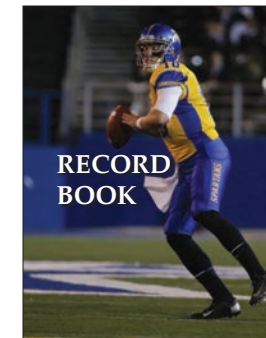

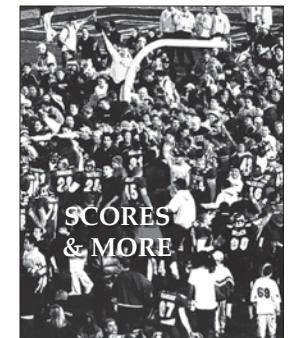

COACHING STAFF



Brent Brennan returned to San Jose State University on December 8, 2016, as the Spartans' new head football coach.

The 44-year old Brennan was an assistant coach with the Spartans during the 2005 through 2010 seasons under head coaches Dick Tomey and Mike MacIntyre. From 2011 through 2016, he coached receivers at Oregon State. The Beavers played Texas in the 2012 Alamo Bowl and won the 2013 Hawaii Bowl over Boise State. Oregon State had one of the best passing offenses in the Football Bowl Subdivision (FBS) ranking in the top-20 in 2011 (19th), 2012 (20th) and 2013 (3rd).

At Oregon State, he coached All-American wide receivers Brandin Cooks and Markus Wheaton and former school career pass receiving leader James Rodgers. Cooks, the 2013 Biletnikoff Award winner signifying the nation's top wide receivers, completed three prolific seasons with the New Orleans Saints and signed with the New England Patriots during player free agency.

A San Jose native, Brent Brennan was a San Jose State football assistant coach during the 2005 through 2010 seasons.

Brennan first joined the Spartans in January 2005 after being named San Diego State's quarterbacks coach. He had a variety of duties at San Jose State. Brennan coached wide receivers, tight ends and offensive tackles, was a special teams coordinator and recruiting coordinator.

Five wide receivers he recruited or coached are among the Spartans' top-10 career pass receiving leaders with 146 or more receptions. Brennan coached San Jose State's only two players with at least 200 career receptions and 3,000 career receiving yards, Noel Grigsby and Chandler Jones. He also coached Ryan Otten, the Spartans' career leader for receptions, receiving yards and touchdown catches by a tight end.

As the special teams coordinator, the 2008 Spartans were 20th nationally in kickoff returns and the 2007 team was ninth in punt returns.



Brennan is the eighth former San José State assistant coach to be named the Spartans' head football coach.

A native of San Jose, Brennan began his coaching career at Woodside (Calif.) High School in 1996. He served as a graduate assistant at the University of Hawaii in 1998, at the University of Washington in 1999 and at the University of Arizona in 2000. From 2001 through 2004, he was the receivers coach and recruiting coordinator at Cal Poly.

Brennan was the Spartans' wide receivers coach when San Jose State won the 2006 New Mexico Bowl.

As a college player, Brennan was a wide receiver for the 1991 through 1995 UCLA teams and lettered on the Bruins' 1993 Rose Bowl Squad. He majored in history and graduated from UCLA in 1996.

Brennan is a second-generation Spartan. His dad, the late Steve Brennan, was an end who lettered in the 1967 season. Brent and his wife, Courtney, have two daughters, Blake and Casey, and a son, Scott.



Coach Brennan coached wide receiver James Jones at San José State. Jones went on to a nine-year NFL career and a Super Bowl XLV championship with the Green Bay Packers.

COACHING STAFF



Joe Bernardi was named San Jose State University's offensive line coach in January 2017. Bernardi came to the Spartans after spending the 2016 season as the tight ends coach at Fresno State.

The new San Jose State assistant coach is a second-generation college football coach. His dad, Gary Bernardi, is in his 40th season as an assistant football coach, fifth season at the University of Colorado and was the Spartans' offensive line coach from 2010 through 2012. The Bernardis become the second multi-generation football coaches at San Jose State after former assistants Mike Quinn (1976-78) and current New York Giants special teams coach Tom Quinn (1999-2001).

In his rapidly ascending coaching career, Bernardi brings experiences from the SEC, the Pac-12 Conference, the Mountain West and the pursuit of College Football Playoff (CFP) national championship to San Jose State.

Bernardi began his coaching career at the University of Tennessee in 2011 as the offensive line quality control coach. He assisted in all phases of coaching and recruiting offensive linemen and tight ends. In his second season, the 2012 Volunteers led the SEC and finished fifth nationally for fewest quarterback sacks allowed per game (0.67).

During the 2013 through 2015 seasons, he was a graduate assistant at the University of Oregon assisting with the offensive line and tight ends. He coached four first-team All-Pac-12 offensive linemen while with the Ducks. Oregon won 33 games; was ranked ninth, second and 19th, respectively, in the final Associated Press polls; and played in the first College Football National Championship game against **Ohio State in 2015.**

The 2010 Fresno State graduate majored in communications and was a member of the Bulldogs football team from 2006 through 2010. The offensive lineman started in 32 games and was part of four Fresno State teams that played in a bowl game. Bernardi was named to the Rimington Award Watch List for the best center in college football twice during his playing career. In his 2010 senior year, he received the Paul Schechter Award for Courage given annually to a Fresno State student-athlete who overcame a physical challenge to become a champion.

He and his wife, Lindsey, were married in June 2017.

COACHING STAFF



Alonzo Carter joined the San Jose State University football coaching staff in January 2017 as the running backs coach. Carter comes to the Spartans with much fanfare as a highly successful local community college and high school football head coach and an unparalleled five years in the world of musical entertainment.

The new Spartan assistant has 18 years of head coaching experience. His teams compiled a 129-69-3 win-loss record, won 11 league championships, three California Interscholastic Federation (C.I.F.) Oakland Section titles, and six post-season bowl games. He was named a league or conference coach of the year in seven of those seasons.



Before coming to San José State, he was at Contra Costa College for seven seasons. He took over a program in 2010 that won just 11 games the five previous seasons and turned it into an immediate winner. The Comets posted a 47-27 win-loss mark, captured four conference championships and won two bowl games. He was named a conference Coach of the Year in 2012, 2014 and 2015 and was a California Community College regional Coach of the Year in 2012 and 2014.

His first football head coaching position was at McClymonds High in Oakland, Calif. McClymonds won four league championships and three Oakland Section titles in eight seasons. Three times (2001, 2005, 2006), he was named the East Bay Coach of the Year.

In 2007, Carter took over a floundering Berkeley (Calif.) High program and produced a league championship season in each of his three seasons at the helm. To cap off his high school head-coaching career, he picked up his fourth league coach of the year honors of the decade as the 2009 Alameda Contra Costa Area League Coach of the Year.

Carter's coaching career began as McClymonds High's track and field coach in February 1993. In his three years as the

track and field head coach, McClymonds produced eight league and section champions. He also had responsibilities as a varsity assistant football coach.

The 2016 California State University East Bay graduate majored in African American Studies. When the school was known as Cal State Hayward, he was a member of the Pioneers' football and track and field teams.

At Cal State Hayward, he and a group of friends answered an audition call, became backup dancers and rap artists, and toured extensively with iconic hip-hop musician MC Hammer. Carter was awarded a multi-platinum record signifying at least 10 million albums sold for "Please Hammer Don't Hurt Em."

Carter was inducted into the African American Ethnic Sports Hall of Fame in 2001. He holds coaching certifications from the American Football Coaches Association, the California Interscholastic Federation and the California Community College Athletic Association. Carter was selected to participate in the Bill Walsh NFL Diversity Coaching Fellowship program in 2017 with the San Francisco 49ers.

He and his wife, Rozell, are the parents of six children – Alonzo II, Isaiah, Alona, Malikhi, Anthony and Kennedie. The Carter family resides in Oakland, Calif.

WIDE RECEIVERS COACH



Kevin Cummings was named San Jose State University's wide receivers coach in January 2017. He comes to the Spartans after three seasons as Oregon State University's quality control coach for wide receivers.

As a player, Cummings was a wide receiver and special teams player on the 2010 through 2013 Oregon State teams. He went on to play for the Edmonton Eskimos and the Ottawa Redblacks during the 2014 Canadian Football League season.

His playing career also includes two championship experiences with USA Football. He was a wide receiver for the 2009 International Federation of American Football (IFAF) Under-19 World Championship team. In 2015, Cummings played for USA Football's Men's National Team that won a world championship.

The 2014 Oregon State University graduate majored in business entrepreneurship.

He is a native of Los Angeles.

COACHING STAFF



Joe Seumalo returns to San Jose State University for his second stint as the team's defensive line coach. He was in the same role for the 2005 season.

Seumalo has 18 seasons of NCAA Division I experience coaching defensive linemen. Ten of his players went on to play professional football. Chris Gocong, who played for Seumalo at Cal Poly, finished second in the 2004 Buck Buchanan Award voting for the top defensive player in the NCAA Division I-AA classification, now known as the Football Championship Subdivision (FCS). Stephen Paea, currently with the Dallas Cowboys, was the 2010 Pac-12 Conference Defensive Player of the Year as one of Seumalo's defensive linemen at Oregon State that season.

Andrew Sowder was named San Jose State University's offensive coordinator and tight ends coach in January 2017. He joined the Spartans' staff after one season as the offensive quality control coach working with the wide receivers at the University of Texas.

Throughout his coaching career, Sowder has connections to championship teams and top-20 nationally-ranked units in total offense. He was on the coaching staffs at Bowling Green State University that won the 2015 Mid-American Conference (MAC) championship and the 2014 MAC East Division title. As the wide receivers coach at Eastern Illinois University in 2012 and 2013, the Panthers won back-to-back Ohio Valley Conference championships. GRADUATE ASSISTANT - DEFENSE



Chandler Jones joins the San Jose State University football coaching staff in 2017 as a graduate assistant. He will be working with the defensive staff coaches.

Jones returns to San Jose State after a professional career in the NFL and Canadian Football League. He was a member of the practice squads for Tampa Bay in 2014 and the Montreal Alouettes of the CFL in 2015. In 2016, he was on the Alouettes' active roster during the season before he was released in July.

The 2013 San Jose State graduate finished his college career as the Spartans career leader in number of receptions (248) and touchdown receptions (31). He is the only player in school history to catch at least 50 passes in a season in all four seasons and one of four Spartans with 60 or more receptions in two different seasons. Jones still holds or shares eight school records.

His best season was in 2013 when he caught 79 passes for 1,356 yards and 15 touchdowns. Jones was a first-team All-Mountain West selection, was named an honorable mention All-America wide receiver and concluded his college career playing in the East-West Shrine Game.





FOOTBALL STAFF



Fred Guidici returned to San Jose State University in February 2017 as the Spartans' first quality control coach. Guidici is in his second tenure as a San Jose State assistant football coach and his fourth season on the coaching staff. His focus for 2017 will be working with the special teams units.

His first coaching stint with the Spartans covered the 2012 through 2014 seasons. He was the special teams coordinator all three seasons and coached the running backs in 2012 when the Spartans won the Military Bowl and finished 21st in the final Associated Press national poll.



The 2013 Spartans were the co-national leader for blocking seven opponent's kick scoring tries. Three of them came in the San Diego State game alone. For the first time in school history, the Spartans recorded back-to-back seasons of at least 100 kick-scoring points with a single-season team record 108 in 2012 and 105 in 2013. Punter Harrison Waid and placekicker Austin Lopez finished their careers as the University's leaders in yards per punt and kick scoring points, respectively. The 2012 San José State team successfully executed its first onside kick attempt in two years which resulted in a touchdown in the school's 62-52 victory over #16-Fresno State. The win was the Spartans' first over a top-20 ranked opponent since the 2000 season.

Guidici joined the San José State University staff in March 2012 as the special teams coordinator and running backs coach. That year, the Spartans set a single-season school record for kick-scoring points, produced the program's highest percentage of field goals made in a season, scored points on punt defense and tied the San José State season record for kickoffs returned for a touchdown.

As the 2012 running backs coach, he coached De'Leon Eskridge, the Spartans' first 1,000-yard rusher in six seasons, and Tyler Ervin, who would set the single-season school-record for rushing yards in 2015. Ervin was a rookie with the NFL's Houston Texans in 2016.

A long-time Bay Area resident, Guidici spent 16 seasons at Menlo College in Atherton, Calif., with three of them being the Oaks' head coach. The 2011 Menlo squad was the school's first in eight years to post a .500 or better win-loss record.

The 1989 San José State graduate has more than 25 years of professional and college coaching experience. He coached at Santa Clara University for three seasons (1990-92), Stanford University for two seasons (1993-94), Menlo College (1996-2011) and College of San Mateo (2015-16). Guidici worked with Pro Football Hall of Fame and Super Bowl winning coach Bill Walsh (1931-2007) at Stanford as a defensive assistant coach.

Guidici spent the 1995 season with the Oakland Raiders as the defensive quality control coach. He moved on to the San José SaberCats of the Arena Football League in 1996 and coached the team's offensive and defensive lines and assisted with special teams coaching in his first three ARENA League seasons. Guidici returned to the Arena Football League's San Jose team as an assistant coach for the 2015 season. The SaberCats posted a 20-1 record and won the Arena Bowl – the league's equivalent to the Super Bowl.

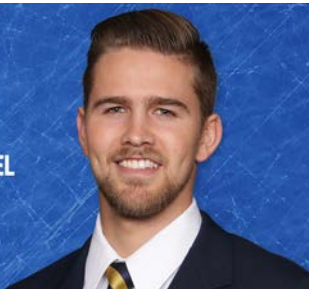

Moore first became part of the football equipment staff in August 2011. He was appointed the interim football equipment manager in November 2016.

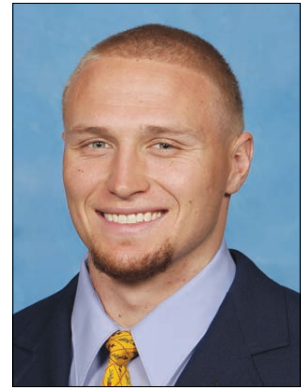
The native of Orange, Calif., has served internships with the San Francisco 49ers staff in 2015 and the New York Jets in 2016.

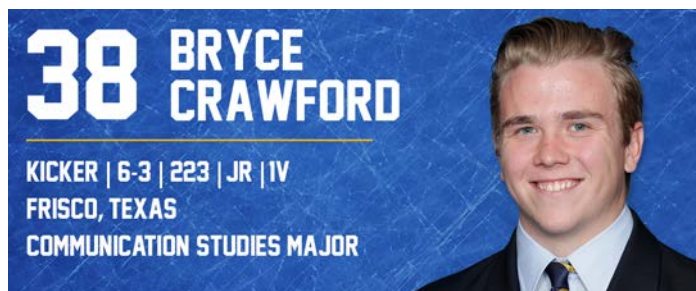

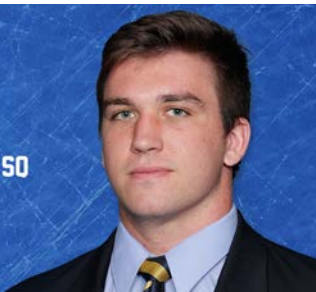

From its inception in 1999, the Mountain West has been committed to excellence in intercollegiate athletics, while promoting the academic missions of its member institutions. The MW continues to cultivate opportunities for more than 5,100 student-athletes each year to compete at the highest level, while fostering academic achievement and sportsmanship.

Over the past 17 years, 42 Mountain West student-athletes have earned NCAA Postgraduate Scholarships. An additional 32 student-athletes have been named MW Scholar-Athlete of the Year and were awarded league-sponsored postgraduate scholarships. Four Mountain West student-athletes have earned distinction as Rhodes Scholars.

Conceived on May 26, 1998, the presidents of Air Force, BYU, Colorado State, New Mexico, San Diego State, UNLV, Utah and Wyoming decided to form a new NCAA Division I-A intercollegiate athletics conference. Boise State University joined the Mountain West in 2011-12, followed by Fresno State and the University of Nevada. On July 1, 2012, the University of Hawai'i became a football-only member of the Conference.

On July 1, 2013, San José State University and Utah State University joined the Conference, bringing to 11 the number of full-time member institutions and 12 football-playing members.

The Mountain West was the first non-automatic-qualifying BCS conference to participate in four BCS bowl games, winning three. In the inaugural year of the College Football Playoff system, Boise State earned the automatic slot into a New Year's Six bowl game as the highest-ranked champion from the Group of Five 5 conferences. The Broncos defeated then 10th-ranked Arizona, 38-30, in the 2015 VIZIO Fiesta Bowl.

Mountain West teams enjoyed a strong year in 2016-17. The MW sent seven teams to postseason bowl games. The league has earned 84 bowl bids including four appearances in Bowl Championship Series (BCS) games and one College Football Playoff (CFP) game since 1999 and holds a 46-38 (.548) all-time record. Entering 2017, the MW has five contracted bowl affiliations – the Las Vegas Bowl, Hawai'i Bowl, Famous Idaho Potato Bowl, Gildan New Mexico Bowl and NOVA® Home Loans Arizona Bowl. The league also has a secondary agreement with the Cactus Bowl.

The MW has produced 1,059 All-America selections among its 18 sponsored sports. A total of 190 MW student-athletes have also earned Academic All-America accolades. Mountain West have captured four NCAA team championships and produced 43 individual NCAA champions in seven sports.

The Mountain West is noted for its geographic diversity. The majestic Rocky Mountain range borders five MW institutions (Air Force, Boise State, Colorado State, New Mexico and Utah State). The high plains of Wyoming (elevation 7,220 feet – the highest Division I campus in the nation) contrast with the desert cities of Las Vegas and Reno, home to UNLV and Nevada, respectively. Fresno State, San Diego State and San Jose State add a West Coast influence with their locations in Central, Southern and Northern California. The inclusion of the Hawai'i football program extends the Mountain West footprint to the beautiful islands in the Pacific Ocean.

RECORD BOOK

Lloyd Thomas is the first San José State University football player to receive first-team All-America honors. The Spartan played as an end on the 1936, 1937 and 1938 teams that had a combined record of 27-7-1. He was an Associated Press Little All-America as a senior in 1938, one of the organization's first black All-America football players. Thomas also was a three-time letterwinner in basketball at San José State.

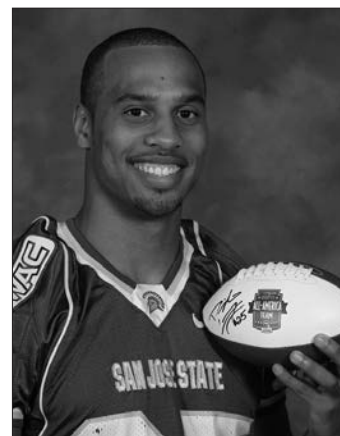
Leroy Zimmerman was a small college Associated Press first-team All-America back in 1939 – San José State University's first undefeated and untied season. The Spartans were 13-0 outscoring their opponents, 324-29. Zimmerman was the team's rushing leader, most proficient passer, led the team with eight interceptions and in scoring, and averaged 40.6 yards a punt. He was the first San José State player selected in a NFL draft when the Washington Redskins made him the 58th overall pick in 1940. He would go on to play nine seasons for five NFL teams.

Dave Chaney was a two-time All-America linebacker. A United Press International second-team All-America as a junior in 1970, Chaney became the Spartans first major college first-team All-America when he was named to the Associated Press and Newspaper Enterprise Association 1971 teams. His greatest single-game performance was in the Spartans' 13-12 upset win over eventual Rose Bowl champion Stanford on November 13, 1971. Chaney was credited with 17 tackles, two fumble recoveries and intercepted a pass. His jersey number 52 was the first to be retired at San José State. After his college football career, he became a very successful high school tennis coach in Central California.

Charles Pauley was the NCAA Division I-A kickoff return leader in 2002 averaging a San José State single-season school 31.6 yards per return. The collegefootballnews.com first team and Associated Press third-team All-America returned kickoffs of 98 yards against UTEP and 97 yards at Stanford for touchdowns his senior season. Pauley was one of the most versatile players to wear a Spartan uniform. He played wide receiver, returned punts and kickoffs, gained yardage running the football and passed for four touchdowns in his two-year San Jose State career. As a junior in 2001, Pauley set a San Jose State single-game record of 355 all-purpose yards in a 64-45 win over Nevada. On the school's career list, he still ranks sixth for all-purpose running yardage and second in kickoff return average.

Dwight Lowery is San José State University's only player with multiple first team All-America honors. In 2006, Lowery's school record nine interceptions tied for the nation's most and played a major role in the team's 9-4 win-loss record and New Mexico Bowl victory. He became the first San Jose State player to receive American Football Coaches Association (AFCA) and the Football Writers Association of America (FWAA) All-America honors. Lowery repeated as an AFCA All-America in 2007. The New York Jets selected Lowery in the fourth round of the 2008 NFL draft. Now with the San Diego Chargers, he played for the Jets, Jacksonville Jaguars, Atlanta Falcons and Indianapolis Colts.



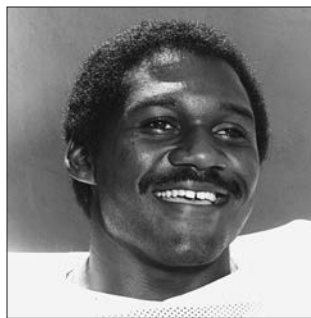

A MODERN-ERA SPARTAN PLAYED IN 50 GAMES IN A CAREER: Dominique Hunsucker played in 53 games during the 2006 through 2010 seasons. Hunsucker's 50th game was on October 30, 2010 at New Mexico State.

A PLAYER RUSHED FOR 200 OR MORE YARDS IN A GAME: Harry Beck rushed for 209 yards versus Santa Clara on October 7, 1950... and by the opponent: Dick Bass of the College of the Pacific rushed for 226 yards on November 8, 1958.

A SPARTAN RUSHED FOR 1,000 OR MORE YARDS IN A SEASON: Rick Kane rushed for 1,144 yards and seven touchdowns on 210 carries in 1975.

A SPARTAN CAUGHT 10 OR MORE PASSES IN A GAME: Steve Cox caught 10 passes for 137 yards at Stanford on September 17, 1966.

A SPARTAN CAUGHT 50 OR MORE PASSES IN A SEASON: Steve Cox caught 54 passes for 653 yards and three touchdowns in 1966.

THREE SPARTANS CAUGHT 50 OR MORE PASSES IN A SEASON: Guy Liggins (72), Lafo Malauulu (56) and Kenny Jackson (51) had at least 50 receptions in 1986 regular-season play.

A SPARTAN CAUGHT 80 OR MORE PASSES IN A SEASON: Edell Shepherd caught 83 passes for 1,500 yards and 14 touchdowns in 2001.

A SPARTAN RUSHED FOR 100 OR MORE YARDS AND GAINED 100 OR MORE YARDS RECEIVING IN A GAME: Brandon Rutley rushed for 132 yards and two touchdowns and caught eight passes for 101 yards in the 27-24 win over Navy on November 19, 2011.

A SPARTAN RUSHED FOR 1,000 OR MORE YARDS AND CAUGHT 50 OR MORE PASSES IN A SEASON: Gerald Willhite rushed for 1,210 yards and caught 55 passes in 1980. Willhite was the second player in NCAA history to rush for at least 1,000 yards and catch 50 or passes in a season and did it in 1981, too.

A SPARTAN PASSED FOR 400 OR MORE YARDS IN A GAME: Steve DeBerg threw for 404 yards at the University of the Pacific in a 50-30 win on November 13, 1976.

A SPARTAN PASSED FOR 3,000 OR MORE YARDS IN A SEASON: Ed Luther threw for 3,049 yards and 20 touchdowns in 11 games in 1979.

A SPARTAN THREW FIVE OR MORE TOUCHDOWN PASSES IN A GAME: Steve Clarkson threw six touchdowns in the 65-33 win at Fresno State on October 3, 1981.

A SPARTAN THREW 50 OR MORE TOUCHDOWN PASSES IN A CAREER: Craig Kimball threw 50 touchdown passes during the 1972 through 1974 seasons.

A SPARTAN COMPLETED AT LEAST 60 PERCENT OF HIS PASSES IN A SEASON: Danny Holman completed 61.5 percent (160-of-260) of his passes in the 1966 season.

A SPARTAN CAUGHT 100 OR MORE PASSES IN A CAREER: Ike McBee caught 106 passes for 1,571 yards and eight TDs from 1972 through 1974.

A SPARTAN GAINED 1,000 OR MORE RECEIVING YARDS IN A CAREER: Mack Burton gained 1,025 yards and scored 10 touchdowns on 72 receptions during the 1959 through 1961 seasons.

A SPARTAN GAINED 2,000 OR MORE RECEIVING YARDS IN A CAREER: Stacey Bailey gained 2,223 yards and scored 13 touchdowns on 123 receptions during the 1978 through 1981 seasons.

A SPARTAN SCORED A TOUCHDOWN AT LEAST THREE DIFFERENT WAYS IN A GAME: Chandler Jones scored on a run, a fumble recovery and a pass reception in the 28-27 win over Hawai'i on October 14, 2011.

A SPARTAN THREW A TOUCHDOWN PASS AND SCORED AT LEAST TWO DIFFERENT WAYS IN A GAME:

Charles Pauley threw a 6-yard TD pass, scored on a 16-yard run and returned a kickoff 98 yards for a score in a 58-24 win over UTEP on September 28, 2002.

A SPARTAN SCORED A TOUCHDOWN AT LEAST FIVE DIFFERENT WAYS IN A CAREER: Walt Roberts scored touchdowns rushing, receiving, on a kickoff return, by interception and by punt return during his three seasons spanning 1961 through 1963.

TWO CONSECUTIVE SAN JOSÉ STATE TOUCHDOWNS WERE ON PLAYS OF 90 OR MORE YARDS: In the September 18, 2003 game with Nevada, Gerald Jones returned an interception 99 yards at the end of the second quarter. The first time San José State gained possession in the second half, Trestin George returned the kickoff 99 yards for a touchdown in a 42-30 loss.

SAN JOSÉ STATE SCORED 50 OR MORE POINTS AGAINST A COLLEGE OPPONENT: San José State defeated Pepperdine, 61-6, on October 9, 1948.

SAN JOSÉ STATE SCORED 70 OR MORE POINTS AGAINST A COLLEGE OPPONENT: San José State defeated Rice, 70-63, on October 2, 2004.



SAN JOSÉ STATE SCORED A DEFENSIVE EXTRA POINT: San José State earned two points when Duke Ihenacho picked up a blocked PAT and ran into the end zone in the 28-27 win over Hawai'i on October 14, 2011.

SAN JOSÉ STATE PLAYED IN AN OVERTIME GAME: San José State defeated UNLV, 55-48, on November 2, 1997.

SAN JOSÉ STATE FINISHED A SEASON RANKED IN THE BCS STANDINGS: San José State was listed 24th in the 2012 Bowl Championship Series standings.

San José State was scheduled to play two games in Hawaii to end the 1941 season. The Spartans were in Honolulu when the attack on Pearl Harbor occurred on December 7, 1941. Many players immediately joined the local police force or the armed services. The games against the University of Hawai'i on December 13 and Willamette College of Oregon on December 16 were canceled.



Did You Know?

In 1981 and 1987, San José State was the "mythical champion" of the San Francisco Bay Area. The Spartans defeated both California and Stanford in those two seasons.

CEFCU STADIUM



The San José State University football team plays its home games in CEFCU Stadium. Built in 1933, the stadium was known as Spartan Stadium until CEFCU entered into a 15-year naming rights with the University in 2016.

The Spartans won the first football game played in the stadium, 44-0, over San Francisco State, on October 7, 1933. Since then, the Spartans have played 395 games over 81 seasons. The team's 100th win in the stadium came on October 21, 1967, against New Mexico, 52-14. The 200th victory occurred in 2005. SJSU's home field record is 237-141-17 entering 2017.

CEFCU Stadium currently seats 30,456 for football. Two stadium expansions and renovations in the 1980's increased the seating capacity from 18,000 to over 30,000.

A FieldTurf surface replaced natural grass in 2009. The original FieldTurf surface was removed for a new one in May 2017. Two scoreboards - one on the East side and a state-of-the-art videoboard were installed in 2011.

The multi-purpose facility is the site of the school's annual commencement ceremony. Concerts, professional and collegiate soccer, religious convocations, band competitions and high school football games also take place at Spartan Stadium.

Five Silicon Valley Football Classics were held in CEFCU Stadium. Air Force in 2000, Michigan State in 2001, Fresno State in 2002, UCLA in 2003 and Northern Illinois in 2004 were bowl-game winners. The 1999 Women's World Cup and 1999 NCAA Women's College Cup soccer events attracted record-setting crowds.

The largest attendance at a home football game was a 31,681 sellout crowd at the 2003 win over Grambling State. The game marked the first time under the current stadium configuration that San José State had a "sellout" prior to game day.

The largest crowd to attend any event in the stadium was estimated at 37,000 for a ZZ Top music concert.

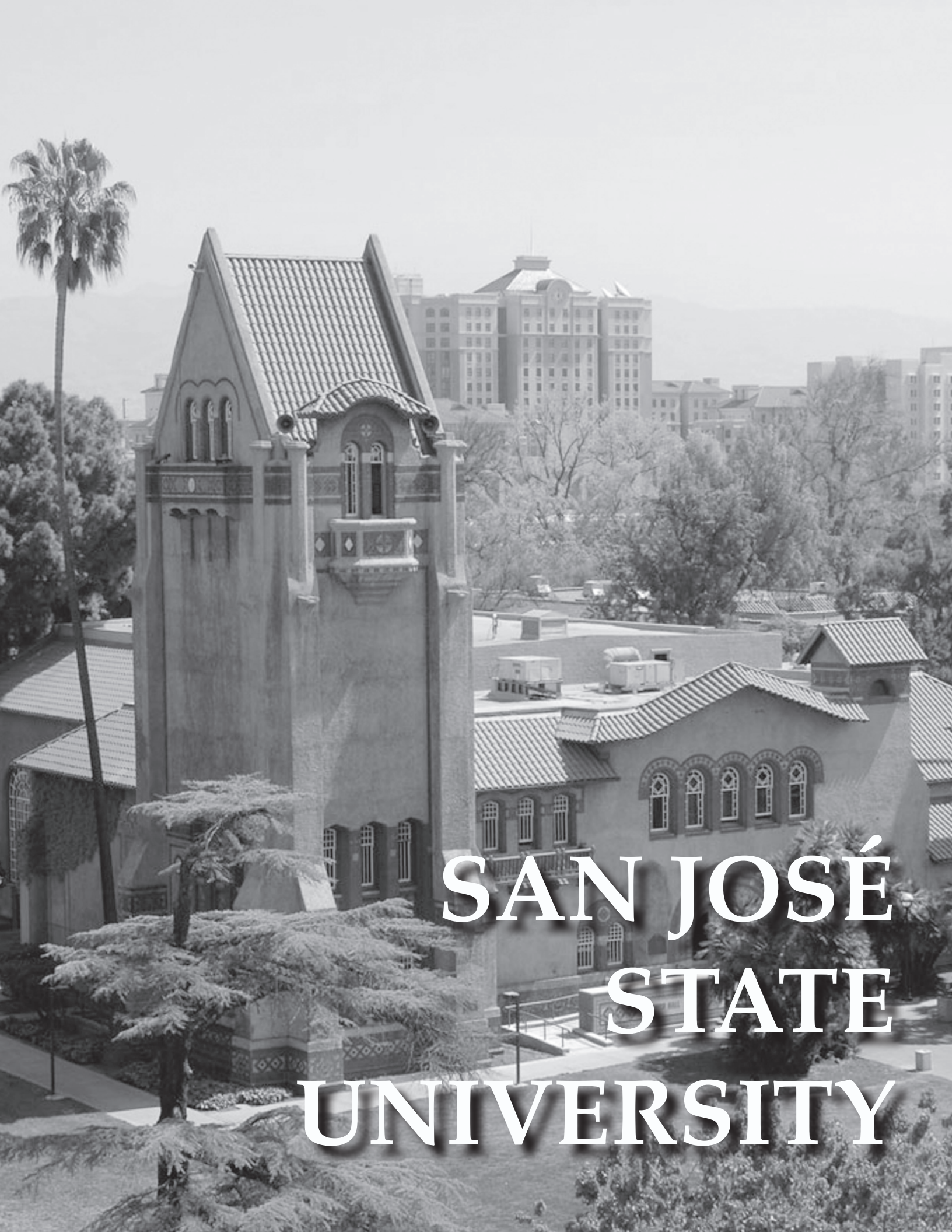

Dr. Mary A. Papazian, a seasoned leader with more than 25 years of teaching and academic administrative experience, joined San Jose State University (SJSU) as its 29th president on July 1, 2016. Papazian is firmly committed to student success; open, transparent and inclusive leadership; fostering a culture of curiosity and discovery; and building enduring campus and community partnerships.

Papazian most recently served as president of Southern Connecticut State University (SCSU) in New Haven, Conn. There, she demonstrated a singular focus on student success, establishing a task force in her first year as president to review practices and develop recommendations for change. Under her leadership, SCSU launched a predictive analytics advising tool and hired additional advisors in key areas to support first-year experience, sophomore, transition programs and degree programs. She developed partnerships with local community colleges to expand advising resources for prospective transfer students and established a summer scholarship program for undergraduate research.

Papazian also served as an exceptional steward, providing a vision for a fundraising initiative that, when launched, will be SCSU's first-ever comprehensive campaign. She secured the campus' first \$3 million gift along with a \$1.2 million bequest to establish its first endowed chair, in Autism and Special Education. Her fundraising efforts supported a new Academic Laboratory and Science Building that opened in fall 2015; expanded international education and study abroad programs; increased research opportunities for undergraduate students, and expanded scholarships to support student recruitment, retention and completion.

Prior to her tenure at SCSU, Papazian was the provost and senior vice president for Academic Affairs at Lehman College of The City University of New York (CUNY), managing a \$70 million budget that supported 450 full-time faculty members and 200 staff members. At Lehman College, she strengthened the research infrastructure by creating a research advisory board, hiring a new director of the Office of Research and Sponsored Programs, and developing a research handbook for faculty.

In addition to her high-level administrative experience, Papazian previously served as the dean of the College of Humanities and Social Sciences at Montclair State University in New Jersey, and associate dean of the College of Arts and Science at Oakland University in Rochester, Michigan. Papazian began her career in higher education at Oakland University, where she was an assistant, associate and tenured professor of English.

Born and raised in Southern California, Papazian holds a bachelor's, master's and Ph.D. in English from the University

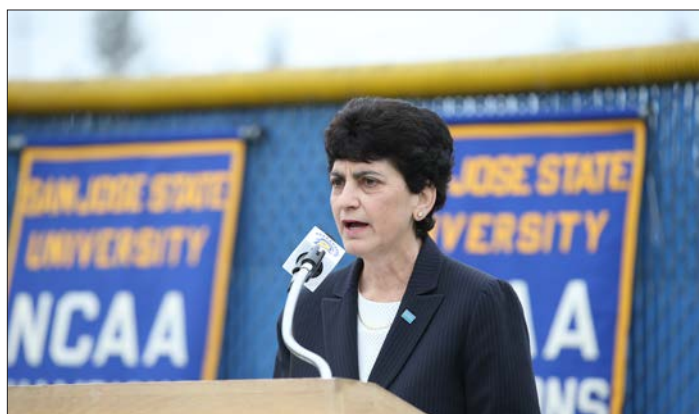
of California, Los Angeles (UCLA). She and husband, Dennis R. Papazian, founding director of the Armenian Research Center at the University of Michigan, Dearborn, have two adult daughters.

SAN JOSÉ STATE UNIVERSITY



San José State University, Silicon Valley's metropolitan university, is pre-eminent in broadly educating leaders and professionals for an increasingly complex and global society.

Located in the heart of the Silicon Valley, this university has aided the development of the computer industry and the resulting technological advances in our nation by providing the largest source of engineering, science and business graduates to Silicon Valley companies.

Graduating about 7,000 students annually, San José State University also provides the professional infrastructure for the region – from teachers to social workers to artists to law enforcement officers to nurses. The terms, “leaders and professionals,” describe not just the types of graduates who earn their degrees, but also the roles they assume in their communities and in their fields of endeavor.

San José State University's place in history is well-established. Founded in 1857, it was the first public institution of higher education on the West Coast. From its humble beginnings as a normal school to train teachers for the developing frontier, it has matured into a master's university offering 191 bachelor's and master's degrees.

The university's 32,000 students study in eight fully-accredited colleges: Applied Sciences and the Arts, Business, Education, Engineering, Humanities and the Arts, Science, Social Sciences and Social Work.

One strength of the academic program is the broad general education curriculum that brings common elements -- critical thinking, writing and communication skills, and cultural pluralism -- to diverse studies. Academic strength also is seen in the university's nationally-recognized programs. Examples include the School of Music, the School of Art and Design, the School of Journalism and Mass Communications, the School of Nursing and the School of Library and Information Science.

In each discipline, quality teaching remains a priority. Tenured faculty teach introductory as well as advanced courses with an emphasis on small classes. Learning facilities include computer-equipped classrooms, the Western world's only undergraduate nuclear science facility and North America's largest Beethoven Center. Focusing on applied research, faculty receive a growing number of contracts and grants each year. From Moss Landing Marine Research Laboratory to the NASA Ames Research Center, faculty are exploring everything from the depths of the ocean to the surface of Mars.

San José State University also finds strength in its diversity. For first-generation students, it is a gateway to economic independence and social mobility. It is also an incubator of cultural and intellectual development and an opportunity for lifelong learning. Students range in age from first-time freshmen to college transfers to professionals seeking additional education. Student demographics – with ethnic pluralism – provide the benefits of multiple cultures and diverse student interests and activities. From residence life to athletic teams to social clubs to co-op jobs – student activities meet the needs of this diverse student body.

Marie Tuite was promoted to the position of director of athletics at San José State University on May 19, 2017 after seven years of university service in several executive positions. Twice, she was the interim director of athletics from February to May 2017 and from April to June 2012. As of July 15, 2017, Tuite is one of nine women who is an athletics director at a NCAA Division I Football Bowl Subdivision (FBS) institution.

She originally joined San José State in June 2010 as a senior associate athletics director and the athletics department's chief operating officer. Tuite also held the position of deputy director of athletics/internal operations and fulfilled the role of senior woman administrator (SWA) before being named athletics director.



Marie Tuite brings 30-plus years of athletics administration executive experiences to her position as San Jose State's director of athletics.

Her many contributions at San José State include:

- Administering the department's \$26-million budget that supports 20 NCAA Division I programs, 450 student-athletes and 110 coaches and staff members
- Facilitating a 15-year naming rights agreement in 2016 for CEFCU Stadium, the Home of the Spartans; and the department's first all-sports apparel partnership in 2017, a six-year agreement with adidas.
- Facility enhancements on the University's 62-acre South Campus. In the last five years, the enhancements include a new practice facility for the men's and women's golf programs, the Stephens Family Pitching & Hitting Facility for baseball, a new playing field for men's and women's soccer and new FieldTurf in CEFCU Stadium football. On the main campus, there are recently renovated locker room facilities for men's and women's basketball, volleyball and women's gymnastics.

- Eliminating a department deficit and adding the sports of women's indoor and outdoor track and field in 2013, beach volleyball in 2014 and men's water polo in 2015. The reinstatement of San José State University's famed men's track and field program is in October 2018.

- Successfully promoting San José State to be the practice site for the Carolina Panthers as the National Football Conference (NFC) representative in Super Bowl 50

- Taking a leadership role in San José State's invitation and acceptance to join the Mountain West in July 2013. Tuite's daily duties included direct supervision of student services, compliance and business affairs; managing future football scheduling; and serving as the sports supervisor for football, men's and women's basketball and women's golf. In her first seven years at San José State, the football team won its two bowl games, the 2012 Military Bowl and the 2015 Auto National Cure Bowl, and the Spartans captured 11 conference team championships.

Her professional career includes executive positions at Pacific-12 Conference universities and the NCAA. She came to the Spartans from Seattle University where she was a Special Assistant to the Athletics Director. Tuite assisted Seattle University's transition to NCAA Division I athletics status.

Her first athletics administrative position was at Alma (Mich.) College in 1981 as the Director of Women's Athletics Programs and Activities. She joined the University of California women's athletics staff in 1984 as an assistant athletics director.

Tuite worked for the NCAA as an Assistant Director of Championships from 1989 to 1994. She assisted the organization's sport committees in the administration of the National Collegiate Championships program and coordinated the Association's corporate partner, merchandising, promotional, and official ball programs for NCAA championships.

She returned to a campus setting in 1994 as a senior associate athletics director at the University of Washington. Her duties included overseeing the process and appointment of new head coaches, directing day-to-day operations including fiscal responsibility and leadership opportunities for numerous sports, and initiating and implementing "keys to success" for priority Husky sports programs.

A two-sport student-athlete and graduate of Central Michigan University, she was inducted into the university's Athletics Hall of Fame in 1990 as just the third female inductee. Tuite played field hockey and was a star basketball player who majored in physical education. She earned her master's degree from her alma mater in athletic administration.

Tuite is a member of NACDA (National Association of College Directors of Athletics), Women Leaders in College Sports, and the Women's Sports Foundation. In May 2012, she was one of 41 local female executives honored at the 28th annual Tribute to Women Awards program by the YWCA Silicon Valley.

The native of Livonia, Mich., has two sons, Michael, a 2015 University of Washington graduate, and John.

Steve O'Brien, who has 11 years of progressive NCAA Division I athletics administration senior level management experience and success, accepted the position of deputy director of athletics at San Jose State University in July 2017.

O'Brien joins San Jose State University after spending six years as a senior associate athletics director at the Naval Academy in Annapolis, Md., two years as an associate athletics director at UC Santa Barbara and three years at his alma mater, Santa Clara University.

His wide-ranging background in college athletics administration includes developing revenue-generating opportunities, sports supervision, facilities enhancement, teaming with compliance officers to resolve student-athlete eligibility issues, creating plans for academic success, introducing life skills programs for student-athletes, enhancing alumni and student body relations, and NCAA committee service.

At Navy, he transformed the athletics department's development activities and created new strategies that resulted in a 10-fold increase from \$1.2-million in annual revenues to more than \$13-million a year. More than \$76-million in revenues from contributions, pledges, ticket and suite revenues, corporate sales and other forms of income were attributable to his initiatives.

A 1998 Santa Clara University graduate with honors, O'Brien's first position in intercollegiate athletics was at his alma mater from 2006 to 2009. He was an academic support manager and later as an assistant athletics director responsible for the operation and management of the Bronco Bench Foundation. The Bronco student-athlete population grade-point average exceeded 3.00 for the first time in school history during his watch.

The Bronco Bench Foundation raised \$1.5-million annually, the largest amount at the time for student-athlete scholarships by a West Coast Conference member institution. He also coordinated the efforts of the Ruff Riders, a 4,000-member student support group for the university and its athletics teams.

O'Brien was named the associate athletics director for development at UC Santa Barbara in 2009. He supervised sports, created revenue streams for facility improvements, and managed all aspects of athletics fund raising with an emphasis on major gifts and capital campaigns. O'Brien created the Gaucho Fund, which increased 70 percent in two years, UCSB's Living Scholar program in which the number of top-tier donors doubled and a multi-million dollar capital campaign, The Walk of Champions.

The San Jose native earned his juris doctorate from the University of Southern California in 2001. He worked as a transactional finance and real estate attorney for California law firms until 2006 when he began his intercollegiate athletics administration career. O'Brien still possesses his California State Bar Association license. He is serving a three-year term on the NCAA's Committee on Sportsmanship and Ethical Conduct.

A men's cross country letterwinner at Santa Clara University, he was named his team's Most Inspirational Athlete in 1997. He, and his wife, Julianne, have a son, John.

Eileen Daley was appointed San Jose State University's senior associate athletics director for academics and student services in June 2016. Now in her 12th year at the University, she is in her second tenure with the University's athletics department.

Daley oversees the academic services program and address the overall academic goals for the Athletics Department. She will work in liaison roles with academic advising, University admissions and the NCAA and will manage the Spartans' Fifth Year program, grant submissions and student orientation programs.

Daley's first San Jose State Athletics position was as the lead academic advisor in 2005. She was promoted to an assistant athletics director position for academic services in 2007. Daley was a central figure in the department's major improvement in the NCAA's measurement of Academic Progress Rate (APR) scores. Once saddled with an APR score for football below 900 (out of 1,000), San Jose State's score in the sport rose steadily during her tenure and beyond topping at 975 for the 2015 NCAA report.

Between 2011 and 2016, she served the University as the associate director for undergraduate admissions and outreach. She and her team were assigned to recruit undergraduate students for San José State with a focus on under represented demographic groups.

The 1995 Sonoma State University graduate majored in psychology and competed in track and field for two seasons. She earned a master's degree in sports psychology from John F. Kennedy University in 1997.

Daley was an assistant track and field coach at Petaluma (Calif.) High School before embarking on a career in athletics administration. As a graduate student, she was assigned to work on psychological performance enhancement with injured University of California Davis student-athletes. Daley worked at Sonoma State University (1998-99) in student-athlete support services and the California Interscholastic Federation (C.I.F.) for four years (1999-2003) as an assistant director focusing on educational programs. She was the academic coordinator for San Francisco State University Athletics (2003-05) before coming to San Jose State.

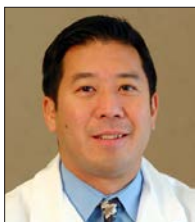

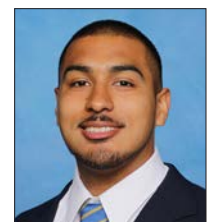

Office Location

The athletics media relations office is located at 1393 S. 7th Street, San José, CA 95112. Parking and work space for the media are available.

Credential Requests

Credentials are issued for news and editorial coverage on a case-by-case basis to those filing game stories, accredited members from established media outlets, and personnel assigned by the sports information office. Requests should be directed to Lawrence Fan, Athletics Media Relations Director. The credential recipient agrees to all conditions set forth by the University relating to conduct and print, video, audio, digital and photographic game coverage.

Press Box

The Spartan Stadium press box is located on the 7th Street side of the stadium and is an open-air facility. Carry a jacket. The press box remains open three hours after each contest.



Game Day Parking

Media parking is located in Lot 4 on 7th & Humboldt Streets. Media parking passes for home games are issued by the athletics media relations office.

Photographers

Credentials are issued to newspapers, wire services, video crews and team photographers. NCAA rules limit photographers to a wide area behind the restraining line around the playing field and outside the 25-yard lines.

Play-by-Play Television

Contact Lawrence Fan in writing at least 30 days prior to a game concerning video play-by-play of San José State University home football games.

Radio Broadcasts

The radio broadcast booth for the designated official flagship station of the visiting team at Spartan Stadium is Box B on the mezzanine level of the press box and has space for five working individuals. ISDN and regular telephone service are provided.

Production Truck & Satellite Uplink Parking

Production truck and satellite uplink parking is on the 7th street side of the stadium. Arrangements must be made to park a truck overnight inside Spartan Stadium.

Scouts

Space limitations prohibit seating and standing in the press box for scouting purposes.

Spotters & Statisticians

Requests for spotters and/or statisticians should be placed two weeks prior to a home game.

Statistics & Services

Game statistics, play-by-play accounts and post-game quotes are compiled and distributed. FAX service is available. A meal is available two hours before kickoff.

Team Practices & In-Person Interviews

During the season, the Spartans practice in the morning. In-person, post-practice interview opportunities with the student-athletes, generally, occur at approximately 11:00 a.m. on Tuesdays and Wednesdays. Please contact the athletics media relations office in advance with your interview request.

Telephone Lines & Wireless Internet

Landline telephone service and wireless internet are available in the press box area.

Travel

Mineta San José International Airport is a 15-minute drive to Spartan Stadium. Alaska, American, Delta, Horizon, Jet Blue, Northwest, Southwest, United and Virgin America are major domestic carriers with daily flights into San José. San Francisco and Oakland International Airports are 45-minute freeway drives to San José State University.

Weekday Telephone Interviews

Players are available for telephone interviews. Best interview days are Tuesday and Wednesday late mornings. Place a request at least a day in advance. Out-of-town telephone interviews with players originate from the media relations office at a mutually-convenient time.

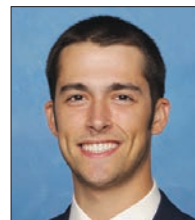
