and Jarvis Geathers (11) both hit double-digits in sacks while tackle Torell Troup was a second round selection in the NFL Draft by the Buffalo Bills.

Miller earned conference USA Defensive Player of the Year honors in 2009 and again in 2010. Miller would eventually be drafted by the San Francisco 49ers after leading the Knights in TFLs and sacks in three seasons under Panagos guidance (2008-10).

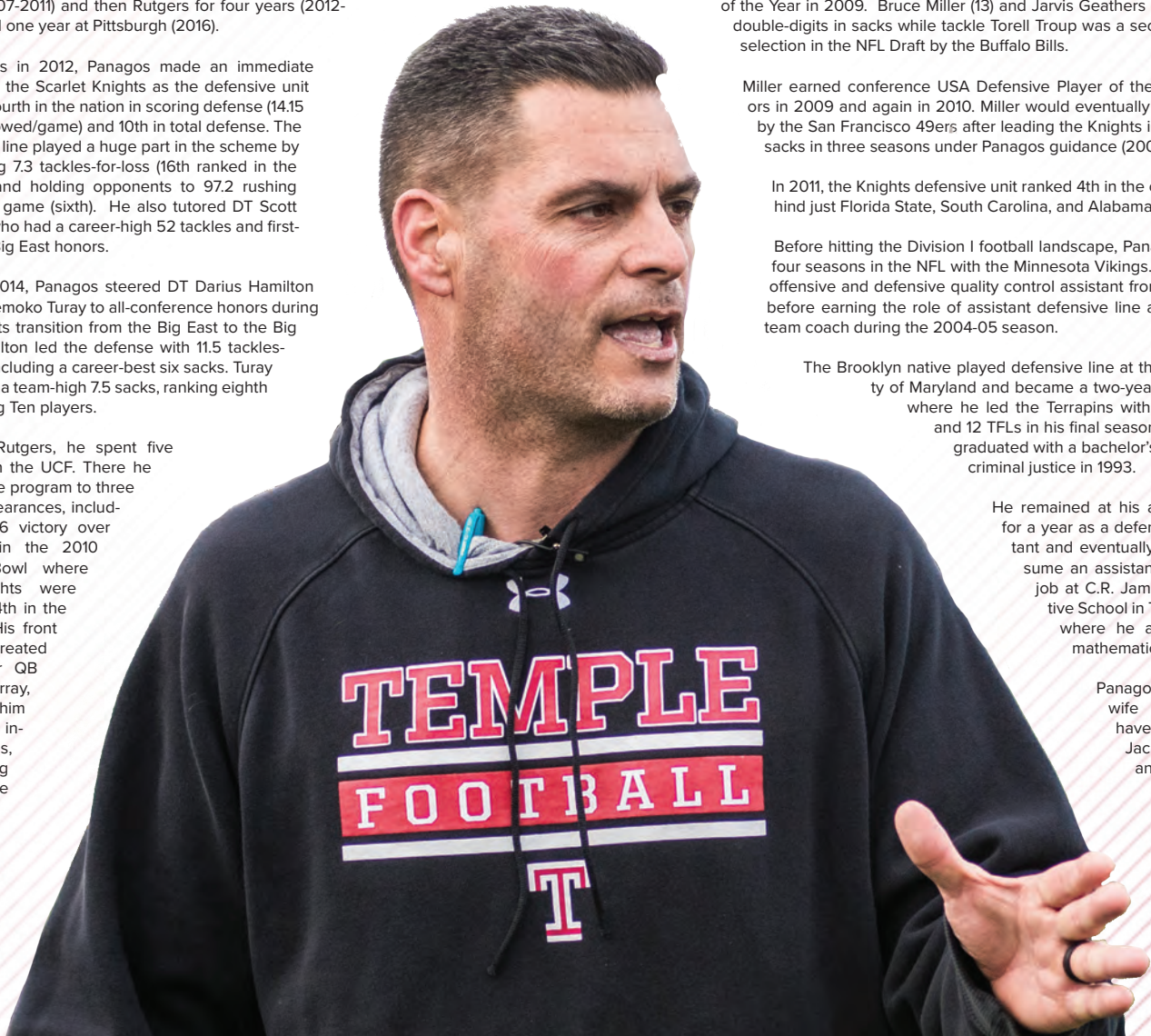
In 2011, the Knights defensive unit ranked 4th in the country behind just Florida State, South Carolina, and Alabama.

Before hitting the Division I football landscape, Panagos spent four seasons in the NFL with the Minnesota Vikings. First as an offensive and defensive quality control assistant from 2002-03 before earning the role of assistant defensive line and special team coach during the 2004-05 season.

The Brooklyn native played defensive line at the University of Maryland and became a two-year letterman where he led the Terrapins with five sacks and 12 TFLs in his final season. There he graduated with a bachelor's degree in criminal justice in 1993.

He remained at his alma mater for a year as a defensive assistant and eventually left to assume an assistant coaching job at C.R. James Alternative School in Tampa, Fla., where he also taught mathematics.

Panagos and his wife Maureen have three kids: Jack, Hayden, and Olivia.

1st Season at Temple

Andrew Thacker was named Temple's linebacker coach in January 2017.

Thacker came from Kennesaw State, where he served as a linebackers coach during the 2016 season. He helped guide the team to an 8-3 record, which was the program's best in their short history. That season, linebackers Anthony Gore and Izzy Sam led the Owls in tackles and were both second-team All-Big South selections. He was also a big part of a defense that ranked first in Big South in scoring (27.1) and rushing defense (130.3) and second in total defense (321.8).

Prior to Kennesaw State, Thacker was the safeties coach at UCF in 2015, returning to the Knights' program after previously serving as a defensive graduate assistant from 2008-09. While coaching the safeties, Thacker was also responsible for recruiting the Northern Florida area.

Thacker returned to the Knights following one season as a defensive assistant with the Atlanta Falcons. In 2014, he helped Atlanta rank 12th in the NFL in interceptions and assisted LB Paul Worrlow to pick up 142 tackles, which ranked fifth in the league that year. In 2013, Thacker was the safeties coach at the University of Southern Mississippi. During that season, three of his safeties were top five on the team in tackles, including DeBarrius Miller who led the team with 92 tackles.

He previously served as the defensive graduate assistant from 2010-12 at Oklahoma State where he was mainly responsible for the linebackers. The Cowboys went 11-2 in 2010 and defeated Arizona in the Alamo Bowl. The 2011 season followed with more success, as they were the Big 12 Champions finishing with a 12-1 record and No. 3 final AP ranking after a win over Stanford in the Tostitos Fiesta Bowl. In 2012, Oklahoma State was 8-5 including a win over Purdue in the Heart of Dallas Bowl. He helped OSU's linebackers Caleb Lavey and Shaun Lewis achieve All-Big 12 honorable mention status in 2012.

While Thacker was a graduate assistant at UCF, he worked closely with current Temple head coach Geoff Collins who was the Knights' linebackers coach from 2008-09. In 2008, the Knights' defense allowed just 333.8 yards per game, led by All-Conference USA first team defensive backs Sha'reff Rashad and Joe Burnett. UCF recorded an 8-5 record in 2009 that included an appearance in the St. Petersburg Bowl. Defensive end Bruce Miller claimed the C-USA Defensive Player of the Year award, and he was joined by defensive mates Jarvis Geathers and Cory Hogue on the all-league first team.

Thacker played at Furman from (2004-07) where he started at safety for the Paladins. He was the 2004 Southern Conference Freshman of the Year and the 35-15 during Thacker's four year career, including making three NCAA FCS Playoff appearances.

The Cartersville, Ga., native received his bachelor's degree from Furman in political science and Spanish in 2007. He is married to the former Liza Calhoun and the couple has a daughter, Caroline Brooks.

4th Season at Temple

Chris Wiesehan (pronounced WEEZ-uh-han) enters his fourth season with the Owls and returns to coach the offensive line. During his 22-year coaching career, Wiesehan has coached nearly all offensive positions.

During the 2016 season, Wiesehan helped develop the running back duo of second-team All-Conference selection Jahad Thomas and sophomore Ryquell Armstead. The two rushed for a combined 1,836 yards while scoring 27 rushing TDs. They are the only pair of RBs in the nation to each rush for 900+ yards and 13 TDs this season.

The 2015 offensive unit for the Owls had three All-American Athletic Conference players in Kyle Friend, Eric Lofton, and Dion Dawkins. The O-line paved the way for running back Jahad Thomas, also an all-conference selection, to rush for over 1,000 yards and 17 touchdowns last season.

In his first season at Temple, Wiesehan oversaw an offensive line that cut its sack total by over 33% from the previous year. The line allowed just 21 sacks (down from 32) which was the third lowest total in 29 seasons. In fact, Temple quarterbacks were sacked just once every 19.2 pass attempts - the best mark in school history. The line performed admirably considering a midseason stretch of six games with six different line combinations.

Wiesehan's methods seemed to impact junior center Kyle Friend the most. Working with his third position coach in as many seasons, Friend earned recognition on every all-conference list.

Wiesehan came to Philadelphia from the University of Hawaii where he began as an offensive line/run game coordinator. He helped coach freshman center Ben Clarke, who received All-Mountain West honorable mention honors and received the team's Offensive Player of the Year award. After coaching the offensive line in 2012, Wiesehan moved to running backs coach in 2013.

Wiesehan traveled to UH after serving as wide receivers coach for the Winnipeg Blue Bombers of the Canadian Football League. In 2011, he helped Winnipeg to the Grey Cup. In his first year, he coached a group which boasted the second leading receiver in the league, Terrence Edwards, who finished with 1,372 yards and 12 touchdowns.

Wiesehan spent the 2009 season at UCLA as tight ends coach. The Bruins participated in the

Eagle Bank Bowl and tight ends Ryan Moya and Logan Paulsen signed with the Cleveland Browns and Washington Redskins, respectively.

From 2007-08, Wiesehan served as the offensive line coach at Syracuse. During his tenure, the Orange had their first 1,000-yard rusher in five seasons and two of his players were either drafted or signed by NFL teams. In addition, his offensive line cut the number of sacks allowed in half during his second year.

Prior to Syracuse, Wiesehan served as the offensive line coach at James Madison in 2006. In his only season, the Dukes won the Atlantic 10 South Division and led the conference in rushing. JMU also ranked 11th nationally in rushing and qualified for NCAA Division I-AA playoffs.

Wiesehan gained NFL experience by working as an offensive assistant for Tampa Bay in 2005. Prior to that, he coached at Northern Arizona from 2001-04, where he spent two seasons each as wide receivers coach and offensive line coach. At NAU, the line allowed the fewest sacks in the Big Sky while helping produce a 1,000-yard rusher, and six linemen earned all-conference honors. NAU also won the 2003 Big Sky Championship and qualified for the NCAA Division I-AA playoffs in 2001 and '03.

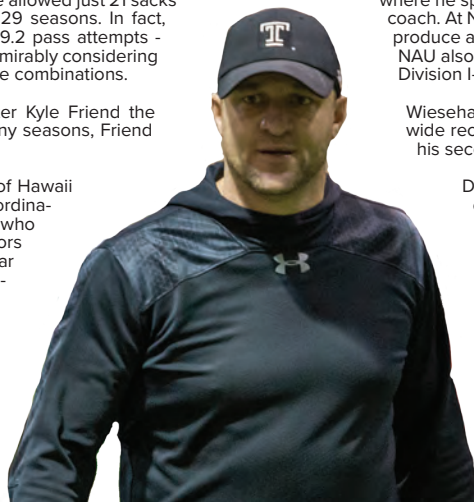
Wiesehan spent two seasons at Buffalo from 1999-2000, coaching the wide receivers and tight ends during his first season and offensive line in his second year.

During 1997-98, he was on staff at Notre Dame as the tight ends coach where the Irish participated in the Independence Bowl and the Gator Bowl. He spent the 1996 season coaching the tight ends at Purdue and mentored three-time Super Bowl champion New England Patriot Matt Light.

He began his coaching career at Fort Hays State from 1994-95 as the receivers coach, where he coached two All-Americans and four all-conference players. The school won the Rocky Mountain Athletic Conference and participated in the Division II National Playoffs.

As a player, Wiesehan was a wide receiver and kick returner at Wabash College (1990-93). As a senior, he served as team captain and earned All-America honors while being named his team's Receiver of the Year for the third time. He was inducted into its Hall of Fame in 2014.

Wiesehan and his wife, Renee, have one son, Colton.

In 2015, Dawkins was given fourth-team Phil Steele All-American honors while in 2016 he was a unanimous first team all-conference selection.

OL KYLE FRIEND - the first three-time captain in school history and one of the most respected players ever to wear the Cherry and White. A starter since his freshman year, he was a staple at the center position despite having three position coaches and two head coaches in his four seasons. Friend was recognized for his on field play - first-team All-American Athletic Conference, Rimington and Rotary Lombardi Award Watch Lists.

RB JAHAD THOMAS - three-year letterwinner and a team captain during his senior year. He was a two-time all-conference running back and scored 38 touchdowns over the last two seasons. In 2016, Thomas scored two touchdowns in nine out of his twelve games including his first six which was the longest streak in the nation last season and the longest streak in Owls' history. He left Temple third all-time in touchdowns (39), third in rushing touchdowns (30), sixth in rushing yards (2,599), and third in all-purpose yards (4,744).

HAWAII

RB JOE IOSEFA - Averaged better than 100 rushing yards per game, finishing the year with eight touchdowns.

UCLA

OL NATE CHANDLER - Multi-position player who began his college career at offensive line and was moved to tight end,

but spent the majority of his career on the defensive line and finished with 38 tackles, two sacks and two pass deflections. Signed by Carolina Panthers as a free agent in 2012.

TE CORY HARKEY - Played every game of his college career, totaling 213 yards on 28 receptions at tight end. Awarded Jerry Long "Heart" Award and Kenneth S. Washington Award for Outstanding Senior of the Year. Signed as a free agent by St. Louis in 2012.

TE RYAN MOYA - UCLA's outstanding senior in 2009. Placed on the 2009 John Mackey Award Watch List. Finished career as #3 UCLA all-time TE.

TE LOGAN PAULSEN - Teamed with Ryan Moya to form a dynamic duo at TE. A late bloomer who was signed by the Redskins and is a 5-year NFL veteran.

JAMES MADISON

OL DORIAN BROOKS - Started all 38 games in his last three seasons after transitioning from D-line to O-line. Second-team All-CAA and all-state. Signed as a free agent with Pittsburgh in 2010 and was a member of the Super Bowl XLV team.

NORTHERN ARIZONA

WR CLARENCE MOORE - Two-time first team All-Big Sky selection (2002 and 2003) and NAU's career receiving yards leader with 3,042 yards. Ranked 11th in Big Sky history, and one of 13 players ever in the Big Sky to top 3,000 career receiving yards. His 28 receptions for touchdowns rank #1 in NAU history and 10th all-time in conference history. Caught 182 passes for NAU, third all-time in Lumberjack history.

UNIVERSITY OF BUFFALO

WR DREW HADDAD - Holds school career record for receptions (240) and receiving yards (3,409) and single-season records in yards (1,158) and catches (85). Drafted in the 7th round of the 2000 draft by Buffalo Bills and also played with Indianapolis, San Diego, and Frankfurt Galaxy (NFL Europe).

WR ANDRE FORDE - Four-year letterwinner amassing 1,775 yards and 13 touchdowns on 125 receptions. Spent time with Chicago, Indianapolis, and Amsterdam Admirals (NFL Europe), as well as two seasons with Tulsa Talons (AFL).

Joe Battaglia was hired as a graduate assistant in January 2017. He will work with the offense.

Battaglia comes from Coastal Carolina where he spent the previous five seasons working as an offensive analyst with the quarterbacks and receivers under current Owls offensive coordinator Dave Patenaude. Ronell Williams enters his first season with Temple University as a graduate assistant.

Williams spent the 2016 season at Widener College as an assistant coach, specifically in training and developing the team's linebacker core. Under Williams' tutoring, the senior duo of Steve Gozur (89) and Tyrone Bundy (48) finished the season as the top-two tacklers on the team. Gozur went on to earn first-team All-Middle-Atlantic Conference (MAC) honors and rank first in the conference and 11th in Division III in solo tackles (69), while Bundy was a second-team All-MAC selection.

The former linebacker was a four-year letterman at Division II West Chester University, where he led the team in tackles for three straight seasons (2011-13). He became the first sophomore and third defensive player in school history to earn first-team All-America honors by the American Football Coaches Association (AFCA) in 2012.

He was also a three-time first team All-Pennsylvania State Athletic Conference (PSAC) and two-time first team All-Super Region 1 recipient at the middle linebacker position. As a junior, Williams was a finalist for the Cliff Harris Award, which is given to the top defensive player in all of small college football.

Away from the gridiron, the Chester native has given back to his community as a mentor and counselor for the Chester Panthers (Chester PAL) and Kevin Jones and John Mobley Football camps, to go along with the Glen Mills' school system.

Williams earned a bachelor's degree in exercise sciences with a concentration in pre-occupational therapy in 2014. The Golden Rams' standout currently ranks third in school history in total tackles (376) and second in assisted tackles (223).

Tim Conner joined the Temple football staff in February, 2017, as the offensive analyst/operations assistant.

He spent the last two seasons with Huntingdon College in Montgomery, Ala., where he coached running backs and H-backs during his first season before taking over as the Hawks' receivers coach in 2016. During his first season, the running backs and H-backs played a key role in the Hawks' USA South Athletic Conference championship. Huntingdon's ground game set a program record with 2,936 rushing yards and tied the school record with 33 rushing touchdowns. Two of Conner's backs earned All-Conference honors and five were named Academic All-Conference.

Before Huntingdon, Conner spent the previous two seasons as an assistant coach at Marietta (Ohio) College. He coached receivers and was the assistant recruiting coordinator in 2014 and coached the running backs and fullbacks in 2013.

Prior to Florida, Linam spent the 2015 season as a graduate assistant at his alma mater, UCF. He previously played four seasons at linebacker where he was a two-year starter for the Knights, and registered 165 tackles, three sacks, six pass breakups, and three interceptions from 2008 through 2011. Bobby James brought over 20 years of college coaching experience to Temple when he joined the Owls in February, 2017, as the special teams analyst/operations assistant. He spent the previous four seasons as the head coach at Limestone College in Gaffney, S.C.

Named the first head coach in Limestone College history on December 14, 2012, James built the Division II program from the ground up and guided the Saints through a red-shirt season in 2013 before the team took the field for the first time in 2014.

Under James' tutelage, the 2014 team showed the nation its potential going 2-9 as the Limestone secondary featured a pair of All-Americans in Joshua Simmons and Titus Williams.

A seasoned defensive coordinator, James joined Limestone after spending the previous six years on Joe Reich's staff at Wingate University. He served a total of five seasons as the defensive coordinator, helping to turn the Bulldogs into one of the most feared defensive units in the Southeast and in the nation. In 2010, the defense helped key a series of firsts for the Bulldogs that included a SAC Championship, an NCAA Tournament appearance and an NCAA Tournament victory.

Prior to his time at Wingate, James served as the defensive coordinator and strength & conditioning coach at Division III Susquehanna University in Selinsgrove, Pa. from 2004-06.

From 2002-03, he was the defensive coordinator and head strength coach at Division II New Haven (Conn.) - where he worked with Owls' OC Dave Patenaude - after serving as the defensive coordinator at Division I Drake (Iowa) in 2001. Prior to Drake, he spent the 1999 and 2000 seasons at Wilkes University (Pa.) where he helped lead the defense to a No. 4 national ranking in total defense and top conference rankings in all major defensive categories.

James started his coaching career at his alma mater Bloomsburg University (Pa.) as an assistant coach in 1995 and 1996. He worked with the secondary those two seasons, playing a big role in guiding the team to back-to-back PSAC Championships and a berth in the NCAA Division II playoffs, before spending time as an assistant coach at nearby Lenoir-Rhyne University in 1997.

Prior to embarking on his coaching career, James was a four-year starter at Bloomsburg from 1990-94, where he was a two-time all-conference selection. He served as a team captain for two years, was chosen as team defensive Most Valuable Player, and was named All-ECAC.

Vince Sinagra joined the football staff in April, 2017, as Chief of Staff and will be responsible for assisting head coach Geoff Collins with all aspects of the football program; working as a liaison to the equipment, training and other staffs within the university.

"I've known Coach Sinagra for over 20 years," said Collins. "I have a great amount of respect and trust in him. He is someone who means a lot to me and my family and I know the people in the Philadelphia community and at Temple University are really going to love and respect him. He will make sure things are being run exactly the way a Top 25, Championship program should be run."

Sinagra was the head coach at Anna Maria College for five seasons, after two seasons as a defensive coordinator for the Amcats. He stepped down from his post following the 2016 campaign at the Division III school in Paxton, Mass.

Prior to his time at Anna Maria, the 41-year coaching veteran had two-year stays at Stony Brook (defensive coordinator, 2004-05), VMI (defensive coordinator, 2006-07) and Norfolk State (linebackers, 2008-09).

Sinagra arrived at Stony Brook after spending five seasons at Holy Cross where he was the linebackers coach and special teams coordinator. In that role, Sinagra was responsible for game and practice planning, as well as recruiting in Southern California, Southern and Central Florida, New York City and Long Island.

Before his time at Holy Cross, Sinagra completed his second stint at Hofstra, serving as defensive coordinator and linebackers coach during the 1998 season. Sinagra had previously coached the Pride wide receivers during the 1993 campaign.

From 1994 to 1998, Sinagra was the defensive coordinator and linebacker coach at Patriot League member Fordham, where he first met Temple head coach Geoff Collins. While with the Rams, he was responsible for supervising assistant coaches and graduate assistants, recruiting and travel planning, as well as assisting with day-to-day football operations.

Sinagra also spent six seasons as the defensive coordinator and defensive line coach at Bloomsburg University. While at Bloomsburg, he assisted with recruiting and was as an academic advisor for the football team, while also serving as the director of summer football camp.

Sinagra earned his bachelor's degree in physical education and health from the University of Rhode Island in 1975 before completing his master's in physical education, health and recreation from the school in 1983. As an undergraduate at URI, Sinagra was a three-year starter at defensive tackle for the Rams. Following his senior season he had the opportunity to play against the Air Force All-Stars in the "Turkey Bowl" held in Frankfurt, Germany. He then had stints with the Philadelphia Bell of the World Football League and the Toronto Argonauts of the Canadian Football League.

His first collegiate coaching job was at his alma mater, where he oversaw the defensive line from 1976-77. Sinagra went on to spend nine seasons at Milford Academy in Connecticut, serving as defensive coordinator for three seasons and head coach and athletic director for his final six years.

The Brooklyn, N.Y., native was a standout offensive and defensive tackle at New Utrecht High School receiving numerous honors including being selected to the Schoolboy All-American Team.

As coordinator of internal operations he was the primary contact for all community service activities, NFL scouts, class scheduling, and team travel, three areas he will continue to oversee.

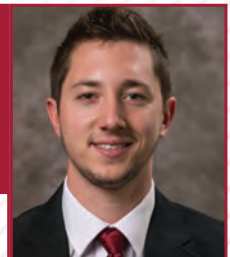

Tom PAJIC

Director of Player Personnel
Bloomsburg '91



1st Season at Temple

Tom Pajic was named Temple's director of player personnel on May 3, 2017.

Pajic spent five seasons (2012-16) as the head coach at Quincy University, leading the program from the NAIA ranks to NCAA Division II and the Great Lakes Valley Conference. He compiled a 20-34 record at Quincy, including the Hawks' first winning season in six years when he led them to a 6-5 mark in 2015. The Hawks won five of their first seven games in 2016, including a season-opening win over FCS program Drake and Quincy's first-ever win over four-time defending GLVC champion Indianapolis.

Under Pajic, the Hawks broke 26 school records and four GLVC records, many on the offensive side of the ball as Quincy routinely boasted among the most prolific offenses in the GLVC. Pajic coached Justin Dickens and Eric Poindexter, who went on to become the two most decorated wide receivers in school history. In just three seasons, Poindexter held every receiving mark in QU's record book and had a career-high 20 receptions for 317 yards in a game in 2016.

Pajic coached 50 All-GLVC selections, including running back Chris Harris who won GLVC Freshman of the Year in 2014. Defensive end Tyler Reidl was a two-time Capital One Academic All-American under Pajic. In 2016, 70 players earned a GPA of at least 2.75, including 52 achieving a 3.0. Four players garnered perfect 4.0 GPAs and earned GLVC Council of Presidents Academic Excellence Awards under Pajic.

Under Pajic, the Hawks won the Ortwerth Team Community Service Award, given to the QU team that best represents the University in the community. The Hawks created the Big Hawk/Little Hawk reading program in local elementary schools and hosted their own annual Red Cross Blood Drive. The QU football team was also involved with the Salvation Army, Special Olympics and the Horizons Soup Kitchen & Food Pantry.

Prior to his time at Quincy, Pajic spent eight years (2004-11) as the offensive coordinator at his alma mater Bloomsburg University in Pennsylvania. During his tenure the Huskies offense was among the best in the Pennsylvania State Athletic Conference (PSAC) and ranked among the top teams in Division II. His offenses led the PSAC in scoring, total yards, rushing yards, rushing TD's, passing efficiency and red zone offense several times and were nationally ranked in the top 10 of Division II in rushing yards per game six times, including number one in 2005. During his time at Bloomsburg, the Huskies offense produced 10 All-Americans, five All-Region selections, three Harlon Hill finalists, two PSAC East Player of the Year awards, three PSAC East Rookie of the Year awards, 40 PSAC East All-Conference selections, and set 30 school and conference records.

Prior to Bloomsburg, Pajic spent four years (2000-03) as the wide receivers coach at the University of South Florida. While under his leadership 29 school records in receiving, all-purpose yards and return yards were established. He had two players earn All-American and one player named an Academic All-American.

Prior to working at USF, Pajic spent one season as the offensive coordinator at Wilkes University (1999), one season at Hofstra University (1998), four years at Fordham University (1994-97), and one year at Gettysburg College (1993).

While a player at Bloomsburg, where he earned his bachelor's degree in 1991, Pajic set a school record for most receptions in a game with 17 against Lock Haven. He and his wife, Julie, have two children, Grace and Tommy.

Kyle Lane was hired as the head video coordinator for the Owls in January 2017.

Lane returns to his alma mater after serving as the assistant video coordinator for Kansas. There he assisted the football team during the 2016 season. Adam DiMICHELE

Quality Control for Offense & Recruiting
Temple '09



5th Season at Temple

After serving the Owls as both a player and coach, Adam DiMichele has held a few roles on the football staff. He held the position of director of player development from 2015-16 and was named quality control for offense and recruiting in 2017.

In 2014, DiMichele was named wide receivers coach, becoming the 19th Temple football player to serve as a full-time coach and the first in over 25 seasons. DiMichele spent the 2013 season at TU as a graduate assistant coach, working with the offense.

Since graduation, DiMichele has played professional football, including stints in the NFL and CFL. During the 2012 season, he played with the Philadelphia Soul of the Arena Football League.

Named the 2011 Southern Indoor Football League MVP, DiMichele led the Erie Explosion to a 9-3 record en route to a division title. He led the league in passing yards per game (270.6), team points per game (70.2), and total team offensive yards per game (260.0), while completing 235-of-427 passes (55%) for over 3,200 yards and a league-best 91 touchdowns to just seven interceptions.

DiMichele has also spent time with the Philadelphia Eagles (2009), the Calgary Stampeders (2009), and the Winnipeg Blue Bombers (2009).

Temple's team two-time MVP and team captain in 2007 and 2008, DiMichele finished his career ranked fourth in school history with 5,024 passing yards, adding 40 passing touchdowns and five rushing scores. During his first season as the Owls' signal caller (2006), DiMichele played in all 11 games with nine starts as a sophomore. In 2007, he started the first eight games before suffering a season-ending injury. In one of Temple's biggest comebacks in school history, DiMichele threw three fourth-quarter touchdowns to lead TU to a come-from-behind win at Akron during their first season of Mid-American Conference play. In 2008, he overcame intense rehabilitation and started nine games as a senior. In the 55-52 win over Eastern Michigan, DiMichele threw for a school record six touchdowns and passed for a career-high 370 yards. He broke school records for passing touchdowns in a game (six) and set a career-high for passing yards in game (370). His 370 yards marked his 10th 200-plus passing yardage games, which rank him third on the Temple's career list for 200-yard passers. It also marked his fourth 300-plus passing game, which tied the school record with Henry Burris.

DiMichele finished the 2008 season at 134-of-231 (58.0 percent) for 1,911 yards and 18 touchdowns in nine games also rushed 61 times for 91 yards and three touchdowns. His passing efficiency (148.02) ranked #19 in the final NCAA statistics. He finished his career with 5,024 passing yards which ranks fourth on Temple's all-time chart.

One of the most accomplished prep athletes in the history of Pennsylvania, DiMichele was a three-sport all-state selection as a senior in football, basketball and baseball at Sto-Rox High School. The McKees Rocks, Pa., native had one of the best high school careers in the history of Pennsylvania as the Western Pennsylvania Interscholastic Athletic League's all-time leading passer, which includes breaking records set by former NFL greats and Hall of Famers Joe Montana, Dan Marino, and Joe Namath. He earned first-team All-State honors in all three sports, and was cited as the state Player of the Year in both football and basketball.

DiMichele was inducted into the WPIAL Hall of Fame in 2011.

Prior to joining the Owls, DiMichele attended Okaloosa-Walton College (FL) for two years to play baseball. He was selected in the 38th round of the 2005 Major League Baseball Draft by the Toronto Blue Jays.

DiMichele received his degree in sport and recreation management from Temple in 2009.

One of seven children, DiMichele's younger brother Alex played football at Temple before transferring to Robert Morris. His brother Anthony played football at Holy Cross. Both brothers were I-AA All-Americans.

Larry KNIGHT

Quality Control for Defense & Recruiting
Central Michigan '10

Larry Knight joined the Temple football staff in February, 2017, as quality control for defense & recruiting. In that role he will work with the defensive staff breaking down film as well as assist with the program's recruiting efforts.

Knight spent the 2015-16 seasons as Georgia State's outside linebackers coach. He was part of a GSU staff that coached the most improved defense in the FBS in 2015. Georgia State led the nation by allowing 15 points fewer per game than in 2014. The Panthers finished in the top four in the Sun Belt in scoring defense (28.3 ppg), total defense (405.6 ypg), rushing defense (181.4 ypg) and pass efficiency defense (120.3).

Before coming to Georgia State, Knight spent two years (2013-14) as a defensive quality coach on Butch Jones' staff at Tennessee, working directly with associate head coach/defensive line coach Steve Stripling and linebackers coach Tommy Thigpen. In 2014, the Volunteers' defensive line featured All-Southeastern Conference selections Derek Barnett and Curt Maggitt, who combined for 21 sacks, third-most by any duo in the nation.

Knight also served one season as a graduate assistant for Jones at Cincinnati in 2012, helping the Bearcats to a Big East title and a victory in the Belk Bowl.

Knight was a four-year letterwinner as a defensive end under Jones at Central Michigan, including all-conference honors as a senior. He participated in four bowl games and helped CMU win three Mid-American Conference championships.

A native of Augusta, Ga., Knight earned his degree from Central Michigan in 2010.

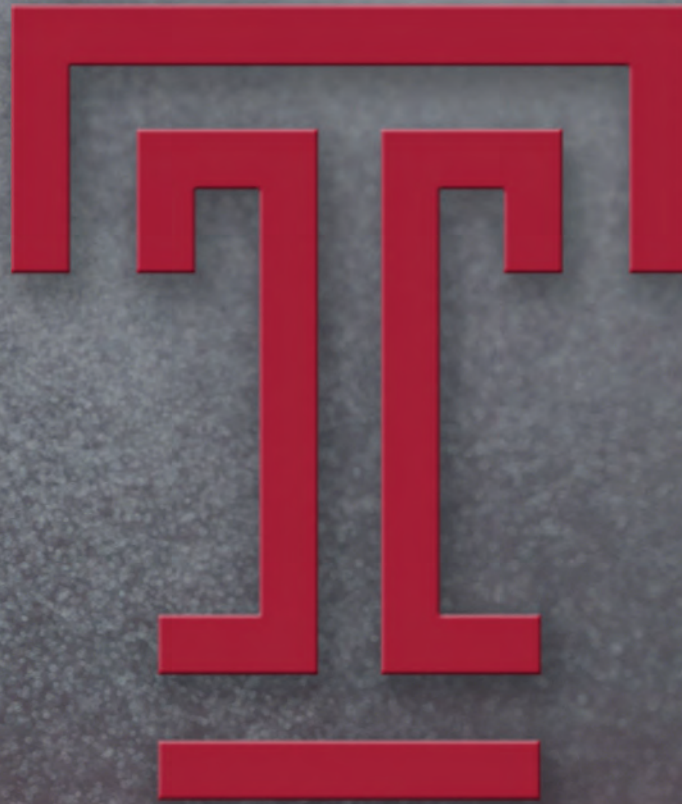

TEMPLE FOOTBALL HISTORY

The Temple University football program will play its 119th season in 2017. For more than 35 years, the Owls have been the only major college football team in the Philadelphia region. That was not the case at the turn of the century.

The Early Years

Football at Temple first planted its roots in 1894, a decade after Russell Conwell founded the night school on North Broad Street. Nearly every college in and around Philadelphia had some sort of football squad at that time, though it may be a stretch to call them organized. The serious football powers of the east included Pennsylvania, Princeton, Harvard and Yale.

Temple's 11-man squad was technically a part of the school's Physical Education Department. The 1894 team was organized by physical education instructor Charles M. Williams, who also coached the basketball team. The Owls won their first game that fall against Philadelphia Dental College, 14-6.

There is almost no record of the first two decades of Temple football. The games were rarely reported in the newspapers, and the opposition usually consisted of small schools such as Pratt Institute or Pennsylvania Military College (now Widener University). After the turn of the century, the Owls began playing regularly against city schools La Salle and Saint Joseph's.

The school mascot had already been established though, along with the school colors—Cherry and White. For many years, the football team had no official home field. Eventually it settled into Vernon Park, a spacious green located on the city limits beyond Germantown.

The most notable person associated with the Temple football program prior to World War I was Elwood Geiges, who was supposed to coach the varsity team in 1917. But the Owls forfeited every regular game on the schedule that season because of the war. Late that fall, the varsity squad matched up with the freshman squad in a game to benefit the war effort. The contest finished in a 6-6 tie.

Geiges began his career as a college football official the following season. He officiated games for 27 years, advancing to the head of the profession. Geiges is credited with inventing the signals for holding, offsides, illegal shift and timeout. He was elected to the National Football Foundation College Football Hall of Fame in 1984.

The Temple football program was administered by the Physical Education Department until well into the 20th century. For many years, the department was headed by Dr. Charles Prohaska, who was largely responsible for the expansion of the intercollegiate athletic program following World War I.

The Owls did not field a varsity football team between 1918 and 1921 due to the war. In the years that followed, Temple grew to have the second largest enrollment in the Philadelphia area. University President Charles F. Beury made a strong commitment at that time to greater success in intercollegiate athletics.

The Modern Era

What might be called the modern era of Temple football began in 1925 with the hiring of Henry J. Miller as head coach. "Heinie" Miller had been a star player at Penn, earning All-America honors in 1917. His much-hailed arrival promised great success against a much tougher level of competition.

Miller's Owls did well in 1925 and 1926, compiling a record of 10-5-2, the best two-year stretch in the school's short history. Things were about to get much better. Several outstanding players joined the roster in 1927, including future Temple Hall of Famers Tucker "Swede" Hanson, Grover Wearshing and Jack Bonner.

The Owls opened the season with a home game against Blue Ridge College, a small school located in New Windsor, Md. The mismatch was apparent from the opening kickoff. Temple held a 27-0 lead at the end of the first quarter, and then scored eight touchdowns in the second quarter to establish a 78-0 lead at the half. Unable to move the ball on offense, Blue Ridge actually began punting on first down. The coaches agreed at halftime to shorten the third quarter to eight minutes and later shortened the fourth quarter to six minutes. By the end of the game, three Temple players had switched jerseys to fill in for Blue Ridge. The Owls won by a final score of 110-0. Hanson scored five touchdowns and Wearshing scored three.

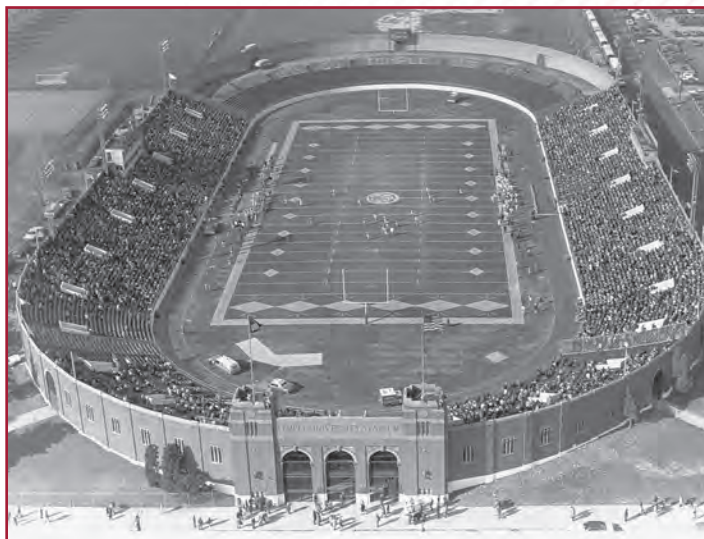
Several other one-sided results from the 1927 campaign, against Juniata (58-0), Galaudet (62-0) and Washington College (75-0), indicated that the Owls were ready for a new level of competition. That competition came from Dartmouth, Brown and Bucknell.

Temple finished 7-1 that season, losing only to Dartmouth, while posting notable victories against Brown (7-0) and Bucknell (19-13). The Bucknell game marked the beginning of a long rivalry with the school located in Lewisburg, Pa. The Owls and the Bison played every year for the next 44 years, often in the last game of the season. Some years later, "The Old Shoe" was dedicated as a prize for the winner of the Temple-Bucknell contest. The bronze statue of a football shoe was awarded to the winning school, which held it until the following year's game.

The 1927 season finale against Bucknell was played at Franklin Field, marking Temple's first appearance on the home field of the Pennsylvania Quakers. The Owls would not need to borrow the facility the following season.

In December of 1927, President Beury announced that the University had received a gift of \$100,000 from Philadelphia land developer Charles G. Erny for the construction of a football stadium at Vernon Park. The stadium was to seat between 20,000 and 25,000 and was to be completed in time for the 1928 football season.

Temple Stadium was first referred to as Beury Stadium, and for many years was known as Owl Stadium. The structure was designed by Philadelphia architect Clarence E. Wunder and was built by Erny's development firm. The total cost of construction was \$350,000, with a seating capacity of 34,200, including mobile field seats.



The Owls made their debut in the new stadium on Sept. 29, 1928, against St. Thomas College of Scranton. Team captain Howard "Barney" Gugel made it a successful debut, scoring on a 66-yard fumble recovery and a 38-yard interception return for a 12-0 Temple victory witnessed by 10,000 fans.

The stadium's official dedication game came two weeks later against Eastern power Western Maryland. The Owls won that game, 7-0, thanks to a touchdown pass from Wearshing to Hanson. The contest drew 25,000 fans, including several dignitaries from the city of Philadelphia.

The 1928 campaign was another great success, as the Owls finished 7-1-2, losing only to Schuylkill College and posting ties against Bucknell and Villanova. Temple was dominant in the new stadium, winning its first six games by shutout. The only team to score against the Owls was Washington College, which managed a single touchdown in a 73-7 rout. Wearshing and Hanson scored three times apiece in that contest.

The battle against Villanova—a scoreless tie—also marked the beginning of a long rivalry (though the teams had played one another in 1908). The Owls and the Wildcats were both developing strong national reputations, and this was the big game on their schedules for the next 15 years.

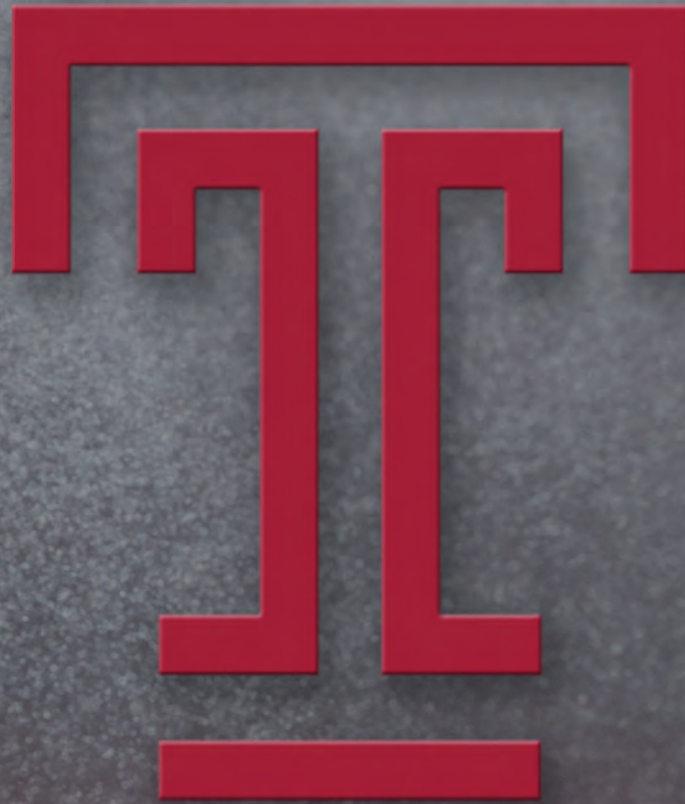
Miller continued to field successful teams through the Depression Era, tutoring a new set of future Hall of Famers in Hank Reese, Tony Dougal and Leon Whittock. All three played key roles in 1931, another milestone year for the program.

The Owls finished with a record of 8-1-1 that season, setting a school record for wins that stood for 42 years. Along the way, Temple recorded a 12-0 victory over developing regional power Penn State. It was considered the school's most notable victory to date. The Owls also scored their first-ever victory over Villanova by the score of 13-7. Reese had an 80-yard interception return for a touchdown and Cornelius Bonner scored on a five-yard run to secure the victory. The Wildcats were coached by Harry Stuhldreher, who had gained fame as one of Notre Dame's "Four Horsemen."

Temple closed the 1931 campaign with its first extended road trip, traveling by train across the Midwest and the Plains to face Denver College and the University of Missouri. The Owls built their national reputation with an 18-0 victory over Denver and a 38-6 triumph over Missouri.

By this time, the University's athletic programs had grown out of their Physical Education Department beginnings. The Owls were administered by Earl Yeomans, Graduate Manager of Athletics, who had replaced James R. Clovis in that position in the mid-1920s. Yeomans would oversee the athletic programs at Temple until 1952. College

ARMY RUNS OVER TEMPLE FOR UPSET VICTORY

PHILADELPHIA - Army utilized its famed triple option running attack to march up and down the field to upset the Temple Owls, 28-13, in the season opener for both teams Friday night in front of 34,005 fans at Lincoln Financial Field. The Black Knights accumulated 329 rushing yards on 67 carries with fullback Andy Davidson leading the way with 121 yards and two TDs.

Temple struggled throughout the game to find any offensive rhythm, with the defense unable to slow down the Army ground game. The Army offense controlled the line-of-scrimmage and dominated the time-of-possession in both halves.

Head coach Matt Rhule reiterated the Owls mistakes following the loss, targeting turnovers, quarterback protection and red zone efficiency.

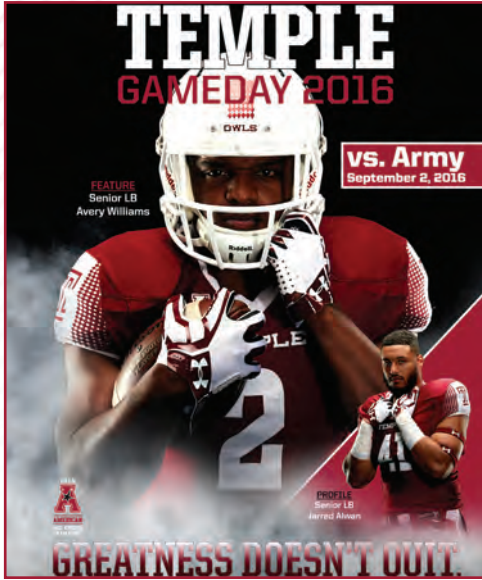
"We looked good early on at times, but when times got hard we couldn't react," Rhule said. "That is not the team that we want to have. I thought defensively, we couldn't stop Army. Offensively, we couldn't capitalize. We got the ball in the red zone three times and could not produce. We had three turnovers, Army had none. We could not protect the quarterback. That's on me. We have three losses in a row and we have to do something, quickly, to get ourselves back on track."

Senior QB Phillip Walker and the offense found no movement through the air or on the ground in the second half, scoring just a field goal. However, the four-year starter was able to break the school record for career passing yards in the contest.

On the day, Walker compiled a solid 168 yards on 12 completions through the air, throwing three costly interceptions with no scores. The senior snapped former QB Henry Burris' record of 7,495 passing yards on Temple's opening drive of the second half, finding Keith Kirkwood on a short checkdown pass in the right sideline for 14 yards. He now has 7,541 passing yards for his Owl career.

Meanwhile, RB Ryquell Armstead shouldered the load for the running back corps, racking up career-high 79 yards on 16 carries with one touchdown. The sophomore's strong performance gives the backfield some much-needed depth, as the Owls' usual starter Jahad Thomas sat out with a hand injury.

The scoring came slowly throughout, with Armstead's only touchdown starting things off early in the second quarter. Army quickly matched the following series behind the efforts of QB Ahmad Bradshaw, who snuck his way into the endzone utilizing the Black Knights' rarely



seen triple option offense.

Despite the Temple offense consistently working its way up and down the field, the Owls struggled finishing drives, owing its slim 10-7 halftime lead to excellent field position granted by a senior DL Sharif Finch blocked punt, the fifth of his career.

The second half seemed to continue a similar story as the Owl defense surrendered an opening 77-yard drive and their lead to the Black Knights, capped by Davidson's surge passed the goal line.

Even with junior PK Austin Jones' field goal closing the gap, Army continued to manhandle the Owl defensive front, methodically converting positive gains for its third touchdown of the game. The Black Knight defense followed suit on the ensuing drive, shutting down Walker for a quick three-and-out.

The Owls had a chance in the final minutes as Army, leading 21-13, missed a field goal with 3:41. Temple took possession on its own 30-yard line, but Walker was picked off two plays later by Kenneth Brinson. The Black Knights then iced the game on a 17-yard TD run by Davidson with 2:28 on the clock. Walker tossed his final interception of the night on the final drive.

Defensively, impressive individual performances by senior linebackers Avery Williams (career-high 12 tackles) and Jarrod Alwan (9 tackles), not to mention senior cornerback Sean Chandler (10 tackles), failed to slow the Army triple-option onslaught. For the Black Knights, Davidson and Bradshaw led the way, combining for 185 yards on 38 carries with three touchdowns.

TEMPLE GETS BACK TO WINNING WAYS WITH 38-0 SHUTOUT OVER STONY BROOK

PHILADELPHIA – Under a blazing mid-September heat with 22,296 fans packing the stands, the Temple Owls secured their initial win of the season over visiting FCS-member Stony Brook, 38-0, Saturday afternoon at Lincoln Financial Field.

Despite the high scoreline, the Temple defense proved the most impressive component for the Owls, holding the Seawolves to just 133 yards with no scores. Throughout the first half, Stony Brook only saw the Temple side of the 50-yard line on one possession. That came after a tipped-pass interception at midfield.

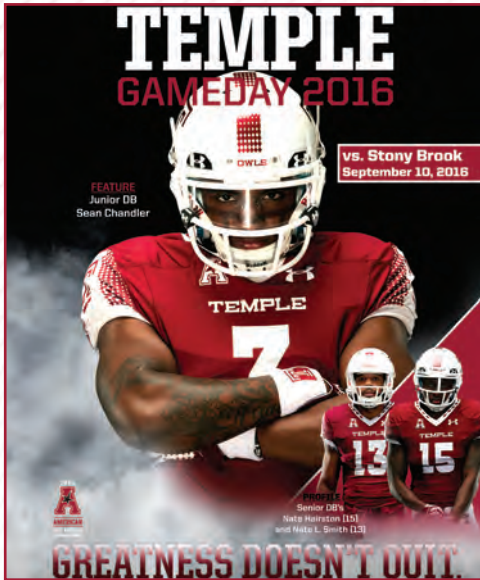
The early dominance by the defense helped the group reassert its identity, a self-proclaimed aggression and hyperactivity. The consistent pressure and blitz-prone front seven made Stony Brook visibly uncomfortable, forcing four turnovers, three sacks and nine tackles-for-loss. On the day, the Seawolves finished a dismal 0-for-13 on third down conversions.

Head coach Matt Rhule discussed his pride regarding how Temple competed during the shutout, noting the “energy” and “juice” the Owls had against the Seawolves despite a full week of grueling practice and, not to forget, last Friday’s loss to Army still fresh in many players’ minds.

“I’m really proud of our team over the last eight days, some real key leadership,” Rhule said. “It was a really, really hard work. We were not a fresh team out there today. We worked this week. I thought you saw, hopefully, a team that played with a lot of energy, a lot of juice, and did enough to win the football game, and to get a shutout on defense is always special.”

Meanwhile, the defensive energy bled its way into the offensive huddle, as senior QB Phillip Walker guided his squad on multiple scoring drives throughout both halves. Walker, who snapped the school record for career passing yards last week against Army, completed a nearly flawless game, throwing 11-of-23 for three scores with the lone interception.

Under Walker’s direction, the offense either reached or began in the redzone five consecutive times after a stalled first possession, scoring touchdowns on four of those occasions. The third quarter proved similar as each of the first two drives saw the scoreboard change in Temple’s favor, including a 26-yard strike to junior WR Keith Kirkwood, all before the senior sat out the final period.



On the receiving end of the senior’s passes were a number of wideouts; none, however, posted a game near Kirkwood, who pulled in a career-high two touchdowns on four receptions for 54 yards. Kirkwood’s standout display was supplemented by a first for sophomore WR Broderick Yancy, who grabbed his initial career score on 15-yard pass in the back of the end zone late in the second quarter.

The Owl offensive engine hit on all cylinders from the get-go, pounding the Stony Brook front all while utilizing a slew of ball carriers for 177 yards on 39 carries for two touchdowns. Sophomore RB Ryquell Armstead saw the most action, generating consistent positive yardage with 48 yards on 14 carries.

A pair of freshmen each made an impact rushing for the Owls, as WR Isaiah Wright made his debut with seven notable touches (42 yards) at tailback while WR Cortrelle Simpson notched two end-around sweeps for 40 yards.

The special teams saw a milestone crossed during the victory, as junior PK Austin Jones’ sole field goal midway through the second half jumped him into sixth all-time on Temple’s career scoring list, surpassing Cap Poklemba’s 190 points from the 1999-02 seasons. Further, P Alex Starzyk showcased his coffin corner skills on two of his four punts against Stony Brook, watching the ball downed at the one-yard line on both kicks.

As for Temple head coach Matt Rhule, the shutout of the Seawolves marks the second of his Owl career, the last of which came against fellow FCS-member Delaware State by a 59-0 mark in 2014.

PENN STATE OUTLASTS TEMPLE FOR 34-27 WIN

STATE COLLEGE – Despite a resilient defensive effort and a late offensive surge, Temple fell short in its first road challenge, suffering a close 34-27 loss at the hands of rival Penn State in front of a crowd of 100,420 at Beaver Stadium on Saturday afternoon.

The Owls, who battled from behind throughout the entire matchup, closed the score to within a single possession on their final drive, but an inopportune turnover snuffed out the possibility for the comeback.

Throughout the first few drives, quick strikes from both quarterbacks signaled a shootout between the Pennsylvania rivals was underway, but a combination of defensive pressure and constant penalties soon slowed down both offenses.

Senior QB Phillip Walker and his unit struggled in the first half, but managed to put together multiple scoring possessions in the second, compiling 286 passing yards on 25-of-34 with a rushing touchdown and interception.

The early Owls' spark came behind the efforts of red-shirt senior WR Romond Deloatch, who grabbed a career-long 67-yard reception on the initial play of the second drive. With the defense reeling, Temple set up RB Jahad Thomas with his first carry and touchdown of the season on an eight-yard sweep a play later.

The rushing score moved Thomas up to fifth all-time on Temple's career touchdown list, a boost for the senior after sitting out the first two games of the year with a hand injury. He finished the day with 14 carries for 52 yards with two touchdowns along with six receptions for 48 yards.

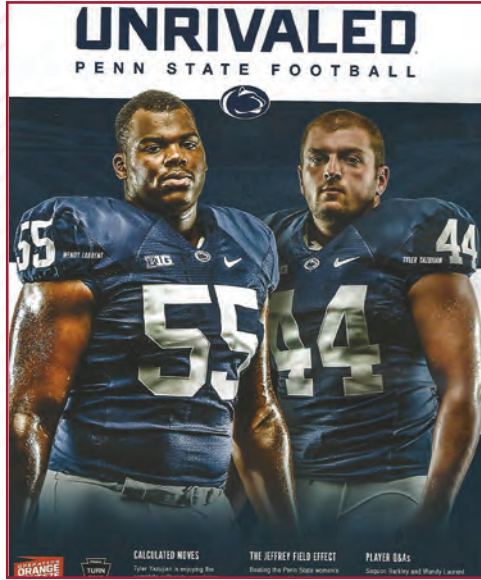
The Penn State offense similarly gave Temple early issues, finding the endzone on two of its first three possessions and jumping out to a quick seven-point lead. Nittany Lion QB Trace McSorley opened the scoring on Penn State's second drive, finding a wide-open WR Chris Godwin on a deep 52-yard bomb down midfield.

Even with a timely turnover deep in Owl territory to start the second quarter, the defense continued to struggle containing McSorley, watching the sophomore expand the Nittany Lion edge to 21-7 with his first rushing touchdown of the year. Redshirt senior Praise Martin-Oguike forced the Penn State fumble inside the Temple red zone.

Two consecutive unproductive Temple drives plagued the defensive stamina late during the first half, as Penn State's offense continued to dominate overall snaps (43-25) and time-of-possession (17:32-12:26). The Owls were held to a trio of three-and-outs versus Penn State's zero in the initial two quarters, constantly forcing the defense to take the field with little to no rest.

With just 38 seconds remaining and the ball spotted on the Owl 20-yard line, though, Walker and the offense suddenly sprang to life. An up-tempo six-play, 52-yard possession allowed junior PK Austin Jones to close the half-time deficit, drilling a 45-yard field goal with relative ease.

Sophomore DB Delvon Randall snared an interception off McSorley inside the Nittany Lion red zone late in the



third quarter, electrifying a period that had only seen a Penn State field goal thus far. The turnover spurred the Owls' offense, which capped the short scoring drive with Walker leaping into the endzone on a fourth-and-goal conversion.

The shift in momentum jumpstarted the exhausted defense, bending under another McSorley air raid, but again allowing only a field goal, giving Penn State a 27-17 advantage early in the fourth quarter. The stalled drive, one of many throughout the game, came due to the efforts of redshirt senior Haason Reddick, who concluded the match with seven total tackles and a career-high three tackles-for-loss.

A stalled drive on the ensuing Temple possession was quickly rectified on special teams, as punter Alex Staryzk's line drive ricocheted off a Nittany Lion blocker, bounced down to the Penn State one-yard line and was promptly recovered by the Owls.

Thomas, once again, came through on a sweep play in the red zone, striding in for a touchdown on a third-and-goal to cut the lead down to a field goal margin midway through the final period.

Penn State star RB Saquon Barkley, who had been relatively contained up until this point, responded in kind just three plays later, outpacing defenders on a 55-yard burst up the middle to restore the 10-point Nittany Lion edge. The Owls pushed back to within a possession courtesy of a second Jones field goal, this time from 34 yards out, sailed through the uprights with just 2:10 remaining.

After a failed onside kick and Penn State three-and-out, Temple managed to take over deep in their own territory. On the second play of the possession, though, Walker took a shot while in his throwing motion, resulting in a game-ending Nittany Lion interception.

TEMPLE WINS SEVENTH STRAIGHT HOMECOMING GAME WITH 48-20 VICTORY OVER CHARLOTTE

PHILADELPHIA — Temple recovered quickly from a slow start in its Homecoming matchup against Charlotte, posting its second victory of the season with a dominant 48-20 decision over the 49ers in front of 27,786 fans Saturday afternoon at Lincoln Financial Field.

A trio of Owl big plays highlighted the first half, as senior offensive stars QB Phillip Walker and RB Jahad Thomas created points both through the air and on the ground, building a comfortable 31-7 halftime lead.

Temple head coach Matt Rhule discussed how his offense was able to rattle the 49er defense with an up-tempo speed and few big plays downfield, finally finding a rhythm early in the second quarter with Walker under center.

"We kind of came out no huddle early and tried to open them up a little bit, just tire them out," Rhule said. "I think we just kind of settled down on offense, got into a rhythm and I think what you're seeing is when we are able to get our quarterback into a rhythm, he's playing pretty well."

After opening the game with a long drive capped by junior Austin Jones' 36-yard field goal, Temple sputtered until the initial play of the second quarter. On a brilliantly faked play-action pass, Walker threw a rope to junior WR Adonis Jennings down the left sideline for a 51-yard score, reclaiming the lead for good.

From that point on the offensive floodgates remained permanently open for the Owls, as the Charlotte defense watched Walker and company become increasingly more effective.

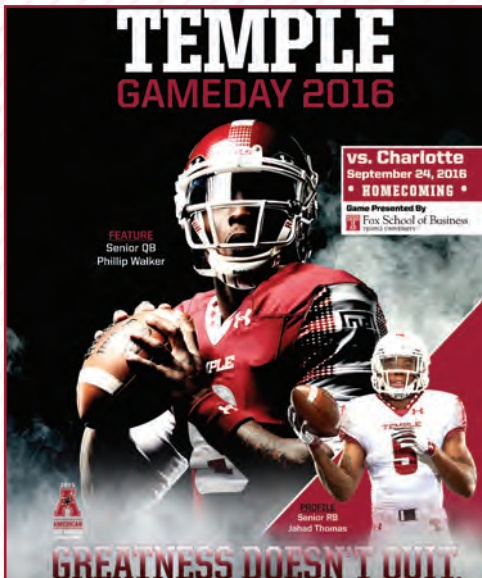
Next up, a fumble recovery by senior DE Praise Martin-Oguike — returned 20 yards by the hulking defensive lineman — was promptly converted into touchdown on a Thomas 13-yard dance into the endzone.

Walker stepped up on the Owls' ensuing drive, dropping a 40-yard dime to WR Brodrick Yancy, who then proceeded to break a tackle and stride in for the second score of his young career. The sophomore wide-out topped his previous career mark for receiving yards, snaring four receptions for a team-best 70 yards.

Another sophomore, this time RB Ryquell Armstead, grabbed the spotlight in Temple's final possession of the half, punching in a touchdown of his own a one-yard dive at the goal line.

As for the defense, a lone scoring drive in the first quarter sullied their near-perfect first half performance. Senior signal-digit linebackers Avery Williams and Stephau Marshall led the way with five tackles each while Martin-Oguike earned the lone turnover.

The third quarter sang the same tune as the 28-point second for Temple offensively, as two consecutive



methodical drives finished with rushing scores to start the period. Both Thomas and Armstead each secured their second endzone appearance, making sharp cuts for one-yard touchdowns.

Leading 45-14 late in the quarter, redshirt freshman reserve QB Logan Marchi replaced Walker as the signal caller for the Owls. The young quarterback proceeded to manufacture a drive deep into 49er territory, setting up Jones' second field goal of the game, this time a 31-yarder.

On the day, Walker finished an impressive 15-of-26 for 268 passing yards and two touchdowns, adding two rushes for 18 yards on the ground. Thomas supplemented the offensive effort in multiple ways, earning a team-best 15 carries for 70 yards and two scores along with three receptions for 49 yards through the air.

The two touchdowns for the senior running back marked the 23rd and 24th of his storied career with the Owls, jumping him to third all-time in program history.

An imposing defensive effort throughout the game was capped on Charlotte's final possession, as the Owls' second-string unit held its ground inside the Temple 10-yard line and forced a turnover-on-downs. Ultimately, the 49ers proficiency on offense — 429 total yards — was never converted into consistent scoring, as the Temple bend-don't-break mantle held firm.

As for Rhule, the fourth-year head coach remains undefeated in Homecoming matchups with the Owls, improving Temple's streak to eight straight.

OWLS OPEN CONFERENCE PLAY WITH STRONG WIN OVER SMU

PHILADELPHIA — Aiming to make a splash in the American Conference debut, the Temple offensive and defensive fronts gave no ground as they guided the Owls into the win column, knocking off visiting SMU in a 45-20 thrashing on Saturday afternoon at Lincoln Financial Field. A combination of consistent quarterback pressure and a punishing ground attack proved the difference for the Owls in the victory, surging past the Mustangs in decisive fashion.

With the game teetering on the brink of a Temple blowout midway through the second quarter, senior DE Haason Reddick saw his opportunity to put away the victory on an SMU third-and-6.

Blowing by the right tackle, Reddick smashed into Mustang QB Ben Hicks full force, triggering a fumble that was promptly palmed by fellow senior Romond Deloatch and corralled into the endzone.

The touchdown extended the Owl lead to a commanding 28 points, a margin that was narrowly slimmed throughout the remainder of the matchup. The advantage forced SMU into panic mode early, an edge for the high-energy Temple defensive front.

The critical victory marks the first in the Owls' defense of last season's Eastern Division Title, as they improve to 3-2 (1-0 American) on the year. The Mustangs, meanwhile, fall to 2-3 (0-1 American) and turn their attention to a Tulsa road trip next weekend.

A rocky start for Temple — highlighted by senior QB Phillip Walker throwing a pick-six — was quickly remedied by, surprisingly enough, punter Alex Starzyk. After Temple's second drive stalled three snaps in, the junior drove a kick into the back of an SMU blocker, allowing Reddick to recover the live ball.

Seven plays later, senior RB Jahad Thomas burst through a truck-sized hole for an untouched 12-yard touchdown run, knotting the score at 7-7. From that point on, the Owls' offense never looked back, surgically picking apart the Mustang defense.

The ensuing Temple possession lasted just a single play, as Walker redeemed his opening gaffe with a 42-yard connection to now-healthy sophomore WR Ventell Bryant for the duo's first score of the season. The touchdown gave the Owls a 14-7 lead, an advantage they did not relinquish.

Walker's early struggles were short-lived, as the senior wrapped up the win with 124 yards passing on 7-of-18 and his lone touchdown to Bryant. The receiving corps saw a plethora of distribution from the signal caller as well, with three wideouts topping 30 yards, the best of which came from junior Keith Kirkwood (41 yards on three receptions).

A second sophomore, this time RB Ryquell Armstead, crossed the goal line next for the Owls following a few back-and-forth punts, punching it in after a 34-yard Walker-to-Deloatch toss set Temple up at the one-yard line. To cap the offense's first half, Thomas made his second endzone appearance of the day minutes into the sec-



ond quarter, breaking off a 15-yard rush for the score.

For the game, the senior tailback finished with 16 carries for 80 yards and two touchdowns, jumping him into sole possession of third place on Temple's all-time career scoring list (26 touchdowns).

The real story of the half, though, proved the stout defensive performance, giving up just 100 yards and a lone, late touchdown to a statistically high-powered Mustang offense. Along with the forced fumble, the stingy unit also grabbed two interceptions — by senior DB Nate L. Smith and sophomore LB Jared Folks, respectively — as sophomore DB Delvon Randall led the team in tackles (5).

As exciting and point-happy as the first half was for both teams, the final two quarters proved conflictly quiet. The third saw only an Austin Jones' field goal for Temple, pushing the lead to a comfortable 38-14, before the Mustangs added only their second offensive score of the game on a 14-yard pass to open the final period.

With SMU finally showing some life, the Owls decided to answer with vigor on their ensuing drive. Once again, the ground game came through as Armstead shrugged off defenders in a 37-yard sprint into the endzone.

The sophomore impressed throughout the game, particularly during the final two quarters, finishing with a career-best 159 yards on 15 rushes for two scores of his own.

A defensive stand inside the ten-yard line helped close out the victory, as SMU failed to convert four straight snaps deep in the red zone. Randall concluded the game with a career-best double-digit tackle mark (10) while both Smith and redshirt freshman LB Chapelle Russell added seven tackles each.

**TEMPLE SINGS MEMPHIS BLUES AFTER
TIGERS COME BACK FOR 34-27 WIN**

MEMPHIS – Under the hostile lights of the Liberty Bowl and fighting a crowd 34,743 strong, Temple struggled to overcome the obstacles of a tough road venue as fellow American Conference foe Memphis outpaced the Owls in a 34-27 shootout.

After winning two straight, the Owls' defense of last season's Eastern Division title took a hit as the team drops to 1-1 in conference play and 3-3 overall. Memphis, meanwhile, bounces back after a close loss last week to No. 14 Ole Miss, surging to a 1-0 American record and a 4-1 mark for the year.

In a true "tale of two halves" game, Temple jumped out to a commanding 13-3 lead in the first half only to surrender that edge over the course of the final two quarters. The Owls started the game with serious energy and poise on both sides of the ball, but a few big plays by the Tigers buried Temple down the stretch.

The third quarter flipped the game for the Owls, as the team watched their 13-3 advantage evaporate into a 20-13 deficit, with both of Memphis' touchdowns coming over a 51-second span in the final two minutes of the period.

The first was the result of Tigers' RB Doroland Dorceus, who broke off a 71-yard dash up the middle, while the second came on a tipped pass turned pick-six by Memphis LB Genard Avery two plays later.

The final quarter, even with some positive results, failed to change the game's eventual outcome, as senior QB Phillip Walker threw his second interception of the night, ending the Owls' hopes of a comeback.

After Memphis RB Darrell Henderson capped a seven-play drive with a 28-yard scoring rush to kickoff the period, Walker found fellow senior RB Jahad Thomas on a 61-yard touchdown pass to narrow the lead to just one possession. Memphis immediately responded on the ensuing kickoff, taking it 95 yards to the house as the Tigers tried keep the Owls at arms length.

Temple set itself up again to close the gap a drive later as Walker connected with Thomas for the duo's second score, this time on a nine-yard screen, cutting the deficit again to just seven. A running into the punter penalty cut the Owls' last chance drive down to just 50 seconds, and the late interception sealed the loss.

On the day, though, Walker finished with career highs across the board, posting a school record in passing attempts (59) while tying in completions (36) and passing yards (445). He joins Henry Burriss (445 yards vs. Pitt, 1996) as the only Owl signal-callers to pass for more than 400 yards in a game. Thomas impressed as well, grabbing six receptions for 121 yards and two touchdowns along



with 37 yards on the ground. It marked his fourth straight game with two touchdowns.

And while the second half looked like a shootout, the first half played out much more like a defensive struggle.

A pair of field goals from 31 and 23 yards out, respectively, from junior K Austin Jones gave Temple an early lead. Late in the first half following a gusty fourth-and-three conversion on Walker toss to senior TE Colin Thompson, sophomore RB Ryquell Armstead punched in the game's opening touchdown from two yards out.

The true story of the first half for the Owls, though, came on the defensive side of the ball.

Led by a suffocating defensive line, the Owls contained the high-octane Memphis offense to just a late field goal and 111 total yards. Tigers' QB Riley Ferguson was visibly uncomfortable throughout both quarters, overthrowing wide-outs and struggling to find space in a tight pocket.

Ferguson and his offense were able to regroup during halftime, generating over double their initial production. However, two non-offensive touchdowns for the Tigers saved their lead late as both the kickoff return and the pick-six shifted momentum towards Memphis.

Redshirt senior DL Haason Reddick led the Owls' defense with 11 tackles, including four for a loss, and two sacks.

TEMPLE STUNS UCF WITH LAST-SECOND SCORE TO ERASE 18-POINT DEFICIT

ORLANDO — Despite trailing for the entirety of the game, Temple battled back to stun UCF on the road with a last second touchdown, stealing a 26-25 victory over the Knights Saturday evening at Bright House Networks Stadium.

Down five with just 32 seconds remaining, senior QB Phillip Walker orchestrated a four-play, 70-yard drive to bring the Owls back from the brink, capped by a dramatic eight-yard touchdown pass to red-shirt junior WR Keith Kirkwood.

Walker threw four consecutive passes on the game-winning possession, the first three to redshirt sophomore WR Ventell Bryant for 20, 16 and 26 yards apiece. The final pass came over-the-top to Kirkwood as the Knight defense anticipated a spike with under 10 seconds left, leaving the junior to make a leaping grab near the back edge of the end zone.

For the game, Walker finished 12-of-24 passing with 167 yards, two touchdowns and one interception. The receiving corps continued to flourish, as Bryant and Kirkwood combined for 113 yards on seven receptions with the lone score.

A quick start by both offensive units mellowed out as the first two quarters progressed, with Central Florida taking control in front of its home crowd. The Knights opened the game with a drive that culminated on a 55-yard pass down the left sideline for a touchdown.

On the ensuing drive, though, Walker gave Temple a spark, crafting a response to the early UCF score.

Under pressure and back-peddling, Walker slipped a screen past two charging defensive linemen to waiting senior RB Jahad Thomas, who then proceeded to weave his way 28 yards past would-be tacklers into the end zone.

A number of big plays plagued the Owl defense throughout the first half, as UCF scored on the aforementioned 55-pass and 63-yard sprint early in the second quarter, building a commanding 25-7 advantage.

Temple chipped away at the lead minutes before halftime, utilizing its powerful run game and a drive-capping seven-yard rush by Thomas to close the gap to 25-14. With the ground touchdown, his second of the day, Thomas claimed the NCAA active title for consecutive games with two-or-more scores, now stretched to five straight on the season.



The senior finished the day with a team-high 120 yards on 27 carries for one touchdown on the ground along with three receptions for 33 yards and a score.

A few key defensive stops helped along the way as well, shutting down the Knights on two consecutive possessions after the 63-yard burst. The Owl front seven proved particularly potent in containing UCF late, generating seven sacks — two from senior DL Haason Reddick — on freshman QB McKenzie Milton.

The third quarter saw some dominant ground-and-pound play from Temple, as the Owls opened the period with a sustained 14-play, 61-yard drive capped by freshman PK Aaron Bomerhi's first career field goal, a short 32-yarder.

The following possession saw a similar result, as the run-centric offense pushed the ball down deep into UCF territory before Bomerhi once again drilled his attempt, this time a tough 47-yard kick. The Owls finished the quarter with an impressive time-of-possession, owning the ball for 11:18 of the 15:00 minutes.

The defense continued to make plays into the fourth quarter, as redshirt senior CB Nate Hairston intercepted Milton just as UCF seemed to be gaining some semblance of momentum. After two Owl turnovers-on-downs, Temple continued to dominate defensively, holding the Knights to back-to-back three-and-outs trailing by only five points.

TEMPLE TAKES DIVISION LEAD WITH
46-30 WIN OVER PRESEASON FAVORITE USF

PHILADELPHIA — Facing off against a rolling South Florida squad undefeated in American Athletic play, Temple continued to prove its resolve in the 46-30 dismantling of the visiting Bulls, surging to the top of the East Division in front of 25,950 Friday night at Lincoln Financial Field.

The Owls, lacking in an offensive identity following a tough road loss to Memphis two weeks ago, found comfort behind a powerful ground game against USF. The unit leaned heavily on sophomore RB Ryquell Armstead, who generated a career-high 210 yards on 20 carries for two touchdowns for the evening.

Armstead even found himself inserted into the school record books, as his high-production now stands as 14th on the all-time single game list for rushing yards. He is also just the 10th player to rush for 200 yards in a game.

With the victory, Temple improves to a noteworthy 5-3 (3-1 American), earning the Eastern tiebreaker over former division leader USF (6-2, 3-1 American). Further, from a revenge perspective, the Owls' triumph over the Bulls reversed the result from last season's game, where USF knocked off an undefeated Temple program on its turf.

The Temple offense exploded out of the gate, compiling a 14-play, eight-minute opening drive nearly pacing the length of the field before settling for a 22-yard field goal from freshman kicker Aaron Boumerhi. The three-point lead marked only the second time this season, not to mention in consecutive weeks, Temple generated points on its initial possession of the game.

USF then put together a scoring drive of its own late in the first quarter, wrapped up with 27-yard bomb into the end zone from QB Quinton Flowers.

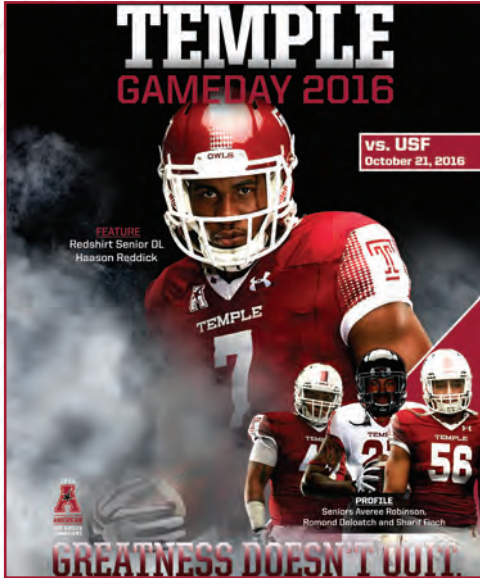
The Temple offense once again responded. The unit marched 75 yards over 15 plays and another eight minutes, chipping off gains behind power rushing and accurate short-yardage tosses from senior QB Phillip Walker.

Set up at the one-yard-line, though, the Owls were not to be denied an end zone appearance this time around. On a seemingly doomed rollout toward the right sideline, Walker twisted 180 degrees to throw back across his body to the opposite pylon, finding wide-open fellow senior TE Colin Thompson for the first receiving touchdown of his career.

The Bulls saw fit to retake the lead off another long pass from Flowers, a 31-yarder sailing over the secondary. A play later, though, the situation turned sour for USF as Temple senior DE Praise Martin-Oguike swung the momentum back in the Owls' favor, notching the fifth blocked kick of his career.

And then, for the first time of the game, the Temple offense decided to move with some urgency. On what looked to be another simple hand-off up the middle quickly transformed into a team season-long 76-yard dash by Armstead, a single-play career best from the sophomore playmaker.

The two-play scoring drive took just one minute, the notable exception during the half as Temple controlled the ball for a stunning 21:44 to South Florida's 8:16. Each of the Bulls' scoring possessions, though, concluded on a major passing play, a weakness that continues to



haunt the Owl defense.

The initial two quarters managed to compose a dramatic finish, as four plays from Walker and the offense set up a Boumerhi 35-yarder. Sophomore WR Ventell Bryant grabbed a crucial reception with eight seconds remaining on the possession, his final of five catches for a career-best of 115 receiving yards.

The second half, however, saw the surge in Temple confidence dissipate over the first seven minutes, as Flowers led USF to 10 straight points on two consecutive drives. The junior quarterback capped the final possession himself, striding into the end zone on a zone-read to open up a three-point advantage.

Three snaps into the ensuing Temple possession, however, and Armstead took the deficit into his own hands yet again, breaking off a 42-yard footrace for his second score of the game. With a new energy to feed off, the defensive front-seven choked the Bull offense to a three-and-out behind relentless pursuit and an athletic pass deflection from sophomore S Delvon Randall.

The ensuing punt continued to drain the spirit from the Bull sideline, as redshirt senior DE Avery Ellis got his hand on the kick. The Temple offense — with field position at the 20-yard-line — broke the goal line two plays later off two touches from senior RB Jahad Thomas.

The two teams traded touchdowns in the final 8:42, the final of which came from Thomas on a three-yard sweep after a Temple interception. With the score, Thomas, who finished with 16 carries for 56 yards, continued his NCAA-best streak of consecutive games with two or more touchdowns (6).

A prime-time defensive performance was fittingly capped with a safety off senior TE Romond Deloatch's sack of back-up USF QB Brett Kean, as the group finished with a combined four on the day.

TEMPLE REACHES BOWL ELIGIBILITY
WITH SOUND WIN OVER CONFERENCE FOE

PHILADELPHIA — Utilizing a devastating ground game highlighted by senior RB Jahad Thomas and his big-play ability, Temple routed visiting American Athletic foe Cincinnati in a 34-13 dismantling, to the delight of 29,763 fans Saturday evening at Lincoln Financial Field.

The all-around victory was generated off critical snaps within each facet of the matchup; however, a bonanza of special teams plays, including a blocked punt and muffed kickoff return, wrecked havoc on the Cincinnati baseline energy.

With the win, Temple moves to a commanding 6-3 (4-1 American), making the team bowl bound in back-to-back years for the first time in school history. Cincinnati, meanwhile, falls to a 4-4 (1-4 American) mark on the season.

Facing a Bearcat offense averaging over 400 yards per game, the Temple defense stepped up early to force a quick three-and-out. The momentum carried through to the special teams on the ensuing punt, as redshirt senior DL Avery Ellis blocked the kick, his second in two games.

Under direction from senior QB Phillip Walker, the Owls' offense rolled down inside the ten-yard line, only to settle for a short 26-yard field goal from K Aaron Boumerhi. The freshman has been perfect on field goal attempts since replacing junior Austin Jones three games ago, the latter of which is sidelined due to a season-ending injury on a kickoff against Memphis.

When Walker and his unit took over two drives later after a Cincinnati fumble, the group was not to be denied the end zone this time around. With just four plays, Temple covered 55 yards for the touchdown, a majority of which came on a 40-yard scoring toss from Walker to junior Adonis Jennings down the left sideline.

The senior quarterback concluded the evening with no turnovers and two passing touchdowns, throwing 12-of-19 for 199 yards through the air.

The Bearcats, led by QB Gunner Kiel, responded on their first play of the second quarter, scoring on a short, four-yard lob to the back-left corner of the end zone.

Fighting a swing in momentum towards Cincinnati, the Owls' offense broke through behind the efforts of senior RB Jahad Thomas, who gashed the Bearcats with a 56-yard cut up the left sideline. Walker and redshirt sophomore WR Ventell Bryant cleaned up the drive two plays later, connecting on a 28-yard post route at the goal line.



Thomas put together another strong performance despite never finding the end zone himself, ending his NCAA-best streak of consecutive games with two or more touchdowns. On the day, he finished with a team-best 151 yards on 17 carries.

Kiel sought to keep the gap at a one-score margin, compiling a ten-play possession and his second touchdown pass of the day — this time a 10-yard crossing route — for the Bearcats. Despite the narrowing lead, Temple maintained a 17-13 advantage heading into the locker room.

The second half, however, proved wildly different from the offensive-centric first, as the Owls' defense held Cincinnati to zero points in the third quarter. Meanwhile, Walker chewed up clock as he guided the offense on an impressive 15-play drive for a second Boumerhi field goal, this time from 27 yards out.

Eventually, just as the final period began, Temple was able to secure solid footing as sophomore RB Ryquell Armstead punched in two scores on near-consecutive snaps, the first from three-yards out and the second a six-yard grind into the end zone. The highly productive back up finished with 18 carries for 61 yards and the two touchdowns.

The momentum created by Armstead's initial score essentially buried Cincinnati on the ensuing kickoff, as Boumerhi's squib kick slipped through the hands of a returner, before junior Cequan Jefferson dove in for the recovery at the 18-yard line. In decisive fashion, the sophomore tailback would score just four plays later.

**OFFENSE RACES TO QUICK SCORES
 AND DEFENSE SHUTS OUT HUSKIES**

EAST HARTFORD — Behind a two-dimensional offensive game plan and a staunch defensive front unwilling to break, Temple took to the road to shutout regional rival and East Division foe UConn 21-0 Friday evening at Pratt & Whitney Stadium.

The Owls utilized a balanced offense, compiling 218 yards on the ground along with 215 yards through the air, to work the clock and generate three early scores. The defense, however, clamped down on a sputtering Husky offense, forcing numerous three-and-outs and holding the unit to just 158 total yards.

The shutout marked the first for the program over an FBS opponent since October 15, 2011, when the Owls held Buffalo scoreless in a 34-0 victory.

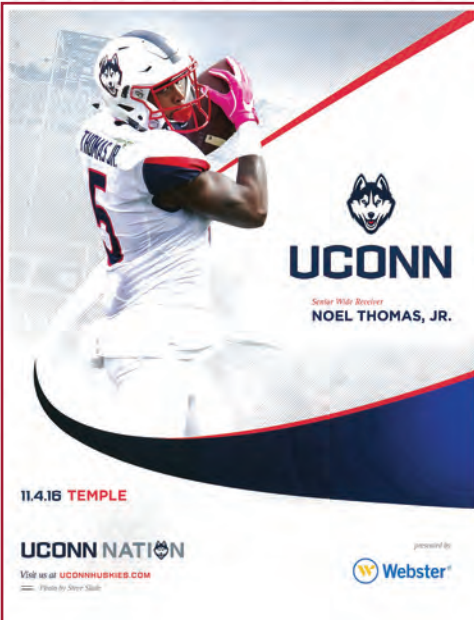
With the victory, Temple improves to 7-3 (5-1 American), good for first in the East Division and a guaranteed bowl invite. UConn, on the other hand, falls to 3-7 (1-6 American), essentially eliminating the program from postseason eligibility.

Facing the top run defense in the conference, senior QB Phillip Walker and the Owls took the air for an early statement score after a quick three-and-out by the Huskies. Throwing three times in a five-play, 74-yard drive, Walker capped the possession with a 23-yard rope to fellow senior RB Jahad Thomas, who pulled in the catch before falling into the end zone.

The ensuing Temple possession saw similar results, as Walker first completed a 44-yard toss to sophomore WR Ventell Bryant before dropping in another touchdown to Thomas, this time a short touch pass in the flats at the goal line.

For the game, Walker finished 12-of-18 through the air for 215 yards and three touchdowns, throwing two interceptions. Thomas, meanwhile, led the team in all-purpose yards, earning 17 carries for 83 yards while grabbing four receptions for 73 yards and two touchdowns.

As UConn took over for the third time having just run six total plays, the Huskies finally managed to find some semblance of rhythm. Driving down inside the Owl redzone, the unit finally stalled and was forced to



attempt a 35-yard field goal, one that was promptly blocked by senior DL Praise Martin-Oguike.

With momentum firmly in Temple's corner following the block, the Owls exploited the faltering Husky defense, turning to their strength: power rushing. Highlighted by the one-two punch of Thomas and sophomore RB Ryquell Armstead, Temple pounded out 59 yards on the ground before turning to Walker to close out the unit's third-straight scoring possession.

The senior proceeded to work in his third touchdown pass of the matchup, finding TE Romond Deloatch on an 18-yard fade up the left centerline. For Deloatch, the score marked his first on offense this season, as

the senior who moonlights at defensive end scooped a fumble into the end zone against SMU earlier this year.

While the Temple defense continued to hold UConn scoreless throughout the second quarter, the Owls' offense finally slowed down. The group's best drive of the period — a 10-play, 54-yard possession — ended abruptly at the goal line, as Husky defender Obi Melifonwu intercepted a pass intended for Bryant.

The second half told a similar story for both squads, as the UConn offense was consistently smothered by the staunch Temple defensive front. Offensively, the Owls were able to move the ball but struggled to build on the 21-0 lead, their best opportunity ending in another Melifonwu pick, this time in the back of the end zone.

A bright spot for the offense, however, came from Armstead, who picked up a team-best 133 yards on the ground behind 20 carries. Combined with Thomas, the two backs pounded the UConn defense, grinding the clock and churning out yardage.

TEMPLE RECORDS SECOND STRAIGHT SHUTOUT ON THE ROAD

NEW ORLEANS — With senior QB Phillip Walker breaking off serious yardage through the air to supplement a smothering defensive effort, Temple continued to control its own conference destiny in a solid 31-0 shutout victory over Tulane Saturday afternoon at Yulman Stadium.

With the win, the Owls improve to 8-3 (6-1 American) on the season, good for first in the East Division with just one game remaining. Paired with the 21-0 victory two weeks ago over UConn, blanking the Green Wave marked the first back-to-back shutout wins since October 2011 when Temple did the same to Ball State and Buffalo. The Owls now have not been scored upon for 10 straight quarters.

Choked up early in the ground game by a relentless Green Wave defensive front, Temple turned to Walker and the Owls' air raid for production. The four-year starter found his stride quickly, hitting 10-of-22 for 223 yards in the first half alone.

The senior's primary target throughout the matchup: sophomore WR Ventell Bryant, who grabbed nine receptions for a career-best 168 yards and one touchdown. On multiple occasions, Bryant pulled in passes over 20-yards, including one that set up the opening two-yard score for senior RB Jahad Thomas.

Meanwhile, the usually potent rushing attack suffered despite persistent attempts against the Tulane defense, even faltering at the goal line during a fourth-down try early in the second quarter.

Even though the offense struggled moving the ball with consistency during the first half, the Owls' defense remained as resilient as ever. The unit pressured Tulane into uncomfortable situations drive after drive, forcing seven three-and-outs in addition to the shutout on the scoreboard.

The second half saw similar results, particularly from the defensive side of the ball. However, the offense woke



up as Walker manufactured a number of scoring possessions during the final two quarters.

First, the senior quarterback led a 73-yard, 14-play drive that culminated with a 12-yard toss to Bryant for a touchdown. A quick three-and-out from the defense allowed the momentum to stick with the Owls, and the offense capitalized.

In a much shorter five-play possession, two critical pass plays helped put Temple into the end zone. Freshman Isaiah Wright started things off two snaps in, grabbing a 30-yard pass up the centerline before a screen to Thomas saw the senior weave 42-yards for his second score.

Lastly, midway through the final period, the Owls' ground game finally found its footing, as a slew of ball carriers

picked up 84 yards on a 10-play drive. Wright capped the grind-it-out possession with authority, bursting through the Tulane center for a 22-yard touchdown.

Walker was able to close the game 18-for-33 through the air for 337 yards and two scores. After weeks of utilizing what seemed-to-be an unstoppable ground game, the senior quarterback proved the Owls are as much a threat when he drops back to throw as when he hands the ball off.

OWLS WRAP UP AMERICAN CONFERENCE
EAST DIVISION CROWN WITH SIXTH STRAIGHT VICTORY

PHILADELPHIA — In need of a victory to advance to the American Athletic Conference Championship for the second straight season, senior QB Phillip Walker and the Temple offense outpaced the potent East Carolina air raid to seal the East Division behind a 37-10 mark Saturday evening at Lincoln Financial Field.

With their sixth straight win, the Owls improve to 9-3 (7-1 American) on the season, locking up the title of East Division Champions on the way. With USF knocking off rival UCF, 48-31, earlier on Saturday, a victory over the Pirates was required to finish atop the hotly contested division.

The first half featured a quick start from both offenses, as East Carolina snapped the Owl defense's 10-quarter scoreless streak on the game's opening possession. Primarily due to the efforts of QB Gardner Minshew, the Pirates orchestrated an 11-play drive capped with a 13-yard touchdown pass, showing little fear in facing off against the conference's top passing defense.

Walker and the offense responded immediately on the ensuing drive, however, as sophomore RB Ryquell Armstead punched in a two-yard score after a perfectly placed 44-yard toss to junior WR Adonis Jennings, who had a career-high 100 yards on six receptions, set up the Owls in the red zone.

A slew of defensive stands from both squads ratcheted down the excitement throughout the remainder of the first quarter and well into the second. With just 2:04 remaining in the half, though, Armstead notched his second touchdown of the game — this time from one-yard out — to close out a 68-yard, 12-play possession.

During that drive, Walker earned himself another place in the school record books, breaking the 10,000-yard passing mark on a short six-yard out route, a first for any Temple quarterback. The senior would conclude his final home game with the Owls a statistically strong 12-of-20 for 158 yards and no touchdowns, ending his career in Lincoln Financial Field the essence of a true game manager.

The Temple defense continued to dominate the point-of-attack after a deep kickoff return by East Carolina, as senior DL Praise Martin-Oguike broke through the offensive front to force a fumble during a sack of Minchew, recovering the ball in the process.



The Owls' offense capitalized in decisive fashion over the course of two plays, both courtesy of senior RB Jahad Thomas. First, the elusive tailback turned what looked to be a dead-end sweep into a 28-yard scramble before forcing his way into the endzone on a three-yard rush up the Pirate center, securing a 21-7 lead for Temple entering halftime.

On the evening, Thomas would rack up a team-best 155 yards on 24 carries for two scores, balancing out the precise passing attack Walker consistently imposed upon the East Carolina defense.

The scoring would not continue until late in the third quarter, as once again the Temple ground game paid dividends with a three-yard

Thomas rush for the score. With the touchdown, the senior running back has now notched a pair of end-zone appearances in nine of his 10 games this season.

The final period saw only a pair of field goals, one from each team, before sophomore RB Jager Gardner put an exclamation point on the win with an untouched 14-yard touchdown sprint. It was the fifth rushing score on the night for the Owls.

As for the Temple defense, the unit wrapped up another stellar performance, allowing just 225 total yards with the only serious blemish coming on the matchup's opening drive, garnering a single turnover as well.

TEMPLE WINS AMERICAN CONFERENCE CHAMPIONSHIP WITH ROAD VICTORY

ANNAPOLIS — Battling a multitude of uncompromising conditions, including a hostile crowd and a slew of historical shortcomings, Temple exorcised its figurative demons behind a 34-10 win over No. 19 Navy, securing the American Athletic Conference Championship on Saturday afternoon at Navy-Marine Corps Memorial Field.

With their seventh consecutive victory, the Owls improve to 10-3 (7-1 American) on the season, locking up the program's first conference championship since earning the 1967 Middle Atlantic Conference title. Furthermore, the victory pushed Temple back into the 10-win column for the second straight year, another first for the Owls, setting up the team for another shot at the elusive (and record-breaking) 11th win.

Despite an unfavorable wind pinning the Owls' offense deep in their own territory to start the game, senior QB Phillip Walker and Co. proceeded to methodically work their system on a 12-play, 75-yard scoring drive. The unit threw an unpredictable mix of run and pass at the Navy defensive front, capping off the game's opening possession with senior RB Jahad Thomas' untouched 15-yard sweep up the left sideline and into the endzone.

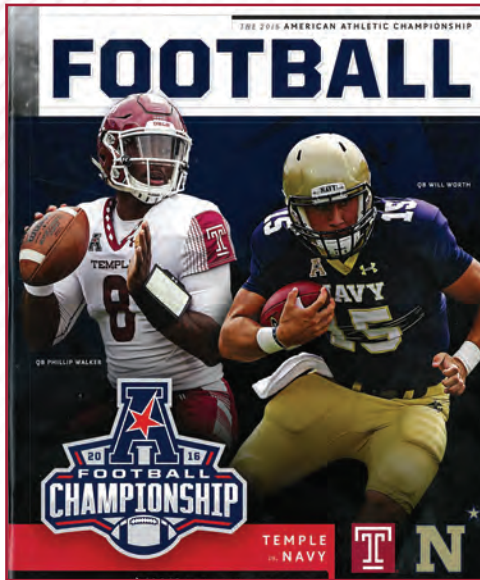
The Temple defense continued to live up to the reputation it established over the last six games, surrendering just 28 yards before forcing a turnover-on-downs as the Midshipmen failed to convert a long fourth-and-seven just across midfield.

With solid field position and momentum on their side, the offense took advantage behind, once again, a well-balanced attack. Situated just outside the red zone and fighting a relentless wind, Walker tossed a dime to WR Ventell Bryant on a 22-yard corner route, allowing the sophomore space to shake his shadow and walk in for the touchdown and a two-score lead.

On the day, Walker finished 16-of-25 for 199 yards and two scores, helping complement the usually ground-centric offense with his accurate passing game. For his efforts, the senior earned the game's Most Outstanding Player honor, standing apart due to his role in setting up Temple in its quick start.

The Navy offense finally came to life on the ensuing possession, converting a crucial third down with a 34-yard toss up the left sideline. Junior safety Sean Chandler, who had been fooled on the deep pass, fixed his own mistake a snap later, sniffing out a pitch and forcing a fumble out of the usually turnover-resistant Midshipmen.

Calmly working with a 14-point edge and a now quiet crowd, Walker maneuvered the Owls to yet another scoring drive, this time singling out WR Keith Kirkwood on a 56-yard strike down the field's centerline. The junior would end the game with a career-high in receiving yards (98) in addition to tying his career-best in catches (5).



Navy soaked up a boatload of clock after taking over two possessions later, chipping away chunks of yards with its famed triple-option. On a single play, however, both Temple and the Midshipmen suffered significant losses, as Navy QB Will Worth was injured on a head-to-head collision with senior Owl LB Avery Williams, who was summarily injured and also ejected for targeting.

Reserve QB Zach Abey led his squad nearly the length of the field following the injury, finally getting stonewalled just short of the endzone at the six-yard line. The Midshipmen proceeded to end Temple's shutout bid, tacking on a field goal and slightly cutting the lead with just 5:12 left in the first half.

Walker and the offense sought to reclaim the 21-point advantage, setting up freshman kicker and second-team All-Conference selection Aaron Boumerhi twice, the first missing left from 50-yards out before watching his second — a career-long 48-yarder courtesy of senior DB Nate Hairston's interception — sail through the uprights.

The second half started just as positively as the first, as the Temple defense forced its second turnover-on-downs of the game. As the quarter progressed, though, Navy was able to finally find the endzone, cutting the lead to 14 as the pair entered the final period.

With possession entering the fourth quarter, Temple was able to burn through just shy of five minutes before the Midshipmen could slow them down, concluding the drive with a 42-yard field goal connection from Boumerhi, good for a 17-point edge.

Despite Navy refusing to concede, the Temple defense stood strong as the clock continued to wind down, first forcing yet another turnover-on-downs before senior DL Haason Reddick picked off Abey's pass on the right sideline.

Sophomore RB Ryquell Armstead cleaned up any lingering doubts a play later, breaking off a 30-yard rush for a game-sealing touchdown.

TEMPLE FAILS IN LATE COMEBACK ATTEMPT
VS. WAKE FOREST

ANNAPOLIS — Facing off in the program's first ever back-to-back post-season appearance, No. 24 Temple came up short, 34-26, against ACC opponent Wake Forest in the Military Bowl Tuesday afternoon at Navy-Marine Corps Memorial Stadium.

Following the loss, the Owls fell to 10-4 (7-1 American) on the season, failing to reach the record 11th win Temple has been chasing these past two seasons. Despite falling behind 31-7 in the first half, Temple came surging back in the second, scoring two touchdowns and three field goals before coming up short on the final drive.

Right out of the gate, Temple showed its resolve on both sides of the ball, initially forcing an interception on the third play from scrimmage to set up the offense in ideal field position. Senior QB Phillip Walker and Co. took advantage one snap later, dropping in a 48-yard dime to junior WR Adonis Jennings, who carried his defender into the end zone.

Unfortunately, the Wake Forest offense woke up two possessions later, scoring on each of their next five drives up to the end of the first half. First, Demon Deacon QB John Wolford found his tight end on a 41-yard pass up the centerline to even the score at seven apiece. Next, after an Owls' three-and-out, Wake Forest drove 54 yards to another end zone appearance, this time a 20-yard pass from Wolford.

A muffed punt by Temple DB Sean Chandler set up the Demon Deacons inside the Owls' 10-yard line, leading to an 8-yard rush for yet-another touchdown. During the second quarter, the Wake Forest onslaught continued, as Wolford led his unit to, first, a field goal before wrapping up the half with a three-yard touchdown rush.

Temple responded in its final possession of the first half, knocking in a 45-yard field goal by freshman Aaron Boumerhi after an 11-play, 54-yard drive.

Similar to how the game began, the Owls' offense saw a spark from Jennings as the second half kicked off, this time watching the junior weave his way through the Demon Deacon defense for a 58-yard score just three snaps in.

The defense held its ground on the ensuing possession, as sophomore DB Delvon Randall intercepted Wake



Forest in the end zone to squash any Demon Deacon response. Behind the efforts of Walker and multiple downfield connections, including two perfectly placed darts to sophomore WR Ventell Bryant and junior WR Keith Kirkwood, the Owls set up Boumerhi for his second field goal attempt.

On the following two possessions, after two punts from Wake Forest, Temple looked to Boumerhi yet again, watching the freshman all-conference selection drill his third and fourth field goals of the day from 32 and 38 yards out, cutting the score to under one possession.

Wake Forest extended its lead back to eight points after a field goal of their

own, ensuring the Owls would need both a touchdown and two-point conversion to force overtime. Unfortunately for Temple, the offense was unable to convert a first down as the Demon Deacons took over on downs and were able to kneel the ball to secure their victory.

football continued to grow by leaps and bounds despite the Depression.

The 1930s saw the establishment of several bowl games and the first Associated Press national poll to determine the best teams in the country. The Temple football program



continued to grow as well, making a huge national splash with the hiring of college coaching legend Glenn S. Warner.

The Pop Warner Years

"Pop" Warner was one of football's great innovators. He pioneered the use of several offensive formations (the single wing, the double wing, the unbalanced line) while building powerful programs at Pittsburgh and Stanford. After carrying his legend from the East Coast to the West Coast, Warner was lured away from Stanford by Temple in December 1932.

"The Old Fox"—another one of Warner's many nicknames—had a successful 1933 debut at Owl Stadium against South Carolina, a dangerous opponent from the south. Edward Zukas had an 80-yard punt return for a touchdown in the first quarter to send the Owls on their way to a 26-6 triumph.

Another round of Hall of Famers took their place under Warner's guidance, most notably Pete Stevens, Dave Smukler, Stan Grayson and Chet Messervey. Stevens joined the team in 1933 and was named team captain in 1934. Smukler was a game-breaking running back who made an immediate impact on the team in 1934.

The Owls won their first two games that season against Virginia Tech (34-0) and Texas A&M (40-6). After a 6-6 tie against Indiana, Warner's squad won five straight against tough competition that included West Virginia, Holy Cross and Carnegie Tech. Temple finished the run with a 22-0 rout of Villanova, and then played Bucknell to a scoreless tie in the regular season finale.

The 1934 backfield quartet of Smukler, quarterback Glenn Frey and running backs Danny Testa and Wilfred H. Longsdorff was one of the best in the nation. Their exploits (and the team's 7-0-2 record) drew the attention of the Mid-Winter Sports Association of New Orleans, which was busy planning the first Sugar Bowl. Warner's Owls were invited to play unbeaten Tulane in that contest on Jan. 1, 1935.

Smukler was a one-man show in the first half of the Sugar Bowl, tossing a touchdown pass to Danny Testa and running the ball in for another score. He also converted both extra points to give the Owls a 14-0 lead. Tulane responded to the second touchdown with a huge play from its star, Claude "Monk" Simons, who took a lateral on the ensuing kickoff and raced 85 yards for a touchdown. The Green Wave knotted the score at 14-14 in the third quarter and it seemed for a while that the game would end in a tie. With less than three minutes remaining, though, Tulane scored on a pass that had been deflected by a Temple defender. The Owls blocked the extra point and mounted one last offensive drive, but they could not put the ball in the end zone. They lost, 20-14.

Warner guided the Temple program for the next four years against the nation's toughest competition. The Owls beat tough southern schools Texas A&M and Vanderbilt in 1935 and began a series of games against Michigan State. The 1938 squad played three teams that finished the season in the nation's Top 10 (Pittsburgh, Holy Cross and eventual national champion, Texas Christian).

Temple was a heavy underdog in what would turn out to be Warner's finale, a contest at Florida on Dec. 3, 1938. Florida was coached by Josh Cody, who was just a couple years

away from beginning a 15-year career at Temple. Playing in 80-degree heat, the Owls upset the Gators, 20-12, thanks in large part to a 102-yard kickoff return by Jimmy Powers. After missing the entire 1939 season due to injury, Powers returned the opening kickoff against Michigan State 105 yards for a touchdown in 1940. The returns remain the two longest plays in Temple football history.

The Post-Warner Years

Warner's top assistant, Fred H. Swan, took over as head coach in 1939. His tenure may have been doomed from the start. The Owls lost his debut game against Georgetown, 3-2, on a field goal with 25 seconds to go. The field goal had been preceded by a controversial pass interference penalty against the Owls.

The following season, Temple hired Ray Morrison as head coach. Morrison had gained fame as an All-American player at Vanderbilt and head coach at Southern Methodist University. One of Morrison's top assistants was Josh Cody. The new coach promised a wide-open offensive attack that he had developed in the south.

The high-scoring offense was on display in the first game of the 1940 season, a 64-7 victory over Muhlenberg. The Owls jumped to a 45-0 halftime lead in the contest and never looked back. Running back "Handy" Andy Tomasic had a 73-yard touchdown run. Tomasic, nicknamed "The Hokendauqua Hurricane" for his hometown near Allentown, Pa., was one of several Temple Hall of Famers that maintained the program's level of national success in the 1940s.

Tackles Chuck Drulis and Bucko Kilroy were All-East selections and Kilroy was Temple's first Honorable Mention All-American. Running back Phil Slosburg was an All-East pick and was chosen to play in the Blue-Gray All-Star Game. Other stars for the Cherry and White included Mike Jarmoluk, Joe Nejman and John Rogers.

The Owls fielded particularly strong teams in 1941 and 1945. The team got off to a 6-1 start in 1941, beating rivals Penn State, Bucknell and Villanova. That marks the only time in school history that all three foes were beaten in the same season. Hopes for a bowl bid were dashed though, with a 46-0 loss at Michigan State in the next-to-last game of the season. The following week, the Owls were heavy underdogs on a trip to Eastern power Holy Cross. They responded with a 31-13 upset victory to finish the season at 7-2.

The 1945 campaign held similar promise as Temple defeated Eastern powers Syracuse (7-6) and Pittsburgh (6-0) on the way to a 6-0 start. The Owls were among the favorites to receive an Orange Bowl bid until suffering a 27-0 loss at Penn State. History repeated itself with a visit to heavily favored Holy Cross the following week. Holy Cross was undefeated at the time and had become the Orange Bowl favorite. Temple pulled off one of the greatest upsets in school history, winning 14-6 thanks to touchdown runs by quarterback Jack Burns and running back Gene Zawolksi. Holy Cross received the Orange Bowl bid anyway, though the Owls received strong consideration for the Cotton Bowl—partially thanks to Morrison's ties with SMU. Temple's 7-1 squad of 1945 ranks as one of its best ever.

Morrison coached the Owls through 1948, and was followed by Albert P. Kawal. The new coach's first team featured a hard-nosed running back who nearly became the first 1,000-yard rusher in school history. Temple Hall of Famer Bill Bernardo gained 994 yards on the ground in 1949, a school record that stood until 1973. The roster also included Hall of Famer Gavin White, who would later enjoy a successful coaching career and would serve as Temple's director of athletics in the 1980s.

Cody replaced Yeomans as Temple's athletic director in 1952, as the University was entering the first few years of an "administrative de-emphasis" of intercollegiate athletics. By the mid-1950s, the Owls were no longer playing a national schedule, replacing the likes of Michigan State and West Virginia with Lafayette and Gettysburg. Bucknell remained a yearly foe, though Villanova had been dropped from the schedule in 1944.

Kawal coached the Owls through 1954, and then Cody took over for the 1955 campaign. The Owls went 0-8 that season, their first winless mark since 1923, and Cody hired 1934 team captain Pete Stevens to coach the team in 1956. Stevens remains the only former Temple player to have coached the team in the modern era.

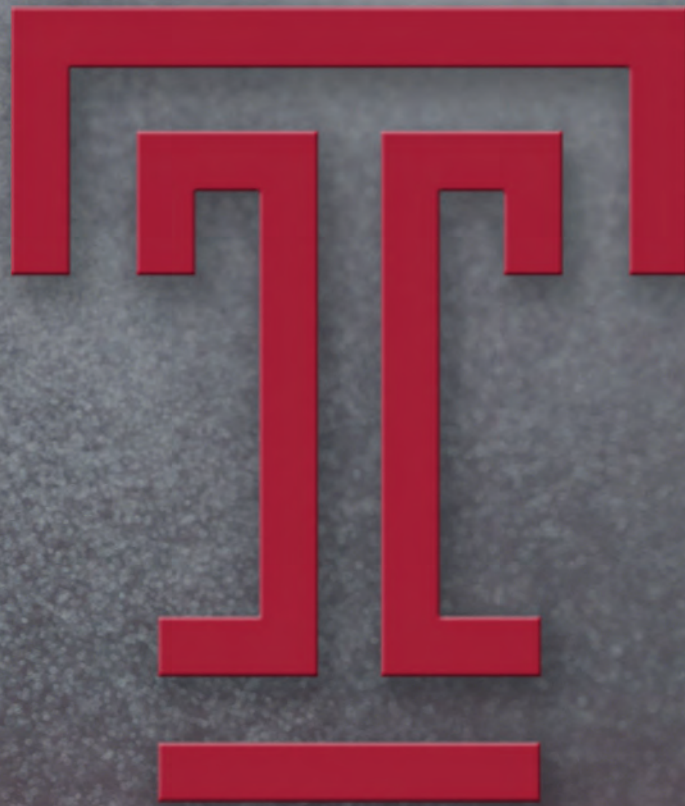
Temple went 3-5 in 1956 and opened the 1957 season with two losses. The Owls then beat Lafayette, 13-12, at Temple Stadium. They would not win another game for nearly three years. The Owls lost their final four games of the 1957 campaign and finished 0-8 in 1958 and 0-9 in 1959. The 21-game losing streak is the longest in school history.

Ernie Casale took over as Temple's athletic director in 1959. Years later, he recalled a 12-8 loss that season against Drexel that attracted just 200 fans on a rainy Halloween night in Philadelphia. The Owls had just 24 players in uniform for their 1959 season finale at Gettysburg.

The following year brought a new head coach, George Makris, to North Broad Street. Makris had established a fine coaching reputation at Bolling Air Force Base in Washington, D.C. The 21-game losing streak came to an end in the 1960 season opener against Kings Point.

The Owls trailed 13-0 in the first half of the contest, but then started their comeback, eventually taking an 18-13 lead on Charlie Lotson's 86-yard interception return for a

touchdown. Lotson later recovered a fumble that set up the game-clinching touchdown. Running back Ernie Wayland scored two touchdowns as the Cherry and White posted a 26-13 victory. Many of the 10,000 fans in attendance stormed the field and tore down the goalposts in celebration.

Middle Atlantic Conference

Temple continued to re-establish itself in the 1960s, playing in the University Division of the Middle Atlantic States Conference. The other losing streak that had to be brought to an end was a long skid against conference rival Bucknell. While the Owls dominated the series from 1938 to 1949, compiling a record of 9-1-2 during that stretch, they had not beaten the Bison since 1953. The losing streak had reached eight by 1962.

The game was up for grabs that year. Bucknell took a 7-0 lead, but the Owls responded with a one-yard touchdown run by running back Bill Cosby (who would eventually gain greater fame). The Owls then jumped ahead, 14-7, on a 38-yard interception return for a touchdown by Joe Morelli. Late in the contest, Bucknell went ahead again, 15-14, scoring a TD and converting a two-point play. The Owls came back with a drive to the Bucknell one-yard line, but fumbled the ball away. Temple got one last chance on offense and advanced the ball deep into Bucknell territory. With 15 seconds left, the Owls lined up for a game-winning field goal attempt. It missed, and the Bison kept possession of "The Old Shoe."

Things got significantly better for the Cherry and White though, as the team posted a 5-3-1 mark in 1963, the school's first winning record since 1951. The Owls finished second in the league standings in 1964 and challenged for the Middle Atlantic title in 1965 and 1966. The 1966 campaign also brought "The Old Shoe" back to North Broad Street.

That season's battle with Bucknell was a blowout from the beginning. Temple held a 20-0 lead at the end of the first quarter, and it was 41-7 by halftime. Late in the first half, sophomore quarterback John Waller was substituted in place of starter Tom DeFelice. Waller connected with wide receiver Jim Callahan for a couple of touchdowns, and then a couple more. Entering the fourth quarter, the Owls held a 75-14 lead and Waller had thrown five touchdowns, four of them to Callahan. One more Waller-to-Callahan TD pass set the school's single-game record for touchdown passes and receptions. The Owls won, 82-28, posting the second-highest point total in school history.

"The Old Shoe" stayed in Philadelphia the next season as the Owls beat Bucknell and every other Middle Atlantic Conference foe to win the 1967 league title. Another school record was broken against the Bison, this time as running back Mike Busch carried the ball a record 38 times for a record 176 yards in a 13-8 victory that clinched a tie for the league title. DeFelice guided the squad to a 45-27 victory over Gettysburg the following week to clinch the crown outright. Temple received strong consideration for the Tangerine Bowl that year but was not selected.



Records continued to fall in 1968, especially passing records, as Waller-to-Callahan became one of the most dangerous pass-and-catch duos in the country. Waller set school marks with 35 completions, 62 attempts and 440 yards passing in a 50-40 loss to Buffalo. He finished the year as the first 2,000-yard passer in Temple history and set just about every other single-season and career passing record for the Owls. Callahan's total of 14 TD receptions in 1968 went unmatched until 2008 [by Bruce Francis]. Amazingly, Callahan's first 10 receptions were all for TDs.

The Owls left the Middle Atlantic Conference after the 1969 season so they could return to playing a full Division I-A schedule. Makris was replaced by Wayne Hardin, a

well-known coach who had six successful seasons at Navy. Hardin's Midshipmen had beaten Army in five of their six meetings. His tenure on North Broad Street did not have such an auspicious beginning.

The Hardin Years

The opponent was Akron in the 1970 season opener. The Zips scored on their first three possessions and never looked back in a 21-0 victory over the Owls. Hardin's team bounced back the following week and beat Bucknell, 10-3, in the last meeting between the two schools. Temple now had possession of "The Old Shoe" trophy for good. The winning ways continued through the 1970 campaign, though the Owls lost their season finale against Villanova, 31-26. It was the first meeting between the two teams since 1943, and it was closely contested from start to finish. Temple-Villanova was the closing game of the regular season every year from 1970 to 1980.

The Owls compiled a record of 18-9-1 during Hardin's first three years as head coach and rolled on from there. Temple beat Villanova, 12-10, in the 1972 season finale. Temple Hall of Fame kicker Nick Mike-Mayer booted two field goals and the game-clinching touchdown was set up on a fumble recovery by Bob Bernardo, the son of Temple Hall of Famer Bill Bernardo. Wide receiver Clint Graves set a school record in 1972 with 63 receptions, and he set the single-game mark with 15 catches against Rhode Island.

Hardin's first few teams featured several other stars, including quarterback Doug Shobert, an Honorable Mention All-American in 1971; tight end Randy Grossman, a Third Team All-American in 1972; and offensive guard Bill Singletary, a First Team All-American in 1972. Singletary is the only football player in Temple history to have his number (64) retired.

The Owls re-established themselves as one of the dominant programs in the East in 1973, finishing the season at 9-1 to set a school record for wins. The team won its final eight games of the season, including a 34-0 shutout of Villanova in which the defense forced 10 turnovers. Hardin's veer offense was almost impossible to stop, as the team surpassed the 30-point mark in eight of 10 games. The backfield tandem of Tom Sloan and Henry Hynoski keyed a powerful rushing attack, and the passing game was left in the capable hands of Steve Joachim. Sloan became the first 1,000-yard rusher in school history, finishing the year with 1,036 yards. Hynoski surpassed the 1,000-yard mark in 1974.

The Temple offense was just as tough to stop that season, and the defense was downright stingy. The Owls won their first six games of 1974, running their win streak to 14 games. It was the longest streak in the nation and it still stands as the longest in school history. In a nine-game stretch that spanned two seasons, Temple outscored its opponents, 361-58. The 14th victim of Hardin's Owls was Delaware, which battled hard before losing a 21-17 contest at Veterans Stadium. That marked Temple's first game at the South Philadelphia venue. The win streak was snapped the following week by Cincinnati, 22-20. The Owls finished the season with a record of 8-2, winning their finale against Villanova, 17-7, in another game played at The Vet.

The awards came piling in after the season. Joachim received numerous All-American honors, offensive guard Pat Staub was an All-East choice and defensive tackle Joe Klecko was an Honorable Mention All-American. The accolades culminated in Joachim being selected the Maxwell Award winner as National Player of the Year.

The 1975 season opener provided another milestone for the Owls, as the team faced Penn State for the first time since 1952. Running back Bob Harris shocked the Nittany Lions by breaking through the middle for a 76-yard touchdown on the first play from scrimmage. The up-and-back contest tilted toward the Owls in the fourth quarter when Anthony Anderson ran for a touchdown that gave Temple a 23-18 lead. But Penn State would score the last touchdown after a long punt return and win the game, 26-25.

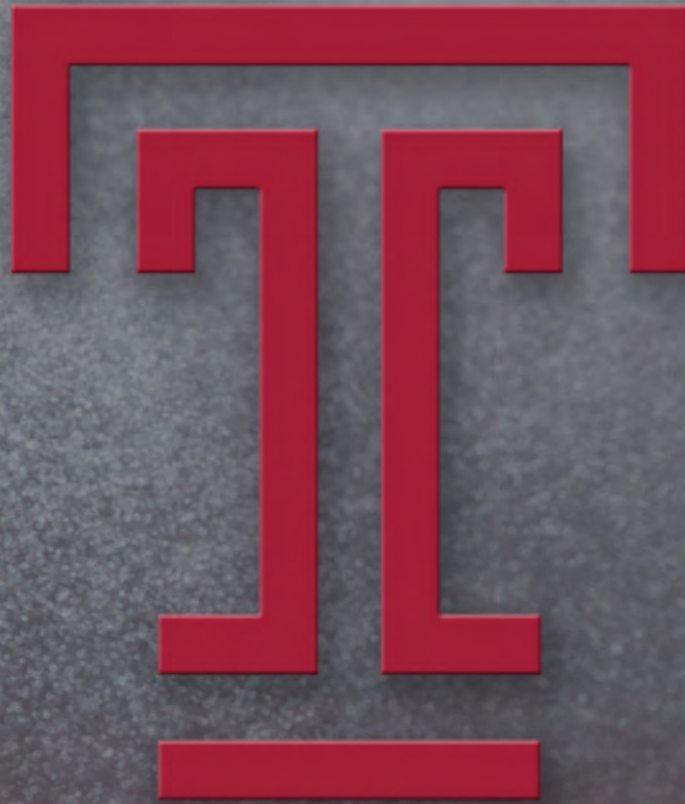
The teams played another one-point game the following year at Veterans Stadium. Beginning in 1976, The Vet became the new home of the Temple football team. Early in the season, the stadium hosted the first meeting between Temple and Grambling, which was coached by the legendary Eddie Robinson. The Owls won the contest, 31-30. That score was reversed when Penn State returned to town in October. Temple scored on the last play of the game to make the score 31-30, and Hardin opted for a two-point conversion attempt to beat the Nittany Lions. The conversion attempt failed.

Klecko ranked as the top tackler in school history following the 1976 season. Another group of stars then arrived on campus that would eventually produce the most successful season in school history. Temple Hall of Famers Anthony Anderson and Steve Watson built that success in 1977 and 1978. The Owls wrapped up both years with a trip to Japan to play in the Mirage Bowl. Tokyo's Korakeun Stadium hosted Temple-Grambling in 1977 and Temple-Boston College in 1978. Running back Zachary Dixon set a single-season school rushing record in the BC game. He finished the year with 1,153 yards on the ground, and the Owls finished with a record of 7-3-1.

The 1979 Season

The 1979 campaign opened with three straight victories before Hardin's squad lost to

1935 SUGAR BOWL

NEW ORLEANS, La. — The Mid-Winter Sports Association of New Orleans was formed in 1934 to formulate plans for an annual New Year's Day football classic. On Dec. 2, 1934, the Association's executive board selected Tulane (9-1), unbeaten in the South, and unbeaten Temple (7-0-2), coached by Glenn "Pop" Warner, to play in the first game.

The game was a financial and artistic success; however, the final 20-14 result was a heart-breaker for Temple fans. The Owls built up a 14-point lead only to see Tulane score touchdowns in the second, third, and fourth quarters to win the game.

The inaugural Sugar Bowl turned into a contest between two All-Americans—Temple's Dave Smukler (who played all 60 minutes) and Tulane's Claude "Monk" Simons. After the Owls' Danny Testa scored the first touchdown in Sugar Bowl history with a seven-yard TD reception from Smukler. Smukler rushed for second score. With Smukler converting both extra points, the Owls were up 14-0.

On the next kickoff, Johnny McDaniel received the ball and lateraled to Simons, who scampered 85 yards for a touchdown. The Owls held a 14-7 edge at halftime.

Dick Hardy scored the tying touchdown in the third quarter on an 11-yard pass from Bucky Bryan.

With less than three minutes left, Hardy notched the game-winning score on a 43-yard reception in the end zone. Temple blocked the extra point attempt, but was unable to score on its final drive. The hometown team would go on to win the first Sugar Bowl. Tulane Stadium served as home for the Sugar Bowl until 1975 when it moved to its present site— the Louisiana Superdome.

Temple Notables

- Temple took the train from Philadelphia to Baton Rouge, La., a three-day ride.
- During a stop in Atlanta, Ga., the Owls stretched their legs on the station platform and held a 10-minute "workout" with a loaf of bread as a football.
- Six players were ill with the grip ("flu") but made the trip.
- Halfback Horace Mowry, who fractured his wrist



against Bucknell in the regular-season finale, was fitted with a special cast for the bowl game. However, he did not start the game.

The following players saw action in the game: LE Lloyd Wise (60 mins.), LT William Doherty (60), LG John Boyd (28), C Peter Stevens (60), RG Stanley Gurzynski (60), RT James Russell (60), RE Elmer Anderson (45), QB Glenn Frey (60), RHB John Stonik (18), LHB Daniel Testa (35), FB David Smukler (60), LG Thomas Miller (32), RE Joseph Zanin (15), RHB Horace Mowrey (42), LHB Wilfred Longsdorff (25).

Temple and Tulane each received \$27,800 from the gate receipts, almost double their guarantee. Admission prices were \$1.50 and \$3.50.

EAST RUTHERFORD, N.J. — Temple ended its most successful season with its first-ever bowl victory. It was the Owls' 10th win of the year (a team record) and earned Wayne Hardin's team a spot in the AP and UPI Top 20. Temple was ranked 17th in both polls, the first time the Temple football team was nationally ranked in the final wire service polls.

Appearing in their first bowl game in 45 years, the Owls jumped out to a quick 21-0 lead in the first quarter, scoring on their first three possessions. Kevin Duckett scored the first two TDs on eight and four-yard runs. QB Brian Broomell connected on a seven-yard pass to Wiley Pitts for the third score. TU had 193 yards of total offense, including 150 yards rushing, in the opening stanza.

Temple then withstood a 17-point California rally before clinching the game with a 14-play, 78-yard scoring drive over 5:58 in the fourth quarter. Broomell tossed a five-yard touchdown pass to Gerald "Sweet Feet" Lucear for the win.

The telling statistic of the game was the rushing total, with Temple gaining 300 yards on the ground while holding the Golden Bears to only 23 yards.

The game's Most Valuable Player, Temple's Mark Bright, gained 112 of those yards on 19 carries, while backfield teammate Kevin Duckett ran for 92 yards and two touchdowns. Temple quarterback Brian Broomell joined in the act by tossing touchdown strikes to Wiley Pitts and Gerald Lucear.

- Temple was ranked No. 17 in the United Press International and the Associated Press final polls.
- Eight members of the 1935 Sugar Bowl team attended the game as guests of Temple President Marvin Wachman.

City, eating at Mama Leone's and attending the musical The 1940s Radio Hour on Broadway.

• Temple received a \$225,000 payout from the gate receipts. Admission prices were \$5 and \$12.

• After four years (1978-81), the Garden State Bowl was discontinued. That led to the formation of the Kickoff Classic, held at Giants Stadium to begin the football season.

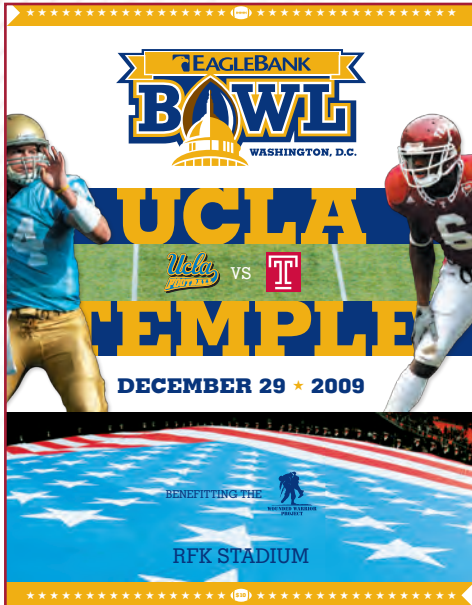

2009 EAGLE BANK BOWL

WASHINGTON, D.C. — UCLA scored 23 unanswered points to pull off a come-from-behind win over Temple, 30-21, Tuesday evening in the EagleBank Bowl. The Bruins (7-6) spoiled the Owls' (9-4) first appearance in a bowl since 1979, but not a remarkable season that included a school-record nine-game win streak and a co-regular season Mid-American Conference East Division Championship.

"We are obviously disappointed in the outcome, but I don't want to diminish what these seniors have accomplished in their careers," Temple head coach Al Golden said. "Unfortunately ending but definitely have to give credit to how UCLA finished the game. We had an excellent game plan. I thought we came out with a lot of energy and a lot of passion...We went after them. I was proud of our kids for doing that, but we made too many mistakes."



A crowd of 23,072, with more than half donning Cherry and White, braved the frigid weather and blustery winds. The Owls had plenty to cheer about in the first half as the offense, directed by junior QB Vaughn Charlton and featuring the freshman backfield combination of Bernard Pierce and Matt Brown, found the end zone three times in building a 21-7 lead.

Making his first start since the Navy win on Oct. 31, Charlton (13-23, 159 yds., 1 TD) completed seven of his first eight passes for 95 yards, none bigger than the 26-yard TD to senior TE Steve Maneri that capped the Owls six-play, 80-yard opening drive.

UCLA answered two possessions later. After Terrence Austin returned a Jake Brownell punt 47 yards to the TU 46, freshman QB Kevin Prince (16-31, 222 yds, 2 TDs) found sophomore SE Nelson Rosario streaking down the left sidelines on the first play for a 46-yard score to tie the game, 7-7.

Temple, which controlled the ball on offense for 21:27 of the 30 minutes of the opening half, started to get its running on track with Pierce and Brown playing tag-team to combine for 94 yards, 61 coming in the second quarter.

Playing his first game since suffering a shoulder injury on the first play of the Kent State game, Pierce gained 86 total yards, 53 rushing on 12 carries and 33 on three receptions. He looked like his old self, especially on the Owls' second scoring drive. He barreled 13 yards up the middle for a first down to midfield and capped it with an 11-yard TD run around right end.

With Temple leading 14-7, junior DB Marquise Liverpool picked off Prince at midfield and returned the ball 21 yards before being pulled down by his facemask.

Starting at their own 15, Temple quickly marched it in with Pierce moving the ball five yards before giving way to Brown, who made three straight rushes, the last up the middle for a two-yard touchdown to give Temple a 21-7 lead with 1:25 remaining in the half.

Both teams exchanged three-and-out possessions that gave the Bruins the ball with 17 seconds left and at their own 47. Prince made two quick first down strikes, the second for 19 yards to Chane Moline, who went out-of-bounds at the Temple 22 with one second on the clock.

Junior PK Kai Forbath, the 2009 Groza Award winner given to the nation's top kicker, converted his 36th straight field goal from within 50 yards to cut the margin to 21-10 at intermission.

Senior Terrence Austin returned the opening kickoff 30 yards to the UCLA 47 and then he capped a six-play Bruin scoring drive with a 32-yard TD reception to cut the margin to 21-17.

When the Owls took the field for their first possession of the second half, Pierce was not with them. In-

stead he was standing on the sideline in a Temple parka, as he injured his left shoulder and would sit out the half.

Temple had its only real opportunity to score in the half on its opening possession. Two big plays, the first was by Charlton — a 21-yard first down scramble, and the second by Brown, who broke a 29-yarder to the UCLA 18. Three straight rushes by Brown made it fourth-and-one at the UCLA 9. The Owls elected to go for it, but with their big back sidelined, Brown was stopped short, ending the drive.

After that, the Bruins defense, which featured three Associated Press All-Americans, was able to put the clamps on the Owl attack. After gaining 242 yards of total offense and 12 first downs in the first half, Temple managed just four first downs

and 40 yards of offense over the final 30 minutes.

The Owls only first down the remainder of the contest came on a roughing the kicker penalty that gave TU the ball at UCLA 40. Charlton then was picked off by first team All-America sophomore FS Rahim Moore, who recorded his nation's leading 10th interception on an acrobatic play defending junior WR Michael Campbell down the right sidelines.

Still, the Cherry and White defense, led by all-MAC performers Dominique Harris, Andre Neblett and Jaiquawn Jarrett, kept the Owls in the contest.

Temple held UCLA without a first down the remainder of the third quarter, and bent at the start of the fourth, before holding the Bruins to a 42-yard field goal by Forbath to make it 21-20 with 12:31 remaining to play.

The Owls defense stopped UCLA on its next possession as Alex Joseph and Muhammad Wilkerson corralled Prince in the backfield on a third and long at midfield. Temple took the ball at its own 18 and after Brown was stopped for a three-yard loss, Charlton was called for intentional grounding setting up a third and 20 from the TU 8. Charlton then was picked off at the line of scrimmage while looking for a short pass on the flat to Joe Jones by Akeem Ayers. Ayers, who would be named the MVP of the game, ran it in from two-yards out to give UCLA its first lead, 28-21.

Things went from bad to worse on Temple's next possession. James Nixon was tackled for a nine-yard loss on the first play. Brown, who finished with a game-high 83 yards on 20 carries, picked up three yards on the next play. Following an incomplete pass Brownell went back to punt, but the ball from center sailed over his head for a safety, making the score 30-21.

UCLA ran out the clock on the ensuing punt to end Temple's best season in three decades.

Pierce, who set the school record for touchdowns in a season (16) with his TD run tonight, and freshman Brandon McManus, who had three extra points, tied for the school single season scoring record with 96 points. They eclipsed the previous mark of 95 points set by PK Don Bitterlich in 1975.

ALBUQUERQUE-- Temple used three one-yard touchdown runs to jump out to a 21-0 lead over Wyoming and never looked back in posting a 37-15 over the Cowboys to win the Gildan New Mexico Bowl on Dec. 17 in front of 25,762. It is the second bowl game victory in program history and first since Temple defeated California, 28-17, in the 1979 Garden State Bowl.

The Owls finished the season on a four-game win streak at 9-4 overall. The win also extended Temple's Senior Class record to 31 wins over the last four seasons.

"I'm awful proud of our seniors, some great accomplishments from them," head coach Steve Addazio said. "That is our first bowl win since 1979 and our ninth win of the year for our seniors, their 31st win. It meant an awful lot to our program and our university."

Sophomore QB Chris Coyer was named the game's Offensive MVP, and senior LB Tahir Whitehead earned Defensive MVP honors. Coyer, showing no ill effects from a shoulder injury suffered in the team's final regular-season game against Kent State, was flawless directing the Temple attack. He completed eight of 12 passes for 169 yards and one touchdown and also rushed for 71 yards on 12 carries.

Whitehead, a second team All-MAC performer, had a team-high 11 tackles, leading an Owl defensive unit that allowed just 267 yards to the Cowboys.

Junior RB Bernard Pierce set the tone early for the Owls. Pierce, who rushed for 100 yards and two touchdowns on the day, had eight carries for 31 yards in Temple's opening drive. His last carry was a one-yard touchdown. That capped a 13-play, 90-yard drive that lasted 6:19 seconds.

Wyoming then marched down the field on an 11-play drive of its own, but junior FS Vaughn Carraway batted away a pass by freshman QB Brett Smith on a third and 16 play. Freshman PK Daniel Sullivan was then wide right on his 49-yard field goal giving the Owls the ball back on their own 31.

Senior WR Joe Jones broke a 35-yard run off a reverse on the first play of the Owls' second drive. It was one of nine straight rushes against the Cowboys 115th ranked rush defense. The last run was another Pierce one-yard TD, to make it 14-0 with 14:28 to play in the half.

Senior CB Kee-ayre Griffin then intercepted a Smith pass and returned it 30 yards to the Wyoming 35. Pierce and Coyer each had 12 yard first down runs before junior RB Matt Brown finished the drive with a one-yard TD run, making it 21-0.

The Cowboys finally got on the scoreboard as Smith connected with freshman WR Josh Doctson on a 21-yard touchdown on a 4th-and-three play with 37 seconds left in the half.

The Owls answered in one play as Coyer found a wide-open senior WR Rod Streater down the right sideline for a 61-yard touchdown to give Temple a 28-7 lead at halftime and momentum heading into the lockerroom.

Temple controlled the game on both sides of the ball in the second half. The only scoring for the Owls



came on the foot of junior PK Brandon McManus, who connected on three of three field goals. Wyoming finally found the end zone again with three seconds on the clock when Smith hit Kody Sutton for 14-yard touchdown.

Temple Notables

- Temple Captains: #85 DE Morkeith Brown, #77 OL John Palumbo, #43 DE Adrian Robinson, and #2 LB Tahir Whitehead.

- The win was Temple's second bowl win in school history. The Owls won the 1979 bowl, 28-17 over California.

- The win was the ninth win under first-year head coach Steve Addazio. He has the most wins in school history by a first-year head coach. He surpassed Wayne Hardin [1970-82] who had seven wins in 1970.

- Temple finished the 2011 season at 9-4 overall. This is the third consecutive season the Owls have posted at least eight victories and the second time in three seasons TU has won nine games.

- The win extended the school record for most wins (31) by any Senior Class in school history. The previous record was 28 wins from 1928-31. The 19 members of the Senior Class concluded their collegiate careers today.
- Senior DB Kee-ayre Griffin's interception in the second quarter was the fifth of his career and the third of his career. R-freshman Anthony Robey's interception in the second quarter was the first of his collegiate career.
- With 255 rushing yards on the day, Temple set the school record for rushing yards in a season (3,335). The previous record was 2,884 from 2009.
- Temple extended the school record for rushing touchdowns in a season. With three rushing TDs in the game, the Owls finished with 38 rushing TDs this season. The previous record was 29 rushing TDs, set by the 2009 team.
- Pierce added to his career records and finished with 324 career points, 53 career rushing touchdowns, and 54 total career touchdowns. He extended his season records to 27 touchdowns and 162 points.
- With four extra points, junior PK Brandon McManus has made 50 consecutive extra points (PAT), a new season record. He surpassed Ron Fioravanti (1979) who made 48 straight.
- The attendance of 25,762 is the second-largest bowl crowd to watch Temple. The most was 55,493 at the 1979 Garden State Bowl.
- Sophomore QB Chris Coyer (8-12-0, 169 yds 1ytd, 12 carries, 71 yds) was named the game's Offensive MVP, while senior LB Tahir Whitehead (11 tackles) earned Defensive MVP honors.

BOCA RATON, Fla. – #24 Temple couldn't complete a fourth-quarter comeback, as the Owls fell to Toledo, 32-17, in a steady downpour at the Marmot Boca Raton Bowl.

Temple's offense was sluggish in the first half, as the Owls were held to just 67 net yards. Toledo racked up 199 yards of offense, 168 in the air, using a safety, two field goals and a touchdown to lead 12-3 at the break.

The Owls came alive in the third quarter, holding Toledo scoreless, but settled for two field goals on offense, in closing the gap to 12-9.

In an action-packed fourth quarter, Temple finally found the end zone, avoiding being held without a touchdown for the first time all season. The

Owls made things interesting, converting an improbable two-point conversion to make it an eight-point game, but an on-side kick attempt was recovered by Toledo. The Rockets tacked on one more score and the Owls final drive stalled, ending the game.

Senior WR Brandon Shippen set a career-high with 70 yards receiving on four catches to lead the Owls, while classmate Robby Anderson finished with six catches for 66 yards. QB Phillip Walker went 23-42 for 236 yards and one interception.

The Owls were without the services of leading rusher Jahad Thomas, CB Tavon Young and LB Avery Williams, who exited the game at the half. They entered the game without Alex Wells as the first team all-conference safety suffered a hamstring injury earlier in the week.

After the teams traded punts to open up the game, Temple pinned Toledo to their own 1-yard line, giving the Owls good field position after forcing yet another Rockets' punt. Starting at their own 48-yard line, Temple used a 13-play 40-yard drive, ending with a 29-yard Austin Jones field goal to take a 3-0 lead with 1:13 left in the quarter.

Temple forced a three-and-out on Toledo's next possession, but the Rockets got on the board after a fumble from RB Jahad Thomas squirted out of the back of the end zone for a safety.

Leading 3-2, Toledo took the free kick out to their own 45, and took the lead after a five-play 55-yard drive. The score came on a 26-yard touchdown from Phillip Ely to Corey Jones, giving Toledo a 9-3 lead with 12:16 remaining in the second quarter.

Toledo tacked on a field goal as time expired to take a 12-3 lead into halftime. The Rockets forced a three-and-out from Temple, taking over at their own 42-yard line. Two big plays, including a 26-yard pass from Ely to Michael Roberts put Toledo in field goal range, where Jameson Vest made it a nine-point lead with a 38-



yard field goal.

Temple opened the second half with an eight-play 67-yard drive, capped by an Austin Jones field goal, cutting the lead to 12-6. A 40-yard pass from QB Phillip Walker to WR Ventell Bryant and a 13-yard rush from Brandon Shippen, set up Jones for a 25-yard FG, his 22nd of the year, setting a new single-season school record. Jones passed Don Bitterlich's 1975 total.

The Owls forced a three-and-out on Toledo's next possession, and then set up yet another Jones field goal. Sean Chandler started the Owls at midfield with a 12-yard punt return and Walker added a 14-yard rush to set up Jones' score, which put Temple within a field goal (12-9) with 6:11 remaining in the third.

Toledo marched down the field on their next possession, getting to Temple's 44-yard line. On a 3rd and 12, Temple SS Nate L. Smith broke up a pass in the end zone, keeping Toledo off the board.

The teams traded punts to open the fourth quarter, with Alex Starzyk booting a career-best 71-yarder for Temple. However, the kick was out of the reach of the Temple defense, trickling into the end zone for a touchback. On the next play, Toledo's Ely found Cody Thompson for an 80-yard touchdown, making it 19-9 Rockets with 12:41 to play.

Temple got down to the Toledo 34 on its next possession, but Walker was intercepted by the Rockets' Juwan Haynes at the 26-yard line. From there, Toledo put together a 74-yard drive that took 5:31 off the clock, ending with a 1-yard TD run from Kareem Hunt. The Owls blocked the extra point, setting the score to 25-9 with 5:46 to play.

After the Toledo score, Temple recorded its first touchdown of the game, capping an 11-play, 68-yard drive with a two-yard run from TE Kip Patton. Shippen had two big catches on the drive, and was thrown to as Toledo was flagged for pass interference in the end zone, setting up the touchdown. Temple elected to go for two, and Walker scrambled out of pressure and somehow found Anderson in the end zone, making it an eight-point game, 25-17, with 2:50 on the clock.

Temple went for the onside kick, but the referees signaled that Toledo came up with the ball under a pile of players at midfield. Hunt then tacked on an insurance score for the Rockets, scoring from 41-yards out to put the game out of reach at 32-17 with just 2:29 on the clock.

The Owls had one more possession before the clock ran out, but the drive stalled at the Toledo 27-yard line, ending the game 32-17 in Toledo's favor.

ANNAPOLIS — Facing off in the program's first ever back-to-back post-season appearance, No. 24 Temple came up short, 34-26, against ACC opponent Wake Forest in the Military Bowl Tuesday afternoon at Navy-Marine Corps Memorial Stadium.

Following the loss, the Owls fell to 10-4 (7-1 American) on the season, failing to reach the record 11th win Temple has been chasing these past two seasons. Despite falling behind 31-7 in the first half, Temple came surging back in the second, scoring two touchdowns and three field goals before coming up short on the final drive.

Right out of the gate, Temple showed its resolve on both sides of the ball, initially forcing an interception on the third play from scrimmage to set up the offense in ideal field position. Senior QB Phillip Walker and Co. took advantage one snap later, dropping in a 48-yard dime to junior WR Adonis Jennings, who carried his defender into the end zone.

Unfortunately, the Wake Forest offense woke up two possessions later, scoring on each of their next five drives up to the end of the first half. First, Demon Deacon QB John Wolford found his tight end on a 41-yard pass up the centerline to even the score at seven apiece. Next, after an Owls' three-and-out, Wake Forest drove 54 yards to another end zone appearance, this time a 20-yard pass from Wolford.

A muffed punt by Temple DB Sean Chandler set up the Demon Deacons inside the Owls' 10-yard line, leading to an 8-yard rush for yet-another touchdown. During the second quarter, the Wake Forest onslaught continued, as Wolford led his unit to, first, a field goal before wrapping up the half with a three-yard touchdown rush.

Temple responded in its final possession of the first half, knocking in a 45-yard field goal by freshman Aaron Boumerhi after an 11-play, 54-yard drive.

Similar to how the game began, the Owls' offense saw a spark from Jennings as the second half kicked off, this time watching the junior weave his way through the Demon Deacon defense for a 58-yard score just three snaps in.

The defense held its ground on the ensuing possession, as sophomore DB Delvon Randall intercepted Wake



Forest in the end zone to squash any Demon Deacon response. Behind the efforts of Walker and multiple downfield connections, including two perfectly placed darts to sophomore WR Ventell Bryant and junior WR Keith Kirkwood, the Owls set up Boumerhi for his second field goal attempt.

On the following two possessions, after two punts from Wake Forest, Temple looked to Boumerhi yet again, watching the freshman all-conference selection drill his third and fourth field goals of the day from 32 and 38 yards out, cutting the score to under one possession.

Wake Forest extended its lead back to eight points after a field goal of their

own, ensuring the Owls would need both a touchdown and two-point conversion to force overtime. Unfortunately for Temple, the offense was unable to convert a first down as the Demon Deacons took over on downs and were able to kneel the ball to secure their victory.

TEMPLE FOOTBALL HISTORY

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Pittsburgh, 10-9. The Owls bounced back to rout Rutgers and Syracuse on the way to five straight wins. The 8-1 start had the Owls thinking about a postseason bowl bid in November. A loss to Penn State was followed by a 42-10 rout of Villanova, giving the team a record of 9-2 and securing a berth in the Garden State Bowl. Temple's offense was led by quarterback Brian Broomell, and his top receiving target was Gerald "Sweet Feet" Lucear, who set several records that year. The defense featured record-setting linebacker Steve Conjar, who had 163 tackles that season and surpassed that mark with 174 stops in 1980.

The Garden State Bowl opponent was California and the matchup painted Temple as the defender of Eastern football. The Owls jumped on the Golden Bears for three touchdowns in the first quarter, with running back Kevin Duckett scoring a pair of touchdowns. California chipped away at the 21-0 lead in the second quarter, scoring a pair of touchdowns to make it 21-14 at the half. A field goal early in the fourth quarter cut the lead to 21-17. Broomell then led the Owls on a 14-play, 78-yard drive that culminated with a five-yard TD pass to Lucear. Significant credit for Temple's offensive success went to running back Mark Bright, who totaled 112 yards rushing on 19 carries. The Owls won the game, 28-17, and Bright was voted the game's Most Valuable Player. Temple's 10-2 finish to the 1979 season marks the highest single-season win total in school history.

Hardin coached the Owls through the 1982 season, compiling 80 wins in his 13 seasons on North Broad Street. He had the most wins and the longest tenure of any Temple football coach. Bruce Arians took over as head coach in 1983. Arians had been tutored by Alabama coaching legend Paul "Bear" Bryant.

The Owls produced some notable wins and notable players in the 1980s. They beat Pittsburgh three times in a four-year span, including one year (1987) in which the Panthers were invited to a bowl game. They also scored victories against bowl-bound squads West Virginia (1984) and Virginia Tech (1986).

Arians also coached Paul Palmer, the most prolific running back in school history. Palmer broke onto the national scene with a 206-yard rushing effort against Penn State in his junior year and continued to break records throughout the season. He holds virtually every Temple rushing record, including those for career rushing yards (4,895), 100-yard rushing games (21) and rushing touchdowns (39).

Palmer couldn't have set all those records without a solid group of teammates. Temple players who earned All-American mention during the 1980s included fellow running back Todd McNair, wide receiver Willie Marshall, tight end Mike Hinnant, defensive back Todd Bowles, linebacker Loranzo Square and offensive linemen Kevin Jones and John Rienstra, who garnered First Team All-America honors in 1985.

The Big East

Jerry Berndt followed Arians as head coach, taking over in 1989. The Owls struggled to a 1-10 finish that season, but then recorded the biggest turnaround in college football and went 7-4 in 1990. Berndt's squad received consideration for the Independence Bowl while putting together the school's best record since the Garden State Bowl season. The following year, Temple helped found the Big East Football Conference, putting the Owls in league competition for the second time in school history.

Ron Dickerson followed Berndt as head coach in 1993. At the time he was hired, Dickerson was the only African-American head football coach of a Division I-A school. Dickerson coached two of the leading tacklers-linebackers Lance Johnstone and Alshermond

Singleton, along with the most prolific passer in school history. Henry Burris set more than a dozen records between 1993 and 1996, including a single-game-best 445 yards passing against Pittsburgh in 1996, and he holds nearly every single-season and career passing mark.

On December 23, 1997, Temple University named Bobby Wallace its 23rd head football coach. The Mississippi native arrived on North Broad Street as the winningest coach in NCAA Division II playoff history after capturing three consecutive national titles at the University of North Alabama from 1993-95. In his first season, Wallace assembled a staff collectively holding 18 national championship rings and persevered through an injury-plagued season with 25 first-year players in the lineup en route to a 2-9 finish.

One of those victories occurred on October 17, 1998, and is arguably one of the greatest upsets in college football history. Before a homecoming crowd the 0-6 Owls traveled to No. 10/14 Virginia Tech to take on the Hokies' top ranked defense. Substituting for 12 defensive players who exited the game due to injury and with 20 first-year players on the field, Temple overcame a 17-0 deficit en route to a 28-24 win. The victory marked the Owls' first-ever Big East road win and first triumph over a ranked opponent in 11 years. Two games later the Owls proved the win was not an aberration. Trailing 20-0 at Pittsburgh, Temple ground out a 34-33 victory to ensure the program's largest comeback win in the modern era.

With a new, pass-oriented offense, the 1999 team posted a 2-9 record and finished tied for sixth in the Big East. The Owls struggled early with a schedule that allowed only two home dates in the first seven games and ranked 13th in difficulty. A come-from-behind, 17-14, homecoming win against then undefeated Boston College and a 56-28 offensive explosion over Rutgers were the highlights. Devin Scott completed 36 of 45 passes versus Rutgers to set both school and Big East records for completions in a game. Defensively, true freshman Dan Klecko earned All-America honors from various publications while linebackers Taylor Suman and LeVar Talley ranked second and fifth, respectively, in the conference in tackles.

The 2000 season began with much anticipation. With its new state-of-the-art practice facility under construction, Temple began the campaign with a 3-1 mark, its best start in 10 years. For the first time in a long time, the Owls had something to play for in November. Unfortunately, Temple lost many tight contests and could muster only one conference victory. Although the goal of a bowl game was not reached, the Owls finished with a 4-7 mark, the program's best since 1990. Sophomore running back Tanardo Sharps became the first Owl since 1987 to rush for over 1,000 yards, accumulating 1,038.

In 2001, Temple battled through a tough schedule en route to its second straight 4-7 record and a 2-5 Big East mark to finish in sixth place. All seven of the Owls' losses were to teams that ended their respective seasons bowl eligible, with a combined .750 (63-21) winning percentage. The strength of the 2001 squad was on defense, where Temple limited opponents to 312.64 yards per game to finish 19th nationally in total defense. The Owls concluded the season with two consecutive wins, including a 17-14 win in Morgantown, W.V., to break a 10-game drought against the Mountaineers. Juniors Dan Klecko and Sean Dillard earned first and second team All-Big East honors, respectively. Klecko was a unanimous choice, becoming Temple's first unanimous All-Big East honor-ee since the school joined the league as a charter member in 1991.

The 2002 Temple football team was composed entirely of players recruited during Wallace's tenure at Temple University. The Owls concluded the campaign with a 4-8 record, including a 2-5 mark in Big East play to finish tied for sixth place. Seven of Temple's eight losses were against opponents that concluded their respective seasons by playing in bowl games.

Once again, the defense paved the way, leading the Big East and placing 15th nationally in run defense, allowing just 108.3 yards on the ground per game. Temple also made its mark in total defense, placing 18th among all Division I programs by allowing just 315.67 yards per contest. Defensive tackle Dan Klecko was a major cog in TU's defensive machine and capped his senior campaign by being named the Big East Conference Defensive Player of the Year and an AP Second Team All-American.

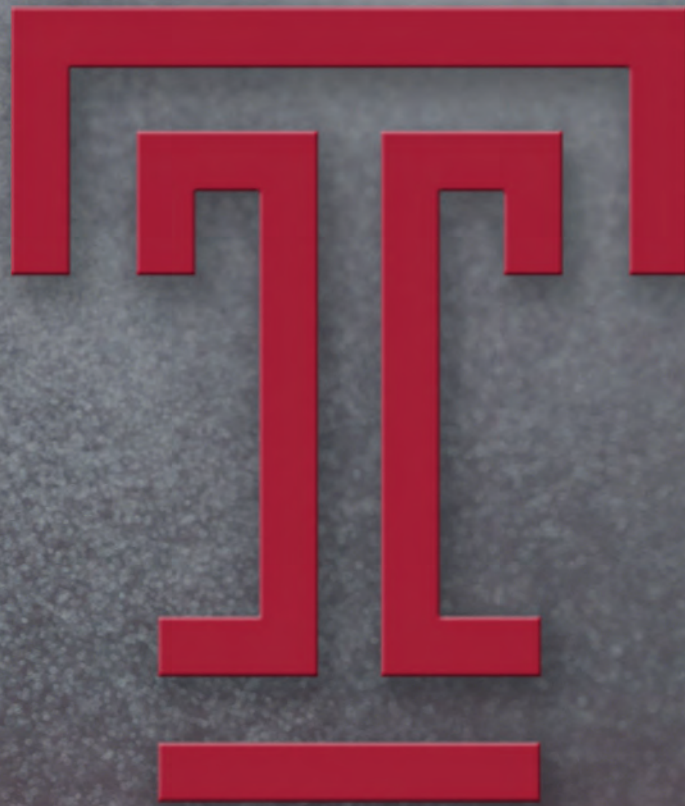
Tanardo Sharps gained 1,267 yards on the ground to conclude his career ranked second to Paul Palmer in virtually every Temple rushing category while Sean Dillard exited Owl Country as the team's all-time reception leader.

Despite one victory, there were many positives to the 2003 campaign under Wallace. First and foremost was the University's agreement with the Philadelphia Eagles for Temple to play its home games at Lincoln Financial Field. It marked the first time since 1991 the Owls played all their home games at the same site. Temple's five games at the venue drew an average 24,147 fans, a 21 percent increase from the prior season's average.

After battling through a school-record three overtime defeats in the early season, the Owls concluded the year with three, hard-fought losses to nationally-ranked opponents. Highlighting the final trio of games was the performance of sophomore quarterback Walter Washington, who averaged 315 yards of total offense and was responsible for eight touchdowns.

Along the way, Washington tied the school record for rushing scores with four at West

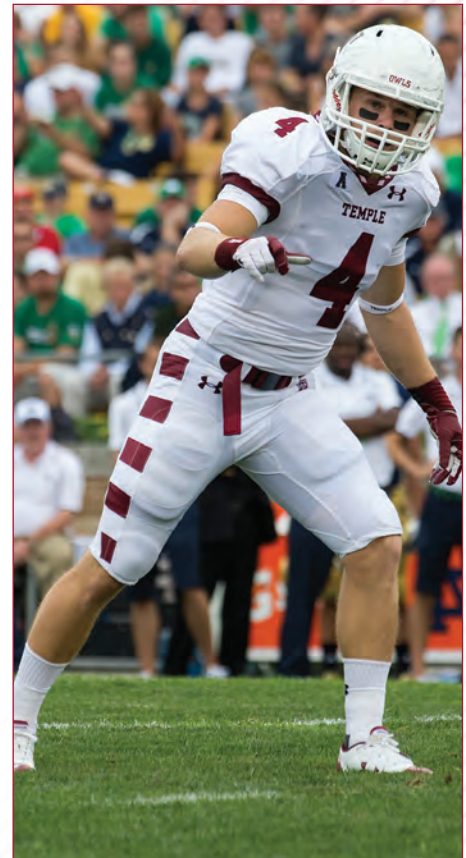

Virginia and also set the Big East mark for total plays with 69 against the Mountaineers. He also became the first Temple signal caller to rush for over 100 yards in a game, eclipsing the mark versus Virginia Tech and at WVU.

Among the postseason honors to come to North Broad Street was a Second Team All-America citation for sophomore linebacker Rian Wallace from CollegeFootballNews.com. The Pottstown, Pa., native had the sixth-best single-season tackle output in Temple history, posting 148 tackles (97 solo) while also registering 19.5 TFLs.

Wallace was also a Second Team All-Big East honoree and was joined by senior wide receiver Zamir Cobb, who was a first team selection. Cobb, the Owls' all-time reception leader with 165 career catches, set the school's single-season reception mark with 74 catches for 866 yards and five TDs in 2003.

Temple concluded its 2004 campaign with a 2-9 mark, including a 1-5 league record in its final season as a member of the Big East Conference. Final NCAA rankings rated the Owls' schedule the 16th toughest in major football (60-43, .583). Six of 11 opponents were nationally-ranked at some point during the season and 10 were at least in the "receiving votes" category. Eight opponents concluded their 2004 campaigns by playing in bowl games.

Despite a multitude of adversity, Temple gave its fans reason to cheer. Many of those cheers were in response to performances turned-in by QB Walter Washington. The junior was the top scorer among Division I-A QBs with an 8.36 scoring average and led the nation in rushing TDs by a signal-caller during the regular season with 15, setting the Big East record for a QB and tying the Temple mark for total scores in a season.

Washington led the Big East with a 281.5 total yards-per-game average (3,096 total), to become Temple's first 3,000-yard player. He set a Big East and Temple record for yards rushing by a QB in a season with 889 net yards (1,104 total) and was responsible for the Owls' final 16 TDs, while accounting for 25 of 29 (86%) overall. Washington led the Big East and ranked 11th nationally in total offense (281.5), 22nd in point responsibility (13.82) and 21st in scoring. He set the Big East and Temple record for total plays with 554.

Washington, the Big East 2004 Player of the Year by CollegeFootballNews.com, was named to the All-Big East Second Team in a vote by the league's head coaches. He was joined on the all-conference squad by fellow juniors Rian "Goo" Wallace and Mike Mendenhall, who earned first and second team honors, respectively. After the season, Washington and Wallace both decided to forgo their senior seasons and enter the 2005 NFL Draft.

A Difficult Independence

Temple faced the 11th most difficult schedule in Division I-A in 2005 according to the NCAA statistical rankings, and was winless for the first time since 1959 (0-9) with a 0-11 record. It marked the final season at the helm for head coach Bobby Wallace, who concluded his eight-year Temple tenure with a 19-71 overall mark. The Owls played as a I-A independent.

Prior to the start of the season, the Owls' schedule was recognized for its degree of difficulty on a national scale in the pages of Sports Illustrated. A four-page spread penned by Franz Lidz deemed the docket as "arguably the most brutal in the country." Unfortunately for the Cherry & White faithful, the proclamation held true. The combined record of Temple's 11 opponents was 83-46 and seven played in postseason bowls, with six earning victories. Ten opponents concluded their regular season bowl eligible. The only Temple foe to post a losing record was ACC member Maryland at 5-6.



The Golden Years

Temple named Al Golden the 24th head coach in the history of the program on December 6, 2005. A Colts Neck, N.J., native and Penn State gridiron alumnus, Golden arrived on North Broad Street after having spent the previous five seasons as defensive coordinator at Virginia. At age 37, he entered his first season on the Cherry & White sideline as the fourth-youngest head coach in Division I-A football.

The 2006 season was difficult but beneficial. The team played the most true freshmen in the nation, with 22 taking the field. In total, 39 players saw their first major college football action, including 27 freshmen overall. These rookies did so against an ambitious schedule that ranked as the third toughest in the nation, with eight foes earning bowl invitations.

The first win of the Golden Era happened on Saturday, October 28 against Bowling Green at Lincoln Financial Field. The 28-14 victory earned Temple runner-up for Tostitos Fiesta Bowl National Team of the Week honors behind Oregon State. The Owls snapped a 20-game game losing streak with a gutsy performance highlighted by a multitude of big plays.

The Mid-American Conference

In his second season in 2007, Golden once again played the nation's most freshmen while guiding the Owls to four wins on the season, all in conference play, during their inaugural season of Mid-American Conference play. Temple won four games, the most wins since the 2002 season and equal to the wins from the prior four seasons combined. The four league wins were the most for Temple in 40 years. The Owls finished the 2007 campaign at 4-8 overall and 4-4 in MAC play.

Led by All-MAC honorees Andre Neblett and Dominique Harris, the Temple defense ranked atop the MAC in five statistical categories, including total defense, and finished ranked No. 1 nationally in red zone defense.

In 2008, Golden led the Owls to their most wins in nearly two decades, finishing at 5-7 overall and 4-4 in the MAC to tie for second in the East Division. Temple out-scored its opponents for the season for the first time since 1990 and was so close to eight wins, falling in three games on the very last play.

The Owls led the nation in kickoff returns as a team, and senior All-MAC KOR Travis Shelton was the national leader individually.

Under the direction of fourth-year head coach Al Golden, Temple recorded one of the best seasons in school history in 2009. The Owls finished 9-4 overall while tying for first place in the Mid-American Conference East Division at 7-1. TU advanced to the 2009 EagleBank Bowl against UCLA.

TU made school history with nine consecutive wins in a single season. Recording its first winning season since 1990 and becoming bowl eligible for the first time since 1990, Temple made its third bowl appearance in school history and first in 30 years.

The 2009 squad, featuring Golden's first recruiting class as seniors, set the school record for rushing touchdowns in a season with 29, surpassing 26 rushing TDs by the 1973 and 1979 teams. In all, Temple re-wrote 18 school season records and 11 game records in 2009.

Rookie RB Bernard Pierce earned several All-America honors during his freshman campaign, including CollegeFootballNews.com Honorable Mention All-American and College FootballNews.com Freshman All-American.

The Owls swept the Mid-American Conference honors as well. Pierce was named the Freshman of the Year, sophomore DE Adrian Robinson was named the Defensive Player of the Year, and head coach Al Golden was named the Coach of the Year. A school record 15 Temple football players were named All-MAC, including a school record eight first-team honorees.

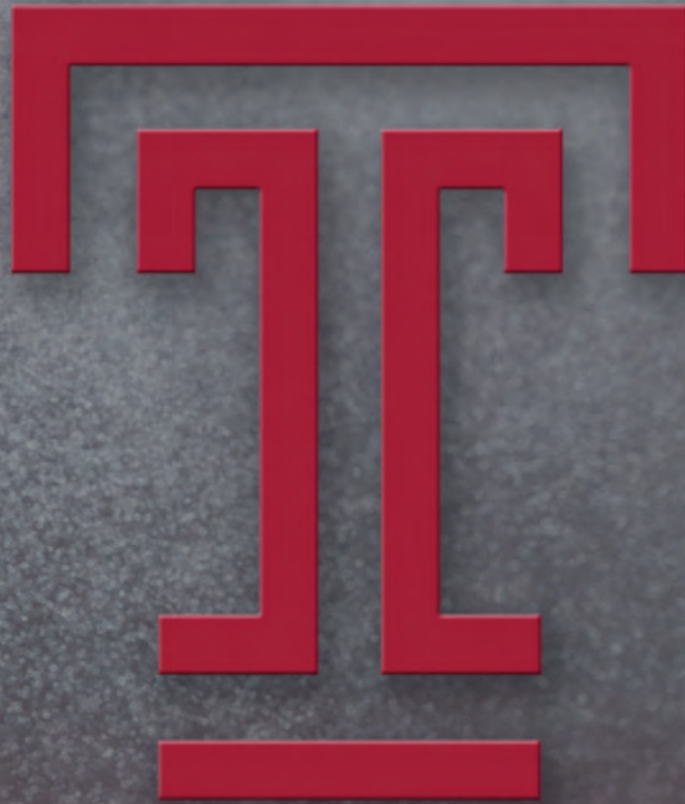
In his fifth and final season with the Owls, Al Golden guided Temple to an 8-4 overall record and 5-3 in the MAC in 2010. Recording its first back-to-back winning seasons since 1978-79, Temple became bowl eligible for the second consecutive year for the first time in program history. However, despite a winning record, the Owls did not receive an at-large bowl invitation.

The Owls' 10-game home win streak at Lincoln Financial Field was the longest since the stadium opened in 2003 and tied the longest home win streak in school history of 10 games from the 1972-74 seasons at Temple and Veterans Stadiums.

For the second consecutive year, a school record eight Temple Owls earned first-team All-Mid-American Conference honors.

Following the season, Golden was named the head coach at the University of Miami.

2017 Temple Football

LINCOLN FINANCIAL FIELD

Lincoln Financial Field, home to the National Football League's Philadelphia Eagles, is a prime destination for world-class entertainment, providing the highest quality sports and entertainment experiences for fans in a safe, clean and friendly environment. In addition to Temple Football's home games, Lincoln Financial Field hosts 10 Eagles games each year and continues to showcase high-profile sporting events and unique experiences year-round. Since opening in August 2003, Lincoln Financial Field has hosted nearly 20 sold-out concerts, has welcomed some of the world's most distinguished soccer clubs and also serves as the home to the historic Army-Navy game. Additionally, the stadium has hosted multiple NCAA Lacrosse Championships, as well as Monster Jam and many other marquee events.

On August 13, 2003, the Philadelphia Eagles and Temple University announced a 15-year pact for the Owls to play their home football games at Lincoln Financial Field. An average of 24,137 fans per game witnessed the Cherry & White in its inaugural season at the venue, a 21 percent increase from the prior year's average.

In 2015, Temple set a record with an average of 44,158 spectators per game including a record home crowd of 69,280 on October 31 when the #21 Owls hosted #9 Notre Dame in Temple's first-ever ranked vs. ranked game.

Familiarly known as The Linc, it has a seating capacity of 69,596. The stadium is located in South Philadelphia on Pattison Avenue between 11th and 10th Streets, closer to the area's stretch of Interstate 95 than to Pattison.

In 2011, the stadium became powered with a combination of onsite wind, solar, and dual-fuel generated electricity, making it the world's first major sports stadium to convert to self-generated renewable energy. Approximately \$25 million was invested to build the system, saving the Eagles an estimated \$60 million in energy costs.

In August 2014, the Eagles completed a \$125 million revitalization project to ensure that guests of Lincoln Financial Field are enjoying their in-stadium experience through enhanced convenience, comfort and connectivity.



EDBERG-OLSON HALL

Edberg-Olson Hall is the home of the Temple University football program. Officially dedicated on December 9, 2000, the facility was designed by AP3C Architects of Philadelphia. The building was engineered to not only support the football team's functional requirements, but to enhance the experience through innovative design concepts.

During the season, approximately 250 people will pass through its doors on a daily basis. In 2012, Edberg-Olson Hall underwent a \$10 million upgrade with a 15,000-square-foot expansion. The original 23,600-square-foot building contains team and coaches locker rooms, a training room, equipment facilities, coach's offices, a players' lounge, individual position meeting rooms, and a theater-style team meeting room. Opened in July 2012, the upgrade has a strength and conditioning area that expanded from 2,500 square feet to 10,000 square feet. The expansion also features an enlarged sports medicine office with hydrotherapy, a full-service academic support area, and a 3,500-square-foot team function room. An observation balcony runs the length of the building. It is the perfect complement to a gridiron landscape outside featuring over 100,000 square feet of Sprinturf and 24,000 square feet of AstroTurf. Eight, 85-foot poles providing 85 candles of white rendition light line the perimeter of the complex. Powder-coated cyclone fences provide privacy.

In 2014, Edberg Olson received a facelift. As part of a \$1.5 million capital project that upgraded the locker rooms for all 19 Temple varsity sports, the football facility installed 125 new lockers and flatscreen televisions. In addition, updated graphics adorn the walls throughout the hallways and in the weight room.

THE PAVILION

The Pavilion Athletic Facility, which is utilized by football, field hockey, women's lacrosse, men's and women's soccer, is a 32,000-square foot multi-purpose field. The facility, which is available as an auxiliary training site for the remainder of Temple's 19 varsity athletic programs, features Field Turf XT57, an ideal surface for Temple's varsity teams to train on.

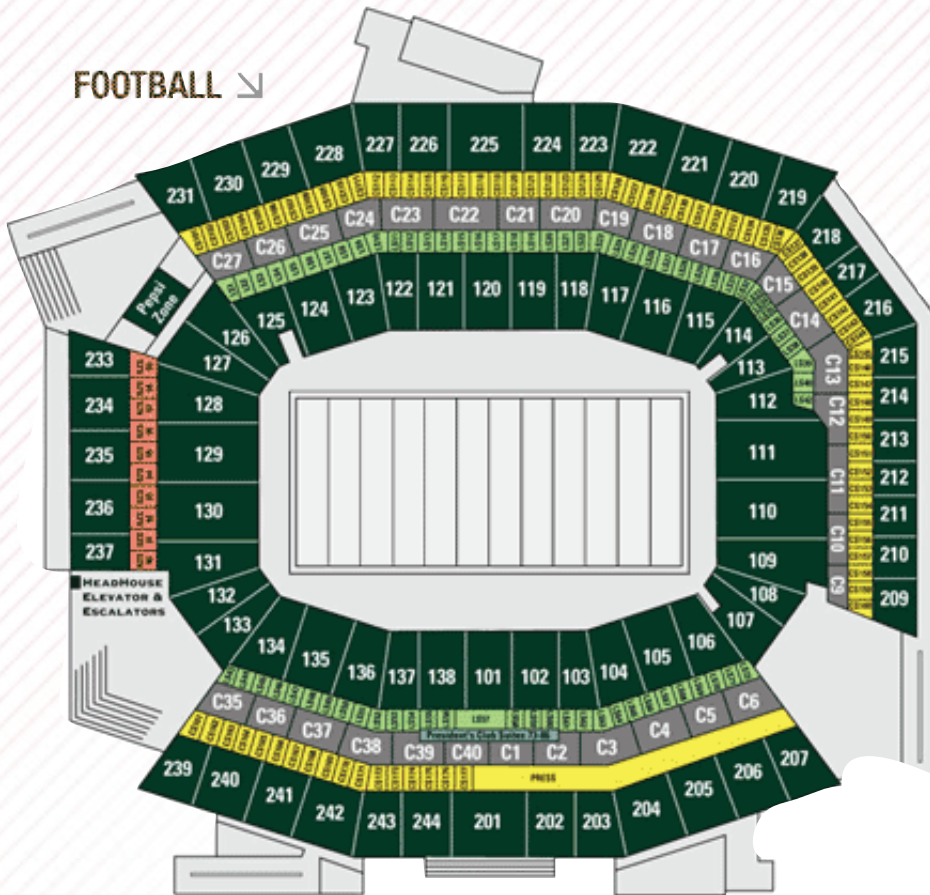

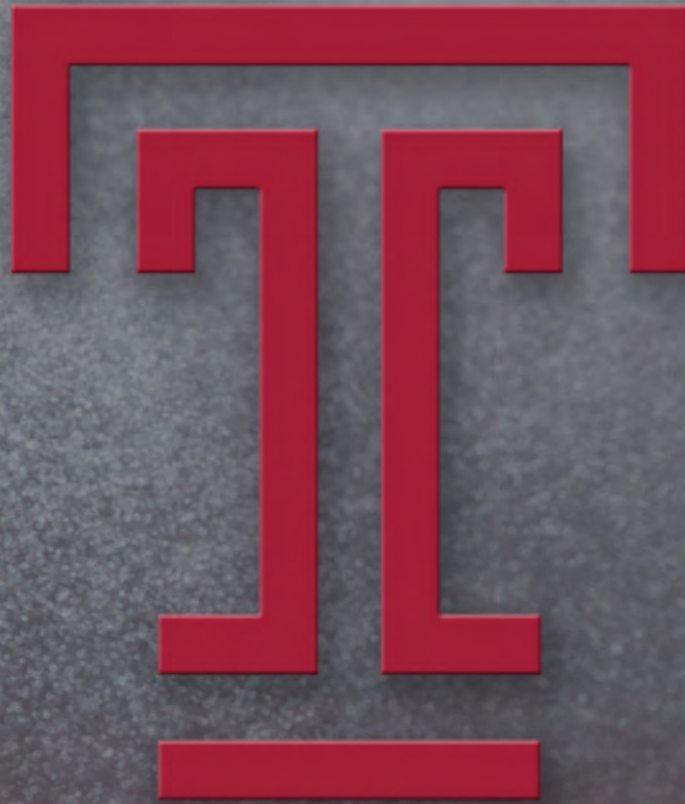

41st Year at Temple

Accessible. High quality. Engaged with the community. Affordable. Diverse. Those are the pillars of Richard M. Englert's presidency. They are also the values he has championed at Temple University for more than 40 years.

After serving Temple with loyalty and distinction in 16 different roles since 1976, Englert became president on July 21, 2016. Under his leadership, the university welcomed its largest and most academically qualified class of new students and broke records for freshman applications. It also began major campus renovations, highlighted by a state-of-the-art library. At the same time, Temple's faculty gained unprecedented national recognition, and its student-athletes reached new levels of success on the field and off.

"I can say without reservation that there has never been a better time to be part of the Temple family, whether you are a student, faculty member, administrator or alumnus," Englert said. "We have a strong dedication to our mission and an unrelenting commitment to our students, our neighbors and our great city."

Englert arrived at Temple as an assistant to the dean of the College of Education. Over the years, he has been provost and interim senior vice president for academic affairs, dean of the College of Education and vice president for administration, among many other roles. Since 1985, he has served as a professor in the College of Education.

Throughout his career, Englert has always responded to Temple's call. In recognition of his lifelong dedication, the Board of Trustees appointed him to the honorific role of university chancellor in 2012.

"President Englert has devoted his life to Temple University," said Board of Trustees Chair Patrick J. O'Connor. "Over the course of his 40-year-plus career at Temple, he has earned a reputation as an outstanding teacher, administrator and leader who always puts the needs of our students first."

Englert earned a doctorate in educational administration from the University of California, Los Angeles. He also has a master's degree from Pepperdine University and a bachelor's degree from St. John's College.

As Temple's president, Englert has focused the university on its historic commitments: engaging with the city of Philadelphia; producing research that improves lives, including work on opioid abuse and traumatic brain injury; and energizing the Commonwealth of Pennsylvania.

Most of all, as a lifelong educator, Englert takes every opportunity to empower Temple's inspiring students and faculty.

"Temple has proved that excellence in education, access, affordability, diversity and community engagement are not mutually exclusive," Englert said. "That's what we've done better than anyone else for more than 130 years. It is who we are and it is the dedication to our mission that will make Temple an even greater institution in the years to come."

5th Year at Temple (3rd as Dir. of Athletics)

Since his appointment as Director of Athletics in May 2015, after serving two years as Deputy Director of Athletics, Dr. Patrick Kraft has led a transformation in Temple University's Department of Athletics. During his span, investments and enhancements in student-athlete welfare, in support of coaches and staff, in academic support and in facilities have provided deserved regional and national attention for the University. In 2016, Kraft was recognized by the Sports Business Journal and by the Philadelphia Business Journal's Forty Under 40 for his work at Temple.

Among the accomplishments and initiatives during Kraft's tenure:

On the Field

- Football won the 2016 American Athletic Conference Championship, marking its first Conference Championship since 1967 and first Conference Championship Game ever; won 20 games in a two-year span, was nationally-ranked for consecutive seasons and competed in a bowl game in consecutive seasons, all for first time in school history; and football is one of five FBS teams to win 10 or more games in each of the past two seasons and play in its conference championship game in each year.
- Men's Basketball won its first American Athletic Conference Regular Season title (2016), and first regular season title since 2012; defeated nationally ranked teams (#24 Florida State, #19 West Virginia) in consecutive days for the first time in school history to win the 2016 NIT Season Tip-Off and earned a berth in the 2016 NCAA Tournament, marking its seventh appearance in nine years.
- Women's Basketball cracked the Top 25 in 2017 for the first time since the 2005-06 season and made its first NCAA appearance in five years.
- Volleyball finished #47 in NCAA RPI in 2016, its best finish since the 2002 season and posted its third straight 20-win season.
- Men's Soccer cracked the Top 25 in 2015 for the first time since 1997 and posted its first road win over Penn State since 1989.
- Women's Lacrosse made an appearance in the Top 20 in 2016 for the first time since 2005.
- Women's Gymnastics posted its best 10 scores in program history during the 2016-17 season and sent its first individual qualifier since 2009, Daisy Todd, to NCAA Regionals.
- Women's Fencing set a school record for wins in 2017 and earned its' highest ever ranking (#6).
- Men's Crew medaled in the Varsity 8 at the 2016 Dad Vail Regatta for the first time in eight years.
- Women's Soccer posted consecutive double-digit win seasons (2014, 2015) for the first time in program history.
- Blanca Fernandez became the first ever All-American in Temple women's cross country history and first women's track All-American since 1988.

In the Classroom

- Student-athletes achieved a record five consecutive semesters with a combined GPA of 3.10 or above and 11 consecutive semesters above a 3.0. Fifteen programs earned a cumulative GPA greater than 3.0, led by women's volleyball (3.58) and men's tennis (3.46). Twelve of those programs combined for GPAs above a 3.40.
- Men's Basketball, Men's Cross Country, Football, Men's Golf, Men's Soccer, Women's Cross Country, Fencing, Field Hockey, Lacrosse, Women's Rowing, Women's Soccer, Women's Tennis, Women's Track & Field and Volleyball (16 out of 19 sports) have achieved record team GPAs in the past four semesters.
- Sixty-nine percent of student-athletes earned at least a 3.0 GPA in the spring of 2017, setting a Temple Athletics record. Another record was set with seven teams earning public recognition for their Academic Performance Rate (APR) data.
- With an average multi-year APR of 991, Temple ranked 12th in the nation among Football Bowl Subdivision (FBS) institutions, and led all full members of the American Athletic Conference in 2017. Temple also is one of just 17 FBS institutions with all sports having multi-year APR's of 970 or greater.
- Student-athletes posted a record high 88% Graduation Success Rate (GSR), setting a school-record for the seventh consecutive year. Temple also posted its highest Federal Graduation Rate (71%) since 2010. Temple's overall GSR number is tied for 24th among all Football Bowl Subdivision (FBS) schools. Football posted a GSR of 86, tied for 14th in the nation along with Nebraska and Miami (Fla.). Temple is one of 11 FBS schools in the country with all teams over 77 in GSR. The other 10 schools are Alabama, Duke, Michigan, Northwestern, Notre Dame, Stanford, Tulane, UCF, Vanderbilt and Virginia Tech.
- Eight programs have earned record high GSRs in the last two years: Football, Men's Basketball, Men's Golf, Men's Soccer, Men's Tennis, Fencing, Women's Lacrosse, Women's Tennis.
- Temple teams earned three conference Team Academic Excellence Awards in 2015-2016: Men's Basketball, Volleyball, Lacrosse (Big East).
- The Graduating Class of 2016 was the largest in Temple Athletics history
- Twenty-five student-athletes had earned their degrees prior to competing in the Military Bowl, which was the largest number of graduates for any of the 2016 bowl participants

Student-Athlete Welfare

- Facilitated the development of a number of initiatives aimed at improving the mental health of student-athletes, including the establishment of a partnership with Temple's Department of Clinical Psychology to deliver onsite behavioral health

coaching for student-athletes. Partnered with the University's Student Health Services so its staff can be a resource for all student-athletes. Hired the first mental health professional to handle student-athlete needs.

- Instituted a career program with more than 50 national and regional employers attending career development events, during which student-athletes have the opportunity to hone their networking skills and establish professional connections.
- The Verified Program was developed in 2016 to provide student-athletes with access to high level professionals to assist in their professional growth. The Verified program is a product of a strong collaboration between the Resnick Center and the Temple Career Center, which provides regular programming and career coaching for student-athletes throughout the academic year and summer.
- Students have served more than 9,000 community service hours in 65 projects since 2014-2015, four times more than in previous periods.

Enhancing Facilities

- The Temple Sports Complex, home to men's and women's soccer, lacrosse, field hockey and track opened in the fall of 2016.
- The newly restored East Park Canoe House, home to men's crew and women's rowing, opened in 2016.
- New practice facility for men's golf opened in 2017.
- Enhancements have been made to athletic training facilities, strength and conditioning facilities, and to the student-athlete academic support center while locker room renovations and upgrades were also completed for each varsity team, including new locker rooms for Temple's Olympic sports programs unveiled in 2015.
- Temple Athletics will open the doors to the brand new STAR (Student Training and Recreation) Complex in the fall of 2017. The Complex will offer a 10,000 square foot weight and cardio area, facilities for the Athletics and Campus Recreation departments, an indoor turf field, and a two-lane track outside the building.

Enhancing Revenue and the Brand

- Annual donations have increased 75% over the last three years and the development office has had three consecutive record-setting years in annual fund raising, including multiple six and seven-figure commitments in support of our football program, the new Temple Owls Sports Complex, and the Men's Crew and Women's Rowing programs.
- Key partnerships with Learfield Sports Properties, Learfield Licensing Partners, and IMG/Learfield Ticket Solutions have been secured and enhanced as well as a lucrative rights deal with Under Armour.
- Created Owls TV, a video services arm dedicated to athletics, and developed a broad-ranging digital and social media department to integrate video and engage the Temple fan base.
- Temple Football posted the largest attendance gain among FBS programs during the 2015 season, playing in front of an average home crowd of 44,159, an increase of 20,789 per game.
- In 2015, ESPN's College GameDay made its first trip to Philadelphia for a Temple football game.

Prior to Temple, Kraft served two years (2011-13) as the Executive Senior Associate Athletics Director at Loyola University Chicago. He was also a member of the senior staff at his alma mater, Indiana University, serving as Senior Assistant Director from 2009-11.

Kraft played football as an undergraduate at Indiana and holds three degrees from the University. He earned a bachelor's degree in sports marketing/management (2000), a master's degree in athletic administration (2005), and a doctorate in sports management (2008).

Kraft and his wife, Betsy, reside in Cherry Hill, N.J., with their daughter, Annabelle, and son, Joseph.



Craig ANGELOS

Deputy Director of Athletics



3rd Year at Temple

Craig Angelos is in his third year as Temple University's Deputy Director of Athletics. Angelos joined the Owls staff in June of 2015.

At Temple, Angelos works with the Owls external team that includes the communications, corporate sales (Learfield), creative services, development, marketing and promotions, social and digital media, ticket operations, ticket sales (IMGL), video services, and strategic planning. He also serves as the sports supervisor for men's basketball, field hockey, men's soccer and golf.

Angelos, who has served on the athletics senior staff at five different Division I institutions as well as the NCAA national office, came to Temple from Florida International University where he served as the Senior Associate Athletic Director for Revenue Enhancement from 2014-15. While at FIU, he was responsible for finding new revenue sources for the athletic department and engaging in all aspects of development activities, while helping overall fundraising to a 20% increase.

Before his stint at FIU, Angelos was the number two person as the Executive Senior Associate Athletic Director at the University of South Florida, overseeing all external areas as well as having oversight of the football program.

Prior to USF, Angelos served nine years as the Director of Athletics at Florida Atlantic University from 2003-2012. At FAU, he led the effort to build a \$70 million, 30,000 seat on campus football facility, which opened on campus in 2011.

Angelos also held number two positions as the Deputy Athletic Director and Chief Operating Officer at Indiana University overseeing all the external areas as well as the football program and was the Senior Associate Athletic Director at the University of Miami (Fla.). Prior to his tenure at Miami, Angelos spent three years at the NCAA as a legislative assistant interpreting NCAA rules and regulations.

A graduate of the Creighton University School of Law, Angelos worked for a short time in a mid-sized litigation firm in Los Angeles, Calif. He earned his bachelor's degree from Brigham Young University where he was the starting first basemen on the baseball team and later played in Buttrio, Italy for an Italian professional baseball league.

Angelos and his wife, Kristin, have six children.

Mary McELROY

Executive Senior Associate AD / SWA



3rd Year at Temple

Mary McElroy is in her third year as Executive Senior Associate Athletic Director and Senior Woman Administrator (SWA) at Temple.

At Temple she coordinates the overall administration of varsity sports and serves as the primary sport administrator for women's basketball, men's and women's cross country, women's track, fencing and volleyball. She also oversees Temple's sports medicine and strength and conditioning staffs.

McElroy joined the Owls' staff in July 2015 from the Collegiate Licensing Company (CLC) in Atlanta, Ga., where she served as the Director for Partner Services. A majority of her work saw her responsible for 65 of the 150 Division I member institutions served by the company.

Prior to her experience at CLC, McElroy served as the Associate Director of the NCAA Division I Women's Basketball Championship in 2013. Her duties at the NCAA included the management of a \$6 million budget for the event, as well as directing the game day operations during the Women's Final Four.

McElroy has served on the staff of five different NCAA schools, most recently as the Assistant Director of Student Services for the Georgia Tech Athletic Association. She also served as the Senior Associate Athletic Director and SWA at Southern Methodist University in 2009, and was the Director of Athletics at Georgia State University from 2005 to 2008. McElroy served in various other roles at Georgia Tech from 1999 to 2005, including Senior Associate Athletic Director and Director of Compliance.

McElroy got her start in college athletics at her alma mater, the United States Naval Academy. She spent three years with the Naval Academy Athletic Association as SWA and Assistant Athletic Director, before a stint as the academy's Director of Alumni Services.

A former Division I varsity basketball player, McElroy earned a degree with merit from the Naval Academy in 1987. After graduation, she served as a supply officer in the U.S. Marine Corps for five years, attaining the rank of captain. McElroy completed her MBA at Georgia Tech in 2000.

McElroy and her husband, Terry, have two sons, Darrin, a second lieutenant in the Marines, and Austin, a rising senior at Georgia Tech.

Vinnie JAMES

Football Administrator



**3rd Year at Temple
(1st as sport administrator)**

Vinnie James, who joined the Temple Athletics staff in July, 2014, was promoted to the position of Associate Athletics Director/Chief of Staff in June 2017. He previously held the position of Assistant Athletics Director for Business Operations.

In his new role, James will provide high-level support to the Director of Athletics by handling special projects, conducting research and facilitating comparative analyses. In addition, James will serve as the sport administrator for the football program and will continue monitoring operating budgets for the department's 19 sport programs and administrative areas.

James came to Temple from La Salle University where he spent two years as Athletics Business Manager for the Explorers. He was solely responsible for executing the daily business operations for La Salle's athletics department. James distributed monthly budget reports for all sports and departments, and assisted in the overall budget planning for the department.

Prior to his time at La Salle, James spent a year at Villanova University as an intern in the Athletic Director's office. His responsibilities at Villanova were widely varied, and included working with the business office as well as providing administrative support and serving as event manager for women's soccer.

James is a 2007 graduate of Bloomsburg University with a bachelor's degree in political science. He was a four-year varsity starter and two-year team captain for Bloomsburg's baseball team, and he went on to earn a master's in business administration from Bloomsburg in 2009. While completing the MBA program, James served as a graduate assistant baseball coach.

Jeremy JORDAN

Faculty Athletic Representative



10th Year at Temple (2nd as FAR)

Dr. Jeremy S. Jordan, Associate Dean, in the School of Sport, Tourism and Hospitality Management, was appointed the university's Faculty Athletics Representative (FAR) in May, 2015.

Faculty Athletics Representatives help ensure academic integrity of intercollegiate athletics programs and enhance the student-athlete experience. Jordan serves as the representative of Temple and its faculty to the American Athletic Conference, NCAA and other stakeholder groups.

A former student athlete, coach and administrator, Jordan has conducted research on intercollegiate athletics and teaches courses on the topic at the undergraduate and graduate levels. His primary research focus is on sport engagement as he studies the individual and community level impact of sport participation and events. He has worked with a number of industry partners including the NCAA, NFL, PHL Sport and Under Armour Japan. He is currently the principal investigator on a study funded by the NCAA that examines the relative consistency of sanctions issued by its Committee on Infractions over the last 50 years.

In March of 2016, Jordan along with the other FARs of the American Conference hosted the first Academic Consortium Symposium on student-athlete well-being in Philadelphia. This American Academic Consortium, formed in 2015, is charged with creating collaborative research opportunities for faculty, staff, and students from all American member institutions.

The FAR reports directly to the president and is the president's senior advisor outside of the athletics department on matters related to intercollegiate athletics. The FAR also advises the athletics director.

In collaboration with Temple Athletic Director Dr. Patrick Kraft, Jordan developed a two-year experiential learning extern program in the athletics department for School of Sport, Tourism and Hospitality Management graduate students.

Jordan has also served as a member of the Faculty Senate Athletics Oversight Committee and the Nancy and Donald Resnick Academic Support Center Faculty Advisory Committee. Starting in June of 2017, Jordan will serve as the FAR representative to American Conference SAAC group.

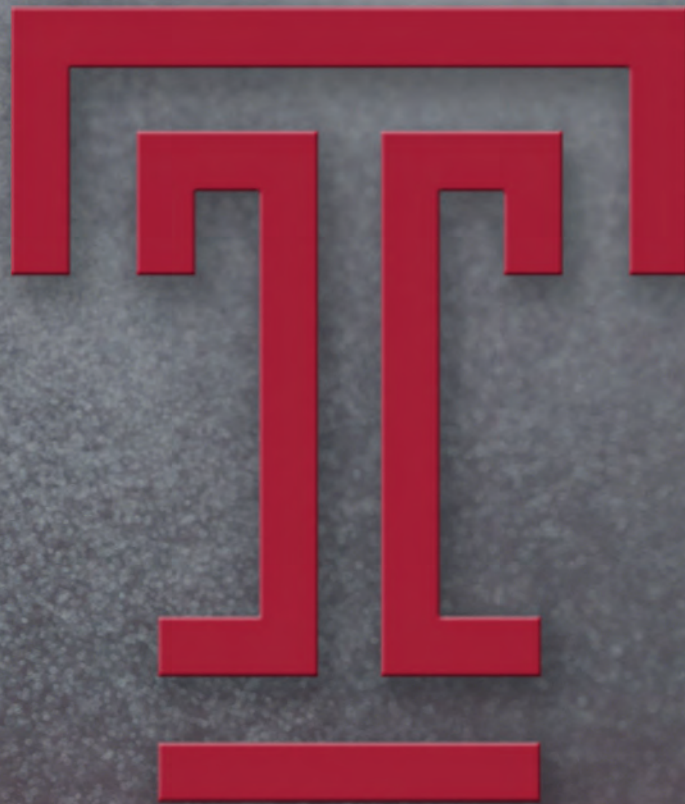

Radio Play-By-Play



23rd Year at Temple

The 2016 season marks Harry Donahue's 23rd consecutive year as the voice of Temple University football. A Philadelphia native, he has also served as play-by-play announcer for the Owls' men's basketball program since the 2002-03 campaign.

One of the most recognizable voices in the Delaware Valley, Donahue worked as a morning news and sports anchor at KYW Newsradio (1060 AM) since 1979 before retiring in 2014. He first joined the station in 1974 as a freelance reporter and anchor.

Donahue is a well-known broadcaster and an integral part of the Philadelphia sports scene. He has done play-by-play for Eagles preseason games, 76ers basketball contests and college basketball for ESPN's Atlantic 10 Conference Game of the Week. Every Sunday, NFL fans around the country hear Donahue describe NFL Films' highlights that are displayed on stadium scoreboards. He is the voice of NFL.com's weekly highlights. Donahue also hosted "Temple Sports Now," a bi-weekly TV show that featured Owl athletics.

Donahue was the play-by-play voice for the Philadelphia Stars of the USFL. He has also hosted "Center Court," the pre-game, half-time, and post-game shows for the 76ers' telecasts.

Donahue's reporting has earned him two Pennsylvania Associated Press Awards for his coverage of the Philadelphia Phillies' World Series run in 1980. In May 2000, he was inducted into the Pennsylvania Sports Hall of Fame.

Donahue is a graduate of Saint Joseph's University. He and his wife Lynda reside in Montgomery County, Pa., and have three sons and five grandchildren.

In 2013, former Temple All-American running back Paul Palmer (1983-86) added the job of color analysis for the Temple Radio Network for all football game broadcasts to his list of accomplishments.

For Palmer it was a return to radio. He served as the Owls' sideline reporter for four seasons (2001-04). Palmer replaced 1974 Maxwell Award winner Steve Joachim, who had to step aside following 13 years as the color analyst for Temple Football due to increased work commitments with his full-time position.

A unanimous first-team All-American in 1986, his senior season, Palmer led the nation in rushing yards (1,866), rushing yards per game (169.6) and all-purpose yards (2,633) that season. Named 1986 ECAC Player of the Year, Palmer set 23 school records and remains the Owls' career leader in rushing attempts (935), rushing yards (4,895), 100-yard rushing games (21), and 200-yard rushing games (6).

Palmer finished second in the 1986 Heisman Trophy race to Miami QB Vinny Testaverde. In 2017, for the seventh straight year, he is on the ballot for the College Football Hall of Fame.

A native of Potomac, Md., Palmer was a first round draft pick by the Kansas City Chiefs where he led the AFC in kickoff return average (24.3 yards per attempt) as a rookie and rushed for 607 yards in two seasons.

Palmer, who resides in Lawnside, N.J., has served as an assistant football coach at Haddon Heights High School for the last eight seasons.

3rd Year at Temple

Kevin Copp was named Assistant Athletic Director for Video Services at Temple in July, 2015. In his role at Temple, Copp oversees the newly-launched video services department, which provides on-demand video content on OwlsTV as well as in-venue video boards at Lincoln Financial Field, the Liacouras Center, and Pearson-McGonigle Hall.

Copp also oversees production of all live broadcasts for numerous sports on Owl-TV, and serves as on-camera talent and as a play-by-play broadcaster on occasion.

Copp came to Temple after six months as the Director of New Media for Towson University Athletics where he produced and/or supervised the production of all video content for TowsonTigers.com and the Towson Athletics YouTube channel. Copp also produced and directed live video broadcasts and in-venue video boards at Towson's arenas and served as a broadcaster for basketball, lacrosse, gymnastics, baseball and softball.

Prior to his time at Towson, Copp spent five years at the University of Georgia, first as a video production assistant and then as the video production manager for Georgia IMG Sports Marketing. He was responsible for producing and editing video while also serving as on-camera and play-by-play talent. He supervised the staff that produced the live broadcasts for six sports, and also cut video for highlight films and produced weekly shows.

Copp started his career at Georgia as an intern for Georgia IMG Sports Marketing. During that time he also worked as a play-by-play broadcaster for the SEC Network and ESPNU for various events, and did weekly interviews and play-by-play for the Georgia Bulldog Radio Network.

Copp earned his bachelor's degree in English from Georgia in 2010. He is not a stranger to Temple, having been an intern in the athletic communications departments at both Temple and UMass-Dartmouth while working toward his degree at Georgia.

Copp married the former Kate Burkholder in June, 2014.

Morgyn Seigfried, 2013 graduate of Temple, was hired as the athletics department's social media coordinator in May, 2014. Seigfried, who was a four-year soccer player for the Owls, came to Temple after a year spent working in athletics at Lipscomb University.

Seigfried's position at Temple is newly-created, as the athletics department looks to further its efforts in social media and community outreach. In her role, she will coordinate the department's social media platforms, creating a strategy to enhance and promote the Temple Brand in this space.

The Addazio Era

On December 23, 2010, Steve Addazio was named Temple University's 25th head football coach.

In his first season in 2011, Addazio guided the Owls to an 9-4 overall record and a second-place finish in the Mid-American Conference East Division en route to their second bowl appearance in three years. Temple defeated Wyoming, 37-15, in the Gildan New Mexico Bowl.

The all-time winningest first-year coach in school history, Addazio mentored 10 All-MAC selections, including first-team honorees OL Pat Boyle, RB Bernard Pierce, DE Adrian Robinson, and TE Evan Rodriguez. The Owls' defense dominated the MAC, leading all teams in five categories while ranking No. 3 nationally in scoring defense.

Addazio's offense set the school records for rushing yards and rushing touchdowns in a season as well behind the explosive efforts of All-MAC honorees Pierce and Matt Brown. Pierce became Temple's all-time leader in rushing touchdowns (53), total touchdowns (54), and points scored (324).

Off the field, the Temple football players were recognized as the 2011 Most Valuable Players by the Philadelphia Affiliate of Susan G. Komen for the Cure for their community service efforts.



A Return to the Big East

On March 7, 2012, the Big East Conference announced that Temple would begin play in the league beginning with the 2012 football season.

In his second season in 2012, Addazio led Temple to a 4-7 overall record and 2-5 (tie for 6th) record in Big East play. The Owls returned to the Big East Conference after a seven-year absence and won back-to-back league games for a 2-0 start in Big East play, both for the first time in school history. True freshman LB Tyler Matakevich was named to the 2012 Football Writers Association of America Freshman All-America Team.

Six Temple Owls earned 2012 All-Big East honors, including senior Matt Brown who was named the Special Teams Player of the Year, and true freshman LB Tyler Matakevich who took home Rookie of the Year honors. Earning first team All-Conference honors were senior RB Montel Harris, Brown at return specialist, and senior Brandon McManus at punter. Second-team accolades went to senior OL Martin Wallace, McManus at place-kicker, senior DL John Youboty, and Matakevich. A total of 31 Temple Owls were named to the 2012 Big East All-Academic Team.

The Owls made history in their final non-conference game. Senior RB Montel Harris had a career day, rushing for 351 yards and seven touchdowns — both Big East and school records — to lead the Owls to a 63-32 win at Army. The 63 points scored tied the Temple NCAA Division I-A record set back in 1973 in a win over Holy Cross. The Owls also established a new team record for rushing yards with 534, breaking the old mark set in 1977 against Drake (477 yards), just two yards shy of the Big East mark. The nine rushing touchdowns were a new Big East and school record.

Harris was not the only record-breaking Owl as senior PK Brandon McManus surpassed Bernard Pierce as the Owls' all-time scoring leader.

Following the season, Addazio was named the head coach at Boston College.

New Coach, New Conference, New Expectations

On December 17, 2012, Matt Rhule was named Temple University's 26th head football coach. No stranger to Temple after six seasons as an assistant under Golden and Addazio, Rhule returned to take the reins after eight months in the NFL coaching ranks.

In March 2013, the Big East formally announced a separation with its basketball schools. On September 6, 2013, when Temple hosted the University of Houston, the football schools began play under a new name, the American Athletic Conference.

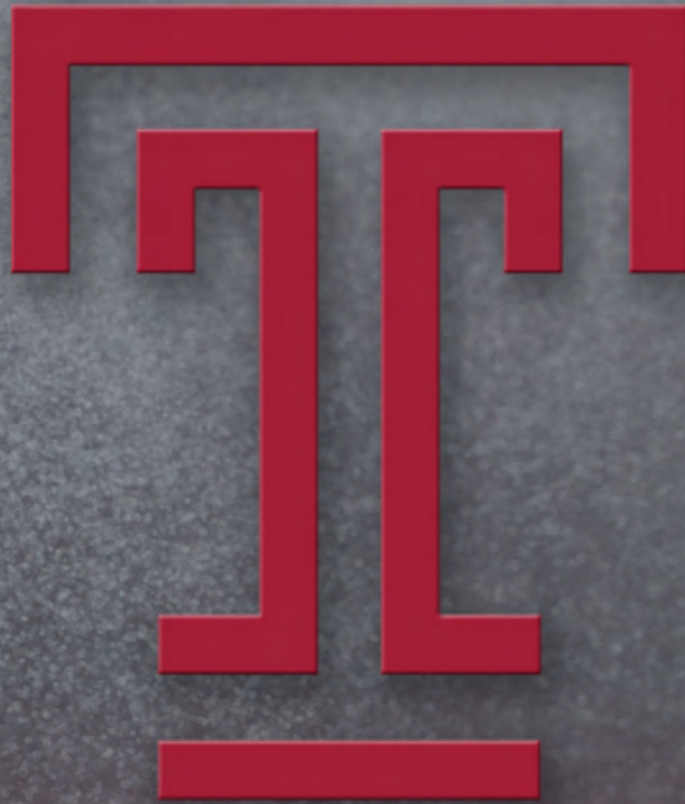
The Rhule Era got off to a slow start getting out of the gates with a 0-6 record and finishing 2013 at 2-10. However, true freshman Phillip Walker took over at quarterback on October 11 at Cincinnati which started a streak of 47 straight starts for the Elizabeth, N.J. native who would go on to re-write the Temple record books.

Temple opened the 2014 season with a road win at Vanderbilt for its first win against an SEC opponent since 1938. Along the way Temple posted its largest margin of victory in nearly half a century beating Delaware State 59-0, but the season was highlighted by a 20-10 win against #21 East Carolina, the first Temple win over a ranked team in 16 seasons. A 6-6 overall record in 2014 left the Owls bowl eligible but out of the postseason.

The 2015 season was a record-setting year for Temple with many memorable moments along the way. Beginning with a 27-10 win over Penn State on opening day in front of a sellout crowd of 69,176 at Lincoln Financial Field. Three straight road victories (for the first time in 45 years) lifted the Owls to a 7-0 start and earned Temple a spot in the Top 25. That set the stage for one of the best moments in school history, an ABC nationally televised, primetime game against #9 Notre Dame that brought along ESPN's College Gameday to Philadelphia's Independence Mall. A nail-biting 24-20 loss to the Irish could not diminish that landmark moment. The Owls finished the regular season at 10-2, tying the 1979 team for the most wins in a season, and a berth in the American Athletic Conference's first-ever Championship Game. Temple fell at Houston, 24-13, and also lost to Toledo in the Marmot Boca Raton Bowl. While many Owls earned all-conference recognition, senior linebacker Tyler Matakevich, who finished with a school record 493 tackles including four seasons with 100+ stops, was named the nation's best defensive player earning both the Chuck Bednarik Award and Bronko Nagurski Trophy. Matakevich, defensive lineman Matt Ioannidis, and defensive back Tavon Young all were drafted into the NFL.

While 2016 ended with a similar 10-4 record, the season was much different from the 2015 version. Following a 3-3 start, the Owls turned a 7-0 record down the stretch, including back-to-back road game shutouts for the first time since 1925, into another Top 25 ranking and a spot in The American Championship Game. This time the results were different as Temple beat Navy in Annapolis, 34-10, for its first conference title since 1967 and its first-ever championship game victory. Quarterback Phillip Walker capped his record-setting career at Temple with the game's Most Outstanding Player Award. He became the first Temple quarterback to lead the Owls to multiple bowl games as Temple played in back-to-back bowl games for the first time ever. During the season, Haason Reddick was among the nation's best defenders with 10.5 sacks and 22.5 tackles for loss. While he was under the radar most of the season, Reddick was rewarded by becoming the #13 overall selection in the NFL Draft going to the Arizona Cardinals. He became just the fourth Temple player selected in the NFL's first round. Offensive lineman Dion Dawkins (Buffalo) and defensive back Nate Hairston (Indianapolis) joined Reddick among the drafted but seven other 2016 seniors signed free agent contracts. The team's success didn't come without consequences and Matt Rhule took a job at Baylor. Temple hired former Florida defensive coordinator Geoff Collins to continue the rise of the Top 25, championship program.

The winner receives a scholarship which may be applied to graduate or professional studies.

WEEKLY AWARDS

The American names offensive, defensive and special teams Players of the Week each Monday morning during the season. Winners are chosen from nominations provided by the conference school's sports information directors.

CONFERENCE CHAMPIONSHIP GAME

On Saturday, December 3, 2016, the American Athletic Conference will hold its second Conference Championship Game. Kickoff will be at 12:00 noon and will be televised nationally by ABC or ESPN. The game will pit the divisional champions from the East and West divisions.

The divisional champions will be the teams from each division with the highest winning percentage in all conference games — both divisional and non-divisional. In the event of a two-team tie within a division, the head-to-head result between the tied teams will determine the divisional champion. The site of the American Athletic Conference Football Championship will be the home venue of the divisional champion with the best record in conference games.



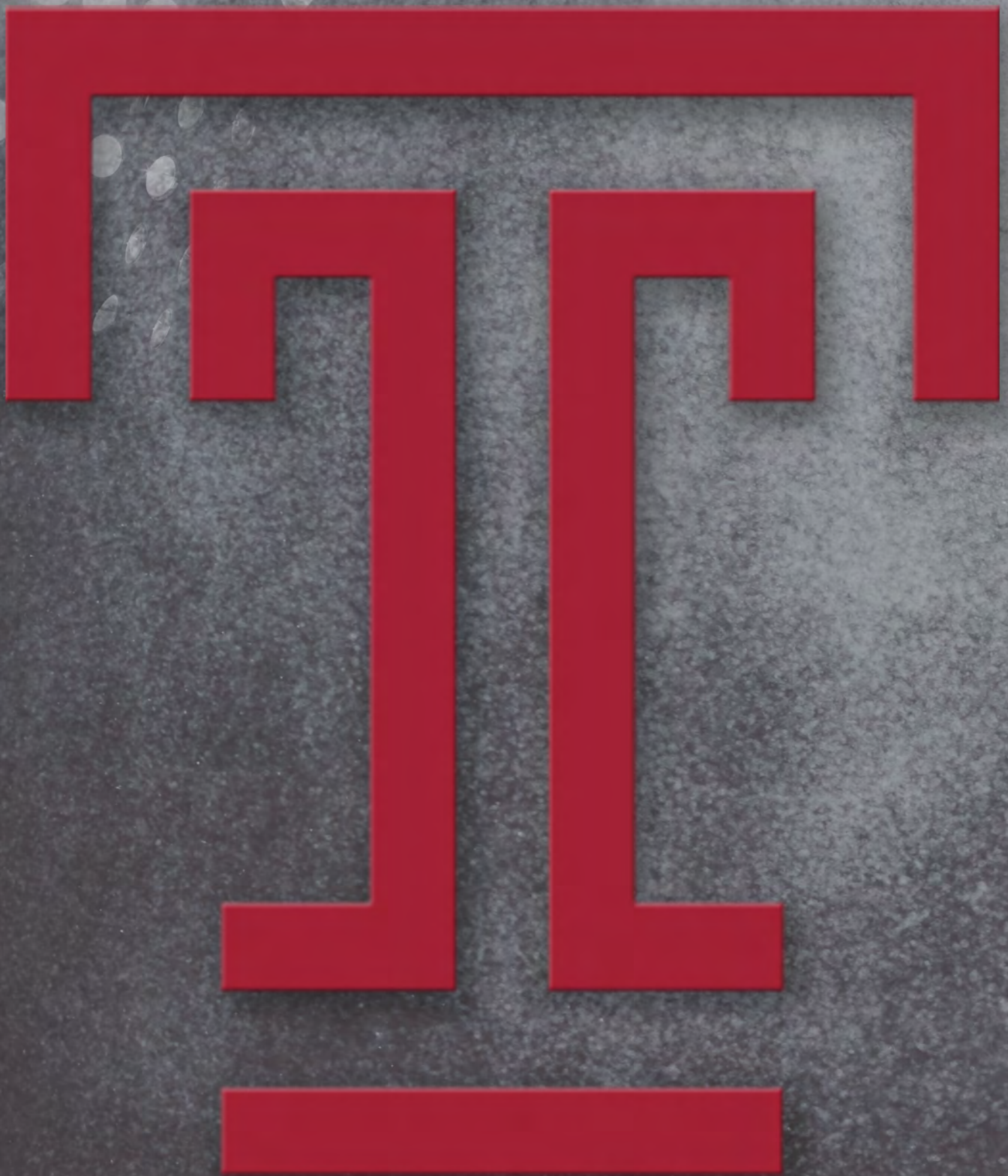
