THE MATCHUP

In a matchup between two old NFC West foes, the New Orleans Saints (8-2) will march into the Los Angeles Memorial Coliseum on Sunday to face the Los Angeles Rams (7-3) in a contest that will be broadcast in the majority of the country.

New Orleans is coming off of a 34-31 overtime victory over the Washington Redskins on Sunday at the Mercedes-Benz Superdome that featured significant contributions on offense, defense and special teams, as the outcome was not decided until K **Wil Lutz** kicked a 28-yard field goal in overtime. The 8-2 Saints currently lead the NFC South by one game over the 7-3 Carolina Panthers.

New Orleans will be looking for their ninth consecutive victory. A win over Los Angeles would put them in a tie for the franchise's second-longest winning streak. It would also give New Orleans, who has already surpassed their win total from each of the past three seasons, their first winning season since 2013, as well as keeping them at least a game ahead of Carolina in the division race, who they will host on Dec. 3.

Sunday's effort in all three phases took all 60 minutes of regulation and 2:35 of overtime for New Orleans to come up with a hard-earned victory over the Redskins. The Saints did not have a lead the entire contest until the game-winning kick and trailed 31-16 with 5:58 left in regulation. QB **Drew Brees** then led the Saints offense on an eight-

play, 75-yard drive that ended with a three-yard touchdown pass to TE **Josh Hill**. Needing a stop on Washington's next drive in a third-and-one situation with 2:46 left and trailing by eight, New Orleans S **Vonn Bell** and LB **Manti T'eo** stopped RB **Samaje Perine** for a two-yard loss to force a punt.

Brees then led the Saints down the field in four plays, highlighted by long completions to TE **Coby Fleener**, and WRs **Ted Ginn Jr.** and **Michael Thomas** to set up an 18-yard touchdown connection with RB **Alvin Kamara**, who then tied the score with a successful two-point conversion run. New Orleans then stopped Washington in the final 1:05 to force overtime.

After Lutz pinned Washington back at the 25-yard line on a touchback on the kickoff to open overtime, DE **Cameron Jordan** sacked QB **Kirk Cousins** for a ten-yard loss, setting up a three and out that gave the Saints field position at their 39-yard line after a 14 yard punt return by WR **Tommy Lee Lewis**.

Brees never even had to use his arm except to hand off twice as RB **Mark Ingram** carried for a gains of 20- and 31 -yards, setting up Lutz's 28-yard field goal as New Orleans completed their biggest fourth quarter comeback in franchise history.

THE COACHES

New Orleans Saints Head Coach **Sean Payton** has posted a 102-68 regular season record and a 6-4 postseason mark, guiding the team to the postseason five times, to the NFC Championship game twice and to the Super Bowl XLIV Championship in the 2009 campaign. He's the club's lone head coach to open a season with 13 straight victories and post a 13-game winning streak and has the franchise's top winning percentage (.600). Payton's 55-30 (.647) home record and 47-38 (.548) mark away from the Mercedes-Benz Superdome are the club's top all-time winning percentages in both categories (regular season). He holds the records for most wins by a head coach in team history with 108 total, ranked 40th all-time in National Football League history. In his first season with the club in 2006, he took over a Saints team that had previously posted a 3-13 record in 2005 to the NFC Championship game and was named NFL Coach of the Year by the *Associated Press* and most other major media outlets. The Saints are the only team to finish in the top 10 in net yards per game each season since 2006, including finishing first in 2016, when they averaged 426.0 yards per game. In 2017, Payton has rebounded the Saints from three consecutive 7-9 campaigns by getting them on an eight-game winning streak after an 0-2 start, currently sitting in first place in the NFC South. His Saints team is ranked in the top 10 in the NFL in three key categories of points per game (second-30.2), opponent points per game (tied for ninth-19.6) and total offense (first-415.7). Payton was hired as New Orleans' 14th head coach on January 18, 2006, after serving on the Dallas Cowboys coaching staff from 2003-05 under Pro Football Hall of Fame Head Coach Bill Parcells. Prior to joining the Cowboys in 2003, Payton served on the New York Giants coaching staff from 1999-2002, including the final three seasons as offensive coordinator. His tenure was highlighted by a Super Bowl berth in his first full season calling plays for New York. Payton's prior NFL coaching experience came as quarterbacks coach for the Philadelphia Eagles from 1997-98. He played quarterback at Eastern Illinois University, where he passed for 10,665 yards, then the third-highest total in NCAA Division 1-AA history. The three-time *Associated Press* All-American selection had professional stints with the Chicago Bruisers of the Arena Football League, Ottawa of the Canadian Football League and the Chicago Bears in 1987. Starting his college coaching career at San Diego State, Payton wrapped two stints as an assistant with the Aztecs (1988-89 and 1992-93) around a stop at Indiana State (1990-91). He moved to Miami (Ohio), where he coached quarterbacks from 1994-95 before doing the same at the University of Illinois in 1996.

Named the 23rd full-time head coach in Rams history on Jan. 12, 2017, **Sean McVay** became the youngest head coach in modern NFL history and has led the Rams to a 7-3 record that has put them in first place in the NFC West. McVay completed his third season as the Redskins' offensive coordinator in 2016 after initially being promoted to the position in 2014. Prior to his promotion, McVay spent three seasons as the Redskins' tight ends coach (2011-13) and one as an offensive assistant (2010). McVay joined the Redskins prior to 2010 after an undefeated regular season with the Florida Tuskers of the UFL. The Tuskers finished a perfect 6-0 before losing in the UFL's inaugural

championship game. McVay originally entered the NFL as an offensive assistant with Tampa Bay in 2008. McVay played wide receiver at Miami (OH). His grandfather, John McVay, served in various administrative roles, including director of research development for the New York Giants (1976), vice president/director of football operations for the San Francisco 49ers (1983-94), as well as serving as general manager one year in San Francisco (1998-99). McVay oversaw five Super Bowl championship squads and earned induction into the 49ers Hall of Fame in 2013.

SERIES HISTORY

The Saints and Rams have played 72 times in the regular season with Los Angeles holding a 40-32 edge, while New Orleans has captured the lone playoff contest. Former longtime foes in the NFC West, the Saints have played only the Atlanta Falcons (95) and the San Francisco 49ers (75) more often than the Rams. Since Sean Payton became head coach in 2006, the Rams have won four of the six meetings. From 1985-95, New Orleans won 15-of-20 meetings with the Rams.

In the 72 games of the series there has been:

- 1,487 points scored by New Orleans, 1,624 allowed.
- A seven-game New Orleans winning streak from 1990-93.
- Two three-game New Orleans winning streaks in games played at the Superdome from 1985-87 and 1990-92.
- 39 games decided by double-digits.
- ten games decided by 21 or more points.
- 32 games decided by eight points or less.
- One 31-point win by New Orleans.
- A 31-point loss by New Orleans.

LAST MEETING

Saints 49, Los Angeles Rams 21; November 27, 2016 @ Mercedes-Benz Superdome – New Orleans turned in one of its most productive outings offensively as they used a balanced attack to overwhelm a Los Angeles Rams defense that came into the game allowing the sixth-lowest amount of points across the NFL. The 49-point output was New Orleans' highest of the 2016 season thus far.

However Los Angeles would strike first as QB **Jared Goff**, making his second-career start and first on the road, led the Rams offense on a six-play, 75 yard drive ending in a WR **Tavon Austin** 24-yard touchdown grab. After trading punts with Los Angeles, New Orleans would get on the board with QB **Drew Brees** throwing his first of four touchdown passes, this one to WR **Brandon Coleman** for the three-yard score. On the ensuing Saints possession however, Brees would be sack by DT **Aaron Donald** causing a fumble that would put the Rams offense on the New Orleans six-yard line. WR **Kenny Britt** would catch a six-yard touchdown on the next play giving the Rams the early 14-7 lead.

RB **Mark Ingram**, who would have his most productive game of the season thus far, would run it in from 10 yards out on fourth-and-one on the next Saints possession, capping a nine-play, 75-yard drive that would even the score at 14-14. On the next Rams possession, DT **Sheldon Rankins** made his most impactful play of 2016, sacking Goff and causing a fumble that would be recovered by DE **Paul Kruger** at the Los Angeles 10-yard line. On fourth-and-one, Brees would QB sneak it for the score, giving the Saints a lead they would not relinquish.

After forcing a Rams three-and-out, Brees would lead the Saints offense on an eight-play, 78-yard drive that would end with a WR **Michael Thomas** six-yard touchdown. However, Los Angeles would answer before the half as Goff would find TE **Lance Kendricks** for a 15-yard touchdown that would bring the score to 28-21 at the half.

In the second half, the New Orleans defense would turn in its most dominating half of football as the Rams offense would be held scoreless. Opening the Saints scoring in the second half was Ingram, who caught a 21-yard touchdown, followed by Thomas' second touchdown catch of the day, bringing the score to 42-21. At the start of the fourth quarter, the Saints offense would add some trickery as WR **Willie Snead IV** would throw a 50-yard touchdown to RB **Tim Hightower**, extending the New Orleans lead to 49-21.

Kamara carried ten times for 68 yards with one touchdown and also had six receptions for 84 yards, including a 33-yard touchdown for a career-high two touchdowns and team season-high 152 total yards from scrimmage.

GAME SUMMARIES

WEEK 1: Minnesota Vikings 29, Saints 19; September 11, 2017 @ US Bank Stadium –

Minnesota Vikings quarterback Sam Bradford set the National Football League record for completion percentage for Minnesota last season, his accuracy aided by the volume of short passes under heavy pressure. With solid protection from the pass rush by a rebuilt offensive line, he showed he can throw the ball down the field with the best of them. Bradford started his second year with Minnesota in style, passing for 346 yards and three touchdowns to help the Vikings beat New Orleans 29-19 and spoil running back Adrian Peterson's first game with the New Orleans Saints and his return to where he played the first ten years of his NFL career.

"When I've got time to sit back there and kind of evaluate things, I've got all the confidence in the world that our guys outside are going to win," Bradford said.

Minnesota wide receiver Stefon Diggs had seven receptions for 93 yards, two for scores and all in the first half, and wideout Adam Thielen racked up 157 yards on nine catches as Bradford had success against a Saints defense that opened the season with the youngest starting lineup in the NFL since 1991.

Rookie running back Dalvin Cook rushed for 127 yards on 22 carries in the formal takeover from Peterson. Peterson was limited to 18 yards on six carries, in a time share with fellow running backs Mark Ingram and Alvin Kamara with the Saints forced to throw the ball more once they started to fall behind. Quarterback Drew Brees was quiet, too, with 291 yards on 27-for-37 passing.

"We didn't do anything different or try to out-trick them," Vikings linebacker Anthony Barr said. "You know, line up and play, do your job."

Saints Tight end Coby Fleener caught their only touchdown toss, after the two-minute warning. Kicker Wil Lutz made four field goals, three under 25 yards.

"The bottom line," Brees said, "is you've got to score touchdowns."

WEEK 2: New England Patriots 36, Saints 20; September 17, 2017 @ Mercedes-Benz Superdome –

If Tom Brady and the Patriots were suffering from a Super Bowl hangover, it looks as though a trip to New Orleans pulled the defending champions out of it.

The 40-year-old Brady bounced back with a vengeance from a season-opening loss, throwing three touchdown passes in the first quarter for the first time in his career, eclipsed 300 yards passing in the first half for only the second time, and New England scored 30 first-half points en route to a 36-20 victory over the Saints, who dropped their first two games of the season. **CONTINUED ON NEXT**

Brady's maiden Super Bowl triumph in the Superdome back in February 2002 is bound to be one of his fondest memories, but the 18-year veteran looked like a superior quarterback in his latest visit. He finished 30 of 39 for 447 yards without an interception -- at least not one that counted. Saints defenders caught Brady's passes twice, but both plays were wiped out by New Orleans penalties. Brady joined Warren Moon as the only QBs age 40 or older in NFL history to pass for at least 400 yards and 3 touchdowns in a game, according to the Elias Sports Bureau.

Patriots tight end Rob Gronkowski had a 53-yard catch and run to highlight his six-catch, 116-yard performance, but left the game in the second half with a groin injury and did not return.

In Brady and the Saints' Drew Brees, the game featured the National Football League's top two active quarterbacks in terms of career yards and touchdowns. Their 922 touchdown passes and 128,251 yards passing combined coming in represented the most by starting signal-callers in the same NFL game.

But in this matchup, Brees couldn't keep up. He was 27 of 45 for 356 yards and two touchdown throws. The Saints' desperation to stay close was encapsulated by a failed attempt to convert a fourth down -- despite being well within field goal range on the Patriots 25-yard line -- with 2:27 left in the first half and New England up by 13 points.

Brady responded by marching New England to the Saints ten-yard line to set up Stephen Gostkowski's field goal, making it 30-13 at halftime.

The Patriots' first three drives ended with a 19-yard touchdown pass to running back Rex Burkhead, Gronkowski's long touchdown and a 13-yard scoring pass to wide receiver Chris Hogan. New Orleans briefly rallied with Brees' five-yard touchdown pass to wide receiver Brandon Coleman and kicker Wil Lutz's field goal on consecutive drives, pulling them as close as 20-13. But New England responded with running back Mike Gillislee's short scoring run on a drive highlighted by downfield passes from Brady to the skilled Patriots trio of Gronkowski, Hogan and former Saints wideout Brandin Cooks.

WEEK 3: Saints 34, Panthers 13; September 24, 2017 @ Bank of America Stadium— Quarterback Drew Brees shredded the league's top-ranked defense, throwing for 220 yards and three touchdown passes as the New Orleans Saints defeated the previously unbeaten Carolina Panthers 34-13 as the Black and Gold would then embark on a six-day trip to London to prepare for a contest against the Miami Dolphins to be played at Wembley Stadium the following Sunday.

Brees led six scoring drives and threw touchdown passes to wide receivers Michael Thomas, Brandon Coleman and ex-Panthers wideout Ted Ginn Jr. as the Saints avoided a third consecutive 0-3 start. Rookie running back Alvin Kamara put the game away with a 25-yard touchdown run with 4:42 left in the contest, the first score of his short career. Carolina had only allowed six points in its previous

two games.

The Saints' defense, which came in ranked 32nd in the league, intercepted Panthers quarterback Cam Newton three times and sacked him four times before he was replaced late in the fourth quarter by his backup, Derek Anderson.

The Panthers, who were already without injured Pro Bowl tight end Greg Olsen, lost wide receiver Kelvin Benjamin in the first quarter to a knee injury; his leg got bent back awkwardly after being dragged down from behind. Carolina's only real offense came from rookie running back Christian McCaffrey, who had 101 yards receiving on nine catches. The Saints led 17-6 when Ginn beat cornerback James Bradberry down the middle of the field for a 40-yard touchdown reception to break it open. It was the same type of big play Ginn provided for the Panthers in previous seasons. Brees was sharp all day, completing 22 of 29 passes.

WEEK 4: Saints 20, Dolphins 0; October 1, 2017 @ Wembley Stadium— It took quarterback Drew Brees and the New Orleans Saints six days and a first half before they finally found their footing in soggy Great Britain in their first trip back since 2008.

Brees threw for 268 yards and two touchdowns and the Saints scored all but three of their points in the second half as they defeated the Miami Dolphins 20-0 on a rainy Sunday afternoon at Wembley Stadium.

New Orleans wide receiver Michael Thomas had a touchdown reception in the third quarter, running back Alvin Kamara added one in the fourth and kicker Wil Lutz made two of his three field-goal attempts for New Orleans (2-2), which arrived for the game on Monday and won the lowest-scoring game ever held in London.

"The defense got a shutout," Brees said. "Offensively, we sustained drives, we did all the things you need to do for winning football."

It was expected to be a big homecoming for the Dolphins' Jay Ajayi, who was born in the city, but the running back finished with 46 yards on 12 carries.

Lutz missed his first try, a 41-yarder, wide right on the second play of the second quarter, and the teams threatened to have the first scoreless opening half since Week 14 of the 2011 season until Lutz connected from 43 yards with no time remaining.

Brees found Thomas, who had eight catches for 89 yards, on a four-yarder to push the score to 10-0 in the third quarter, and Kamara took a shovel pass from Brees 12 yards into the end zone with 3:57 remaining in the contest to wrap up the victory. Kamara finished with 96 total yards from scrimmage, including 71 receiving, and fellow running back Mark Ingram ran for 45 yards. Dolphins Quarterback Jay Cutler completed 20 of 28 passes for Miami (1-2), which finished with 185 total net yards, its fewest since its last shutout, a 19-0 loss at Buffalo on December 22, 2013. New Orleans last shut out an opponent on December 16, 2012, a 41-0 win against Tampa Bay.

"Obviously those first two weeks weren't what we aspired to be, we played two real good teams, the Vikings and Patriots," Brees said. "Basically now, two road wins ... I felt we had a great plan coming out here, obviously it's a tough trip coming across the pond."

GAME SUMMARIES

WEEK 6: Saints 52, Lions 38; October 15, 2017 @ Mercedes-Benz Superdome – Running backs Mark Ingram and Alvin Kamara combined for 237 yards from scrimmage, the Saints defense forced five turnovers and scored a team-record three times, and New Orleans took a 52-38 win over Detroit.

New Orleans built a five-touchdown lead, only to wind up gutting out a remarkable comeback bid by Detroit. Detroit scored four straight touchdowns, including one on a punt return by rookie cornerback/return specialist Jamal Agnew and another on defensive tackle A'Shawn Robinson's close-range interception near the Saints goal line, in less than 15 minutes off the game clock to pull as close as 45-38 with 6:41 to go. But after Agnew muffed a punt and barely got it out of the end zone, Saints defensive tackle Cam Jordan scored on virtually the same type of play as Robinson when he got his hand on Matt Stafford's pass from the end zone.

The Saints' defense produced its first points on Detroit's first possession, when Alex Okafor sacked and stripped Stafford in the end zone and safety Kenny Vaccaro recovered. In the third quarter, rookie cornerback Marshon Lattimore, New Orleans' top draft choice last spring, made his first interception and returned it 27 yards for a touchdown. Stafford was sacked five times and turned the ball over five times -- twice on fumbles and three times on interceptions, two of which were tipped. New Orleans also batted down 13 of Stafford's throws.

Saints quarterback Drew Brees completed 20 of 30 passes for 186 yards and touchdowns of 20 yards to wide receiver Ted Ginn Jr. and two yards to tight end Michael Hoomanawanui. However, he was also intercepted for the first and second time this season. The first interception -- also the Saints' first turnover this season -- came when cornerback Darius Slay wrestled the ball away from Thomas before the receiver could secure it.

Ingram scored two touchdowns on short runs and rushed for 114 yards on 25 carries.

WEEK 7: Saints 26, Packers 17; October 22, 2017 @ Lambeau Field – The way the Saints won on the road might serve as a valuable lesson in their quest to return to the playoffs.

The defense gave up a long touchdown run on the first series to Green Bay. Quarterback Drew Brees had two interceptions -- and the Saints weren't even out of the first quarter yet at Lambeau Field.

But Brees bounced back to throw for a touchdown, the 500th of his career both regular season and postseason combined and run for another, running back Mark Ingram rushed for a score and the Saints recovered for a 26-17 victory.

Green Bay lost its first game with Brett Hundley starting at quarterback for the injured Aaron Rodgers.

Kicker Wil Lutz kicked two second-half field goals, including a 44-yarder to put New Orleans up for good 19-17 with 10:26 remaining in the game. Brees' one-yard quarterback sneak gave the Saints a two-score lead with 4:55 remaining in the contest.

The Saints were fortunate to get their fourth straight victory. But after taking the first three wins by at least 14 points, they'll savor a victory earned following several early mis-

takes in addition to Brees picks.

The defense gave up a 46-yard touchdown run to rookie Aaron Jones on the opening drive. Lutz had a blocked extra point and New Orleans was penalized seven times for 80 yards.

Still, the Saints pulled away late at overcast Lambeau Field, scoring on four second-half drives before running out the clock.

After holding the Packers to a three-and-out inside the 20, New Orleans drove 55 yards in eight plays to seal the game with Brees' sneak over the goal line. Brees finished 27 of 38 for 331 yards, while Ingram ran for 105 yards on 22 carries.

Jones had 131 yards on 17 carries. Hundley showed toughness in running for a 14-yard score to give Green Bay a 14-7 lead with 8:37 left in the second quarter.

But the Packers managed just a 46-yard field goal from kicker Mason Crosby in the second half, which gave them a brief 17-16 lead.

The Saints took over from there, and the Packers couldn't keep up through the air.

Hundley finished 12 of 25 for 87 yards. He was intercepted by safety Kenny Vaccaro on a deep ball down the middle of the field with 4:20 left, ending the Packers' comeback bid.

WEEK 8: Saints 20, Bears 12; October 9, 2017 @ Mercedes-Benz Superdome – Drew Brees completed 23 of 28 passes for 299 yards with a 111.2 passer rating against a Bears defense that ranked sixth against the pass, and the New Orleans Saints beat Chicago 20-12 Sunday for their fifth straight victory after starting the season 0-2.

Running backs Mark Ingram and Alvin Kamara each ran for touchdowns for New Orleans (5-2). Ingram finished with 99 yards from scrimmage, including 75 on the ground, but his two late fumbles kept the Bears in the game into the final minutes. Kamara had 76 yards from scrimmage – 48 receiving.

The Saints were threatening to score twice in the fourth quarter when the Bears stripped the ball from Ingram. Chicago converted the first fumble into its only touchdown with 3:43 to go on rookie running back Tarik Cohen's short dive over a pile of players at the goal line. The second turnover occurred with a little more than two minutes left on the Bears 30-yard line, but Chicago was unable to get a first down as rookie quarterback Mitchell Trubisky's fourth-and-one pass fell incomplete, with it being batted down by strong safety Kenny Vaccaro, who led the team with nine tackles and split a sack with defensive end Cameron Jordan who now leads the club with 5.5 quarterback takedowns.

Chicago had one more chance to tie the contests after Wil Lutz's 49-yard field goal with 1:35 left, but an interception by Saints rookie cornerback Marshon Lattimore ended that threat.

Trubisky completed 14 of 32 passes for 164 yards in his fourth start for the Bears (3-5). Chicago running back Jordan Howard had 102 yards rushing on 23 carries.

Chicago had a touchdown overturned on video review after Zach Miller's 25-yard catch, during which the tight end's left leg bent unnaturally as he landed. As Miller was carted off the field with an apparently serious knee injury, officials ruled that replayed showed the ground caused the ball to loosen in Miller's grasp as his upper body crashed to the turf – after his knee had given out.

GAME SUMMARIES

WEEK 9: Saints 30, Buccaneers 10; November 5, 2017

@ Mercedes-Benz Superdome – The Saints extended their win streak to six when Drew Brees completed 81.2 percent of his passes for 263 yards and two touchdowns in a 30-10 win over reeling Tampa Bay.

The Buccaneers came in hoping to stem a four-game skid, but instead were not just beaten, but beaten up. QB Jameis Winston left with shoulder soreness after the first half. DE William Gholston was carted off the field with a neck injury.

Brees' touchdowns went for 33 yards to Alvin Kamara and 36 to Ted Ginn. Kamara, who also scored on a 6-yard run, did most of the work on his TD reception, thrilling the Superdome crowd with a waving, tackle-slipping run after his short catch. The Saints also scored on Justin Hardee's blocked punt, which he recovered in stride and returned for a touchdown. Kamara finished with 172 yards from scrimmage, including six catches for 84 yards.

New Orleans' defense limited the Buccaneers' receiving tandem of Mike Evans and DeSean Jackson to three catches for 38 yards. Saints rookie CB Marshon Lattimore, who also was involved in the sideline scuffle, blanketed Evans much of the game. New Orleans also got pressure in the backfield, finishing with four sacks. Cameron Jordan had 1.5 sacks.

Hardee's touchdown came on the first of two blocks on consecutive snaps. First, he came in clean up the middle for a smothering block on punter Bryan Anger. The ball then bounced high and behind Anger, allowing Hardee to run under it practically in stride and glide into the end zone. Then the Bucs' Ryan Smith blocked Wil Lutz' extra point, leaving New Orleans with a 9-0 lead in the first quarter.

WEEK 10: Saints 47, Bills 10; November 12, 2017

@ New Era Field – Mark Ingram and Alvin Kamara are so in sync, the New Orleans Saints running back duo is now finishing sentences for one another.

"Listen, it's fun whenever we're scoring at will," Ingram said, before sounding like Oprah on a giveaway episode following a 47-10 win over the Buffalo Bills on Sunday.

"Drew (Brees) got a touchdown. AK (Kamara) got a touchdown. Trey (Edmunds) got a touchdown. Man, that's what we work for, so everybody eats."

That's when Kamara interjected by noting to Ingram, "You don't want to say you got three touchdowns," before the two broke into a fit of laughter.

Ingram had 131 yards rushing and scored three times, and the Saints won their seventh straight in producing one of the most prolific running performances in team history. The six touchdowns rushing set a club record, and New Orleans' 298 yards rushing were third-highest in team history. "We came out and wanted to impose our will," said Kamara, who scored once and added 106 yards rushing. "We were in the locker room and said, 'We've got to put pressure on them to break their neck.'"

Ingram set a career high by scoring twice from 3 yards and another from 1 yard. Kamara scored on a 5-yard run, while Brees scrambled in from 7 yards. Edmunds capped the run of rushing touchdowns with a 41-yard scamper.

The Saints never punted by scoring on eight of their nine possessions, not including two mean-nothing drives to

close both halves in a game they finished with 482 yards and 32 first downs.

The Saints (7-2) became the second team in the Super Bowl era to win seven straight after starting the season 0-2, joining the 1993 Cowboys, who went on to beat Buffalo in winning the Super Bowl.

Buffalo managed 198 yards, and 10 first downs. And five of those first downs came on Buffalo's meaningless final drive that ended with backup QB Nathan Peterman hitting Nick O'Leary on a 7-yard touchdown pass. After Stephen Hauschka capped a nine-play, 57-yard opening drive with a 37-yard field goal, the Bills never crossed midfield over their next eight possessions.

The most notable cheer came with 4:53 left when Peterman replaced Tyrod Taylor and immediately hit Deonte Thompson for a 10-yard reception along the right sideline.

WEEK 11: Saints 34, Redskins 31; November 19, 2017

@ Mercedes Benz Superdome – Alvin Kamara climbed into the Superdome stands, stood in the first row with his arms folded and soaked in the adulation of fans who were relishing their decision to stick around after all had looked lost. Kamara's celebration of his 18-yard touchdown reception had an air of presumption, given New Orleans still needed a 2-point conversion to erase what had been a 15-point deficit when the Washington Redskins scored with 5:58 left in regulation. Then again, the Saints' confidence was understandable; they haven't lost in more than two months. Kamara climbed back down in time to take a pitch into the end zone for the needed conversion, and the Saints won their eighth straight when Wil Lutz's 28-yard field goal capped a 34-31 triumph in overtime.

"We just kind of hung in there. Guys believed," said Saints coach Sean Payton, whose mind seemed to be racing as he labored to recall details of the frenzied final stretch. "There were a lot of things happening in a short period of time."

Drew Brees passed for 385 yards and two touchdowns, going 11 of 11 for 164 yards and his only two touchdowns on New Orleans' final two possessions of regulation. His first TD went to TE Josh Hill from 3 yards out with 2:53 to go and the last to Kamara with 1:05 left.

"I tip my hat to Brees. That's what he does. That's what great quarterbacks do. But at the end of the day, we've got to make plays," said Redskins S D.J. Swearinger, whose first-quarter interception was Brees' first turnover in four games. "We didn't do our job. We beat ourselves for sure." The unlikely comeback made New Orleans the first team since the 1970 AFL-NFL merger to win eight straight after starting 0-2.

"We haven't encountered a game like this in a while, and it was great to watch the team rally," said Brees, whose team won its previous seven more convincingly. "We have the confidence to win in a lot of different ways. We have the personnel to do it and the right attitude to do it."

The Saints (8-2) set up their final drive by stopping Samaje Perine on third-and-1 at the two-minute warning when a first down would have allowed Washington (4-6) to run out the clock.

Washington moved into winning field-goal range in the final minute of regulation, only to be pushed back by a fluky grounding penalty that appeared to result from Kirk Cousins' miscommunication with receiver Jamison Crowder, followed by a sack.

DOUBLE DIGIT WINS

In 2013, after posting an 11-5 regular season record, New Orleans won at least ten games for the fifth time since Payton first joined the team as head coach in 2006 and for the third time in four seasons. Two of New Orleans' four seasons of at least 12 wins have occurred since 2006, with the team tying the franchise record for regular season victories in 2011 originally set in 2009. The club's two 13-victory seasons occurred in 2009 and 2011. Several members of the Saints coaching staff have playing experience in the National Football League

Head Coach **Sean Payton** - Played for the Chicago Bears in 1987

Special Teams Coordinator **Bradford Banta** - A fourth round (106th overall) draft pick of the Colts in 1994 out of

the University of Southern California and played in 156 career regular season games and five more postseason contests primarily as both a long snapper and tight end with Indianapolis, the New York Jets, the Detroit Lions and Buffalo Bills.

Assistant Head Coach/Tight Ends **Dan Campbell** - A third round draft pick (79th overall) of the New York Giants in 1999 out of Texas A&M, who went on to appear in 114 total games with 75 starts for New York, Dallas and Detroit, where he caught 91 passes for 934 yards and 11 touchdowns, also appearing in five postseason contests with two starts.

Assistant Wide Receivers Coach **Ronald Curry** - Curry was a seventh round draft pick (235th overall) of Oakland in 2002 out of North Carolina and played for the Silver and Black for seven seasons, appearing in 76 games with 32 starts and registering 193 receptions for 2,347 yards with 13 TDs.

Secondary Coach **Aaron Glenn** - Glenn was the 12th overall pick of the New York Jets in 1994 out of Texas A&M and started 176 of 205 career regular season games during his tenure with New York, Houston, Dallas, Jacksonville and New Orleans and was a three-time Pro Bowl selection. Glenn recorded 41 career interceptions with six brought back for touchdowns, adding one more score on a kickoff return.

Defensive Assistant **Leigh Torrence**—Torrence enjoyed a seven-year career with Atlanta, Washington and New Orleans for his final four seasons, where he played in 73 career games.

Pass Rush Specialist **Brian Young** - Young played in the NFL from 2000-08 with the St. Louis Rams for his first four seasons, who originally selected him in the fifth round of the 2000 NFL Draft (139th overall) out of Texas El-Paso and for his final five campaigns with the Saints, appearing in 124 career games and recording 22.5 sacks, one interception seven forced fumbles eight fumble recoveries.

EXCELLING IN NOVEMBER

After posting a 4-0 record in October, New Orleans has now moved into the month where they've resumed their past success, winning three contests. The Saints were winners of 14 consecutive games in November from 2009-12, in a win streak that spanned four seasons, including three undefeated Novembers, posting a 24-11 mark overall in the month since 2009. With a win Sunday, the Saints will have achieved their fifth undefeated November in team history, the fourth since Payton became head coach. In the four Novembers in club history that the Saints have gone undefeated, they've advanced to the playoffs in each of them.

Quarterbacks Coach Joe Lombardi - The grandson of

legendary NFL head coach Vince Lombardi, who led both the Green Bay Packers and Washington Redskins and also had a long distinguished career as an assistant.

Secondary Coach Aaron Glenn - Younger brother, Jason, was a linebacker and sixth-round draft pick of the Detroit Lions in the 2001 NFL Draft, playing six seasons in the NFL with the New York Jets, Miami and Minnesota.

Linebackers Coach Mike Nolan - Father, Dick, played safety in the NFL for nine years before becoming a coach. He led San Francisco from 1968 to 1975 and was the head coach of the New Orleans Saints from 1978 to 1980.

Assistant General Manager/College Scouting Director Jeff Ireland - Stepson of Kansas City Chiefs Hall of Fame LB/C E.J. Holub and the grandson of former Eagles player and Bears personnel executive Jim Parmer.

National Scout Terry Wooden - Brother, JoJo, is director of player personnel for the Los Angeles Chargers.

Area Scout Joey Vitt - Father, Joe Vitt is a longtime NFL coach who served as assistant head coach/linebackers of the Saints for 11 seasons.

CB Ken Crawley - Cousin, Stephon Morris, spent the 2012 season with the New England Patriots.

RB Trey Edmunds - Father, Ferrell Jr., enjoyed a seven-year career as a tight end with Miami and Seattle and was selected to two Pro Bowls.

CB De'Vante Harris - Father, Rod, was a wide receiver, playing three seasons in the NFL and spending the 1989 season with New Orleans where he would appear in 11 games, handling the club's kickoff and punt return duties.

RB Mark Ingram II - Father, Mark Ingram Sr., was a ten-year NFL veteran who played for the New York Giants, Miami, Green Bay and Philadelphia.

DE Cameron Jordan - Father, Steve, had a 13-year career as a tight end with Minnesota, with six Pro Bowl selections.

LB Michael Mauti - Father, Rich, had a six-year career as a wide receiver and special teams contributor with New Orleans and Washington.

T/G Andrus Peat - Father, Todd, played six NFL seasons as a lineman with the Cardinals and the Raiders.

Ahead's a synopsis of several returning players and newcomers through the draft, free agency and trade to the 2017 Saints offensive line:

LT Terron Armstead - The club's first third round draft choice in 2013 out of Arkansas-Pine Bluff, Armstead impressed scouts by running the fastest 40-yard dash time (4.71) by an offensive lineman in the history of the NFL Scouting Combine. He has opened 42 regular season games for New Orleans, returning to action in week six after missing the first four contests with a shoulder injury.

G/C Senio Kelemete - A fifth round selection of Arizona C (151st overall) in the 2012 NFL Draft, since first joining the Saints practice squad at the start of the 2013 season, this fifth-year lineman has displayed the versatility to play every position on the line. The 6-foot-3, 300-pounder saw action in 37-of-38 games over the past four seasons with 16 starts and has become an invaluable piece of the line. In 2017, Kelemete has already played at right tackle in the season opener and played at left guard in four games and at right guard in week seven and starting in week eight.

T/G Andrus Peat - A first round selection (13th overall) in the 2015 NFL Draft out of Stanford, Peat was considered one of the top college linemen. In 2016, Peat took a big step forward from his rookie season, starting 15 contests at left guard, left tackle and as an extra tight end, blocking for the most productive offense in the NFL (426.0 ypg.). Headed into his third season, Peat's a key to the Saints' future success, starting at both left guard and left tackle in 2017.

T Ryan Ramczyk - The Black and Gold used their second first round selection in 2017 to snag Ramczyk, viewed by many as one of the best linemen in the entire draft. The 6-6, 314 lb. tackle moved from Division III Wisconsin-Stevens Point to the University of Wisconsin, and in just one season with the Badgers, he flourished. Ramczyk started all 14 games in 2016 and was a consensus All-American, blocking for an offense that gained 203.1 rushing yards per game and allowing just a single sack. Ramczyk figures to make an immediate impact for the Black and Gold, adding valuable depth to the outside of the offensive line, starting two games at left tackle and eight contests at right tackle.

C Max Unger - Since being acquired by the Saints via trade at the start of the 2015 offseason, Max Unger has anchored the middle of the Saints offensive line, opening 37-of-38 contests, missing only one game in 2016 due to a foot injury. Originally a second round draft pick of the Seahawks in 2009, Unger has been named a first-team All-Pro by the *Associated Press* in 2012 and is a two-time Pro Bowler, helping the Seahawks to two Super Bowl appearances and a victory in Super Bowl XLVIII. Unger has opened all 107 games he has played in since 2009. Sidelined in the offseason and some of the preseason by a foot injury, Unger returned to his spot by the season opener.

G Larry Warford - A third-round pick by the Detroit Lions in 2013, Warford has been one of the best offensive linemen in the NFL since his arrival. In 2013, he was named *Pro Football Focus* Rookie of the Year after starting all 16 games without surrendering a sack. This offseason, the 6-3, 317 lb. guard joined the Saints, and he will play a critical role in the team's efforts to repeat as the National Football League's top offense manning the right guard position.

DEFENSIVE NOTES

DEFENSIVE DRAFT

Over the last three NFL Drafts, New Orleans has shown a commitment to improving the defense, spending 14-of-21 picks on that side of the ball. With nine picks in the 2015 NFL Draft, the Saints picked six defensive players, the most taken since New Orleans chose nine defensive players in a 12-round selection meeting in 1990. Below is an overview of the 11 players selected by New Orleans since 2015 on the 53-man roster:

S Vonn Bell, Ohio State (D2b-16) - Selected by New Orleans in the second round (61st overall) of the 2016 NFL Draft, Bell was a consensus All-American and one of the top rated defensive backs in the NFL Draft. As a senior, the Rossville, Ga. native was a Jim Thorpe Award semifinalist after recording 65 tackles and adding two interceptions, one brought back for a touchdown, one fumble recovery and 11 passes defensed. During his 2016 rookie season, Bell translated that collegiate success to the NFL with ease, starting 14 games and finishing second on the team with 98 tackles (59 solo) and first on the team with two forced fumbles. Now a proven asset, Bell will look to enter the upper echelon of NFL safeties in 2017, coming off of his best game of the season when he split a tackle late in the fourth quarter with Manti Te'o for a loss to force a punt and had a key sack and forced fumble. For the season, he has a team-high 48 tackles, 2.5 sacks, two passes defensed and three forced fumbles, also adding three special teams tackle. **CONTINUED ON NEXT PAGE**

DT Tyeler Davison, Fresno State (D5b-15) - This run-stopping widebody defensive lineman played in 53 career games at Fresno State and made 28.5 stops for a loss and 14.5 sacks. After moving into the starting lineup in 2016, Davison has continued to improve, with his 19 tackles (13 solo) and one pass defensed, showing his true value as a run-stopper.

DE Trey Hendrickson, Florida Atlantic (D3c-17) - A product of Florida Atlantic University, Trey Hendrickson joins the Black and Gold in 2017 hoping to add depth to the defensive line. The four-year letterman for the Owls dominated in his final two seasons; as a senior, he was named Conference-USA Defensive Most Valuable Player and led the nation with four blocked kicks. As a junior in 2015, Hendrickson recorded 13 sacks, second-best in the nation, and five forced fumbles. Powerful, agile, and with an eye for getting to the football, Hendrickson will be a welcome addition to the defensive front. He has made an impact with two sacks to lead the team's rookies.

DE Hau'oli Kikaha, Washington (D2-15) - Though a pre-season knee injury prematurely ended his 2016 campaign, Kikaha still enters 2017 as a key member of the Saints' front seven and pass rush. He came to New Orleans after a senior season at Washington in 2014 where he was the nation's leader with 19 sacks. In his rookie campaign, Kikaha played in 15 games with 10 starts and recorded 56 tackles (41 solo), one pass defensed, four sacks and four forced fumbles to tie for sixth in takedowns and first in forced fumbles among rookies. The Hawaii native finished the season tied for second in the league in forced fumbles, the lone rookie with four. Kikaha has made a nice rebound from missing the 2016 campaign, recording three sacks.

CB Marshon Lattimore, Ohio State (D1a-17) - The 11th pick in the 2017 draft and the first cornerback taken, Lattimore possesses all the traits of a future lockdown defender. In 2016 at Ohio State, he was named first team All-Big Ten after recording four interceptions during the year. With his agile, fluid style of play, Lattimore has the ability to shut down even the best wide receivers. He's played a critical role in the Black and Gold pass defense in 2017, as he moved into the starting lineup in week one and recording an interception return for a touchdown, Oct. 15 vs. Detroit and adding a game-clinching pick, Oct. 29, vs. Chicago. Lattimore's coming off an October where he became the first Saints rookie since 2000 to capture the NFL Defensive Rookie of the Month award, when he had 16 tackles, two interceptions, one returned for a touchdown, five passes defensed and one fumble recovery. For the season, he has

36 stops, the two picks, a team-high nine passes defensed, one forced fumble and one fumble recovery.

DE Al-Quadin Muhammad, Miami (Fla.) (D6-17) - Muhammad joins the Saints in 2017 after showing potential as a pass rusher at the University of Miami. While he did not play in 2016, in 2015 he notched 54 tackles, good for third on the squad, while leading the team in tackles for loss and sacks with 8.5 and 5, respectively. He also forced a fumble and broke up one pass. Muhammad's strength on the line should be a valuable asset for a Saints front looking to improve on its 30-sack mark from 2016 after leading the team in quarterback takedowns in the preseason.

DT David Onyemata, Manitoba (D4-16) - Possessing a unique combination of size and speed, this Lagos, Nigeria native had an impressive rookie year after becoming the first player from the University of Manitoba to be drafted into the NFL. Despite being extraordinarily new to football, the fourth round pick appeared in all 16 games in 2016, notching 32 tackles on the year. Now with experience under his belt, Onyemata has become a critical member on the interior of the Saints defensive front as an important member of its defensive tackle rotation, making 1.5 sacks.

DT Sheldon Rankins, Louisville (D1-16) - Selected by New Orleans 12th overall in the first round of the 2016 NFL Draft, the Covington, Ga. native played in 46 games along the defensive line at Louisville from 2012-15, producing 133 total tackles (72 solo), 31.5 tackles for loss and 18 sacks during his collegiate career. A broken leg delayed his National Football League debut last season until Week Nine, but he made the most of his limited action, still finishing tied for third on the club with four sacks. In the week 10 win at Buffalo, he had a 27-yard interception return and a sack.

S Marcus Williams, Utah (D2-17) - A three-year starter at Utah, Williams was twice named All-Pac 12 and earned second-team All-American honors as a junior before declaring for the NFL Draft. In 2016, he tied for second in the conference with five interceptions, even after missing two games due to injury. The defender boasts a dangerous mix of speed, fluidity, and instinct that allows him to read the offense and make breaks on the ball. His athleticism was on display in week three at Carolina, when he snared his first career interception with his fingertips.

CB P.J. Williams, Florida State (D3b-15) - One of the most gifted athletes among the Black and Gold, Williams' career was limited in the beginning by missing all but two games in his first two seasons with injuries, but has come on in 2017. An experienced starter from Florida State University who developed into one of the nation's top cover corners as a junior in 2014, Williams finished his college career with 123 tackles (82 solo), four interceptions and 18 passes defensed. Williams recorded his first career interception in week three at Carolina.

DEFENSIVE NOTES

NEW FACES ON DEFENSE

Along with the NFL Draft, New Orleans used free agency to add pieces to its defense, bringing players from other teams, as well as other leagues to help create the perfect mixture of veteran leadership and young talent in the Saints locker room. Below is an overview of those players:

S Rafael Bush (UFA-17 DET) - The six-year NFL veteran returns to the Saints after spending the 2016 campaign in Detroit. Bush joined the Saints following the 2012 preseason and was a significant contributor both in the secondary and on special teams for four seasons. In his only season in Detroit, he appeared in all 16 games with four starts and finished fifth on the team with 48 tackles (31 solo) and added one sack, two picks and three passes defended. In 65 career games, he has accrued 18 starts, 184 tackles (118 solo), two sacks, three interceptions, 13 passes defended, 29 special teams stops, and one coverage fumble recovery. In 2017, Bush will contribute to the Saints both in multiple defensive back packages and on special teams.

LB A.J. Klein (UFA-17 CAR) - Klein joined the Saints in 2017 at the start of unrestricted free agency, after spending his first four NFL seasons with Carolina. The 2013 fifth-round draft choice out of Iowa State has appeared in 66 games with 29 starts, posting 188 tackles (143 solo), five sacks, an interception, four passes defended, four forced fumbles, and 27 special teams stops. In 2016, he played in 15 games for the Panthers with seven starts and made 31 tackles (26 solo), one sack, a career-high two forced fumbles and two special teams stops. Experienced, intelligent, and athletic, he has 41 stops, one sack, six passes defended and one forced fumble in 2017, in nine starts.

DE Alex Okafor (UFA-17 ARI) - Okafor, a fourth-round selection in 2013 by the Arizona Cardinals out of Texas, enters the fifth year of his career and his first with the Saints. In the past five seasons, Okafor has totaled 130 tackles (71 solo), 15.5 sacks, seven passes defended, an interception, two forced fumbles, and two fumble recoveries. Okafor enjoyed one of the most productive seasons of his career in 2017, recording 43 tackles (27 solo), 4.5 sacks to rank second on the club, four passes defended and two forced fumbles to tie for the team lead before suffering a season-ending Achilles injury vs. Washington.

LB Manti Te'o (UFA-17 SD) - The 2012 Heisman Trophy runner-up joins the Black and Gold this season after four years as a San Diego Charger. In his career, he has appeared in 47 games with 39 starts, recording 322 tackles (190 solo), 1.5 sacks, ten passes defended, and two picks. In 2017, Te'o has 34 stops (20 solo) and one pass defended through the first ten contests.

SACK ATTACK

In 2017, while the improvement in the New Orleans defense can be credited to all three levels, the Saints are tied for ninth in the NFL with 27 sacks after week 11 after recording only 30 quarterback takedowns during the entire 2016 campaign.

QUARTERBACK

DREW BREES

- Since signing with the Saints as an unrestricted free agent in 2006 from San Diego, QB Drew Brees has thrown for 4,000 or more yards each season, became the only NFL signal-caller to throw for 5,000 yards five different times and ranked at or near the top in every passing category, both in single-seasons and over the 12-year period, breaking virtually every club passing record.
- Brees has kept up the pace in 2017, leading New Orleans on a six-game winning streak, completing 244-of-341 passes (71.6%) for 2,783 yards with 15 touchdown passes, five interceptions and a 104.3 passer rating, adding two rushing touchdowns. Through ten games, he is ranked first in the NFL with a career-high completion percentage, second in completions, third in passing yardage, passer rating and fourth quarter passer rating (118.6).
- Since signing with New Orleans in 2006 and playing in 184 games for the Black and Gold, fifth in club record books, Brees leads the NFL with 56,546 passing yards, 400 touchdown passes, 7,290 attempts, 4,955 completions, a 68.0% completion percentage, 102 games with at least 300 yards passing, 15 with at least 400 yards passing, 431 passes of 25 yards or more and stands at third in the league with a 99.5 passer rating. He did not throw an interception through the first four games of the season for the first time.
- Brees has been selected to play in a franchise-record nine Pro Bowls as a member of the Saints, with ten overall berths in the National Football League's all-star game, twice as a starter, including a selection following the 2016 season. His seven consecutive selections as a Saint is tied for first in franchise history with Pro Football Hall of Fame tackle William Roaf.
- Brees has posted a 109-75 regular season record in contests he has started since signing with the Saints in 2006. In Week 15 of the 2016 campaign, Brees earned his 100th regular season victory in a Saints uniform. Including his six playoff victories, his 115 total wins as a member of the Saints make him the winningest quarterback in franchise history.

• One of the club's two first round draft picks in 2011, the 2009 Heisman Trophy winner has been an integral part of the rushing attack since his arrival in New Orleans. In 2016, Ingram had the most productive season of his seven-year NFL career, rushing for 1,043 yards on 205 carries (5.1 yards per attempt) and six touchdowns. This was the first time Ingram had broken the 1,000 yard barrier in his career. He became the first Black and Gold back to hit the mark since Deuce McAllister ran for 1,057 in 2006 and the seventh back to do so in franchise history. For his career, he ranks second in club record books with 5,044 yards rushing, second with 40 rushing touchdowns and eighth with 44 total touchdowns.

• In 2017, Ingram has picked back up where he left off in 2016, playing in all ten games with eight starts and leading the team in rushing with 155 carries for 806 yards (5.2 avg.) with eight touchdowns and adding 34 receptions for 213 yards for 1,019 total yards from scrimmage. Ingram's is ranked fourth in the National Football League in rushing, fifth in total yards from scrimmage and is tied for first in rushing touchdowns. Ingram has had four 100-yard rushing performances in 2017

• A talented runner and receiver with a 5-10, 215-pound frame who was selected by the Saints in the third round of the 2016 NFL Draft out of Tennessee, Alvin Kamara is enjoying an outstanding rookie campaign. He ranks second on the club in both rushing and receiving, carrying 72 times for 459 yards (6.4 avg.) with four touchdowns and one two-point conversion, while catching 48 passes for 447 yards (9.3 avg.) with three touchdowns for seven total scores. Kamara is ranked first in the NFL in yards per carry and is coming off another standout performance in Sunday's overtime win vs. Washington, where he carried eight times for 42 yards (5.3 avg.), also running for a successful two-point conversion to tie the contest and caught six passes for 74 yards with an 18-yard touchdown.

• A talented wideout with a large 6-3, 212-pound frame who was selected by the Saints in the second round of the 2016 NFL Draft out of Ohio State, Michael Thomas had an outstanding rookie campaign. He led the team in receptions with 92, going for 1,137 yards and a team-leading nine receiving touchdowns. He became the first Saints rookie to break 1,000 yards in a season since Marques Colston went for 1,038 in 2006. TED GINN JR.

• Ginn joined the Saints in the 2017 offseason as an unrestricted free agent as he enters his 11th National Football League season. He has been a member of five teams since being selected with the ninth overall pick in the 2007 NFL Draft by the Miami Dolphins out of Ohio State, and has appeared in 161 games with 67 starts over that period. In his long career marked by big play ability, he has accumulated 4,855 receiving yards off 344 catches (14.1 avg.), recording 28 touchdowns. In his first season in New Orleans, Ginn has played in all ten games with six starts and has recorded 35 grabs for 570 yards with three touchdown receptions, has carried five times for 20 yards and has brought back 19 punts for 103 yards and five kickoffs for 56 yards. Ginn is ranked second on the Saints in receiving yardage and tied for second in touchdown grabs.

BRANDON COLEMAN

• Originally signed by the New Orleans Saints out of Rutgers following the 2014 NFL Draft, Coleman won a roster spot on the 2015 opening day roster after spending most of his rookie campaign on the practice squad, appearing in all 16 games with four starts. Coleman finished the 2015 season with 30 receptions for 454 yards and two touchdowns. In 2016, again appeared in all 16 games with four starts, tacking in 281 yards through the air and scoring three touchdowns. Coleman has taken his production to a new level in 2017, appearing in all ten games with four starts and making 16 grabs for 288 yards, averaging a team-high 18.0 yards per a catch and three touchdown grabs, which is tied for second on the club.

DEFENSIVE ENDS

CAMERON JORDAN

• New Orleans' first choice in the 2011 National Football League Draft (24th overall) out of California, Jordan is enjoying another standout season in 2017, recording 42 tackles, eight sacks, one interception return for a touchdown, four passes defended and two forced fumbles. With 54.5 sacks in seven seasons with the Black and Gold, Jordan is fifth on the Saints career sack list. Jordan has also proven to be one of the NFL's best run defenders, as well as being known for generating pressure on quarterbacks that doesn't always show up on the stat sheet.

JORDAN SACK NOTES

Since week eight of 2014, Jordan's played among the NFL's elite defensive ends. He's tied ninth in the NFL since Oct. 26, 2014 with 32 sacks. In 2017, he is tied for eighth in the league with eight takedowns. With eight sacks this season following a key quarterback takedown in overtime vs. Washington on Sunday to force a three-and-out, Jordan became the only Saint to have at least 7.5 quarterback takedowns in six consecutive seasons, surpassing LB Ricky Jackson, who did so in five consecutive seasons from 1983-87.

ALEX OKAFOR

- Selected by the Arizona Cardinals in the fourth round of the 2013 NFL Draft, Okafor joins the Saints in 2017 where he will add valuable depth on the defensive line. Okafor has appeared in 53 games with 35 starts in five years, collecting 18 sacks, an interception, three forced fumbles, one fumble recovery, and nine passes defensed. In 2017, he has 43 tackles (27 solo), 4.5 sacks to rank second behind Jordan, four passes defensed and two forced fumbles.

DEFENSIVE TACKLES

TYELER DAVISON

- The Fresno State product followed up a solid rookie season with an even better season in 2016, helping to improve the 31st ranked run defense in 2015 to the 14th best in the league in 2016. Starting 15 games, the disruptive defensive tackle finished the 2016 campaign with 29 tackles (14 solo) and two pass deflections. In 2015, Davison became a key Saints defender while still a rookie, appearing in all 16 games with five starts and attacking for 18 tackles (10 solo) and 1.5 sacks. In 2017, the New Orleans run defense has continued to improve and this defender has played a key role in this improvement, starting all seven games and recording 19 tackles (13 solo) one pass defensed and one forced fumble.

SHELDON RANKINS

- Rankins was limited by injury in 2016, yet he nonetheless produced an impressive campaign. After a broken fibula delayed his National Football League debut, the rookie exploded for 20 tackles (15 solo) in nine games, adding four sacks and a forced fumble. The third defensive lineman selected in the 2016 NFL Draft (12th overall), Rankins played in 46 games along the defensive line at Louisville, producing 133 tackles (72 solo), 31.5 tackles for loss and 18 sacks during his collegiate career. In his senior campaign, the former Cardinals standout racked up a single-season career-high 58 tackles (28 solo), 13 stops for loss, six sacks, one pass defensed and a fumble recovery returned 46 yards for a touchdown. Rankins was named second-team All-Atlantic Coast Conference following his efforts. In 2017, he has posted ten tackles (five solo), one sack, one interception, one pass defensed and one forced fumble. On Nov. 12, at Buffalo, Rankins had a breakout performance with a 27-yard interception return and a sack.

DAVID ONYEMATA

- David Onyemata was chosen with the team's fourth round pick (120th overall) in 2016 after a stellar college career at the University of Manitoba of the CIS, becoming the first member of the Bisons program to be drafted. Over the course of his rookie campaign, Onyemata shined, appearing in all 16 games and recording 32 tackles (15 solo). On Oct. 1, against Miami in London, Onyemata recorded his first career sack and through seven games, as an integral part of the club's defensive line rotation, he has recorded 22 tackles (nine solo), 1.5 takedowns for losses of 8.5 yards and one pass defensed.

LINEBACKERS

CRAIG ROBERTSON

- In just his first year with the Saints, Robertson quickly became one of the most important members of the young defense. After four seasons with Cleveland, Robertson joined the Saints looking to contribute on defense and special teams, yet his production outpaced even the highest expectations. Starting 15 games, Robertson led the Saints with 131 tackles (100 solo), while adding a sack, four passes defended, and interception, and two fumble recoveries. Robertson will continue to be a leader Saints defenders look to during the upcoming campaign, as he has returned to the starting lineup. In his first start of the season vs. Detroit, Oct. 15, he led the team with 11 tackles and had the sack, forced fumble and recovery all on the same play. In 2017 in ten games with starts in the last six contests, he has 38 stops (23 solo) and the sack/forced fumble/fumble recovery.

A.J. KLEIN

- Signed as an unrestricted free agent from Carolina, where he spent his first four NFL seasons, Klein has taken over play-calling duties on defense for New Orleans. Opening all four games on the strongside for the Saints, Klein has 41 tackles (29 solo), one sack, five passes defended and one forced fumble.

MICHAEL MAUTI

- Mauti, a Mandeville native who was originally selected by the Minnesota Vikings in the seventh round (213th overall) of the 2013 NFL Draft, returned to join his hometown team and made solid contributions on both defense and special teams when he was acquired off of waivers from Minnesota at the conclusion of the 2015 preseason. The son of former Saints wideout and special teams ace Rich Mauti, Michael Mauti has appeared in 52 career games with three starts in six NFL seasons and has tallied 47 tackles (30 solo), one sack, one forced fumble, 35 special teams stops and one blocked punt he recovered for a touchdown. He started at outside linebacker in Sunday's overtime win vs. Washington and tied for the team lead at his position with five stops.

MANTI TE'O

- Coming to New Orleans as a free agent, Te'o used his four seasons in San Diego to become a talented, linebacker. A second round pick in 2013 out of Notre Dame where he finished second in the voting for the 2012 Heisman Trophy, In 2015, his third season in San Diego, he started all 12 games he appeared in, recording a career-high 83 tack-

les (63 solo), a half-sack, an interception, and a forced fumble. Last year, he started the first three games of the season, before an Achilles injury ended his campaign. In 2017, he ranks among team leaders with 34 tackles (21 solo) and one pass defended.

DEFENSIVE BACKS

KEN CRAWLEY

- Crawley came to the Saints as an undrafted free agent in 2016 from Colorado. During his rookie year, he appeared in 15 games with five starts, recording 50 stops (41 solo), 10 passes defended, a forced fumble and a fumble recovery. A corner who played in all 47 games at Colorado, Crawley will look to continue his development in 2017. He saw his first action of 2017 in a contest in which he started, Sept. 24 at Carolina, and recorded a team-high nine tackles (eight solo) and two passes defended. He followed that standout performance with another in the Saints' win at Miami at London's Wembley Stadium, Oct. 1, when he recorded his first career interception and also added four stops and two more passes defended. Overall in 2017, he has 30 tackles, one interception and eight passes defended

MARSHON LATTIMORE

- Taken 11th overall in the 2017 NFL Draft from Ohio State, Lattimore possesses the physicality, speed, and intelligence to impact the Saints secondary. Despite appearing in just 20 games during his college career, Lattimore wowed NFL scouts. As a redshirt sophomore in 2016, he started all 13 games and was named first-team All-Big Ten. He notched four interceptions, one of which he returned for a touchdown. Lattimore figures to become a critical component of the Saints secondary. In eight game, all starts, Lattimore has the lead among cornerbacks with 36 stops (31 solo), two interceptions, one returned for a TD and a team-high nine passes defended in establishing himself as a candidate for NFL Defensive Rookie of the Year.

P.J. WILLIAMS

- This third-season defender is primed for a jump. An experienced starter from Florida State, who developed into one of the nation's top cover corners in 2014, Williams finished his college career with 123 tackles (82 solo), four interceptions and 18 passes defended. In 2017, through the first nine games, Williams has 32 tackles (20 solo) and recorded his first career interception in the Sept. 24 win at Carolina.

KENNY VACCARO

- Originally a first round selection of New Orleans in 2013 out of the University of Texas, Vaccaro has filled up the stat sheet for the past three seasons, primarily from the strong safety position, where he has appeared in 64 games with 62 starts and has posted 461 tackles, 6.5 sacks, eight interceptions, 29 passes defended, five forced fumbles and three fumble recoveries. Through the first eight games of 2017, Vaccaro has 39 tackles (30 solo), a club-best three interceptions, seven passes defended and a fumble recovery for a touchdown.

VONN BELL

- Bell left onlookers impressed with his 2016 rookie campaign, alerting the NFL to his arrival through his hard-hitting play. Appearing in every game with 14 starts, he totaled 98 tackles (59 solo) both of which were second on the team. He also added four passes defended, a sack, two forced fumbles, and a fumble recovery. Drafted by New Orleans in the second round of the 2016 NFL Draft (61st overall), Bell was a consensus first-team All-American, was voted First-team All-Big Ten and was also a Jim Thorpe Award semifinalist following his junior season at Ohio State. In 2017, he's appeared in all ten games and has posted a team-high 48 tackles (34 solo), 2.5 sacks, two passes defended and two forced fumbles.

RAFAEL BUSH

- A Saint from 2012 to 2015, Bush returns to New Orleans after spending 2016 with Detroit. Last season, he appeared in all 16 games with four starts, recording 53 tackles (34 solo), a sack, three passes defended, and two interceptions, one of which he returned for a touchdown vs. Jacksonville in Week 11. Over his first four seasons with the Saints, Bush appeared in 40 games with 14 starts, totaling 118 tackles (90 solo), eight passes defended, an interception, a forced fumble, and three fumble recoveries.

MARCUS WILLIAMS

- Drafted in the second round of the 2017 NFL Draft, Williams is coming off a brilliant career at Utah, where he was a three-year starter. In 2016, he was named a second-team All-American by *Pro Football Focus* after starting all 11 games he played. He came in second in the Pac-12 in interceptions (five). The year prior, he started all 13 games as a free safety, again taking in five picks. His freshman year, he started six of 13 contests, notching an interception and two forced fumbles. During his sophomore and junior years, he was named a first-team Pac-12 All-Academic selection. Sept. 24, at Carolina Williams posted his first career interception.

SPECIAL TEAMS**P THOMAS MORSTEAD**

- Morstead has established himself as one of the National Football League's top punters, where he's posted career club-best 47.0 gross and 41.2 net punting averages. In 2016 over 16 games, he punted 57 times for 2,751 yards, putting 22 of his punts inside the 20-yard line, with five touchbacks. He posted a 48.3 gross average with a net average of 42.4.

FOLLOW THE LEADER

Morstead is the team's all-time leader in both gross and net punting averages. His 43.2 net in 2012 ranks ninth all-time and he has the 10th and 11th-best. His career 41.2 net ranks third in NFL records since the statistic was first compiled in 1976.

- Lutz made an immediate impact in his rookie season in 2016. He was named NFC Special Teams Player of the Week in Weeks Six and Eight, twice. Lutz was 28-of-34 on field goals and 49-of-50 on PATs in 2016, and was named to the *PFWA* All-Rookie team for his efforts.

In a Week Three loss to the Atlanta Falcons in the 2016 season, Lutz lined up for and converted a 57-yard field goal with no time remaining in the first half; that successful effort tied him for the third longest field goal in franchise history, behind only legends Tom Dempsey and Morten Andersen. Lutz took over kickoff duties from Morstead in 2016 and was successful in that area as well. On 89 kickoffs, Lutz forced touchbacks on 49 of them, allowing only 40 returns.

SAINTS POSTGAME NOTES

- With the win, New Orleans moves to 8-2 on the season, their first eight-game winning streak since an eight-game winning streak to close out the 2011 regular season. At 8-2, they have exceeded their win totals for each of the last three seasons and stand one full game ahead of the 7-3 Carolina Panthers in the NFC South division race.
- With the win, New Orleans' improves their all-time record against Washington to 9-17. It was their first win against Washington since a 33-30 overtime victory at Fed-Ex Field on Dec. 6, 2009 and their first win against Washington in the Superdome since a 20-3 victory on Monday Night Football on Nov. 23, 1992.
- The Saints now own a 13-15 overall record in overtime in the regular season with an additional overtime win in the 2009 NFC Championship Game vs. Minnesota. It was their first overtime victory since a 26-20 win over Dallas on Oct. 4, 2015 and their first overtime contest since a 34-28 loss to Tennessee on Nov. 8, 2015.
- The comeback from a 15-point deficit in the fourth quarter marked the first time the Saints have ever won a game in franchise history when they trailed by 15 or more points at any point in the fourth quarter of a contest.
- The Saints take on the Los Angeles Rams for a week 12 matchup on November 26 at the Los Angeles Memorial Coliseum. Kickoff is set for 3:25 p.m. CST. The game will be aired on CBS (WWL-4 in the New Orleans area).
- The Saints currently have a streak of 250 games without having been shut out, dating back to a 26-20 win at the Tampa Bay Buccaneers on September 6, 2002 at Raymond James Stadium, the longest running streak in the National Football League.
- New Orleans outgained Washington in total net yardage 535-456.
- New Orleans outrushed Washington 160-156.
- New Orleans outgained Washington in net passing yardage 375-300.
- Head Coach **Sean Payton** has 108 career victories (regular season and postseason) after today's victory, he moved into sole possession of 40th place all-time in NFL record books for victories past Buddy Parker.
- QB **Drew Brees** appeared in his 243rd career contest moving him past Dan Marino into seventh place all-time in games played by a quarterback. Brees also started his 184th career game as a Saint today, moving into sole possession of fifth place on the club's all-time games played list past **DL Jim Wilks**. Brees completed 29-of-41 passes (70.7%) for season-high 385 yards and a 106.2 passer rating. Brees recorded his 400th career touchdown today as a Saint as he joins the company of Peyton Manning, Brett Favre, Tom Brady and Dan Marino as only the fifth quarterback to have 400 touchdown passes with a single team.
- It was the 37th career fourth quarter/overtime game-winning drive by Brees. In New Orleans' final two series' of regulation, where he helped the Saints offense produce 15 points, he completed 11-of-11 passes for 164 yards with both of his touchdown throws.
- It was Brees' 109th career 300-yard passing game and 57th career 350-yard passing game, both NFL records.
- RB **Mark Ingram** led the Saints in rushing with eleven carries on a season-high 134 yards with one touchdown. Ingram recorded the longest run of the day with a 36-yard touchdown run, moving him into sole possession of second place on the club's all-time rushing touchdowns list passing RB **Dalton Hilliard**. Ingram also surpassed 5,000 career rushing yards becoming only the second Saint to do so, joining RB **Deuce McAllister**. It was Ingram's 13th career 100-yard

rushing game, as he moved past RB **Ricky Williams** to move into sole possession of third place all-time in club record books for 100-yard rushing games. With four, 100-yard rushing games in 2017, Ingram is tied with the 2014 season for the most by him in club record books. Ingram also added three catches for 21 yards for a game-high 155 total yards from scrimmage.

- RB **Alvin Kamara** has now recorded a touchdown in his last four games. Kamara finished the game with eight carries for 42 yards. He also reeled in six catches for 74 yards and a touchdown. With the receiving touchdown, he tied WR **Donte' Stallworth** in becoming the second Saints rookie to score a touchdown in four straight games as a rookie. Stallworth did so in the first four games of 2002. Kamara also rushed for his first career two-point conversion and the first by the Saints in 2017 to tie the contest.
- TE **Coby Fleener** recorded five catches for a total of 91 yards and the Saints longest reception of the day, hauling in a 29-yard catch. Fleener now has surpassed 3,000 career receiving yards with a total of 3,072.
- TE **Josh Hill** recorded the first receiving touchdown for the Saints and his first touchdown of the season, reeling in a three-yard touchdown pass from Drew Brees.
- WR **Michael Thomas** finished the game with six catches for 91 yards.
- WR **Tommy Lee Lewis** recorded two punt returns for a total of 38 yards, including a 23-yard runback.
- WR **Ted Ginn Jr.** recorded six catches for a total of 87 yards.
- DE **Alex Okafor** led the defensive line with six total tackles.
- DE **Cameron Jordan** played in his 106th consecutive game today and overall, putting him in a tie for 40th place on the club's all-time games played list with DE **Joe Johnson** and G **Jake Kupp**. Jordan finished the game with four tackles and a sack. With eight sacks on the season, he becomes the only Saints to have at least 7.5 quarterback takedowns in six consecutive seasons, surpassing LB **Rickey Jackson**, who did so in five consecutive seasons from 1983-87.
- CB **P.J. Williams** recorded eight tackles (six solo).
- Rookie CB **Marcus Williams** had a career and season-high seven tackles (six solo).
- S **Vonn Bell** recorded a season-high and a career-high with a game-high 13 tackles (ten solo) and a sack creating a 12-yard loss along with a forced fumble recovered by Washington.
- K **Wil Lutz** nailed field goals of 52, 42, 29 and the game-winning 28-yard kick in overtime. It is his first game-winning kick of 2017 and the third of his two-year career.
- P **Thomas Morstead** punted three times for 119 yards (39.7 avg.) with all three punts landing inside the 20.

SAINTS HEAD COACH SEAN PAYTON

(Opening Statement) “Obviously, there’s a big swing in a game like that. There are a lot of things we didn’t do well. In the end, we did a few things necessary to get back in the game. It is unusual for any team to go as long as we have gone with a scoring differential that did not put us defending or in a two-minute mode. We were talking about it Friday and sure enough it came up. Enough guys did enough good things. I am proud of how they hung in there. Washington played outstanding. We tip our hats to them. They’re a well-coached team and they certainly were ready to win a game.”

(On how winning this game can help moving forward) “We’ll look at the film. Our league is different than college. It seems every year we see the ability to turn around a score and get a stop. It can change quickly. Certainly, there is a confidence in belief in a team and you get more confidence when you do that. Hopefully that is something we can build on with regard to the two minutes. The other stuff we’re going to have to get back to the drawing boards on and get better at. I thought we didn’t get enough pressure. I thought Drew (Brees) was under pressure. That battle we didn’t win. I thought our third down numbers probably aren’t going to be really good.”

(On Drew’s resilience through the pressure and hits) “It was one of those games, obviously, we got pressured a little bit and gave up some hurries. Kirk (Cousins) did a really good job. Those guys hit some big plays. We just hung in there and guys believed. I thought (the way) we handled the situation there at the end with timeouts and getting the stop defensively were significant.”

(On scoring possibilities at the end of the first half if the ball had been spotted quicker) “It is what it is. They don’t give you time for slow spots. That’s the challenge of not having the umpire where he needs to be. Mostly, we need to be better about bringing it to him. I would say occasionally there are those times that it takes a little bit longer to spot the ball.”

(On thought-process during Alvin’s last touchdown catch) “He was on a check-burst. Fortunately, he was able to secure it. A lot of things happened in a short period of time but I thought getting the stop defensively (was important). At one point, if not for intentional grounding, they’re in field goal range in (the end of) regulation. I think enough things happened, but probably not enough down the road that we’re going to need.”

(On the moment he believed they were turning the game around) “When we got the ball back, there was a lot of time with us knowing that we were down eight and we spent a lot of time discussing what the two-point play was going to be. We had three different ones listed and we went through them all. You go through those on Thursday night, but you’re going through the game as it unfolds. My only concern with the plays were on a competitive period with our defense we ran it against them and they played it correctly. They basically stopped it and now you’re just counting on the look that you saw on film, so we settled on the two-point play. That play, we spent a minute on through the headsets while we were getting ready to get the ball prior to scoring.”

(On not commitment to the run game) “Part of it is the way the game unfolds. I always get a kick out of that. Your rushing attempts are always going to be stronger with a lead, so we would have loved to have run the ball forty times today but third down numbers were not as good. I thought we weren’t able to stay on the field. I think the time of possession favored Washington. Credit them. I thought they did a really good job on run and play action. They had good balance. They caught us in some man coverages and had a good plan. It was probably a combination of a lot of those things.”

(On Marshon Lattimore’s absence affecting the defense) “There were certain things we wanted to do and we tried to do them. It’s like our game today when you’re down some players and Washington was down some players as well and you just have to adjust. You want to be mindful of the matchups and pay attention to them, but the next guy steps in, (and you) still try to give your players the best chance possible. Again, Washington had a really good plan. They did a really good job of executing it. Fortunately, we were able to hang around.”

(On defensive's ability to come up with big plays) "I thought it was huge. There was that point late in the game that looked like they were going to get a field goal and we ended up getting the sack fumble to end the regulation period. I thought our offensive linemen did some really good things down in the stretch, protection-wise and in the run game. In the overtime period we were able to hit some big plays."

(On what he's learned about his team after this win) "Your season has all of these steps to it and you hope you're on the better side of it like this. I would say, when you have wins like this it's the number one thing you'll miss when you finish playing or you finish coaching. The excitement of getting one you think maybe you're not going to get. You can remember those and you can also remember the ones that felt like you were going to get a win. You just hope you get more of these. All the way, there's things you're learning about your team. There's a lot of things we've got to get cleaned up. There's no victory tomorrow. We will be in tomorrow and you guys will be able to get your interviews on time. Every one of them. That's just how it is going to be."

(On the theme of 'One Game at a Time') "The uniqueness of this game and the fact that it's so unusual to get to week 11 and not have played a game that comes down to a two minute drill either way. We had been into half situations but we had never really been in a game. We were just talking about it. I think you have to take that approach because that's how we look at it as well. I know we're in Los Angeles next week and I don't know where we're at after that. Next thing you know you're in November and December. We are just kind of sheltered into the moment and I think the players are as well."

(On Tommy Lee Lewis' punt returns) "I thought he was solid. We were going to be aggressive in the return game today. We returned kickoffs. We brought them out regardless, so there will be some things we look at but I thought that last one was huge."

(On moving away from Ted Ginn, Jr. on special teams) "Ted's still working at it. Those guys are still working at it. It's just about getting him some more work."

(On if he believes the Saints are a good team) "Yes, but it's one game at a time. You're still just past the midway point of the season and we're talking about good horses that aren't even at the three-quarter pole yet. Let's see how we continue to play, but obviously I'm encouraged. We're playing better in some areas, yet I wouldn't have said today if you had asked me that question if we were a good team because we certainly didn't look like it for two thirds of that game. I'll say that."

(On Michael Mauti's ability to bounce back to where he is now) "He's doing well. I want to see the tape though. He's one of those special guys."

(On the comparison to 2009 Saints team and the 2009 Saints-Redskins come-from-behind win at FedEx Field) "That was a game we probably did not deserve to win. They were down to make a twenty-something yard field goal and missed it. We got a few plays and then got it into overtime and that was that type of win though. I think that would be a very fair comparison and then look back on the significance of in it. We'll see (if this team has that type of DNA) when you look at what they did and compare it. I think that is for later though."

(on how you would describe this game) “It was exciting. We made it interesting. This was a hard-fought football game. They are a very, very good football team. If you look at the Redskins’ losses, they have lost against division leaders and playoff caliber teams. We knew the type of game this was going to be. They are a fast team and they are a team that can score. We felt like we had to be very efficient offensively. I felt like we weren’t great on third-down today and I’ll take responsibility for that. There were some missed opportunities there. We had a couple shock plays where maybe they had the right blitz called or they had the right defense called and we weren’t able to get it off. The reverse to Ted Ginn Jr., they had the perfect call for that. The only way that makes that not work (is that call). We had some instances today where you just felt like ‘ah, we missed out.’ At the end of the day though, you just have to find a way to win. We knew it was an uphill battle down 15 points and starting that drive with five and a-half minutes left. I felt like we could move the ball, and go down and score, and said ‘let’s see where this thing goes.’ The defense came up with a big stop, we went down, get another one, and got the two-point conversion. Once we got to overtime, we felt like the momentum was on our side and we were going to go win this thing.”

(on what clicked late and if he felt close to hitting some pass plays that they had missed on earlier) “Yes. Just little things here and there where maybe they had the perfect defense called for the play or we needed a split second longer for the play to develop. We missed some of those plays early on. That’s probably why we were down the way we were there in the fourth quarter, but we were able to rally back.”

(on if this game will be on his one to remember list) “I think it’s more about the team and the season, but we’re very much in the moment with this team, and season, and just finding different ways to win. We haven’t had a game like this in a while. It was great to watch the team come together, rally, defense comes up with the stops that they needed to come up with, offense comes up with the points we needed to, and special teams has a game winning field goal. These are wins that you can build on and you develop confidence. You understand that the games only get tougher, and you magnify their importance, and you just realize that we can win anywhere or anytime no matter what the circumstance.”

(on what can be gained from a game like this) “We can say we made the plays that we needed to make at the right time. I’d say that a game like this, we’re going to grow, and get stronger from, and gain more confidence from versus last week. You go on the road in a tough environment, and you win 47-10, and you weren’t really challenged like we were today. At the end of the game everybody has to be on their A-game. This is one where we grew today. We got better today.”

(on if he makes any comparison with this New Orleans-Washington game to the other dramatic comeback win in 2009 at FedEx Field) “I hate to compare teams and so I’m not going to go there quite yet. Obviously, that was a special team that went on to win a world championship, won 13 in a row, and did some amazing things. It’s funny because I would say we are a lot younger on this team than we were on that team, and yet with that mix of veterans and the youth, you’re watching this thing come together before your very eyes. From where this started to where it is now, we’ve grown been leaps and bounds. I think the sky is the limit for this group. We’re playing with a ton of confidence and we feel like we have a ton of momentum. You win games like this and you feel like you can win anywhere, anytime, and any way so that’s a good thing.’

(on how he maintains his personal composure in a situation like being down 15 in the fourth quarter) You understand you need chunks so you can’t just dink and dunk. Completions are good, but it’s more about the clock. It’s how we are managing the clock, getting chunks, handling pressure, and all that stuff. We had to score fast, especially on the first drive, because you are trying to allow as much time as possibly for the defense to go out there and stop them, use your time outs, and the two minute warning. That’s probably the most difficult part, and yet two-minute is something we practice all the time. It’s, obviously, one of the bigger situations in any game with what you could do at the end

of a half. Getting three points at the end of the half was crucial, when you look at the final score, and then what we were able to do in the fourth quarter. Those are game-winning opportunities.”

(on what it means to have a gamebreaking player like Alvin Kamara) He’s a weapon, he’s a matchup problem for defenses, and someone you have to have a plan for. Obviously, he draws a lot of attention which can set up other things.”

(on what it was like personally to deliver such a big performance in the passing game today when they didn’t really need gaudy numbers from him much this season until today) “I’m ready, willing, and able to do whatever I have to do to help this team win. Some games from game to game that can be a little bit different. We all have the confidence here to win in a lot of different ways. We have the right personnel to do it, we have the right attitude to do it, and we’ve done it before. There’s been validation from past experiences to. I think we just approach every game with a ton of confidence. Having a game-plan in place, but not exactly knowing how it’s all going to shape out and when your number is called upon, you just have to make the plays.”

(On losing a two touchdown lead in the fourth quarter) “We gave up too quick of a touchdown on the initial one. They scored, so we got the ball back. We had a third down and one and did not convert, unfortunately. We punted it right back to them and they went 90 (yards), I think it was. Hat’s off to them for making the plays. Unfortunately, we didn’t get it done.”

(On why he called a timeout before the team’s fourth quarter third and one situation) “We actually lined up incorrectly. We lined up with a tight end on the wrong side, so we had to get that fixed up, we fixed it. I thought that we had a good play call. It didn’t work.”

(On what happened on the intentional grounding play) “We had 25 seconds left and a first down. We were in a position where it was (on the) 35 (yard line). It wasn’t quite close enough for a field goal, so I was trying to get his attention and hand signal a bubble screen out there. If we get it out there and get it out of bounds, we get another play called. Unfortunately, Jamison (Crowder) didn’t get it. And, he just threw it away. I don’t know why that was a penalty, but it was.”

(On Semaje Perine) “Semaje ran hard. I was impressed with Semaje’s running style. I figure with that type of game and the type of player that he is, he will get better with more carries. And, that is what he showed today.”

(On how it feels to lose this way) “It’s terrible. I feel bad for the players. We laid it all out on the line. We came out to a hostile environment against a team that has won seven in a row. You don’t get anything for close.”

(On why he called the fake punt) “Coaches (Ben) Kotwica and (Bret) Munsey came up with that. If they had the right blocks in there, we figured that we could get it in there for a yard. It had to be less than two yards. We just lost Chris Thompson on the play before that. I felt like the momentum was changing a little bit. I thought that it was important to try and get it back somehow. It was a helluva risk, but a great reward.”

Quarterback Kirk Cousins

(On intentional grounding call in the 4th quarter) “We had a run play called and based on the defensive look they were giving, it was going to be a tough run to get and we were probably going to get stuffed and have to clock it and then hope for the best with a field goal. We were hoping for maybe a few more yards to be a more makeable field goal. I looked over to the sideline out of the corner of my eye, and I just saw the coaches saying, ‘throw it.’ They wanted potentially an audible, get to an actual pass play. I thought they were saying that if you just throw it by Jamison (Crowder), in the general area of Jamison, there is an eligible in the area and there’s no penalty. So what I didn’t understand was had Jamison turned around and looked at me and the ball been thrown past his head, up and away out of bounds, would that be a penalty? Is it just that he was not looking at me? He was looking to go block somebody that made it a penalty, I don’t know. I thought if he is in the area of where the ball is thrown that they wouldn’t flag it, but I can understand why the flag was thrown in the sense that it appeared like he was not trying to catch it. So, it looks like I am throwing it to nobody.”

(On once his options once he decided that they weren’t going to run it on play that ended in intentional grounding in the 4th quarter) “My thought process was the ball goes in Jamison’s direction, in the area, how do you define an inaccurate throw from an intentional grounding? I thought if he had turned and looked at me and the ball had been ten feet over his head, I could just say, ‘oh it slipped out of my hand, it was inaccurate.’ And that’s what I didn’t understand was how do you separate an inaccurate throw from a no eligible in the area. I felt like an eligible was in the area, so I threw it in the area, but I can understand why the call was what it was, but it certainly hurt us.”

(On if he asked the officials about the intentional grounding call) “I didn’t. I didn’t take the time to. I am nervous about getting the next play called, the play clock running down. I can’t have a conference with them for 30 seconds. I would waste too much time and I am trying to get our guys going for the next play.”

(On falling to 4-6 and the pressure it puts on for the next few weeks) “I don’t view it that way. There was pressure week one when we were 0-0. There’s pressure if you are 8-0. You just go one week at a time. It’s so cliché, but it’s the best way to operate. Whether we are 4-6, 6-4, 10-0, I would go into the next game with the exact same approach and mental make-up.”

(On Chris Thompson getting injured) “I didn’t know until he had gone inside and my quarterback coach told me, ‘it looks like we lost Chris for the year or for a while with a broken leg.’ So, I understood at that point, into the 4th quarter that that had taken place. It’s tough. Chris was one of our best players, if not our best player, this year. This game has tested all of us, including him. He’s just had a phenomenal season and it’s going to be challenging to continue to move the ball with all the guys that we have had injured, but we will find a way. Just keep grinding and believe that if we do that, good things will happen.”

(On series of events when Thompson got hurt, the fake punt, then the drive to score) “I think it is a great example of how it is a team game. We relied on special teams to keep us on the field and they came through for us. That drive was a combination of running the ball, throwing to a variety of different receivers and tight ends. We counted on everybody. That’s the way you have to win in this league, especially on the road. You have to find ways and it may not always be pretty. Today we just didn’t make enough plays, but we certainly gave ourselves a really good chance.”

(On throwing 50-50 balls to Josh Doctson and the connection with him) “Josh did a phenomenal job and we have talked about it. We have said that is something he does really well. We need to continue to give him opportunities. On the last play of regulation, when I got hit, I was trying to give him a similar throw. I have to see the film, but I believe I was hot and the blitz was free and got me, and I couldn’t get the ball to Josh. We were trying throughout the game to get him opportunities, but a lot of times it’s just the play call and the reads. They took him away for whatever reason and I worked somewhere else.”

Tight End Vernon Davis

(On Chris Thompson getting injured) “Obviously, he is a great player. His ability to help this team win has been unprecedented. To have him go down is a huge setback for us, but thankfully we have other guys that can get the job done and do really well. I’m pleased about that, but it’s really, really unfortunate to have him go down.”

(On how hard it is to replace Chris Thompson) “Chris Thompson, he is one of the best in the league when it comes to running the ball and catching and making plays, so to lose him it’s tough, it’s tough. It’s hard to replace a guy like that. With his talent, his ability to do what he does, it’s just a tough situation to be in.”

(On response after Thompson injury) “I feel like we have a lot of warriors on this team. Guys who are winners. Guys who want to come in and compete and do their very best every single play. We have that here. I am not worried about that. We have had that since I’ve been here. That’s a good thing.”

(On last drive and offense in overtime) “Yeah, that last drive was tough, it was so tough. We put ourselves in that situation. The situation where we had to really get in there and execute, but unfortunately we had some plays where it didn’t go our way. I had a drop. A few other guys had some drops. Collectively as a team, we couldn’t really pull it off at that moment. I will say that I am excited about the next one. I am excited about practice. I know the rest of the group is, so we are just going to have to move on from this and get ready for the next opponent.

Running Back Samaje Perine

(On Chris Thompson injury and increased responsibility in running game) “I was just feeling sorry for him. I just let the game play out how it played. I was just thinking about him and how unfortunate it is for him. He was doing so great and possibly having a Pro Bowl type season and just to have him go down like that, it’s never good.”

(On the offensive line) “They played a great game. (I) couldn’t ask for anything more. I feel like I left a couple yards out there, but overall we played great as a unit.”

Linebacker Junior Galette

(On game today and Drew Brees) “Once he (Drew Brees) gets into his rhythms, he’s getting the ball out quick and doesn’t give the rusher a chance to get there. In 2-minute, he is one of the best I’ve seen, but still we got to (go) down and (tie) our defense up and be disciplined. They are a really good team, but I honestly feel like we beat ourselves today. That’s is a really good team. One of the better teams we’ve played all year. If you watch(ed) that game, then you know that we beat ourselves.”

(On Chris Thompson injury) “(It) really hurt. I know how hard he has been working and the kind of year he has been having. One of the years I was here, he was hurt or coming off IR, so I understand. I know personally how it feels. You feel like you’re on top of the world then you go down. He’s such a vital part of our offense, but Samaje (Perine) stepped up today. He grew up a lot. He grew up today.”

(On playing in four days against New York following this loss) “You got to dig down. You got to see what are we really about. Are we really a team that wants to be in the Wild Card race right now or nothing. It is what it is. I am actually happy to have a quick turnaround because this one hurts. It is going to sting for a while, but if we can get a good win Thursday, get this divisional game. It feels like one and a half games, divisional opponent so.”

(On last few defensive drives for Washington) “I tip my hat to (Drew) Brees. That is what he does. That is what great quarterbacks do, but at the end of the day we got to make plays. What does it say about Marshon Lattimore that he tried to get back in the game after the half?

“Number one, he is tough, he is competitive and I think he felt like he could go or else he would not have tried to and yet he was smart enough to understand that he was not at full speed. He was going to be smart enough to (where we could) get the next guy in there.”

How has Trey Hendrickson grown throughout this season and what has grabbed your attention?

“He’s played quite a bit. He gives you flexibility outside and inside. He’s a good rusher inside, very quickly in training camp you just saw a sense of urgency and someone who had some natural strength to (complement) his play.”

Is it safe to say Trey Hendrickson would get the first shot to replace Alex Okafor?

“Like I said at the onset, I’m not going to go through any types of scenarios.”

What have you seen from Hau’oli Kikaha this season being in and out of the lineup this season?

“A lot of it is based on the type of team where we’re playing with regards to pass, run, were they a heavy 21 team (personnel wise) or were they more of an 11 team (personnel wise). A lot of it’s been gameplanned that way.”

What did you think of the way Vonn Bell played at the end of the game?

“Those were significant and yet I think that today was a good day for all of us to come in here and make corrections. There’s a lot of things that we didn’t do well in that game. Fortunately, in the end we made enough plays to give ourselves a chance and he was one of the players that did some things there in the end that helped (force overtime).”

What do you think of Vonn Bell taking responsibility for struggling early and bouncing back late in the game?

“He was accurate. I think that he bounced back and made a few plays. There are a handful of things that have to happen to get back in (the game) and you can point to all of them as significant and yet (they were) necessary and he was involved in a few of those plays.”

How tough was it to see Alex Okafor go down in the middle of such a good season for this team?

“Yeah it’s real difficult, He’s a great teammate here, a part of our team and he’ll continue to be a part of the team and it’s always tough. You do not like to see that. You hate to see it.”

What did you think of the way Coby Fleener played down the stretch?

“He sure did. Those were significant and (he had) a couple of them. One was improvised, he got into the seams real well and the play he makes on our sideline to (set up) tying touchdown to put us in position was really good.”

The league supposedly reached out and told the Redskins that play at the end of the fourth quarter was not intentional grounding on Kirk Cousins. What did you see on the on that play?

“You go back and forth on it. There are four or five calls in a game each week that take place (that are in question). There were 12 in the huddle twice that I felt never was called. We are kind of on to the next game.”

What specifically has Jeff Ireland done that has helped revamp the scouting process, since you have mentioned his efforts recently?

“Just the overall (department) structure and how we put together our board, the typing (of players), how we value players. The reports and what’s necessary on a report. A lot of (those) things we did in Dallas.”

Anything you can point to that Ireland did that help shape this draft class?

“Just what I mentioned, first off reducing the draft board from 500, 400 players, 300 players down to a manageable number and then at that point really paying attention to the profiles we set up for each position and then the typing that we’ve set up for each position and then also the attention to detail with how we read a report and what has to be included in a report. All those things would be things that I think have really helped.”

When did the team give him a previously reported extension?

“I’m not really aware. I have no clue where he is at contract wise. I just know I’m glad he’s here.”

A couple of years ago in Charlotte you took detail to a newspaper photo that showed the excitement of your younger players at a game in terms of pulling for each other. What can we take from that you and Drew Brees dove into with the defensive team picture in the locker room?

“I do not know that I realized it was a defensive team photo as much as it was just a bunch of guys excited about a game and being real spontaneous. It is one of the things I said after the game. We talked Friday and we’d played in nine games and quite honestly it was a little unusual. We had not played in a game that finished within a score or a two-minute drive to win or defending a two-minute drive. We talked about this on Friday, we have had some two-minute drills at the end of halves, but to go nine weeks into an NFL season that’s I’d say very unusual and sure enough just after talking about it Friday, here is was. We were really in it twice offensively in a two-minute drill to hurry

up and score. There is just that level of excitement after the game and celebrating as a team.”

What is it like to be in a game similar to the Redskins game in 2009, with Robert Meachem in attendance at this game representing the Legends group?

“I have no idea who (handles) the decision when we bring back players. I’m sure someone is looking at it. I don’t think it (the thought) was let’s bring Robert back because we are playing the Redskins. I think we’ve had Devery (Henderson) here, we’ve had (Jonathan) Vilma, Carl (Nicks), we’ve had all of these guys back. I think that was more coincidence, but I think over the years you play in some games where you have a big lead and then all of a sudden it gets away from you or you have a significant lead and you come up short or vice versa. Yesterday, you’re down, but not out and then you get back in it and find a way to win. You just hope to be on the positive side end of those more than the negative end and yesterday was one of those games where there’s a lot of things that we have to get cleaned up and yet there was enough mental toughness and grit to climb back in and make the plays down the stretch and then finish with a win. That says something about the guys on the sideline and in the locker room and then obviously we come in today and look closely at cleaning these things up.”

What vibe do you get when you are in the city when the team is playing as well as they are?

“I don’t get out much. Honestly in-season is kind of crazy and then I’m back to Dallas to see Connor play (football) each weekend. His season just ended and there’s not a whole lot of time maybe to experience it or enjoy it. Occasionally, it will be a dinner on a Friday night or yesterday after the game (to) go out and get something to eat and people are excited, but I think the fans are passionate and I think they feel like we are always in a game and there’s that resiliency and maybe in years past they didn’t feel that way, but that excitement that’s generated from a game like that at home is something certainly you sense especially if you’re out amongst the fans.”

Were you worried Alvin Kamara may not get back down from the stands for the two-point conversion?

“I was not aware he was in the stands honestly. Maybe in the offseason we can reduce the size of that wall. We can put that on Doug Thornton’s list, maybe pad it, kind of make it like a (John) Kuhn wall, if Kuhn can get up and into the fans then (it is safe). That would be a good idea actually, but I didn’t realize he was up in the crowd. I saw on film and it’s a pretty significant jump so that we’ll hopefully be on our renovation list.”

Who did you give the game balls to yesterday?

“It’s something we do. We gave game balls to players today and Alex (Okafor) received one on defense and on offense (Mark) Ingram received one, (Coby) Fleener, (Alvin) Kamara got one, special teams I thought Wil (Lutz) was outstanding, Tommy Lee (Lewis) was outstanding (on) punt returns, really to put us in (good) position even in overtime.”
