NEW ENGLAND PATRIOTS (0-1) at New Orleans Saints (0-1) Sunday, Sept. 17, 2017 • Mercedez-Benz Superdome (73,000) • 1:00 p.m. ET

The New England Patriots will try to rebound from their opening day loss when they travel to face the New Orleans Saints this Sunday.

Last season, the Patriots finished the season with a perfect 8-0 road record. The Patriots 8-0 current road streak is second to the 12 straight road games the team won from Dec. 24, 2006, through Oct. 5, 2008. The Patriots 12-game road win streak is second in NFL history to the 18 road game win streak by the San Francisco 49ers (1988-90).

New England will face New Orleans for the first time since Oct. 13, 2013, when Tom Brady threw a 17-yard touchdown pass to rookie WR Kenbrell Thompkins with five seconds left to lift the Patriots to a come-from-behind 30-27 victory at Gillette Stadium. It will be the Patriots first regular season trip to New Orleans since a 38-17 loss on Nov. 30, 2009.

BROADCAST INFORMATION

<u>TELEVISION</u>: This week's game will be broadcast by CBS and can be seen on WBZ-TV Channel 4. Jim Nance will handle play-by-play duties with Tony Romo as the color analyst. Tracy Wolfson will work from the sidelines. The game will be produced by Jim Rikhof and directed by Mike Arnold.

<u>NATIONAL RADIO</u>: This week's game will be broadcast to a national audience on **Sports** USA. Larry Kahn and John Robinson will call the game.

RADIO: 98.5 FM, The Sports Hub, is the flagship station for the **Patriots Radio Network**. A complete listing of the network's 40 stations can be found in this press release. Play-by-play broadcaster **Bob Socci** will call the action along with former Patriots quarterback **Scott Zolak**, who will provide color analysis. The games are produced by **Marc Cappello**.

ROAD WARRIORS

The 2016 Patriots finished 8-0 on the road for the second time in team history. The only other season the Patriots went undefeated on the road was in 2007 with an 8-0 record. The Patriots join San Francisco (3 times) as the only NFL teams with two 8-0 undefeated road seasons.

Tom Brady threw a 17-yard touchdown pass to rookie WR Kenbrell Thompkins with five seconds left to play to lift the Patriots to a come-frombehind 30-27 victory to hand the visiting New Orleans Saints their first loss of the year.

The touchdown pass capped an 8-play, 70-yard drive that started at their own 30-yard line with 1:13 seconds left to play. The victory marked the 38th time that Brady has led his team to victory following a fourth-quarter deficit or tie.

Brady completed five-of-seven passes for 70 yards to lead New England to the win. On the drive, Brady completed three quick passes in a row (to three different receivers) to put the Patriots in position to win, firing off a 23-yard completion to Julian Edelman, a 15-yard completion to Austin Collie and a 6-yard pass to Aaron Dobson to set New England up at the New Orleans 26-yard line with 35 seconds left. Following two incompletions, Brady completed a 9-yard pass on fourth down to Collie, and then following a clock-stopping spike, Brady tossed the game-winning 17-yard touchdown to Thompkins with 5 seconds remaining.

The Patriots had squandered a 17-7 halftime lead after New Orleans scored a field goal and a touchdown on their first two drives of the second half to tie the game. K Stephen Gostkowski drilled a career-long 54-yard field goal in the third quarter and added a 23-yard field goal in the fourth quarter to put New England in front, 23-17. But the Saints took a 24-23 lead with 3:29 to play when QB Drew Brees threw a 34-yard touchdown pass to WR Kenny Stills.

On the ensuing drive, the Patriots tried to convert a fourth-and-six situation from their own 24-yard line with 2:50 to play but were stopped, leading

to a New Orleans field goal for a 27-23 lead. Brady was intercepted on the first play following the Saints touchdown, allowing New Orleans to get the ball back with 2:16 to play.

The Patriots defense had a key three-and-out on that series set the New England offense up for the game-winning drive. S Steve Gregory stopped New Orleans's RB Khiry Robinson for a 2-yard gain on first down and the Patriots then took their final timeout. Gregory and DL Joe Vellano stopped RB Pierre Thomas for a 1-yard gain on second down, leading into the two-minute warning. DL Chandler Jones then sacked Brees on third down, setting up a New Orleans punt that gave the Patriots the ball back with 1:13 remaining and setting up the game-winning drive.

The New Orleans offense twice failed to pick up a first down that would have put the game away in the final three minutes. Excluding a field goal attempt and a punt, the Saints ran six plays from the 2:46 mark of the fourth quarter on, and those snaps produced just one single yard.

The Patriots built a 17-7 halftime lead after scoring a field goal on their first drive of the game and then two RB Stevan Ridley touchdown runs in the second quarter.

The Patriots defense held Saints TE Jimmy Graham without a reception. Graham entered the game averaging 118.6 yards per game.

CONNECTIONS

NEW ENGLAND TIES

Saints offensive coordinator Pete Carmichael hails from Framingham, Mass. He attended Medway High School and went on to play baseball at Boston College. In 1994, he began his football coaching career at the University of New Hampshire as the assistant offensive line coach, helping the Wildcats win the Yankee Conference championship that year.

He played defensive back and running back at Northeastern from 1974-77, fol-lowed by a stint as an assistant coach at Swampscott (Mass.) High School from 1978-80. Giunta also coached at Brown University from 1984-87

★ Saints defensive line coach Ryan Nielsen was the defensive coordinator at Central Connecticut State from 2008-09, where he helped directed the team to the Northeastern Conference title in 2009.

Saints offensive line coach Dan Roushar was an assistant coach at the University of Rhode Island in 1993.

NEW ORLEANS TIES

Patriots P Ryan Allen attended Louisiana Tech from 2010-12, where he became the first player in NCAA history to win the Ray Guy Award in back-to-back seasons in 2011 and 2012. He was also a unanimous First Team All-American in 2012 and finished his career averaging a school record 48.0 yards per punt with 20 punts inside the 20 and 21 punts over 50 yards.

FORMER PATRIOTS

Saints TE Michael Hoomanawanui played for the Patriots from 2012-2015. He started 28 of the 45 games in which he appeared as a Patriot, tallying 20 catches for 289 yards and one touchdown.

Saints CB Sterling Moore played for the Patriots from 2011-12 and appeared in 14 games during his time with the team.

Saints WR Austin Carr was signed as an undrafted free agent by the Patriots in May 2017 and spent training camp and preseason with the team.

FORMER SAINTS

Patriots WR Brandin Cooks was drafted by the Saints with the 20th overall pick in the 2014 NFL Draft. In his three seasons with the Saints, Cooks started 32 of 42 games played and recorded 215 receptions for 2,861 yards and 20 touchdowns.

The Kansas City Chiefs spoiled the New England Patriots Super Bowl LI Ban-The reference with a 42-27 victory. Rookie RB Kareem Hunt ran for 148 yards and a touchdown and caught five

passes for 98 yards with two touchdowns, accumulating 246 total offensive yards. QB Alex Smith led the Chiefs on three 90 yard drives and completed a 75-yard touchdown to WR Tyreek Hill and a 78-yarder to Hunt. Smith threw for $368 \ \text{yards}$ and four touchdowns. Hill finished with seven receptions for 133yards.

The only bright stop for New England was a three-rushing touchdown by RB Mike Gillislee. He became the first Patriots player to score three touchdowns in his debut

New England got off to a fast start before fading in the second half. The Patriots scored on three of their first four drives to take a 17-7 lead that they held until Kansas City executed a perfect two-minute drill to cut the lead to 17-14 at halftime

The Patriots opened the game with a nine-play, 73-yard drive that was capped by a two-yard touchdown run by Gillislee. S Jordan Richards forced a fumble on a hit to Hunt that was recovered by S Devin McCourty at the Chiefs 32-yard line on Kansas City's first play from scrimmage on the ensuing drive. New England appeared to take a 14-0 lead after QB Tom Brady connected with TE Rob Gronkowski on a 20-yard touchdown pass but the play was revered after an official's review. Faced with a fourth-and-one from the 10-yard line, the Patriots were stopped on a run up the middle.

Kanas City answered with a 12-play, 90-yard drive that ended in Smith's first touchdown pass of the night to tie the game at 7-7. New England scored on its next two drives with a 25-yard Gostkowski field goal followed by another 2-yard touchdown run by Gillislee to culminate an 11-play, 82-yard drive that put the Patriots in front, 17-7.

The Chiefs got the ball at the end of the first half with 2:47 to play and converted two third-down and reached the New England 3-vard line with 17 seconds to play before Smith completed a three-yard touchdown pass to Hunt to finish a 12-play, 90-yard drive that cut the New England lead to 17-14.

Kansas City took its first lead of the game in the third quarter when Smith connected with Hill on a 75-yard touchdown pass to go up, 21-17. New England responded with scores on its next two drives to re-take the lead. Gillislee added his third touchdown of the night on a 1-yard touchdown run to put the Patriots in front, 24-21 and then Gostkowski drilled a 3-yard field goal on the next offen-

The Patriots were held to just 31 yards in the fourth quarter compared to 239 by Kansas City, and the Chiefs rallied for 21 points in the fourth quarter to take a 41-27 victory. Smith hit Hunt for a 78-yard touchdown pass on the sec-ond play of the fourth quarter to take a 28-27 lead. Hunt capped a seven-play, 60-yard dirve with a four-yard touchdown run for a 35-27 lead. Then later in the quarter, Hunt broke free for a 58-yard run that set up a 21-yard touchdown run by RB Charcandrick West for a 42-27 final.

QB Tom Brady passed for 267 yards and now has 4,075 passing yards in 15 Week 1 games and joins Peyton Manning (4,736) and Drew Brees (4,306) as the third quarterback with at least 4,000 career passing yards in season opening games.

MOST SEASONS WITH ONE TEAM

The 2017 season is Brady's 18th season with the Patriots, breaking a tie with John Brodie (San Francisco) and Dan Marino (Miami) for the most seasons with one team by any NFL Quarterback.

CAREER NIGHT FOR GILLISLEE

RB Mike Gilislee became the first Patriots player to score three touchdowns in his debut with the team. He scored three rushing touchdowns with a two-yard run in the first quarter, a two-yard run in the second quarter and a one-yard run in the third quarter. His prévious best was a two-touchdown game on Dec. 4, 2016, at Oakland when he played for Buffalo. The last time the Patriots had a player score three rushing touchdowns in a game was when RB LeGarrette Blount had three rushing touchdowns vs. Seattle on Nov. 13, 2016.

AMENDOLA REACHES 100

WR Danny Amendola finished with six receptions for 100 yards. He now has eight career 100-yard games and six 100-yard games as a member of the Patriots. It was his first 100-yard receiving game since he finished with 117 yards vs. Buffalo on Nov. 23, 2015.

RICHARDS FORCES THE ISSUE

S Jordan Richards started the game and forced a fumble on Kansas City's first play from scrimmage when he forced a fumble on a tackle of RB Kareem Hunt that was recovered by CB Devin McCourty at the Kansas City 32-yard line.

FLOWERS RACKS UP SACKS

DI Trey Flowers registered two sacks. It marks his fifth career two-sack game with three two sack games in the regular season and his 21/2 sack performance inn Super Bowl LI. Flowers was credited with a three-yard sack in the second quarter and a one-yard sack in the third quarter.

WISE GETS FIRST SACK

Fourth-round draft pick DL Deatrich Wise, Jr. registered his first NFL sack when he was credited with a 12-yard sack of QB Alex Smith in the second quarter.

Brady was chosen as a captain for the 16th straight season. McCourty and Slater are captains for the seventh time. Gronkowski and Hightower were named captains for the second time, while Andrews and Harmon were elected captains for the first time.

BILL BELICHICK

*Belichick has an NFL-best five Super Bowl championships as a head coach. If he wins one more championship he will join George Halas and Curly Lambeau as the only NFL coaches with six championships since the league began postseason play in 1933.

*Belichick is tied with Tom Landry and Don Shula for the most postseason games as a head coach with 36 and needs to coach in one more postseason game to set the NFL record.

*Belichick set a postseason mark by leading his team to advancement in the playoffs for six straight seasons (2011-16) and looks to add to that mark in 2017.

*Belichick enters the 2017 season in fourth place with 263 career victories overall and needs eight victories in 2017 to move past Tom Landry (270) into third place all-time, behind Don Shula (347) and George Halas (324).

*Belichick will look to win back-to-back championships for a second time in his career (2003-04) – a feat so rare it's been achieved by only two other coaches in history. Chuck Noll did it with the Pittsburgh Steelers in the 1970s (1974-75, 1978-79), and Vince Lombardi did it with the Green Bay Packers in the 1960s (1961-62, 1966-67).

Belichick (16 straight winning seasons) has the second-most consecutive winning seasons all time, trailing only Tom Landry with 20.

TOM BRADY

*If Brady reaches 30 or more touchdowns passes in 2017, he will become just the fourth player in NFL history with 30 or more touchdown passes in seven seasons, joining Brett Favre (9), Peyton Manning (9) and Drew Brees (9).

*Brady is tied with Peyton Manning, Drew Brees and Aaron Rodgers with four seasons with 35 or more touchdowns and needs to reach 35 touchdowns in 2017 for his fifth season with 35 or more touchdowns, for the most in NFL history.

*Brady has passed for 4,000 yards eight times in his career and if he reaches 4,000 yards in 2017, he will be the third player to reach nine seasons with 4,000 yards, joining Peyton Manning (14) and Drew Brees (11).

*Brady led the NFL with 36 touchdowns passes in 2015, his fourth time leading the NFL in passing touchdowns. He tied Drew Brees, Len Dawson, Brett Favre, Peyton Manning, Johnny Unitas and Steve Young for most seasons leading the NFL in touchdown passes.

*Brady has 183 regular season wins and needs four more wins to move past Peyton Manning (186) and Brett Favre (186) for the most regular season wins in NFL history by an NFL starting quarterback.

* Brady has led the Patriots to eleven 12-win seasons, tied with Peyton Manning for the most 12-win seasons in NFL history and needs to lead the Patriots to a 12-win season in 2017 to set the NFL record.

*Tom Brady is tied with Peyton Manning with 27 Player of the Week awards and needs one more to set the NFL record for the most Player of the Week honors.

*Brady is tied with Joe Montana with nine games in the postseason with three or more touchdown passes and needs one more to set the NFL record.

*Brady is tied with Peyton Manning with 51 career games with three touchdown passes and no interceptions. He needs one such game in 2017 to set the NFL record.

*The 2017 season is Brady's 18th season with the Patriots, the most seasons with one team by any NFI quarterback. He had been tied with John Brodie (San Francisco) and Dan Marino (Miami) with 17 seasons.

*Brady has started 236 regular season games at quarterback. With five more starts in 2017 he will move into third all-time for most regular-season starts by a quarterback behind only Brett Favre (298) and Peyton Manning (265). He needs four starts to pass Fran Tarketon (239) and five to pass Dan Marino (240).

*Brady has played in 238 NFL regular season games entering the 2017 season, which is seventh all-time among NFL quarterbacks. If he plays in all 16 games in 2017 he will move into fifth place all-time with 253 games played among NFL quarterbacks, behind George Blanda (340), Brett Favre (302), Peyton Manning (266) and Earl Morrall (255).

*Brady (12) needs one more Pro Bowl berth to join Tony Gonzalez (14), Peyton Manning (14), Bruce Matthews (14), Ray Lewis (13), Jerry Rice (13) and Reggie White (13) as the only NFL players with at least 13 Pro Bowl berths.



STEPHEN GOSTKOWSKI

* If Stephen Gostkowski leads the league in scoring in 2017, he will set the NFL mark for most seasons leading the league in scoring with six, moving past Don Hutson (5) and Gino Cappelletti (5). Gostkowski has led the NFL in scoring in 2008, 2012-15.

*In 2015, Gostkowski became the first NFL player with four seasons of 150 or more points and can add to that in 2017.

*Gostkowski [4] needs one more 30-field goal season to tie David Akers [5] and John Carney [5] for the most in NFL history with five seasons of 30 or more field goals.

*Gostkowski has led the NFL in field goals three times (2008, 2013 and 2014) and if he leads the NFL in field goals in 2017, he will join Lou Groza (5), Jack Manders (4), Ward Cuff (4) and Mark Moseley (4) as the only NFL players to lead the NFL in field goals in at least four seasons.

*Gostkowski (1,466) is 23rd in NFL history in total points scored and needs 33 points to reach the top 20.

*Gostkowski (160) is third all-time in postseason points, behind Adam Vinatieri (234) and David Akers (175) and will look to add to those numbers in 2017.

MATTHEW SLATER

*Matthew Slater has earned six Pro Bowls (2011-16) as a special teams player and needs one more special teams Pro Bowl invitations to match Steve Tasker (1987, 1990-95) for the most special teams Pro Bowl honors in NFL history.

ROB GRONKOWSKI

*Gronkowski (3) needs one more 1,000-yard season to join Tony Gonzalez and Jason Witten for the most 1,000-yard seasons by an NFL tight end with four.

*Gronkowski has an NFL-leading five seasons with 10 or more touchdowns by a tight end and can add to his record in 2017.

*Gronkowski enters the 2017 season with twenty-three 100 yard games, third in NFL history among tight ends behind Tony Gonzalez [31] and Kellen Winslow (24). His twenty-three 100 yard games are third in Patriots history, behind the 38 by Stanley Morgan and the 28 by Wes Welker.

*Gronkowski and Tom Brady have connected on 67 touchdown passes, second among all quarterback and tight end combinations to the 84 by Philip Rivers and Antonio Gates. The Brady to Gronkowksi connection is tied with Peyton Manning-Reggie Wayne for sixth all-time.

Since Robert Kraft purchased the team in 1994, the Patriots have experienced one of the most dramatic turnarounds in the history of sports. Now in his 24th season of ownership, Kraft has transformed one of the league's least successful clubs into what observers view as a model NFL franchise. In the five seasons immediately preceding his purchase (1989-93), the Patriots were a moribund team, winning just 19 of 80 games (238 pct.) and logaring the weat preceding the NE logging the worst record in the NFL over that span. When he bought the franchise on Jan. 21, 1994, Kraft announced his intention to bring a championship to New England,

a championship to New England, a tall order considering the team's previous success rate. But under Kraft's leadership, the Patriots have won more division titles (16), con-ference crowns (8) and Super Bowl championships (5) than any other NFL team. Super Bowl LI was the eighth Super Bowl appearance since Kraft purchased the team, a period during which no other team has earned more than four berths. In Kraft's 23 seasons, the Patriots have qualified for the playoffs 18 times, more than doubling the franchise's accomplishments during its first 34 seasons. In 2016, Kraft earned his 20th winning season in 23 years of owning the franchise.

A SAFETY FIRST

The Patriots recorded a safety in back-to-back games for the first time in team history in 2016. LB Dont'a Hightower dropped Cincinnati (10/16/16) QB Andy Dalton in the end zone for an 8-yard sack for a safety. At Cleveland (10/9/16) the previous week, Browns QB Cody Kessler fumbled the ball out of the end zone for a safety, forced by a strong rush by Dont'a Hightower. The Patriots recorded their team-record third safety of the 2016 season when DL Malcom Brown registered a tackle in the end zone vs. Baltimore on Dec. 12.

LB Shea McClellin blocked a first guarter field goal attempt vs. Baltimore on Dec. 12, 2016 for the Patriots third blocked kick of the 2016 season. The Patriots had two safeties in a season six previous times (1963, 1965, 1967, 1969, 1978 and 1985). The NFL record for most safeties in a season is four by many teams.

BILL BELICHICK

*Bill Belichick reached his seventh Super Bowl in 2016 to move past Don Shula (6) for the most conference titles as a head coach.

*Belichick has five Super Bowl wins as a head coach to move past Pittsburgh's Chuck Noll for the most Super Bowl wins by a head coach in Super Bowl history.

*Belichick won his 14th division title to move past Tom Landry and Don Shula (13) to set the record for most among all head coaches.

*Bill Belichick now has 237 regular seasons wins. He is behind Don Shula (328), George Halas (318) and Tom Landry (250).

*Belichick set the postseason mark with his six straight season of playoff advancement (2011-2016). Belichick (2003-07), John Harbaugh (2008-12), Mike Holmgren (1993-97), John Madden (1973-77) and Andy Reid (2000-04) won a playoff game in five consecutive seasons.

TOM BRADY

*Tom Brady has 208 wins overall (183 in the regular season and 25 in the postseason) and passed Peyton Manning (200: 186 in the regular season and 14 in the postseason) to become the all-time leader for most wins by an NFL quarterback.

* Brady (183) is just the third NFL quarterback with 180 career regular season wins, joining Brett Favre (186) and Peyton Manning (186).

*Brady threw 28 touchdowns and only two interceptions in 2016 for a TD/ INt. ratio of 14.00, the best ever in a single season.

*Brady threw just two interceptions in 432 pass attempts in 2016 for an interception percenatge of 0.46, the fourth lowest in NFL history.

*Brady became the fifth NFL quarterback to reach 60,000 passing yards in the win at the NY Jets (11/27/16). He now has 61,849 passing yards, fourth in NFL history.

BY THE NUMBERS

WR Chris Hogan caught two 40-yard passes (63 and 43) at Cleveland (10/9/16) to become the first Patriots player to do so in a game since Rob Gronkowski (50 and 49) at Washington (12/11/11).

James White finished third in the NFL among running backs with 60 receptions and 551 yards in 2016. $\underline{4}$

Stephen Gostkowski executed a successful onside kick vs. Washington (11/08/15) and vs. Philadelphia (12/06/15). It was his third [Cleveland - 12/08/13] and the fourth in team history. The first came when Jim Lee Hunt recovered a Gino Cappelletti kick at the end of the first half in a 26-10 win vs. the NY Jets (9/27/64).

<u>4</u>. The 2017 Patriots have four rookie free agents on the team - DL Adam Butler, OL Cole Croston, TE Jacob Hollister and LB Harvey Langi. It is the third-most rookie free agents in the Bill Belichick era. The Patriots had six rookie free agents in 2013 and five in 2000.

RB Mike Gillislee led the NFL with 5.7 yards per carry while with the Buffalo Bills in 2016.

The Patriots became the first team in $\widetilde{\text{NFL}}$ history in 2014 to earn five straight first-round byes and extended that record with their seventh straight bye in 2016. Dallas and San Francisco earned four straight byes from 1992 through 1995 and Denver earned four straight from 2012-15.

The Patriots and Green Bay Packers are the only teams that have made the playoffs in each of the last eight seasons (2009-16).

The Patriots have had a rookie free agent make the 53-man roster for 14 straight seasons, the third most, behind the Chargers (21) and Colts (19).

The Patriots have gone 16 straight seasons without being swept by a division opponent after beating each of the AFC East teams in 2016, extending the longest such streak since the 1970 NFL merger.

16 The Patriots have won nine or more games in 16 straight seasons, the most seasons of nine or more wins since 2001 in the NFL.

16 The Patriots have 16 first-team All-Pro selections via the draft since 2000, which ranks behind only Carolina (18) and Seattle (17). The Patriots 63 Pro Bowl selections via the draft since 2000 is a league-leading total, followed by Dallas (62).

<u>17.9</u> Patriots WR Chris Hogan finished tied for first in the NFL with Washington's DeSean Jackson with a 17.9-yard average in 2016. **19**

Nate Ebner finished tied for first in the NFL with Miami's Michael Thomas (19) with a career best 19 special teams tackles. 20

The Patriots have scored on the final possession of the first half and the opening possession of the second half 20 times since 2009, first in the NFL. New Orleans is second with 14 such scoring drives.

Following a 3-0 record in September and a 4-0 record in December in 2016, the Patriots now have 23 undefeated months since 2000, the most in the NFL. Indianapolis is second with 15.

The Patriots are 48-12 (.800) against NFC teams since re-alignemnt in 2002, the best inter-conference record in the NFL during that time.

Rob Gronkowski and Tom Brady have connected on 67 touchdown passes. It is the second most connections between a quarterback and a tight end in NFL history and is sixth overall.

TOM BRADY BY THE NUMBERS

Brady won his seventh conference title in 2016 and moved past DL Mike Lodish for the most Super Bowls played with seven in Super Bowl LI. Lodish played in six (four with Buffalo and two with Denver).





Tom Brady joined just 12 other quarterbacks since the 1970 merger to start an NFL game past the age of 40. The oldest player to attempt a pass in a game was George Blanda at age 48 as a member of the Oakland Raiders in the final game of his career on Dec. 21, 1975. Blanda finished with one completion on three attempts for 11 yards. Brady is the fourth Patriots player to play at 40, joining Doug Flutie (43-2005), Vinny Testaverde (43-2006) and Junior Seau (40-2009).

WR DANNY AMENDOLA

WEARING TROY BROWN'S #80 JERSEY

When Danny Amendola joined the Patriots in the 2013 offseason, he was assigned jersey #80, the same number worn by Patriots' Hall of Famer Troy Brown, who finished his career as the team's all-time leading receiver and punt returner.

Said Amendola on wearing Brown's jersey #80: "I talked to (Troy Brown) a little bit before I came here. I told him he's one of the greatest ever, and it's an honor to wear No. 80. I'm going to try to represent it the best I can."

RB BRANDON BOLDEN

BETTER THAN AVERAGE

RB Brandon Bolden's 8.6-yard average at Buffalo (9/30/12) is tied for the third highest ever in a single game for the Patriots among running backs with at least 15 rushing attempts. Bolden earned the FedEx Ground Player of the Week for his performance.

He forced a fumble on a kickoff vs. Cincinnati (10/5/14) that was returned 9-yards for a touchdown by DB Kyle Arrington. He also forced a fumble on a kickoff at the New York Giants (11/15/15).

FOOTBALL FAMILY TRADITION

Bolden's grandfather, Frank Pitts, played 10 years in the NFL (1965-74) as a receiver for Kansas City, Cleveland and Oakland. He was with Kansas City for two Super Bowls, losing Super Bowl I and winning Super Bowl IV. Said Bolden about his grandfather, "I remember being six years old, him popping in a highlight film of Super Bowl I and IV. I've seen that tape at least 500 times."

BOLDEN BLOCK PARTY

Brandon Bolden blocked his first NFL punt in the win at San Diego (12/7/14) to give the Patriots a first down at the Chargers 25-yard line. It was the Patriots first blocked punt since Patrick Chung blocked a punt at Miami on Oct. 4, 2010.

RB REX BURKHEAD

OVERCOMING ADVERSITY

As a junior at the University of Nebraska, Rex formed a close bond with a 5-year old fan of his, Jack Hoffman, who had been diagnosed with brain cancer. During that 2011 season, Rex wore a wristband with the phrase "Team Jack – Pray" which helped bring pediatric brain cancer into the national spotlight. Burkhead hosted Hoffman for a lunch, provided a personal tour of Memorial Stadium and has since joined the board of directors of the "Team Jack Foundation," which has raised more than \$4 million dollars to fight pediatric brain cancer since 2013. Rex recently hosted a fund raiser this past offseason at his high school alma mater that raised roughly \$45,000. In 2013, Jack Hoffman's touchdown run during Nebraska's spring football scrimmage went viral and earned him an ESPY award.

OL MARCUS CANNON

OVERCOMING ADVERSITY

On April 20, 2011, just days before Texas Christian offensive line prospect Marcus Cannon was to enter the NFL Draft, he was diagnosed with non-Hodgkin's lymphoma, a treatable form of cancer found in lymph tissue. A little more than one week later, the Patriots selected Cannon in the fifth round (138th overall) of the draft with the knowledge of his illness. The Patriots placed Cannon on the Reserve/Non Football Injury list to start the 2011 season while he received treatment and recovered. Cannon was activated to the 53-man roster later that year and is now in his seventh season with the team. Cannon made a full recovery and was named the Patriots 2011 Ed Block Courage Award winner - an annual award presented to select players in the National Football League who are voted by their teammates as role models of inspiration, sportsmanship and courage.

WR BRANDIN COOKS

OVERCOMING ADVERSITY

Brandin Cooks, the youngest of four children, lost his father to a heart attack at the age of six. His mother was forced to pick up a second job at an after school program on top of her regular 3:00 a.m. shift at a local warehouse in order to keep food on the table for the boys. Eager to take some of the burden of raising four boys off his mother, Brandin committed himself to athletics where he excelled at both track and field, as well as football, on his way to earning a scholar-ship to Oregon State University.

QB JIMMY GARAPPOLO

GAROPPOLO MAKES FIRST START

Jimmy Garoppolo became just the fifth quarterback in the last 31 years to make his first regular season start in a season opening night game (Sept. 11, 2016 vs. Cardinals). Aaron Rodgers was the last (2008, win vs. Minnesota), with Philip Rivers (2006), David Carr (2002) and Brian Griese (1999) before him. Garoppolo finished 24-of-33 for 264 yards with one touchdown.





TE ROB GRONKOWSKI

RECEIVING YARDS RECORD



Rob Gronkowski finished the 2011 season with 1,327 receiving yards, surpassing San Diego's Kellen Winslow's 1980 record of 1,290 receiving yards for most receiving yards in a season by a tight end. Gronkowski [1,176] reached 1,000 yards for the third time in 2015 and had 11 touchdowns in 2015 for his fifth season with 10 or more touchdowns. The 1,176 yards led all tight ends in 2015 and is 10th all-time for a tight end in NFL history.

Chris did not get invited to compete in that year's Combine, but turned heads during a Pro Day held at Fordham. Later that summer, he signed with the San Francisco 49ers as an undrafted free agent.

UNCONVENTIONAL JOURNEY

A noted sports fan and basketball enthusiast, Shaq's mother, Alicia McGuire, named him Shaquille Olajuwon Mason in 1993 after her two favorite NBA stars at the time, Shaquille O'Neal and Hakeem Olajuwon. The Tennessee native had the opportunity to meet one of his namesakes at a Memphis Grizzlies game while O'Neal was a member of the Miami Heat, receiving a special meet-and-greet and having his jersey signed.

ELECTED TEAM LEADER

Patriots wide receiver Matthew Slater has been named to six straight Pro Bowls (2011-16) for his special teams work, but perhaps more revealing of his value to New England is the fact that he was elected a captain by his teammates for the seven straight season in 2017.

The special teams ace was willing to share his advice on being a great captain with high school football players in a story published by The Boston Globe. "I think first and foremost, you have to be able to put others before yourself. Being a captain and leadership is about serving, and to me, that means a great deal of sacrifice - putting aside personal agendas for the greater common goal. Leadership is equated with sacrifice. I think you have to be willing to do whatever it takes for the unit to succeed. I think you need to lead by example. A lot of times, it's about what you do, not what you say.'

SLATER'S EMERGENCE WAS SPECIAL

Bill Belichick acknowledged Matthew Slater's role as a gunner on special teams: "Matt is one of the best in the league," Belichick said. "Any time the punt return team has to double somebody, that makes it one less guy they can use somewhere else in the return. He almost always draws two guys out there unless they're in an eight-man rush. Most of the time, there's two guys out there – fourth-and-short, where they're trying to protect the box – but he draws a lot of double teams, and deservedly so. He does an outstanding job of covering punts.'

OL JOE THUNEY

LIKE FATHER LIKE SON

An Ohio native, Joe Thuney was told he may not have the size to play offensive line in the Big Ten conference for his hometown Ohio State Buckeyes. Settling on North Carolina State, Thuney went on to become a mainstay on the offensive line while also earning his bachelor's degree in accounting in just three years, added an internal affairs degree and also minored in Spanish.

RB JAMES WHITE

WHITE HAS CAREER DAY

James White set career regular season highs with 10 receptions and 115 receiving yards vs. Philadelphia (12/6/15). White's 115 receiving yards are the second-highest such total for a Patriots running back since the 1970 AFL-NFL merger, trailing only Shane Vereen's team-record 153 receiving yards vs. Cleveland on Dec. 8, 2013. White's 10 catches are the third highest such total of the Bill Belichick era for a running back (since 2000), trailing only Shane Vereen's club record 12 catches vs. Cleveland on Dec. 8, 2013, and Kevin Faulk's 11 catches vs. Tampa Bay on Sept. 3, 2000.

DB NATE EBNER

MAKING THE OLYMPICS



Nate Ebner was selected to the 2016 U.S. Olympic Rugby squad and after he was given an excused leave of absence from his football obligations in Foxboro, suited up for Team USA in Rio de Janeiro last August. The Dublin, Ohio native was introduced to the sport of rugby around the age of six and developed a passion and a talent that stemmed from his father and role model, Jeff Ebner, who played the game at the University of Minnesota. Nate did not play football in high school but was a two-time MVP of the USA Rugby team at the Junior World Cup and a standout on the U19 and U20 national teams.

Although his parents were divorced, Nate and his father remained very close. "We were super tight," Nate told the *Boston Globe.* "I would put my father-son relationship against anyone's. He taught me how to be a man." The two often spent time working together at the family's auto reclamation business, Ebner & Sons in Springfield, Ohio, and would also train in the gym together behind the motto, "Finish Strong," - a message Jeff always preached to his son.

Nate played rugby at Ohio State during his first two years of college, but as an All-American on the school's club team, he decided to walk on to the Buckeyes football team and finish his career with his sights set on reaching the NFL.

DOUBLE TROUBLE: DB DEVIN McCOURTY

After being selected by the Patriots in the first round of the 2010 NFL Draft, DB Devin McCourty became part of a select group in league history. McCourty's identical twin brother, Jason, is a cornerback now with Cleveland was selected in the sixth round of the 2009 NFL Draft by Tennessee. The two are the 12th set of twins to play in the NFL. Devin redshirted for the 2005 season and therefore was a year behind his brother in eligibility. McCourty is the second twin to suit up for the Patriots, after CB Kato Serwanga was a member of the team from 1998-2000. His twin brother, Wasswa, played for San Francisco and Minnesota from 1999-2001. According to McCourty's mother, the two can only be told apart by tiny scars on their faces left by chickenpox. The McCourty twins are one of two active sets of twins playing in the NFL.

Rob Gronkowski got the scoring started by hauling in a 2-yard touchdown pass from Tom Brady with 1:57 left in the first half to make the score 24-7 and cap off a 10-play, 80-yard drive.

After the Patriots defense forced a quick three-and-out, a 42-yard Julian Edelman punt return gave New England possession at the Chicago 9-yard line, and Brady found Brandon LaFell for a 9-yard touchdown on the next play to give the Patriots a 31-7 lead with 1:07 left in the first half.

On the Bears' first play following the LaFell touchdown, Zach Moore forced a Jay Cutler fumble that was recovered by Rob Ninkovich and returned for a 15yard touchdown and a 38-7 Patriots lead with 55 seconds left in the first half.

A COMEBACK FOR THE AGES

The Patriots came back from a 24-point deficit to defeat the Broncos, 34-31, in overtime in a Sunday Night Football matchup on Nov. 24, 2013, marking the largest regular season comeback win in team history, after trailing 24-0 at halftime

New England's previous best comeback win was from a 23-0 deficit to win, 38-23, vs. Seattle (9/16/84). The Patriots also came back from 22 points down to win at the New York Giants, 23-22 (12/21/96). The Patriots have come from 21 points down to win four times, most recently vs. Buffalo (1/1/12).

PATRIOTS IN THE PLAYOFFS

The Patriots have qualified for the playoffs 24 times in their 57-year history. Eighteen of those playoff berths have come in the 23 seasons since Robert Kraft purchased the team in 1994, a dramatic contrast to the six total playoff berths the team earned in its first 34 years of existence. The Patriots have won 19 division crowns, including 14 in the last 16 seasons, and have qualified as a Wild Card team four times (1976, 1985, 1994 and 1998). The Patriots also qualified for the playoffs in 1982 during the strike season.

New England has qualified for the playoffs 24 times in its 57-year history. The Patriots have earned 18 of those playoff berths in the 23 seasons since Robert Kraft purchased the team in 1994. New England has won 19 division crowns overall (18 AFC East crowns) and has qualified as a Wild Card team on four occasions (1998, 1994, 1985 and 1976). The Patriots also qualified for the playoffs in 1982 as part of a 16team tournament following a players' strike.



ANNUAL ACHIEVEMENTS

Since the 1994 season, the Patriots have won 69.1 percent of their regular season games (255-114), which marks the second-highest winning percentage in major American professional sports over that period. Since 1994, there have been 147 franchises that have fielded teams in the five major American sports leagues (NFL, MLB, NBA, NHL and MLS).
