**THE MATCHUP**

The Saints will take on the Falcons in a Thursday Night Football matchup on Dec. 7. Kickoff at Mercedes-Benz Stadium is slated for 7:25 p.m. This will be the first meeting between the two division rivals in 2017. New Orleans is coming off of a 31-21 win over Carolina at the Mercedes-Benz Superdome on Sunday, while the Falcons fell to the Minnesota Vikings, 14-9 at Mercedes-Benz Stadium.

Winners of nine of their last ten contests after an 0-2 start and clinching a winning record for the first time since 2013 with Sunday's win, New Orleans has also changed the narrative on the road. After finishing 3-5 away from the Mercedes-Benz Superdome the past two seasons, the Saints have a 4-2 road record in 2017, with a win putting them in position for their first winning road mark since 2011, also the last time they won the NFC South.

Key reasons for New Orleans' 9-3 record in 2017 were on full display in Sunday's win over Carolina with an improved defense and high-powered running game.

Offensively, the running back tandem of **Mark Ingram II** and rookie **Alvin Kamara** accounted for 248 total yards from scrimmage and three touchdowns. Ingram carried 14 times for 85 yards and caught six passes for 37 yards, powering a second quarter series almost by himself, when he had a carry for 72 yards, followed two plays later by a three-yard rushing touchdown. Ingram now is ranked fourth in the NFL in rushing with 180 carries for 922 yards

with a league-best nine rushing scores. Kamara carried nine times for 60 yards with a career-high two touchdowns and also collected five receptions for 66 yards for a game-high 126 total yards from scrimmage. In the process, he became only the third rookie in NFL record books with 600 yards rushing and 600 yards receiving. Now the Atlanta native will return to his hometown on Thursday night ranked first in the NFL in scoring among nonkickers (68 points) and fourth in total yards from scrimmage (1,220).

Defensively, the big improvements for New Orleans have taken place in both the yardage and scoring categories. After finishing 27th and 32nd in the NFL in total defense and pass defense in 2016, the Saints have improved to 12th and 11th in those respective league rankings. After finishing 31st in opponent points per game in 2016, giving up 28.4 points per game, the Saints have improved to 12th and 11th in 2017, surrendering only 20.3 points per game. This improvement showed itself on Sunday against Carolina, as the Saints surrendered only 279 total net yards, including only 167 through the air, while giving up a point total close to their improved season average. DE **Cameron Jordan** leads the defense with ten sacks, ranked fourth in the NFC and tied for seventh in the NFL.

This Week In The NFC South: On Sunday, the Tampa Bay Buccaneers host the Detroit Lions at Raymond James Stadium. The Carolina Panthers, who the Saints defeated on Sunday, host the Minnesota Vikings at Bank of America Stadium.

THE COACHES

New Orleans Saints Head Coach **Sean Payton** has posted a 103-69 regular season record and a 6-4 postseason mark, guiding the team to the postseason five times, to the NFC Championship game twice and to the Super Bowl XLIV Championship in the 2009 campaign. He's the club's lone head coach to open a season with 13 straight victories and post a 13-game winning streak and has the franchise's top winning percentage (.599). Payton's 56-30 (.651) home record and 47-39 (.547) mark away from the Mercedes-Benz Superdome are the club's top all-time winning percentages in both categories (regular season). He holds the records for most wins by a head coach in team history with 109 total, ranked 40th all-time in National Football League history. In his first season with the club in 2006, he took over a Saints team that had previously posted a 3-13 record in 2005 to the NFC Championship game and was named NFL Coach of the Year by the *Associated Press* and most other major media outlets. The Saints are the only team to finish in the top 10 in net yards per game each season since 2006, including finishing first in 2016, when they averaged 426.0 yards per game. In 2017, Payton has rebounded the Saints from three consecutive 7-9 campaigns by getting them on an eight-game winning streak after an 0-2 start and to a 9-3 record, currently sitting in first place in the NFC South. Payton was hired as New Orleans' 14th head coach on January 18, 2006, after serving on the Dallas Cowboys coaching staff from 2003-05 under Pro Football Hall of Fame Head Coach Bill Parcells. Prior to joining the Cowboys in 2003, Payton served on the New York Giants coaching staff from 1999-2002, including the final three seasons as offensive coordinator. His tenure was highlighted by a Super Bowl berth in his first full season calling plays for New York. Payton's prior NFL coaching experience came as quarterbacks coach for the Philadelphia Eagles from 1997-98. He played quarterback at Eastern Illinois University, where he passed for 10,665 yards, then the third-highest total in NCAA Division I-AA history. The three-time *Associated Press* All-American selection had professional stints with the Chicago Bruisers of the Arena Football League, Ottawa of the Canadian Football League and the Chicago Bears in 1987. Starting his college coaching career at San Diego State, Payton wrapped two stints as an assistant with the Aztecs (1988-89 and 1992-93) around a stop at Indiana State (1990-91). He moved to Miami (Ohio), where he coached quarterbacks from 1994-95 before doing the same at the University of Illinois in 1996.

Dan Quinn was named the 16th head coach in Atlanta Falcons history in 2015 and took over the club after serving as the Seattle Seahawks defensive coordinator from 2013-14. In 2015, Quinn helped the Falcons improve from 6-10 to 8-8, finishing second in the NFC South, and he delivered the division title and a Super Bowl appearance in 2016. During his span as defensive coordinator of the Seahawks, Quinn oversaw the NFL's top defensive unit as Seattle led the league allowing only 270.4 yards per game, 15.2 points per game, and 178.8 passing yards per game while holding opponents to 91.6 rushing yards per game. Quinn first joined the Seahawks in 2009, after spending the previous six years coaching the defensive lines for San Francisco (2003-04), Miami (2005-06) and the New York Jets (2007-08). He previously served as the Seahawks

assistant head coach/defensive line coach in 2009 and served as defensive coordinator at the University of Florida from 2010-12. He began his NFL coaching career in San Francisco as a defensive assistant in 2001 before moving on to coach the defensive line from 2003-2004. Quinn got his start coaching the defensive line at William and Mary in 1994, followed by a season at VMI. He held the same position with Hofstra for four seasons before being promoted to defensive coordinator in 2000. Quinn was a four-year letterwinner and two-time co-captain at Division III Salisbury (Md.) State as a defensive lineman, where he recorded 139 tackles and eight tackles for loss. He also lettered in track and held the school record in the hammer throw.

SERIES HISTORY

Atlanta leads the series, 50-45, with New Orleans holding a 15-7 advantage over the Falcons since 2006. Since 1991, 29 games have been decided by a touchdown or less. The Falcons had a 10-game winning streak from 1995-99, which remains the Saints' longest winless streak against an opponent. New Orleans took 13-of-16 in the rivalry from 1986-94 and Atlanta won nine-straight over the fledgling Saints from 1969-73. Atlanta's most recent mastery over a five-year period ended with a 21-19 win for New Orleans at the Georgia Dome on Nov. 22, 2000. Seven games in the series have gone into overtime.

GAME SUMMARIES

WEEK 1: Minnesota Vikings 29, Saints 19; September 11, 2017 @ US Bank Stadium –

Vikings quarterback Sam Bradford set the National Football League record for completion percentage last season, his accuracy aided by the volume of short passes under heavy pressure. With solid protection from the pass rush by a rebuilt offensive line, he showed he can throw the ball down the field with the best of them. Bradford started his second year with Minnesota in style, passing for 346 yards and three touchdowns to help the Vikings beat New Orleans 29-19 and spoil running back Adrian Peterson's first game with the Saints and his return to where he played the first ten years of his NFL career.

"When I've got time to sit back there and kind of evaluate things, I've got all the confidence in the world that our guys outside are going to win," Bradford said.

Minnesota wide receiver Stefon Diggs had seven receptions for 93 yards, two for scores and all in the first half, and wide receiver Adam Thielen racked up 157 yards on nine catches as Bradford had success against a Saints defense that opened the season with the youngest starting lineup in the NFL since 1991. Rookie running back Dalvin Cook rushed for 127 yards on 22 carries in the formal takeover from Peterson. Peterson was limited to 18 yards on six carries, in a time share with fellow running backs Mark Ingram and Alvin Kamara with the Saints forced to throw the ball more once they started to fall behind. Quarterback Drew Brees was quiet, too, with 291 yards on 27-for-37 passing.

"We didn't do anything different or try to out-trick them," Vikings linebacker linebacker Anthony Barr said. "You know, line up and play, do your job."

Saints tight end Coby Fleener caught their only touchdown toss, after the two-minute warning. Kicker Wil Lutz made four field goals, three under 25 yards.

"The bottom line," Brees said, "is you've got to score touchdowns."

GAME SUMMARIES

WEEK 2: New England Patriots 36, Saints 20; September 17, 2017 @ Mercedes-Benz Superdome – If Tom Brady and the Patriots were suffering from a Super Bowl hangover, it looks as though a trip to New Orleans pulled the defending champions out of it.

The 40-year-old Brady bounced back with a vengeance from a season-opening loss, throwing three touchdown passes in the first quarter for the first time in his career, eclipsed 300 yards passing in the first half for only the second time, and New England scored 30 first-half points en route to a 36-20 victory over the Saints, who dropped their first two games of the season.

Brady's maiden Super Bowl triumph in the Superdome back in February 2002 is bound to be one of his fondest memories, but the 18-year veteran looked like a superior quarterback in his latest visit. He finished 30 of 39 for 447 yards without an interception -- at least not one that counted. Saints defenders caught Brady's passes twice, but both plays were wiped out by New Orleans penalties. Brady joined Warren Moon as the only QBs age 40 or older in NFL history to pass for at least 400 yards and 3 touchdowns in a game, according to the Elias Sports Bureau.

Patriots TE Rob Gronkowski had a 53-yard catch and run to highlight his six-catch, 116-yard performance, but left the game in the second half with a groin injury and did not return.

In Brady and the Saints' Drew Brees, the game featured the NFL's top two active quarterbacks in terms of career yards and touchdowns. Their 922 touchdown passes and 128,251 yards passing combined coming in represented the most by starting signal-callers in the same NFL game. But in this matchup, Brees couldn't keep up. He was 27 of 45 for 356 yards and two touchdown throws. The Saints' desperation to stay close was encapsulated by a failed attempt to convert a fourth down -- despite being well within field goal range on the Patriots 25-yard line -- with 2:27 left in the first half and New England up by 13 points.

Brady responded by marching New England to the Saints ten-yard line to set up Stephen Gostkowski's field goal, making it 30-13 at halftime

The Patriots' first three drives ended with a 19-yard touchdown pass to RB Rex Burkhead, Gronkowski's long touchdown and a 13-yard scoring pass to WR Chris Hogan. New Orleans briefly rallied with Brees' five-yard touchdown pass to WR Brandon Coleman and K Wil Lutz's field goal on consecutive drives, pulling them as close as 20-13. But New England responded with RB Mike Gillislee's short scoring run on a drive highlighted by downfield passes from Brady to the skilled Patriots trio of Gronkowski, Hogan and former Saints wideout Brandin Cooks.

WEEK 3: Saints 34, Panthers 13; September 24, 2017 @ Bank of America Stadium – New Orleans quarterback Drew Brees shredded the league's top-ranked defense, throwing for 220 yards and three touchdown passes as the Saints defeated the previously unbeaten Carolina Panthers 34-13 as the Black and Gold would then embark on a six-day trip to London to prepare for a contest against the Miami Dolphins to be played at Wembley Stadium the following Sunday.

Brees led six scoring drives and threw touchdown passes to wide receivers Michael Thomas, Brandon Coleman and ex-Panthers wideout Ted Ginn Jr. as the Saints avoided a third consecutive 0-3 start. Rookie running back Alvin Kamara put the game away with a 25-yard touchdown run with 4:42 left in the contest, the first score of his short career. Carolina had only allowed six points in its previous two games.

The Saints' defense, which came in ranked 32nd in the league, intercepted Panthers quarterback Cam Newton three times and sacked him four times before he was replaced late in the fourth quarter by his backup, Derek Anderson.

The Panthers, who were already without injured Pro Bowl tight end Greg Olsen, lost wide receiver Kelvin Benjamin in the first quarter to a knee injury. Carolina's only real offense came from rookie running back Christian McCaffrey, who had 101 yards receiving on nine catches. The Saints led 17-6 when Ginn beat cornerback James Bradberry down the middle of the field for a 40-yard touchdown reception to break it open. It was the same type of big play Ginn provided for the Panthers in previous seasons. Brees was sharp all day, completing 22 of 29 passes.

WEEK 4: Saints 20, Dolphins 0; October 1, 2017 @ Wembley Stadium– It took Drew Brees and the Saints six days and a first half before they finally found their footing in soggy Great Britain in their first trip back since 2008.

Brees threw for 268 yards and two touchdowns and the Saints scored all but three of their points in the second half as they defeated the Miami Dolphins 20-0 on a rainy Sunday afternoon at Wembley Stadium.

Saints WR Michael Thomas had a touchdown reception in the third quarter, RB Alvin Kamara added one in the fourth and K Wil Lutz made two of his three field-goal attempts for New Orleans (2-2), which arrived for the game on Monday and won the lowest-scoring game ever held in London. "The defense got a shutout," Brees said. "Offensively, we sustained drives, we did all the things you need to do for winning football."

It was expected to be a big homecoming for the Dolphins' Jay Ajayi, who was born in the city, but the running back finished with 46 yards on 12 carries.

Lutz missed his first try, a 41-yarder, wide right on the second play of the second quarter, and the teams threatened to have the first scoreless opening half since Week 14 of 2011, until Lutz connected from 43 yards with no time left. Brees found Thomas, who had eight catches for 89 yards, on a four-yarder to push the score to 10-0 in the third quarter, and Kamara took a shovel pass from Brees 12 yards into the end zone with 3:57 left in the contest to wrap up the win. Kamara finished with 96 total yards from scrimmage, including 71 receiving, and fellow RB Mark Ingram ran for 45 yards. Dolphins QB Jay Cutler completed 20 of 28 passes for Miami (1-2), which finished with 185 total net yards, its fewest since its last shutout, a 19-0 loss at Buffalo on December 22, 2013.

New Orleans last shut out an opponent on December 16, 2012, a 41-0 win against Tampa Bay.

"Obviously those first two weeks weren't what we aspired to be, we played two real good teams, the Vikings and Patriots," Brees said. "Basically now, two road wins ... I felt we had a great plan coming out here, obviously it's a tough trip coming across the pond."

GAME SUMMARIES

WEEK 6: Saints 52, Lions 38; October 15, 2017 @ Mercedes-Benz Superdome – Running backs Mark Ingram and Alvin Kamara combined for 237 yards from scrimmage, the Saints defense forced five turnovers and scored a team-record three times, and New Orleans took a 52-38 win over Detroit.

New Orleans built a five-touchdown lead, only to wind up gutting out a remarkable comeback bid by Detroit. Detroit scored four straight touchdowns, including one on a punt return by rookie cornerback/return specialist Jamal Agnew and another on defensive tackle A'Shawn Robinson's close-range interception near the Saints goal line, in less than 15 minutes off the game clock to pull as close as 45-38 with 6:41 to go. But after Agnew muffed a punt and barely got it out of the end zone, Saints defensive end Cam Jordan scored on virtually the same type of play as Robinson when he got his hand on Matt Stafford's pass from the end zone.

The Saints' defense produced its first points on Detroit's first possession, when Alex Okafor sacked and stripped Stafford in the end zone and safety Kenny Vaccaro recovered.

In the third quarter, rookie cornerback Marshon Lattimore, New Orleans' top draft choice last spring, made his first interception and returned it 27 yards for a touchdown. Stafford was sacked five times and turned the ball over five times -- twice on fumbles and three times on interceptions, two of which were tipped. New Orleans also batted down 13 of his throws.

Saints quarterback Drew Brees completed 20 of 30 passes for 186 yards and touchdowns of 20 yards to wide receiver Ted Ginn Jr. and two yards to tight end Michael Hoomanawanui. However, he was also intercepted for the first and second time this season. The first interception -- also the Saints' first turnover this season -- came when cornerback Darius Slay wrestled the ball away from Thomas before the receiver could secure it.

Ingram scored two touchdowns on short runs and rushed for 114 yards on 25 carries.

WEEK 7: Saints 26, Packers 17; October 22, 2017 @ Lambeau Field – The way the Saints won on the road might serve as a valuable lesson in their quest to return to the playoffs.

The defense gave up a long touchdown run on the first series to Green Bay. Quarterback Drew Brees had two interceptions -- and the Saints weren't even out of the first quarter yet at Lambeau Field.

But Brees bounced back to throw for a touchdown, the 500th of his career both regular season and postseason combined and run for another, running back Mark Ingram rushed for a score and the Saints recovered for a 26-17 victory.

Green Bay lost its first game with Brett Hundley starting at quarterback for the injured Aaron Rodgers.

Kicker Wil Lutz kicked two second-half field goals, including a 44-yarder to put New Orleans up for good 19-17 with 10:26 remaining in the game. Brees' one-yard quarterback sneak gave the Saints a two-score lead with 4:55 remaining.

The Saints were fortunate to get their fourth straight victory. But after taking the first three wins by at least 14 points,

they'll savor a victory earned following several early mistakes in addition to Brees picks.

The defense gave up a 46-yard touchdown run to rookie running back Aaron Jones on the opening drive. Lutz had a blocked extra point and New Orleans was penalized seven times for 80 yards.

Still, the Saints pulled away late at overcast Lambeau Field, scoring on four second-half drives before running out the clock.

After holding the Packers to a three-and-out inside the 20, New Orleans drove 55 yards in eight plays to seal the game with Brees' sneak over the goal line. Brees finished 27 of 38 for 331 yards, while Ingram ran for 105 yards on 22 carries.

Jones had 131 yards on 17 carries. Hundley showed toughness in running for a 14-yard score to give Green Bay a 14-7 lead with 8:37 left in the first half. But the Packers managed just a 46-yard field goal from kicker Mason Crosby in the second half, which gave them a brief 17-16 lead. The Saints took over from there, and the Packers couldn't keep up. Hundley finished 12 of 25 for 87 yards. He was intercepted by safety Kenny Vaccaro on a deep ball down the middle of the field with 4:20 left, ending the Packers' comeback bid.

WEEK 8: Saints 20, Bears 12; October 9, 2017 @ Mercedes-Benz Superdome – Quarterback Drew Brees completed 23 of 28 passes for 299 yards with a 111.2 passer rating against a Bears defense that ranked sixth against the pass, and the Saints beat Chicago 20-12 Sunday for their fifth straight victory after starting the season 0-2.

Running backs Mark Ingram and Alvin Kamara each ran for TDs for New Orleans (5-2). Ingram finished with 99 yards from scrimmage, including 75 on the ground, but his two late fumbles kept the Bears in the game into the final minutes. Kamara had 76 yards from scrimmage – 48 receiving.

The Saints were threatening to score twice in the fourth quarter when the Bears stripped the ball from Ingram. Chicago converted the first fumble into its only touchdown with 3:43 to go on rookie running back Tarik Cohen's short dive over a pile of players at the goal line. The second turnover occurred with a little more than two minutes left on the Bears 30-yard line, but Chicago was unable to get a first down as rookie quarterback Mitchell Trubisky's fourth-and-one pass fell incomplete, with it being batted down by strong safety Kenny Vaccaro, who led the team with nine tackles and split a sack with defensive end Cameron Jordan.

Chicago had one more chance to tie the contests after kicker Wil Lutz's 49-yard field goal with 1:35 left, but an interception by Saints rookie cornerback Marshon Lattimore ended that threat.

Trubisky completed 14 of 32 passes for 164 yards in his fourth start for the Bears (3-5). Chicago running back Jordan Howard had 102 yards rushing on 23 carries.

Chicago had a touchdown overturned on video review after Zach Miller's 25-yard catch, during which the tight end's left leg bent unnaturally as he landed. As Miller was carted off the field with an apparently serious knee injury, officials ruled that replayed showed the ground caused the ball to loosen in Miller's grasp as his upper body crashed to the turf – after his knee had given out.

GAME SUMMARIES

WEEK 9: Saints 30, Buccaneers 10; November 5, 2017

@ Mercedes-Benz Superdome – The Saints extended their win streak to six when Drew Brees completed 81.2 percent of his passes for 263 yards and two touchdowns in a 30-10 win over reeling Tampa Bay.

The Buccaneers came in hoping to stem a four-game skid, but instead were not just beaten, but beaten up. QB Jameis Winston left with shoulder soreness after the first half. DE William Gholston was carted off the field with a neck injury.

Brees' touchdowns went for 33 yards to Alvin Kamara and 36 to Ted Ginn. Kamara, who also scored on a 6-yard run, did most of the work on his TD reception, thrilling the Superdome crowd with a waving, tackle-slipping run after his short catch. The Saints also scored on Justin Hardee's blocked punt, which he recovered in stride and returned for a touchdown. Kamara finished with 152 yards from scrimmage, including six catches for 84 yards.

New Orleans' defense limited Tampa Bay's receiving tandem of Mike Evans and DeSean Jackson to three catches for 38 yards. Saints CB Marshon Lattimore, blanketed Evans much of the game. New Orleans also got pressure in the backfield, finishing with four sacks. Cameron Jordan had 1.5 sacks.

Hardee's touchdown came on the first of two blocks on consecutive snaps. First, he came in clean up the middle for a smothering block on punter Bryan Anger. The ball then bounced high and behind Anger, allowing Hardee to run under it practically in stride and glide into the end zone. Then the Bucs' Ryan Smith blocked Wil Lutz' extra point, leaving New Orleans with a 9-0 lead in the first quarter.

WEEK 10: Saints 47, Bills 10; November 12, 2017 @ New Era Field – Mark Ingram and Alvin Kamara are so in sync, the Saints running back duo are now finishing sentences for one another.

"It's fun whenever we're scoring at will," Ingram said, before sounding like Oprah on a giveaway episode following a 47-10 win over Buffalo. "Drew (Brees) got a touchdown. AK (Kamara) got a touchdown. Trey (Edmunds) got a touchdown. That's what we work for, so everybody eats." That's when Kamara interjected by noting to Ingram, "You don't want to say you got three touchdowns," before the two broke into a fit of laughter.

Ingram had 131 yards rushing and scored three times, and the Saints won their seventh straight in producing one of the most prolific running performances in team history. The six touchdowns rushing set a club record, and New Orleans' 298 yards rushing were third-highest in team history. "We came out and wanted to impose our will," said Kamara, who scored once and added 106 yards rushing. "We were in the locker room and said, 'We've got to put pressure on them to break their neck.'"

Ingram set a career high by scoring twice from three yards and another from one. Kamara scored on a five-yard run, while Brees scrambled in from seven yards. Edmunds capped the run of rushing TDs with a 41-yard scamper. The Saints never punted by scoring on eight of their nine possessions, not including two drives to close both halves in a game they finished with 482 yards and 32 first downs. The Saints became the second team in the Super Bowl era to win seven straight after starting 0-2, joining the 1993 Cowboys, who went on to beat Buffalo in the Super Bowl.

Buffalo managed 198 yards, and 10 first downs. And five of those first downs came on Buffalo's meaningless final drive that ended with backup QB Nathan Peterman hitting Nick O'Leary on a 7-yard TD pass. After Stephen Hauschka capped a nine-play, 57-yard opening drive with a 37-yard field goal, the Bills never crossed midfield over their next eight possessions.

The most notable cheer came with 4:53 left when Peterman replaced Tyrod Taylor and immediately hit Deonte Thompson for a 10-yard reception along the right sideline.

WEEK 11: Saints 34, Redskins 31; November 19, 2017

@ Mercedes Benz Superdome – Alvin Kamara climbed into the Superdome stands, stood in the first row with his arms folded and soaked in the adulation of fans who were relishing their decision to stick around after all had looked lost. Kamara's celebration of his 18-yard TD reception had an air of presumption, given New Orleans still needed a two-point conversion to erase what had been a 15-point deficit when Washington scored with 5:58 left in regulation.

Then again, the Saints' confidence was understandable; they haven't lost in more than two months. Kamara climbed back down in time to take a pitch into the left side of the end zone for the needed two-point conversion, and the Saints won their eighth straight when Wil Lutz's 28-yard field goal capped a 34-31 triumph in overtime.

"We just kind of hung in there. Guys believed," said Saints Coach Sean Payton, whose mind seemed to be racing as he labored to recall details of the frenzied final stretch. "There were a lot of things happening in a short period of time."

QB Drew Brees passed for 385 yards and two TDs, going 11 of 11 for 164 yards and his two TDs on New Orleans' final two possessions of regulation. His first touchdown went to TE Josh Hill from three yards out with 2:53 to go and the last to Kamara with 1:05 left.

"I tip my hat to Brees. That's what he does. That's what great quarterbacks do. But at the end of the day, we've got to make plays," said Redskins S D.J. Swearinger, whose first-quarter interception was Brees' first turnover in four games. "We didn't do our job. We beat ourselves for sure." The unlikely comeback made New Orleans the first team since the 1970 AFL-NFL merger to win eight straight after starting 0-2.

"We haven't encountered a game like this in a while, and it was great to watch the team rally," said Brees, whose team won its previous seven more convincingly. "We have the confidence to win in a lot of different ways. We have the personnel to do it and the right attitude to do it."

The Saints set up their final drive by stopping Washington RB Samaje Perine on third-and-one at the two-minute warning when a first down would have allowed Washington to run out the clock.

Washington moved into field-goal range in the last minute of regulation, only to be pushed back by a grounding penalty that appeared to result from Kirk Cousins' miscommunication with WR Jamison Crowder, followed by a sack. The Redskins received the ball first in overtime, but the Saints' hobbled defense, which gave up more yards than in any game during its winning streak, forced a quick punt thanks in part to Cameron Jordan's sack.

"We had a surplus of emotion and a surplus of confidence," Jordan said. "That was the difference-maker." New Orleans RB Mark Ingram capped a 134-yard rushing performance with gains of 20 and 31 yards on back-to-back carries to set up Lutz's clinching kick.

GAME SUMMARIES

WEEK 12: Los Angeles Rams 26, Saints 20; November 26, 2017 @ Los Angeles Memorial Coliseum – Jared Goff passed for 354 yards and hit Sammy Watkins and rookie Josh Reynolds for touchdowns, and the Los Angeles Rams snapped the New Orleans Saints' eight-game winning streak with a 26-20 victory on Sunday in a meeting of NFC division leaders.

NFL scoring leader Greg Zuerlein kicked four field goals for the Rams, who earned their fifth victory in six games. For the first time since 2006, this revitalized franchise is guaranteed not to finish the regular season with a losing record.

Los Angeles turned in a gritty defensive effort against the high-scoring Saints, holding Drew Brees to 246 yards passing – just 96 in the first three quarters – and sacking him three times.

Alvin Kamara made an early 74-yard touchdown run and a late TD reception for the Saints, who finally lost for the first time since Sept. 17.

One week after rallying from 15 points down late in the fourth quarter to beat Washington in overtime, the Saints fell behind on the opening drive and never caught up. New Orleans struggled to stop Goff's passing game with its top two cornerbacks sidelined by injuries, and the Rams methodically moved the ball to win a meeting between two of the NFL's top three highest-scoring teams. Goff went 28 of 43, patiently picking at the Saints' defense in his fourth 300-yard game of the season despite the absence of top receiver Robert Woods. Rookie Cooper Kupp set career highs with eight catches for 116 yards, and Reynolds made his first career TD catch in the second quarter.

The Rams made two lengthy drives ending in fourth-quarter field goals, and Watkins recovered the onside kick after the Saints finally trimmed Los Angeles' lead to one score on Kamara's TD catch with 1:45 to play.

The Rams scored on their opening drive for the second straight week, with Watkins catching a slant for a 5-yard TD. Los Angeles also sacked Brees twice early, but the Saints adjusted and got back in it with that brilliant run by Kamara.

Reynolds' TD catch capped an 86-yard drive for Los Angeles in the second quarter. The methodical Rams out-gained New Orleans 250-166 in the first half and held the ball for 18:35.

WEEK 13: Saints 31, Carolina Panthers 21; December 3, 2017 @ Mercedes Benz Superdome – Rookie sensation Alvin Kamara took the brunt of a hard collision near the goal line with Carolina LB Shaq Thompson, who is 2 inches taller and 15 pounds heavier than runner he was trying to prevent from scoring on fourth down.

Kamara bounced backward but remained upright, then slihtered out of DE Wes Horton's ankle grab and dived under linebacker Luke Kuechly's lunge to find the end zone. "That was just: I've got to get in there by any means," Kamara said. "I got hit and got it on in."

Kamara added a second tackle-shedding touchdown from from 20 yards, New Orleans took advantage of two Carolina special teams gaffes, and the Saints reclaimed sole possession of first place in the NFC South with a 31-21

victory over the Panthers on Sunday.

Carolina coach Ron Rivera seemed at a loss to pinpoint what his defense could have done better to stop Kamara, whose production as a runner and receiver as a rookie are placing him in distinguished company.

"You prepare for everything you want, but he has got some elite ability," Rivera said.

Kamara finished with 126 yards from scrimmage, capping his day with a serpentine, 22-yard gain on a third-and-10 screen pass at the two-minute warning. The first-down gain allowed New Orleans to run out the clock.

"He's a monster," fellow Saints RB Mark Ingram said. "He's always balling, doing his thing, running and catching. He's definitely the rookie of the year. He's savage. Cold-blooded."

Carolina entered the game ranked second defensively overall and third against the run, allowing 83.2 yards per game. The Saints rushed for 148 yards, with Ingram gaining 85.

Ingram gained 122 yards from scrimmage, highlighting his day with a 72-yard that set up his 3-yard TD.

Drew Brees passed for 269 yards, including a 10-yard TD to Michael Thomas a few plays after Panthers P Michael Palardy lost his handle on the ball as he was about the kick it away. Palardy aborted the punt and threw incomplete, giving New Orleans the ball on the Carolina 31.

In the fourth quarter, a fumble by Panthers PR Kaelin Clay near midfield set up Wil Lutz's 31-yard field goal to give New Orleans a 31-14 lead.

Cam Newton passed for 183 yards and TDs of 21 yards to Christian McCaffrey and 24 yards to Devin Funchess. Newton also ran for 51 yards. Jonathan Stewart added a short TD run for Carolina, which had its four-game winning streak ended.

The Panthers' comeback attempt was hindered by their inability to convert a fourth-and-6 play deep in Saints territory in the fourth quarter. Newton connected with Funchess, who was stopped a yard short by CB Ken Crawley.

"That's a good team," Newton said of the Saints, who allowed Carolina to convert only three of 10 third-down plays. "We just have to move forward, be optimistic of our opportunities knowing that the world just doesn't stop because the Panthers lost today. We have to learn from this."

MAKING HISTORY

Kamara has touchdowns in six straight games, the first time a Saints rookie has done so in the team's 51-year history. Kamara needs three touchdowns to break George Rogers' rookie franchise record of 13.

Meanwhile, Kamara's 614 yards receiving and 606 yards rushing this season make him one of only three rookies in NFL history to have at least 600 yards as both a runner and receiver, joining Pro Football Hall of Famer Charley Taylor and Billy Sims.

Brees, who completed 25 of 34 passes, reached 6,127 career completions, surpassing Peyton Manning (6,125) for the second-most all-time. Only Pro Football Hall of Famer Brett Favre has more with 6,300.

Special Teams Coord. **Bradford Banta** - A fourth round (106th overall) draft pick of the Colts in 1994 out of the USC and played in 156 career games, primarily as both a long snapper and tight end with Indianapolis, the New York Jets, the Detroit Lions and Buffalo Bills.

Asst. Head Coach/Tight Ends **Dan Campbell** - A third round draft pick (79th overall) of the Giants in 1999 out of Texas A&M, who went on to appear in 114 games with 75 starts for New York, Dallas and Detroit, where he caught 91 passes for 934 yards and 11 TDs.

Asst. Wide Receivers Coach **Ronald Curry** - Curry was a seventh round draft pick (235th overall) of Oakland in 2002 out of North Carolina and played for the Raiders for seven seasons, appearing in 76 games with 32 starts and registering 193 receptions for 2,347 yards with 13 TDs.

Secondary Coach **Aaron Glenn** - Glenn was the 12th overall pick of the Jets in 1994 out of Texas A&M and started 176 of 205 games with New York, Houston, Dallas, Jacksonville and New Orleans and was a three-time Pro Bowl selection. Glenn recorded 41 interceptions with six brought back for TDs, adding a score on a kick return.

Pass Rush Specialist **Brian Young** - Young played in the NFL from 2000-08 with St. Louis for his first four seasons, who originally selected him in the fifth round of the 2000 NFL Draft (139th overall) out of UTEP and for his final five with the Saints, appearing in 124 career games and recording 22.5 sacks.

Offensive Coordinator Pete Carmichael - Father, Pete, served as an assistant coach in the National Football League from 1994-2003 with the Jacksonville Jaguars and the Chicago Bears.

Quarterbacks Coach Joe Lombardi - The grandson of legendary National Football League head coach Vince Lombardi, who led both the Green Bay Packers and Wash-

ington Redskins and also had a long distinguished career as an assistant.

Secondary Coach Aaron Glenn - Younger brother, Jason, was a linebacker and sixth-round draft pick of the Detroit Lions in the 2001 NFL Draft, playing six seasons in the NFL with the New York Jets, Miami Dolphins and Minnesota Vikings.

Linebackers Coach Mike Nolan - Father, Dick, played safety in the National Football League for nine years before becoming a coach. He led San Francisco from 1968 to 1975 and was the head coach of the New Orleans Saints from 1978 to 1980.

Assistant General Manager/College Scouting Director Jeff Ireland - Stepson of Kansas City Chiefs Hall of Fame linebacker/center E.J. Holub and the grandson of former Eagles player and Bears personnel executive Jim Parmer.

National Scout Terry Wooden - Brother, JoJo, is director of player personnel for the Los Angeles Chargers.

Area Scout Joey Vitt - Father, Joe Vitt is a longtime NFL coach who served as assistant head coach/linebackers of the Saints for 11 seasons.

CB Ken Crawley - Cousin, Stephon Morris, spent the 2012 season with the New England Patriots.

RB Trey Edmunds - Father, Ferrell Jr., enjoyed a seven-year career as a tight end with Miami and Seattle and was selected to two Pro Bowls.

RB Mark Ingram II - Father, Mark Ingram Sr., was a ten-year NFL veteran who played wide receiver for the New York Giants, Miami Dolphins, Green Bay Packers and Philadelphia Eagles.

DE Cameron Jordan - Father, Steve, had a 13-year career as a tight end with Minnesota, with six Pro Bowl selections.

LB Michael Mauti - Father, Rich, had a six-year career as a wide receiver and special teams contributor with New Orleans and Washington.

T/G Andrus Peat - Father, Todd, played six NFL seasons as an offensive lineman with the Phoenix Cardinals and the Los Angeles Raiders.

synopsis of several returning players and newcomers through the draft, free agency and trade to the 2017 Saints offensive line:

LT Terron Armstead - The club's first third round draft choice in 2013 out of Arkansas-Pine Bluff, Armstead impressed scouts by running the fastest 40-yard dash time (4.71) by an offensive lineman in the history of the NFL Scouting Combine. He has opened 43 regular season games for New Orleans, returning to action in week six after missing the first four contests with a shoulder injury.

G/C Senio Kelemete - A fifth round selection of Arizona C (151st overall) in the 2012 NFL Draft, since first joining the Saints practice squad at the start of the 2013 season, this fifth-year lineman has displayed the versatility to play every position on the line. The 6-foot-3, 300-pounder saw action in 39-of-40 games over the past four seasons with 17 starts and has become an invaluable piece of the line. In 2017, Kelemete has already played at right tackle in the season opener and played at left guard in six games and at right guard in week seven and starting in week eight.

T/G Andrus Peat - A first round selection (13th overall) in the 2015 NFL Draft out of Stanford, Peat was considered one of the top college linemen. In 2016, Peat took a big step forward from his rookie season, starting 15 contests at left guard, left tackle and as an extra tight end, blocking for the most productive offense in the NFL (426.0 ypg.). Headed into his third season, Peat's a key to the Saints' future success, starting at both left guard and left tackle in 2017.

T Ryan Ramczyk - The Black and Gold used their second first round selection in 2017 to snag Ramczyk, viewed by many as one of the best linemen in the entire draft. The 6-6, 314 lb. tackle moved from Division III Wisconsin-Stevens Point to the University of Wisconsin, and in just one season with the Badgers, he flourished. Ramczyk started all 14 games in 2016 and was a consensus All-American, blocking for an offense that gained 203.1 rushing yards per game and allowing just a single sack. Ramczyk figures to make an immediate impact for the Black and Gold, adding

valuable depth to the outside of the offensive line, starting two games at left tackle and 10 contests at right tackle.

C Max Unger - Since being acquired by the Saints via trade at the start of the 2015 offseason, Max Unger has anchored the middle of the Saints offensive line, opening 37-of-38 contests, missing only one game in 2016 due to a foot injury. Originally a second round draft pick of the Seahawks in 2009, Unger has been named a first-team All-Pro by the *Associated Press* in 2012 and is a two-time Pro Bowler, helping the Seahawks to two Super Bowl appearances and a victory in Super Bowl XLVIII. Unger has opened all 109 games he has played in since 2009. Sidelined in the offseason and some of the preseason by a foot injury, Unger returned to his spot by the season opener.

G Larry Warford - A third-round pick by Detroit in 2013, Warford has been one of the best offensive linemen in the NFL since his arrival. In 2013, he was named *Pro Football Focus* Rookie of the Year after starting all 16 games without surrendering a sack. This offseason, the 6-3, 317 lb. guard joined the Saints, and he will play a critical role for one of the NFL's top offense manning right guard.

DEFENSIVE NOTES

DEFENSIVE DRAFT

Over the last three NFL Drafts, New Orleans has shown a commitment to improving the defense, spending 14-of-21 picks on that side of the ball. With nine picks in the 2015 NFL Draft, the Saints picked six defensive players, the most taken since New Orleans chose nine defensive players in a 12-round selection meeting in 1990. Below is an overview of the 11 players selected by New Orleans since 2015 on the 53-man roster:

S Vonn Bell, Ohio State (D2b-16) - Selected by New Orleans in the second round (61st overall) of the 2016 NFL Draft, Bell was a consensus All-American and one of the top rated defensive backs in the NFL Draft. As a senior, the Rossville, Ga. native was a Jim Thorpe Award semifinalist after recording 65 tackles and adding two interceptions, one brought back for a touchdown, one fumble recovery and 11 passes defensed. During his 2016 rookie season, Bell translated that collegiate success to the NFL with ease, starting 14 games and finishing second on the team with 98 tackles (59 solo) and first on the team with two forced fumbles. Now a proven asset, Bell will look to enter the upper echelon of NFL safeties in 2017, coming off of recording 23 tackles in his last two games, two straight double-digit totals. For the season, he has a team-high 61 tackles (44 solo), 3.5 sacks, two passes defensed and two forced fumbles, also adding four special teams tackles.

DT Tyeler Davison, Fresno State (D5b-15) - This run-stopping widebody defensive lineman played in 53 career games at Fresno State and made 28.5 stops for a loss and 14.5 sacks. After moving into the starting lineup in 2016, Davison has continued to improve, with his 25 tackles (18 solo), one pass defended and one forced fumble, showing his true value as a run-stopper.

DE Trey Hendrickson, Florida Atlantic (D3c-17) - A product of Florida Atlantic University, Trey Hendrickson joins the Black and Gold in 2017 hoping to add depth to the defensive line. The four-year letterman for the Owls dominated in his final two seasons; as a senior, he was named Conference-USA Defensive Most Valuable Player and led the nation with four blocked kicks. As a junior in 2015, Hendrickson recorded 13 sacks, second-best in the nation, and five forced fumbles. Powerful, agile, and with an eye for getting to the football, Hendrickson will be a welcome addition to the defensive front. He has made an impact with two sacks to lead the team's rookies.

DE Hau'oli Kikaha, Washington (D2-15) - Though a pre-season knee injury prematurely ended his 2016 campaign, Kikaha still enters 2017 as a key member of the Saints' front seven and pass rush. He came to New Orleans after a senior season at Washington in 2014 where he was the nation's leader with 19 sacks. In his rookie campaign, Kikaha played in 15 games with 10 starts and recorded 56 tackles (41 solo), one pass defended, four sacks and four forced fumbles to tie for sixth in takedowns and first in forced fumbles among rookies. The Hawaii native finished the season tied for second in the league in forced fumbles, the lone rookie with four. Kikaha has made a nice rebound from missing the 2016 campaign, recording three sacks.

CB Marshon Lattimore, Ohio State (D1a-17) - The 11th pick in the 2017 draft and the first cornerback taken, Lattimore possesses all the traits of a future lockdown defender. In 2016 at Ohio State, he was named first team All-Big Ten after recording four interceptions during the year. With his agile, fluid style of play, Lattimore has the ability to shut down even the best wide receivers. He's played a critical role in the Black and Gold pass defense in 2017, as he moved into the starting lineup in week one and recording an interception return for a touchdown, Oct. 15 vs. Detroit and adding a game-clinching pick, Oct. 29, vs. Chicago. Lattimore's coming off an October where he became the first Saints rookie since 2000 to capture the NFL Defensive Rookie of the Month award, when he had 16 tackles, two interceptions, one returned for a touchdown, five passes defended and one fumble recovery. For the season, he has

36 stops, the two picks, a team-high nine passes defended, one forced fumble and one fumble recovery.

DE Al-Quadin Muhammad, Miami (Fla.) (D6-17) - Muhammad joins the Saints in 2017 after showing potential as a pass rusher at the University of Miami. While he did not play in 2016, in 2015 he notched 54 tackles, good for third on the squad, while leading the team in tackles for loss and sacks with 8.5 and 5, respectively. He also forced a fumble and broke up one pass. Muhammad's strength on the line should be a valuable asset for a Saints front looking to improve on its 30-sack mark from 2016 after leading the team in quarterback takedowns in the preseason.

DT David Onyemata, Manitoba (D4-16) - Possessing a unique combination of size and speed, this Lagos, Nigeria native had an impressive rookie year after becoming the first player from the University of Manitoba to be drafted into the NFL. Despite being extraordinarily new to football, the fourth round pick appeared in all 16 games in 2016, notching 32 tackles on the year. Now with experience under his belt, Onyemata has become a critical member on the interior of the Saints defensive front as an important member of its defensive tackle rotation, making 1.5 sacks.

DT Sheldon Rankins, Louisville (D1-16) - Selected by New Orleans 12th overall in the first round of the 2016 NFL Draft, the Covington, Ga. native played in 46 games along the defensive line at Louisville from 2012-15, producing 133 total tackles (72 solo), 31.5 tackles for loss and 18 sacks during his collegiate career. A broken leg delayed his National Football League debut last season until Week Nine, but he made the most of his limited action, still finishing tied for third on the club with four sacks. In the week 10 win at Buffalo, he had a 27-yard interception return and a sack.

S Marcus Williams, Utah (D2-17) - A three-year starter at Utah, Williams was twice named All-Pac 12 and earned second-team All-American honors as a junior before declaring for the NFL Draft. In 2016, he tied for second in the conference with five interceptions, even after missing two games due to injury. The defender boasts a dangerous mix of speed, fluidity, and instinct that allows him to read the offense and make breaks on the ball. His athleticism was on display in week three at Carolina, when he snared his first career interception with his fingertips.

CB P.J. Williams, Florida State (D3b-15) - One of the most gifted athletes among the Black and Gold, Williams' career was limited in the beginning by missing all but two games in his first two seasons with injuries, but has come on in 2017. An experienced starter from Florida State University who developed into one of the nation's top cover corners as a junior in 2014, Williams finished his college career with 123 tackles (82 solo), four interceptions and 18 passes defended. Williams is tied for second on the team with two interceptions.

DEFENSIVE NOTES

NEW FACES ON DEFENSE

Along with the NFL Draft, New Orleans used free agency to add pieces to its defense, bringing players from other teams, as well as other leagues to help create the perfect mixture of veteran leadership and young talent in the Saints locker room. Below is an overview of those players:

S Rafael Bush (UFA-17 DET) - The six-year NFL veteran returns to the Saints after spending the 2016 campaign in Detroit. Bush joined the Saints following the 2012 preseason and was a significant contributor both in the secondary and on special teams for four seasons. In his only season in Detroit, he appeared in all 16 games with four starts and finished fifth on the team with 48 tackles (31 solo) and added one sack, two picks and three passes defended. In 65 career games, he has accrued 18 starts, 184 tackles (118 solo), two sacks, three interceptions, 13 passes defended, 29 special teams stops, and one coverage fumble recovery. In 2017, Bush will contribute to the Saints both in multiple defensive back packages and on special teams.

LB A.J. Klein (UFA-17 CAR) - Klein joined the Saints in 2017 at the start of unrestricted free agency, after spending his first four NFL seasons with Carolina. The 2013 fifth-round draft choice out of Iowa State has appeared in 66 games with 29 starts, posting 188 tackles (143 solo), five sacks, an interception, four passes defended, four forced fumbles, and 27 special teams stops. In 2016, he played in 15 games for the Panthers with seven starts and made 31 tackles (26 solo), one sack, a career-high two forced fumbles and two special teams stops. Experienced, intelligent, and athletic, he has 54 stops, two sacks, five passes defended and one forced fumble in 2017, in 11 starts.

DE Alex Okafor (UFA-17 ARI) - Okafor, a fourth-round selection in 2013 by the Arizona Cardinals out of Texas, enters the fifth year of his career and his first with the Saints. In the past five seasons, Okafor has totaled 130 tackles (71 solo), 15.5 sacks, seven passes defended, an interception, two forced fumbles, and two fumble recoveries. Okafor enjoyed one of the most productive seasons of his career in 2017, recording 43 tackles (27 solo), 4.5 sacks to rank second on the club, four passes defended and two forced fumbles to tie for the team lead before suffering a season-ending Achilles injury vs. Washington.

LB Manti Te'o (UFA-17 SD) - The 2012 Heisman Trophy runner-up joins the Black and Gold this season after four years as a San Diego Charger. In his career, he has appeared in 47 games with 39 starts, recording 322 tackles (190 solo), 1.5 sacks, ten passes defended, and two picks. In 2017, Te'o has 35 stops (20 solo) and one pass defended through the first 12 contests.

SACK ATTACK

In 2017, while the improvement in the New Orleans defense can be credited to all three levels, the Saints are tied for sixth in the NFL with 33 sacks after week 13 after recording only 30 takedowns in 2016.

QUARTERBACK

DREW BREES

- Since signing with the Saints as an unrestricted free agent in 2006 from San Diego, QB Drew Brees has thrown for 4,000 or more yards each season, became the only NFL signal-caller to throw for 5,000 yards five different times and ranked at or near the top in every passing category, both in single-seasons and over the 12-year period, breaking virtually every club passing record.
- Brees has kept up the pace in 2017, leading New Orleans to a 9-3 record, completing 291-of-407 passes (71.5%) for 3,298 yards with 17 touchdown passes, five interceptions and a 104.2 passer rating, adding two rushing touchdowns. Through 12 games, he is ranked first in the NFL in completion percentage, second in completions and fourth quarter passer rating (120.0) and third in passing yardage and passer rating.
- Since signing with New Orleans in 2006 and playing in 186 games for the Black and Gold, fifth in club record books, Brees leads the NFL with 57,061 passing yards, 402 touchdown passes, 7,356 attempts, 5,002 completions, a 68.0% completion percentage, 102 games with at least 300 yards passing, 15 with at least 400 yards passing, 435 passes of 25 yards or more and stands at third in the league with a 99.5 passer rating. He did not throw an interception through the first four games of the season for the first time.
- Brees has been selected to play in a franchise-record nine Pro Bowls as a member of the Saints, with ten overall berths in the National Football League's all-star game, twice as a starter, including a selection following the 2016 season. His seven consecutive selections as a Saint is tied for first in franchise history with Pro Football Hall of Fame tackle William Roaf.
- Brees has posted a 110-76 regular season record in contests he has started since signing with the Saints in 2006. In Week 15 of the 2016 campaign, Brees earned his 100th regular season victory in a Saints uniform. Including his six playoff victories, his 116 total wins as a member of the Saints make him the winningest quarterback in franchise history.
- In his 17-year NFL career during which he has appeared in 245 games, ranked seventh in NFL record books for signal-callers, with 244 starts, Brees has completed 6,127-of-9,165 passes (66.9%) for 69,409 yards, 482 touchdown passes and a 96.7 passer rating. He's stands as the NFL's all-time most accurate passer, is ranked second in completions, third in passing yardage, fourth in touchdowns and sixth in rating.

• One of the club's two first round draft picks in 2011, the 2009 Heisman Trophy winner has been an integral part of the rushing attack since his arrival in New Orleans. In 2016, Ingram had the most productive season of his seven-year NFL career, rushing for 1,043 yards on 205 carries (5.1 yards per attempt) and six touchdowns. This was the first time Ingram had broken the 1,000 yard barrier in his career. He became the first Black and Gold back to hit the mark since Deuce McAllister ran for 1,057 in 2006 and the seventh back to do so in franchise history. For his career, he ranks second in club record books with 5,160 yards rushing, second with 41 rushing touchdowns and eighth with 45 total touchdowns.

• In 2017, Ingram has picked back up where he left off in 2016, playing in all 12 games with eight starts and leading the team in rushing with 180 carries for 922 yards (5.1 avg.) with nine touchdowns and adding 42 receptions for 255 yards for 1,177 total yards from scrimmage. Ingram's is ranked fourth in the National Football League in rushing, sixth in total yards from scrimmage and is ranked first in rushing touchdowns. Ingram has had four 100-yard rushing performances in 2017

ALVIN KAMARA

• A talented runner and receiver with a 5-10, 215-pound frame who was selected by the Saints in the third round of the 2016 NFL Draft out of Tennessee, Alvin Kamara is enjoying an outstanding rookie campaign. He ranks first on the club and fourth in the NFL in total yards from scrimmage (1,220), second on the team in both rushing and receiving, carrying 86 times for 606 yards (7.0 avg.) with seven TDs and one two-point conversion, while catching 59 passes for 614 yards (10.4avg.) with four TDs for a club-best 11 total scores, tied for first in the NFL. Kamara is ranked first in the NFL in yards per carry and is coming off another standout performance in Sunday against Carolina when he had 122 total yards from scrimmage and a career-high two rushing touchdowns.

TED GINN JR.

• Ginn joined the Saints in the 2017 offseason as an unrestricted free agent as he enters his 11th National Football League season. He has been a member of five teams since being selected with the ninth overall pick in the 2007 NFL Draft by the Miami Dolphins out of Ohio State, and has appeared in 163 games with 69 starts over that period. In his long career marked by big play ability, he has accumulated 4,953 receiving yards off 353 catches (14.0 avg.), recording 28 touchdowns. In his first season in New Orleans, Ginn has played in all 12 games with eight starts and has recorded 44 grabs for 668 yards with three touchdown receptions, has carried six times for 26 yards and has brought back 19 punts for 103 yards and five kickoffs for 56 yards. Ginn is ranked second on the Saints in receiving yardage and tied for second in touchdown grabs.

DEFENSIVE ENDS

CAMERON JORDAN

• New Orleans' first choice in the 2011 National Football League Draft (24th overall) out of California, Jordan is enjoying another standout season in 2017, recording 52 tackles, ten sacks, one interception return for a touchdown, six passes defended and two forced fumbles. With 56.5 career sacks in seven seasons with the Black and Gold, Jordan is fifth on the Saints career sack list. Jordan has also proven to be one of the NFL's best run defenders, as well as being known for generating pressure on quarterbacks that doesn't always show up on the stat sheet.

JORDAN SACK NOTES

Since week eight of 2014, Jordan's played among the NFL's elite defensive ends. He's tied ninth in the NFL since Oct. 26, 2014 with 32 sacks. In 2017, he is tied for eighth in the league with eight takedowns. With eight sacks this season following a key quarterback takedown in overtime vs. Washington on Sunday to force a three-and-out, Jordan became the only Saint to have at least 7.5 quarterback takedowns in six consecutive seasons, surpassing LB Ricky Jackson, who did so in five consecutive seasons from 1983-87.

ALEX OKAFOR

- Selected by the Arizona Cardinals in the fourth round of the 2013 NFL Draft, Okafor joins the Saints in 2017 where he will add valuable depth on the defensive line. Okafor has appeared in 53 games with 35 starts in five years, collecting 18 sacks, an interception, three forced fumbles, one fumble recovery, and nine passes defensed. In 2017, he has 43 tackles (27 solo), 4.5 sacks to rank second behind Jordan, four passes defensed and two forced fumbles.

DEFENSIVE TACKLES

TYELER DAVISON

- The Fresno State product followed up a solid rookie season with an even better season in 2016, helping to improve the 31st ranked run defense in 2015 to the 14th best in the league in 2016. Starting 15 games, the disruptive defensive tackle finished the 2016 campaign with 29 tackles (14 solo) and two pass deflections. In 2015, Davison became a key Saints defender while still a rookie, appearing in all 16 games with five starts and attacking for 18 tackles (10 solo) and 1.5 sacks. In 2017, the New Orleans run defense has continued to improve and this defender has played a key role in this improvement, starting all 12 games and recording 25 tackles (18 solo), two passes defensed and one forced fumble.

SHELDON RANKINS

- Rankins was limited by injury in 2016, yet he nonetheless produced an impressive campaign. After a broken fibula delayed his National Football League debut, the rookie exploded for 20 tackles (15 solo) in nine games, adding four sacks and a forced fumble. The third defensive lineman selected in the 2016 NFL Draft (12th overall), Rankins played in 46 games along the defensive line at Louisville, producing 133 tackles (72 solo), 31.5 tackles for loss and 18 sacks during his collegiate career. In his senior campaign, the former Cardinals standout racked up a single-season career-high 58 tackles (28 solo), 13 stops for loss, six sacks, one pass defensed and a fumble recovery returned 46 yards for a touchdown. Rankins was named second-team All-Atlantic Coast Conference following his efforts. In 2017, he has posted 15 tackles (nine solo), one sack, one interception, one pass defensed and one forced fumble. On Nov. 12, at Buffalo, Rankins had a breakout performance with a 27-yard interception return and a sack.

DAVID ONYEMATA

- David Onyemata was chosen with the team's fourth round pick (120th overall) in 2016 after a stellar college career at the University of Manitoba of the CIS, becoming the first member of the Bisons program to be drafted. Over the course of his rookie campaign, Onyemata shined, appearing in all 16 games and recording 32 tackles (15 solo). On Oct. 1, against Miami in London, Onyemata recorded his first career sack and through 12 games with two starts, as an integral part of the club's defensive line rotation, he has recorded 28 tackles (ten solo), 1.5 takedowns for losses of 8.5 yards and one pass defensed.

LINEBACKERS

CRAIG ROBERTSON

• In just his first year with the Saints, Robertson quickly became one of the most important members of the young defense. After four seasons with Cleveland, Robertson joined the Saints looking to contribute on defense and special teams, yet his production outpaced even the highest expectations. Starting 15 games, Robertson led the Saints with 131 tackles (100 solo), while adding a sack, four passes defended, and interception, and two fumble recoveries. Robertson will continue to be a leader Saints defenders look to during the upcoming campaign, as he has returned to the starting lineup. In his first start of the season vs. Detroit, Oct. 15, he led the team with 11 tackles and had the sack, forced fumble and recovery all on the same play. In 2017 in 12 games with starts in the last eight contests, he has 48 stops (30 solo), two sacks to lead the linebackers, two passes defended and the forced fumble/fumble recovery.

A.J. KLEIN

• Signed as an unrestricted free agent from Carolina, where he spent his first four NFL seasons, Klein has taken over play-calling duties on defense for New Orleans. Opening ten games on the strongside for the Saints, Klein has 54 tackles (37 solo), two sacks, five passes defended and one forced fumble.

MICHAEL MAUTI

• Mauti, a Mandeville native who was originally selected by the Minnesota Vikings in the seventh round (213th overall) of the 2013 NFL Draft, returned to join his hometown team and made solid contributions on both defense and special teams when he was acquired off of waivers from Minnesota at the conclusion of the 2015 preseason. The son of former Saints wideout and special teams ace Rich Mauti, Michael Mauti has appeared in 54 career games with three starts in six NFL seasons and has tallied 47 tackles (30 solo), one sack, one forced fumble, 36 special teams stops and one blocked punt he recovered for a touchdown. He started at outside linebacker in Sunday's overtime win vs. Washington and tied for the team lead at his position with five stops.

MANTI TE'O

• Coming to New Orleans as a free agent, Te'o used his four seasons in San Diego to become a talented, linebacker. A second round pick in 2013 out of Notre Dame where he finished second in the voting for the 2012 Heisman Trophy, In 2015, his third season in San Diego, he started all

12 games he appeared in, recording a career-high 83 tackles (63 solo), a half-sack, an interception, and a forced fumble. Last year, he started the first three games of the season, before an Achilles injury ended his campaign. In 2017, he ranks among team leaders with 35 tackles (21 solo) and one pass defended.

DEFENSIVE BACKS

KEN CRAWLEY

• Crawley came to the Saints as an undrafted free agent in 2016 from Colorado. During his rookie year, he appeared in 15 games with five starts, recording 50 stops (41 solo), 10 passes defended, a forced fumble and a fumble recovery. A corner who played in all 47 games at Colorado, Crawley will look to continue his development in 2017. He saw his first action of 2017 in a contest in which he started, Sept. 24 at Carolina, and recorded a team-high nine tackles (eight solo) and two passes defended. he followed that standout performance with another in the Saints' win at Miami at London's Wembley Stadium, Oct. 1, when he recorded his first career interception and also added four stops and two more passes defended. Overall in 2017, he has 33 tackles, one interception and a team-best ten passes defended

MARSHON LATTIMORE

• Taken 11th overall in the 2017 NFL Draft from Ohio State, Lattimore possesses the physicality, speed, and intelligence to impact the Saints secondary. Despite appearing in just 20 games during his college career, Lattimore wowed NFL scouts. As a redshirt sophomore in 2016, he started all 13 games and was named first-team All-Big Ten. He notched four interceptions, one of which he returned for a touchdown. Lattimore figures to become a critical component of the Saints secondary. In eight game, all starts, Lattimore has the lead among cornerbacks with 36 stops (31 solo), two interceptions, one returned for a TD and a team-high nine passes defended in establishing himself as a candidate for NFL Defensive Rookie of the Year.

P.J. WILLIAMS

• This third-season defender is primed for a jump. An experienced starter from Florida State, who developed into one of the nation's top cover corners in 2014, Williams finished his college career with 123 tackles (82 solo), four interceptions and 18 passes defended. In 2017, through the first 12 games, Williams has 40 tackles (27 solo), two interceptions and seven passes defended.

KENNY VACCARO

• Originally a first round selection of New Orleans in 2013 out of the University of Texas, Vaccaro has filled up the stat sheet for the past three seasons, primarily from the strong safety position, where he has appeared in 66 games with 65 starts and has posted 469 tackles, 7.5 sacks, eight interceptions, 29 passes defended, five forced fumbles and three fumble recoveries. In ten games in 2017, Vaccaro has 47 tackles (37 solo), 1.5 sacks, a club-best three interceptions, seven passes defended and a fumble recovery for a touchdown.

VONN BELL

• Bell left onlookers impressed with his 2016 rookie campaign, alerting the NFL to his arrival through his hard-hitting play. Appearing in every game with 14 starts, he totaled 98 tackles (59 solo) both of which were second on the team. He also added four passes defended, a sack, two forced fumbles, and a fumble recovery. Drafted by New Orleans in the second round of the 2016 NFL Draft (61st overall), Bell was a consensus first-team All-American, was voted First-team All-Big Ten and was also a Jim Thorpe Award semifinalist following his junior season at Ohio State. In 2017, he's appeared in all 12 games and has posted a team-high 61 tackles (44 solo), 3.5 sacks, two passes defended and two forced fumbles.

RAFAEL BUSH

• A Saint from 2012 to 2015, Bush returns to New Orleans after spending 2016 with Detroit. Last season, he appeared in all 16 games with four starts, recording 53 tackles (34 solo), a sack, three passes defended, and two interceptions, one of which he returned for a touchdown vs. Jacksonville in Week 11. Over his first four seasons with the Saints, Bush appeared in 40 games with 14 starts, totaling 118 tackles (90 solo), eight passes defended, an interception, a forced fumble, and three fumble recoveries. SAINTS POSTGAME NOTES

- With the win, New Orleans moves to 9-3 on the season, clinching their first winning season since the 2013 campaign. Today's win also put them in sole possession of first place of the NFC South again.
- The Saints take on the Atlanta Falcons for a week 14 matchup on December 7 in their first trip to Mercedes Benz Stadium. Kickoff is set for 7:25 p.m. CST. The game will be aired on NBC (WDSU-6 locally), NFL Network and Amazon.
- Today's win improved New Orleans' record to 22-24 against the Panthers, giving them their first series sweep against the Panthers since the 2011 campaign and their first winning streak against their division rivals since a four-game win streak comprised of sweeping the 2010 and 2011 season series'. The win also evened Head Coach **Sean Payton's** record against the Panthers at 11-11.
- Today's win improved New Orleans' record at the Mercedes-Benz Superdome in 2017 to 5-1, which gives them a winning record at home for the first time since 2013 when they went 8-0. It also gave them a five-game home winning streak, tied for the fourth-longest home winning streak in team history.
- With the win, New Orleans improved their all-time record at the Mercedes-Benz Superdome in the regular season to 164-161.
- The Saints currently have a streak of 252 games without having been shut out, dating back to a 26-20 win at the Tampa Bay Buccaneers on September 6, 2002 at Raymond James Stadium, the longest running streak in the National Football League.
- New Orleans outgained Carolina in total net yardage 400-279.
- New Orleans outrushed the Panthers 148-112.
- New Orleans outgained Carolina in net passing yardage 252-167.
- QB **Drew Brees** appeared in his 186th career contest as a Saint moving into a tie with T Stan Brock for fourth in club record books for games played. He completed 25-of-34 passes (73.5%) for 269 yards and a 106.1 passer rating. With his 25 completions today, Brees surpassed Peyton Manning and moved into second place all-time (6,127).
- RB **Mark Ingram** led the Saints in rushing with 14 carries for 85 yards and a 72-yard run marking the second-longest of his career, behind a 75-yard run for a touchdown at San Francisco on Nov. 6, 2016. It was his longest run of the year and it was the second-longest non-scoring rush in franchise history. With his three-yard touchdown run, Ingram tied his career-high nine rushing touchdowns in a season, which he first set in 2014. Also leading the team in receiving today with six receptions for 37 yards, he had 122 total yards from scrimmage. Ingram now has 6,427 total yards from scrimmage, moving him into fifth place in the club record books, past RBs Pierre Thomas and Dalton Hilliard.
- RB **Alvin Kamara** started and finished with nine carries for 60 yards and a career high two rushing touchdowns and the third time he scored two TDs in a contest and second straight week. He also recorded five catches for 66 yards for a game-high 126 total yards from scrimmage. Kamara has 11 touchdowns on the season, making him only the second Saints Rookie with ten touchdowns behind RB George Rogers' 13 touchdowns in 1981. With 606 rushing yards and 614 receiving yards, Kamara joined former Washington WR **Charley Taylor** (1964) and former Detroit Lions RB **Billy Sims** (1980) as only the third rookie in NFL history with 600 yards rushing and 600 yards receiving. With a two-yard touchdown run, he became the fourth Saint to score a touchdown in six consecutive contests, joining Hilliard (six games from 12/18/88-10/8/89 and 10/18-11/29/92), Thomas (11/16-12/21/08) and TE Jimmy Graham (12/18/11-9/23/12).
- WR **Michael Thomas** finished the game with a team-high 70 yards on five catches. With a ten-yard touchdown catch, Thomas moved into a tie for ninth place in Brees' all-time touchdown pass targets (12) with running backs Reggie Bush (2006-10) and Pierre Thomas (2007-14).
- DE **Cameron Jordan** played in his 108th consecutive game today. Jordan also started his 93rd consecutive game today, giving him the longest consecutive games played streak among active NFL defensive ends. Jordan finished with six total tackles (five solo).

- Facing his former team, LB **A.J. Klein** recorded his second takedown of the season, sacking Panthers QB **Cam Newton**, reating a 13-yard loss. Klein finished with five total tackles (three solo).
- LB **Craig Robertson** recorded three tackles (two solo), one pass defensed and his first career fumble recovery on special teams.
- S **Kenny Vaccaro** recorded the first sack of the game, creating a three-yard loss. He finished the game with three solo tackles.
- S **Chris Banjo** caused the Panthers one turnover of the game, forcing a fumble that Robertson recovered with 9:08 left to play in the fourth quarter.
- K **Wil Lutz** nailed a 31-yard field goal. Lutz now has 53 career field goals, putting him into sole possession of fifth in franchise history.
- P **Thomas Morstead** punted four times for 184 yards (46.0 avg.) with one punt landing inside-the-20 yard line. Morstead played in his 138th career game and move into a tie for 19th place on the club's all-time games played list with C John Hill.

(opening statement) "I thought it was obviously a significant win. I felt like there were points in that game where we have to be smarter. That sequence where we turned the ball over and we have possession with momentum, all of those things kind of get them right back in the game right before the half; even towards the finish there but we'll learn from the tape. I thought overall all three phases played well. I thought we had some big plays from the kicking game that were significant. Defensively, we did a real good job, third down especially after that first series. Offensively, I thought we did a better job on third down in the second half rather than the first, but we ran the ball well again against what I think is a really good run front and a good team."

(on decision to go for it on fourth down right away for the rushing touchdown by Alvin Kamara) "Just a gut (feeling). I think we did that against them a few years ago against them. It's just the timing, where we were in the game, and I felt like we had a good play as well. I felt confident in the play we had."

(on Taysom Hill's play on special teams) "I thought it was outstanding. My only concern was when we sent specialists out for pregame he stayed in with the quarterbacks and I told him, 'listen, you are a specialist right now'. He did a great job. We had a couple spots for our gameday roster because of a few injuries. He's big and he's strong and he can run. He had a good week of practice. You just do not want to be lining up next to him on kick coverage because you are going to look slow if you do not get going. I thought it was a credit to his effort. He made a few big plays and I am sure when we watch the tape, we'll see it."

(on how long Taysom Hill has been working with the team on special teams) "This week. We were looking at the inactive portion of the roster and you get over to that list and say alright, who can help us in the kicking game? He was the one guy that we felt like ran and had good size and once he started working there on Wednesday it really jumped out. He did punt and a few of the units and I think he did well."

(on how surprised he was at how quickly Hill adapted to being a specialist) "We saw it in practice, but this is a guy that is 6-2, 235, and runs a 4.42. That's pretty good. I think it's probably the fastest quarterback time in the last 20 years coming out of the combine, if my memory holds it. This guy was explosive, and it just made sense. He plays with a passion. We saw it in practice during the week and it just came up in the game."

(on if he has ever had a QB play as a specialist) "No, this will be the first one."

(on a play where Mark Ingram was just short of a first down and Max Unger helped push him through) "It was significant, I saw it. We always talk about finishing with the ball and the offensive lineman doing that just epitomizes that. It was a big play. I agree it was going to be right there and all of the sudden there is an extra yard and I am sure when we see the snap, we will see the effort on it. Ultimately, it is playing each down like it was your last and he is someone that does that. We are coaching that you're following the ball, you're getting out the stack on defense, you are finishing the play and it was a real smart play by him. You are trying to get a block and then you are down there with him and you are stacked up and you're moving him."

(on if he thought the defense did a good job of keeping Cam Newton in the pocket) "I thought so."

(on Ken Crawley's improvement.) "Him coming back healthy, he can run and he made a big play over his head early in the second half when they tried to go on top of the post, but he is doing well."

(on getting approximately double yards per carry than Carolina has been giving up) "I think it's significant in the division against a good run defense like that. It was significant towards time of possession; it was significant towards us being better on third down, all of those things. It's a

divisional game and an important game for us. The guys up front did a good job, the runners had some big plays and its part of playing well as a team.”

(on practice effort improvements this week) “It was better this week, Guys did a good job and I thought we played better.”

(on if this team is smart) “I think we're playing good football. It's a young team so I think we are learning each week. As coaches, our job is to keep teaching.”

(on if play-calling becomes more challenging later in the season and coming up with new ways to use Alvin Kamara) “It was not ‘it’s third and 10, we have to get Alvin (Kamara). The thought was more let’s keep the clock moving here, let’s be mindful of field position and the ball is out quickly. Had we not thrown the earlier one to Mike (Thomas), he could have very easily been another (target). There was a design and Alvin (Kamara) was able to get man coverage. He’s smart, he is a guy that understands football and knows how to line up in some different spots and he works at it. At that point, Senio (Kelemete) made a good play getting out and its one of those receiver screens.”

(on if the opening drive decision to go for it on fourth down was made early on) “No, you don't think like that. You think about scoring a touchdown on your first drive, or execution, and when you get down to the two you are still considering where are we at here, so it wasn’t until it got to fourth down.”

(on the short turnaround leading up to the Atlanta game) “It is what it is.”

(On having control of their own destiny in December) "It's big. We have an extremely tough division. We have three teams that are vying for that top spot and certainly a playoff opportunity. No more important game than the next game. Coming back from L.A. last week, four of these five last games are divisional games, so this is where our best football needs to be played. Our best preparation to set out to achieve the goals we set out to accomplish at the beginning of the year. It's all in front of us. I think our minds are still set to strive to get better and strive to play a quicker game. I don't think we've done that yet. I thought today was very complementary in a lot of ways. Special teams comes up with a big play and a big turnover. Really, I guess two. Defensively, we're playing extremely well. Offensively, we have a good balance. We've had some big plays in the run game and the pass game scoring points. We just have to continue going in that right direction. That's the formula to winning a lot of games, but the games only get tougher and more important."

(On the message a fourth down conversion gives) "We're being aggressive. We came here to win. We came here to put guys in positions to be able to make plays to win the game. Obviously those are big momentum changers too when you're able to get it in there, but also the message it sends to the team that we're going to be aggressive."

(On why he's comfortable with plays similar to the two-point conversion against Washington) "Probably because it's in Alvin Kamara's hands. How about that?"

(On comfort level with Alvin Kamara) "I'm very comfortable. From the very beginning there was something unique about him. His ability to absorb this offense, which can be very complex and can be a lot. Especially from the running back position. You kind of wonder what kind of position you can put him in and gradually that playbook has expanded to where really any situation we can be comfortable with him in the game. And Mark (Ingram) for that matter too so it is great to have two guys like that. They can complement each other and also be a one-two punch and you have confidence in them."

(On Mark Ingram's 72-yard run) "That was great, especially because he had to work to stretch out those last 30 yards. Really a great individual effort on his part and again you look for those game-changing plays, those game-defining plays, and certainly going for it on fourth down first drive and getting that was big. That play was huge and a couple of others."

(On moving into second place on the career completions list) "I didn't realize that until Mike Thomas said, 'hey the ball that I jumped up and caught moved you into second place'. I've said this before, you play long enough I guess those things happen. It just makes me think of all the guys that have caught those balls and all of those guys blocking."

(On thought process every time he sees Alvin (Kamara) hurdle defenders) "Please land on your feet and not your head."

(On Kamara and Ingram averaging six yards per carry) "It's a testament to those guys' ability to run the football. The guys up front, blocking for them, those guys have done a tremendous job. I think the scheme and just the gameplan each and every week for how we are going to attack an opponent (has been productive). Obviously, we know there are plenty of run defenses out there just like the Carolina Panthers. You've got to pick and choose your times but you also have to understand in the beginning that two-yard runs and three-yard runs are okay because all the sudden you pop one like Mark (Ingram) did or you pop one like Alvin (Kamara) did that result in big plays. A lot of that is just sticking with it, trusting it, and continuing to find the schemes that work for you."

(On bouncing back from last week's loss in Los Angeles this afternoon) "Listen, a divisional game at home against a team that you are really tied for a division lead with at the time with two 8-3 records, just knowing the stretch we have got ahead of us here (with) four out of five divisional games to finish out the regular season. We knew the importance of the game obviously. We wanted to come out and play our best. We wanted to play complementary and I felt like we did that."

(On the third quarterback Taysom Hill playing special teams today) "I love it. What a stud. Had two special teams tackles. It looked like he got close to a couple of punts as well. He was on the punt rush team. I was really happy for him. You always say, 'the more you can do'. I think it's his attitude and his ability to just embrace the opportunity to get on the field and help the team in whatever way he could. He's a big, strong guy but it's not every day that you can say a quarterback who's never played special teams ever, we're going to have you playing in an NFL game running down on kickoffs and rushing punts and tackling people. That's a big chore and he did a great job today."

(On how much the big plays impact the team's energy) "They fire everyone up. It was a big momentum play in that game. We always look for them in a game. We talked about the fourth down run early in the game that got us in (the lead) and Mark Ingram's big run. Those are plays that get us fired up and get us fired up on the sidelines and just make you feel like you can do anything if you put in the work."

(On key to playing well throughout these last games) "Take it one play at a time and continue to focus on playing your best game."

(On what he saw defensively during Mark Ingram's 72-yard run) "It was an eight-man front, so he had to make somebody miss. He did a great job."

(On team's opportunity to have another Super Bowl season) "I like where we are at but I feel like we can continue to get better. There are still things that I feel like we are leaving out there. There are opportunities we are leaving out there. If we want to accomplish and go where we want to go, we've got to continue to improve upon and get better at those things. When you can walk away from games saying that and yet you still won them, that's a good thing. It signifies the attitude has always got to be that we are hungry and we are striving to find our best performance."

(On the team effort to push Mark Ingram when the offense almost came up short of a first down) "That is exactly what it was. It was effort and one-two and desire and will. (It was a) Great effort by Mark Ingram to continue to fight and then here comes the cavalry to help push him across (for the first down). It is a football IQ play. We knew it was third down. We knew we were close. We knew we wanted that first down. It takes smart, tough football players who are tough and want it."

RB Mark Ingram

(On scoring on the first drive) "That was the plan. They have been getting the best of us especially in big games. We put an emphasis that we were going to be the bullies. We were going to hit them in the mouth. That was a great team win."

(On his 72-yard run) "It was wide open. I tried to hit the hole as fast as I could and hit the end zone. They were sleeping on my speed, so I have to put the burners on them every now and then. I was trying to get my Alvin Kamara mode and get my matrix on"

(On Kamara's performance) "He is a monster He is always doing his thing. He's running. He's catching. He's a special player. He is definitely the rookie of the year."

(On the third down conversion with the Max Unger assist) "As a running back you try to do everything that you can to get extra yards. When you are short of the first down you try to push. I think Max came and gave me a little bump at the end for a first down."

RB Alvin Kamara

(On Mark Ingram's 72-yard run in the second quarter) "I was about to run on the field. It is one of those things where you see how someone prepares all week. He performs the way he practices. He runs like that during practice. I wasn't surprised. I was just hyped."

QB Taysom Hill

(On playing special teams) "It was really fun to go out there and it helped getting support from all of the guys."

(On coming close to blocking a punt) "I think I got close, but I'll have to go back and watch the tape to see how close it actually was. It was definitely close enough for us to all be on edge."

DE Cameron Jordan

(On facing Cam Newton) "When I hit Matt Ryan, I know he is going down. When I hit Cam, It is 70-30. That being said. I hit Cam a couple of times today. I got in his face a couple of times. I didn't squeak out my sack. We played the power option well. We tuned into to exactly what they wanted to do and we edged out a win. It's tough to beat any team twice. We talked about how much their offense has been rolling. We talked about the ability of Cam Newton and the rest of their offense. I was upset that I had this pass deflection and could have caught it. It hit my left hand, which isn't my dominant hand. If it had hit my right hand, then I would have been more competent. That's on me at the end of the day and that's what we were focused on."

(On the long Mark Ingram run igniting the team) "It's awesome to see him run like that by making the separation and then cutting back and confusing the defensive back like he did. It's awesome for the offense and definitely a momentum getter there."

WR Michael Thomas

(On how the run game affects the receiving corps) "It's great. Coach always emphasizes to get on those guys and block. These guys can make people miss. Once they get to that second level, great things and great gains happen."

(On teams deferring after the opening coin toss like the Panthers did) "It is what it is. It is football. It is heads or tails. They choose to defer, and we have to get ready to respond and execute at a high level It's our job to go out there as an offense and put points on the board."

(On if he was disappointed in all the sloppiness and mistakes this afternoon by his team) “I think more so by the mistakes. The opportunities we missed, the things that we allowed. We allow a big run on an eight-man front, that’s disappointing. We had opportunities to complete plays downfield and we get holding calls, facemask calls. We can’t do that, not against a good football team. That’s why you get beat.”

(On evaluation of offensive side of the ball from scoring on the first offensive possession on out) “Missed opportunities. Self-inflicted mistakes. Again, you can’t have penalties. You are moving the ball well. You convert a big third down, or at least you think you do and you get a penalty. You can’t do it. Not against a good football team.”

(On special teams, the punter dropping the ball and having to turn over on downs as a result and one fumbled punt return) “Last week it (special teams) was big for us. This week it wasn’t. Those are things we have to clean up. You can’t bobble the snaps. You can’t fumble the ball. We were going to get great field position on the fumbled punt return which was disappointing but Kaelin (Clay) is a heck of a football player and he’ll make a play for us. Unfortunately, that one didn’t go our way.”

(On the bobbed snap? Was it pressure or he just dropped it) “No, he just dropped it. That is something that unfortunately happens. I know Mike, for the most part, is going to catch it and punt.”

(On the explanation given for the non-called neutral zone infraction) “No idea. They did not see it. They didn’t think we reacted, we moved enough for them to throw the flag and blow the play down.”

(On that play throwing off the offensive line to allow A.J. Klein to get to Cam Newton) “Unfortunately it could have. I’m not saying it did or didn’t. But unfortunately, it could have. But that’s ball. They (the referees) are going to make calls and miss calls.”

(On Thomas Davis’s limitation today) “That was the plan coming in that we were going to play Thomas today limited and trying to get him through the game which we did and healthy. And same thing with Shaq (Thompson). He tweaked that foot again but then he came back and finished it for us so we should be all right going forward.”

(On Alvin Kamara’s capability and their preparation for it) “We can prepare for whatever we want, but he’s got some elite ability. They scheme very well. They do some really good things with what Coach Payton calls. Right now they are real difficult to defend because of all the other weapons they have. You have to respect their receivers. You have to account for their tight ends. And then the back team are unbelievable. Him and (Mark) Ingram are tremendous backs. Everything starts with the quarterback’s ability. He’s a heck of a triggerman.”

(On heading into this final stretch and you’ve essentially had two games in the division with four to go, what’s the mindset heading into the final quarter) “We have Minnesota next, that’s the mindset that we have. We are going to take it one at a time and focus in on who we play next.”

QB Cam Newton

(on why the team wasn't efficient after their opening drive) "It's too early to tell. I felt like we came out and, like you said, executed and were efficient. We just hit a lull right there. We are playing a type of team like this, games moving forward, we just have to find ways to keep and stay intact. We didn't do that today."

(on if there is pressure to match the Saints score) "No, we don't play their offense. We just go against their defense. I have full faith that the type of game like this won't happen again via our defense. I just don't think that we played complementary football today. They gave us an opportunity early on when it was tied up. We had an opportunity to go down and go up. And, we did not do that. Like I say, we just did not play complementary football. When you are playing in the type of game like this in a hostile environment, especially a division game, every single play counts. That showed more than anything today."

(on his take on the Saints defense) "That's a good team. If everything plays out right, we may see that team again. We just have to move forward and be optimistic of our opportunities, knowing that the world doesn't stop because the Panthers lost today. We have to learn from this. We'll learn from this. We will be better prepared for Minnesota."

LB Luke Kuechly

(on the next three home games) "We have got to win them all. I think that that's the biggest thing. You've got to take them one game at a time. We've got a good team (Minnesota) coming in this week that's on a hot streak. They are playing really well. They have a good defense. They run the ball. They have a quarterback that is playing well. We have our work cut out for us, but we are excited to be at home in front of our fans. They give us a lot of good energy."

WR Devin Funchess

(on four or five plays making the outcome of games) "That's football. Any given Sunday, like everybody says. We've just got to take it and look at it. I made a lot of mistakes. I can't do that, as the guy that I am. (We) just have to get back in the lab and get back to it."

(on the team playing uncharacteristic on defense this afternoon) "Anytime that you do not play your best, it's frustrating. We felt like we didn't give ourselves a chance today. (on the breakdowns on the run defense) "It happens. We will get that fixed though. We just have to do our job across the board, everybody. I've got to get him down. I've just got to get him down. We just have got to play better as a whole. A mistake on this play and on that play doesn't help us at all."

What's the schedule for this week playing on Thursday night?

"We'll be in tomorrow and Wednesday with two days of practice, really walkthroughs and then we'll fly out Wednesday night."

Going back to the fourth and two situation at the goal line in the first quarter, I think you guys had a fourth and one at Buffalo. This one was on the first drive, that one was in the first quarter a little further along. Are those tone-setting plays? I know that you said you had a play that you liked. Are they tone-setters in terms of building confidence early in a game?

"There's a couple things, I think early in the game there's two thoughts that go into it. Do we feel like the percentages of scoring along with the percentages of what happens with Carolina having the football at the one-one and a half (if you don't convert) coming out and you start putting those numbers together and what's the risk assessment? Part of it is setting the tone. It's not every time we do that. We've done it a handful of times. I can think back over the years, Carolina before. I think we had a play versus Baltimore before. Early drive, first drive, fourth and goal at the one and you want to finish the correct way and yet you hope you're able to score and if not you put them on the one-yard line or two-yard line and you try to take advantage of that field position and the next possession."

What have you seen from Taysom Hill and do you think he could be the successor to Drew Brees?

"What I said was this player is a special teams player who I think is going to do very well and we liked the prospect as a quarterback. I think we saw enough on tape to claim him, to put him on our active roster, but anything we do with regards to where we're going forward is certainly something that will be won and lost on the field. I think that he's athletic. I think he did a good job yesterday, especially bringing some juice to the special teams. He can run, he has size. It was refreshing."

How important is it to have a quarterback with a dual skillset like him for running the scout team in preparing for quarterbacks such as Cam Newton who can gain yards with their feet as well as through the air?

"I think it is always helpful and I think there is a personality he has that I think brings a little energy and I felt it in our kicking game yesterday. We had two game-changing plays. The muffed punt that we (recovered) at midfield and then we had the caused fumble and then we have a punt return for a touchdown. Now we're blocking in the back and that was a good call, but I like it. I like it."

What have you seen from Garrett Griffin with his development?

“We brought him in and gave him a workout and felt like he was going to be further along as a receiver. He ran well. He’s athletic and I think as his time spent here during the camps and padded practices, he was a little further along as a blocker. I think he’s smart and tough. He’s continued to develop. I didn’t know if I was going to be able to have him up yesterday. Some of that was predicated on the health of guys like (Marshon) Lattimore, but it was good we could get him up.”

What does it say about Brandon Coleman, when he’s running downfield with Mark Ingram to block for him on Ingram’s big run?

“I love Brandon Coleman and his passion. When you start running the ball like we have been able to run the ball, I do not care what team you are you have to block the perimeter. There has to be receivers with that mindset and if you don’t have it then you don’t have the same success and Brandon one of the great traits he has is he’ll block, he’ll go run and make a play above his head, he’ll do whatever it takes to win and he’s well-respected for that by our players and certainly respected by me.”

How are you able to balance the need for practice, rest, recovery?

“I don’t have the right answer for you because I think it’s difficult. We’ll try and keep them off their feet today, recover, rest, tomorrow we’ll have a walkthrough and Wednesday we’ll have a walkthrough. That’s it really. It’s a simple answer.”

What stood out to you on the film?

“I haven’t watched all the film yet.”

What sticks out about the Falcon’s defense?

“They can run. I think that’s the one thing on film. They’re fast at all the positions. I think (Keanu) Neal has played extremely well. I think they rush the passer very well and if you get into the third down and a lot of the things that we saw happen in Seattle (under Dan Quinn as defensive coordinator) with the pass rush, with the rotation of guys coming on and off the field. They’re fast and I think the problems come in those longer yardage situations.”

Is the completeness of Mark Ingram and Alvin Kamara something that’s unique that’s you’ve never had before/

“I think the versatility maybe is something that’s unique and yet as you mention that we are getting ready to see a team that has two runners (Devonta Freeman and Tevin Coleman) with similar versatility and I mean that. You see them do all the same things very well, but I think most important to me is when I see guys excited genuinely for each other regardless of whether it is their carry or their play or (Brandon) Coleman’s block or

someone else. As soon as you start getting that on a team, guys caring more about the win and less about their own (stats), then you begin to have a chance to have something. I think to your point there is some similar versatility that creates less stress on me as a play-caller. Where I'm not ahh I need this (guy in), we are fine. Both of these guys can handle most of what we're doing."

Is that something you think evolved throughout the year?

"I think it has. Honestly if we would have known what we were going to get as a runner we would not have taken him in the third round we would have earlier. It would not have been good for (Marshon) Lattimore. I mean who knows? I think it was more of the vision. Initially (he) shared carries with the other back at Tennessee. There were certain things we knew, but it's worked out well."

How much has that Falcons offense changed with the new offensive coordinator, Steve Sarkisian from Kyle Shanahan previously?

"I do not know that I am far enough along to give you a correct or accurate answer, just because of where we are at with the tape study. By and large there's things that they do that they've always done a great job with the play action of the boots. Matt's (Ryan) been very good with deception with regards to ball handling, very athletic in regards to finding targets on the move to the right or to the left. I don't know that to the early study eye (I'm far enough along yet). I think there's an offense in place and I'm sure there are some subtle changes."

What kind of test will this be against the Falcons receivers for the cornerbacks?

"I think it will be an extremely difficult one. When you look at (Muhammad) Sanu and (Taylor) Gabriel and the tight ends there this is a team and it's just built differently and is very explosive outside and we're going to have to be on point."

What's the biggest challenge about the short week Thursday games?

"Normally the biggest challenge is getting guys healthy, getting guys right, game planning in enough time. But when you talk about week 14 technically, now it doesn't matter if you guys are trying to bounce back and get healthy. At this point the body probably needs two or three days of recovery and we don't have that kind of time."

How much did Mark Ingram's long run juice you guys up yesterday?

“When he takes off that early in the game with that strong of a run, you get super-excited. Seeing a guy being able to perform the way he does and at the same time it makes it that much more pressure on the defense to step up and get rolling. I think we did just that. We responded well.”

With the offense going for it on fourth down in the first drive, what does that do to boost up the team?

“That was a hell of a run by Alvin Kamara. He almost got stopped. Nine times out of 10 if it had have been anyone else they would have gone down. His balance is amazing. That’s really what’s separating him from a lot of different running backs.”

I’m sure you always want to get after the quarterback but just knowing how good the receivers are with the Falcons, is there any extra pressure with getting pressure on Matt Ryan?

“Yes, of course. But even watching the Vikings game this morning, watching them play against a variety of different teams, we talk about Matt Ryan’s release. His release is quick. They probably have one of the strongest wide receiver groups in the game. It is going to be strictly on the D-line to get their hands out and try and knock a few down to try to disrupt the quarterback as much as we can. We have a task ahead of us the next couple of days.”

Statistically, yesterday was a lot better than the previous two games against Washington and L.A., beyond the statistics do you kind of remember what you saw and felt with the unit over the course of the game?

“Statistically, I can’t speak to the statistics. I do know at the end of the day we did enough to get a win. Even when two weeks ago, when you talk about that Redskins game. I do not know what it does statistically but that being said it does a heap for us in the confidence department when you talk about knowing you can go into a battle and be down and come back and win those games. That’s what’s important. When you talk about going out to L.A., you know we lost that but it made us even more hungry. (It) Brought us an even more desperate factor to win this next game. So you play a team twice. You play a team like the Panthers, that’s something that you have to be the most deadly team and I feel like we were.”

We did not get to see any of Taysom Hill because he was not with you during training camp, but talk about what does he do for the scout team and helping you guys get prepared?

“When he’s in, he gets us pretty right. He’s gets us pretty right. In terms of what does do, honestly, Chase (Daniel) is more of the scout team quarterback. Taysom gets in every now and again, but clearly when he’s in the game he is pretty effective on special teams in a large way.”

Coming back on a short week like this, are you glad you're facing more of a pocket passer than a guy you saw like yesterday?

"Sure. At this point, we were able to get back to Cam (Newton) a couple of times. A.J (Klein) got a sack. I was close to at least one or two of them. Two, three of them. Four if you count the holding. I feel like at the end of the day, it's our job to get to the quarterback so we have to figure out the right way to get there."

With Ryan's release game as quick as it is often is, we saw you having good hands and just having your hands up against Detroit, I don't know if you think that is a similar kind of challenge but can you just talk about maybe the emphasis on getting hands up this year and how it might play into this game?

"Yes, we talk about the ability to get your hands up. The ability to possibly bring his hands down. This is something that we have to be aware of. At the end of the day, he's a hell of a quarterback. When we talk about the quarterbacks in our division, clearly we have (several of) the top 10 quarterbacks in the league, we have a clear cut three of the top 10. When you talk about the competitor that is Jameis Winston he's probably not too far outside of the top 10. When you talk about the strength of the quarterbacks in our division, you'd probably start off with our quarterback Drew Brees and then Cam Newton and Matt Ryan and then Jameis. When you have those guys in your division, it just makes you that more hungry to get to the quarterback."

I don't know if you have seen this but Steve Spagnuolo is the interim head coach in New York, what do you think about that?

"Good for him. I worked with him for a year. He's a good guy. With that being said, it's been five years since I had him. I have no ill wishes or positive wishes for him. I wish him the best as I do any other person."

I know we were joking about the durable defender thing with the Craig Robertson gameday cover, but in all honesty why do you think you've been so durable for most of your career, starting 93 consecutive games, the longest current streak for an active NFL defensive end?

"I mean Craig Robertson is a durable defender on the magazine. In terms of my durability, I have no idea. I think more explosive is the word durability brings to the table. That's why we were making fun of it so much. When you talk about the word durability, durable's a guy that just hangs around. Durable's not what Craig Robertson is to our team. Durable is not what I am to our team. Durable is not a word that I use so lightly in describing any of our defenders so I talk about durable I sort of listen and laugh. But in terms of being able to play seven years and play however many games I have played (and) started however many games I have started, at the end of the day what's important I would like to say I am going for a win every game. I am gunning to make that tackle in every game I play. When you talk about the ability to get pressure, irritate the hell out of the quarterback, that is my goal every game, so durability does not come to

mind. What comes to mind is having that infection mindset where we're riding on offenses. We're the attackers. We're the aggressors. And we're making off just us and that's what comes to mind. Durable is not one of those."

What does it do for the confidence of the whole team when you go for it on fourth and goal?

"It just means he (Coach Payton) has a lot of confidence in us. When your coach shows faith in you like that you definitely want to be able to execute and be able to make (his choice) right. That confidence makes you want to come through for him."

Do you look forward to opportunities like that?

"We just have an expectation to be great and coach will be aggressive and there will be times where he won't be. We have to be able to be aggressive with him and be able to overcome whatever the situation is and execute and get a first down or a touchdown. Whatever situation they present we have to be able to withstand an execute."

What have you learned over the years that has helped you get ready for games with such a short turnaround?

"Everything's accelerated, you have to recover quicker and have a solid gameplan that everybody's familiar with (that allows) guys to play fast and know their assignments. Everything's accelerated and recovery's accelerated and we just have to be ready to go."

What does it say about Brandon Coleman running with you to throw another block?

"It says a lot about what type of player he is. He's very selfless, laying it all on the line to make sure his teammate gets one extra yard or maybe spring him and get him the touchdown. He always does that and a lot of it goes unnoticed, but within the locker room he's very valuable for us (with) his ability to block for the run and his ability to stretch the field and score touchdowns in the red zone. He is a strong asset to our team and I'm glad that I'm out there with him."

Did you ever think it would be possible for two running backs to do what you and Alvin Kamara are accomplishing?

“I felt like it was a possibility if we ran the ball. I just know the offense is wide open and it puts us in primary position to make plays. I feel like we give the backs carries and I felt like it was possible especially for one (guy), maybe not two. But it’s just crazy how it’s happening this year. I’ve been preparing well (and) the offensive line, receivers, tight ends, full backs (have as well). Our gameplans from our coaches, everything’s been going well. We’ve been executing it’s just crazy how it’s been happening.”

Does it make you rethink one guy needing all the touches since you both get the perfect amount?

“I still want to be in there more and carry the ball more, but it’s working and there’s enough touches for both of us. We are both staying healthy, we’re both staying fresh and we’re able to make it work and we’re able to help put our team in position to win games and that’s what we want to do and that’s what we prepare for.”

Have you seen one nickname for you and Alvin that you like best?

“I think there one like boom and zoom. I like that one. You see them all over the place. There was one boom and zoom and I think there was a smash and dash, but I think the boom and zoom is my favorite one so far. It’s kind of unique and I haven’t really heard of that before. That’s been my favorite one so far. There have been a lot that I’ve seen in my mentions. It’s just fun to look at.”

Are you ok with being the boom or smash?

“See boom is all of it. It is explosive, fast, powerful. I do not mind boom, it is like BOOM. I do not want a nickname that just makes me seem like the big power back because that is not me. I can do that, but I try to be a big power back, but I feel like I can do it all and be versatile in many ways. I like a name that can reflect that. I like boom and zoom.”

How cool was the role reversal for you to be the zoom and Alvin the boom on your big runs on Sunday, when you showed some speed and elusiveness on the 72-yard run and he showed the physicality you are known for on a few?

“Like I said you really cannot label one of us. Both of us have the complete package and he can run physical, he can run strong, he is hard to tackle. He can get in space and make you miss and hit home runs. When I get the chance I like to show my speed and hit home runs. When I get my number called in between the tackles or guards I like to be able to run hard and physical. I want to be that complete package speed, explosion, power.”

How crazy is it that 66 players went ahead of Alvin Kamara in the draft?

“The draft still has unknown guys. Sometimes you hit early, sometimes you don’t. It is just an unknown science. He’s proving that right now.”

I assume you have no problems with the CFP committee’s selection of Alabama for the playoff?

“No. I have no problem with it at all. Ohio State got in last year and didn’t win the (conference) Championship game. They set the precedent. We lost to a good Auburn team and that was our only loss of the year. If we didn’t get in, it was our fault, but we were able to get in.”

What’s your impression of the offensive line responding from last week and having to be versatile and move around?

“Since day one, these guys are a special unit of players. From Terron Armstead, to Andrus Peat, to Max Unger, Larry Warford, Ryan Ramczyk, do not forget Zach Strief and Senio Kelemete filling in. Senio does whatever he can do, left tackle, left guard, right tackle. He is just an ace for us on the offensive line and a special player being able to plug (him) in. Peat moved from guard to tackle and those guys need to keep playing at a high level an elite level. Maybe somewhere they are uncomfortable since they have not been there all year. It just says a lot about how special they are, how versatile they are and how important they are to our offense.”

Did you talk to Max Unger about him pushing the pile on that first down run?

“I knew he hit me or pushed me for the extra half yard I needed, but that is Max. You always see him on film downfield pushing the pile. Larry Warford was downfield pushing blockers down that we’re trying to tackle me as well. Those guys can cover downfield and I’m glad that I have those guys as my linemen. They are the best in the league.”

What does it feel like when they enter the pile?

“Yeah usually a defenders trying to pull you the wrong way. They get to you and try to push you the right way. It gives you a little extra boost trying to push and drive your legs and get a little extra spring or power to push you for however many yards it will be. When they come down and push the pile it’s definitely helpful helpful.”

Does it give you a second wind?

“You just fighting for everything and get a little extra help. Maybe get a little extra power. Definitely helpful when you’re fighting for more yards and get to a point where you can

move anymore and they push you forward. Its good.”

When Max Unger hits you is that more boom or zoom?

“That’s definitely boom. Yeah he boomed me forward for the first down.”

When the was first time you saw Alvin Kamara jump into the stands?

“We’d been talking about it. He’d been doing the jump and he said he was going to jump up in there next time. I was like, yeah go up in there. He has turned it up ever since. I like it. It’s pretty cool.”

Is it crazy since the wall is so high?

“Yeah you have to jump and pull yourself up and he’s been doing it. He’s been getting in there partying. It’s cool.”
