### THE TEAMS & CLUB MILESTONES

<b>ARIZONA CARDINALS</b>	<ul style="list-style-type: none"> <li>Became the only team in NFL history with a QB-RB-WR trio to account for at least 300, 100 and 100 total touchdowns, respectively: QB <b>CARSON PALMER</b> (302), RB <b>ADRIAN PETERSON</b> (104) and WR <b>LARRY FITZGERALD</b> (110).</li> <li>LB <b>CHANDLER JONES</b> led the NFL in sacks (17) and tackles for loss (28). His 17 sacks are a single-season franchise record.</li> <li><b>Jones</b> had at least one sack in 13 games this season, the most in franchise history.</li> </ul>
<b>ATLANTA FALCONS</b>	<ul style="list-style-type: none"> <li>Earned a playoff berth for the second consecutive season.</li> <li>QB <b>MATT RYAN</b> passed for 4,095 yards, his franchise-record seventh consecutive season with at least 4,000 passing yards.</li> <li>WR <b>JULIO JONES</b> led the NFC with 1,444 receiving yards, his fifth career seasons with at least 1,000 yards. Jones joined <b>RODDY WHITE</b> (six) as the only players in franchise history with at least five 1,000-yard receiving seasons.</li> <li><b>Jones</b> has 585 career receptions and surpassed <b>TERANCE MATHIS</b> (573) for the second-most receptions in team history. <b>White</b> (808) is the only Falcon with more career receptions.</li> <li>DE <b>ADRIAN CLAYBORN</b> recorded six sacks in Week 10, the most in a single game in franchise history.</li> <li>DE <b>TAKKARIST MC KINLEY</b> had six sacks, tied for the second-most by a rookie in franchise history.</li> </ul>
<b>BALTIMORE RAVENS</b>	<ul style="list-style-type: none"> <li>Ranked first in the NFL with a +17 turnover differential.</li> <li>Recorded three shutouts this season and became the fifth team in the past 30 years to record at least three shutouts in a single season.</li> <li>Became the third team since 1970 (1992 Pittsburgh and 1971 Cleveland) to have at least four interceptions in each of its first two games of a season.</li> </ul>
<b>BUFFALO BILLS</b>	<ul style="list-style-type: none"> <li>Earned a playoff berth for the first time since 1999.</li> </ul>

McCoy, who had 1,623 scrimmage yards with Buffalo last season, joined Pro Football Hall of Famers <b>THURMAN THOMAS</b> (five) and <b>O.J. SIMPSON</b> (three) and <b>JOE CRIBBS</b> (three) and <b>TRAVIS HENRY</b> (two) as the only players in franchise history with multiple seasons with 1,500+ scrimmage yards.</li> <li>• CB <b>TRE'DAVIOUS WHITE</b> had four interceptions and became the third Bills rookie since 1980 with at least four interceptions.</li> <li>• <b>White</b> tied for first among NFL rookies with 18 passes defended, the second-most by a rookie in team history (<b>RONALD DARBY</b>, 21 in 2015).</li> <li>• DT <b>KYLE WILLIAMS</b> has 43.5 career sacks, the most in franchise history by a defensive tackle.</li> <li>• K <b>STEPHEN HAUSCHKA</b> made seven field goals of at least 50 yards, the most 50+ yard field goals by a kicker in franchise history.</li> </ul>
<b>CAROLINA PANTHERS</b>	<ul style="list-style-type: none"> <li>• Earned a playoff berth for the fourth time in the past five seasons.</li> <li>• Had a fumble-return touchdown (LB <b>LUKE KUECHLY</b>) and a punt-return touchdown (PR <b>KAELIN CLAY</b>) in the fourth quarter of their Week 12 victory against the New York Jets, the second time in franchise history – and first since the club's inaugural 1995 season (October 8, 1995 against Chicago) – in which the Panthers scored two return touchdowns in the fourth quarter of a game.</li> <li>• RB <b>JONATHAN STEWART</b> (7,318) surpassed <b>DE ANGELO WILLIAMS</b> (6,846) for the most career rushing yards in franchise history.</li> <li>• <b>Stewart</b> (51) surpassed Williams (46) for the most career rushing touchdowns by a running back in Panthers history. QB <b>CAM NEWTON</b> (54) has the most rushing touchdowns by a player in franchise history.</li> <li>• <b>Stewart</b> rushed 16 times for 103 yards and three touchdowns in Week 14 and became the second player in franchise history (<b>TIM BIAKABUTUKA</b>, October 3, 1999) to rush for at least 100 yards and three touchdowns on fewer than 20 carries.</li> <li>• RB <b>CHRISTIAN MC CAFFREY</b> set franchise rookie records in scrimmage yards (1,086) and receptions (80).</li> <li>• LB <b>LUKE KUECHLY</b> had a team-high 134 tackles and is the only player in franchise history with more than 100 tackles in each of his first six seasons as a Panther.</li> <li>• <b>Kuechly</b> had three interceptions this season and has 15 career interceptions, surpassing <b>THOMAS DAVIS</b> (13) for the most interceptions by a linebacker in franchise history.</li> </ul>
<b>CHICAGO BEARS</b>	<ul style="list-style-type: none"> <li>• RB <b>JORDAN HOWARD</b> ranked third in the NFC with 1,122 rushing yards. Howard, who rushed for 1,313 yards as a rookie in 2016, is the first player in franchise history to rush for at least 1,000 yards in each of his first two NFL seasons.</li> <li>• <b>Howard</b> has 12 100-yard rushing games and surpassed Pro Football Hall of Famer <b>WALTER PAYTON</b> (nine) for the most 100-yard games by a Bear in his first two NFL seasons.</li> </ul>

<p><b>LOS ANGELES RAMS</b></p>	<ul style="list-style-type: none"> <li>• Won the NFC West division title for the first time since 2003.</li> <li>• Led the NFL averaging 29.9 points per game. The Rams, who scored the fewest points in the NFL last season (14.0 per game), became the second team in NFL history (San Francisco, 1964-65) to lead the league in scoring after recording the fewest points in the previous season.</li> <li>• Head coach <b>SEAN MC VAY</b>, at 31 years old, became the youngest head coach in NFL history to lead his team to a playoff berth.</li> <li>• RB <b>TODD GURLEY</b> led the NFL with 2,093 scrimmage yards and joined Pro Football Hall of Famer <b>ERIC DICKERSON</b> and <b>MARSHALL FAULK</b> and <b>STEVEN JACKSON</b> as the only players in franchise history with 2,000+ scrimmage yards in a single season.</li> <li>• <b>Gurley</b> rushed for 152 yards with three touchdowns and added a touchdown catch in the Rams' 42-7 win at Seattle in Week 15. Gurley joined Pro Football Hall of Famer <b>MARSHALL FAULK</b> (October 20, 2002) as the only Rams in franchise history to have at least 150 rushing yards, three rushing touchdowns and a receiving touchdown in a single game.</li> <li>• QB <b>JARED GOFF</b> passed for at least 300 yards and three touchdowns with no interceptions in Weeks 9 and 10 and became the first player in franchise history to pass for 300+ yards and three touchdowns with no interceptions in consecutive games.</li> <li>• <b>Goff</b> threw a 94-yard touchdown pass to WR <b>ROBERT WOODS</b> in Week 10, the third-longest offensive play from scrimmage in franchise history and the longest since 1964.</li> </ul>

	<ul style="list-style-type: none"> <li>• DT <b>AARON DONALD</b> led the team with 11 sacks and has 39 career sacks, the most by a defensive tackle in team history.</li> <li>• Became the first team in NFL history to record two interception-return touchdowns and a safety in a season opener.</li> </ul>
<b>MIAMI DOLPHINS</b>	<ul style="list-style-type: none"> <li>• WR <b>JARVIS LANDRY</b> led the NFL with 112 receptions, the most in a single season in team history.  <b>Landry</b>, who had 110 receptions in 2015, became the first player in franchise history with multiple 100-catch seasons.</li> <li>• RB <b>KENYAN DRAKE</b> rushed for 114 yards and had five receptions for 79 yards in the Dolphins' Week 14 win against New England. Drake is the third player in franchise history with at least 100 rushing yards and 75 receiving yards in a single game.</li> <li>• DE <b>CAMERON WAKE</b> has 92 career sacks, the second-most in franchise history.</li> <li>• In Week 13, joined the 1927 New York Giants and 1961 Washington Redskins as the only teams in NFL history with two safeties and an interception-return touchdown in the same game.</li> </ul>
<b>MINNESOTA VIKINGS</b>	<ul style="list-style-type: none"> <li>• Won the NFC North division title for the second time in three years.</li> <li>• Ranked first in the NFL in total defense (275.9 yards per game) and scoring defense (15.8 points per game).  Held opponents to a 25.2 percent third-down conversion rate, the best mark in the NFL since the stat began being tracked in 1991.</li> <li>• QB <b>CASE KEENUM</b> posted a passer rating of at least 100 in four consecutive games (Weeks 10-13) and tied Pro Football Hall of Famer <b>BRETT FAVRE</b> (2009) and <b>DAUNTE CULPEPPER</b> (2000 and 2004) for the longest streak in franchise history.</li> <li>• <b>Keenum</b> completed 25 of 33 passes (75.8 percent) for 369 yards with three touchdowns and no interceptions in Week 3. Keenum became the second quarterback in franchise history (<b>TOMMY KRAMER</b>, December 14, 1980 vs. Cleveland) to complete at least 75 percent of his passes with at least 360 passing yards, three touchdown passes and no interceptions in a single game.</li> <li>• WR <b>STEFON DIGGS</b> recorded his 200th reception in his 40th career game and surpassed <b>RANDY MOSS</b> (42) and <b>PERCY HARVIN</b> (42) for the fewest games to reach the mark in franchise history.</li> <li>• TE <b>KYLE RUDOLPH</b> has 37 career touchdown catches, the most by a tight end in franchise history.</li> <li>• DE <b>EVERSON GRIFFEN</b> had at least one sack in eight consecutive games (Weeks 1-8), tied for the longest streak in team history.</li> </ul>
<b>NEW ENGLAND PATRIOTS</b>	<ul style="list-style-type: none"> <li>• Won the AFC East division title for the ninth consecutive season, the longest streak in NFL history.</li> <li>• Recorded their 17th consecutive season with a winning record, the longest streak since 1970, surpassing the previous record of 16 held by the 1970-1985 Dallas Cowboys and 1983-1998 San Francisco 49ers.</li> </ul>

	<ul style="list-style-type: none"> <li>• Registered their seventh season with at least 13 victories (13-3), the second-most 13-win seasons in NFL history (San Francisco, nine).</li> <li>• Produced their eighth consecutive season with at least 12 wins, surpassing the 2003-09 Indianapolis Colts for the longest such streak in NFL history.</li> <li>• Led the NFL in total offense (394.2 yards per game) and ranked first in the AFC averaging 28.6 points per game.</li> <li>• Head coach <b>BILL BELICHICK</b> has 276 career victories (including the postseason) and surpassed Pro Football Hall of Famer <b>TOM LANDRY</b> (270) for the third-most wins by a head coach in NFL history. Only Pro Football Hall of Famers <b>DON SHULA</b> (347) and <b>GEORGE HALAS</b> (324) have more career victories.</li> <li>• QB <b>TOM BRADY</b> threw eight touchdowns to TE <b>ROB GRONKOWSKI</b> this season. The two have connected on 75 career touchdown passes, the second-most from a quarterback to a tight end in NFL history.</li> </ul>
